



Weirs beach riot Laconia, New Hampshire June 19-20, 1965

Riotous conditions developed at Weirs Beach located on Lake Winnipesaukee at Laconia, New Hampshire, on the night of June 19, 1965, when a crowd of 6,000 to 10,000 men and women who had congregated on Lakeside Avenue at the resort became disorderly and defied the local police.

#### NATURE OF THE CROWD:

The crowd was composed primarily of motorcyclists from all parts of the United States who were in the area to attend the annual motorcycle races at nearby Loudon, New Hampshire. Host of the individuals were in their twenties or early thirties.

### INITIAL INCIDENTS:

Trouble first occurred at about 7:00 p.m. on June 19, 1965, when someone threw a smoke bomb and the crowd converged in that area. Several more smoke bombs were thrown in the next hour with similar results. The crowd became disorderly and noisy, taunted police officers with vulgar and profane remarks, and interfered with traffice.

#### RIOTING ERUPTS:

By 9:00 p.m., the crowd had become an unruly mob completely defiant of police orders. Numbers of the mob fought among themselves, threw firecrackers, rocked and over-

turned two automobiles, one of which caught fire. An unsuccessful attempt was made to burn a bowling alley by pouring gasoline into the air-conditioning system of the building and igniting it. At 9:30 p.m., traffic was completely stopped in the area and some of the motorcyclists were drag racing amid the mob.

#### POLICE ACTION:

The Riot Squad of the Laconia Police Department, consisting of thirty men, moved into the area at 10:10 p.m., equipped with shotguns and other riot gear. They were met with a barrage of flying objects from the mob which refused to move. At that time the local police were joined by sixty New Hampshire State Police troopers and by officers of the Belknap County Sheriff's Office. Tear gas was used by the police with little effect, the mob still refusing to disperse. Shotguns were then brought into play by the police who fired birdshot at the feet of the rioters.

Approximately 200 members of a National Guard detail assisted the police in the clean-up operation. A rumor that the motorcyclists would attempt a similar riotous disturbance on the night of June 20th, 1965, did not materialize. As of 12:45 a.m., June 21, 1965, all of the motorcyclists had left the area and conditions were quiet.

#### ARRESTS AND INJURIES:

Thirty-three rioters were arrested and each is being held in custody in default of \$500 cash bond. Fifteen were charged with failure to disperse under a new State antiriot law, eleven were charged with participating in a riot and the remaining were held on charges of drunkenness or assaulting an officer. One juvenile, aged 17, was among those arrested. Thirty-one rioters were treated for bird-shot wounds at the Laconia General Hospital. Two of the injured reportedly received eye injuries. Several notice officers were victims of minor injuries.







At approximately 9 p.m., 6/19/65, mob composed of motorcyclists rioted at Weirs Beach, Laconia, New Hampshire. Rioting resulted in the setting of numerous fires and the burning of the boardwalk and the overturning of vehicles in the area, including a police cruiser. Many individuals were arrested and rioters fought by National Guardsmen, trained deputies from Belknap County and Laconia, New Hampshire, Police Department. Data submitted by Boston by teletype as of approximately Ctwelve noon, 6/20/65, furnished Special Agent Substantive Desk Supervisor, who requested Boston be telephonically instructed to furnish the following data:

- (1) Whether Army Intelligence was being kept advised as tany pertinent data.
  - (2) The specific cause of the riot.

(3) Whether any subversive, radical, racial or criminal elements involved in the riot.

- (4) If cause undetermined at this point, whether appropriate informants had been alerted to attempt to determine the cause of the riots
- (5) Current status report as to whether the rioting had stopped and full control of situation being maintained by local authorities.

(6) Whether local authorities had any advanced information that riot was to occur.

Supervisor, Boston, telephonically advised the following:

- (1) Army Intelligence has been advised of pertinent data regarding the riot.
- (2) Several conflicting stories have developed regarding cause of riot and attempts are being made to pin this down.
- (3) No evidence of subversive, racial, radical or criminal elements involved.
- (4) As of afternoon, 6/20/65, rioting had ceased and rioters had either been arrested or dispersed; however, the 44th Annual Laconia Motorcycle Rally which has been associated with the rioters was to continue and the possibility of another breakout exists.
- (5) Local authorities were aware of the 44th Annual Laconia Motorcycle Rally which was to be held on 6/19/65 and would result in large numbers of motorcycle enthusiasts being in the area. This, coupled with past experience in riot problems in the area, caused local authorities to be alert for possible trouble and local authorities and National Guard were on stand-by.







