

Your Health

Misdirected Weight Loss May Cause Goiter

By DR. HERMAN N. BUNDESEN, Health Editor of The Chicago Evening American.

WHEN the food burns up in the body faster than it is eaten, the body begins to lose weight. This is the condition we see when the thyroid gland becomes diseased and works faster than normally. This disorder

is called toxic goiter or thyrotoxicosis (thi - ro toks-ik-O6-is)

A person who has this condition becomes weak, sweats a great deal, and the heart beats rapidly. He is extremely nervous and irritable. Sometimes the thyroid gland in the is enlarged; neck eyeballs may protrude.

nutrition may Poor

Poor nutrition may lead to the development of toxic goiter. That is the opinion of Dr. J. H. Means of Boston and his co-workers, who have noticed this condition in thirty-five different patients.

This is what happens. A person wants to reduce weight. So, he puts himself on a diet which is greatly limited in foods. Then, a loss of weight takes place.

After they have lost the desired amount of weight, they begin to eat more food, but they find that the weight loss does not stop. In fact, they seem to lose weight even faster than before. This person has reduced his intake of the fuel foods which make fat. But at the same time he has eliminated the vitamin and minerals which regulate the body chemistry and thus has thrown the delicate life-mechanism out of order.

Among the patients Dr. Means studied, he discovered symptoms of toxic goiter. These

persons were weak, and the muscles seemed to lose their strength and actually to become smaller. In addition, the bones lost part of their minerals, such as lime, particularly the bones of the spine, and those of the legs and arms.

There seemed to be a shortage of iron in the body. The nails became spoon shaped and lost their luster. There were other symptoms, such as lack of acid in the stomach, and the development of a contract the stomach, and the development of a contract the stomach, and the development of a contract the stomach. ment of a smooth tongue.

When these symptoms occur, there is need to combat them vigorously and quickly. To begin with, it is well to give a diet rich in lime-containing foods, such as milk and its products; to give some preparation of lime or calcium such as calcium glycerophosphate (glis-er-o-FOS-fate), as well as viosterol for its vitamin, D, needed so the body can use the lime. Also, some preparation containing from, such as iron; and ammonium citrate, is advisable, and its use often will bring rapid improvement in the anemia. anemia.

It also is shown in these individuals that there may be a lack of vitamins, particularly vitamin B. Even in persons who develop toxio goiter from other causes, giving vitamin B, in the form of yeast, has been noted to bring about-ranid improvement. rapid improvement.

In any event, these observations show how important it is that when a person is reducing, that he keeps under the care of a doctor. Improper reducing, particularly, may lead to the development of serious disorders, and while weight may be lost quickly, the health may be demaged beyond renair.

damaged beyond repair.

The proper reducing diet is one which is well balanced, furnishing all of the necessary food

parts. Weight loss should not be allowed to occur too rapidly. A loss of one or two pounds a week is ample.

LOSS OF PIGMENT IN SKIN.

I have noticed white spots on my neck and chim. I have been informed that it is only a loss of pigment. What can this be? What can be done?—W. P.

It is possible you are suffering from vitiligo (vit-i-LI-go), a disease of the skin in which the pigment is destroyed, causing white patches of various sizes.

Treatment is not always successful. Arsenic and thyroid extract have been given internally

and for loss of pigment. Recently it has been reported that injections of cold sodium thiosulaphate into a vein will cure this condition. The spots can be rendered less noticeable by applying walnut juice.

Poor Boone, remembering how he lost his own Kentucky lands because he lacked the money to pay the taxes of them, would allow, as present-day Kentuckians do, that the commonwealth owes him a party,

Born in 1734, near Reading, Pa., he knew from boyhood that, as Kipling was to write; there was "something lost beyond the ranges."
When he came home in 1755 from Braddock's defeat, with his scalp still luckily on his head, he fell in love with 15-year-old Rebecca Bryan

A high forehead under a dark mop of hair might have suggested the scholar: the prominent chin and the firm, thin lips showed his caim and resolute nature. His eyes were given blue that could be chilly, but ordinarily were mild and friendly.

