Blake advised information had been received in St. Paul that Fat Growe, referred kidnapper and racketeer, possessed pertinent information relative to the above entitled passes.

For your information, Special Agent 7. F. McDevitt located Pat Crowe, who is now residing at the Salvation army Notal, 705 Worth Broad Street, Philodelphia, at which address Crowe will remain until the end of the week, at which time, he stated he intends to return to Chicago. Crowe advised that he had dispatched a wire to 1. F. Sweeney, Sweeney Detective Bureau, Inc., 426 First National Bank Building, St. Paul, Minn., Crowe stating that Sweeney is an ex-captain of detectives in St. Paul and in the only man with whom he (Crowe) will attempt any negotiations. Orowe was questioned at length both by Special Agent Mand the writer at this Division Office; but the above information comprises all that Growe would divulge. He is very valuable and takes great pains to impress upon his listeness his achievements of the past in kidneying cases.

Orowe also stressed the fact that if knowledge becomes public that he is involved in this case, the mangeters responsible for this crime will immediately put young Breizer to death.

Re: UNKNOWN SUBJECTS EDWARD G.BREMER, VICTIM. C KIDNAPING. St.Paul File No.7-30.

The attention of the Division is invited to letter addressed to the St. Paul Division Office by the Philadelphia Office, A.Schroeder, Acting, under date of January 50, 1934, in the above entitled matter.

I am of the opinion that CROWE should be forcefully informed either by a representative of the Philadelphia Office, or someone from Washington, that the Division will not tolerate the withholding by him. CROWE, of any information of any kind, or nature whatsoever, that he may possess relative to the BREMER kidnaping case. It is not believed that any action should be taken here in the matter, nor that M.R. SWEENEY of St. Peul, referred to by CROWE, should be taken into the confidence of this office. It is not believed, of course, that CROWE possesses any information relative to the BREMER case and in this connection it should be noted that the original communication from the kidnapers instructed that no negotiations be held in response to any communication other than that bearing the signature of the victime It is CROWE'S desire to gain either notoriety, or possibly money. However, it would appear intolerable that this old man, who is probably senile, should inject himself into this case and presumably, or, according to his own statement, withhold information from this Division.



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

Reference is made to my letter of Jamary 26, 1954, in connection with the latent prints developed on the series of extortion notes in connection with the case entitled UMENOWN SUBJECTS; EDWARD G. FREETR, VICTIM. The search of such of these latent prints as could be classified has been completed in the single fingerprint file with the exception of one print of a delta formation which will necessitate search through the entire file.

Additional identifications of these latent prints with the fingerprints of persons known to have handled the letters have been made as follow:

- 2 fingerprints of Dr. Hippert have been found on the envelope bearing the typewritten address "To Valter Magee, Adolph Bremer, very important".
- 2 latent prints appearing on the envelope addressed "Dr. H. T. Wippert personal, please deliver at once", have been Mentified as those of Thomas Cabill.
- 2 latent prints appearing on the handwritten letter beginning "Dearest Pat, Please do not worry", have been identified as those of Edward G. Bremer, the victim. One latent print on this same letter has been identified as that of Thomas Dahill.
- 10 of the latent prints found on the handwritten letter beginning "Dear alter, I'm sorry", have been identified as those of the victim, Edward G. Bromer.
- l of the latent prints appearing on the envelope which accompanied? the last described letter has been found to be that of walter w. Magee.

The fingerprints of Fra. Edward G. Bremer have been compared with the FILES SEARCH Prints with negative results.



Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter dated January 26, 1934 relating to the case entitled UNKNOWN SUBJECTS, EDWARD GO BREMER, VICTIM, KIDNAPING, with which were transmitted copies of a letter addressed to the Attorney General under date of January 19, 1934 by Mr. A. J. Hertz, 6011 Plankinton Building, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Please be advised that Special Agent V. W. Peterson interviewed Mr. A. J. Hertz on January 30, 1934 in his office located in Room 6011 Plankinton Building, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Mr. Hertz advised that he was formerly an attorney and was engaged in the practice of law in St. Paul, Minnesota. Several years ago he was retained to represent one, Leon Gleckman, who is alleged to be the dominating figure of the St. Paul underworld. Leon Gleckman was indicted for violation of the National Prohibition Act and on the advice of A. J. Hertz, his attorney, a plea of guilty was entered. It is alleged that Gleckman and former Assistant United States Attorney William Anderson, who was representing the Government in the case, were very friendly and that after William Anderson was released from his duties as Assistant United States Attorney he entered the employ of Gleckman in the latter's loan office. It is stated by Mr. Hertz that the Government later filed a confession of error in the case and that because of the influence of Leon Gleckman he, A. J. Hertz, was disbarred.

