mentioned on April 13, 1971, that ABBIE HOFFMAN was recently telling some people that HOWIE EMMER of Kent, Ohio, wanted him to come to Kent on May 4, 1971, but HOFFMAN did not think he could make it because he was in a heavy legal struggle in order to keep his bail from being revoked. HOFFMAN was scheduled to speak in Iowa the night before (May 3, 1971) and HOFFMAN felt that if the people at Kent wanted to put him on the program it would be OK but he did not want the entire program built around him. HOFFMAN was going to try to get to Kent for May 4, 1971, but he could not guarantee it.

ABBIE HOFFMAN

ABBIE HOFFIAN was found guilty in the United States District Court, Northern District of Illinois, Chicago, Illinois, during February, 1970, of violation of a Federal Anti-Riot Law Statute, arising out of his participation in the riots during the Democratic National Convention held in Chicago in August, 1968. On February 20, 1970, HOFFMAN was sentenced to five years imprisonment and fined \$5,000. As a result of the trial, HOFFMAN was also found guilty on February 14, 1970, of 23 separate criminal contempts and sentenced to 8 months imprisonment. On February 28, 1970, the U.S. District & Court of Appeals, Seventh Circuit, Chicago, Illinois, is ordered that HOFFMAN be released on \$25,000 bond.

The Administration of Kent State University claims that the events of last May were "uniquely ours alone", and that our remembrance of our fallon brothers and sisters should be a "family affair". We can dig it, but we consider all of you part of our family.

We say that our family is people the world over struggling against the U.S. government. Our family is at war:

it is a war between life and death;

it is a war between human beings and machines;

it is a war between cultures;

it is a war between oppressor and oppressed.

The university is playing its corporate liberal games. Their "peace and harmony" is but "law 'n order" by another name. Their attempts to make the menerial a funereal wake are but an effort to deny the engoing struggle which is the only valid means of honoring our fallen corrades. We want to revive their spirit and their struggle. The university hopes to keep both buried.

Behind that liberal facade lie war, racism, and repression. Despite years of struggle against ROTO, the KSU Board of Trustees and the administration are determined to keep it on campus and the Faculty Senate showed where it was at by voting to retain the Corps. The administration has invited a speaker from Jackson State in hopes that we will forget their racist repression of Kent State Black United Students, but we realize that the struggles for black liberation at Jackson State, Crangeturg, and elsewhere are, as they must be, an integral part of our fight. They mumble about "justice" and "due process" while 25 of our brothers and sisters are being ripped off for last May's events instead of the real criminals.

So, too, would those in power have us ignore or forget Nixon's

"revolutionary" programs.

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STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

Students for a Democratic Society, commonly known as SDS, came into existence at a founding convention held during June, 1962, at Port Huron, Michigan. From an initial posture of "participatory democracy," Marxist-Leninist ideology of various shadings became predominant during 1968-1969 with debate centering on how best to create a revolutionary youth movement. SDS moved from involvement in the civil rights struggle to an anti-Vietnam war position to advocacy of a militant anti-imperialist line linking up the oppressed peoples of Asia, Africa and Latin America with the black liberation movement in the United States. All major factions within SDS embrace Markism-Leninism and identify internationally with China, Cuba and North Vietnam as countries leading the worldwide struggles against the United States. However, the Soviet Union was regarded as imperialist and with the Communist Party, United States of America, "revisionist" in nature.

SDS operated under a national constitution which called for an annual National Convention (NC) and quarterly National Council meetings wherein programs were initiated and debated. Three national officers were elected annually with a National Interim Committee to run the organization. Regional offices and college chapters elected delegates to the national meetings but each functioned independently on local matters. Its official publication "Fire" (formerly "New Left Notes") last appeared in December, 1969.

Internal factionalism of serious proportions developed during 1968 - 1969 and the following three factions evolved as a result of a split at the June, 1969, NC: Weatherman, Worker Student Alliance (WSA), and Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM). The effect of the split on SDS chapters throughout the country was divisive. Some alligned with one or the other of the three major factions. Others, unable to identify with any faction, disassociated with SDS completely and changed names.

WEATHERMAN

Initially called the "Action Faction," Weatherman came into being immediately before the June, 1969, Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) National Convention (NC). At this NC Weatherman won all three national officer positions and a majority of the National Interim Committee as well. Subsequently, they took over the SDS National Office (NO) in Chicago, and controlled its funds, paper and national records. Although internal struggle existed until late 1969, Weatherman for all major purposes controlled SDS nationally from June, 1969, until its NO closed in February, 1970. At this time it no longer considered itself part of SDS.

The term Weatherman emerged from an ideological paper prepared by its leaders entitled "You Don't Need a Weatherman to Know Which Way the Wind Blows" ("New Left Notes" June 18, 1969). This statement outlined the basic stance of Weatherman: Marxist-Leninist in content but with strong advocacy that action not theory would bring about revolution in the United States. This posture was complemented with an international identification to the Cuban revolution and Castro's statement that the duty of a revolutionary is to make revolution.

