



MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

The fingerprints of Fred Barker, with aliases, deceased, which were transmitted to the Division with the letter attached hereto, signed by Mr. E. J. Connelley, Special Agent in Charge, were examined in the Identification Unit and found to show very serious mutilation. The finger ridges were obliterated over large portions of the fingertips. Accurate classification of these fingerprints would be impossible. Fnough characteristic detail showed, however, to permit identification.

Then the fingerprints were received in the Technical Section of the Identification Unit, however, they were immediately compared with the fingerprints in the special mutilated fingerprint file and were identified with a photographic copy of fingerprints of Fred Barker which had been placed in the special file as indicated in my memorandum of September 26, 1934.



Oklawaha, Florida, let's answer a few questions about Fred
Barker. He was born in Oklahoma; together with his brother he
engaged in a series of mid-western crimes. Fred Barker was one
of the prisoners who escaped from the Kansas State Penitentiary
in 1931. Since then he has had a career of hold-ups and killings.
The authorities identified him with the notorious Blackburn gang,
the mob that for more than a year has been hunted in connection
with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, the St. Paul brewer.
Federal men announced some time ago that the two Barker brothers
had been identified by fingerprints as members of the Bremer kidnaping gang. So Fred Barker has been rated as one of the
country's most dangerous outlaws.

And now let's see where Oklawaha is. The lake country of Florida runs down the center of that glorious state, honeycombed with lakes and towns - a region of farms, truck farms where the Florida winter vegetables are grown. Oklawaha is on Lake Weir, a small town drowsing in the mellow warmth of the South. And now what happened. Fred Barker and several others of the Blackburn gang took possession of a handsome summer cottage on the banks of the lake. With them was Barker's mother, sixtyfive years old. They call her "Ma" Kate. The Federal agents got a tip, so fifteen government men of J. Edgar Hoover's staff helped by local police surrounded that cottage on Lake Weir - and

the battle was on. The outlaws and "Ma" Kate barricaded themselves in the house and fought it out with machine guns. The Federal men with machine guns and tear gas bombs fought like soldiers on the outside from places of shelter, from cover. The gun fire was incessant. People from the surrounding country reported that the continuous shooting sounded like a small battle, and the fight lasted for five hours. The government agents riddled the cottage with bullets - and how did it end?

Barker, shot and killed and his sixty-five year old mother, "Ma" Kate, shot dead - a machine gun at her side. The several others of the gang all accounted for, either killed or captured. It looks as if the Federal agents with one stroke down there in the lake country of Florida had wiped out the Blackburn gang. That's one gun fight story; here's another.





On February 5, 1935, a telegraphic reply was received from the Winchester Repeating Arms Company, as follows:

"Retel Regret Have No Record of Sale of Browning Automatic Rifles by Serial Rumber"

On February 5, 1935, Mr. Keith sent another telegram to the Winchester Company, as follows:

*Retel Nineteen Eighteen Model Thirty Caliber
Browning Automatic Rifle Number Two Eleven
Three Four Nine Stop If No Record of Sale such

Replying to the above-quoted telegram, a long-distance telephone call was received by Mr. Keith February 5, 1935, from Mr. Berney, Sales Manager of the Winchester Company, who advised that in 1932 the Remington U. M. C. Co. and the Winchester Repeating Arms Company agreed to a concolidation and that during the general reorganization which followed, all records were destroyed of the .30 Caliber Browning Automatic Rifles, Model records were destroyed Mr. Keith that during the years 1933-34, several

.30 Caliber Browning Automatic Rifles, Model 1918, were sold to the firm of Sedgely of Philadelphia, dealers in firearms, munitions, etc.

On February 5, 1935, Special Agent Heffler of the Philadelphia Office was requested, by phone, to have an immediate sheck made by the firm of Sedgely at Philadelphia to ascertain if the above-described gun had been handled by that firm. Mr. Keith was subsequently advised, by phone, by the Philadelphia effice, that Sedgely had no record of the instant gun.

Mr. N. N. Herndon, Sales Tax Division, Internal Revenue, Treasury Department, in charge of the registration of firearms, as provided in the National Firearms Act approved June 26, 1934, made a search of his records and advised that the firearm referred to above has not been registered in accordance with the provisions of Section 5 - (a) of the National Firearms Acts

In the event it should become necessary, subpoens should issue on the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, who will designate Mr. No Me Herndon as one qualified to testify concerning the non-registration of this gun.

Inquiries were made of the following listed Service Branches of the United States as to whether one .30 Cal. Browning Automatic Rifle, Model 1918, Serial No. 211349, had ever been in their possession and if so, subsequently found to be missing or having been reported as stolene. Negative replies were received from the Service Branches listed below:

- 1. Mr. E. L. Kahlert, Ordnance Department, War Department;
- 2. Comdr. N. C. Gillette, Bureau of Ordnance, Navy Department;
- 5. Mr. H. G. America, Supply Division, U. S. Marine Corps;
- 4. Mr. S. A. Harvey, Ordnance Section, U. S. Coast Guard.

Mr. E. L. Kahlert, of the War Department, advised that the .30 Cal. Browning Automatic Rifles manufactured for the United States. Army, did not have serial numbers as high as 200,000.

Mr. M. M. Herndon, Sales fax Division, Internal Revenue,
Treasury Department, advised, as a matter of possible interest to this
Division, that his office had received a registration of two 30 Cale
Browning Automatic Rifles from Lieutenant L. F. Turner of the Palm
Beach, Florida, Police Department. According to the report made by
Lieutenant Turner, these guns had no serial numbers and that one had
been taken possession of by that police department in October, 1932,
and the other possessed in December, 1933. In the absence of serial
numbers, it appears that there has been stamped in the middle on the
right-hand side of the receiver, the following: "Property of P. D.,
right-hand side of the receiver, the following: Troperty of P. D.,
Palm Beach". Mr. Herndon pointed out the possibility that one of
these guns may have been obtained in some manner from the Palm Beach
Police Department and may be the gun which is the subject of this investigation.

Under date of January 31, 1935, there was received from Special Agent in Charge J. H. Hanson, Miami, Florida, a telegram stating that Harry Sawyer was identified as being in Miami about January 15, 1935, driving a black Packard sedan, bearing New Jersey license plates. This telegram requested that the Philadelphia Office ascertain if the car was registered by him in New Jersey.

Special Agent J. R. Sharp made an examination of the motor vehicle registrations at Trenton, N.J., on the same date. It was ascertained that no license for 1934 or 1935 was issued to Harry Sawyer under his correct name or aliases. Although the records revealed several Harry Sawyers who appeared to be residents of New Jersey for the past several years, a check was made of these New Jersey drivers without any result. The descriptions of each of these Sawyers were checked against the description of Subject and none were found that might correspond or be identical.

The files of the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, having yearly registrations filed by license numbers and owners' names are arranged alphabetically. All these files were searched under Harry Sawyer's correct name and aliases without ascertaining any identifying data with reference to the Packard sedan. The thought occurred that the car might be registered under Louis or Dutch Brooks and the records were searched without result. In this connection, it was

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ascertained through a perusal of the above captioned file that Sawyer usually has an alias starting with the letter "S". It is, therefore, thought that a search of all the owners and licensed drivers in New Jersey be made under the letter "S", in order to ascertain whether there is a recent registration of a black Packard sedan.

Jack Murray, the husband of Edna Murray, has been interviewed by an Agent and disclaimed that he has received any communication from Edna since her escape in December 1932. However, he furnished information regarding her family and personal history which, through investigation, resulted in securing much of the data now available regarding her. It is believed that he might be a helpful source of further information.

The family of Edna Eurray, Er. and Ers. N. D. Stanley, resided at Cardin, Oklahoma for over 25 years, originally having come from Eansas. The mother, Lula Stanley, is considered comewhat respectable But her two daughters, Doris and Edna, have led criminal careers from an early age. The father, N. D. Doris Connell, sister of Edna Murray, is thought to be in touch with Edna, and there is a probability that since they have always operated with the same criminals it might be possible to locate Edna through Doris. Doris Connell for most of the time since 1924 has been the paramour or wife of Earl Stuchlick and they have lived together a considerable portion of that time at Hill City, Kansas, which is the home of Stuchlick. The present location of Doris Connell, however, is unknown. It is indicated by the report of Special Agent Paul Hanson, dated at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma January 18, 1935, that Doris is believed residing somewhere near Kansas City, Missouri. However, the above circumstances would indicate a possibility that this is true and if within a short time the car is not registered in Missouri a circular letter will be issued in order to endeavor to locate it.

Agent Shanahan's report indicates inquiries at 3830 Main, at which time no identification was made from photographs of the various Subjects shown.

Mrs. Collier, who operates the Colonial Hotel, at 5850 Main Street,

Kansas City, Missouri, informed the Kansas City Office on Jamery 50, that the same party, Paden, had appeared at the hotel the previous hight.

The writer immediately proposeded to the Colonial Motel where Mrs. Collier informed that on the previous night Paden, together with en older mem, eppeared at the hotel. The older man registered under the name of "E. STEWART, TOPEKA, KANSAS". The registration card was produced by Mrs. Collier showing that the registration was on 1-29-55. The original registration card bearing the handwriting of E. Stewart is in the possession of this office and is being forwarded to the Division. A photograph of Earl Stuchlick as taken by the agents of the Secret Service was secured from Mr. William Davenport, in charge of that office in Kenses City. Missouri. McKKIGHAM, assistant manager of the Rosslyn Hotel, Los Angeles, and a thorough search of the records of the hotel was made in an effort to find the name under which KATE BARKER had registered while there, and in that way, through telephone calls and otherwise, to ascertain who, if anyone, KATE BARKER contacted while here; however, no record was found of her registration under her name or however, no record was found of her registration under her name or aliases. Referring to the letter of reference from Special Agent in Charge M. H. Purvis, relative to .58 calibre police special revolver No. 273652, which was shipped to Cline, Cline & Company, Los Angeles, California, December 29, 1922, Agent interviewed MR. W. H. Pursuant to your instructions I telephoned Mr. Hugh Fisher of the Criminal Division relative to the possible extradition of Nathan Heller from Cuba to this country on a harboring charge or a conspiracy charge. After consulting the existing extradition treaty between this country and Cuba, Mr. Fisher advised that the treaty did not cover harboring or conspiracy, but that it did cover kidnaping.

I explained to Mr. Fisher that Heller cannot be included in the kidnaping conspiracy indictment in that we do not at this time have sufficient evidence to implicate him. We discussed the continuing feature of the crime of kidnaping down to the exchanging of kidnap ransom money and in this connection Mr. Fisher advised that he had received information from the United States Attorney at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, that the Court of Appeals would probably hand down its decision on this question within the next three weeks.





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

I talked with Mr. Hanson at Miami in regard to the developments In the above, and he stated that as yet they have been unable to locate McDonald; that they have heard rumors, and otherwise received information to the effect that McDonald is in and around Miami. Mr. Hanson asked my reaction to the situation, in that he has to appear before the grand jury at Jacksonville tomorrow. I told him that it would be a good idea for him to leave two men down there to work on the leads which they now have; that he could go to Jacksonville, testify before the grand jury, and then return to Miami and press the investigation vigorously; that in the meantime the remainder of the men down there should return to their headquarters. Hr. Hanson stated that he would leave Agents Nichols and Metcalfe down there.

Mr. Hanson then mentioned the property of Karpis' which was recovered down there, which property consists of an automobile, a motor boat, a radio, etc. I told him that it was up to the Cuban authorities as to what disposition should be made of this property; that, however, it would be all right to confiscate the automobile; that in this connection the American Ambassador and the United States Attorney should be contacted to make the necessary arrangements; that we should not touch the remainder of this property.

Mr. Hanson stated that he has instructed Agent Brown to give the Cuban authorities all the information concerning Heller which they have collected so that the Cuban authorities might use the same in their deportation proceedings against Heller.

Mr. Hanson then mentioned the two automobiles down there, which automobiles formerly belonged to Karpis and Campbell. I told him to keep the time betterney. (2) In violation of Section 141 U.S. Criminal Code, harboring, concealed one AlvinCKarpovich, alias Alvin Karpis, the person for whom writs, search and bench warrants have then and there been issued by the District Court of the United States for the District of Linnesota, well knowing and having known it as a fact that bench warrants have been issued for the apprehension of Karpovich.

Yesterday noon, United States Attorney John W. Holland requested that I call at his office for a conference. Upon my arrival at Mr. Holland's office he introduced me to Claude B. Kenney, an attorney from Joplin, Missouri, and Frank Dixon, who is the employer of George Barker, father of the Barker brothers. Messrs. Kenney and Dixon appeared sincere, responsible, ethical, and gentlemen in every respect. They presented to Mr. Holland letters of introduction from the Clerk of the United States District Court at Joplin, Missouri. They also presented letters of administration showing that by the Probate Court of Jasper County, Missouri, on January 23, 1935, George Barker and Frank Dixon were appointed administrators of the estate of Fred Barker, deceased.

These gentlemen were here for the purpose of securing for George Barker any estate left by Fred Barker.

Mr. Holland advised Messrs. Kenney and Dixon that all money found in the house occupied by Kate and Fred Barker at Oklawaha, Florida, on January 16, 1935, was being held temporarily by the Government, that he wanted to be frank in his statements, and that he wanted these gentlemen to know that he would give them no information to make their work or search for assets easier, that the connection of Kate and Fred Barker with this nationally known mob was such that any property left by Kate and Fred Barker would be handled according to law, that he did not intend to aid or cooperate with attorneys or others to the end that any one not entitled to this property would attain same; that the Government in connection with this estate inwould attain same; that he did not intend to tell these men all he knew about the gang of which Kate and Fred Barker were the leading members, that he would not cooperate in working out their problems to secure any part of the estate.

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To the Director

Mr. Kenney stated that he believed that George Barker would be entitled under the law to the estate left by Fred Barker, that of course of the property found he could not determine which would belong to Kate and which would belong to Fred, that he did not know who had purchased the automobile that was found, but that George Barker had informed him that he had learned that Fred had purchased an automobile, that of source it might have been purchased under a fictitious name.

Frank Dixon informed Mr. Holland that he has known George Barker for seven or more years, that during the last three and one half years he has employed him and has found him to be a congenial, respectable, honest man in every respect; that George Barker since his divorce from Kate Barker has lived in fear of his life, that he has been afraid of his wife and sons and has stated that Kate Barker was responsible for the criminal lives and activities of her sons. Mr. Dixon stated that Mr. Barker would never talk of his family, that he never mentioned the boys, his sons, unless it would relate to the time when they were all children. Dixon stated that he really believes that up until a year ago George Barker was contacted at various times by his sons, that he knows that on occasions Mr. Barker would bar the doors and windows of his home at nights with 2x4 timbers, fearing that during the night his boys might some and kill him.

With reference to Fred Barker's estate, Mr. Holland called the attention of Messrs. Kenney and Dixon to the fact that possibly Fred Barker might have had a wife or two who might show up at some future time and claim his estate, which would leave his father out entirely. Mr. Holland also called the attention of these gentlemen to the fact that possibly the Government might take action against this estate in an effort to sollect income tax, since it was known that Fred Barker and others, after kidnaping Mr. Bremer, had received \$200,000.00, and that of course if income tax had not been paid on this amount the Government might take action to collect and if for the payment of income taxes it would seize all of the money leftwhich he did not believe would cover the tax--nothing would be left for any one setting up claims showing a legal interest in Fred or Kate Barker's estate, after which Mr. Kenney stated that at the behest of Mr. Barker they were in Florida simply on a "fishing" expedition to determine whether these persons had left an estate to which George Barker was entitled. Both of these gentlemen intimated on leaving that because of the ramifications in connection with this case they hardly thought that it would be worthwhile pursuing their investigation.

I telephoned Mr. Manson at Miami and inquired whether a warrant has been issued for Nathaniel Heller. Mr. Hanson stated that there has been one issued charging him with conspiracy. I then inquired if this warrant has been certified so that it may be used in extradition proceedings. Mr. Hanson stated that he is informed by the United States Attorney that the offense of conspiracy is not an extraditable offense; that in this connection, the warrant has not been certified. I told Mr. Hanson to have the warrant certified in any event, so that if the occasion presents itself to use it, it will be ready; that if we are unable to serve it, we will at least have tried.

I inquired when the indictment is going to be returned. Mr. Hanson stated that the case is going to be presented to the grand jury tomorrow morning, and it is expected that the grand jury will make its return about. Thursday. In this connection, Mr. Hanson stated that he has appointments with the United States Attorney both this afternoon and this evening, and the case will then be presented tomorrow.

I then mentioned that A was somewhat concerned about the attitude of the American Ambassador in Cuba. I told him that a telegram received from Agent Brown this morning indicates that the Ambassador is not satisfied that Heller knew who Karpis was, and unless the Ambassador can be convinced, there will possibly be no deportation. Mr. Hanson stated that the Ambassador had asked him what his opinion on this matter was, and Mr. Hanson told him that he, Mr. Hanson, was sure that Heller knew with whom he was dealing; that he had pointed out the many things which Heller had done for Karpis which were so unusual and irregular for a hotel manager to do for his regular guests; that, however, it appears that the Ambassador is not satisfied that Heller knew who Karpis was.

I told Mr. Hanson to have the indictment certified when it is returned, and we will then take further steps along the above lines.

Please be advised that during the week ending February 2, 1935, Henry "Duke" Randall was arraigned before the United

States Commissioner at Miami, Florida on January 25, 1935 on charges of harboring Alvin Karpis. He waived preliminary hearing and was committed to the County Jail in default of \$25,000

bond.

On January 29, 1935 Joseph H. Adams was arraigned before the United States Commissioner at Miami, Florida on charges of harboring Alvin Karpis, also for violation of Sections 4-A of the Firearm Act and 3450 of the Revised Statutes - Concealing Goods with Intent to Evade Revenue Law. The latter two violations arose out of the handling of the Browning automatic rifle which Adams is alleged to have obtained from Willie Harrison. Adams was released on \$5,000 cash bond and hearing was set for February 12, 1935.

Special Agents in Cuba have located one Nathan Heller, hotel proprietor who admits harboring Alvin Karpis and otherwise assisting him. Karpis presented a card on which a notation had been placed by Adams, referred to above, indicating to Heller that Karpis was "O. K." Investigation also discloses that Cassius McDonald, together with Willie Harrison and Harry Sawyer, exchanged a considerable portion of the Bremer ransom money in Havana, Cuba during September of 1934.

Extensive investigation in the vicinity of Toledo, Ohio has failed to develop any information regarding the whereabouts of Karpis and Campbell, although the latest tangible leads on these two individuals indicated their presence in that vicinity.

Mr. Caffery thinks this a splendid idea; that it would satisfy the newspapers and accomplish our purpose also. He asked my opinion about the matter. I stated that to the best of my knowledge, in deportation proceedings, the Ambassador has no jurisdiction; that he can simply satisfy himself that the man is an American citizen; that the deportation is up to the Cuban authorities. I stated, however, that if Heller would agree to go to the United States voluntarily and face the charges, this would be satisfactory. I then stated that if he did not hear further from me within the next hour and a half he should follow the above procedure - the transportation costing \$35 - according to Mr. Brown. He further stated that in September of last year (September 10th), Cassiu McDonald and a Cuban named Alivar negotiated at the Chase National Bank approximately \$72,000 in fives, tens and twenties, which was evidently part of the Bremer ransom money. 



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

Coulter stated that the U.S. Attorney's office is very adverse to this fellow Hoffman seeing Bolton because he is one of our main witnesses; that this fellow Hoffman is on the other side and is going to cause a great damage if he does see him. However, the attorney who is very favorable to the judgement, an attorney named Robert Flynn, will probably go over there to see Jimmy Wilson this afternoon and he had in mind to let Bolton be available so if Bolton wants to talk to him it will be alright.

absolutely have to keep Bolton out of the hands of two or three blawyers up here, and Hoffman is one of them. Er. Coulter said he wanted to advise the Division of this so that if Flynn comes over there, they weren't going to make any special efforts, but are going to fix it so that Bolton can talk to him. I agreed to this arrangement. I also told Er. Coulter that if the Court orders it so that any of these lawyers can see Bolton, we do not want to get ourselves judged in contempt. Er. 

RE: Brekid.

I spoke to Mr. Ladd this afternoon with reference to the three hundred and some odd dollars that we took from Arthur Barker when he was taken into custody. I informed Mr. Ladd that he should take up with the United States Attorney the first thing in the morning, the question of the disposition of same. And if he would not pass on it, that he was to call Agent Coulter in St. Paul and have him take it up with the United States Attorney there. I told Mr. Ladd that we would like very much to make proper disposition of this morey.

I aked Lr. Ladd if that money was all the property of Barker that we had. He informed me that we have a couple of suits and other personal effects that were taken from him when he was taken into custody. Er. Ladd advised me that Barker's attorney had written letters requesting that this property be turned over to him, but he also requested that the \$5000in the safe deposit box be turned over to him. I advised hr. Ladd that we do not have anything to do with that. I told ir. Ladd to take up the question of Barker's clothes also, when he spoke to the United States Attorney and to be guided by his advice; that if he would not pass on it, to take it up with the United States Attorney at St. Paul. 



Volney Davis, who was indicted at St. Paul, Minnesota on Jamusry 22, 1935 for participating in the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, was located and apprehended by Division Agents in Kansas Dity, Missouri yesterday afternoon. A waiver of removal was obtained from him and he was placed in a chartered airplane for transportation to Chicago, Illinois. The sirplane was forced down due to weather conditions, near Yorkville, Illinois, after dark last evening. In the resulting confusion surrounding the forced landing of the airplane in a corn field near Yorkville, Davis succeeded in making his escape from the sustody of the Agents. Stremmous efforts are being made to reapprehend him.

