On August 24, 1968, an individual whom he believes was ABBOTT HOFFMAN and JOE TORNAEBENE requested permission to drive a flat bed truck into Lincoln Park to use for a rock and roll band. TORNAEBENE was the driver of the truck.

[REDACTED] compromised with HOFFMAN and TORNAEBENE and agreed to let the truck park just outside the park by a fence north of LaSalle Street and very close to where they had wanted to park the truck. This satisfied HOFFMAN and TORNAEBENE but by this time a crowd of approximately 1,000 had congregated around the truck. [REDACTED] summoned additional policemen and they hurriedly cleared a path for the truck to make a "U" turn and proceed to the agreed upon area, and there was no incident.

[REDACTED] had no other personal contact with HOFFMAN and HOFFMAN did not at that time attempt to incite the crowd or cause any trouble.

On Sunday, August 25, 1968, at approximately 9:30 p.m., ABBOTT HOFFMAN approached him in Lincoln Park and requested that he be furnished a loud speaker. HOFFMAN was told by [REDACTED] that the police did not have a loud speaker for him to use and suggested that HOFFMAN borrow one from other groups in the park. HOFFMAN said he did not know the individuals who had the speakers in the other group.

HOFFMAN asked if he could stay in the park after 11:00 p.m. HOFFMAN was told that he could not stay after 11:00 p.m. because of a city ordinance which prohibited anyone from staying after 11:00 p.m. HOFFMAN answered by stating that they may not have a legal right but they have a moral right to stay after 11:00 p.m.

[REDACTED] who immediately obtained a loud speaker from someone else, say over the loud speaker, [REDACTED] informs us we have no legal right to be in the park because an ordinance prohibits us after 11:00 p.m., but we have a moral right."

[REDACTED] stated that this was his only contact with HOFFMAN but he did have one contact with ED SANDERS, a friend of HOFFMAN's, who resided at the Lincoln Hotel during the convention. He met SANDERS in the lobby of Second City Theater on either August 24 or 25, 1968; but prior to the above incident

[REDACTED] told SANDERS they would only be allowed to bring in equipment as other "be-ins" were allowed to do in the past, which was they were allowed to bring in equipment in a truck, unload it, and then remove the truck from the park.

[REDACTED] They went to Grant Park, where a rally was being held by a group called the Mobilization Committee. Members of the Chicago Police Department were on hand at the rally, where they distributed leaflets announcing that a permit had been granted for this rally within the park, but that if participants went outside the park limits to conduct a march, they would be subject to arrest as constituting a potential traffic hazard.

[REDACTED] recalled that the following individuals spoke at the rally, which was attended by several thousand:

DICK GREGORY;
WILLIAM GOLDING
JEAN GENET

TOM HAYDEN
NORMAN MAILER
DAVID DELLINGER

He could not recall if ABBOTT HOFFMAN was one of the speakers, although he stated he recalls mention at least of this individual's name.

[REDACTED] said he did not pay much attention to the speeches because he was listening to the convention broadcast on his transistor radio, and that he cannot attribute any specific remarks to any one speaker.

The only unpleasant incidents during the rally took place when someone took down an American flag from a flagpole. This action caused the police to move in, and a scuffle then ensued.

At the end of the rally those in attendance were given a choice of alternatives as to future activity on that date:

1. To stay there
2. To disperse and go home

3

3. To disperse and meet elsewhere to engage in a march to the convention

4. To gather at a monument at one side of the park (Grant Park) and to then have a non-violent march to the convention site.

██████████ said that the third alternative, as presented, was never clearly defined as to whether this was to be a violent or non-violent demonstration, but that the fourth alternative, which was proposed by DAVE DELLINGER, to the best of his recollection, clearly was presented as a non-violent action. Since he does not believe in violence of any kind, he elected to join the demonstrators at the park monument.

After a group gathered at the monument, they were instructed to lock arms in groups of eight and to march in this manner to the convention site. These instructions were given by parade marshals, who were so identified by armbands. The march was halted by police immediately after it started. After about two to three hours of negotiations, between the parade marshals and the police, it was finally announced that negotiations had broken down and that there would be no march. The group of marchers then began to disperse.

██████████ after leaving the park, eventually was able to cross Michigan Avenue, and finally found himself with a group of demonstrators outside of the Conrad Hilton Hotel. He said there were no speeches, with one exception, that being when a man from a mule train which had marched to the area, and which was a carry-over from the Poor Peoples Campaign, made a short talk, asking those present to wait for Reverend ABERNATHY, who would be by later to join them. Instead of speeches, there was a general chanting by those present critical of the Democratic Party and praising Senator McCarthy.

During this period, [REDACTED] became separated from his friend [REDACTED]. Ultimately, the Chicago Police moved in and began fighting with the demonstrators and making mass arrests. [REDACTED] said that his attendance was completely passive and that he left the area about 11 PM and proceeded to [REDACTED]. Later that night, he and [REDACTED] returned to the Conrad Hilton Hotel area, where he remained until about 5 AM the next morning. During this time, several delegates to the convention made speeches to the demonstrators. After a few hours sleep, he left Chicago at 8 AM that morning.

[REDACTED] concluded that he traveled to Chicago on his own volition, hoping to add his voice to the supporters of Senator Mc Carthy and to see what was going to transpire at the National Convention. He gave no participation to any riot or any violent activity.

In connection with the investigation currently being conducted, your attention is directed to the report published by the Corporation Counsel of the City of Chicago, captioned, "The Strategy of Confrontation - Chicago and the Democratic National Convention - 1968," dated September 6, 1968, a copy of which is in your possession.

On page 6 of this document it is reported that:

"Private citizens and newspaper reporters did, as a matter of fact, witness the training carried on by Hoffman and others. Snake dancing, defensive blocking, kicking of adversary in leg or groin were demonstrated and practiced during the 'Marshals' training. Use of red or green flares as weapons, also oven cleaning spray, hair spray and manufacture of primitive but effective missiles such as nails stuck into golf balls, razors concealed in canes and darts made from sharpened coat hangers was also part of the instruction. [Emphasis added.]"

On page 15 of this document it is reported that a newspaper article in the "New York Post" on September 5, 1968, quoted Abbie Hoffman in part as follows:

"They called us hardcore anarchists with plots to overthrow the government, well, that's not a secret. That's always been the case. What's the big deal? In Chicago we had two aims. One was to present the reality of America as we saw it as long-haired dropouts. And what we see in America as a police state. The second was to present the reality and beauty of struggling for a new society."

In connection with the investigation currently being conducted, your attention is directed to an article entitled "Press, TV Influenced Both Sides" by William Chapman in the Washington Post of December 2, 1968.

This article on page 1 and 17 states in part as follows:

Abbie Hoffman, the Yippie leader, is quoted in the report (study released on December 1, 1968 by the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence) explaining how he hoped to use television as a weapon against the convention.

"We wanted to up their image on TV. I fight through the jungle of TV, you see. . . it's all in terms of disrupting the image, the image of a democratic society being run very peacefully and orderly and everything is according to business."

Describing the Yippies' tactics, the report said: "This theatrical concept was a primary ingredient of their approach. The audience would be the American public, the means of communication would be the mass media, manipulated to create distorted images of themselves. The stage would be the streets and the message would be a demonstration of disrespect, irreverence and ridicule."

It quotes Hoffman as saying "You got a TV set? That's a jungle. . . We get on that tube. . . we get information out, and our information is heavy, and it sticks, and it's exciting, it's alive."

The Department has observed that this information has been generally obtained concerning all subjects; however, it is desired that a witness be obtained to testify to each of the above points other than informant testimony. Witnesses capable of furnishing this information might be neighbors, landlords or singular individuals who may not know the destination of subject, but who will nevertheless be able to state that subject was not at his residence for a stated period prior to, or during the convention.

Referenced airtel continues that if such information is not available, appropriate leads should be set out and report submitted when all the requested information has been obtained.

A review of Chicago files fail to reflect date subject departed his residence, date he arrived in Chicago and his mode of travel. It is noted that subject has come to Chicago by air during subsequent court appearances in Chicago.

New York teletype dated August 15, 1968, entitled "DEMCON", reflected that subject was then in Chicago and ANITA HOFFMAN was leaving New York by air the evening of August 16, 1968.

The surveillance by the Chicago Police Department did not begin until after August 21, 1968.

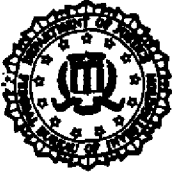

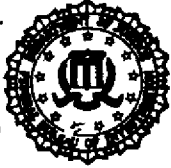

Page 17 of referenced report reflects that the demonstrators hurled such objects as bricks, rocks, bottles, balls with nails protruding, spears of wood and knives at the police.

Report of Special Agent [REDACTED] dated November 22, 1968, at Chicago, entitled Wolfe B. Lowenthal, reflected on page 2 that Departmental Attornies Gregory Jones and Michael Abbell have received numerous rolls of film and that NBC reel number 25 covers a training session in Lincoln Park in which Lowenthal is shown leading a group and is demonstrating defense tactics.

Page 8 through 20 of this report contained reports of Chicago Police Officers who conducted surveillances at Lincoln Park during training sessions, including taking photographs. Page 16 reflected that Lowenthal illustrated a kick in the groin.

