
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

This is with reference to your telegram of March 14, 1935, in the case of ALVIN KARPIS; et al - Bremer Kidnaping, advising that Frankie/Foster, a well known hoodlum, was reported as presently residing at the Fleetwood Hotel, Mismi Beach, Florida, and requesting discrees ... inquiry, etc., in an endeavor to locate Harry Sawyer.

In my letter to your of March 14, confirming receipt of your telegram I advised that Special Agent B. F. Fitzsimons at Minmi, Florida, had determined that Frankie Foster was not registered at the Pleetwood Rotel, etc.

This will confirm my long distance telephone conversation with you on March 16, 1935, in which I informed that Special Agent Fitzsimons had advised the Jacksonville Office that he has now determined that Frankie Foster is registered at the Fleetwood Hotel, Kinmi and Beach, Florida, under the name of Frank Frest. He shocked in on January 3rd, 1935, giving his address as New York City. He is accompanied by a woman supposed to be his wife. She is about twenty-eight years of age. 5 feet four inches in height, weighs 135 pounds, rather stout build, dark hair and medium complexion.

Agent Fitzsimons advised that he has not had an epportunity to observe Frank Foster, alias Frank Frost or his alleged wife, however, the Manager positively identified Frank Frost from the picture of Foster.



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

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Packard Sedan, Motor # 286154, Serial # 803800, Model 1200, appeared at that garage February 2, 1935, requesting that adjustments be made on the starter, and that the grease retainer be renewed, stating that this grease retainer is technically known as the pinion bearing oil seal. Mr. Pickman further stated that the automobile in question was a gunnetal gray Packard Sedan, and that the mileage on this automobile at the time of the repairs was 3368, and that the automobile was sold to Mr. Sawyer on December 21, 1954.

Pickman stated that T. D. Sawyer was a man of approximately sixty years of age, 5°8" in height, weighing about 165 pounds, gray hair with some black showing, and that he bore all the marks of being a gentleman, and appeared in no wise suspicious, and that Mr. Sawyer was staying at the Soreno Hotel. Pickman further advised that the pictures of Subject Harry Sawyer, as exhibited to him, did not bear the slightest resemblance to Mr. T. D. Sawyer.

Inquiries were made at the Soreno Hotel and it was ascertained that no one at that point remembered T. D. Sawyer well enough to offer any information of value. However, the Agent was allowed to observe the registration card of this party, and the same reflected that Mr. T. D. Sawyer and wife, of 96 Jason St., Arlington, Mass., were assigned to Room 732 on February 1, 1935, leaving February 15, 1935; that Mr. Sawyer had an automobile which was stored at the North Side Garage located a block away from the Soreno Hotel.

At the North Side Garage, Andrew J. Price, Storage Clerk, stated that he recalled Sawyer and recalled his automobile, and from his records produced information concerning the said automobile, which reflected, in addition to that previously mentioned, that the said car bore License 1846 Mass. 1935. Mr. Price stated that the pictures of Harry Sawyer, as exhibited to him, in no way resembled Mr. T. D. Sawyer, and the description given by Price tallies in practically every detail with those mentioned by Mr. Pickman of the Henry Wallin Company.

No lead is being sent out to the Boston Office to check the identity of T. D. Sawyer of 96 Jason Street, Arlington, Mass., the same being left to the discretion of the office of origin.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Bremer Case.

Mr. Alt telephoned from the Jacksonville Office informing that he had just talked to Mr. Connelley at Chicago, who suggested that he call me about the matter. Mr. Alt stated that in talking with Dolores Delaney and Wynona Burdette the day before yesterday at the jail, they indicated that they will plead guilty. These women are in Jacksonville, and the United States Attorney at Jacksonville will endeavor to make arrangements to have them plead at Jacksonville rather than return to Miami, because of the Judge down there. Mr. Alt believes, as does Mr. Connelley, that this would be a better procedure.

The question arose as to whether it would be advisable to have them plead guilty before the trial at Miami of the others who are indicted down there. Mr. Alt stated that he as well as Mr. Connelley believes that this procedure would be advisable under the circumstances. I told Mr. Alt that this is a matter which should be taken up with the United States Attorney, since he is the one who has to try the other persons in Miami. Mr. Alt stated that the Assistant United States Attorney in Jacksonville who is handling this matter is very cooperative and suggested that he might abide by the desires of the Bureau in this regard. I told him that the Bureau would have to be guided by the judgment of the Attorney as to whether it would be advisable to accept or not to accept a plea before the other trial; that while the Bureau realizes the advantages and disadvantages of of either procedure, we will place the matter entirely in the hands of the Attorney and abide by his decision. Mr. Alt stated that the Assistant who ishandling this matter is of the opinion that they should plead in Jacksonville, for the reason that he is afraid that the judge in Miami will put the women on probation.

With reference to the investigation performed by the various Agents at Miami, Florida and Havana, Cuba in regard to McDonald, Adams, Randall and the others, Mr. Alt informed that he is now in receipt of a letter from the Assistant United States Attorney at Miami requesting re-interviews with various witnesses at Miami and at Havana, stating that when the Agents go to Havana to

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conduct this additional investigation, he, the Assistant United States Attorney, wanted to go along. Mr. Alt stated that this man is a "publicity hound" and a "rank politician", and since Mr. Alt believes that the investigation conducted by the various Agents was a very thorough one, he does not think this additional investigation is at all necessary. He further stated that the Assistant United States Attorney does not specifically state what additional facts or information he wants.



Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of March 12,1935, requesting that BYNON BOLTON be interviewed for the purpose of determining whether -5800 West 111th Street, was the address he had in mind when he gave the information as set out in the report of Special Agent J.R.Brennan, St.Penl. Kinnesota, dated March 11,1935, paragraph 4, page 4,

BYION BOLTON was interviewed at the Ramsey County Jail during the afternoon of March 14,1935, during which time he stated he never sew the place and knew nothing about the occupants and the only information he received regarding same was that conveyed to him by FREDFUORTZ. He stated that 5800-lest 111th Street is in the general vicinity of the place that GOETZ described to him, being only a short distance from the place given in his previous information and that he is not in a position to say whether this address is correct. He further advised that he knew no one named the GUST and he had no way of knowing whether the place in question, frequented by KARPIS, was GUST'S place. He stated that he doubted very much that the place frequented by KLRPIS was a house of prostitution but that he had no way of knowing and the above statement is merely a guess on his part. He stated that, since thinking of the foregoing, he has be a unable to supply

any additional information. However, if additional information some to his mind in the future, he will advise a representative of the Burers.

MAIL C.HOVDTOHY, 524 Jackson Street, St. Paul, Minnesota, who, after examining his records, stated that he had no correspondence with the Stuart-Jefferies Hardware Company, Amboy, Indiana, or with Mr. C.R. Stuart, personally, in his files at the present time. He advised, however, that his files de mot go back beyond January 1,1930. All files prior to that date having been burned some time ago. He does not keep as individual record for each gum and does not recall ever having sold this gum to MISSKIL GIRSON, examy other members of the BARKEN-KARIS GANO, photographs of this gung being exhibited to him with negative results. He advised that, as marly as he can recall, he sold approximately twelve of those guns, all of which were sold to banks or less enforcement officials.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: KILLING OF FRED AND KATE BARKER AT OKLAWAHA, FLORIDA WHILE RE-SISTING ARREST.

Subsequent to the raids conducted at Chicago, Illinois on January 8, 1935, which resulted in the death of Russell Gibson, who resisted arrest with fire arms and the apprehension of Arthur R. Barker and Byron-Bolton, alias Monte Carter, information was obtained concerning the hide-out used by members of the Barker-Karpis gang in Florida. Bolton, who was found residing with Gibson at 3912 Pine Grove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, furnished information that he visited the place as recently as December 18, 1934, but could not furnish specific directions as to how to reach the place. There were found in the apartment occupied by Arthur R. Barker, 432 Surf Street, Chicago, Illinois, two maps of Florida, on one of which Ocala, Florida was merked and on the other map Lake Weir was surrounded by a penciled ring. These maps were exhibited to Bolton, who advised that it appeared that the markings indicated where the hide-out could be found. He further advised that the place is reached by way of highway No. 41 and that the lake on which the hide-out is located is famous among local residents because its waters are inhabited by an alligator known as "Big Joe". He also advised that members of the gang had endeavored to catch this alligator, but without success; that members of the gang had participated in deer hunting and had recently killed three deer; that when Gibson and Arthur R. Barker returned to Chicago, Illinois shortly before the raids of January 8, 1935, they brought with them portions of the deer carcasses. The foregoing information was obtained from Bolton on January 11, 1935.

On the following day, Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley, accompanied by Special Agents R. D. Brown, G. C. Campbell and R. L. Jones proceeded to Jacksonville, Florida by plane, followed on the train by a squad consisting of Special Agents V. J. Wolfe, T. M. McDade, S. K. McKee, T. M. McLaughlin, J. L. Madala, W. C. Ryan, D. F. Sullivan, Thomas G. Melvin, J. C. White, A. A. Muzzey and C. B. Winstead. On January 13, 14 and 15, the Agents conducted under cover investigations in the vicinity of Ocala, Florida, for the various circumstances referred to by Bolton. On January 15, 1935, the house of Carson Bradford was located and from incuiries conducted, it was ascertained that Fred Barker and his mother, Kate Barker, using the name T. C. Blackburn, occupied this place. The

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photograph of Harry Campbell was identified as an occupant of the place known under the name of George F. Summers. Other persons had occupied this house, together with the Barkers, but could not be identified as resembling the photographs of other members of the Barker-Karpis gang.