At seven forty-five PK on February 7, 1935, Special Agent S. K. McKee, by long distance telephone in Havana, was informed confidentially that Cassius McDomald had been indicted by a Federal Grand Jury in Facksonville, in view of which he and Agent Brown were to make vigorous investigation in Havana for all possible evidence to be used in McDomald's trial. McKee said that Rene Bolivar, who has been furnishing information in this matter in Havana, had stated that he contacted McDomald twice and Willie Harrison wase in September, at which time McDomald and Harrison were stopping at the Mational Hotel in Havana under their correct names. This was from September 9 to 11, 1934.

Makes also stated that The Matienel City Bank in Havena, had checked up and found that they had 879 Ten Dollar Brener runson bills; that a representative of the bank had informed that they have three original packages containing fifty Ten Dollar Bills each, received September 6, 1934, which had been previously embanged by McDonald en September fifth for gold. It appears that these bills were presented at the bank by Mir and Suas, two persons in Havena who handle gold. Makes stated that he believed that if every bank in Havena were shocked up Fifty Thousand Dollars of this renson money might be located. He suggested that arrangements be made with the Division in Washington, to have the Atlanta Federal Reserve Bank instruct the branch in Havana to instruct all banks in that city to search their Five and Ten Dollar Bills for all Minneapolis notes and pull them out.

Mokes also said that it appeared that we would have difficulty with Bathaniel Heller in getting him out of the country; that the newspapers in Havana were "panning" the Agents because they did not give them a story; that Heller appears to have numerous friends in Havana; that he had retained one lawyer, later discharged him, employed a second one who is editor of one of the Havana newspapers.

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Melos also stated that Rens Bolivar had informed the Agents that if the Government would pay all of his expenses, he is willing to some to Florida and testify for the Government at any time against MeDonald. Department, who usually visit the larger garages about once a week to look over cars bearing foreign license tags, were in the Walker Garage a few days after the car was stored and made a casual inquiry about the car.

Perry Washington, when interviewed at the above address, advised that about 9 PM on January 3, 1935, a heavy middle-aged man drove a Chevrolet in to the garage and ordered the car greased and a tire on the rear end of the car repaired. Washington advised that the record of the 1935 Minnesota license tags on the car was 919-348, but the records show a confusion in recording license-tag numbers taken from cars stored in the garage on January 3, 1935, and he was not certain of the correct license numbers on the instant car. A wire was dispatched to the St. Paul office concerning ownership of 1955 Minnesota license tags 919-548, and a reply thereto notified this office that license tags do not run that high in number. Mr. Stanley stated that Mr. and Mrs. Wallace impressed him as "high flyers" and not much credence can be placed in their statements. They have no children. Mr. Stanley has talked to Miss Conrad and is of the opinion that she as well as her cousin, Mrs. Wallace, are women of questionable character; that Mrs. Wallace has been away on frequent trips and on returning to Lakeview she never mentions where she has been.

Postmaster Al Lille, Lakeview, advised that both Miss Conrad and Mrs. Wallace have been receiving their mail through the General Delivery which seemed strange to him as Mr. Wallace receives his mail at the camp, although the Wallace family resided in town. Mr. Lille advised that on January 18, 1935 Miss Conrad received a special delivery letter from Chicago, Illinois which had no return address; that on January 28, 1935 Miss Conrad received another special delivery letter postmarked at New York City with no return address thereon. Upon receipt of the latter letter, Miss Conrad said that she was leaving for St. Louis, Missouri and to hold her mail; however, no mail has since come for her. Mr. Lille advised that Miss Conrad has never bought any postal money orders, but she sould have forwarded money through the one bank in town, The Farmers State Bank.

Miss Doris Mann, Teller at the Farmers State Bank, Lakeview, advised that on January 26, 1935 she cashed a check for Miss Conrad and believes the amount was \$125.00; that on the same date Miss Conrad purchased a cashiers check in the amount of \$75.00, payable to the Northwestern National Bank & Trust

Company of Minnespolis. Miss Conrad had a pass book on the afore-mentioned bank at Minneapolis but said that she had closed out her account there; however, she was sending the cashiers shack to the Minneapolis bank to re-open her account. Miss Mann exhibited to Agent the cashiers check which had been returned. It bears tellers stamp No. 4, dated January 29, 1935 and shows the endorsement of the Morthwestern Mational Bank & Trust Company. Miss Mann advised that Miss Conrad has only been in the bank once as above described and has never transacted any other business there.

Mr. Wallace, wpon being interviewed on Jammary 29, 1935, advised that his wife and Miss Conrad had left Lakeview the preceding dw. Mrs. Wallace had gone to Minneapolis for a few days visit, and Miss Conrad left for St. Louis where she was to meet a boy friend, and they intended to proceed to Chicago. Mr. Wallace professed not to know the identity of the boy friend of Miss Conrad and intimated that both his wife and Miss Conrad kept much from him.

Agent called at the Wallace home a second time on February 4, 1935 and there interviewed Mrs. Wallace in the presence of her husband. Mrs. Wallace advised that her husband, during her absence, had received a letter in the lest few days from Miss Conrad postmarked at St. Louis, which had no return address in which letter she advised she was leaving for Chicago and upon arrival there would notify them of her address. Mrs. Wallace advised that she expects Miss Conrad will only remain in Chicago a few days and then will return to Lakeview, and after a few weeks visit, it is expected that Miss Conrad will them go to Minneapolis. The address of this Division office was left with Mrs. Wallace. She promised to notify this office as to the address at Chicago where Miss Conrad can be located when she hears from her and will also notify this office when Miss Conrad returns to Lakeview.

Agent made arrangements with Chief of Police Stanley to notify this office whem Miss Conrad returns to Lakeview.

Omaha, advised that he has known Mr. and Mrs. Wallace for a number of years; that when he was at Lakeview on or about January 15, 1935 he visited them and at the time met Miss Conrad. The latter spoke about a Chevrolet coach that a woman named Mrs. Sawyer had been driving for some time past, and mentioned that the car was at the Walker Garage. Miss Conrad said that she would have to get the claim check for the car from Mrs. Sawyer. Miss Conrad requested him to go to the Walker Garage and see what kind of mechanical condition the car was in and inform her by letter of what he learned; that upon going to the Walker Garage he was told by a garage attendant there that there were a number of Chevrolet cars in the garage, and he would have to give them the claim—check number so that the car he was interested in could be found; that he then left

the garage and didn't give the matter any further attention; nor did he write to Miss Conrad. Mr. Pehle is evidently a man of good reputation. He said that Mr. and Mrs. Harry Sawyer are unknown to him.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

With further reference to my memorandum of yesterday advising you concerning the escape of Volney, Davis from the sustedy of Division Agents, I wanted you to know the following facts which have been ascertained in connection with the escape.

Yolney Davis was apprehended at Kansas City, Missouri on February 6, 1935, as he returned to a garage where he had left his ear for repairs. Because there were no facilities available for holding this person in the Kansas City Division Office, steps were taken, after a waiver of removal had been obtained from him, to transport him to Chicago, Illinois, where he could be preperly held for questioning. In order to avoid any publicity, it was felt that the most desirable way of transporting a prisoner would be to utilise a chartered airplane, but the only plane available at Kansas City, Missouri was a three-passenger ship. Accordingly, Volney Davis, properly handcuffed and shackled, was placed in this plane and two Division Agents accompanied him as guards, the pilot being instructed to proceed to Chicago, Illinois, where a force of Division Agents would meet the plane at the sirport and transport the prisoner to the Chicago Division Office. It will be noted that because of the capacity of the only available airplane, no more than two guards could be sent with the prisoner.

The departure from Kansas City was made shortly after three o'clock and it was estimated that the plane would arrive in Chicago in about three hours. The pilot, however, lest his course as darkness settled and was unwilling to proceed, not knowing his exact location. He accordingly made a forced landing in a corn field near Yorkville, Illinois. The Division Agents left the plane, together with the prisoner, and secured the services of a passing automobile to transport them into the town of Yerkville, in order that a telephone call could be made to the Chicago Division Office and proper arrangements perfected for the continuation of the transportation of the prisoner to Chicago. The owner of the automobile transported the Agents and their prisoner into the town of Yorkville, but was unwilling to weit there while the. telephone call was made by Division Agents, and it was necessary for the Agents to remove the prisoner from the automobile. In order to avoid publicity, the Agents removed from the prisoner the handouffs and leg irons and entered a small hotel for the purpose of making a telephone call. One of the Agents entered a telephone booth, leaving his companion to guard the prisoner. While

the first Agent was in the telephone booth, the prisoner suddenly whirled, struck the second Agent, knocking him form and dove head-first through a mearby window. Both Agents immediately undertook pursuit of the prisoner, firing at his bearly visible form as he disappeared into the darkness. An intensive search was immediately undertaken in Yerkville but Davis had located a Ford V-S sedan in the city, which car was unlocked, and had made located a Ford V-S sedan in the city, which car was unlocked, and had made his getaway in this car. The car was found late yesterday at West Chicago, Illinois.

You will recall that Volney Davis was indicted at St. Paul, Minnesota on January 22, 1935 for participation in the kidneping of Edward G. Bremer. Davis is also a fugitive from the State Ponitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma, he having been received there on February 3, 1923 on a charge of murder and sentenced to serve a life term. He escaped from the McAlester Penitentiary on one occasion but was subsequently returned there, and on Movember 3, 1932 was granted leave of absence, which leave has since been cancelled.

Eiwill advise you fully of any additional developments in this situation.

Mr. M. B. Warkland, who was referred to me from your office, advised that he is a general contractor of Atlantic City, New Jersey, and in the past has been making strenuous efforts to eradicate from Atlantic City criminals of the vicious type; that he had been interviewed by Agent Stroeder at Atlantic City relative to the recent escape of Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell and since that interview had learned from one William Braun, an electrical contractor, 1917 Atlantic Avenue, Atlantic City, that the police officers who went to the Danmor Hotel had permitted Karpis and Campbell to escape; that Officer Brennan, one of the raiding officers had an interest in the hotel and had taken one of the fugitives into custody and had placed handcuffs on him, but after the fugitive identified himself, the handcuffs were removed and he was permitted to return to his room; that the subsequent shooting was for the purpose of making it appear as though an effort had been made to take them into custody.

Mr. Markland stated that the source of Mr. Braun's information is the garage repair man who was on duty at the Coastwise Garage at the time the car of the fugitives was located and who accompanied the officers to the hotel. Mr. Markland stated that according to his information this repair man observed the officers when they took one of the fugitives into custody.

Mr. Markland also discussed incidents that had taken place in Atlantic City in the past and advised that he had several times been a member of the Grand Jury at Atlantic City and had made an effort to bring about the solution and successful prosecution of several crimes of major importance. He also stated that he had an appointment with the Governor of New Jersey in the near future when the matter of appointing a new prosecuting attorney for Atlantic City, New Jersey, would be discussed.

The following information regarding Cassius M. McDonald, who resides at 500 Trombley Road, Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan, was obtained through interviews had with Chief of Police James Drysdale, Grosse Pointe Park - Inspector John Hoffman, Special Investigation Squad, Detroit Police Department - Joseph Bell, Agent, Bureau of Marcotics, U. S. Treasury Department, Detroit, Michigan - an examination of the files of

as well as an examination of the files of

Cassius M. McDonald is listed in the City Directory of Detroit, Michigan, as a civil engineer. As near as can be determined, he has lived in the vicinity of Detroit, Michigan, for approximately fifteen years, having been born in Chicago, Illinois. His father was engaged in the lumber business in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and had extensive tracts of timber land in the vicinity of Escanaba, Michigan. Upon the death of his father some years ago, Cassius M. McDonald continued in the lumber business. During the War he was in the United States Service as an expert in timber and bought lumber to be used in the building of airplanes. He is married to Edith Gordon McDonald, formerly of Grand Rapids, Michigan. Both Cassius McDonald's family and Mrs. McDonald's family were considered very wealthy. Upon the death of Cassius M. McDonald's father, he inherited several million dollars. Since the War Cassius McDonald has not engaged to any extent in civil engineering but has been trading in the market. It was learned that during the crash of 1929 he lost approximately a COPIES DESTROYED million dollars.

The home in which Cassius McDonald has resided in Grosse Pointe Park is in his wife's name. In addition to this home, he has also owned a lodge on Beatons Lake, which lake is located about eight miles West of Watersmeet, Michigan.

For a number of years Mr. and Mrs. Cassius M. McDonald have been spending the winters in Florida and Cuba. In January 1934, Chief of Police Drysdale at Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan, received a communication from J. F. T. Dumont, American Consular General, Havana, Cuba, advising him that Cassius Michael McDonald had entered Cuba by plane on January 19, 1934, and that a few days later his wife followed him; that while they were in Cuba, they were accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Day of Detroit who were registered in Cuba under the names of Mr. and Mrs. William Dayton. The Consular General's letter to the Chief of Police requested information as to McDonald's reputation in Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan. Chief of Police Drysdale advised that the records of his department failed to indicate that McDonald had ever been in any kind of trouble in Grosse Pointe Park and apparently he bore a good reputation. He so advised the Consular General at Havana, Cuba.

Robbery near Chicago, Illinois, some bonds which were stolen in that robbery came into the possession of Cassius K. McDonald and he was called in by the Postal Inspectors of Chicago, Illinois, to explain his possession of these bonds. The explanation he gave at that time proved satisfactory and he was released. It later developed that a man by the name of Bacon, who is alleged to have been implicated in that robbery, was harbored at the home of McDonald in Grosse Pointe Park for several weeks immediately after the robbery and that some time later this Bacon, alias Slim alias Alabam' escaped from the penitentiary. The Post Office Department for some time after his escape kept the McDonald home in Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan, under surveillance thinking Bacon might show up there. However, it was reported that Bacon was killed near Savannah, Georgia.

Several years ago a chauffeur of McDonald's was investigated by the Bureau of Narcotics, Detroit, Michigan, being implicated in a narcotic ring and was later convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary. It was in this way that Agent Joseph Bell of the Detroit Office of the Bureau of Narcotics became acquainted with McDonald. Agent Bell advised that McDonald has a number of influential friends in Detroit, Michigan, and that he also had numerous friends of questionable character. In this connection, he mentioned the fact that McDonald was very well acquainted with Richard Galatas whom McDonald knew to be a confidence man.

McDonald at the present time drives a Packard Sedan, 1934 Model, serial number 716405, motor number 377912. This ear is registered in the name of E. G. McDonald, 500 Trombley Road, Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan -- 1935 Michigan license number 4-135.

The test bullets and shells have been taken from all of these guns and compared with the specimens contained in the Laboratory files, but no identification has been effected. The test specimens will be filed, appropriately indexed for possible future reference.

The fired shells contained in a box marked, "shells found in the house of Fred Barker", have been examined and it has been found that 38 of the .45 calibre cartridge cases were fired from the Thompson Sub-machine gun used by Fred Barker. 22 of these .45 calibre cartridge cases were fired from the Thompson Sub-machine gun found lying near Ma Barker. The one .33 calibre shell was fired from the .33 calibre lever action Winchester rifle recovered.

The examination reveals that stains found on the .45 Colt Automatic Pistol #C160657 damaged by a bullet and the Thompson Sub-machine gum found lying near Ma Barker were blood stains.

An attempt will be made to restore the numbers obliterated on four of these guns and a supplementary report will be submitted within the next several days.

A report on the fingerprints will be submitted separately.





I telephoned Mr. Connelley to inquiry as to the press situation out there in regard to the escape of the above. Mr. Connelley stated that the Chicago papers are not carrying the story; that it appears that there was so very little information given out, that it does not make a good story; that they know nothing about the prisoner, and very little about the Agents.

Mr. Connelley stated that they have been unable to find any leads at all on Davis; that they have been contacting the known hideouts of Davis in and around Aurora, but negative results have been secured thus far; that there have been no returns on the broadcast concerning the car in which Davis escaped. Mr. Connelley stated that he contacted the pilot of the airplane this morning, and instructed him to talk to no one about the affair; that the pilot came on to Chicago to refuel, after which he is going back to Kansas City. He stated that he believes this pilot will not talk, although it appears that there was a leak someplace in Kansas City, in that the Chicabo Tribune carried the story that a prisoner was coming into Chicago; that a reporter and a photographer from this paper were out at the airport; however, they left before hearing anything.

I then informed Mr. Connelley of the battle which the Agents of the Kansas City Office had with Jess Doyle of lifting, Kansas this morning, in informing him that Agent Bryce claims that he shot Doyle badly with a machine gun; that, however, Doyle escaped. Edna Murray, his women compension, MARICE presently in custody at Pittsburg after having been captured.

With regard to the escape of Davis, Mr. Connelley stated that it appears that after the two Agents with Davis got into the building there, and Trainor had gone into the telephone booth, Davis, who was standing at somewhat of a right engle position to Stakem, suddenly whirled and struck Stakem in the face, knocking him down; that he immediately whirled again and dove head first through a window, landing on a concrete walk on the outside. Mr. Connelley stated that had Davis picked the other window in the room, he would have landed in the basement of the place, thus indicating that he had looked the situation over as he came into the place. He then ran across the yard the situation over a small fence. Stakem shot twice at Davis during this there and jumped over a small fence. Stakem shot twice at Davis during this time, but was apparently rather groggy from the blow in the face, and evidently did not hit Davis. Trainor then same out of the telephone booth when he heard the commotion, and attempted to trail Davis, but it was so dark that Davis was lost in the darkness.

After crossing the fence, Davis found himself hemmed in by a river which runs north and west around the town; that he then ran about two blocks down the street, turned left, where he ran into an intersecting street. He then apparently ran between some houses there and came upon the grocer who had just drove up in his Ford, four-door Sedan, and who had gone into the house, leaving the keys in the car. This is the car which Davis took.

In addition to broadcasting the information about the car there, Mr. Connelley stated that he telephoned the St. Louis, Omaha, and Indianapolis Offices and requested that they also broadcast the information; that this morning he telephoned the Detroit Office and gave them the information in question.

Mr. Wilson of the Latin-American Division of the State Department telephoned in regard to Heller, and stated that they have just received the following telegram from the Ambassador in Cuba: "Legal advisers of Secretary of Government called to say under existing laws there is no provision in deportation cases for defendent to appear before court of justice. The cases are decided in the Department of Government. This department will deport Heller if Government of United States requests it; otherwise, he will be released, unless extradition is requested. No charge has been lodged against him here by Cuban authorities. He is being held at the instance of the Agents of the Department of Justice. Agents are convinced that Heller aided Karpis gang here. Brown told me that warrant issued in Florida for his errest in same connection. Heller's lawyer says he believes Heller to be willing to proceed to Mismi to ensuer charges there if released here. I request instructions es soon as possible."

I told Mr. Wilson that I had talked to Agent Brown in Havane this morning at which time I was informed that Agent Brown was going to see the Ambassador this morning; that they had offered to pay the expenses incurred by Heller in his going to Florida if he would volunterily do so. I then informed Mr. Wilson that an indictment was returned yesterday in Florida egainst Heller charging him with harboring, and with conspiracy to harbor. Ho ever, in talking with Mr. Brown this morning, he indicates that Heller is not willing to go back to the United States voluntarily. In talking to the Criminal Division of the Deportment, they informed me that under the existing extradition treaties, they doubt very much that it would be possible to extradite Heller. Consequently, our only recourse is to have him deported as an undesirable alien. I am advised that the wife of Heller will go to the President of Cuba to intercede in his behalf. I told him that in view of the fact that the charges have been preferred and an indictment returned in Jacksonville, we feel that the man should have to enswer the charges; that while it would be desirable to have him extradited, we are advised that it is highly improbable that this can be done; that, however, I would confer with Brown in Havans relative to the situr RECORDED a INDEXED enhone him back.



In this connection, it is requested that all field effices immediately contact the motor vehicle bureau registrations in their districts with a view to having them search through their files in an effort to determine whether the above car was registered in any of their respective states. If it develops that the ear has not as yet been registered, it is suggested that a stop eard be placed in their files against this automobile with the request that the proper field effice be immediately notified in the event an application for registration is received by them.



With regard to the above mentioned automobile, Mr. Nathan asked my opinion as to whether the party calling for this car should be taken into custody, or whether he should be kept under surveillance. I told him that the party, if picked up, would probably prove to be someone who is not particularly wanted by the Division, whereas if kept under surveillance, he might lead us to an important place.

I instructed Mr. Nathan to keep after the situation, and keep the Division advised of any developments.

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



Mr. Browntelephoned me from Havana, Cuba and stated that he had just finished a conference with Ambassador Caffery; that the Ambassador informed him that he had sent a telegram to the State Department last evening requesting advice as to what action he should take under certain circumstances as outlined by him in the telegram to the State Department. He stated to Agent Brown that he might not be fully guided by the advice from the State Department, in that he might change his mind. Brown stated that the Ambassador, while not exactly hostile, is not overly friendly with him. Brown stated that the Ambassador informed that the attorney of Heller called on him last evening, and indicated that Heller may accept an invitation to go of his own volition to the United States; but, he is going to be first satisfied whether or not he is going to be deported; that if it appears he is going to be deported, he will then accept the proposition of going of his own volition.

I informed Agent Brown that I had just received a call from the State Department to the effect that if we want Heller deported, they will start the necessary proceedings through the proper channels. I instructed Mr. Brown to have no part in this at all; that it will be in the form of a formal request to the State Department from the Department of Justice for the deportation of Heller. Mr. Brown stated that he would make no further steps whatever.

Mr. Brown stated that in the event Heller offers to go voluntarily, should he and Agent McKee accompany him. I told him that it was my opinion that both of them should accompany him. He requested advice as to his course of action in the event Heller should refuse to allow the Agents to accompany him. I told him that he should call Mr. Hanson at the Cortez Hotel in Miami in order that proper arrangements might be made for Heller's arrest upon his arrival in the United States.





