On 1/10/53 the attached material was received from the office of Senator McCarthy of Wisconsin. It should be reviewed by you.

By memorandum dated February 7, 1953, Assistant to the Director L. B. Nichols advised: "In Mr. Baumgardner's memorandum of February 3, 1953, inquiry was made as to how the Bureau may use copies of correspondence addressed to Senator McCarthy. I wish to advise that I have specifically raised this problem with Don Surine of Senator McCarthy's Office.

"Surine states that we are authorized to use this material any way we see fit and to say that the material had been referred to the Bureau by Senator McCarthy to disseminate and to conduct any investigation that is suggested by the facts. I told Surine we would do this and to avoid making inquiry in each instance, I inquired whether we could assume that this applied to anything else he might furnish us unless he specifically put a restriction on it. He stated that we could so assume and if there was anything they did not want known came from them, they would so advise us. However, Surine did state with reference to the dissemination of such letters to other Government agencies, that we not show the Senator's Office as the source but carry the source as "of unknown reliability." Surine further stated that we should use good judgment in all the letters. For example, if a writer asked the Senator to keep confidential the source of the information, we, likewise, should keep confidential the source of information and should it be necessary to interview the original complainant, we should not divulge that Senator Mc Carthy's Office has furnished us the information."

You should be guided accordingly in handling the material, taking appropriate action where necessary.

If no action is warranted, make a notation to this effect on this form and file under instant caption, marking for indexing where necessary.

If action is warranted, route a part of your initial correspondence into above file so the material can be located later with a minimum of effort. The correspondence, of course, should bear an appropriate caption suitable to the particular item.

Dear Senator McCarthy:

Jointly with your investigation of Communists in our government, and the election results, I wish to call your attention to our case with the Atomic Energy Commission.

Regardless of what you will decide to do with this information permit me to say, that this case will tie in with some of the very "higher-ups" in the government for one world, which will try again and again to get the U. S., the only barrier against Communism, out of the way.

The facts in brief are as follows: our company has learned of the availability of a large number of good uranium properties and mines, some of these which already have been successfully worked, and some examined by the A. E. C. staff geologist through our courtesy and found promising.

For the last two years we have been unsuccessfully pleading with the A. E. C. to permit the development of these properties, and asking their assistance for these developments unsuccessfully. Instead of helping us Americans, which the A. E. C. not only refused to do but has done practically everything to stop us, the A. E. C. went so far as to deny recognition of the rightful owners of these properties. We delivered certified documents, confirmed by the American Embassy, proving ownership and mining rights, with no avail. The A. E. C. restricted the findings of the American staff geologist to be used to raise capital through private American enterprise as one leading member of the A. E. C. said that small American corporations have no right to enter the uranium field. However, at the same time the A. E. C. has granted millions of U. S. taxpayers dollars for development, in the same places where we were refused, for an independent English corporation, which is in reality a Cyprus corporation controlled by a few foreign individuals.

The A. E. C. states that we need all the uranium that we can buy but for an unexplained secret political reason draws a curtain ^{in front of} uranium producing countries such as Portugal.

Several large companies such as American Uranium Co., Climax Uranium Co., American Smelting and Refining Co., and a number of private companies were all interested to develop these properties on some of which the German government previously spent tremendous amount of money for development, only to be stopped immediately upon contacting the A. E. C. for confirmation.

You are in a position Sir, to check into this thoroughly, because I believe that you realize that the control of the world uranium supply is as important to our national life and liberty as the American heritage of freedom.

OUR HOPE IS NOW THAT THE REPUBLICAN NEW ADMINISTRATION WILL PURGE NOT ONLY THE AMERICAN CORRUPTION AND COMMUNIST AND THEIR FELLOW TRAVELLERS BUT WILL HELP US ALIENS TO PURGE OUR LINES FROM COMMUNIST OR PROCOMMUNIST AND FROM THEIR FELLOW TRAVELLERS.

The "democratic international administrations" and corruption, the most part sponsored morally and materially such "so-called" National Committees originating from behind of the "Iron Curtain" which previously shortly before their escaping, collaborated with the communist and helped them to the power. These people are mostly belonging to a certain circle (see instructions) or left wing people, with the one sided intention, by penetrating into the highest key positions of press, radio or television and by this controlling the opinion of the people and influencing the so-called, but not elected National Committees of the Aliens too.

They are making up to now publications in name of Hungarians etc. They will now try to convince the coming Republican Administration, that they are representing the Hungarians in exile. They want some change and by this to prove, that the necessary purge was made, but actually the same people want to rule the Hungarians afterwards too. While we are working hardly for the future loyal allies, they are getting money from secret sources for their own political purposes.