In connection with the investigation involving subject, an [REDACTED] official of the Youth International Party (YIP), growing out of the Chicago violence, the Department has requested interview of Lawrence Lipton concerning an article he wrote based on his alleged telephone interview of subject concerning the YIP Festival of Life scheduled for 8/25 - 30/68 in Chicago during the Democratic National Convention. According to the article, subject indicated that festival plans encompassed a march to the Amphitheater (where Convention was held) and civil disobedience.

Lipton, subject of Bureau file 100-428153, a beatnik poet, published a vulgar satirical poem "I was a poet for the FBI" in 1958; when contacted and admonished regarding his unauthorized use of the initials FBI, he apologized and later apologized to the Director by letter. However, the poem was included in a subsequent article written by him.

[REDACTED] reportedly attacks law enforcement in his writings and lectures. He reportedly would have no hesitation in misquoting persons or attributing erroneous statements to law enforcement officers if he thought it would further his journalistic career.

While Lipton is apparently an unreliable and undesirable type, this is a criminal matter and Lipton is the logical witness regarding subject's statements. In order to properly discharge our responsibilities, we should attempt to interview him as requested by the Department. If he will not cooperate, the Department can then subpoena him. *176-3450*

Pages 3 through 5 of this document contains a newspaper article entitled "Yippies to Visit Hog Capital" by Lawrence Lipton that appeared in the August 16-22, 1968 issue of the Los Angeles Free Press.

The article states that it is based on a telephone conversation between Lipton and Abbott Hoffman. Please interview Lipton about the information in the article with emphasis on Hoffman's statement on page 5 of the report about the march to the Amphitheater and civil disobedience in downtown Chicago that was planned for August 28, 1968.

LAWRENCE L. LIPTON, 2311 Oakwood Avenue, Venice, was interviewed at his residence and furnished the following information:

LIPTON related that approximately a week before the Democratic National Convention held in Chicago, Illinois, he had telephonically contacted ABBOTT HOFFMAN, a member of the Yippies, concerning the plans which the Yippies had scheduled for occurring at the Democratic National Convention. He advised this telephone conversation had been taped by him and was reported verbatim in his article appearing in the Los Angeles Free Press captioned, "Yippies to Visit Hog Capital." LIPTON related, "The Yippies who came to Chicago came to ridicule, befuddle, and in short, to drive the authorities nuts. The Yippies consider this to be the number one element of revolution which is as old as the holy fools of Christianity." LIPTON added the "holy fools" of Christianity fooled the Roman soldiers by their crazy actions and antics, as the Yippies are fooling those persons in positions of authority today. He cited a recent example of this by recalling JERRY RUBIN, a member of the Yippies, when appearing before a recent investigating committee, dressed himself in a Santa Claus suit. LIPTON commented that individuals such as JERRY RUBIN, ABBIE HOFFMAN, and PAUL KRASSNER are all anarchists who dislike authority and "the establishment." LIPTON added that he was sure that if HOFFMAN was tried, he would admit to any charges which might be brought against him plus admitting to other things. LIPTON was of the opinion that HOFFMAN was open in all his involvement and would not attempt to hide anything.

LIPTON was asked if the Yippies who came to Chicago came for the purpose of creating civil disobedience. He related that some of the individuals intended to create civil disobedience, but those persons connected with "the establishment" failed to try to understand that, to the Yippies, their movement is a religious movement and action

in the streets is equivalent to High Mass in the Catholic Church. LIPTON stated the best way to defeat organizations such as the Yippies is for persons connected with the establishment to have a sense of humor and be able to laugh at the crazy antics of the Yippies rather than consider the Yippies as a threat, but the "One thing that the establishment cannot stand is ridicule and laughter."

LIPTON was also asked the question concerning the reason for the self-defense workshop scheduled by the Yippies at the Democratic National Convention. He related that "Right wing organizations had threatened to beat up persons participating in the demonstrations at the convention and the reason for the training was to defend themselves from right wing vigilante groups." He went on to state that the security of the United States was more in jeopardy from the elements in the right wing than it was from the left.

Mr. LIPTON stated that his telephone conversation with ABBIE HOFFMAN was recorded by himself and the article which he wrote for the "Los Angeles Free Press" contains all the conversation between himself and ABBIE HOFFMAN. He related the tape containing this conversation was retained by him and he would make it available if anyone so desired.

During the course of interview, it was ascertained that LIPTON has authored more than 22 mystery and other novels, in addition to being a free-lance author. He advised he had written articles for numerous magazines including "Cavalier", "Knight", and the newspaper, "The Los Angeles Free Press". He related he had recently written an article concerning the Democratic National Convention for the "Cavalier" magazine.

While LIPTON was being interviewed, he volunteered the information that he had just written an article appearing in the January 10, 1969, issue of the "Los Angeles Free Press," which was a book review of a book entitled, "Revolution for the Hell of It," written by Free, which according to LIPTON, is a pseudonym of ABBOTT HOFFMAN. He made available copies of the "Los Angeles Free Press" containing copies of this article which is set forth as follows:

In a series of self-propounded questions, Abbie Hoffman, author of this book and self-appointed anonymous non-leader of the non-existent Yippies (this by his own description), has this to say about the most frequently propounded question concerning the Youth International Party (YIP):

QUESTION: Do you consider yourself politically relevant?

ANSWER: No.

QUESTION: Is that the best answer you can think of?

ANSWER: Well, when you ask a question like that you trigger off umpteen responses in my head. I believe in the politics of ecstasy.

QUESTION: Can you explain that a little more?

ANSWER: No, but I can touch it, I can smell it, I can even dance it, I can even fight it. Politics is to me the way somebody lives his life. Not what they vote for or support or even believe in. I'm more interested in art than politics but, well, see, we are all caught in a word box. I find it difficult to make these kinds of divisions. Northrop, in MEETING OF EAST AND WEST, said, "Life is an undifferentiated aesthetic continuum." Let me say that the Vietcong attacking the U. S. Embassy in Saigon is a work of art. I guess I like revolutionary art.

QUESTION: This word game, as you call it. Doesn't that present problems in conveying what you want to say?

ANSWER: Yes, but not in what I want to do. Let me say... Did you hear Andy Warhol talk?

QUESTION: Yes, or at least I think it was him.

ANSWER: Well, I would like to combine his style and that of Castro's. Warhol understands modern media. Castro has a passion for social change. It's not easy. One's a fag and the other is the epitome of virility. If I was forced to make a choice I would choose Castro, but right now in this period of change in the country the styles of the two can be blended. It's not guerrilla warfare but, well, maybe a good term is monkey warfare. If the country becomes more repressive we must become Castros. If it becomes more tolerant we must become Warhols.

As I write these lines Abbie Hoffman is bringing a big damage suit, with ACLU backing, against the District of Columbia fuzz who busted him Oct. 4 for wearing a shirt made out of an American flag. His complaint is that against his will the D.C. police took a sample of his blood in jail and did it with a nondisposable needle which gave him a hepatitis infection and permanent damage to his liver. I remember his perpetual state of REVOLUTIONARY HIGH (yes, there is no better name for it, a high, much like a dope high) when he was doing his thing in Chicago last August, and it grieves me to think of Abbie brought to a terrible LOW like the hepatitis low, than which there is no going lower or more turned off.

It's the nearest thing I can think of to a poetic injustice.

Of all the facets of the current multidimensional world revolution the most strikingly new and original is the Yippie— what shall I call it? since words, names, are irrelevant in this case and only acts can define or even name it. Picture Abbie laughing his holy fool head off as the Chicago Dazey pigs (or was it the feds, I forgot, but what the hell is the difference?) were whaling the hell out of him during an "interrogation". Picture Abbie in a goofy disguise, like some

goddamn old-time mystery flick, speaking openly in Grant Park to a crowd of thousands while the fuzz are all over the place and the Secret Service goons detailed to tail him are snooping around all over Chicago trying to pick up his trail. YIP has been called a blend of psychedelic and guerrilla revolution. In Abbie's case it is more like an esthetic art high that results naturally, like a mantra-chant high from the ACT OF REVOLUTION itself.

I felt it every day I was in Chicago last August. Abbie had it, Jerry Rubbin had it, Paul Krassner had it, Ed Sanders had it, everybody who participated in the action had it. It was like the non-verbal high you have on an acid trip. You don't want to make speeches or write descriptions of it, or make reports about it, I had a hell of a time trying to get myself to sit down at the typewriter and bat out the reportorial stuff I was committed to sending back to the L.A. Free Press and the New York-based Cavalier magazine. It wasn't till after the street theater, the live action, was over that I was able to do more than drop a few pages in the mail or report on it by long distance telephone, orally.

Aldous Huxley once told me that when he ingested lysergic acid he didn't want to verbalize about it "during" and had trouble trying to write about it afterwards—and he was a wordcraft cat if I ever saw one. Tim Leary said, when I put the question to him, "you're just too BUSY experiencing it to feel the least bit like describing it."

