

CARR ALLEGES THAT HER FATHER TOLD LOUISE BUNDY THAT HIS NAME WAS EITHER LLOYD NELSON OR JACK WORTHINGTON. CARR BELIEVES THAT BUNDY WAS BORN ONE OF TWO TWIN BROTHERS AND THAT THE BIRTH RECORDS SHOULD BE MAINTAINED IN VERMONT. BUNDY WAS BORN NOVEMBER 24, 1946, AT BURLINGTON, VERMONT.

CARR ADVISED THAT SHE AND HER FATHER VISITED TED AND LOUISE BUNDY AT WEST PARK IN PITTSBURGH, PENNSYLVANIA, SOMETIME IN THE MID-1950S, WHEN CARR WAS FOUR OR FIVE YEARS OLD. CARR RECALLS WATCHING BUNDY PUSH A LITTLE GIRL OFF OF AN EMBANKMENT IN THIS PARK INTO THE PATH OF AN ONCOMING BURLINGTON NORTHERN TRAIN. THE LITTLE GIRL ALLEGEDLY DIED OF THIS INCIDENT. CARR'S NEXT RECOLLECTION OF BUNDY IS THAT WHEN HE WAS 14 OR 15 YEARS OLD, HE STOLE A CAR IN TACOMA, WASHINGTON, AND DROVE IT TO PITTSBURGH, PENNSYLVANIA. CARR IS OF THE UNDERSTANDING THAT BUNDY'S JUVENILE RECORD HAD BEEN EXPUNGED.

CARR RECALLS MEETING BUNDY AGAIN SOMETIME BETWEEN 1968 AND 1970 WHEN BUNDY WAS A STUDENT AT TEMPLE UNIVERSITY. CARR TRAVELED TO PHILADELPHIA TO ATTEND A ROCK CONCERT. THE NEXT TIME CARR RECALLED MEETING BUNDY WAS SOMETIME IN 1970, WHEN CARR WAS A STUDENT AT THE UNIVERSITY OF PITTSBURGH. CARR STATED THAT SHE ATTENDED A PARTY WHERE BUNDY WAS PRESENT AND, DURING THEIR CONVERSATION, BUNDY INDICATED TO HER THAT HE HAD KILLED SOMEONE IN TACOMA, WASHINGTON, AND WAS RESPONSIBLE FOR A 1969 NEW JERSEY TURNPIKE MURDER. DURING THIS TIME, CARR KNOWS BUNDY IS IN PITTSBURGH AND A UNIVERSITY COED IS STABBED TO DEATH. CARR CLAIMS THAT SHE CONTACTED POLICE AT THIS TIME (1970) TO LET THEM

KNOW BUNDY IS A VIABLE SUSPECT, AS SHE IS FAMILIAR WITH HIS PREVIOUS CRIMINAL HISTORY. AFTER 1970, CARR STATES THAT SHE HAS NO FURTHER PERSONAL KNOWLEDGE OF ANY OF BUNDY'S CRIMES.

CARR HAS SENT A 1946 PHOTOGRAPH OF HER FATHER WHICH
BEARS A RESEMBLANCE TO PUBLISHED PHOTOGRAPHS OF TED BUNDY. CARR
STATES THAT HER FATHER "THINKS THAT SHE IS NUTS" AND THAT THESE
STORIES ARE FABRICATIONS. CARR INDICATES THAT SHE HAS WRITTEN TO
LOUISE BUNDY, BUT IT IS UNKNOWN IF BUNDY HAS RETURNED ANY
CORRESPONDENCE.



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

Dear Director Sessions:

THE "TED BUNDY MULTIAGENCY INVESTIGATION TEAM CONFERENCE" was held February 21-24, 1989 at the FBI Academy. I attended the conference along with fifteen other investigators and prosecutors who dealt with Ted Bundy over the years. Each participant presented Bundy's method of operation for the crimes that he committed and gave a chronology of his travels while he lived in their respective jurisdictions. From this information, the personnel of the National Center for the Analysis of Violent Crime were to produce: (1) a detailed summary of Ted Bundy's various methods of operation and (2) a chronology of Bundy's life, which was to include specific dates and times of his whereabouts. This information was to be used by law enforcement officers who were interested in whether or not Bundy could be responsible for a murder in their locales.

At the conference, I provided a transcript of Bundy's confessions given to me just days prior to his execution, a description of Bundy's method of operation in eight murders in the Pacific Northwest, and a partial timeline of Bundy's activities from his birth to September of 1974. Over the years, I have provided to NCAVC personnel a 161 page transcript of Bundy's statements to me in November 1984, a 69 page transcript of Bundy's statement to me in February 1988, and copies of numerous letters Bundy wrote to me from 1984 to 1988. Subsequent to the conference, I went through Bundy cases files at the King County Police Department with FBI personnel and documents that contained information about Bundy's whereabouts were photocopied to be included in the chronology. Other investigators and prosecutors who attended the conference provided similar information to FBI personnel.

In addition, the summary and chronology were to include any in his information developed by Agent L conversations and correspondence with Ted Bundy over the years, 100 be to date, no such summary and chronology have been produced: 100 book of the King County Police Department, Seattle, Washington and I participated with the expectation that there would be a good faith effort to produce the summary and

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chronology in a timely manner. We were expecting these documents within 6-8 months after the conference, and now, it has been almost 2 1/2 years. Two and 1/2 years cannot be construed as timely.

Any assistance that you could give to expedite the production of the summary and chronology would be appreciated. Law enforcement officers from all over the country were aware that the information was to be forthcoming and have made inquiries about sundy's M. O. and whereabouts. If you have any questions, please call me at _______ Thank you for your cooperation.

THOMAS D., CARR, date of birth (dob) February 12, 1913, was contacted at the Pittsburgh Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). He was advised of the identity of the interviewing Agent and the nature of the interview. CARR then furnished the following information:

CARR was born in Columbus, Ohio. His family moved to Reading, PA, where he attended grade school, and then to Spokane, Washington, where he attended high school. CARR moved back to Ohio and lived in Toledo and Findlay before moving to Pittsburgh in 1937. CARR was hired in 1936 as a Civil Service employee for the Railroad Mail Service. When he moved to Pittsburgh, he worked at the railroad terminal located in the Post Office Building in downtown Pittsburgh. He worked there until retirement in 1975.

CARR first heard his daughter, JANLA CARR, speak of TED BUNDY subsequent to BUNDY'S death several years ago. He recalls JANLA saying she had called someone in Washington about TED BUNDY. CARR tried to discourage JANLA from contacting the authorities concerning BUNDY, but was unsuccessful. He noted that JANLA had spent a great deal of time and effort researching BUNDY and has read all the books and articles about BUNDY she could obtain. JANLA conducted her research with the aid of computers at the Carnegie Mellon University Library and the University of Pittsburgh Library.

JANLA raised the topic of TED BUNDY several years ago when she told CARR that when she was in college, BUNDY had come looking for her because she had incriminating information concerning him. JANLA told him other stories concerning BUNDY and CARR is aware that she attempted to find information that would corroborate her stories.

CARR denied that he is the father of TED BUNDY. He does not know anyone by the name of LOUISE BUNDY. He does not know why JANLA thinks he is TED BUNDY's father. CARR described JANLA as a very intelligent and clever person. He suspects that

she may have emotional problems, though he has never known her to be treated for emotional problems. She grew up in Pittsburgh as the only child of CARR and

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JANLA attended the University of Pittsburgh for approximately two semesters, then dropped out of school. She was not attending classes and claimed she had a thyroid problem. CARR recalled that JANLA was prescribed a thyroid extract for the thyroid problem. JANLA sees her own physician and CARR is unaware of any health problems she may have.

CARR*noted that JANLA is very close to

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at some point, and JANLA went on a trip through Vermont together. He also confirmed that JANLA lived in a dormitory while she attended the University of Pittsburgh. He indicated that while JANLA is 39 years old and is single, she has had no significant work experience. CARR could not recall any other topic with which his daughter was so obsessed as with TED BUNDY.

CARR admitted that his relationship with his daughter is strained. He indicated that the FBI should question his daughter about why she insists that CARR is the father of TED BUNDY. It was CARR's opinion that JANLA could be very convincing and clever. He again indicated that JANLA had never mentioned TED BUNDY to him until after BUNDY was dead.

> Her son was introduced to JANLA as TEDDY. JANLA and TEDDY went off together in the park. TEDDY dropped a little boy over a wall in the park. The little boy crawled over to the railroad tracks. TEDDY tried to pull, the little boy off of the tracks, but was unsuccessful. The little boy was then hit be a train and killed. TEDDY attempted to sexually attack JANLA after the train incident by acting out what he had learned in pictures.

> The next encounter CARR had with TED BUNDY occurred in 1968 in Old Bennington, Vermont. CARR was on vacation with CARR met a strange man at the railway station in Old Bennington. She recalled that she was attracted to the man, who introduced himself as TED. CARR called her father in Pittsburgh at this time and described TED to him. CARR recalled that her father got very upset and began shouting at her over the phone.

> CARR's next encounter with TED BUNDY occurred in November of 1969. At this time, CARR was a freshman at the University of Pittsburgh. CARR's dormitory roommate, , was from Philadelphia. CARR and travelled to Philadelphia during the weekend prior to Thanksgiving in order to attend a Rolling Stones concert. While in Philadelphia, CARR attended a party at Temple University. At this party, CARR was approached by a young man who turned out to be TED BUNDY. tried to get her away from the crowd. CARR did not recognize him from their earlier meetings because her father had brainwashed her to forget that she ever met him.

> CARR and BUNDY took LSD at the party. CARR stated that she was in love with BUNDY, then realized during the course of their conversation that he was a mass murderer. BUNDY told CARR that she did not know what he was like, and he talked about the devil as if he were the devil. He told CARR about an incident that occurred when he was 14 or 15. A little girl he liked fell off a bridge into the water below and broke her neck. She was dead from the fall, but BUNDY sexually assaulted her and buried her near the river. CARR told him that as long as such an incident never happened again, she could accept it. BUNDY then made a face as if he was remembering the incident. He then mentioned Kettering, Ohio, and the names He asked CARR if she liked Volkswagens. He then asked her if she liked silver blue Volkswagens.

During the LSD trip, BUNDY also admitted to CARR that he had shot someone in Jackson, Mississippi, and started a race riot. CARR indicated that was also brought up by CARR indicated that was from and was murdered. CARR indicated that the death of was attributed to the subject of a book called The Michigan Murders. BUNDY further discussed the devil and made more statements to CARR that indicated to her that he had killed other people. BUNDY told CARR that he was psychic. He predicted that a woman named _____ was going to be stabbed. CARR claimed that on the following day, a woman named was stabbed at Penn State University. BUNDY also predicted that that he would have a career as a criminal, and that he would be killed for his crimes. At the end of this encounter at Temple, BUNDY hypnotized CARR to forget everything he told her!

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In the spring of 1970, CARR was on campus at the University of Pittsburgh when she again saw TED BUNDY. At this time, she remembered that he told her he had killed people. She went to the Pitt Campus Police and told them that TED BUNDY was on campus and that he had killed people. CARR does not know if the Campus Police did anything, but BUNDY disappeared. Around the same time, a Pitt coed who had her hair parted in the center was strangled to death. CARR did not tell anyone else about BUNDY because she thought that contacting the Campus Police was sufficient.

CARR*had further contact with BUNDY over the telephone. In the early 70s, BUNDY called CARR at her unlisted telephone number. He told her he received her number from a spirit. At this time, she recalled their meeting at Temple.

In 1983, BUNDY called CARR from prison and gave her the code name of ANGELA WOODS. Also in 1983, CARR received a call from who identified herself as She told CARR that BUNDY had used credit card to call CARR. CARR told that she did not know BUNDY was married.

In 1987, CARR received a call from BUNDY but did not recognize his voice. He said he was the most evil person in the world. CARR indicated that she was half-asleep when he called and did not realize until later that it was BUNDY.

CARR explained that she began to fully recall all these events several years ago and because both her father and BUNDY had hypnotized her, she did not always know or recognize BUNDY as her half-brother. CARR admitted that she had written to LOUISE BUNDY and received a written response from her. CARR refused to provide the response from LOUISE BUNDY to the FBI because it was too defamatory. CARR indicated that LOUISE BUNDY discounted everything CARR had written about. CARR termed LOUISE BUNDY's response as, "the original poison pen letter." CARR explained that her father denies everything connecting him to TED BUNDY. Furthermore, her father destroyed letters from LOUISE BUNDY that were addressed to JACK WORTHINGTON and he destroyed an Army jacket with the name NELSON on it.

CARR indicated that she was willing to take an FBI polygraph examination concerning the foregoing events she described. The following information concerning CARR was obtained through observation and interview:

JANLA CARR's allegations concerning her contacts with BUNDY were uneven and difficult to follow inasmuch as nearly every encounter she described with BUNDY, she had no recollection or made no connection with her prior contacts with BUNDY. She explained that she had been brainwashed by her father and hypnotized by BUNDY into forgetting her contacts with BUNDY. Although JANLA CARR appeared cooperative during the interview, of significance is the fact that she refused to show to the FBI the letter she received from LOUISE BUNDY, which she admitted refuted point by point her allegations concerning her relationship with BUNDY.

Inasmuch as JANLA CARR's allegations concerning her personal contacts with TED BUNDY lack credibility and in view of the indication she conducted extensive research concerning BUNDY, no investigation was conducted to determine if the crimes described by JANLA CARR occurred.

Inasmuch as no investigation remains in the Pittsburgh Division, this case is being placed in an RUC status.



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DEBRA KENT MISSING PERSON

On the evening of November 8, 1974, at approximately 10:10 P.M., Debra Kent, a 17-year-old high school girl, was attending a play at the Viewmont High School auditorium at Bountiful, Utah, with her parents. Her father, who is an official of a local oil company, asked Debra to take the family car, which was parked in the school parking lot, and to pick up her younger brother who was expecting the family. Debra took the keys to the car and left the auditorium, and has not been seen since that time.

As has been previously reported, Melissa Smith, daughter of the Chief of Police of Midvale, Utah, disappeared on a Friday evening sometime after 9:00 P.M. after she had visited a girl friend. On the evening of October 26, 1974, the body of Melissa Smith was found in a heavily wooded area east of Salt Lake City, Utah, at a point known as Summit Park. Medical examination disclosed her death to have been caused by a massive brain hemorrhage. She had been sexually assaulted, a stocking had been tied around her throat, and she had been badly beaten about the head.

Similarities in the two incidents have caused intensive investigation by law enforcement officers in the entire Salt Lake City area.