Mr. Hertz further advised that after his disbarment he moved to Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Subsequent thereto he went to St. Paul, Minnesota for the purpose of instituting a civil suit against Leon. Gleckman for damages. On this occasion he was accompanied by one, P. J. Dunham, and they registered in the Lowry Hotel, St. Paul, Minnesota. Apparently Gleckman became aware of the intention of A. J. Hertz to file a civil suit against him for damages. Within a short time after arriving at the Lowry Hotel in St. Paul, he, Mr. Hertz, received a telephone call from some man who informed him that he would meet the same fate as some other men who had been taken for "rides" in St. Paul. A few minutes later three or four

men came to the Lowry Hotel and without knocking entered his room and began threatening him. Mr. Hertz stated that he became extremely frightened and that he is unable to furnish a description of the men who entered his room on this occasion but he is confident that they were sent there by Leon Gleckman. Mr. Hertz is alleged to have reached for the telephone and the men left the room, after raising a disturbance. Mr. Hertz immediately left St. Paul and did not dare to attempt to return.

According to A. J. Hertz, Leon Gleckman is the Al Capone of the St. Paul underworld, and that it would be almost impossible for gangsters to committ a kidnaping without the knowledge and consent of Leon Gleckman. Leon Gleckman is alleged to have served a term in the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas for violation of the National Prohibition Act and it is stated that he is now under indictment for evasion of the Federal Income Tax.

Mr. A. J. Hertz advised that he is well acquainted with Edward G. Bremer, for whom he has a high regard and also knows the father of Bremer. Mr. Hertz expressed a firm conviction that Leon Gleckman is implicated in the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer.

The following description was provided by A. J. Hertz:



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

Examination of Lincoln Bedan, bearing Minnesota State License B 74-619 for 1933, property of EDWARD G.BREMER, now being held at the McGee Garage in St. Paul, Minnesota, revealed that the front set and upholstery of same had been drycleaned, whereby all bloodsteins alleged to have been contained thereon had been removed.

OSCAR HYDAL, foremen of this garage, stated that the front seat had been taken to Sweeney's Clothes Cleaners, 115 West 7th Street, on January 19,1934, by Frank Way, a mechanic of McGee's Garage, and the other upholstery, which was apparently stained with blood had been eleaned by Way and himself, all of which was done upon instructions of Mr.McGee, He stated that McGee did not want MR.ADOLPH BREEKR to see the stains on this ear.

At Sweeney's Glothes Cleaners, the writer was informed that an automobile seat had been eleaned on January 19,1934, and that appeared to be blood stains had been removed; that no instructions had been given them to wash the stains out, whereby they might be preserved and analysis made, and it was not known until they were informed that the eleaning job was to be charged to McGee that this seat was from the REMARKS care.

MR.H.M.SCHOEKRG, bacteriologist, and director of the laboratory of the Department of Public Health, St.Paul.Minnesota, stated that he had made an examination of the EREMER car at McGee's Garage and found that stains on the upholstery had been removed by dry eleaning, although on the side of the cushion running to the floor, adjacent to the driver's seat, he found several streaks which, upon chemical examination, proved to be blood; that he also found a spot on the edge of the cushion leading to the floor, which, on chemical examination, proved to be blood. MR. SCHOBERG explained that due to the insufficient amount of blood available for chemical analysis, he was unable to determine whether or not it was human blood.

The photograph marked "A" shows blood stains on the seat adjacent to the driver's seat on the floor mat immediately beneath and spots on the upholstery of the right floor.

The photograph marked "B" shows the same stains on the sout adjacent to the driver's seat, and several spots on the back of this seat.

The photograph marked "O", is taken from the driver's side of the floor seat and shows two marks which were found to be grease left from the extension gord used in making photographs.

The photographs marked "D", "E", "J", and "G", are photographs of the exterior of the ear. The apparent smears shown in the photograph were made by fingerprint powder in the search for fingerprints. Thief Dehill stated that no fingerprints were found on the ear.