Sir, if I may suggest, please investigate this problem and you will see that this is also extremely important for the security of the U.S. get rid of procommunist elements. Dear Senator,

There is one person I have been disturbed and concerned about: Francis B. Sayre.

The day I visited Hiss's second trial I heard his testimony. He wanted to create an impression of a desire to be co-operative & I do not recall one time when he answered, "I don't remember" but often, when Mr. Murphy pressed him for an answer, he replied, "I cannot say specifically."

Mr. Murphy pressed him on the matter of how he obtained his job with U.N. He continued to insist that he spoke to ^{no} one about recommending him for the job that he never spoke to Hiss about it, did not ask Hiss to recommend him, that Hiss did not suggest he get in with U.N. After fencing with Sayre for some time as to exactly how it happened he obtained his lucrative job with U.N., Mr. Murphy asked him point-blank, "How did you get your job with U.N.?" Sayre came back with this,

I went directly to the White House,
asked Mr. Truman for the job & got it!
On words to that effect. As you are
aware, Sayre quietly resigned from
his lucrative post with U. N. some months
ago & left for Japan, ostensibly to
represent a religious group there.
Is it possible that Hiss never discussed
the U. N. with his former State Department
boss, Sayre? All the way thru his
testimony Sayre maintained at no time,
anywhere, did he ever speak to Hiss
about U. N. or did Hiss ever speak to
him about U. N. or the possibility of Sayre
becoming connected with that organization.

Do you have any information
about Sayre? His testimony confused
& perplexed me. The writer is a native
of Selma, Alabama.

Senator Joseph McCarthy recently furnished this Bureau with an undated anonymous letter directed to him which had attached to it a list of seven former employees and nine allegedly present employees of the Department of State who were said to be guilty of "what is commonly called moral turpitude." The anonymous letter writer stated that he was an employee of the Department of State and was disturbed by the number of State Department employees who were still working, both in Washington and abroad, who were guilty of moral turpitude. The anonymous writer stated that his assignments with the Department of State had taken him to various posts abroad and under certain given circumstances (not set out), it is not difficult to ascertain who among them was an actual or potential menace to the security of the United States. This writer attached to his letter a list of individuals who he said have been employed by the Department of State in the past and who have been discharged or allowed to resign, as well as those who, to his knowledge, are continuing to work with the Department of State. The list as furnished by this anonymous writer to Senator McCarthy is as follows:

On April 17, 1953, Don Surine telephoned and advised Crosby that the Senator would like dissemination of any material received by the Bureau from his office credited to sources as follows:

a. Information in ordinary mail referred to the Bureau by Senator McCarthy may be disseminated and Senator McCarthy's Office may be described as the source.

b. In the case of mail which is addressed to the Senator for his confidential information or under language implying that the communication is confidential, the substance of the material may be disseminated crediting the office of Senator McCarthy as the source with the statement that Senator McCarthy's Office described the material as having been received from a source of unknown reliability.

c. In the case of material already in the Bureau which was received by Senator McCarthy under a confidential cover, the substance of the material may be disseminated and Senator McCarthy's Office should be described as the source. The statement indicating that Senator McCarthy's Office received the material from a source of unknown reliability should again be included. *✓*

The only difference between "b" and "c" above is that with reference to material already in the Bureau. Surine stated that in the future he will attempt to separate clearly material which was received by the Senator under confidential cover.

On 1/10/53 the attached material was received from the office of Senator McCarthy of Wisconsin. It should be reviewed by you.

By memorandum dated February 7, 1953, Assistant to the Director L. B. Nichols advised: "In Mr. Baumgardner's memorandum of February 3, 1953, inquiry was made as to how the Bureau may use copies of correspondence addressed to Senator McCarthy. I wish to advise that I have specifically raised this problem with Don Surine of Senator McCarthy's Office.

"Surine states that we are authorized to use this material in any way we see fit and to say that the material had been referred to the Bureau by Senator McCarthy to disseminate and to conduct any investigation that is suggested by the facts. I told Surine we would do this and to avoid making inquiry in each instance, I inquired whether we could assume that this applied to anything else he might furnish us unless he specifically put a restriction on it. He stated that we could so assume and if there was anything they did not want known came from them, they would so advise us. However, Surine did state with reference to the dissemination of such letters to other Government agencies, that we not show the Senator's Office as the source but carry the source as "of unknown reliability." Surine further stated that we should use good judgment in all the letters. For example, if a writer asked the Senator to keep confidential the source of the information, we, likewise, should keep confidential the source of information and should it be necessary to interview the original complainant, we should not divulge that Senator McCarthy's Office has furnished us the information."

