On April 1, 1965, PAUL E. SHOFFEITT, Assistant Director, State of Alabama, Department of Toxicology and Criminal Investigation, Auburn, Alabama, furnished SA a copy of the autopsy report prepared by his Department in connection with the case of VIOLA GREGG LIUZZO, Case Number 50-49455.

The details of this report are as follows:

SUBJECT: Post-Mortem Examination

At the request of Major W. R. Jones, State Investigator, and with authorization of Circuit Solicitor Arthur E. Gamble, Jr., a post-mortem examination was conducted on the body of Viola Gregg Liuzzo, white female, at the White Chapel Funeral Home, Montgomery, Alabama. Time of examination was 12 midnight on March 25, 1965. Body was identified by State Investigator J. F. Gardner. State and Federal Officers and funeral home personnel were present part of the time during the post-mortem examination. Guy V. Purnell, Toxicologist, of this Department assisted with the examination.

EXTERNAL EXAMINATION:

This is the unembalmed body of a moderately obese, white female, measured height 5 feet 2 inches and estimated weight 150 pounds, resembling the reported age of 39 years. Scalp hair is reddish-blonde. Teeth are natural with three upper left, two upper right, three lower left, and four lower right missing but not of recent extraction. After photographs are made, bloodstained clothing consisting of a girdle, torso brassiere, slip and dress is removed from body. Two rings on ring finger on left hand, one ring on right finger of right hand, and wrist watch on left wrist are delivered to State Investigator Lt. E. J. Dixon.

Bloodstains cover the major portion of the head, neck, and face; expecially, the left side. Bloodstains are also on hands and smaller stains are on lower extremities below the knees. Feet are soiled. Soiled areas also appear on the

back of right hand. Body is washed and additional photographs are made. On lateral surface of upper arms are small dark areas. Fingernails are short with no free edge present. An old linear scar of the lower mid-abdomen is judged to be surgical. Lower abdomen is marked with white lines (strike atrophicae).



THORACIC-ABDOMINAL;

The thoracic and abdominal cavities are opened with a Y incision. There is appreciable fat in the abdominal wall. No evidence of physical trauma is observed to organs of these cavities. Lungs possess the typical mottled, glistening outer surface with a crepitant feel. Heart is not remarkable in size. Coronaries are patent in the large observed sections. There is evidence of minimal atherosclerosis of the aorta in the area of the coronary orifices. An appreciable quantity of fat is around the kidneys. Capsules of kidneys peel easily revealing a smooth, slightly congested surface. A small quantity of a white milky liquid is observed in pelvis of each sectioned kidney. Stomach contains an estimated 5 ounces of a brownish, thick semiliquid. The appendix is not located. Uterus is non-pregnant. Adrenals, spleen, liver, and pancreas are not remarkable grossly.







b76 and SA at Prattville, Alabama, on March 29, 1965.

JEAN COLLINS, employee, Go Go Restaurant, was shown photographs of four subjects and she related she did not recall them being at that restaurant on the morning of Thursday, March 25, 1965. She said she felt she would recall the boys had they been in the restaurant together for breakfast. She stated that Mr. R. K. JACKSON eats breakfast there almost every morning and might recall the four subjects.

R. K. JACKSON was shown photographs of the subjects and was unable to identify them. He stated he had breakfast at the Go Go Restaurant on March 25, 1965, but does not recall the four subjects being there for breakfast on that date.

FLORENCE ALINE POWFLL, employee, Go Go Restaurant, said she was the waitress working at the Go Go Restaurant on the morning of March 25, 1965. She viewed photographs of the subjects and stated she did not recall any of them eating breakfast there on that date. She stated the restaurant is operated by a Mr. BOIN and he had owned the restaurant for only two weeks and he was not there on the morning of March 25, 1965.

Mr. R. C. CARLTON advised he frequently eats breakfast at the Go Go Restaurant but was not there on the morning of March 25, 1965.

