DEMANDED \$10,000

LOS ANGELES, Calif.—A  
crippled man who held in jail his  
wife's mother and checked her  
clothes and diary of nude pictures  
was released yesterday from Alcatraz  
Prison.

John W. McPherson, 35, of Valencia,  
Calif., was held at Alcatraz since he and his  
wife, Mrs. John W. McPherson, 32, were  
arrested last week on suspicion of mail  
theft by Robert E. Harry, suspect  
in the kidnapping of Charles J. Gandy.

McPherson was held by  
FBI agents in the continued  
dispute over the completeness  
of the investigation of the  
kidnapping. The man was held  
as a friend. Yesterday he  
was released on the condition that he would not be  
away during the next four months.

## Ex-convict gives up in San Diego

Federal agents today were conducting a far-reaching search for an asserted accomplice of Valentine McGaghie, Canadian, lame little former Canadian Royal Air Force mechanic and ex-convict, who last night admitted sending a \$10,000 extortion note to the sprightly Alfred Semple McPherson, Angelus Temple pastor.

The note, one of five he allegedly mailed the Four Square Gospel leader, demanded the money or else of "burning her career" by publishing secreted photographs of Mrs. McPherson and a friend in the nude.

Meanwhile, Max White was released in a compromise, charging misuse of the mail, which was signed today by Federal Commissioner George R. Price of San Diego. He was accused of a burglary attempt, resulting from his asserted intention of a burglary to San Diego eight months ago.

Mr. White, hospitalized here the San Diego police station, a 10-story office building, the past two weeks, has been reported to be recovering from the collapse of the only other five notes he said he had mailed.

"I've just had to admit I'm guilty," White said when asked if he had written the San Diego authorities to admit it. "The need of writing the letter to answer my letters so I had to give myself up."

Later, under questioning by the federal agents, he added his confession to the fact he is Harry Kresser, described on a Los Angeles business page.

He disclosed no new information yesterday, but said he had given himself up to other persons with whom he had confided his intention to kidnap McPherson, his wife, and their son, and to burn down the church.

White, 34, was born in Canada and had been a member of the Communist Party for 10 years. He was sentenced to 10 years in prison for mail robbery in 1937.

The federal officials said they believe White will be held without bail until he can be arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Charles H. Morris, 1145 West Street, in an Angelus Temple meeting room and informed where he can find friends at the temple, he said.

The note sent Mrs. McPherson was written on a plain card addressed in a letter to stay in all black and white and addressed to "Alfred Semple McPherson, 1145 Chestnut Boulevard, Los Angeles, California." It was marked "personal" and read:

"We are in need of \$10,000. Answer this request if you care to do so and we will burn your career and also the name. We'll also have quite a few pictures of you and yourself to the ends."

## ER FELD HELD FOR BLACKMAIL IN AIMEE PLOT

U.S. COMPTROLLER HELD  
FOR BLACKMAIL Charged With  
\$10,000 Extortion Attempt

Toronto (UPI)—Federal Commissioner of Narcotics Philip McAdoo was held yesterday without bail on a charge of attempting to extort \$10,000 from Arthur Ampleman, his attorney, by threatening to publish photographs of him in the possession of the now-disgraced Aimée Photographic Co.

The 42-year-old McAdoo was held at the Federal Building here with sufficient bail to cover his release.

### INTERVIEWED SPONTANEOUSLY

In Los Angeles, Calif., McAdoo was represented by attorney Robert H. Rosen, who said he had been advised by the man who gave him the \$10,000 to be held by the Canadian department of Narcotics Commissioner.


"He was a nice man," McAdoo said.

McAdoo, who surrendered voluntarily made his spontaneous confession, said that he originally wanted to name Harry Rosenthal, and told him that he had photographs of the photographic firm, according to McAdoo. One is Rosenthal, but he was being sought here and elsewhere to find a safe place to live. The photographs were to show that he was a participant of the plot to blackmail the two Canadian men involved.