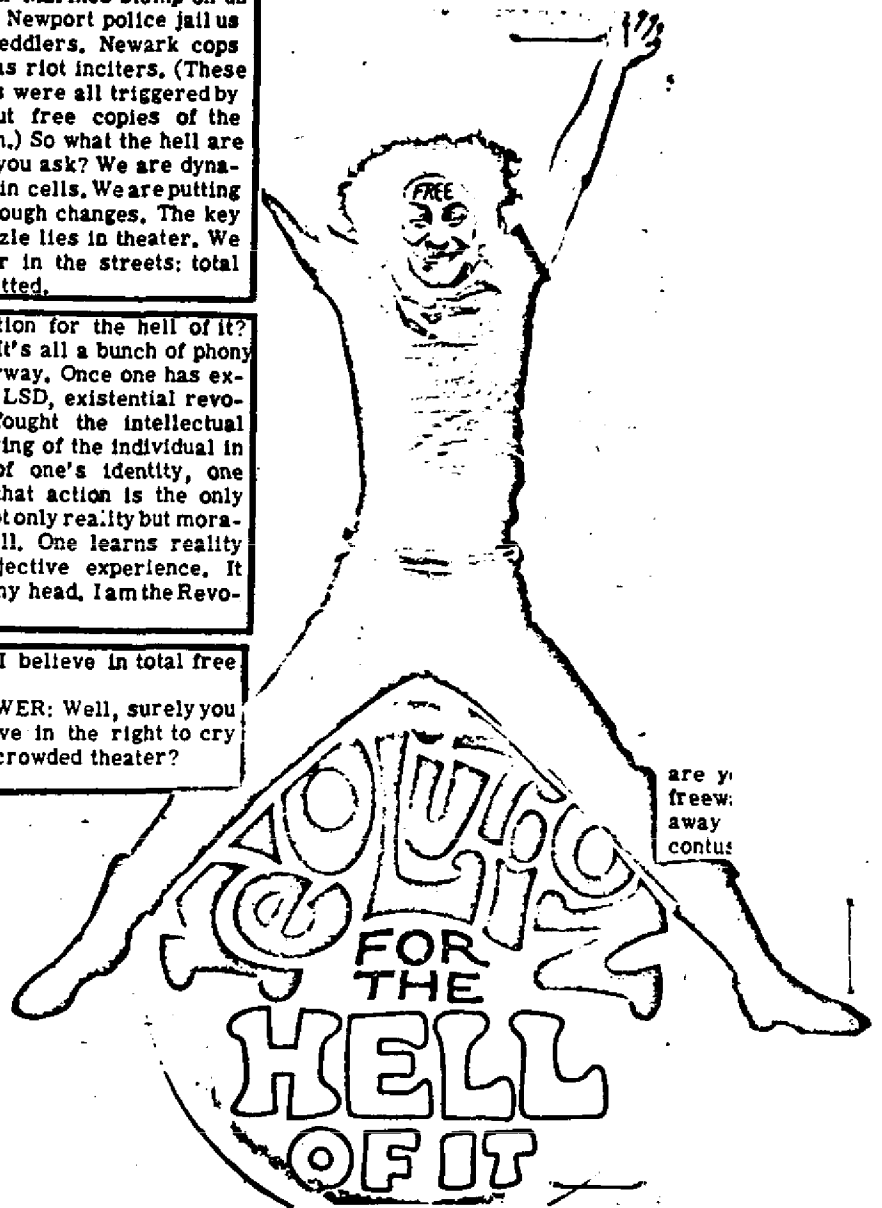
Abbie Hoffman is STILL too busy experiencing it to say very much about the revolutionary high itself, but he has managed to put 200 pages on paper about the before and after effects in REVOLUTION FOR THE HELL OF IT, most descriptive word formula for the DURING effect of the revolutionary high anybody ever has put on paper. Wasn't that the way Molly Bloom described her first fuck (I'm still too high just thinking about Chicago in August to bother looking it up in my copy of ULYSSES) in these words (I quote from memory) "I let him lerrup it into me just for the hell of it."

"The Old Left says we work for the CIA. Ex-Marines stomp on us as Pinkos. Newport police jail us as smut peddlers. Newark cops arrest us as riot inciters. (These four events were all triggered by passing out free copies of the same poem.) So what the hell are we doing, you ask? We are dynamiting brain cells. We are putting people through changes. The key to the puzzle lies in theater. We are theater in the streets; total and committed.

"Revolution for the hell of it? Why not? It's all a bunch of phony words anyway. Once one has experienced LSD, existential revolution, fought the intellectual game-playing of the individual in society, of one's identity, one realizes that action is the only reality; not only reality but morality as well. One learns reality is a subjective experience. It exists in my head. I am the Revolution.

ME: Yes, I believe in total free speech.
INTERVIEWER: Well, surely you don't believe in the right to cry "fire" in a crowded theater?
ME: FIRE!

"Don't be for or against. Riots—environmental and psychological—are Holy, so don't screw around with explanations. Theater also has some advantages. It is involving for those people that are ready for it while at the same time dismissed as nonthreatening by those that could potentially wreck the stage.

Lawrence Lipton and his Recorder entertain two FBI Agents

LAWRENCE LIPTON

One of the yippies who had taken a prominent part in the Battle of Chicago "street theater" said to me when it was over, "Larry, the Establishment is a pushover."

I knew he DIDN'T mean that the punitive power of the Establishment had weakened to the point where it was a pushover, because he, like myself, had suffered from the militarized police power of the Establishment. What I understood him to mean was that the Establishment was (to him, at least) surprisingly vulnerable to the YIP kind of revolutionary activism. It was easy for me to see why he should have come to such a conclusion. As far back as February, if not earlier, Mayor Richard Daley of Chicago had panicked at the reports his advisors brought him—culled almost entirely from a few underground newspapers—that the yippies were planning to "take over the city" in August, during the Democratic convention. He scented an underground plot to challenge his long-held mafia-like dictatorship over Chicago and present him with such anarchistic demands as free speech, free assembly and due process of law!

He turned Chicago into an armed camp and—the rest is history.

But that was not the end of the

matter. It is still not the end of the matter, far from it. The FBI and God and J. Edgar Hoover only knows how many sleuths are now gumshoeing all over the country to try and build a case for conspiracy, incitement to riot and who knows what other heresies and blasphemies against the "outside agitators" who slipped into Chicago last August and plotted the overthrow of law and order.

A team of FBI operatives—they always travel in pairs, as in I Spy and Mission Impossible—came to pay me a visit (last Thursday, Jan. 16, for the record) in order to inquire what, if anything, I could tell them about one of the accused, Abbie Hoffman, in addition to the long distance telephone interview I had with him last August and which was reported in the Los Angeles Free Press. Since this is the second time in two months that my coverage of the Chicago events has figured in government investigations, it would seem that the Free Press has become a kind of historical source book for the secret machinations of the political, social and cultural underground.

The sleuthsome twosome is as old as Don Quixote and Sancho Panza and Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson. The FBI variation on the theme is a friendly smiling type who has only your rights and your welfare in mind, backed

pp. by a narrow-eyed menacing dragon type whose role it is to keep reminding you that you'd better co-operate with your FBI or else. This was a friendly visit, not an accusative one. There is an etiquette in handling this kind of a visitation. Here are a few pointers for the uninitiated.

It is not proper etiquette for FBI investigators to call up and make an appointment with you but to drop in on you uninvited at their own convenience, like door-to-door salesmen working their way through college. This leaves you at an initial disadvantage, but it isn't considered good etiquette to just point to the NO SOLICITING sign or to simply slam the door in their faces. In my case the door was wide open anyway, as it always is weather permitting, which is an open invitation from in front, so I just smiled back when one of them flashed an FBI badge and said, "Come in, gentlemen, and be seated." As I was having my breakfast I brought the bowl of cornflakes into the livingroom, continued to eat and said, "What can I do for you, gentlemen." I advise this response, unless, of course, you're partaking of something less legal than cornflakes at the moment and have to stall for time to legalize yourself (in which case it is inadvisable to leave the front door

wide open). My open door policy got us off to a good start.

A second point of etiquette is, answer all questions truthfully, especially if you have already answered all their questions in your books, your articles and your columns, on TV shows, on radio and in public speeches and university classes and lectures, in which case you simply refer them to same. Do not show too much surprise if their information about you and your views is a bit sketchy, in spite of the fact that they had a big fat secret FBI dossier on you that they could have consulted before setting out on their visit. Remember they're your guests and the rules of hospitality apply at all times, even to the uninvited fuzz. In fact, it turned out in my case that my visitors who were out digging up all the secret underground dope (metaphorically, that is) about Abbie Hoffman, were completely taken by surprise when I carelessly blurted out the fact that Abbie Hoffman had published a book about himself and all the secret plots of the yuppies weeks ago, and I detected a look of high interest—that Jack Webb look—when I dropped the name of the book!—**REVOLUTION FOR THE HELL OF IT.**

Since I had already let the cat out of the bag I thought I might as well sell out completely and

confess that I had written a review of Abbie's book and published it in the Freep the week before. Naturally they could not pass up a chance to nab such a prize of criminal investigative evidence, so I went to the secret files where I keep the Freep hidden away and gave them a copy of the review. They could have gotten a free copy of the book itself if they had thought to ask Abbie Hoffman, since he is giving it away free to everybody, even cops. But since I had already given away all my copies to reviewers I advised that they pick up a copy at any bookstore for \$1.95 and list it on the swindle-sheet. Anything with the word revolution on it will be considered well worth \$1.95 by the FBI accountant.