During October, 1969, Weatherman riots in Chicago resulted in more than 260 arrests for mob action and related charges. A program of armed struggle was finalized during a December, 1969, "War Council" wherein terrorist tactics and political assassination were contemplated. 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

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


RENNIE DAVIS was found guilty in the United States District Court, Northern District of Illinois, Chicago, Illinois, during Pebruary, 1970, of violation of a Federal Anti-Riot Statute, arising out of his participation in the riots during the Democratic National Convention held in Chicago, Illinois, in August, 1968. On February 20, 1970, DAVIS received 23 individual and separate criminal contempt citations regarding the above trial, and was sentenced to two years, one month and nine days regarding these citations. DAVIS was incarcerated in the Cook County Jail, Chicago, but was released on \$25,000 bond on February 28, 1970, pending appeal.

on April 13, 1971, that ABEIE HOFFMAN was recently telling some people that HOMIE EMMER of Kent, Ohio, wanted him to come to Kent on May 4, 1971, but HOFFMAN did not think he could make it because he was in a heavy legal struggle in order to keep his bail from being revoked. HOFFMAN was scheduled to speak in Towa the night before (May 3, 1971) and HOFFMAN felt that if the people at Kent wanted to put him on the program it would be okay but he did not want the entire program built around him. 

The "Principles of Unity" adopted by the conference included a struggle against white supremacy and male supremacy; fights against imperialism, anticommunism, fascism and oppression of youth; and support of the right of solf-determination of all "oppressed nations," also support of the right of all "oppressed and exploited" pooples "to armed self-defense." It was agreed that NYM would not be a Marxist-Louinist organization; however, source sold this was decided in order to indicate an organization broad enough in form to be acceptable to everyone. A temporary Extional Steering Committee (YSC) made up of eight females and two males was elected to govern RMM until rational officers could be elected during the Spring of 1970.

RYM publications have listed the RYM Rational Office (NO) at Post Office Box 5421 and Post Office Box 77012 C, both Atlanta, Georgia, and a second source has advised that the NO has no office space but would probably be considered as located at Apartment 27, 1667 Alta Avenue, Northeast, Atlanta.

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WORKER STUDENT -ALLEANCE/PROGRESSIVE LABOR PARTY

National Convention (NC) of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) held in Chicago, Illinois, Caring June, 1969, a split arose between the Progressive Labor Farty (FLP) and the National Office (NO), the MO becoming known as the Weatherman faction. The FLP faction dreather largest support among those in attendance at the MC.

that during late Summer, 1969, the FLP faction of SPS established its National Headquarters (NH) on the second floor of a loft-type building at 173A Massachusetts Avenue, Boston, Massachusetts. The campaign on which the PLP faction centered was to build a worker student alliance or a campus worker student alliance. Thus, they adopted the names of Worker Student Alliance (WSA) or Campus Worker Student Alliance.

hat the "New Left Hotes," printed in New York City, is the official publication of the USA faction.

that within the ban, the WSA is a caused of which the PLP constitutes the leadership.

during demonstrations staged in the Boston area during the Spring and Sommer of 1970 by the NH, the main theme of previous demonstrations staged by the NH shifted from protestations of the Victnam Mar and other United States foreign policy nations to attacking domestic issues such as racism and anomaloyment and demonstrating support of the "workers' struggle."

APPERDIX

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PROGRESSIVE LABOR PARTY

"The New York Times" city edition, Tuesday, April 20, 1965, page 27, reported that a new party of "revolutionary socialism" was formally founded on April 18, 1965, under the name of the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) which had been known as the Progressive Labor Movement.

According to the article, "The Progressive Labor Movement was founded in 1962 by Hilton Rosen and Mortimer Scheen after they were expelled from the Communist Party of the United States for assertedly following the Chinese Communist line."

that the PLP held its Second Matienal Convention in New York City, May 31 to June 2, 1958, at which time the PLP reasserted its objective of the establishment of a militant working class movement based on Marxiell-Loninism.

Convention Milton Rosen was unanisously reclected National Chairman of the FLP and Levi Laub, Fred Jerose, Jared Israel, William Epton, Jacob Rosen, Jeffrey Gordon, and Walter Linder were elected as the National Committee to lead the PLP until the next convention.

The PLP publishes "Progressive Labor," a bimonthly magazine, and "Challenge-Desaffo," a monthly newspaper.

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MUATHERMAN

Initially called the "Action Faction," Weatherman came into being immediately before the June, 1969, Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) National Convention (RC). At this NC Ventherman won all three national officer positions and a majority of the National Interim Committee as well. Subsequently, they took over the SPS National Office (NO) in Chicago, and controlled its funds, paper and national records. Although internal struggle existed until late 1939, Weatherman for all major purposes controlled SDS nationally from June, 1969, until its NO closed in February, 1970. At this time it no longer considered itself part of SDS.

The term Meatherman energed from an ideological paper prepared by its leaders entitled "You Don't Meed a Weatherman to Know Which Way the Wind Blows" ("New Left Notes" June 15, 1939). This statement outlined the basic stance of Weatherman: Emmisted wind in content but with strong advocacy that action not theory would being about revolution in the United States. This posture was complemented with an international identification to the Cuban revolution and Castro's statement that the duty of a revolutionary is to make revolution.

During Catebor, 1839, Weatherman riots in Chicago resulted in more than 280 arrests for non-action and related charges. A program of armed struggle was finalized during a December, 1969, "War Connell" wherein terrorist tactics and political assessination were contemplated. The basic strength of Weatherman was then revealed to be some 360 - 350 mationally and geographically apportioned to the Midwest, New York, and some Northwest.

As its rectoric of violence escalated, Weatherman leaders increasingly discussed the necessity of an underground operation wherein more than 55 percent of the organization would be submarged; "affinity groups" of three - five barbors would function independently. In February, 1970, Weatherman leaders announced a program of "styntogic substage" with police and nilitary installations as primary targets.

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In February, 1970, Weatherman abandoned the SDS NO, 1608 West Medison Street, Chicago, Illinois, and throughout the country entered an underground status.