On the evening of Friday, November 8, 1974, a young girl, approximately 17 years of age, was approached by a white male in his late 20's who displayed a badge and told her he was an officer and asked her to accompany him to where her car was parked as there was some trouble in the parking lot. This occurred at the Fashion Place Mall, an area frequented by

Melissa Smith and a large number of high school teenagers in the area.

The girl accompanied the man to the parking lot. He grabbed her, forced her into an automobile and attempted to handcuff her. One handcuff was placed on her wrist and he drove away with her in the car, and when the car stopped, she escaped.

A search of the parking lot near the Viewmont High School where Debra Kent disappeared disclosed a handcuff key which fit the handcuff retained by the girl who was assaulted at the Fashion Place Mall on November 8, 1974.

It appears that all three of these incidents may have a similar basis. Because of the widespread local

Because of the widespread local publicity, law enforcement officers in the entire area are joining in an inquiry to identify the subject who is believed responsible for the murder of Melissa Smith, the disappearance of Debra Kent, and the attempted abduction of the young girl at Murray, Utah.




On 6/2/74, the body of a young girl was found in the Green River near Grand Junction, Colorado. She was unidentified for a long period of time but Grand Junction authorities recently identified her as SANDRA JEAN WEAVER, a native of Racine, Wisconsin.

Grand Junction authorities, in contact with SO at Salt Lake City, Utah, indicated that the victim had been sexually assaulted, and murdered in almost exactly the same fashion as were both MELISSA SMITH and LAURA AMIL.

SO has been conducting investigation with several deputies assigned as Grand Junction authorities learned from Wisconsin that the victim at Grand Junction had been employed by a trucking company of Salt Lake City immediately prior to her death.

The Wycoff Trucking Company employed this girl for a short period of time and the SO has learned that on the evening of 6/30/74, SANDRA JEAN WEAVER with three boyfriends spent the entire night on a party including

When SANDRA left work she was wearing some unusual sandals which were specifically recalled by fellow employees.

The girlfriend was traced back to Racine, Wisconsin. She was interviewed there by Wisconsin Police who reported her completely uncooperative. She was wearing the sandals known to have been worn by SANDRA WEAVER on the morning of 7/1/74. SANDRA's body was found on the evening of 7/2/74.

The girlfriend in Wisconsin is reported to have been harboring three felons wanted for robbery and burglary and their apprehension in Wisconsin required police to use tear gas to force them from the girlfriend's apartment.

SANDRA JEAN WEAVER and the girlfriend are reported to have been traveling regularly by hitchhiking. They came from Wisconsin to Utah in that fashion. Both were involved in drugs. It is thought that SANDRA JEAN WEAVER was particularly addicted.

SANDRA's associates at the house trailer at Tooele, Utah, where she was living, at the truck line and any other acquaintances identified have all been interviewed by Sheriff's deputies.

As noted in the original communication in this case, DEBRA KENT, 17 year old high school girl, disappeared after she had attended a play at a high school in Bountiful, Utah, with her parents. She left the play in order to take the family car from the parking lot and pick up her younger brother at a nearby bowling alley.

Salt Lake City Division has been following this matter at a regular interval since the date this occurred, and has offered local agencies Bureau assistance where ever possible.

On the evening of October 26, 1974, the body of MELISSA SMITH, another 17 year old girl living in Midvale, Utah, was found in a wooded area east of Salt Lake City. She had been sexually assaulted and murdered.

A short time later, the body of a third 17 year old girl, LAURA AMIE, was found in a mountainous area south of Salt Lake City. She had been sexually assaulted and murdered in the same fashion as had MELISSA SMITH.

Salt Lake City has been assisting local officers in out-of-state leads in connection with these two murder cases, and some local authorities are of the opinion that DEBRA KENT may be a victim of the same unknown subject responsible for the

murders of the other two girls. There has been absolutely no trace of DEBRA KENT since the evening she disappeared. As of 3/14/75, the Chief of Police in Bountiful, Utah, has reported no good leads in this case.

This matter is being followed to determine if there is any possible violation in which this Bureau may have interest. Salt Lake City will continue to follow this matter in view of the seriousness of the offenses.

Hike Reward For Debra, Officers Ask

BOUNTIFUL — With few clues in solving the Debra Kent mystery, a \$10,000 reward fund for the arrest and

conviction of her abductor will be started Thursday by 10 civic leaders.

The new reward could bring to \$15,500 the amount offered to solve the mystery.

Debra Kent disappeared from the parking lot of Viewmont High School last

Debra Kent November. She had left the school play she was attending with her parents to pick up a younger brother and was never seen again.

A \$5,500 reward for information on her whereabouts has already been posted.

Within 30 Days

Bountiful Mayor Morris F. Swapp said the Debra Kent Reward Fund Committee hopes to collect the \$10,000 within 30 days. He said the committee is asking contributions of \$1 to \$100 from all members of the south Davis County communities.

"We want the citizens of our communities to know that we have interest in protecting our young people at any cost," said Mayor Swapp. He said if the reward is not used in solving the Debra Kent case, it will be used in her memory as a reward in any similar incident that might occur in the south Davis area.

Mayor Swapp said with no current information on the girl's whereabouts, the Bountiful Police Department advised the city a substantial reward might bring information leading to the arrest and conviction of her abductor. Mayor Swapp said police believe the girl has been murdered.

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Special Fund

The mayor and city council will administer the special reward fund, he said. Contributions can be sent in care of the fund to the Bountiful City Hall.
The contributions are tax deductible, he said.

Other Rewards

Rewards are also being offered for the arrest and conviction in the murders of Melissa Smith and Laura Ann Aime.

The bodies of the two teen-age girls were found last fall, murdered and sexually assaulted.

No suspects have been arrested in any of the cases.

Also unsolved is the murder of Barbara Jean Rocky, a 22-year-old Brigham Young University coed who was found slain in March, 1974, in Big Cottonwood Canyon.

Found Strangled

Miss Smith, 17, daughter of Midvale Police Chief Louis S. Smith, disappeared last October and was later found

by a deer hunter in Toll Canyon, near Summit Park.

Miss Aime, 17, of Salem, Utah County, was found near the Timpanogos Cave Visitor's Center about a month later.

Salt Lake County Sheriff's Capt. N.D. Hayward was forced to release one suspect after insufficient evidence failed to produce a criminal complaint from the county attorney's office.

He now says his office has retraced its steps, firmed up the evidence and will probably seek a criminal complaint against a suspect within the next month.

Utah County Sheriff Mack Holley, investigating the Aime case, says he has not fared so well.

Although he has assigned an officer to work on the case full-time, the sheriff says he has "nothing yet."

Nothing New

He said the clues his office has obtained were found immediately following the murder and nothing new has developed in recent months.

Bountiful City police, assisted by the Davis County Sheriff departemnt, have scoured the hillsides near Bountiful for Miss Kent.

Nothing has turned up and Bountiful police admit to being "mystified." Evidence, they say, is scarce...clues vague.

'Have Suspects'

Summit County Sheriff Ronald Robinson says, he too, is investigating full-time the death of Miss Smith. "We have suspects." he adds, but admits that any arrest "depends on the breaks."

All of the officers are somewhat thesitant to discuss their cases. Although clues have been investigated and reinterestigated, the answer always turns up the same — no concrete suspects.

New funds sought for missing girl

BOUNTIFUL — "Nobody can come into Bountiful and abduct one of our girls and get away with it!" Mayor Morris F. Swapp said today.

He was referring to the apparent abduction of Debra Kent. 17, who has been missing since Nov. 8, 1974, when she left a Viewmont High School play that she and her parents were watching.

She supposedly went to the school parking lot about 10:10 p.m. to get the family car to pick up one of her brothers at a skating rink across town. She has never been seen since.

"The police believe Debra was abducted."
We are going to bring that man to justice and take him out of society," Swapp pledged.

He spoke to Davis County school principals, county and city officials, businessmen, church leaders and Chamber of Commerce members who met to discuss raising a \$10,000 reward for information about Debra's disappearance

The group, meeting at the Serv-Us Drug Co., 55 N. Main in Bountiful, decided to circulate letters to more than 10,000 Davis County homes asking for donations to a Debra Kent Reward Fund.

The letters will be taken home to parents by school children in the elementary, junior high and high schools.

"We have almost \$400 now and hope to raise the money in a week. At any rate, we will just raise \$10,000 and no more," said Swapp.

Debra Kent Reward Hits \$5,000 Mark

BOUNTIFUL — Contributions to the Debra Kent Reward Fund have reached nearly \$5,000 and are still coming in, the Bountiful treasurer said.

The fund was started over a month ago to gather \$10,000 to provide a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the abductor of Debra Kent.

Miss Kent was a 17-yearold Viewmont High School senior when she disappeared last Nov. 8. She had been attending a school play with her parents and had left to pick up her younger brother when she disappeared. She has never been seen since.

Other Cases

Two other 17-year-old girls who disappeared about the same time where later found raped and murdered.

Bountiful Treasurer Ira Todd said while contributions are still coming in, less money is being contributed now than when the fund was started by 10 Bountiful businessmen.

Plan New Push

He said the largest contribution has been \$200.

At the time of the fund's inception, Viewmont High Principal Almon J. Flake had predicted the \$10,000 would be raised within a week. Bountiful Mayor Morris Swapp said the fund would serve as an example that residents would not sit idly by and allow women to be abouted, raped and murdered.

U. Law Student Charged In Kidnaping

A University of Utah law student was charged Thursday with aggravated kidnaping and attempted criminal homicide in connection with a report last Nov. 8 from a 17-year-old girl that a man posing as a police officer abducted her at Tashion Place Mall in Murray. She was able to escape, police reported then.

Named in a two-page complaint was Theodore Robert Bundy, 28, 364 Douglas St. (1240 East). He was booked in jail Thursday evening after questioning by Salt Lake County Sheriff's Capt. N. D. Hayward and other lawmen.

Signs Complaint

The complaint was signed before Salt Lake City Judge Floyd H. Gowans, who set bail at \$100,000. Preliminary hearing was set for Oct. 24 at 2 p.m. before Judge Gowans.

Murray Police Sgt. Paul Forbes, who signed the complaint, alleged that the said Theodore Robert Bundy did intentionally or knowingly by force, threat on deceit, detain or restrain Carol DaRonch against her will with the intent:

"(a) To facilitate the commission of or attempted commission of a felony, to wit: criminal homicide or aggravated assault, or:

"(b) To inflict bodily injury on or toterrorize Carol DaRonch."

Cause Death

Count two alleges that the defendant attempted to intentionally or knowingly cause the death of Carok DaRonch, while the said defendant was engaged in the commission of or attempt to commit aggravated kidnaping or kidnaping."

The complaint also states that the defendant has been identified by Carol DaRonch as the person who abducted her by deceit and-or force from the Fashion Place Mall at 6100 S. State in Murray, and pointed a gun at her and stated he was going to blow her head off."

Capt. Hayward, chief of sheriff's detectives, said lawmen "did not have a chance" to question the suspect about anything other than the Fashion Place Mall report. He declined to say whether the investigation would be expanded Friday.

Able to Escape

Capt. Hayward said the DaRonch girl was able to escape when the man who abducted her turned off the road after handcuffing one of her wrists. He said the other cuff "hung loose."

"She was able to wriggle out of the car and stand in the middle of State Street near the mall in the lights of an oncoming vehicle which stopped," he said. "The abductor took off at this point."

He said the abductor was driving a

light colored Volkswagen with rust spots.

A University of Utah spokesman said the defendant, a second-year law student, is a part-time custodian at the university.

In Olympia, Wash., an aide to Gov. Daniel J. Evans confirmed a report that Bundy had served as a "campaign assistant" for the Republican chief executive but was not a paid employe of the governor. Washington University daily newspaper personnel said Bundy was graduated from the university in 1972 with a bachelor of science degree in psychology.

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Lawmen question mai

A man was arrested today in connection with an attempted kid naping in a mall parking lot last year and is being questioned by lawmen regarding the death and disappearance of other teenage girls last fall, sources told the Deseret News.

Chief Criminal Deputy County Atty: William R. Hyde said a formal complaint has been filed against Theodore R. Bundy, 28, charging attempted homicide and aggravated kidnaping in the attempted abduction last Nov. 8.

The attempted kidnaping took place in the parking lot of Fashion Place Mall. A man tried to overpower a teenage girl, handcuff her and force her into his auto: The girl escaped with a handcuff still on one wrist.

Sources said the arrested man was being questioned about the deaths of Melissa Smith and Laura Aime and the disappearance of Debra Kent which also took place last fall

Miss Smith, 17, Midvale, was found dead Oct, 27 after, being missing for several days. The body

of Miss Aime, 17, of Salem, Utah County, was found Nov. 17.

Spokesmen for the Salt Lake County Attorney's Office clamped an immediate lid on information about the lineup held at the Metropolitan Hall of Justice.

Capt. N. D. Hayward of the Salt Lake County Sheriff's Office announced that a press conference would be held this afternoon.

Lawmen locked themselves inside the County Attorney's Office for several hours after the identification was made and refused to make any comment until the press conference.
Police suspect the murders, the
Kent girl's disappearance and the
mall abduction attempt are con-

nected. There were similarities in the circumstances of the two girls deaths. Both were 17, both were found strangled and beaten. Both had nylon stockings tied around their necks when they were found.

Miss Smith, daughter of Midvale Police Chief Louis Smith, disappeared the evening of Oct. 18, 1974; after Jeaving & Midvale restaurant.

Nine days later her body was

found in Parley's Canyon by deer hunters. She had been raped as well as beaten and strangled.

Numerous leads were investigated, but no arrests were made.

Almost a month later, Miss Alme's body was found in American Fork Canyon. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Alme, Salem.

Miss Aime had been strangled beaten and raped. She disappeared from her home on a Friday night, the same night of the week that Miss Smith vanished.

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Being Investigated

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The Associated Press reported from Seattle Thursday night that Bundy was assistant director of the Seattle Crime assistant director of the Seattle Crime Prevention Commission in 1973 and received publicity when he reportedly captured a purse snatcher.

AB also said he was formerly and assistant to the Washington State Republican Central Committee.

Still under investigation in three counties are the rape-killings of Mellssa Smith. 17 daughter of Midvale Police

Smith, 17, daughter of Midvale Police Chief Louis Smith, whose body was found last Oct. 27, and Laura Aime, also 17, Salem, Utah County.

Officers in Utah, Davis and Salt Lake

counties also are probing the disappearance since last Nov. 9 of Debra Kent, 17, from Viewmont High School.