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

Representatives of this Rivision at Jacksonville, Elerida have been confidentially advised of the return of sixteen indictaonts by the Federal Grand Jury at Jacksonville, Florida on February 7, 1935, charging Joseph E. Adams, Henry "Duke" Rendell, Bathaniel E. Heller, Cassius Hellonald, Tynoma Burdette and Deleres Delaney with harboring Alvin Karpis, a fugitive from justice, who was indicted by the Federal Grand Jury at St. Paul, Hinnesota on May 4, 1914, charged with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer,

Mans and Heller are hotel men of Hismi, Florida and Havana, Caba, respectively, and they assisted Karpis in the reuting of houses, purchasing of automobiles and in other ways. Cassius Hellonald is a notorious confidence man and assisted the kidnapers in exchanging sees of the Brener ranson money. The indictments charge each, separately and jointly, with the harboring of Karpis. Separate indictments were also returned charging each with misprision of felony in failing to reveal that Karpis was the individual who had fled in interstate commerce to avoid prosecution. A separate indistant was returned charging all the aforenamed with conspiracy to commit misprision of felony. Another indictment charges all subjects with conspiracy to common one falony. Separate indictments were returned charging Randall and Adams with unlawful possession of a mechine game.

All of the aforenamed defendants, except Mathemiel E. Heller, have been taken into oustody and are swaiting trial. Heller is presently in Cuba where megatisticus are in progress looking to his return to this country.

Mr. Alt advised that the Agents have located three packages, each containing fifty \$10.00 bills, the original packages being intact, as they were received in the bank, and consisting entirely of Bremer ransom money. Efforts ere now being made to identify the persons who exchanged this money for gold and it is believed that it will be definitely ascertained that Cash LicDonald negotieted this trensfer of funds. Mr. Alt advised that Renee Eolivan has indicated his willingness to proceed to the United States to testify in criminal proceedings in this case. Mr. Alt advised that, Heller has obtained the services of a lawyer who is also the editor of a newspaper, and consequently this newspaper, L'Pais, is bomberding the Agents with criticisms. Synopsis of Facts:

On Jamery 22, 1935 indistment was filed in the V. S. Distri Court, District of Minnesota, Third Division, charging that between December 1, 1933 and May 1, 1934 ALVIN KAHPAVICZ, ARTHUR R. BARKER, VOLNEY DAVIS, HARRY CAMPBELL, MIMER FARMER, HAROLD ALDERTON, WILLIAM WEAVER, HARRY SAWYER, WILLIAM M. HARRISON, CLIVER A. BERG, JOSEPH PATRICK MORAN, JOHN JOSEPH MCLAUCHLIN, WILLIAM EDWARD WIDLER, PHILIP J. DELANEY, "WHITIE", BYRON BOLTON, JAMES J. WILSON, JESS DOYLE, MINA MURRAY, MYRTLE RATON, JOHN DOE, and RICHARD ROE, conspired to transport the kidnaped victim BREMER from St. Paul, Minnesota, to Bensenville, Illinois, and to hold him for \$200,000 renson, in violation of Act of Congress approved June 22, 1932, Chapter 271, 47 stat. 526; 18 U.S.C. 408a. Defendants ALDERTON, FARMER and BOLTON committed Remsey County Jail, St. Paul, in default of \$50,000 bail; BARKER in default of \$100,000 bail, and WILSON in default of \$5,000 bail. Bench warrants issued for Karpis, Davis, Campbell, Wraver, Sawyer, Harrison, Berg, JOHN DOE and RICHARD ROE, bail fixed at \$100,000 each. Bench warrants issued for "WHITIE", JESS DOYLE, MONA MURRAY, MYRTLE EATON, bail fixed at \$50,000 for "WHITE" and \$15,000 wash for the last three. Ho bench warrants issued for MoLAUGHLIN, VIDLER and DELANEY as they are under bond under previous 1/2 indictment. Indictment also filed in St. Paul January 22,1955 charging that on Jamery 17, 1934 ALVIN KARPAVICZ, ARTHUR R. BARKER, VOLNEY DAVIS, HARRY CAMPBELL, MIMER FARMER, HAROLD ALDERTON, WILLIAM WEAVER, HARRY SAWYER, WILLIAM J. HARRISON, BYRON BOLTON, JOHN DOE and RICHARD ROE transported the kidnaped victim BREAKR from St.Paul, Minnesota, to Bensenville, Illinois, where they held him for \$200,000 ransom in violation of Act of Congress approved June 22, 1952, Chapter 271, 47 state 326; 18 U.S.C. 408a. No bench warrants issued on this indictment as all defendants named in above indistment. Non est return made on bench warrant issued on indictment filed against ALVIH KARPIS and others by U. S. Marshal May 4, 1954. Certified sopy this indictment and bench warrant forwarded Jacksonville, and Philadelphia Offices. Certified copies conspiracy and kidnaping indictments filed St. Paul January 22, 1935 together with bench warrant for ALVIN KARPIS, forwarded Jacksonville and Philadelphia Offices January 24, 1935 and new bench warrant issued for KARPIS under conspiracy indictment as of this date.

DETAILS:

The title of this case is being changed so as to show the Subject KARPIS as a fugitive; to eliminate FRED BARKER with aliases and HUSSELL GIBSON with aliases as they are both dead, and to eliminate JOHN J. McLAUGHLIN with aliases, the indictment as to this subject having been dismissed at St.Psnl on November 2, 1934 and United States Attorney George Sullivan having stated that this terminated prosecution as to this defendant; so as to add the aliases CLAIRE LUCAS and HUCK WEAVER to the name of WILLIAM WEAVER; the alias "SEA LION" to the name of HARRY SAWYER; the alias ROY GREEN to the name of WOLNEY DAVIS, and to add the names of additional defendants who have been indicted, to wit: ELMER FARMER, HAROLD ALDERTON with aliases, BYRON BOLTON with aliases, "WHITIE", JOHN DOE, and RICHARD ROE.

This report is made for the purpose of recording indistments filed against defendants in the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota at St. Paul and the status of the defendants.

On Jamery 22, 1935 an indictment was filed in the United States District Court in the District of Minnesota, Third Division, against the following named defendants, the status of whom is indicated after each name:

One ALVIN KAMPAVICZ alias Alvin Karpis - Jamuary 24, 1935 bench warrant issued, returned not found; new bench warrant is sued; bond fixed at \$100,000.00. (Whereabouts unknown).

One ARTHUR R. BARKER alias "Doo" Barker - Jamery 24, 1935 bond fixed at \$100,000.00. Defendent committed to Remsey County Jail, St. Paul, Minnesota, in default.

One <u>VOLNEY DAVIS</u> alias "Curley" alias "Cotton" - Jamary 24, 1935 bench warrant issued, bond fixed at \$100,000.00. (Whereabouts unknown).

One RICHARD ROE, whose true name is unknown to the Grand Jurors, whose approximate personal description is as follows: 30 years of age; height five feet six or seven inches; weight 155-140 lbs.; dark brown hair; thin face; alender build - Jamary 24, 1935 bench warrant issued; bond fixed at \$100,000.00.

The above indictment charges that the above named defendants, between December 1, 1935 or thereabouts and May 1, 1934 or thereabouts, conspired to violate the provisions of the Act of Congress approved June 22, 1932 forbidding the transportation of any person in interstate or foreign commerce, kidnaped or otherwise unlawfully detained, Chapter 271, 47 state, 326; 18 U.S.C. 408a, to kidnap the victim EDWARD GEORGE BREMER and transport him from St.Paul, Minnesota, to Bensenville, Illinois, and there hold him for and demand a ransom of \$200,000,000. This indictment alleges ten overt acts in support of the charge of conspiracy. All bonds are returnable the first Tuesday in April 1935.

On Jamary 22, 1935 emother indictment was filed in the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota, Third Division, sharging that on the 17th day of Jamary, 1934, one ALVIN KARPAVICZ alias Alvin Karpis; one ARTHUR R. BARKER alias "Doc" Barker; one VOLNEY DAVIS alias "Ourley" alias "Cotton"; One HARRY CAMPBELL alias George Winfield, alias "Dave"; one MAKER FARMER; one HAROLD ALDERTON alias Harold Allerton; one WILLIAM WEAVER alias "Bill" Scott, alias Phoenix Donald, alias Charles W. Incas; one HARRY SAWYER alias Harry Sandlovich; one WILLIAM J. HARRISON alias "Willie", alias Elmer Howe; one BYRON BOLTON alias Bryon Bolton, alias Owen D. Certer, alias Owen Bernard Carter, alias Monty Carter; one JOHN DOE, whose true name is unknown to the Grand Jurors, whose approximate personal description is as follows: 50 - 55 years of age; height five feet nine inches; weight 175 lbs.; dark brown hair; large eyes; round face; sturdy build, and one RICHARD ROE, whose true name is unknown to the Grand Jurors, whose approximate personal description is as follows: 30 years of age; height five feet six or seven inches; weight 135 - 140 lbs.; dark brown hair; thin face; slender build, did, in violation of the Act of Congress approved June 22, 1932, Chapter 271, 47 state 326; 18 U.S.C. 408 a, transport by automobile the kidnaped victim EDWARD GEORGE BREMER from St. Paul, Minnesota, to Bensenville, Illinois, and having transported him, held him for ransom in the sum of \$200,000.00. As each of the defendants named in this indictment are also named in the indictment previously referred to above, no bench warrants were issued or bonds fixed on this charge.

As noted above, no bonds were fixed or bench warrants were issued for the defendants McLAUGHLIN, VIDLER and DELANKY for the reason that they are on bond on an indictment filed in the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota, Third Division, charging violation of the Act of Congress approved June 22, 1931, Chapter 271, 47 stat. 326; 18 U.S.C. 408a, which indictment also names ALVIN KARPIS, ARTHUR BARKER, "IZZY", ROY GRAY, and FRANKIE WRIGHT. On this indictment a bench warrant was issued on May & 1934 for ALVIN KARPIS and a not found return was made on May 7, 1954. A certified copy of this indictment, together with bench warrant showing the Marshal's non est return, was forwarded to the Jacksonville Division Office under date of January 26, 1935, at which time certified copies of these papers were also forwarded to the United States Attorney at Philadelphia by the United States Attorney at St. Paul pursuant to the direction of the Attorney General. Through error, in response to a request of the United States Attorney at Jacksonville, Florida, the United States Attorney at St. Paul caused a non est return to be made on the bench warrant issued for ALVIN KARPIS on the conspiracy indictment filed at St. Paul on Jamery 22,1935. • 7 m

and forwarded this with a certified copy of the indictment to the United States Attorney at Jacksonville, whereas the United States Attorney at Jacksonville desired a certified copy of indictment and bench serrent issued for KARPIS, which indictment was filed at St.Paul on May 4, 1934, and when this error was discovered on January 24, 1935 a new bench warrant was issued for ALVIN KARPIS on the conspiracy indictment filed at St.Paul on January 22,

A copy of this report is being forwarded to all Division offices so that each may be informed of the charges against these defendants in the event any of them may be apprehended in any district.



Mr. Hanson telephoned and stated that he had just received word from Agent Metcalfe at West Palm Beach, Florida to the effect that he, Metcalfe, had just apprehended Cash McDonald. Mr. Hanson stated that Metcalfe reports that he was driving around the town looking for the car of McDonald, and came upon the automobile standing in front of a particular spot; that he immediately took McDonald into custody and of a necessity took him to the Police Station there.

Mr. Hanson stated that he had wired the Division that the indictment against McDonald had been returned; that he subsequently telephoned Mr. Newby and informed him of the desire of the judge down there that no publicity be given to the returning of this indictment, the reasons for this desire on the part of the judge not being known to Hanson. I instructed Mr. Hanson to get the United States Marshal, or his deputy, proceed immediately to West Palm Beach, and arrest McDonald on the warrant based upon the above named indictment. Mr. Hanson stated that he was instructing two Agents to proceed immediately to Test Palm Beach to assist Metcalfe in this matter, Metcalfe being alone there; that he is proceeding there tonight by airplane.


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
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

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Bremer Case

Consulted the United States Attorney and attempted to turn over to him the C1/,000 and diamonds which had been taken from "Ma" and Fred Barker after they had been shot at Ocala, Florida. The United States Attorney refuses to accept these items and I told Mr. Coulter that this was rather an inconsistent position for him to take after he had issued a subpoena duces tecum for the money and diamonds. Mr. Coulter said that the United States Attorney had indicated that he would use information in the trial of the Bremer Case, showing that these people had the money and diamonds and that the production of the items themselves in Court would not be necessary.

In view of the various claims that are being made for the money and diamonds, I respectfully suggest that I be authorized to instruct Coulter to contact the United States Attorney and request that a bill of interpleader be filed in the Federal Court at St. Paul, Minnesota in the name of the Special Agent in Charge of the St. Paul Division Office, whereby the money and diamonds can be turned into the Court's custody for whatever disposition the Court authorizes, after hearing all claims presented to the Court. Mr. Coulter advised that the attorneys for the Bremer interests contemplate bringing legal action to obtain anything of value found in the possession of the Barkers. Since we claim no interest in any of the property, a bill of interpleader would appear proper in this instance and would protect the Division against any conflicting claims from any source.



MEMOPANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: Bremer Case

Mr. Baker of the State Department called and stated that he had just received a telegram from the American Embassy at Havana, Cuba, stating that an American citizen, named Nathaniel Heller, was being detained by the Cuban police at the request of Agents McKee and Brown of this Division. I advised Mr. Baker that I was acquainted with this situation and he, in a pugnacious manner, demanded to know "what the idea was in getting this man detained".

I advised Mr. Baker during the course of developments in this situation, on Saturday afternoon the matter had been discussed by you at some length with a representative of the State Department and that Division Agents had contacted the Ambassador at Havana on Saturday afternoon, and on Sunday. Mr. Baker stated that he was the person who should handle this case for the State Department and that he was confronted with the problem of answering the telegram. I advised Mr. Baker that I thought the situation had been all straightened out but that Mr. Wilson could give him more details.

For record purposes it may be stated that Mr. Baker's attitude was belligerent.

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
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

I telephoned Mr. Connelley at Chicago and informed him of the apprehension of McDoneld at West Palm Beach, Florida.

I mentioned the surrender of Jess Doyle at Girard, Kansas, and stated that I was somewhat concerned over the possibility of publicity emanating from this surrender; that in view of this, it was not my opinion that we should take him into Chicago and hold him for two or three days; that the only alternative is to interrogate him in the county jail there until the arrival of the United States Marshal.

With regard to Edna Murray, I mentioned that we might be able to get her i to Chicago for questioning before any publicity emanates from Pittsburg, Kansas; that in the event of any publicity, she could be taken by the Marshal before the Commissioner.

I told him that McDonald is a rather cage individual to deal with; that it might be necessary to file a complaint against him in St. Paul. I told him, however, that McDonald was indicted this morning in Florids for herboring, and we will have no trouble keeping him in custody.

I requested Mr. Connelley to keep the Division advised of any developments in regard to Volney Davis.





During a telephonic conversation with Mr. Nathan at Kansas City, I inquired of any developments at Pittsburg, Kansas in the above. He stated that Edna Murray will talk some, but she will not make any statements which will implicate herself. She denies that she was allowed into the council at the time the above matter was being planned. She does admit certain phases of the above, however. Mr. Nathan stated that he understands a written statement is being taken from her now. Mr. Nathan further stated that Edna Murray states that Jess Doyle is not at all implicated in the matter.

With reference to Jess Doyle, Mr. Nathan stated that he will not discuss the above case at all, claiming that he knows nothing about it. I instructed him to continue working on this man because we know that he is implicated in some way. He stated that he was forwarding a photograph and the fingerprints of Doyle by the very first mail possible.

Mr. Nathan mentioned that the Sheriff where Doyle is being held is not overly cooperative with our men. He seems to be somewhat disturbed over the fact that we had someone under suspicion in his county and did not let him know about it. Mr. Nathan instructed the men to take no attitude toward the Sheriff which would serve to irritate him further.

Mr. Larson telephoned from Detroit and advised that he had just learned that "Cash" McDonald had been apprehended in Florida; that he would like to suggest going through McDonald's home at Gross Point Park in order to ascertain if there is anything of value in the nature of telegrams and letters which might serve as evidence, also with the idea in mind that possibly some of the Karpis gang might be quartered there. Mr. Larson stated that he believed he could obtain access to the house through the chauffeur and that the Chief of Police has stated to Mr. Larson that he did not believe the latter would have any difficulty in going in and searching the house, but Mr. Larson stated that he did not believe the police would be inclined to do much in this respect on their own initiative.

I advised Mr. Larson that we could not go in and search the house without a search warrant and that we have nothing at present to base such a warrent on other than we might suspect part of the gang to be quartered there and this was not sufficient basis as it was merely a suspicion; that however, Mr. Larson could send several agents out there and look the place over with a view of seeing if any of the gang is in the vicinity or quartered at the house but that we should stay within our legal rights to see if McDonald is quartering them, in other words not to make a search of the house without first obtaining a search warrant.


MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR RE: Bremer Case.

I called Mr. Nathan at Kansas City and instructed him obtain a good photograph of Jesse Doyle and send it to St. Paul where Bryan Bolton might identify him as being one of the unknown individuals in the indictment.

I advised Mr. Nathan that I had instructed Mr. Connelley to send Agent Madala to Pittsburg, Kansas to question Edna Miurray. Mr. Nathan stated tha Agent Hansen was on his way to Pittsburg to assist in the questioning of Edna Murray. I advised Mr. Nathan that if he thought she should be taken to Kansas City to do so; that he should file a fugitive complaint at once if there is any publicity. I advised Mr. Nathan that it would be well to have the St. Paul Office send him a summary of the indictment; that he should have it for reference in filing complaints; that he should also request copies of the warrants for Jesse Doyle and Edna Murray; that he should give some time and consideration to the questioning of Dorris O'Connor. Mr. Nathan stated that an Agent is questioning her now but he is not asking her questions which will prove embarrassing or in any way let the police know what it is about.

With regard to Jesse Doyle, Mr. Nathan stated that the jail is safe enough but the facilities for questioning are not so good. Mr. Nathan stated that the newspapers know that these people are being held but they do not know who they are. I advised Mr. Nathan to watch out for any attorneys with a writ of habeas corpus.

Mr. Nathan stated that he had received a telephone call advising him that a call was put in from Chicago to Girard, Kansas but the party maing the call was unable to complete it. I advised Mr. Nathan that it might be Volney Davis and for him to contact Mr. Connelley and have him trace the call there.





MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Bremer Case;

I telephoned Mr Wilson of the Latin-American Division of the State Department, and stated that after a further discussion of the above matter, it was decided to request the State Department to request the deportation of Heller. Mr. Wilson then stated that he didn't know whether this could be done; that as far as he knows, no formal request has ever been made of a foreign government to deport an American citizen; that it was one thing for the Cuban government to deport the man, and entirely another matter for us to request his deportation when there is no extraditable offense lodged against him. I then stated that this man is charged with a crime in the United States, and it would seem that he would be an undesirable alien in Cuba. He then switched the situation around and asked what the attitude of the United States would be if a person were in our country charged with a crime in another country. I informed Mr. Wilson that the scope of my experience has not reached in that field of endeavor, and I was unable to make an opinion.

I then mentioned the indication on the part of Heller that he might voluntarily come into the United States. I told him that the lawyer of Heller had evidently talked him out of this, and the indication on the part of Heller now is that if he learns that deportation proceedings have been instituted against him, he will then volunteer to come to the United States in order to avoid such proceedings.

Mr. Wilson assured me that the State Department is eager to assist the Department of Justice in any way possible in the apprehension and prosecution of criminals; that, however under the circumstances, he is somewhat of a loss to know what to do. He stated, however, that he would keep in touch with me. I told him that there was nothing further I could do in the matter; that I had requested of the Department of State through Mr. Wilson that this man be deported, and ascertained that there was no such thing as a formal request; that we have tried for a week to convince the Ambassador in Cuba that this man should be deported, and the Ambassador is as yet unforwinced. He stated that he would give the matter further thought.





MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Bremer case; Cash McDonald. Mr. Henson telephoned and stated that he had spent the night interrogating the above named subject, who was apprehended by Division Agents yesterday afternoon. Mr. Hanson informed that the story of McDonald does not agree with that of Joe Adams; that he admits knowing Adams and admits having been in the El Commorodo Hotel, but he denies that he knows Willie Harrison or Harry Sawyer; however, he says that the occasion of his visit with Joe Adams was to get a gambling concession, and that he had with him a fellow whom he had met at a gambling place in Miami Beach. He then identified the photograph of Sawyer as that man. He says that Sawyer claimed that his name was Mandovich, or something like that, and that he was from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He denies that he made the airplane trip with Herrison to Havana, although Mr. Hanson has records showing that the two of them were on the same airplane on two occasions. Mr. Hanson stated that he would continue working on this fellow today. I told him that it would be a good idea to let McDonald know that he has been identified as having been in those banks down there. McDonald explains that he exchanged some currency over in Havana for gold; that he was interested in a gambling concession in Havana and that he did not go through with the deal, so he drew what money out of that project that he had over there; that he also had with him for placing in that project \$25,000 in Liberty Bonds, which he cashed over there and bought gold.

I mentioned that the original money is still over there in the original wrappers, and the bank officials have identified him as the one who changed the money; that he should inform McDonald that he had better come through with the straight story, or he will find himself involved in the Bremer case. Mr. Hanson stated that in addition to informing McDonald of these facts, he has informed him that if he, McDonald, is harboring Harrison or Sawyer down there, he will be charged with harboring.

Mr. Hanson mentioned that the newspapers down there were making certain inquiries about one McDonald in Vest Palm Beach; that while he does not know how they found out about the apprehension of McDonald, he he keined to take him to Miami immediately and there hold him for further cuestioning; that he has a Deputy United States Marshal with him at the present time, and in case any emergency arises, the capias can be served; that upon their arrival at Miami, the Marshal will be asked to leave for a while.