### MAILED LETTER

Besides the Federal charges, McAdoo was charged in State Court as a burglary suspect because identified, according to police, as having a gun, cartridges and a pistol. His preliminary hearing in the burglary case will not start until the trial date will be disposed of before the criminal charges are presented, officials said.

Although he refused to make any admissions before the State Court, he said he had received bug and voice control equipment, attorney's fees, an expense account and what was turned over to Federal agents to cover the costs of his defense, which totalled \$10,000. That figure does not include his attorney's office, his legal expenses and his living expenses.



## Threat to Blast Angelus Temple Received in Mail

A NOTORIOUS ex-convict was held in San Diego last night after he was reported to have conferred somehow with letters through the mail to Almon McPherson, pastor of Angelus Temple, threatening to circulate photographs of the evangelist and another person in the nude.

The alleged extortionist, who demanded that \$10,000 be sent by parcel post to San Diego, is Valentine McAuliffe, who federal officials say once served a prison term for murder in Pennsylvania.

The extortion plot was exposed after McAuliffe walked into a San Diego police station on a pair of scratches.

"I tried to shake Almon McPherson down for ten grand," McAuliffe was quoted as telling a Los Angeles sergeant. "I'm tired waiting for him to answer my letters so I want to give myself up."

At the Angelus Temple services last night Mrs. McPherson displayed a copy of a note received by parcel from San Diego, 12, 1944.

"Almon we are in need of \$10,000. I know this request if you come to see we will beat your colors and shut the temple doors. We have made a few photos of a woman and yourself to be used."

The note carried a postscript threatening Mrs. McPherson to send the money by parcel post to "Jack the Ripper," covered treasury, San Diego.

"I receive many letters every day," the evangelist declared. "This one was phoned to me by my secretary. I didn't pay much attention to it, but when I read it I thought it sounded strange." (Continued on page 12)

McPherson has been the target of gangsters since his conversion to Christianity, he said, and he has been threatened many times.

Federal authorities in San Diego are preparing to file charges against McAuliffe. They said McAuliffe was serving a life sentence in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas.

McAuliffe made a statement to San Diego investigators who planned to see him again to assist a trial in connection with a robbery.

"Things were getting bad and my god told me to go to God," McAuliffe said. "He told me he would give me a chance. I know he's hard to get along with."

McAuliffe, who began his career as an underworld character, argues that McAuliffe's companion has had the same career. "He was never a good man," he says.

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Friday, April 13.—A San Francisco newspaperman was held in jail yesterday morning after he threatened to publish a purported story of a "nude picture" of Mrs. Charles H. Smith, actress Aimee McLaughlin.

Carrying the name of "Wheeler Phillips," San Francisco, and describing himself as a "secret photo advertising expert," the man, who identified himself as Harry Shulman, threatened to expose Mrs. Smith's nude picture unless the publisher, Publishers' Weekly, paid him \$10,000.

Miss McLaughlin, 31, left for New York yesterday to attend a production meeting of the International Federation of Dramatic Critics in New York City. She was to speak at a conference on "Contemporary American Drama."

The money was demanded as payment for a secret of publishing his planned new publication, "Wheeler Phillips' Photo Advertising," which he said he had written in New York. He also threatened to publish a "nude picture" of Miss McLaughlin unless the money was paid him directly or to the intended recipient, the International Federation of Dramatic Critics, in New York.

John C. McGuire, police chief, said he had no record of the man in mind of publishing nude pictures. He said the man had been held in jail since 10 a.m. and would be released later.






MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Reference is made to teletype of the Los Angeles division to the Bureau dated January 7, 1937, advising of the rec'dt at Los Angeles by Willard Andrews, attorney for the victim, of a letter postmarked Peekskill, New York, December 30, 1936, which indicated that the writer of the letter, Dolly M. Christian, had overheard two men plotting to kidnap Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson and because of the fact that these two men had learned that the Christian woman over-heard their conversation she felt that it was necessary for her to employ a bodyguard, for which reason she was asking Mr. Andrews to furnish her with \$3000.00.