Now, about search and seizure. It is perfectly correct etiquette for your guests to get up and go browsing among your books. If one of them finds something of interest, say, a copy of an anthology in which there is an article called "I Ching," by Lawrence Lipton, do not hasten to reassure him that I Ching is not the name of a Jewish-Chinese communist named Isidore Ching, a fellow conspirator of Chairman Mao. That may come as so shocking a disappointment to him he may suspect you're holding out on him. And if he picks up a **LOOK**

called "Police Power: Police abuses in New York City," and pointing to the title page asks you "Who is Pantheon," don't let on that he might be thinking it has something to do with the Panthers. Just tell him it is the name of the publisher and if he looks a little higher up on the page will find the author's name, Paul Chavigny—which should be foreign-sounding enough to satisfy his fondest suspicions.

Whether you should offer your guests liquid refreshments is optional, but in my case it would have been ill-advised in view of the fact that I was being questioned as a friend, perhaps even a partisan, of Abbie Hoffman, and my guests had already alluded to the yippies' plot to spike the Chicago water reservoirs with LSD. So I confined myself to some brief bibliographical references to published writings in which I have disclosed such top secret documents of the revolution as essays and articles on the Holy Fool, black humor, the revolutionary use of laughter, ridicule, mockery, satire and sex, street theater, the politics of ecstasy and the psychedelic revolution, the subversive incantations of the C.N. and the ritual of the raising (or is it rising?) of the Pentagon, ending, an hour later, with the reassuring (to them, I hoped) recollection that the hippies had not attempted to raise the Chicago City Hall by exorcism but only contented themselves with nominating a pig for President—which might well have been accepted by Mayor Daley as a tribute to Chicago as, in the words of Chicago's late poet laureate Carl Sandburg, the "hog butcher of the world," and not, as Daley might have thought, a veiled reference to himself and to the Chicago Police.

One last point of etiquette always begin by reminding your visitors of their civil rights and cautioning them that anything they say might be used against them. And—O yes—be sure to keep your guns, ammo, bazookas, plastic bombs and self-destruct tapes, microfilms and code books concealed under the family Bible, in order not to arouse their suspicions, and keep the conversation on a friendly basis. In my own case, not having a family Bible I introduced them to DUNHAB, my patron robot and Detector of Undesirable Habitudes, who entertained them without giving away the fact that in his secret electronic innards I keep my hash stashed away and my firearms concealed, as well as the tape recorder on which I recorded the tape on which this account of their visit is based. As DUNHAB always says: "Be kind to your flat-footed friends

On January 28, 1969, HOFFMAN appeared before Judge KENNETH R. WENDT, Cook County Court House, Chicago, Illinois. Special Agents [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were also in attendance. b7c

HOFFMAN was convicted of resisting arrest and sentenced to one year probation, with first 15 days to be served in House of Correction, Chicago, Illinois. HOFFMAN was released on \$1000 appeal bond.

HOFFMAN was also found guilty on charge of carrying a switchblade knife aboard an aircraft and was fined \$100. He was released on \$250 appeal bond on this charge. The charge of disorderly conduct for having obscene word on forehead against HOFFMAN during the Democratic National Convention was dismissed.

HOFFMAN was given until March 18, 1969, to file Notice of Appeal.

HOFFMAN's wife was overheard to say they had arrived via American Air Lines on that date and they would depart Chicago, Illinois, via American Air Lines for New York City on that same date.

[REDACTED] blunterly appeared at the Chicago Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) on December 16, 1968.

[REDACTED] for the "Chicago American," a daily newspaper published in Chicago, from early August, 1968, until September 30, 1968. [REDACTED] advised he had a two-fold assignment during this period, first, to "cover" the younger delegates to the Democratic Party's National Convention from the delegations representing California, New York, Wisconsin, and Washington, D.C.

[REDACTED] stated that his "coverage" of younger delegates to the Democratic National Convention consisted of attending the various open caucuses of the delegations he was assigned and interviewing these delegates, some of whom were personally known to him. [REDACTED] advised these younger delegates were generally in favor of the candidacy of Senator AUGAN J. MC CARTHY and his assignment was to determine if they would walk out of the convention if Vice-President HUMBERT H. MURPHY was the Democratic Party's nominee for President, or if they would take any other newsworthy act to show opposition to the expected nomination

of HUMPHREY. [REDACTED] advised in addition to several caucuses prior to the Convention, he was in the Convention Hall during the evening sessions on August 27th and 28th, 1968, conducting spot interviews of various delegates.

[REDACTED] advised that he has not maintained any notes taken during the period he served [REDACTED] with the "Chicago American," inasmuch as he made frequent oral reports to the City Desk of the "Chicago American," and he did not write stories under his own by-line.

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[redacted] stated he feels DAVID DELLINGER is a throwback to the "Old Left," who is sincere in his public image as a "pacifist." [redacted] stated his only recollection of DELLINGER during or prior to the week of the Convention was DELLINGER's speech at Grant Park on the afternoon of August 28. [redacted] advised he considered DELLINGER to be a "dull speaker," and therefore recalls little of what DELLINGER said other than DELLINGER's attempt to organize a march to the Amphitheatre, site of the Democratic Party's National Convention. DELLINGER repeated several times that this would be a "peaceful, non-violent march." [redacted] advised that DELLINGER stated that, as an alternative to, those not wanting to participate in this march could remain by the Band Shell in Grant Park and depart when the crowd had cleared. [redacted] stated DELLINGER seemed to indicate this alternative should be taken by women and children.

As DELLINGER was giving these alternatives, another individual took the microphone and gave a third alternative. [redacted] stated he did not recognize this individual and did not understand the alternative outlined by him other than believing it had something to do with marching to or through the Loop area of Chicago. [redacted] stated that, at this time, people were "milling around" and some people were leaving the area giving him the impression the crowd was leaderless.

[redacted] stated the people intending to join in the "peaceful, non-violent march" organized by DELLINGER, gathered by a statue in Grant Park. [redacted] stated he feels the vast majority of people participating in this march believed they would not provoke violence, but very few felt that violence would not ensue. Approximately fifty people among these marchers were running around giving out dampened rags to use in the event tear gas was used against them, so he feels these marchers must have felt that it was a reasonable assumption that the Police would use tear gas against them.

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[REDACTED] stated that he believes JELLINGER's goal was to force a massive peaceful sit-in to "clog the political machine."

[REDACTED] stated he departed Grant Park prior to the outbreak of violence on the 28th to "cover" events on the convention floor.

[REDACTED] stated that he listened in on an interview of THOMAS HAYDEN sometime prior to Convention week at which time HAYDEN stated he hoped to "picket in front of various Chicago hotels to see if we can get the National Guard to emerge from their armories and get them to take up positions outside these hotels thereby showing the world that Democracy is dead in Chicago and that we are living in a Police State." [REDACTED] advised this is not a direct quote, but merely how he remembers HAYDEN outlining his goal for Convention week in Chicago. [REDACTED] added that the cover on "Newsweek" magazine following the Convention picturing Vice-President HUMPHREY behind a wall of bayonets would be exactly what HAYDEN hoped to achieve.

[REDACTED] stated HAYDEN had planned several disruptive, but not violent, activities for the Convention week including the following:

A huge demonstration (hopefully 15,00) by Illinois Institute of Technology, Chicago, which does research work in biological warfare, to protest this research work.

A sizable demonstration (hopefully several thousand) at the Chicago Office of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), to protest the activities of that organization.

A group of several hundred or more picket carrying, chanting individuals marching through downtown Chicago department stores on a general "peace" theme.

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██████████ stated the failure of these plans to materialize has led him to believe the events of Convention week in Chicago were largely spontaneous.

██████████ stated he never interviewed KENNIE DAVIS, but did observe him on several occasions and listened to him explain his ideas and on the basis of this feels DAVIS wants to achieve change within the existing social order and particularly peace in Viet Nam.

██████████ advised he did speak, during the week of the Convention, to CORINNA FALES, who described herself as Communications Director of the NMC. FALES stated the NMC, and she as a representative of it, was "here to convince all the disillusioned 'MC CARTHY kids' that the existing political structure is a fraud." FALES stated the NMC would "expose the hypocrisy of the political structure," and show that there was "no choice between (Vice-President HUBERT H.) HUMPHREY and (Republican Presidential Nominee RICHARD M) NIXON." ██████████ stated he does not recall that FALES gave any alternative to the existing political structure.

██████████ stated ABBY HOFFMAN in a discussion following the week of the Convention, in the office of JACK MABLEY, Associate Editor of the "Chicago American" termed the demonstrations during the week of the Convention in Chicago a "gigantic drama," "role playing" and claimed the Youth Independence Party (YIP) has no leadership and that the newsmedia just choose him to quote as a YIP leader. ██████████ stated leadership is alien to HOFFMAN's philosophy.

██████████ stated he believes HOFFMAN and JERRY RUBIN are individuals who have "given up on our society, people who don't care about money," and who "want to form a new society."

