I talked to [redacted] and [redacted] of NBC this afternoon.

[redacted] received a copy of Max Lowenthal's book through the mail and he wants to get squared away because he was quite positive that he could not overlook the book in his news program.

I told them briefly about Lowenthal's background and sent copies of the Dondero speech on September 1, 1950, to both, although I previously talked to [redacted] about the book.

[redacted] wants to meet with me in the next week or 10 days before the book is published in order to work out a line of attack. [redacted] has always been very friendly.

[redacted] told me something that was somewhat amazing - that about a month ago he talked to [redacted] who has been [redacted] of the State Department for about the last three months, who told [redacted] in response to a blunt question as to whether the McCarthy charges were true, that in effect they were true but that there was no evidence against the individuals who were involved, that they had been careful not to permit themselves to be openly connected with the Party and it was very difficult to get at them.

[redacted] stated he thought he would have a further talk with this individual and use that as a springboard of going into the Lowenthal book, illustrating how stooges do the Communists work. I told him I thought it would be a good idea.

Ben Mandel of the House Committee on Un-American Activities called Mr. Holloman on December 9, 1950, and stated that there was an individual who had on his own free time prepared a very comprehensive index of all Senate and House hearings. This index is in typewritten form and is about 5,000 pages in length. This individual is suffering from a severe heart condition and is expected to die at almost any moment. He is willing to make this index available if we are agreeable to photostating it. Mandel wondered if we wanted this index and if so he could make it available to us if we would give him, Mandel, a photostatic copy.

Mandel went on to state that this individual had not asked any compensation for this index but that he, Mandel, thought this individual was in financial stress and would appreciate anything that could be paid to him for it.

Mr. Holloman advised Mr. Mandel that we normally did not have appropriations available for such expenditures. Mandel stated that such payment, of course, was not necessary.

While talking to Ben Mandel on other matters he informed me that [redacted], had this index; that he was certain if we asked [redacted] he would be glad to loan us a copy to be photostated. He stated that the index was exceedingly good as it not only indexed the Congressional Record but indexed numerous Congressional hearings and the like.

I see no purpose to be served in trying to get a copy of this.

You are advised that in checking further on [REDACTED] I have ascertained that he is the individual presently employed in the Civil Service Commission who has been suspected of being the source of information Senator McCarthy has used. I have talked to Mr. Ladd and it appears that his so-called index consists of data taken not only from FBI reports but also data from Congressional hearings and the like.

Since we have been investigating [REDACTED] I think it would be inappropriate at this time to go to him and no further action will be taken unless the Director and you have a contrary view.

In accordance with your request the following was obtained from files regarding Robert J. Morris who was Minority Counsel of the Subcommittee on Foreign Relations (Tydings' Committee) United States Senate.

BACKGROUND:

Morris furnished the following information concerning himself before the Federal Grand Jury in New York City in the Amerasia case.

It is noted that on March 21, 1950, Senator Hickenlooper wrote the Director requesting any pertinent information on Morris who was being considered at that time for appointment as Co-Counsel to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. At that time Assistant Special Agent in Charge Whelan of the New York Office, advised the Bureau that Morris was a New York secretary of Congressman Coudert and was formerly his secretary when Coudert was a State Senator engaged in Communist investigations. He also stated that Morris was at that time (March 1950) a member of the law firm of Hochwald, Morris and Richmond, at 40 Exchange Place, New York City. He said that Morris had been a Lieutenant Commander assigned to the third Naval District ONI during World War II. He characterized Morris

as a member of the "anti-Communist Intelligencia" of New York. He advised that Morris is personally known to Special Agent [redacted] who considers that Morris has always been most cooperative with the Bureau and holds the FBI in highest esteem. Senator Hickenlooper was advised that Morris had not been investigated by the FBI nor had he been officially associated with the Bureau. [redacted]

Reference is made to your memorandum dated September 19, 1950, captioned as above requesting this Bureau to reopen its investigation in this matter and to interview Messrs. Seth W. Richardson, L. V. Keloy and Robert Fann of the Loyalty Review Board, Mr. James K. Hatcher, Civil Service Commission, Mr. Donald L. Nicholson, State Department, and [redacted] Loyalty Review Board.