From observation it was observed that the Go Go Restaurant is located on a cross street just West of U. S. Highway 31. It is the first place of business located on this cross street and the restaurant faces South. The cross street is the first cross street South of the water tank which bears the name Prattville, Alabama.

TOM H. KENNEDY, owner, Bek's Frostop Cafe, advised he does not serve breakfast and does not open each day until approximately 10:00 a.m. He stated he serves almost exclusively barbeque at the cafe. He was shown photographs of the subjects and stated he did not recall seeing any of them at his cafe.

Mr. MURRAY PATTERSON, Owner, American Service Station, 351 Dexter Avenue, Montgomery, advised as follows:

He stated that during the afternoon of the civil rights demonstration and march, which took place on March 25, 1965, a spectator to the march entered his station and advised him that one of the demonstrators had cut the line to a public phone booth located outside of his station. He stated he did not know the identity of the spectator. He added that during this same day, an Army Major was sometimes parked outside of his station in an Army jeep. He stated that on about two occasions this Army Major entered his station. He stated that he believed the Major's last name was GIBSON, but added that he was not positive of this. He added that he did not know if the Major was attached to the regular Army or the Army National Guard.

PATTERSON said he could not state that se four individuals were at his gas station on March 25, as the crowds were so large he could not recognize any ticular person.

PATTERSON further advised that EICHARD CASTLEBERRY working part time at the gas station on Earch 25, 1965, it was his day off. He said that CASTLEBERRY lives on mille Road, Montgomery, Alabama, and works for the board Railroad Company.

On March 29, 1965, JCHN J. HORTON, U-Park king Lot, Montgomery, Alabama, advised he was working day on March 25, 1965, and stated that he recalled that cars were parked in his lot that day and inasmuch as this king lot is a self-park type place, he could not recall specific cars that were parked there. HORTON was cifically asked if he recalled a 1962 red and white, two r, hardtop Chevrolet in the lot on that date and HORTON lied that he could not recall make or color of any cific car in his lot.

On March 29, 1965, JOHN B. GRIMES, employee, ark Parking Lot, Monroe and Lawrence Streets, advised held not recall seeing the red and white, two door, hardtop vrolet on that lot inasmuch as the cars are parked by the ers, and due to the large number of vehicles in the lot.

SECTION XVI

INVESTIGATION REGARDING SUBJECTS

SPENCER EUGENE COONER, home address, Route #1, Townley, Alabama, employed as lineman, Alabama Power Company, advised that he has been in Selma since January 25, 1965, working on cross-country power lines to the Dan River Project.

He related that he eats dinner regularly at three or four restaurants in Selma, one of which is the Silver Moon Cafe.

COONER recalls eating at the Silver Moon Cafe on Thursday evening, March 25, 1965. He estimates that he arrived at the cafe at approximately 7:00 PM and stayed from 45 minutes to an hour.

COONER does not recall observing any well-dressed individuals in the cafe. He was shown photographs of subjects WILLIAM ORVILLE EATON, EUGENE THOMAS, COLLIE LEROY WILKINS, and GARY THOMAS ROWE, JR., but he could not identify them as being individuals he had ever seen. He was also shown a photograph of a 1962 Chevrolet, white over red, and advised that he could not recall having seen this vehicle in the area of the Silver Moon Cafe at any time.

COONER explained that he always goes to dinner with a group of four or five other Alabama Power Company employees who work on the same crew that he does. Whenever this group goes into a restaurant for dinner, they always sit at the same table, converse among themselves, and generally do not associate, pay any attention to, or converse with local citizens who may be in the restaurant.

COONER could furnish no further information.

He stated that he and NICHOLS sat at a table in front of the juke box, and he did not notice any strangers, particularly four men dressed in suits.

PERRY stated he was unable to identify photographs of COLLIE LEROY WILKINS, EUGENE THOMAS, WILLIAM ORVILLE EATON, and GARY THOMAS ROWE as anyone he has ever seen and stated he did not notice a 1962 Chevrolet, white over red, parked anywhere around the Silver Moon that evening.