Capt. Hayward said Bundy's arrest came after "six weeks of intensive investigation by Bountiful, Murray and Salt Lake County officers." He said Sheriff's Det. Jerry Thompson arrested Bundy at the sheriff's office after a lineup.



BUNDY was arrested by the Utah Nighway Patrol in August, 1975, on a traffic violation, at which time he had in his vehicle a paper bag containing a pair of pantyhose with holes cut for the eyes and nose, a pair of handcuffs similar to those recovered from a woman in a Murray, Utah, shopping center on 11/6/74, when she escaped from a would-be abductor, and a small prybar.

BUNDY has a college degree in psychology and is a third year law student at the University of Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah. He is originally from Seattle, Washington, where he is also considered as a possible

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suspect in the rape-slaying of several girls from that area. The details concerning these murders are similar to those of the girls in the Salt Lake City area.

BUNDY was subposaned to appear in a police line-up and was identified by the woman who escaped from an abductor in the Murray shopping center as the individual she escaped from. He has been charged with kidnaping and attempted murder. BUNDY was also identified by two witnesses as being present at Viewmont High School the night DEBRA KENT disappeared from that high school. BUNDY has refused to be interviewed or to make any comment and at present is not charged in any of the slayings or in the abduction of DEBRA KENT.

Salt Lake City will continue to follow investigation being conducted by local authorities to determine whether or not there is a possible Federal violation and to furnish assistance where possible.



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Earlier, Lubeck and co-counsel John O'Connell filed a motion asking to know the circumstances under which Bundy was identified, asking that prosecutors in Utah and Washington be forced to turn over photographs of Bundy that might have been used in identification.

Meanwhile, Deputy Salt Lake County Atty. David E. Yocum, who is prosecuting Bundy, has filed a bill of particulars and a list of witnesses and evidence he plans to submit at the Feb. 9 trial.

Twenty-six witnesses will be called against Bundy. Judge Peter F. Leary issued a court order reassigning the case to Judge Hanson, Third Judicial District presiding judge.

Besides Miss DaRonch, witness for the prosecution will include law enforcement officers from the Murray Police Department, Bountiful City Police Department, Salt Lake County Sheriff's office and the Utah State Tax Commission and the Department of Motor Vehicles.

Also testifying will be the couple who picked up Miss DaRonch after she escaped from her abductor, four other women, including a Seattle resident, a Weber State College crime evidence expert, and a blood chemist.

Bundy lawyers challenge ID

The defense for Theodore Robert Bundy, 29, Tacoma, Wash., continued arguments today aimed at suppressing evidence of his identification as the abductor of a Murray girl.

Bundy is accused of kidnaping at gunpoint Carol DaRonch, now 19, at Fashion Place Mall, Murray, over 14 months ago. The victim, handcuffed by her abductor, broke free and jumped from her captor's compact car to safety minutes after the assault.

M. Hanson Jr., after sampling, reporters' attitudes behind closed doors, ordered spectators—including news writers—from Wednesday's hearing at

the Salt Lake City-County Bidg.

Hanson reverted back to a two-month-old court order of Salt Lake City Judge Paul G. Grant imposing a partial embargo on news coverage of proceedings against Bundy. The order forbade photographs of the defendant and witnesses, as well as barring coverage of this week's hearing.

"I am concerned over pretrial publicity," Hanson told reporters in the inner chamber huddle before their eviction from the hearing. In the unusually brief consultation, the judge said he wanted to determine feelings of the reporters covering the case. Reporters said they felt closing proceedings from their scrutiny tended to attract more attention than normal court coverage. Also, they said they could not conscientously sit in the hearing and fail to report on what they observed.

"I think it has to be either all or nothing," Bundy's attorney John D. O'Connell said in the closed meeting. A second closed session occurred in the judge's private chamber between defense and prosecuting attorneys following the meeting with reporters.

When court officials emerged from the second

closed session, Hanson promptly announced his order. However, the Grant order, to which he reverted, was not discussed in the session with reporters. Neither was there any discussion of the taking of photographs, leaving reporters somewhat confused about Hanson's order.

In a written motion filed at the County Clerk's Office earlier this month, the defense said: "The lineup was so unlecessarily suggestive and con-q ducive to irreparable mistaken identification," that the defendant was "denied due process of law."

Hearing for Bundy

Closed to Newsmen

Hearing on a motion to suppress eyewitness identification evidence against Theodore R. Bundy, charged with kidnaping, opened Wednesday and was quickly closed to the public, including newsmen.

Third District Court Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr. adopted an order filed earlier by City Judge Paul G. Grant to restrain the publication or showing of pictures of the defendant or witnesses.

The motion to suppress, filed by one of Bundy's attorneys, Bruce C. Lubeck, contends that a lineup, in which the kidnap victim identified Bundy as her assailant, was improperly conducted.

Bundy, 29, 656-1st Ave., was charged in October with kidnaping in connection with a November, 1974, incident, in which Carol DaRonch, 19, said a man took her by force from a suburban shopping mall. She said she managed to escape after he got her into his car.

The defense motion contended pretrial confrontations between Bundy and Miss DaRonch "were conducted in such an impermissibly suggestive manner as to give rise to a very substantial likelihood of irreparable misidentification."

Police have said Bundy was identified by Miss DaRonch in a lineup last Oct. 2. The defense motion says everyone in the lineup except Bundy was a policeman.

Judge Hanson said the Wednesday hearing was not on trial merits but on evidentiary questions, including some of constitutional proportion.

He said he was granting the motion to exclude the public because of the defendant's right to a fair and impartial trial "free of any taint on the jury."

The hearing will continue Thursday at 10 a.m. in Judge Hanson's court.

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Alleged Kidnap Victim Testifies, Trial for Bundy Begins in S.L.

The first day of the kidnap trial of Theodore R. Bundy ended Monday with the alleged victim, voice cracking with emotion, describing how she was abducted on Nov. 8, 1974.

Bundy, 29, waived his right to a jury trial and the case is being heard solely by 3rd District Court Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr.

The kidnap victim, Carol DaRonch, now 19, took the stand as a prosecution witness after a lunch recess.

The willowy brunette, under direct examination by Deputy Salt Lake County David E. Yocom, described how a man approached her as she was shopping at Fashion Place Mall, 6100 S. State, Murray.

Packed Courtroom

At times tearful, Miss DaRonch told the packed courtroom her assailant asked what her license number was. When she told him, he said someone had been caught attempting to break into her car at the parking lot.

She accompanied the man and found nothing missing from her car.

Mr. Yocom asked whether that man was in the courtroom. Her voice broke for a moment then she clearly identified Bundy as the man.

As Mr. Yocom's questioning continued, Miss DaRonch, who was 18 when the incident occurred, said the

man eventually asked her if she would accompany him to a police station to sign a complaint against a man caught breaking in her car.

Flashed Badge

She said she complied only after the man flashed a badge at her.

In the passenger side of the man's Volkswagen, she rode up 6100 South to 1300 East where the man turned left. When the car reached 5100 South, she said, he pulled the car over.

Miss DaRonch said she then asked the man what he was doing. He didn't reply, but he grabbed her left arm and attached one side of a pair of handcuffs.

Simultaneously, she testified, she reached for the door handle and opened the door.

Bundy sat relaxed during her testimony.

As she struggled from the car, her

assailant followed her out the pasesenger side of the vehicle.

'Kept Screaming'

Miss DaRonch said. "I kept screaming, fighting and scratching," until she had wrenched herself free. She then flagged down an oncoming motorist. She got into that car and was taken to the Murray City Police Station.

John D. O'Connell, attorney for the former University of Utah law student, fired questions at Miss DaRonch during cross examination in apparent attempts to shatter her credibility.

The defense attorney claimed numerous discrepancies in the girl's past and present testimony.

O'Connell's questions.

Mr. O'Connell brought out direct differences in Miss DaRonch's testimony concerning a description of the badge her assailant showed her.

During a preliminary hearing she said the badge was gold and silver or blue and silver, Mr. O'Connell said, quoting from a transcript of that hearing held before Salt Lake City Judge Paul G. Grant last December.

Monday, she described the badge as silver and oval.

"Why the difference in your testimony?" Mr. O'Connell asked. Smiling, Miss DaRonch replied, "I don't know."

During the preliminary hearing, she said she didn't scratch her assailant, Mr. O'Connell continued. "I don't remember," the witness said.

Moustache Issue

Three separate times, Miss DaRonch decided her attacker first did, then didn't and then did have a moustache. Monday, she said she didn't remember what she'd said about moustaches.

During morning court action, after Bundy personally waived his right to a jury trial, attorneys each made hour-long opening statements.

Mr. Yocom outlined his case, using Miss DaRonch's description of her ordeal which eventually led to her identification of Bundy.

He told of lawmen's search of Bundy's car and dwelling. Lawmen found a different pair of handcuffs in Bundy's car and the vehicle matched the description of the one they were searching for.

· 'Knew Immediately'

"Carol DaRonch will say she knew immediately which man was the one who abducted her," he concluded.

Mr. O'Connell opened, saying the trial outcome would be "anticlimactic," and that the state's case is . "a lot of smoke, but no fire."

He contended that law enforcement personnel, after Bundy was arrested on a different matter in August, 1975, "pressured" Miss DaRonch into making the eyewitness identification.

He said the victim "committed" herself on the issue of Bundy's car and was likely afraid to admit she might be wrong.

The case continues Tuesday at 9 a.m. before Judge Hanson.

Bundy Case Reveals Handcuffs

Handcuffs and a crowbar were found in Theodore R. Bundy's car, a 3rd District Court judge was told Tuesday during the second day of Bundy's trial on kidnaping charges.

Under examination by Deputy Salt Lake County Atty. David E. Yocom, Utah Highway Patrol Sgt. Robert Hayward said he stopped Bundy Aug. 16, 1975. Subsequently, the handcuffs were discovered in the trunk of the defendant's Volkswagen and the crowbar behind the front seat, he testified.

Bundy, 29, is on trial before Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr., who will decide the case since Bundy waived his right to a jury trial. He is charged with kidnaping Carol DaRonch on Nov. 8, 1974.

objected to Sgt. Hayward's testimony on grounds it was irrelevant. The handcuffs were of a different brand than the handcuffs recovered after Miss DaRonch's alleged abduction and it was unfair to say Bundy handcuffed Miss DaRonch just because Bundy had handcuffs in his car, Mr. O'Connell said.

After both sides argued the issue, Judge Hanson ruled the issue should be aired and allowed the sergeant to testify.

Prosecutors had argued that Bundy's youthfulness, the fact he drove a Volkswagen similar to the one Miss DaRonch had described and that his car contained the handcuffs as well as a crowbar were sufficient reasons to link him to the abduction.

Monday, Miss DaRonch testified she was handcuffed by a man driving a light-colored Volkswagen who also threatened her with a crowbar and a gun.

Salt Lake County Sheriff's Detective Jerry Thompson told the court he first encountered Bundy Aug. 21 when the defendant consented to let the lawman search his apartment at 565-1st Ave.

Under examination by Mr. Yocom, Det. Thompson said he noticed two or . three pairs of "shiny shoes" in Bundy's closet.

Miss DaRonch said Monday her abductor wore shiny patent leather shoes.

The sheriff's detective also said he showed Miss DaRonch 27 pictures and she eventually picked out Bundy's as resembling her assailant.

Under cross examination by Mr. O'Connell, the detective was asked about his questioning of the victim when she was shown the pictures.

Witness Testimony

Miss DaRonch said Monday she "didn't know" why she put Bundy's, picture aside at the time.

Mr. O'Connell earlier had criticized detectives for their handling of that incident. He said it was possible the lawmen had unduly influenced the girl to pick Bundy's picture.

Tuesday, Det. Thompson said he didn't remember the exact words used by Miss DaRonch when she picked

: Bundy's picture,

The detective said he was the one who showed Miss DaRonch pictures of Bundy's car and she said it resembled the car her abductor drove.

"Don't you think it was unbelievable she could identify the car 10 months later?" Mr. O'Connell asked the detective.

"No," he replied.

The defense attorney also questioned Det. Thompson's seeking a search warrant for Bundy's car after it had already been searched.

That search warrant alleged the detective was looking for a gun and Miss DaRonch's purse and wallet.

The detective said Bundy was a "good" suspect in the kidnaping incident, so he thought the search warrant was a valid avenue of recourse.

Under further questioning, Det. Thompson said the "shiny shoes" examination was actually connected to a Bountiful case, but he did not elaborate.

During the morning, Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur F. Walsh, Murray, testified that they first met Miss DaRonch when she

ran in front of their car after escaping from her alleged abductor.

The couple said they were fearful at first the girl might be dangerous or an escapee since she had a handcuff on one arm. They took the hysterical girl to the Murray City Police Department where lawmen heard her story.

The final witness Tuesday was Margaret Maughn, who was Bundy's neighbor at 565-ist Ave. She told the court she remembered a tear in the backseat of Bundy's car.

Miss DaRonch said the backseat of her assailant's car s was torn.

Query on Shoes

Mr. O'Connell asked her if Bundy ever wore shiny, patent leather shoes.

"No," she said.

Mr. Yocom indicated he would finish his list of prosecution witnesses Wednesday when the case continues in Room 310 of the Salt Lake City-County Building.

Bundy is expected to take the stand in his own defense as part of Mr. O'Connell's presentation.

Kidnaping victim terrified, court told

A Murray police officer and a couple who befriended a kidnap victim testified today in the thetrial of Theodore R. Bundy, 29, Tacoma, Wash.

A tearful Carol DaRonch, 19, spent 2 ½ hours on the witness stand Monday afternoon describing how she fought off an assailant and escaped the night of Nov. 8, 1974.

Bundy, a University of Utah law student, waived his right to a jury trial and the case is being heard by Third District Court Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr.

"I have never seen anybody so frightened in my life," Mrs. Mary Walsh, Murray, testified today, describing how Miss DaRonch appeared in front of the Walsh car as she and her husband, Wilbur, were driving by the McMillan School, the night of Nov. 8.

She said the hysterical girl (handcuffs dangling from one wrist) opened the car door and jumped in. "I tried to comfort her, then I saw the handcuffs and I was confused. I thought maybe she was a fugitive or something."

She said she and her husband drove the girl to the Murray Police Station.

After her husband gave similar testimony, the defense attorney, John D. O'Connell, asked if the girl had mentioned a tire iron or crowbar.

Walsh said, "She mentioned a gun and a tire iron or crowbar, some metal object. I think she said tire iron."