After this interview, which was conducted by Shief of Police TOM TAHILL, Chief of Detectives MARLES TIMENT, Detective TOM MONE, and agent, PEDERSON was placed in the jail and his fingerprints and photograph were taken.

To was interviewed later on the same date and he then admitted the following:

Monday morning, after he had been reading the various newspaper stories about the MEMER kidnaping, he conceived the idea that if he could call MAGEE and induce MAGEE to come to the Majestic Hotel, PEDERSON might be able to convince MAGEE that he could assist in solving this kidnaping, thereby making it possible for him to secure a few dellars in advance and possibly a few more dellars from time to time as he was estensibly working on the solution of the kidnaping. He admitted that he had no means whatever of solving the case and that he had no idea as to who had done the kidnaping, knew nothing about it, and in all probability would receive no information other than that reported in the newspapers. It was his impression that since the newspapers had repeatedly carried stories to the effect that the police and other officials had adopted a "hands off" policy, he could easily work this confidence game on MAGEE without police interference.

He stated that while he had ridden on the bus from thicage to Minneapolis, as previously stated, the only person he spoke to on the bus was MISS HARRIET TAYLOR of Park Rapids, Minnestta, and had not spoken to an exconvict as he had previously stated.

Gomearning his past, he advised that he was born at Peshtige, Wisconsin; that he has a wife and two children living at Merrill, Wisconsin, from which place he had been sent to Wanpun for embessling \$200 from the Shoe Department of a department store, this being in 1927. He advised that he has a brother, OFFO J. PEDERSON, railway engineer, residing in the 1700 block on Dayton Avenue in St. Paul. For about the past two years he has been living in New York Sity, being employed in the diet kitchen of the Metropolitan Hespital for ever a year and residing at 454 East 54th Street, New York Sity. In that connection, a letter is being written to the New York Sity Division office to check on this last information. He has never resided in Chicago but has residing in Milwaukee and in Marinette, Wisconsin.

He attempted to justify the attempted extortion by stating he thought it would make the old man EREMER feel better if MAGKE had an ex-convict assisting him in the case. He freely admitted that he had no plans for solving the case and that his only connection with same would have been to obtain a few dollars from WALTER MAGEE on a pretext of being able to supply some information.

The Police are holding PEDERSCH until the solution of this case.



Roy 0. White (author of letter) came to Springfield, Mo. in the winter of late 32 or early 33. I became acquainted with him and, borrowed money which, we used to establish the above business. (the business is now defunct.)

Upon Whites insistence that, his wife owned a large share of her brothers farm, near Barret, Minnesots. I berrowed more money and, took he and his family to Barret, for the purpose of converting Mrs. Whites share of the farm into cash, to finance the business.

After remaining a few days with the relatives, White suggested that, he and I return to Kansas City, and sell some hand painted menu boards, while his wife was selling her property.

In Kansas City, I left white and, returned to Springfield, to look after the business which was in bad shape and, within a few days, on May 19th. I received the enclosed letter from white. Thus ended my connection with white.







A letter dated January 27, 1854, written to ADOLPH BREMEN, by Sylvester Urbany, Carroll, Iowa, was turned ever to this effice by MR. BREMEN, This letter sets out information that MR. URBANY is proprieter of the Commercial Botel, Carroll, Iowa, and that a party stayed at that hotel on January 25, 1854, and registered as JACK RAY of St. Paul, Minnesota; that MR. URBANY's daughter compared the handwriting on the register of this party with that of the note written to the BREMER family shortly after the kidnaping signed, "One of the Gang", and advising that BREMER was deed and his body was in the vicinity of Anoka, Minnesota, The letter also states that furing this party's absence from the hotel, MR. URBANY's daughter inspected the room and found a blood stained shirt, also a blood stained hat lining and kid gloves. The register sheet covering the date of January 25,1935, was forwarded with this letter and photostatic copies have been made.