Special Agent in Charge Connelley, together with Agent Brown, observed the place discreetly and noted Fred Barker and his mother on the place and thereafter made arrangements to immediately withdraw the other Agents who were conducting investigations in the vicinity of Ocala, Florida, where plans were formulated to raid the place on the following morning, hoping that in the meantime, Campbell and any of the other associates would return to the house. A rough sketch of the property and vicinity was drawn and studied by the various Agents who were to take part in the raid and each Agent was designated to his respective post. In accordance with plans, a squad of Agents proceeded to Oklawaha, Florida, arriving there at 5:30 A.M., and took up their respective positions to prevent the escape of any one from the house. The Agents waited until daybreak, approximately 7:00 A.M.. In order to insure innocent travelers from being hurt, should any shooting become necessary, Agent. T. M. McLaughlin was stationed a considerable distance west of the property on which the house was located on highway No. 41, to divert automobiles from this road, should any shooting start. Agent Melvin was likewise stationed to the east of the property on highway No. 41, for the same purpose. Agents Winstead, Wolfe, Campbell and Sullivan were stationed along highway No. 41 at the north edge of the property, in order to cover the exit of any of the occupants of the house to the north or east. Agents Brown and McKee were located to the east of the property beyond the cover of a house occupied by Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Westberry, to cover the exit of any one through the lane which runs from the Bradford house to highway No. 41. Agents White, Jones, Muzzey, Madala, McDade and Special Agent in Charge Connelley were stationed to the southwest corner of the property, where there was located a house occupied by the colored care taker of the property, Willie Woodbury. This house was approximately thirty yards from the Bradford house. As soon as it was light enough to observe any one leaving the house occupied by the Barkers, Special Agent in Charge Connelley called to the occupants, advising them that the house was surrounded by Agents of the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice and that they were to leave the house one at a time and provided they did so in this manner, would not be injured, otherwise, if they did not immediately leave the house, it would be necessary to gas the place and drive them out. The Agents waited for a period of approximately fifteen minutes and no answer was received from the occupants, although it was noted that some one was moving about within. After about twenty minutes had elapsed, a tear gas shell was shot at the house and at this time a woman, who later proved to be Kate Barker, screamed. For a few minutes everything was quiet. During the interval above described, the other Agents surrounding the house called to the occupants to surrender, however, no response was obtained. Special Agent in Charge Connelley again called to the Barkers, addressing them by name, and commanded them to come out of the house and Kate Barker called out in a rather distinct tone of voice "All right - go ahead". When she

made this remark, it was interpreted to mean that the occupants were planning to come out, at which time Mr. Connelley instructed that Freddie Barker should come first. Immediately thereafter, some one in the second floor front bedroom on the southeast corner of the house fired twenty-five to thirty machine gun bullets at Special Agent in Charge Connelley, who was standing approximately thirty yards from the house. After this, some one, apparently Fred Barker, fired a rifle from the front lower floor of the house through the front door toward Agents stationed at the southwest corner of the property. As soon as the firing started from within the house, Special Agent White, who was covering Mr. Connelley, immediately shot into the house with a .351 rifle. Mr. Connelley fell back and fired into the house with a 30.06 rifle and at this time, the occupants of the house were concentrating their fire on the tree beyond which Agent White was located. Machine gun fire from the house was spread over the side yard and through a little grove in which were located Agents Jones and Muzzey, who had also commenced firing into the house. Agents Madala and McDade, who were also located on the west side of the house, fired into the house. The machine gun fire from the house was spread in such a manner as to cover an area of a distance of about three hundred yards to the west of the house, extending approximately to the place where Agent McLaughlin was located in the highway to divert traffic. While the firing was concentrated on Agent White, Special Agent in Charge Connelley moved into a position in front of the care taker's house at the southwest corner of the property and fired several shots through the front of the house, which were answered by a number of machine gun bursts in the direction of Mr. Connelley. The firing continued from the house at intervals in all directions and subsequent observation of the screens disclosed that they had fired from all windows on the second floor in all four directions, apparently endeavoring to locate some of the Agents. The firing continued for approximately two hours.

As the firing continued, it became evident that the parties in the house were endeavoring to conserve their ammunition, as they lenghtened the period between their fire and reduced the number of shots in the machine gun bursts coming from the house. Apparently while firing out of the east side of the house, Barker shot about four bullets from a .33 caliber Winchester rifle through the house of Mrs. A. T. Westberry. During the early stages of the firing, Agents Muzzey and McDade, who were stationed on the west side of the house, endeavored to fire gas shells into the house and were successful in getting approximately four shells into the house. Due to screens and misfire, the shells were not placed in the upper southwest corner room, from which most of the firing was coming. During the latter stages of the firing, Agent White with a .351 rifle, Agent Jones with a 30.06 rifle, Agent Muzzey with a shotgun and Agents Madala and McDade with machine guns and Agent Connelley with a 30.06 Springfield rifle, concentrated on the second floor bedroom in the southwest corner of the Bradford house. It is estimated that Agents fired approximately five hundred rounds of ammunition into the house and that Fred Barker and his mother fired about two hundred and fifty rounds. During the firing, the Agents stationed on highway No. 41 and to the east of

the property also shot into the house from the north and east side in enswer to shots coming from the house.

After the firing had ceased from within the house, a reasonable period of time was allowed to elapse and after checking all of the Agents who were taking part in the raid, to establish that no one had been hurt, Willie Woodbury, the colored care taker of the property who had been engaged by the Barkers at \$5.00 per week, was instructed to call to the Barkers and invite them out of the house if they were injured, in order that they might be taken care of and at the same time, assure them that they would not be harmed should they come out in the proper manner. Woodbury agreed to go into the house for the purpose of ascertaining whether the Barkers were still alive. He tried both the front and rear doors and found them locked. Woodbury was instructed to force his way into the house and not finding any one downstairs, he went to the second floor and called out the second floor bedroom at the northeast corner of the house and advised that he could find no one in the house. He thereafter entered the southwest corner bedroom and called from the front window to advise that Fred Barker and his mother, Kate Barker, were both dead.

Upon entering the house, it was found that Fred Barker had moved a cot to the first floor of the house and placed it in the front room near the front door and was sleeping there, apparently to intercept any one who might approach the house. This is the point from which he first fired the .35 caliber Winchester rifle. On the second floor, there were four bedrooms and from the bullet holes in the screens, it appeared that they had fired in all four directions from all four rooms. Kate Barker and Fred Barker were found in the southwest corner bedroom. Fred Barker was lying in the middle of the room, face down, a .45 automatic pistol under him and a machine gun with a 50 shot drum beyond his left hand. Kate Barker was found in the northeast corner of this same room, lying on her back, with a machine gun at her left hand, which gun was equipped with a 100 shot drum. There was also found a 50 shot drum in the southeast corner bedroom of Kate Barker, which had evidently been completely fired. A 50 shot drum in the gun used by Fred Barker was entirely empty and the 100 shot drum on the gun found beside Kate Barker had fired approximately thirty or forty shots.

Due to the lapse of time between the first burst of machine gum fire from the house and the second burst, it is believed that Fred Barker probably reloaded the 50 shot gum at least once. In connection with the .45 automatic pistol found under his body, same was loaded with a clip containing seven bullets. One bullet, which was still in the chamber, had been fired but a shot from a 30.06 rifle had cut away part of the steel butt of this pistol, causing it to jam on this one shot and rendering it useless. Fred Barker, judging from the position in which his body was found, was apparently facing the front of the house or the southwest window on the west side of the house and had wounds of ten bullets in his left shoul er and his chest and one wound through the back of his head, which was probably the fatal wound, from

Kate Barker had three bullet wounds in the chest, one of which had apparently gone through the heart. All of the bullets had passed completely through the bodies.

After the firing ceased and the bodies had been located, same were left untouched until the necessary arrangements were consumated with the coroner. Shortly after the shooting, the sheriffs from the surrounding counties appeared on the scene and offered their cooperation, as well as did Wallace E. Sturgis, County Attorney, A. P. Buie, District Attorney, A. P. Meadows, Prosecuting Attorney and L. E. Futch, County Judge, who also acts as coroner. During the course of the shooting, Sheriff S. C. Thomas arrived on the scene and assisted in diverting traffic from highway No. 41.

On January 17, 1935, a coroner's hearing was conducted, at which time the coroner's jury held that Fred Barker and Kate Barker came to their death at the hands of Special Agents of the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, in the protection of their own lives; while the decedents were resisting arrest.

The arsenal of Fred and Kate Barker, recovered after the shooting, consisted of

One .380 Caliber Automatic Colt Pistol - number illegible.

Five .380 Automatic Pistol Clips.

One Browning 12-Gauge Automatic Shotgum, number 92870.

One Remington 12-Gauge Pump Shotgun, number 272907.

One Winchester .33 Caliber Level Action Rifle - number illegible.

There was also recovered one Buick Coupe belonging to Fred Barker and obtained by him under the alias of T. C. Blackburn at St. Charles, Illinois. There was also recovered £14,312.00, four £1,000 bills of which were recovered from a money belt of Fred Barker. Ten £1,000.00 bills were recovered from the pocketbook of Kate Barker. The other money was found in the clothes of the deceased. None of this money could be identified as part of the Bremer ransom money.

The fingerprints of Fred and Kate Barker were taken and forwarded to the Division. The prints of Fred Barker, although badly mutilated in an apparent effort to prevent identification, were positively identified as the prints of Fred Barker, who was being sought for the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer. Kate Barker had no previous criminal record.