Mr. Nathan telephoned from the Kansas City Office and stated that in one of the suitcases recovered in Pittsburg, Kanses, apparently belonging to Volney Davis, there were found five Mellon National Bank Travelers' Checks; that the numbers of these checks were furnished to Mr. Brantley of the Oklahoma City Office, who, after a check of the same, ascertained that they were stolen in one of the Okemah, Oklahoma bank robberies on January 22, 1935.

I inquired if there was anything else in those bags of evidentiary value, and he advised that there was not; that there were several letters found in the bags addressed to different names, two of which are known to be aliases of Davis; that there was a new name which has not been known heretofore with a post office box at Grand-view, Missouri.

With reference to the money found in the possession of Davis at the time of his errest, I told Mr. Nathan that this money is presently in the possession of Mr. Connelley; that in this connection, he, Mr. Nathan, should request Mr. Connelley to have a further check made to ascertain if this momey came from either of the banks robbed at Okemah, Oklahoma on January 22, 1935.

I instructed Mr. Nathen that under no circumstances should any personal property not possessing evidentiary value be taken by the Division Agents from subjects in their custody.

He stated that he believes the Cuben authorities will deport Heller if Mr. Caffery does not insist upon his staying; that he believes Mr. Caffery is now won over, due to the fact that we have offered to allow the man to go of his own free will and accord to the United States; that since Heller has refused to accept this offer, Mr. Caffery believes that he is implicated.

Brown stated that Heller is represented by Dr. Ramon Caydin, who, besides being a lawyer, is editor of the El Pais, a newspaper there. Mrs. Heller is somewhat socially prominent over there, and well liked by the other Americans over there; that she has circulated a petition and has gathered the names of many prominent Americans there. She is going to submit this petition to the President this morning in an effort to sway him. However, Mr. Brown states that the personal representatives of the President will take care of that for them. It then remains to be seen whether or not the Ambassador will assume an attitude of "hands off". If so, Brown states that Heller will be taken from Cuba today.

Mr. Brown stated that he understands that Mr. Hanson will forward photographs of McDonald just as soon as the same are obtained; that this photograph will be exhibited to various witnesses over there in an attempt to strengthen their case against bonald.

Mr. Brown stated that he would advise the Division of any further developments.


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

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIPLCTOR

Re: Volney Davis

Mr. Nathan telephoned from the Kansas City Office to give the folloving complete story of the apprehension of Davis:

They learned two days ago that the automobile of which they were suspicious was in Kansas City at a motor service company for repairs. It happened to be spotted there by one of the men who works for the company from which Davis had bought it. They checked the situation, and have since that time maintained contact at the place where the car is. Plans were formulated whereby the officiels at the garage were to notify the Kansas City Office in advance of the time it was ready to take out so that men could be stationed there. Yesterday efternoon, Davis came by for the car, but it was not completed. Upon receipt of information to the effect that the car would be completed this morning, Mr. Nathan dispatched five Agents to the garage. These Agents were Agents Trainor, Staken, Carry, Shanahan and Dietz. They had two cars available in case they should decide to trail the party rather than take him into custody; however, then the party appeared, it was apparent that it was Davis, so Agent Trainor, who was inside the garage, took him into custody. Davis was alone at the time, having come up to the garage on foot, and only the people at the garage sat the errest. Mr. Nathan stated that these people have promised to do no telking.

Mr. Nathan stated that they ascertained where the compenion of Davis who was with him yesterday resides, this being Jess Doyle. However, since his girl friend, Doris O'Connor, was arrested by the police at Kansas City for shooting another vomen, Doyle has evidently left town. He stated that they had just returned from Doyle's place, but it looks as though he has left for good. They ascertained, howe er, the description of the car in which he is traveling, and Mr. Nathan asked my opinion as to the broadcasting of this information. I told him that if this can be done without any mention of Davis, it would be all right.

I instructed Mr. Nathan to get a walver of removed From Davis, charter an airplane and immediately remove him to Chicago, there the proper facilities are sveileble for his questioning; that he should communicate with Mr. Connelley at the Chicago Office informing him of the time of Deperture as well as time of arrival; that the Division should also be furnished this information. Kidnaping

After the apprehension of Volney Davis at Kensas City, Missouri on February 6, 1935, Special Agents who were maintaining a surveillance of the house occupied by Harry C. Stanley, brother of Edna Jurray, who resides at Pittsburg, Kansas, in cooperation with the local police department, engaged Jess Doyle in a gun battle on the morning of February 7, 1935. Doyle escaped.

There was found residing in the house Edna Murray, paramour of Volney Davis. She was taken into custody and placed in the jail at Pittsburg, Kansas. Around 12:00 noon (E.S.T.) on the same day the Kensas City office received a telephone call from the Sheriff at Girard, Kansas, advising that Jess Doyle had surrendered himself. Special Agents were immediately dispatched to that point, where Doyle is being questioned.

Doyle and Edna Murray are also named as defendants in the indictment returned at St. Paul, Minnesota on January 22, 1935, by the Federal Grand Jury, charging them, with others, with violating the Conspiracy Section of the Federal Kidnaping Statute, Title 18, Section 408-C. Very little is known as to the exact parts played by these two individuals in the case.

MENORANDUM FOR SPECIAL AGENT RECORDED Ro: Brokid INDEXED

As you have been edvised Cassins McDonald was taken into custody yesterday at Mess Falm Beach, Florida. He was interrogated very lengthily, but denies knowing William Harrison or Harry Sawyer alias Sealion. He does admit, however, that he made two trips from Mismi to Havana last September - he cannot recall the third trip which the records here reveal. Likewise he denies knowing that a William Harrison traveled on the same air ship with him to Havana on Sept. 6th last and returned with him on the same ship on Sept. 11th. He does admit knowing Joe idams. claiming to have again met him last Sept.
thru a Mismi gambler named Long whose description as furnished by RoDonald does not fit Sawyer or Harrison. He also stated that the photograph of Harrison re-sembles a man known to him as Whitey Martin who ran a saloon across from the Roney Place Hotel on Mismi Beach a couple of years ago; further that he also met a man in a room at the ElComodoro Hotel in Sept. who favors Harrison; that there was with this man a second individual who resembles Sawyer and who claimed to be a gambler from rittsburgh; that this second party worked at Carter's gambling house on Miami Boach.

McDonald also claims that he has been working with Juan R. Jimenes, Colle 7 entre 8 y 10 "La Sierra", Warianas, Havana, Cuba; that Jimenes is a Chinaman who controls gambling in Cuba and that the two of them had control under the Tourist Laws of gambling in Cuba. He had a portfolio with a lot of Spanish writing presumably contracts which might be a part of his "con" work. He claims that he had a financial interest in Jimenes' six Chinese gambling houses; further that in March in sold twenty-five thousand dollars worth of Liberty bonds to Fenner & Beane in Ravana, that he received this money in various demoninations, that he stored the money with Jimenez, that he bought some gold as an investment claiming to have profitedby the purchase, then trading

the Cuban coin or currency that he received for some one thousand dollar bills at the Bank of Canada.

the residente Hotel in Havana and that his is well known to the manager. From correspondence it was leaned that Mario Artesiano, Zapote 52, Santa Swarez, Havana, knows of McDonald's alleged gambling interests in Cuba.

McDonald denies knowing may of the Harker-Karpyis crowld or that he telegraphed red Barker alias blackburn at Ocklawsha per the telegram you found there.

meDonald's name is cassins m. McDonald his aliases being: Cash McDonald. C. McDonald. E. C. McDonald. Two copies of his photograph are attached hereto.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

On February 6, 1935 Special Agents of the Kansas City office had under surveillance an automobile at a motor service company in Kansas City, Missouri. The automobile had been located in the garage by one of the men employed by the automobile dealer who had sold the car to Volney Davis. Plans were formulated whereby the officials at the garage were to notify the Kansas City office in advance of the time when the car would be ready for delivery.

On the afternoon of February 5, 1935 an individual called for the car but was advised that the repairs would not be completed until the following morning, at which time Agents W. F. Trainor, Thomas E. Stakem, B. I. Parry, R. P. Shanahan, and H. A. Dietz covered the garage. The Agents had two Division cars available in case it was desired to trail the individual calling for the car under surveillance, rather than take him into custody. When the individual appeared at the garage, he was identified as Volney Davis and was taken into custody by Special Agent Trainor, who was stationed inside of the garage. Davis was alone at the time, having approached the garage on foot and the garage attendants were requested, and promised, to keep the apprehension of Davis confidential. It was learned that Davis was accompanied on the day before by Jess Doyle and the house where these two individuels had been living was located. It appears, however, that the paramour of Doyle, Doris O'Conner, was arrested at Kansas City, Missouri on the day before for shooting another woman and for this reason Doyle had appearently left Kansas City, Missouri.

Davis was taken to the Kansas City Division office for questioning. At the time of his apprehension there was found on his person \$1100 and a 380 Colt revolver. Pursuant to Division instructions a waiver of removal was obtained from Davis, an airplane was chartered for the purpose of removing him to Chicago, Illinois where the proper facilities are available for his questioning, and instructions were also issued that Epecial Agent

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in Charge Connelley should be advised of the time of departure, as well as the time of arrival and that the Division should also be furnished with this information. The Kansas City office was further instructed to take every possible precaution to prevent his escape.

Davis was removed, in accordance with these instructions, by Special Agents Trainor and Stakem and Special Agent in Charge Nathan of the Kansas City office has since advised that, prior to the departure of these agents, they were advised of the Division's instructions regarding handcuffs and leg-irons for the prisoner and were further instructed to take no chances, delivering the prisoner safely to the Chicago office. The telegram reporting this information also sets forth that the prisoner was kept in handcuffs during the entire stay at the Kanses City office and at all times was under guard of at least two agents. Davis was accompanied to the airport by five agents and immediately, prior to the departure of the plane, Special Agent in Charge Nathan advised the pilot to hold up the departure until the irons could be fixed. In route from the office to the airport the handcuffs had been removed from the prisoner. Special Agent Trainor was also instructed to immediately advise Special Agent in Charge Connelley and Special Agent in Charge Nathan in the event of any mishap.

The plane carrying Davis and the agents was forced down at 6:45 P. W. in a corn field one mile south of Yorkville, Illinois and ten miles south of Aurora, Illinois. There was not a telephone in the vicinity and a farmer was hailed and requested to drive the agents with their prisoner to town in order to telephone the Chicago Division office. To prevent curiosity and disclosing the identity of the prisoner, all leg-irons and handcuffs were removed and all three walked into the Vaiding Hotel and Barroom. Special Agent Trainor went into the telephone booth, while Special Agent Stakem remained standing at the end of the ber with the prisoner. then Agent Trainor had entered the telephone booth, Davis struck Agent Stakem on the cheek, knocking him down and then immediately leaped head . first through a window and ran along the building to the rear. Agent Stakem immediately drew his gun from his hip-holster, ran to the window and fired twice at the prisoner, who disappeared in the dark. Special Agent Trainor, upon hearing the commotion, ran out and tried to follow the prisoner without success. He secured the assistance of local persons and the Sheriff in conducting a search. During the course of the search they passed the cer which was later stolen, apparently by Davis, which was a Ford V-8 Sedan, bearing Illinois License Number 104,140, property of Holland Bretthauer, a local grocer. The car was stolen about 7:40 P. M. and Davis apparently had hid in the vicinity from 7:10 to the time of the theft. At the time he disappeared he was wearing a dark blue overcoat, brown suit and hat, wore a finger ring and had in his possession a gold watch and no money. The Sheriff was not advised of the identity of the prisoner, except that

he was a Federal prisoner. Radio alarms were sent through the local police department to bick up the described automobile in which Davis was thought to have escaped.

Metty Gleason of Aurora, Illinois approached one G. A Farnhart and offered to sell him a white gold half-carat ring for \$60.00, claiming that the ring was the property of the prisoner who had escaped the previous evening from Federal officers and is wanted in connection with the Bremer kidnsping case; that the prisoner had asserted to him that the Government had taken all his money except the ring and a watch. Barnhart purchased the ring around 10:00 P. W. the evening of February 7, 1935 and Gleason, who sold the ring to him, was followed to a house of prostitution, which is operated by him. One of the persons interviewed at this place identified Davis fro the description furnished as an individual who visited that house the night before. Gleason was taken into custody and brought to the Chicago Division office but no information of value has been obtained from him up to this time. It is possible that he has assisted Davis in escaping from that vicinity. The Ford Sedan which was used by Davis in fleeing from Yorkville, Illinois was found abandoned near Wheaton, Illinois with bloodsteins on the front seat indicating hands or legs injured, probably caused from his leaping through the glass window. The ring recovered at Aurora, Illinois fits the description of the ring worn by Davis at the time of his escape.

On February 4, 1935, a telephone call was received at the Kanses City Office from an employee of Noel V. Wood Motor Company, Kansas City, Missouri, which company was cooperating in the efforts of this office to locate a Pontiac Seden believed to have some connection with the Subjects of the case. Agents were immediately despatched to the Koel V. Wood Company, where it was ascertained that the car had not been brought into that company for repairs, but that an employee of that company had observed and recognized the car on the floor of the United Motors Service, 2501 McGee, Kansas City, Missouri. It was ascertained that 1905 Missouri license plates were on the car, and that it had a Kensas City, Missouri, city license. Immediate inspection of this car by Agents determined that it was actually the car in which we were interested. It was determined that the car had been left there by a man, and that it would not be ready to be taken from the garage until the late evening of February 5, at the earliest. Arrangements were effected whereby the Kansas City Office would be notified in the event the car should be ready for delivery to its owner prior to that time, and it was arranged that this office should be notified in advance of the time when the car could be ariven from the garage, in order that appropriate surveillance might be maintained.

Inquiry through the Motor Vehicle Registration Department of the State of Missouri, both at Kansas City and at Jefferson City, Missouri revealed only that the car was registered during 1935 in the name of G. L. Harper, Box 12, Raytown, Missouri, and that it had been transferred during the month of January from its previous registrant, Grace R. Hanson, to Harper. Inquiries were accordingly made at the Raytown Post Office through the Postmaster, Mr. Muir, where it was determined that Harper was unknown, and that the box had been rented under circumstances similar to the rental of a box at Belton, Missouri, rented under circumstances similar to the rental of a box at Belton, Missouri, previously reported. It could not be determined at Raytown that Harper was known to any persons interviewed. Photographs of the various Subjects and others implicated in this case were exhibited to persons both at Raytown and at the United Motors Service, but no positive identification was made of anyone. It United Motors Service, on February 5, that one of the mechanics at the United Motors Service thought that the photograph of Volney Davis resembled to some extent the individual who had brought the car there for repairs.

On the early afternoon of February 5, 1935, a telephone call was received from the United Motors Service, to the effect that the owner of the car and another man had come in to look at the car and to determine what progress was being made on it. an order that it be washed on the following morning, and that he would call for it about 10 or 11 o'clock. On the possibility that there might be some change in the plans of the owner, it was determined to keep the car under strict surveillance, and Agents were left at the garage for that purpose.

Further inquiries through the Motor Vehicle Department disclosed that the Chevrolet car mentioned was registered in the name of J. C. Stacey, 23 Warner Plaza, Kansas City, Missouri. By inquiries in the neighborhood of that address, it was determined that the sar was then parked on Warner Plaza. Agents W. F. Trainor and V. I. Parry observed an individual in the car and endeavored to trail him upon leaving, but lost him in traffic; it is noted that this surveillance occurred after dark, and it was impossible to obtain a view of the occupants of the car. In view of the set-up which had been arranged in connection with the Pontiac, it was deemed by the writer to be inadvisable to attempt any further surveillance of the persons residing at 23 Warner Plaza, inasmuch as such surveillance might create suspicion, and it appeared that the possibilities of identifying the owner of the Pontiac when he came for the car, were better than any other action which could be taken. Accordingly, the surveillance at 23 Warner Plaza was discontinued.

Agents of the Kansas City Office resumed their surveillance at the United Motors Service when this place opened on the morning of February 6, 1935, at 7:30 a.m. The Agents taking part in this surveillance were W. F. Trainor, R. P. Sharahan, T. E. Stakem, H. A. Dietz, and V. I. Parry. It was arrenged that Agent Parry should accompany the Pontiac from the United Motors Service to another automobile company at the time it was washed, and he was provided with appropriate clothing for the purpose. At a little before 12 o'clock, an individual resembling Volney Davis was observed to walk by the show windows of the United Motors Service Company, and after looking around he entered the place and came over to where the Pontiac was stationed. Special Agent Trainor had an opportunity to get a good look at this individual, and recognized him as being identical with Davis. He was immediately taken into custody and offered no resistance. Upon being searched, it was found that he had in his possession a .32 caliber automatic pistol, which was removed from his person. He was brought to the Kansas City Office immediately, and the Division was notified. Davis was briefly questioned by the writer and admitted his identity. He was asked as to the individual who had been with him on the preceding day, and after some hesitation advised that it was Jess Doyle. He stated that Doyle was probably at 23 Warner Plaza, but expected to leave within ar hour. When questioned as to his place of residence, he advised that he had resided at 3215 Broadway, but had left there several days ago because Edna Murray had deserted him and had been living at the Warner Plaza address with Doyle. It is observed that these statements were subsequently found to be untrue.

In an effort to locate Doyle, Agents Trainor, Shanahan, Dietz, Parry, and Nathan immediately proceeded to 23 Warner Plaza, where, after properly stationing agents at all strategic points, it was determined that apparently no one tioning agents at all strategic points, it was determined that apparently no one was in the apartment, and entry was effected through the service door. The

apartment had the appearance of having been vacated by its occupants, although there were a few articles of women's clothing and toilet articles in the place. Prior to forcing an entry through the service door, permission to do so was obtained by Agent from the manager of the apartment, Mrs. C. T. Miller, who obtained by Agent from the manager of the apartment, Mrs. C. T. Miller, who resides at 15 Warner Plaza, telephone Valentine 0142. Three Agents were left in this apartment on the thought that Doyle might return there, and Agents were maintained there continuously until the following day, when Doyle was found to be at Pittsburg, Kansas.

Inquiry at 3215 Broadway, given by Davis as his former address, disclosed that the address which he meant was the Zelda Apartments, 3211-13 Broadway, where the manager, whose name was not obtained, advised that a Hanson had lived there for a period of approximately two months with his wife, but had left several weeks prior to Agents' visit, stating that he was going to St. Joseph, Missouri. The apartment was briefly examined and was found to have been entirely cleaned out.

Under instructions from Er. Temm of the Division, arrangements were made to charter a plane in order to take Davis to Chicago. Davis had previously executed a waiver of removal to any point for prosecution or questioning. He was escorted by five Agents to the Kansas City airport, and left Kansas City at 3:20 p.m., accompanied by Special Agents W. F. Trainor and T. E. Stakem. Prior to the arrival of the plane at Chicago, a forced landing was necessitated due to the pilot's losing his way, the landing taking place near Yorkville, Illinois. Davis was taken by the agents into Yorkville, and, during a phone call being made by Agent Trainor to the Chicago Division Office to advise Mr. Connelley of the situation, pavis succeeded in making his escape, slugging Agent Stakem and diving through a closed window. Agent Stakem fired two shots at him, but apparently neither took effect. Further details in this connection are being omitted, in view of the fact that the Division has been fully advised of the circumstances.

With the approval of the Division, a description of the Chevrolet car in which Doyle was believed to be traveling was furnished to various lam enforcement officers in the Kansas City district and to the Division Offices surrounding Kansas City. Detailed information concerning this automobile was also furnished by telephone by the writer to Special Agent D. A. Bryce at Pittsburg, Kanses, who had been spotted there together with Special Agent W. B. O'Mahoney for several weeks. On the morning of February 7, 1935, Agents Bryce and V. R. Clary, who was assisting in the surveillance at Pittsburg during the temporary absence of Agent O Mahoney, determined that the Chevrolet car with the Kissouri license noted above had appeared at the home of H. C. Stanley. Accompanied by Chief of Police Ross Armstrong, Agents Bryce and Clary proceeded to that address. Other members of the Pittsburg, Kansas, Police Department were enroute to the scene, but it was observed that persons were apparently preparing to leave the address, and it was noted that Jess Doyle was in the Chevrolet car described. Doyle made his escape temporarily from the agents, who fired at him, several shots taking effect in the car, and it was at first thought that Doyle was wounded, from his actions. However, it was

subsequently determined that he was not hit, although the car was damaged. Officers in the vicinity were notified from Pittsburg and from the Kansas City Office to be on the lookout for Doyle, and at approximately 10:30 a.m., February 7, information was obtained that Doyle had called the Sheriff at Cirard, kansas, from the outskirts of Girard, and surrendered himself, his car having become stuck, and he apparently having lost his nerve after abserving the shots in his car. He was taken to the Crawford County Jail at Girard. It was determined by the Agents that the other occupants of the Stanley home included Edna Murray and Er. and Ers. Harry C. Stanley, all of whom were taken into custody and lodged at the city jail at Pittsburg.

On February 9, 1935, on instructions of Mr. Temm of the Division, complaints were filed against Jess Doyle and Edna Murray at Topeka, Kansas, by Special Agent R. G. Reed, the complaints being based on the indictment returned at St. Paul. These complaints were authorized by Assistant United States Attorney D. C. Hill, who also authorized filing of a complaint against the Stanleys, charging them with harboring Edna Murray and Doyle on February 7, 1935. This complaint charged a violation of Section 246, Title 18, C. S. Code.

On February 10, 1935, Doyle and Edna Murray were taken into custody by a Deputy United States Marshal, and were brought before United States Commissioner C. M. Armour, Fort Scott, Kansas. They had previously both executed waivers of removal to St. Paul or any other point. They waived hearing before the Commissioner and were committed to the Wyandotte County Jail, Kansas City, the Commissioner and will probably be removed to St. Paul on or about Kansas, by the Marshal, and will probably be ramoved to St. Paul on or about February 11, 1935. The Stanleys will probably be taken into custody by the Marshal on February 11.