Pursuant to your instructions, Mr. Richardson was interviewed. He advised that at approximately the time Senator McCarthy's statement concerning the State Department broke, Mr. Richardson received a telephone call from Drew Pearson, newspaper columnist, with whom he is friendly. Pearson said in effect, "I have been told by a member of Senator McCarthy's staff that he has been obtaining information from an individual employed in the Loyalty Review Board. Also an individual employed by the Loyalty Review Board has been seen at Senator McCarthy's office. And what about this fellow [redacted] who works for [redacted]?" Mr. Richardson advised that he cannot say Pearson said [redacted] had been furnishing information to Senator McCarthy or had been seen at Senator McCarthy's office, but the implication was obvious. At the time of Pearson's call, Mr. Richardson was not aware of [redacted] identity as an employee of the Loyalty Review Board. During Mr. Richardson's conversation with Pearson, Pearson inquired as to where he might secure a list of names of the employees of the Loyalty Review Board. As a result of this inquiry, Mr. Richardson and Mr. L. V. Keloy, Executive Secretary of the Loyalty Review Board prepared such a list which was subsequently given to Pearson.

Mr. Richardson advised that he is willing to have the above facts recited to Pearson should the Bureau interview Mr. Pearson in this matter, in order to refresh Mr. Pearson's memory concerning the previous discussion with Mr. Richardson. Mr. Richardson further advised that Pearson can be informed that he, Richardson, has no objection to Pearson's revealing information concerning this matter to the Bureau.

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It is requested that you advise whether you desire to have Mr. Drew Pearson interviewed concerning instant case.

L. B. Nichols Communists in the State Department

In a conversation with Congressman Fred E. Busbey I inquired regarding the statement attributed to him to the effect there are 65 potential "Remingtons" now in Government posts. The Congressman stated he has a list of names which he would be glad to furnish us on a strictly personal and confidential basis. I told him we would be glad to receive the list of names. He will send them to us in the next day or two.

Busbey also told me he received a three page letter from John Stewart Service as a result of his statement to the press, and that this three page letter in his opinion "hangs" Service. He stated he is now in the process of formulating a reply and will send us copies of Service's letter and of his reply.

He stated the other day he attended a staff conference of the Civil Service Loyalty Review Board. He is very much impressed with the attitude of former Senator Bingham and stated he was asked to say a few words to the staff. He stated in the course of his remarks he told the staff that any member of the Loyalty Review Board or of the staff who opposed Senator Bingham's recent amendment had no right to remain on the Loyalty Review Board, and he has called on Senator Bingham formally to furnish a list of names of persons who have opposed his amendment. Senator Bingham will furnish Busbey with this information.

Dear Mr. Snow:

Thank you for your reply to my letter of inquiry of April 17, 1951.

Inasmuch as you have combined your statistics on both the loyalty and security issues, it is necessary that I request clarification of the information and answers to further questions.

It was intended that the questions in my letter would be directed only to cases of applicants and employees coming within the operation of Executive Order No. 9835 and, therefore, your answers to the 5th and 6th questions require further discussion.

How many full field investigations of State Department employees by the FBI under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9835 were referred to the Loyalty Board? There are no security provisions in Executive Order No. 9835, but if the FBI made investigations on a question of loyalty and these cases were cleared by your Loyalty Board but converted into security cases, please say so, but do not confuse security investigations made by the FBI with loyalty investigations under the executive order.

This will undoubtedly call for a review of your answer to No. 6.

From your answer to questions 6 and 7 it appears that 66 cases cleared by your board are pending before the Loyalty Review Board on post audit. Am I correct in this assumption?

Out of the 323 cases cleared by your board and referred to the Loyalty Review Board for clearance on post audit, how many were denied clearance by the Loyalty Review Board and referred back for your further consideration?

In your response to question 9 you mention one case found ineligible under Executive Order No. 9835 and also found to be a security risk. Was this employee removed, and, if so, was the removal made under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9835 or as a security risk?