When he stood up against the light from the blazing logs he would have seemed a tall man, though many of his forest companions would have overtopped his five feet, ten inches of bone and muscle. His voice was soft, partly because men had to speak softly when they were hunting, or being hunted.

He won Mentucky in years of fighting from the Shawnee Indians, whom he hated like ratitiesnakes; but his lands slipped through his unbusinesslike hands, and were sold for taxes. West he drifted to Missouri, where the Spanish at St. Louis received him amiably and gave him a small office. But when the Americans took over in 1813, he lost his post and was again the lone hunter with barely a dollar in his pocket.

Almost to the end he kept on hunting. At 82, he made an excursion to the plains of Nebraska. When Chester Harding went out to make his picture in 1819, he found the old ploneer in a cabin, broiling venison over an open fire, on the tip of a ramrod. A year later he died, at 88.

A quarter of a century after that, his body and that of his faithful Rebecca—whom he had loved since her young girlhood—were brought back to Kentucky soil, to Frankfort, Kentucky, He had at last found a little land that could be all his own, forever free of taxes.

Life's ironies touch even the simple souls of frontiersmen. Daniel Boone found a parametise he could not keep, saw his beloved wilderness, just before his death, reach a population of more than half a million and never had material reward for what he did.

He loved the wilderness as he loved his Rebecca—perhaps a little more—and because he and so many others of his breed loved it. It ceased to be a wilderness.

HE Federal Bureau of Investigation observes its 30th anniversary today. It was created by an executive order issued by Attorney General Charles J. Bonaparte, who was related to Napoleon Bonaparte. In 30 years the personnel has increased from less than 100 to over 1,800. In 1908, the FBI investigated only twenty-four types of offenses - today it has primary jurisdiction over 100 different federal violations.

THE first training school of special agents of the FBI was not created until in January, 1928; previously agents only had been given instruction in the field,

It has only been since 1924 that applicants for appointments as special agents were required to be graduates of recognized law schools, expert accountants, or to have had extensive experience in investigation. Today, over 85 per cent of the G-men are either accountants or law school graduates. Approximately 1,000 applicants are considered for each special agent appointed. ...

Toy Pistol Ban

The city council is urged to ban the sale of toy pistols that look like real pistols.



I asked if he was familiar with the Department policy dealing with the release of news. He said he was not thereupon I explained to him that Mr. Hoover's hands were tied so far as relations with the press were concerned; that everything pertaining to the Bureau was released through the Attorney General's office and Mr. Hoover carried out his instructions as did

Because Winshell gets information about cases in which the Bureau might be interested is no indication he is getting information from the Bureau. Stated that he never thought of this angle and again he believed that this dissension was possibly due to some of the Director's enemies in the newspaper freternity who misrepresented him.

He stated that he had read the article in Collier's Magazine and the conly criticism he has of it is that it is not strong amough and that the papers and individuals involved were not put on the spot as they should have been. I, of course, thanked him for his views. He had not seem the article in Editor and P blisher so I told him about this. He stated that while he does not believe in purges as a general thing, nevertheless the journalistic field has a purge coming to it and needs one badly.

stated that if at any time he could ever be of assistance to the Bureau either personally or in an official capacity, do not hesitate to call upon him. has been on several tours of the Bureau but has never seen the range. Accordingly, he will return to the Bureau in one hour after he has gone to his office and I will personally take him to the range.

At the request of the Director's Office an envelope addressed to Walter Winchell, postmarked "New York, N.Y., Apr. 29, 1939, 9:50 A.M. Sta. G" together with a small box containing an unexploded .38 S & W cartridge manufactured by the Winchester Repeating Arms Co. were examined in the Laboratory.

The examination has been made and all of the specimens were treated for the development of latent fingerprints and one fingerprint of value for comparison purposes was found on the inside of the flap of the envelope. In this connection it is noted, however, that the appearance and location of this fingerprint indicates that it was probably placed on the flap after the envelope had been opened. This fingerprint was compared with the fingerprints of Walter Winchell on file but no identification was effected.

The envelope is made of plain white bond paper containing no watermark and measures approximately $3\frac{1}{3}$ by 6°. The two cent stamp on the envelope contains perforations on the top and right hand side only, those on the left and bottom having been cut off with a sharp instrument.