Attached hereto, in triplicate, are copies of the letter to Mr. Andrews referred to above, as well as copies of an enclosure received with it, and the envelope in which it was mailed, as well as the envelope in which the Christian woman expected Mr. Andrews to reply to the same.

(2) As you were advised by teletype, the facts in this letter were presented to Mr. Wm. Fleet Palmer, Assistant U. S. Attorney, by Special Agent John Whitson of this division on the morning of January 8, 1937, at which time Mr. Palmer advised that there was not involved in the sending of this letter a violation of the Extortion Statute but Mr. Palmer stated that there was possibly involved in it a violation of using the United States Mail to defraud, and he suggested that the letter be delivered to the Postal Inspectors in Los Angeles for investigation. In view of the circumstances in this case, this procedure was followed, Special Agent Whitson delivering the letter in a cellophane envelope to Mr. C. E. Webster, Post Office Inspector, Federal Building, Los Angeles, who at that time was informed of Mr. Palmer's opinion and suggestions. Mr. Andrews, the complainant in this instance, was likewise advised by Special Agent Whitson. You were advised of this action in a telegram from the Los Angeles division dated January 8, 1937, and Mr. Tamm, on an occasion when I was engaged in a telephone conversation with him on the afternoon of January 8, was likewise advised of the action that it was contemplated would be taken. He at that time indicated the Bureau's approval of this action.



I am much worried over an approaching tragedy



"Dr. A. M. Foote," the bell in the "muckpottery ring" really could blare! is his title to Aimee. Several paragraphs said:

"I write to you, as you have understanding. Rhoda has equal understanding, but she does not have your bladders. Miss Wong can help us find the people who tortured this boy and we can get to Hearst the information we have.

"I want you to come down to my room at 2:30 p. m. and disguise your appearance. I have a role in the movie for you and I want Dr. Mackay in a part of Aaron and again as John, the Baptist.

"When you converse with me, you will have it revealed to you that I am Jones, a much-worn Jew, but I have for ages assumed man's burdens and feel no greater joy than you do."



"I needed cash to pay down on a new car," Underwood said. The armed woman explained she was booked on suspicion of extortion on Mrs. Lillian Strommen. The note was signed "Mrs. E. Aimes" but carried Mrs. Strommen's Chicago address, the officer asserted.

When first questioned, Detective Underwood said she denied any knowledge of a Mrs. Aimes and had stated there was no ink in the house similar to the violet ink used on the extortion note.

A search disclosed a bottle of ink, identification cards and identification cards and envelopes to A. Strommen, Underwood asserted. After her handiwork was checked, Underwood said, the woman identified herself, Wilson.

The note saluted Sister Aimes as "My Dear Heater and Other of All Good Oaths" and added:

"I have a bill that must be paid and no means except you, and I am sure to save yourself and see you will send it by return mail.

"No delay, as you are in great danger of the black hand. I have had a vision that you are the only one that can help me, so please send me \$250. Keep these promises and you will be blessed and prosperous. Beware for you will fail."


The second letter sent Mrs. McPherson was signed "A. M. Peels" and apparently was written by a weird unknown who has been sought by investigators since Tuesday.

Notes bearing this signature and asking \$2,000 to avert a threat of harm were received this week by Anna May Wong, Chinese actress, and Mrs. David O. Selznick, wife of the film producer.

Detectives said they were unable to track or identify the author of A. M. Peels, retired Los Angeles chiropractor. He received a letter signed "The Gang." It ordered him "to act as intermediary for the extortionists."

