With reference to Senator McCarthy's inquiry concerning [redacted] the Baltimore office has ascertained that a young lady by this name, approximately 23 years of age, resided with her mother, [redacted] in Baltimore until last year, by which time they moved to New York City leaving a forwarding address of [redacted] New York City 21, New York.

The Baltimore Office ascertained that in 1936 this young lady attended Holy Name Academy in Seattle, Washington, and one person contacted indicated that at one time the mother and daughter lived in California. Apparently [redacted] is planning to study voice and modeling in New York City.

My dear Senator:

It gives me great pleasure to extend to you this invitation to deliver the graduation address on the occasion of the graduation of the Thirty-seventh Session of the FBI National Academy on Friday, March 26, 1948. The graduation exercises will be held in the Departmental Auditorium located on Constitution Avenue between Twelfth and Fourteenth Streets, N. W., and will begin at 10:30 A.M. There is always a capacity audience of approximately 1,500 persons in attendance.

The FBI National Academy was established by this Bureau in 1935 for the purpose of training state, county, and local law enforcement officers in advanced methods and techniques of law enforcement. Since the establishment of the Academy, 1,748 officers representing all of the United States, its possessions, and many foreign countries have been graduated. The present class consists of fifty-eight police officers, among which is one from Egypt, one from Canada, and one from Puerto Rico.

Included among the previous speakers at these graduation exercises are the late Frank Knox, former Secretary of the Navy, former Commandant of the United States Marine Corps General A. A. Vandegrift, former Fleet Admiral of the Navy Ernest J. King, Associate Justice William O. Douglas of the United States Supreme Court, Cardinal Francis Spellman, Mr. Arthur Hays Sulzberger of the New York Times, United States Senators Patrick A. McCarran of Nevada, Elbert D. Thomas of Utah, Homer Ferguson of Michigan, Styles Bridges of New Hampshire, and Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin, and men prominent in the business world.

I am sure that the members of the present class will be deeply honored by your acceptance of this invitation. I assure you that all of us in the FBI would likewise feel it a distinct honor if you could be with us on this occasion. I am looking forward to receiving a favorable reply from you, and if there is any further information which you would like to have, please let me know.

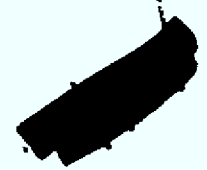

**COAR:**

This is Washington ... and this is your radio corres-  
pondent Bob Blake again inviting you to sit in on an  
informal talk with Senator Joe McCarthy of Wisconsin.  
Each week at this time by transcription, this station  
brings you Senator McCarthy speaking directly from his  
office in the United States Capitol ... so that you may  
know what is going on in Washington. On this broadcast,  
Senator McCarthy has as his guest J. Edgar Hoover --  
Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. At  
this point, Senator, I'm going to turn the program  
directly over to you so that you may introduce your  
guest.

**McCARTHY:**

Mr. Hoover, I certainly appreciate your taking the time  
out of your busy day to appear on this broadcast ...  
and I know that the people in my state will be very  
much interested in what you have to say.

**HOOVER:**

I am very happy, Senator McCarthy, to have this  
opportunity of participating in this program with you.

**McCARTHY:**

You know, Mr. Hoover, we have an unusual situation here  
in Washington where practically every department and  
bureau head comes in for criticism from time to time  
for waste and inefficiency and incompetence in his  
department. But, without a doubt, you stand out as  
the great exception. The FBI, I would say, is the

only bureau in Washington that gets the highest praise from everyone. Republicans and Democrats alike agree that you are doing a phenomenally good job. And that's quite an accomplishment--remaining a completely non-partisan figure respected by all sides--in this political city of Washington.

**HOOVER:** Thank you, Senator McCarthy. Of course, it is of prime importance in our type of work that we remain non-partisan.

**McCARTHY:** One thing that has impressed everyone was the way in which the FBI went into action at the beginning of the last war. Within a matter of hours after Pearl Harbor was hit, the FBI had picked up practically every potential saboteur and dangerous enemy agent. I think it is almost unbelievable that we had practically no sabotage in this country during the war. This was almost entirely due to the FBI.

**HOOVER:** Yes, with the cooperation of local law enforcement agencies, we were able, a few hours after Pearl Harbor, to render ineffective thousands of Japanese, German and Italian alien enemies considered dangerous to our internal security. This feat was rendered possible only by meticulous and careful advance planning, of course.

**McCARTHY:** Well, Mr. Hoover, I hope we have that kind of luck if another war should start. This is one of the main things that concerns your department, of course ...



and it is one reason why many of us feel you should have more men in the FBI at this time.

**HOOVER:** Our work load increased tremendously last year, Senator McCarthy, and if new assignments are given us we will need additional personnel. At this time we, of course, could do a more effective job with additional personnel.

**McCARTHY:** The thought occurs to me, Mr. Hoover, that many of our listeners would like to hear -- not about the spectacular things which the FBI does and which they read about in the papers -- but rather about how the FBI operates and the type of work it handles.

**HOOVER:** I'll be glad to explain that, Senator McCarthy. The FBI, as you know, is the investigative arm of the United States Department of Justice. We are charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States, collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest, and in performing other duties imposed by law. At the present time we have investigative jurisdiction over more than 120 different violations.

**McCARTHY:** The FBI then is strictly an investigative organization.

**HOOVER:** That is correct, Senator McCarthy. Ours is strictly a fact-finding function. We do not pass judgment on the evidence we collect or determine whether there is to be prosecution. That is the function of the Department of Justice officials or the United States Attorneys.