A set of twenty-four photographs taken of the exterior and interior of the Bradford house, showing the results of the gunfire, has been furnished to the Division. The house was a two-story, frame, structure which fronted on Lake Weir.

The report of reference advises that Glidden acted suspiciously while at Sioux City, lows and it was thought possible that he might have some connection with the Bramer kidnaping. The description of Gildden and the circumstances of his visit to Sloux City, Town, indicate possibly Clidden may be in fact billion Elmer Mead, who is suspected of being associated with members of this so-called Karpis-Barker game.

Previous reports in this case, copies of which have been t submitted to the Omaha Bureau office, show that Milliam Klmer Wead is a confidence man and has criminal connections in many parts of the country. A photograph of Mead is being enclosed herewith and it is suggested that same be shown to Mr. Silas Moline of Sioux City. Iowa, for the purpose of determining whether or not Glidden in fact William Klmer Wead.





SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Review made of all reports in Omaha effice which is Cassuming supervision in the effort to locate Harry Sawyer and Myrtle Eaton who originated in this district. Gawyer's brothers and sisters reside at Lincoln, Mebras ka, and contact made with them, but they claim not to know his whereabouts. Mrs. Sawyer's maiden name Gladye Sull Nin Bundy, and her parents reside at Sidney, Nebraska. Myrtle Enton originally came from Des Moines, Iowa where whe has relatives, and her maiden name was Myrtle Hubbard. William Weaver, as J. A. Orhood, purchased new Chevrolet. coupe, motor #4135550 at Des Moines, Iowa, March 23, 1934; this car has never been located. Myrtle Eaton reported to have separated from Weaver and returned to Des Moines, Iowa. Effort being made to locate here

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DETAILS: This report is a review of all reports on file in the Omaha office on the above captioned matter. The report is confined solely to the activities of Harry Sawyer, who originally came from Lincoln, Nebraska; and Lyrtle Eston, who originally came from Des Moines, Iowa. There is set forth some information relative to Bill Weaver, who originally came from near Mammoth Springs, Arkansas, and where he still has relatives residing, as Weaver for sometime past has been the companion of Myrtle Eaton.

In so far as possible, information concerning these particular subjects is set out in chronological order from the time of their birth to the present time.

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HARRY SAWYER'S correct name is Harry Sandlovich and so far as has been ascertained, he was born in the year 1890 in Russia of Jewish parentage. The date of his parents immigration to this country is unknown; however, the family has lived for a great many years at Lincoln, Mebraska, Subject Sawyer father, David Sandlovich, died March 27, 1927, and his mother, Gertrude Sandlovich. died May 5, 1934, both at Lincoln, Nebraska where they are buried. The prothere and misters of Sawyer are as follows:

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Albert S. Sandlovich, part owner and operator of the Standard Meat Market, 1535 O Street, Lincoln, Nebraska, and residing at 2828 Sheridan Boulevard, Lincoln;

John L. Sandlovich, part owner and operator of the Standard Mean Market, 1535 O Street, Lincoln, Nebraska, and residing at 1519 R Street, Lincoln; E. Ray Sandlovich, part owner of The Nebraska Auto Exchange, 1724 D Street, and residing at 2111 Sewell Street, Lincoln;

Sam Sandlovich, part owner of The Nebraska Auto Erchange, 1784 0 Street, and residing at 1319 R. Street, Lincoln

Mrs. Bessie Katleman, (widow), residing at 1319 R Street, Lincoln Mrs. Belle Hillman, (widow), residing at 1519 R Street, Lincoln; Mrs. George (Klizabeth) Lehnhoff, resides at the Mormandy Hotel Los Angeles, California, Her husband was formerly a trunk manufacturer in that

The early history of Harry Sawyer is lacking, but records at Lincoln. Nebraska reveal that he was in trouble with the law some 80 years ago when he was first arrested on December 12, 1914 with one Thomas Carr and charged with breaking and entering the office of the Standard Oil Company at Lincoln, Nebraska and attempting to rob the safe thereof with the aid of explasives. On December 25. 1914 he entered a plea of guilty, and the court ordered him released on parole to the probation officer at Lincoln, Nebraska for a period of three years.

It is further noted, that on March 27, 1918 Sawer stole a car at Lincoln, Nebraska and disappeared. He was subsequently arrested at St. Paul, Minnesota, and on September 11, 1918 was fined \$100.00 for attempted grand largeny. Records at Lincoln, Nebraska disclosed that On February 11, 1920 charges were filed against Harry Sawyer for the theft of the automobile on March 27, 1918; that he was released on bond but failed to appear in court on April 16, 1920, and his bond was thereupon forfeited. A STATE OF THE STATE OF

On December 31, 1919, the Farmers & Merchants Bank at Benson, Nebraska, now a part of Omaha, was robbed of \$150,000,00, and Harry Sawyer was identified as one of the parties making this holdup. He was arrested on January 2, 1920 and an information filed against him at Omaha on January 30, 1920. His two compenions in this robbery were one John Finn, and his brother Mike Finn who were subsequently arrested at St. Paul, Minnesota, but the Chief of Police of the city refused to release the two men to the Nebraska authorities.

Sawyer was then turned over to the authorities at Lincoln, Rebraska where he was charged with jumping his bond. However, he advised that his failure to appear in court was due to the fact that his attorney had failed to advise him. A new bond was thereupon filed by his parents, and Sawyer was released. The other theft charges were finally dismissed at Lincoln, Hebraska on December 31, 1925, and the bank robbery charges at Imaha, Nebraska were finally dismissed on May 10, 1921 because of insufficient evidence.

Very little appears to be known concerning subject Savyer's wife, Gladys Sawyer. According to her own statement, she married Harry Sawyer at Line coln, Nebraska eleven years ago [1923]. We definite information is available as to her maiden name, place of birth and the location of her parents, According to Bessie Green, Mrs. Sawyer's full name is Gladys Rita Bundy Mason Sawyer, and she has a half-sister by the name of Bundy who is thought to live in St. Paul. The brothers of Harry Sawyer are unable to give any detailed information regarding Mrs. Sawyer. A friend of the family was of the opinion that she came from Mirdock, Nebraska, which is 25 miles northeast of Lincoln. Br. Henry Hall of St. Paul advises that her father is believed to be W. A. Bundy of Sidney, Nebraska.

Following his trouble in Nebraska, Sawyer appears to have moved to St. Paul, Minnesota where he became associated with Danny Hogan, underworld boss of that city. Hogan was later killed about 1927 when a bomb was attached to the starter of his automobile, and Sawyer subsequently assumed his position in that city.

During Sawyer's residence in St. Paul, Minnesota, he operated saloons at 545, 543 and 541 Wabasha Avenue. The buildings located at these addresses are said to be owned by the Schmidt Brewry Company, which concern is ewned by the Bremer family. The Sawyers are said to have owned the property at 1878 Jefferson Avenue, St. Paul, where they resided and to have later purchased a 40-acre farm on the outskirts of St. Paul at Dayton Bluffs Station, located on the Hodgson Road. The Sawyers have no children of their own, but for over a year they have had living with them a little girl known as Francine, whom they obtained from a friend of theirs by the name of Saugman, with the intention of adopting her.

1934, Harry Sawyer remained in St. Paul for approximately two months. Mrs. Sawyer, in her signed statement, admitted that Harry Sawyer had revealed to her that he was the "finger man" in the Bremer kidnaping case, and when he heard that the Department of Justice was looking for him he immediately left town. Reports

indicate that all of the subjects in this case as well as all the members of the Dillinger gang frequented Sawyer's saloon in St. Paul.

Sawyer and his wife left St. Paul shortly after April 1, 1954 in their Plymouth coups and drove to Fremont, Nebraska. Here, this car was traded for a Plymouth seach which was brought to Fremont, Nebraska by subject Sawyer's brother, Ray Sandlovich, who operates the Nebraska lute Embange at Lincola, Nebraska. This car was later registered in the name of Frank James in the State of Nebraska. The traded in some was registered in the same name in the State of Minnesota. From Nebraska, the Sawyers went to Las Vegas, Nevada and stopped at the Boulder Hotel and them at various tourist camps. About the middle of May, 1934, Mrs. Sawyer returned to St. Paul by train to see her doctor, Dr. Harry Hall, them residing at 1878 Jefferson Street, which was the property can'd by the Sawyers. Mrs. Sawyer remained in St. Paul a few days, and upon leaving left word that mail should be forwarded to the address of a party near Sicux City, Iowa, whom she and her husband had previously stopped with and made arrangements with them to forward any mail to them at Las Vegas, Nevada. This errangement was apparently made on their first trip from St. Paul to Las Vegas, Nevada.

Mrs. Sawyer left St. Paul to return to Las Vegas by way of Omaha, Nebraska and rejoined her husband. Two weeks later, they received a letter from Alvin Karpis through the above mentioned forwarding agent, who, from information developed by the St. Paul office, is believed to be Abe Kroloff, 919 Pierce Street, Sioux City, Iowa. Kroloff operates the Pullman Grocery Store, and at the same address operates the Iowa Vending Machine Company which distributes gambling devices throughout this section.

According to information received from a confidential source in St. Paul, the mail intended for the Sawyers is placed in an envelope marked "Rita", and this envelope placed in another envelope addressed to Abe Kroloff, who in turn forwards it to the Sawyers. It will be noted that in the signed statement given by Mrs. Sawyer at Chicago on September 15, 1934, she gives her full name as Gladys Rita Sawyer. Following the receipt of the letter from Alvin Karpis, the Sawyers sold their Plymouth coach at Las Vegas, Nevada and proceeded to Cleveland. Ohio by train, arriving there about June 16, 1934 where they registered at the Cleveland Hotal and remained there until June 19, 1934. On that date, they were contacted by Alvin Karpis and his girl friend, Dolores Delaney, who had located a house for them in the 48-hundred block on Flamingo Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio where they remained.