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██████████ stated he did not witness any act of violence in connection with his "coverage" of the NMC either on the part of the police or on the part of the demonstrators. ██████████ added that he also did not hear any individual urge others to commit acts of violence.

THOMAS F. BUCKLEY was contacted telephonically for purpose of making an appointment for an interview regarding his article which appeared in the "New York Times" Magazine on September 15, 1968, entitled "The Battle of Chicago: From the Yippies Side." He was advised that his article contained references to ABROBT HOPIAN, THOMAS EMMETT HAYDEN, JERRY CLYDE RUBIN, DAVID TYRE DELLINGER, RENNARD CORDON DAVIS and PAUL JAMES KRASSNER and we wanted to know what he knew personally about each.

BUCKLEY advised that he did not recall that information he had from personal knowledge and what he obtained from sources and research. He also advised that he felt that if anyone was to be prosecuted, it should be some of the Chicago Police. He advised that he did not feel that an interview would be productive.

[redacted] concluded that from his observations in Chicago, he objected to the characterizing of the confrontations as "police riots" since he observed that action by the police was a result of undue provocation by the hippies.

[redacted] stated that he did not state to the press that he took personal notes concerning what took place in Chicago.

LAWRENCE L. LIPTON, 2311 Oakwood, Venice, California, telephone number EX 9-8245, was interviewed at his residence, at which time he furnished the following information:

Mr. LIPTON was asked if he would provide the tape recording concerning his telephonic interview of ABBOTT HOFFMAN immediately preceding the Democratic National Convention which he used to write his article in the Los Angeles Free Press captioned "Yippies to Visit Hog Capitol". Mr. LIPTON was agreeable to provide a copy of this tape. Utilizing a card index, LIPTON located the reel which contained the telephone interview of HOFFMAN along with numerous other interviews. In the presence of interviewing agents, LIPTON attempted to locate that part of the tape recording reel containing the interview of HOFFMAN. Mr. LIPTON could not locate that part of the reel containing the interview and surmised that it had been inadvertently erased by a subsequent interview.

SA [REDACTED] observed the container from which the reel had been removed. The label on this container reflected a notation, "Interview of ABBOTT HOFFMAN, 8/68." As the tape was reviewed, those interviews immediately preceding and following the pertinent interview were found to be noted on the container.

LIPTON re-iterated that his article in the Los Angeles Free Press captioned, "Yippies to Visit Hog Capitol", was complete as the tape recording and contained no additional information. He apologized for not having the tape as he had previously advised the interviewing agents.

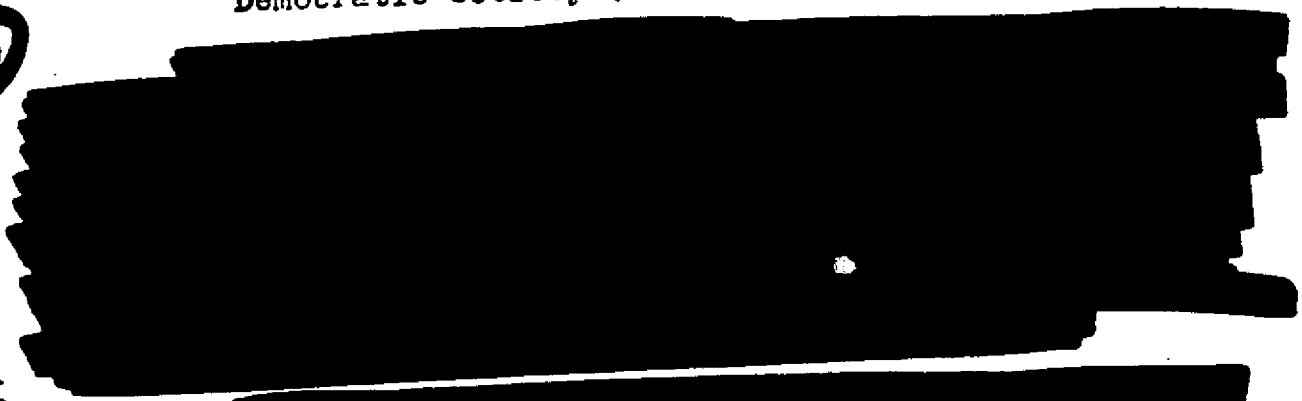

The August 5, 1968, issue of the "Chicago American", a Chicago daily newspaper, on page three, column one, contained an article reflecting that Abbie Hoffman "made fools of the television reporters". Hoffman stood on La Salle Street near Chicago Avenue, at noon on August 4, 1968, and stated, "We'll have a hundred thousand hippies here for our life festival".

(67C) David E. Stahl, Deputy Mayor of the City of Chicago, Room 507, City Hall, Chicago, Illinois, advised SAS [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] on October 8, 1968, that he met with Abbie Hoffman and four other individuals on August 7, 1968. These individuals stated they planned to have a "Festival of Life" in Chicago and that they wanted 24 hour access to Chicago public parks. They said the festival would include training classes in defense against the police August 20-24, 1968. They stated the Chicago government is a "hostile system"; they "don't like Chicago" and they would "come prepared to fight and die in Lincoln Park and tear up the town and the Convention." Abbie Hoffman stated, "If you were smart, you'd give us \$100,000 to not hold the festival. We'll get out of town."

The August 16, 1968 issue of the "East Village Other", a New York City weekly newspaper, on pages three and four, sets forth an article entitled, "Pig Butcher", which sets forth the Yippies' schedule for the Democratic Convention and then states that Abbie Hoffman, who is in Chicago, believes that the Yippies have the best chance of being permitted in Lincoln Park.

The August 16-22, 1968, issue of the "Los Angeles Free Press", published in Los Angeles, California, on page seven, sets forth an article written by Lawrence Lipton entitled, "Yippies to Visit Hog Capitol", wherein Lipton

stated that according to a telephone conversation he had with Abbie Hoffman, who, with others, proposed the idea of the Yippie Festival of Life scheduled for August 25-30, 1968, in Chicago and are acting as coordinators, the plan was to go forward with the festival as it was first announced.

The article then sets forth a transcript of Lipton's telephone conversation with Hoffman concerning the schedule of events for the festival.

SA [redacted] advised [redacted] on October 4, 1968, that prior to and during the Democratic National Convention in Chicago, he was assigned to the Intelligence Division of the Chicago Police Department.

[redacted] stated he observed Abbott Hoffman and another individual make a speech at a Lincoln Park rally approximately one week prior to the Convention. These speeches were directed toward the marshals who were apparently indoctrinating and training these marshals to handle themselves during the Convention.

On September 6, 1968, Abbott Hoffman advised SAS [redacted] and [redacted] that about five days before the convention, he was advised that his Chicago group never received a permit to use Grant Park; that thereafter, the application for a permit had been withdrawn. Hoffman stated that he then decided to go to Chicago to see what he could do to get a park permit; that he then flew to Chicago on a student rate fare and met immediately with Deputy Mayor Stahl and others in a last ditch stand to try to get Grant Park for the demonstrations.

[redacted] WIND Radio Station, 400 North Michigan Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, advised SA [redacted] on September 25, 1968, that on August 21, 1968, he was in Lincoln Park, Chicago, Illinois, where approximately 20 to 30 persons were sitting on the

[REDACTED] stated the the original tape would be maintained at his office and would be made available without a subpoena for any possible evidentiary purposes.

The August 23, 1968 edition of the "Chicago Tribune", a Chicago daily newspaper, on page five, column five, section twelve, contained an article stating that on August 22, 1968, Judge William J. Lynch of the Federal District Court agreed to dismiss a suit filed by the YIP which was to force the Park District to grant a permit for thousands of Yippies to come to the park during the convention.

According to this article, Abbie Hoffman of New York City, a Yippie spokesman, said the group requested the suit be dropped because "we have lost faith in the Judicial System and the Park District has failed to give us an answer on the permit."

Hoffman stated the Yippies and National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam demonstrators intended

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anti-Communist proviso was removed from the SDS Constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes," the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some Communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

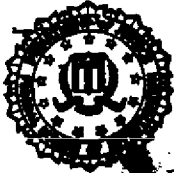

A representative of the Bureau of Special Services (BSS) of the New York City Police Department (NYCPD) advised on March 24, 1969, that at 2:45 AM on March 23, 1969, a neighbor complained to the NYCPD that some people were "shooting up" in an apartment located at 333 East 5th Street, New York City.

Detectives of the Ninth Squad of the NYCPD responded and in Apartments A-4 and F-3 at that address found five males and a quantity of suspected heroine and hypodermic needles. In Apartment A-4 they also uncovered three weapons and a quantity of ammunition. The five males were placed under arrest and charged with illegal possession of weapons and/or narcotics.

Shortly after the above arrests, Abbott Hoffman appeared at the Ninth Precinct of the NYCPD located on East 5th Street, New York City, to complain about police being in his Apartment, A-4, at 333 East 5th Street, New York City. Hoffman stated that he rents Apartment A-4 at 333 East 5th Street, New York City, for use as his office.

Yippie Leader Raps 2d Arrest

By EDWARD BENES and LESTER ABELMAN

Yippie leader Abbie Hoffman, 32, under indictment for conspiracy to riot during the Democratic National Convention in Chicago last summer, was arrested early yesterday on a gun charge after a police raid on an office he rents on the lower East Side, only five doors from the E. Fifth St. station.

