## Legislators Get Another Salary Hike

Gov. Francis W. Sargent yesterday signed into law legislation increasing the salaries of the House and Senate chairmen of the committee on government regulations.

As a result of the new law, Sen. Charles V. Hogan (D-Lynn) and Rep. William Q. MasLean (D-Fairhaven) will receive pay raises of \$3,800.

The base pay of legislators is \$11,400. However, recent practice has had the legislature grant additional compensation to the chairmen of both the House and Senate ways and means committees, the committee on taxation, and the committee on counties.

In addition, the House speaker gets double the pay of legislators, while the minority leader, and the assistant legislative leaders of both the speaker and the minority leader receive additional compensation.

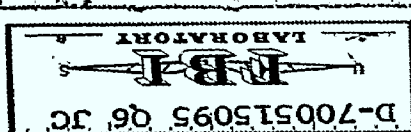

# Court to Review Abort

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court, in a case that could produce a landmark decision, agreed Monday to examine the constitutionality of the District of Columbia's abortion law.

The court will schedule arguments next fall on an appeal by the Justice Dept. from a ruling last Nov. 10 by U. S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell striking down the district's 69-year-old criminal statute against illegal abortion. The case will be decided by written opinion of the high court.

Gesell dismissed an indictment of Dr. Milan Vuitch, a Yugoslav immigrant who has been crusading for more liberal abortion policies.

Many states have laws similar to the district's, which bars an abortion except when "necessary for the preservation of the mother's life or health."

The American Civil Liberties Union and other abortion law activists have participated in recent stepped-up efforts to liberalize abortion laws. The most liberal one went into effect March 11 in Hawaii.

A number of state legislatures have pending bills similar to the one enacted in Hawaii. Others have liberalized their criminal codes to a lesser extent since Colorado did so in 1967.

A judge Federal Court in Milwaukee struck down part of Wisconsin's abortion statute. Lawsuits are pending in New York and New Jersey. More are planned.

The ACLU, feminist groups and others argue that an abortion is a matter solely between a woman and her physician. They say that the laws discriminate against the poor.

Earlier this term, the Supreme Court refused to re-

view a state court decision in California striking down the law in that state.

District Judge Gesell's opinion in the Washington case said the clause "necessary for the preservation of the mother's life or health" is so vague that a person accused of violating it cannot properly defend himself. He said it also places on the defendant the burden of proving that he made the right medical judgment.

The Justice Dept. appealed on the ground that Gesell should not have thrown out the case before trial but should have applied the law to the specific circumstances of Vuitch's case. The department added that the doctor's medical judgment is not always an issue because physicians sometimes perform abortions after doing nothing more than establishing the fact of pregnancy.

# O'Donnell aims campaign guns

Kenneth P. O'Donnell, at a press conference Wednesday, became the first of the gubernatorial candidates to announce specifically what his campaign strategy will be, both for the September primary and, if successful in that political war, the November election.

Although regarded as a liberal, progressive leader, one who gave himself the label "the anti-establishment candidate," O'Donnell has chosen a traditional theme of party versus party, Democrat against Republican, as the foundation of his strategy.

O'Donnell contends that, historically, his party, has led the way for all liberal and progressive programs, and that the Republicans have conceded their support only when forced to do so.

He considers Sargent highly vulnerable because of lack of accomplishment. He denounces him as an "Autumn liberal," indicating that the governor comes in with late support for programs only after they have been proven popular.

O'Donnell intends to "make Sargent a Republican, a Nixon Republican, a man who carries out Republican policy."

He says Sargent, in the spirit of the regime of former Gov. John A. Volpe, blames resistance from the Democratic legislature for failure to get things done. Behind the O'Donnell strategy is his conviction that the majority of Bay Staters prefer to vote Democratic; that the 40 percent of the voters who are registered Democrats represent a decisive base for any Democratic candidate of that a majority of the voters who regard them.

O'Donnell doesn't say that the Democrats need revitalizing, only an attractive candidate that can win. He says the lack of desirable options in the past has forfeited victory to the Republicans.