Twenty-nine suspects accused of taking part in a motorcycle-gang riot pleaded innocent yesterday when arraigned under New Hamp-shire's new "get-tough" antiriot law.

The men were clad in T-shirts, dungarees and motorcycle boots. Some had black eyes and wore bloodstained clothing. Others wore bandages on their hands and head.

They were charged with disobeying an officer and failing to dsperse from a riot. District Court Judge Bernard I. Snierson set ball at \$500 for 27 of them, but doubled it fo rthe two others because they had records.

#### HOSPITALIZED

One alleged rioter forfeited bail he had posted earlier, and another was confined to Laconia Hospital with injuries suffered in the Saturday night melee at Weirs Beach


on Lake Wnnipesaukee.
Two juveniles were to be arraigned later. In addition, police said about 30 other persons also were arrested and would be arraigned later in the week on charges ranging from drunkenness and speeding to assault.

The alleged rioters were brought into the tiny courtroom in groups of four and five. The room, which has space for only 50 persons, was jammed with spectators.

The riot was put down by steel-helmeted state and local police and about 200 National Guardsmen. They used clubs, tear gas, armored jeeps and shotguns loaded with birdshot and rock sait to quell the uprising.

A new riot-control law, rushed through the New Hampshire Legislature last week, provides for fines up to \$500 and a maximum of one year in jail for those convicted of being rioters and fines up to \$1,000 and threeyear jail terms for anyone convicted of causing personal injury or property damage during riof I ha old the

Laconia Police Chief How and Knowlton said at least four of the suspects have been identified as belonging to the Hell's Angels motorcycle club from California. He charged that they were instigators of the melee.

The Record American of Boston, Massachusetts, a daily newspaper, contained an article on June 22, 1965, entitled "Mayor Says Reds Started Weirs Riots." This article is datelined Laconia and supposedly quotes Mayor Peter Lessard who charged that rioting was communist inspired. Lessard alleges he has "reliable reports" that instigators were communist "riot mongers." The article also states that Lessard has information that seven members of the notorious California motorcycle band, the Hell's Angels, had been in Mexico for "special training on how to start riots." Mayor Lessard supposedly was going to ask the FBI to investigate it.

Peter R. Lessard, Mayor, Laconia, New Hampshire, issued a press statement on June 22, 1965, in which he claimed that the "Hell's Angels" was so well prepared that they chained fire hydrants in the Weirs Beach area the day before the riot, sprayed gasoline over highways, were equiped with shotguns and chains, and passed out paper bills whose headlines screamed "kill a cop Saturday night." Lessard also questioned in his statement how this group can be effective since 1950, meaning the "Hell's Angels" as their crime record is so heavy and so well published. Why are they permitted to take part in gang assaults and property damage throughout the country? Where and by whom are they trained in their riotous tactics? Also why have more than five hundred well known crime offenders traveled from California, more

than 3,000 miles for one evening's entertainment and consistently escape themselves.



#### AN ACT

relative to mob action.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

l New Chapter. Amend RSA by inserting after chapter 609 the following new chapter.

Chapter 609-A

Mob Action

609-A:l Mob Action. Mob action consists of any of the following: I. The use of force or violence disturbing the public peace by two or more persons acting together and without authority of law; or

II. The assembly of two or more persons to do an unlawful act; or

III. The assembly of two or more persons,

without authority of law, for the purpose of doing violence to the person or property of any one supposed to have been guilty of a violation of the law, or for the purpose of exercising correctional powers or regulative powers over any person by violence.

609-A:2 Penalty. Any person engaged in mob action shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars, or imprisoned not more than one year, or both.

609-A:3 Violence. Any participant in a mob action which shall by violence inflict injury to the person or property of another shall be fined not more than one thousand dollars, or imprisoned for not less than one nor more than three years, or both.

609-A:4 Refusal to Withdraw. Any person present during mob action, whether a participant in the mob action or not, who does not withdraw


on being commanded to do so by any peace officer shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars, or imprisoned not more than one year, or both.

609-A:5 Refusal to Aid. Any person who shall be present at a mob action and upon request by a peace officer to assist in suppressing the mob action refuses to assist, shall be fined not more than fifty dollars, or imprisoned not more than three months, or both.

