Sen. Williams joins an odd crew

NEW Jersey's U.S. Sen. Williams has thrown his support solidly behind the anti-war marches to be held in Washington and San Francisco on April 24.

He gave the demonstrations a glowing testimonial in a news release this week, calling them "a positive step toward peace" which would bring "unity" to the nation again.

"I support the April 24th rallies as a historic milestone in our return to a national consensus, and a positive step toward peace," Sen. Williams said.

The senator's praise means that he has the same feelings toward the originators and promoters of these demonstrations.

The sponsoring group is known as the National Peace Action Coalition. The coalition was put together by the Socialist Workers party, which has been cited as a Communist front, and the Young

Socialist Alliance, the youth branch of the Socialist Workers party. These two organizations represent the Troskyite branch of Communism.

A Chicago policeman who infiltrated the Young Socialist Alliance said, in testimony before the House Committee on Internal Security one year ago, that the organization was "trying to create their revolution . . . They feel it would be a violent revolution . . . They advocate violence when it is necessary to be implemented toward a political goal."

These are the promoters of the demonstrations to which Sen. Williams has given his blessing.

The "unity" which Sen. Williams sees growing out of the demonstrations will have to be the only kind of "unity" that Communism permits — Communist "unity." We see that kind of "unity" in hapless Poland and Czechoslovakia.

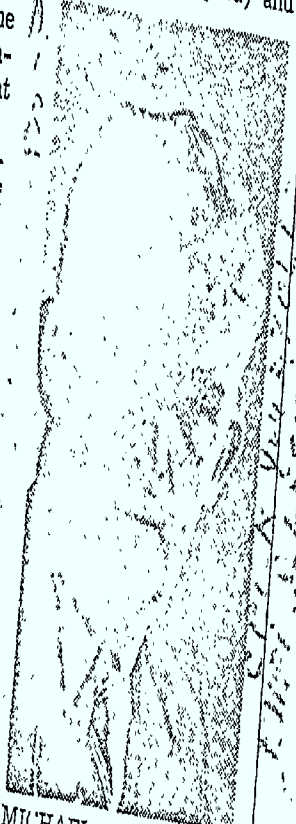

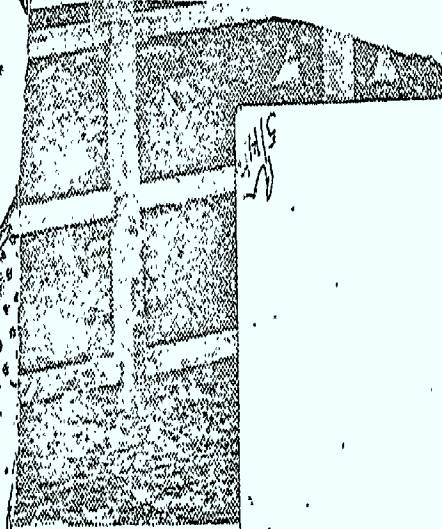

O'Donnell aims

campaign guns

Kenneth P. O'Donnell, at a press conference Wednesday, became the first of the gubernatorial candidates to announce specifically what his campaign strategy will be, both for the September primary and, if successful in that political war, the November election.

Although regarded as a liberal, progressive leader, one who gave himself the label "the anti-establishment candidate," O'Donnell has chosen a traditional theme of party versus party, Democrat against Republican, as the foundation of his strategy.

O'Donnell doesn't say that the Democrats need revitalizing, only an attractive candidate that can win. He says the lack of desirable options in the past has forfeited victory to the Republicans.

And, of course, he identifies himself as the only contending Democrat who can tip over Gov. Francis W. Sargent come election day.

Republican control of government doesn't work in the executive branch of a state in which the legislature is overwhelmingly Democratic, says O'Donnell. And this is not because the

legislature becomes obstructionist, he adds. O'Donnell contends that, historically, his party, has led the way for all liberal and progressive programs, and that the Republicans have conceded their support only when forced to do so.

He considers Sargent highly vulnerable because of lack of accomplishment. He denounces him as an "Autumn liberal," indicating that the governor comes in with late support for programs only after they have been proven popular.

O'Donnell intends to "make Sargent a Republican, a Nixon Republican, a man who carries out Republican policy."

He says Sargent, in the spirit of the regime of former Gov. John A. Volpe, blames resistance from the Democratic legislature for failure to get things done. Behind the O'Donnell strategy is his conviction that the majority of Bay Staters prefer to vote Democratic; that the 40 percent of the voters who are registered Democrats represent a decisive base for Democratic candidate of

I. C. Case Faces Highest Test

Court to Review Abort

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court, in a case that could produce a landmark decision, agreed Monday to examine the constitutionality of the District of Columbia's abortion law.

The court will schedule arguments next fall on an appeal by the Justice Dept. from a ruling last Nov. 10 by U. S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell striking down the district's 69-year-old criminal statute against illegal abortion. The case will be decided by a written opinion of the high court.

Gesell dismissed an indictment of Dr. Milan Vuitich, a Yugoslav immigrant who has been crusading for more liberal abortion policies.

Many states have laws similar to the district's, which bars an abortion except when "necessary for the preservation of the mother's life or health."

"STUDENT POWER" flexed its muscles Wednesday at Boston College when the University Academic Senate voted 41-4 to end classes for the semester three weeks early. The three weeks will be used as a "reading period" to be followed by the regularly scheduled final exams.

The action was taken as part of the students' continuing protest against a proposed hike in tuition. The students had been on strike for 10 days when the vote was taken.