About July 1, 1934, Fred Barker drove Mrs. Sawyer from Cleveland, Ohio to Chicago, Illinois where they contacted Mrs. Kate Barker, Mrs. Sawyer then proceeded on to St. Paul and was confined in the Midway Hospital there from July 7 to July 25, 1934. She returned to Cleveland about August 1, 1934 and went

to live at 10515 Parkhurst Drive with her husband. A short time later, she and subject Sawyer moved to a house at 4419 W. 171st Street, at which place she was living at the time of her arrest on September 5, 1934. Following her arrest, a signed statement was secured from Mrs. Sawyer relating some of her connections and activities both before and after the Bremer kidnaping. On September 25, 1934, she was released by the Chicago Bureau Office and immediately proceeded to Cleveland, Chic with Paula Harmon where she sollected her personal effects left in that sity at the time of her arrest, and then returned to St. Paul, Minneseta.

On October 9, 1934, she was reported living with Mrs. Paul Conrad. at 601 South 9th Street, Minneapolis and at Two Harbors, Minnesota in a cottage.

According to Mrs. Conrad, on October 18, 1934, she returned with Mrs. Sawyer to Minneapolis, and the latter, shortly thereafter, received a telephone call, and she left in a Chevrolet coach, motor #2029084, serial #21AD76256, bearing 1934 Minnesota License B-89155. A check at the Kennedy Chevrolet Company in Minneapolis revealed that on October 6, 1934, the above mentioned car had been purchased by Mrs. Conrad for cash and registered in her name.

On November 6, 1934, Dr. Harry Hall of St. Paul, advised the bureau office in that city that efforts were being made by one Emly Gordon to secure an affidavit from him that Mrs. Sawyer was not competent to make a statement to the Chicago Bureau agents, during her incarceration, due to her recent illness. On November 11, 1934, Dr. George Earl, also of St. Paul, reported that efforts were being made to secure an affidavit from him to the same effect.

On December 7, 1934, Mrs. Alice Conrad advised that about the first of December, 1934 she was visiting friends in Chicago and while there received a communication from Mrs. Sawyer's attorney, name unknown, asking her to return home. Upon returning to St. Paul, she was visited by another attorney who attempted to have her transfer the title of the Chevrolet coach, which Mrs. Sawyer had taken away with her, to Mrs. Sawyer, but on advice of Bureau agents she declined to do so.

On Jammary 24, 1935, Mrs. Alice Conrad wrote to the St. Paul Bureau office, advising that she had received a latter from Mrs. Sawyer at Des Moines, Iowa, saying that she had left the car at the Walker Carage in Omaha, and for Mrs. Conrad to dispose of same. Investigation by the Omaha office revealed that this Chevrolet cosch in question was left at the Walker Carage. 1313 Farney Street, Omaha, Nebraska on Jammary 3, 1935 by a person answering the description of Harry Sawyer. The car bore 1935 Minnesota license 919-548. The car was released by the Walker Garage on January 23, 1935 to one Ervin Thorpe of Lakeview, Iowa, who advised that he had purchased same from Mrs. Alice Conrad for \$125.00.

A recent report of Special Agent J. H. Hanson, Jacksonville, Florida, dated 2-20-35, indicates that Harry Sawyer has been in Mismi, Florida and Havana, Cuba from September 1, 1934 to January 7, 1935; that during the time he was in Mismi, Florida, he was driving a new 1935 Packard, standard sedan, black in color with New Jersey license tags.

Monty Carty in his statement, advises that Harry Sawyer is elso known as the "Sealion", and that he and his wife are now with Frank Foster in New York City, the latter being the gang's connection there.

Information previously obtained by this Agent and Special Agent in Charge Hanni of the Omaha office, from an informant,

elicited the information that Sawyer was very close to same select, alias Sam "The Killer" and Louis Litky. The informan

It was also

Tearned from this informant that Bernard Phillips quarreled with Sawyer, and Phillips then went to New York; that Sawyer contacted Seigel and Litky, and Phillips was later killed.

The following herewith is a recent investigation made at Lincoln, Nebraska by Special Agent J. R. Green of the Omaha Bureau office:

Mrs. M. K. Tripp, assistant, temporarily in charge of State Automobile Registration Bureau, Lincoln, Nebraska, advised that an examination of their records failed to disclose registration of 1933 Pontiac Coach, motor #935155 for 1933 or 1934; nor for 840 DeLuxe Packard Club Sedan, motor #189533 for years 1930 to 1934; that they have no available records yet for 1935; and that their office will place a stop notice on these two sars, and will immediately advise the Cmaha Bureau office, if same are later shown as being registered in Nebraska.

On February 23, 1935, Agent conferred with W. C. Conditt, Chief of Police, Lincoln, Nebraska, with whom the Omaha office had been quietly working on instant matter relating to apprehension of subject Sawyer, since first advised his apprehension was desired by the Bureau. The Bureau's Identification Order for Sawyer had not yet reached Agent or the law enforcement officers at Lincoln; however, while in conference with Chief Conditt, a Lincoln representative of the Associated Press telephonically communicated with Chief Conditt and this Agent that the Associated Press from St. Paul had asked for information concerning relatives of Harry Sawyer or Harry Sandlovich at Lincoln, but no information was furnished. The evening papers of February 23rd at Lincoln (so Agent was later advised on his return to Lincoln) and the evening edition of the World Herald at Omaha, on that date, ran news items concerning subject Sawyer, known as Harry.

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Sandlovich, being wanted by the Bureau, and giving names of some of his relatives at Lincoln. Chief Conditt had been unable to secure further information concerning subject Sawyer, other than that his brothers at Lincoln, Nebraska owned a farm somewhere near Lincoln or Denton, Nebraska (same county) and listed in the Lincoln telephone book as Sandlovich Bros. Farm, Denton 1711; that he had no reason to believe that Sawyer had been in Lincoln or at said farm, but would quietly work on this matter and advise the Omaha effice should be secure by further information, and would cause his apprehension should Sawyer appear there. His confidential officer, Detective Valentine, was present at the time of this interview, and he advised he would give this matter his earnest attention.

confidential informant, advised he would secure the location of the Sandlovich farm and would advise this agent on his return to Lincoln, which he later found to be located three or four miles south of Emarald, Nebraska, and approximately two and a half miles north of Denton, which would make the farm about eleven or twelve miles southwest of Lincoln. When later contacted by Agent, but after interview with John and Albert Sandlovich as hereinafter recorded. stated that they had a hired man on aforesaid farm by the name of Page, who is red headed, and this farm is frequently used by various members of the Sandlovich family for giving steak-fry parties"; that confidential inquiry of friends and relatives of the family dise closed no information as to Barry Sawyer's present whereabouts or his being in communication with his relatives at Lincoln, he well knowing Sawyer and his 🔌 brothers. He further stated that from a close friend of Harry Sawyer's by the name of Pearlman, who is a travelling optician out of St. Paul or Minneapolis. and who comes into his cigar store now and then, and who has furnished glasses & to a member of the family of one of his clerks, he was advised that relatives of Harry Sawyer's wife are said to reside at Mirdock, Nebraska, which is approximately twenty-five miles northeast of Lincoln on the Rock Island Railroad; that this Pearlman has a brother who he claims is a Deputy Sheriff at St. Paul, Minnesota, believes he would furnish Sawyer but might be Minneapolis, and if so with information coming to that office from the Bureau; that Ray and Sam Sandlovich besides operating the Nebraska Auto Exchange at 1724 0 Street, Lincoln, operate ... what is known as the McBride Sales Barn on Highway at College View, which is a suburb of Lincoln.

On February 27th and again on March 1st, Agent interviewed Albert S. Sandlovich and John L. Sandlovich, each personally known to this Agent, at the Standard Meat Market, operated by them at 1535 O Street, Lincoln, Nebraska. Each advised that they had no sympathy with their brother Harry (subject SAWYER) in his criminal operations and present predicament, they no longer recognizing him as their brother, and his conduct had caused their family much grief; that they desired the apprehension of subject Sawyer, as it would be much better for him as well as their family if he was in Federal custody, and would do everything in their power to assist in locating him, and requested Agent to assure the Bureau of their earnest co-operation and assistance in every way possible in instant

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matter; that their brothers, Ray and Sam, who operate the Nebraska Auto Exchange at 1724 O Street, and the other members of their family would likewise assist. Agent called their attention to it being a Federal Criminal Violation, subject to penitentiary sentence to harbor or assist a fugitive, such as Subject Sawyer now was, which they stated they and the other members of the family so know.

Albert Sandlovich, who is the eldest of the family, is a business man of splendid reputation, is a Shriner, and considered one of the higher type of the Jewish race at Lincoln, stated that he cut Harry Sawyer off as a brother when he first started his criminal activities in 1917, and when arrested later; for automobile theft about 1920, he refused to sign his bonds, though same were later signed by his father and mother; that he had not seen Harry in recent years nor had he been in Lincoln to his knowledge; that there had been no communication in the past few years between the family at Lincoln and Harry Sawyer at St. Paul or the latter's wife, excepting that on Mother's Day, Harry had always sent his mother a large boquet of flowers from St. Paul, and no one of their family had heard from him since Mother's Day of 1933, when the last flowers were sent by him to their mother; that their father, David Sandlovich died March 27, 1927, and their mother died at Lincoln, Nebraska, May 5, 1934. When questioned relative to whether Harry was at their mother's funeral, each stated that he was not; that on account of having no recent word from him, they did not know where to reach him, and none of their family had any word from Harry Sawyer or his 📲 wife, at that time nor later, and that they did not some to Lincoln at that time.

