Please permit me to congratulate you on your recent capture of public "rats". You have shown the criminal world that they cannot get away with it.

Before National Prohibition, the iron hand of the Federal Government was feared and respected. The general public felt like the negro who was being arraigned in a Federal District Court. After the clerk had finished reading the indictment and asked the accused whether he pled guilty or not guilty, the negro said; "Boss, please read that fust part over again." Whereupon the clerk read, "United States vs. Jim Johnson." Thereupon the negro said: "If de whole United States is agin me, I pleads guilty."

During National Prohibition days, the bootleggers aided by the mass of prosecution and the indifference of the jurors, brought the Federal Courts into disrepect and contempt. Haw violators dearned in that they could violate the Federal law and escape punishment.

I thought that it would take a generation before the Federal prosecutions would be regarded with the fear and respect which they formerly held, but by your splendid work you have not only brought this about within a few years, but the campaign of the Department of Justice for law enforcement has awakened the whole body of citizenry of the United States to the necessity of the enforcement of the criminal laws, with the result that the criminals in the State Courts are being tried before jurors alert to enforce the State laws.

When I was in Washington a couple of years ago, I had a personal conversation with General Cummings, in which he discussed his plans for going after crooked criminal lawyers. The Department of Justice has been doing this, but there is a lot more work that should be done in that quarter. Any criminal lawyer who in his defense of criminal causes said criminal to materially alter or change the mature of his

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defense previously duly stated to competent legal authorities, should be prosecuted for subornation of perjury. Of course, the said lawyer would have the right to amplify and introduce proof to support the defense already stated by the prisoner, but the crooked criminal lawyer who coaches the defendant is as much an enemy to society as the criminal and should be handled. Having been prosecuting attorney for eight years and having handled three thousand indictments a year, I know that the criminal lawyers will consider this suggestion revolutionary, but I had in mind that some official like a public defender could be appointe whose duty it would be to take the statement of the prisoner before he was allowed to see a private lawyer, and the prisoner would be required to state his defenses to the said official. In case the prisoner refused to state his defenses, the record would show that fact, and a jury trying the case would naturally conclude that the defenses had been cooked up by the lawyer.

Please pardon me for transgressing on your valuable time, but I am keenly interested in the record that you are making and wanted to let you know that I felt you had added something to the safety of every man, woman, and child in the United States. I am an old friend of Colonel Bo& Gates. I beg to remain

Kidnaping Doesn't Pay

Kidnaping was made a federal offense in June, 1932, and that made the crime the business of Department of Justice agents. Now that the last man wanted for a major part in a kidnaping has been arrested, it becomes interesting to check the record of accomplishment during the last four years.

A total of 63 kidnaping cases has been reported and 173 persons have been convicted. Some 29 are serving life sentences and a total of 2,028 years has been imposed on other members of kidnap gangs. Four kidnapers died before they came to trial and two others were lynched by outraged private citizens. Five kidnapers have been killed while resisting arrest and six were murdered by other gangsters. There are about 20 kidnapers waiting trial.

An interesting and encouraging phase of the manner in which the Department of Justice has handled the cases lies in the number of kidnapers who have pleaded guilty and accepted long prison sentences rather than face the evidence ready to be produced against them. Within the week two men of this type have pleaded guilty. One of them took a life sentence and the other a term of 60 years. In a word, the G-men have been certain as well as persistent and inexorable. In a great majority of cases they have worked rapidly, too, as far as that goes.

In order to have a complete picture of should be kept in mind that the G-men have not rested with hunting down, arresting and convicting the so-called Big Shots of the kidnaping organizations. They have also pursued these cases on down to all those who aided and abetted the major perpetrators. They have sought out crooked lawyers, crooked surgeons, receivers of stolen goods, the dealers in stolen cars, the rooming house keepers who knowingly harbored kidnapers, and all and sundry who played any conscious part in either the crimes themselves or the efforts of the criminals to escape.

It amounts to a job devastating in its thoroughness and supplies what seems to be an entirely conclusive proof that kidnaping does not pay. EECORDET: RCH: BG 62-43010-52

#### ANOTHER GANGSTER SETBACK

With the capture in New Orleans the other day of Alvin Karpis, erstwhile No. 1 bad man on the list of the federal bureau of investigation, Uncle Sam's G-men have once more demonstrated the relentlessness with which they pursue their hunt for these characters whose actions make them fit subjects for the bureau's action.

