SAC TURYN related that he just received a telephone call at home from BILL LANDER, Supervisor, Washington Field, concerning the captioned individual. THIS CASE IS TO BE HANDLED WITH ABSOLUTE DISCRETION AT THE DIRECTION OF ASSISTANT TO THE DIRECTOR DELOACH.

ANNA CHAN CHENNAULT is the wife of the former famous General CLAIRE CHENNAULT of Flying Tiger and Chinese Theatre of Operations during World War II fame. She is allegedly one of the principal fund raisers for the Republican presidential nominee RICHARD NIXON and has been subject to considerable discretion ~~additional~~ coverage.

Washington Field had been instructed by Mr. DELOACH to determine what her activities were and identify the individuals with whom she had been in contact. 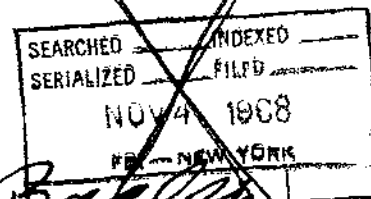

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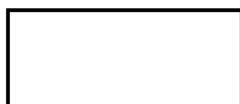

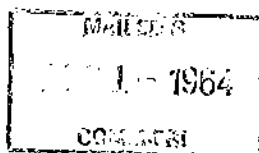

Although Mao-tse-tung and the Kremlin leaders may quarrel among themselves, the Washington correspondent for the Hsin' Cheng Daily News warned against such optimism as thinking they would fail to present a solid front against the West.

"The Chinese Communists will continue to cause trouble for us in Asia and the Soviets elsewhere," she predicted. "They are both part of a carefully planned strategy for world conquest."

The speaker also advised the United States to stop telling the Communists what we are going to do. "They don't tell us," she argued, "and they do take advantage of our hesitation and indecision."

Mme. Chennault assured her audience that South Viet Nam does not want Communist control, "but if we move out today, the Communists will move in tomorrow," because the South Vietnamese will be powerless to stop them.

She also recommended that military forces from other Asian nations who have indicated a willingness to fight Communism be allowed to join our own in a common defense for democratic principles.

"It is high time for America to start thinking of herself," she said. Don't try to please everyone in the dangerous game of dealing with Communism. The world is full of fear and trouble, but it is not empty of hope. We must be brave enough to face the challenge of tomorrow."

Birthday Dinner To Aid Refugees

Arthur Godfrey will act as emcee for the Chinese Refugee Relief "First Birthday" dinner and reception scheduled for May 22 at the outdoor terrace of the Shoreham Hotel.

The group was organized last year with the approval of President Kennedy, helps refugees who have escaped from Communist China.

Chennault's husband founded the "Flying Tigers," a group of American airmen who flew for Chiang Kai-shek in China before World War II.

The Agriculture Department report said that while information from China was scarce, it appeared that Peking had given priority to food imports over industrial imports.

"No figures have been published on the performance of agriculture for 1961," the report said, "and none are available for the individual grain crops since 1958. Such statistics are usually released in annual reports presented to the National Peoples Congress. This year, the congress met on April 16, but once again no agriculture data were released."

"There was, however, a press communique which, when viewed in the light of other events, tends to substantiate the view that there has been a major change in national policy toward agriculture as a result of the present critical food shortages."

The report was prepared by David H. Spaeth, an analyst for the Economic Research Service of the Agriculture Department.

An estimated 60,000 hungry Chinese refugees streamed into the British colony last month, but all but about 10,000 were rounded up and forced back across the border. President Kennedy disclosed that what officials later said would be 5000 to 6000 refugees are to be admitted to the United States as an emergency measure. They are not among the flood of escapees last month, but rather are skilled Chinese who have been investigated and processed and were waiting to enter under the annual 105-man United States quota.

Mrs. Chennault said after her meeting with Mr. Kennedy that the President "seemed very interested in this problem." She said the public would be asked to contribute to the organization to feed, clothe and resettle the refugees now in Hong Kong. She said Chinese refugee relief would accept contributions at once "Care of Postmaster, Washington, 13, D. C."

Morale Tonic for Chinese?

Mrs. Claire L. Chennault, Chinese-born widow of the commander of the "Flying Tigers," expressed the opinion last night that Communist China launched its attack on India in an effort to boost the morale of the Chinese people.

With the failure of various efforts to organize production, the leaders of Red China needed a war that was big enough to build up the morale of the people but not large enough actually to endanger China, Mrs. Chennault speculated.

Korea Avoided

To have renewed the war in Korea would have meant a direct confrontation with the United States, and probably was ruled out on that ground, she said.

Mrs. Chennault spoke at a dinner meeting of the League of Republican Women's Evening Political Study Group at the Lafayette Hotel. Miss Catherine D. Scott, director of the group, presided.

During a recent visit to Taiwan and Hong Kong, Mrs. Chennault said she interviewed a number of refugees from Red China. They told her not only of shortages of food, but of their despair at the way communism is destroying freedom of thinking, freedom of communication "and above all, human trust and the dignity of man," she reported.

The Chinese refugees are looking to the Western world for their hopes for the future

and "these are people who choose to be on our side," she said.

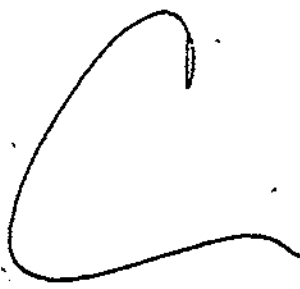
As leaders of the free world, she declared, "we can't stand strong and free unless other nations stand strong and free with us."

and John Jay, who asked that his name be withheld. "Some of us are trying to get \$500 a week. Our companies don't pick up these credit ratings without violating the Credit Practices Act. We have to get our money 'back' by taking it out of petty cash or charging on our expense accounts."

Some parties are spectacular, held in the full glare of the public spotlight, . . . those President Kennedy attended for Sen. Warren Magnuson (D-Wash.) in Seattle, and George Smathers (D-Fla.) in Miami. These brought in a reported \$350,000 apiece.

But most are cozy affairs, kept strictly on the Q. T. Nothing is done in writing, no invitations, no tickets—just quiet phone calls. The parties are handled in a Joe-sent-me atmosphere.

Final Costs

Usually, handy blank checks are provided for those who want a record of their generosity. But most lobbyists, particularly those who represent the big corporations, prefer to hand out crisp \$50 and \$100 bills.

Big business lobbyists often help arrange the parties for Republicans, such as the quiet affair thrown for Sen. Richard Caperton (R-Ind.) recently at Washington's Army-Navy Club.

Sometimes, a fat \$100-a-head is asked from those on the "good" list. But there has been such a surplus of parties lately that Chris Long, primary victor in a recent Louisiana congressional race, was obliged to hold a discount party and reduce the asking price from \$100 to \$75 a head.

Still, as one dis-trusted lobbyist put it: "Congressmen look upon these cocktail parties as the greatest invention since Santa Claus."

Articles for Refugees

Based upon information filtering through the bamboo curtain, Chinese Refugee Relief has warned Congress to brace for a "mass stampede" of Chinese refugees who may have to be turned back by bullets from overwhelming Hong Kong.

"Authorities familiar with the danger have acknowledged candidly but privately that the British may be forced to shoot to hold back the human tide," a report to the Senate Refugees Subcommittee declares grimly.

"Famine and floods in the highlands of the north, and drought in the rice paddies of the south are now threatening the wretched Chinese masses with their fourth hungry year in a row," the N.Y. Herald Tribune said, but cynicism that

the last, thanks to his "hot" personality, an infusion of "hot" ideas and ideas. "Cultural" and "social" ideas have become almost unbecomingly even for a people renowned for their stoic acceptance of hardship.

"Isolated stories of beatings, of suicides to escape slow starvation, of children wolfpacks roaming the countryside for food, even of cannibalism have been brought out of Red China by the refugees," the report adds.

The relief group contends that the food level, now fixed at 1200 calories for the average person, only slightly higher for manual laborers, has been pushed below the subsistence level.

The ominous result may be a dam burst of refugees streaming out of Red China, a mass exodus touched off by the dangerously hungry millions who have been "loose" from the cities to forage for food as best they can in the impoverished countryside.

NOTE—To prepare for this threatening crisis and to aid the hungry refugees who have already escaped Red China, the relief people are meeting with top Government officials to discuss how the United States can help. Such contributions may be made to the Chinese Refugee Care of the Postmaster, Washington 25, D. C.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee:

My name is Mrs. Anna Chennault. I am the widow of Lt. General Claire Lee Chennault who led the Flying Tigers and the U. S. 14th Air Force in the Pacific Theatre during World War II. I am a citizen of the United States.

For the last 20 years I have worked as a journalist, writer and lecturer. I am the President of the General Claire Lee Chennault Foundation. The purpose of this Foundation is to help Asian students from the Free Nations to have a better understanding and knowledge of America. I am also the President of the Chinese Refugee Relief, a private organization formed with the approval of the late President Kennedy to help Chinese refugees escaping from Red China.

At the end of the second World War my late husband, General Chennault, returned to China to form a commercial airline to help war-torn China establish much needed air communication to carry out projects of relief and rehabilitation. I worked closely with my husband in Asia until his death in 1958. The airline, Civil Air Transport, which he organized is still operating in the Far East and Southeast Asia and I keep up my connections with many of the free Asian countries and their peoples.

Although my home and office are in Washington, I am required to take trips to Asia to keep myself informed. I have only last month returned from a trip to the Far East and Southeast Asia. It was my third trip in the last 12 months. Within that period I have visited Vietnam, Thailand, the

Philippines, Korea, Malaysia, Hong Kong, Nationalist China, Japan and other countries. *I have interviewed directly the heads of state of Vietnam, the Philippines, Taiwan and Korea.*

At the invitation of Chairman Zablocki, I offer this report to the Committee on the situation in Asia as a whole as I see it and the problems and challenges for every American to face today and tomorrow. The sacrifices we make today, we make for the safety of our children's tomorrow.

The tomorrow of the Free World is being determined in Asia today. What my husband vainly predicted 10 years ago is now recognized everywhere -- we will never be through putting out brush fires on the periphery until we have brought under control the central fire in China. Our real trouble is not in Hanoi and Haifong, but in Peking. During my tours in the Far East and Southeast Asia I had the impression that Red China is not only threatening all Asia with a physical hydrogen bomb, but also with a spiritual A-bomb -- a racial conflict and an anti-American atmosphere. She is laboring mightily to create an "Asia for the Asian" attitude. Its proliferation and manipulation creates riots, demonstrations, strikes, murder, fear and suspicion. Red China's tactic is to isolate the advanced countries by brutal terroristic conquest of underdeveloped areas, while holding America away from defending these countries by unreasoning fear of touching off our ~~A~~^{China's} bombs until ~~her~~ own are ready.

Until this last year, we have watched almost mesmerized while Chinese Communist imperialism -- a Chinese enemy where we threw away a once Chinese friend -- spread its influence throughout Asia, Latin America and Africa.

What the Western alliance seriously needs at this critical time is a practical policy for dealing with the Red Chinese in a period of great transition in world affairs. What is most impressive about the so-called great debate we have been treated to lately is that the music goes around and around and comes out nowhere. There is a cry to "communicate" while admittedly there is no way to communicate -- not even an available language concept while as Dean Rusk says the Chinese always hang up the phone. There is a cry to negotiate unconditionally without answering the practical questions "with whom, when, where and over what?" There is a pacifistic urge to throw ourselves on the mercy of the Chinese Communists to be decent like us in some indefinite future. At the same time every knowledgeable expert admits that for the practical future

of the Chinese Communists'
the domestic political needs not only of Mao's generation but their successors require the threat of war by the West as a cement to hold their authoritarian regime together.

The practical answer is to keep friends believing we are their friends and make them strong for their value as our friends, rather than pretend to hope to convert enemies.

We must also remember that many nations in Asia right now are not ready for our kind of democracy, our kind of participation in self government. Self-determination of people can be practiced only in a land of plenty, and plenty depends on order and security. The important thing for us to do is to have on our side governments which with order and security can hold their nations together.

As I listen to the preachments of appeasing Communist China, I could only think with all respect to the purity of their motives of Shelley's "ineffectual angel fluttering in the void its luminous wings in vain." The men who know that Vietnam is Munich and that yielding is Gotterdammerung are the practical men with their feet on the ground.

The people in Asia today have to prefer first things first.

The first thing first they need is order and protection to keep the communist power out.

The second thing they need first is production of food for a better standard of living.

The third thing first they need is education to be able to take advantage of technology to learn about the outside world and provide for democracy when they are not racked by disease and lacking of energy because of malnutrition.

When they have accomplished certain knowledge of self-government we can talk about freedom and democracy and about individual and political freedom which presupposed all those first three essentials. With Red Chinese imperialism rampant, frothing at the mouth and waving its new bomb what all Asian countries need is not participation in a political party, but an effective and responsible government which can protect the country from its enemies and maintain peace and stabilization within so that the first things first can be achieved.

In a country like South Vietnam the urgent problems are nationalism and livelihood, problems hard for us even to understand because we take them for granted. Military victory and the security that comes from it is the foundation of economical and political stability out of which nationalism and livelihood can rise. Our hesitation to use military power to achieve these minimum political objectives at critical times is what has tolerated and even created the new communist power in Asia which we at last recognize.

I am always amazed at Americans demanding what we call democracy in Vietnam as the price of our help on these fundamental needs in what has now become the keystone of all Asia. I assume the sincerity of these democratic demands at the same time I know that practically they are a form of aid and comfort to the enemy.

The so-called intellectuals who put forward these demands are intellectuals who somehow forgot to learn that democracy in the first instance has to be a result of security even though later on democracy is a ^{guaranty of} security of neighbors just as totalitarianism is the guarantee of ~~the~~ insecurity ^{for} neighbors. They forgot also that there is no such thing as democracy as we define it not only in Asia but anywhere else in the world outside of Great Britain -- not even in dictated France. They forget also that even in the United States when our security is threatened we have a practical totalitarianism in the power we give the President as commander-in-chief. ^R The one all important fact about all of Asia in the psychotic state of Chinese communism today is the insecurity of everyone else.

Today South Vietnam is the proving ground on the one hand of the success of the communist desire for world domination and on the other of our capacity to begin to bring to what is left of independence in Asia a military security upon which our own future security is based.

As I have said the sacrifices we are making today are to purchase our own tomorrows. For in a world in which you can reach Saigon by air in one day the outcome of this struggle in Vietnam will decide the fate not only of Asia but of the United States. Not without reason Red China regards the United States as her chief enemy because as President Johnson said, we are guardians of the gate because there is no one else. If once we withdrew from Asia all the non-communists would feel the impact, even Australia which by her participation in the South Vietnam war clearly indicates the immediacy of her concern. Whether the Chinese communist regime will succeed in its nuclear blackmail against the world every Asian knows depends on the effectiveness of the United States nuclear umbrella over them. Even Asian neutralism is possible only so long as the United States and whatever allies we have are willing to bear a portion of the burden of the defense of Asian freedom.

To an Asian these simple truths are clear as crystal. For that reason the degree to which they will struggle in their own behalf is dependent upon their confidence that we see the truth as clearly as they see it. They know that there is no surer way to invite aggression than to succumb to philosophical discussion about unrealities. This is the way centuries ago the Christian world lost Constantinople. The Asians understandably are puzzled by the kind of talk they hear in the American Congress and the kind of exhibitions they see on the American streets at the same time our fighting men are performing with such bravery and competence in war. If they could be sure which represents our true conviction we would be having an easier time in Asia today. From the possibly simple

mindful Asian point of view, once in a war and once having taken on the stakes of prestige and moral position that the United States has taken on, there is nothing for us to do but win the war and do the talking afterwards. That they could understand.

To back up a firm purpose on our part in Asia there are great assets -- assets that I have seen as I have travelled on my last three trips from Malaya to Korea. There is a passionate desire for freedom in Asian countries, a passionate desire that clearly understands that the United States is the only hope to establish a peaceful world to bring justice and freedom from now on. If they were once sure of us -- sure that we would stick it out and not leave those who take our side to the mercy of the communists if we withdraw -- we would be surprised with the resoluteness of the willingness of these people to fight for themselves.

Let us not overlook how much these people will sacrifice for a last chance at freedom. One million refugees escaping from North Vietnam to South Vietnam; four million North Koreans fleeing to South Korea; 14 thousand actual Red Chinese prisoners of war choosing to go to ^{TAIWAN} Formosa; and ~~thirty~~ two million forgotten Tibetans standing up against Red Chinese soldiers with bare hands. That is, we still have much hope in Asia if Asia dares to hope consistently in us. In a continent which technology passed by and which has never known peace since the colonial powers came to it 150 years ago it will take concrete achievement by the United States to capitalize on this hope.

As I have said before, freedom and democracy in a nation is essential for the security of its neighbors. In this world we are now all neighbors. It is in the interest of our own security -- our own tomorrows -- to see that the world is finally organized as a mutual respecting federation of free peoples rather than through the ruthless domination of master states enslaving others.