At the Commercial Hotel, Carroll, Iowa, MRS. FRANK J. MUCHELT sas interviewed. She is the daughten of SYLVESTER URBANY and her husband is the brother of FRANK BUCKHEIT, Sheriff of Carroll County. On the night of January 25. 1954, she stated that two men came to this hotel and looked at the gooms and decided the location and the rooms were just what they wanted so they went sutside and then sent in a party who registered as "JACK RAY, St. Penl, Mina," She assigned him to room 12, but when he got to the men and noted that the look was broken on the spec he insisted on having a room, which sould be looked at all times and stated he wanted no maid to enter the room during his absence. He was, therefore, assigned to room 🔬 ll. MRS. BUCHHEIT observed the lieunse number on the ear which she was driving, a green coupe, same being Blis-970, Minneseta 1933. (This number was checked through the Motor Vehicle Department by S.A.C. Hanni and was determined that same was Insued for a Budson Coups, motor number 8447, lisensed to C. F. HEDLICK COMPANY, 305 Lincoln Building, Minneapolis, Minnesota. The Minneapolis Directory shows CHARLES F. BRULICK to reside at 16 South 4th Street, which address is the Russell Hotel.) MRS. MUCHERIT advised that she called the Sheriff shortly after this registration by the party giving the name of "RAY", and he also compared it with the handwriting on the mote above referred to, this being available from a newspaper she had saved wherein this note had been printed. The Sheriff was of the opinion that the handwriting was similar so requested her to call him the next day when this party got up. She called the Sheriff and as soon as this party left the hotel, the Sheriff accosted him on the street. She stated that as soon as this party left the hotel, she went up stairs and made an inspection of the room and opened this man's suit case and found therein -ATROYER





found the register of H. E. ANDERSON of Minneapolis, assigned to room \$25, and H. E. BRADLEY, Doe Moines, the same date immediately following ANDERSON'S registration assigned to room \$10. F. A. BENTLEY, flork, at the Barke Motal, stated that he knew MLIZZARD, who had been there before and knew MLIZZARD had registered as MRADLEY, and further saw MLIZZARD send out official mail from that hotel under the name of MLIZZARD. BENTLEY also understood MLIZZARD was a Marcotic Agent. S. A.G. Hanni called the Marcotic effice in Minneapolis and determined that Agent ANDERSON of that office had been in Carroll, Jown and vicinity on January 25, 1954.

In compliance with telephonic request from the Chicago Division Office, I communicated with Lieutenant Van Loomis in charge of the Detective Division of the Michigan State Police at East Lansing, for the purpose of securing the original log used by the individuals who robbed the First State Bank at Folland, Michigan, on September 29, 1932, which log gave directions of the roads to follow and was found in the abandoned automobile following the robbery.

Lieutenant Loomis who is very familiar with this matter informed me that as far as he knew the State Police had never been in possession of the original log which was typewritten. and also he did not know of any carbon copies of same. He stated that his office did have several photostatic copies, and that one had been forwarded to the Division in compliance with the request. of Special Agent Metcalfe of the Chicago Office on January 28, 1934.

Lieutement Loomis stated that he was of the opinion that the Burns Detective Agency in Chicago, who was interested in this case perhaps would be in possession of the original log. He was informed however that this organization had been contacted by our office at Chicago and it was their thought that the original was in the possession of the State Police.

Lieutenant Loomis made several inquiries throughout his organization regarding this particular matter and later again notified me that he was unable to secure any information as to the possible whereabouts of the original log.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to my letter of February 5, 1934, concerning the above-captioned case.

Prior to telephonic conversation with Mr. Clegg on this date, the writer again interviewed Pat Crowe, who called at the Philadelphia Division Office, and he advised that if Mr. Natham obtained assurance from the Victim's father that he (Crowe) would receive 5% of any ransom money recovered, he would then turn the information over to me or to Mr. Nathan. I then telephoned Mr. Clegg, who advised that I inform Crowe that the necessary arrangements were perfected. Crowe informed me that he would not turn any information over unless he was permitted to go to Washington where he would turn the information over to Director Hoover if he had a witness, with whom he was acquainted, present, or in lieu thereof unless Detective Sweeney of St. Paul, Minn., would assure Crowe that the Government will lay down and make no arrests in the Bremer case until the ransom money is paid and the Victim is returned.

I spent two hours arguing with Crowe, but without result. Finally, he stated that if I would call a Catholic priest and have him present he would give the information by telephone to Mr. Nathan. In the next breath he informed that he had not made the statement to me when I reiterated his remark. He variously stated that he would give the information if Captain Creedon or Inspector Duffy were present in the office, and then denied that he had said this.