He stated that he recalls seeing photographs in the newspapers of the four men arrested in Birmingham, Alabama, for killing some white woman on the highway between Selma and Montgomery, Alabama, and at that time looked them over carefully and did not recognize any of them as people he know.

He advised that on March 25, 1965, he reported on duty at the SMC at approximately 9 AM and as usual worked there until about 5:30 PM, when he was relieved by his wife, Mrs. CUOLA LACKEOS, who normally relieves him between the hours of 5:30 PM and 7:30 PM daily. Following a period of about 2 hours at his nome, he returned to the SMC and remained there until closing time, midnight. Mr. LACKEOS stated that his wife left the SMC by cab at about 7:30 PM, however, he could not recall the cab company she used.

Mr. LACKEOS advised that the following employees of the SMC were on duty March 25, 1965, beginning at 2 PM that date:

OUIDA A. IARSON, 2 PM - 10 PM ELSIE GREINER (phonetic), 11 AM - 9 PM HELEN BEVERLY MARTIN, 10 PM - midnight.

The above three individuals are waitresses; HEIEN BEVERLY MARTIN is not regularly employed at SMC and filled in the two hour period for LARSON who requested two hours off that evening.

In addition to the above, EDGAR STRIPLING, a general handyman, who also assists behind the bar and has no regular hours, was around the SMC most of the day and evening.

LACKEOS advised that he did not know exactly how long he was off duty during approximate period 5:30 to 7:30 PM, March 25, 1965, but believed he left at about 5:30 PM and returned at 7:30 PM or slightly later. On return to the SMC, he recalled the cafe was about ½ full of people, Among those he noted as being there was NAMON O'NEAL HOGGIE, who was sitting on one of the bar stools and he believed HOGGIE left at about 8 PM alone. 



Mr. THOMAS BISSINGER, 116 Perry Street, New York 14, New York, presently residing at 121-C George Washington Craver Apartments, Selma, Alabama, furnished the following information to SA

At about 11:00 PM, March 25, 1965, he received a telephone call at the First Baptist Church from a white male, southerner. The caller stated he had heard on the news that a woman had been shot and that he had some information. The caller disclosed that at about 8:30 or 9:00 PM that evening he had observed a 1960 or 1961 red Chevrolet convertible following very closely behind a blue Olds—mobile driven by a white woman and containing one Negro passenger. The Chevrolet appeared very suspicious, and the caller stated that he followed the two cars along Broad Street and out Highway 80 to Cap's Service Station where he discontinued following the vehicles. The caller stated there were four white males in the Chevrolet, two in the front and two in the rear.

The informant refused to discione his name to Mr. BISSINGER but stated that he might come around to the Baptist Church the following morning.

TOM BESSINGER, who was presently residing at 121 George Washington Courts, advised that the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Competent office had received a telephone call at approximatily ill P.M. from an unidentified male indicating that this unidentified male had heard on a news report that a women had just been killed. The unidentified caller had recoved to make his identity known, but advised that at approximately 7 F.M. on March 25, 1965, he had seen a 1960 or 1961 and convertible following a 1963 blue Oldsmobile that wis boing driven by a white woman and currying a Noaro pushencer. BESSINGER advised that the unidentified cashes related that he was quite suspicious of the red Chavrolet in that it had fullowed the Oldsmobile very closely. He stated that this bridentified caller advised him that he had told the red Chevrolet and Oldsmobile down Broad Stonet and art route 80 East to Kapps Service Station before turning around. BESSINGER advised he would immediately contact the FBI if he received any more information in vofation is the case of if he received information that would adoptify the person making the call.