Hoffman charged that his arrest stemmed from a "police setup."

"It is totally inconceivable that a person in my position would hide an arsenal of guns and dope a couple of houses away from a police station," he told newsmen.

Five Others Arrested

Five other men were arrested in the raid on the combined office-apartment on the ground floor of a five-story tenement at 333 E. Fifth St.

A sign outside the flat read: "Real World Hallucinations, Inc."

Police said that at 2:30 a.m., an unidentified man came into the police station and tipped them off about the guns and narcotics. Detectives Barry Levine, Vincent Maresca and Sam Pulley walked to the flat, where they found Stephen Mullen, 20, Larry Jacobosky, 22, and Clyde Pitts, 19. They said Pitts was handling a loaded .45-caliber Colt revolver.

Guns Confiscated

Police said they confiscated a 9-mm. German Luger, a .32 Japanese automatic and two glassine envelopes allegedly containing heroin.

Mullen, who said he was an unemployed musician, said he lived on the floor above. In his flat, detectives found Isaac Lipkowitz, 21, and Charles Anthony, 17. They said they also found two syringes and a small quantity of marijuana.

The five were taken to the police station. One of them called Hoffman, who was asleep in his apartment at 114 E. 13th St. and

he hurried over to find out what it was all about.

When he admitted he was responsible for the office-apartment, he was arrested.

"What, again?" he asked.

Calls It Harassment

At the arraignment before Judge Murray Koenig in Criminal Court, Hoffman's lawyer, Gerald Lefcourt, called the arrest an "illegal harassment."

"If the prisoner were not Abbie Hoffman, no arrest would have been made, he said.

Hoffman was released in \$100 cash bond for a hearing April 7.

Hearing Set for May 8

Pitts was released in \$100 cash bond for a hearing May 8 on a weapons violation charge. A narcotics charge was dismissed. Mullen was paroled for a hearing May 8 on a narcotics charge. Narcotics charges against Lipkowitz, of 200 E. 74th St., Jacobosky, of 80-15 Jamaica Ave., Woodhaven, Queens, and Anthony, of 26 Guilford Rd., Port Washington, L.I., were dismissed.

Pitts said he lived in Mullen's flat.

A dozen yippies were arraigned before Koenig on disorderly conduct and harassment charges stemming from midtown demonstrations Saturday night. Charges against three girls were dismissed.

Six men were paroled and three others were held in \$50 cash bond or \$500 bail each for hearings next Monday and April 28.

Arthur Turco, a lawyer for one of the defendants, said he would go to the district attorney's office to press charges of police brutality during the demonstration.

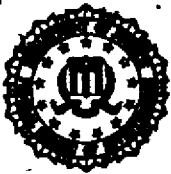

Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) that on March 17, 1967, one Abbie Hoffman spoke in the Community Hall auditorium on the campus of Rio Grande College, Rio Grande, Ohio. Hoffman was identified as a leader in the Youth International Party (Yippies). Hoffman was to speak on the subject of "Administrative Tyranny", but his speech rapidly grew into an obscene denunciation of police. Hoffman supplemented his remarks with a movie of the riots which took place during the 1968 Democratic National Convention at Chicago, Illinois, into which was spliced film strips of the "Keystone Cops." Hoffman also spoke of police brutality and illustrated his talk by smashing eggs and gourds. During the showing of the movie, he would call out "pig" upon the appearance of a police officer and his followers would echo the cry. The speech was attended by approximately 400 persons, including students, faculty, and their wives. Also speaking at the same time were Eugene Stewart Newman, an instructor in Sociology at Rio Grande College, and Ronald L. Burgher, a former instructor in speech at Rio Grande College.

Hoffman's appearance was sponsored by the "Young Democrats", a legitimate campus organization formed prior to the 1968 National Elections. Hoffman was physically brought to the campus by Ronald Burgher from the Antioch College campus at Yellow Springs, Ohio. After the speech, Hoffman was believed to have gone to the apartment of Eugene Stewart Newman, but has not been seen since then on the Rio Grande College campus.

Hoffman was brought to Rio Grande College in support of William N. Christopher, an Assistant Professor of English, whose contract was not to be renewed. His cause was taken up by Burgher and Newman with the support of other students.

advised a Special Agent of the FBI that although some student arrests continue, the situation is not riotous. He stated that no buildings were seized and no property was destroyed, but the demonstration was regarded as "illegal" by college officials and approximately 40 students were suspended as a result. He noted that the suspensions are being reconsidered and many may be rescinded. He advised that not all of the suspended students were actively involved and that not all of those involved were suspended. He advised he considers the principal activists on the Rio Grande College campus to be Steve Troyanovich, Mike Tanner, Vicky Brown, Ken Arnold, Mike Graham, and Cathy Graham. He stated that Ken Arnold threw himself upon the hood of the Gallia County Sheriff's car after the arrest of Burgher and Troyanovich and noted that Mike Graham is president of the student body. Cathy Graham is the wife of Mike Graham and she insisted her name be included among those students who were suspended. Mike Graham was unable to participate in the demonstration as he was in a meeting with college officials concerning the demonstration.

He maintains an apartment above the "Last Chance" tavern located just within the Gallipolis City limits on State Route 160. He is very friendly with Troyanovich and Burgher.

Additionally, by way of background information, William Christopher, age about 30, has a Master of Arts Degree from Vanderbilt University. He did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth College and was awarded a BA Degree in 1959. He taught at General Beadle State Teachers College, Madison, South Dakota, but became involved with a female student and was

dismissed. He subsequently married this girl and she is his second wife. Ronald Burgher presently resides in Columbus, Ohio, with his wife and child. He no longer teaches, but is attending Ohio State University working toward his Doctorate. He apparently has an intense dislike for Rio Grande College President Alphas R. Christensen. Eugene Newman has been suspended from his position as instructor in Sociology. It was noted he claimed to have appeared in Federal Court in the State of California regarding a Selective Service law violation on February 28, 1969, and was acquitted. Whether or not he received a new contract at Rio Grande College will depend upon the outcome of this matter and his earning his Masters Degree.

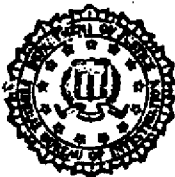

Reference is made to New York memorandum dated March 25, 1969.

On April 7, 1969, a Special Agent (SA) of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) observed Abbott Hoffman and subsequently his attorney, Gerald Lefcourt, enter part 1B1 of the Criminal Court of the City of New York, Room 219, 100 Centre Street, New York City, where Hoffman was scheduled to appear before the court for a hearing in connection with his having been arrested by the New York City Police Department (NYCPD) on March 23, 1969, on charge of illegal possession of weapons.

[REDACTED] NYCPD, who arrested Hoffman on the aforementioned charge on March 23, 1969, advised on April 7, 1969, that Hoffman's case had been continued and would be tried on May 14, 1969, in part 2B1 of the court in connection with this charge. [REDACTED] further advised that Hoffman was continued on \$100 bail.

On the evenings of May 11 and 12, 1968, the "At Random" television program was aired on the Columbia Broadcasting System Television (CBS-TV), Channel Two, Chicago, Illinois, with Moderator John Madigon. Among the participants on part two of these programs was Abbie Hoffman, who identified himself as a representative of the Youth International Party (YIP). During the ensuing discussion, Hoffman was asked if he was in favor of the overthrow of the United States (US) Government by the Moderator and Hoffman replied that he was in favor of the overthrow of the US Government by any means possible.

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", revised and published as of December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., contains the following concerning the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee:

"Emergency Civil Liberties Committee

"1. 'The Emergency Civil Liberties Committee is an organization with headquarters in New York, whose avowed purpose is to abolish the House Committee on Un-American Activities and discredit the FBI. * * * The committee finds that the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee, established in 1951, although representing itself as a non-Communist group, actually operates as a front for the Communist Party. It has repeatedly assisted, by means of funds and legal aid, Communists involved in Smith Act violations and similar legal proceedings. One of its chief activities has been and still is the dissemination of voluminous Communist propaganda material.'

'FRANK WILKINSON was called as a witness when he appeared in Atlanta as a representative of the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee to propagandize against the Committee on Un-American Activities and to protest its hearings. In 1956 WILKINSON was identified as a Communist Party member by a former FBI undercover agent within the Party. Summoned at that time to answer the allegation, his reply to all questions was, "I am answering no questions of this committee." This also became his stock reply to questions

when he appeared during the Atlanta hearings. * * * WILKINSON has since been convicted of contempt of Congress and sentenced to one year in jail.'

'Disputing the non-Communist claim of the organization, the committee finds that a number of other individuals connected with the ECIC also have been identified under oath as Communists.* * *'
(Committee on Un-American Activities, Annual Report for 1958, House Report 187, March 9, 1959, pp. 34 and 35.)

"2. 'To defend the cases of Communist law-breakers, fronts have been devised making special appeals in behalf of civil liberties and reaching out far beyond the confines of the Communist Party itself. Among these organizations are the * * * Emergency Civil Liberties Committee. When the Communist Party itself is under fire these fronts offer a bulwark of protection.'
(Internal Security Subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee, Handbook for Americans, S. Doc. 117, April 23, 1956, p. 91.)"