Our job is to obtain, impartially and fairly, all available facts.

**McCARTHY:** And to do this you have offices throughout the country?

**HOOVER:** Yes, the FBI at present has 51 field divisions, including offices in Hawaii, Alaska and Puerto Rico. Our offices are located in the major cities. In addition, our Agents are so assigned in the field that in cases of emergency they could be in any locality within a very short period of time.

**McCARTHY:** Many times, Mr. Hoover, I have had occasion to meet Special Agents of the FBI ... and they have been without exception men of the highest intellectual and moral caliber. Would you say a few words about the qualifications for the position of Special Agent.

**HOOVER:** The Special Agent applicant at present must be a graduate of either a duly accredited law or accounting school. He must be between the ages of 25 and 41, a citizen of the United States, willing to serve wherever he is needed, and in excellent physical condition. If the applicant possesses these basic qualifications and is successful in passing <sup>our</sup> examination, his character and fitness become the object of a searching investigation.

**McCARTHY:** Now, Mr. Hoover, here is a question I am sure a great many of our listeners would like answered. In what way can the FBI, as a Federal investigative agency, be of assistance to local law enforcement?

**HOOVER:**

In many ways, Senator McCarthy. The FBI is a service organization, dedicated to making law and order a reality throughout the nation. The FBI, in fact, is a clearing house, bulging with information, facilities and technical know-how, which are daily rendering invaluable assistance to law enforcement. Let me illustrate by mentioning a few of the facilities. First, there is the FBI Laboratory. The Laboratory, by applying science to crime detection, has opened an avenue of unlimited possibilities to the peace officer. Crimes which previously had baffled the best known investigative techniques can now, with the aid of science, be solved. The puzzle of yesterday becomes the fact of today. The FBI Laboratory is staffed with highly trained technicians utilizing the latest available scientific instruments. A scrap of paper, a smudge of dirt, or a splinter of glass, when examined, may be the clue which will solve the case.

**MCCARTHY:**

And the services of this FBI Laboratory are available to local law enforcement agencies throughout the country?

**HOOVER:**

That is correct, Senator McCarthy. The Laboratory will examine, free of charge, evidence submitted by a constituted law enforcement agency in connection with a local case. Later, in event that the case goes to trial, an FBI examiner will testify, without cost to the local agency, as to the results of the scientific examination conducted.

**McCARTHY:**

*I well remember, Mr. Hoover, during my work as a judge, the great service which the FBI rendered many times. This type of cooperation -- or teamwork -- between the FBI and local and state law enforcement agencies, has impressed me very much in the contacts I have had with the FBI. I wish you would tell our listeners, Mr. Hoover, some of the other methods by which the FBI assists the local officer.*

**HOOVER:**

*Well, Senator McCarthy, as you know, one of the most important ways in which we can help local officers is in the identification of dangerous fugitives. Fingerprints, of course, assist in this and furnish information about the previous criminal history of a prisoner. A set of fingerprints received in the Identification Division in the morning may result in the apprehension of a badly wanted fugitive before nightfall. A fingerprint left on a piece of evidence by the criminal may be the clue to effect his apprehension later. The FBI at present has over 111,000,000 sets of fingerprints. Of this total, roughly 18 million are criminal prints, representing approximately  $7\frac{1}{2}$  million individuals. The remainder, or more than 80 per cent, are in the non-criminal files. I might point out, Senator McCarthy, that fingerprints are constantly performing many humanitarian needs ... such as identifying amnesia victims, locating missing persons and helping identify*

victims, otherwise unidentifiable, of tragedies, such as fires, floods and airplane crashes.

**MCCARTHY:** And then, in addition to this service, Mr. Hoover, doesn't the FBI conduct a training school for selected local officers?

**HOOVER:** Yes, Senator McCarthy, the FBI National Academy was established in 1935 for the purpose of training carefully selected representatives of local, county and state law enforcement agencies as police instructors. Nearly 2,000 men, representing every state in the Union and several foreign countries, have been graduated from the Academy. These men, upon graduation, return to their respective departments and in turn set up training schools for their brother officers.

**MCCARTHY:** This is a very important and valuable service. Tell me, Mr. Hoover, in your opinion just how serious is the crime situation today?

**HOOVER:** It is a very serious situation, Senator McCarthy. During 1948 there were more than a million and a half serious crimes, or, roughly speaking, one serious crime every 18 seconds. That is a situation which calls for attention from all elements of society. The latest available statistics reflect that the crime rates in 1948 were substantially higher than in the pre-war period. The most tragic point of the entire crime

picture, in my opinion, is the arrest figures of boys and girls under 21 years of age. In 1948, boys and girls under 21 constituted 15.8 per cent of the total number of individuals arrested and fingerprinted. Beyond that, as every law enforcement knows, the crime problem is essentially a youth problem.

**McCARTHY:**

Yes, and it is a joint problem -- it is the task of the home, church, school and the law enforcement agency to work together now -- not tomorrow -- to eliminate the dangers of juvenile delinquency. I want to mention, Mr. Hoover, another phase of the FBI's work, a highly important phase -- namely, the FBI's responsibility for the internal security of the United States. The American people, to my mind, are very much aware of the menace of Communism. The mail which I receive from my people in Wisconsin shows that they are acutely aware of the dangers of this godless, materialistic doctrine.

