
Dear Sir:

With reference to the investigation that has been conducted by special agent lickee and myself concerning the rumor that Alvin Karpis had been in Havana, Cuba, on March 15th, as you have been advised telegraphically the inquiry in Havana resulted in learning that the person who had been reported to have seen Harpis denied making the statement. I'rs. George Harris who started the story is a heavy drinker and on the several occasions that I saw her in Havana whe was intoxicated. A complete report on the investigation conducted there has been prepared in rough draft form and submitted to the Jacksonville office with the request that the report be expedited.

Upon our arrival in Mami last night we contacted Asst. U. S. Attorney Gramling who was preparing to depart for Jacksonville to confer with a Mr. ABarlow, A Special Assistant to the Attorney General / who has been designated to handle the cases pending here in connection with this matter. Ir. Gramling advised that Ir. Barlow was expected to come to Miami immediately and it is expected that we wall be able to go over the cases thoroughly with Messers Gramling and Barlow on the 30th. After that time we will be able to better estimate just work will be necessary and you will be promptly advised as to what will have to be done. 





On the morning of March 29, 1935, Bruno Austin was arraigned for hearing before United States Commissioner, Edwin X. Walker at Chicago, Illinois, but due to the fact that Assistant United States Attorney F. C. Rurley, who has been handling the removel proceedings against Austin, was at the time engaged in a trial of a case in the Federal Court, the hearing was postponed until 10:00 a. m. on April 5, 1935.

On the morning of March 30th a motion was entered before United States Commissioner Walker by Semuel A. Aronfeld, Attorney for Austin, for the reduction of the bond which had been set at 12 \$50,000. As a result, the bond of Subject Austin was reduced to ... \$15,000 by Commissioner Walker. It is anticipated that the 1958 hearing on the removal of Subject Austin will take place on the morning of April 5, 1935, but Assistant United States Attorney Eurley has not indicated as yet whether he will desire that Special agent K. R. McIntire be called as a witness.

In reference to Bureau letter of March 28, 1935, Special Agent John E. Brennan interviewed Mr. Edward G. Bremer relating to the manner in which ranson notes signed by him were handled.

L'r. Bremer related that on the day he was kidnaped, just after he was transferred to the kidnapers' car from his own, he was compelled to sign his name to a number of papers, each bearing two or three typewritten lines to the effect that he would guarantee the amount of money paid. He stated that goggles had been previously tightly fitted over his eyes; that they had not been removed, but were held up sufficiently that he might see the papers on which he signed his name. The following description of Karpis was noted in addition to the published description: Has a very bad set of false teeth with a good deal of gold in the front. Has a scar behind left ear and two short scars on the right side of the face; he is left handed; both he and Ma Barker wore platinum rings each set with a large dark sapphire. A small lump is on the cheek at the right side of the mouth. The two small scars on left side of face, mentioned above, which are under the eye, are said to be the result of a plastic surgical operation. The scar on finger is on the second finger of left hand, inside, and is very smooth.

He had a dog license number 32315, believed to be from Mismi and marked "Pitman-Moore Co.-Rabies Vaccine."

During the course of an investigation conducted by representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation of this Department in Cuba, looking to the location and apprehension of one Alvin Karpis, a fugitive from justice, who is under indictment at St. Paul, Minnesota, as one of the kidnapers of Edward G. 



Sullivan further advised that the statement given by AUSTIN ... does not appear to be of any value to the prosecution at this time. Mr. Bullivan also advised that he was not complaining, but that he 🕍 indicted AUSTIN at the insistance of a representative of the Chicago office and that he felt that it was up to the agents of the Bureau to develop a case against AUSTD; if such were possible. He further advised that if it becomes necessary, Agent McIntire should be called as a witness in the removal hearing.



It is believed that the following information will be of some interest to you.

Yesterday Guy Reeve, United States Marshal here, who is well known to you, with whom this Office maintains the most cordial relations, advised that on March 26, 1935, Bart A. Riley, an Attorney of Miami, Florida, called at his Office on other matters, and during a general conversation stated that it was quite likely that he would represent Joe Adams, one of the defendants charged in indictments in the Southern District of Florida, with harboring Karpis, Fred Barker and others, providing a sizable fee would be forthcoming.

Riley stated to Mr. Reeve that the Bureau had no evidence whatsoever on Adams to substantiate the charges in the indictments, and that if he were retained he would show and produce evidence to prove that for weeks during October and November, 1934, Bureau Agents were guests at the El Comodoro Hotel in Miami, and while there had ample opportunity to observe and identify Karpis and other members of this mob, however, they did not arrest any of them; further that Agents were in Ocala, Florida, the night of January 15, 1935, the day before Kate and Fred Barker were killed, and that during this night Kate and Fred Barker attended a picture show in Ocala; that Agents attended the same show and sat near these two persons but did not arrest them; that at the time they knew full well where they both resided and the next morning, January 16, 1935, these Agents with others proceeded to Oklawaha and killed them;

You will recall my personal and confidential letter to you of March 22, 1935, to which I attached copies of a letter dated March 22, 1935, addressed to me by W. Sanders Gramling, Assistant United States Attorney at Miami, that on Page 7, of Mr. Gramling's letter it is stated that T. Robert Knight, father-in-law of the defendant Joe Adams, in discussing this matter with Mr. Gramling had stated that the attorneys representing Adams had intimated that during Adams' trial claims would be set forth that the Officers of the Division of Investigation, who participated in the shooting affray at Oklawaha, Florida, used exceedingly bad judgment, and apparently intended to convey to Mr. Gramling that they would make that affair appear to be one of deliberate and malicious murder, though he did not use these exact words in expressing himself.

We, of course, know that the statements of both Riley and Knight are not only false but malicious.

Riley also informed Mr. Reeve that he contemplated making a trip to Washington where he will call on you and the Attorney General for the purpose of obtaining the names of all Bureau Agents who worked on this case in Miami, Havana, Ocala, and Oklawaha.

Bart A. Riley is an attorney at Mismi, Florida, and well known to the writer. He is a native of Florida, born in Key West; between 35 and 40 years of age. He is considered intelligent, alert and a fighter in Court, and very well acquainted in Dade County of which Mismi is the County Seat. His practice is mostly in Criminal Courts. During prohibition his clients were principally liquor law violators. His reputation as an attorney is not the best, and his practices at times have been considered very questionable, and according to Mr. Reeve, he bears watching always.

I telephoned Mr. Ladd at the Chicago Office and mentioned the press dispatches which indicate that the Treasury Department, in their concentrated "drive", have ascertained where the hideout of Alvin Karpis is, and that Federal Agents were preparing to raid the place. Mr. Ladd stated that a story similar to this appeared in the Chicago Herald-Examiner about two days ago; that the other press agencies had been calling the Chicago Office, and they have been unable to ascertain the source of the information; that the press representatives remarked to Mr. Ladd that it appeared to them that it was just another one of those stories to make the headlines; that they couldn't get into the headlines any other way, so they chose that manner. Mr. Ladd stated that he did not believe there was any real foundation to the story at all.

Mr. Ladd mentioned that in writing to the Bureau the other day, he had informed that the Treasury Department has sent a newspaper man to Chicago as a publicity expert for the Treasury Department; that his duties consist of contacting the newspaper men, taking them out to dinner, etc., and at the same time release publicity to them regarding any Treasury Department investigative agencies, including the Secret Service, Alcohol Tax Unit, Internal Revenue and Income Tax Unit. The newspaper menhave informed Mr. Ladd that this man has repeatedly asked the press representatives if they want any information about any of the above investigative agencies; that if they desire any information about them, he will write to the heads of those agencies and get any information they desire for publication. Mr. Ladd stated that it appears to him that the Treasury Department is trying to build up their prestige so that if there is effected a consolidation of all Governmental investigative agencies, they will have something to show how efficiently their units work together, etc.

On March 25, 1935, Judge H. L. Ritter, Miami, Florida, imposed sentences aggregating 5 years each on Dolores Delaney and Wynona Eurdette, who entered pleas of guilty to indictments charging both with harboring Alvin Karpis, and other offenses. Both women were committed to the Federal Jail at Milan, Michigan.

On March 28, 1935, Special Agent in Charge Hanson advised from Habana, Cuba, that investigation at that point had failed to disclose the presence of Karpis, and therefore he and Special Agent S. K. McKee would proceed to Miami, Florida, to confer with the United States Attorney with a view to perfecting the cases against Joe H. Adams and others charged with harboring Karpis, and other offenses.

On March 30, 1935, the hearing on the removal of Bruno Austin at Chicago, Illinois, was continued to April 6, 1935.

The trial of Arthur R. Barker and others will be set at St. Paul, Minnesota, on April 9, 1935. United States Attorney George F. Sullivan will urge that the trial commence immediately after the convening of the April session of court.

While discussing other matters with Mr. Connelley, he advised that Special Agent R. C. Suran had proceeded to New York for the purpose of keeping Alice Conrad, a contact of Harry Sawyer and his wife, Gladys, under surveillance. Er. Connelley stated that this surveillance might possibly produce results in that his information is that Harry Sawyer has been associating with one Louis Brooks, a big time gambler of Newark,

I asked Mr. Connelley whether the St. Louis office had obtained any information of interest to the Bureau with respect to the Browning automatic rifles which are supposed to be in the possession of the Rock Island, Illinois, Arsenal and are not there now.

Mr. Connelley stated that there are some suspicious circumstances in connection with the keeping of records at the Rock Island Arsenal and that it has not yet been possible to obtain the desired information, and that possibly this Arsenal has been the source of the guns recovered from the possession of the Barker-Karpis gang.

Mr. Connelley also advised that Frankie Foster had been located by the Jacksonville office at Miami, Florida, and that he was being placed under surveillance with a view to ascertaing whether he is in contact with Harry Sawyer and other members of the Barker-Karpis gang.



It will be noted that Reilly states that he can furnish information that will result in the apprehension of Sawyer and Karpis and that he can also locate the roadside grave where the body of John Hamilton was buried, upon certain conditions which he specifies, to the effect that he be released upon parole for a period of 60 days, innamuch as he must personally contact parties in St. Paul in an effort to procure the necessary information, such information not being procurable by him while incarcerated at El Reno and that, upon the successful termina tion of his efforts, he will be furnished with a pardon. Reilly indicates that his chief desire in this matter is to procure his own liberty

and as to the degree of trust and confidence that can be placed in his, no comment can be made by this office other than those contained in the attached memorandums.

In you of the definite statements of Rellly that he but effect satisfactory results in this matter within a short time, this information is being submitted for consideration by the Eureem. Rellly has not been given any abcouragement, or indication that plans he suggests will be followed out.

Reference is made to the letter of Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley, Chicago, Illinois, dated March S, 1935 in the case of John Paul Chase, et al. and to a letter from Special Agent is Charge E. J. Connelley, Chicago, Illinois, dated Earch 6, 1935 in the case of Alvin Karpis, with aliases, I. G. 1218, at al.

Albert William Reilly, No. 1164, United States Southwestern Reformatory, El Reso, Oklahoma, who is better known as Pat Reilly, was again interviewed by this agent Faroh 18, 1985, and gave principally the same information that he gave agent Birth as set out in his memorandum dated March 12, 1935. The question of the payment of a sum of money to ... Beilly for confidential information that would result in locating the body of John Hamilton, if deed, or apprehending him, if alive, and apprehending fugitives in the BREKID case, was discussed with him. Reilly emphatically stated that he was not interested in money in any sum, but what he wants is his freedom. He sas, told that it would be difficult, if not impossible, for him to obtain his temporary freedom upon any promise he might make regarding any help he might render the Bureau in apprehending any of these fugitives. Reilly mays that in spite of the fact that he does not believe he has been dealt fairly with concerning elleged promises which were made to him regarding the amount of time he would get upon his ples of guilty on the two charges he is now serving on, he will still render this Bureau assistance, if he can be assured of his liberty.

It is Reilly's idea, therefore, to be given a regular parole; for a limited time, if necessary, not to exceed sixty days, at which time

Reilly shid that the only person in St. Paul he would trust, and want to know about this work that he mays he day do, is igent Wicholson of the St. Paul office. He would not, however, contact agent Wicholson in St. Paul or Minneapolis as Micholson is well known to a lot of people in that section who also know Reilly, and if seen together they would immediately earry the more to some undesimble persons. It is Reilly's idea that the writer or agent Birch would proceed to Winneapolis, Minneapole, and live there at a place where his presence would not be questioned by underworld characters, and his identity there here become known, and Reilly then contact this agent.

It was explained to Beilly that a procedure of this kind would be most unusual, and he was given no encouragement as to whether it would or sould be sarried out. Due to the fact that Beilly was born and recred in St. Paul, and further due to the fact that he has a family, and his sentence is small, it does not seem that he would become a fugitive if given his liberty. It cannot be determined by this agent how reliable Beilly is, and that can probably be better determined by some one is St. Paul; preferably Agent Micholson, who knows more of Beilly's history and background.

In Lucila Murphy, 2311 S. W. 6th Avenue, Portland, Oregon, make the following voluntary statement to H. A. King, Special Agent, Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice:

and lived there the greater part of my life. In about 1927, Elmer Farmer was operating the Raymond Hotel in Bensenville. I first met Farmer at this time and went to work for him as a waitress. I continued to work for Elmer Farmer as a waitress at the Raymond Hotel from some time in 1927 to some time in the year 1928. Sometime between 1928 and 1929 Elmer Farmer sold the name I don't know. Katz ran the hotel and I did not work there while he was operating the said hotel. In about January 1929, my mother, Mrs. Amelia Brettman, and myself took over the hotel in and continued to operate it until about May 1930. At this time I was married to Art Gradt, who worked on the Chicago, Milmankee a 5t. Paul Bailroad. I was divorced from Art Gradt January 16, 1931.

"On or about December 31, 1930, Walter Murphy and myself took over the Raymond Hotel and operated this hotel until October 24, 1934. We both managed the hotel and I did the cooking in the restaurant.