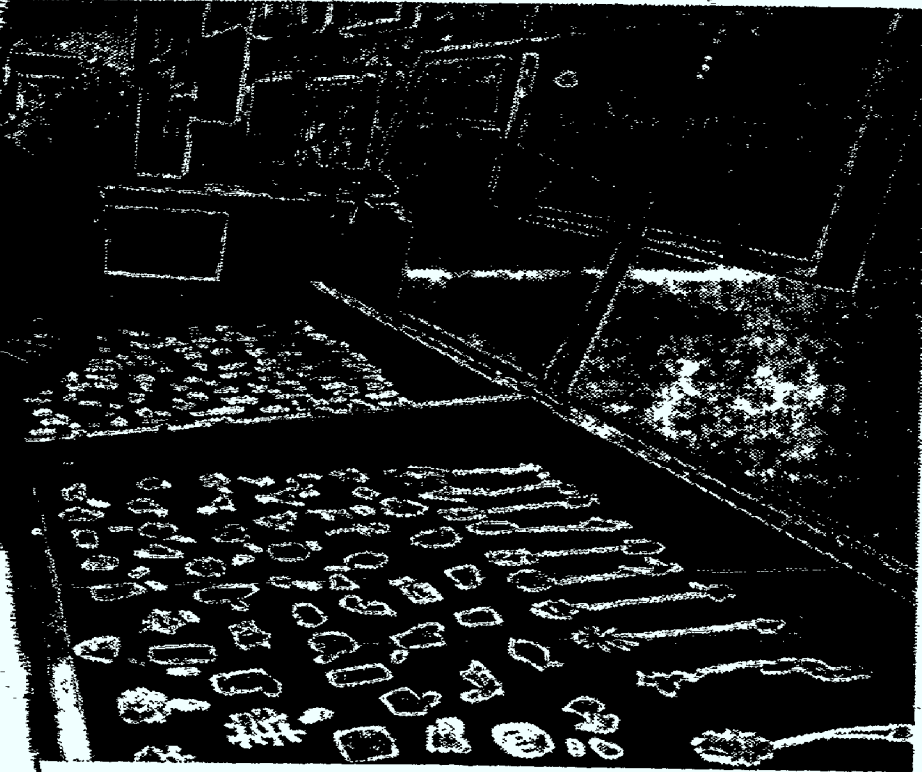

# Nixon Says Cambodia Neutrality Vital to U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The White House said Monday that the United States has "an overriding interest" in preserving the Cambodian neutrality because of the effects a Communist takeover would have on the U. S. war effort in South Vietnam.

Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said: "The President is deeply concerned about the course of events in Cambodia and is closely following developments."

He said Nixon wanted to preserve the territorial integrity of Cambodia and viewed with concern violations of Cambodian territory by North Vietnamese troops in "Blatant disregard" of the 1954 Geneva Accords.

Ziegler could give no indication of when a decision would be made by Nixon.

He called off for a third time a scheduled meeting of the National Security Council, but Ziegler said the session was not intended to deal with the Cambodian situation.

Ziegler said Nixon met both Sunday and Monday with top diplomatic and defense advisers to assess implications of North Vietnam's actions in Cambodia. The United States says there are 40,000 North Vietnamese and iVet Cong troops in Cambodia.

The White House statement followed one Friday by Ziegler characterizing the Communist force in Cambodia as a "foreign invasion."

With the exception of two years ago, soon after the death of Sen. Robert Kennedy, Ted has been racing here and has enjoyed great success.

Last year the senator finished ninth in the huge fleet. Later that night came the tragedy of Chappa-

quidick and if Kennedy prefers to avoid the scene of a nightmare, most people will understand.

But the feeling around the yacht club yesterday was that the youthful senator belongs here.

Last night, Ralph Martin, secretary of the Race Committee, had a large list of entries for the Wianno Class. Victura was not listed among them.

"Entries are closed," Ralph said. "but if the Senator shows up today, he certainly will be welcome."

There have been several questions about the entries for this great show. They have worried about the

because Soviet war supplies to Egypt were shifting the balance of power.

ROGERS was very pleased with the warm welcome he received from the Hungarian communist leaders, including Janos Kadar, the rough party regime played the Secretary's

visit in low key and Kadar had nothing to say publicly about it, Rogers felt the Hungarian Red ruler, his foreign minister and other officials were warm in their welcome and he considered the Hungarian visit "highly successful."

Kadar told the Secretary he appreciated his visit, the first an American cabinet minister has made to Hungary since the Communists took over in 1947.

The Secretary explained how President Nixon's foreign policy is aimed at creating an era of negotiation and cooperation with all nations.

He emphasized that while America feels it is necessary

for the preservation of world peace that the United States and the Soviet Union get along, it also feels it is very important that "we improve our relations with the smaller countries." Kadar agreed.

THE HUNGARIAN leaders appealed to Rogers to understand the delicacy and difficulty of Hungary's position they referred to the "scars" of the past and the tragic history of Hungary. The greatest mistake their ancestors made, they added, was to locate where they did, between two great powers — Russia and Germany. Kadar also pointed out Hungary's lack of resources and its economic dependence on the Soviet bloc. What he seemed to be saying to the Secretary was "We are very happy you are here, but take into consideration our situation."