John Sandlovich informed that he had not seen his brother Harry since he got into trouble in connection with the robbery of the Benson Bank at Omeha in 1920, until about three years since, when passing through St. Paul, he went to the place he was then operating and talked with him for probably an hour, and he had not seen nor heard from him since, and that he had lost all love for him since, his first trouble at Lincoln.

When questioned as to their relatives and their addresses, the brothers of Harry Sawyer jointly furnished the following information:

An Uncle, a brother of their father, now 80 years of age and retired, who shortened the name to Sandlo, and known as Benjamin Sandlo, resides at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and has a son there, named Morey Sandlo in the automobile business under his own name;

Cousins on their father's side, by name of Morris and Charles Glesenfield, Attorneys, also residing at Milwaukee;

An Aunt, Mrs. Sarah Poska, who is their mother's sister and resides at Lincoln, Nebraska; another Aunt, Mrs. P. Polsky, mother of Lou Polsky, residing at Lincoln, this aunt being the widow of P. Polsky, now deceased, and who was a brother of their mother, Mrs. Gertrude Polsky Sendlovich.

They further stated that they had no other relatives, nor any known friends elsewhere that Harry Sawyer might contact, unless it was M. R. Onden, brother of Jack Cohen, a Lincoln attorney and friend of Sawyer's, whose address they later secured and furnished Agent, which is as follows: M. R. Cohen, 2832 E Street, San Diego, Galifornia. It should be noted, this was the party, or rether the name used, by a man and women at the Harry Sawyar farm near St. Paul, when it was reided last summer by Bureau Agents.

When questioned relative to connections of Harry Sawyer's wife, and her maiden name, Albert Sandlovich stated that Harry Sawyer married some girl outside of Lincoln, after he left Lincoln, and sometime after he was in the bank jam at Omaha in 1920, and that they had had no relations with Harry's wife, he having only seen her once, when she came to Lincoln, years since, and wanted him to sign Harry's bond in connection with his automobile trouble at Lincoln, in its latter stages, neither could he or John remember her maiden name; that he understood Harry's wife, had a married sister residing at St. Paul, Kinnesota, but do not have her name or address; that he understood her parents were dead, that she had had a grand-mother whom he believed once lived between Omaha and Lincoln, but believed she was now deceased, and did not know what other relatives she had. John Sandlovich said he was quite certain that Harry married his wife, either at Omaha, Nebraska er Council Bluffs, Iowa.

On Agent's last interview, they each stated that they had been greatly grieved by the newspaper publicity given to this matter, or rather their relationship to Sawyer, and Agent assured them this did not come from the Bureau; also, they did not see the reason why their names were published as brothers of subject Sawyer on the Bureau's Identification Order, which had since prior interview come to their attention, as they no longer considered him as a brother, agent advised them that they were not singled out in this particular instance, but that it was always the practice on such Identification Orders to list the known relatives of the Subject of such Identification Orders.

A prior search of the marriage records of Lancaster County, in the County Judge's office, Lincoln, Nebraska, for the past twenty years failed to disclose the marriage of subject Sawyer under the name of Sandlovich, Sawyer or Porche. A similar search of the records since 1913 at the office of the Bureau of Vital Statistics for the entire State of Nebraska disclosed no marriage record which could be that of subject Sawyer.

In the absence of Claude Hensel, Cheriff of Lancaster County, Lincoln, Nebraska, his Deputies, K. C. Ward; G. A. Hughart; Henry Craig and Vancel Greer, were interviewed. Each were familiar with Sawyer's prior arrests at Lincoln and his family connections there, while the former three personally knew Savyer. Each stated that they would do everything possible to secure his appro-hension and secure information which would assist in same, and watch possible Lincoln contacts of Sawyer.

An examination of the arrest blotter, by jailor and Deputy Sheriff
Henry Craig, disclosed his arrest as Harry Savyer, January 4, 1980, for aute
theft, released en bond January 6, 1920 and arrested May 17, 1920, released en
bond May 19, 1920. His address in the first instance was recorded as 2017 Sherdon
Avenue, Omaha and later arrest as 2007 Sherman Avenue, Omaha, but is believed
former was in error, and that the latter address is correct.

A confidential informant, them Agent considers absolutely reliable and in the best possible position to furnish information concerning subject Sawyer's past connections at Lincoln, Nebraska and whose name Agent promised met to reveal to other than the Bureau, fermished the following informations

That about five years ago an investigation was made by LaGuardia. then in charge of the Narcotic Bureau at St. Paul, Minnesota, at Lincoln, Mebrase ka, and it was ascertained that Harry Sawyer was then head of a dope ring which was running narcotics from St. Paul to Sioux City, Iowa, Lincoln, Rebraska; Denver, Colorado and possibly other points, and that the Lincoln contact was Guy Orcutt, whom Sawyer formerly knew, and then and now operating a cigar store in the 100 block on North 14th Street, Lincoln, Nebraska; that Orcutt was still a shady character at Lincoln and would probably be Sawyer's nost likely contact there; that he understood that contacts of Sawyer at Sioux City, Denver and other points were also found during that investigation; that one Louis Benero a former Lincoln retired Italian fruit merchant, who has formerly had contacts with Ray and Sam Sandlovich at the Nebraska Auto Exchange, 1724 O Street at Lincoln, is also a former friend of Harry Sawyer, and is now believed to be residing at Santa Monica, California, but visite in Lincoln, now and then, and might be a possible with contact between Harry and these two brothers, or might be visited by Harry in California; that the son of Ike Cooper, deceased, many years since Chief of Police at Lincoln, known as "Babe" Cooper and formerly worked on the ice wagon of the old Lincoln Cold Storage Company, later merged with the Bestrice Creamery Company, is said to frequently drive automobiles from the Nebraska Auto Exchange out into the state, and might also be a possible contact between the Sandloviches and subject Sawyer; that while he has heard rumors that Harry Sawyer was at his ... mother's home one night, just after her death, in May, 1934, he has been unable. to secure any definite information on this; that through various avenues available to him he would make discreet inquiry and secure such further information 🔆 possible which would assist in the apprehension of Sawyer, including Guy Orcutt's operations and possible contact with Sawyer and his brothers; street address of Louis Benero at Santa Lonica, California, and employment of "Babe" Cooper by the Nebraska Auto Echange

Lincoln, which he had expected to be the following week, but emergency matters have interferred, but expects to see him shortly. It was arranged that agent communicate telephonically in making appointments for contacts with this into ment.

While Agent is not well acquainted with Guy Orcutt, yet many years since he had some business dealings with him, is familiar with his local repus tation and believes is a very likely contact for Harry Sawyer, However, it is not the printed of the various parties interviewed, that Sewyer would risk coming to the vicinity of Lincoln,

All of the above addresses are at Lincoln, Nebraska. Tracing is he male of all first class mail coming outside of Lincoln to these addresses and forwarded to the Omaha Bureau Office as securede

On February 27th, Mr. Jack Cohen, Attorney of Lincoln, Nebraska, called at the Omaha office and stated to SAC Hanni that he was representing the Sendlovich family of Lincoln, Nebraska, and that he had come to this office for a the purpose of assuring the Covernment that the relatives of Harry Sawyer at Lincoln, Nebraska have absolutely nothing to do with him, would not harbor him or give him refuge of any sort, and that if they at any time should come in possession of information as to Harry Sawyer's whereabouts, they would immediately communicate by telephone with the Omaha Bureau Office. Mr. Cohen himself stated that he would urge the brothers of Harry Sawyer as well as his sisters to assist the Government in locating Harry Sawyer, and that he, Cohen, would undertake steps on his own effort to learn where Sawyer may be located.

An opportunity was taken to inform Mr. Cohen that the Government desires the apprehension of Herry Sawyer and would be severe with anyone found to have given Harry Sawyer aid and refuge since he has been publicly announced as being a fugitive from justice. He was also informed that no matter who the person may be that harbored Sawyer, he would be prosecuted under the Federal Harboring Statute. Cohen was questioned for the purpose of learning whether or not he or Sawyer's brothers in Lincoln have any information or idea as to where Harry Sawyer is located. However, no information in that respect could be obtained,

On Jamary 22. 1935, an indiatment On January 22, 1935, an indictment was filed in the United States District Court in the District of Minnesota, Third Division at St. Paul, against Harry Sawyer, alias Harry Sandlovich, charging that between December 1, 1933 and May 1, 1934, he conspired with Alvin Karpavicz alias Alvin Karpis, Arthur Barker, Volney Davis, Harry Cambell and several others to transport the kidnep victim Edward G. Bremer from St. Paul, Minnesota to Bensonville, Illinois and to hold him for \$200,000.00 ransom. On January 24, 1935, a bench warrant was issued, and his bond fixed at \$100,000.00.