I have known Harold Allerton and his mother, Mrs. Allerton since about the year 1927. When I first met the Allertons they were living on Irving Park Boulevard at Bensenville and I met Mr. and Mrs. Allerton through Elmer Farmer. In about the year 1928 Harold Allerton and his mother moved into a flat which was across and down the street just a short ways from the Raymond Hotel. Mr. and Mrs. Allerton occupied the first floor of the flat and the landlord, Mr. Herman Baucke occupied a portion of the second floor with a family by the name of Mochel. As far as I know Mr. Baucke and the Mochels are still living at that address.

Walter Murphy, was even better acquainted with them. The Allertons sold home brew and whiskey in their flat and my husband and I used to visit them frequently. We used to send out meals to the Allertons occasionally, but neither myself nor Walter Murphy ever personally delivered any meals to them. An old man by the

name of Jim Duffy, who to the best of my knowledge with the farmers, used to deliver the spals which we prepared for the Allertons. To the best of my recollection the last tim that we ever sent a meal over to the Allertons was some time. prior to thristmas of 1856. 1 T do not recall that we ever sent any meals to them after that and particularly I do not recall! sending any meals to the Allertons in January or February of 1934. The last time that I visited the Allertons was to the bes of my recollection just before Christmas of 1933. I might be mistaken in this and it may have been after Christmas. However on that occasion Walter Murphy and myself went over there to get a drink. Mrs. Allerton pame to the door and said that she did? not have any liquor and acted rather peculiarly. She did not want us to come in the house and we left. I saw the Allertons. coming in and out of the house after that, but thereafter did not visit them. I did not see anyone else around the house for the occasion of my last visit to the Allertons. I do not repail that there were any automobiles parked near or around the house; et that time, but I do recall that on a number of vocasions ther were several automobiles parked around the house.

In 1933 and 1934, Elmer Farmer was operating a saloen known as Elmer's Tavern. This tavern was about two blocks from the re-Raymond Hotel and across the street. I was not working for Elmor Farmer at that time and had not worked for him after he sold the Raymond Hotel. Elmer Farmer did not live at the Raymond Hotel at that time and never lived at the hotel after he sold it. I saw him frequently and know that he was very friendly with Harold Allerton. I do not know whether they were engaged in any business together. I knew that both Elmer Farmer and, Harold Allerton had poor reputations. I knew that Harold Aller ton was a bootlegger and that Elmer Farmer was in the slot machine racket and I am of the opinion that he was mixed up in the Syndicate. " I recall particularly that is about 1931 or " 1932 we used to have a slot machine in the hotel provided by Elmer Farmer and that we aplit the proceeds with Farmer. Elmer Farmer took this slot machine out in 1931 or 1932, saying that the town was getting "hot" and that the G-men were there. He never returned the slot machine and, accordingly, we bought another slot machine and installed it. This slot machine remained in the Raymond Hotel for four or five months and was stolen from us at the point of a gun. 18 4 1 3 1 3 B

"Regarding riends of Farmer and Allerton, I know particularly that Oscar Distad was a close friend of Harold Allerton and also of Rimer Farmer. He visited the Allertons nearly every day and spent a great deal of time there. A man by the name of Leo Rivard was also very friendly with the Farmers and Allertons and to the best of my knowledge is still living with Elmertons.

meals to Harold Allerton, nor did I ever bring any meals to a blindfolded man in the early part of 1934. I also wish, to state that I mever told any one that I had delivered meals. The only incident which I can think a to a blindfolded man. It should also be stated that Mrs. Murphy admitted that she is not presently married to Walter Murphy, but is living with him and they are operating "Murph's Restaurant". Mrs. Murphy also stated that her mother had written her some little time ago concerning an interrogation by Agent Melvin, and produced for agent's inspection the letter in which Mrs. Brettman had stated that she had been questioned. There is nothing of value in the letter with the exception of the fact that Mrs. Brettman told her daughter to be careful what she said. Mrs. Murphy was unable

to explain this, but appeared to be telling the truth in the above quoted statement. It should also be noted that Harold Allderton is referred to as Allerton by Mrs. Murphy, she stating that this was the way she thought the name was spelled and the name she always called Allderton. It should also be noted that agent questioned Luclia Murphy concerning the time that Mrs. Allderton, Harold's mother, left and went to Indiana, but Incila Murphy stated that she had only a vague recollection of this.

Agent also questioned Walter Murphy, who stated that he was


well acquainted with Harold Allderton and his mother; that he never liked Harold allderton and had as little to do with him as possible. He stated that he frequently went there to buy beer and other drinks and admitted that he was quite friendly with Mrs. Allderton. He recalled that Mrs. Allderton went to Indiana sometime in the early part of 1934 or poseibly the latter part of 1933, and stated that she eccasionally had gone to Indiana to visit her son Leon before; that he had met Leon on one or two occasions and thought that Leon was commerted with the telephone company. at Peru, Indiana, rather then Kokomo. Murphy stated that the blinds were frequently drawn at the Allderton residence; that there was nothing amusual about this and did not remember particularly that the blinds were down during the latter part of Jamuary or early part of February, 1954. He stated that Trequently there were automobiles parked there to which he paid very little attention; that he had delivered, sandwiches to the Allde ton residence occasionally at night, but that he never delivered any sandwiches when Mrs. Allderton was not there, and had not been in the Allderton household after the incident mentioned in Luella Murphy's atatement.

Walter Murphy confirmed in all respects the statement made by Luclia. He is well acquainted with Elmer Farmer, knows that Farmer and Allderton were very friendly. He stated that Farmer did not live at the Raymond Hotel and claimed to be unable to furnish any information of value. Murphy did state that the Raymond Hotel bore a very poor reputation when he and Luclia took it over, and stated that he had a hard time keeping undesirables out and admitted by inference that probably many criminals had stayed at the hotel.

Murphy examined the photographs furnished with the reference.

With reference to the information to the effect that Karpis was seen in a certain saloon in Havana, Mr. Hanson said that the woman who furnished this information was drunk on the night she is supposed to have seen Karpis, and does not even remember the names of the persons to whom she told that Karpis was in her husband's saloon. The owner of the saloon said that this woman came home drunk that night, and during the time Mr. Hanson was over there, he saw the woman four or five times, all of which times she was drunk.

Mr. Hanson said that the surveillance of this seloon has been turned over to the Intelligence Division of the Cuban Army, who are keeping the place under surveillance. When they return to Cuba, further inquiries are going to be made relative to this matter, but Mr. Hanson said "it was just another vild goose chase".

Mr. Hanson said that they have changed their headquarters from the Cortez hotel to the Alcazar Hotel in Miami.

I telephoned Mr. Connelley at the Chicago Office and informed him that we have some information coming out of Florida to the effect that some attorney who is going to participate in the trial of one of the harboring cases in Florida is making statements that he will produce evidence to show that the Agents were in Ocala, Florids on the night of January 15, the night before Kate and Fred Barker were killed, and that during this night Kate and Fred Barker attended a picture show in Ocals; that Agents of this Bureau sttended the same show, sat near these two persons, but did not arrest them. Mr. Connelley said that this is entirely untrue; that there were only three Agents in Ocale at this time, these being Mr. Connelley, Agents Brown and Madale; that manala arrived there late on the night in question while Brown and Mr. Connelley were out in the country there looking the situation over. Mr. Connelley said that no Agents to his knowledge attended a motion picture threatre in Ocala that night.

I told Mr. Connelley further that the attorney in question says that the Agents knew full well at this time where Kate and Fred Barker were residing, and that on the next day, these Agents, with others, proceeded to Oklawaha where they killed Kate and Fred Barker. Mr. Connelley said that they had "a pretty good idea" that they knew where Fred and Kate were, but had information that possibly Campbell would return there; that during the afternoon and night of January 15, 1935, they were checking with their informant in the vicinity there, and as a result of their checking, made the raid on the house of the Barkers at daybreak the next morning.

I further informed Mr. Connelley that this attorney says that during October and November of 1934, Agents of this Bureau were in Miami, Florida where they were staying at the El Commodoro Hotel; that during this time, members of the Barker-Karpis gang were also there, and while the Agents had plenty of opportunities to arrest these men, they did not do so. I told Mr. Connelley that I had not checked the file on this as yet, but it was my recollection that Mr. Cowley with some other Agents were in Miami at this time; that possibly Hurt and Campbell were along. I requested Mr. Connelley to interview Mr.

Campbell about this matter, Campbell being in the Chicago Office at the present time, and ascertain definitely who were in Miami at the time in question, where they stayed and how long they remained, as well as the information they were down there on.

It will be noted that Arthur Newquist of the Vrba Motor Company, 5100-06 West 25th Street, Cicero, Illinois, has made an affidavit that Clara/Gibson purchased Ford coupe, motor number 775269 from the Vrba Motor Company for the sum of \$684.00 under the name of Irene Rogers. It will also be observed that Edward A Reynolds of the North Shore Buick -Pontiac Company, Incorporated, 1030 Davis Street, Evanston, Illinois, made an affidavit that he sold Buick sedan, motor number 2778426 to Clara Gibson under the name of Estelle Gray for a cash consideration of \$2,099.00.

For your information please be advised that the facts of this ratter were discussed with United States Attorney Dwight H. Green, Chicago, Illinois and Assistant United States Attorney Bosworth, by Special Agent V. W. Peterson of this office. United States Attorney Green and his assistant Mr. Bosworth, were of the opinion that in the event the affidavits of Mr. Newquist and Mr. Reynolds are bonafide, that Clara Gibson could establish ownership of the two cars in question and that the court would probably require the Federal Bureau of Investigation to turn over said cars to her.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Newspaper Statements Connecting Jess Doyle with a number of Bank Robberies, etc.

At 9:10 P.M. on Saturday night, March 30th, Mr. Kleinkauf read to me the following press dispetch:

"St. Paul, Minn. - At least one member of the Barker-Karpis Gang has turned State's evidence, the United Press says under copyright, revealing in amazing detail the story of how John Dillinger and his henchmen executed scores of bank robberies, kidnapings, murders end holdups.

"Justice Agents admitted that Jess Doyle, one of 12 persons under arrest in connection with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, has 'done plenty of talking.

"They said that from information from Doyle they had obtained the solution to the greatest number of major crimes ever charged to one gang in modern police history."

Subsequently, at 11:45 P.M. on the same evening, Mr. Kleinkauf called me and stated that you desired to ascertain from the St. Paul Office whether there was in fact any basis for this statement and whether anyone from the St. Paul Office had given out such a statement. I knew from the developments in this case over the past several months that Jess Doyle had never been connected by our investigation with any member of the Dillinger Gang. You will observe that the above press dispatch indicates that Doyle was supposed to be revealing "in amazing detail the story of how John Dillinger and his henchmen executed scores of bank robberies, kidnapings, murders and holdups".

I talked to Mr. Coulter, as you were subsequently advised, and he stated that no recent interviews had been held with Doyle and that certainly nothing hed been developed recently, indicating that Doyle had been associated with any of the Dillinger organization. Mr. Coulter also advised that no one from the St. Paul Office had contacted the newspapers or received inquiries from them.

This was the information that was subsequently transmitted to you. At no time did I know that the press dispatches referred to any Federal bank

robbery. Mr. Tolson read to the Executive Conference this morning your memorandum addressed to him, evidently dated today, concerning this matter. The implication of Jess Doyle in the robbery of the Third Northwestern National Bank robbery has been the subject of some correspondence between the Bureau and the St. Paul Office, and I have discussed this situation with Mr. Newby on several occasions. I had no reason to associate Doyle's implication and statements concerning the robbery of this bank with any press dispatch relating to the operations of the Dillinger Gang.

The press dispatch statement that the information received from Doyle constituted "the solution of the greatest number of major crimes ever charged to one gang" likewise branded the press dispatch as entirely erroneous, since Doyle's statements to the Bureau have been confined to the Third Northwestern National Bank, the Fairbury Bank of Nebraska and other matters which did not pertain to violations of any Federal Statutes within our jurisdiction.

I telephoned Mr. Coulter at the St. Paul Office with respect to United Press dispatches that Department of Justice Agents have announced that Jess Doyle "has done plenty of talking and confessed to murders, kidnapings and a great many other crimes", in connection with his activities with the Dillinger gang, and inquired if Mr. Coulter knew of any basis in fact for such a story. Mr. Coulter stated that he did not believe that this story came out of the St. Paul Office for the reason that no one there has talked to Doyle; that Doyle has even refused to secure the services of an attorney, although one tried to see him about two weeks ago, at which time Doyle refused to see the attorney.

Mr. Coulter stated that Doyle has talked to no one since being incarcerated at St. Paul, and has not in fact been interrogated by the Agents, with the exception of the exhibition to him of some pictures for identification 2 purposes. Mr. Coulter further stated his positive belief that no one there had been talking to the newspapers. I suggested that the story might have emanated from the United States Attorney, but Mr. Coulter stated that he doubted this n very much for the reason that the report setting forth the apprehension of Doyle had not been submitted to the United States Attorney at St. Paul.

Pursuant to your instructions, I telephoned Acting Special Agent in Charge Coulter at the St. Paul Office, relative to the dispatches which indicate that Jess/Doyle has furnished the Federal Government with a confession involving himself, together with members of the Barker-Karpis gang in numerous bank robberies, one of which occurred at Minneapolis, Minnesota, when the Third Northwestern Bank was robbed on December 16, 1932, for which crime there is presently serving a life sentence in the Minnesota State Penitentiary, Stillwater, Minnesota, an individual who is innocent of this crime. Mr. Coulter stated that the attorney representing this individual is now at the St. Paul Office seeking information concerning the alleged confession, but that he, of course, is not making any comment; that he is doing likewise with inquiries from local newspaper men.

Mr. Coulter advised that the stories contained in the local papers appear to emanate from Kansas City where Doyle is alleged to have made his confession; that he cannot account for any possible leak at St. Paul, and that the question of turning Doyle over to the State authorities for prosecution on charges of participating in the robbery of the Third Northwestern Bank had not been discussed with the local authorities. Mr. Coulter further advised that the United States Attorney would, of course, have to obtain authority from the Department before releasing this information to the local State prosecutor.