There is pasted to the front of the envelope a small piece of paper containing the typewritten address "Walter Winchel, Deily Mirror, New york" which is concluded to have been written on a typewriter equipped with Corona or Smith Corona Elite type. Slightly under the words "Deily Mirror" and inverted in position is the typewritten word "Ninow" written on the same typewriter. The meaning or significance of this word is not known.

The small cardboard box in which the bullet was enclosed is such as is used to pack toys or novelties. It contains a rubber stamp mark "Made in Germany" across the center of the top of the box. Slightly above this has been pasted a piece of paper cut from a magazine or periodical on which are found representations of five swastikas. Below the rubber stamp is pasted a piece of paper on which is typewritten the words "IF Frits

The unexploded cartridge contained in the box was manufactured by the Winchester Repeating Arms Company and is a .38 caliber S & W type cartridge.

The original evidence is being retained in the Laboratory and photographic copies of the envelope and the box are attached hereto for your information.





MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

On May 11, 1939, I saw Mr. George F Reedy of the Philadelphia Inquirer, who was taken on a special tour of the Bureau on May 9, 1939, by Mr. Holloman. During the tour Mr. Reedy advised Mr. Holloman as follows:

He stated that practically all of the writers today who write special articles are on salaries from the newspapers which they represent and there are very few free-lance writers. That until May 8. 1939, he was the Washington representative of the Philadelphia Inquirer covering the U. S. House of Representatives and that he knew all of the the members of the House and was well acquainted with their activities. He was taken off of this assignment so that he might work on a special assignment writing special articles concerning the rBI, based on closed cases of the Bureau. He explained that the reason he was given this assignment was that his salary was more than \$5200 a year and all The the employees of the Inquirer who received a salary of more than \$5200 were required to do overtime work without extra compensation, whereas an inches employee making \$5199 a year or less would have to be paid time and a half for all overtime. Another reason was that he had been engaged in covering police departments in the past and had a good working knowledge of criminal activities. He stated he had done quite a bit of crime work in regard to newspapers and had come in direct contact with criminals. Mr. Reedy asserted very emphatically that he was not a free-lance writer but that he was on a regular salary from the Philadelphia Inquirer. 文明各一十分最高 等收入的管理人

During the entire tour Mr. keedy was profuse in his praise of the work done by the FBI and attributed the entire success of the Bureau to the leadership of Mr. Hoover. He advised Mr. Holloman that he believed a series of articles written by him would do much good in bringing before the public the activities of the FBI and although numerous stories had been written concerning the work of the FBI additional stories would further aid the progress of the Bureau. He mentioned that on one occasion he had written a series of articles with the Commissioner of the War Department on the U.S. Aeronautics; that he had gone to the War Department and exhibited his desire to write these articles and they had granted him permission. He said that as a result of his article the War Department was able to obtain an increase in appropriations because he had brought this branch of the service before the public.

ar. Reedy informed the writer that he had been commissioned by the managing Editor of the Philadelphia Inquirer, Mr. I. I. Fitzpatrick, was formerly with the Washington Times, to do a series of at least fifteen articles on the FBI. This commission originally came from Mr. Curvis, Executive Director, who has been associated with the Inquirer for several years.

He stated he would like to get several outstanding cases, that it would not appear in the rticles that the material was from the Bureau, and that it was his plan to go to some of the citizens in the communities wherein these cases occurred, and to go to some of the law enforcement officials and get their comments -- which would doubly emphasize the Bureau's work.

He will do one articleon the Mational Police Academy, one on the Technical Laboratory, probably one on fingerprinting, and the others on cases. He stated that he had spoken to Mr. Gordon Dean about this and Mr. Dean approved of the Bureau furnishing him with the information. He advised that the series would open by two columns appearing in his paper discussing the work of the Bureau. The columns would be written by General Hugh Johnson and Walter Winchell. He stated that he had already approached General Johnson to write the column and General Johnson said that he would do anything for the Bureau, but that he wanted to be sure about the commission coming from the front office, and that accordingly he had called Mr. Reedy, who made some arrangements for word to come from Fitzpatrick.