**HOOPER:**

Communism, Senator McCarthy, represents a dangerous threat to the internal security of this nation. The Communists, with malicious intention and deliberate calculation, are assaulting the bulwarks of American democracy. The outcome of the present world-wide struggle between totalitarian Communism and democratic precepts for the minds of men will shape our lives

for years to come. The FBI, by Presidential Directive and by Acts of Congress, is charged with the protection of the internal security of this nation. We are alert to the dangers posed by Communism. We are prepared, in event of a sudden national emergency, to render harmless Communists or other enemies deemed dangerous to the country's security.

**McCARTHY:** I think our listeners might also be interested, Mr. Hoover, in knowing what the FBI is doing with regard to keeping Communist Party members out of the employment of the Federal Government. In other words, just how does the FBI fit into the Loyalty Program?

**HOOVER:** The FBI has the responsibility of checking the names and fingerprints of Federal employees through its files. Then, if information is developed coming within the standards set forth in the President's Executive Order, we make a full field investigation. The FBI makes no recommendations and draws no conclusions; however, as that is the responsibility of the various Loyalty Hearing Boards. You might be interested in knowing, Senator, that the FBI has returned 99.6 per cent of the Federal Employee Loyalty Forms to the Civil Service Commission with the notation "No Disloyal Data."

**McCARTHY:** I see our time is up, Mr. Hoover. Thank you for joining me today on this program ... your remarks have been very interesting and reassuring.

**COAR:**

Today we have brought you J. Edgar Hoover with Senator Joe McCarthy on this weekly program. Each week at this same time this program is brought to you by this station as a public service. We invite you to tune in again next week when Senator Joe McCarthy reports from Washington. This program was electrically transcribed in the Nation's Capitol.

MR. HOOVER:

I am glad to be with you, Senator. I appreciate your keen understanding of the problems of law enforcement and the FBI. Your service as a Judge in Wisconsin and now as a member of the United States Senate gives you a vantage point to analyze and study the role of law enforcement in America today.

SENATOR MCCARTHY:

Yes, it does, Mr. Hoover. The law enforcement profession is today a vital cog in the machinery of our everyday living. The peace officer each day performs many tasks vital to the welfare of the nation. He has become the sentinel of society, the individual who stands ready, day and night, to protect the community against the attacks of the evildoer. And moreover, year after year, his tasks and responsibilities have become more numerous, complex and urgent.

MR. HOOVER:

How true your observations are, Senator McCarthy. The past generation has wrought many changes in law enforcement work. The peace officer was expected to keep law and order on the city streets and to guard property at night. Technical equipment and specialized training of personnel were virtually unknown. importance to the citizens of the country.

**SENATOR McCARTHY:** And law enforcement in the United States, unlike the systems in some other countries, like Nazi Germany or Communist Russia, has grown up in the democratic tradition.

**MR. HOOVER:** I have no doubts as to the accuracy of that statement, Senator. Law enforcement in this country has developed in the democratic tradition. **MR. HOOVER:** The key to success in law enforcement, as in many other types of work, is teamwork. We are all members of the same team, working toward the same goal. The more we work together the greater will be our service to the community.

**SENATOR McCARTHY:** Cooperation of this type, I think, is the best answer to those critics who say that the United States, in order to overcome geographical difficulties and concurrent jurisdictions, needs a national police system.

**MR. HOOVER:** The national teamwork of law enforcement is indeed the best answer to these individuals. America has no place for a national police. Such would be contrary to the fundamental precepts of our form of government. It could only lead to the abuse of civil rights and to a lack of responsiveness to the will of the people. The present setup of local, state and Federal agencies, each in turn responsible directly or indirectly to the general public, is the very essence of our system of law enforcement. The present system is now solving and, I am confident, will continue to solve the problems facing us.

**SENATOR McCARTHY:** Now, Mr. Hoover, as Director of the FBI, would you briefly tell our listeners something about the work of the FBI?

**MR. HOOVER:** It would be a pleasure, Senator McCarthy. The FBI is the investigative arm of the United States Department of Justice. We are charged with the duty of investigating violations of the laws of the United States, collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest and performing other duties imposed by law. At the present time we have investigative jurisdiction over more than 120 different violations, and each year we are receiving additional responsibilities.

**SENATOR McCARTHY:** The FBI is then strictly an investigative organization.

**MR. HOOVER:** That is correct. Ours is strictly a fact-finding function. We do not pass judgment on the evidence we collect or determine whether there is to be prosecution. That is the function of Department of Justice officials or the United States Attorneys. Our job is to obtain, impartially and fairly, all available facts.

**SENATOR McCARTHY:** Many of your investigations, Mr. Hoover, are conducted on a

nationwide basis. This necessarily means that the FBI must have many offices throughout the country.

MR. HOOVER: Yes, it does. The FBI at present has 51 field divisions, including offices in Hawaii, Alaska and Puerto Rico. Our offices are located in the major cities. In addition, we have sub-offices, known as Resident Agencies, in many other cities and towns. In this way, FBI Agents are able to handle very quickly violations of Federal laws within our investigative jurisdiction any place in the nation.

SENATOR McCARTHY: Many times, Mr. Hoover, during the course of my public life, I have had occasion to meet Special Agents of the FBI. They have been without exception men of the highest intellectual and moral caliber. Could you say a few words about the qualifications for the position of Special Agent?