609-A:6 Liability of Principal. Any person who shall promote, aid or encourage a mob action or take any lead or direction of such mob action, by word or act, or attempt to do so, or who shall be armed or disguised therein, shall be liable criminally as a principal for any crime or offense which may be committed by the mob, or any of them.

2 Repeal. RSA 609, relative to the suppression of riots, is hereby repealed.

# No Room For Riots

IT WOULD BE EASY to shrug off the riot Sunday in Liberty Park with the criticism that this is what can happen when the individual lets a mob make up his mind for him.

It would be easy to dismiss the wholesale disorderliness as just another deplorable example of what can happen when young people don't learn how to put leisure time to constructive use.

So much is at stake, however, that what happened should not be written off as only the work of a few punks and the immature who let their emotions get the better of them. Such incidents are occurring far too often across the nation not to suspect that the symptoms go much deeper.

At stake, of course, is the right of the law-abiding citizens of Salt Lake City to use their parks and playgrounds in safety. All too often, however, our parks are being frequented by drunks, perverts, molesters, and riff-raff looking for a fight.

IF THE ONLY WAY to keep our parks free from such trouble-makers is to get tough and to step-up police patrols, then so be it. Otherwise, it would be better to plow up the parks and playgrounds and turn them over to housing and commercial development than it would be to let lawless elements take them over.

At stake is the fundamental respect for law and order on which society is built. Without its stabilizing influence, progress is hard to come by.

Such respect, however, hasn't been helped by the number of recent court rulings which, on technicalities, have led too many people to think they can harass an arresting officer and get away with it.

If the arrests that were made at Liberty Park didn't put that notion to rest, maybe we should consider adopting a law like the one being proposed by the American Law Institute. In its Model Penal Code is a provision which specifies that a person being arrested must submit when he knows the person making such an arrest is a police officer. If the arrest turns out to be unlawful, the individual's civil and criminal remedies are still protected.

ALSO AT STAKE is the future of anyone foolish enough to let himself become embroiled with the law.

As Judge Jerome M. Lasky of New York's Nassau County District Court has written in Reader's Digest, "Too many young people are woefully unaware of the harm that a police record for a seemingly petty violation can do to their lives."

Because of his police record, a young man may find it impossible to enter a profession where a special license is needed, such as law or real estate brokerage. It could hurt his chances of acceptance into the armed services, or deny him promotion to officer status if he is accepted. Many firms are reluctant to hire young men with police records.


With so much at stake, it's only common sense to avoid showing disrespect to a police officer, especially if a crowd has gathered. An act of defiance may force an officer to make an arrest. Moreover, don't remain in the area where a gang fight or other riot is taking place. Innocent bystanders may sometimes be arrested by policemen who are unable to tell those who are involved from those who are not.

If an arrest is considered wrongful, it's better to submit quietly and later sue for damages than to precipitate a fracas that can blow up out of all proportion to the original incident.

ABOVE ALL, it's totally irrational to expect the police to curb an increasing crime rate and at the same time subject them to physical attacks from ordinary citizens, as has happened repeatedly across the country. If such attacks on police continue, all of us will pay dearly in the form of more and more crime.

With regard to your inquiry, riots are basically a matter of concern to local authorities; however, the FBI has afforded instruction on mob and riot control in a total of 833 police training schools from October, 1964, through June, 1965, with 35,700 officers in attendance. In addition, our laboratory and identification facilities are made available in criminal cases stemming from such civil disturbances.

We are always willing to extend our cooperation to all law enforcement agencies in matters of mutual interest, and you may be assured this Bureau will continue to make every effort to discharge its responsibilities with the highest degree of thoroughness and dispatch.

By memorandum dated July 5, 1966, captioned as above this office furnished information concerning a riot at Pine Lake by members of a motorcycle club referred to as the Gypsy Raiders. As is set out below and as is apparent from news photographs of the cyclists, this club is actually named the Gypsy Jokers.

The following article by BILL SIEVERLING entitled "Cyclists Deny Blame In Melee" appeared in the July 6, 1966 issue of the "Seattle Post-Intelligence", a daily newspaper published in Seattle, Washington:



#### MOTORCYCLE CLUB RIOT

"We had no intention of causing any trouble."