MURDER ACCIDENT occurred last July, the trial last September and the inquest last January, the story of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy and the Chappaquiddick Bridge continues to drag on.

Sen. Kennedy on Thursday asked the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court to order the release of the original transcript and report of the Mary Jo Kopechne inquest for public examination.

THE RELEASE OF THE TRANSCRIPT has been delayed by a suit filed by the court stenographers who compiled the transcript. They claim that they have the right to sell and distribute copies of the 764-page document now impounded in the office of Edward V. Keating, clerk of Suffolk Superior Criminal Court.

Miss Kopechne died when a car driven by Sen. Kennedy plunged off a narrow bridge into a salt pond on Chappaquiddick Island.

EVENTS OF A DECADE AGO are being rehashed in the trial of 63-year-old George L. Brady, former chairman of the Massachusetts Parking Authority. He is charged with conspiring to extract a \$405,000 "kickback" during the construction of the \$7.5 million garage under Boston Common.

During testimony last week, Francis W. Kiernan, an engineer who already has served his time in connection with the case, testified that he delivered \$261,000 in cash to Brady in 1960.

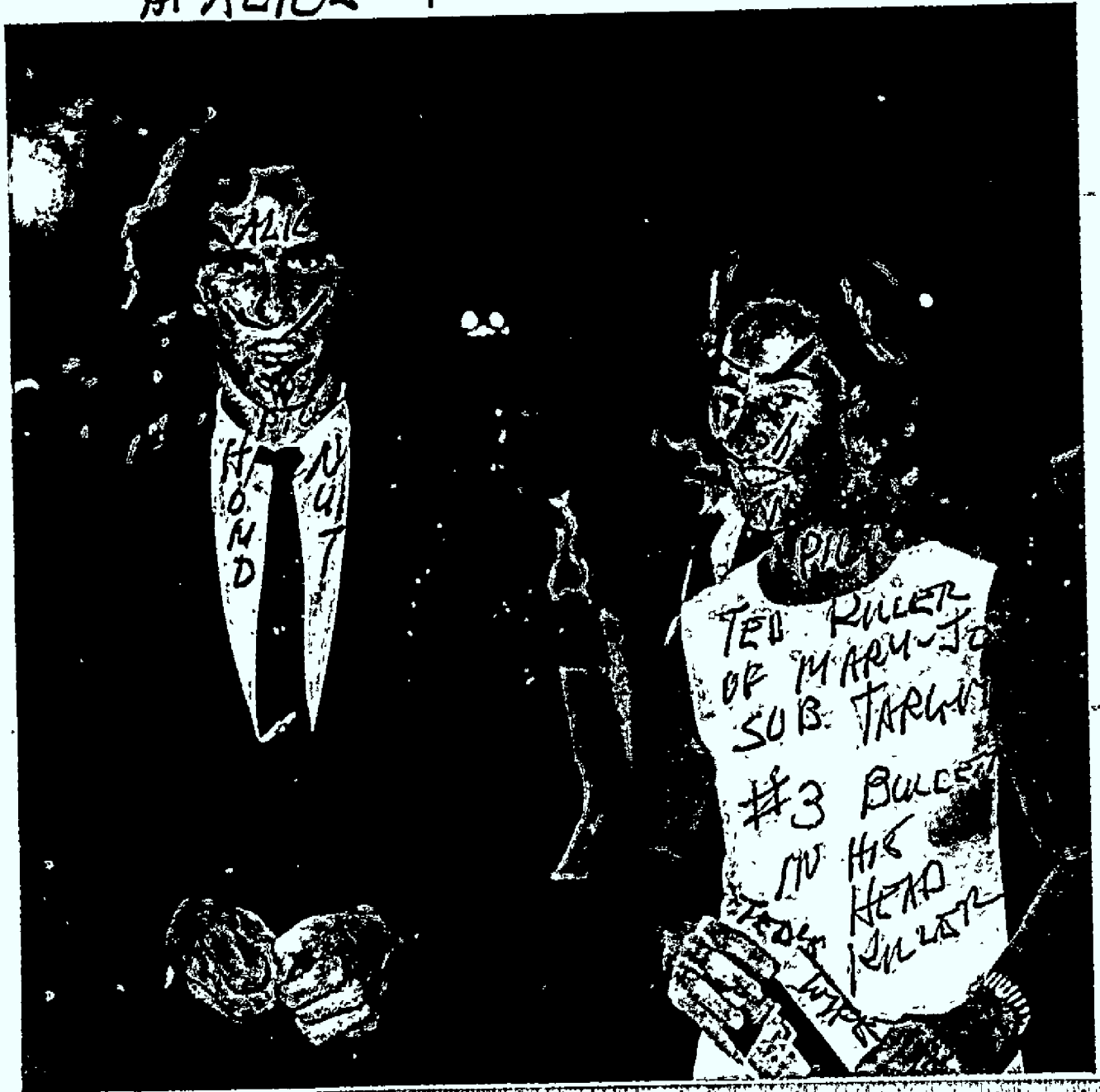

Harrington Asks Lavelle Probe

LIGONIER, Pa. — Arnold Palmer, elating his hometown fans with an old-fashioned charge, teamed with Jack Nicklaus for a ten-under par 61 yesterday to take a three-stroke first-round lead in the \$200,000 National Four-Ball Championship.

The game's two most dynamic stars combined for ten birdies — Palmer 6 and Nicklaus 4 — as they missed the tournament scoring record by just one stroke.