Further, you mention that 11 employees left the State Department after charges were preferred but before a hearing. Were these 11 employees charged under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9835? Are they included among the 418 full field investigations reported by the FBI?

Also, you say 16 employees were found to be security risks. Are these 16 cases separate and apart from the 418 full field investigations reported by the FBI? You mention that one employee was separated by administration action on grounds of suitability. Was this case separate and apart from the 418 full field investigations? Was the separation effected under the provisions of the Lloyd-LaFollette Act (title 5, sec. 652, U.S.Code)?

Have you any explanation of the ineligible finding of the board in but one case out of 418 full field investigations?

My dear Mr. Busbey:

Reference is made to your letter of April 17, 1951, expressing an interest in the loyalty and security programs of all of the agencies of the Government and directing certain questions to me as to the progress of these programs in the Department of State. I am glad to be in a position to answer your questions. Your questions and my answers are set out below.

1. Are you familiar with the provisions of the President's Executive Order #9835 dated March 21, 1947?

Yes.

2. Has the Department of State set up its Loyalty Board as provided in this executive order and the rules and regulations promulgated by the Civil Service Commission Loyalty Board under the order?

Yes. Secretary of State Marshall established a Personnel Security Board on July 9, 1947, five months prior to the organization of the Loyalty Review Board. Conrad E. Snow was appointed Chairman and Maynard Barnes and Darrell St. Claire, Members of this original Board. On September 17, 1947, procedures were issued governing the operation of the Board. These procedures were revised and expanded on June 8, 1948, to take into account the regulations of the Loyalty Review Board which had been issued subsequent to the Department's initial promulgation of its regulations. A further revision was made on March 11, 1949, in the process of an overall modernization of the Department's Regulations and Procedures. Lastly the Loyalty and Security Regulations and Procedures were revised on April 16, 1951 (copy enclosed) to conform

the Board's operations with certain amendments by the Loyalty Review Board of its Regulations and with the requirements of Public Law 733, 61st Congress.

3. What is the correct name of this board as used in the Department of State and the names of its members?

Loyalty Security Board of the Department of State.  
The Board's name was changed from Personnel Security Board to Loyalty Security Board by the revision of the Board's Regulations dated June 8, 1949.

4. When did this Loyalty Board begin to function?

The Personnel Security Board, now known as the Loyalty Security Board, began to function on July 9, 1947.  
The first case was adjudicated by the Board on September 29, 1947.

5. How many full field investigations by the F.B.I. of the State Department employees have been referred to your Loyalty Board?

As of April 1, 1951, the Loyalty Security Board had received 451 full field investigations by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Of this number 418 were

received

received by the Board for adjudication both as to loyalty and security. The remaining 33 investigative reports were referred to the Board for a determination as to security only, the question of loyalty having been resolved by a Regional Loyalty Board or not being in issue.

6. How many of the full field investigation cases have been referred to the Loyalty Review Board?

As of April 1, 1951, 323 full field investigation cases had been adjudicated by the Loyalty Security Board and referred to the Loyalty Review Board. This figure is a head count only and does not include 44 cases which have been reconsidered and forwarded to the Loyalty Review Board. Also the figure of 323 does not include the security cases which had been adjudicated because they are not subject to a post-audit review by the Loyalty Review Board and consequently are not referred to that Board.

7. How many of these cases have been adjudicated?

As of April 1, 1951, the Loyalty Review Board had post-audited (adjudicated) 257 of these cases. The figure of 257 likewise is a head count and does not include the post-audit of 5 reconsiderations.

8. What was the average number of days per case necessary for adjudication counting from the time you received it from the F.B.I. until you reached a decision within the agency?

The average time required for the Board to reach a decision, computed from the date of receipt of the case by the Board until a formal decision is reached by the Board is 55.175 days. This computation does not include the additional time that may be required for the reconsideration of a case due to the receipt of supplemental investigative reports subsequent to the

initial

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initial adjudication of such case.