Robert B. Walker, 23, of 417 Eastlake Ave. E., wearing a denim jacket with flamboyant white letters spelling out "Gypsy Jokers" on the back, made the statement soberly and thoughtfully as he sat on a wooden bench in the King County Courthouse Tuesday.

Walker, charged along with nine other members of the Seattle motorcycle gang following a free-swinging melee at Pine Lake Monday, had just posted \$50 bail after spending the night in the county jail.

WALKER, an electrician who describes himself as president of the Seattle motorcycle club, denied accounts that the motorcyclists started the fracas by making advances to women picnickers at the resort.

"Some of the guys joked with some of the girls," said James Sloniker, 29, also of 417 Eastlake Ave. E., another member of the motorcycle outlit. "But there was nothing to it."

Sioniker, his face still heavily bandaged from cuts suffered during the scuffle, said he and a girl friend, Joyce Eliis, 23, of 417 Eastlake Ave. E., were taking a stroll when they were surrounded by a group of picnickers.

"TREY TOLD US we couldn't go by there," Sloniker recounted. "The next thing I knew I had a bottle up side of my head. The guy that cut me wide open wasn't charged. All we ever used was our fists."

Sloniker, Walker and eight other members of the "Gypsy Jokers" were charged with disorderly conduct in Issaquah District Justice Court. Miss Ellis was not charged.

Sloniker was treated for his wounds at King County Hospital Monday night before being booked at the county jail.

One of two picnickers also sent to the hospital by the melee was still in Overlake Hospital Tuesday with a fractured jaw and head cuts. VERN L. GAINES, 24, of 10212-37th Pl. SW, said from his hospital bed that he saw members of the motorcycle gang using beer bottles in the fight.

Teddy L. Argraves, 24, of 30592-55th Ave. S., Auburn, also injured in the fight, was discharged from Overlake Hospital Tuesday morning. Argraves and Gaines were attending a company picnic when the trouble erupted.

Meanwhile, a spokesman for the Northwest Motor-cycle Association hastened to disassociate his group from the "Gypsy Jokers."

Bill McDonell, public relations director for the association, said:

"THEY'RE OUTLAWS. As far as we are concerned, they do not even exist. We don't condone this sort of action. It gives us all a bad name."

McDonell said members of his association engage in blood donation drives, fund-raising projects and other worthwhile charitable activities.

Sheriff's Lt. Richard Christie said investigation of the Pine Lake incident is continuing.

He said that contrary to some reports no weapons were confiscated from the motorcyclists.

Sloniker and Walker said there are about 12 members of the "Gypsy Jokers" in Seattle. He said the club was chartered about three months ago by a group of the same name in San Francisco.

The "Seattle Post Intelligencer", a daily news-paper published in Seattle, Washington, on July 5, 1966, contained an article entitled, "Lake Riot: Black-Clad Cyclists Vs. Picnickers" which stated:

"A small riot erupted at Pine Lake southeast of Redmond between picnickers and a group of Seattle motor-cyclists Monday afternoon.

"At least a half dozen parsons were injured in the melee as the motorcyclists, clad in black leather jackets and boots hurled beer bottles and rocks at picnickers and battled with fists, deputy sheriffs said.

"Ten motorcyclists, one injured, were arrested.

"More than 14 deputies, assisted by Redmond police and state troopers broke up the riot and made the arrests.

"Two picnickers - Teddy L. Graves, 24, of 30592 - 55th Ave. S., Auburn, and Vern L. Gaines, 24, of 10214 - 37th Place SW - suffered multiple lacerations and head injuries. They were admitted to Overlake Hospital.

"Deputies said the riot broke out when the motor-cyclists, many shaggy-haired and bearded and jacketed in the 'Hell's Angeles' style, began molesting women at the resort. Some cut the pigtails off girls and waved them in the air.

"An estimated 15 motorcyclists belonging to an unidentified club from the West Seattle Georgetown area took part in the riot. Five jumped on their two-wheelers and fled, yelling they were going for reinforcements.

THEY JUST CAN'T stay out of trouble. It may be on the Pacific Coast, in New York City or in New England. They may be exhibiting a strangely-derived "patriotism" or responding to a rampant sex urge or prowling with chips on their black-leather-jacketed shoulders. But wherever they are, something bad seems to happen when

Hell's Angels are around. ostensibly was directed against peace demonstrators in Berkeley, Calif., who were demanding an end to the war in Viet Nam. Actually, the police took the brunt of it, which is par for the course.