O'Connell objected to allowing testimony by James Gaskill, assistant professor of police science at Weber State College, saying hé was not a physician or hematologist and therefore not an expert witness.

The judge overruled the objection and Gaskill, who is in charge of the WSC crime lab, testified that blood samples taken from Miss DaRonch's coat were Type O blood.

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O'Connell, in cross examination, asked Gaskill if it was possible the blood samples were too small to get a true type. "Couldn't it have been that you didn't find A or B blood simply because the sample was too small and you had to conclude it was O because you didn't find any A or B factors?"

Gaskill said it was possible, although very unlikely.

' In later reexamination, Deputy Salt Lake County Atty. David E. Yocom asked Gaskill, "In your expert opinion, is it Type O blood?"

"Yes, it is," Gaskill replied.

Murray Police Detective Joel Riet testified to taking fingerprints from the handcuffs that were removed from Miss DaRonch's wrist and also of taking pieces of cloth from her coat and sending it to the WSC crime lab.

He also testified that they had shown Miss DaRonch thousands of "mug" shots. O'Connell said, "Did you show her any photographs more than one time?" Riet replied that they were not supposed to.

Glen H. Davis of the Salt Lake City-County Health Department testified that Bundy has Type O positive blood and that Miss DaRonch has A positive blood.

Before recessing at noon, the judge took under advisement arguments by the prosecution and defense over whether to allow testimony by Sgt. Bob Hayward of the Utah Highway Patrol, who arrested Bundy in the Granger area last August.

Hayward testified at Bundy's preliminary hearing regarding items found in Bundy's car at the time of the arrest.

Monday afternoon O'Connell tried repeatedly to show that Miss DaRonch had accepted police officers' opinions about Bundy's car and other aspects of the case.

He said some of her testimony differed markedly from that given during a preliminary hearing last year and her statements to police on the night of Nov. 8, 1974.

In reply to his repeated questions, Miss DaRonch answered in a subdued voice, "I don't remember," or "I'm not sure, it has been so long."

Under questioning by Deputy Salt Lake County Atty. David E. Yocom, she testified earlier that she recognized Bundy immediately in a lineup at Salt Lake City Police Headquarters.

In cross-examination, O'Connell asked, "Did you recognize him from the pictures police showed you? Do you think you would have known him immediately because you had seen 🧎 his picture?'

8, but he did not have a moustache at the lineup. I think I remember him from pictures, too.

Under O'Connel's questioning. she said she had looked through a series of photos and not been able to identify them, but she said Bundy's photo looked more like the assailant than anyone. She said she saw Bundy's photo three or four times before the lineup.

"How do you know Mr. Bundy's "I don't know," she said. "I drove?" O'Connell asked. Miss think I remembered him from Nov. DaRonch replied that a photograph

of Bundy's car had shown a ripped back seat, "just like the car I had been sitting in." O'Connell showed her pictures of similar cars with ripped seats and asked, "Do any of these look like Bundy's car?

"I can't tell," she said clearly.

The defense attorney asked how she managed to escape from an assailant six feet tall when she was only five feet seven and weighed less than 110 pounds. "Have you participated in athletics or have you had any kind of self-protection or defense training." She replied, "No."

"How in the world did you keep him from striking you with that crowbar? Perhaps he never meant to hurt you at all," O'Connell said.

He then asked pointedly, "Didn't you discuss with police the night of Nov. 8 how you broke away and didn't you say or agree that perhaps the man had not meant harm to you after all?"

"I don't remember that. I don't remember any such conversation,' she answered softly, dabbing at her eyes with a tissue.

Earlier in the testimony, O'Con-

nell objected to Yocom's using Bundy's name in describing Miss DaRonch's assailant. The judge agreed and ordered Yocom to specify the words "assailant" or "man" and not use Bundy's name.

When asked by Yocom if her assailant was in the courtroom, Miss DaRonch clearly identified Bundy as the man.

The defendant appeared calm during the proceedings and smiled at times when his attorney appeared to have made a point.

State rests its case in Bundy trial

The state rested its case this morning in the trial of Theodore R. Bundy, 29, University of Utah law student charged with aggravated kidnaping, and the judge took under advisement a motion to reduce the charge to simple kidnaping.

Defense Atty. John D. O'Connell told Third District Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr. the prosecution did not know the intent of the assailant of Carol DaRonch, 19, the kidnap victim, and therefore could not actually specify that it was aggravated kidnaping.

Deputy County Atty. David E. Yocom said that handcuffing alone is an act of terrorism and

that having in his possession handcuffs, a crowbar and a gun show what the man intended and what he was capable of.

After making the motion in opening Bundy's defense, O'Connell then stated, "My client doesn't want me to make this motion. He doesn't like the motion. He didn't do it. He doesn't want to argue about specific charges."

Hanson took the motion under advisement, then recessed the court for 10 minutes.

Yocom concluded the state's case in half an hour this morning by recalling one witness and then calling his 16th and last witness.

Recalled to the stand was Murray Police Officer Joe Riet, who straightened out some discrepancies over how blood samples were taken from Miss DaRonch's coat. The samples were then admitted as evidence. Tuesday afternoon O'Connell had objected to their being admitted and the judge sustained the objection until the additional testimony this morning.

Yocom also introduced Polaroid pictures of Miss DaRonch's left hand, showing broken See PROSECUTION on B-5

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Prosecution rest its case in Bundy trial

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fingernails from the night of her abduction.

The prosecution's last witness, Salt Lake Police Officer Wade Robinson, who has worked in the crime lab 24 years, testified he could not identify the latent prints taken from the handcuffs as they were smudged and could make no comparison between them and those of the defendant.

Bundy is accused of abducting Miss DaRonch from the Fashion Place Mall parking lot the night of Nov. 8, 1974, and threatening her with a gun and crowbar.

During Tuesday afternoon proceedings, the defense failed in an attempt to block testimony by Sgt. Bob Hayward of the Utah Highway Patrol who arrested Bundy on Aug. 16, 1975, and searched his car.

He said he arrested Bundy after he saw him driving in an area near 3378 Hogan St. in the county. He said Bundy showed him his license and said he was lost.

Hayward testified he looked in the car and saw a small crowbar in the back seat. He said he then asked "Is it all right if I look in your car?" and Bundy said, "It's all right."

Hayward said two other patrol cars arrived and the other deputies took the crowbar out of the car and also a pair of handcuffs they found in the trunk.

Defense Atty. John D. O'Connell objected to this testimony, claiming the prosecution was trying to besmirch his client. "Just because a man has certain things in his car doesn't mean he's going around kidnaping girls," he said.

The judge ruled the testimony could stand.

Another witness, Margarith Maughan, who lived in the same avenues apartment house as Bundy, said she knew him well.

· She testified that she had seen a tear in the back seat of Bundy's car in the fall of 1974 and that stuffing was coming out of the seat.

Miss DaRonch had testified Monday, the opening day of the trial, that the back seat of her abductor's car was ripped and that it had rust spots and dents on the outside.

O'Connell asked Miss Maughan if she had ever seen Bundy wear dark patent leather shoes and she said she had not. Miss DaRonch had testifled that her assailant wore such shoes and police found a pair of black patent leather shoes in Bundy's apartment during a search.

Salt Lake County Deputy Sheriff Jerry Thompson

testified about showing several pictures to Miss DaRonch, including one of Bundy, to see if she could identify her abductor. He said she took one picture out of the stack and gave the others back and when he asked her why, she said "I don't know." He said he asked her again and she said, "It looks something like him, I really don't know."

O'Connell seized on this, chiding Thompson for having asked her more than once about the picture. He also said it was the second photo of Bundy the girl had been shown and asked, "Wasn't it improper to show a witness another picture of the same man?"

"I didn't think it was wrong when the second picture was so different from the first," Thompson said. The first picture Miss DaRonch was shown was one taken after Bundy's arrest. The second was a driver license photo.

Thompson testified that he took Miss DaRonch to look at Bundy's car after it had been fixed up at a repair shop, with the back seat repaired and the rust and dents removed. He said Miss DaRonch recognized the car.

Not at mall that night, Bundy says

Theodore R. Bundy, 29, took the stand in his own defense today and denied he had anything to do with the attempted kidnaping of a teen-age girl at the Fashion Place Mall Nov. 8, 1974.

Bundy, a second-year law student at the University of Utah from Tacoma, Wash., is charged with aggravated kidnaping of Carol DaRonch, now 19.

He told Third District Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr. that he was not at the mall that night and didn't have any contact with Miss DaRonch.

On the kidnap date; he went shopping at Cottonwood Mall and his small foreign car broke down on Highland Drive, Bundy said. He spent most of the day getting it repaired at a service station and went home about 5 or 5:30 p.m. and had dinner.

"I recall going out later that night to start the car and it wouldn't work," he said.

Bundy indicated that, to the best of his recollection, he used his pickup truck to go to a movie at Trolley Square and later to a nearby pub, getting home about 11:50 p.m. He then phoned a girlfriend in Seattle, he said.

"I'm not trying to fool anybody," he said. "It's hard to think back that far." He said he reconstructed some of the events that day by goingthrough records and notes and searching checkbooks.

Bundy, in answer to questions from his attorney, John O'Connell, said he had never owned a handgun and hadn't had a police badge "since I was a kid." Both items were used in the kidnap attempt of Miss DaRonch.

He said he did not have a mustache in the fall of 1974, but did have a pair of handcuffs which he found at the Salt Lake City dump, after taking some junk there from an apartment for his landlord. He said he didn't have a key for them and never used them.

Bundy was questioned about his arrest Aug. 16, 1975, by a Utah Highway Patrol trooper about 2:30 a.m. in a Granger residential area.

. He said he had gone there after work because it was a hot night and he wanted to go for a drive and "explore an area I hadn't been in before."

He said he parked on a side street to smoke some marijuaffa — a fact, he admitted concealing from police and his own lawyer after his arrest.

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Bundy said he was "panicky" when police first approached and got rid of the marijuana and lied to police about why he was parked there, telling them he had just come from a drive-in movie.

The defense opened its case Wednesday afternoon with testimony of a 31-year-old psychology professor from Harvard

University.

Dr. Elizabeth Loftus said many factors contribute to the loss of memory and discrepancies which can crop up in a victim's recollections of an incident after a long time.

The attitude of a questioner has an important bearing on what the witness can remember about an incident, she said.

Defense Attorney John O'Connell asked if there is a definite effect on a witness in trying to recall a face if he is shown a great many pictures.

"Yes," the psychologist said.
"The more pictures a victim sees, the more effect there is on his or her retention and the more chance of failure to correctly identify a picture."

O'Connell referred to the fact that Miss DaRonch was shown a great number of pictures as a suspect for her kidnaping was sought.

The psychologist also noted that a person remembers less in a stressful situation than in a

non-stressful situation.

Dr. Loftus told Judge Hanson that a subject's original memory of an incident can be distorted unintentionally by a questioner who "loads" questions or who by subtle cues sets up his own bias in the victim's mind.

· O'Connell asked if this bias might be stronger if the subject sees the questioner as an authority figure, and the psychologist answered that it would.

Not at mall, Bundy says

- It is difficult to get a person to change his or her mind once he has made a commitment (a choice of photo, for example) the doctor said.
- Under cross examination by Deputy Salt Lake County Atty. David E. Yocom, Dr. Loftus admitted there are no studies of situations in which actual victims of crimes were the subjects.

. Nor have there been studies of persons who picked the right picture, she said.

"If the choice were correct and a subject were

committed to that choice, there would be no reason to change, would there?" Yocom asked.

"That's right," said Dr. Loftus.

Edward M. Barton, a veteran police officer, now retired and working as an investigator for the Legal Defenders Association of Salt Lake City, said he thought it would have been better if Miss DaRonch had not been shown more than one photo of the suspect.

The victim was shown a photo of Bundy taken in August 1975, and later showed a photo taken for his driver's license shortly after the alleged incident.

Barton said he would not himself have shown her both photos, even though they were substantially different.

The former police officer also said he had participated in as many as 200 line-ups and that victims frequently pick the wrong person. He said that in his opinion, line-ups are not the best form of evidence.

Yocom asked if, when victims do pick a man in a line-up and it is the correct suspect, identification is made very quickly. Barton responded that this is usually the case.

Miss DaRonch picked Bundy from a police line-up almost immediately, it was established during the prosecution's presentation.

Regarding Miss DaRonch's testimony that the Volkswagen in which she was taken from the shopping center had a tear in the rear seat, a mechanic testified that many such vehicles have torn seats.

The sun causes the seats to tear, according to Bill' Gord, an employe of Jack's Top Shop.

Former neighbors of Bundy, James Dunn and his wife, Janet Davis, told Hanson they had never seen Bundy wearing dark patent leather shoes, nor had they seen handcuffs or a crowbar in Bundy's car.

Miss DaRonch earlier had testified that her abductor wore dark, shiny shoes and that he threatened her with a crowbar. Her assailant also attempted to put handcuffs on her, and succeeded in getting one of the handcuffs secured before she broke free from him, she testified.

A former girlfriend of Bundy, Ann Swenson, said she had been in his car and apartment on many occasions and did not see any patent leather shoes. Nor did she recall a rip in the seat of the car.

Policemen found a pair of dark, shiny shoes in Bundy's apartment after it was searched in late 1975.

Hanson, who is hearing the case alone after Bundy waived right to a jury trial, took under advisement a defense motion to have the charge reduced to simple kidnaning.

Trial Hears Bundy On Stand

Both Sides End Presentations

Accused kidnaper Theodore R. Bundy took the witness stand Thursday in his own defense and denied any involvement in the Nov. 8, 1974, abduction of Carol DaRonch.

Both the defense and prosecution rested Thursday afternoon as respective attorneys announced they had no further evidence or testimony to submit.

The issue will go to 3rd District Court Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr. Friday after closing arguments' scheduled to begin at 10 a.m.

Bundy, 29, appeared a little nervous and annoyed during cross examination by Deputy Salt Lake County Attorney David E. Yocom, who sought to discredit the defendant's credibility.

The former University of Utah law student is accused of kidnaping Miss DaRonch, then 17, from the Fashion Place Mall.

Who's Telling Truth?

The issue is expected to boil down to whether Bundy is telling the truth about never having seen Miss DaRonch until he was charged or if the victim is correct in her eyewitness identification of Bundy as her abductor.

John D. O'Connell, chief defense attorney, called his client to the stand at 10:30 a.m.

Bundy told the packed courtroom that he attempted to reconstruct his activities for the night of Nov. 8, 1974. Citing cancelled checks and other records, he said he went to the Cottonwood Mall that day to look for clothes.