9. How many employees were found to be ineligible by your Loyalty Board under the provisions of Executive Order #9835?

One employee has been found ineligible by the Loyalty Security Board under the provisions of Executive Order 9835. This determination was reached on April 19, 1951. However, the Loyalty Security Board has found 16 employees to be security risks to the Department and has recommended their removal from employment. The figure of 16 does not include the one case found ineligible under Executive Order 9835 although this individual was also found to be a security risk to the Department of State. Of the 16 security risk cases 14 have been separated from employment in the Department. Two of the cases determined to be security risks are presently on appeal to the Secretary of State. Moreover, it should be pointed out that 11 additional individuals left the Department subsequent to the Board's decision to prefer charges against them and prior to the holding of a hearing. In addition, one employee was separated by administrative action on grounds of suitability on the recommendation of the Board.

10. How many of these employees that were found to be ineligible by your Loyalty Board have been removed?

See answer to Question No. 9. Of the 16 cases found to be security risks and therefore ineligible, 14 have been separated from employment in the Department and 2 are on appeal to the Secretary of State. These two employees are presently suspended. The one employee who has been found ineligible on loyalty and security grounds has not as yet exhausted the appeal privileges and therefore has not been separated. However, this employee is presently suspended.

11. How many of your ineligible determinations made by your Loyalty Board were appealed to the Loyalty Review Board of the Civil Service Commission?

None. However, the one ineligible determination on grounds of loyalty has not yet reached the stage for appeal to the Loyalty Review Board.

12. What

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12. What was the average number of days per appeal to the Loyalty Review Board counting in the time the Loyalty Review Board was advised of an appeal up to and including the time you received a decision by the Loyalty Review Board?

Not applicable.

13. How many of the ineligible cases processed by your Loyalty Board were reversed by the Loyalty Review Board?

Not applicable.

14. Has your Board taken any further action on the cases in which the Department of State Loyalty Board arrived at an ineligible rating which were reversed by the Loyalty Review Board?

Not applicable.

15. Have you ever had occasion to request the F.B.I. to make a further investigation of any Department of State employee who had been previously cleared either by a Loyalty Board or by the Loyalty Review Board?

Yes, in a number of cases. The requests for such further investigation in general arise where supplemental information is received which, when considered in conjunction with the entire investigative report, requires further investigation to resolve.

16. In how many cases of your employees did you issue an interrogatory?

As of April 1, 1951, the Loyalty Security Board had issued interrogatories to 88 individuals whose cases involved the issue of loyalty and security. In the cases of 5 of these individuals more than one interrogatory had been issued. In addition, the Board had issued interrogatories to 3 individuals whose cases involved the issue of security only.

SURINE [redacted] advised SA [redacted] that this document had been sent to him by one [redacted] official of Dahlberg Light & Power Co., Solon Springs, Wis., by means of a personal letter to [redacted] from [redacted] enclosing the above-mentioned statement and directed to [redacted] on 6/23/51. In his letter to [redacted] [redacted] stated, "enclosed you will find some papers which were picked up by our meter reader, [redacted] in the town of Minong recently.

"I am sending them to you thinking that perhaps they may be of some use to you or to the FBI office. It looks as though these are copies and might have been lost by someone investigating this matter."

SA [redacted] contacted [redacted] who advised that the enclosed statement, together with the stapled brief mimeographed flyer attached thereto, had been found in the driveway of the summer home of one [redacted] in rural Minong, Wis. The documents, according to [redacted] were not enclosed in an envelope or protected from the elements in any manner, thus indicating to [redacted] that they had either been lost or placed there recently. [redacted] advised further that the Power Co. records show that [redacted] lives at [redacted], West Allis, 14, Wis. and stated there has been no power consumption at [redacted] summer home since Oct. 1950, which indicated to [redacted] that the summer home had not been occupied during the past 8 months.

The following information is given by me freely and voluntarily without any promises or threats. I furnish this information because it is the truth and I feel it is my patriotic duty to furnish the facts as I apprehend them.

I am living at 1902 North 24th Street, Arlington, Virginia at the present time.