You should be guided accordingly in handling the material, taking appropriate action where necessary.

If no action is warranted, make a notation to this effect on this form and file under instant caption, marking for indexing where necessary.

If action is warranted, route a carbon copy of your initial correspondence into above file so the material can be located later with a minimum of effort. The correspondence, of course, should bear an appropriate caption suitable to the particular item.

He then commented that John Edgar Hoover wouldn't turn over confidential FBI files to the sounding fathers of our republic except on higher authority and "even then I think he would fuss a bit."

McCarthy Set a 'Heady Mixture'

Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) has become the stormy center of "one of the most interesting and powerful political and social circles in Washington." It is pointed out in the current issue of Look magazine.

An article by Richard Wilson, head of the Washington Bureau of the Cowles Publications, states:

"The McCarthy set is a heady mixture of Texas millionaires and former corner grocers . . .

of hardworking political bosses and reportorial sleuths; of hot-shot investigators and radio stars; of Wisconsin politicians and rich horsewomen; of market plungers and solid industrialists.

"Platoons of lawyers, investigators, advisers, financial backers surround McCarthy. More than 70 persons are playing major roles in the McCarthy retinue."

Wilson goes on to mention some of the many intimates of the "McCarthy set," whom he characterizes in this way:

"Some want to make him President. Others think association with him will be a springboard to a bigger future. Many passionately believe he will be the savior of America . . ."

The "magnet" of the heterogeneous group that surrounds McCarthy," Wilson writes, appears to be "conspiratorial excitement and controversy."

"... Political reality suggests that McCarthy has reached the top elective office he can hold. Catholicism has proved a barrier

for many men who deserved or aspired to the Presidency. But McCarthy is not satisfied standing still . . . If he can't be President, he can become a great power, for better or worse, in national life, provided Wisconsin continues to send him to the Senate . . .

"If anticommunism isn't in style, some other great public issue will be, and Joe will do his best to ride with it."

The McCarthy circle, Wilson writes, "finds its highest social level at the Al Marah Arabian horse farm of Mrs. Garvin Tankersley in Maryland on the outskirts of Washington . . ."

"Mrs. Tankersley is the former Elizabeth (Bazy) McCormick, niece of publisher Robert R. McCormick of Chicago and once vice president of the Washington Times-Herald. Bazy periodically gathers the McCarthy clan, with trimmings.

"Here, McCarthy rubs shoulders with Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth; Gwen Cafritz, party-giving competitor of Perle Mesta; Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer; Vice President Richard Nixon; an assortment of Nationalist Chinese, Central American and Spanish diplomats; Mrs. Marcella du Pont; Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd, jr., commandant of the Marine Corps; Mrs. Preston Davie; actress Constance Bennett, accompanied by poodle; Mrs. Ivy Baker Priest, the personable Treasurer of the United States; the classically beautiful Mrs. William Randolph Hearst, jr."

In the background of this group, the article continues, is "a more significant, if somewhat duller group who are near to, but not quite of, the McCarthy inner circle: Sens. William E. Jenner of Indiana, George W. Malone of Nevada, Homer E. Capehart of Indiana, Spessard Holland of Florida, Herman Welker of Idaho; Reps. Charles A. Halleck of Indiana, Clarence J. Brown of Ohio.

"These are sometimes supplemented by a journalistic contingent: Fulton Lewis, jr., columnist and broadcaster; George Sokolsky, farthest right of the political columnists; Constantine Brown, Washington Star columnist; Danton Walker, an imaginative Broadway columnist; Walter Trohan, chief of the Washington bureau of the Chicago Tribune. Westbrook Pegler, though no party-goer, confers frequently with McCarthy."

Wilson states that McCarthy's bride, the former Jean Fraser Kerr, probably had her first influence with the Senator when she was able to "clean up a bit" the "barnyard language" he used in "earthy" discussions about cows on the Senate floor.

During their on-off romance, Wilson continues, the then Miss Kerr went back to script writing and program arranging, helping to launch a recorded television series called Facts Forum. The program was backed by H. L. Hunt, Dallas oil operator, sometimes called the richest man in America. McCarthy was the first guest star on the program. Some say Hunt will eventually back him in a series of reports to the Nation on his activities . . .

Some of McCarthy's many other Texas associates are noted in the article:

"... He recently stayed at the home of Douglas Marshall, son-in-law of H. R. Cullen, the oil multimillionaire, who has a keen interest in McCarthy.

\$5000 to 1952 Campaign

"Cullen contributed \$5000, the legal limit, to Joe's campaign for reelection in 1952. Joe was successful but ran well behind President Eisenhower's Wisconsin vote. Cullen put up \$48,000, in addition, to "help other candidates for Congress in 1952."