Crowe became very incensed when informed on several occasions that his refusal to divulge information, which he admitted he had in his possession, would place him in serious difficulty inasmuch as a

penalty is provided under the Federal laws for failure to disclose in grantion concerning a Federal offense. His only reaction to such statements was to remark that he did not care whether he lived and would welcome going to jail. During the course of conversation, Crove informed me that he had known the identity of the Pennsgrove, N. J., bank robbers before the police made arrests. This is just another of his haphazard statements which mean nothing, in my opinion. The Pennsgrove case concerned the robbery of a pay roll by several desperadoes, which took place on Thursday, February 1, 1934, and concerning which the police made arrests on February 3rd.

Crowe is an old reprobate, and in my opinion would not receive the confidence of any criminals—certainly not criminals of the type that kidnapped Bremer. He uses what change he can beg or borrow to buy liquor.

I telephoned Mr. Nathan at St. Paul, and he informed me that he would not dignify Crowe by talking with him inasmuch as he feels as I do that Crowe possesses no information. Mr. Nathan informed me that in the event Crowe would agree to furnish the information without taking into our confidence any outsiders, he would talk with him, but otherwise Mr. Nathan felt that it would serve no good purpose to talk with Crowe.

I conferred with United States Attorney Charles D. McAvoy to-day and advised him of Crowe's refusal to divulge information, which he alleged he had in his possession concerning the identity of the kid-nappers, and he informed me that he was thoroughly convinced that Crowe is a publicity seeker, and he did not desire to take any action against him because to do so would give Crowe publicity. In addition thereto, Mr. McAvoy said he can place no significance in the information allegedly in Crowe's possession.

I am transmitting to the St. Paul Office for its information a copy of my letter dated February 3, 1934, to the Division.

He said that he would gladly furnish these papers to the Division for their use and stated that they came into his possession while he was in the service of the William J. Burns Detective Agency in Chicago, at which time he was investigating the robbery of the First State Bank at Holland, Michigan. Mr. Stewart's residence and place of occupation were ascertained through further inquiry by the above mentioned agents at the office of Swan Lorish and Caspers, Inc., 1959 East 71st Street, Chicago. He would like to have the chart returned to him when it has served its purpose.

Reference is unde to long distance telephone call received from your office last night requesting that this office determine whether Boo Verne Sankey, subject of Detroit File 7-2 catitled Reo Verne Sankey with aliases - Fugitive, et al., Charles Boetteher II, Victim, Kidneping, had registered at the Field Botal in Detroit under the mane of "W. B. Clark and wife" at any time during the past six months and especially between January 15 and 19, 1934.

Please be advised that Special Agent L. D. Soccy personally checked the registration records at the Field Motel, which is located at 445 Field Avenue, Detroit, from June 1, 1955 to the present date and was successful in locating the following registrations of W. E. Slark:

Registration eard \$727 reflects that Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Clark of 3746 Shefield, Chicago, checked in to said hotel on \$41/33 and were assigned room 401, rate \$3.00; that they remained at this hotel for two mights. Mr. J. Moore, Manager of the above hotel, registered these people in on this occasion. For identification purposes at the hotel, their folio number is 4846.

Registration eard #796 dated 8/15/33 reflects that INVESTIGATION Clark, address Council Bluffs, Iowa, registered in and 1934 A.M. was assigned to room 201 at a rate of \$2.00. He remained 1934 A.M. at this hotel one might. This registration may depidential Of JECTICE field at the hotel through folio #5135.

Registration eard \$1170 dated 10/84/85 reflects that J. W. Clark and wife of Chicago, Illimois registered in and warm assigned room 150 at a rate of \$3.00 per day. They pomaimed at the hotel one night. The hotel felic number of this pegistration is 6518. [Note: While the initials of this party are "J.C." instead of "W. E." Clark, a comparison of the hamburiting would indicate that they are one and the same person.

Registration eard #2950 reflects that W. E. Clark, address Chicago, registered in said hotel on 1/16/34 and was assigned room 205 at a rate of \$1.50 per day. He remained at the hetel one day. The hotel felio representing this registration is 7462. Clark on this eccasion was registered in by Mr. W. B. Harren, night elerk.

Mr. W. R. Warren, night elerk, Field Hotel, who registered Clark in on January 16, 1934 informed Agent Socsy that he does not recall whether Clark was driving an automobile on this occasion or not. He did state, however, that since the register reflects only Clark's signature and the fact that he was assigned to a single room, he could fairly definitely state that the latter was not accompanied by a moman or other person.