During the time that these parties were held at Pittsburg and Girard, Kansas, they were interviewed by Agents of the Kansas City Office and by Special Agents Paul Hansen and Whelan, of the Oklahoma City Office, and Special Agent J. L. Madala, of the Chicago Office. The statements which were made will be incorporated in the subsequent report to be submitted. Memoranda will be prepared by each of the Agents participating in the investigation outlined herein, and included in another report.

It should be noted that on the late afternoon of February 5, 1935, a shooting scrape occurred in Kensas City, during which a woman giving the name to the police of Mrs. Frances Taylor, alias Rush, was shot and seriously wounded by Doris O'Connor, sister of Edna Murray. This shooting occurred at about the time that information was obtained by this office as to the address of Jess Doyle under the name of J. C. Stacey; on the morning of February 5, local newspapers carried an account of the shooting, giving the name of the asseilant as Mrs. Vinita Stacey. In view of the woman having the same name as that of the person residing at 23 Warner Plaza, and operating the Chevrolet

Coupe under suspicion, inquiries were made through the Kansas City Police
Department, where the fingerprints of the woman held were compared with those
of Dorigio Connor, and the identity of this woman established. On the same
morning, a telephone call was received by the writer from an employee of the
libel V. Wood Company to the effect that the picture of the woman held under the
name of Stacey by the police department, was identical with the woman to whom
the Pontiac Sedan in question had been sold. It is evident that the reason for
Jess Doyle leaving his apartment at 23 Warner Plaza was this shooting affair,
inasmuch as he had undoubtedly vacated this apartment prior to the apprehension
of Volney Davis.

Doris O'Connor has been interviewed briefly by Special Agent A. K. Farland of this office, but has declined to talk, beyond an admission of her identity after being confronted with the fingerprint identification. It has been established through the records of the Kansas City Police Department that the woman who was shot has been arrested in the past in connection with a blackmeil scheme investigated by the Post Office inspectors at Kansas City, in which she was involved with one John Langdon. The indications are that this woman, together with Langdon, has been associating with Doyle and Davis in Kansas City. She is in a serious condition in a local hospital, and for a time it was thought that she would not recover, but the present indications are that there is at least a chance of her recovery. She has refused to identify her assailant or to give the police any information. She was also briefly interviewed by Special agent Farlend, the interview necessarily being extremely limited because of her physical condition. Further attention to this angle of the matter is being given, and every effort will be made to determine the identities of any other persons who may have been associates of the Subjects during their stay in Kansas City. 3

At the time of the apprehension of Davis, he had in his possession approximately \$1100.00 in currency, consisting of ten one hundred dollar bills, and a number of smaller bills. This money was turned over to Special Agent in Charge Connelley by the Agents who accompanied Davis from Kansas City to York-ville, Illinois. At the same time they turned over certain other personal effects taken from Davis, and the list which had been made of this currency and other effects. No copy was retained in Kansas City, due to the limited time Davis was held here.

Among the effects found in the possession of Doyle were a number of Mellon Travelers Checks, which have been identified as having been stolen from one of two national banks at Okemah, Oklahoma, which were robbed on the same day, approximately December 22, 1934. These robberies were perpetrated by six men, and it appears quite probable that Doyle and Davis were implicated in these and possibly in other bank robberies in this section. Attention is being given to this angle of the case.


During the interviews had by Agents of the Kansas City Office with Jess Doyle at Girard, Kansas, he informed them of the fact that Volney Davis and Edna Lurray had resided in another apartment subsequent to moving from 5211 Broadway. He was unable to give the exact location of this apartment, but generally described its neighborhood. Inquiries made by the writer and Special Agent W. E. Miller established rather definitely the location of this apartment as the Beaumont Apertments, 3028 Baltimore Avenue, Apertment 209. With the permission of the manager of this apartment, Mrs. Schupan, a thorough search was made of the apartment on February 9, 1935. It was found to have apparently been hurriedly vacated by its occupants, who left at least the majority of their personal effects. The search disclosed no firearms or money of any description, there being one cartridge for a .401 rifle in one of the portable trunks in the apartment. There was a large quantity of men's clothing and a smaller quantity of women's clothing, together with a number of handbags and trunks. This apertment was rented under the name of G. Harper on or about February 1. From the newspapers which had not been removed from the front of the apartment, it is evident that the apartment had not been occupied since February 6. The latest paper found in the apartment was that of the afternoon of that date. In this connection, Doyle told the agents that he had spent the day at this apertment after Davis had gone to obtain his automobile, and had vacated the apartment during the late afternoon, proceeding from Kansas City to Pittsburg, Kensus, that night.

After discussing this phase of the matter with Mr. Connelley by telephone, transcrients were effected with the manager of the apartment for Agents
of this office to be planted in it against the possible return of Davis. Special
Agents A. E. Farland, N. O. Scott, and E. M. Heavrin are presently in the apartment, appropriately armed, and will remain there until such time as it appears
that this lead has no possible value.

It is also noted that in the brief interview had with Davis by Agent Farland, Davis advised that he had contemplated going to Coulee Dan, in the state of Montana. However, it has been determined that a number of the statements which Davis made at that time were false.

All leads developed by the inquiries in this district are being given innediate attention, and any leads requiring attention elsewhere are being submitted to the appropriate offices.

Reference is made to your telephonic conversation with the writer of February 2, 1935, concerning the arrest of Nathaniel H. Heller of Havana, Cuba, by the Havana police after having been furnished information by special agents R. D. Brown and S. K. McKee concerning Heller's association with and harboring of Alvin Karpis.

As you were advised telephonically on February 2nd, after special agent Brown's return to Miami from Havana, Brown advised me that upon his arrival in Havana on January 20th he telephoned the United States Ambassador's first secretary, Mr. H. F. Mathews, advising him of his arrival in Havana. He further stated that he did not call upon Mr. Mathews personally or on any other member of the Ambassador's or the Consul's staff until after he had conducted his investigation and furnished the Cuban officials with the information concerning Heller's harboring of Karpis.

Brown also told me that he did not speak to anyone attached to the Ambassador's or Consul's staff until the Havana police had arrested Heller on the grounds that he was an undesirable alien; that after the arrest and on February 2, 1975, he called upon the United States Ambassador, the Hon. Jefferson Caffrey, when he related all the facts to him. Brown mentioned that he made this call between 1 and 2PM on February 2nd and that while the Ambassador at first appeared to be provoked because Heller had been arrested without his knowledge and because he was not in a position to make a statement to the Press, yet after all the facts of the case had been explained to the Ambassador, Brown was of the opinion that Mr. Caffrey's attitude had changed and that he was no longer disturbed about the Matter.

RECORDED & INDEXED

Immediately after talking to you on the telephone on the evening of February 2nd, I communicated the the Assistant United States Attorney in Miami who authorized a templaint against Heller charging him with conspiracy to harbor Karpis in Miami. The complete details as to the complaint were telephoned to the Division that night for which reason they are not being repeated here.

Further in accordance with your instructions I went to Havana, Cuba, on February third to call upon Ambassador Caffrey. I explained to him your regrets over the action of Special Agents Brown and McKee in going to the Havana police without having taken the matter up with him or his staff. He informed me that that matter was now a past incident so far as he was concerned; that at the time of the arrest and shortly thereafter the matter was embarrassing because the Press, upon whose cooperation he was very gependent, had called upon him for a statement and he was in no position to furnish it. He informed me of the necessity for the Ambassador or his staff to be acquainted with the work done by the various representatives of the United States in Cuba, especially when such work might involve a citizen of the United States inasmuch as when a citizen of this country got in trouble it was the duty of the Consul to see that he got his rights and also because the various members of Congress generally were interested in the welfare of their constituents and would call upon the Ambassador or the State Department for information concerning the case.

I explained to the Ambassador that special agents Brown and lickee would keep him fully informed as to their investigation and that no action would be taken by them without the approval of the Ambassador. Mr. Caffrey seemed very much satisfied with that arrangement and requested that the agents keep his first secretary, Mr. Mathews informed as to the case. The agents were instructed to do this. I also pointed out to him that the arrest in this case had been made by the Havana police which fact he stated was known to him. He however pointed out that because of his close relationship with the President of Cuba, he would be called upon by the Cuban authorities for a recommendation with respect to deporting Heller even tho the Havana police made the arrest. In this respect he inquired of me whether I believed Heller was guilty of harboring karpis inasmuch as Heller denies knowing the identity of Karpis claiming to know him only as Mr A Waggoner. I informed the Ambassador that it was my personal opinion that the various acts committed by Heller, viz the renting of a home for Karpis, the purchase of an automobile for him, the purchase of a motor for a motor-boat, of various household goods including the purchase of groceries and daily newspapers and the keeping of approximately ten thousand dollars for Karpis, were all such facts or duties outside of the duties of a hotel manager that they lead me to believe that Heller was acquainted with Karpis! identity. The Ambassador then indicated that he would withhold any judgment that he had to make until all the facts were presented to his secretary. I further explained to him that the United States Attorney in Miami was satisfied that the evidence of Heller's association with Dolores Delaney in Miami was such evidence that he had authorized the prosecution of Heller and that there was now

a warrant outstanding for Heller in the United States District Court at Miami.

At the conclusion of my interview with Mr. Caffrey I was of the opinion that he no longer was harshly disposed towards the Division.

I should also mention that the Ambassador also asked if there was any objection to permitting the newspaper men to interview Heller. I, of course, informed him that Heller was in the custody of the Havana police and that so far as this Division was concerned they had complete custody of him and that if they would permit the newsmen to see Heller that was satisfactory with me. I told the Ambassador that I would instruct special agents McKee and Brown to that effect which I did. As I indicated above, I also told these agents to keep the Ambassador's first secretary fully informed as to the entire investigation in Cuba; furthermore that the property belonging to Karpis which was recovered from Heller which property included a radio, motor for a boat, household goods and a Ford Sedan, all of which was recovered by the Havana police be disposed of as the Havana police and the American Ambassador believed proper and lawful.

Subsequent to my return to Miami, late on the night of February third, special agent Brown communicated with me telephonically advising that the Havana police had declined the newspaper men permission to see Heller.

I also should have mentioned above that special agent Brown informed me that he had intended to call upon the Ambassador's secretary, Mr. Mathews, after his telephonic conversation with him on the day of his arrival, but that after commencing the investigation and after contacting who for fifteen years

was advised that as soon as the representatives of the Ambassador or Consulate became acquainted with the assignment of the special agents it would appear in the Press. Brown believing that there was a possibility of locating William Harrison and Harry Sawyer in Havana was attempting to avoid any publicity. Nevertheless, Brown disregarded the instructions that I had given him to call upon the United States Consul.

After receiving your information by telephone on the night of February 6, to the effect that JESS DCYLE, had left Kansas City, No. driving a Chevrolet Coupe bearing 1935 No. tags 193-390, and that it was possible that he was headed for Pittsburg, Kan., Agent V. R. Clary and the writer checked all streets and garages in Pittsburg, but failed to locate the above described car.

On the morning of Feb. 7, 1935, Mr. J.D. Miller called the writer at 7:00 a.m. stating that there was a Chevrolet Coupe parked behind the residence of H. C. Stanley, 206 E. Adams St. Pittsburg, Kan. Agent Clary and writer immediately drove by the Stanley home and noticed the Chevrolet, bearing tags numbered 193-380. The car was still parked behind the house as previously described by Er. Miller. Agents immediately called Chief of Police, Ross Armstrong, Pittsburg, and Sergeant Thomas Stowers, also Pittsburg Police. They were told to meet Agents in the vicinity of the Stanley home. After the arrival of Chief Armstrong, and before the arrival of Thomas Stowers, at about 8:05 A.M., H. C. Stanley came from the back door of his home and got into his own personal automobile, a Buick, and backed out to the street, where he stopped as if waiting for someone. Jess Doyle then, after having come from the Stanley home, entered the Chevrolet Coupe and drove it to where H. C. Stanley was parked waiting. Stanley then drove two blocks south of Adams Street, where he turned west with Jess Doyle following him. Agents Clary and the writer, together with Chief Armstrong, followed the two above mentioned automobiles in a Division owned automobile, that Agents were driving.

Stanley and Doyle in their respective cars turned west after proceeding two blocks south of Adems Street and went three blocks west crossing Broadway, the first intersection crossed. After driving west three blocks they again turned south and drove in that direction on a street that had a dead end. Apparently neither Stanley nor Doyle realized that the street dead ended until reaching the end. They made the turn at the end of the street and started back facing us. Stanley was leading Doyle by about ten or fifteen yards. There was only one course open for Agents and the Chief to take Doyle, which was to block the street with the Division automobile. Agent Clary drove past Stanley and blocked the street with the Division automobile. The writer immediately stepped out of the car covered Doyle with the machine gun calling "We're coppers, Jess, put your hands up". Doyle then reached in the seat by his side with his right hand, picking up a pistol and with his left hand wheeled his car over the right curb ran along inside of the sidewalk for a distance of about 15 yards turned back into the street and started north.

The writer fired thirteen shots at Doyle through the back of his fleeing car, firing two bursts from the machine gun. Several of the shots fired were seen to hit the car directly behind the driver and Doyle was seen to slump in the seat but continued to drive north. Chief Armstrong was also firing at the car with a high powered rifle, thing the car one time on the right side, the bullet coming out striking the right glass frame. Chief Armstrong was firing from the Division automobile.

The writer then jumped back into the Division car, Agent Clary turned the car around and started in pursuit of Doyle. We failed to locate Doyle after the affray. The car was lost in the residential district of Pittsburg, Doyle having a four block lead before the Division car could be turned around.

When it was seen that Doyle had escaped, we immediately drove to the Stanley home, 206 E. Adams Street, Agent Clary went to the back of the house, Chief Armstrong watched the front, the writer went in the house through the front door, ordering everyone to put up their hands. There were three people in the house, Er. and Ers. Stanley and Edna Eurray. Edna Turray had a .32 cal. Colt sutomatic pistol when the writer entered the house followed by Chief Armstrong. She threw the pistol on the divan. All three people were then placed under arrest and lodged in the Pittsburg city jail.

At writer's request Sergeant Tom Stowers called all outlying cities in the vicinity of Pittsburg, giving the tag number and description of the car driven by Doyle as well as description of Doyle, scription of the car driven by Doyle as well as description of Doyle, requesting that officers so notified block all highways within a radius of fifty miles.

At about 11:10 A.M. Sheriff Delamaide of Crawford County,
Kansas, called the Pittsburg Police Department stating that he had
Jess Doyle in custody at the County Jail. Agent Clary, Thomas Stowers
and the writer immediately proceeded to Girard, Kansas and placed a
Covernment hold order on Jess Doyle.

Upon interview with Poyle immediately upon reaching the jail,
Doyle stated to Agents that he had called the Sheriff by telephone
telling him that he was wanted as a fugitive by the Government and
that he wanted to get in jail for fear of his life. The Sheriff then

stated to Agent that Doyle had called him out of bed by telephone
stating that he was a fugitive and had had a shooting scrape in
Pittsburg and wanted to get in jail before he got killed, giving the
Sheriff his location at the time which was 132 miles southwest of Girard,
Kensas.

Poyle then stated that his car was stuck in the mud two miles from where the Sheriff had picked him up. The Sheriff then accompanied

Agents and Thomas Stowers to the Chevrolet car driven by Doyle.

Inside the coupe directly behind and above the seat was found a gun
case containing 1 Remington automatic rifle 401 caliber, 1 pump 12.

gauge sawed off shotgun; 1 Remington sawed off sutomatic shotgun and
l regular Remington 12 gauge sutomatic shotgun. All these guns were
put into the Division automobile together with four suit cases also
found in the back end of the coupe. All this property was taken to
the County Jail at Girard, where the Sheriff picked up the new
pemington 12 gauge automatic shotgun stating that he was going to
sheriff who refuses to surrender same to Agents.

Subsequent search made in the vicinity of the neighborhood where Doyle abandoned his car was made by county officers who accompanied the wrecker to the Doyle's car, which resulted in the finding of a brief case containing several sets of license tags and a Colt .45 cal. automatic pistol. The Sheriff took this pistol also and took it to his living quarters in the jail. He has also refused to turn this pistol over to Agents. In fact requested that all guns found in poyle's car be left in his custody for his disposition.

After the Chevrolet Coupe had been found it was evident that the gun case previously described had stopped four of the shots from the machine gun. The car when found and examined was seen to have eight machine gun bullet holes on the left side of the back directly behind the steering wheel, and one rifle bullet hole on the right side, that bullet having passed through the body of the car.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE SPECIAL AGENT IN CHARGE:

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I am submitting herewith memorandum covering my activities at Pittsburg, Kansas, on February 6th and 7th, 1935, in connection with the Bremer case:

On Wednesday, February 6, 1935, I was instructed to assist Special Agent D. A. Bryce in the surveillance of a house located at 206 East Adams St., Pittsburg, Kansas, the home of H. C. Stanley and his wife.

During the afternoon I had Division Car No. 1 at the service station being greased. At about 4:30 PM, Special Agent Bryce called me at the service station and requested that I return to the Besse Hotel immediately. This I did, and, upon arriving at the Besse Hotel, Agent Bryce informed me that he had received a telephone call from Special Agent in Charge R. B. Nathan informing him that Jess Doyle had left Kansas City in a black Chevrolet coupe, 1933 model, bearing 1935 Missouri License tags 193-580, with a Sullivan Chevrolet Co. tire cover. It was thought possible that he would go to Pittsburg, Kansas.

We immediately began driving around the streets in the vicinity of 206 East Adams St. and also Broadway Street which is highway 73-E from Kansas City. We did not see this car, but continued looking for it at intervals of about thirty minutes until quite late. I am not certain of the time that we quit and put the car in storage, but believe it was nearly midnight.

At 7:10 AM on Thursday February 7th, 1935, Special Agent Bryce called me and said, "That car has shown up. Get your clothes on." I dressed and went to his room. At about 7:20 AM I went to the garage and got the car. We drove south on Locust Street, which is the street which intersects Adams Street about 100 feet west of the house known as 206 East Adams St. On crossing Adams Street we observed a black Chevrolet coupe parked north and south in back of the house at this address. We could not see the numbers on the license tags well enough to make them out, nor could we read the lettering on the tire cover. It was thought advisable to avoid attracting attention by stopping and trying to make out the numbers on the tags.

We therefore, continued to the police station to pick up Chief of Police R. A. Armstrong. He had not arrived at the Police station and we went to his home to pick him up. Special Agent Bryce had telephoned him from the police station while I remained in the car. We went to the home of the police station, but he had left. A few minutes later we picked him up in front of the Besse Hotel.

Chief of Police R. A. Armstrong, Special Agent D. A. Bryce and this agent

who was driving, proceeded in Division car No. 1, to a point on Washington Street (one block north of Adams Street) where car was parked with motor running, facing east about forty feet from Adams Street.

It was decided to wait for the Chevrolet Coupe to leave, then follow the car out of town, when it was planned to overtake this car and apprehend the occupant thereof without any publicity and also without warning the remaining occupants of the Stanley house.

About five minutes after eight o'clock, H. C. Stanley was observed leaving this house. He went to the garage and backed his Buick Sedan out into the alley. This agent did not see anyone go to the Chevrolet, but in a minute or so, the Chevrolet also started moving. This agent moved the Division car up to the intersection and Stanley's Buick was seen turning south on Locust St. followed closely by the Chevrolet Coupe.

The Division car was driven to Adams Street and west on Adams Street one block to Broadway where these two cars were seen turning south on Broadway. We followed them several blocks south on Broadway when both cars again turned west and then, after driving west a block or two, again turned south. When the Division car made this last turn it was discovered that we were only about half a block behind them. To avoid being noticed, the Division car was slowed down to give the other two cars time to get farther ahead.

It was then observed that Stanley's Buick and the Chevrolet Coupe were making a "U-turn" around a flag-pole in the middle of this street about a block and half away and were coming back toward.us. As we approached the intersection of Quincy and Walnut Streets, Chief Armstrong said that they had gotten into a blind street and that now was the time to get them.

In view of the fact that we were headed in the opposite direction and the Chevrolet Coupe would pass by us, it was considered that any further attempts to trail this car would prove ineffective. By this time, the Division car was on the north side of the intersection facing south, the Stanley Buick was on the south side of the intersection facing north. A car from the west crossed and a car from the east was approaching at a high rate of speed. It was necessary, therefore, for both Stanley's Buick and the Division car to wait, on opposite sides of the street, for these two cars to gross.

It was not deemed advisable to block the road in front of the Stanley Buick because this would have then given the occupant of the Chevrolet warning and have permitted him to have either attempted an escape by abandoning the car, or to get whatever firearms he might have had in readiness.

While the Division car was blocked on the north side of this intersection, the Chevrolet Coupe had come up close behind the Stanley Buick. This made it impossible to get the Division car in between these two cars. As soon

The state of the state of

as possible, the Division car was driven across the intersection, past the Stanley Buick, and in front of the Chevrolet Coupe. Special Agent D. A. Bryce, who was riding in the right-hand front seat jumped from the car taking with him a Thompson sub-machine gun loading with a clip of twenty.

The driver of the Chevrolet Coupe (who was later definitely identified as Jess Doyle) apparently had his car in second gear because he seemed to have a great deal of power. As the Division car approached, he suddenly jerked his car over the curb and pulled around the Division car. As Doyle's car passed this agent, I saw Doyle reach down onto the seat of his car with his right hand. Although I did not see Doyle with any firearms, it is my belief that at that time he was reaching for a pistol which was probably on the seat beside him. At this point, it is noted that Mrs. Stanley informed this agent later in the day that Doyle had two automatic pistols when he left her home that morning.

As Special Agent Bryce jumped from the Division Car he called to Doyle to stop. When it was seen that Doyle did not intend to stop and was about to effect his escape, Agent Bryce opened fire with the Thompson sub-machine gun from a point just east of the front left fender of the Division car. A number of the bullets were seen to enter the back of the Chevrolet. Chief of Police Armstrong, who was riding in the back of the Division car fired five shots with an automatic rifle. In the opinion of the writer, none of the shots fired by Chief Armstrong took effect.