MR. HOOVER: The Special Agent applicant at present must be a graduate of either a duly accredited law or accounting school. He must be between the ages of 25 and 41, a citizen of the United States, willing to serve wherever he is needed, and in excellent physical condition. If the applicant possesses these basic qualifications he is given at the time of his application for employment, a written examination which has been designed primarily to test his aptitude for our work. In addition, before offering him an appointment, the FBI will conduct a thorough and searching character and fitness investigation.

SENATOR McCARTHY: What kind of training is the new Agent given?

MR. HOOVER: The new Agent, upon reporting for duty, attends the FBI Academy for 12 weeks. This training program, which is conducted by our own staff, is designed to acquaint the Special Agent with the

problems which he will later encounter in actual investigative work in the field. He is given instruction in a number of subjects, such as Federal procedure, investigative techniques, fingerprints and use of scientific aids in criminal investigation. In addition, the new Agent is given a thorough training in the use of firearms on the FBI ranges at Quantico, Virginia.

SENATOR McCARTHY: Firearms represent a very essential part of law enforcement work. Thorough and meticulous training in the use of the various weapons may save the peace officer's life. Being a veteran of the Marine Corps, I know that advance training of this nature is of the most vital importance.

MR. HOOVER: It certainly is, Senator. In a gun battle with a dangerous criminal this training may prove the law enforcement officer's margin of victory.

SENATOR McCARTHY: Now Mr. Hoover, here is a question which will be of great interest to many of our listeners. In what way can the FBI, as a Federal investigative agency, be of assistance to local law enforcement?

MR. HOOVER: In many ways, Senator McCarthy. The FBI is a service organization, dedicated to making law and order a reality throughout the nation. We attempt in every possible way to help other law enforcement agencies. The FBI, in fact, is a clearinghouse bulging with information, facilities and technical know-how, which are daily rendering invaluable assistance to law enforcement. Let me illustrate by mentioning a few of the facilities. First, there is the FBI Laboratory. The Laboratory, by applying science to crime detection, has opened an avenue of unlimited possibilities to the peace officer. Cases which previously had

baffled the best investigative techniques can now, with the aid of science, be solved. The puzzle of yesterday becomes the fact of today. The FBI Laboratory is staffed with highly trained technicians utilizing the latest available scientific instruments. A scrap of paper, a smudge of dirt, or a splinter of glass, when examined under the enlightening glow of science, may be the clue which will solve the case. The FBI Laboratory will examine, free of charge, evidence submitted by a constituted law enforcement agency in connection with a local case. Later, in event that case goes to trial, an FBI examiner will testify, without cost to the local agency, as to the nature of the scientific examination conducted. Law enforcement agencies in every section of the nation are utilizing the facilities of the Laboratory.

**SENATOR McCARTHY:** The FBI Laboratory might be well termed the "good right arm of law enforcement." I very vividly remember, during my work as a Judge, the great service which science rendered in the field of crime detection. The guilty culprit was apprehended in many cases through the help of science, when without this aid he might have gone undetected. But, Mr. Hoover, what are some of the other methods whereby the FBI may assist the local officer?

**MR. HOOVER:** Fingerprints day after day are performing miracles of accomplishment in the interest of better law and order. Fingerprints assist in the location of dangerous fugitives, furnish information about the previous criminal history of a prisoner, and help to establish the identity of individuals. A set of fingerprints received in the Identification Division in the morning may result in the apprehension of a badly wanted fugitive before nightfall. A latent fingerprint

left on a piece of evidence by the evildoer may be the clue to effect his apprehension later. Law enforcement agencies throughout the country utilize, free of charge, the facilities of the FBI's Identification Division. The FBI at present has over 111,000,000 sets of fingerprints. Of this total roughly 18 million are criminal prints, representing approximately 7½ million individuals. The remainder, or more than 80 per cent, are in the noncriminal files. I might point out, Senator, that fingerprints are constantly performing many humanitarian needs, such as identifying amnesia victims, locating missing persons and helping identify victims, otherwise unidentifiable, of tragedies, such as fire, flood and airplane crashes.

SENATOR McCARTHY: And then, Mr. Hoover, doesn't the FBI conduct a training school for selected local officers?

It is estimated that during these fourteen years over 100,000 police officers have received the benefits of this specialized training.

SENATOR McCARTHY: The FBI, besides carrying out its own many and varied responsibilities, finds time to render a great deal of assistance to local law enforcement. And by helping police departments, sheriffs and village constables in handling their problems, the FBI is indeed



promoting the welfare of every individual citizen in the country. Another question, Mr. Hoover, which I know greatly concerns every listener is the problem of current trends in crime. Just how serious is the crime situation today?

MR. HOOVER: Senator McCarthy, the crime problem in America today is serious. During 1948 there were an estimated 1,686,870 crimes, or roughly one serious crime every 18.7 seconds. That is a situation which calls for attention from all elements of society. The latest available statistics reflect that the crime rates in 1948 were substantially higher than in the prewar period. For example, reports from 373 cities with populations in excess of 25,000, indicate that only negligent manslaughter and auto thefts have declined to points below the prewar average of 1938-1941. Aggravated assaults and rapes in the larger communities reached peaks in 1948 of 68.7 per cent and 49.9 per cent respectively over the 1938-1941 average. Other crimes committed in 1948 which still exceed this prewar level are: burglary, 16.7 per cent; murder, 14.1 per cent and robbery, 8.9 per cent. Larceny, while declining during the war years, is on the increase and in 1948 was 4.6 per cent in excess of the prewar averages.

SENATOR McCARTHY: The figures you quote are indeed shocking. They signify in unmistakable fashion that crime today is a disease gnawing at the very heart of American life. Imperative action is needed now, before it is too late.