Upon viewing the photograph of Reo Verne Sankey, Mr. Warren advised that he would be unable to definitely state whether W. E. Slark and Sankey are one and the same person. He did state, however, that the facial characteristics of Sankey are very familiar to him and that it is possible that the latter had been seen by him at the hotel within the past few months.

Mr. J. Moore, Manager of the Field Hotel who had registered W. E. Clark on a previous occasion, when interviewed stated that he does not recall the matter. He was also unable to identify Sankey's photograph as that of anyone known to or observed by him at the Field Hotel.

Cilbert Woods, beliboy at the above hotel, was also interviewed and upon reviewing the photograph of Reo Verne Sankey advised that he is quite definitely certain he saw the latter although he cannot recall where or when. He is of the opinion, however, that it was at the above hotel, since he has been employed there regularly for the past year.

Tiesue bracings of Clark's handwriting as taken from the four registration earls at the Field Hotel are being forwarded herewith to the Chicago office for such identifying purposes as they may serve.

In pursuance of the telephonic instructions received on January 28, 1934, from Assistant Director H. H. Clegg, interview was had on the same night with Chief of Police Peter Lievense, by Special Agent J. J. Metcalfe of this office.

Lr. Lievense after searching and his records advised that he believed he had turned over the original plans of escape that were left by the bandits at the scene of the robbery of the First State Bank in Holland, Michiga in September, 1932, to the Michigan State Police at East Lansing, Michigan. Mr. Lievense communicated with the Michigan State Police to determine if these plans were in the hands of Sergeant H. I. Marmon, and was subsequently advised that the plans were at that place. Agent Metcalfe then conversed with Detective Harold Mulbar of the Michigan State Police, and requested him to forward the original plens by Special Delivery, Air Mail, to the Division, with instructions on the inner envelope that they were to be transmitted to the laboratory. Mr. Mulbar advised that these papers would be forwarded immediately. Chief Lievense was informed as to the necessity for these plans being sent to Washington, but this information was not communicated to the Michigan State Police, as it was deemed inadvisable and unnecessary ofter conversation with Chief Lievense. Accordingly the title: re Bremer kidnaping case, will not appear on the envelope containing these plans which is being forwarded to the Division. Chief Lievense requested that the plans be returned to him at Holland Michigan after they have served

Chief Lievense stated that the plans which are being forwarded by the Michigan State Police are original carbon copies. He said that he believes that there were two copies of these plans found at the time of the bank robbery, and that one of them was the original plan and the other an original carbon copy of the plan. He was not certain as to this however, and stated that it is possible that both copies were original carbon copies. With reference to the other copy he said that he believed that to be in the hands of either the Surns Detective agency in Chicago, or in the hands of Mr. Stewart, who was formerly employed by that detective agency.

At the Milliam J. Burns Detective Agency, 10 South LaSalle Street, Chicago, interview was today had by Special agent Metcalfe with Er. A. R. Lapitz, and one of the Burns Detectives, a Mr. Crowe. Mr. Lapitz searched his files but could find no original plans. However, he did discover a photostatic copy of these plans, and this photostatic copy is being transmitted to you herewith. Mr. Crowe said that he understood that there was only one original copy of these plans, and that that was the copy in the possession of the Michigan State Police. He did not know whether this was the original copy or an original carbon copy but he called attention to the fact that the records of the Burns Detective Agency show that these plans which were at one time in the hands of Mr.Stewart, consisted of "typewriting on helf sheets of 82 by 11 yellow second sheets, devoid of any water merks, and of common stock paper obtainable anywhere." Er. Crowe said that it is very possible that the fact that these plans were on yellow paper may have led some persons to believe that they were original carbon copies instead of originals. Kr. Lapitz and .r. Crowe stated that if there exists any other original copy such copy might be in the hands of Ir. Stewart, who is C. M. Stewart, and whose last known address was 6102 Jeffery Street, Chicago, Apartment 303.