As soon as it was seen that even after the firing Doyle was not going to stop, this agent began turning the Division car around. The car was at such an angle in this narrow street that it was necessary to back up twice to get turned around. Doyle's Chevrolet was then observed driving rapidly north on Walnut Street. Walnut Street jogs at a point about four blocks north of the point of firing. By the time we had arrived at the jog in walnut Street it was impossible to determine which direction the Doyle Chevrolet had gone.

Anticipating that Doyle had possibly decided to make an attempt to return to Kansas City, the Division car was driven several miles north on highway 75-E. After satisfying ourselves that he had not gone in this direction, we returned to 206 East Adams St., Pittsburg, Kansas. Special Agent Bryce and Chief Armstrong went to the front door and this agent went to the back and Chief Armstrong went to leave the back door, and when Special Agent Bryce called to me, I went to the front door and went in. There were two women and one man inside, in addition to Special Agent Bryce and Chief women and one man inside, in addition to Special Agent Bryce and Chief women and one said that one of the women was Edna Murray.

After we had searched the three persons found in this house, I took Edna Murray to the Division car and Chief Armstrong and Special Agent Bryce brought Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Stanley out to the car. As we were ready to

leave this place, Tom Stowers, Desk Sergeant, Pittsburg Police Department, drove up. Edna Kurray and Krs. H. C. Stanley were transferred to his car. The Division car then followed Stowers' car to the Pittsburg Police Statical where Edna Kurray and Kr. and Mrs. H. C. Stanley were placed in the Pittsburg City Jail.

Immediately upon arriving at the Police Station Special Agent Bryce called Special Agent In Charge R. B. Nathan at Kansas City, Mo., and told him of the arrests and the encounter with Doyle. In the meantime, at the request of Special Agent Bryce, Tom Stowers called police officers and sheriffs' offices in the vicinity of Pittsburg, Kansas, giving them a description of the Doyle Chevrolet and requesting them to be on the lookout for it. This was done quite thoroly and we were assured that all the principal highways were being watched. It is noted that on this date it was raining quite hard which rendered travel on unimproved roads practically impossible.

After questioning the Stanleys for some time in an attempt to ascertain where Doyle was going when he left their place, Special Agent Bryce, Tom Stowers and the writer made a search of the passable roads and highways in the vicinity of Pittsburg in an effort to locate some trace of Doyle's car, but were unsuccessful.

We then returned to the Pittsburg Police Station and were questioning Edna Murray when word was received from Sheriff Delamaide at Girard, Kansas, that Jess Doyle had voluntarily surrendered himself to Sheriff Delamaide. Special Agent Bryce, Tom Stowers and the writer then proceeded in Division Car to Girard, Kansas, where Jess Doyle was found in the sheriff's office.



Dear Sir:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of January 30, 1935, referring to the shipment by me of Fourteen Thousand Dollars in currency, and jewelry belonging to the Barkers, which were found in the house they occupied at Oklawaha, Florida, to Saint Paul in violation of the Division's rules and regulations.

In explanation for this action on my part, I can only state that at the time I believed the arrangements to ship these articles to Saint Paul were perfectly satisfactory; however, I now clearly see your viewpoint. I exceedingly regret having taken the action I did and I feel that no one else is to blame. I realize the responsibility for doing the right thing was mine and I followed the wrong course, but I am compelled to state that this was done after serious consideration on my part as to the proper procedure to take. I erred in not seeking your advice.

The articles taken from the Barker house at Ocala, with which I am familiar, were:

\$14,312, shipped to Saint Paul on January 28,

Jewelry (value estimated by me \$1,500) shipped to Saint Paul on January 28, 1935, RECORDED & INDEXED

Five pieces of luggage, shipped to Chicago on January 22, 1935, containing miscellaneous articles of wearing apparel to be traced,

Three pieces of luggage taken to Chicago by Special Agents J. C. White and C. B. Winstead on January 25, 1935, 2

Bass

Miscellaneous firearms shipped to the Division on January 22, 1935, in wooden boxes, contents listed and furnished the Division on date of shipment,

One Philco radio, stored in the Jacksonville Office,

Miscellaneous men's and women's wearing apparel, boots and shoes, stored in two wooden boxes in the Jacksonville Office, lists of contents furnished the Division on January 23, 1935,

One lot of miscellaneous shotgum shells, presently stored in the Jacksonville Office, approximately 250 rounds, and

One Suick coupe, motor number 2884746, in good condition, presently stored, at my order, in a garage at Savannah, Georgia. This car was purchased at Saint Charles, Illinois, on March 10, 1934, by a man using the name of T. C. Blackburn, the name Fred Barker was using in Florida before he was killed on January 16, 1935. The same day that he was killed, this car found in the garage near the house he and his mother occupied, and was driven to Jacksonville, Florida, by Agent J. C. White.

Mr. Tamm of the Division, by telephone, has advised that the luggage which was shipped to the Chicago Office by express and that carried to that office by Agents White and Winstead, would be returned to the Jacksonville Office, after which the luggage with the wearing apparel, boots and shoes stored in two wooden boxes in the Jacksonville Office, should be shipped to County Judge L. E. the Jacksonville Office, should be shipped to Gounty Judge L. E. Butch at Ocala, Florida, to be administered under the probate laws of the State of Florida. I have advised Mr. Jutch by letter today that the above articles would be shipped to him in the very near future.

During the afternoon of February 12, 1935, Detective Al Earmon of the Kinneapolis Folice Department called Special agent R. C. Coulter of this office and advised him that he had some information which he desired to supply the Division. Through arrangements made, Agent Coulter met Detective Marxon at 6th Avenue South and 18th Street, a considerable distance from the Police Department; and he stated that late yesterday afternoon he was talking with an individual and the name of Harry Sawyer come up, and the individual informed him that he had talked with emother party who had seen Sewyer in Fortland shortly after last Christmas, and this individual informed Detective Karxon that Sawyer was playing between Fortland and Seattle and "working a little". Detective Karmon stated that he did not know what his informant meant by "working a little" unless Sawyer was plying his old trade of disposing of stolen property.

Detective Marzon declined to mame the individual who furnished him the information and explained that this information was not furnished to him with the thought in mind that it would be used to apprehend Sawyer; and that if the individual who furnished him the information had any idea that it would be used in such a menner, the information would not have come to him; and that this individual under no circumstances would furnish information to him er anyone else with a view to apprehending criminals; and for that . reason, he did not desire to disclose the identity of his informant. While the reports in captioned case do not indicate
Savyer's presence on the Mest Coast, information came to this effice
on February 11, 1935, that approximately \$3,000.00 worth of bonds
etolen from the Kraft State Bank, Meanmonie, Wiseonsin, which was
robbed in July, 1932, I believe, had been disposed of in British
Columbia. There were approximately \$100,000.00 worth of
negotiable bonds of various amounts and issues stolen during the
above mentioned robbery. It is known definitely that one Frank
Rebber and Charles Harmon participated in this robbery as one of
them was killed during the robbery and the other one's body was
discovered a short distance from Kenomonie abortly thereafter.
It will be recalled, of course, that Charles Termon was the husband
of Paula Harmon, who was an associate of Fred Barker, with aliases.

In connection with the above, Detective Marxon advised me that it is his understanding that the mob responsible for the robbery of the Kraft State Bank was in Sawyer's place in St. Paul on the morning prior to the robbery; and that there is a possibility that sawyer is on the hest Coast disposing of the above referred to bonds.

He further edvised that the individual who supplied him with this information stated to him that Sawyer has either a sister or a sister-in-law residing in Portland. However, he could not be definite in that connection; and as far as agent Coulter recalls, there is nothing in the files reflecting the presence of any of Sawyer's relatives either in Portland or in Seattle.

The foregoing information is supplied you in order that appropriate investigation may be made in Portland and Seattle for the purpose of Setermining whether Sawyer has been in either of those localities recently. With reference to the bonds in question, a report will be submitted in the case UMKNOWN SUBJECTS, Interstate Transportation of Stolen Property, in the very near future and copies of said report will be submitted to your office with the request that investigation be conducted.

Department of Justice, I have been marmed of my specializational rights and know that what I pay may be used against me at any time; moreover, no threats or promises have been made to me in order to obtain this attended.

My maiden name is Man Stanley, and my place of birth is Merica, Remones; the date being May M. 1898.

I have known Volney Deris since I was to may three (%) years of age;
having most him in Expulpe, Oklehoms, where I was working at that time
as a weitrous and eachier at the Imperial Cute, We worken sweethearts
and in February of 1925, he was conteneed to the Oklehoms State Penitentiary at Mc Alester, Oklahoms, for life for the murder of a mightwatchman in Tules, Oklahoms. I believe that Arthur "Dee" Barker received a life sentence on the same charge.



Mr. Harvey wanted to know the Division's attitude in this matter.

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


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

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILE Re: Bremer Case

Mr. Connelley celled from Chicago to advise that Agent Trainor had just frantically contacted him by telephone from Yorkville, Illinois and advised that their plane had made a forced landing subsequent to which Volney Davis escaped from the custody of Agents Trainor and Stakem. I asked Mr. Connelley for additional details and he stated that he did not have any additional information, since Trainor had excitedly left the telephone after furnishing this information. I instructed Mr. Connelley to dispetch a sufficient number of Agents to Yorkville to enable them to patrol all of the highways and side roads in the hope of effecting Davis' apprehension.

I called Mr. Nathan to ascertain whether he had been advised of these facts and learned that he had not been informed of Davis'escape.

Subsequently, Connelley called from Chicago and advised that he had ascertained that the plane had made a forced landing in a corn field, near Yorkville, Illinois and that Agents Trainor and Stakem had proceeded in a passing car into the town of Yorkville; that in reaching Yorkville, they decided it would be too conspicuous if leg irons and handcuffs were left on Davis, and accordingly, they removed all of the irons. They entered a small hotel, and while Trainor was in a telephone booth, calling the Chicago Division Office, Davis assaulted Stakem, dove through a window and escaped.

I instructed Connelley to personally proceed to Yorkville, immediately and properly organize a search looking to Davis' apprehension.




The Attorney General telephoned and inquired whether or not there is any truth to the reports that two of our men with a prisoner were forced down in an airplane near Chicago last night, at which time the prisoner escaped. I told him that I heard of an incident somewhat similar to this, but the men in question have been reporting direct to the Director in New York City.

The Attorney General then stated that he was not going to give out any statement, but for his own personal knowledge, he wanted to know whether or not the above is true. I then informed him that two of our men were trensporting a prisoner to Chicago in an airplane; that the plane was forced down; that there ensued a skirmish of some kind. the details of which were furnished by our Chicago Office to you in New York City. He asked if the man got away, and I told him that he did. He then asked who the man was, and I told him I did not know. I was then asked if he were a man of importance, and I again answered that I did not know.

Miss Candy .. Subject to your approval, I am instructing Agents McKee and Brown to return to Miami when Nathaniel Heller leaves Cuba and after appropriate arrangements have been made for Heller's custody, to spend a day interviewing Cash McDonald in Miemi. Although McDonald was interrogated for a period of approximately 48 hours by J. H. Henson and other Agents, they were unsuccessful in obtaining any tangible admissions from him. Brown and McKee have, while in Havana, visited various banks where McDonald exchanged Bremer ransom money, and accordingly they are in possession of additional facts which may be instrumental

in "breaking" McDonald. After Brown and McKee have completed their questioning of McDonald I believe they should proceed to the Jacksonville Office and dictate a complete report upon the result of their investigation, in order that this information will be readily available to the United States Attorney in Florida. I recommend then that Brown and McKee come into Washington in order that I may discuss with them the substentive evidence Eveileble in Havana to substentiete the kidnaping charges against Kerpis, Campbell and Willie Harrison, and to ascertain what if any edditional investigation in Havana is necessary or desirable. I feel that if additional investigation is necessary Agent McKee should return there, since Brown should return to Chicego and to St. Paul for the purpose of participating in substentive investigation to substantiate the kidneping charges. It appears that Agent Brown is the only Agent to whom Byron Bolton will talk freely.



> At 12:20 P.M., I telephoned Mr. Tolson and informed him that I hed received numerous inquiries concerning the escape of Volney Davis from the Agents of this Division at Yorkville, Illinois, all of which inquiries had been answered with the statement that the situation was being handled by the Director personally in New York City. However, the Attorney General telephoned me and demanded to know whether or not the story as he had heard it concerning the escape of the above was true, stating that he had been informed that a men whose identity is unknown had escaped by slugging one of our Agents at Yorkville, Illinois, after the Agents and the prisoner had been forced down in an airplane. I told the General that such an incident hed occurred but the men had been reporting directly to Mr. Hoover in New York City and I was not advised as to the details of the escape, the identity of the man or as to his importance. I informed Mr. Tolson that the Attorney General seemed to be rather displeased as to my answers to his questions.

Mr. Tolson then conferred with Mr. Hoover about the matter, and then Mr. Hoover took the telephone and informed me to immediately submit a brief memorandum to the Attorney General giving the facts concerning the escape, the importance and the identity of Volney Davis.

Please be advised that Romeo Padgett is being held by the Secret Service Division of the United States Treasury Department in this city charged with possession of counterfeit money. Some time in December 1932 Padgett was sentenced in the State Court at Asheville, North Carolina, to serve two years for the transportation of intoxicating liquor. He escaped in February transportation of intoxicating liquor. He is to be released to Asheville, North Carolina, to complete his unexpired term.

While in custody here Padgett stated that he had some information relative to the location of Alvin Karpis.

Padgett was interviewed by Special Agent W. E. Peters of this office, at which time he stated that following his escape he had been living at various addresses in Cincinnati, Ohio, and Cleveland, Ohio. He advised that he lived on East 56th Street in Cleveland just north of Euclid Avenue, and also from time to time Cleveland just north of Euclid Avenue, and East 20th Street, Padgett lived in that city on East 19th Street and East 20th Street, Padgett being unable to recall definitely the exact street address. He stated that he had left Cleveland on September 2, 1934, and had gone to Cincinnati, where he read in the daily papers of the attempted apprehension of Alvin Karpis and others at Cleveland.

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Upon his return to Cleveland in the early part of October 1934 he made frequent visits to the Prospect Whist Club, the address of which he believes to be 1015 Prospect Avenus. He states that this Club is a "bookie joint", operated by one A"Big Nike", whose last name is unknown to Padgett. Padgett further advised that "Big Mike" also operates a "bookie joint" on the opposite side of the street from the Prospect Whist Club, and that when one of these places is raided operations are immediately resumed on the opposite side of the street. Padgett stated that while in conversation with "Big Mike" and other members of the Cleveland underworld he was informed that Alvin Karpis was in Cleveland the latter part of November or the early part of December 1934. He stated that he had no information whatsoever as to any definite location at which Karpis might have been stopping at that time, and was only able to advise that Karpis is alleged to have made the statement that he was afraid to return to Chicago because of the "Government heat" in that city.

Padgett left Cleveland approximately December 10, 1934, and has no information relative to the location of Karpis or any other members of the gang since that time.



I telephoned Mr. Mathan at Kansas City and inquired if he had the statements from Trainor and Stakem relative to the escape of Davis. Mr. Mathan stated that he has these statements.

I told him that the papers here are carrying a story to the effect that the escape of Davis was effected at a time when Agent Stakem and Davis were having a glass of beer. Mr. Nathan stated that according to the statement of Stakem, when they first enetered the building there, Trainor went into the telephone booth; thereafter, Davis asked if he might have a drink, preferably a glass of beer. Stakem ordered two glasses of beer while Trainor was still in the telephone booth. Trainor then came out of the booth, after which they moved closer to the lobby of the hotel. I told him that it is the understanding here at the Division that Trainor went into the telephone booth, after which Davis asked if he might have a glass of beer. Stakem then stepped up to the bar and purchased two glasses of beer, one for himself and one for Davis, after which they started drinking the beer. Mr. Nathan then stated that Trainor came out of the telephone booth at this point and got some change for use in his telephone call. Staken and Davis then moved out from the bar end toward the telephone booth, this being after the beer had been consumed. Trainor then reentered the telephone booth to make his call. There was no more beer consumed by Stakem or Davis.

I then told him that it was the desire of the Director to know why the leg irons and handcuffs were taken off Davis, and why Davis was not left in the car in which they rode to the city. Mr. Nethan stated that it is his recollection that the statements of these men account that the farmer with whom they rode was in somewhat of a hurry, and they could not or did not want to make him stay. I stated that they should have asked this farmer to remain, and possibly have given him a five dollar bill for his trouble.

I then inquired why Davis was taken into the hotel, when one of the men could have remained outside with him and kept him handcuffed. Mr. Mathem stated that he did not question the men on this point, but supposes that they were merely exercising their best judgment under the circumstences, PROORDED 7-576-4585

I inquired as to the attitude of these two agents. Wir I hathan stated that the men have indicated that if they had it to do over again, they would do it differently; that they both feel that they are in line is reprimand and are ready to take it. Of course, they feel badly about the escape of this man.

I then inquired if Davis had any money on him at the time of this trip. Mr. Nathan stated that Davis was thoroughly searched at the time of his arrest, and all the money, his gun, and all other personal possessions taken from him. The money taken from the possession of Davis was in the custody of Stakem for the purpose of taking it to Mr. Connelley at Chicago. Mr. Nathan stated that as far as he knows, Davis had on his person a couple of sticks of chewing gum and a match. I told Mr. Nathan that when questioning these Agents, he might discreetly approach the subject of any possible attempt of Davis to bribe the Agents in any way. Mr. Mathan in this regard stated that one of the men last night mentioned that he was glad that there had been no intimation against their character. He stated, however, that he would bring up the subject in the course of a conversation and get their reaction. I told him that it was desired that a positive statement be gotten from the Agents to the effect that no offer or overture was made to them by Davis. It was suggested that the men not be called into the office specifically for the purpose of asking them the above question. However, Mr. Nathan stated that the men still have a couple of portable typewriters in their possession, and he could call them asking that they bring the typewriters to the office, at which time they could be approached on the above. It was suggested that Davis could have made some offer or overture to Stakem while Trainor was in the telephone booth at the hotel.

I inquired why this man was taken into a saloon in the first place.

Mr. Nather stated that it has been explained that upon their arrival in the town,
the telephone office had closed; that the man with whom they rode to town suggested that they might make a call from the booth in this hotel; that upon their
going into the place, it turned out to be a combination lobby, hotel and barroom.

Mr. Nather stated that the reason Stikem did not make the call is that Stakem

Re: Bremer Case

I telephoned Mr. Connelley at Chicago at 12:30 P.M., and stated that it was desired that he check to ascertain what kind of an investigation had been made into the escape of Volney Davis from Agents Trainor and Stakes on the night of February 6, 1935. I inquired if the imm-keeper had been questioned, and told him that particularly close attention should be given to this questioning in order to make sure that no money changed hands in regard to the above matter.

Mr. Connelley then mentioned the story being carried in the papers to the effect that the Agents were supposed to have purchased the prisoner a glass of beer. He stated that according to the Agents, nothing like that occurred; that they were just standing there at the counter when the fellow hit Agent Stakem. I then informed him that Agent Stakem admitted that he bought Davis a glass of beer, and also had a glass of beer with him. Mr. Connelley stated that Agent Stakem certainly didn't tell him that.

I inquired of the attitude of these Agents, and Mr. Connelley informed that they are both very low and apprehensive concerning their fate, fearing that they might be suspended; that they both admit that they had made mistakes in the handling of the prisoner.

Mr. Connelley assured me that he would contact everyone who might be able to furnish any information concerning the matter, and would send his report by telegram as soon as possible.



As of possible interest to the Division in connection with the investigation and handling of this case in the Jacksonville District, I wish to advise that on February 11, 1935, Special Agents/R. B. Donaldson and J. P. Lacour called upon County Judge L. E. Futch at Ocala, Florida, in connection with the surrendering to him certain moneys and other property found in the premises occupied by the late Fred Barker and his mother, Kate Barker, at Oklawaha, Florida. While interviewing the Judge in connection with this matter, he volunteered the information that inquiry had been made of him by a local attorney regarding the money left by these persons and indicated that this local aftorney was prompted to make this inquiry by reason of a request from attorneys at Saint Paul, Minnesota, who represent the Bremers in that city. Judge Futch was not in possession of any particular details as to anticipated efforts that may be made by the Bremers to acquire the available money and stated that he merely informed the inquiring attorneys that he did not possess any of the money and, therefore, could give the matter no consideration.

This is submitted for such use as the Division may care to make of it, and if I receive any additional information bearing on this angle; I will promptly so advise the Division.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Volney Pavis was apprehended in Kansas City on February 6, 1935 Pursuant to your instructions, I talked with Mr. Connelley in Chicago, concerning the desirability of removing Davis to Chicago or St. Paul and he stated that he believed it desirable to remove Davis to Chicago, where he could be held for questioning. I accordingly instructed Mr. Nathan to make appropriate arrangements to remove Davis to Chicago and since we desired absolutely no publicity or leak in this situation, suggested that he charter a plane and have Davis transported by this means to Chicago. Mr. Nathan subsequently called me and advised that efforts had been made to obtain a plane but that the only plane available was a four-seated machine, which would accommodate three passengers. I stated that I did not know whether this would be a sufficient number of guards and inquired about weather conditions. Mr. Nathan stated that the airport officials had checked weether conditions and advised that there would be no difficulty in making the flight. I advised Mr. Nathan that I believed if Devis was properly handcuffed and shackled two guards would be sufficient, and accordingly, arrangements were made to transport Davis by plane to Chicago. I was advised by Mr. Nathan that the departure was made about 3:20 P.M. and that it was estimated three hours would be consumed in making the flight. Mr. Nathan advised after plane that a safe take-off had been made and that Davis was properly shackled and handcuffed. Mr. Connelley was advised of the approximate arrival of Davis, in order that Agents could be stationed at the airport to meet the plane.