Another oil man listed among McCarthy's "backers and associates" is "Clint Murchison, who owns Henry Holt & Co., book publishers in New York. Like Joe's other big Texas friend, Hunt, Murchison is interested in influencing public opinion.

"Austin Hancock, former San Antonio Insurance executive, is a friend of McCarthy. Hancock heads an organization called the American Heritage Protective Association. He has said that he hopes to help get the Republican presidential nomination for McCarthy.

"Some of McCarthy's volunteer helpers have been very influential in his career. One of them is a former FBI agent, Robert E. Lee, recently appointed by President Eisenhower to the Federal Communications Commission . . . Lee left the FBI, where he was one of J. Edgar Hoover's brightest young men, for a position as one

of the chief staff members of the House Committee on Appropriations . . ."

Wilson notes that a list of suspected subversives in the State Department was compiled by that committee, and that McCarthy's Red "case studies" which plunged him into the Nation's headlines in 1950, "were all on the list Lee compiled for the Republican Congress in 1947."

"Lee and his wife," the article continues, "are close personal friends of the Senator and Jeanne, often teaming up on parties with the Edward K. Nellors. Nellor is a former reporter for the New York Sun, who worked for several years as an investigator and reporter for Fulton Lewis. He still writes Lewis' syndicated column in the Hearst newspapers, but is also independently employed as a Washington correspondent by the North American Newspaper Alliance. He became an unofficial, volunteer adviser to McCarthy on the fairly sound journalistic assumption that he could thus keep abreast of what McCarthy was doing . . .

"Joe's relations with his fellow men in the United States Senate are strained and probably always will be. Vice President Nixon, a friend, but no boon companion, has taken on the difficult assignment of adjusting McCarthy and the Eisenhower Administration to each other. . . . Sen. William E. Jenner . . . chafes over Joe's invasion of what Jenner considers his own hunting preserves as chairman of the Senate (sub) Committee on Internal Security . . .

Wisconsin supporters of McCarthy named in the article include Walter Harnischfeger, president of the Harnischfeger Corp., Tom Korb, counsel for that firm, and Wayne Hood, former State chairman in Wisconsin. "McCarthy's Wisconsin newspaper backers include John Heidl, managing editor of the Appleton Post-Crescent and a boyhood friend; John Wynyard of Madison, columnist for a dozen Republican papers; Rex Karney, editorial writer for the Wisconsin State Journal . . ."

"The McCarthy of today," the article states, "is a far cry from the one-man operator who drew these scores of people into his orbit. He is now an entity, complete with a staff of 50. He has money, powerful backing and impressive public support. Unconfirmed rumors in Washington credit him with a private, secret staff financed by contributors, but this is denied."

Wisconsin Professor Assails McCarthy's 'Warped Theories'

By the Associated Press

FREDERICK, Md., June 18.—A Wisconsin professor believes Senator McCarthy has "risen to power by making an idolatrous religion out of what he considers to be patriotism."

The Rev. Dr. Chad Walsh of Beloit College (Wis.) hurled the charge here yesterday as he addressed some 400 delegates at a conference of the Washington province of the Episcopal church.

"The forces of history would have created an equivalent demagogue with a different name" if Senator McCarthy hadn't come along, the speaker said.

He said it was "inevitable in this age of jitters that the political Neanderthal should arise."

Says Tactics Aid Reds.

"If Senator McCarthy were a Russian agent planted in this country to spread disunity and suspicion and prepare the way for a Communist coup d'etat, he could not be doing a more effective job," said Dr. Walsh.

He termed McCarthyism "200 per cent Americanism" and said it is a force which "acts as though the end justifies the means, as though anything goes . . . so long as you can strike

a blow at some one or some thing that is possibly red or reddish . . . it does not tally well with anything said by the founding fathers."

Dr. Walsh said "200 per cent Americanism creates an atmosphere of mob justice . . . spreads suspicion between neighbor and neighbor . . . encourages the craven timidity of a Casper Milquetoast . . . brands the slightest disagreement with it as virtually equivalent to treason."

Nation Is An Idol.

The Wisconsin educator declared that "200 per cent Americanism perverts so good and wholesome a thing as patriotism into idolatrous worship of the state. When one's nation becomes an absolute to which all moral values and individual rights must be subordinated, then that nation is an idol, a fiery Moloch demanding human sacrifices for its maw."

He added: "The Neanderthal believes in human sacrifice."

The theme of his remarks was "The Christ and His Modern Rivals."

In Washington Senator McCarthy could not be reached for comment.