He said his Volkswagen broke down while he was there and was repaired at a nearby service station. Mr. O'Connell introduced a cancelled check for \$2.50 dated Nov. 8 and made out to the Cottonwood Mall Texaco station.

"I suppose I had dinner," Bundy said, after describing how his car was fixed and he said he drove it home to 565-1st Ave. '.

Trolley Square Movie

Mr. O'Connell asked what he didnext. "I'm not going to try and fool anybody," the defendant sais. "I think I went to a movie at Trolley Square."

He went to a tavern at the same location, according to his testimony.

He then denied having been at Fashion Place on Nov. 8.

Miss DaRonch testified during the first day of trial Monday that her assailant had a mustache and put a handcuff on one of her arms before she was able to escape.

She said the man lured her to his car by showing a badge after he told her he was a police officer investigating a thief who tried to break into her car while it was parked at Fashion Place.

No Gun, No Badge

Thursday, Bundy testified he never owned a gun, which the kidnaper had, or a badge.

Mr. O'Connell asked Bundy if he ever wore a fake mustache in fall of 1974. "No," was the reply.

On Aug. 16, Bundy was pulled over by Utah Highway Patrol Sgt. Robert Hayward in Granger. At that time, lawmen searched the defendant's Volkswagen and found a pair of handcuffs.

Bundy testified Thursday he found the handcuffs in a box of "junk," while moving things for his landlord. . . :

Mr. O'Connell, in a move to clarify Bundy's presence Aug. 16 at 2:30 a.m. in Granger, asked the defendant to reconstruct the events leading to his arrest that morning.

Bundy said he had gone home from his job as a night watchman at 'University of Utah about 11 p.m.

Smoked Marijuana

He said he took a bath and smoked some marijuana.

Then he said he drove his car to the

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area of Highland High School in hope a girlfriend of his might be awake.

But her house lights were all turned out so he "started driving west."

He testified he really didn't know where he was when he decided to pull off a side street to smoke some more marijuana.

...At this time, Sgt. Hayward began pursuit of Bundy's car. Bundy said he became paranoid and started fleeing from the unmarked police car while at the same time throwing out any remaining marijuana in his car.

Admits Lieing

When he was finally stopped, he testified he lied to police, saying he had been to a movie in the area.

Lawmen, however, arrested him for fleeing and possession of burglary tools. Found in his car was a crow bar, which police later alleged was used to threaten Miss DaRonch the night she was abducted.

During cross examination, Mr. Yocom asked Bundy why he continued to lie about his presence in Granger even after he knew he was being investigated for something more serious.

Bundy said he even lied to his attorney until a few weeks ago because he was extremely embarrassed about admitting his involvement with marijuana.

Mr. Yocom asked if Bundy didn't realize, as a law student, that charges of fleeing and possession of burglary tools were much more serious than a marijuana charge.

Faced Choice?

"You felt it would be better to take the rap for burglary tools and evading than to say why you were there (in Granger)?" Mr. Yocom asked.

"Yes, I guess so," was the reply.

Under examination by Mr. O'Connell, Bundy said his car was definitely not running well Nov. 8 and cited the gas station repair incident. Mr. Yocom, during cross examination, produced numerous gas station credit card receipts bearing the defendant's signature.

Using those receipts, which Judge Hanson later received into evidence over Mr. O'Connell's objection, Mr. Yocom proved Bundy bought gasoline Nov. 8 and used his credit card.

Topped Off Tank

It was not revealed where he bought the gasoline, but Mr. Yocom established Bundy received 6.4 gallons and "topped off the gasoline tank." Bundy agreed.

Mr. Yocom asked if, on the night of Nov. 8, after having visited the tavern in Trolley Sqaure, Bundy's breath may have smelled of alcohol. "I suppose so," was the answer.

The prosecutor asked what movie Bundy saw and he told him.

"I wouldn't tell you anything that wasn't true," Bundy responded on his own.

"But you did lie to the police in

August?" Mr. Yocom asked. "Yes," Bundy replied.

Political Spy?

Mr. Yocom then contended that Bundy had, indeed, worn a false mustache to spy on other candidates when he worked on Washington Gov. Dan Evans' campaign.

Mr. O'Connell objected, but Bundy answered that he never wore a mustache and never spied on any candidates.

"Did you ever make the statement, 'I like virgins and I can get them anytime,' " Mr. Yocom asked.

"No," Bundy said:

The defendant said he may have made another statement, "There's no difference between right and wrong," but that Mr. Yocom took the words out of context. Bundy said the words do not reflect his opinion.

Large Crowds

Following a lunch recess, extra court bailiffs had to be called to regulate the crowd gathered outside Judge Hanson's courtroom in the Salt Lake City-County Building.

Mr. Yocom continued his questioning of the defendant.

"Did you ever go to Fashion Place Mall?" he asked.

"Yes, I've been there," Bundy replied.

After further questioning, Bundy admitted he may have been at the mall in the fall of 1974, but not on Nov. 8.

Bundy's testimony concluded at 3 p.m. and Mr. O'Connell rested his case.

Mr. Yocom reopened his case with two witnesses, Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Shear, who lived across the hall from Bundy at 565-1st Ave. during the summer of 1975.

Wore Shiny Shoes

The couple testified individually that they saw Bundy wearing black, shiny patent leather shoes several times that summer.

Miss DaRonch said, during her testimony, her abductor wore such shoes.

Wednesday, different former neighbors of Bundy said they never saw him wear such shoes.

Mr. O'Connell, during cross examination of Mr. Shear, showed the witness the black shoes Bundy was wearing in court.

"Are these the shoes?" he asked.

"No, the shoes were shiny plastic looking and I remember them because I don't like those kind of shoes," Mr. Shear replied.

Mr. Yocom then recalled three lawmen present at Bundy's Aug. 16 arrest in Granger.

Each said there was no evidence of marijuana or marijuana smoke on Bundy or in his car when he was stopped.

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Bundy files petition

*Convicted kidnaper Theodore Robert Bundy, 29, of Tacoma, Wash., has asked Third District Court to find Utah State Prison Warden Samuel Smith in contempt of court.

Bundy, who was convicted of aggravated kidnaping in the November 1974 abduction of Murray teenager Carol DaRonch, has filed a handwritten petition with the court.

Judge Stewart M. Hansen Jr. considered the petition Tuesday and ordered a hearing on the matter June 22 at 9 a.m. — the same time Bundy is to be sentenced for the kidnaping offense in Hansen's courtroom in the City-County Building.

Bundy, in his petition, named Smith as respondent in a motion for a hearing to show cause why the warden should not be held in contempt for violating a court order issued by Hansen directing the Division of Corrections to conduct a 90-day diagnostic evaluation of Bundy.

Bundy was also found guilty of failure to stop at the command of a police officer and will also be sentenced on that offense June 22.

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Judge Sentences Bundy to 1-15-Year Term

Convicted kidnapper Theodore R. Bundy Wednesday was sentenced to serve from one to 15 years at the Utah State Prison.

Third District Court Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr., who found Bundy guilty after a non-jury trial last February, listened impassively prior to the sentencing as the former law student asserted he was not properly evaluated during his 90-day stay at the prision.

The judge allowed Bundy to act as his own counsel after appointing defense attorneys John D. O'Connell and Bruce C. Lubeck to assist.

Bundy's speech was an explanation for the basis of his motion for an order to show cause why prison Warden Sam Smith shouldn't be held in contempt of court for not conducting a proper evaluation.

Judge Hanson denied the motion after listening to Bundy for about 90 minutes.

Bundy, 29, was found guilty of kidnaping Carol DaRonch Nov. 8, 1974, from the Fashion Place Mall at 6100 S. State in Murray.

Judge Hanson sentenced Bundy to the penalty for a second-degree felony even though the conviction was on a first-degree offense.

Deputy Salt Lake County Attorney David E. Yocom, who successfully prosecuted the case, said he expected the judge to sentence under the second-degree statute since the victim was uninjured in the incident.

Sentence under the first-degree offense could have been five years to life.

Judge Hanson asked Bundy whether he wanted another 90-day evaluation. "I don't want another 90 days, I just want to be sure the (diagnostic) report information is clear and not misleading to the court," Bundy replied.

The former University of Utah law student wore his orange prison t-shirt under a regular dress shirt as he pleaded his case before the judge.

The psychiatrists, psychologists and counselors who examined him may have been under pressure to find things wrong with him, Bundy contended.

"The doctors may have had a fear of being wrong," he said.

"When you have a spare 90 days you should go take the tests," Bundy told Judge Hanson.


He was also not allowed a transfer to the minimum security work farm as were his fellow diagnostic prisoners, he told the court.

In a final, emotion packed plea, Bundy broke down in tears and addressed both the judge and psychiatrists in the court room. "I'll be a candidate for treatment," he sobbed, "but not for anything I've done, for what the system's done to me."

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Theodore R. Bundy was sentenced to serve one to 15 years in prison for kidnaping.

Bundy Charged In Colorado

Nurse Slaying

DRAPER — A warrant of arrest for murder was served on convicted kidnaper Theodore R. Bundy in his maximum security cell here Friday morning. A fugitive warrant was signed during the afternoon in Salt Lake City Court.

The warrant of arrest charges the 29-year-old former law student and Washington State political worker with killing Caryn Campbell, Dearborn, Mich., in Aspen, Colo.

It was served by Michael J. Fisher, chief criminal investigator for Pitkin County, Colo., in the presence of Bruce Lubek, one of Bundy's attorneys; Deputy Salt Lake County Attorney David Yocum, and a deputy sheriff.

Although the complaint issued by Ninth Judicial District Court Judge George E. Lohr in Aspen charges a capital offense, Judge Lohr set a \$25,000 pail.

Frozen Body Found

Miss Campbell, 24, a nurse, disappeared Jan. 12, 1974, while on vacation in Aspen. Her nude and frozen body was found five days later on a rural road two miles from the Wildwood Inn where she was staying, Mr. Fisher said.

Filing of the fugitive warrant by Deputy Sheriff Bill Oeffinger before Salt Lake City Judge Robert C. Gibson was the first step in extradition of Bundy to Colorado, said Mr. Yocum. A fugitive warrant indicates Bundy left that state to avoid prosecution.

Judge Gibson set arraignment for Tuesday at 9 a.m. and denied bail.

Prison officials were reluctant to discuss the reason Bundy is in maximum security until after he has a hearing before the prison's disciplinary committee Tuesday or Wednesday.

Suspect Escape Try

However, Warden Samuel W. Smith, said Bundy and George Metropolis, 31, serving for murder and parole violation, were moved into the maximum security facility because of suspected association with some escape paraphernalia found in the prison's print shop last week.

Bundy is serving one to 15 years for aggravated kidnaping on Nov. 8, 1974, when Carol Da Ronch, 17, was seized near Fashion Place Mall in Murray. She was handcuffed and forced into a car before escaping when the vehicle halted at a stop sign. She still had the handcuffs on one wrist when she arrived at the Murray Police Station.

Bundy was received at the prison last July 6 after spending 90 days in the diagnostic unit following his conviction March 1.

Authorities in Washington. Utah and Colorado have been investigating Bundy in connection with the disappearance of several young women, some of whom are still missing.

First-Degree Murder

Frank Tucker, district attorney in Aspen, said the extradition procedures have begun for Bundy's return to Colorado to "stand trial for murder in the first degree in connection with the death of Caryn Campbell."

He said he will confer with authorities in Seattle, Wash., to coordinate his investigation with their probes into the leaths or disappearance of at least eight young women.

Utah investigators have been concentrating on the murders of Melissa Smith, Midvale, and Laura Aime, American Fork. Debra Kent, Bountiful, reported missing the same night as the kidnaping in Murray, has not been found.

Mr. Yocom said he believes the next step after the arraignment will be the filing of a governor's warrant from Colorado for extradition to that state.

Signed Credit Card Slips

If Bundy decides to fight the extradition, the process could take some time, Mr. Yocom said.

Although Pitkin County officials were reluctant to talk of any new evidence, they had said earlier that credit card slips were signed by Bundy in Aspen on Jan. 12, 1974, the same day Miss Campbell disappeared.

He was also investigated, along with 2,800 other persons, in connection with the "Ted murders" of college-aged girls in Washington and Oregon. Officers say witnesses in some of these cases said a person giving the name of "Ted" was seen with the girls shortly before they disappeared.

John D. O'Connell, Bundy's attorney, criticized the way the murder warrant was served. He felt he should have been told in advance and was in court when he learned of the warrant and had to send Mr. Lubeck to the prison.

He accused the authorities of calling the news media first and lawyers second.

Three weeks ago Mr. Fisher said the case against Bundy was largely circumstantial and Mr. Tucker said at that time he would not charge Bundy unless he was sure of a conviction.

Bundy was a law student at the University of Utah at the time of his arrest. Before coming to Utah, he lived in Washington and was an advance man in the campaign of Gov. Dan Evans.

Until his transfer a couple of days ago to maximum security. Bundy had been working in the prison's printing shop.


Convicted kidnaper Theodore Robert Bundy, 29, was returned to the Utah State Prison today to await possible extradition to Colorado to face a murder charge after a brief appearance in Salt Lake City Court this morning.

He was brought, shackled and in handcuffs, before City Judge Melvin H. Morris for court proceedings after a fugitive from justice complaint was issued against him Friday.

Bundy's attorney, John D. O'Connell, told the judge he should dismiss the fugitive complaint because legally the judge could not commit the prisoner to the county jail, as specified by state law.

Morris said the customary 30-day commitment on a fugitive complaint would actually be a continuation of Bundy's time in the prison where he is serving 1 to 15 years for the kidnaping of Carol DaRonch from a Murray shopping mall in November 1974.

Colorado authorities served a

warrant of arrest on Bundy Friday on an affidavit charging him with the murder of Caryn Campbell, 23, Dearborn, Mich., who disappeared in January 1975 while attending a medical convention at Aspen, Colo. Her body was found about four months later about three miles from Aspen.

O'Connell charged, "The only reason they brought him in here

today was for the benefit of the press." He said Utah should not "give publicity to some politician in Colorado."

He also told the judge that extradition proceedings do not depend on the fugitive complaint which was filed last Friday by Deputy Salt Lake County Atty. David E. Yocom. He said Bundy was obviously not going anywhere.

Yocom said the fugitive proceeding was a standard court action in cases of defendants who have fled from, or are in a different state than, the one in which they are charged with a crime. He also said it sets a 30-day limit on Colorado for bringing the charges against Bundy.

O'Connell was also critical of the Colorado authorities for having made an announcement a month ago of their contemplated action against Bundy.