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Ross called me from Los Angeles at this time and said that he had just received a call from the Los Angeles Examiner to the effect that a man named Hart had surrendered at the office of the Examiner, stating that he had sent a letter through the mails to Aimee Semple McPherson demanding \$10,000 on threat of death. Mr. Ross stated that Mrs. McPherson did receive such a letter today, postmarked last night at 7 P. M., and that the Los Angeles Examiner wanted the Los Angeles Bureau Office to come get Hart, they apparently not notifying the Police or anyone else. Mr. Ross stated that last Saturday, Hart, who is a one-legged man, gave himself up to the United States Marshal, who sent Hart to the Los Angeles Bureau Office. At that time Hart told a story that he had sent a threatening letter to Mrs. McPherson threatening to publish a photograph of her in the nude if she did not give him so much money. However, at that time a check with Mrs. McPherson indicated that no such letter had been received by her, and as the Post Office Inspectors did not desire to take any action Hart was not held. Mr. Ross asked what action should be taken in this matter.

I told Mr. Ross to get Hart from the newspaper office and also get the letter from Mrs. McPherson, after which the entire facts should be presented to the United States Attorney.

## Cripple Confesses Sending \$10,000 Demand to Aimee

Charged with using the mails in an attempt to extort \$10,000 from Evangelist Aimee Semple McPherson, son, on a threat of "death in your home," James E. Hart, 28, cripple of 347 South Los Angeles street, yesterday surrendered to Federal agents and was jailed. It was the second time within a week a would-be extortionist surrendered before a threatening letter had reached its intended victim. The first note was sent to Postmistress Mary D. Briggs and threatened death unless \$10,000 were paid to the sender. James Winthrop, former convict, was indicted by the Federal Grand Jury on charge of using the mails to extort, and was being returned to the County jail at about the same time Hart was being booked at the jail on a similar complaint.

Both Winthrop, who walked into a police station before Mrs. Briggs had received his note, and Hart, who similarly surrendered before Mrs. McPherson had received the one sent her, claimed they had given themselves up rather than face relentless pursuit by Federal authorities.

Hart said he had "tried to bluff Aimee into sending the money," but that he had not intended to harm her. Winthrop, following his arrest, said he wanted to "make the jailer pay" as he couldn't get along on the outside.

"No use or not," a Federal agent declared, "we can't let them follow get away with it. If they want to make prison, we'll accommodate them."

The Federal Grand Jury will consider Hart's case next Wednesday, while Winthrop is scheduled for arraignment in Federal Court next Monday.



his office an individual named HART who had confessed to writing and mailing an extortion letter to AIMEE SEMPLE MC PHERSON on February 7, 1938.

Agent and Special Agent F. W. Stone took subject HART into custody at the Los Angeles Examiner Office on February 8, 1938, and brought him to the bureau office for questioning. It is here noted that on February 5, 1938, subject HART came into the Los Angeles Bureau Office and was interviewed by Special Agent W. P. Morin, whose memorandum in connection with this interview follows:

JAMES E. HART, 347 South Los Angeles St., Los Angeles, California, came into this office today and stated that he wanted to give himself up to the Federal authorities; that he had sent an extortion letter to Aimee Semple McPherson on Tuesday, February 1, 1938, in which letter he threatened to publish a photograph of Aimee Semple McPherson in the nude if she didn't place \$100,000. in an old shoe box by Saturday night, February 5, 1938. HART stated that he decided not to go through with his scheme and stated that he knew that the Federal officials would get him if he did; that he decided to give himself up and save the Government a lot of time. As this did not come within the purview of this Bureau and came within the jurisdiction of the Post Office Department, Inspector E. D. Chance of the Post Office Department was contacted telephonically and advised of the above facts. Inspector Chance stated that he would get in contact with MRS. MC PHERSON to ascertain if she had received such a letter as HART stated he had sent to her. Inspector Chance telephonically communicated with this Agent and advised that he had spoken to MRS. MC PHERSON'S secretary who advised him that no such letter had been received; that if one had been received, it would have been transmitted to the proper authorities. In view of these facts, Inspector Chance advised that his department would not want to hold HART. HART'S address and description was given to Chance. HART stated that he had lived around Los Angeles for about nine years.