Mr.Crowe expressed some concern over the inquiry being made regarding these papers, as he thought that the Chicago office was endeavoring to investigate the Burns Detective Agency. He explained that there has been considerable friction between this detective agency and the Chief of Police at Holland, Lichigan, and that the Chief at Holland was of the opinion that the Burns Detective agency was endeavoring to conceal the identity or whereabouts of the persons who perpetrated the crime of robbing the First State Bank at Holland. He said that there existed some jealousy on the part of the Holland Police, owing to the fact that the plans of escape, and the bullets of the robbers, were originally discovered by in. Stewart of the detective agency, and that the Chief of Police at Holland had claimed that these articles were in fact found by the Holland Folice, and subsequently turned over to the Burns Detective agency, who then attempted to take credit for the discovery of the articles. Mr. Crowe stated he understood that the matter had also been referred to Senator Vandenberg of Michigan. In this connection it may be noted that the same information was furnished Agent Metcalfe by Chief Lievense, who said that Stewart failed to appear at Springfield, Illinois at the time extradition proceedings were taking place for the purpose of removing a suspect to Michigan, and that Stewart appeared at the last minute, on behalf of the suspect instead of on behalf of the Burns Detective Agency, as he should have. Chief Lievense also stated that in view of the fact that the plans and bullets which were abtained by Stewart were given to him by the Holland Police on the theory that he knew more about matters of that kind, and that these articles were never returned

to the Holland Police, he was of the opinion that possibly the Burns Detective Agency was not endeadoring to solve the case, but was attempting to shield the criminals. The Chief also expressed considerable criticism of the Chicago Police Department, for its lack of cooperation in solving the case, and helping to extradite suspects, and he said that he had referred these matters to Senator Vandenberg, who replied that he was very much interested and would have the matter looked into.

Agent Metcalfe assured Mr. Crowe of the Burns Detective Agency that this Division was in no sense investigating the Burns Detective Agency, but merely desired the typewritten charts to make laboratory comparisons.

Efforts to locate Lr. C. M. Stewart were unavailing. The Real Estate company of Swan, Lorish and Caspers, Inc. 1959 Kast 71st Street, Chicago, advised that Lr. Stewart moved from the premises at 7102 Jeffery Street, about one year ago and left no forwarding address. The South Shore Station of the Post Office, 2207 E. 75th Street, Chicago, advised that they had no removal address on file for C. M. Stewart as of 7102 Jeffery Street. The telephone company advised that telephone number Butterfield 0682, which was formerly the telephone number of C.M. Stewart, is no longer in operation, and that they now have no telephone number listed in the name of C.M. Stewart. In this connection your attention is again respectfully invited to the fact that Mr. Crowe was very firm in his belief that only one copy of the plans of escape was ever in existence, and that this is the copy which the Michigan State Police are forwarding to you.

It is desired your office give every ettention to this matter and expedite the inquiry. A copy of this letter is being furnished the Detroit Office in order that similar inquiry may be conducted at the beedquarters of the Michigan State Police at most Lansing.

Upon arrival here I consulted FRANK WHEKLOCK, Assistant Chief Police, and learned that there is no 951 Cecelia St., in Sioux City, which was verified by personal inspection in company with MR. WHENLOCK . There are numbers 925 and 927, the latter being the end of the 900 block. MORGAN, former Chief of Police and at the present time on the auto theft detail, lives at 1025 Gecelia St., and thru him a check on most of the residents in the vicinity was made. It was found that his wife was sti better acquainted with the persons living nearby. However, the parties living at the above two numbers, 925 and 927 are not known to the MORGANS. The old inhabitants of these houses either sold or moved out and rented about a year ago. There is also a house located in the rear of these two places where which might bear checking. Inquiry of the druggist, FRED BARNEY, who is in the same block as these two houses, revealed that he did not know who registed therein but felt sure he would be table to find out shortly. A party by the name of SMITH has been residing for about a year in the house located in the rear of these two, and is not considered intelligent enough to engage in any criminal work that required some brains.

In the 1100 block there is a suspicious couple, supposed to be insurance agents, man and wife, who have a Mash Sedan about 1931 or 1932 model, large, dark colored, in some respects resombling a Lincoln, bearing lowa 1933 plates 97-19852. They give the name of MURPHY and the ear is said to be registered under that name but nothing is known about them and they appear to be strangers in the town. They have been there since a week ago last Monday. Arrangements are being made so that I may enter their room tomorrow in their absence and try to find out something about them, sithough it is said that they have no luggage or belongings that are not looked in two suitcases and a brief bags.