Mr. Coulter stated that an Associated Press dispatch emanating from Kansas City, Missouri, indicated that Doyle, when he was apprehended, did considerable talking. On this information, the local correspondents of the Associated Press at St. Paul, Minnesota, questioned Hankin and Larry DeVol, two prisoners who are serving life sentences, having been convicted for their participation in the Third Northwestern Bank robbery. DeVol, of course, was a participant and acquainted with all the details,

At least one member of the notorious Barker-Karpis gang has turned State's evidence and revealed in amazing detail the story of how John Dillinger and his henchmen executed scores of bank robberies, kidnapings, murders and holdups, the United Press learned tonight.

Federal Department of Justice agents admitted that Jess Doyle, one of the 12 persons under arrest in connection with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, has "done plenty of talking." ALLIANCE REVEALED

They said that from information from Doyle they had obtained the solution to the greatest number of major crimes ever charged to one gang in modern police his-

tory.

It disclosed postively, for the first time, that the Dillinger gang operated, on occasions, in close alliance with the Barker-Karpis mob, a less colorful but perhaps accurately as methods or complete the second control of the second color equally as ruthless criminal band as that of the slain Dillinger.



I telephoned Special Agent in Charge Nathan of the Kansas City Office relative to the information furnished by the St. Paul Office to the effect that press dispatches referring to confessions made by Jess Doyle had emanated from Kansas City, Missouri.

Mr. Nathan advised that the stories first appeared in local papers at Kansas City, Missouri, yesterday, Sunday, March 31, as having been furnished by the correspondents of the Associated Press and one other press association from St. Paul, Minnesota. I advised Mr. Nathan that the reports from the St. Paul Office indicate that the information was developed at Kansas City from information furnished by someone to the effect that Doyle, when apprehended, "had talked considerably".

Mr. Nathan stated that he does not know how information had gotten to the local representatives of the Associated Press if such information had first been obtained by these representatives, but that he would conduct appropriate inquiries. He telephoned at £:30 p.m., and advised that he had consulted George Stanley, Manager of the Associated Press at Kansas City, Missouri, who stated that no information was furnished to the St. Paul representatives of his newspaper association, but that some time ago he, Stanley, had straightened out the St. Paul correspondents as to the actual town in which Doyle had been taken into custody. Mr. Stanley stated that had he obtained information to the effect that Doyle had made admissions attributed to him, he would have been only too glad to have furnished this information to the St. Paul representatives and obtain the credit for it.

Mr. Nathan further advised that he had consulted Special Agent R. G. Shanahan, who stated that during the time of Doyle's incarceration

at the Wyandotte County Jail, he was kept in solitary confinement, and that there was an empty cell on either side of the cell in which he was placed. Of course, attaches at the County Jail knew that Special Agents were frequently questioning Doyle over long periods of time, but it was not known that Doyle had been doing any talking.

I instructed Mr. Nathan to conduct further inquiries into this matter, particularly that he should make inquiries of the United States Marshal who removed Doyle to St. Paul, with a view to finding out whether at any time information had been given to the effect that Doyle had made admissions to representatives of the Bureau.

I also instructed Mr. Nathan to endeavor to find out exactly what press dispatches were sent out from Kansas City at the time of Doyle's apprehension and at the time of his removal to St. Paul.

Mr. Nathan stated that he would conduct this additional investigation and advise the Bureau immediately by letter.

Two photographs of Volney Davis were made under the same penitentiary number at the State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklohoma, the number being 12808. 

PERSONAL AND CONFIDENTIAL

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

I beg to submit the following comments concerning my visit with officials in New York and Philadelphia and Camden, New Jersey, incident to my trip to New York City to assist in fingerprinting members of the Chamber of Commerce of the State of New York:

Commissioner of Police Valentine at New York was most cordial to me during our interview. I saw him the day before the Director arrived, knowing that he had been invited to attend the affair at the Chamber of Commerce and at that time I stressed the theory of cooperation very strongly. I offered him our facilities in searching the fingerprints of applicants for the a New York Police which is not done. As indicated, Mr. Valentine was most cordial to me and wanted me to take one of the police cars for my use during my entire stay in New York. He also said that if he could assist the Division in any way personally to let him know. Mr. Valentine was quite anxious for me to talk with Chief of Detectives Sullivan and Inspector Donovan in charge of the identification activities, as well as to see the police college.

I talked with Mr. Sullivan only briefly and just exchanged the usual pleasantries. I spent about three hours with Inspector Donovan and gave him 🤲 many suggestions which I thought would help in his work. Contrary to the rather aloof attitude he manifested upon the occasion of a prior meeting, Donovan seemed very glad to see me and welcomed my views. He was very cordial and insisted on taking me to lunch. Two bits of rather interesting information were obtained during this talk. One is that Donovan claims he has in various noncriminal files approximately 800,000 non-criminal prints, representing applicants for taxi-drivers' licenses, hawkers, pawnshops, peddlers, dance-hall operators, and the like. If he has this number of non-criminal prints, it seems to me that possibly it may be helpful in connection with our criminal investigations. Mr. Donovan told me he would be glad to make information appearing in any of his files available for our confidential use. Donovan also told me that considerable political pressure is being brought to bear in New York State, to place the State Bureau of Identification under the jurisdiction of the State Police, rather than under the Department of Correction. He said he thinks this is a step to 🔝 oust Miss Clara Parsons from her job at Albany. I made inquiry whether he knew the identity of the persons seeking this position and he stated he did not. Later on I referred to Captain Moore of the New York State Police casually in our conversation and Donovan states he knows him. He indicated that Captain: Moore is a theorist and is not practical. It occurred to me, however, that Moore who is quite ambitious might be "shooting" for this identification job.

Superintendent Morris of the Radio set-up at New York City gave me the attached pamphlets (triplicate copies) concerning the Radio Patrol System. He told me that codes such as the word "thirty" are used to describe types of crimes when such crimes are broadcast. For example, "thirty" would mean "felony reported being committed". He said these codes are used 🎘 to shorten messages and to improve accuracy. He said it had never been found necessary to change the code numbers, but this could be done readily. The ... New York Radio Receiving Station does not receive other radio messages from other law enforcement agencies although it is connected by teletype. I asked Superintendent Morris who was very friendly and apparently quite proud of his organization which I think is efficiently conducted whether he had heard of 🚉 the new system to provide for the receipt of radio messages on "ticker tape". He said he had not and expressed the belief that such messages would be more accurate than spoken messages and have other advantages in that they would be a matter of permanent record and further, radio signals could "go through the air" where spoken words possibly would be garbled. He furnished one other interesting bit of information which was to the effect that slightly more 🐖 arrests are made by the radio cars each week as the result of observation by the aquad car operators them as a result of salls from headquarters.

Mr. John J. O'Connell is now in charge of the police college. He conveyed his best regards to the Director. I have always heard very favorable reports as to Mr. O'Connell. I think he is making progress with his college. While I was there I sat in with him for a few minutes on a lecture being conducted by a Captain of Detectives to 60 Detectives. Arrangements have been devised for these officers, over a period of 52 consecutive weeks, to attend three hour lectures each week on practical phases of detective work, where actual cases, good work and bad are explained. Everyone seemed to be in deadly earnest concerning the conference and there was not a bit of foolishness.

In the Laboratory, two young men, both having college educations, are working under Lieutenant McMahon who stated Mr. Coffey had been in sometime ago. I do not believe there is anything of value to report as to the Laboratory's activities. I mentioned to the Laboratory Technicians one or two matters which I thought possibly would help them somewhat in their work. They are very enthusiastic and have I think the beginning of a comprehensive set-up.

Late the night of February 6th, Mr. Thomas P. Brophy who has been Chief Fire Marshal of the City of New York for the last 16 years came to see me and I spent a few hours with him. Mr. Brophy, an old member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, is high in his praise of Mr. Valentine who he states is scrupulously honest. He indicated that when Valentine, while an Inspector, was called to the stand in the Seabury investigation, despite heavy political pressure, he told the truth. He states he thinks that Valentine will remain as Commissioner of Police at New York for quite a while. Of course, Valentine is conducting a rather extensive advertising campaign. Mr. Brophy felt that he was wise in doing this because he feels that the police must be sold to the people of New York who should be convinced of their sincerity. Incidentally, the New York Police for a few

months past, have been inviting the citizens by press comments to have their fingerprints taken at the various precincts and thousands have been taken. Mr. Brophy is an Instructor in the police college and talks about arson investigations. He told me that Yalentine and Sullivan in the Department have been most intimately associated for years and that they either succeed or go down together. I think this is an interesting point to keep in mini.

Mr. Brophy also stated that Mr. Bielaski with whom he, Brophy, as Fire Marshal has close contact, now has a salary of over \$20,000 a year. Mr. Brephy and I went several places together and I observed that at least twenty persons called him by name, including many persons at the Waldorf. He has an extremely wide circle of acquaintances in New York and is an intimate friend of Joseph J. Canavan, now Parole Commissioner and formerly Secretary to Governor Lehman. Mr. Brophy wants to be placed on our mailing list and to receive 100 fingerprint cards. The necessary letter will be prepared.

At Camden, New Jersey, I met very briefly Chief of Police Arthur Colsey and thanked him for his cooperation. I also talked to Officers Charles Boettcher and Edward Mills concerning the fingerprint table devised by Officer Carpani. I do not think the table would be practical or needed. The principal advantage of the table is that the card is "fed" through or upward by means of a screw device. This enables the operator to run the card from the right hand to the left hand space and then to the single impression spaces without touching the card. Despite this factor, I do not think it is worth anything, and the factor would be so inconsequential for our use that I do not believe we should purchase any of these tables which sell for about \$100.00. The table also is a bit too low in height. Our operatives do not take so many prints that they would have to worry about ink getting on their fingers and then on the paper.

I telked rather extensively with Officer Mills and made suggestions concerning his files for which he thanked me. He wants citations as to our court decisions which will be sent him.

At Philadelphia, I talked to Mr. Harvey briefly. He referred to the fact that the Chief of Police at Atlantic City had expressed a desire to see him concerning the Division's action in keeping the car in which Karpis had escaped. He said the Chief was somewhat resentful of this action. I do not know whether this has been reported to the Division. The Chief at Atlantic City of course will be the host for the next I.A.C.P. convention.

At Philadelphia, I also met Chief of Police Theodore H. Hollowell of Elkins Park, Pennsylvania, an old friend, who has been a member of The I.A.C.P. many years. He told me LeStrange is coming along all right in Philadelphia, despite some political opposition. While I was at lunch with Hollowell, he introduced me to Mr. Charles McAvoy, United States Attorney, Philadelphia, at a nearby table. It may also be interesting to know that McAvoy was formerly prosecutor for Montgomery County and a very close personal friend of Hollowell.

_

Elkins Park is located in Montgomery County and is a suburb in which some very wealthy men, including Mr. Weideman, who is a broker and has a racing stable, reside. Hollowell is highly respected there.

When I met Superintendent LeStrange, I sensed a certain coolness on his part. I wish to mention incidentally that LeStrange is now a member of the Executive Committee of the I.A.C.P. I had intended only to pay him my respects but when I sensed this alcofness. I thought I would stay a while. I asked him how everything was and he said all right, although there had been a bit of "baby work" in the Mais and Legenza case. I expressed my surprise at this statement and told him I could not figure out what he meant. I indicated that the Director had on the radio on the N.B.C. hookup just the day before in New York, commented upon the splendid cooperation and concerted action of the New York and Philadelphia Police Departments with the Division in clearing up the Mais and Legenza case. This seemed to stump him a bit and he did not refer to the case further at that time but stated that he did not think he would "annoy" us with any requests for information unless we could give the said requests more prompt attention than we had given to the return of certain papers he had sent to us involving an alleged 🔆 extortion letter sent to Lessing J. Rosenwald, head of Sears and Roebuck. He showed me the Division's letter of Jamuary 10th, stating in the last paragraph that we would return the enclosures in this case to him and indicated that he had never received them. He stated he had been intensely interested personally in ... this case and although Rosenwald is now in the tropics, his secretary has called him several times about it. I told him I would make an immediate inquiry on my return to Washington. I find this morning that these enclosures were returned to Mr. LeStrange on January 15th by registered mail and I prepared a letter for the Director's signature to him immediately advising of this fact.

It is my recollection that Mr. Siccardi and LeStrange are very close friends, which may account for Mr. LeStrange's appointment to the executive committee of the I.A.C.P. I mention this as a matter of interest. LeStrange is a relatively new member in the Association.

I remained with Mr. LeStrange for a while and he then seemed to feel that possibly he should discuss the Mais and Legenza case further. He said that he had always regarded cooperation as being a 100% matter or nothing at all. He stated that he had not known that the Division had intended to return these condemmed men to Richmond so soon until he had been in touch with Mr. Harvey and had gone to New York with Harvey, where he had met Mr. Fay. He said that this was on the Saturday afternmon following the Rednesday when these men were arrested. He said he secured confessions from Mais and Legenza, as well as from Ferrell, although Wylie has consistently refused to talk. He stated that he was too rushed with these confessions, and in fact, while he was talking to Legenza, the nurse came in to prepare Legenza for the return trip to Richmond, at 9:30, Sunday night, but the Director had personally granted a postponement of this return. He stated he had expressed a desire to the Division officials which apparently could not be granted that these persons be held over in Philadelphia in an endeavor to have them seen by witnesses to other crimes. During our conversation, Mr. LeStrange sort of drifted away to further phases of this Mais and Legenza case. For example, he said that many newspaper men had asked him what the Philadelphia Police had

done in the case and he had told them it is not always the men who make the actual arrest who furnished the most important assistance in such a matter. I told Mr. LeStrange that the Division had leaned over backward in trying to give due credit to agencies assisting in major cases and he said he did not mean to criticize our action in this matter but that he did think these men should have been held in Philadelphia. He asked me not to report his conversation. He was strong in his praise of Agent McDevitt. He mentioned also that one of the New 20 York officers assigned to the case, whose name, I believe, was Walter Sullivan, had been so out of touch with his own Department and had felt that his own Department would criticize him for not swinging the case more its way, that the said Officer came to LeStrange and told him that he did not know whether he should go in the back or the front door of New York headquarters. LeStrange said he wrote a letter to Valentine about this incident and expressed his feelings as to the mplendid qualities of Sullivan. When I left Mr. LeStrange, he was very 📉 courteous and seemed to be entirely pleased that he had gotten something off his chest. Just what the something was, however, I can't state. It is my personal feeling that he believes his Department fell down somewhat on this case and he just had to have something to say about it. I think it would be best possibly to let the matter rest where it is but to keep this rather childish attitude in mind for any consideration it may merit in the future. I told LeStrange that if he ever felt he had any complaint about our service where he had cases dealing directly with Washington he should telephone to Washington, reversing the charges and talk to the Director, his Assistants, or to me, if he wishes, giving any complains. This seemed to please him tremendously and we parted with his invitation to see him and ask his help anytime.