In August 1946 I was released from the U.S. Navy in California. I came to Washington, D.C. and while in Washington, D.C. I was looking for a job. I went into the Walter Johnson Building of State Department at 18th & New York Ave N.W. I talked to a fellow in the State Department by the name of [unclear] at the State Department during that time. I got a temporary clerical job in the file of the Walter Johnson Building. These files were the Departmental Personnel files located in the Walter Johnson Bldg. I started work in these files in Sept 1946. When I started for duty I was told that I would be working on a project or two files. The project had been going on for some time before I started. On June 15, 1951, [REDACTED] delivered to the Director's office a copy of a memorandum dated June 4, 1951, captioned "Allegations by Former State Department Employee." This relates principally to [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. Substantially the allegation is that [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] who reportedly are still employed by the Department of State, were appointed by Alger Hiss to positions under his supervision on the Special Political Desk for United Nations Affairs in 1945 or 1946. This memorandum also contains information relating to a publication "Postwar Foreign Policy Preparation 1939 - 1945." This publication was prepared at the instigation of the President and covers the period of from the beginning of the war in Europe until the United Nations Conference in San Francisco in 1945. This memorandum notes that said publication listed an index of persons who directly participated in its preparation numbered among whom were [REDACTED] Esther C. Brunauer, [REDACTED], Alger Hiss, William F. Stone and [REDACTED].

For your information the records of the Loyalty Section do not disclose that an investigation of either [REDACTED] or [REDACTED] has been conducted under the provisions of Executive Order 9835. It is noted that on the basis of the allegations contained in said memorandum the most that could be undertaken would be a preliminary inquiry. Bureau files are now being checked relative to [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] with the end in mind of initiating the appropriate action should it be determined that both these persons are employed within the purview of the Loyalty Order.

Instant memorandum notes with reference to [redacted] that he is currently out of government service and is reportedly teaching at Syracuse University.

Eather C. Brunauer has been the subject of extensive investigation under Executive Order 9835. The latest advice available to the Loyalty Section discloses that Brunauer is under suspension from her position with the Department of State as a result of action taken by the Navy Department against her husband, Stephen Brunauer.

[redacted] is not employed by the United States Government at this time. He reportedly is serving the Government of Columbia, South America, in an advisory capacity on monetary matters. [redacted]

Alger Hiss, as you know, is currently serving a prison sentence as a result of his conviction on a perjury charge in Federal Court.

The William T. Stone mentioned in this memorandum is believed identical with William Treadwell Stone of the Department of State. Stone, as has Brunauer, has been investigated under the provisions of Executive Order 9835.

[redacted] is an admitted espionage agent.

For your information photostatic copies of instant memorandum have been made available to the Espionage and Internal Security Sections of the Security Division for their information and whatever action is deemed appropriate regarding the individuals named above and contained in instant memorandum who are not currently government employees.

As is noted above appropriate action will be taken regarding [redacted] and [redacted] and copies of this memorandum as well as the material furnished by [redacted] are being disseminated for each of the other case files on the individuals mentioned above. Where necessary additional investigation relative to Brunauer and Stone will be initiated by the Loyalty Section.

### Allegations by former State Department Employee

A former employee of the Department called on me and offered assistance relative to exposing the undesirables still on the Department's payroll.

It was indicated that when Hiss took over the Special Political Desk for United Nations Affairs in 1945 or 1946 he put on one as one of his principal assistants. He is alleged to be still on the State Department payroll and all during the Hiss criminal proceedings he was mysteriously ill. was likewise connected with the old Special Senate Committee to investigate the Munitions Industry for which Hiss was counsel.

Hiss likewise put on one who was deputy to Mr. Hiss at the United Nations conference in San Francisco. He is currently in charge of all appointments to the United Nations and is alleged to be the right hand man of Warren Austin.

It was further alleged that many people in the Far Eastern Division who were recommended by Hiss have been shifted to cultural relations staffs and are still employed by State.

It was likewise indicated that Mr. Hiss kept handwritten notes on the Yalta conference which were later used by Department employees in preparing the volume, "Postwar Foreign Policy Preparation". These notes are allegedly still in existence and are in the custody of one "Beckworth".