BILL BURDICK, First Taptism Church, who was residing at 2216 Hardy in Selma advised he was driving a rented truck for the Sindert Nonviolent Coordinating Committee and had left Montgomery, Alabama, at an unrecalled time. He stated he was carrying two adults and four youths as passengers and the electrical equipment that had been used for the demonstration march. He advised that approximately 25 miles from Montgomery he saw a light and dark car parked on the right side of the roadway. He advised these vehicles were headed towards Selma, but that he could not recall any further description as to the twoe of cars. BURDICK stated he did not see the 1964 Oldsmobile on the left side of the highway.

He advised be proceeded on to Selme and won his return he determined that EEPOY MODEL tas a Mearo who had attempted to stop him.

EVAN HACKER. 21; Elst recomm Street, Carbondale, Illinois, advised he was one of the last buses to leave the capitol area. He advised when they bassed St. Jude's Church on Highway 80 traveling east an ambulance passed them at a high rate of speed with its red light on. He advised when the bus passed the scene of the nurser, several State Police cars were in the area. HACKER stated that he had seen a 1960 model light colored car on the right side of the roadway near the scene of the accident, but that this car was probably an unmarked taw enforcement vehicle. He advised that he could not recall scening a 1953 Ford along the roadway.

FEDERAL PROSECUTION

The facts of this matter were brought to the attention of Acting Assistant Attorney General JOHN DOAR who authorized the filing of a complaint for violation of Section 241, Title 18, United tates Code. Accordingly, a complaint was filed by SA before United States Commissioner JAMES M. GUTTERY, Montgomery, Alabama, at 10:25 a.m., March 26, 1965. Warrants were issued the same date.

The complaint states that on or about March 25, 1965, at Lowndes County, in the Middle District of Alabama, did, commencing on or about January 1, 1965, and continuing to date of this complaint, William ORVILLE EATON, COLLIE LEROY WILKINS, JR., EUGENE THOMAS, and GARY THOMAS ROWE, JR., within the Middle District of Alabama, Northern Division, conspired together with each other and with other persons unknown to injure, oppress, threaten, and intimidate citizens of the United States in the vicinity of Selma and Montgomery, Alabama, in the free exercise and enjoyment of the following rights and privileges secured them by the Constitution and laws of the United States:

- 1) The right to peacefully assemble, publicly protest and petition the Governor of Alabama for redress of grievances on behalf of Negro citizens of Alabama free from arbitrary and oppressive interference from the State of Alabama.
- 2) The right to publicly protest unlawful deprivation of the right of Negroes of Alabama to register to vote and to vote for candidates for Federal offices.
- 3) The right to encourage and assist Negro citizens of Alabama in the exercise of their right to register to vote and to vote for candidates for Federal Offices.
- 4) The right to participate in a protest march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama, to present a petition to Governor of Alabama in Montgomery, Alabama, and to participate

in the carrying out of a proposed plan for such march pursuant to and under the terms of an order entered on March 17, 1965, by the United States District Court for the Middle District of Alabama in the case of WILLIAMS versus WALLACE, No. 2181-N.

It was part of the plan and purpose of the conspiracy that the defendent where the the area of Selma and shoot and kill persons who came to the area of Selma and Montgomery, Alabama, to participate in and lend their support to a demonstration march from Selma to Montgomery pursuant to a plan approved by an order of the United States District Court, Middle District of Alabama on March 17, 1965, referred to above, and to harass, threaten, assault, shoot and kill Negro citizens of Alabama who participated in or supported the march, in violation of Section 241, Title 18, United States Code, and complainant stated that this complaint is based on information coming to the attention of Special Agent SPENCER ROBB of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, during the course of an official investigation.

By communication of March 26, 1965, the Birmingham Office advised that subject ROWE was taken into custody at 11:06 a.m., March 26, 1965; subject THOMAS was arrested at 11:08 a.m., at Lorene's Cafe, Bessemer, Alabama; subject WILKINS was arrested at 11:07 a.m., in his automobile on Highway 11 in Bessemer; and subject EATON was arrested at 11:16 a.m., March 26, 1965, at his residence on Route 6, Box 866, Bessemer, Alabama.