Considering also the resources of Asia it is critically important to the future security of our children that Asia develops our way rather than the Chinese communist way. Not only our security but our affluence and our own standard of living depend upon the world's being organized on a peaceful basis. To the Chinese communist with nothing to lose there is everything to gain in keeping Asia disorganized and on a war basis except on the terms of accepting communist domination.

In this struggle for an organized peace there are battles we simply cannot avoid because they are thrust upon us. The more critical of these now is to prevent the Chinese communists from organizing the rich and vast land mass of Southeast Asia under their totalitarian whip and then turn their organized slave power against us and the other free people of the world as they did in Mainland China.

It is the geography of China that makes this unhappy land so desperately important to the future of Asia. China with its central position is undoubtedly the key to the Pacific. A China following the leadership of Chinese who understand and like America is a guarantee of the security of our tomorrows. But a China organized as it is today under the leadership of Chinese who hate and envy America is the surest guarantee of the insecurity of our tomorrows.

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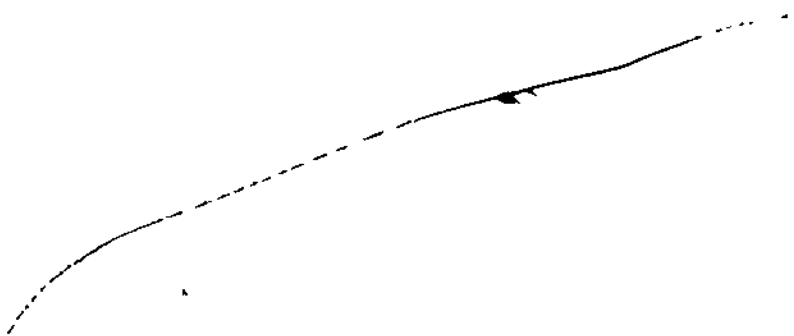

The airline, Civil Air Transport, which he organized is still operating in the Far East and southeast Asia and I keep up my connections with many of the free Asian countries and their peoples.

Although my home and office are in Washington, I am required to take trips to Asia to keep myself informed. I have, only last month, returned from a trip to the Far East and southeast Asia. It was my third trip in the last 12 months. Within that period I have visited Vietnam, Thailand, the Philippines, Korea, Malaysia, Hong Kong, Nationalist China, Japan, and other countries, and have interviewed directly the heads of states of Vietnam, the Philippines, Taiwan, and Korea.

At the invitation of Chairman Zablocki, I offer this report to the committee on the situation in Asia as a whole as I see it and the problems and challenges for every American to face today and tomorrow. The sacrifices we make today, we make for the safety of our children's tomorrow.

The tomorrow of the free world is being determined in Asia today. What my husband vainly predicted 10 years ago is now recognized everywhere—we will never be through putting out brush fires on the periphery until we have brought under control the central fire in China. Our real trouble is not in Hanoi and Haiphong, but in Peking. During my tours in the Far East and southeast Asia I had the impression that Red China is not only threatening all Asia with a physical hydrogen bomb, but also with a spiritual A bomb—a racial conflict and an anti-American atmosphere. She is laboring mightily to create an "Asia for the Asian" attitude. Its proliferation and manipulation creates riots, demonstrations, strikes, murder, fear, and suspicion. Red China's tactic is to isolate the advanced countries by brutal terroristic conquest of underdeveloped areas, while holding America away from defending these countries by unreasoning fear of touching off our bombs until China's own are ready.

Until this last year, we have watched almost mesmerized while Chinese Communist imperialism—a Chinese enemy where we threw away a once Chinese friend—spread its influence throughout Asia, Latin America, and Africa.

What the Western alliance seriously needs at this critical time is a practical policy for dealing with the Red Chinese in a period of great transition in world affairs. What is most impressive about the so-called great debate we have been treated to lately is that the music goes around and around and comes out nowhere. There is a cry to communicate while admittedly there is no way to communicate—not even an available language. As Secretary of State Dean Rusk said the Communist Chinese always hang up the phone. There is a cry to negotiate unconditionally without answering the practical questions—with whom, when, where, and over what? There is a pacifistic urge to throw ourselves on the mercy of the Chinese Communists to be decent like us in some indefinite future. At the

same time every knowledgeable expert admits that for the practical future the domestic political needs of the Chinese Communists, not only of Mao's generation but their successors, require the threat of war by the West as a cement to hold their authoritarian regime together.

The practical answer is to keep friends believing we are their friends and make them strong for their value as our friends, rather than pretend to hope to convert enemies.

We must also remember that many nations in Asia right now are not ready for our kind of democracy, our kind of participation in self-government. Self-determination of people can be practiced only in a land of plenty, and plenty depends on order and security. The important thing for us to do is to have on our side governments which with order and security can hold their nations together.

As I listen to the preachments of appeasing Communist China, I could only think, with all respect to the purity of their motives, of Shelly's "ineffectual angel fluttering in the void its luminous wings in vain." The men who know that Vietnam is Munich and that yielding is Gotterdammerung are the practical men with their feet on the ground.

The people in Asia today have to prefer first things first.

The first thing they need is order and protection to keep the Communist power out.

The second thing they need is an increased production of food for a better standard of living.

The third thing they need is education to be able to take advantage of technology to learn about the outside world and provide for democracy when they are not racked by disease and lacking of energy because of malnutrition.

When they have accomplished certain knowledge of self-government we can talk about freedom and democracy and about individual and political freedom which presupposed all those first three essentials. With Red Chinese imperialism rampant, frothing at the mouth and waving its new bomb, what all Asian countries need is not participation in a political party, but an effective and responsible government which can protect the country from its enemies and maintain peace and stabilization within so that the first things first can be achieved.

In a country like South Vietnam the urgent problems are nationalism and livelihood, problems hard for us even to understand because we take them for granted. Military victory and the security that comes from it is the foundation of economical and political stability, out of which nationalism and livelihood can rise. Our hesitation to use military power to achieve these minimum political objectives at critical times is what has tolerated and even created the new Communist power in Asia which we at last recognize.

I am always amazed at Americans demanding what we call democracy in Vietnam as the price of our help on these fundamental needs in what has now become the keystone of all Asia. I assume the sincerity of these democratic demands at the same time I know that practically they are a form of aid and comfort to the enemy.

The so-called intellectuals who put forward these demands are intellectuals who somehow forgot to learn that democracy in the first instance has to be a result of security even though later on democracy is a guarantee of security for neighbors just as totalitarianism is the guarantee of insecurity for neighbors. They forgot also that there is no such thing as democracy as we define it not only in Asia but anywhere else in the world outside of Great Britain—not even in dictated France. They forget also that even in the United States when our security is threatened we have a practical totalitarianism in the power we give the President as Commander in Chief.

The one all important fact about all of Asia in the psychotic state of Chinese communism today is the insecurity of everyone else.

Today South Vietnam is the proving ground on the one hand of the success of the Communist desire for world domination and on the other of our capacity to begin to bring to what is left of independence in Asia a military security upon which our own future security is based.

As I have said the sacrifices we are making today are to purchase our own tomorrows. For in a world in which you can reach Saigon by air in 1 day the outcome of this struggle in Vietnam will decide the fate not only of Asia but of the United States. Not without reason Red China regards the United States as her chief enemy because as President Johnson said, we are guardians of the gate because there is no one else. If once we withdrew from Asia all the non-Communists would feel the impact, even Australia which by her participation in the

South Vietnam war clearly indicates the immediacy of her concern. Whether the Chinese Communist regime will succeed in its nuclear blackmail against the world every Asian knows depends on the effectiveness of the United States nuclear umbrella over them. Even Asian neutralism is possible only so long as the United States and whatever allies we have are willing to bear a portion of the burden of the defense of Asian freedom.

To an Asian these simple truths are clear as crystal. For that reason the degree to which they will struggle in their own behalf is dependent upon their confidence that we see the truth as clearly as they see it. They know that there is no surer way to invite aggression than to succumb to philosophical discussion about unrealities. This is the way centuries ago the Christian world lost Constantinople. The Asians understandably are puzzled by the kind of talk they hear in the American Congress and the kind of exhibitions they see on the American streets at the same time our fighting men are performing with such bravery and competence in war. If they could be sure which represents our true conviction we would be having an easier time in Asia today. From the possibly simple-minded Asian point of view, once in a war and once having taken on the stakes of prestige and moral position that the United States has taken on, there is nothing for us to do but win the war and do the talking afterwards. That they could understand.

To back up a firm purpose on our part in Asia there are great assets—assets that I have seen as I have traveled on my last three trips from Malaya to Korea. There is a passionate desire for freedom in Asian countries, a passionate desire that clearly understands that the United States is the only hope to establish a peaceful world to bring justice and freedom from now on. If they were once sure of us—sure that we would stick it out and not leave those who take our side to the mercy of the Communists if we withdraw—we would be surprised with the resoluteness of the willingness of these people to fight for themselves.

Let us not overlook how much these people will sacrifice for a last chance at freedom; 1 million refugees escaping from North Vietnam to South Vietnam; 4 million North Koreans fleeing to South Korea; 14,000 actual Red Chinese prisoners of war choosing to go to Taiwan; and 2 million forgotten Tibetans standing up against Red Chinese soldiers with bare hands. That is, we still have much hope in Asia if Asia dares to hope consistently in us. In a continent which technology passed by and which has never known peace since the colonial powers came to it 150 years ago it will take concrete achievement by the United States to capitalize on this hope.

As I have said before, freedom and democracy in a nation is essential for the security of its neighbors. In this world we are now all neighbors. It is in the interest of our own security—our own tomorrows—to see that the world is finally organized as a mutual respecting federation of free peoples rather than through the ruthless domination of master states enslaving others.

Considering also the resources of Asia it is critically important to the future security of our children that Asia develops our way rather than the Chinese Communist way. Not only our security but our affluence and our own standard of living depend upon the world's being organized on a peaceful basis. To the Chinese Communist with nothing to lose there is everything to gain in keeping Asia disorganized and on a war basis except on the terms of accepting Communist domination.

In this struggle for an organized peace there are battles we simply cannot avoid because they are thrust upon us. The more critical of these now is to prevent the Chinese Communists from organizing the rich and vast land mass of southeast Asia under their totalitarian whip and then turn their organized slave power against us and the other free people of the world as they did in mainland China.

It is the geography of China that makes this unhappy land so desperately important to the future of Asia. China with its central position is undoubtedly the key to the Pacific. A China following the leadership of Chinese who understand and like America is a guarantee of the security of our tomorrows. But a China organized as it is today under the leadership of Communist Chinese who hate and envy America is the surest guarantee of the insecurity of our tomorrows.

THE ASIAN LEADERS

(By Anna Chennault)

During my recent trips to the Far East and southeast Asia it was my privilege to interview the four strongest and most progressive leaders of free Asia today—President Park of Korea; President Marcos of the Philippines; General Ky of

Vietnam; and President Chiang Kai-shek of free China. The first three are all young men in their early forties or even thirties; President Chiang Kai-shek has wisely provided the administrative training for men in the same age brackets who already hold important posts in the Taiwan Government.

All four men enjoy the help of beautiful, accomplished wives who have traveled and studied extensively in the West. These wives have in common a strong, articulate sense of social progress and of the need to preserve liberty by lifting the educational and living standards of the masses.

In spite of the geographical distances that separated their countries, all four of these leaders have similar backgrounds in experience. All have been soldiers at one time or other and as such have had to fight the subversive infiltration of communism within their own countries. All have a very realistic understanding of the dangers of Communist intrigue. All realize the persistence of Communist ambitions to ultimately enslave all Asia. All recognize that because of the Communist persistence there can be no letdown in the fight for freedom; no appeasement.

All four leaders told me the same thing. The No. 1 need of free Asia today is a united political front and solid core military effort of the free Asians for cooperative defense against Communist aggression. SEATO has not provided the strength and unity required. With its present membership SEATO is, at best, limited to being a sounding board and discussion table for divided viewpoints. All four leaders frankly agreed that what is needed beyond SEATO is an organization similar to NATO that can make its unified power felt both throughout Asia and in the U.N.

Ironically, the chief obstacle to such an organization at the moment is not Communist influence but Western apathy. Such an organization would require strong Western support, both psychological encouragement and physical support. During the past 18 months, Taiwan has won through to its goal of solid economic security and self-support. In 1965, President Chiang Kai-shek was able to announce that no further direct economic aid would be required. This is the kind of improvement we like to encourage. But Korea, the Philippines, and Vietnam will require extensive and understanding economic development and planning for some years. Help and advice will be particularly needed at the basic levels of land reform, creation of home industries and small farms, education, buildup of efficient government administration, and gradual suffrage for the masses and emancipation of women.

It is perhaps in the two latter categories that Western understanding is most needed. For centuries, these countries have been governed by feudal rule. In many areas, the masses are still impoverished to a point of bare survival. It will take time to build pools of young modern administrators, and time to educate peasants to assume the responsibility of suffrage and effective self-government. It is going to take even more time to lift Asia's women out of acquiescence in the subservient semislave status they have accepted in the past. The attempt to democratize these areas cannot be expected to produce results overnight. It has taken the United States, starting from its base of political freedom in British ideas, 175 years to achieve its present state of progress and liberalism.

It is a sanitary thought for those who demand super-American democracy and political tolerance in these Asian nations to remember that there is nothing even approaching Anglo-Saxon political democracy anywhere else in the world including Europe. Nations which do not have such a base need encouragement and tolerance in their valiant attempt to establish free democracies in less than a generation. Above everything, they need understanding and encouragement in their most formidable fight, that of defending freedom against Communist enslavement.

The following suggestions were given by the Asian leaders and their peoples:

1. A more united front for all free Asian countries.
2. A more active participation for all free nations on the Vietnam war.
3. For a long-range program, a more concrete and economical program to make all these countries self-efficient.
4. A psychological warfare to make these people believe we are their friends and make them strong enough to be our friends.

I. PRESIDENT CHIANG KAI-SHEK OF CHINA

The last time my late husband General Chennault met with President Chiang Kai-shek in Taiwan I was with him. It was a cold night of 1958. My husband suffering from lung cancer had come to say goodbye to his longtime friend. Presi-

dent Chiang said to my husband: "You must get well, we have work to do." Then he turned to me: "Now, you take good care of him. I look forward to seeing both of you when you return."

My husband died of cancer a few months later in the United States.

I have returned to Taipei to see President and Madame Chiang many times since General Chennault's death. I have seen Taiwan moving toward higher goal, and its success on land reform program.

Free China has learned its bitter lesson and she is now moving forward. For instance, Taiwan no longer requires foreign aid since 1965. The Taiwan economy is now secure and self-sustaining. Last year the country enjoyed a favorable trade balance of \$56 million. Manufactures are flourishing, and private American capital is being invested in various enterprises opening new economic potential.

Recent events in the Far East and southeast Asia have proved Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek to be the greatest soldier-statesman of our time on the continent of Asia. Free China today under his leadership has progressed more than any other nations in Asia who faces Communist destruction.

President Chiang is the man who has been the leader of China for almost half a century. He has seen China in her finest hour, as she fought off the challenge of foreign conquest; he has seen her in her darkest hour, as mainland China passed into Communist rule. This towering figure of Chiang Kai-shek has moved out importantly into the world stage in 1936 after the Communist's managed Sian coup d'etat when China's struggle for freedom merged with world events.

President Chiang's personality has been inseparable from the stirring events of our era. For the last 30 years before and after World War II this man has been a controversial figure, sometimes abused and misrepresented by his foes and their sympathizers and misunderstood by many of his own best wishers.

Madame Chiang has been her husband's inspiration ever since they were married in 1927.

She is a remarkable woman in our time and excellent speaker both in Chinese and English.

The ordeal was inevitable for a man whose vision was so far ahead of his time. Today, the free world appears to be catching up with him.

It is now generally recognized that President Chiang was the one soldier and statesman who as long ago as 1927 recognized the danger and objective of international communism, and took all possible measures to meet it. While the others were in the long trance of appeasement, he was never fooled.

We have seen this man against the backdrop of many situations and problems. We have seen him meet them with rare political, deep intuitive wisdom. He has been wrong, but history will record that he has been right oftener than his contemporaries.

President Chiang Kai-shek has said: "It is my earnest hope that the bitter lessons China has learned may prove instructive to countries and governments and especially those in Asia which now face the threat of communism."

It is on the island of Taiwan that President Chiang has given his tacit pledge to return to the mainland of China. In view of the increasing Communist threat to the free world, the day may not be far away when a greater number of the Asiatic nations will begin to feel the need for collective security.

Chiang Kai-shek is truly a friend of the United States. The future promises a closer drawing together of free China and America.

II. PRESIDENT MARCOS OF THE PHILIPPINES

I met President Marcos at the Malacanang palace. And I asked him to tell me about his country and himself.

Ferdinand Edralin Marcos once told his public school teacher-mother that one day he would be the President of his nation, and at the age of 48, his destiny fulfilled, Marcos was elected as the sixth President of the Republic of the Philippines.

His state-of-the-nation message was the shortest ever made (53 minutes) by a Filipino President, and had a sober tone. The legislators, both nacionalista and liberal, applauded him 12 times.

Looking fit in barong Tagalog, sitting in front of a desk fit for the President, Marcos looked at ease despite the loss of 15 pounds since winning the presidency.