### STATE DEPARTMENT TESTIMONY ON THE MATTER OF EMPLOYEES RECOMMENDED BY HISS WHO ARE STILL IN THE DEPARTMENT.

On page 686 of the 1952 State Department hearings before the House Appropriations Committee the following colloquy seems to cover the point:

#### "Loyalty Check of Mission Personnel"

Mr. Rooney. The next question that I have asked on previous occasions. The mission to the United Nations was organized at a time when Alger Hiss was one of the architects; is that right?

Mr. Humelsine. Yes; he was the office director of this particular organization at the time he left the Government in February 1947, I believe it was.

Mr. Rooney. Has this office and every one of the personnel been checked with regard to security?

Mr. Humelsine. Yes; every one.

Mr. Rooney. Since the conclusion of the Hiss case?

Mr. Humelsine. I think every person in this shop has been checked and rechecked since Mr. Hiss left the Department. That is my recollection. I want to check that for the record to be absolutely sure.

Mr. Rooney. This is a very important matter and I want it to be absolutely accurate in the record.

Mr. Humelsine. If my recollection is correct they have been.

Mr. Rooney. And I also want to know if there is anybody, anyone of the 190 employees who were recommended to the Department by Hiss?

Mr. Humelsine. I do not believe there is anyone in this group who was recommended by Mr. Hiss. I will check that with the personnel officer. But it is my recollection-- I was not in this area at that time, but I believe Mr. Feurifoy and Mr. Rusk, who took over Mr. Hiss's job told me they had checked the entire personnel very carefully, and that very point was investigated because of the fact that Mr. Hiss had occupied this particular post in the Department.

Mr. Hickerson. May I add this statement, since I took over my present position when the Hiss investigation and trial was under way. I asked Mr. Feurifoy if every individual in the Bureau of United Nations Affairs had been checked since that time and if everybody in the mission in New York had been checked for loyalty, and he told me that they had, every last member of the organization. That was one of the very points in mind when I was talking to him, and I was told categorically that every individual had been checked and that the Department was completely satisfied as to their loyalty.

Mr. Rooney. Have you yourself guarded carefully against the possibility of anyone who might be disloyal getting into this agency?

Mr. Hickerson. I have, indeed."

#### STATE DEPARTMENT REGISTER FOR 1950.

This register confirms the employment of the two individuals mentioned by the informant and gives their background as follows:

She was also publicly named by Senator McCarthy and testified before the Tydings Committee in refutation of the charges.

There are 23 references to Hiss in the publication, who had a great many responsibilities in connection with International affairs during this period. He is, of course, presently serving a prison sentence in connection with his denial of participating in the Communist conspiracy as charged by Whittaker Chambers.

He is mentioned as an alternate member of the Advisory Committee on Post-War Foreign Policy; member of the sub-committee of the Advisory Committee on Economic Reconstruction.

William T. Stone has been a controversial figure for a good many years, his case having been before the Loyalty Board on a number of occasions, in each of which he has been cleared.

PURPOSE: In accordance with the Director's request to be advised of the number of the 570 persons in the State Department on whom we have conducted full field loyalty investigations in which there has been some evidence of Communist Party affiliation, sympathy or association are still employed in the State Department or some other Government agency, there is attached hereto a blind memorandum listing 142 of these cases to assist our liaison representative with the State Department in determining the present employment status of these individuals. U

BACKGROUND: By memorandum dated March 16, 1951, captioned "Communist Infiltration into the Armed Forces, Industrial Plants, and the State Department," the Director was advised that as of March 13, 1951, there had been a total of 570 loyalty cases conducted on applicant and employees of the State Department in which there had been some evidence of Communist Party affiliation, sympathy or association with individuals alleged to be Communist sympathizers at some time. The Director noted, "Just how many are still employed in State or some other Government agency. H." U

To determine the present employment status of these 570 individuals, files have been reviewed and a list prepared with necessary identifying data on 142 of these cases. This list, in blind memorandum form, is attached for the assistance of our liaison representative with the State Department to determine present employment status. If the individual is not employed by the State Department and State Department files show transfer to another Government agency, this information should be obtained. U

The remainder of the 570 cases are being reviewed and similar identifying data will be furnished to Liaison when additional lists are prepared. U

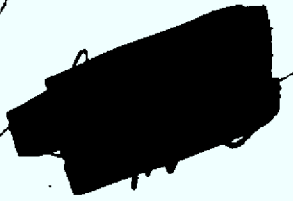

PURPOSE: Communists in the State Dept

To advise you of the identity of the 29 individuals Senator McCarthy claims are "security risks" in the State Department.