MR. HOOVER: The most tragic point of the entire crime picture, in my opinion, is the arrest figures of boys and girls under 21 years of age. In 1948, males and females under 21 constituted 15.3 per cent of the

total number of individuals arrested and fingerprinted. And we should remember, Senator, that the number of arrest records is doubtless incomplete in the lower age groups because of the practice of some jurisdictions not to fingerprint youthful offenders. These figures should cause America to pause and think. Children are the heirs apparent of the future. They will become the leaders of tomorrow. The juvenile, by attacking the laws of society, is forfeiting his opportunity to contribute to the good of the community. It is our problem, the task of the home, church, school, law enforcement agency, to work together now, not tomorrow, to eliminate the dangers of juvenile delinquency.

SENATOR McCARTHY: I want to mention, Mr. Hoover, another phase of the FBI's work, a highly important phase, namely the FBI's responsibility for the internal security of the United States. The American people, to my mind, are giving urgent attention to the menace of Communism. The mail which I receive from my constituents in Wisconsin reflects that they are acutely aware of the dangers of this godless, materialistic doctrine.

MR. HOOVER: Communism, Senator McCarthy, represents a dynamic threat to the internal security of this nation. The Communists, with malicious intention and deliberate calculation, are assaulting the bulwarks of American democracy. The outcome of the present world-wide struggle between totalitarian Communism and democratic precepts for the minds of men will shape our lives for years to come. Communism degrades the dignity of man and belittles the accomplishments of the independent mind. The Communists desire the creation of a "Soviet America," an America in which the cherished liberties of our forefathers, such as freedom of speech, freedom of religion and habeas corpus, will have

been abolished. Communism decries spiritual values, disparages moral compunctions, forbids criticism. The victory of Communism in the United States would extinguish the lights of progress and plunge humanity down into an abyss of slavery. The FBI, by Presidential Directive and by Acts of Congress, is charged with the protection of the internal security of this nation. We are alert to the dangers posed by Communism. We are carrying out prearranged plans, in event of a sudden national emergency, to render harmless Communists deemed dangerous to the country's security. The FBI, in cooperation with local law enforcement agencies, was able within a few hours after Pearl Harbor to render ineffective thousands of Japanese, German and Italian aliens considered dangerous to our war economy. This feat was rendered possible only by meticulous and careful advance planning. The FBI today has similar plans in operation. In event of an emergency the FBI will spring into instantaneous action against the new enemies of America.

SENATOR McCARTHY: Your comments, Mr. Hoover, are indeed reassuring.

MR. HOOVER: Thank you for your kind observations. The interest taken by citizens and public officials, like yourself, Senator McCarthy, has enabled the FBI to become a service institution dedicated to the welfare of the people. We are indeed grateful for the trust which has been <sup>placed</sup> ~~imposed~~ in us.

He will return to Phoenix Friday, November 4, and depart on the American Airlines at 11:45 p.m., arriving in Washington at 11:25 a.m. He seems to be enjoying himself out here and has done a lot of horseback riding. He is sold on the climate. He thinks you and the Director should come out this way.

I plan on taking him to his plane Friday night. He is most appreciative of our having provided him with transportation since he has been here.

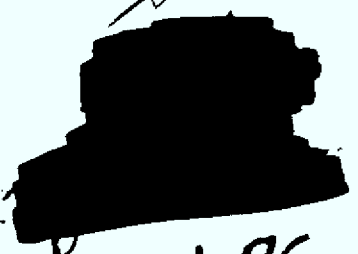

# Sen. McCarthy Cheered by People Back Home

By FRANK CONNIFF

WASHINGTON, June 14.—Sen. Joseph McCarthy passed a major milestone over the weekend in his fight against Communists-in-Government when he went back to the hustings to take the pulse of the people on 1950's most controversial political issue.

News of the uproarious welcome which greeted the tough, free-wheeling Irishman on his native soil has wafted back to the radar net here in sensitive Washington and created a deep impression among vote-conscious politicians. Republican Wisconsin roared a thumping endorsement amidst scenes of enthusiasm virtually without parallel in the staid old city of Milwaukee.

Now do not assume for a moment that Sen. McCarthy had taken the tumultuous reception for granted in advance. This was his first report back to the people who put him in office since the big rhubarb began four months ago.

In the interim he had been exposed to one of the most concerted and vicious campaigns of abuse in American political history and he had no way of knowing how much of the filth had rubbed off on the electorate.

True, the mail from back home had been overwhelmingly in his favor, always a pretty sharp index that the folks like what their man in Washington is doing. But his enemies had been tireless in their efforts to spread the campaign of vilification and a section of the reactionary press had gleefully belabored him from their editorial pill-boxes.

So Joe McCarthy was genuinely surprised and gratified by the

spontaneity of his Milwaukee welcome. He was given a standing ovation of ten minutes when introduced to the audience. His bristling attack on State Department appeasers was punctuated 17 times by applause in the space of a half-hour. He was mobbed by back-slappers and autograph-seekers when he had finished. All in all, it was one of the most triumphant returns to the people ever registered by an elected representative.

Republican gatherings in recent years have never been noted for their elan or sparkle. But this one in Milwaukee caught fire when Joe McCarthy strode to the microphones to pour it on. He was a happy and gratified man when he got back to Washington after that exhilarating experience.