"They have had all this evidence for over eight months, thinking about it," he said. "I think this is an abuse of this court. They are making a fool of this

court. They are making this court look ridiculous."

The 30-day waiting period on fugitive from justice complaints is to keep the defendant in custody until extradition papers can be signed.


Colorado authorities said last week they expected to begin extradition proceedings on Bundy within 10 days. If the Colorado governor approves, the request will be sent 'to Goy. Calvin L. Rampton.

The prisoner, wearing blue prison garb and with about a week's growth of beard, rose once while Yocom was speaking, saying, "I don't need your help."

The court session lasted about 15 minutes. Before it started both Bundy and his attorney turned from the front of the courtroom to survey the spectators. The room was crowded with spectators and newsmen.

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Theodore R. Bundy Faces Colorado Charge

To Court Slaying

. Over objections by his attorney convicted kidnaper Theodore R. Bundy was arraigned Tuesday in Salt Lake, City Court on a fugitive warrant based on a first degree murder charge out of Aspen, Colo.

Attorney John D. O'Connell called the arraignment on the fugitive from justice warrant "ridiculous" since his client is already committed to the Utah State Prison for 1 to 15 years.

Judge Melvin H. Morris disagreed however, and ordered Bundy back to the prison to await a governor's extradition warrant from Colorado The judge said that warrant should nome by Nov. 26 to be within the legal lounds.

The Colorado charge alleges that Bundy, 29, was responsible for the disappearance and murder of Caryn Campbell, 24, Dearborn, Mich.

Miss Campbell, a nurse, disappeared Jan. 12, 1974, while vacationing at Aspen. Her frozen, nude body was found about four weeks later some two miles from the Wildwood Inn where she had been staying.

'Publicity Attempt'

Mr. O'Connell stood in court with his client shackled and called Tuesday's arraignment another attempt by the prosecution to generate publicity around the case.

Colorado authorities, Mr. O'Connell said, had this case for eight months: Why did they wait until a week before elections in Pitkin County? he asked later. The district attorney, he said, is up for reelection in that county.

Deputy Salt Lake County Attorney David E. Yocom, who prosecuted ·Bundy, said the intent of such an "arraignment is to detain. However, in Bundy's case the purpose was to legally, perfect the eventual extradition of the defendant to Colorado.

Mr. Yocom said it's expected Bundy will fight extradition.

Denies Wrongdoing

In a written statement released through his attorney, Bundy once again said he was innocent of any wrong

"I am more confident today than a any time before that my kidnaping conviction will be reversed with a new trial resulting in my acquittal on that charge," the statement said.

He was convicted March 1 in 3rd District Court of the Nov. 8, 1974; kidnaping of Carol DaRonch, then 17 from the Fashion Place Mall in Murray.

Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr. sen[‡] tenced Bundy to serve 1 to 15 years at the Utah State Prison. He began that sentence July 6.

Not Blind Faith

Of the new charges out of Colorado? Bundy's statement Tuesday said, "I am absolutely certain that should I be allowed a fair trial in Colorado, I will be found not guilty of the charge in Colorado.

"My confidence is not the result of blind faith; it is the product of personal knowledge. Through personal know ledge I can say that I have never killed; never kidnaped and never even desired to injure another human being," the statement said.

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Bundy says he'll be freed

Convicted kidnaper Theodore Robert Bundy, 29, Tuesda expressed confidence that he will be vindicated in the kidnaping count and will succeed in proving his innocence in a Colorado murder case.

Bundy, in a press statement, said he was prepared to "use every ounce of strength I have to vindicate myself." The typed statement was issued following Bundy's court appearance before Salt Lake City Judge Melvin H. Morris Tuesday on a fugitive complaint.

"I am more confident today than at any time before that my kidnaping conviction will be reversed with a new trial resulting in my acquital," the statement said. Bundy is serving a 1-15 year term in the Utah State Prison for the kidnaping of teen-ager Carol DaRonch from Fashion Place Mall in Murray 23 months ago.


"I am absolutely certain that, should I be allowed a fair trial in Colorado, I will be found not guilty of the charge," the statement continued. An aff affidavit davit from the district attorney's chief crime investigator, Michael J. Fisher, Pitkin County, Colo., charges Bundy with the slaying of Dearborn, Mich., nurse Karyn Campbell 21 months ago in Aspen.

The murdered woman's nude body was found less than three miles from a ski lodge at Aspen. Her head had been smashed in by some type of blunt weapon, investigators said.

"Through personal knowledge I can say that I have never killed, never kidnap ed and never even desired to injure another human being," Bundy's statement said.

He said his confidence in clearing himself was not based on blind faith, but was a product of his personal knowledge of himself and his conduct.

"I am prepared to overcome the massive and prejudicial pub-

licity which significantly affected my first trial and promises to influence the second," he said. "While I have no money to hire an attorney and no way of matching the limitless power of the state of Colorado with its prosecutors, investigation, laboratories and expert witnesses, I am prepared to present a defense proving my innocence.

"In reality there is no such thing as a presumption of innocence. I am prepared to do all this alone if necessary and I will win—because I am right," the statement said.

Bundy said his statement was "intended as much for the many people who care about me and believe in my innocence as it is for those who believe there can only be a presumption of guilt in my case."

Over vigorous protests of his attorney, John D. O'Connell, the city judge Tuesday scheduled a fugitive hearing for Nov. 26 in city court. O'Connell told the court that state law requires fugitives to be held in county jail and said the fugitive complaint against Bundy should be dismissed because he is already in prison.

The fugitive proceeding against Bundy plus a detainer on file in Gov. Calvin L. Rampton's office are to allow Colorado authorities to file papers to extradite the prisoner for trial on the first degree murder count, a capital offense.

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Bundy going before board

UTAH STATE PRISON — A unit classification committee recommended Tuesday that convicted kidnaper Theodore Bundy be held in maximum security.

Bundy's future prison status will be determined Friday by an executive classification committee, comprised of the warden, deputy warden and other officials, which will review the recommendation.

Prison officials said this follows normal procedure when an inmate is reclassified. A unit committee made up of officials in the block in which the "inmate has been held (medium security in Bundy's case), reviews the reasons for possible reclassification. If maximum security is recommended, the executive committee makes the final decision.

The reclassification stems from apparent escape materials, including forged identification and notes on airline schedules, found among Bundy's possession Oct. 19. He has already served 15 days in isolation for the infraction.

Bundy, serving 1-15 years on his conviction for aggravated kidnaping in the abduction of a 17-year-old girl from a Salt Lake County shopping center, has been named in connection with the 1975 death of Caryn Campbell, a young nurse from Dearborn, Mich., who was found dead near Aspen, Colo.

Colorado authorities have instituted extradition proceedings against Bundy.

Wilks was paroled Aug. 10, 1976, after serving a portion of a five-year-to-life sentence for shooting Utah Highway Patrol Trooper Charles D. Warren in Springville on Sept. 2, 1969. Trooper Warren was not killed but was forced to retire from the highway patrol because of head wounds.

Receiving a parole on July 12, 1977, will be William W. Wellwood, 33, Southgate, Mich., who has served five years of a five-year-to-life sentence for the Oct. 15, 1971, robbery of La Castia Cafe in Salt Lake City.

In other action the board granted four paroles, gave one termination of sentence, denied paroles to

two and revoked the paroles of three others.

Granted paroles, dates and sentences being served were James D. Allen, Henderson, Ky., not more than five years for theft, and Gary Don Mecham, 20, Roosevelt. 1 to 15 years for burglary, both on Jan. 10, 1978; Bradley C. Dalton, 21, Taylorsville, not more than five years for theft, July 11, 1978, and James R. Butters, 26, Salt Lake City, not more than five years for attempted theft, July 12, 1977.

Terminate Sentence

The board told Marvin James Laster, 30, Ogden. his one-year sentence for burglary of a vehicle will be terminated on Nov. 14, 1977.

The board told Elmer G. Erickson, 47, Logan, it would not give him a parole date, but it set another hearing for September, 1977. He is serving not more than five years for theft.

Haymond Casey, 23, Blanding, serving not more than five years for assault by a prisoner, attempted assault by a prisoner and assault with a deadly welloon, will appear before the board again in January, 1978.

Bundy in Colorado for trial

kidnaper Theodore Robert Bundy, 30, Tacoma, Wash., was flown to Colorado Friday evening to be tried for murder in the same court in which French-born singer Claudine Longet was convicted two weeks ago.

The clean-shaven, chain-shackled prisoner was transported by three Pitkin County, Colo., officers. Bundy waived his right, Friday to challenge extradition from Utah.

Bundy will be tried for the 1975 murder of a Michigan nurse attending an Aspen convention. In Salt Lake City Friday, Third District Judge Jay E. Banks remanded Bundy to the Colorado authorities after the prisoner dropped his attempt for a writ of habeas corpus to free him from the murder count and from prison.

Confident of acquittal, Bundy had his attorney, Bruce C. Lubeck, distribute copies of a typed statement he had prepared. In Colorado he will be represented by public defender, authorities said. The statement said:

"Today, I waived my right to challenge my extradition to Colorado and informed Utah and Colorado authorities that I wish to travel to Aspen as soon as arrangements can be made for my transfer.

"I would not waive my right to a hearing and voluntarily request removal to Cololado unless I was certain that I will be acquitted on the charges there," Bundy, a former University of Utah law student, wrote.

Ben H. Meyers, undersheriff of Pitkin County, Colo.; Detective Sgt. Rick D. Kralicek, and Pitkin County Chief Investigator Michael J. Fisher immediately began planning to return Bundy to Carorado to face the charges filed against him last fall.

"When we go, he's going. He's been remanded to our custody, so I guess he belongs to us awhile," Meyers said. However, the three Colorado officians would not say exactly when they will transport Bundy to Aspen.

Bundy is charged with the murder two years ago of Karyn Campbell, 23, Dearborn, Mich., whose body was found not far from an Aspen ski resort. She died of blows to the back of her head and apparently was dumped into snowdrifts after the bludgeoning. The body was not found for about five weeks, investigators said.

Colorado authorities say they have been able to place Bundy in the Aspen area at the time of the slaying. Credit card purchases led investigators to check Bundy's travels there

He was arrested in the summer of 11/75 in Salt Lake County on a traffic violation. Shortly after his arrest, Salt Lake County authorities charged him with kidnaping Murray teen-ager Carol DaRonch from a shopping mall. The victim escaped from her captor's car within minutes of the abduction.

Bundy was subsequently convicted and sentenced to one to 15 years in Utah State Prison for the offense. He has appealed the conviction to the Utah Supreme Court. A hearing was scheduled for next month.

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Should Colorado authorities fail to prove the murder count against Bundy, he will automatically be returned to the Utah State Prison to continue his sentence, Deputy Sait Lake County Atty. David E. Yocom sait.

In his written statement, Bundy said, "I have postponed going to Colorado these past two months for a number of reasons. First, I wanted to determine what remote connection, if any, there could have been between myself and the tragic death in Colorado. As I suspected, the accusations made by Pitkin County district attorney have proven to be grossly exaggerated, and in some instances purely fictitious and totally without merit."

Bundy said he also had needed time to check into the legality of the extradition and to assure himself of competent legal representation upon arrival in Colorado. In addition, the prisoner said, he wanted to work with his Salt Lake attorneys in writing his kidnaping appeal.

"The irony is that this wrongful conviction is the major, if not the sole, justification for the charge against me in Colorado," Bundy wrote.

He referred to the fact that Colorado Au authorities had not checked into his visit in the Aspen area until Salt Lake officials uncovered the credit purchase connections while investigating the DaRonch case.

Bundy's home state, Washington, alse has been investigating his travels in that state, where other murder cases are unsolved.

Judge will hear motion to restrict Bundy trial

ASPEN, Colo. (UPI) — A district court judge says he will hold another hearing this month on a defense motion to bar newsmen from court appearances of Theodore Bundy, charged with murdering a Michigan nurse two years ago.

Bundy appeared Monday before District Court Judge George Lohr to be advised of his rights in the murder of Caryn Campbell, who died while she was on a ski vacation with her fiance. Her body was found several weeks later under a snowbank.

Glenwood Springs Public Defender Charles Leidner requested the news media be barred from the arraignment and all future court hearings in the case. Lohr denied the request, but agreed to clear photographers from Bundy's path between the jail and the courtroom for the arraignment.

Lohr also said he would hear a motion at a Feb. 28 hearing to bar the press. Bundy's preliminary hearing was scheduled for March 11.

Bundy, a second-year law student at the University of Utah at the time of his arrest, currently is serving a prison term in Utah for the kidnaping of a teen-aged girl. He originally fought extradition but announced last week he was confident of acquittal and would transfer to Colorado of his own will.

Before the court appearance, Leidner requested that Bundy be allowed to make the court appearance unmanacled.

"If people see Mr. Bundy transported back and forth from the jail to the courtroom in handcuffs, they will begin to think there is a reason for it when others in this town charged with murder are allowed to walk unfettered," said Leidner, referring, to Claudine Longet, who was sentenced earlier Monday in the same courtroom.

Lohr overruled Leidner's request after Sheriff Mike Keinest said Bundy was considered a maximum security prisoner in Utah and had been involved in an escape plan.

"We have put the jail under maximum security conditions," Keinest said. "My concern in doing that is for his security. There are certain people who would like to get to Mr. Bundy and do him some harm."

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Bundy Awaiting Hearing in Aspen

ASPEN, Colo. (AP) — Convicted kidnaper Theodore R. Bundy was advised of his rights. Monday in State District Court here, and a preliminary hearing was set on whether he should be tried on a murder charge.

The slender, well-groomed Bundy, wearing a baggy blue jump suit, toyed with a pencil as Judge George E. Lohr told him he faces a death sentence if convicted in the slaying of a Michigan nurse two years ago in this Rocky Mountain ski resort.

Bundy, 29, was extradited Saturday from Utah.on an arrest warrant charging him with murder in the Jan. 12, 1975, killing of Caryn Campbell of Dearborn, Mich. Miss Campbell's nude, frozen body was found near a ski resort road three months after her January disappearance. She had been vacationing in Aspen.

Dist. Atty. Frank Tucker said formal charges against Bundy probably would be filed within two weeks.

Lohr barred photographers and television crews from taking pictures or film of Bundy as he was escorted from a jail cell in the courthouse basement to the second-floor courtroom.

Lohn's order was aimed at preventing prejudicial pretrial news coverage. But Lohr denied a defense motion to bar the public and press from Monday's proceedings and from all future court actions in the case, including the trial.