Thirty-five gaudily uniformed Hell's Angels swarmed through police barricades and aimed for the marchers. A police sergeant's leg was broken when he was beaten to the pavement. One of the Angels, towering, bearded Mike (Tiny) Walter, was clubbed down and two others were arrested.

Last month, two of the unangelic cyclists encountered an AWOL marine in Greenwich Village. A fight started, and he was stabbed in the abdomen.

#### Earrings Are Badge

The marine, Pfc. Walter Burns, 20, of Rockville Centre, L.I., was taken to St. Vincent's Pospital. Quite by coincidence, for lacketed, booted and wear-

rold earrings in their nto the hospital a few o see about having a cyst in the neck of one of them. and found knives, they said, on all four.
Two were identified as being involved in the stabbing, and all were held on rei weapons charges.

Brazenly the four announced they had

come to town to "shake up New York" and that 15 to 24 other Angels were also roaming around the city.

To Attorney General Thomas C. Lynch of California, whose state is particularly plagued with them, the Angels are provenly capable of shaking up

any community.

He describes them as a widely-spread, loosely-linked club of maranding motor-cyclists who purvey violence and sex with headlong brutality-a sort of twobit Genghis Kahn and his wheeled horde warring against the world.

In a report intended to warn the rest of the country as well as his own state, Lynch has cited chapter and verse to demonstrate that the group's hoodlum activities include gang assaults, gang rapes and vicious destruction of property well as numerous other crimes.

Thus pre-alerted, New Hampshire authorities learned, 10 days before a scheduled series of motorcycle races on



the shores of Lake Winnipesaukee this past summer, that 500 Hell's Angels were on their way to the scene.

The state legislature rushed through new riot - control law, providing for fines up to \$500 and a maximum of one year in jail for those convicted of being rioters and fines up to \$1,000 and threeyear jail terms for anyone convicted of causing personal injury or property damage during a riot. The old fine was only \$25.

All told, some 15,000 cyclists gathered in the lakeside town of Laconia for the four days of racing events. Although most of the newcomers were obviously interested in the sporting angle, plus some beer drinking and fun, what worried the steel-helmeted state and local police and 200 National Guardsmen were groups who vroomed into town wearing Wellington boots, grimy jeans and black leather jackets—and also the signs that appeared on telephone poles along the highway: COME TO THE RIOT—SEE WEIRS BEACH BURN SATURDAY NIGHT! What happened at Weirs Beach, a

Laconia suburb, was right on schedule.
"The Hell's Angels started it," said
Commissioner of Safety Robert W.
Rhodes. "They stopped traffic, tipped over a car and set it ablaze. Then they threw a ring around the whole area. They wouldn't let anybody get away. The thing blew up in our faces in minutes."

#### Shotauns Quelled Riot

The guerrilla-like battle lasted several hours. Cyclists struck out with lethal bicycle chains. They broke windows and set fire to buildings. They stoned the police, who came back with nightclubs swinging. Tear gas shells exploded and National Guardsmen, advancing with fixed bayonets, fired shotguns loaded with rock salt and No. 6 birdshot into the crowd.

About 70 people were injured, some with serious fractures, and 34 cyclists wound up in jail. (Most were fined, two received 1-year sentences.)

Laconia Police Chief Howard Knowlton said at least four of those in custody had been identified as Hell's Angels from California, but there seemed to be see disagreement on exactly how many Angels were involved or where they origin-, ated. Some said there was an Angela' contingent from Toronto or Quebec. \*: • \* \$600kk

ALTHOUGH Hell's Angels chapters have been reported from such widely senarated snots as Westchester County, N.Y., and New Zealand, Attorney General Lynch says most of the groups known to be affiliated are throughout California and in Phoenix, Ariz., and Portland, Ore.

A week or so after the Laconia outbreak, some 250 Hell's Angels gathered at Bass Lake, Calif., a resort area where they had created disturbances on earlier visits. This time 100 officers—sheriff's denuties, police, highway patrolmen and nark rangers-met them, rode herd on them and finally escorted them on their departure.

#### Unangelic Angels

But in the interim some Hell's Angels had been in serious trouble much further south, down in the San Fernando Valley where many members have maintained hangouts.