"The New York Times", a New York City daily newspaper, in its April 1, 1968, issue, page 13, contained an item captioned, "Draft Dissenters to Get More Help", which related that at a news conference held by the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (ECLC) on the previous day, it was announced that the organization was changing its name to the National Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (NECLC) "to reflect our determination to develop a vital national civil liberties organization in all 50 states as rapidly as possible."

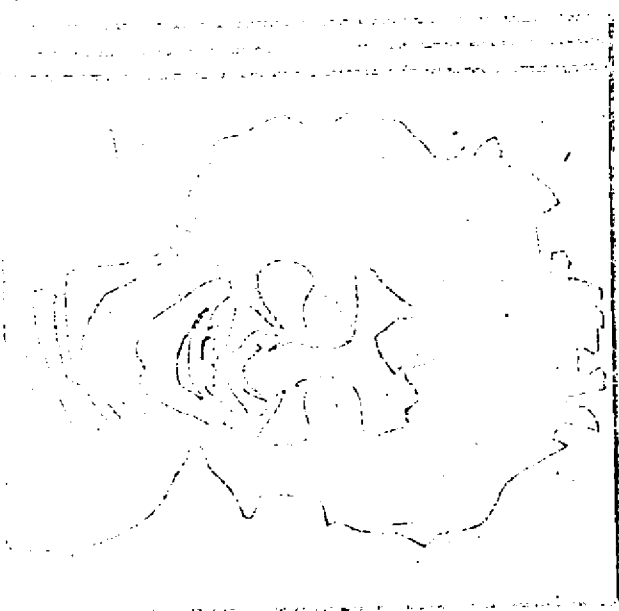
Last summer, just a few days before Congress zipped through the law making it illegal to conspire to run a pig for president in the streets of Chicago, they passed a federal law prohibiting the flag from "defacement and desecration." The maximum penalty is one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine. (The only other country to have just passed a similar law is Norway.)

The law is not the only national symbol to be protected. Previous laws of the Protection to Smokey the Bear, the G-11 club's sovereignty, and the Statue of Liberty, for example, anyone who "defaces a fac-simile of Smokey the Bear is subject to a \$250 fine and six months in jail."

The arrest (for wearing a flag shirt) at the HUAC hearings last October was the first arrest under the Federal Law. At the trial I was found guilty and given a 30 day sentence which is just coming up for appeal. A transcript of the trial can be found in the November, 1956 issue of the Realist.

There the law is so vague that it would make Uncle Sam, drum major, and emeralds who sport red, white, and blue hats and ties semantically is relatively unimportant to the federal government. They have adopted Code-22 as their motto which states, if you remember, "you can't anybody in jail who we don't like no matter what the fuck his constitution says" and "lets appeared really in front of numerous courts. Edward Bremer, a President of Virginia Commonwealth University was sentenced to a year in jail for wearing a flag vest. Wearing the same type vest, a 16 year old person Guy Vining, Alexandria, Virginia, was arrested and "banned from the city of Alexandria until the day of his death." Guy did not respect a student at Pennsylvania State College in Lancaster, Pa. about College in Lancaster, Pa.

The government is so anxious to protect its symbols and its symbols as to be willing to go to any lengths to do so. In the past few months, District of Columbia Court of Appeals, has everyone who wears a flag shirt or dress gets arrested, just as not even someone who smokes pot goes to jail. The flag design is a current modification among the rich. As for criminals and "lets appeared really in the New York Times, Los Angeles Times and the San Francisco Examiner, to name a few. Physics Diller was arrested on TV in a hat with stars and stripes and wearing a briefcase. In flag shirts (for what reason?) flag shirts, flag ties, flag pants, flag shirts, flag dresses, flag pants, and there is a rumor that a flag duplet is on the way.

Review of *Revolution for The Hell of It*, by Abbie Hoffman

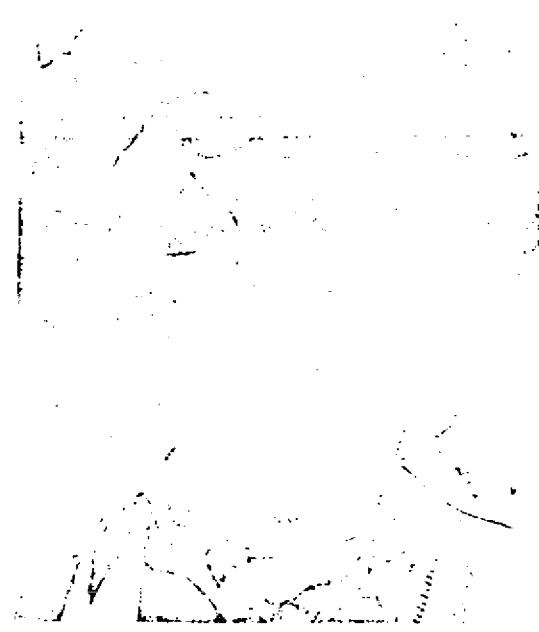
Abbie Hoffman—psychologist turned SNCC field worker turned movement entrepreneur (Liberty House) turned hippie/digger/yippie/acid head—first surfaced in the peace movement in the spring of 1967 as an apostle of—of all things—Flower Power. "Watch out America," Abbie warned—after his flower brigade was stomped upon by beer-bellied legionnaires, longshoremen and teamsters after it had infiltrated New York City's "Support Our Boys" parade with garlands of flowers and appropriate signs—"Plans are being made to mine the East River with daffodils. Dandelion chains are being wrapped around induction centers. Holes are being dug in street pavements and seeds dropped in and covered. The cry of 'Flower Power' echoes throughout the land. We shall not wilt."

Revolution for the Hell of It begins with flowers and ends on the blood-bathed streets of Mayor Daley's Chicago. The dandelion chain scheme never materialized. But so what. The book is filled with information about other landmark events, events that are unprecedented in the histories of revolution. Besides the ill-fated flower brigade, there is the throwing away of dollar bills at the N.Y. Stock Exchange, the attempt by the diggers to freak out S.D.S., the exorcism of the Pentagon, the creation of the Free Store, the Grand Central Yip-In, the Central Park Yip-Out, and finally the Yippee celebration of life in Chicago, about which Abbie devotes about one-third of the book. Also included in its entirety is "Fuck the System," the now classic guide to living free in New York City, which alone is worth the price of the book if you're fool enough to pay for it.

Revolution for the Hell of It, as the title implies, is unlike any previous book written about revolutionary movements, tactics or strategy. For one thing, it is funny; enough so to completely turn off those on the left for whom revolution is no laughing matter and who haven't yet come to realize that Marx had two brothers, three if you want to count Zeppo. In the Ideological Derby, the contest to decide who has THE CORRECT LINE, Abbie is left at the starter's gate. Like Dancer's Image, he is

probably stoned. But Abbie's humor is deceptive. Side by side with the fun and games, the ego-tripping, the fantasies and the bullshit, of which there is plenty, are some of the most creative and brilliant insights into how to make a meaningful (as opposed to rhetorical) revolution in an affluent society. Insights, incidentally, that Abbie states come from Marcuse, McLuhan, psychologist Abe Maslow, as well as Chico, Harpo, Groucho and Karl Marx.

Abbie Hoffman was one of the first people on the left to realize that the hippies, flower children and dropouts panhandling on St. Marks Place are, as much as the blacks, what the revolution is all about. And, he understood, too, that the Second American Revolution is a cultural revolution, as much as or

more than a political one. Young whites, after all, are oppressed more by boredom than they are by poverty or potential powerlessness. Boredom is their condition of life, it represents their present as well as their future.

Abbie put into a political and activist context what Tim Leary was preaching and The Beatles were singing. "Drop out, drop out, everybody drop out." Revolution is not an ideology or a series of positions one takes on specific issues. It is existential, it is now, it is the way you live your life, not tomorrow after the revolution, but today as if it were already here. How to give such a revolution momentum, prevent it from being coopted, transform it into a viable political movement? "You build a better system," Abbie told an SDS gathering in June 1967. "Assume America is already dead, dead for those kids who are flocking to the Lower East Side and Haight-Ashbury, and give them a new, positive, authentic frame of reference. If it's done effectively they won't go back."

Talk about life-style and alternatives has become commonplace in the Movement, but in the spring of '67, when the Movement was short-haired and straight, it was pretty heady stuff. The leadership was out of touch with developments in the Haight and in other new-age communities. Pot was thought of as leading young people into frivolity, out of the Movement. In discussing the Movement one spoke of "Trots" and about getting hundreds of thousands of respectable looking people to march down Fifth Avenue so that the news would cover the parade. After all, were you going to convince President Johnson to stop the bombing if you were not well known? It was possible to contribute to the cost of a full-page ad in the *Sunday Times*. Allen Ginsberg was turning on a few of the younger New Leftists, Jerry Rubin for instance; but most Movement people looked down upon the growing hippie thing with disgust, embarrassment, or with confidence that it was an irrelevant and passing phase.