BACKGROUND:

Recent Washington, D. C., newspapers have contained articles concerning 29 persons whom Senator McCarthy has claimed are "security risks" in the State Department. Senator McCarthy has been quoted in the newspapers as saying that he had made a "reasonable" request that he be assured that the 29 persons be barred from "secret materials" while their "loyalty" cases were pending before the State Department's Loyalty-Security Board. The State Department, according to these articles, refused to tell Senator McCarthy what it has done about these 29 individuals. McCarthy was said in these articles to have sent a letter to Dean Acheson listing these 29 persons and demanding immediate "assurances" from Acheson that all have been barred from secret information and said unless he got such assurances he would make the names public.

Undersecretary of State Carlisle H. Humelsine wrote the Senator that his allegation that the 29 persons he named are involved in pending loyalty cases "is incorrect." Humelsine said that some of these individuals are not State Department employees, some already have been cleared and some are "in process through the Loyalty Program."

The Liaison Section has secured the list of 29 persons furnished by Senator McCarthy to Dean Acheson.

PURPOSE: In accordance with the Director's request to be advised of the number of the 570 persons in the State Department on whom we have conducted full field loyalty investigations in which there has been some evidence of Communist Party affiliations, sympathy or association are still employed in the State Department or some other Government agency, there is attached hereto a blind memorandum listing 142 of these cases to assist our liaison representative with the State Department in determining the present employment status of these individuals. U

BACKGROUND: By memorandum dated March 16, 1951, captioned "Communist Infiltration into the Armed Forces, Industrial Plants, and the State Department," the Director was advised that as of March 13, 1951, there had been a total of 570 loyalty cases conducted on applicant and employees of the State Department in which there had been some evidence of Communist Party affiliation, sympathy or association with individuals alleged to be Communist sympathizers at some time. The Director noted, "Just how many are still employed in State or some other Government agency. H." U

To determine the present employment status of these 570 individuals, files have been reviewed and a list prepared with necessary identifying data on 142 of these cases. This list, in blind memorandum form, is attached for the assistance of our liaison representative with the State Department to determine present employment status. If the individual is not employed by the State Department and State Department files show transfer to another Government agency, this information should be obtained. U

The remainder of the 570 cases are being reviewed and similar identifying data will be furnished to Liaison when additional lists are prepared. U

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that our liaison representative with the State Department contact that Department to determine the employment status of the individuals identified on the attached list. U

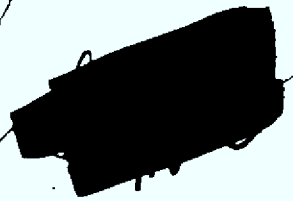

PURPOSE: Communists in the State Dept

To advise you of the identity of the 29 individuals Senator McCarthy claims are "security risks" in the State Department.

BACKGROUND:

Recent Washington, D. C., newspapers have contained articles concerning 29 persons whom Senator McCarthy has claimed are "security risks" in the State Department. Senator McCarthy has been quoted in the newspapers as saying that he had made a "reasonable" request that he be assured that the 29 persons be barred from "secret materials" while their "loyalty" cases were pending before the State Department's Loyalty-Security Board. The State Department, according to these articles, refused to tell Senator McCarthy what it has done about these 29 individuals. McCarthy was said in these articles to have sent a letter to Dean Acheson listing these 29 persons and demanding immediate "assurances" from Acheson that all have been barred from secret information and said unless he got such assurances he would make the names public.

Undersecretary of State Carlisle H. Humelsine wrote the Senator that his allegation that the 29 persons he named are involved in pending loyalty cases "is incorrect." Humelsine said that some of these individuals are not State Department employees, some already have been cleared and some are "in process through the Loyalty Program."

The Liaison Section has secured the list of 29 persons furnished by Senator McCarthy to Dean Acheson.