While I was getting ready to leave Mr. LeStrange's office, he called to the office to meet me Mr. Harry Bodkin, in charge of his identification bureau. I have known Bodkin for years and we spent a pleasant hour or two together while I went through his set-up. He requested information concerning the method of "stopping" silver nitrate action on paper, as well as the chemical to "stop" latent fingerprints developed by iodine fumes from fading away. This information will be sent him with 200 non-criminal cards he also requested.

While I was with Mr. Bodkin, Lieutenant McGovern came to see me from Mr. LeStrange's office and said that they had recently taken up with the Division the question of returning the .32 Savage automatic, taken by the Division from Mais and now required at the trial of some of the Mais gang. He stated that one of the bullets taken from the body of a person killed has been found by a Philadelphia ballistics expert to match with the bullet fired from this weapon and they needed it for evidential purposes. I told him I would keep the matter in mind and I will call Mr. Tamm concerning it.

Reference to made to telephone call from Mr. Newby of the Bureau on April 1, 1965, regarding recent publicity apparently emanating from St. Paul concerning an alleged statement made by Jess Doyle.

Confirming my telephone call to Mr. Newby on April 1, you are advised that I on that date called at the office of the Associated Press in Kansas City and interviewed Mr. George Stanley of that organization. Mr. Stanley advised that, to his knowledge, there had been no tip from Kansas City to St. Paul upon which the story in question was based, and he made inquiries among those employees in a position to have had any information regarding a tip of this character, and advised that none had any such information. With his permission, I examined the file of messages maintained by the Associated Press, for three days prior to the date of the appearance of the story, and found no message in any way relating to Doyle. Mr. Stanley was entirely cooperative, and suggested the possibility that the St. Paul office of his company had possibly indicated that a tip had come from Kansas City in order to protect some other source of information. He further suggested that, in all probability, any original information in this matter was obtained by one of the St. Paul newspapers, and by the press association through that paper. He indicated that he would have been quite interested in receiving and sending out from Kansas City the story in question, but stated that had he had any information regarding Doyle's alleged statement, he would have called this office for verification prior to taking any action on it. It might be stated that in the past this office has found Ir. Stanley to be

entirely fair in his dealings.

At the suggestion of Mr. Newby, a further search was made by Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, of this office, through the messages of the Associated Press on the dates near to the removal of Doyle and Edna Murray from Kansas City, Kansas, to St. Paul, this date being February 16, 1935. Agent Shanahan found only one message concerning this removal, which was forwarded February 16, 1935, from Kansas City, Kansas, and was to the effect that Doyle and Murray left Kansas City on the evening of February 15, via C.R.I. & P. Railroad, at 5:45 p.m., in custody of Marshal Lon Warner, of Topeka, and were scheduled to arrive in St. Paul at 7:15 a.m. February 16. The article advised that these persons had been taken into custody by Federal and local officers recently at Pittsburg, Kansas. No further information was contained in the message.

I have discussed with Special Agent Shanahan the conditions under which Doyle was interviewed when incarcerated in the Kansas City, Kansas, jail, and he advises me that at no time were any persons present during the interviews, with the exception of himself and Special Agent J. L. Madala of the Chicago Office, except for brief periods when they were accompanied by other Agents of this office. These interviews were held in a private office in the Wyandotte County Jail. Agent Shanahan informs me that Doyle was kept during his incarceration in Kansas City, Kansas, in solitary confinement, and that there were, to the best of his recollection, no prisoners in the cells immediately adjacent to that occupied by Doyle.

Norstrom of this office is presently at Topeka, Kansas, and is endeavoring to determine from Marshal Lon Warner whether Doyle made any statements enroute St. Paul from which it could have been gathered that he had given a statement. However, I am advised that Mr. Warner is presently absent from Topeka in connection with the removal of a prisoner to California. Appropriate discreet interview will be had with him as soon as possible, and the Bureau will be informed of the results thereof.

It should be noted, that from the contents of the newspaper articles appearing in Kansas City, it would seem extremely unlikely that the story had been concocted by a newspaperman from a tip.







Special Agents P. C. Dunne and H.E. Kriegel were dispatched to Atlanta, Georgia with the necessary data procured from the Birmingham file for assistance in the above investigation.

A thorough check of all better class and commercial hotels, hospitals, hotel drug stores, car rental companies and medical instrument companies, was conducted by the above mentioned agents with negative results. Numerous doctors were interviewed and photographs of Moran displayed, with the same results. These doctors included bone specialists as well as eye, ear, nose and throat specialists and physicians who might be interested in orthopedic instruments. Numerous parties connected with garages were sontacted, but failed to produce material information.

Dr. A. J. Glisson, proprietor of the Glisson Pharmacy, Peachtree and Ivy Streets, after studying pictures of subject Joseph P. Moran, advised Special Agent A. J. Lemaire that he believed the same were of the likeness of a person who had frequented the soda fount there for about a week or ten days during the early part of last year; that this party, who always carried a sample case, attempted to cash several small checks which bore the signature of Dr. John B. Fitts, but that he, Dr. Glisson, had refused to cash same.

Dr. John B. Fitts, 902 Medical Arts Building, advised Agent A. J. Lemaire that he had purchased a Mays Ophthalmoscope from a traveling salesman over a year ago. Dr. Fitts failed to recall anything about the salesman other than the fact that he appeared to know his business and seemed to be well versed in the terms of the medical profession. Dr. Fitts however, upon closely examining the photograph of Koran displayed to him could make no definite identification. Upon Agent's request, Dr. Fitts produced his cancelled checks relating to the above purchase, and in every instance the checks, which were installments ranging from \$3.00 to \$6.00 and aggregating \$26.00, were made payable to Boehn Surgical Instrument Company, Rochester, N. Y. None of these checks were endorsed by the salesman.

Mr. J. H. Plage, Forwarding Clerk, Old Postoffice, displayed to Special Agent J. E. Lunsford a forwarding card wherein John Moran on February 23, 1935, requested that his mail be forwarded to General Delivery, Birmingham, Alabama. A tracing of this forwarding card, showing the signature of John Moran, was made by Agent Lunsford, and the same is being retained in the Birmingham file for possible future information.

AT BIRMINGHAM, ALABAMA

Upon receipt of the above information, telephonically transmitted by Special Agent Lunsford, inquiry was immediately made by Special

Agent Charles Holtz at the General Delivery window at Birmingham. Agent Holtz obtained, for temporary use, a change of address car indicating that one John Moran on February 25, 1935 had requested that his mail be forwarded to Warrenville, Illinois. The Chicago office was immediately telegraphically advised to this effect; the original of the change of address card bearing the signature of John Moran has been forwarded to the Bureau for the purpose of determining if the same is the handwriting of subject Joseph P. Moran.

On February 22, 1935, it was ascertained by Special agent W. E. Overstreet at the Children's Hospital, that a John Moran representing a surgical supply house of Nashville, Tennessee had recently called. The party contacted there did not recall the features of this person well enough to make an identification; at the Doctor's clinic, Dr. E. R. Bradford stated that a party resembling the photograph of Moran had called that afternoon endeavoring to sell surgical supplies. The Identification Order was also displayed to Miss Lillie McMahon, nurse, who stated that she believed the party calling was Moran. Mr. Dan Bradford, a son of the Doctor, also identified the photograph.

Accordingly, having been informed that the visitor intended to call again between 6:00 and 8:30 o'clock that evening, Special Agents J. H. Hanson, W. E. Overstreet, J. S. Kavanaugh, Wm. R. High, W. A. Temple, L.B. Ni chols, Charles Holtz and F. T. McIntyre, proceeded to the Doctor's Clinic at 2430 11th Avenue North. Agents Holtz and Overstreet entered the Doctor's office, where they seated themselves in the waiting room, ostensibly as patients awaiting treatment. The remaining members of the group stationed themselves at strategic points in front of the Clinic. At approximately 7:30 P.M. the sale sman suspected of being subject Moran entered the clinic, and it was immediately obvious that he was not the subject. After the latter ? party had completed his interview with the Doctor, he was accosted and by reason of the fact that he is engaged in a line of work believed now to be followed by Moran, he was questioned concerning same. He stated that his name is Guy Balliller of 637 Boston Boulevard, Detroit, Michigan. He was driving Chetrolet coach, motor #A-364180, and he is employed by McKaskey Register Company of Alliance, Ohio. He is 6' in height, has blue eyes and brown hair and weighs approximately 200 pounds. Mr. Killer was very cooperative and accompanied Agent Holtz to the Birmingham office. A communication was later received by Agent Holtz from Mr. Miller, postmarked at Nashville, Tennessee, wherein the latter stated that he made inquiry in that city for the John of the Moran believed to have called at the Children's Hospital in Birmingham. He advised that there are two medical supply houses in Nashville, but that no one by the name of John Moran is employed by either. Agent Holtz was advised by the desk clerk at the Colonial Hotel that a stranger registered in room 311 as S. W. Bumpus resembled photographs of Moran, whereupon this party was immediately contacted by Special Agents J. S. Kavanaugh, Charles Holtz, and

L. B. Nichols. The exits from the hotel were guarded at the time by Agents P. C. Dunne and F. T. McIntyre. This person, from all appearances a bootlegger, bore no resemblance to Moran.

Agents Holtz and Overstreet canvassed all hospitals at

Birmingham, Alabama with negative results.

A check of all first class and second rate hotels by Special Agents W. E. Overstreet, H. E. Kriegel and Charles Holtz also failed to develop information of value.

A negative investigation was also conducted by Special Agent W. M. Sirene at Montgomery, Alabama.

The detailed memoranda submitted by the Agents mentioned in this report are not being incorporated, inasmuch as they were without results and contained nothing material to the investigation of this case. Such memoranda are being retained in the Birmingham file.

THE CHICAGO OFFICE, at Warrenville, Illinois, will conduct the necessary investigation in accordance with telegram of reference.

THE BUFFALO OFFICE, at Rochester, N. Y., will contact Boohn Surgical Company with a view to determining whether the salesman who sold a Mays Ophthalmoscope on April 4, 1933, to Dr. John B. Fitts, Medical Arts Building, Atlanta, Georgia, is Joseph P. Moran. lenta, Georgia, is Joseph P. Moran.

In the statement of Jesse Doyle, furnished to this Agent at Kansas City, Kansas on February 15, 1935, it will be noted that Doyle denied participation in and knowledge of the instant kidnaping, giving the explanation that he was not associated with the subjects in this case during that period. This statement is contained in the report of reference.

The evidence in this case at the present time indicating Jesse Doyle's close association with the Barker-Karpis gang is, in... the most part, his own admissions and, therefore, leads will be set out at the conclusion of this report requesting certain investigation to establish, by other witnesses, Doyle's connections with this mob. It will be noted from the information set forth hereinafter that subsequent to the kidnaping of Edward George Bremer, Doyle apparently was not associated with any members of the Barker-Karpis gang except Volney Davis, Edna Murray and Doris O'Connor.

Fred Barker was released from the Kansas State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, where he served a sentence of five to ten years for burglary. While in the penitentiary Jesse Doyle did several favors for Fred Barker, and when Barker left the penitentiary he told Jesse Doyle that he would watch the papers to see when Doyle would be released, after which he would meet him on that date in front of the Majestic Hotel in Kansas City, Mo.

May 31, 1931

June, 1931

Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis lived in Joplin, Mo., with Fred's mother, Kate Barker. This town is the home of Herbert A. Farmer, who is at present serving a two year sentence at Leavenworth, Kanse, for conspiracy to obstruct justice, in delivering a Federal prisoner, Frank Bash. Herbert A. Farmer and Fred Barker were closely associated prior to this time; in fact Farmer practically reared Fred. As a result of this association Fred Barker, as well as Alvin Karpis, mat and later became associated with Frenk Rash, Vernon CaMillar, Francis Keating, Thomas Holden, Harvey Bailery, Charlie Harmon, etc., all of whom had connections with Herbert A. Farmer.

June 10, 1931

Alvin Karpis and Fred Barker were arrested by the Tulsa, Okla. Police Dept. in Tulsa, Okla., for investigation for burglary of a car.

June 11, 1931

Alvin Kerpis and Fred Barker were delivered to the Police Dept. at Okmulgee, Okla., on a fugitive warrant for burglary. Fred Barker was shortly thereafter released.

September 10,1931

Alvin Karpis was sentenced to serve four years in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAllister, Oklass for the above crime. But was placed

PAROLE

October 12, 1931

A. W. Dunlop, alias George Anderson, the supposed husband of Kate Barker, rented a cottage lecated one and one-half miles from Thayer, Mo. Shortly thereafter Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis moved in with them. It will be noted that Alvin Karpis was apparently paroled from the Oklahoma State Penistentiary after serving only a few weeks of his sentence. The details and circumstances of Karpis release from the penitentiary are not reflected in the Chicago Bureau Office files.

December 18, 1931

Alvin Karpis and Fred Barker robbed a store in West Plains, Mo., using a 1931 model Desoto automobile in this robbery. When the police raided Dunlop's cottage, where Karpis and Barker were living, they found all of the merchandise which was taken from this store except fifty ties. December 19, 193

Alvin Karpis and Fred Barker drove into Davidson Motor Company Garage in West Plains, Mo., in a 1931 model DeSoto ear, which the Sheriff of West Plains, Mo., recognized as being identical with the car used in the store robbery the day pres vious. When Sheriff Kelly walked towards this sar to question the occupants thereof concerning the robbery, he was fired upon by them and subsequently died as a result of the wounds sustained. The eye witnesses to the shooting positively identified the photograph of Alvin Karpis as the person who fired at the Sheriff with a .45 calibre automatic pistol. The same witnesses positively identified the photograph of Fred Barker as the driver of the car and the man who fired at the Sheriff ... with a +38 calibre revolver. It appears that both of the murderers made their get-away immediately after the shooting.