JAMES E. HART was fingerprinted by Special Agent W. P. Morin and these prints are being forwarded to the bureau. In view of the fact that HART was suffering from arthritis, it was difficult to obtain a good set of prints. The following is a description of JAMES E. HART as observed by Agent Morin:

Upon interview with HART on February 8, 1938, he furnished  
signed statement concerning his having written the extortion letter  
on January 7, 1938, which is set out as follows:

"I, James E. Hart, freely and voluntarily make the  
following statement to A. R. Miller, Special Agent Federal Bureau of  
Investigation U. S. Dept. of Justice without any threats or promises  
being made to me. I am 33 years of age, single & for the past year  
have lived at 347 South Los Angeles St. L. A. The only gainful occupa-  
tion I have is peddling pencils on the streets as I lost my right leg  
in 1922. I have been in California steadily since 1930. The only  
criminal record I have is being arrested for drunkenness.

"On Feb. 1st 1938 I wrote & mailed a letter to Aimee Semple McPherson demanding \$100,000 & threatening to publish a nude picture of Aimee McPherson if she did not give up. I did not have any such photograph. I wrote this letter at my hotel room & mailed the same at a mail box at 101 Main St. on February 2nd. I decided to give myself up to the Government for doing this & called at the office of Mr. E. P. Morris on Saturday Feb. 5 - 1938 where I talked to Special Agent E. P. Morris & was released, & being told it was not a violation over which the Federal Bureau of Investigation had jurisdiction.

"On February 7th I wrote another letter to Aimee Semple McPherson, demanding \$10,000.00 & threatening death if she did not comply with the request contained in it. I have since shown this letter by Special Agent Miller & state that it is the very same letter & wrote and mailed to Aimee McPherson on Monday February 7th 1938. I am troubled with arthritis & rheumatism & have not been able to secure the proper treatment & decided to shoot for something big, not caring about the consequences. It was my intention at the time I wrote & mailed this second letter to carry on out the threats.

"On thinking the matter over, however on Tuesday February 8th 1938 I decided I could not get away with it so decided to turn myself in to the authorities. I called at the office of the Los Angeles Examiner about 2:30 or 3 P.M. on Feb. 8 - 1938 & told Mr. Lewis there what I had done & stated I wanted to give myself up to the proper authorities. I am willing to plead guilty to this offense & get it over with.

"The paper on which I wrote these letters is regular note book paper & I used a small plain white envelope. The name Chas King I used was fictitious name I made up. I have other similar stationery & envelopes in my room No 7 - at the Mission Annex Motel.

"I have read this statement consisting of 2 pages written in long hand and the same is true & correct to my best knowledge & belief.

On February 9, 1938, Agent called at the residence of [REDACTED] which is the Edison Annex Hotel, 347 South Los Angeles. [REDACTED] was admitted to the room of subject by the proprietor, [REDACTED]. In a drawer of a small table in room 7, Agent secured an envelope similar to the envelope used in the original extortion letter, and from a small notebook, secured three samples of the notebook paper which seems to be identical with that used in the original extortion letter. It is noted that the first of these sample sheets clearly bears the imprint of the original extortion letter, it being possible to read the extortion letter by holding the sample sheet at a certain angle to the light. This sample sheet has been initialed by Special Agent Miller, and is being forwarded to the Technical Laboratory for comparison.

Subject was fingerprinted and his prints have been forwarded to the Bureau.

On February 9, 1938, Agent interviewed DR. GILLES K. [REDACTED] at the Angelus Temple, who stated that the extortion letter had not been handled by any of the employees at the Angelus Temple, but that a metal letter opener was used; consequently, no employees at the Temple were fingerprinted. DR. KIGHT furnished the following description of the victim, ALICE SEMPLE MC PHERSON.

