#### Zegislators Get Another Salary Hike

Gov. Francis W. Sargent yesterday signed into law legislation increasing the salaries of the House and Sensts chairmen of the committee on government regulations.

As a result of the new law, Sen. Charles V. Hogan (D-Lynn) and Rep. William Q. MasLean (D-Fairhaven) will receive pay raises of \$3,800.

The base pay of legislators is \$11,400. However, recent practice has had the legislature grant additional compensation to the chairmen of both the House and Senate ways and means committees, the committe on taxation, and the committe on counties.

In addition, the House speaker gets double the pay of legislators, while the minority leader, and the assistant legislative leaders of both the speaker and the minority leader receive additional compensation.



# Court to Review Abort

WASHINGTON (UPI) — the Supreme Court, in a case hat could produce a land-nark decision, agreed Monlay to examine the constitutionality of the District of Columbia's abortion law.

The court will schedule arguments next fail on an appeal by the Justice Dept. from a ruling last Nov. 10 by U. S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell striking down the district's 69-year-old criminal statute against illegal abortion. The case will be decided by writen opinion of the high court.

Gesell dismissed an indictment of Dr. Milan Vuitch, a Yugoslav immigrant who has been crusading for more liberal abortion policies.

Many states have laws similar to the district's, which bars an abortion except when "necessary for the preservation of the mother's life or health."

The American Civil Liberties Union and other abortion law activists have participated in recent stepped-up efforts to liberalize abortion laws. The most liberal one went into effect March 11 in Hawaii.

A number of state legislatures have pending bills similar to the one enacted in Hawaii. Others have liberalized their criminal codes to a leser extent since Colorado did so in 1967.

The ACLU, feminist groups and others argue that an abortions is a matter solely between a woman and her physician. They say that the laws discriminate against the poor.


Earlier this term, the Supreme Court refused to re-

view a state court decision in California striking down the law in that state.

District Judge Gesell's opinion in the Washington case said the clause "necessary for the preservation of the mother's life or health" is so vague that a person accused of violating it cannot properly defend himself. He said it also places on the defendant the burden or proving that he made the right medical judgment.

The Justice Dept. appealed on the ground that Gesell should not have thrown out the case before trial but should have applied the law to the specific circumstances of Vuitch's case. The department added that the doctor's medical judgment is not always an issue because physicians sometimes perform abortions after doing nothing more than establishing the fact of pregnancy.

O'Donnell contends that, historically, his party, has led the way for all liberal and progressive programs, and that the Republicans have conceded their support only when forced to do so.

He considers Sargent highly vulnerable because of lack of accomplishment. He denounces him as an "Autumn liberal," indicating that the governor comes in with late support for programs only after they have been

proven popular.
O'Donnell intends to "make Sargent a Republican,

a Nixon Republican, a man who carries out Republican policy."

He says Sargent, in the spirit of the regime of former Gov. Join A. ### Nixon Says Cambodia Neutrality Vital to U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The White House said Monday that the United States has "an overriding interest" in preserving the Cambodian neutrality because of the effects a Communist takenver would have on the U.S. war effort in South Vietnam.

Press Secretary Ronald L.-Ziegler said: "The President is deeply concerned about the course of events in Cambodia and is closely following devel-

He said Nixon wanted to preserve the territorial integrity of Cambodia and viewed with concern violations of Cambodian territory by North Vietnamese troops in "Blatant disregard" of the 1954 Geneva He said Nixon wanted to Ziegler could give no indi-cation of when a decision would be made by Nixon.

He called off for a third time a scheduled meeting of the National Security Coun-cil, but Ziegler said the ses-sion was not intended to deal with the Cambodian situation.

Ziegler said Nixon met both Sunday and Monday with top diplomatic and defense ad-visers to assess implications of North Vietnam's actions in Cambodia. The United States says there are 40,000 North Vietnamese and iVet Cong troops in Cambodia. troops in Cambodia.

Vietnam and the Middle 'East were the main topics of Rogers' talks with Yugoslavian Eoreign Minister Mirko Pepavac in Belgrade Saturday. Tito's position on Vietnam is that the United States

should just pull out and let the Communists take over.

ON THE MIDDLE EAST, the Secretary urged the Yugoslavian leaders, as he had the Arab officials with whom he conferred in Bahrein and Kuwait, to try to persuade Egypt to enter direct negotiations with Israel. He pointed out to the Arabs, and the Yugoslavs, who are very pro-Arab, that everybody is talking to one another these days.

He cited the recent agreement between North and South Korea to explore the possibility of unification and he called attention to the talks between East and West Germany and between the latter and Russia and Poland, all of which have lead to an improvment in relations.

While the Yugoslav Com munist regime strongly favors the North Vietnamese coalition government "naand opposes the use of American air power to support South Vietnam, the foreign minister refrained from publicly condemning the American bombing in the toast speech he gave at a Saturday night dinner in Belgrade in Rogers' honor.

Tepavac omitted from his speech a protest against the bombing which was included in the prepared draft. He did so in deference to Rogers' wishes.

In the discussion of Vietnam, the foreign minister .. said he knew that Rogers was . aware of the Yugoslav view on Vietnam. He did not specifically critize American policy nor urge the bombing be stopped.

Tepavac told Rogers he had . discussed the Vietnamese situation a fews days ago with the North Vietnamese ambassador in Belgrade, who gave the impression Hanoi was still

standing on its seven-point peace plan, which calls for a tional accord" in South Vietnam in which the Communists would have a dominant influence.

In the discussion on the Arab-Israel problem, Rodgers said the American government is distressed that the Mideast was the one area of international tension where the disputants were not talking to one another. He cited India and Pakistan, North and South Korea and East and West Germany.