All four subjects were arraigned before United States Commissioner LOUISE O. CHARLTON, at Birmingham, Alabama, on March 26, 1965. Subjects THOMAS, EATON and WILKINS were represented by Attorney MATT MURPHY. Bond for the subjects was fixed at \$50,000 each and they were remanded to the custody of the United States Marshal at Birmingham and committed to the Jefferson County Jail, Birmingham, Alabama

Subjects THOMAS, EATON and ROWE were released on bond from the Jefferson County Jail, Birmingham, Alabama, at 8:19 p.m., March 26, 1965. Bond was arranged by Attorney MATT MURPHY. Bond had also been arranged for subject WILKINS; however, he was not released since the United States Marshal received a Probation Violator's Warrant on WILKINS in connection with a Federal Firearms violation.

Miss MILLIE DAVIS, U. S. Marshal's Office, Birmingham, Alabama, advised that EUGENE THOMAS, GARY THOMAS ROWE, JR., and WILLIAM ORVILLE EATON were released on \$50,000 bond at 9:30 p.m., March 26, 1965.

She advised that COLLIE LEROY WILKINS was not released on March 26, 1965, as he was held on a probation violator's warrant issued by U. S. District Judge C. W. ALGOOD, Birmingham, Alabama. Miss DAVIS said that WILKINS was subsequently released on \$50,000 bond for the warrant in connection with the shooting of victim, Mrs. ANTHONY J. LIUZZO and an additional \$500 bond on the probation violator's warrant. WILKINS was released at approximately 2:30 p.m., March 29, 1965.

At 1:41 p.m. on March 26, 1965, WILLIAM ORVILLE RATON, EUGENE THOMAS and COLLIE LEROY WILKINS, JR., appeared before U. S. Commissioner LOUISE O. CHARLTON, Room 300, Federal Building, Birmingham, Alabama. All three men were represented by Attorney MATT MURPHY. The U. S. Government was represented by Assistant U. S. Attorney R. MACKY TAYLOR.

Mr. TAYLOR advised the U. S. Commissioner that warrants had been issued for KATON, THOMAS and WILKINS in the Middle District of Alabama on March 26, 1965, for violation of Title 18, U. S. Code, Section 241. Mr. TAYLOR further stated the original warrant had not arrived at that time in Birmingham but should be in the possession of the U. S. Marshal in Birmingham on or before March 29, 1965.

At this time U. S. Commissioner CHARLTON stated that she would then set a temporary bond for the above three men. Mr. TAYLOR asked the Commissioner if she wished the recommendation of the U. S. Attorney's Office pertaining to the amount of the bond. The U. S. Commissioner stated she did not wish this recommendation and then set bond for each of the three above-listed men at \$50,000 each.

At this point, EATON, THOMAS and WILKINS were placed in the custody of the U.S. Marshal in Birmingham, Alabama, in lieu of bond.

STATE PROSECUTION

Governor GEORGE C. WALLACE, State of Alabama telephonically contacted Special Agent at Montgomery, Alabama, on March 26, 1965, and expressed complete disgust with the "cowardly act" perpetrated by the subjects of the case or anyone who would do such an act of violence. Governor WALLACE stated he had instructed Colonel AL LINGO, Director, Alabama State Department of Public Safety, to make available all resources of his department and to afford complete cooperation to the FBI in pursuing the investigation in this matter. Governor WALLACE stated he also had requested the State Toxicologist Office at Auturn, Alabama, to cooperate fully with the FBI. He also advised that he would contact Circuit Solicitor ARTHUR GAMBLE, JR., Greenville, Alabama, and request that he also afford his cooperation.

--Governor WALLACE requested that State authorities be afforded the results of the FBI investigation that would support the issuance of a warrant for murder, as soon as completed.

RUFUS HEAD, Alabama Highway Patrol Investigator, advised on March 26, 1965, that LEROY JEROME MCTON was being held at the Dallas County Jail as a "material witness."