Specimen Q1 is a plain white envelope addressed in pencil. The envelope measures approximately 3 $\frac{1}{2}$  by 6 $\frac{1}{2}$  inches and contains no watermark. This envelope is similar to envelopes submitted and designated as II and IV.

Specimen Q2 is handwritten in pencil on a sheet of notebook paper from a "spiral" notebook, having two rounded corners on the right-hand edge and forty-three 1/16-inch holes at the left edge for binding. The paper is ruled with nineteen blue-green lines starting approximately 1.1 inches from the top of the page and spaced an average distance of .375 inches apart. The paper contains no watermark, measures approximately 7 by 8 $\frac{1}{2}$  inches and has a substance number of approximately 12. This paper is identical to the paper submitted and designated as II and IV. On specimen Q2 are found indentations of the writing of specimens IV. On specimen IV are found indentations of the writing of both Q2 and IV.

The material submitted was treated for the development of latent fingerprints but none of value was found.

The handwriting contained on this extortion letter and envelope will be compared with that contained in the anonymous letter file in the Laboratory and if any identification is made you will be further advised. A photographic copy of this handwriting will be placed in the anonymous letter file.

A comparison of the known handwriting of James E. Hart with the handwriting contained on Q1, Q2 and IV has resulted in the conclusion that these were written by James E. Hart.



James E. Hart, a cripple, who wrote a letter to Almeda Remple McFarren, demanding \$10,000 under threat of death, yesterday was indicted by a Federal grand jury, on a charge of extortion. After writing the letter Hart voluntarily surrendered to the police and was turned over to Federal Bureau of Investigation agents. He said he had no intention of harming the evangelist, but thought he might bluff her into paying the money. Then out of conscience began blackmailing her, he said, and he surrendered. Hart's bail was fixed at \$30,000 and arraignment set for 23 today.

## DETAILS:

Incident of Case

Under date of September 1, 1927, a letter was received from United States Attorney, S. A. McHabb, Los Angeles, advising that he had received a letter from Rear Admiral J. G. Johnson, U.S.N., Commandant of the eleventh Naval District, San Diego, California, calling attention to a photograph which shows subject and certain members of her religious congregation attired in uniforms which very closely resembled that of the uniform worn by the officers and men of the United States Navy.

Mrs. Alice Sample Anderson, the subject of this investigation, is the leader of a religious organization known as the International Institute of Fourquare Evangelism with headquarters at the Angelus Temple, 1100 Glendale Boulevard, Los Angeles. Recent press dispatches contained information to the effect that subject was reorganizing her congregation somewhat along naval lines; that she was to be known as the admiral, and that her several subordinates were to be regarded as lieutenants, first mates, gods, etc.; that the lighthouse was to be the insignia of the organization.

Agent conferred with Agent in Charge Frank J. Blane and United States Attorney S. T. McNabb prior to beginning this investigation and was instructed to proceed to Angelus Temple and observe whether or not subject or any of her followers were in fact using uniforms noticeably similar to those of the United States Navy.

Agent attended religious services at said temple on the evenings of September 7th, 9th, 13th and 14th, but no evidence was obtained indicating that subject or any of her members were using uniforms bearing the insignia or emblems of the Navy or uniforms closely resembling the uniforms prescribed for officers or men of the United States Navy.

Agent again conferred with United States Attorney McNabb, and it was suggested by him to interview subject or her secretary and ascertain what plans they had in mind relative to their future prescribed uniform.

Agent subsequently interviewed Miss Waldron, secretary to subject, at the Angelus Temple, and was informed by her that she and subject were at present reorganizing their forces; that they had planned to do so along naval lines; that they would use the lighthouse as the insignia of the organization; that they intended to regard subject as being the Admiral of her "crew", and that her subordinates were to bear other commonly known terms such as Commander, Ensign, gobs, etc. She stated that to date no one in the organization had purchased a uniform because of the fact that it had not been definitely decided just what uniforms were to be used.