In his address before the first regular session of the sixth Congress, President Marcos set forth six goals for his administration. He called them the grand design for greatness.

First is to strengthen the agricultural sector. Self-sufficiency in the production of food, especially rice, must be attained in the shortest possible time.

Listed as No. 2 goal by the President is the rehabilitation of ailing essential industries. As remedies, he said the administration would ease credits, stabilize exchange rates, maintain adequate international reserves, and extend tariff protection to domestic industries.

For his third objective, Mr. Marcos wanted a solid physical base to support planned and sustained economic growth. This would include the construction of better roads, bridges, better electric power, water service, etc. An educational system which could tap the potentials and vitality of human resources is his fourth goal.

He also mentioned the maximum protection to the workingman through labor law, and finally to raise the efficiency of public health services to a level which should meet the minimum requirements of their people.

When asked about Philippine's policy toward Vietnam, the President said, "We have a vital stake in the survival of the Republic of Vietnam, and we shall continue to assist that nation to the best of our ability. At the same time, we shall support any reasonable move for a negotiated peace in Vietnam."

On their relation with the United States, Mr. Marcos said: "We are convinced the United States would want nothing better than to see the Philippines prosper in dignity and freedom."

He also said that the situation in regard to American bases in the Philippines has improved through mutually agreed modifications of some of the terms of the military bases agreements, and that some points that remain to pose as irritants would be clarified or modified.

The field of foreign relations is not new to President Marcos. As senator, he took part in the treaty-ratifying functions of the Senate and participated in many foreign policy debates. He was a delegate to the U.N. General Assembly in 1954, 1961, and 1962.

President Marcos is married to Imelda Romualdez, a young beauty blessed with good looks, persuasive manner, and intelligence. I spent an hour talking to the Philippines' first lady at the presidential palace. I found her with an unassertive confidence, and great sense of humor. She is a warm and interesting person, and happily in love with her husband.

When they moved into their new home, the three Marcos children complained that they had moved too far away from their friends.

Those who recall with delight how young first ladies in other countries give an accent of culture even to social life in their capitals, and thus imparted a new dimension to the world of politics, look forward eagerly to the new regime in Malacanang, under young Mrs. Marcos, herself an artist, singer and scholar, so committed to the finer things in life. She is truly a great beauty of our time.

She came into the President's office while Marcos was talking to me. After greeting me she went over to her husband and helped him to straighten his collar. Their hands touched, they smiled to each other. In that brief moment, without words, one knew these two persons are deeply in love with each other. And now these two charming young people are working together to give the Philippines a much needed new dedication and hope.

III. PRESIDENT PARK OF KOREA

The winter snow had begun to melt along the Han River when I saw President Park at the Blue palace.

Korea today is staunchly allied with the United States. It is in many ways the most admirable and encouraging of our Far Eastern allies.

President Park Chung Hee was born on September 30, 1917, in the North Kyungsang Province of Korea. He is the youngest of six children of a farm family. He and President Marcos of the Philippines are the same age, in fact, Marcos also was born in the month of September. They both graduated from college at the top of their class.

President Park's government has moved a long way since his victory in the Presidential election in 1963.

He has taken three bold major steps to improve Korea's position and to make things easier for the United States:

1. The Korea-Japan Treaty in Tokyo on June 22, 1965, ending a long negotiation and normalizing the diplomatic relation between the two countries.

2. A 5-year program for Korea paying more attention to Korea's agricultural resources, embodying a realistic attitude toward the development of the Korean economy according to its pressing consumer needs. For years Korea has been struggling on an uphill road, a country cut off from the superior natural resources of Communist-conquered Northern Korea—a country living under an armistice.

not a peace; a country carrying the economic burden of the fifth largest army in the world. Such going has been slow and arduous, but Korea is moving upward. It has made substantial progress toward economic self-sufficiency. With this new 5-year plan it moves into a new phase.

3. South Korean troop contribution to South Vietnam: 20,000 Koreans to South Vietnam were the first solid response from any country to U.S. appeals for more flags in Vietnam. It was also the first time in the country's 4,000-year history that Korean troops have been voluntarily involved in operations overseas.

Critics of the Government wonder where it may lead, pointing out that Korea herself is still directly menaced by some 400,000 Communist troops north of the 38th parallel. However, the common reaction has been enthusiastic. As Prime Minister II Kwon Chung said to me: "We are proud to be in a position to give help instead of asking for it."

The departure of Korean troops for Vietnam also served to dramatize the similar interests of these two Communist-menaced countries that cannot fail to impress a traveler in the Far East.

In some ways, as the Koreans put it, the situations in Vietnam and Korea are similar. Both are divided countries. Both are subjected to intense pressures from the Communist north. But Korea has found its way to successful resistance; Vietnam is still trying.

As President Park had said to me: "We are certain that the support of the Korean people has contributed much to the morale of the South Vietnamese, for we suffer the same tragedy of south-north division."

"Freedom and peace are not given but won; aggression is not to be avoided but faced and challenged. It is for this reason we send our youth into the battlefields of Vietnam."

President Park's successful state visit to Germany in 1964 was followed by his visit to the United States in May 1965, and his visit to southeast Asia and Free China in February 1966.

His right-hand man and good friend, II Kwon Chung, has been Prime Minister since 1964. Mrs. Park, a schoolteacher, is a charming lady who was his staunch supporter and stay during years of difficulty and is now his true lieutenant in his place of powers.

IV. GENERAL KY OF SOUTH VIETNAM

General Ky is one of the most charming young leaders I have ever met. You can't help but like him even if you are not entirely in agreement with him.

In May of this year, Gen. Nguyen Cao Ky will complete one year as Premier of South Vietnam. For Vietnam, that's quite a record. When Ky first took office, the general feeling was: "Let's see how long he will last." But Ky has survived with growing pains and all.

When I first met Ky at his office in Saigon he impressed me as an earnest and hard worker trying his best to do his job under the thunder of gun and the complexities of a new formed government. Only when we talked about aviation did he relax, and I believe he spoke the truth when he remarked to me: "I am a leader for my country at war; when peace should come, I want to go back to flying."

And flying he still enjoys, in fact I saw him arriving at work flying his private helicopter. Long before he became Premier, General Ky as air force chief had established himself as a major military figure important in Saigon's coups and politics. He learned fast, and in May 1965 when Dr. Phan Huy Quat's civilian cabinet collapsed, Ky was asked by Quat to take over. It was a peaceful transition of power since the death of President Diem and Ky with youthful Nguyen Van Thien (42), Directory Chairman and Chief of State, have governed their broken country with firm hands.

Ky said to me: "We are at war, and at the same time try to start by eliminating political and social defects. We have much to do, to bring peace and justice to our people."

Today this impatient and ambitious young man has matured. With his dashing flair, mustached charm, and a touch of frankness, Ky has become a national hero much admired by the Vietnam public who really need some kind of hero to pull the people together to win the war.

The Catholics and the Buddhist leaders are quieter now. I visited the powerful Buddhist leader, Thich Tri Quang, at his guarded and secluded temple which no outsider is able to locate. Without doubt, he will continue to be a key figure of Vietnam's future, having tackled the controversy of public life, the excitement of politics, he and his lieutenants will not be satisfied taking the back seats. The Catholic leader is Archbishop Nguyen Van Ben. My visit with him was

arranged by a Vietnamese woman professor. As Ky had said to the newsmen in Taiwan: "My job as Premier is a delicate matter, we try to keep things balanced."

As for Dr. Phan Huy Quat, a moderate, a scholar, and a physician—what is he doing now? His advice is sought by many, but he spends some of his time raising orchids. He said to me: "Maybe my idea of a democratic government is a bit too advanced for my people, but I hope in due time, with a firmer position of U.S. participation to bring peace to my country, with a more stabilized government, my people will engage my services again."

Ky's second wife Mai was an air hostess. They have five children. With long working hours, Ky laughingly said to me: "My wife complains we hardly get to see each other."

Ky declared to his people, "we are a government of the poor and the oppressed. We will continue our fight against oppression and poverty."

The night before I left Saigon, I was invited by Mr. Richard McCarthy, our USIA Deputy Director to Vietnam to attend a meeting to hear some of the local talents. The following song was sung by Steve Addiss and Phan Duy, of Saigon. It's a sad song, and tells the story of the simple people in war.

"RAIN ON THE LEAVES

"The rain on the leaves
Is the tears of joy of the girl
Whose boy returns from the war.

"The rain on the leaves
Is the bitter tears
When the mother hears her son is no more.

"The rain on the leaves
Is a heart's distress and
A loneliness life passes by.

"The rain on the leaves
Is a last caress and
A tenderness before a loved one dies."

A WOMAN TALKS TO FOUR KEY MEN OF ASIA

TAIPEI, TAIWAN.
One evening in Saigon not long ago, I heard a song that will haunt me all my life. It is a song of war, composed by Vietnamese folksinger Phan Duy, who has been at war almost all his life — first against the French, now against the Communists.

The title of his song, "Rain on the Leaves," has a special meaning for the people of Southeast Asia whose lives are ordered by the torrential downpour of the monsoons. The refrain goes:

The rain on the leaves
Is the tears of joy of the girl
Whose boy returns from war.
The rain on the leaves
Is the bitter tears
When the mother hears her
son is no more.
The rain on the leaves
Is a heart's distress and
A loneliness life passes by.
The rain on the leaves
Is a last caress and
A tenderness before a loved
one dies.

Often as a girl in my native China I have listened to the monsoon rain, sometimes soothed by its first gentle patter, sometimes terrified as it has reached crescendo. Then the monsoon would pass, and life would begin again. Flowers would bloom and the paddies would be carpeted with the almost transparent delicate green of the rice shoots. As the song ended, I found my-

self wondering if mankind could survive the monsoon of war, in which bullets, not raindrops, rattle on the roofs.

The song and its message stayed with me as I traveled through the Far East and called upon four of the most important leaders in free Asia. I talked to Premier Nguyen Cao Ky of South Vietnam, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek of Free China, President Park Chung Hee of South Korea and President Ferdinand Edralin Marcos of the Philippines. As I write, the fate of Gen-

eral Ky is still uncertain.

I talked to these men about the thunder over Asia, which rumbles ominously around the world. As a woman, I found myself even more interested in what I had glimpsed of their private lives. As a woman, I was also concerned about the role women should play if human freedom is to survive in Asia.

The four leaders have much in common. All have been soldiers, all have fought Communism. All are married to beautiful, brilliant women with

Western educations who have escaped the prison of Asian womanhood.

In essence, all agree that the priority need for free Asia is a united political front and a solid core effort to resist Communist aggression. None is in any doubt that the Communists mean to enslave all Asia. All recognize there can be no letup in the fight for freedom, no appeasement.

As I read the headlines of the political chaos in Saigon, I am saddened. I keep remembering how General Ky, flamboyant, confident, swooped down at the controls of his personal helicopter to keep his appointment with me. He apologized for the absence of his wife, Mal, a former Saigon air hostess, explaining shyly that she was in a hospital having their first child.

He grinned. "If you think I am harassed in my job as Premier," he said, "you should see me at home with four children clamoring for my attention. I get more peace here than at home."

Then his mood changed and he spoke of his ambitions for his people. His first objective is peace but not at the cost of surrender; his second, lifting the living standards of his people.

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek is an old friend. For 30 years, he knew my late husband, Gen. Claire Chennault, founder of the "Flying Tigers." So I feel at home here in his Spartan house on the hillside overlooking Taipei.

Though 79 years old, Chiang looks 20 years younger. He sits erect, stands erect, walks briskly, thinks briskly. Like any man of his age he can be leasable, but he is also intensely human. He has surrounded himself with younger men, trained to take over when he gives up the reins of power.

He can speak without rancor of the days when his advice and experience were brushed aside. He can also speak with the pride of a young man of the achievements of his government in Taiwan. The island now has the highest living standard in Asia, outside of Japan. It also has the most successful land reform program in the world.

"We've got to show people we can help ourselves before we can expect their help," Chiang told me.

President Park, the youngest of six children of a farmer's family, came to power by military coup. But he was elected in a free and close election in 1963. He has made three bold and major moves: he has sought to end the ancient enmity between Korea and Japan, he has begun to revamp the Korean economy with a five-year plan, he has sent 20,000 Korean troops to South Vietnam — the first solid response from any country to U.S. appeals for "More Flags" in Vietnam.

"We are proud," he said, "to be in a position to give help instead of asking it." At the same time he cautioned, "What is good for the West is not necessarily good for the East. The American way of running its govern-

ment might not always be suitable in Asia. Each country must adopt the degree of democracy that suits its own problems."

While I interviewed President Marcos in Manila's stately Malacanang Palace, his children dashed through the room shrieking happily and his wife straightened the collar of his open-neck shirt—the *barong tagalog*.

A PROMISE KEPT

President Marcos, guerrilla fighter against the Japanese, war hero and brilliant lawyer, once told his schoolteacher mother that he was going to be President of his country. He has kept his promise. He comes to power when free Asia is in ferment, but unlike Rudyard Kipling, Marcos believes that "the twin"—East and West—must meet. With four years of power ahead of him, he is racing to build up his country under a six-point "Grand Design."

The Philippines has had its differences with the United States, but President Marcos is moving as fast as he can to iron them out. "The majority of the Philippine people are friendly to the United States," he said. "This is the message I want you to take back to the American people."

I came away from my meetings with the four leaders with a growing consciousness that, while the United States is willing to help the Asian countries towards sound democracy, there is still a great gap in understanding to be bridged. For centuries, the Asian lands have been under caste and feudal rule. The masses are still impoverished to a point of bare survival.

Patience as well as tolerance are needed today. But I believe that true democracy can come to Asia, and I believe it will come all the sooner if the women of Asia can be enlisted in the cause.

DISILLUSIONMENT AND DIVORCE?

THE POLICE CRISIS IN AMERICA

The American policeman is under fire.

In countless cities throughout the nation he is being denounced as some or all of the following: ruthless, inept, crooked, unfit, inefficient, cruel, bigoted, political, ignorant, heavy-footed, unversed, half-skilled and bungling.

The McCone Commission, charged with investigating the causes and background of the Watts race riots in Los Angeles last summer, revealed that every one of seven major riots in the northern U.S. in 1964 was triggered by a police incident.

Policemen are being attacked not only for their role in the burgeoning civil rights movement and for membership in the Ku Klux Klan and the John Birch Society, but minority groups are now demanding civilian review boards to protect their interests against so-called police discrimination. In New York, traditionally the stronghold of the Irish cop, Police Commissioner Michael Murphy resigned last year when public pressure mounted inexorably for just such a citizen review board.

Added to this development, three recent major Supreme Court decisions on the constitutional rights of the individual regarding search and seizure, interrogation, and arrest and detention have contributed further to the woes and criticism of the police.

In short, the public image of the average policeman has deteriorated so precipitously that municipal governments are finding it increasingly difficult to recruit police. As of a few weeks ago, Newark, N.J., was short 125 policemen. Los Angeles needed another 200. Cleveland expected to be 150 shy before the year was out. Chicago wanted 600.

"Unless something is done to stop the slandering, maligning attacks on the police," says Los Angeles Police Chief

William H. Parker, "we won't be able to recruit enough police to look after the population."

That the police are disliked throughout America—"Nobody likes a cop" is a favorite expression—there can be no doubt. Many polls have proven conclusively the existence of that dislike.

It may be anomalous, but the better-educated citizenry often regards the policeman as gruff and ill-bred, of low mentality, doubtful honesty and scant integrity. It considers him an uncouth, aggressive, rude figure of brutality, a frequently sadistic individual who chronically harasses the innocent citizen.

The educated citizen should know better, but law is an abstraction that usually becomes personified when its representative, the policeman, undertakes to enforce some law restricting behavior. Then even the law-abiding citizen starts to look upon the policeman as an enemy. Nobody likes to be stopped for speeding, much less for other, more serious offenses.

As Gerhard Falk recently indicated in the *American Bar Association Journal*, public attitudes toward the police spring

from personal contacts with the police rather than any knowledge of the true caliber of police generally or the trying conditions under which police must function.

What kind of man is the average American policeman? What type of man chooses voluntarily to occupy what is at best a thankless, unpleasant, dangerous, depressing, uncomfortable, unpopular job?

TOUGH, ENERGETIC, OUTSPOKEN

The psychological makeup of the contemporary policeman and the attractions of police work have not been studied in any real depth to date, but psychologist Robert B. Mills of the University of Cincinnati, who piloted a police selection program, offers some interesting observations. According to him the typical police officer is: "tough-minded . . . seldom dwells upon or reveals personal weaknesses . . . prefers to present himself to others as impregnable; he is typically energetic, enterprising and outspoken, he tends to be somewhat exhibitionistic . . . he is outgoing, socially skilled and enjoys the company of others; the typical officer

appears more aggressive and hostile than the 'normal male.'"

Dr. Mills also reports that the police officer is interested in working with people and is "well above average in stability, citizenship and social standards." But Dr. Arthur N. Wiers of the University of Oregon Medical School, also well-experienced in police selection, believes that American policemen "need little kindness or succorance from others and give little."