It's been nearly three years now since the kidnaping of William Hamm, Jr., at St. Paul, one of the crimes in which Karpis is accused of having had a hand. Meantime the search has continued with other crimes since in which Karpis is suspected of being simplicated adding to the intensity of the chase.

Karpis has had the laugh on his pursuers at least once during the chase when he evaded a trap set for him by shooting his way of of an Atlantic City hotel. But now, it appears, the last laugh is on the side of law and order.

Just as the federal agents, through their relentless pursuit, finally crushed the Dillinger group of gansters, so it appears, they have put an appreciable crimp in the Barker-Karpis gang.

That it's bound to be a losing game which Karpis and his type play is indicated by the score as it stands thus far in the Hamm kidnaping case.

of the participants in that case, Karpis' arrest brings to four the total now in custody and facing charges. Three others have already been sent to the penitentiary and two met death while evading arrest. Of the notorious Barkers, Arthur is in Alcatraz, the "escape proof" prison; Fred Barker and "Ma" Barker are dead.

Attempts at plastic surgery, by which he sought to alter his appearance and disfigure his fingerprints availed Karpis nothing. As did his companions before him, he fell into the net spread for him, as he must have known he must eventually.

It's significant too, that his boastfulness was missing — his attitude of superiority to the long arm of the law missing — his ego deflated when the federal agents swooped down upon him.

It is likewise significant, in view of some

hief of the federal bureau of investigation hat the capture of Karpis was accomplished without a shot being fired. It will be recalled that there was some recent sniping at the bureau chief back in Washington not so long ago, because of the fact that occasionally some fatalities result when federal agents close in on men they seek. Mr. Hoover noted then that the agents, while armed, are instructed to fire only in self-defense. He seems to have proved the truth of his statements in New Orleans.

a few weeks ago of three other suspects in the Hamm abduction, the taking of Karpis represents a distinct triumph for the aw enforcement agencies of the land.

The fate of Karpis now rests with the courts. Whatever, it is, his career stands as another warning to kidnapers and the like that they "can't get away with it."

William Mahan, linked to the Weyerhacuser abduction, now that Karpis is taken, moves to the No. 1 position among the nation's wanted men. It's a promotion of doubtful distinction and one which isn't calculated to bring increased peace of mind to Mahan. It will be the hope of many that the good work of the federal agents will continue to be fruitful that there may be similar promotions as the respective No. badmen graduate into prison cells.

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### WIPING OFF THE SLATE

Less than two weeks ago, the capture of Alvin Karpis by the federal department of justice agents in New Orleans was announced by J. Edgar Hoover, head of the department.

At that time it was here noted that the elimination of the No. 1 bad man of the nation from the list of such characters sought by the agents boded no great consolation for the other ranking characters upon the G-men's slate of wanted.

Subsequent developments have proved the correctness of that assumption in rather less time than was anticipated, even though announcements at the time were to the effect that the chase for some of the others was being pursued relentlessly and with air chances of success.

Altogether the roundup during the past couple of weeks has been impressive—sufficent to convince even the most skeptical that the G-men bear a resemblance to Canada's widely famed Royal Northwest Mounted police force when it comes to getting their man.

The ink was hardly dry upon the papers which carried the word of Karpis' arrest before Harry Campbell, Karpis gang associate, had been taken in another bloodless raid, led by Mr. Hoover.

Within a few days came the capture of William Mahan, last remaining fugitive of a gang involved in a west coast kidnaping. Then, just by way of proving that all this was no stroke of luck, Thomas H. Robinson, Jr., the last remaining major kidnaper still at large, was taken.

The events which followed the capture of these offenders have likewise been encouraging.

\*Karpis awaits arraignment at St. Paul, with assurance given by authorities that they have built up an air-tight case around him.

Campbell, upon a plea of guilty, has drawn a sentence of life imprisonment. Mahan, who likewise admitted his guilt, has been sent to prison for 60 years. The penalties meted out to these two seem sufficient to insure that society will be safe from their depredations for years to come.

Four smashing blows have been dealt to the kidnaping racket. The slate, as far as major offenders is concerned, has been wiped clean.

There still remain those minor characters who, by their conniving and assistance, have enabled the four now in custody or under sentence, to evade arrest for as long as they lid. The record thus far indicates that their night be in for some troublesome times be lore long.







### The G' Way for Lynchers

J. Edgar Hoover's G-Men are entitled to all the credit they are getting. And they are getting it in full measure. For, when results are forthcoming, the public is not niggardly with its appreciation.