December 19, 1931

Immediately after the murder of Sheriff Kelly Dunlop's house at Thayer, Mo., was raided and found to have been abandoned hurriedly. Letters found in the house indicated that Mrs. G. A. Barker, alias Mrs. Arrie Barker, for four years prior thereto resided at 401 Cincinnati Street. Tulsa, Okla., apparently owning this property. (See memorandum to Special Agent in Charge R. B. Nathan, Kansas City, Mo., dated June 8, 1934, submitted by Special Agent W. E. Miller in the case entitled CHARLES ARTHUR "PRETTY BOY" FLOYD with aliases, deceased; ET AL.)

December, 1931 to April 25, 1938 Kate Barker and A. W. Dumlop resided in a house at 1031 South Roberts Street, West St. Paul, Minney together with Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis. During this period Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis spent a good deal of time in the "joints" of Harry Sawyer and Jack Pfeiffer. According to Irene Goetz, a paramour of Fred Goetz, now deceased, she and Fred first met Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis in Jack Pfeiffer's place around this time.

- 4 -

April 25, 1952

The woman who rented the house at 1031 South Roberts Street, West St. Paul, Minn., to Kate Barker and 1. W. Dumlop became suspicious of these people and noticed that Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis would, when leaving the house and returning to it, each carry a violin case. The woman's son noticed previously the photographs of Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis in a detective magazine indicating that they were wanted for the murder of the Sheriff at West Plains, Mo. At about 1 A.M. on this date he reported this matter to Chief of Police Dahill and Chief Ine spector James Crumley of the St. Paul Police Dept. For some unexplained reason the police delayed going to the house to apprehend these people until about 8 4.M. that morning. At 7 A.M. Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis, Kate Barker and A.W. Dunlop had packed their belongings and left the house. On the following morning the body of A.W.Dunlop was found on the shores of Lake Frensted near Webster, Wis. It was stripped of clothing and showed that it had been shot three times at short range. Not far from the body there was found a blood-smeared woman's glove. It is the general contention that Dunlop was killed by Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis believing that he tipped them off to the police. (See the report of Special Agent J. D. Glass, St. Peul, Minn., dated Novems ber 1, 1932, in the case entitled FRANK NASH with aliases, Fugitive, I.O. 1156.)

May 12, 1952 to July 5, 1932 Kate Barker, Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis, during this period, resided at the Longfellow Apartments, 4804 Jefferson Street, Kansas City, Mo., under the name of Mrs. A. S. Hunter and two sons. Mrs. Juanita Baker, Manager, stated that these people had many visitors. (See the report of Special Agent R. J. Caffery, Kansas City, Mo., dated July 29, 1932.)

June 17, 1932

Jesse Doyle was released from the Kansas State.

Penitentiary at Lansing, Kans., where he served
a five to tem year sentence for burglary. He

proceeded to Kansas City, Mo. by street car and met Fred Barker in front of the Majestic Hotel as previously arranged. Fred gave Doyle \$400 to \$500 for clothes and other expenses, and them took him to his apartment. On this same night Jesse Doyle met the following individuals in Fred Barker's apartment: Francis Keating, Thomas Hollen, Harvey Bailey, Larry Duvol, Alvin Karpis, and Bernard Philips. They went into one room and later Doyle saw each one with a large quantity of money. In view of this he surmized that the above individuals were responsible for the Fort Scott, Kans. bank robbery which occurred on that day. (See Jesse Doyle's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Mo., dated February 21, 1935.)

The Fort Scott, Kans. bank was robbed and accordeding to Jesse Doyle the following men participated:

Fred Barker
Francis Keating
Thomas Holden
Harvey Bailey
Larry DuVol
Alvin Karpis
Bernard Philips

The split of the loot in this robbery was made in Fred Barker's apartment at the Longfellow Apartments, 4804 Jefferson Street, Kansas City, Mo. (See Jesse Doyle's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Mo., dated February 21, 1935.)

Kate Barker, Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis and possibly Jesse Doyle resided in Apartment 204 in the Villa Carmen Apartments, 414 West 46th Terrace, Kansas City, Mo., under the name of Mrs. A. F. Hunter and sons. The above persons left hurriedly at about 5:30 P.M. on July 7, 1932, leaving a fully cooked meal on the table. The condition of the apartment clearly indicated that they made a rapid departure. Mrs. Hildreth, the Manager, identified the photograph of Harvey Bailey as the person who assisted Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis

July 7, 1932

to move into the apartment. Larry Duvol was living in Apartment 205, which was across the hall from Barker's apartment during the period June 15, 1932 to July 7, 1932. (See the report of Special Agent R. J. Caffery, Kansas, Mose dated July 29, 1932.)

July 7, 1932

Contraction of the said

Thomas Holden, Francis Keating, Harvey Bailey Marge Keating, Lillian Holden and Winnie Williams were apprehended by Bureau Agents and the Kansas City Police on the Mesion Golf Course, Kansas City, Mo. It was reported that Bernard Philips was likewise on the course at this time but managed to escape. Keating and Holden were san caped Federal prisoners and accordingly were returned to Leavenworth Penitentiary to finish a twenty-five year sentence for mail robbery. There was found in the possession of Harvey Bailey a 3 bond identified as one taken in the loot of the Fort Scott, Kansas bank robbery, and in view of this he was removed to Fort Scott, Kansas, and subsequently tried and convicted for participas tion in this robbery. Lilliam Holden, Marge Keating and Winnie Williams were held for questioning by the Kansas City Police for a few days and then were released. Information has been reseived from numerous underworld sources that Bernard Philips was subsequently killed in gange lend fashion and his body was buried in an una identified grave.

July 9, 1932

Fred Barker, Kate Barker, Alvin Karpis and an uneidentified men, (possibly Jesse Doyle) rented a
house at Mahtomedic, a summer resort on White
Bear Lake, White Bear, Minn. They resided hers
under the name of Mrs. A. S. Hunter and her three
soms. Alvin Karpis paid Mr. Lambert, the Owner,
the sum of \$500 for three months' rental. [See
the report of Special Agent J. D. Glass, St.
Paul, Minn., dated November 1, 1932 in the case
entitled FRANK NASH with aliases, Fugitive, 1.0.

July. 1932

Helen Ferguson and Earl Christman, now deceased, moved to White Bear Lake and lived with Alvin Karpis, Fred Barker and Este Barker until about

August 1, 1932, when they proceeded to St. Paul,
Minne, and obtained an apartment at the Centrel
Park Apartments under the name of Mr. and Mrs.
R. S. Ferguson. According to the statement of
Helen Ferguson on or about July 23, 1932, Earl
Christman, Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis drove to
Concordia, Kans., and when they returned four or
five days later she noticed that each had a sone
siderable amount of money; that Christman had
about \$4,000.00. (See the report of Special Agent
R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ill., dated September 1,

July 26, 1932

The Cloud County Bank at Concordia, Kans., was robbed by possibly six men. Approximately \$240,000 in bonds and an indefinite amount of cash was taken. Miss Ida Cook, an employee of the bank, positively identified the photographs of Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis as two of the bandits, and it is believed that Larry Duvol, Jesse Doyle and Farl Christman were the other bandits. It is reported that the bonds, valued at \$240,000, were subsequently recovered, and that \$15,000 was paid for the return of them. (See the report of Special Agent R. C. Suran, Kansas City, Mo., dated January 22, 1934.)

August, 1938

It is reported that around the period that Fred
Barker and Alvin Karpis were living at White Bear
Lake they were associating with a criminal attorney,
J. Earl Smith of Tulsa, Okla. Subsequent to the
Fort Scott Bank robbery on June 17, 1932, Smith
was reported to have turned in two bonds, in the
denomination of \$1,000, to Fenner & Beane, Brokers,
in Tulsa, Okla., and that he received one hundred
shares of Continental Oil stock and the balance
in a check from the brokers. These bonds were
identified as part of the loot in the Fort Scott
Bank robbery. Smith, upon being questioned by
the authorities, edmitted that he received the
bonds from a third party who got them from Fred
Barker.

It is further reported that after Harvey Bailey was arrested in Kenses City, Mo. on July 5, 1932, J. Earl Smith was instructed to go to Fort Scott, Kenses, and represent Bailey, which he did. After Bailey was convicted and sentenced at Fort Scott Smith received a telephone call on the morning of August 13, 1932, presumably from Alvin Karpis, and received the instructions that he should mest Fred Barker in Tulsa, Okla, The next morning Smith's body was found bullet-riddled at the Indian Hills Country Club, fourteen miles north of Tulsa, Okla. It is the general contention that Smith was put on the spot by Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis for his dilatory tactics in his efforts to have Bailey released at Fort Scott, Kans. The fact that Smith revealed the association of Fred ... Barker with the stolen bonds of the Fort Scott Bank robbery, above mentioned, may also have had something to do with this killing. (See the report of Special Agent J. L. Fallon, Oklahoma City, Okla., dated December 19, 1932, in the case entitled FRANK NASH with aliases, Fugitive, I.O. 1156.)

August 14, 1932

Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis and Kate Barker, and possibly Jesse Boyle, vacated their house at white Bear Lake, Minn., and proceeded to St. Paul. According to Jesse Doyle they rented an apartment in the 900 block on Grand A enue.

September 20,1932

Arthur "Doc" Barker was released on a conditional pardon from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAllister, Okla. It is reported that a large sum of money was paid by Fred Barker to Jack Glynn, a private detective at Leavenworth, Kans. and Attorney Lester of Tulsa, Okla., to effect his brother's release. According to Jesse Doyle "Doc" Barker first went to visit his father at Neosha, Mo., and then proceeded to St. Paul, Minn., where he lived with them, his mother and the boys, in their apartment on Grand Avenue.

November 5, 1932

Volney Davis was given a leave of absence from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary at McAllister, Okla. This leave was to expire on June 30, 1935, but on that date the leave was extended to July 1, 1934. He is now considered a parole violator. Volney Davis and "Dos" Barker were sentenced on the same charge to life imprisonment for the sureder of a night watchman. According to Jesse Doyle Volney Davis, upon his release from the penitentiary, proceeded to St. Paul, Minne, and shortly thereafter he accompanied Kate Barker on a visit to her sister in California.

November, 1938 to December, 1932 Fred Barker, "Doc" Barker, Alvin Karpis and Jesse Doyle were residing at the Twin Oaks, or Three Oaks, Apartments, possibly located at Cleveland and Marshal Street, St. Paul, Minn. Larry DuVol and Harry Hull, former members of this gang, were residing at this time at 906 or 926 Grand Avenue, St. Paul, Minn.

December 16, 1938

The Third Northwestern Bank of Minneapolis was robbed and according to Jesse Doyle six men participated in this robbery, besides himself:

Fred Barker
"Doc" Barker
Larry DuVol
Alvin Karpis
Bill Weaver
Werne Miller
Jesse Doyle

In this robbery two Minneapolis Police Officers were killed by machine gun bullets. Jesse Doyle advised that Larry DuVol fired the shots. However Harry Rull advised that Fred Barker did the shooting in this instance. The loot taken in the robbery, \$15,000 was divided in seven parts in the apartment of Larry DuVol at 906 or 925 Grand Apenue, St. Paul. According to Harry Hull, after the gang made their get—away from the mink they drove to St. Paul, Minn. in two cars. At Coma Park in St.Paul, one of the cars had a flat tire, which necessitated the changing of automobiles. During the progress of changing cars some

eitizen in an automobile drove past them and tried to see their license number. "Doc" Barker noted this and shot this man in the head with a machine gun. (See the report of Special Agent 7. V. Murphy, San Antonio, Tex., dated March 28,1934, and Jesse Doyle's statement in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Mos, dated February 21, 1935.)

December 21, 1932

Larry DuVol was arrested in his apartment while drunk, and there was found some \$16,000 to \$17,000 on him, which was identified as part of the loot of the Third Northwestern Bank robbery. He refused to name his companions in this crime and pleaded guilty. He is now serving a life sentence in the Minnesota State Penitentiary at Stillwater, Minnesota for this robbary.

December 22, 1932

Immediately after Harry Hull learned of DuVol's arrest he notified Fred Barker, after which Fred Barker, "Doc" Barker, Alvin Karpis, Jesse Doyle, William Weaver and Harry Hull hurriedly left St. Paul and proceeded to Reno, Neve, Earl Christman and Helen Ferguson already were in Reno, Neve, at this time, having gone there a month previous. Kate Barker and Volney Davis also were in Reno when the above mentioned persons arrived. (See the report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, San Antonio, Tex., dated March 28, 1934.)

December 25, 1932

Alvin Karpis, under the name of E. L. Burns, rented an apartment in the Alvada Apartments, 328 Flint Street, Reno, Nev. The Manager, C. Washith stated that Alvin Karpis lived here alone, but had numerous male visitors. (See the report of A. R. Gere, Salt Lake City, Utah, dated March 22, 1934). Jesse Doyle and Harry Hull registered at the Anderson Hotel, probably under the name of E. A. Connley. They remained at this hotel for two or three days, and then obtained an apartment at the Gibson Apartments located on 2nd Street and Stevenson Street, Reno, Nev. (See the report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, San Antonio, Texe dated March 28, 1934.)

Fred Barker, "Doc" Barker, Kate Barker, and possionally Volney Davis, rented a home at 130 West Pueblo Street, Remo, Nev. They lived at this place for two months, and according to Mrs. Madden, 150 West Pueblo Street, these people had numerous visitors. (See the report of Special Agent in Charge R. K. Vetterli, Salt Lake City, Utah, dated April 5, 1934)

While in Reno, Nev. Harry Hull stole about \$250} and some clothes from Jesse Doyle; Doyle anticipated that Hull would go to Kansas City, Moto and in this connection "Doc" Barker and Doyle propeeded to that city by plane in an effort to find . him. Upon leaving Reno, Nev. Volney Davis gave "Doc" Barker a message for Volney's girl friend, Mina Murray. While making inquiries at various places in Kansas City in an effort to find Harry Hull, Jesse Doyle and "Doc" Barker met Barl Doyle, who was operating a beer joint in Kansas City. Jesse and Earl Doyle are not related. According to Jesse, Earl Doyle took him and "Doc" Barker to Edna's apartment in Kansas City, where she was living with her sister, Doris O'Connell, alias Doris O'Connor. Jesse began courting Doris and when he left Kansas City at this time he told her that he would return soon for here [See Jesse Doyle's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Mose dated February 21, 1935

February 1, 1933 to February 6, 1933 Alvin Karpis and Fred Barker resided at the Casa del Vallejo Hotel, Vallejo, Calif., under the names of E. L. Burns and C. W. Davis respectivedly. Alvin Karpis had his tonsils removed at the Vallejo General Hospital during this period. (See the report of Special Agent W. R. Ramsey, Jr., San Francisco, Calif., dated April 2, 1934.)