A further hearing on the exclusion request was set for Feb. 28. The preliminary hearing was scheduled for March 11

Bundy is a former law student at the University of Utah who once was employed by the Republican Party in Washington state. He is serving a 1-to-15 year sentence for the kidnaping of a girl in the Salt Lake City area in 1974.

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Bundy Extradited to Colorado, Murder Arraignment Monday

Theodore R. Bundy, serving time in the Utah State Prison for kidnaping, was turned over to Pitkin County, Colo., authorities Friday when 3rd District Court Judge Jay E. Banks dismissed a writ of habeas corpus which would have delaifed the extradition.

. Bundy is scheduled for arraignment Monday in Pitkin County on first-degree murder charges.

Prior to Friday's action, attorneys for Bundy had indicated their client would fight extradition.

Releases Statement

In a prepared statement released after the court proceedings, Bundy said, "I would not waive my right to an (extradition) hearing and voluntarily, request removal to Colorado unless I was certain that I will be acquitted of the charges there."

The Colorado charges contend that Bundy was responsible for the Jan. 12, 1974, disappearance of Caryn Campbell, 24, a nurse from Dearborn, Mich.

Her nude, frozen body was found some four weeks later about two miles from the Wildwood Inn, Aspen, where she had been staying.

Bundy's Salt Lake City attorney, Bruce C. Lubeck, said his client will be represented by the public legal defender's office in Pitkin County and will be housed in that county's jail.

Of his extradition, Bundy cited several other reasons, besides his innocence, for wanting to go to Colorado.

"First, I wanted to determine what remote connection, if any, there could have been between myself and the tragic death in Colorado. As I suspected, the accusations made by the Pitkin County district attorney have proven to be grossly exaggerated, in some instances purely fictitious and without merit.

"Second, I needed time to check into what matters I could challenge in Utah concerning the legality of the extradition.

"Next, I had to assure myself that I. would receive competent legal representation upon my arrival in Colorado.

"And finally, I wanted to work with my Salt Lake City attorneys in writing my appeal of my kidnaping conviction.

Bundy was sentenced to serve 1 to 15 years in the Utah prison for the Nov. 18, 1974 kidnaping of Carol DaRonch from the Fashion Place Mall at 6100 S. State in Murray.

ASPEN, Colo. (UPI) — Strands of hair found in a car driven by accused killer Theodore Bundy matched those of a Michigan nurse abducted and later slain while vacationing at this Rocky Mountain ski resort with her fiance, an FBI official said. Tuesday.

Robert Neill testified before District Judge George Lohr ended a two-day preliminary hearing for Bundy, saying he would decide late today whether to order the former Utah law student bound over on murder charges for the death of Caryn Campbell.



Bundy to move from Aspen jail

ASPEN, Colo. (UPI) — Former law student Theodore Bundy, accused of murder in the 1975 death of a Michigan nurse, has been ordered moved from the Pitkin County Jail because of poor conditions at the facility.

Sgt. Rick Kralicek Monday said the Colorado Department of Health advised that no one be kept more than 30 days in the jail, a courthcuse basement facility which once held Old West gunfighter Doc Holliday.

"The jail is just in very poor condition," said Kralicek. "There is very poor lighting, and the facilities are not in good shape."

Bundy appeared before District Judge George Lohr Monday, asking to remain in the Aspen jail. 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Bundy Pleads Innocent To Aspen Slay Count

ASPEN, Colo. (UPI) — Theodore Bundy pleaded innocent Monday to the slaying more than two years ago of a Michigan nurse abducted from her resort hotel.

The bearded Bundy, dressed in a yellow T-shirt and beige slacks, entered the plea during a hearing on motions ranging from a request for more meals to more bedding in his jail cell at nearby Glenwood Springs.

Bundy, 30, is accused of the kidnaping and slaying of Caryn Campbell during a ski vacation the Michigan nurse took with her fiance in January, 1975. Her body was found in a snowbank outside Aspen one month after her disappearance.

Agrees With Request

U.S. District Judge George Lohr agreed with a request by Bundy to have an expert from a forensic science laboratory at Oakland, Calif., help him prepare a defense. Authorities have said they found strands of hair similar to Miss Campbell's in Bundy's car.

Bundy, acting in his own defense, at times appeared close to tears while describing conditions at the jail where he was moved after the Aspen jail was closed for health reasons.

Bundy said he had lost 20 pounds since being imprisoned and was receiving only two meals per day. He said the only exercise he had was in walking back and forth to the law library in the county courthouse while preparing his defense.

Refuses Call for Sheets

Lohr left a decision on an extra meal to Sheriff Ed Hogue but said Bundy should be provided with vitamins. He refused Bundy's request for sheets as bedding in the prisoner's cell.

Bundy called Aspen Valley Hospital nutritionist Mary McCartney in efforts to gain a third meal, saying his weight loss interfered with his ability to prepare his defense. Miss McCartney said two meals were sufficient unless weight loss was substantial.

Bundy also complained of an abscessed tooth he said was the result of improper dental care at the Utah State Prison before he was transfered to Colorado.

Bundy, a former law student at the University of Utah, last year was convicted of the attempted abduction of a Utah teen-ager from a shopping center outside Salt Lake City.

The judge did grant Bundy restricted use of a telephone credit card. He has had unlimited use of phone cards during his incarceration here, but following his escape two weeks ago the use of the card was rescinded. Under Lohr's order, use of the card will be reinstated with the provision that each call shall be placed by a deputy to the number and name provided by Bundy. The identification of the person called will be verified by a sheriff's officer.

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5 Coloradans resign

ASPEN, Colo. (AP) — The Pitkin County indersheriff and four deputies have resigned, two as direct result of the escape of Theodore R. Bundy on une 7, Sheriff Dick Kienast says.

Kienast said Wednesday the departure of Undersheriff Ben Meyers and of the sergeant and deputy he did not identify were for "personal reasons" only remotely connected with Bundy's getaway,

The former Washington state employe, political worker and law student jumped 25 feet from a second-story window to gain his freedom while Deputy David Westerlund had left a library room where Bundy was studying to go out into a hallway, according to a Colorado Bureau of Investigation report.

Westerlund and Sgt. Rick Kralicek, shift commander, should have been aware of the security problem, the report stated. Both resigned following the CBI investigation.

Bundy, convicted of kidnaping in Utah and sought by authorities in connection with the disapparances and deaths of women in that state as well in Colorado and the Puget Sound area of Washington, is charged with murder in the death of a Michigan nurse 2½ years ago near Aspen.

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Bundy to Face 4 Trial Counts

ASPEN, Colo. (AP)—A district court judge ruled Friday that there was probable cause to bind Theodore Bundy over for trial on four counts related to his escape last month from the Pitkin County Courthouse.

Bundy, accused of murdering a Michigan nurse, leaped from a second-floor window in the courthouse June 7 during a pretrial hearing in that case. He was recaptured six days later after wandering in the hills south of Aspen and hiding out in a mountain cabin.

Bundy, a 30-year-old-former law student, appeared Friday before District Court Judge George E. Lohr. He was wearing blue jail overalls, his legs were shackled and he was barefoot. Lohr ordered that Bundy be provided with shoes for future court appearances.

Bundy had been returned from Utah to stand trial in the January 1975 slaying of a Dearborn, Mich., nurse, Caryn Campbell, who was vacationing near Aspen. He was serving a 1-to-15 year sentence in Utah for the 1974 kidnaping of a Salt Lake City girl.

Of the five counts brought against Bundy in relation to his escape, Lohr ruled there was probable cause sufficient to justify trial on all but one count,

By virtue of his escape here, the district attorney's office had charged Bundy with escape from the Utah Penitentiary. Lohr ruled that such a charge exceeded the authority of the district attorney.

Lohr ruled that Bundy should stand trial on four charges — escaping from the Pitkin County Jail, breaking and entering into a mountain cabin near Castle Creek, theft of a rifle from that cabin, and the theft of a 1966 blue Cadillac from a home just west of Aspen.

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Bundy asks new kidnap trial

Convicted kidnaper Theodore R. Bundy asked for a new trial Monday afternoon, claiming the Salt Lake County Attorney's Office suppressed vital evided ce to obtain a conviction last February.

In a motion filed with the Third District Court, Bundy's Utah attorney, John D. O'Connell, said prosecutors withheld a police report which casts doubt on the kidnap victim's identification of Bundy.

Bundy, 30, was convicted of kidnaping Carol DaRanch, Murray, from a shopping mall parking lot on Nov. 8, 1974. She was 17 at the time. Bundy is being held in Aspen, Colo., where he is charged with mur lering a Michigan nurse and with escape.

O'Connell's motion for a new trial states, 'The pnly significant evidence supporting the verdict of

guilty was the testimony of Carol DaRonch that she could identify the defendant as the man who had kidnaped her."

O'Connell wrote that while in Colorado, Bindy was given copies of investigation materials, and accidently came across a report prepared by Salt Lake County Deputy Jerry Thompson.

A copy of the report, which was attached to the motion, stated Deputy Thompson questioned Miss DaRonch Sept. 1, 1975, and later said:

"In going through the pictures, she pulled out Mr. Bundy's picture in her hand, gave the pictures back to this officer, stating, 'I don't see anyone in there

that resembles him.

"She was asked what the one was doing in her hand. She stated, 'Ph here.' I asked her if that; ws the guy, or why she; pulled it out. She stated, 'I don't know, aah, I gues it looks somethinglike him.'

"She was asked if she was afraid to identify him, and she stated no. She said, 'That looked maybe something like him' she really just didn't know, she didn't think she could identify him if she saw him again or not."

Deputy Thompson also wrote, "This is a very poor witness in this detective's opinion, and I don't now if she can identify the individual or if she is scared or what the situation is."

"O'Connell said in the motion that his client had asked the prosecution to produce all materials dealing with the investigation, and that the prosecution said in court that everything pertaining to the case from the Sheriff's Office was given to the defense.

The attorney contended that a police report which was released "Indicates a fair viewing process conducted by an objective detective who obtained a tentative identification which called for further efforts to determine if the victim could actually make an identification.

"Whereas, the suppressed report reflects the frustration of a detective who attempted and failed to get the victim to make an identification of aperson he regarded as guilty and dangerous and indicates that those attitudes were conveyed to the victim."

O'Connell said the newly discovered report would have been of great value to Bundy's defense because it would have established the theory that Ms DaRonch was initially unable to identify Bundy but was later induced to do so by investigators.

O'Connell said the motion was not made immediately after the new SEARCHED. evidence was discovered SERIALIZED because Bundy believed the report was inadventently delivered to him by Pitkin County, Colorauthorities.

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Bundy case sent down

The case of convicted kidnaper Theodore R. Bundy was remanded to Third District Court Tuesday from the Utah Supreme Court to consider nawly discovered evidence.

Bundy, 30, convicted of kidnaping Carol Di-Ronch, Murray, from a shopping mall parking lot Nov. 8, 1974, contends the new evidence was not available to Bundy's attorney.

Bundy asked for a new trial a week ago on grounds that the Salt Lake County Attorney's Office suppressed vital evidence to obtain a conviction last February.

In a motion filed with Third District Court. Bundy's Utah attorney, John D. O'Connell, said prosecutors withheld a police report that casts doubt on the kidnap victim's identification of Bundy.

Bundy, being held in Colorado, received copies of investigation materials and accidentally found a report prepared by Salt Lake County Deputy Jerry Thompson in which he described hesitancy by Miss Di Ronch in identifying a picture of Bundy and also described her as a poor witness.

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Ordered

Under an order signed Thursday by 3rd District Court Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr., the prosecutors of convicted kidnaper Theodore R. Bundy must respond to a defense motion that there may be new evidence in the case.

Last Tuesday, the Utah Supreme Court remanded the case to the lower court for the action.

Deputy Salt Lake County Attorney David E. Yocom, who prosecuted the case before Judge Hanson, now has until Dec. 30 to file a written response to the claim by defense attorney John D. O'Connell that his client was deprived of a certain report that had bearing on the case.

Bundy, now 31, was convicted by Judge Hanson March 1, 1976 based mainly on eyewitness testimony from kidnap victim Carol DaRonch, then 17.

The report, which defense counsel claims was withheld, says Miss DaRonch was not considered a "good" witness.

Bundy was sentenced to serve one to 15 years in the Utah State Prison, but has since been transferred to Pitkin County, Colo. to face charges that say he murdered Caryn Campbell, a Dearborn, Mich., nurse.

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Being Investigated

Bundy prosecutors face query

Utah prosecutors of Theodore Bundy, 30, convicted kidnaper of a Murray teen-ager, have been given until Sept. 30 to answer allegations that they surpressed evidence and presented perjured testimony during the kidnap trial.

Bundy's defense lawyer in the kidnap case, John D. O'Connell has contended that evidence regarding viewing of suspect photos by the victim, Carol DaRonch, was withheld from the defense. He also charged in a written motion that officials offered perjured testimony regarding the same aspect of the trial.

An order to answer questions about the evidence was issued Thursday afternoon by Third District Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr. He scheduled a special conference in his chambers for Oct. 3, 9 a.m., to discuss O'Connell's allegations.

Bundy is in a Colorado jail awaiting trial for the murder of a Michigan nurse, Caryn Campbell, 23, Dearborn, who was killed while attending a convention in Aspen, Colo., in 1975.

Until extradited to Colorado, Bundy had been serving a one-to-15 year sentence in Utah State Prison for kidnaping Miss DaRonch.

O'Connell won return of the kidnaping case to District Court after an appeal to Utah Supreme Court.

In his current motion, O'Connell contended that a report made by Salt Lake County Sheriff's officers regarding sessions with Miss DaRonch, in which she was asked to identify her assailant from photographs were withheld.

Bundy had been arrested by a Utah Highway Patrol sergeant for attempting to elude an officer and for possession of burglary tools. He was charged with the kidnap after Miss DaRonch identified him.

In his motion, O'Connell said that prosecutor David E. Yocom, assistant Salt Lake County attorney, agreed before the trial to furnish all reports and photographs relating to the case to the defense.

Yocom subsequently testified before Third District Judge Peter F. Leary that everything in the record had indeed been given to defense lawyers.

However, O'Connell said in his motion that Sheriff's Detective Gerald S. Thompson, who also testified at the trial, had made a second report regarding the photo viewing and that the second report said that Miss DaRonch was not certain that she could identify Bundy as her kidnaper.

The report in question surfaced when Pitkin County, Colo., investigators requested and were given reports on the DaRonch trial.

The prosecution committed perjury in claiming to have furnished proper pre-trial reports to the defense, O'Connell charged.