With the arrest and confession of that elusive female impersonator, Thomas H. Robinson Jr., the G-Men have completed the round-up of kid-napers. For the first time since passage of the Lindbergh Law, which made kidnaping for ransom a federal offense, there are no known or alleged kidnapers at large.

Here is the record of four years of intense and intelligent activity of the G-Men: 63 kidnaping cases cleared up; 146 convictions; 20 more prisoners in custody awaiting trial; prison sentences totaling 2028 years; 29 life sentences; 4 death sentences.

of course it is possible that the slate which is clean today may not look so good next week. New bands of kidnapers may spring up. A new wave of kidnaping may sweep the country, striking terror into the hearts of parents. That may happen, but we don't expect it. We don't, because Mr. Hoover's G-Men have put terror in the reverse; they have brought into the picture that most effective of all crime deterrents—fear of certain punishment.

All we have said here concerns the rime of kidnaping for ransom a dime with which state and local police proved themselves utterly incapable to cope. So Congress made it a federal crime. The record is proof of the effectiveness of federal police action—of the superiority of an intelligently directed and mobile force of law enforcers, unhampered by state lines, unhindered by local political influences.

Kidnaping for ransom became a federal crime because of the default of local enforcement. There are other crimes which local law officers apparently are unable or unwilling to curtail.

One, in particular, is the crime of

lynching.
There hasn't been a new case of kidnaping for months. Why? Because of that fear of certain punishment.

But there have been at least a half dozin cases of mob murder in recent weeks. Why? Because of confidence that munishment would not result.

# he Gangster "Doesn't —— Live Here Anymore"

IVE years ago it appeared as if gangland and the racketeers had taken the nation. Several major cities were in complete control of the gangsters and the only serious threat to any gangster group was that offered by some rival group. Kidnapping ran rampant; hijacking was the fashion: racketeers collected "protection" money without any pretense of secrecy; and "being taken for a ride" was an everyday news story. The nation was twice treated to the spectacle of a gangster king's funeral that equalled the last rites of a nobleman. If peace officials became too inquisitive they were "bumped off; if newspapers became too emphatic, a bomb or two through the windows was the consequence. Five years ago gangland was running wild.

Then a young fellow named J. Edgar Hoover was sent in to head the Department of Justice. Gangland scoffed at him; some openly challenged him to meet them face to face. The country demanded an organization the equal of Scotland Yard of England or the Mounted Police of Canada. But the young head of the Department of Justice went quietly to work organizing his force. Today no detective force in the world can equal it. No similar organization anywhere has made the record that J. Edgar Hoover's men have created in so short a time.

Today not a gangster of reputation is alive of living outside prison walls. During the last five years every boasting racketeer and gangland chief has turned yellow; has turned and run like a hunted animal until cornered somewhere by Hoover's men. The list of names would fill this column—but Mahan, Karpis and Campbell, complete the roster. The old spirit of bravado has disappeared; Karpis trembled like a coward when Hoover stood face to face with this murderer. No mercy was shown; those who made the

Blightest suspicious move—like Baby Face Nelson, Dillinger and others, were mercilessly mowed down. No longer is America the gangster's paradise; no longer are its citizens intimidated by them.

Once again Americans have their self-respectand "law and order" is not an idle phrase.





Capture of the Hamm kidnapers brings out in detail the story of how the G-Men found the prison of another kidnap victim. Bremer, through his memory of sounds. 

#### THE FEDERAL WAY.

THERE is another big lesson for the country in general and for State law enforcement in particular, we think, in the highly efficient, clean-cut, non-fumbling way J. Edgar Hoover and his federal G-men dealt with Alvin Karpis under the federal kidnaper law.

No games of tag with justice across State lines. No jurisdictional tangles. Nothing to halt the swift conveyance of Karpis from New Orleans to the custody of the federal authorities in St. Paul.

No \$1,000-a-day costs, as in the case of getting "Lucky" Luciano back from Hot Springs, Ark., to New York County.

No local clumsiness or unseemly publicity stunts, as when the late John Dillinger was photographed in the encircling arm of a smirking prosecuting attorney at the Crown Point, Ind., jail, from which the desperado shortly after ascaped.

No nonsense of any sort.