February 8, 1933

"Dog" Barker as R. E. Davis, Volney Davis as E. Vo Davis, and Kate Barker checked in the Casa del Vallejo Hotel, Vallejo, Calif., and stayed there one night.

February 9, 1935

Alvin Karpis as E. L. Burns and Fred Barker as C. W. Davis remained at this hotel for one night. February 20, 1955

Fred Barker rented Apartment 106 at 1290 Gm ns Avenue, St. Paul, Minns, under the name of C. E. Moors. "Doc"Barker and Jesse Doyle subsequently moved in with hims Mr. Parnell, the Janitor at this address, identified the photographs of "Doc"Barker and Verne Miller as individuals who went in and out of this apartments (See the report of Special Agent O. G. Hally St. Paul, Minns, dated March 7, 1934s)

February 27, 1955

Alvin Karpis rented Apartment 502 at 1280 Grand Avenue, St. Paul, Minn., under the name of Edward L. Burns. Mr. Parnell identified the photograph of Alvin Karpis as the man living in this apartment. (See the report of Special Agent C. G. Hall, St. Paul, Minn., dated March 7, 1934.)

Volney Davis rented Apartment 102 at 1280 Grand Avenue, St. Paul, Minn., under the name of JaH. Lockwood. Volney Davis was identified by Mr. Parnel as the person seen going in and out of this apartment. (See the report of Special Agent O. G. Hall, St. Paul, Minn., dated March 7,1934.)

March 4, 1935

The above individuals hurriedly vacated their apartments upon being tipped off that the police were going to raid theme

Mr. Parnell, the Janitor, advised that on the night of Earch 4, 1933, he observed several automobiles in the alley of the building, and obe served considerable moving in and out and back and forth between the buildings. He recognized some of the cars and men as being those visiting the above mentioned apertments, and immediately surmized that something was up, and that the gang was preparing to make a get-away. He immediately telephoned Lt. Talbot of the St. Paul Police Dept. concerning his suspicions of the gang at his home. Lt. Talbot stated the he would arrange to have his squad car sent out. According to Mr. Parnell, six detectives, whose names he could not furnish, came to his apartment while the gang

was still in the process of moving out. The ofeficers made no effort to stop them, but merely a seated themselves confortably in his apartment. One of the officers exhibited a photograph to Mr. and Mrs. Parnell, which they partially idene tified as being that of one of the persons seen by them entering the apartments in question. The officers explained to Mr. Parnell that he need of the not worry about this fellow as he had a nice wife and daughter, and ran a place on Wabasha Street in St. Paul, where the officers went to drink, and where they were treated fine. Mr. Parnell further stated that the police officers spent considerable time in his apartment on this particular evening, while these people were moving out; and when Krae Parnell urged them to do something the officers 3 merely looked at one another and winked; that the officers left the apartment after the gang had if left and went over to the apartments across the street, but did not conduct any raid.

Concerning the above, Jesse Doyle stated that about a week after he, Fred and "Doc" Barker are rived in St. Paul, Minn, from Reno, Nev., he came home one night alone from a movie; that he observed Gladys Sawyer, the wife of Harry Sawyers sitting in her car in front of the building at this address. She asked where Fred and Alvin & were, and when he told her he did not know, she stated that he had better look for them, as she had received information that the police were going to raid their apartment in the morning Doyle went downtown to look for Fred and Alving but could not find them. When he returned Gladys Sawyer was still in front of the building, and at this time said that Fred Barker and Karpis had been there and were already gone; that they would meet him in the joint, meaning Harry Sawyer's place on Wabasha Street. (See the report of Special Agent O. G. Hall, St. Paul, Minn., dated March 7, 1934, and Jesse Doyle's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Mo., dated February 21, 1935.)

Merch 14, 1955

Around this time Fred Barker, "Doc" Barker, Jesse Doyle, Alvin Karpis, Volney Davis, Kate Barker, Earl Christman and Helen Ferguson proceeded to Fox River Grove, Illinois, and went to live at Louis Cernocky's place, a rendezvous for notorious criminals. It is believed that Frank Nash directed them to this place, as he and his wife, Frances, were living with Louis Cernocky when the above named persons arrived there. Subsequently this gang met Eddie and Bessie Green at this place. (See Jesse Doyle's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Mo., dated February 21, 1935.)

March 16, 1933

Prances Nash assested Kate Barker in renting an apartment at the Home Apartments, 114 Home Ap

March 18, 1933

Helen Ferguson rented an apartment at the Home Apartments, 114 Home Avenue, Oak Park, Illesshe lived herewith her husband Earl Christman until April, 1933, at which time he was killed in the Fairbury, Nebre Bank robbery.

March 22, 1933

Jesse Doyle rented Apartment 201 at the Relmar Apartments, 2036 South 5th Arenue, Maywood, Ille, under the name of E. A. Conniey.

According to Edna Murray, when Jesse Doyle was in Kansas City shortly subsequent to this date, he advised her sister, Doris O'Connor, that he had rented an apartment in Maywood, Ill. She consented to live with him as man and wife, whereupon Doyle instructed her and Edna to drive to this apartment in Maywood in his Nash automobile and live at this apartment until he returned; that a few days after their arrival in Maywood Jesse Doyle and Volney Davis arrived; that the four then lived at this address for about three or four weeks. (See Edna Murray's statement contained in the Report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Mo., dated February 21, 1935.)

March 23, 1933

Alvin Karpis rented an apartment at 219 North
Second Avenue, Maywood, Ille, under the name;
of Dawson, paying a month's rent in advance, but
left before the month was up. Mrs. Dillon, the
Manager at this address, advised that after
Dawson departed he sent an Italian to the apartement for his baggage. She further stated that
Dawson advised her, when he first came to the
apartment, that he was waiting for his wife and
mother to come to Chicago from California.

(See page 41, report of Special Agent R. C. Suran,
Chicago, Ille, dated September 22, 1934e)

March and April,

During this period the entire gang frequented.

Louis Cernocky's place in Fox River Grove, Ill.,
almost daily. Jesse Doyle advised that he lived
at this place for over a week before he rented
an apartment at the Relmar Apartments in Maywood,
Ill. Frank Nash and his wife, Frances, were also
living at Louis Cernocky's place at this time.
Eddie and Bessie Green frequented Louis' place
occasionally during this period. Eddie Green was
considered an excellent bank robber, and the gang
readily enlisted him in their crowd. Verne Miller

to Kansas City, Mo. two or three days in advance
of this robbery, and rented a furnished apertment

that "Doc" Barker and Volney Davis made the are
rengements for this apartment; that Earl Christman

was wounded on this job, and that Volney Davis aparently remained in Kansas City, Mo. to take care
of him. According to the information received

from Vi Mathis, the paramour of Verne Miller, Earl

Christman was brought to her home at 6612 Edgvale Avenue, Kensas City, by Fred Barker and Alvia Karpis; that Earl appeared to be badly wounded and died a few days later; that Fred and "Doc" Barker buried him in an unidentified grave.

Doyle further related that he, follow Davis and "Doo" Barker returned to their apartment in Kansas City, Mo, immediately after the robbery, after which Fred instructed "Doc" Barker and him to return to Chicago (doubtful). However, "Doc" wanted to see Harry Sawyer, and as a consequence Doyle and "Doc" Barker proceeded to St. Paul, Minn, by train and contacted Harry Sawyer at his saloent that they only remained there a fet hours, after which a fellow named Tom, who worked for Harry Sawyer, drove "Doc" and Jesse to Louis Cernocky's place in Fox River Grove, Ill. (This person "Tom" is undoubtedly Tommy Gannon.) (See the states ment of Jesse Doyle contained in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shenahan, Kansas City, Mo., dated February 21, 1935.

With reference to the above trip to St. Paul.
Minn., undertaken by "Doc" Barker and Jesse Doyle.
It was noted that, without previous reference to
this trip Bessie Green stated that the loot taken
in the robbery at Fairbury, Nebr. was taken to St.
Paul and turned over to Harry Sawyer, who disposed
of it through an individual by the name of Sam Taran.

April 5, 1933

Vivian Mathis telephoned Paula Harmon at Beaumont,
Tex. from Kanses City, Mo. asking that the latter
visit her. Paula immediately proceeded to Kansas
City, No. and went to 6612 Edgvale Avenue, Kansas
City, where Vi Mathis and Verne Miller were living.
She remained here for about two weeks and during
this period she saw Fred Barker on several occasions.
She also met "Doc" Barker and Volney Davis at this
address on a few instances during this period.
(See Paula Harmon's statement contained in the report
of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ill., dated
October 1, 1934.)

April 15, 1935

Alvin Karpis apparently moved from 219 North Second Avenue, Maywood, Ill. around this dates. The file reflects that he moved to Oak Park, Ill., address unknown, where he began to live with Dolores Delamey as man and wife.

April 25, 1935

Volney Davis and Edna Murray rented a three-room furnished apartment at 219 North Second Avenue, Maywood, Ille, under the name of E. V. Davise, Mrs. Dillon, the Manager, advised that she rescalled that Davis and his wife attended the Kentucky Derby in May; that shortly after their return Mrs. Davis informed her that she was going to Kansas to get her son and thereafter returned to the apartment with a boy. (See the report of Special Agent E. C. Suran, Chicago, Ille, dated September 22, 1934.)

April and May_s 1933 During these two months the Barker-Karpis gang were at Louis Cernocky's place in Fox River Grove almost deily. Edna Murray, Jesse Doyle, Helen Ferguson, Frances Nash and Vi Mathis all furnished information to this effect. These individuals also advised that Louis "Doc" Stacey was a frequent visitor at Louis' place, and that he appeared to be very friendly with the boys.

May 29, 1935

Paula Earmon and Fred Barker rented a home at 204.

Wernon Avenue, St. Paul, Minn., under the name of Mr. and Mrs. J. Stanley Smith, paying a rental of 645.00 a month. Mr. and Mrs. J. P. McLaren, owners, positively identified the photograph of Paula Harmon as the woman who rented the house. They also identified the photographs of Alvin Karpis, "Doe" Barker, Frank Nash and Frances Nash as visitors in this house. (See the report of Special Agent 0.63 Hall, St. Paul, Minn., dated July 27, 1933, in the case entitled Charles Arthur "Pretty Boy" FLOYD with aliases, deceased; ET IL.

Concerning the above, Paula Harmon stated that Fred and "Doc" Barker lived with her at this address; that Fred Goetz, Alvin Karpis, Russell Gibson, William Weaver, Volney Davis, Verne Miller, Frank Nash and Frances Nash visited them on variousoccasions during the period May 29 to June 20, 1933.

Latent fingerprint of Frank Mash was found on a Baccasar beer bottle after the police raided this home on June 20; 1935. (See the report of Sprint Agent 0. G. Hell, St. Faul, Einn., dated July 27; 1935 in the case entitled CHARLES ARTHUR "FRETTY BOY" FLOYD, with aliases, deceased; ET AL.)

Alvin Karpis rented and lived in a house on White Bear Lake during this month. According to Paula Harmon she proceeded to this cottage with Jack Pfeiffer, owner of the Hollyhocks Inn in St. Paula and to remained there ever night; that Alvin Karpis had a Japanese servant. (See the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ille, dated October 1.

The State Bank of Ihlen, Minn, was robbed on this date. The Identification Order on Subject Karpis reflects that he is wanted by the Sheriff's Office at Pipestone, Minn, for this robbery.

William A. Hann, Jr. was kidnaped at St. Faul, Winne, and held for \$100,000 ransom.

William 1. Hemm, Jr., was released by his kidnapers after a ransom payment of \$100,000.

The St. Paul Police Dept. raided the premises at 204 Vernon A. enue, St. Paul, upon information furnished by the St. Paul Dispatch, a newspaper, to the efect that suspiciouspersons had been occupying the above premises for a short period prior and during the Hamm kidnaping. (See the report of Special Agent O. G. Hall, St. Paul, Minn, dated July 27, 1933 in the case entitled CHARLES ARTHUR "PRETTY BOY" FLOYD with aliases, deceased; ET AL.)

In connection with the above, Paula Harmon advised, that about midnight on June 19, 1935, Jack Pfeiffer, owner of the Hollyhocks Inn, came to 204 Vernon Ave., and told her that she had better move; that Jack Pfeiffer assisted her in moving her belongings from this address and took her to a cottage on White Bear Lake, which she believed was rented by Alvin Karpis. (See Paula Harmon's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ill., dated September 22, 1934.)

Paula Harmon edvised that on July 4, 1955, while at this cottage they were visited by Charles J. Fitzgerald, alias Old Charlies. Fred Goets and Byron Bolton, alias Monty Carter. At other times they were visited by "Doc" Barker, Alvin Karpis and Russell Gibson. (See Paula Harmon's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ill., dated September 22, 1934.)

July, 1933

fround this time Alvin Karpis and Dolores Delaney rented the summer home of Edward Konvalinka at Long Beach, Ind., on Lake Michigan. According to Irene Dorsey, the paramour of Fred Goetz, Goetz acquainted Karpis with Konvalinka during the Spring of 1933, which subsequently lead to Konvalinka renting his summer home to Alvin Karpis. Irene further advised that she and Fred Goetz visited Karpis and Dolores Delaney on numerous occasions while they were residing at this summer home; that Byron Bolton, alias Monty Carter, also visited Alvis and Dolores. (See the report of Special Agent Jalandala, Chicago, Ill., dated Gotober 30, 1934.)