MYRTLE KATON was born in Des Moines, Iowa, March 14, 1902, her maiden name being Myrtle Hubbard. Her father died a number of years ago, and her mother re-married a men by the name of Alvin Beber with whom Myrtle and her sisters never got along, so they left home at an early age. Myrtle's father died a few years ago, and Baber is said to have left Des Moines but occasionally returns for a wisit. Myrtle is not on speaking terms with her step-fathers. Myrtle had two sisters - Elsie Hubbard, who married Lawrence Bud Joyce of Des Moines and who later served a sentence in Minnesota State Penitentiary for robbery, and about three years ago while Elsie was enroute to see her husband, she was killed in was automobile accident. The younger sister, Ruby Bubbard Peterson Jones is divorced from her husband, Richard Jones, but they are now residing together in Ruby's house at 1113 Southeast Kirkwood Avenue, Des Moines, Ioma, Myrtle as a young girl was known to hustle and walk the streets in Des Moines. She later started living with one Muriel Rolls of Des Moines, who about ten years ago killed a man and disappeared and has not been heard from since. She then started living with "Boots" Frow, and upon separating from him went to live with Clarence "Doc" Eaton. Then "Doc" Eaton was sent to the Minnesota State Penitentiary on a bank robbery charge. Myrtle moved to St. Paul, Minnesota and became the paramour of Andy Rothmeyer. About two years ago when she became acquainted with William Weaver, subject of this case, she became his paramour. Myrtle Eaton is known to the Police as a shoplifter and fur booster and has the following record of arrests:

As Myrtle Eaton, \$5805 PD, Des Moines, Iowa, errested in 1927 for liquor investigation, at which time she was associating with indy Rothmeyer. They were picked up at the Fort Des Moines Hotel, but were subsequently released;

As Ruth Martin, #3113 PD, Minneapolis, Minne, arrested on 2-27-50, charged with grand larceny in connection with shoplifting. She was fined \$100.00 on March 10, 1930 when the charges were changed to petty larceny;

on March 10, 1930 when the charges were changed to petty larceny;
As Sue Bond, #22402 PD, St. Paul, Minn., arrested on 12-9-50, charged with shoplifting. On December 19, 1930 these charges were dismissed by the County Attorney;

As Alice Martin, #5805 PD, Des Moines, Iowa, arrested on 12-29-31 for investigation but was not held. At the time of this arrest she was in company with Clyde Nimerick and his wife, who were known as Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Harris, John Waters alias "Go-About" Riley and his wife, Nina Snyder. Myrtle was in company with "Doc" Eaton who was not arrested at the time. All of these subjects were found in the Northwestern Hotel in Des Moines. Clyde Rimerick was the only one held, and he was turned over to the authorities at Kansas City, Missouri on a bank robbery charge and subsequently jumped a bond of \$20,000.00.

and St. Paul, she was accompanied by an Kleie McHenery of Des Moines, Iowa, who is now living with Jimmy Murphy a gambler, and they reside in the New Albany Hotel in Des Moines, Iowa.

livrtle Eaton as the paramour of Andy Rothmeyer resided in an apartment at 565 Portland Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota for approximately six or seven years. Bothmeyer maintained this apartment for her, he being a well-to-do saloon keeper, with a place of business at 949 W. With Street, St. Paul. He is married, has several children, one of whom is a marse in a hospital in Duluth, Minnesota.

It is not known just when "Bill" Weaver became acquainted with Myrtle Eaton, but it appears from reports that he became intimately acquainted with her during the summer of 1933 when they made various trips together to lake resorts in and around St. Paul. About the middle of September, 1933 "Bill" Weaver rented a flat above 777 Selby Avenue, St. Paul, which was over the beer gardens known as the Moonlight Gardens, and operated by one Harry Miller. Myrtle Eaton is known to have stayed with him in his flat at various times.

On October 28, 1933, Myrtle Eaton was in an automobile accident with a girl known as Madeline and was somewhat seriously injured. They were attended by Dr. Henry Hell. On December 7, 1933 Myrtle Eaton and Bill Weaver called at Dr. Hell's office and paid \$50.00 on account and advised that they were going to Des Moines. Iowa to visit some of Myrtle's relatives and then were going to Calveston, Texas. An address was given to Dr. Hell at the time, but he subsequently was unable to find it. Dr. Hell identified the picture of Marjorie Keeting as being the Madeline with Myrtle Eaton and who also accompanied her to Calveston. Texas.

A check of lyrtle Enton's telephone for the fall of 1933, up until the time she left St. Paul in January, 1934 reveals the following telephone calls made:

11-21-33, Main 3710 Minneapolis, Morts Lumber Company, 707 Pents Building;
11-21-33, Regent 6633 Minneapolis, A. G. Morts, 2529 Carfield Avenue;
11-29-33, a call from a Hubbard at Des Moines, telephone 44-3310; calling

12-24-33, a telephone call to the Sportsman Club, Des Moines, Iowa, telephone
43-7505 - this place was then operated by Dewey Burlovich and "Go-About" Riley;
12-25-33, a call to Locust 7750, Minneapolis, Oland P. Wells, waiter, 3641
Fourth Avenue, South;
1-12-34, Locust 9948 Minneapolis, Mrs. J. Be Davenport, 4109 Columbus Avenue.

Reports indicate that all of the Barker-Karpis gang was in Star Paul from January 1 to 15, 1934; that shortly thereafter nearly all of the women members of the gang moved to Chicago, Illinois or vicinity. It is known that Bill Weaver took an active part in the kidnaping of Edward Bremer and was at the hideout a good deal of the time. In the statement of Paula Harmon, dated at Chicago, Illinois, September 15, 1934, she mentions that she moved to Chicago, Illinois from St. Paul about January 15, 1934 and secured an apartment at 67th & Stoney Island Avenue; that about January 26th William Weaver visited her at this apartment, and about February 1, 1934, Myrtle Faton came to Chicago and stayed with Bill Weaver, From this statement it would appear that about February 14, 1934 most of the Barker-Karpis gang moved to Toledo, Ohio; however, Myrtle Faton and Bill Weaver appear

to have broken away and gome to Aurora, Illinois to live. The first definite address of Myrtle Eaton and Bill Weaver in Aurora, Illinois was obtained from Frank Burkell, 50 So. 4th Street, who advised that about the first of March, 1954 he rented this couple a sleeping room in his home for about two weeks; that they used the name of Mr. and Mrs. William Thornton and later rented an apartment at 14 Claim Street, Aurora, Hilinois and remained there until about the and of April, 1934.

During this period information was received that Myrtle Eaton and

Bill Weaver were also in Des Moines, Iowa. This information is verified by the fact that on March 23, 1934, Bill Weaver, under the name of J. A. Orhood, purchased a Chevrolet coupe, motor #4135550, serial #1DAO315359, with black body and steel-drummed tire cover, regular equipment with front and rear bumbers with bumper guards and had a Sportlite spotlight installed. Weaver secured 1934 Iowa license tags #77-34648 under the name of J. A. Orhood, 317 E. 5th Street. which address is fictitious. About ten days after purchasing this ear Weaver returned to the O'Day Chevrolet Company and had same serviced. This car has never been located to date. There appears to be quite a lapse of time from February 8th, which was the date of Bremer's release, until march 23, 1934, that the whereabouts 💯 of Myrtle Eaton and Bill Weaver is not definitely established, with the exception of of two appearances in St. Paul, Minnesota. According to the statement that Bina Mirry made at Kansas City, Missouri on February 12, 1935, after the others left for Toledo, Ohio about the middle of February, 1934, Bina Murry and Volney Davis returned to Chicago and remained there for a week or ten days and then moved to Aurora, Illinoise; that it was about three or four weeks thereafter that Myrtle Baton and Bill Weaver came to Aurora. From the fact that Weaver purchased a new far in Des Moines on March 23rd and ten days later had it serviced there would perhaps indicate that they had both lived in Des Moines, Iowa after leaving Chicago,

Myrtle Eaton and Bill Weaver resided as shown in Aurora, Illinois until April 28, 1934 and then drove to Toledo, Chio where the other members of the Barker-Karpis gang were living. Reports do not show clearly where Myrtle Eaton and Bill Weaver resided, but that they were in contact with the gang. About the end of May, 1934 they moved to a cottage on Lake Erie not far from Sandusky, Chio, but according to the statement of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Willgrube at Grand Forest Beach near Sandusky, Chio, they did not rent a cottage to Mr. and Mrs. Orhood which was the alias used by Mrytle and Bill until the latter part of June. They took the cottage until September 4, 1934. The Orhoods gave their previous address as 1711 F Street. Toledo. Chio.

During July, 1934 this Agent Interviewed Charles Eaton at 1609 S.E. 14th Street, Des Moines, Iowa and was advised by him that his 13-year old daughter, Myrtle Winnie Eaton was then visiting her uncle, Clarence "Doc" Eaton at Burlington, Wisconsin. According to the statement of Mrs. Willgrube on or about July 1, 1934,

Bill Weaver and Myrtle Eaton left Sandusky, Ohio estensibly for Eau Claire, Wisconsin to pick up their two small children. They returned about five days later with little Winnie and Bettie Eaton. From information appearing in reports Myrtle and Bill left Grand Forest Beach near Sandusky, Ohio about the end of August and took the two children with them and headed for an unknown destination.

Other reports indicate that some time in September Edna Murry and vi Gregg went through Aurora, Illinois and advised parties there that they were in their way to bes Moines to see Myrtle Eaton who was very ill, and that Vi Gregg was intending to take the train from there to Montana. Later towards the end of October, one Lloyd Hobson, a bootlegger of Aurora, Illinois, claims to have seen Myrtle Eaton in Des Moines. Myrtle Eaton at the time was reported to have separated from Bill Weaver because the Government was looking for him. From time to time during the late fall, word was received by Agent from various sources that Myrtle Eaton was in and out of Des Moines, but no definite information could be obtained as to where she was actually living.