When Mr. Hoover points to politicians and their hand-picked appointees as the bane of law enforcement, when he says, "Politics itself is Public Enemy No. 1," he obviously has in mind what too often happens in State criminal jurisdictions. There's sharp meaning and contrast in his statement:—

bure more than 5,000 persons annually charged with various federal violations. It is difficult to rate them. To us they are all 'rats.'

Why not give the people of these United States even greater benefits from this cold, quick, non-political federal efficiency in dealing with criminals who become public enemies?

For example, why not extend federal law to bring into federal jurisdiction any man convicted anywhere of three major felonies who is fleeing across State lines to escape trial for a fourth?

That would be a speedier remedy than getting slow-moving States to adopt uniform extradition laws. Far speedier than cutting what Mr. Hoover describes as "the links of the underworld to politics and at times to law enforcement officials."

Few States at the present time can afford to cappise federal aid and federal expertness of the tind shown in more captures that that of Karpis. Certainly not this State.

From little crimes he went to bigger ones, encouraged by paroles and suspended sentences and all kinds of police inefficiency and court leniency. The climax of his career was a kidnapping, the end of his trail is a prison and an "airtight" case which may keep him there a long time or send may keep him there a long time or send

him to the chair for murder.

Karpis belonged in jail a long time ago, where he could not menace the peace and safety of society. He has been captured at last, and will probably be convicted by the untiring efforts of an organization which has no illusions about criminals. Most of them are dangerous, many of them are incurable. Their effences can be checked by fear of capoffenses can be checked by fear of cap-ture and certainty of punishment. This is the theory of Mr. J. Edgar Hoover and his G men, and its soundness is proved by the record.



Curtains for Kidnapers

Arrest of Thomas H. Robinson Jr., charged with kidnaping and holding for ransom Mrs. Alice Stoll, of Louisville, clears up the list of such cases that have engaged the attention of the Bureau of Investiga-

We cannot say there will be no more kidnapings, but the menace which was really terrifying two or three years ago has been largely dispelled.

Gangsters and individual criminals took up kidnaping as a means of getting large sums of money quickly. Now most of them are behind prison bars for life or very long terms. Some are dead.

"The "snatch racket" is wiped out. The risks have been made too great for the man who stops to think what he is doing, and kidnaping is a carefully planned crime in most instances.

So too, with the notorious gunmen, most of whom are now dead.

State and local police authorities aided in dealing with many of these cases. But the decisive factor, the one which has turned the scale against the criminal, was the introduction of an agency not hampered by state lines and ready to keep men on the trail of major offenders until they were caught.

This factor of persistence has been perhaps the most important of all, though the members of the Bureau of Investigation are carefully selected and ably directed.

This work has been expensive and yet, in the long run, it will prove cheap, because it has so notably reduced the types of crimes with which the bureau deals

crimes with which the bureau deals.

And it means something when small boys, in their games, want to be G men, not gangsters or gunmen.

gangsters or gunmen.

Eliminating crime is a big problem. It values social and economic questions, as well as those of law enforcement.

In coping directly with criminals, it is to be hoped the example set by the federal men will hasten interstate co-operation, help do away with that ridiculous figure, the untrained county aheriff, and spur resolves to keep politics out of the police field. Roch. Democrat Growels.

Who is Public Enemy No. 1? May 14/16.

John Dillinger once enjoyed that sobriquet; then it fell to Baby Face Nelson. Still later Alvin Karpis was so designated. But J. Edgar Hoover, chief G-man, doesn't share that view. "Old Man Politics," he retorted when asked about it in New York the other day. "He is now, he was and he always will be Public Enemy Number One, locally, in the states and nationally."

There is something for the American people to ponder in this statement. And there have been recent evidences of its truth. Witness the almost successful attempts of politically prominent attorneys in Arkansas to prevent the extradition of the accused head of a gigantic New York city vice racket. Witness the necessity of a special prosecutor, a special grand jury and a specially designated judge to meet New York city's vice situation. Witness the scandalous implications of the Wendel kidnaping episode of the Lindbergh kidnaping investigation. Witness the charge of a responsible Rochester citizen that fixing was holding back the enforcement of the law in serious traffic cases in Rochester.

The G-men have shown the people of the country what non-political law enforcement means. Mr. Dewey and his special aids in New York city are doing the same thing. When the American people take Mr. Hoover's remark seriously; when state and local police and prosecuting agencies generally can be permitted to move as they will, without having some "higher-up" hold their punches, we shall be getting somewhere in law enforcement, but not before.