The grass roots success of McCarthy, as opposed to the fierce prickling he has endured from "liberal" and leftist commentators, illustrates, I believe, the ability of common, ordinary people to pierce the fog obscurantist abuse and get down to the hard core of a given situation.

A people startled by the Hiss, Gold, and Fuchs betrayals, jarred by the contradictions of Yalta and Potsdam, made ill by the noisome fumes of the Amerasia mess, are not going to pull up on McCarthy simply because he has grated against the sensibilities of a few "liberals."

Here in Washington even the Senator's worst detractors concede that the Communists did indeed penetrate deeply into important Government agencies.

do not deny the validity of McCarthy's objectives; they concentrate their fire on what they call his "methods." There will now be a brief pause while everyone recalls that this was the identical objection raised against the House Committee on Un-American Activities when it was baking a cake under Alger Hiss, the Hollywood ten, and other acknowledged or convicted Communist agents.

With their innate good sense, the big mass of Americans have long known that something was stinking in a State Department which haplessly prepared our total diplomatic failure in China. What is more important, they have grasped the fact that the liquidation of tough, resilient traitors of the Hiss type cannot be accomplished in a lightning war-of-movement. They know that it can only be achieved by the steady, slogging siege warfare that requires the stubborn perseverance of a Joe McCarthy for successful execution.

That is why the immense torrent of abuse sprayed upon the Wisconsin strong boy has failed to dent his hold upon the rank-and-file. That is why the home folks blew their tops with unwonted Republican exuberance in Milwaukee. Joe McCarthy is fighting the good fight and the people know it, bless them. And if you have the people with you, who needs the "liberals"?

Reference is made to my conversation with Mr. D. M. Ladd this date advising of the unfortunate incident of Miss Kerr suffering a fall on the evening of December 7, which later was determined to have resulted in a fracture of the right hip. As I indicated, two of the Special Agents of the office and I were showing Miss Kerr one of the nicer private homes on the Island, and at approximately 6:30 p.m., after dark, we were leaving this residence to return her to the hotel so that she could fulfill a dinner engagement. I was escorting Miss Kerr down an outside stone stairway leading to the garage and parking area of this residence, and both she and I tripped and fell over an unbarricaded ledge, falling some four or five feet to the asphalt parking area at this residence.

~~DEFERRED RECORDING~~

Miss Kerr was immediately taken back to her room at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel with utmost care, and a physician was called immediately, who, after preliminary examination, advised that there appeared to be no fracture, but that X-rays would be necessary to confirm this fact.

On the afternoon of December 8, Miss Kerr was taken to the Honolulu Clinic by me personally, where X-rays determined that she did in fact have a fracture of the right hip. The pelvis bone was not broken, and Mr. Warren White, who is considered one of the eminent bone specialists in the country, advised that it was not a serious fracture. A consultation was held on the early evening of December 8, and it was decided that an operation setting the fracture would take place on the morning of December 9. It was learned through the doctor that Miss Kerr will probably be hospitalized for about a period of three weeks.

I notified Mr. Ladd the first thing Saturday morning, December 9, as I felt that you would possibly desire to assure Senator McCarthy that Miss Kerr was receiving the very best of medical care, and that every consideration possible was being extended by the Honolulu Office of the FBI.

As I indicated in my radiogram of December 9, the operation setting Miss Kerr's fracture was completely successful, and full recovery is assured. She is presently a patient at Queens Hospital in Honolulu, which is the best hospital in the city. Every consideration is being given and will continue to be given to assure her of every comfort.

As I indicated in a previous radiogram, Miss Kerr has been vacationing with [REDACTED] who are forced to return to the Mainland on December 16. Miss Kerr will be visited daily, and you may be assured that I will keep you advised currently as to her condition. b7c

Reference is made to Bureau radiogram this date entitled, "Miss JEAN KERR" requesting advice as to when Miss KERR first arrived in Honolulu, when first contacted by me and any courtesies extended to her prior to her accidental fall.

This is to advise that Miss KERR first arrived in Honolulu on November 22nd, having traveled from the mainland on the SS MALINE. On November 25th Bureau radiogram was received requesting that she be contacted and extended any and all courtesies. On that same date I contacted Miss KERR and from her found that she was vacationing at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel with her personal friends, formerly of Washington, D.C. [redacted] It was also learned from Miss KERR that [redacted] was then ill with a bad cold and virus infection and Miss KERR intended to spend the next few days caring for her friend. However, a luncheon engagement was arranged and the writer and his wife took Miss KERR to lunch at one of the typical nicer Hawaiian restaurants on Saturday, December 2nd. On the following Tuesday she was taken by my wife and me for a drive about the Island so as to show her points of interest and scenic views. A dinner party was planned for Miss KERR and her friends on December 11th and or other tentatively scheduled later in the week. On the afternoon of December 7th I had introduced Miss KERR to two of the single agents of the office and it was when showing her one of the nice private residences on the Island that Miss KERR suffered the unfortunate accidental fall, the details of which have been previously furnished the Bureau.

In my radiogram of December 7th, I indicated that a letter would follow outlining the courtesies which were extended to Miss KERR and her party. When Miss KERR suffered the fall on December 7th, her welfare, of course, became of paramount importance to me and the Bureau and in my conversation with Mr. Ladd and letter of December 9th, I inadvertently omitted furnishing the information outlined in the foregoing part of this letter but dealt only with the details of Miss KERR's condition.