During the course of this Agent's investigations at Des Moines in an effort to locate Myrtle Baton, word was received that she and Bill Weaver were in town with a girl known as "Big" Marie and her man; that they had come from ; St. Paul. "Big" Marie was described as being in her early twenties and weighing around 200 pounds, and is reported to have been a former prostitute in Des Moines but now working her trade in St. Paul. Interview was had by this agent and ether agents of the St. Paul office with Harry Miller of 777 Selby Avenue, St. Paul during July, 1934, at which time he gave information that Bill Weaver and Myrtle Eaton came to see him in St. Paul a few weeks after Bremer was returned and paid Weaver's rent. They again dropped in to see him about two months after Bramer was returned. Miller further states that during June, 1934 Myrtle Eaton telephoned to Andy Rothmeyer on two occasions, and about ten days prior to the interview, which would be around the first of July, Lyrtle called Rothmeyer from Des Moines and told him where the Buick car which he had given her was located. This therefore, coincides with the story of Mrs. Willgrube of Grand Forest Lake near Sandusky, Ohio that Weaver and Myrtle Baton left Sandusky about July 1st ostensibly going to Eau Claire, Wisconsin. However, it appears very possible that they came. to Des Moines, Iowa and picked up the two children and then returned to Sandusky, Ohio. The statement of Charles Eaton about the middle of July to this agent that his small daughter, Winnie Eaton, was in Burlington, Wisconsin would appear to be

In an interview with andy Rothmeyer who same to the St. Paul
Bureau Office on June 21,1934 with victim Edward G. Bremer, who introduced Rothe
meyer as a life-long friend, he claimed that he last saw hyrtle Enton in February,
1934 and had not heard from her since then. She told him upon leaving town that

In the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Illinois, dated 11-12-34, pages 58 and 59 there appears an interview with Joe Fisher, brother of Clara Gibson, the latter being a shoplifter. Clara Gibson frequently made trips to New York and stayed with a Rose Atkins, who originally came from Newark, New Jersey, her husband being Jack Atkins. Rose is known as "Big" Rose and is now reported operating a house of prostitution in Kansas City, Missouris.

In this Agent's investigations at Des Moines, Myrtle Raton was reported running with a shoplifter from New York by the name of Daisy who had good connections there.

As previously shown in this report, Special Agent in Charge Hanni and this Agent interviewed

Bernard Phillips is alleged to have quarreled with Sowyer and later went to New York. Sawyer is said to have contacted Seigel and Litky and Phillips was later killed. Sam Silver was also killed in New York and Werne Miller killed in Detroit, in the same way.

Barker and Karpis are also said to have the machine gun used in the Kansas City massacre and have same hidden out somewhere.

also stated that Blonde George Ziegler and Jack Pfeiffer are alleged to have killed two women. One of these women is said to have been the one involved in the Denver Mint robbery. This is thought to be Indian Rose and it is believed that George Ziegler and his wife later adopted this women's little daughter. Then this woman got out of the penitentiary she is said to have gone to St. Paul (in about 1932) and was later killed and buried.





Mr. Whitley telephoned from the New York City Office with reference to the teletype from the Chicago Office concerning Alice Conrad, a copy of which is in the Bureau, and stated that in talking the situation over in the New York Office, it had occurred to them that since Sawyer is supposed to be in New Jersey, possibly around Newark, and since she is possibly going to contact him, it is possible that they will follow the bus she is on and simply stop the bus and take her off. Mr. Whitley mentioned that if this did happen, Agent Suran on the bus could do nothing more than to get the license number of the car.

In view of these facts, Mr. Whitley stated that the following plan had been tentatively set out, subject to my approval. The bus stops at Easton, Pennsylvenia for dinner, and remains there, according to Mr. Whitley for about 30 minutes. The plan is to have three men drive in a Bureau car to Easton, Pennsylvania, where one of the men who is known to Agent Suran will board the bus while the other two in the Bureau automobile will follow the bus until it reaches its New York station. Agent Ross from the Chicago Office, who knows Agent Suran, will board the bus, while Agents Starr and Binns will trail the bus in the Bureau automobile. Mr. Whitley stated that while her instructions are to get off the bus at the 36th Street Terminal. the bus first stops at the 42nd Street Terminal, which is a larger terminal and a very busy one, and it is possible that she will contact Sawyer there, or get off the bus there. In view of this, Mr. Whitley stated that arrangements will be made to have Agents at both of these terminals.







On the evening of March 8, 1935 confidential informant whose services were used quite extensively curing the early period of the Dillinger investigation, contacted Special Agent/W. C. Ryan and advised that during the latter part of November, 1934, he had occasion to contact a party by the name of "Mibs" and one Sammy, for the purpose of obtaining from them some slot machines; that he went to the home of Sammy, which is located at 825 South Marshfield Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, and there met "Libs" and Sammy who were accompanied by a party whom they introduced to him as X"Slim". stated that he did not connect this party "Slim" with anyone who was wanted by the Bureau at that time, but that later on he recalled certain pictures which had been shown to him by Special Agent in Charge M. H. Purvis, and recalled that Mr. Purvis had shown him a photograph of one Russell Gibson alias Slim Gray and that he recalled a resemblance between the party "Slim" whom he had met and Russell Gibson.

About two weeks before the killing of Slim Gray in Chicago, steted, he again tried to contact "Mibs" and Sammy for the purpose of ascertaining definitely if the "Slim" he had met was identical with Slim Gray, but that he was unable to contact them at this time. He also advised at the time of this interview that after the death of Slim Gray he again tried to contact "Mibs" and Sammy, but was advised, upon making inquiry at a restaurant frequented by them, that they were not hanging around the neighborhood as much as they had previously.

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stated that this indicated to him that "Mibs" and Sammy were no doubt hiding out from the law. It furnished the further information with reference to his meeting with "Slim" that on that particular night "Mibs" brought out two large rifles, which from the description furnished by were no doubt monitor rifles, and that "Slim" had told "Mibs" to bring these rifles to his apartment. At this time advised that he would again try to get in touch with "Mibs" and Sammy to ascertain what, if any, connection they might have with the remaining members of the Karpis-Barker gang.

With reference to "Mibs" and Sammy, your attention is directed to the report of Special Agent W. C. Ryan, dated at Chicago, Illinois, February 19, 1935, wherein on page 14 it will be noted that subject Bruno Putis alias Austin alias Whitie advised that Joe Galliachio alias "Mibs" and Sammy Mano, who resides on South Marshfield Avenue, were frequent visitors to the apartments occupied by Slim Gray and Doc Barker, and that Slim Gray had advised him that "Mibs" had furnished him with "heaters", meaning guns. Putis also indicated that "Mibs" and Sammy appeared to be just as friendly with Doc Barker as they were with Slim Gray. It is also to be noted that at the time of the raid on the house in Oklawaha, Florida, at which time Fred and Kate Barker were killed, there was found a card bearing the pencil notation "Pat Kano. 825 South Marshfield". From the information furnished by Putis and the card found in the possession of Fred and Kate Barker, it is felt that Joe Galliachio and Sam Mano must be no doubt connected with the remaining members of the Karpis-Barker gang and it is felt that they will be a likely source of supply for gugs for these remaining members.

again contacted Special Agent Ryan on the evening of March 15, 1935, and advised that he has again contacted "Mibs" and Sammy, and that in conversations with them he has determined that they are acquainted with all the members of the Karpis-Barker gang, but that "Mibs" advised him that he has only seen Karpis on one occasion, however, that he expects to hear from other members of the gang at any time. He also stated that "Mibs" further advised him that on the night previous to the killing of Slim Gray, Slim had just returned to the city and had stopped in at the address at 825 South Marshfield Avenue, and had picked up a machine gun, a bullet proof vest, a rifle and several pistols; that "Libs" had also told him that the wife of Slim Gray advised him that on the night of the raid on the apartment on Pine Grove Avenue, upon receipt of the call that the place was surrounded by Agents, Slim Gray stated, "Well they are here" and threw a bullet proof vest to Bolton, saying, "Let's go": that Slim rushed out the door expecting to be followed by Bolton, but that Bolton threw himself on the floor, and that she was of the opinion that if

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Bolton had backed up Slim they would have both escaped. Previous information in the file indicates that Clara Gray was at one time associated with the Gallachio gang and was engaged in shop-lifting. The also advised that while with "Mibs" and Sammy on the afternoon of March 15, 1935, they evidenced a lot of interest in a photograph and article appearing in the Chicago Daily Times concerning the removal of Edna Murray to St. Paul, Minnesota; that "Mibs" stated, "I told you she was in St. Paul," and that both "Mibs" and Sammy agreed that it was a very good picture of Edna Murray.

stated that he is confident that "Mibs" and Sammie will some time in the near future have contact with other members of the Karpis-Barker gang and that in order for him to get all the information possible from them, it will be necessary for him to spend practically all of his time with them. He stated that he is at present earning a few dollars through slot machines, which he has placed in various stores in the city, but that in order for him to neglect this business it will be necessary for him to have other compensation. He stated that he desires that he be furnished with \$50.00, which amount would last him for several weeks.

Inasmuch as it appears entirely likely that members of the Karpis-Barker gang may contact "Mibs" and Sammy within the near future, since they are at present in need of new firearms due to recent losses, it is requested that authority be granted to pay informant the sum of \$50.00 for two weeks services. For your additional information, investigation in the vicinity of 825 South Marshfield Avenue has disclosed that this neighborhood is in a very tough section of the city and the matter of covering these parties is impossible without the use of an informant who can have direct contact with them. It is requested that you advise this office by teletype whether the authority to pay informant is granted.