Hungary is eager to expand its trade relations with the United States, which have been adversely affected by

restrictive barriers on both sides.

The Hungarian leaders took the initiative in proposing a quick settlement of the claims against Hungary for American property, mostly Mobile Oil and Singer interests, expropriated by the Communist regime. The U.S. is claiming approximately \$30 million, almost half of the original claim.

IN ADDITION to signing an agreement for exchange of scientific information, the Hungarians agreed to negotiate a cultural agreement in line with President Nixon's policy of promoting freer movement of people and ideas between the Communist-ruled nations and the West.

Vietnam and the Middle East were the main topics of Rogers' talks with Yugoslavian Foreign Minister Mirko Pevavac in Belgrade Saturday. Tito's position on Vietnam is that the United States

should just pull out and let the Communists take over.

ON THE MIDDLE EAST, the Secretary urged the Yugoslavian leaders, as he had the Arab officials with whom he conferred in Bahrain and Kuwait, to try to persuade Egypt to enter direct negotiations with Israel. He pointed out to the Arabs, and the Yugoslavs, who are very pro-Arab, that everybody is talking to one another these days.

He cited the recent agreement between North and South Korea to explore the possibility of unification and he called attention to the talks between East and West Germany and between the latter and Russia and Poland, all of which have led to an improvement in relations.

He expressed the conviction that if Egypt would enter into direct talks with Israel, the Arabs might find the Jewish state much more conciliatory about a settlement than they think likely.

# Vietnam Peace Talks Outlook 'Encouraging', Rogers

He did not go into details. But he did express the belief the war is going to end although he could not say just when and how.

However, he said President Nixon believes China and Russia want to see the Vietnam conflict settled, though it is not clear how much pressure they are bringing on Hanoi to negotiate.

The Secretary also told the Yugoslav that it is now clear the international community as a whole wants to see the Vietnam war end.

While the Yugoslav Communist regime strongly favors the North Vietnamese and opposes the use of American air power to support South Vietnam, the foreign minister refrained from publicly condemning the American bombing in the toast speech he gave at a Saturday night dinner in Belgrade in Rogers' honor.

Tepavac omitted from his speech a protest against the bombing which was included in the prepared draft. He did so in deference to Rogers' wishes.

In the discussion of Vietnam, the foreign minister said he knew that Rogers was aware of the Yugoslav view on Vietnam. He did not specifically criticize American policy nor urge the bombing be stopped.

Tepavac told Rogers he had discussed the Vietnamese situation a few days ago with the North Vietnamese ambassador in Belgrade, who gave the impression Hanoi was still

standing on its seven-point peace plan, which calls for a coalition government "national accord" in South Vietnam in which the Communists would have a dominant influence.

In the discussion on the Arab-Israel problem, Rodgers said the American government is distressed that the Mideast was the one area of international tension where the disputants were not talking to one another. He cited India and Pakistan, North and South Korea and East and West Germany.

The Secretary was trying to convey the hope that the Yugoslavs, who have good relations with the Arabs might urge Egypt to start direct talks with Israel.

Tepavac said Yugoslavia was concerned about the supply of arms to the parties in the Middle East. Rogers pointed out that for eight months the U. S. withheld the supply of war planes to Israel and only resumed them

because Soviet was supplies to Egypt were shifting the balance of power.

ROGERS was very pleased with the warm welcome he received from the Hungarian communist leaders, including Janos Kadar, the rough party regime played the Secretary's

Kadar told the Secretary he appreciated his visit, the first an American cabinet minister has made to Hungary since the Communists took over in 1947.

The Secretary explained how President Nixon's foreign policy is aimed at creating an era of negotiation and cooperation with all nations.

He emphasized that while America feels it is necessary

for the preservation of world peace that the United States and the Soviet Union get along, it also feels it is very important that "we improve our relations with the smaller countries." Kadar agreed.

THE HUNGARIAN leaders appealed to Rogers to understand the delicacy and difficulty of Hungary's position they referred to the "scars" of the past and the tragic history of Hungary. The greatest mistake their ancestors made, they added, was to locate where they did, between two great powers — Russia and Germany. Kadar also pointed out Hungary's lack of resources and its economic dependence on the Soviet bloc. What he seemed to be saying to the Secretary was "We are very happy you are here, but take into consideration our situation."

Hungary is eager to expand its trade relations with the United States, which have been adversely affected by

restrictive barriers or sides.