Meanwhile, prosecutors in the murder trial in Colorado have asked permission to introduce evidence regarding two Utah slayings — those of Laura Ann Aime and Melissa Smith. The bodies of both teen-agers were found, on separate occasions, in meuntain areas near Salt Lake City more than two years ago. Bundy was not charged in the killings.

The Pitkin County district attorney said Thursday that a judge might wait until the start of Bundy's trial to decide if evidence regarding the Utah murders will be allowed.

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Judge Grants Compromise On 1 Motion By Bundy

ASPEN, Colo. (AP) — District Court Judge George Lohr on Friday came up with a compromise on one of five motions filed in the case of Theodore Bundy, acquised of the 1975 murder of Caryn Campbell, a Milhigan nurse.

Earlier this month, prosecutors filed a motion to introduce into the case evidence from two similar cases in Utah.

Bundy, who is defending himself, told the court that it would be "overburdened by this patently irrelevant evidence."

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Hearing Date Set On Bundy Trial

A hearing will be held Oct. 14 on whether convicted kidnaper Theodore R. Bundy should have a new trial.

That date was decided Monday when attorneys for both sides met with 3rd District Court Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr. about the defense request.

Bundy, 30, was convicted by Judge Hanson of the November, 1974, abduction of Carol DaRonch from a Murray shopping mail.

Then after being committed to the Utah State Prison to serve a term of one to 15 years, Bundy, a former University of Utah law student, was extradited to Pitkin County, Colo., to face murder charges.

Those charges allege he killed Caryn Campbell, 13, a Dearborn, Mich., nurse in January, 1975.

Defense attorney John D. O'Connell's request for a new trial in the Utah case centers on reports and evidence that were not made available to him and his client before the 3rd District Court trial.

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Judge schedules Bundy arguments

Third District Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr. has set Oct. 14 for arguments on whether convicted kidnaper Theodore M. Bundy will receive a new trial.

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Bundy hearing reset

A hearing planned today on convicted kidnaper theodore Bundy's petition for a new trial has been rescheduled for Oct. 31 in Third District Court.

Judge Jay E. Banks also set Tuesday to hear a motion asking that Bundy be allowed to leave the Glenwood Springs Jail in Colorado for three days to attend the Oct. 31 hearing.

Bundy, 30, was transferred from Utah State Prison early this year to Pitkin County, Colo., for trial on a first-degree murder charge in the slaying of Karyn Campbell, 23, Dearborn, Mich., in January 1975 near an Aspen ski resort.

He was serving a 1 to 15-year sentence in the Utah State Prison on an aggravated kidnaping conviction.

Judge Banks took over the Bundy case this week after Judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr., who convicted Bundy in a non-jury trial, voluntarily withdrew.

After an appeal by Bundy, the Utah Supreme Court this summer remanded the case back to Third District Court for hearings on allegations that prosecutors and witnesses had withheld information about the kidnaping victim's identification of Bundy.

The prosecutor claimed evidence would link Bundy to the murder of Laura Ann Aime, Salem, Utah, whose body was found Nov. 27, 1974, and to the disappearance of Debra Kent from a high school parking lot in Bountiful that same year. Both girls were 17.

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Judge Rejects Bundy Motion

ASPEN, Colo. (AP)—A district court judge has denied a motion to introduce at the murder trial of Theodore Bundy information the prosecution said might link Bundy to the unsolved murders of two young girls in Utah.

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Bundy Tests Utahn On Kidnap Details

ASPEN, Colo. (UPI) — Accused murderer Ted Bundy, in an effort to suppress evidence from his forthcoming trial, Wednesday cross-examined a Utah woman he was convicted of kidnapping three years ago.

Carol DaRonch, 21, Murrah, Utah, was calm throughout several hours of questioning, although she was unable to remember some specific details of her Nov. 8, 1974, kidnapping from a shopping center parking lot.

Bundy is charged with first degree murder in the 1975 slaying of Caryn Campbell, a Michigan nurse who was vacationing at this Rocky Mountain ski resort. He and his attorneys want to block evidence from the DaRonch kidnapping, as well as the murder of a Utah woman, Melissa Smith, from being introduced at his trial for the Campbell killing.

Earlier in the day, proceedings were brought to an abrupt halt when Bundy and sheriff's deputies exchanged angry words after he began walking around in the courtroom.

When Sgt, Don Dayis told Bundy to sit down, Bundy became upset and exchanged words with him and other deputies. Bundy was taken out of the courtroom and down the stairs into the lant area.

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ASPEN, Colo. (AP) — Theodore Bundy, acting in his own defense, questioned Carol DaRonch Wednesday afternoon for over two hours in efforts to shake her memory of him as her abductor in 1974.

Bundy, who faces trial in January in Pitkin County for the 1975 murder of Caryn Campbell, was convicted in Utah of the DaRonch kidnapping but maintains his innocence and is appealing the conviction. Testimony by Miss DaRonch, of Murray, Utah, is important in determining what evidence will be admitted in Bundy's murder trial in Colorado.

Prosecutors are attempting to show similarities in the circumstancessurrounding her abduction and Miss Campbell's death. Miss DaRonch testified Wednesday concerning her abduction and told special prosecutor Milton Blakey that she identified Bundy with certainty, and without any suggestins from Utah law enforcement officers.

She testified that she identified him by the way he walked onto the stage during a police lineup. Bundy prefaced his cross examination by asking her to relax, assuring her that he was not there to upset her.

Bundy asked her numerous questions about her observations during the abduction, about the car and about all circumstances surrounding the event. She answered, "I don't remember" to many of Bundy's questions.

Admitting she was in a state of panic, she testified that she could not remember what the lighting was like during the 20 to 25 minutes she spent with her abductor before she battled her way out of his car, or whether she had a good look at his face during that time.

However, she said the lighting was bright inside the mall where she was first approached by her abductor. That was the only time, she said, she got a fall face view of him in the light. In the March 1976 kidnap trial she testified that Bundy had posed as a detective and convinced her to go with him.

Bundy concluded his questioning by asking, "You are not really sure if I was your abductor, are you?"

She replied, "Yes, I'm certain, You can't change a face."

At the conclusion of her testimony Bundy said: "Miss DaRonch, I feel very sorry for you but you have made a mistake."

Presiding Judge George Lohr ordered the statement stricken from the record. The court then recessed until Monday, when pathologists for the prosecution and defense will begin their testimony.

Two witnesses were called Wednesday morning. They were David Yokum, assistant district attorney for Salt Lake County and Herold Kinghorn, an assistant county attorney there. Kinghorn's testimony involved his discussions with the girl about police identification procedures. Kinghorn was firm in his testimony that Miss DaRonch was not pressured by the police in making the identification.

The morning session was disrupted when Bundy became upset and damaged the lightweight chair leg restraints which he must wear in court since his escape from the courthouse last June. He was escorted downstairs to the jail but reappeared at the afternoon session in the usual leg restraints.

A motion for a new trial for convicted kidnapper Theodore Bundy, 30, found guilty in a 1976 non-jury trial, was denied today by 3rd District Judge Jay E. Banks:

Banks ruled that the report by Salt Lake County Deputy Sheriff Jerry Thompson was unlikely to have changed the outcome of the trial and that the defense made ample examination of Miss DaRonch as a witness. In any case, the comments by the deputy were not admissible in the trial, he said.

Incensistencies in the girl's testimoney were more than probed by defense lawyers, Banks said, and trial judge Stewart M. Hanson Jr. took them into

account in making his decision.

Banks said the defense lawyers for Bundy had made their contention many times during the trial that Miss DaRonch was an unreliable witness who had voiced some inconsistencies in her identification.

Comments by the deputy that Miss DaRonch was a poor witness for the prosecution would not have helped the defense or changed the course of the outcome, he said.

John D. O'Connell, the original defense lawyer for Bundy, said the report by the deputy was supressed, but Banks said in his view the report was not wilfully withheld by the prosecution.

Bundy is currently being held in Colorado where he is awaiting trial on murder charges in connection with the death of a Michigan nurse in Aspen, Colo., in 1975.

Bundy also has been questioned in connection with other deaths and disappearances of young yomen in several western states and is fighting court hattles to keep evidence from some of those cases from being introduced into his murder trial.

Judge Banks said the fact that Miss DaRonch was at times "indecisive" about her abductor was brought out during the trial before Judge Hanson. He added that Det. Thompson's personal observations about the witness were "immaterial" and would not have been admitted in the trial anyway.

In response to the defense attorneys' allegations that his office withheld vital information, Sheriff's Capt. N. D. Hayward Monday issued a formal reply.

The captain's response dealt with remarks made by Bundy's attorney, John D. O'Connell.

"Mr. O'Connell," the release says, "faid that the sheriff's office had concealed and suppressed evidence, made false and misleading statements and had presented perjured testimony at the trial (of Bundy)."

Regarding his department's treatment of the Bundy case, Capt. Hayward wrote: "When Bundy was initially arrested in August 1975, every effort was made by this office, the Murray City Police Department, the Bountiful City Police Department and the Salt Lake County attorney's office to protect his rights during the ensuing monthlong investigation.

"As Yaw enforcement officers, we deplore the tactics of Mr. O'Connell'in sensationalizing the false allegations contained in his motion for a new trial," the report concludes.

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2 Pathologists Testify at Bundy's Trial

ASPEN, Colo. (AP) — Two pathologists have outlined, the injuries that killed a young Utah woman as the prosecution sought permission to introduce evidence concerning that death at the murder trial of Theodore Bundy.

At Monday's hearing, Dr. Serge Moore, Utah state medical examiner, and Dr. Donald Clark of Denver showed slides and outlined the autopsies they performed on Miss Campbell and Melissa Smith of Midvale, Utah.

The body of Miss Smith, the daughter of Midvale's police chief, was found near Midvale in October 1974.

Clark showed 19 color slides detailing the injuries received by Miss Campbell. Moore then showed 31 slides taken at the autopsy of Miss Smith.

Head Injuries

Both women had received head injuries and other injuries, the pathologists said.

The prosecution is attempting to demonstrate similarities in the deaths of the two women in hopes of having such evidence introduced at the trial of Bundy, a one-time Republican Party worker in Washington State.

Bundy was brought to Colorado to , stand trial in the Campbell case from Utah, where he is serving a sentence for kidnapping a young Salt Lake City woman, Carol DaRonch.

During hearings last week, Bundy attempted unsuccessfully to shake the memory of Miss DaRonch regarding her identification of Bundy as her abductor from a Salt Lake City shopping mall in 1974.

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Pathologist Disputes Testimony In Evidence Hearing for Bundy

ASPEN, Colo. (AP) — A Denver pathologist testified Tuesday there was little similarity in the wounds of two women whose nude bodies were found in late 1974 and early 1975 in Colorado and Utah.

Dr. John Woods' remarks came during the ninth and final day of hearings on what evidence will be admitted when Theodore Bundy's first-degree murder trial begins in January. Dr. Woods' testimony disputed earlier testimony by two projecution pathologists.

Davis said Bundy engaged in "light banter" at times with deputies, keeps abreast of current events and stays in shape by doing calisthenics. The deputy said Bundy keeps a supply of health foods and vitamins in his jail cell.

Bundy is allowed 20 hours of library time a week to study for his murder trial early next year, and reads newspappers and news magazines, said Davis.

He has become so adept at walking in leg shack es that Davis said he now periodically changes the length of the shackles to throw off Bundy's timing. Davis said Bundy recently beat a member of

the jail staff in arace up a flight of stairs while he was wearing the shackles.

Davis said Bundy, who escaped by leaping from a courthouse window last summer; is considered a high. P. . B - 11 security risk and is kept under heavy guard.

Each day, Bundy, a native of Washington, is taken from the Garfield County Jail in Glenwood Springs to the Pitkin County Courthouse in Aspen for his evidence suppression hearing.

Prosecutors Monday attempted to draw similarities between the January 1975 murder of a nurse in Aspen to the murder of aUtah woman in 1974.

Testimony was heard from Dr. Donald Clark; Denver, who performed an autopsy on Caryn Campbell, of Dearborn, Mich., and Dr. Serge Moore, Utah medical ex aminer, who performed an autopsy on Melissa Smith.

Miss Campbell disappeared while vacationing at Aspen in January 1975, and her nude body was found

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one month later in a snowbank outside town. Miss Smith was murdered in Utah, and Clark and Moore testified that head wounds on the women were similar, along with cuts, bruises and hemorrhages on the heads, legs, faces and thighs of the two women.

The pathologists claimed there was no conslusive... evidence to determine whether either of the two women had been raped. Neither women showed signs of self-defense, such as having black or broken fingernails, said the medical men.

Prosecutors want to use evidence allegedly linking Bundy with the murder of Miss Smith, as well as a 1974 kidnapping of Carol DaRonch from a Salt Lake County shopping center, in his murder trial early next year.

In Salt Lake City Monday, Third District Judge Jay E. Banks turned down Bundy's request for a new triel in the Utah kidnapping case. Bundy was convicted of the crime last year and sentenced to serve one to 15 years in the Utah State Prison.

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Bundy hearings end in dispute

ASPEN, Colo. (AP) — The evidence hearings for Theodore Bundy's first-degree murder trial have ended after nine days, with a Denver pathologist disputing the previous testimony of prosecution witnesses who said there were several similarities between the way Caryn Campbell and Melissa Smith died.

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Bundy Asks Change In County of Trial

ASPEN, Colo. (UPI) — Former Utah law student Theodore Bundy Friday filed a motion in district court for a change of venue in his murder trial next month:

The suit filed in Pitkin County District Court at Aspen claims pre-trial publicity about the murder case and Bundy's escape from the county jail last summer make it impossible for him to get a fair trial in Pitkin County.

Accused in Slaying of Nurse

Bundy is accused of murdering Carlyn Campbell, a nurse from Dearborn, Mich., while she was vacationing at an Aspen ski resport in January 1975. Her frozen, nude body was discovered a month later in a spowdrift outside of town.

Bundy, who remains jailed in Aspen, was transferred from the Utah State Prison, where he was serving time for kidnapping a young woman from a shopping center in Salt Lake City last year.

Recpatured After Week as Escapee

Bundy escaped from the Pitkin County Courthouse during a pre-trial hearing last summer but was recaptured after about a week of wandering throughout the Colorado mountains.

District Judge George Lohr will hear the change of venue motion, along with a number of others, at a hearing scheduled in Aspen Dec. 23, Among the other motions is one to strike the death penalty should. 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ASPEN, Colo (AP)— Theodore Bundy has filed a motion in Pitkin County District Court seeking a change of venue in his upcoming murder trial.