At 8:20 P.M. Mr. Connelley called me from Chicago to advise that Agent Trainor had just called the Chicago Office and stated that the plane had made a forced landing at Yorkville, Illinois and that Volney Davis had escaped from the Agents. Connelley was instructed to immediately dispatch a sufficient number of Agents to the vicinity of Yorkville to patrol all highways and make every effort to locate Davis and subsequently I instructed Mr. Connelley to personally proceed to Yorkville and take charge of the search. Mr. Connelley transmitted a teletype to the Division on the morning of February 7, 1935, in which he advised that at 6:30 P.M. the pilot of the plene transporting Agents Trainor and Stakem and Volney Devis, to Chicago, had become lost and had landed at 6:45 in a corn field, one mile south of Yorkville, Illinois. There was no telephone in the vicinity and Agent Treinorhalled a pessing motorist and sterted for the town of Yorkville, leaving Stakem with the shackled prisoner in the corn field. He decided, however, that this procedure was improper and returned to the corn field and obtained the prisoner and Agent Stakem, returning to Yorkville in the car. Trainor explains this action by stating that automobiles had been attracted to the scene because of the landing of the plane and he feared possible publicity if he left the prisoner in the plane. To prevent curiosity and publicity, Agent Trainor and

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Stakem removed the leg irons, in order to permit the prisoner to walk, but left the handcuffs on him. Upon arrival in Yorkville, it was ascertained that the telephone office was closed but the man who had driven the car bringing the Agents and Davis into town advised them that they could make a telephone call from a booth in the hotel and accordingly Agents Trainor and Stakem entered the Vailing Hotel. Prior to entering the hotel, the Agents removed the handcuffs to avoid possible publicity or curiosity in the hotel. The farmer driving the car which carried the Agents into Yorkville was reluctant to remain or to permit the Agents to use the car and accordingly it was necessary for them to take Davis into the hotel. The room which the Agents entered is a combination lobby, restaurant and barroom.

Agent Trainor entered the telephone booth and Volney Devis then asked Agent Stakem if he might have a drink, preferably a glass of beer. Stakem ordered two glasses of beer while Trainor was still in the telephone booth. Trainor came out of the booth to get some change for use in his telephone call and Stakem and Devis finished the beer which they were drinking and moved away from the bar towards the telephone booth.

While Agent Trainor was still in the telephone booth, Davis struck Stakem in the face, knocking him down, and leaped head-first through a window and ran towards the rear of the building. There were two windows in the store and one of the windows was immediately over the entrance to the basement of the building. Davis had evidently planned this move, since he chose the window away from the entrance to the basement and in leaping, landed upon a cement sidewalk. Stakem entrance to the basement and in leaping, landed upon a cement sidewalk. Stakem rose to his feet, drew his gun and ran to the window, firing twice at Davis. Agent Trainor heard the commotion and ran outside in an effort to follow the prisoner but was unsuccessful.

The Agents secured the assistance of local persons, including the Sheriff in conducting the search. During the search they passed a parked Ford car. Davis ran about five blocks to the right and three blocks to the left, at which point he stole a Ford V-8 sedan, silver in color, bearing Illinois tags 104140. This car was parked in the driveway with the keys in the car. This is the car which the Agents passed while pursuing Davis. It was impossible to ascertain the direction the Agents passed while pursuing this car but the car was subsequently found in which Davis fled after stealing this car but the car was subsequently found in the Chicago, Illinois.

Agents Trainor and Stakem state that the reason they removed the handcuffs and leg irons from Davis was to avoid curiosity and publicity.

Matt Gleason of 104 4th Street, Aurora, who is a small-time bookmaker and gambler and operator of a house of prostitution, approached G. A. Bernhart, another bookmaker, on February 7 and offered to sell him a white gold half caret ring for \$60, claiming to Barnhart that this ring was the property of the prisoner who had escaped from the Federal officers upon the previous night. Barnhart advised who had escaped from the Federal officers upon the previous night. Barnhart advised the Chicago Division Office of the approach by Gleason and upon my authorisation,

the Chicago Division Office paid Earnhart \$60, which he used in purchasing this ring from Gleason. The ring had been identified as the ring which Volney Davis was wearing at the time of his escape. In this regard, it may be noted that at the time of his arrest in Kansas City, Volney Davis had in his possession approximately \$1100 and a 380 caliber automatic pistol which items had been taken away from him. Davis had no money at the time of his escape.

Barnhart purchased the ring from Glesson for \$60 and Division Agents shadowed Glesson who returned to his home at the above named address. He was subsequently taken into custody and it was learned that Volney Davis had visited his place on the night of February 6, lesving sometime on February 7th. Glesson is presently in the Chicago Division Office where he is being interviewed for details concerning Volney Davis' escape.

When the Ford V-8 sedan was recovered at West Chicago, Illinois, it was ascertained that there was some blood in the front, indicating that the hands or legs of the person driving the car had been injured.

In explaining why he acquiesced to Davis' request for a glass of beer, Stakem states that he did this to prevent observers from being suspicious of the prisoner.

The pilot of theplane was Joe Jacobson, who Mr. Nathan states was highly recommended to him by the Inspector of the Aeronautics Branch of the Commerce Department.

With reference to Division letter of January 31, 1935, referring to the five packages shipped from the Jacksonville office to the Chicago office under Government bill of lading #J-69685, the articles contained in this shipment were in addition to those listed as stored in the Jacksonville office and included various articles which presented possibilities as to latent fingerprints, it being noted that there were numerous mirrors in this luggage and also in the pocketbooks concerned, all of which had been processed for fingerprints in the Jacksonville office by Special Agents McDade and Donaghue and such latent prints photographed. However, these prints, due to the fact that the film had been placed in a blue Postal Telegraph envelope, were lost, inasmuch as the light filtered through and destroyed the films before they could be reproduced. After the arrival of these articles at Chicago, they were again processed for fingerprints and such prints as could be lifted were forwarded to the Division for necessary comparison, and inasmuch as no further prints can be obtained from the articles in question, there was returned to the Jacksonville office on February 11th four grips or suitcases containing articles as listed on the attached copy of a memorandum prepared by Special Agent Chaffetz. These were forwarded under Government bill of lading #J-64643, the original copy of which is being enclosed to the Jacksonville office with a copy of this letter.

With reference to the articles enumerated on page three as being retained at the Chicago office, the articles from which latent prints were lifted are of no practicable value and are being retained in connection with any possible identification which might be made from the lifted prints. The balance of these articles listed on page three, namely the black silver-trimmed suitcase, which is in fact a tin suitcase containing four bullet proof vests, together with



Henry Mayman, Room 12, at the above address, is the Janitor for the building and has charge of renting the rooms therein. He is an old fellow and apparently of German extraction and seemed very anxious to furnish all information requested by Agent. He stated he frequently has aided the Police when called upon to do so and that on the first floor there lives one Scott Johnson, who has been there for about three years, together with Boy Hancie, who has a broken leg and is a lumatic. On the third floor live Elbert and Elvin Mancie and the Waldons and also a newspaper peddler named Fendellen. The Janitor lives on the fourth floor with tenants by the name of Ernest Simon, Simon's brother and a woman; that Simon is a young fellow on Relief; and that both of these boys are about. twenty years of age and all of them are supported by the Relief. Immediately above the Janitor's room is an Italian Laborer named Biedel, who is about 45 years of age and another individual by the name of Clark, who is about sixty years of age, sharing this room with Biedel. Mayman knew of no three or four individuals living together in the house and did not know anyone by the name of Chester or the description submitted by the self-styled informant, Waldon. Mayman failed to recognize any of the Karpis-Barker gang as being among the roomers or as having called there. He stated that all the people who live in the rooms at that address are poverty ridden and have difficulty buying a meal, let alone an automobile. He stated that no one there owns a car, as reported by Waldon. The building is old, and in a run-down condition, with very disagreeable living quarters. In view of the above, it appears that Waldon is suffering from some hallucination.

It is also noted that when the information was furnished by Irvin Waldon to Special Agent N. B. Klein, Mr. Connelley was contacted by telephone and advised that he did not know Irvin Waldon.

In view of the above no further action is being taken as to this.







He advised that should agents proseed to Florida with a view to apprehending Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell, whom he believes are presently there, and should they escape in some manner, he firmly believes that they will either proceed to Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland or New York City; that in the event they come to Chicago they will either contact Willie Heeney or Eddie Donovan, both eff whom are contacts of the Barker-Karpis mob. He stated that Willie Heeney resides at 16th Street and Austin Boulevard, Oak Park, Illinois, and that his home is immediately adjacent to the empty lot which is owned by Irene Dorsey, the wife of Fred Goetz, now deceased. He further stated that Willie Heeney has heretofore been . contacted by this mob for places of refuge and ether purposes and that he would not hesitate to harbor them should he be called upon to do so. Concerning Eddie Donovan, above mentioned.

Konty stated that he has heard his name frequently mentioned smong the boys and that he is considered a very good friend of both Fred and "Doc" Barker; that sheald Fred Barker learn that his brother has been taken into custody by the Federal Government he will immediately contact Eddie Donowan for the purpose of procuring an attorney for him. He further stated that Eddie Donovan, to his knowledge, is the owner of the Green Lantern Tavern located at 79th and Dobson Street, Chicago, Illinois.

THE RESERVE OF THE PARTY OF THE Further information obtained from Monty Carter disclosed that Willie Harrison is very friendly with the owner of the "Homestead", which is located in the vicinity of 95th Street and Western Avenue, Chicago, Illinois; that

heretofore willie had on muserous occasions taken members of the mob to the Homestead for something to set and that he firmly believes that the owner of this restaurant is aware of Harrison's location at all times.

Monty stated that should the boys go to Detroit.
Michigan, for refuge they will undsubtedly contact a fellow named Casch. He stated that he knows of no information whatsoever concerning Casch and that he has heard his name mentioned on numerous occasions while in conversation with the boys.

Monty stated that should members of the mob so to New York they will undoubtedly centact Frankie Foster, who is very well known smong the underworld circles in that city. In this connection he advised that at one time he asked "Doc" Barker where Harry Sawyer had disappeared and according to Monty, "Doc" stated that he is now in New York with Frankie Foster. Further, that Sawyer's wife, Gladys, is also with him at the present time.

Monty stated that the contacts for the mob is Cleveland are two men named art and Shimmy. He stated he does not know their last names and he frequently heard those names mentioned among the boys.

The records at the above mentioned company disclose that the above described pistol was sold by Hibbard, Spencer and Bartlett to Thomas Hardware Company, Tulsa, Oklahoma, on July 5, 1928.

Oklahoma City office was advised of this information by letter on January El, 1955, and was requested to make appropriate inquiry at the Thomas Hardware Company to ascertain if possible the identity of the purchaser of this pistol. Photographs of arthur "Doc" Barker and Byren Bolton were at that time forwarded to the Oklahoma City office.

and the second Reference is made to the letter of the St. Penl office to the Chicago office in the above case dated January 18, 1935, with regard to the keys found in the overcoat pocket of Arthur R. Barker in St. Paul. Particular reference is made to the Hurd key, No. FC-858. This key has been found to be the ignition key of 1934 Ford V-8 sedan, motor No. 18-1130845, and same has been placed in an envelope with the other key belonging to said car, both of which will be found in the safe of this office,

Regarding key No. 2, which is a brass key of the Independent Lock Company, 1001 KB stamped Q on the reverse side, Martin Bader, the janitor of the apartment house at 7269 South Shore Drive, in which building Freddie and Kate Barker resided during 1934, advised that this key does not fit any lock in that building. Keys 5 and 4 to which reference is made in the letter from the St. Paul office to the Chicago office dated January 18, 1935, to not fit any of the bags in the possession of the Chicago Division office, and are presumably for the padlocks taken off the metal suit cases which contain the steel vests belonging to the Barkers found in Florida. The investigation with regard to the keys above mentioned, was made by Special Agent F.G.Tillman.

During the course of the search on January 8, 1935 of the apartment previously occupied by Russell Gibson and others, 3912 Pinegrove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, Special, Agent R.C. Suran found in the desk drawer in the living room of this apartment a certificate of title of a motor vehicle #1289927 issued to Andrew Allen, 57 East Harrison Street, Chicago, Illinois, for a 1934 Ford Victoria, engine #1142463, together with an invoice of

the Wrba Motor Company, 5100 West 25th Street, Diegra, Illinois, and a receipt from Edward J. Hughes, Hecretary of State, dated Movember 26, 1934 for license glate \$1289927.

Agent Buran also found inthis desk see receipts made out to J.B.Bolton, one bearing date December 1, 1934, and the other January 1, 1935, each being for the amount of \$8.00 for the rent of a garage. The receipts are signed by C. Lipsicts and were on the receipt slips of Charles Lipsicts, Real Estate, 5936 Pinegrove Avenue, Chicago.

interviewed Mr. Charles Lipsiets at 5936 Pinegrove Avenue, and he stated that on or about December 1, 1934 he rented a garage to J.B.Bolton, which garage was located in the group of garages at the rear of 5936 Pinegrove Avenue. The photographs of various individuals in this case were exhibited to Mr. Lipsiets and he stated the one of willie Harrison was a likeness to the person renting this garage. Mr. Lipsietz said this individual did not pay the rent January 1, 1955, but the same was paid by a blond headed wiman. Mr. Lipsietz pointed out the garage to agent, and through observation by the rear window agent determined that the garage contained a Ford Victoria bearing 1934 Illimois license plate \$1289927.

On the night of January 8, 1934, A.P.Barber found a key, which appeared to be the garage key, near the bottom of the stairway where Russell Gibson was wounded. Special Agent S.K.McKee found at this place a set of keys which apparently belonged to the Ford ear. After the discovery of the Ford Victoria located in the above described garage, it was determined that the key found by Agent Barber was a key to the garage in which the Ford Victoria was located, and the key found by Agent McKee ware the keys to the ignition of said ear. This car was stored by Agents McKee and Suran at the Clark-Van Buren Garage en January 10, 1935.

On the night of Jamuary 8, 1955, Agents McKee and Suran proceeded to the Paddington Garage located at 702 West Irving Park, Chicago, as previous observation by Agents Suran and Madala had revealed Ford sedan \$1266231 was apparently stored in the near vicinity of 3912 Pine Grove Avenue, it was determined by observation of the cars in the Paddington Garage that the car in question was stored therein. The attendant in charge stated that the car had been stored that evening by a tall slim man accompanied by a black haired woman. He advised that the car had been stored on previous days, but always by a woman and January 8, 1935 was the first time the tall slim man had brought the ear into the garage.

In the dash compartment of this ear agents Mokes and Suran found a leather case containing State of Illinois certificate of title of a motor vahicle, bearing \$1266231, issued to J.B. Bolton, Harrison Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, for a 1954 Ford sedan, engine \$1130843, and invoice of the Vrba Motor Company, 5100 West 25th Street, issued to J.B. Bolton, Harrison Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, which invoice was for a Ford Beluxe Fordor sedan-black, motor \$1130843, indicating that \$717.00 was received for the above car on September 27, 1934. The invoice was signed by H. Johnson.

Also found in this leather case was a repair bill from the Litsinger Motor Company, 913 West Jackson Blvd., Chicago, Illinois, made out to J.B.Bolton, Harrison Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, dated August 5, 1934. The car on which the repairs were made bore license fl-266-231, and motor fl130845, speedometer mileage 1385. It will be noted that the date of this repair bill is prior to the date of the purchase invoice for the same car. An additional invoice for repairs was found in this leather case from the Shanesy Motor Company, Inc., 2821 Sheffield Avenue; dated Hovember 19, 1954.

A vehicle license from the City of Chicago issued to J.B.Bolton, 57 East Harrison Street and a photographic copy of a certificate of ownership issued to J.B.Bolton, Harrison Hotel, for the previously described Ford sedan was also found in the leather case. This car was stored in the Clark-Van Buren Garage on January 9, 1935 by Special Agents McKee and Suran.

A photograph of "Slim" Gray was also identified by Patricia Lonquest as a likeness of the individual known to her as "Slim".

At the time they called at the Lonquest residence at 2242 Lincoln Park West, Chicago, meither Mildred, "Slim" nor "Henry" entered the house. Patricia Lonquest accompanied them to the Algiers Club that night where they had dinner them to the Algiers Club that night where they had dinner and a few drinks, after which she was taken home about 11:00, and a few drinks, after which she was taken home about 11:00, on that same evening, Barbara Lonquest met Mildred for the first time according to Patricia.

Gray and "Doc" Barker, whom she claims were known to her as "Slim" and "Henry", together with Mildred, called the her at 2242 Lincoln Park West, after which they drove her downtown. According to Patricia, that was the last time

A short while before Thanksgiving, 1936,
Mildred visited the Lonquest home. At that time Mildred was
in a car with an individual whom she introduced as
"Elmer", and also with "Henry" (Doc Barker). Patricia
described "Elmer" as follows:

Height: 5'V"
Glasses: Wears horn-rissed
Beir: "Dish-water" blonde

(It is believed that this individual is identical with Willie Harrison but Patricia Lonquest was unable to identify the photograph of Harrison).

On this occasion "Elmer" and "Dog" Barker took

again called for Patricia and Mildred in front of the Morrison Hotel, Chicago. "Elmer" drove a car and took her, Patricia, to 641 Oakdale Avenue, Chicago.

Mildred called at 641 Oakdale, Chicago, the Saturday prior to Christmas, 1936. She came in a car and Patricia denied knowledge as to the identity of the individual who ecompanied her to the Lonquest home on that occasion. Mildred stayed only a few minutes and left. Patricia stated that she saw Mildred the next Wednesday following Christmas, 1934. On this occasion she was by herself and proceeded to the Lonquest residence in a taxion she also left the place by herself. The next occasion on which she saw Mildred was on January 1, 1935, at which time which she saw Mildred was on January 1, 1935, at which time wildred was alone. Patricia insisted that the last time she saw "Henry" (Doc Barker) was on the occasion previously referred to before Thanksgiving, and further insisted that she had not seen "Elmer" during the past month.

On the Sunday prior to the date of this interview with Patricia Lonquest, she stated that Mildred came to the Lonquest "call flat" at 459 Arlington, Chicago. Patricia denied knowledge that "Henry" was identical with "Doc" Barker She claimed that she had no knowledge concerning his true identity and that Mildred had only referred to him as a married man who was keeping her.

With reference to Johnnie Borcia, Patricia
Lonquest stated that she has known him for the past 7 years.
She stated that Borcia formerly had a tavern just north
of Diversey near the corner of Diversey and Clark Street,
Chicago, She first began keeping company with him about
September, 1934. At that time he was living at his home
located in a two-flat building on the southwest corner of
Hamlin and Augusta, Chicago. It was claimed by Patricia
that Johnnie Borcia met Mildred Kuhlman through her about
October, 1934, and that within her knowledge Johnnie Borcia
has never met "Slim", "Henry" (Doc Barker) or "Elmer".

Special agent V.W.Peterson submitted the following memorandum with regard to his interview with Tillie C. Lonquest:

"January 18, 1955

Tillie C. Lonquest, 641 Oakdale Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, was interviewed by the writer at the Chicago Division office on the morning of January 9, 1935, at which time she stated that she was 55 years of age, having been born September 21, 1879; that she is the widow of Albert P. Lonquest, who was formerly a railroad conductor on the E. B. & Q. R.R.; that he worked out of St. Joseph, Missouri; that Albert P. Lonquest has been deceased for a period of 5 years. Tillie C. Lonquest stated that she has resided at 641 Oakdale Avenue, Chicago, for the past two years, prior to which she lived at 4800 Borth Ashland Avenue, for one year and before that lived in

LaGrange, Illinois, with her daughter Patricle, who was then married to Jesse Reberts for a period of two years. Tillie Lonquest stated that she has four daughters, Barbara, Patricia, Grace and Frances. She advised that she base a 160 acre farm located about five miles south of Eldorsde Springs, Missouri; that one Harry E. Smith rents the farm from her at the present time.

concerning any of the subjects of this case. She was shown photographs of the various individuals connected with this matter, but she was unable to identify same. She states that Barbara Lonquest and herself went to Kansas on the Sunday before Christmas and returned only a few days ago. She was unable to provide any further information in this matter, and also denied that she knew Mildred Kuhlman.

Special Agent V.W.Peterson submitted the following memorandum with regard to his interview with Grace Lenguests:

license number on this automobile and frankly? admitted that he lacked the intestinal fortitude to immediately inform the Chicago office of Volney's visit in Aurora and to the Riverside Tavern. Be further admitted that he was in fear for his life; that he was unarmed at the time Volney came into the tavern and from the way Volney kept his hands in his pockets he was positive that Volney was armed. further stated that he was afraid to call the chicago office from Aurora, fearing Volney would discover that he was calling and would do him bodily said that he proceeded to Montgomery, Illinois, town on the outskirts of Aurora, and called the Chicago office, informing authorities there about Volney's presence in Aurora, this call being made further stated that about 12:30 at night. he has not seen Volney Davis nor any of the other aforementioned subjects since that time and assured ... the writer that in the event Volney does reappear in Aurora, he will immediately notify the Aurora Police and the Chicago office; that in any event he will make a serious effort to have Volney Davis apprehended. further stated that during the time Volney Davis and Bill Weaver resided in Aurora, which was in the spring of 1934, Volney made frequent visits to Joliet, Illinois, and is of the opinion that Volney may have gone to Joliet to contact one Francia Curry, who operates a bar in that city known as the Elks Ber. and that Volney also might have gone to Joliet to contact one John Tezak, who also operates a tavern en Chicago Street right off Cass Street, that city, and suggested to the writer and Agent McLaughlin that possibly Volney Davis may be contacting these men in Joliet at the present time.