Mr. Friar telephoned from the Washington Field Office and advised that he had just received a call from one O. L. Johnson, service manager of the Ford Garage at Fredericksburg, Virginia, 810 Charlotte Street, who advised that approximately two months two men and two women in a maroon Ford automobile stopped at his garage and that these people acted suspiciously in that one of the party would keep watch all the time while the other three were eating in the rear of the filling station. Johnson said that approximately ten days or two weeks later, he recognized this man's picture in the Baltimore paper as Alvin Karpis, who had escaped from the officers at Atlantic City.

Johnson further reported to Mr. Frier that this afternoon the same two men came to his garage; that one of the men wore a mustache which he did not wear before; that they were driving the same automobile. The license on this car was Pennsylvania 1935 license 14-E-35. The man in question was described as being about 5 feet 10 inches in height and weighing about 175 pounds; that there was a woman with him who was blonde and short.





Reference is made to your letter dated March 5, 1935, calling attention to a letter addressed by me on February 27, 1935, to William S./Cuthbert, Director. of Public Sefety, Atlantic City, M.J., in reply to his Letter of February 19th, wherein I indicated that proper cooperation had been afforded by Er. Cuthbart and the Atlantic City Police.

I was not aware of the fact that ir. Cuthbert had personally criticised the Bureau for failing to advise him of the identities of the persons, who went to Atlantic City from Florida, and who subsequently were identified as Alvin Marris and Harry Campbell. Hereafter I will be guided by your suggestions in matters of this nature, and communicate with the Bureau prior to commenting on the cooperativeness of officials.

I might cite the fact that Director Cuthbert has rendered very good cooperation to the Philadelphia Office even before the transfer of the New Jersey territory to this district. I was informed prior to acknowledging Director Cuthbert's letter by agents of this office that the Atlantic City police were somewhat resentful of the fact that the Bureau obtained possession of the Karpis car, and felt that as a matter of policy it would be well to meintain a cordial relationship with this department in the interest of law enforcement.

I desire to inform you, however, that I intend to take a trip to Atlantic City as soon as the more pressing administrative duties requiring my presence in Philadelphia are disposed of, in order that we may discuss matters of mutual interest.

Mr. Alt telephoned from the Jacksonville Office with reference previous conversation concerning attempts made by him to gain possession of the original of a certain telegram which Cassius McDonald is supposed to have sent from Miami, Florida to Blackburn the latter part of December, 1934. This telegram was going to be sent to the laboratory for comparison purposes. Mr. Alt stated that the matter was placed before Judge Ritter at Miami this morning for the purpose of his issuing a court order calling for this telegram. The judge flatly refused to issue such an order stating that there was no authority for the issuance of such an order. He said that the judge did not make any suggestions in regard to the matter, but just merely declined to sign the order.

Mr. Alt stated that the United States Attorney had issued a request subpoena calling for this telegram, but the Western Union Telegraph Company office in Miami refused to honor the request. I mentioned that Mr. Alt had informed me yesterday that this was all the telegraph company wanted. Mr. Alt stated that they told him that yesterday, but today they refuse to honor the request subpoena. Mr. Alt stated that when Mr. Gramling, the Assistant United States Attorney, conferred with Mr. Parrish, Special Assistant to the United States Attorney, on this matter, they decided that a subpoena could not be legally issued unless court was in session. Mr. Alt suggested that a Joe Doe complaint might be filed and a subpoena issued in this manner; however, to date, this suggestion has not been acted upon.

Mr. Alt said that it is absolutely imperative that we get this telegram. but he has exhausted every means known to him, and has failed to get the same. He wanted to know if I had anything to suggest. I told him that I was unable to understand the situation down there; that this is the first instance that we have been unable to get a subposna when we needed one, especially in a case like this one; that, however, we would see what we could do about it here in Washington.

I asked Mr. Alt if he has received from the Assistant United States Attorney at Miami a memorandum of the additional investigation desired by him. Mr. Alt stated that Agent Donaldson is seeing about this at the present time. I instructed Mr. Alt to immediately furnish the Bureau with this information upon its being obtained.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAMM

Pursyant to your instruction I conferred with Mr. Guy Confered United States Alarshal for the Southern District of Florida. Mr. Reeve was introduced to me by Mr. Schilder who advised me of the former connections of Mr. Reeve as a Special Agent of the Bureau and also Chief of Police at Miami, Florida.

Mr. Reeve stated that he was anxious to see a successful prosecution of Joe H. Adams who is to be tried at Miami, Florida on charges of harboring Alvin Karpis, but that he does not believe that the prosecution will be successful unless the Government takes certain precautions. He stated that Joe Adams is the son-in-law of Robert T. Knight who heads the most powerful political group in Miami; that the Knights originally came from Adel, Cook County, Georgia, and that a large number of residents of Miami also come from this same vicinity or are closely associated with them. Mr. Reeve stated that should any of these individuals be summoned to serve on the jury before whom Adams will be tried, that the result will be a hung jury. He suggested that the prospective jurors be investigated with regard to their past residences and associations with the Knight group.

Mr. Reeve also stated that the jury should be locked up during the course of the trial in order to prevent any jury tampering. He stated that it will not be necessary to tamper with the jury should any of its members come from Cook County, Georgia.

Mr. Reeve stated that, although he has confidence in the ability of Assistant United States Attorney W. Sanders Gramling as a prosecutor, he feels that this case should be handled by a Special Assistant to the Attorney General working out of Washington.

MEMORABDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

RECORDED

During the course of the investigation in Missi, Florida and Havana, Cuba of the activities of various individuals for berboring alvin Karpis, information was obtained which resulted in the indictment of Joe K. Adems, manager of the El Comodoro Hotel at Minmi. Adems, together with several other individuals, was indicted upon charges of herboring Alvin Kerpis. In order that you may be fully acquainted with the background of this individual, I wanted you to know that Joe R. Adeas is the son-in-law of Robert T. Knight, sho is reported to be the leader of one of the most powerful political groups in Kismi, Florida. I have been informed that Mr. Knight originally resided in Adel, Cook County, Georgia and that a large number of the present residents of Klami and vicinity originally resided in Cook County, Georgia and are consequently acquainted with Robert T. Knight and his family. In this regard, I am apprehensive of the consequences if ... the Government proceeds to the trial of this case before a jury which includes one or more individuals who formerly resided in Cook County, or who are stroked presently acquainted or associated with Robert T. Knight in Missi. Florida. Undoubtedly, such a condition would result in a hung jury, regardless of the strength of the Government's case. This information has been furnished to: the Eureau's representatives by informants and other persons known to be reliable, who are thoroughly conversant with the situation prevailing is Florida. Evidently, the only precaution we can take in this matter is to conduct a careful investigation of those individuels who comprise the jury; panel selected for the term of court at which this case is tried. In this regard, I may state that no date has as yet been set for the trial of Joe E. Adams and the other persons charged in the present indictment.

I feel that the successful prosecution of those individuals who have been harboring alvin Karpis is particularly desirable at the present time, perticularly since Karpis remains a fugitive and the conviction of those individuals who have heretofore harbored him will, of course, make it increasingly difficult for him to secure aid or essistance in avoiding apprehension by law enforcement officers. While I am not femiliar with the ability or combilities of the United States Attorney and his staff who are trying this that the case is one in which consideration might be given to the perturbility of appointing a Special Assistant to participate in the trial. I will, of course, savine you of current developments in this matter.

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

rifles, one of which had a label attached to it indicating that a
Browning sutomatic wifle #211724 was contained therein.

In connection therewith, your attention is invited to your letter to this office dated February 5, 1935, and to a report relating thereto submitted by Special Agent Burruss, dated February 21, 1935, in which he reported that the War Department found no record indicating the theft or loss of the above described rifle. Your attention is particularly invited to your letter of February 5, in which it is stated that the number on this rifle had been obliterated but had been restored by the Bureau Laboratory to read 211774.

As suggested in the telegram, it would appear to be advisable to cause an inquiry to be made at the Rock Island Arsenal with a view to confirming Mr. Kahlert's report, and if such a rifle is found there to bear \$211774 it would appear that the possibility exists that the laboratory has feiled to develop the correct number. On the other hand, it should be borne in mind that these automatic rifles were manufactured, during the World War, by several firms and it is suggested that the igent conducting this inquiry ascertain all data pertaining to the gun now in possession of the Hock Island Arsenal and primarily the name and location of the manufacturer.

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In the event further inquiry is desired to be made by this office, please inform me.

Miss Alice Conrad, close friend of Harry Sawyer and wife, has proceeded to New York where she is being kept under surveillance by Bureau Agents in contemplation of a contact with the Sawyers. From all indications, Harry Sawyer has recently been and is possibly now located in the vicinity of New York and Newark, New Jersey.





An inspection of the store room in which chest number 7973 is supposedly stored revealed that the above mentioned chests are stacked in groups, nine high, twenty wide, and thirty long, and further that a steel tape has been sealed across each of the thirty-sections. It was further observed that this room contained a number of the above mentioned groups, and an examination was made of each chest which appeared on the outside of these groups in an attempt to locate chest number 7973, but without results.

The above information is included in this report, inasmuch as Kr. Nye advised that it would cost approximately \$300.00 to produce instant gun for examination, and that the Arsenal authorities desired to advise the General Ordnance, War Department, Washington, D. C., before authorizing the expenditure of said sum for verification of the above mentioned records.

The following observations are included in this report for information. Apparently three concerns manufacture Browning Automatic Rifles for the U. S. Covernment, namely Marlin-Rockwell, Winchester, and Colt, and further that in addition to the Browning Automatic Rifle, there is also a Browning Machine Rifle which is similar to the Automatic Rifle in many respects with the exception that the Machine Rifle has the sling swivel on the left side of the stock and also has a heavy corrugated barrel.