As I indicated that I would do in my letter of December 9th, I have daily personally visited Miss KEPP at Queen's Hospital. She has been extremely cheerful and in good spirits notwithstanding the natural discomforts as a result of the aftereffects of the operation setting her fracture. Today, for the first time since the operation, the bone surgeon permitted her to sit up in a wheelchair. The surgeon is most pleased with her progress and she was extremely happy. In addition to my visits to the hospital, I wish to advise that other agents of the office and some of the wives have also visited her and taken flowers, gifts, etc. She has repeatedly expressed to me her appreciation of the kindnesses and attention which our personnel have shown her.

[REDACTED] and I are looking into the matter of insurance with a view toward compensation for the medical expenses involved. When some definite details are known in this connection the Bureau will be advised.

In conclusion I can state that the personnel of the Honolulu Office, their wives and I will continue to do everything we can to have Miss KEPP's stay in Honolulu as comfortable and pleasant as possible.



DATE: April 30, 1951

On the afternoon of April 27, Jack Anderson, associated with Drew Pearson, called. After discussing another matter which is the subject of a separate communication, Anderson stated that they would like to know about the incident in Hawaii where Jean Kerr broke her hip, how she broke her hip and why she was with Joe Logue. He stated that they had been informed that Jean Kerr had produced a letter sent by somebody in the Bureau introducing her to Joe Logue requesting that the local office extend services to her, and that he presumed the letter was signed by "Hoover." He would like to know how come "Hoover" signed that kind of a letter to an employee of McCarthy. I told Anderson that I would check on it.

Sunday afternoon, while discussing other matters with Anderson, I advised him that I had made a check and that no such letter of introduction had been given to Jean Kerr; that, however, the Honolulu Office had been advised of her visit and told to extend such courtesies as possible as we would to any Senator or Congressman or their Administrative Assistants.

I told him that while no letter of introduction was sent in this case, had such a letter been sent, it would have been the same as the action of the Director in giving Drew Pearson a letter of introduction to Scotland Yard and contacting Scotland Yard to extend courtesies to him at a time when Drew Pearson was in need of aid and assistance.

Anderson stated that they had been told on good authority that such a letter had been written. I told him that their authority was not very good.

He asked about how it was that she broke her hip. I told Anderson that Joe Logue had taken her to visit a private residence and the accident occurred shortly after 6:30 P.M. when it was dark. I told him he would observe this was also after office hours; that Miss Kerr had broken her hip and that was all there was to it.

He stated that the reason he was calling was to determine whether this was true because if it was then it was evidence of a connection between the Bureau and Senator McCarthy. I told him there was no such thing as this. He then asked if we were working with

McCarthy. I told him that we steered a middle of the road course with everybody and merely did our duty. He then brought up the [redacted] matter and said that [redacted] had said he was working with Mickey Ladd. He wanted to know if this was true. I told him we were not responsible for what [redacted] did; that obviously if [redacted] or any other person wanted to contact the Bureau and furnish information it was their privilege; that we were a public organization and had to receive such information as they want to impart. He wanted to know if we would give him a statement for the Committee. I told him there was no point in this; that if any member of the Committee had questions they could ask them and we would answer them as we had in the past.

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Before me, the undersigned Notary Public, this day personally appeared Charles Davis, and on oath did depose and say:

1. My name is Charles Davis. I presently reside at 256 West 31 Street, New York, New York. I was born in Dallas, Texas, on November 10, 1927, and attended grade schools and high school in Dallas. I moved to California and graduated from Pasadena High School in Pasadena, California in 1947. I also took some college classes at Pasadena City College in Pasadena, but did not graduate.

2. Between 1948 and September of 1952, I became connected with certain left-wing and communist front student organizations and publications in Southern California. Among these were The Southern Christian Association, the Civil Rights Congress, The California Labor School, and the Peoples' Educational Center located at 1212 Vine Street, Hollywood, California. I also contributed articles and other material to left-wing publications in Southern California. All of the named organizations have at one time or another been exposed as communist front or communist dominated groups.

3. In the early fall of 1952 the California Labor School became interested in having one of its associates go to Europe to participate in communist youth activities in European countries. I left the United States from New York City on September 24, 1952, travelling by the USS Washington, and arrived in Le Havre, France, on October 5, 1952. During the next several weeks I contacted left-wing groups in France, Belgium, Holland and Denmark, and assisted in the preparation of articles for publication in European magazines and newspapers of communist political tendencies. I soon became irritated at the distortion of my experiences with the treatment of my race in the United States and the insistence of my associates on exaggerating and even fabricating those experiences. It seemed to me that their versions of what happened in the United States were so grossly overstated that intelligent people could not believe them.

...in Switzerland, I finally decided to approach consular officials of the United States at Geneva, Switzerland for a dual purpose: I was impressed by the lack of discrimination against my race in Europe and was desirous of applying to become a citizen of Switzerland in some of our foreign countries. It was necessary to have the assistance of consular officials of the United States in order to get a passport to enter a foreign country and enough to become a citizen. My other purpose was that I had decided to discontinue my left-wing activities and felt that information which I had acquired in Europe might be of value to my own country's representatives.

My first contact with the American Consulate at Geneva, Switzerland, was in the latter part of November, 1949. I spoke with Vice Consul S. R. Tyler. Mr. Tyler is a native of Texas, about 35 to 40 years of age, approximately 5'10" tall, weighs around 185 pounds, with a receding hair line. He speaks fluent English and passable French and German. Mr. Tyler introduced me to the Consul General, Mr. Robert C. Ward, and to another member of the staff, Mr. Charles W. Thomas, to both of whom I explained my purposes. Tyler exhibited considerable interest in the information I had acquired in Europe and urged me not to abandon my left-wing connections but to continue them, reporting to him as the contact, any information I could obtain about the activities of French, Swiss, or American youth in various communist front organizations.