As for Abbie Hoffman, the stalwarts on the left considered him to be insufficiently ideological and moralistic. Abbie, of course, was pleased to accept both criticisms. He was never into left-wing sloganeering. "America is racist, America is imperialistic . . .," Abbie writes, "Bah-Bah-Bah-Bah-Bah-Bah-Bah-Bah-Bah. Sheep taking the moralistic people on the left spend most of their time telling each other 'Bah' like that." As for the moral imperative, speaking in terms of the "demands of conscience," Abbie says, "I think fun and leisure are great. I don't like the concept of a movement built on sacrifice, dedication, responsibility, anger, frustration and guilt. All those

your creativity, then get out of school, quit your job. Come on and help build and defend the society you want."

No wonder the traditionalists of the Old and New Left put Abbie down. They are talking about children being napalmed in Vietnam. Abbie is talking of getting laid. The most convincing parts of *Revolution for the Hell of It* deal with communications and the media. Abbie observes that a 30-second spot commercial is more effective in conveying a message than the news reports it pays for. What good is it to tell people that children are being killed in an illegal, immoral and unjust war in Vietnam when they see it being done every night on TV right in their living rooms—and are not moved by it.

The traditional left, with its position papers, slogans, leaflets, ideological nitpicking, etc., still functions in an age of reason under the liberal assumption that there exists a free and open market place for ideas. They operate solely in a political context without any concern for the psychological and technological forces that have a far greater influence on the public mind than has politics. A basic premise of Abbie Hoffman, as well as other media-orientated activists in the Movement, is that the great majority of Americans are no longer susceptible to education. Scared, defensive, uptight, their computerized minds programmed to reject anything but the comfortable *status quo*, they are no longer susceptible to a political alternative, no matter how clearly articulated. How then to reach these people? Open them up to new ideas? Instead of facts, use "monkey warfare," Abbie says. Use myth and theatre. Juggle their symbols, blow their minds, cause confusion, chaos, "A Perfect Mess." Create, vicariously, a new order that demands new information, because the old data won't do, won't reflect the reality which they see but don't want to accept. Abbie describes his monkey warfare as one part Andy Warhol (because Warhol understands the media) and one part Fidel Castro (because Castro has a passion for social change). In a tolerant society, Abbie says, use Warhol as a model. In a repressive society, use Castro. In the United States, blend the two for best results.

The exorcism of the Pentagon and the littering of the Stock Exchange floor are the two most successful attempts at Monkey Warfare. The Yippee Celebration of Life was planned on a much more ambitious scale. Its deterioration into an inevitable confrontation with the police represents the dilemma which Abbie has not successfully resolved. From its inception, Yippee suffered from schizophrenia: a vision of a celebration and manifestation of an alternative life-style (a very real concern of Abbie's which, regrettably, is underplayed in the book) as against a confrontation with the police as a means of stopping the Democratic Party of its public relations respectability and showing it

confrontation. The line between the two, however, was never hard and clear. Abbie thinks that the entire week in Chicago was a great success. He

claims that despite the confrontation, Jerry feels it failed. Nonetheless, the two serve as adequate symbols of the differences within Yippee. Not surprisingly, they feuded most of the week in

"Ours might prove to be the greatest debate at this point in the movement," Abbie writes with characteristic exaggeration. "Jerry wants to show the clenched fist. I want to show the clenched fist and the smile. He wants a gun. I want the gun and the flower." This is a key debate within the Movement and I'm sorry Abbie doesn't take it seriously. What the gun can do, but we've hardly explored the possibilities of the flower and the smile. The Pentagon spends billions of dollars each year on research. But what does it know about the possibilities of a?

The Yippies, the Yippies, the Yippies that is a due and is often denied them by more narrowly political members of the Left. But it also obscures the problem, which becomes evident if one reverses the order of the sentence: Side by side with the creative insights are the ego-tripping, the fantasies and the bullshit—which in the end get in the way of making a revolution.

The truth is that the Yippies are essentially comics—in the glorious tradition of comics who have sharpened people's insights into the hypocrisy and pretentiousness of established values and institutions. But they do not offer a way out of the present society, with its organized selfishness and cruelty, its centers of military, economic and political power. Their role is essentially preparatory. Despite their talk about creating a counter-culture, they have not done so. Consequently their revolution is largely rhetorical, like the sloganeering of the Left which they correctly criticize. They have failed to create a counter-culture that leads out of the present moras because they have failed to create a way of life that synthesizes freedom and responsibility, satisfaction and sacrifice, individual fulfillment and social solidarity.

This failure is not surprising, since no other group in this country has done so either. But like the others the Yippies must be seen as representing an

early, flave stage of rebelliousness, not a revolutionary way of life that exemplifies the true values of free men. And to the extent that they boast of their irresponsibility—and worse live up to it—they don't even help set our faces in the right direction.

Jezer is accurate as a reporter but fails us as a social critic when he writes approvingly: "Abbie says—I don't like the concept of a movement built on sacrifice, dedication, responsibility, anger, frustration and guilt.... It is Yippie adventurism to suggest that there is any way of getting rid of the repressive institutions of this society without immense sacrifice, dedication and responsibility. It is a non sequitur to imply that a movement characterized by these qualities has to be caught up in sexual frustration and guilt. We may have to cope with the political frustration of not being able to put an end to the napalming of children, but certainly not the frustration of not getting laid. To suggest that in order to get laid you have to become a Yippie—and stop thinking about the children in Vietnam, to boot—is on par with the ads that imply you can't get laid unless you buy the right cigarette, perfume or wardrobe. The Yippie's culture turns out to be distressingly like the mirror-image of the culture he thought he was rejecting—and it doesn't

the commodity culture by Yippies and politicians alike rests only partly on the fraudulence of the commodities it provides; it rests as well on the frustrations of a way of life which concentrates on one's own satisfactions without noticing that children are being napalmed in Vietnam, bitten by rats on the other side of town, and dying of malnutrition in Georgia and Venezuela.

The Yippie finds himself caught in a similar dilemma in other areas as well. Work is rejected because it has been prostituted in our 9 to 5 culture in which most people either hate their work or should hate it, because of the authoritarian context in which it takes place and the irrelevant or socially destructive purposes for which it is organized. But purposeful work is a necessary part of all human fulfillment, so a culture based on idleness and drugs soon becomes as boring as the culture it sought to replace. Besides, there are thousands of tasks to be performed, not to perpetuate the old order but to build the new one, and no way to perform them except through hard work. The Media are condemned for their dishonest advertising, but time and again Yippies will make spectacular statements that bring discredit on the movement or confuse their own followers in order to advertise themselves through a headline or a spot on the news. Where the pitch is an obvious put-on or put-down is one thing, (such as the announcement that they were going to levy the Pentagon) but others have gotten kids who took them seriously into unnecessary trouble they weren't prepared for.

It is important to recognize that Hoffman, Rubin and Jezer are all better than their rhetoric. They do occasionally, with concern for the victims of our society—not just the castrated straight men of their comedy routines but the blacks, the Vietnamese etc. Moreover, they do not just expose repressive institutions and point fitfully in the direction of a creative free society and a responsible human community. But like the society they are too often victims of their consequences—other people of the things they say or do.

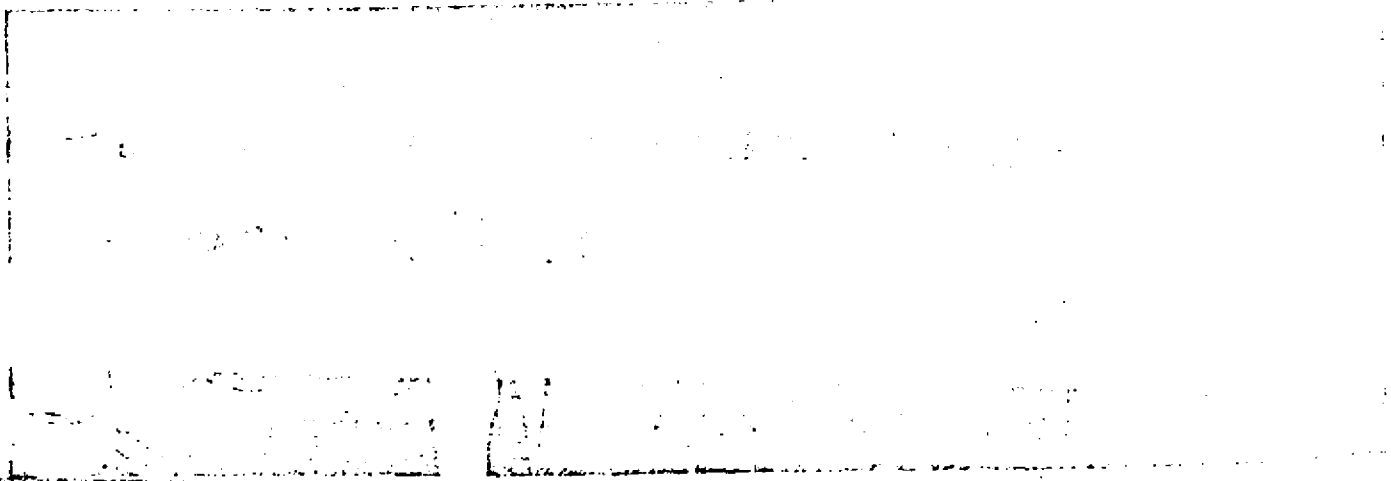