Paula Harmon mentioned in her statement that she and Fred Barker had originally planned to live with Alvin Karpis and Dolores Delaney at Konvalinka's summer home, but due to some misunderstanding they did not follow out this plan, but instead rented a cottage at Long Lake, Ill. However, Paula advised that Fred Barker and she visited Karpis and Dolores at the above summer home on numerous occasions during the summer of 1933. (See Paula Barmon's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ill., dated September 22, 1934.)

NOTE: It might be stated that Fred Goetz and Irene Dorsey were living at 308 Walnut Street, Elmhurst, Ill., from the Spring of 1932 to August 14, 1933. It was also established that Byron Bolton, alias Monty Carter, and

his wife and children were residing at 264 Ridgeland Avenue, Elmhurst, Ill., during this period and up to August 14, 1933.

July 5, 1933

Volney Davis and Edna Murray moved from the Eleanor-Manor Apartments, 7150 Cyril Pkwy, Chicago, Illi, after which they went to live with Fred Barker and Paula Harmon at their cottage at Long Lake, Illi, (See Edna Murray's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Moundated February 21, 1935.)

August, 1935

In Jesse Doyle's statement he stated that he, Doris O'Connor and Eddie and Bessie Green were living in a cottage on Three Lakes near Crosby, Minn.; that prior to residing at this place Doris and he stayed at the St. Paul Hotel under the name of E. A. Connley for a few days; that they were not visited by anyone, particularly members of the Barker-Karpis gang while living at this cottage. (See Jesse Doyle's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Mo., dated February 21, 1935.)

August 14, 1933

Fred Goetz and Irene Dorsey, and Mr. and Trs. Byron
Bolton moved from Elmhurst, Ill. Fred and Irene
rented an unfurnished apartment at 1934 West Carfield
Blwd., Chicago, Ill., where they resided up until
February 1, 1934, at which time they moved to 7827 South
Shore Drive, Chicago, Ill. They lived at the latter
address until the date of Fred Goetz' assassination
which was on March 21, 1934. Byron Bolton and his
wife, upon leaving Elmhurst, Ill., went to live at
the Wilmington Hotel, Chicago, Ill., and resided there
for approximately three weeks, after which Bolton and
his wife and children moved to Phoenix, Arize, on account of Bolton's health.

Irene Dorsey advised that while they were living at 1934 West Carfield Blvd.; Chicago, Willie Harrison lived with them for approximately three weeks during December, 1933, and January, 1934; that while at this address they were visited on a few occasions by Alvin Karpis, Volney Davis, as well as Byron Bolton. (See the report of Special Agent J. L. Madala, Chicago, Ill., dated October 30, 1934.)

August 30, 193

On this date six bandits staged a payroll robbery at South St. Faul, Linn., in which \$30,000 was taken and two police officers were shot. During the course of this robbery a Thompson sub-machine gun was taken by one of the bandits from Officer Yeoman. It was subsequently determined that the machine gun taken from the apartment of "Doc" Barker, at 432 Surf Street, Chicago, Ill., by Bureau Agents on January 8, 1935, was identical with the weapon taken from Officer Yeoman at the time of the robbery.

Bessie Green, the consort of Eddie Green, now decessed, advised that this robbery was committed by the Barker-Karpis gang, and her husband, Eddie Green.

It will be noted that a get-away chart was recovered in Cleveland, Chic, at the time Paula Harmon, Cladys Sawyer and Wynona Burdette were taken into custody. Investigation disclosed that this chart began at Zero at the Stock Yards National Bank at Concord Street, South St. Paul, Kinn, and following this map for a distance of approximately fifteen miles out of the city, it was found to be approximately in accord with regard to speedometer readings and marketings.

September 1, 1933

In the statement of Jesse Doyle it is reported that Eddie and Bessie Green and Doris "Connor and Doyle left Three Lakes near Crosby, Minn., and rented a cotage on a lake approximately twenty-five miles south of Minneapolis, Minn., (probably White Bear Lake). They remained at this cottage for about thirty days.

September 18, 1933

Kate Barker and Fred Barker rented an unfurnished apartment at 2644 East 73rd Street, Chicago, Illeguader the name of Mrs. F. E. anderson. She occupied under the name of Mrs. F. E. anderson. She occupied this apartment until October 1, 1933, and then this apartment until October 1, 1933, and then moved to an apartment at 7269 South Shore Drive, moved to an apartment at 7269 South Shore Drive, which apartment was located in the same building. (See the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ill., dated October 17, 1934.)

Gladys Sawyer, the wife of Harry Sawyer, mentioned in her statement that she and Harry were in Chicago

around this period and that she assisted Mrs.

Kate Barker in buying her furniture. (See the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ille, dated September 22, 1934.)

September 22, 195

Two bank messengers were held up by five man at Jackson Blvd. and Clark Street, Chicago, Ille, and from them were seized two sacks of registered mail. The bandits made their escape in a Hudson automobile and at Jackson Blvd. and Halsted Street, Chicago, they collided with another sar and overturned. When Chicago Police Officer Miles A. Cunningham approached their car to question them about the accident, he was fired upon by the bandits with a machine gun and was instantly killed. The bandits escaped after commandeering another automobile.

commandeering another automobile.

Concerning the above, Trene Dorsey, the common law wife of Fred Goetz, advised that she believed that Fred Goetz and possibly Harry Sawyer were two of the participants in this crime; that Goetz-and Sawyer left her house together at 1934 West Garfield Blvd. that evening; that she later heard Fred Goetz make the remark that they did not receive anything of value, making reference to this robbery. It will be noted from the information available that Fred Barker, "Doc" Barker and Alvin Karpis were in Chicago, Ille around this date and it is possible that they likewise participated in this robbery and killering.

September 25,1935

Around this period William Weaver resided at 777
Selby Avenue, St. Paul, Minn. and lived there
until shortly prior to the Bremer kidnaping.
Harry Miller, confidential informant for the
St. Paul Office, advised that Myrtle Eaton never
lived with Weaver at this apartment but would
perhaps spend a night or two there. He also ade
vised that about three or four weeks before the
instant kidnaping, three fellows, whom he believed
were from Chicago, occupied Weaver's apartment
while the latter was away; that they were observed to be dressed in high top shoes and were

carrying surveyors instruments. On the evening of the day that Bremer was kidnaped these three men moved out of Weaver's flat. Harry Miller could not make any photographic identifications at the time he was interviewed. (See the report of Special Agent D. L. Nicholson, St. Paul, Minni, dated July 12, 1934.)

It was determined that around this period Myrtle Eaton was living at 565 Portland Avenue, St. Paul, Minn. Andy Rothmeyer, informant and personal friend of Victim Bremer, indicated that William Weaver began living with Myrtle Eaton at this address around December, 1933; that prior to this time he was living with Myrtle Eaton at this address.

Harry Miller, informed that he frequently saw-Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis at Myrtle Eaton's apartment around supper time.

Dr. Henry H. Hall and Elss Kaether, nurse, who treated Myrtle Eaton for injuries sustained in an automobile accident, identified the photographs of "Doc" Barker, Kate Barker and Bill Weaver as visitors of Myrtle Eaton at 565 Portal and Avenue, St. Paul. (See the report of Special Agent D. L. Nicholson, St. Paul, Minn., dated July 12, 1934.)

Wynona Burdette in her statement mentioned that on September 30, 1933 Harry Campbell, "Doc" - Barker and she proceeded to St. Paul, Minne from Hammond, Ind., and went to live for a short time with Myrtle Eaton and Bill Weaver at the Portland Avanue address; that they resided at this place for about three or four days, after which she end Harry Campbell rented a separate apartment for themselves. (See Wynona Burdette's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ill., dated September 22, 1934.)

September 29, 1935 Tynona Burdette arrived at Hammond, Ind. from Texas and registered at the Savoy Eotel in Hemmond under the name of Mrs. Willis Harrison, At this time she met for the first time Fred and "Doc" Barker and Willie Harrison, who were at the Savoy Hotel with Harry Campbell when she arrived there. (See Wynona Burdette's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ill., dated September 22, 1934.)

Jesse Doyle, Doris Gronnor, Eddie and Bessie Green left Thite Bear Lake and proceeded to Minneapolis, Minney where Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor rented an apertment at the Whiteside Am riments on Gerard Street under the name of Mr. and Tra. E. A. Connley.

Eddie and Bessie Green, according to Doyle, rented a furnished apartment at 5300 Fremont Street, Minneapolis, Minne

In Doyle's statement it is mentioned that he frequented Harry Sawyer's place on numerous com casions while in St. Paul during this period; that shortly after Thanksgiving in 1935, Volney was Davis and Edna Murray lived with Doyle and Doris O'Connor for a few days; that on two occasions Fred Barker came to see Doyle at this address; further, that Myrtle Eaton and Bill Weaver also visited Jesse and Doris on numerous occasions during this period. (See Jesse Doyle's statee) ment contained in the report of Special agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Mo., dated Faber ruary 21, 1935.

Fred Barker, Paula Harmon, Harry Campbell, Wynona Burdette and "Doc" Barker were enroute from Minneapolis, Minn, to Reno, Mey.

Harry Campbell and Wyhona Burdette rented Apartment 240-1 at the Hiland Apartments, 234 West Liberty Street, und der the name of Mr. and Mrs. George L. Marting They left this address on or about December 30-1933. (See the report of Special Agent 1, B. Gere, Salt Lake City, Utah, dated March 22,1934.)

October 25 to 27,

Dolores Delaney and Paula Harmon resided at the William Taylor Hotel, San Francisco, Calif., under the names of Mrs. William Lohman and Mrs. T. C. Blackburn, respectively. (See the report of Special Agent W. R. Ramsey, Jr., San Fm neisco, Calif., dated April 2, 1954.)

November 2, 1935

Fred Barker and Paula Harmon moved from the Hiland Apartments, 234 West Liberty Street, Remo. Nev. to the Belmont Apartments, 400 Belmont Hoad, Reno, Nev., where they occupied Apartment 48. Miss Emma Wray, Maid, who identified their photographs, advised that they left on er about December 2, 1933. (See the Report of Special Agent in Charge R. E. Vetterli, Salt Lake City, Utah, dated April 3, 1934.)

Alvin Karpis and Dolores Delaney rented a funnished apartment at/Elvada apartments, 328 Flint Street, Reno, Nev., under the name of E. L. Burns and wife. They likewise moved out on or about December 2, 1935. (See the report of Special Agent in Charge R. E. Vetterli, Salt Lake City, Utah, dated April 3, 1934.)

In the statement of Edna Murray reference is made to the effect that Volney Davis and Edna Murray likewise lived in Reno, Nev. during this period. However, the file does not reflect at what address these two individuals resided.

December 2, 1935

All of the above named individuals departed from Reno, Nev. on or about this date and proceeded direct to St. Paul, Minn, except Alvin Karpis and Dolores Delaney who travelled direct to Chicago,

Harry Campbell and Wynona Burdette rented an apartment in an apartment hotel near the downstown district of St. Paul, Minn. The files in this case do not reflect the address at which they were living. (See Wynona Burdette's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Illi, dated September 22, 1934.)

Edna Murray and Volney Davis rented a furnished apartment in St. Paul, Minn., and according to recent information received from the United States Attorney, St. Paul, it is believed that these individuals resided at the Edgecombe Apartments located at the corner of Osceola and Lexington Avenue, St. Paul, Finn. until the middle of January, 1934.

December 5, 1935

Alvin Karpis and Dolores Delaney registered at the Orlando Hotel in Chicago, Ill. under the name of Mr. and Mrs. William Lohman. They resided at this hotel until on or about December 15, 1933, when they moved to 7133 Yates Avenue, Chicago. They lived at this latter address until the early part of April, 1934. (See the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Chicago, Ill., dated May 24, 1934.)

(See Jesse Doyle's statement contained in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Mo., dated February 21, 1935.

Edward G. Bremer, Victim was kidnaped at about 8:30 A.M. in St. Paul, Minn.

January 18, 1934

Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor and Eddie and

under the name of K. A. Connley for approximately
three weeks, after which he and Doris went to
Cardin, Oklahoma, and lived with Doris' parents.

February 7, 1934

Edward George Bremer was released by his abductors after a ransom payment of \$200,000.00.

February to April. Boris O'Connor and Jesse Doyle resided with Mott Stanley, a brother of Doris O'Connor, at Cardin, Oklahoma during this period;

May and June, 1934 Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor, around the latter part of May, proceeded to Aurora, Illinois at the request of Edna Murray, paramour of Volney Davis, and sister of Doris O'Connor. According to Jesse Doyle they resided at the Riverside Hotel in Aurora under the name of E. A. Connley for two . weeks, after which they rented a sleeping room at the residence of Frank Burkell, address unknown, in Aurora, where they resided for about one month.

August, 1934 to January, 1935

Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor were residing at 4112 Locuste Street, Kansas City, Missouri, under the name of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Connley.

In Edna Murray's signed statement it is reflected that she and Volney Davis lived with Jesse Doyles and Doris O'Connor at the above address for three or four days, after which they rented an apartment at the Zelda Apartments, 3213 Broadway Avenue, 3555 Kensas City, Missouri.

Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor resided at 23 Warner Plaza, Kansas City, Missouri, under the name of J. C. Stacey. During this period Volney Davis and Edna Murray were living at 3028 Baltimore Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, under the name of G. L. Harper,

Jesse Doyle was taken into custody at Girard, Kansas. February 7, 1935

The information subsequent to the date of the kidneping set out above was taken from the signed statements of Jesse Doyle and Edna

As stated at the beginning of this report Jesse Doyle's association with the Barker-Karpis gang was principally established by his own admissions. Other evidence in this connection was furnished by Mrs. Frances Nash in a signed statement to Special Agent R. C. Suran dated at Chicago, Illinois October 5, 1934. In this statement she positively identified the photograph of Jesse Doyle as a member of the Barker-Karpis crowd who visited Louis Cernocky's Place in Fox River Grove, Illinois during the spring of 1935. Frances Nash is at present residing at Aurora, Minnesota as Mrs. Frances Miller,

Paula Harmon, in a signed statement to Special Agent R. B.
Brown, dated at Chicago, Illinois September 22, 1934, provided information to the effect that members of the Barker-Karpis gang, mamely, Fred Barker, Arthur "Doc" Barker, Alvin Karpis, William Weaver, Volney Davis and Harry Campbell, had numerous meetings in Myrtle Raton's apartment at 565 Portland Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota, from January 1, 1934 to January 17, 1934, at which time these meetings were attended by Jesse Doyle and Eddie Green. She could not state, however, whether Doyle and Green were connected with this tase. The files in the Chicago Bureau Office reflect that Paula Harmon is at present confined in the Texas State Insane Asylum at Rush, Texas.