During the next several months I made frequent reports to Tyler, orally and in writing, about my movements among left-wing groups and the activities of these groups. Finally, on one occasion in late May, 1950, or early June, 1950, I told Mr. Tyler at one of our meetings that I was ~~desperately in need of financial assistance on the income available to me~~ and that I needed to have a source of income. Up to that time I had received no money from the Consulate General's Office. Tyler volunteered the suggestion that I should get in touch with Justice Joseph McCarthy,

stating that the matter was probably an indication of the type that  
I had a right to expect. The matter was handled in a way that was both  
politically and financially.

4. I then received a letter from Senator McCarthy and finally saw  
some of the details of the matter. I was in the office of the  
Senator at the time, and I recall that I had had a letter, a copy of which  
is no longer available to me and which was written to him on June 5  
and June 10, 1950, I congratulated the Senator on his activities in ex-  
posing communists in the United States, and that I had had left-wing connec-  
tions which I now had repudiated, and that I would be glad to place my  
services at his disposal to help him in his fight against espionage, along with ex-  
posing subversive activities in Europe. As I recall it, I said in the  
letter that it would give me a great pleasure to supply him with any and  
all information I had which would be of value to him in his worthwhile  
campaign. This, of course, is paraphrasing my present recollection of the  
letter.

Some time around the middle of July, 1950, I received a reply to my  
letter. The reply was signed Joseph McCarthy and also by a secretary whose  
name I have now forgotten. The letter consisted of two full paragraphs.  
It welcomed my offer to send information, thanked me for my comments about  
the Senator's campaign and instructed me to send any information I acquired  
either to the Senator's office or to his home address, which, as I recall it,  
was 3315 22nd Street, Washington, D. C.

5. Shortly after receipt of this letter I wrote Senator McCarthy  
again, telling him that I did not consider it wise to send him information  
from abroad by mail, and asking him if it were not possible for me to be  
put in touch with a representative of his in Europe. He replied to this  
letter rather promptly, advising that his man in Europe was John W. Farrant,  
whose address was 27 rue de la Paix, Paris, France, and also stating his tele-  
phone number. The letter said that Mr. Farrant would get in touch with me  
and direct me to the man in Europe. Farrant is now in Paris. This  
same letter also stated that I would be glad to supply the Senator

McCarthy's last any other papers.

After receiving a letter from Senator McCarthy, I left Switzerland and went to Paris, where I attempted to contact the office at No. 2 Avenue Gabriel, Paris, France, No. 1 Avenue Gabriel. I had placed McCarthy's name and address on the telephone which I had placed in my suitcase to call the office in Paris. I called the office in Paris on the telephone, but the person who answered the phone was not McCarthy's friend to talk with Mr. Larkin. She told me that Mr. Larkin was not available for a while but that I could introduce myself at the American Embassy. I did not have a conversation of any kind around the early part of August, 1952. I then called the office in Paris and gave the receptionist in the office my name. I did something concrete by my name to call, she promptly referred me to Vice-Consul Larkin, who occupied Room No. 1 on the first floor of the Embassy Building at 1 Avenue Gabriel. While I was talking with Mr. Larkin, he had come to a Mr. Gray, who shortly joined me in our conference. We talked at length about my activities around the fit-wing groups and both gentlemen urged me to continue those activities and to report to them any information which might be of value to the United States. At this conference there was no discussion of Senator McCarthy or his campaign. They told me that if I was ever picked up by the French police, that I should contact Mr. Larkin, who would take care of the matter. Thereafter, I reported to Mr. Larkin almost daily for several weeks. Mr. Larkin had a touch with Larkin and Gray for about a week and a half, I reported in the morning and was told by him to go to Room 611 at 1 Avenue Gabriel, Paris, France, to the person in that room who would take care of me.

He said that he had a letter from the Senator which identified the Senator as being authorized to represent the Senator in the matter. He then gave me a letter in French and asked if I could translate it for him. I told him that I could and that I would be glad to do so. I told him that I had contacts with left-wing groups in Europe and he presented me the letter which was a letter to a small American committee of little importance but was primarily interested in people who were in high diplomatic posts. I said my best contacts were in Switzerland, which was a territory with which I was quite familiar and that I should be given something to do or to find out in Switzerland. He made notes while I was talking and concluded our conference by saying that he would get in touch with the Senator and discuss an assignment for us in Switzerland. He said that he would get in touch with me later.

10. Ferrand also said that when he got in touch with the Senator he would also obtain funds with which to pay me for going to Switzerland and obtaining information if the project were approved by the Senator.

11. About two weeks later Ferrand came to my hotel again. This time he brought with him between \$150.00 and \$200.00 which he said he had obtained from the Senator through a bank draft via a New York Bank, as I recall it. He gave me the money and told me to proceed to Switzerland and find out anything that I could about possible left-wing political activities or unusual social activities of high diplomatic personnel in Switzerland. He told me specifically that he wanted information about John Carter Vincent including information on both his political and social activities.

12. I proceeded at once to Switzerland, stopping first at Geneva. Through contacts among the Swiss political police I discovered information indicating that Healdy Montes, an English communist with the International Telecommunications Society, was a subscriber to the London Daily Worker, was probably homosexual and was
