I telked to his wifethen and the doctors and was told that Scottoriggio was very badly hurt and they could not tell how badly because they had done X-rays and were going throu the diagnosis process. I saw Scottoriggio at that time. He was conscious enough to recognize me. I talked to him very briefly because he was obviously a very sick man, but I got the impression from the conversation that he didn't know who had hit him; that he had been struck from behind and from that point onhe pretty well blacked out. I can recall the time of that pretty well because he asked me what time it was and I said it was 10:30, andhe said. Are the returns in yet?" and I said, "Joe, it's only 10:30 in the morning. There are no returns yet. Don't worry. Everything is go! to be all right. Just relax and take care of yourself." I think that is all I can tell you about that incident because I never, while I saw him on several occasions, incuding the visit of Govern Dewey the day after election, saw him conscious egain.