A team of management consultants hired to appraise the members of the Chicago police force report that as a group those policemen "did not conform at all to the popular stereotype of the tough, cynical, hard-bitten police officer. Rather all the evidence indicates that they are decent, kindly men intent on doing their job, with marked social service values."

But why become a policeman in the first place? What is the basic motivation? When police recruits are asked this question, and they always are, the overwhelming majority replies, "I've always wanted to be a policeman," or "I like people," or "I want to help people."

Inspector John Downer, head of the New York City Police Academy, says, "It's been my experience [24 years on the force] that there are three main reasons why men go into police work. One, is the desire for a secure position which pays a good salary with pension benefits. [A first-grade policeman in New York City gets \$8483 a year, but is now demanding a 35-hour week and a \$10,500 per year salary plus a longevity bonus of \$500 for every five years served]. Two, is the desire to work in an adventurous job, something outside the ordinary. And three, is the desire to do something for the community."

"The kind of policeman we try to get in New York must be a high school graduate or a man with an equivalent education. We want him to have all the virtues of the boy scout: honesty, bravery, reverence, trustworthiness and so forth."

"We still don't know," Downer says. *Parade* • May 29, 1966

serts, "what type of man makes the best policeman. But we sure know who makes the worst. The type of man we eliminate as a recruit is very often the one who tries hardest to get on the force. He's motivated by a strong desire for revenge. He's going to get even with society or with a particular group in society. Or he's a crusader with extremist views which he's determined to push, or he's a man with strong racial and religious prejudices."

"We send our recruits to the Police Academy for 18 weeks in which they have to pass four tough exams. And we try to choose them carefully. Last year only 38 out of 1800 passed out."

It is no secret, however, that many young men who enter police work become disillusioned after two or three years. The policeman learns quickly that life in the blue uniform is not all action, glamor, adventure and excitement. It's been estimated that 90 percent of all police business is noncriminal. Policemen are called upon to settle marital disputes, deliver babies, rescue cats, direct traffic, sober up drunks, etc. Often their life is a life of incredible monotony, cooped up with the same partner day after day, enacting the identical routine.

NOT A HAPPY LOT

In addition to boredom, there are more serious drawbacks to the job: loss of faith in people; long hours and, in many communities, poor pay; and, of course, physical risk. Policemen must be prepared to work all hours of the day and night, in all neighborhoods, under all conditions—on a salary scale that ranges from \$250 to \$700 per month for starting policemen. Last year 57 officers were murdered in the line of duty—the number has doubled since 1960—and 18,000 (or one in every 10) were assaulted. The omnipresent threat of danger understandably produces mounting tensions and conflicts, because the policeman must never show fear.

As a group, policemen suffer a high incidence of ulcers, heart attacks and divorce. The problem of divorce is particularly widespread. As one policeman described it, "A man can't be a cop for umpteenth hours a day, then go home, turn it off and become a loving father and husband."

One former police officer, now a professor of police science at a California university, told PARADE: "I used to think I was a good father. I used to sit up late and wait for my daughter every time she went out. Then one time I heard her say to her mother, 'Why does Daddy stay up and interrogate me after every date? Doesn't he trust me?'"

A nurse who divorced her policeman husband after 10 years of marriage says: "From my own experience and what I could tell of others we associated with, policemen make poor husbands. They are accustomed to authority, not compromise. Most of them are nonintellectuals. They don't read books. As a rule they are not cultured men. They witness only the seamy, squalid side of life—

robbery, cheating, assault. Lots of times they attribute the tactics and motives of the underworld to their own family."

"In my own case," she goes on, "my husband refused to believe that I liked spending time in the library at night while he was working. He was sure I was trying with some other man. From a humorous, open-minded human being he gradually became a doubting monster always attributing the worst motives to people. Frankly I blame it on his job. You can't let a man wallow in a world of crime and criminals, then expect him to come up smelling like a rose."

Although most policemen appear extroverted and aggressive, they are frequently lonely men. Many feel strongly that no one understands them—certainly not the public, not even their wives—except their fellow officers. It has often been correctly observed that policemen constitute a subculture unto themselves.

a posture of extreme defensiveness; the hostility of public opinion that assumes he has his hands in the till anyway.

One Denver policeman who was caught stealing and sent to prison explained: "Young fellows don't put on those blue uniforms to become crooks. There are a lot of reasons for joining the police, but for most guys it adds up to the fact that it was an honorable, decent way to make a living. . . . Somewhere along the way a guy's disillusioned. . . . The pressures mount up. . . . He may decide to quit fighting and make the conscious decision to beat society instead."

It is a sad commentary on the American conscience, but the public seems far more outraged at a policeman's penny ante robbery than at the million-dollar embezzlement by some corporation executive. Why do we expect policemen to be

the greater resistance offered, the greater the force permitted. But a policeman is liable to punishment if he uses more force than warranted.

The FBI carefully investigates charges of police brutality. During 1964-65 there were 1700 complaints. Forty-seven were presented to federal grand juries. Only five were declared founded in fact. The FBI's diligent research into police brutality failed to turn up any such thing—but it did reveal widespread civilian brutality against the police.

The police occupy a most untenable position in the civil rights struggle. They must defend the laws already on the books, and from their point of view monitors violating certain laws are encouraging widespread violation of all laws. And then again, in areas where a chief of police is still an elected official, police activities are unavoidably controlled from above by political concerns.

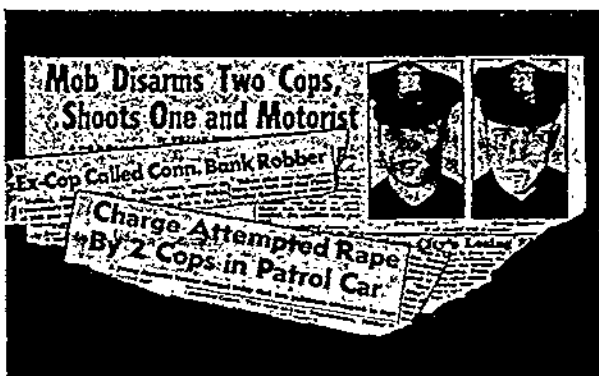
DO REVIEW BOARDS WORK?

Civilian review boards are universally rejected by law enforcement agencies because their existence tends to abridge the authority of responsible officials, undermine morale and deter officers from the proper performance of their duties for fear they will be judged later by individuals unfamiliar with law enforcement. In two cities—Philadelphia and Rochester, N.Y.—where civilian review boards have been set up, they have not demonstrated their usefulness—or even reduced hostility to the police. They appear to be a sop to the demands of minority groups and little more.

In the past few years police departments throughout the country have been making honest efforts to improve procedures and to better their public relations. They have tried to upgrade requirements, obtain more pay for their men, conduct sensible recruitment drives and improve the quality of personnel.

In some cities intensive psychiatric tests are now being used for the first time to weed out undesirable applicants. Personnel counselors are provided for policemen who have personal and financial problems. Some cities, following the example of Berkeley and Santa Monica, Calif., now require two years of college for applicants, and many are sponsoring college scholarship programs to enable law enforcement officers to attain a better education. Inservice training programs, such as the one in New York City which teaches policemen how to handle delinquent children, are being expanded.

The greatest obstacle to improved police forces—in fact, the present crisis in law enforcement—stems from the public attitude toward the police. Somehow the police image has to be upgraded. TV programs will have to stop depicting police as idiots. Parents will have to stop using them as threats to their young children. And the police themselves will have to institute better public relations and community programs. Otherwise fewer and fewer men will want to become policemen.



Typical headlines show policemen today are often targets for accusations and attacks.

They share a bond of common dangers and hardships. They are loyal to and identify with one another and in most cities manifest a strong concern for their department and its reputation.

In many communities the belief persists that the police are beyond public control, that they are relatively free to do as they wish, that they hide their sins and protect miscreants. Misuses of police power are rapidly becoming abuses of the past.

Corruption used to be a relatively simple matter. The cop on the beat simply helped himself. He shook down the neighborhood bookie, madam or bartender, shared the "take" with his precinct captain. Just five years ago several major police scandals rocked the nation. In Chicago the police engineered several of the city's most lucrative robberies. In Pensacola police officers were involved in tow car and gambling rackets. In Detroit 5 percent of the force was accused of various criminal activities.

But the occasional case of the burglar in blue is not that of the regular criminal. It reflects rather the weaknesses of our own society. The policeman is cast into

more noble than big business executives? Why are we so quick to downgrade the police?

Take the charge of police brutality, widely used to explain or justify riots. The Los Angeles riot of 1965 began when an officer attempted to arrest a Negro on charges of drunken driving. The man later pleaded guilty to the charge. In Harlem, in 1964, rioting broke out when a policeman shot a youth who attempted to knife him. A grand jury later exonerated the officer. Yet the cry of police brutality is heard over and over again. At the University of California in Berkeley the Police Brutality Committee began propagandizing even before the first arrest, advising students to yell, "Brutality, brutality," and to report injuries such as headaches, blisters, bruises to hospital attendants.

Photographs showing policemen subduing citizens are used to support brutality charges, but these same photos rarely reveal the unprovoked attacks on officers, compelling them to use force. Officially a policeman is entitled to use only that amount of force necessary to apprehend a criminal or law violator;

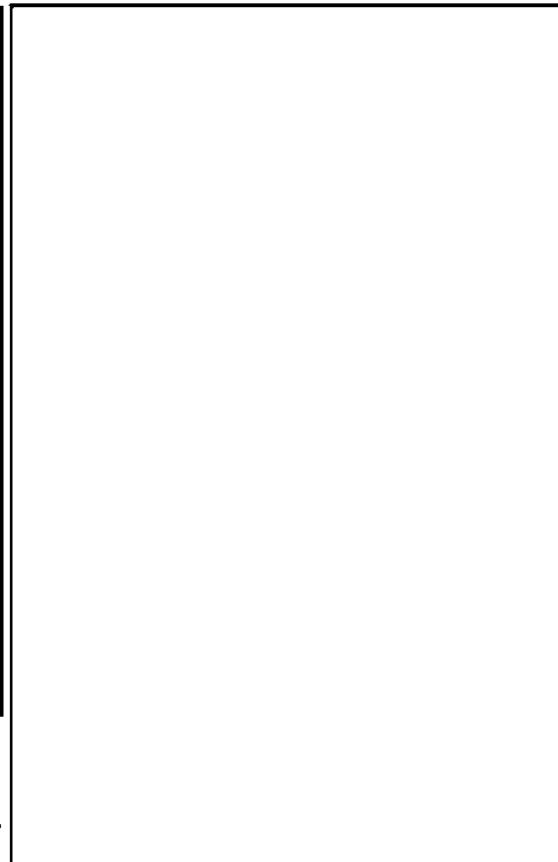

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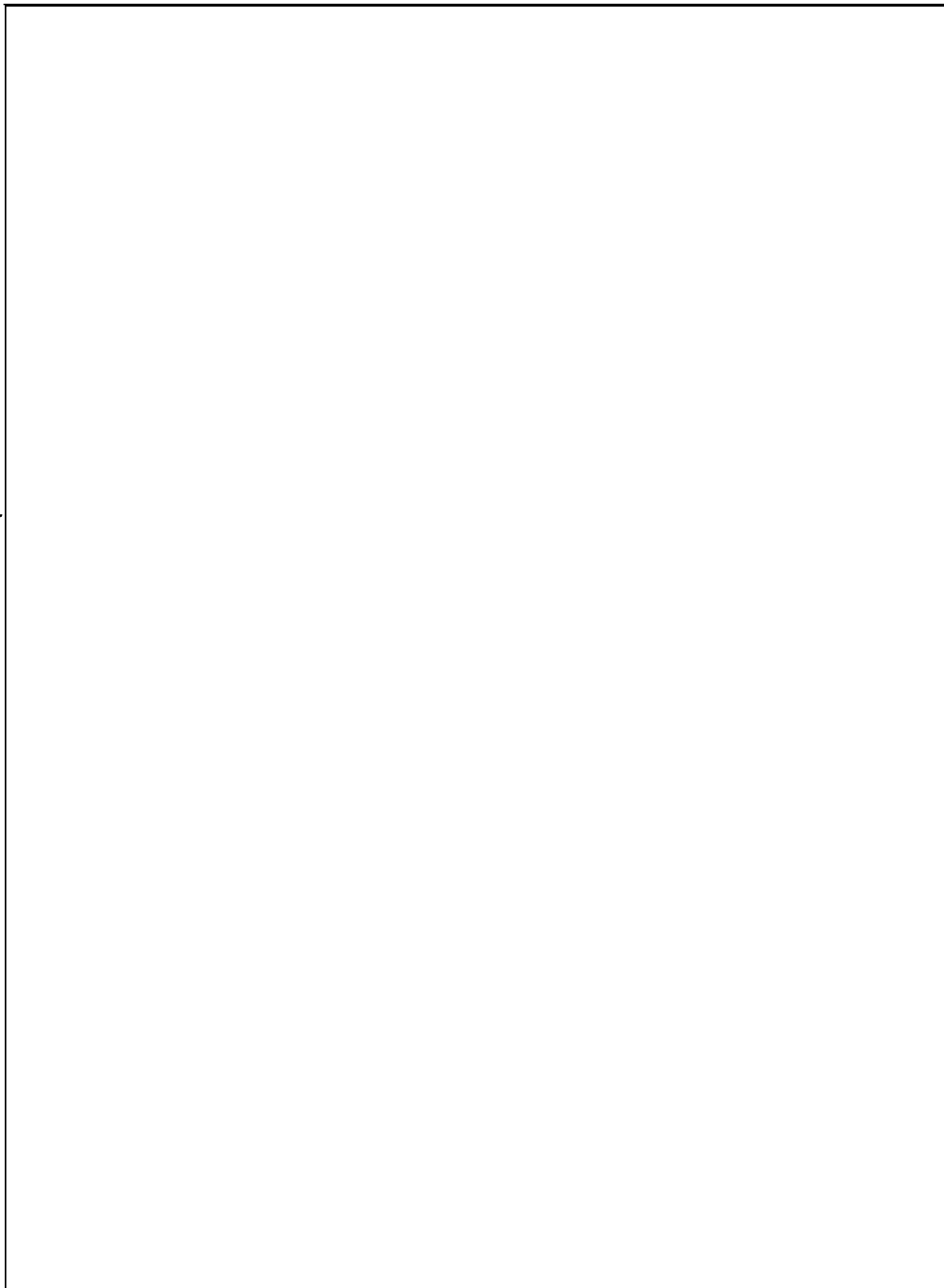

Anna Chennault, wife of the late Lieutenant General Claire Lee Chennault of Flying Tiger fame, is scheduled to meet the Director in the Director's office at 10:30 a.m., on 3-21-67.

Mrs. Chennault is currently on the Special Correspondents' List and the Director has exchanged cordial correspondence with her. The Director has met Mrs. Chennault in his office several times, the last time being on July 11, 1966. At that time, Mr. Hoover remarked that "Mrs. Chennault is strongly anticommunist and when she is not traveling abroad, she is making appearances before schools and colleges in this country trying to enlighten the younger generation on just what communism is and what it has done in the countries which it has taken over." At that time she gave the Director a copy of an article she had written for the May 29, 1966, issue of Parade Magazine. It pertained to interviews she had conducted with four Asian leaders.

Mrs. Chennault travels frequently to the Far East. On January 26, 1967, she telephoned Mr. Hoover's office saying that she was leaving for Asia again and that when she returns she would be in touch with Mr. Hoover to ask if she could bring Senator John G. Tower (R-Texas) to meet Mr. Hoover. She described Tower as a great admirer of the Director. Mrs. Chennault writes frequently about her experiences in the Far East and is well acquainted with prominent leaders in this area. *NO INDICATION SENATOR TOWER WILL ACCOMPANY HER ON THIS VISIT.*

For the Director's information, there is attached a brief summary of current trends in the Chinese intelligence field which he might like to use in his discussions with Mrs. Chennault.

CHINESE COMMUNIST ACTIVITIES IN THE U.S.

There are an estimated 250,000 Chinese in the U.S., a large number of whom are well-educated, highly trained professionals in the educational and technical fields. Many also have close friends and relatives residing in Communist China and are in frequent contact with these individuals, often providing financial assistance. Recently amended immigration laws now permit up to 20,000 Chinese aliens to enter the U.S. annually. Many Chinese are in the U.S. illegally, thus presenting an intelligence as well as immigration problem.

Communist China has no diplomatic establishment in the U.S.; however, official Chinese Communist (Chicom) Government news agency, New China News Agency, has representatives assigned in Canada and until quite recently, in Mexico, engaged in activities directed against the U.S. Another major cause of concern is large number of Chinese currently employed by United Nations Secretariat, many of whom are openly pro-Chicom and in some instances, believed to be engaged in intelligence activities.

Within the U.S. the following groups are active in behalf of the Chicoms:

"CHINA DAILY NEWS" (CDN)

CDN is a pro-Chicom Chinese-language newspaper published semi-weekly in New York City and distributed throughout the U.S., Canada and several foreign countries.

[redacted] respectively, have been associated with Chicom movement in the New York area for many years.