Dr. S.D. Goodman, Chiropodist in the City of Aurora, who operated on Edna Murray's feet in the spring of 1934, for ingrown toenails, during which operation. Volney Davis fainted, and he was resuscitated by Dr. Goodman, who stated that he has not seen nor heard of

of Volkey nor Edna Murray since the time he performed the operation on Edna's feet. Br.Goodman implicitly assured the writer that in the event he does see or hear anything of Volkey or Edna he will immediately notify the Chicago office, the address and telephone number of which are in his possession.

Miss Emily Myles, living at 729 Penn Avenue, Illinois, who called the writer at his home the night that Volney Davis appeared in Aurora to inform him of Volney's presence in Aurora, and which call was received by Agent Abbaticchio, transmitted to the Chicago effice; stated that she has never seen Volney Davis, but that me the night in question she was at the Riverside Tavern had told her that Volney Davis had been there early in the evening and that he was afraid to fi inform the Chicago office of Volney's presence in Aurora, and that she, knowing the writer and knowing that he was anxious to apprehend Volney, called at approximately 11:45 that evening from her home. Miss Myles further stated that she will immediately notify the writer or the Chicago office in the event she acquires any more information relative to these subjects.

Agents of the Division had come to Aurora the following day in response to the sall he had made to the Chicago office and that he had given them all the information he had concerning subjects which information undoubtedly is now incorporated in a report. The writer was unable to see Miss Anna Olson, Walter Burkell, Frank Burkell, or Hanry Daily, who have cooperated with the Chicago office in the past relative to these subjects because of the fact they could not be located in Aurora this day.

Continued investigation at Aurora and Joliet, Illinois with regard to the location of Volney Davis is contained in the following memorandum submitted by Special Agents A.A. Muzzey and J.T. Eclaughlin:

of lurors, Illinois, which statements were incorporated in a previous memorandum submitted by the writer. Welney Davis, subject of the above entitled case, made frequent visits to Joliet, Illinois, while he was residing in Aurors, Illinois, and according to Francis Curry and one John Tezak were named as possible contacts of Volney Davis' in Joliet.

The writer accompanied by Special Agent J.T.

McLaughlin in Joliet, Illinois, located Frank J. Texak,
his place of business a combination bar and gambling joint
at 405 Chicago Street, and went into the place, made
discreet inquiry as to the identity of John Texak and
discovered John Texak is a brother of Frank J. Texak and
that these two brothers operate this tavern and gambling
joint. Ho one resembling any of the subjects in instant
case was seen by Agents, there being but a very few customers
at the bar at the time of Agents' visit.

J. Walter Lowrey, Postmaster, and inquired of him as to the reputation of Tezak and Curry. Mr. Lowrey stated that both were very shady individuals, very unreliable and undoubtedly have hoodlum connections, particularly Curry. Agents were told Curry operates the Royal Bodago Tayern in the Elks Building directly across the street from the Post Office; that this tayern is also a night club on a small scale and that it would be futile for Agents to make known their presence or identify themselves in this tayern for the reason that no information would be forthcoming from anyone connected with it.

Mr. Lowrey further stated that Curry was the finger man in the kidnaping of one Jim Ward of Chicago Heights, Illinois, during prohibition days; that Curry has been associated with underworld characters as long as he can remember and has provided hideouts and given aid to many hoodlums and gangsters. Mr. Lowrey further stated to the Curry is very friendly with the owner of the Louislate that Curry is very friendly with the owner of the LouisJoliet Hotel and although he did not wish tobe quoted

as saying that the proprietor of the Louis-Joliet Hotel was connected with gangsters, nevertheless because of the close association between himself and Durry it is mr. Lowrey's opinion that the Louis-Jeliet Hotel would be a possible stopping place for many gangsters.

Mr. Lowrey suggested that M.J.Formango, Chief of Police, Joliet, was a very reliable person in whom confidence could be reposed and from whom the Tullest cooperation with the Division could be expected.

Agents telephoned Mr. Fornango and requested that he come to the Postmaster's office in the Post Office Building, and there exhibited photographs of the Karpis-Barker mob to him and Chief Fornango positively identified the photograph of Volney Davis as being a person whom he had met in the bar of the Woodruff Hotel sometime ago, had met in the bar of the Woodruff Hotel sometime ago, the exact date not known to him; that at the time of meeting Volney Davis he does not recall the mame by which Davis was introduced to him, but is positive that the person introduced to him is identical with Volney Davis; that at that time Davis had been doing quite a bit of drinking and that time Davis had been invited to have a drink with Volney Davis, and the meeting with him resulted.

Chief Fornango personally knows Dr. Joseph [Moran and stated that he has not seen Doc Moran in Joliet recently and is of the opinion that Doc Moran would not come to Joliet because of the fact that he is so well known in that eity.

Agents were advised by Chief Formango not to make any open inquiry at the Royal Bodago Club because of the fact that it would be futile to make such inquiry; that nothing of importance relative to gangsters could be procured from enyone associated with this place.

Wr. Lowrey, Postmaster, was requested by igents
to inquire at General Delivery to whether any mail had been
sent care of General Delivery to Volney Davis or Bill Weaver,
under their correct names and also under aliases used by
them, particularly those of J.E. Hanson and William Thornton,

under which names Volney Davis and Weaver were living the Aurora. Mr. Lowrey consulted the man in charge of the General Delivery relative to this request and such consultation was negative in results. Mr. Lowrey promises his fullest cooperation and stated that he would request the Superintendent of Mails to be on the lookent for any limit addressed to these particular subjects under their correct names and aliases and will post these names as the clock in a conspicuous place where all carriers will see them, with instructions to notify him if they should handle any mail addressed to these names.

At the time of the raid on the apartment of Russell Gibson on January 8, 1935, at 3920 Pine Grove Avenue, certain articles were found in his apartment, among which was a slip of paper bearing telephone No. Fairfax 4482, and the name Edna. The following memorandum is submitted by Special Agent S.K. Makes with regard to his investigation of the above mentioned telephone number:

Reference is made to the alip of paper found in the bureau drawer in the bedroom of apartment I north at 5920 Pine Grove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois on January 9, 1955, which home the telephone number, Tairfax 4482 and the name "Edna".

It was ascertained through the telephone company that Fairfax 4482 is listed to Irene Funk, apartment 2 et 2305 East 70th Place, Chicago, Illineis.

Special Agents R.C. Suran and S.K. McKee interviewed Mrs. B. Ries, manager of the court apartment at the above eddress. Mrs. Ries resides in apartment 1 at 2517 East 70th Place and is the manager of the entire block of apartment buildings.

with respect to Irans Funk, Mrs. Ries informed that she moved into spartment 2 at 2305 East 70th Place on October 6, 1954 at which time she signed a one year lease at a monthly rental of \$55.00. The spartment is question is unfurnished and Mrs. Funk has her own furniture. Mrs. Funk was described as being about 35 years of age, of medium height, having dark brown hair and being of ordinary appearance. When she moved into the apartment of ordinary appearance. When she moved into the apartment her young daughter, approximately 14 years of age, who attends high school, was living with her. According to attends high school, was living with her. According to the Ries, the daughter went away shortly before Christmas and Mrs. Ries could not say whether she has returned at the present time. Mrs. Ries said she had no knowledge of Mrs. Funk's associates or visitors saying that her only contact with the woman was at the time the apartment was rented.

Mrs. Ries produced an application for rental of the apartment, which had been filed in by Mrs. Funk at the time she took up her residence in the building. This application indicated she had formerly fesided at 7157 Bennett Avenue, care of Varner; that she is employed as private secretary by Doctor Charles Frezier, 29 East Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois, and that she maintains a bank account at the First Mational Bank. She furnished as references the following persons:

Walter Marsh, Congress Hotel
George Gill, care Baird and Warner

The several strip photographs containing pictures of subjects and their associates in this file were displayed to Mrs. Ries, and she picked out the photograph of Doris O'Commer as being the likeness of Mrs. Irene Funk.

Adolph Pratscher, janitor of the apartment building in which Mrs. Funk resides, was interviewed, and the same photographs were shown to him as those shown to Mrs. Ries, and he, without hesitation, stated that Mrs. Funk and Doris & Conner were identical. He advised that until a short sime before Christmas, 1954, Mrs. Funk had her young daughter living with her. The girl went away shortly before Christmass and according to Pratacher he has not seen her at the apartment at the present time, Pratacher stated that for the past couple of weeks he has seen a man come out of the Funk apartment around V MM on several mornings and has observed that this man had a key to the back door. This man has also been seen at the apartment in the evening and at the time he has been seen to enter and leave the apartment, he has always used the rear entrance, which opens on a court yard. Pratacher could not furnish a description of this individual other than to say that he appeared to be between 35 and 40 years of age, of medium size and with dark hair,

As a matter of fact, it should be stated that the telephone number located in the apartment occupied by Adolph Pratscher and his wife is Hydepark 9558.

On the morning of January 11, 1935, Mrs. Adolph
Pratscher was interviewed and photographs of persons
connected with this case were shown to her. She immediately
picked out the picture of Doris & Conner as being a
likeness of Mrs. Irene Funk. She stated this woman had come
to her apartment on two occasions and she was positive that
the Funk woman and Doris & Conner are one and the same
person. She was questioned concerning the man whom her
husband stated he had seen going in and out of the Funk
apartment. She said she had never seen this individual.

It was learned through Mrs. Pratscher that there are two vacant apartments from which observations might be made on the Funk apartment. One of these is situated on the floor below and immediately adjoining the Funk apartment, while the other is on the same floor but located across the court yard from the Funk apartment.

Varner, who resides at 7157 Bennett Avenue, has been conducted and will be reported by Agent R.C.Suren. Agent Suran has likewise made inquiries through the building management of the building in which Dr. Charles Frazier maintains his office.

Special Agent McKee interviewed Mr. W.J.Clark,
Legal Department, First National Bank of Chicago, and
learned that Mrs. Irene Funk does not maintain either a
savings or checking account in this bank. The search for
an account in her name was made both as to open and elosed
accounts. The First National Bank of Chicago does not
operate any branch banks. A search was likewise made for
credit information under the name of Mrs. Irene Funk
but none could be found.

The following further investigation was conducted and reported in the memorandum submitted by Special Agent R.C.Suran, as follows:

Special Agents S. K. McKee and R. C. Suran ascertained at this address by observing the mail boxes, that KLDA VARNER occupied the third floor apartment in this building. These Agents also interviewed Mr. Quickborn 1811 E. 71st Street, who is the Manitor at that address, as well as being the janitor for 7157 Bennett Avenue, Agents Suran and McKee at once determined through conversation with Quickborn that he is no doubt unreliable. Quickborn stated that Mr. Fatt, 805 North Clerk Street, had charge of the rental of the building at 7157 Bennett Avenue. Mr. Fatt advised Agents McKee and Suren that he did not have an opportunity to see the tenants at 7157 Bennett Avenue that however, Mr. JOHN SEYBOID was his collector, and possibly might have information concerning Elda Varner, Mr. Fatt caused to be made a copy of the lease application executed by Elda Varner, said application being dated Jenuary 22, 1934, and being for a lease on apartment 1, third floor, at 7157 Bennett Ave from March 1, 1934 to April 80, 1935, at a monthly rental of thirty-five dollars. El Ga Varner gave as her prior address 7150 East End Avenue and her landlord as the Prudential Insurance Company. He stated that she was a woman between thirty-five and forty years of age, five feet five or six inches tall, dark brown hair, slender build; that she has two children, the names of whom he does not know, one being a girl fifteen or sixteen years of age, and the other a boy fourteen or fifteen years of age. Mr. Seybold promised to make discreet inquiries and endeavor to ascertain hore of the personal history of Elda Varner.

Special Agents K. R. McIntire and R. C. Suran on January 12,1935 re-interviewed Mrs. B. RIES, manager of the apartments at 2505 E. 70th Place. She stated that the day following the interview with her by Agents Suran and McKee, she was in a neighborhood beauty parlor, at which time Irene Funk was there also. She stated that on this occasion she took particular notice of Trene Funk, and there is no question in her mind that the photograph of Doris O'Connor is a likeness of Irane Funk. Arrangements were made with Miss Ries for Agents to occupy the second floor apartment, left, at 7046 Crandon Ste Chicago, which point of observation would permit a surveillance of the dinette windows of the apartment occupied by Irene Funk. The apartment at 7046 Crandon is an unfurnished apartment. Kiss Ries also advised that the apartment located on the third floor, left, at 2315 E. 70th Place was vacant, and unfurnished. It was noted that this apartment would permit observation of the front windows in the apartment of Irene Funk, as well as the door, to the buil ding.

On January 15,1935, Agent Suran communicated with Mr. Fatt and was advised that Mr. Seybold had been unable to secure any additional information concerning Elda Varner. Agent Suran advised Mr. Fatt that it information to accertain the mames of the children.

with further reference to Doris G'Connor, the following investigation was conducted by Special Agents K.R.McIntire, and J.L.Madala, and the following memorandum is submitted by Special Agent K.R.McIntire:

Reference is made to the memoranda submitted by Special Agents R. C. Suran and S. K. McKee, seen earlier in this report, with regard to Miss Irene Funk, who is believed to be identical with Doris O'Commor.

On January 26, 1935 Special Agents E. R. MoIntire an J. L. Madala interviewed Adolph Bratcher, who is the Jahitor of the building in which Irene Funk resides. At this time Mray Adolph Pratcher was also interviewed. Mrs. Pratcher advised Agent that on January 21, 1934 Irene Funk hired a maid to clean ber apartment and that arrangements were made whereby the maid should leave the apartment key at the home of Adolph Pratcher. Mrs. Pratcher further informed that at about 7 o'clock FM on the night of January 21, 1935, a woman appeared at her apartment and requested the key to the spartment of Irene Funk. Mrs. Pratcher declared that this woman is identical with Edna Murray, who is known to be the sister of Doris O'Connor. With respect to her certainty in this matter, Agents displayed several pictures of women prominently. mentioned in this case, and she immediately chose the picture of mentioned in this case, as trongly, Irene Funk, declaring that that. is the woman who called for the key of Irene Funk.

On January 26, 1935 the Division was advised by teletype of the visit by Edna Eurray to the apartment of Irene Funk,

Mrs. Pratcher also informed that approximately two weeks before this occurrence Irene Funk held a drinking party at her apartment.

In view of these developments it was considered advisable, to immediately arrange for a tap on the telephone of Irene Funk, which is Fairfax 4482, located in her apartment, No. 2303 at East 70th Place. Agent Madala, through Adolph Pratcher, arranged for the telephone tap. Incidentally, it should be stated that Malph

On January 25, 1935 arrangements were made for Special Agents C. E. McRas, J. J. Metcalfs and M. Chaffets to occupy the apartment at 7041 Crandon and to maintain a surveillance of Irans Funk's apartment. At about 5:15 PM on January 21, 1935, immediately after the telephone tap had been installed, Agent McIntire overheard the following telephone conversation:

Shortly after the telephone ten was installed on Irene Funk's telephone, Agents Madala and McIntire observed a man visit Irene Funk. He is described as follows:

Age: About 56 years

Height: Approximately 5 feet

Weight: 190 pounds

On the outside of the apartment building was observed an automobile being used by Irene Funk and her male companion, bearing 1934 Indiana license plates No. 689-930, found on an old Essex sedant on January 29, 1935 the Indianapolis office was telegraphically requested to ascertain the person to whom such license plates were issued.

On the same date the Indianapolis office telegraphically advised that said plates were issued to E. S. Funk, 52 Cerroll Streets

Hammond, Indiana, for an Essex sedan, motor number 1156896.

Agents meintaining the surveillance also observed a 1934 Pontiec coupe, bearing 1934 Indiana license plates number 17-830 The Indianapolis office, on January 28, 1955, was telephonically requested to ascertain the name of the person to whom such plates were issued and the Indianapolis office advised on the same date that said plates were issued to Harry T. Pritchard, care of the Columbia Club, Indianapolis, Indiana on his 1934 Pontias coupa, motor number 1029719.

On January 29, 1935 the Indianapolis office was telegraphically requested to discreetly ascertain the identity of Pritchard and on even date a telegram was received from the Indianapolis office advising that Harry T. Pritchard is a prominent Indiana and New York business man with permanent address at 100 Broadway, New York City. Apparently this car has no connection with Irene Funk.

Agents McRae, Metcalfe and Chaffetz, maintaining the surveillance of Irene Funk, ascertained from Mrs. B. Ries that Irene Funk had told Mrs. Ries that she, Irene, had been visited by one Harry Baker, who is connected with the Continental Can Company, Chicago, Illinois.

From the telephone tap the Agents learned that Harry Baker is living at the Orest Hotel, 5730 Stony Island Avenue, Chicago, Illinoisa

The Agents maintaining the surveillance of Irene Funk have reported to this office that the following talephone balls a have been made from the apartment of Irene Funks

Crest Hotel located at 6730 Stony Island Avenue

This is undoubtedly the man whom agents
McIntire and Madala observed at Irene
Funk's apartment on January 26, 1935. This
conclusion is reached because Agent McIntire
heard Irene Funk call Fairfax 7100 and ask
for Room 622 on the night of January 26, 1935;
at which time she asked the party at Fairfax
7100 if he were coming over soon; that she had
dinner ready for him and that they would see
out for the evening.

Mr. Meyer - Englewood 0270 - which is the telephone number of Clarence E. Miller, 6758 Lafayette Street, Chicago, Illinois. It appears that the party calling from Irene Funk's apartment talked to the daughter of Mr. Meyer, known as One Meyer.

The Agents maintaining the surveillance have also ascertained that Irene Funk plans to join the Funk family at Miller, Indiana when she vacates her spartment at 2303 East 70th Place. Immediate inquiries will be made in Miller, Indiana to ascertain the identity of the Funk family.

On January 26, 1935, the Division was advised information had been obtained by this office that Edna Burg had visited her sister, Doris O'Connor on Monday, January 21, 1935. At this time a request was made upon the Division for authority to rent two apartments for surveillence, and also authority to tap the telephone Fairfax 4482, listed to Irene Funk, 2505 East 70th Place, Chicago. Authority was granted by the Division to rent twospartments for surveillance and to tap said telephone.

On January 19, 1935, Special Agent In Charge R.E. Vetterli, telephoned the Chicago office from the St. Leuis office advising that Special Agent in Charge Alt, had wired him. from Jacksonville, Florida, stating that agents in Florida had F. seized 1934 Buick compe at Ocala, Florida, bearing motor \$0,000 2884746, with 1934 Illinois license plates 750974. This license plate was checked by the St. Zouis office, and was found tobe registered and issued to T.O.Blackburn, 114 Walnut Street, St. Charles, Illinois, under date of March 10, 1934; that Blackburn purchased the car new on March 19, 1934 from Roff O. Judd Sales Company, 114 Walnut Street, St. Charles, Illinois. The bill of sale for the car was notarized by Fred E. Drew, Gook County, Illinois.

Interview was had with Mr. Ross O. Judd Sales, 114 Walnut Street, St. Charles, Illinots, who stated that the above mentioned automobile, described as a 1934 Buick coupe, serial #2725776, motor Mo. 2884746, was sold by his brother, Mr. Elmer M. Judd of 4143 Cottage Grove Avenue on March 10, 1954; that the entire transaction was handled by Elmer M. Jude, although it was handled in the name of the Ross O, Judd Sales, St. Charles, Illinois. He exhibited to agent the original car order showing the sale of the above mentioned car from the Buick Company to his concern. stated that the sale price of the car was something

In commection with the litense plates, which were bought at his address. Mr. Ross 0. India stated that these plates came to his place of business apparently at the direction of his brother and that three men called for the plates at a later date. He stated that he would be unable to make any identification, as the only time he saw them was when they called for the plates. He was shown photographs of all members of the Barker-Karpis gang but could make no identification.

Mr. Judd further stated this records indicated that the transaction was handled for his brother Mr. P.Loper, an employee of Elmer M. Judd, \$145 Gottage Grove Avenue. Mr. Judd stated that the reason this car was sold in his name was because of an arrangement had with his brother, whereby his brother, Elmer M. Judd, would occasionally make sales of new automobiles, and inasmuch as Elmer M. Judd had no license and was not a dealer, all sales of new cars were made in the name of Boss C. Judd Sales, St. Charles, Illinois; that Elmer Judd was engaged in the business of repossessing and handling cars for insurance companies.

Mr. Russell P. Loper, an employee of Elmer H. Judd, 4145 Cottage Grove Avenue, stated that he recalls making a sale of a new 1954 Buick coupe to T.C.Blackburn in March of 1954; that Blackburn came to his place of business inquiring about the purchase of a car; that he showed him a catalog and Blackburn tentatively selected a 1954 Buick coupe; that approximately a week thereafter Blackburn again come to his place of business and placed en order for a 1934 Buick coupe without a rumble seat; that he asked Blackburn where he could phone him when the ear was delivered, to which Blackburn replied that he was moving about a good deal and that he had no place where he could be reached by telephone; that thereafter the car was delivered and Blackburn called and paid for the car in \$100.00 bills. He stated that he took Blackburn next door to Mr. Fred E. Drew, Motary Public, 4141 Cottage Grove Avenue, where Blackburn notarized the application for license. Further, that he suggested to Blackburn that since he had no regular address he give the address of Ross O. Judd Sales, 114 Walnut Street, St. Charles, Illinois in purchasing the license plates.

Mr. Loper stated that he had never had any previous contact with Blackburn; that he was a perfect stranger to him and that he has not seen him since that time. Photographs of all the Barker-Karpis gang were exhibited to Mr. Loper but he was unable to make any identification. He described T.C. Mackburn as follows:

Judd. He further stated that he had no papers reflecting the transaction with T.C.Blackburn as they had been forwarded to Ross D. Judd Sales, St. Charles, Illinois.

Public at 4141 Cottage Grove Avenue, who stated that he
could not recall notarizing an application for the bill of
sale for T.C.Blackburn in March of 1954. He stated that he
has numerous people calling on him to notarize papers and it
is impossible for him to remember each individual. He
further stated that he had no record of the transaction.