It was at the door of one of these club haunts, a rather rickety house in Northridge, that 18-year-old Shirley Diane O'Neal knocked one July afternoon. She had been selling cook books from door to door to earn money for her college tuition. A cyclist, later identified as George Ulatowski, 18, snotted her blocks away and gave her the address, saving: "Come to my house -my uncle will buy some of those from

In resnonse to her rap a youth' called Rick, later identified as Eric Forrest, 19, invited her inside. But there was no uncle. There were only Ulatowski and three other young toughs, whose identities were established as Ford Wood. 20, his brother Ronald, 21, and Matthew Melville, 20.

"We are going to rape you," one of them announced—an intention which Shirley, starting to scream, had already realized.

They pushed her into a room, she said, then grabbed her and tossed her from one to the other, stripping off her clothing piece by piece. When she was

nude, they carried her into an adjoining bedroom and each one raped her, then subjected her to other indignities "too horrible to talk about.

What the hoods didn't know when they finally let her go was that they had raped the daughter of a lieutenant in the vice squad. The girl staggered home and hysterically told her father. Thomas E. O'Neal, 41, about the attack.

Police rounded up a group of 16 suspects and she managed to identify two of them before collapsing. She was reduced to "the mentality of a 5year-old," according to Chief of Detectives Thad Brown.

O'Neal wasn't assigned to the case, but he assigned himself to it. He showed up the next day at the station house where the suspects were being held. Outwardly he seemed calm.

Two of the men arrested were being led down the hallway to a waiting police car when O'Neal started yelling, whipped out his automatic pistol and fired five wild shots before he could be restrained.

#### Shots Wound One

One of the men, Carl Norman, 21, fell, critically wounded with three bullets in the back. The other prisoner bolted for safety to another room, where police grabbed him, thinking they were intercepting an escape attempt.

Ironically, Norman was being held on a marijuana charge, not the rape charge.

He survived the shooting.

As for the unfortunate O'Neal, a nondrinker and non-smoker with a sterling service record, he broke down and became incoherent after the shooting. Tried last month for assault with a deadly weapon, O'Neal was acquitted by a jury of eight men and four women who deliberated only an hour and a half. Linking of the motorcycle complex

and sex is something that's recognized everywhere from slick ads to cheap, pornographic magazines. On this point, Dr. Bernard Diamond, a psychiatrist and criminologist at the University of Cali-

fornia, says:

"The motorcycle is obviously a sexual symbol. It's an extension of one's body."

The reported behavior of Hell's Angels indicates some homosexual ele-ment, he says. Their outer toughness would be "a denial mechanism, an attempt to conceal the homosexual inclination."

But Lynch says in his report:

"While homosexuals seem to be attracted to Hell's Angels, no information received indicates that the Hell's Angels as a group are homosexuals. They seem primarily concerned with heterosexual contacts.

Some club initiation rites, according to the report, prescribe that any new member must bring a "sheep" to the meeting. "Sheep" is their slang for girl or woman. The "sheep" must submit to sexual relations with each member of the club.

THE Angels were founded in 1950 in the steel town of Fontana, Calif., 50 miles outside Los Angeles. The San Bernardino County chapter remains the "mother" organization, with the word
"Berdoo" (nickname version of Bernardino) sharing the cyclists' jackets
with the words "Hell's Angels."

The fledgling group made its reputation fast by taking over the little California town of Hollister for a reign of terror over the inhabitants. The incident provided the basis for a short story published in 1951 titled "Cyclists' Raid" and the story, in turn, reached the screen in 1953 as "The Wild Ones." "hero." Marlon Brando portrayed the leader of the gang who falls in love with a girl of the town and develops a heart of gold.

Lynch's report doesn't show any confidence in emergence of hearts of gold or any subscription to the theory that the Angels won't keep proliferating and influencing others to ape them.

Of the 446 persons identified as members of Hell's Angels by law enforcement groups, 50 have been arrested for felonies. Among them, they have 874 felony arrests and 300 convictions. In the misdemeanor category there have been 1,682 arrests and 1,023 convictions.

What do they do? "Apart from general hoodlum acts," says the Lynch report, "offenses mainly were forgery, assault, auto theft, rape and sex perversion."

They also number some crack mechanics because "many Angels are adept at stripping and cannibalizing motorcycles, including removal of serial numbers which are replaced with fictitious numbers.'

Ruthless mass assaults on individuals are described in the report which summarizes a series of such incidents.