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CHINESE HAND LAUNDRY ALLIANCE (CHLA)

CHLA, an organization which has helped CDN in its fund raising, was originally organized for purpose of furnishing legal aid to Chinese laundrymen; however, it has been under control of a pro-Chicom group since the 1940s.

HAI YEN SHE, also known as Petrel Club

Since 1950 Petrel Club has demonstrated pro-Chicom and procommunist sympathy and its discussions have definitely sided with Communist China in its ideological dispute with the Soviet Union. This club is the hub of pro-Chicom activity in the San Francisco area.

CHINA BOOKS AND PERIODICALS (CBP)

CBP has the largest collection of Chicom propaganda material in the San Francisco area. It is operated by Henry Halsey Noyes, a registered foreign agent whose principal is Goozi Shudian, Peking, China. Goozi Shudian translated into English is International Book Store. It is operated by the Chicom Government.

CHINESE COMMUNIST INTELLIGENCE COLLECTION OPERATIONS

It has been estimated that 95% of the material in Sino-Soviet-bloc intelligence objectives has been acquired through acquisition of American publications. With this in mind, Director John Edgar Hoover prepared an article captioned "How Red China Spies on the U.S." which appeared in June, 1966, issue of "Nation's Business," alerting the business community of this threat. (Copy attached)

PRO-CHINESE COMMUNIST GROUPS

The following organizations are communist-oriented organizations which split off from the Communist Party, USA, because of a difference of opinion regarding the Sino-Soviet dispute which basically revolves about the way to bring socialism to the world. The Chinese believe in adopting a strong policy against the Western world and favor actual warfare in order to bring about the establishment of socialism over capitalism.

The Provisional Organizing Committee for a Marxist-Leninist Communist Party split off from the Communist Party, USA, in 1958 because of its disagreement with the policy of peaceful coexistence with capitalist nations. This organization had about 100 members until September of 1965 when it also was split and a new group called the Communist Party, USA, Marxist-Leninist was formed based on the west coast which consisted of a small minority who felt that the parent organization was not sufficiently aggressive in its policies or tactics designed to bring about the overthrow of the United States Government and bring about the establishment of a socialist government in this country. The Provisional Organizing Committee for a Marxist-Leninist Communist Party now has a membership of approximately 80 members and the Communist Party, USA, Marxist-Leninist now claims approximately 20 members.

One of the most militant of the pro-Chinese groups is the Progressive Labor Party which was created in 1962 by expelled members of the Communist Party, USA. Members of this group have been most active in creating civil disturbances in New York and in arranging demonstrations objecting to the foreign policy of the United States. The Progressive Labor Party has created various front groups to found its policies. It has established the Harlem Defense Council which was organized to create block committees, set up specifically in Harlem as defense units for the residents to protect themselves from police. It also created the Student Committee for Travel to Cuba which arranged and sponsored two trips to Cuba in 1963-64 in violation of the State Department ban on travel. It also created the May 2 Movement, an organization specifically designed to protest United States intervention in Vietnam. The latter two organizations are now defunct. The current membership of the Progressive Labor Party is approximately 200.

SINO-SOVIET DISPUTE

As indicated in the Director's book "A Study of Communism" published in 1962, the tactic of peaceful coexistence is of practical value to the Soviet Union in its international relations by providing them an element essential to their goals--time, but Chinese communist leaders feel that peaceful coexistence curbs the revolutionary ardor through which they hope to achieve their imperialistic aims and they continue to promote the idea that war is inevitable and militant revolutionary activity vital for a further expansion of communism.

The dispute between the Soviet Union and Communist China is not with regard to the strategic and ultimate goal of communism, which is domination of the world, but merely over the tactics to be emphasized in achieving that goal.

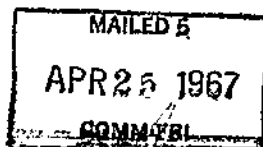

Mrs. Anna Chennault, widow of Lt. Gen. Claire Lee Chennault, today announces the presentation of the Chennault papers to the Hoover Institution of Stanford, California. The official presentation will take place on October 18th at the Hoover Institution.

The collection of the Chennault papers relates particularly to the American Volunteer Group known as the Flying Tigers; the China Air Task Force; the U. S. 14th Air Force; and Civil Air Transport, the private airline which Gen. Chennault organized in 1946 after the Second World War to help Nationalist China resist the Communist invasion. These papers include correspondence between Gen. Chennault and President Roosevelt, Winston Churchill, General MacArthur, Wendell Willkie, General Marshall, General Stilwell, General Arnold, and President and Madame Chiang Kai-shek.

Gen. Claire Lee Chennault was born in Commerce, Texas. His family later moved on to Louisiana. He began his career teaching in a country school in Louisiana after graduation from LSU (Louisiana State University). Later he enlisted in the Army in World War I and stayed in the service as a fighter pilot. During his lifetime he was in the forefront of the fight to recognize the value of air power and as a non-conformist he suffered the same bureaucratic disfavor before Pearl Harbor as Gen. Billy Mitchell. In 1940 he succeeded in getting organized to carry out his own "radical" ideas the world renowned American Volunteer Group, otherwise better known as the Flying Tigers. Their legendary achievements during the war against Japan altered the whole concept of military air power.

After the Second World War Gen. Chennault returned to China to establish and operate a civilian airline called Civil Air Transport which in the Communist invasion relieved the beleaguered cities of non-Communist China as the prototype of the later Berlin airlift. No American has had such confidence and support from the free Chinese people high and low: his is the only statue of a "foreigner" in Free China.

General Chennault married Anna Chennault, a news columnist and lecturer in Shanghai, China in 1948 when he was 53 and she 23. Gen. Chennault died in 1958 at the age of 63.

Mrs. Chennault will present the papers to the Hoover Institution. The Library of Congress, Washington, D. C., will receive a microfilm copy.

Dr. Glenn Campbell, Director of the Hoover Institution, has invited a group of General Chennault's friends and associates both in the United States and China to attend the presentation.

Your letter of March 25th has been received, and I read the statement which you enclosed with great interest. It was thoughtful of you to make this available to me.

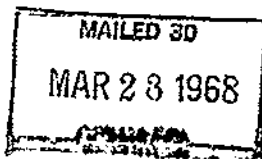

STATEMENT BY MRS. ANNA CHENNAULT

Things are happening so fast in Asia that no one is actually qualified to be an expert on all of it. None of us is more than a student of some part of Asian affairs.

However, all Americans are concerned and all involved in Asian affairs because in this nuclear age collective security has become the fact of life and for the sake of our own survival as a free nation we cannot afford to be isolated. We have to face the paradox that freedom cannot be protected in part and yet at the same time under present conditions for America power is a lonely business. Constantly subject to democratic public opinion we are fighting a so-called limited war trying hard to keep a balance of power abroad to avoid an ultimate unlimited war and at the same time keep foreign affairs in balance with domestic problems at home.

Regardless of our particular problems in Asia and in spite of all the troubles in that area the Asian continent is moving forward everywhere we touch it and we ourselves are looking at Asia with a new attitude, a new spirit and hopefully a better understanding. In Asia today we need long range thinking and patience, not short-cut solutions, and at the same time practical and realistic actions rather than academic advice and analyses. If we ultimately hope that Asians will themselves take over our problems as theirs we need, no matter how fast events move, to maintain consistent positions. We need to keep strong friends steadily on our side while at the same time we help with whatever help we have left the weaker nations to prevent them from falling into the Communist orbit.

In other words, we are facing a new Asia which Lord Jim and the Old China Hand would simply not understand.

The reason the U.S.A. faces the efforts of all Communist nations in Asia while they willingly do business with everyone else is because the Communists know our strength and our power. It is all that stands between them and consolidation of the continent and its periphery. They know we are the only power who can offer the people of the continent an alternative to them with our open opportunity and our system which favors the individuals (which is the reason that still everyday thousands of people seek entry here).

The Communists are trying to destroy our democratic system everywhere. They use "isolation by infiltration" wherever the opportunity arises. And Asia is the testing ground of our will and strength now as heretofore were Greece and Turkey, Iran, Berlin, Lebanon, the Formosa Straits and Cuba. That is, Asia is the testing ground of our willing strength today as these others were the same testing ground in prior years. All through the intelligent people in Asia you find confirmation of Secretary Rusk's experienced judgment that if our will and strength falters now in South Vietnam as it has not hitherto faltered we are in for a big war in Asia within a couple of years.

For instance, Korean President Park thinks the North Korean and the Red Chinese will start a big move within a year or two if we show no strength nor determination to their present challenges to Korea.

And Free China is also deeply concerned about the defense of the perimeter of Asia in the near future in view of attitudes reportedly growing in the United States.

If you think war has never been popular in the U. S., think what it is in Asia which has not been free of war for 25 years. But peace without guaranteed security and surrender promises even more dangerous war in the future. We live so fast that possibly our day to day knowledge runs

ahead of our long term judgments of what is humanly possible with other peoples. We may be having indigestion with our own knowledge. In this nuclear age which thinks in terms of computers, we can have instant coffee and instant tea, but let's not expect to have instant solutions of centuries' old problems and instant democracy. We simply cannot just add water and serve. For this reason Americans should not be so apologetic and defensive of our action in Vietnam as each new wind blows. We have spent too much time debating on the many mistakes made yesterday - they are happily less than the mistakes of anyone else in the area. But it is time for us to plan for tomorrow knowing that we have no alternative but to control the situation.

The Communists have always been ahead of us in their determination to keep the Asian situation under control for their purposes and in how to go about it. Two incidents have certainly forced us to accelerate our timetable. One is the incident in Korea; the other is the packing up of the British. Both these incidents compel us to reappraise our present levels of strength both at home and abroad to meet the accelerating situation.

Today the United States is engaged as it has truly been engaged for the last 25 years in a world-wide struggle over organization of the world with Communist power bearing many faces but always ultimately sustained by the industrial and military strength of Russia. Our attitude toward Asia should be based on a thoroughly realistic appraisal of this enemy on one hand and of the value of Asia to us if Russia tries to exclude us from it.

We have made many mistakes - as have our enemies. But our efforts, mistakes included, have permitted behind our shield the gradual emergence of independent Asian powers for the first time daring to be free on their

own without being resigned to Communism as the way of the future. That is the real goal we are trying to attain, to hold firm until a free Asia can develop with courage and strength of its own. But since this is our only ultimate goal, to function in Asia without full Asian support is to build on shifting sand. At the same time we must get the Asians to recognize today's need for energetic maturity on their part. We must - for our resources are not limitless - continue our help to them in such a way that we have full Asian support and the greatest possible cooperation from the Asians themselves.

To understand the crisis in Vietnam we actually have to look at the whole picture of Asia, because in Asia we are not only fighting a military war but also a psychological war with the Communist power for the enlistment of Asian energy on our side.

There is no avoiding the fact that the creation of free nations from conquered colonies takes time. Conditions in South Vietnam today are no worse than they were in South Korea ten years ago. But our patience and our military shield have made South Korea today a vigorous and united nation. The same patience will make South Vietnam a vigorous and united nation in time. There is no question but that evolution of nations can only take place behind the shield of the continuance of our manifestation of power.

From Vietnam to India and Pakistan, to Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand, the Philippines, Japan, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Korea, they all ask the same question of power: "Who is going to win?" which means to them which power is going to last it out. They hope we will but they want to be sure before they dare to become the kind of committed free strong nations we want them to become.

The major danger today is not so much a battlefield defeat, but a diplomatic defeat at the conference table, which will be a psychological defeat in the hearts and minds of people who, still scared of ultimate Communist lasting power, would like to be free.

I do not presume like some wives of Generals to give advice on military strategy. I know what I do not know. But possibly I do know something that may be useful to you about the Asian attitude toward what we Americans are trying to do in Asia.

I have just returned from Korea and Taiwan immediately after the events of the attempted assassination of the President of Korea and the capture of the Pueblo. I have had a chance to feel the attitude and mind of Asian leaders in view of those and other events of the last couple of months. Understanding that this is what I may be qualified to speak about, I will be glad to review what I think I have learned about the state of mind in Asia in each particular country.

CHINESE IN THE UNITED STATES

The current total of about 300,000 Chinese residing in U.S. is increasing each year with the immigration of Chinese from Hong Kong, many of whom are recent refugees from Communist China. However, we have seen no noticeable inroads made by the Chinese communists among Chinese in this country. A Chinese-language newspaper in New York City, "The China Daily News," continues to spout the Chinese communist line and some small groups of Chinese in New York and San Francisco continue to favor the Chinese communist government. But, the vast majority of Chinese here have seen through the propaganda attempts of the Chinese communist leaders whose attempt to eradicate ancient traditions has erased any feelings of loyalty towards them. We are keeping a close watch to counter any Chinese communist efforts to place intelligence agents among refugees.

The growth of Chinese communities in the U.S. has created other problems. For example, responsible citizens of Chinatown in San Francisco are concerned over the excesses of some of the Chinese youth. The Chinese community, which has long enjoyed a fine reputation for low juvenile delinquency and crime rate, is alarmed at the activities of some of the young recent immigrants from Hong Kong who are dissatisfied with the conditions and opportunities in Chinatown. During the 1968 Chinese New Year's celebration in San Francisco, groups of young Chinese created disturbances and generally disrupted the otherwise happy festivities. There has been no evidence that this disorder was caused by Chinese communist elements although this is feared by some members of the Chinese community.

We are aware of pro-Chinese communist sympathizers among Chinese employed at the United Nations Secretariat. There are approximately 200 Chinese working at the Secretariat, some of whom travel to Communist China periodically when granted home leave from their duties at the United Nations. Others travel regularly to Europe and are known to be in regular contact with Chinese communist diplomatic establishments there. As United Nations employees, these persons are free to make such travel and contacts and we are aware of the potential of their operating in this country on behalf of Communist China.

An apparent attempt to obtain sensitive electronic equipment from this country was thwarted recently when a Hong Kong

businessman was arrested in Canada. He was convicted for having made a false customs declaration on electronic equipment he obtained from company operated by a Chinese individual in Passaic, New Jersey. The equipment, which can be used for missile tracking, was apparently destined for Red China. The Chinese-American in Passaic who sold the equipment has since filed bankruptcy and has had liens placed on his firm by the United States Internal Revenue Service.

We are aware of other attempts of the Chinese communists to obtain strategic materials from this country for use in their nuclear and missile development. By obtaining this type of equipment, the Chinese communists can leap over the periods of research and development in their effort to catch up with other major powers.

Numerous individuals in this country have received unsolicited materials from propaganda distribution centers in China. Such materials are frequently sent to college newspapers and bookstores near college campuses, hoping to influence American youth toward sympathy for Red China. We have seen regular distribution, also unsolicited, of news releases from China directed at Negro publications in this country aimed at exploiting racial problems. The Chinese communist press makes frequent comments regarding racial and political difficulties in the U.S. and seeks by its propaganda activities to drive a wedge between the various groups of our society.

Over the past several years, we have seen the rise of young radical left-wing groups in this country. These groups follow the Chinese communist line and are generally composed of old-time Marxists who deserted the American Communist Party and of young radicals who seek violent and revolutionary action. The best example of these groups is the Progressive Labor Party, which played a leading role in the Harlem riots in New York City during 1964. We have seen indirect financial support for these groups from Communist China through excessive payments for the militant publications put out by these groups. We have not, however, seen direct evidence of Chinese control or direction of the activities of these groups in this country.

Recent allegations have been made to the effect that I engaged in a conspiracy to thwart the Paris peace talks by convincing the South Vietnamese government to refuse to cooperate with the government of the United States.

These allegations are both manifestly untrue and absurd.

I have not hitherto answered because I realize that, with a newly elected President faced with the most delicate problems of credibility in Asia, this is no time to reopen endless non-confidence-inspiring arguments about political expediency in the treatment of the Vietnamese issue in the last election.

Since however during an absence in Asia from which I have just returned the charges have been repeated and redecorated, I feel it may help if I make this comment.

1. On the face of the charges it will be observed that there is not the flimsiest evidence to sustain them except hearsay references to mysterious undisclosed wire tap evidence allegedly acquired by sources close to the Democratic Party. I challenge the presentation of any hard evidence to sustain these charges.

2. I deny the accusations as false. Presumptively they are politically inspired to find a scapegoat for inaccurate political calculations in high places by those who presumably had all instrumentalities of intelligence (untapped) at their disposal.

3. As I have earlier said, these charges are an insult to the integrity of our supposed ally, the government of South Vietnam. Any but the most naive - and I was an accredited war correspondent at nineteen - knows that a government in crisis, Vietnamese or American, makes its own determination as to what is in the interest of its national survival uninfluenced by an

4. I am a soldier's wife and I try to act as a soldier should pursuant to his orders and in channels. In addition to the formal duties I was asked to assume by the Republican hierarchy I served during the campaign as a Southeast Asia and Far Eastern consultant to the Key Issues Committee chaired by Senator John Tower of Texas. In that capacity and under his orders I acted along with others as "eyes and ears" for information from which the Committee could form judgments as to the likelihood of a political resolution of the Vietnamese conflict prior to the election and reported to him, among others, my every action and all my information.