Edna Murray, a defendant in this case, stated in a signed statement to this agent, dated at Kansas City, Kansas February 12, 1935, that she first met Jesse Doyle in March of 1933 at Kansas City, Missouri; that at that time she was living with her sister, Doris O'Connon at Kansas City, and on the above occasion Doyle was accompanied by Volney Davis and Arthur "Doc" Barker; that shortly thereafter, at Doyle's suggestion, she and Doris proceeded to Maywood, Illinois after which she and Volney Davis lived with Doris and Jesse in an apartment in Maywood for approximately three weeks; that during this period and subsequent thereto Jesse Doyle, Doris O'Connor, Volney Davis and she made frequent visits to Louie Cernocky's Place in Fox River Grove, Illinois, and associated with Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis, Arthur "Doc" Barker, Kate Barker, Frank Nash, Verne Miller, Earl Christman and Louis "Doc" Stacci. Also, during this period Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor were in the constant company of Volney Davis and herself.

Edna Murray further advised that while Jesse Doyle and her sister were residing in Minneapolis, Minnesota during the fell and winter

of 1933 she lived with them for a short time on or about October 1; 1933, as did Volney Davis. In May or June of 1934 while in Oklahoma Edna Murray, together with Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor, proceeded to Aurora, Illinois in Jesse Doyle's automobile, and Doris and Jesse rented an apartment at the same residence where Bill Weaver and Myrtle Eaton previously lived in Aurora. Edna Murray's statement further reflects that in October, 1934 Volney Davis and she lived with Doris O'Connor and Jesse Doyle in Kansas City for approximately one week; that during this time and subsequent thereto Volney Davis was closely associated with Jesse Doyle, until Doyle's apprehension on February 7, 1935.

and who in the past has furnished valuable information to this office concerning the activities at with the Louis's Place, was interviewed by the writer on March 7, 1935. A photograph of Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor was exhibited to her and she, without any hesitancy, identified them as two persons known to her as Jesse and Doris who frequented Louie's Place on numerous occasions during the spring of 1933. In this connection she advised that Doris and Jesse often came to Louie's Place with two young boys who she believed were Doris' sons; that she was made to understand that these boys were attending a military academy in the West and that they were in Chicago on a visit to the World's Fair. She stated that these boys on numerous occasions would come to Louis's Place dressed in military garb and oftentimes they conversed with her concerning their work at the military academy. advised that both Doris and Jesse appeared to be very friendly with Fred Barker, Frank Nash, Eddie Green, "Doc" Barker, Alvin Karpis, Verne Miller, Volney Davis and Helen Ferguson; that as she recalls the above-mentioned individuals would, on each Sunday, come to Louis's Place and have dinner together at one table Doris and Jesse were particularly friendly with persons known to her as "Rabbits" and "Cotton", whom she identifies as Edna Murray and Volney Davis, and that the four of them usually travelled together; that she believes Doris and Jesse lived somewhere in Maywood; Illinois but did not know the exact address.

is at present working as a confidential informant for the Chicago Bureau Office, and for this reason it is deemed inadvisable at this time to subpoena her in the trial of this case.

Doris O'Connor, the consort of Jesse Doyle, admitted to the writer at Kansas City, Missouri in February of 1935 that she and Jesse Doyle were living at the Whiteside Apartments on Girard Street in Minneapolis, Minnesota shortly prior to the kidnaping. She also admitted that they were frequently visited by Volney Davis and Edna Murray while at this address. Doris, however, refused to furnish any other information concerning in her and Jesse Doyle's past activities. She emphatically stated that Jesse Doyle played no part in this case nor was he even remotely connected with it; that they were in Topeka, Kansas at the time the news of the kidnaping came out in the newspapers, having left Minneapolis, Minnesota a week previous thereto; that Eddie and Bessie Green left Minneapolis with them and that Eddie and Bessie Green were in their constant company for three or four weeks thereafter.

Numerous efforts were made by this agent and Special Agent R. P. Shanahan of the Kansas City Office to elicit further information from Doris O'Connor without success. She stated that she will tell her story in the federal court when the time comes. Doris O'Connor is at present confined in the Jackson County Jail at Kansas City, Missouri, awaiting trial on a charge of assault with intent to kill.

An investigation at Aurora, Illinois by Special Agent A. A. Muzzey of this office disclosed that Charles Webster, clerk at the Riverside Hotel in Aurora, is able to identify the photograph of Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor as having resided at this hotel for two weeks in the spring of 1934 under the name of Connley, the initials being unknown to him. Webster could not furnish the exact dates of their stay at this hotel for the reason that the registration records for the Vime have been destroyed. Charles Webster can be located at the Riverside Hotel in Aurora, Illinois.

Special Agent Muzzey also determined at Aurora, Illinois that Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor were residing at the home of Frank Burkell, 405 Fox Street, Aurora, Illinois for about one month in the spring of 1934; that they lived at this address under the name of Connley. Mr. Burkell advised that on one occasion Mrs. Burkell, by chance, looked into a brief bag contained in the apartment of the Connleys and observed three pistols, a flashlight, rubber gloves and other implements which appeared to be burglar's tools. Mr. Burkell stated that there was

no indication that Connley was known to Volney Davis and Edna Murray whom Burkell knew as "Curly" Hansen and his wife.

As a matter of interest it might be stated that at the time
Jess Doyle was apprehended at Girard, Kansas in February of 1934 there,
were found in his car, among other things, 1934 Illinois license tags
which investigation disclosed were issued to Roy D. Hubbard, 946 Oliver
Avenue, Aurora, Illinois. It was ascertained at Aurora, Illinois by Special
Agent Muzzey that these plates were stolen from the automobile of Mr.
Hubbard while he had it parked at the fairgrounds in Aurora, which is
only a short distance from the Fox Gardens. It also has been established
that Jesse Doyle frequented the Fox Gardens on numerous occasions around
the time that these plates were stolen.

This agent conducted an investigation at the Relmar Apartments, 2036 South 5th Avenue, Maywood, Illinois, on March 16, 1935. Mrs. Emma Gornke, menager at this address, positively identified the photograph ... of Jesse Doyle as E. A. Connley, who resided in Apartment 201 from March 27, 1933 to June 22, 1933. Mrs. Gornke advised that Mr. Connley. was living there with a woman named Doris who was supposed to be his 🐬 wife. However, she was unable to identify the photograph of Doris O'Connor as this woman. She further stated that these people were very friendly with another couple the likewise lived in Maywood, Illinois, and that they visited back and forth. She could make no photographic identifications of these other persons. Mrs. Gornke advised that sometime in April or May of 1934 two boys, who appeared to be around fifteen years of age, came from the West and lived with the Connleys until the time they moved away; that to her recollection these boys were just out of a second military school and one of them was supposed to be a son of Mrs. Connley. She further stated that the Connleys did very much travelling and at times would be away for two weeks at a time; that they appeared to have plenty of money and were always dressed in an expensive fashion.

In the reference letter from the Bureau particular attention was directed to the portion of Jesse Doyle's statement which involved the financial transaction occurring between Jesse Doyle and Volney Davis. It was alleged that Volney Davis owed Jesse Doyle a sum of \$800.00, and that shortly after the kidnaping of Bremer Davis paid \$250.00 to Doris O'Connor to be given to Doyle. There were also two \$100.00 money orders which were transmitted by Volney Davis to Mott Stanley, brother of Doris O'Connor, to be given to Doyle. The Bureau desired that every effort

should be made to trace these money orders. Copies of the above reference letter were likewise furnished to the St. Paul, Kansas City and Oklahoma City Offices.

In a letter dated March 2, 1935 Special agent in Charge
E. J. Connelley requested the Oklahoma City Office to interview Mott
Stanley at Cardin, Oklahoma in an effort to determine the approximate
date these money orders were received by him. To date no report has
been received from that office reporting the result of this investigation. In this same letter the St. Paul Bureau Office was requested
to interview Jesse Doyle at the Ramsey County Jail in St. Paul, Minnesota, and obtain from him the approximate date on which Mott Stanley
gave him the two money orders from Volney Davis mentioned above.

Under date of March 7, 1935 the St. Paul Bureau Office advised Mr. Connelley by letter that Doyle was interviewed and stated that to the best of his recollection Mott Stanley received the money orders in question during the summer of 1934 and that they were given to him about three weeks later; that he cashed them at the post office at Cardin, Oklahoma,

The reference letter reflected further that the Bureau will make arrangements to have Bessie Green interviewed with reference to the trip alleged to have been made by Jesse Doyle, accompanied by Eddie and Bessie Green, as set forth under the date of January 16, 1934 in the body of this report.

THE KANSAS CITY OFFICE. At Kansas City, Missouri, is requested to exhibit the photograph of Jesse Doyle, as well as photographs of the other suspects in this case, to the proper employees at the following addresses, with a view to showing a previous association of Jesse Doyle with the Barker-Karpis gang:

Longfellow Apartments, 4804 Jefferson Street; Villa Carmen Apartments, 414 West 46th Terrace; Tattershall Apartments; 23 Warner Plaza; all of Kansas City, Missouri. It is also requested that efforts be made to locate the apartment house near 45th and Main Streets, Kansas City, Missouri, where, according to Jesse Doyle, "Doc" Barker and Volney Davis rented an apartment shortly prior to April 4, 1935, the date of the Fairbury, Nebraska bank robbery. Photographs of all suspects in this case should be exhibited to the employees at this address should it be located,

It is further requested that an appropriate investigation be conducted at 3028 Baltimore Street, Kansas City, Missouri, and at the Zelda Apartments, 3213 Broadway Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, where Volney Davis and Edna Murray resided from August, 1934 up to February of 1935. The photograph of Jesse Doyle should be exhibited at these places in an effort to have him identified as a visitor at these addresses.

At Topeka, Kansas, will obtain the exact dates of the period of occupancy by Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor and Eddie and Bessie Green at the Senate Apartment Hotel in this city. It should be borne in mind that both Jesse Doyle and Bessie Green stated that they were residing at this address at the time the news came out in the newspapers concerning the Bremer kidnaping.

At Concordia, Kansas, it is requested that the photograph of Jesse Doyle be exhibited to Miss Ida Cook, employes at the Cloud County Bank, and other witnesses in an effort to have him identified as one of the participants in the robbery of this bank on July 26, 1932.

THE ST. PAUL OFFICE. At Mahtomedi, Minnesota. It is desired that Mr. Lambert, located at Mahtomedi, on White Bear Lake, be shown a photograph of Jesse Doyle with a view to having him identified as being at his home with Fred Barker, Kate Barker and Alvin Karpis, whom he has already identified.

ments, possibly located at Cleveland and Marshall Streets, St. Paul, it is requested that the manager be interviewed for the purpose of obtaining the exact dates that Fred Barker, "Doc" Barker, Alvin Karpis and Jesse Doyle resided there. It will be noted that Jesse Doyle stated in his statement that the above individuals were residing there at the time they robbed the Third Northwestern Bank at Minneapolis, Minnesota on December 16, 1932.

At 1280-90 Grand Avenue, will reinterview Mr. Parnell, Janitor, and exhibit the photograph of Jesse Doyle to him with a view to associating him with the other members of the Barker Karpis gang, whom he has already identified.

An appropriate investigation should also be conducted at either 900 or 926 Grand Avenue, St. Paul, where, according to Harry ... Hull, Larry Duvol and he resided at the time of the Third Northwestern bank robbery.

If the whereabouts of Harry Miller are known to your office it is requested that a photograph of Jesse Doyle be exhibited to him in an effort to have him identified as a visitor at 777 Selby Ivenue and 565 Portland Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota, at which address Bill Weaver and Myrtle Eaton resided during the period prior to the kidnaping. Doyle's photograph should also be shown to Andy Rathmeyer, Dr. Henry H. Hall and Miss Kaether, nurse.

It is also desired, if it has not already been done, that Jesse Doyle's photograph be exhibited in all instances where investigation is conducted at the places in St. Paul, Minnesota where the subjects in this case resided shortly prior to the kidnaping of Edward

At Minneapolis, Minnesota, will conduct an appropriate investigation at the Whiteside Apartments on Girard Street. Your attention is particularly directed to the information furnished by Jesse Doyle to the effect that he left this address on Jamuary 16, 1935 in company with Doris O'Connor and Eddie and Bessie Green, after being warned to do so by Fred Barker. Special efforts should be made to have other suspects in this case identified as visitors to Doyle's apartment at this address.

THE SALT LAKE CITY OFFICE. It is requested that the photograph of Jesse Doyle be exhibited to all persons who have previously been interviewed and who have identified photographs of certain subjects in this case as having resided in Reno, Nevada during the winter of 1932. The addresses where this investigation is to be had are set forth in the body of this report.

THE OKLAHOMA CITY OFFICE. The present situation at Cardin ; and Commerce, Oklahoma is not known to this office. If the Oklahoma City

Office deems it advisable to openly sontact the Stanley family, it is desired that Mott Stanley be interviewed with particular reference to the two money orders received by him from Volney Davis to be given to Jesse Doyle. It is also requested that the approximate dates be ascertained when Jesse Doyle and Doris O'Connor had lived with him from time to time. It should be borne in mind that Jesse Doyle stated in his signed statement that they proceeded to Cardin, Oklahoma with Eddie and Bessie Green after leaving Minneapolis, Minnesota the day prior to the instant kidnaping, and that the four of them, namely, Jesse Doyle, Doris O'Connor, Eddie and Bessie Green, lived for a short time with Mott Stanley during this period.

For the assistance of the Oklahoma City, Salt Lake City and St. Paul Bureau Offices, a recent photograph of Jesse Doyle is attached to the copy of this report for each of these offices.