She explained further that when the press learned about their proposed plans of reorganization, which at the Angelus Temple and requested a photograph of subject and some of her followers in naval uniforms similar to those they had in mind using. Miss Waldron states that arrangements were then made to rent a few uniforms which were later put on by subject and some of her followers, and said parties posed for a photograph for the local press. She states, however, that these uniforms were immediately returned and have not been used since that date. Miss Waldron was then requested to furnish a list of the type of uniforms to be used by subject and her followers.

Under date of October 5th the following letter was received from Harriet A. Jordan, Dean of the International Institute of Foursquare Evangelism:

"We are herewith enclosing a description of the uniforms planned for the members of the Foursquare Gospel Lighthouses. As you will see, the whole plan of the uniforms and insignias have no real bearing upon those of the Navy, but are made up in character by our own workers and ministers.

"The uniforms of the Sunday School children of the Foursquare Gospel Lighthouses, known as the Jack Tars and Torettes, will be the ordinary civilian middy worn by school children."

"The boys, up to the age of twelve years, will wear the plain sailor suit. The sailor suits and middies can be purchased from any department store but the Foursquare Gospel Lighthouse children will have the lighthouse insignia made on the sleeve to identify them with this church."

"The girls, from twelve years old and adults, will wear the regular Angelus Temple uniform with the square collar and the insignia of the life-belt with the figure four in the corner."

"The young men and adults will wear a blue serge, double breasted suit which is the stock suit of wholesale clothing stores. On these blue suits will be plain buttons and on the sleeves will be the Foursquare Lighthouse insignia embroidered which is composed of a lighthouse built upon a rock and a cross embroidered in the Bible which rests upon the rock."

"To show in which department the worker is serving, such emblem as for the Basic Department, a harp; for the Sunday school teachers, an open Bible with the figure four; and for the Bible students an open Bible with the figure four with bars above to indicate the seniority."

"The crusaders will have an emblem upon their sleeve of the shield and the open Bible. The general leadership of the church will have the lighthouse emblem on the sleeve."

"All men under the organization will wear what is commonly known as a yachting cap with the Foursquare Lighthouse insignia embroidered on the front."

"The girls and women of the Bible School will wear a blue sailor hat with black band with the letters L.I.P.E. embroidered, standing for Lighthouse of International Foursquare Evangelism and from the center of the cap will fall a black silk cassie hanging almost to the shoulder on the left side."

"We appreciate very much your interest and would be glad at any time to have your council and advise if there is anything in this description that would infringe upon the rights and dignity of the Navy."

Dear President Coolidge:-

I know you are a very busy man but there is a matter which I believe has a community of interest that lays heavy on my heart and for weeks I have felt I should write you about the matter. I have never met this party but she is, and from early life has been, a friend and acquaintance of some of my friends. I refer to Mrs. Amie Semple McPherson of Los Angeles, California. It certainly seems to me that her case is a frame up by the enemies of the cause of Christ and that the procedure is that of tyranny and a pointed challenge pitted against the tenets of the christian religion and the fundamental principles of our government. Is it seeking too much if I ask you to take immediate steps to see that a fair and impartial hearing is given her, and that the government of the United States takes immediate steps to unearth this plot and to apprehend all who are connected with the kidnapping, abducting into Mexico and further persecuting of this woman who has been a marvel of the century as a christian evangelist turning thousands from the paths of sin to those of virtue, fearlessly holding up the blood stained banner of the Lord Jesus Christ. Again I ask you that this woman who is a mother of a family, a citizen of the United States, and one who has served time as a foreign missionary, where her young husband laid down his life, and one who has accomplished wonders as an evangelist from Canada to Florida and from coast to coast, one who is now the pastor of a large church and the head of a Bible school be accorded a fair hearing in the courts; that her abduction and persecution be unearthed and that if it is necessary the American army be put in a position to defend the dignity of the stars and striped and the sacred laws of God which have ever consecrated the constitution and flag of our nation.