Reminiscent of the Hollister debacle, a group of motorcyclists headed for Porterville, Calif., for the Labor Day weekend of 1963. They included dele-gates from the Angels, Stray Satans, Galloping Gooses, Comancheros and Cavaliers. They all converged on the city.

The report reads like a nightmare: "Most started to drink in local bars, becoming obnoxious and vulgar. They stood in the middle of the street where they stopped vehicles, opened car doors and attempted to pet and paw female passengers in the automobiles. The women who accommended the group lav in the middle of the street where they went through suggestive motions.

#### Barroom Invasion

"At about this time, some half dozen motorcyclists invaded a bar and brutally beat an old man and attempted to abduct the barmaid. Shortly thereafter some dozen motorcyclists went to the local hospital where they pushed in every door of the hospital looking for the victim of the besting.

"Mutual aid in the form of police officers from neighboring cities, the Highway Patrol and the Kern County Sheriff's Office Canine Corps assisted and the group was ordered out of town after five arrests were made.'

One of the modern-day Tariars, commenting about the trouble which seems to accompany the Angels on their visits is quoted as saying: "People will just have to learn to stay out of our way. We'll hust up everyone who gets in our

potch worn by some of the Hell's Angels reads "1%-er." It signifies the wearer is part of a small exclusive group within the organization. There also are "1%-ers" among the Coffin Cheaters, Satan's Slaves and Iron Horsemen.

Some police believe the 1% derives from an assertion by the American Motorcycle Club that 99% of all motorcyclists are respectable citizens.

A sneering rival group calling themselves Outsiders wear a patch reading "0%-er." It's a taunt and a challenge.

This brawling criminal element is the bane of legitimate motorcyclists who enjoy riding as a sport and don't like the rotten association it has acquired.

John McCormack, director and vice president of the American Motorcycle. and Scooter Association, said responsible motorcycle organizations have barred groups like the Hell's Angels from even being spectators.

The Hell's Angels, he said, "would

be condemned if they rode horses, mules, surf boards, bicycles or skateboards. Regretfully, they picked mo-

A group of "wild ones" milled around in a dimly lit bar in the San Gabriel Valley section of California recently. This was one of the bars they regard as "theirs." A reporter had come to interview them and a photographer to take their pictures.

They said they were glad to be interviewed, to give their side of the story, although the reporter had some competition from a group improvising obscene lyrics to juke box records or from the occasional smashing of a glass or gush of a bottle of beer being poured over someone's head.

Among the group were Hell's Angels, Coffin Cheaters and a few mavericks.

Men and women dressed alike, either in dungaree jackets or black leather. Some of them had thick coats of grease on the seats of their trousers. Metal skulls and crossbones hung from jacket pockets and a few wore the Nazi swastika or German Iron Cross. Long hair was preferred and earrings were prevalent. Only beards could be called strictly the male prerogative.

\_\_ Sneer at Cops

Three times during the evening sheriff's deputies came in to check on identification, in an atmosphere of tension and mutual contempt.

"Give me your badge number," demanded a club member of one deputy. "Get away from me, animal!" the deputy snapped.

This, said the members, is what they have to put up with: law enforcement harassment and persecution.

"We are proud of our colors," the -== president of the Berdoo Angels said. "Why should we be singled out just because we look different?"

The skulls and swastikas were ex-plained as just "collectors' items."

One Angel tilted his chin belligerently and said in a hard voice, as if defying contradiction:
"Sure, we get rowdy once in a while

but it's all in fun. No one gets hurt, We see to that. The important thing is that when we are drinking together like this, we are not bothering anyone else so why don't the police just leave us alone?"

One answer why the police don't let rough-riding bikers of whatever group alone came out of Riverside, Calif., just the other day when a group of mo-torcyclists attacked a Los Angelesbound bus with rocks, bottles and a chain.

The riders, said bus driver Walter ffler, "came out of nowhere" to sur-Leffler, round the westbound bus on U.S. 60 just outside Riverside. Some cut in front of the bus and slowed down, evidently trying to force Leffler to stop.

"I put the bus in gear and passed them when, all of a sudden, they began throwing rocks and bottles," he said. "Then one of them threw a 12-inch chain which smashed in the rear window and landed in an empty seat.

"The passengers were scared—and I didn't blame them."

And now Hell's Angels seem to be directing their hostility to the anti-war demonstrators -- who'll need all the podice protection they can get