Since the activities and direction of the Key Issues Committee are not a matter for me to discuss out of channels I have since the beginning of this controversy been instructed by Senator Tower to refer all inquiries to him. I have accordingly earlier referred further inquiries to him. It is interesting that up to date no one has made such inquiries of the Senator. As of today I am specifically authorized by him to say he still will welcome such inquiries.

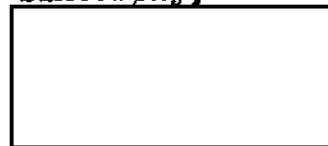

Smears Anna Chennault So As To Clear LBJ

TEDDY WHITE REWRITES HISTORY

Theodore H. (Teddy) White has had a relapse. Or rather, he is himself again. His series of books on Presidential election contests has eclipsed, ~~certainly for the new generation~~, his vigorous role in creating the propaganda climate in the United States as regards China that made Mao Tse-tung the victor. Edgar Snow, whose writings had greatest impact in creating this pro-communist, propaganda climate, hasn't had this luck. He tried South America as a diversion, but it wasn't sufficient. People persisted in remembering.

"Teddy" White, in his latest book, engages in a psychological warfare ploy of the sort that was so successful in rewriting contemporary events in China in a way to undercut its national government, to the advantage of the Moscow-backed, Chinese reds. This time, in "The Making of the President 1968," he uses a tactic called "transfer." He seeks to transfer the dismal intrigue at the last minute in the last election contest, by which Lyndon B. Johnson sought to rescue Hubert Humphrey by a fake Viet Nam "peace" effort. He exploits the fact that Mrs. Claire Lee (Anna) Chennault was in Asia at the time, to make it seem an anti-peace intrigue by her.

This is in character with the man who in a Chicago round table forum on Oct. 27, 1946 declared Moscow had "much less" influence on the Chinese reds than we had on the Chinese national government. He said Russia was "weary of war," and could only intervene "by direct armed intervention." This was a bit of "transfer," too. This was the period when the free and truly war-weary Chinese were fighting for survival, and the pro-red and fake "liberal" tom toms were beating for the book by Theodore White and Annalee Jacoby, entitled "Thunder Out of China." It indulged in such bare-faced deceptions as that the Chinese reds were not "an uncalled-for conspirational subversion."

All of this is brought out by Freda Utley in her historic book, "The China Story... How We Lost 40,000,000 Allies," published in 1951. This was the period when authors favoring the Chinese communists were reviewing each other's books in the N. Y. Times. Then any book---without exception---that took the side of the Chinese free government either was ignored completely or pilloried. She refers to White as one of the "champions of the Chinese Communists."

SAME PROPAGANDA GIMMICKS THEN AS NOW IN U.S.

White tells us in his 1946 book that the Chinese people seek merely "change"---doesn't the word, "change," sound familiar to us today? The same synonym is being used by the pro-reds in the United States now, along with the other ploys that were used in China then by communists, such as seizure of buildings and holding executives as hostages in their offices, demands for large sums as "reparations" for the alleged sins of past generations, and acceptance of "guilt" in brainwashing (sensitivity training) sessions.

White wrote, in this book, that the communists "seek peace," and that "they, and they alone, have given effective leadership to the peasant's irresistible longing for justice in his daily life.... the Communists have established a new way of life."

Anyone who recalls the last Presidential election should remember the desperate search for a sure-fire election appeal for Humphrey, of the sort that President Kennedy came up with in the Congressional elections when he suddenly announced the discovery of missile sites in Red Cuba. They were already known to such senators as Kenneth B. Keating, but their offices were under strictest secrecy orders on the subject by the State Department, through use of the "classification" device.

At exactly the right moment, President Johnson came forth with a "peace" plan for Viet Nam, by which we would begin so-called "negotiations" with Hanoi. These required a virtually hysterical capitulation by the government at Saigon to a whole series of North Viet Nameese demands, that would have tied it hand and foot.

Anna Chennault was abroad at the time. This writer assumes that any knowledgeable American with a trusted background, in that area at the time, was asked to discuss this, and was asked, too, what hope there was in relying upon American pledges. This was sufficient for White's purposes. The easy assumption was that the Democrats under Hubert Humphrey would have been able to achieve the peace we all want, if only Johnson's project had not been torpedoed by the widow of the creator of our heroic "Flying Tigers." This is White's ugly implication, and a tidier, more cunning rewriting of history would be hard to find, even these days.

The propaganda lie was spread throughout the nation as pre-publication publicity for the book. A typical leading paragraph was Philip Potter's in the Baltimore Sun: "Theodore H. White's new book suggests that Hubert H. Humphrey might have won the Presidency last November by exploiting information that a beauteous Oriental supporter of Richard M. Nixon tried to 'sabotage' Viet Nam peace negotiations on Mr. Nixon's behalf."

Mrs. Chennault Denies Seeking Peace Talk Delay

Widow of General Describes
White's Account as 'Insult'

TAIPEI, Taiwan, July 22 (UPI)—Mrs. Anna Chan Chennault, widow of Lieut. Gen. Claire Lee Chennault, described as an "insult" today a published report that she had tried to delay the Vietnam peace talks in Paris to help the Nixon campaign.

The report was contained in Theodore H. White's book "The Making of the President — 1968."

Mr. White said Mrs. Chennault, an active supporter of Richard M. Nixon's Presidential campaign, had tried to work up resistance to the peace talks in Saigon as well as in South Korea and Nationalist China.

Working Up Resistance

"This is an insult to my intellect and the integrity of the South Vietnamese Government," she said in a news conference. "Now that we have elected a President, we should support him, whoever he is," said Mrs. Chennault, a former Chinese journalist who became a United States citizen after marrying General Chennault during World War II.

In his book, Mr. White said Mrs. Chennault tried to work up resistance to the Paris peace

talks in Saigon, Seoul and Taipei while President Johnson was trying to get them started. Mr. White wrote that Mrs. Chennault talked with Government leaders of the three countries "apparently implying as she went that she spoke for the Nixon campaign." Mr. White reported that Mr. Nixon's Democratic opponent, Hubert H. Humphrey, knew of Mrs. Chennault's activity, but declined to raise the point in the campaign because he did not believe Mr. Nixon had approved or was aware of her actions. The Nixon campaign headquarters was furious when

it learned of Mrs. Chennault's activity, Mr. White said.

Mrs. Chennault, who arrived in Taipei Sunday on a tour of Asia, said she planned to return to Washington Friday.

Her husband won fame as commander of the Flying Tigers, a group of volunteer American pilots who helped defend China early in World War II.

Further Comments Offered

TAIPEI, Taiwan, July 22 (AP)—Elaborating on her remarks, Mrs. Chennault said:

"Some day when the right time comes, all the facts will be made known.

"I have never met Mr. White, although he is described as a China expert. He was on the China mainland before, while I was still a high school girl.

"Mr. White is an excellent writer, but sometimes good writers can make mistakes. It would be naive to say any individual man or woman could influence the nation.

"Today, we already have people who have gone to the moon. And as far as I am concerned, the election campaign is over. To me, America's interest comes first and the Republican party second.

Black Mark for Teddy White

Being personally acquainted with Mrs. Anna Chennault, I have read with some distaste an Associated Press account of how the latest book by Theodore H. White (*The Making of a President 1968*) portrays her. It seems only decent that the right tag should be put on work of this kind.

To try to re-inflate HHH into a political Sir Galahad in a post mortem of a presidential election quite understandably makes a bookman blow pretty hard. But it takes an ink-slinging stinker to try it by character assassination of a woman as perceptive and consecutive in her thinking, resolute in speaking her mind and as delicately charming personally as Anna Chennault.

Among other political sins—as the weasel words slither over them—Mrs. Chennault “neglected to take the most elementary precautions of an intriguer.”

Actually, what could be better proof that her political activities on the Republican side of the campaign were out in the open?

It turns out that she, a Chinese by birth and an American citizen by choice, knew her Asia deeply enough to know how to thwart a sell-out of South Vietnam, which was being pushed at the time for election purposes by Asia amateurs whispering little fables about “peace” in Lyndon Johnson’s ear. If, as acknowledged in the book, she did it single-handedly, it was quite an accomplishment.

As for HHH’s decency, diminished by excessive awe at it, when he chose not to win the election by charging Richard Nixon with complicity in Mrs. Chennault’s “sabotage” of this allegedly surefire Democratic issue in the last four days of the campaign: wherein lies the decency? The charge would have been crooked in the first place.

Mrs. Chennault Denies Seeking Peace Talk Delay

Widow of General Describes White's Account as 'Insult'

TAIPEI, Taiwan, July 22 (UPI)—Mrs. Anna Chan Chennault, widow of Lieut. Gen. Claire Lee Chennault, described as an "insult" today a published report that she had tried to delay the Vietnam peace talks in Paris to help the Nixon campaign.

The report was contained in Theodore H. White's book "The Making of the President — 1968."

Mr. White said Mrs. Chennault, an active supporter of Richard M. Nixon's Presidential campaign, had tried to work up resistance to the peace talks in Saigon as well as in South Korea and Nationalist China.

Working Up Resistance

"This is an insult to my intellect and the integrity of the South Vietnamese Government," she said in a news conference.

"Now that we have elected a President, we should support him, whoever he is," said Mrs. Chennault, a former Chinese journalist who became a United States citizen after marrying General Chennault during World War II.

In his book, Mr. White said Mrs. Chennault tried to work up resistance to the Paris peace

it learned of Mrs. Chennault's activity, Mr. White said.

Mrs. Chennault, who arrived in Taipei Sunday on a tour of Asia, said she planned to return to Washington Friday.

Her husband won fame as commander of the Flying Tigers, a group of volunteer American pilots who helped defend China early in World War II.

Further Comments Offered

TAIPEI, Taiwan, July 22 (AP)—Elaborating on her remarks, Mrs. Chennault said:

"Some day when the right time comes, all the facts will be made known."

"I have never met Mr. White, although he is described as a China expert. He was on the China mainland before, while I was still a high school girl."

"Mr. White is an excellent writer, but sometimes good writers can make mistakes. It would be naive to say any individual man or woman could influence the nation."

"Today, we already have people who have gone to the moon. And as far as I am concerned, the election campaign is over. To me, America's interest comes first and the Republican party second."

talks in Saigon, Seoul and Taipei while President Johnson was trying to get them started. Mr. White wrote that Mrs. Chennault talked with Government leaders of the three countries "apparently implying as she went that she spoke for the Nixon campaign."

The Director has indicated that he will see Anna Chennault, the wife of the late Lieutenant General Claire Lee Chennault, at 10:15 a. m., Friday, October 24, 1969 (u)

Mrs. Chennault is well known to the Director and is on the Special Correspondents List. She has met with Mr. Hoover on a number of occasions in the Director's Office and at their last meeting on July 11, 1966, Mr. Hoover remarked as follows: (u)

"Mrs. Chennault is strongly anticommunist and when she is not traveling abroad, she is making appearances before schools and colleges in this country trying to enlighten the younger generation on just what communism is and what it has done in the countries which it has taken over."

Mrs. Chennault has frequently traveled in the Far East and is well acquainted with a number of prominent leaders in that area of the world. It will be recalled that at the instructions of the White House we instituted a physical surveillance of Mrs. Chennault from approximately 10-30 to 11-7-68, particularly in connection with her contacts with [redacted] Apparently President Johnson's staff suspected her of being involved in some sort of peace overture in behalf of the Nixon campaign team. No pertinent information was developed during the surveillance. (S) (U)

By letter dated March 28, 1968 the Director indicated that he had read her statement (attached) with great interest and indicated that he was looking forward to seeing her in the near future. Bufiles contain no information to indicate that the Director has seen her in his office at any time following this letter (u)

Mrs. Chennault's main file contains no pertinent derogatory information concerning her, and the records of the Identification Division disclosed no arrest data identifiable with her. The personal files of the Director's Office were checked in connection with the preparation of this memorandum. The Director was photographed with Mrs. Chennault at a party he attended in her home in 1965. He autographed a copy of this picture to her on 9-29-65. 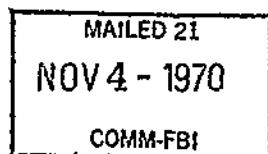

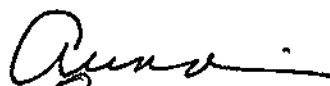

Asians Can't Comprehend

Mrs. Chennault Urging People Of U.S. to Dismiss Self-Doubt

BY MEL FREELAND

The widow of the famed World War II Flying Tigers' Lt. Gen. Claire L. Chennault called for Americans to end their self-doubt and stop apologizing for their actions.

Chinese-born Mrs. Anna Chennault told more than 400 Houston Navy League members and their wives Tuesday night at a dinner in the Warwick Hotel, "People in Asia can't comprehend why the United States, with her wealth and power, is so full of self-doubt.

"Each day the thousands of people who seek entry into the United States should be an outstanding testimony for the

American people that we who believe in free enterprise surely have something better to offer, that our democratic system is certainly better than that being enforced behind the Bamboo and Iron Curtains."

Mrs. Chennault, vice-president of the Flying Tiger Line, an air freight industry based in Washington, D.C., is the first woman vice-president of a U.S. airline.

She travels extensively throughout the United States and Asia speaking to business and educational institutions and service organizations.

Mrs. Chennault is President Nixon's adviser to the Kennedy Culture Center and the

State Department's commissioner to UNESCO.

"In America," she said, "a psychology of defeat has brought a new growth of isolationism to our people — exactly what the Communists want.

"The assumption is this: If the American public talks itself out of supporting freedom in Vietnam, it most certainly will not support freedom anywhere in the Pacific and, therefore, not in Berlin or the Middle East.

"They (the Communists) see Asia as a turning point in all our past policy toward supporting freedom," Mrs. Chennault said.

On March 22, 1971, Mrs. Claire L. Chennault was interviewed by Special Agents of the FBI at her office, Flying Tiger Airlines, 1511 K Street, N.W., Room Number 1042, Washington, D. C. (WDC). She stated that shortly before 11:00 a.m. on this date her secretary, [redacted] received a telephone call from an unknown male stating he had a watch that had belonged to her husband and wished to return it to her. After her secretary relayed the caller to her, she said she talked to him briefly. He reiterated the information and requested her address, which she gave him.

On March 22, 1971, [redacted] furnished the same information. She additionally stated that approximately five minutes after she talked to the man on the telephone, he appeared at the door. He requested to see Mrs. Chennault, and when advised she did not wish to see him, gave [redacted] a Timex watch. He stated the watch was given to him by General Chennault in 1947. She said he acted in a strange manner and requested that she write the following note to be given to Mrs. Chennault:

Mme Chennault finds U.S. still Asia's hope

By SOLVEIG EGGERZ ²⁴

"To give the world the impression that the United States is dropping out of Asia as a military power is a very dangerous game to play." The League of Republican Women heard this message yesterday from their party's leading exotic, anti-communist hardliner Anna Chennault. The beautiful Chinese-American widow of Gen. Claire Chennault is just back from an extensive tour of Asia where she visited with heads of state in the Philippines, Malaysia, Taiwan, Vietnam, Thailand, and Singapore.

"All the leaders of these countries look to America," she said. "You might hear of anti-American feeling in Asia but I think it's over-emphasized."

"War has never been popular, but the path to peace isn't easy and without a secure peace we might have an even bigger war."

Calling the public demand to cut funds for the war "shortsighted" she said, "that will only open our nation to nuclear blackmail. Soviet Russia has certainly not cut military spending and if we do we can stop considering ourselves a military power by 1975."

A holder of a degree in journalism and a contributor to various newspapers, Madame Chennault accused the press of blaming everything on the Vietnam war.

"When a husband and wife quarrel it's blamed on the war. Even if the war ended tomorrow, I don't think all our domestic problems of crime, pollution and other things would go away."

Madame Chennault who came to the United States in the 1950s says "the accomplishment of America is the miracle of our time. The test of our time is to prove that man can match the growth of power with the growth of spirit and character."

Calling the economic system in Asia, that we fashioned, "the Spirit of Asia," she cites Japan, with the highest standard of living in Asia, as an example of "how people who are free are the best producers."

Should Vietnam fall, Madame Chennault feels all of Asia will follow, right down to Australia. She advocates considering the long-term objective rather than immediate peace.

Citing the differences between American and

Asian psychology she said, "we enjoy our power and glory, but the Asians have a more fatalistic attitude, an acceptance to tragedy. They're much more practical about man's nature and long-term objective."

She said the Asians consider, "peace at any price no peace at all. They know the difference between a good and bad settlement."

Mme. Chennault strongly supports Taiwan and the exclusion of Red China from the United Nations. "They're not all Communists on the mainland. Proof is the many who escape."

She says "the forces of freedom are looking to America for help. While people are fighting for freedom we shouldn't make a compromise with the enemy. Red China is supplying 20 per cent of the arms of the Viet Cong and Russia is supplying 80 per cent of the hardware to kill American boys."

As Vice President of the Flying Tiger Line Madame Chennault visits Asia many times a year. "Many people in Asia don't agree with our involvement in Vietnam," she says, "but they all want America to stand strong."

As an example of a Communist loss she points to Indonesia where, "the people turned from Communist control, because in 1967 we stood firm on the Vietnam issue. This gave the people courage."

There appears to be no Bureau jurisdiction and Metropolitan Police Department and U. S. Secret Service have been notified concerning the threat to Mrs. Chennault and that there is no FBI jurisdiction.

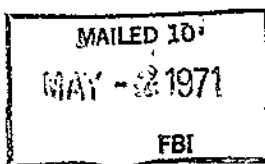

The Perils of Trade With China

By ANNA CHENNAULT

WASHINGTON—Ever since the revolution against the Manchus establishing the first Chinese Republic in 1911 three generations of my family have been deeply involved in the attempt to transform China politically, educationally and economically into the kind of modern nation in which one of the truly great peoples of history could have the Four Freedoms that friends of China wish for all the peoples of the world—freedom of speech and expression, freedom of worship, freedom from want and freedom from fear.

That task has been difficult because China has never known internal peace for 100 years as the result of attempts by foreign powers. Critics of the "failures" of those who have attempted to lead China into the modern world have never taken into account the burden caused by nations who saw profit in cheap natural resources and cheap labor.

I have friends and relatives in Mainland China and Overseas China as well as in Taiwan. I, by marriage, and my sisters by birth, are U.S. citizens as, of course, are our children. I can appreciate all points of view of all loyalties of Chinese. As against exploiters and China's hereditary real enemies, we are all in heart Chinese together, whether Nationalist, Mainlander or Overseas. But as a practical matter in a world where Chinese hearts have to make choices, my own attitude has always revolved around the only hard certainties among ideological fantasies.

(1) The United States, alone among great powers, has been genuinely and generously friendly to the hopes of those who want to make China a modern and peaceful nation; the United States alone, unlike Russia or Japan, does not hope for exploitation of the resources of China.

(2) The Communist Government on Mainland China has never, despite fluctuations, lost the orientation and support of its Russian origin since the Western powers, mistakenly refusing to back the first revolution against the Manchus, forced its leaders to take Communist Russian help.

(3) The U.S. economic and military interest in the Pacific (inescapable in the one world of dwindling natural resources and distributed technology) is far more securely related to Chinese power than to the power of either Russia or Japan. These nations will never give up their original hopes to make China their pawn to unify Asia under themselves—and also will never forget the U.S. frustration of their megalomaniac dreams.

(4) By the adoption of U.S. methods of free enterprise the Nationalist Government on Formosa, as compared to Mainland China, has had phenomenal economic success in raising the living standards of all its people and, even by American standards, their comparative freedom.

(5) I am a journalist and a businesswoman. I know the simplicity that trade accounts must ultimately balance. U.S. businessmen who think that there must be profitable markets in a China of Communist economics are deluded. It is the same story which the same businessmen pressed upon President Roosevelt to recognize Soviet Russia. We supposedly learned then that the one-buyer, one-seller economy of a Communist country, in which trade is primarily a political weapon, will never yield a business profit to a competitive free enterprise counterpart.

Certainly no trade can be carried on with a Communist underdeveloped country with nothing equivalent to export except on the basis of loans and credit—supplied by U.S. taxpayers'

money. The only beneficiaries of "trade" with the Peking state-trading-monopoly, supported by credits at the expense of the U.S. economy and individual taxpayers, will be the first clever operators in deals sanctioned by Peking for political purposes.

All Communist China trade is managed for political objectives. As to imports from Communist China, can the U.S. take what Peking has to export, i.e., textiles, hog bristles, peanuts, soybeans—or heroin?

I know all generalizations about changing China's hundred years of agony are doubtful. No one has lived through more disillusionment than my generation of Chinese. But I bite the bullet of heartbreaking real choices and look to the future. I am sure that the best interests of my own and my children's country, the United States, and all the people of my brilliant, hardworking and deserving Chinese race whether in Taiwan, Overseas China or on the Mainland are linked to the United States. That link is to both the unambitious political generosity of the United States and the American free-enterprise way of life.

I do not pretend that Nationalist China any more than any other nation but ourselves is the pure uninhibited democracy we have quixotically and unsuccessfully for a generation tried to thrust upon the rest of the world. But we can only live with the world as it is. And the best hope as I see it for the great Chinese people and ourselves to live together in a long future is through Chinese men and women who understand and try to live by America's political and economic message.

Anna Chennault is vice president of The Flying Tigers Airline, founded by her late husband, Maj. Gen. Claire L. Chennault, who headed the U.S. air task force in China, 1942-45.

FBI chief hits new China policy

By Paul Scott

WASHINGTON — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover is about to become deeply embroiled in another far-reaching controversy — the growing debate on President Nixon's new China policy. Hoover's role as a central figure in the debate has been virtually assured by two events growing out of his courageous decision to speak out about Peking's stepped up subversion in this country.

The first event involves the publication of an article by Hoover titled "Mao's Red Shadows in America," appearing in the Veterans of Foreign Wars magazine. It tells the story of Peking's growing subversion in the U.S. The second event was a decision by a group of lawmakers headed by Representative John G. Schmitz (R. Calif.) to use the article to rally support in and out of Congress to bar Red China's entry into the United Nations and to try to get President Nixon to reverse his decision to trade with Communist China.

President Nixon and his foreign advisers see Communist China not as an enemy but as a vast market for U.S. farm surpluses and goods, while Hoover tells the story of Peking's activities toward the U.S. as they are. He writes: "Mao Tse-tung, the Red Chinese dictator, is some 6,000 miles from the U.S. But the shadows of pro-Peking subversion are daily becoming a more serious problem in this country. We can expect the subversive danger to grow. . . ."

Hoover documented several examples of Peking's growing subversion and then stressed that it will get much worse should Communist China be admitted to the U.N. or is recognized diplomatically by the U.S., stating: "The FBI's investigation reflects stepped up intelligence and espionage activity by Peking. Red Chinese intelligence in the U.S., as compared with Soviet Russia's, has a major handicap in that Peking is not recognized diplomatically by this country nor is it a member of the United Nations.

"This deprives the Red Chinese of a legal base from which to operate spies. A high percentage of Soviet espionage, for example, is carried out by Soviet diplomats assigned to either the Soviet embassy in Washington or the USSR's mission to the United Nations in New York."

Even without this legal base, Peking is now adding a variety of pro-Maoist groups bent on touching off a revolution in the U.S., according to Hoover. Two of the most militant of these are the Revolutionary Union (RU) and the Progressive Labor Party, which, although often in dispute over the tactics of bringing about the revolution, are working zealously for the Red Chinese cause.

Hoover revealed that one of RU's West Coast leaders recently told a secret meeting of its members to quit putting emphasis on theoretical work and "start arming." The latter policy, Hoover reported, is already in effect, stating: "FBI investigations reflect that RU members already have accumulated weapons and have engaged in firearms and guerrilla warfare training. Originally based in San Francisco area, RU has now spread to other cities in the South, Midwest and East."

Hoover also detailed a variety of ways that Communist China is now attempting espionage in the U.S. One is to endeavor to introduce deep cover intelligence agents into the U.S. — trained Peking agents who clandestinely enter this country using false identities and identifications and attempt under the cover of being an American to conduct spy operations.

Penetration of Chinese ethnic groups in the U.S. is also being tried by Peking, Hoover said. He pointed out that Mao leaders constantly seek to identify those Chinese Americans who might help them, especially among the younger elements who might have a sentimental pride in the so-called "accomplishments" of Mao in the ancestral homeland.

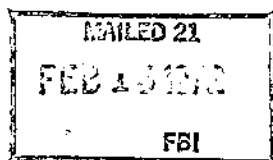

Captioned individual telephonically contacted my office and advised that in all probability the "New York Times" would publish articles this coming weekend concerning activities of the Bureau and former Assistant to the Director C. D. DeLoach. He mentioned that several of the items to be covered in these articles have previously been published in the media, such as the FBI's activities in Atlantic City, however, the Times planned to report on 2 items which have not been previously publicized. He commented that these 2 items were as follows: (u)

(1) That DeLoach testified under oath that the FBI obtained records of toll calls of members of Vice President Agnew's staff in 1968 and that the FBI placed a wiretap and a physical surveillance on Anna Chennault at the request of then President Lyndon B. Johnson.

(2) That 2 former top officials of the FBI have acknowledged that, at the White House's request, the identities of all public officials, including Members of Congress, who entered or exited the Soviet Embassy in Washington, D.C. be furnished to the White House. Horrock indicated that he was aware that the FBI had a fixed lookout on the Embassy.

Anna C. Chennault

Mrs. Anna Chennault came in to see me September 30th. She brought with her the enclosed newspaper article from a Chinese language newspaper together with the enclosed translation.

Mrs. Chennault states that she has made numerous speeches around the country in which she has criticized Chinese nationals for not becoming good U. S. citizens and believes that this article may stem from those activities. It is well known, she noted, that she is very close to the Reagan Administration. She observed that she had no contacts with the FBI about the United Bamboo Gang but that apparently she is being given credit for some of our activities.

Mrs. Chennault expressed some mild concern for her safety. She asked for a point of contact in the event she should obtain any information relative to the subject matter. I gave her your name. I also assured her that if we developed any intelligence that she was the target of any kind of terrorist activity we would take appropriate steps to advise her and do whatever else was necessary to avoid injury to her.

If you have any more information on this than I am aware of, please let me know.

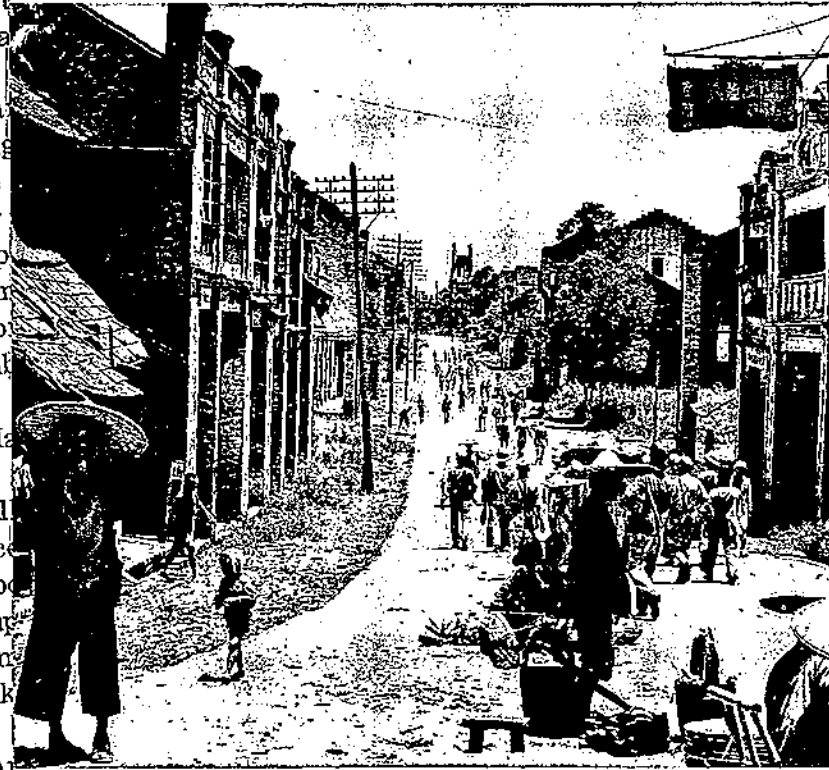
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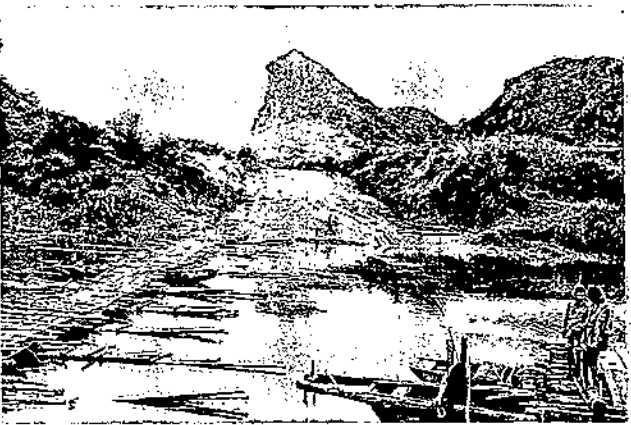

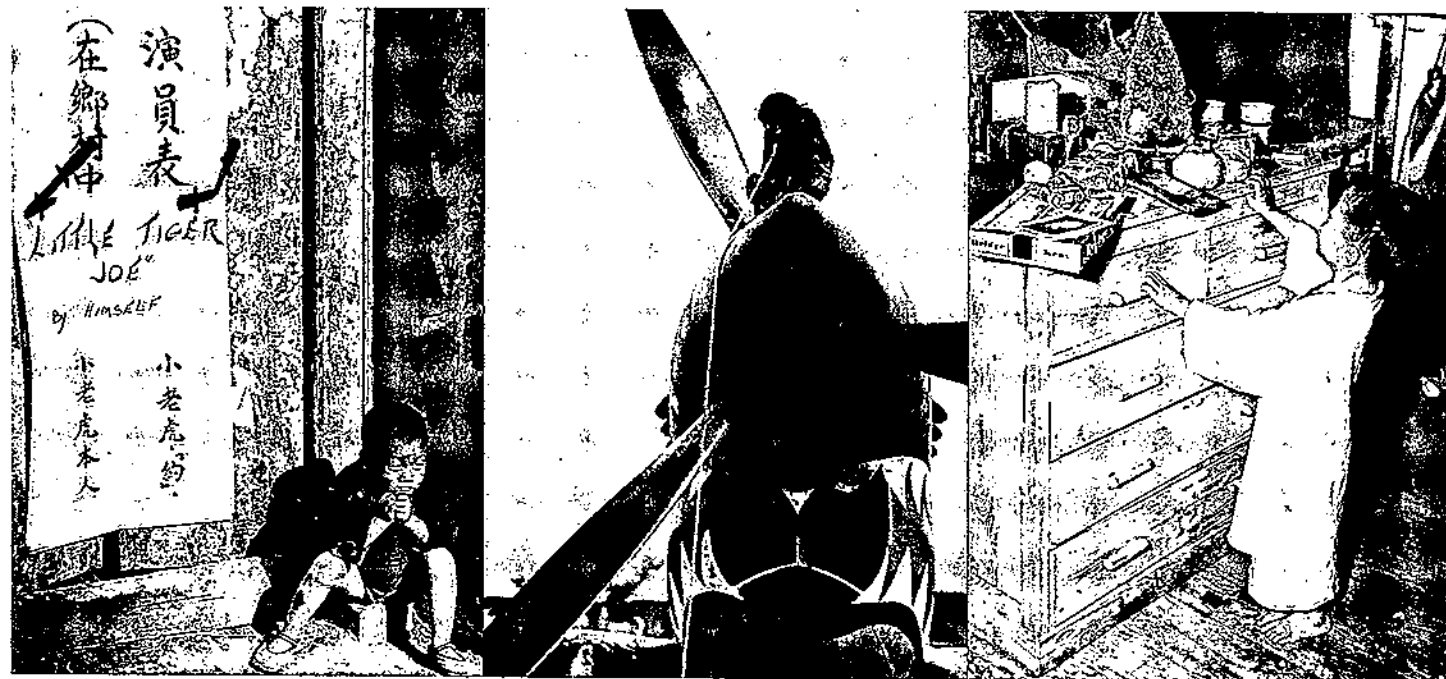

And a line for each of them, it appears, can be found in that of the "Chao Mu" (grandmother), above, whose countenance makes Chennault's look baby-smooth by comparison. She tilled the soil with her primitive tools alongside the bases and then-modern mechanical equipment of the 14th Air Force while her grandson in the lower left wove baskets near Chengtu to earn enough money to buy her a Christmas gift of Jergens Lotion.

Approbation of this act of filial devotion is expressed in the "Ding Haos" of a pair of Linchow's leading socialites in the upper right. But - and wouldn't you know there'd be at least two in every crowd? - revulsion at the whole sordid affair is revealed in the succeeding shot in the physiognomies of the pair of matrons of the Pieh tribe, who live in the area between Lungling and Mangshih. Here, as shown, married women wear black, turban-style hats to indicate their status, a practice that is not only more economical than platinum wedding bands but also more readily distinguishable on a crowded night club dance floor.

The entire matter is finally resolved at the next regularly-scheduled meeting of the Lolo Tribesmen's City Commission (lower right), the broad wink by the patriarch on the right indicating an indulgent attitude toward Granny's foible. The Loyal Opposition (standing) seems resigned.



THE G I IN CHINA: AN AVID COLLECTOR OF SOUVENIRS



Framed by an ancient Chinese doorway in the upper left squats "Little Tiger Joe", a refugee child adopted by one of the units of the 14th Air Force. He is truly representative of the American soldier's propensity for acquiring things while stationed in a foreign land. The mascot of the 16th Fighter Squadron, whose resemblance to anyone living or dead is not to be construed as a bad joke on the editor's part, is shown next, flanked by another shot of Little Joe celebrating the first Christmas day he had known, sponsored by his foster fathers, the 907th Engineers.

In the sequence below the head of the Kunming Daughters of the Boxer Rebellion is seen on the left entering her headquarters while next to her another favorite of the 14th Air Force, Miss Cafe Society is perched on one of her favorite haystacks. Little Lord Fauntleroy in the lower right seems bemused as he enjoys a mid-day snack.

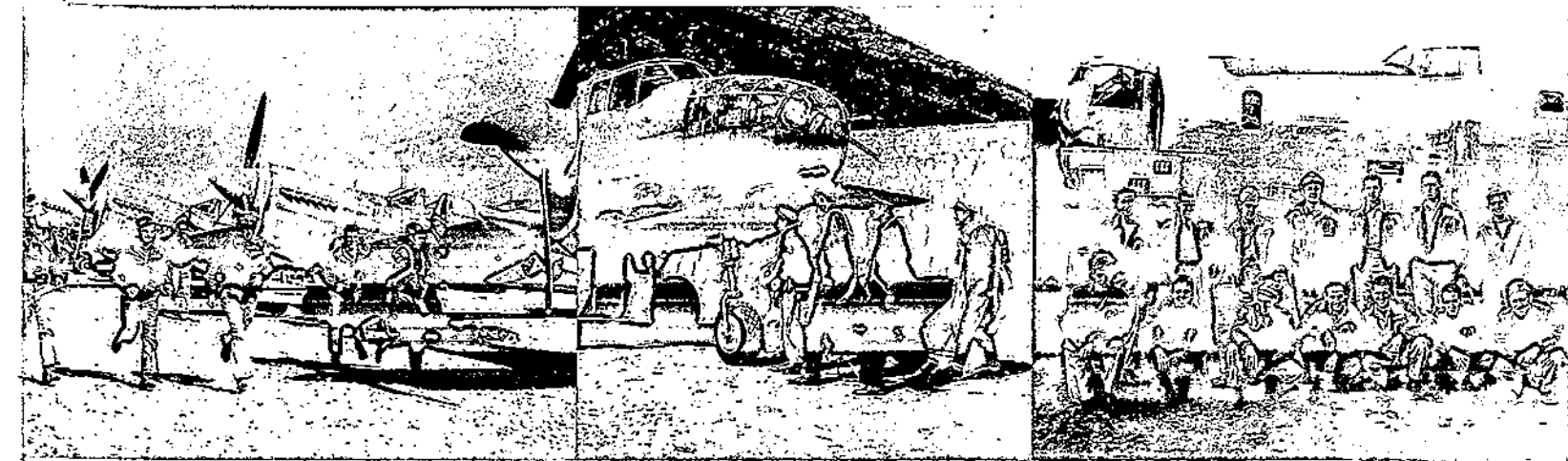

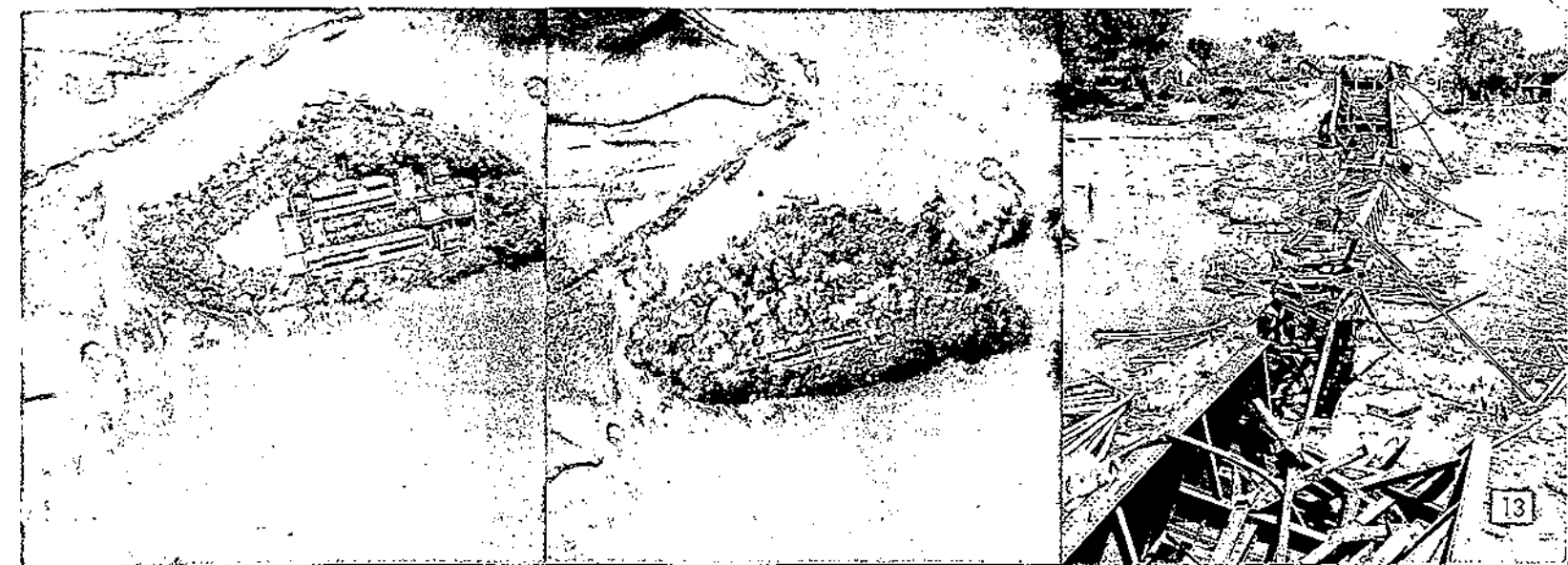

The lower sequence graphically illustrates the object of the game. A well-hidden Jap warehouse complex dozes peacefully at the water's edge on the left in the "before" picture. It dozes no longer in the "after" photo in the center, as considerable smoke produced by a fusillade of 14th Air Force Bombs pours skyward from the every corner. And to the right of it that's no factory defect in the bridge at Luchow which is not even fit to hold a row of teeth after lads like the ones in the top row of daguerreotypes get through working it over.





And hot stuff, indeed, was M/Sgt. Howard Arnegard (CATF) on that summer day in 1943 when he was presented a silken banner (above), replete with Chinese and American Kudos, by Gen. Chennault for designing the official 14th Air Force insignia.

Now a successful Oklahoma City architect, Howard is shown (right) displaying selfsame banner at 20th Anniversary Party in New York on March 23, 1963, to goggle-eyed fellow China Hands. Looking on are Commander Wong, Free China's representative in the UN and our own Anna Chennault.

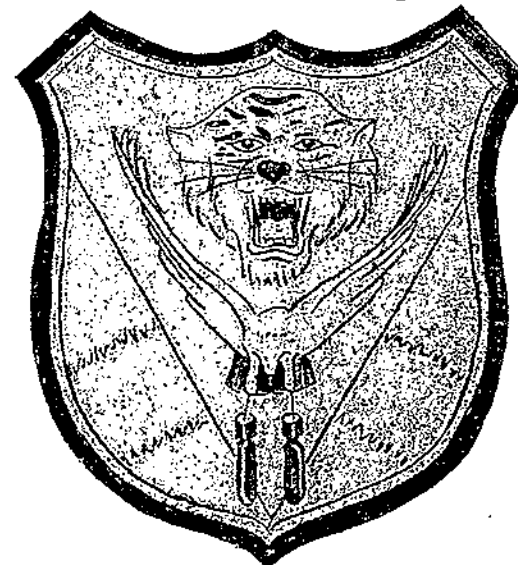

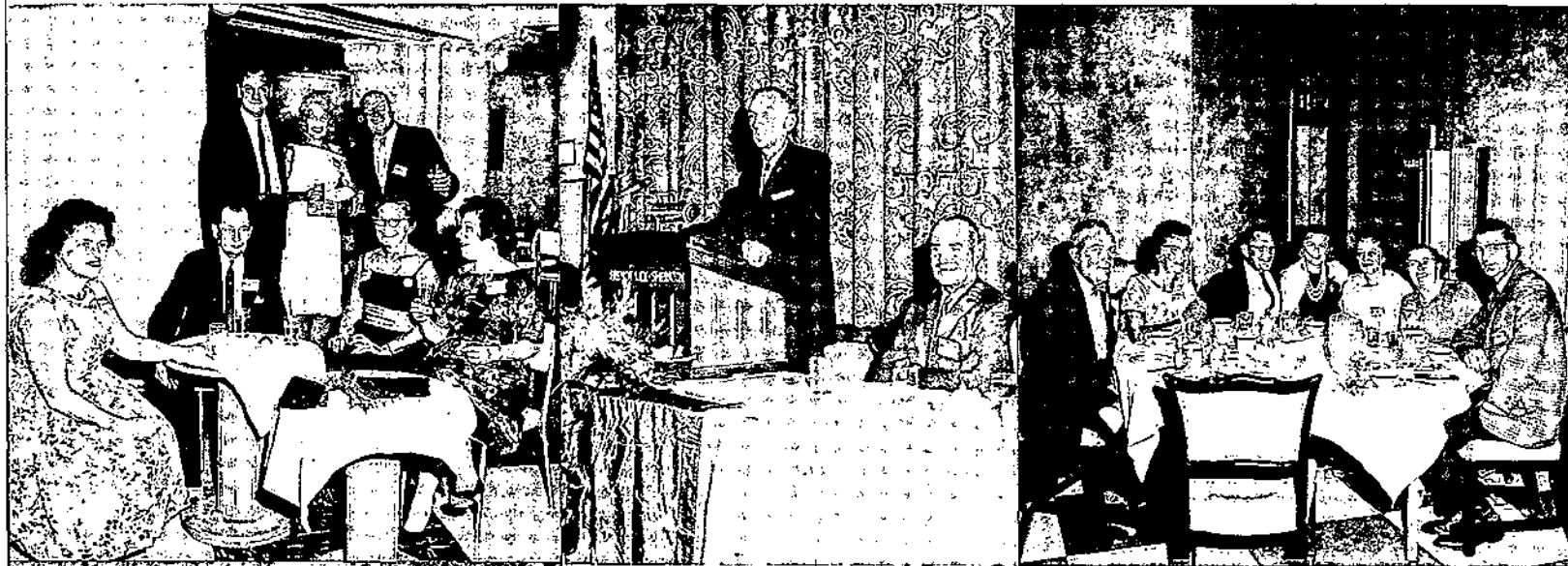

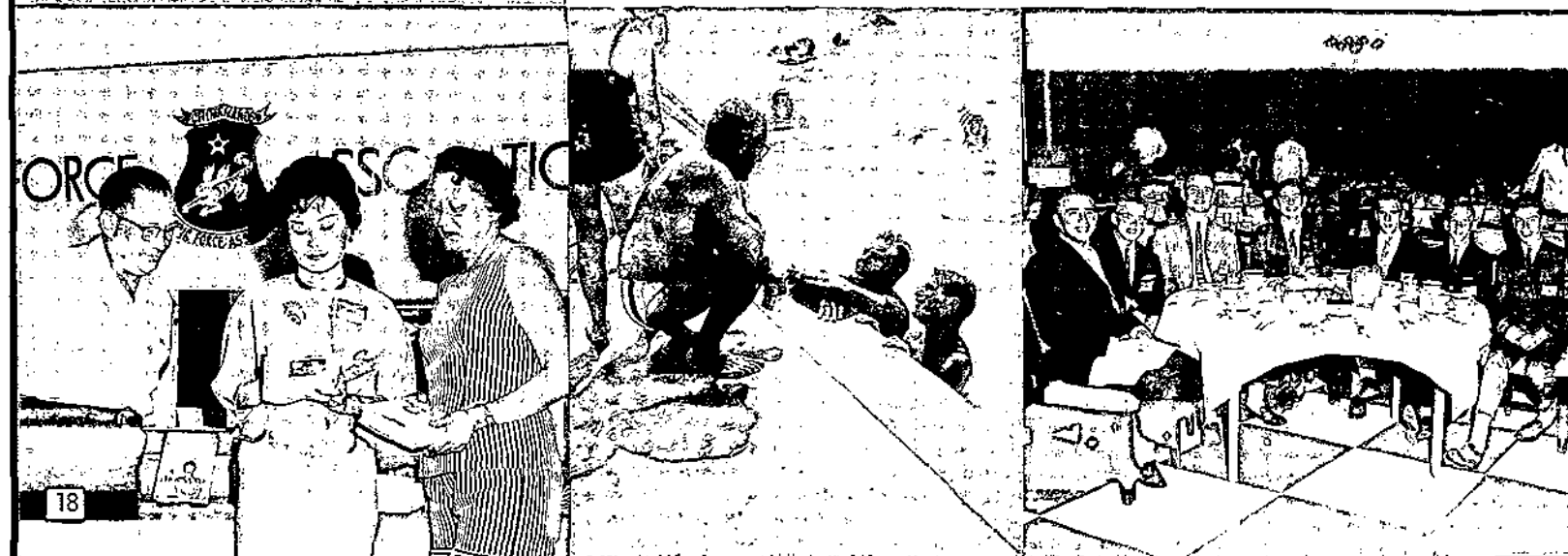

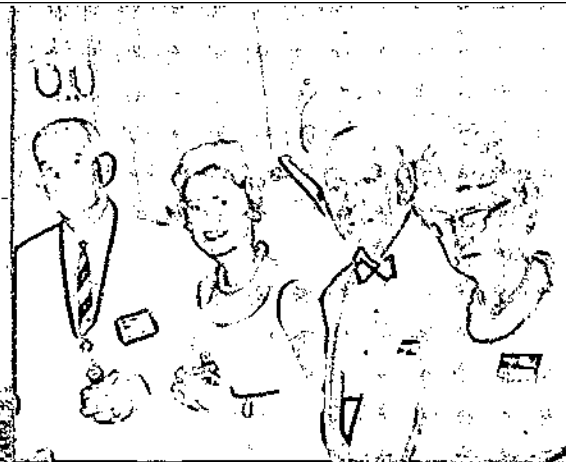


The clan gathers annually around Memorial Day to pay tribute to Gen. Chennault's memory. This year May 25 was the date.

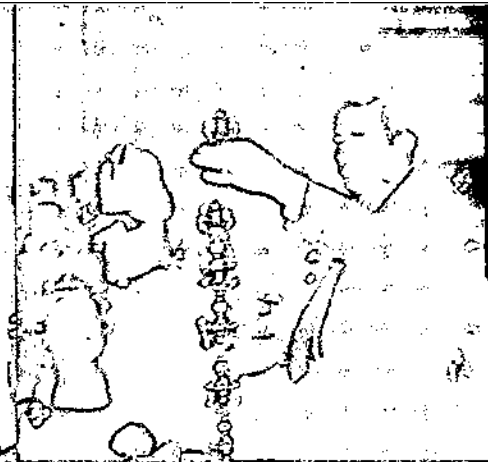

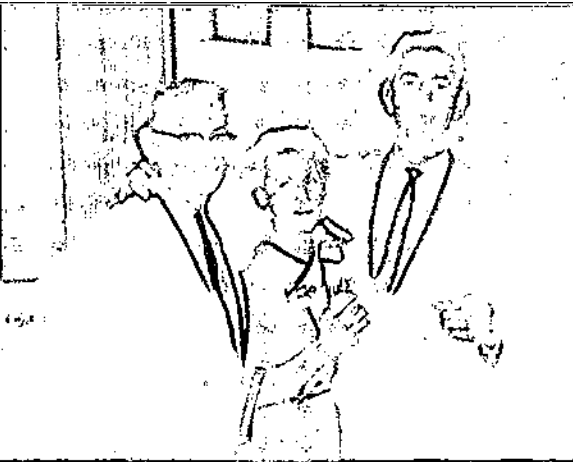

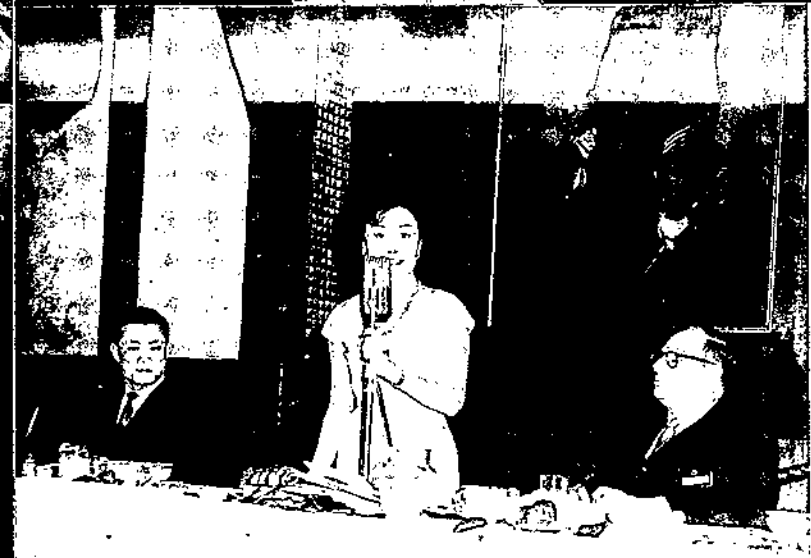
