Dear Sirs:

In connection with further investigation of the above matter, I learned today that Clarence "Dee" Eaton, is now using the name of Hubbard and operates a night club at Burlington, Wis. not far from the Police Station. He is well known to the officers there, but his true identity is apparently not known.

The local Police Department called my attention to a matter today which may bear checking. There has been a man stopping at the Birchwood Apartment House, 2225 Grand Avenue, under the name of Walter C. Johnson. He had with him a woman who was supposed to be his wife, another man, and a chauffeur. He had two Packard automobiles bearing Indiana licenses. When this man first came he gave a check for some expenses and it was returned, but before he left he was spending money right and left, playing the slot machine at the Elks Club by the hour, and when drunk making other displays of his money. He was supposed to be selling some kind of a gasoline saver for automobile, but apparently made no effort to sell any here. He left the end of last week for Moline, Ill. and is now staying at the LocClaire Hotel. The description I have is very vague other than he is a very large man, six feet or more and weighing 375 to 400 lbs. Could this by any chance be "Big Ben" whom you advised me of. I do not have a description of the latter.

Mr. Findley, Chief of the Bureau of Investigation advised me this evening that he received another letter from "Little Joe" designating the spot now as near Mt. Ayr, Ia. He names a James Padden, mayor, of Ryham(?), Ill., as head of the gang who took Bremer. This mayor gives protection to various gangs and has a man named Murphy in on the deal with him. Padden is supposed to own a sporting house and gambling place at 101 Flanner St., Calumet City, either Illinois or Indiana. I will secure a copy of this letter and advise you.

The tap is working on the phone here, but no information of any value has yet been revealed. I am forwarding you a copy of same in the next mail.

On this date, telegraphic communication was received from Frank X. Fay, Special Agent in Charge, New York Division Office, requesting that the EM Manufacturing Company, 763 Pico Street, Los Angeles, makers of electric sirens used for fire and general alarms, be contacted to ascertain the towns in the middle west where that type of alarm is used; the information obtained to be directed to the St. Paul Division Office.

In compliance with the above, Special Agent C. D. White of this office contacted the above concern, Mr. H. Miles, owner, advising that his records back to 1931, in which year he began manufacturing a general siren alarm, reflect that shipments were made to the following points:

You are advised that on February 16th, Special Agent T. E. Lott of this office contacted M. C. Armstrong, vice president of the Sterling Siren Fire Alarm Company, 36 Allen Street, Rochester, N. Y.

With regard to the Interstate Machine Products Company, Mr. Armstrong stated that his company had taken over this business many years ago. Mr. Anderson stated that when inquiries are made at the Bullard Company above referred to, this company should be requested also to furnish a list of customers of the Siracode Company, which the Bullard Company purchased about a year ago. He further advised that the Erick Electric Siren Co. and Decot's Machine Works practically control the sale of sirens in their respective States, and very few products of other manufacturers will be found in those States.

Agent Lott secured from Mr. Armstrong a typewritten list of his company's customers in the States of North and South Dakota, Iowa, Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota. It is noted that opposite each customer's name is indicated the type of siren said customer purchased, and bulletins describing these sirens are enclosed herewith, as also are the typewritten lists.

You are advised that attempts are being made by this office to locate the Coagrade Company at Irvington, N. J., for the purpose of making appropriate inquiry, and further that upon receipt of your wire of February 16th, Mr. Armstrong was requested by telephone to mail to this office a list of all his company's customers in Eastern Nebraska, and this list will be forwarded to you immediately upon its receipt.

Reference is made to your letter of
February 17, 1934.

Mr. Henry Hyman, President of the
United States Electric Manufacturing Corporation, 222 W. 14th
Street, New York City, has referred the inspection of the re-
cords in his office to Mr. Atkin, office manager, who prepared
a list setting forth notations of sales in the middle West dis-
trict, of all flash lights in the instant case, which has been
transmitted to you. In compliance with letter of reference, com-
municate was made with the United States Electric Manufacturing
Corporation, for the purpose of further identifying model 637 HM,
which was received by this office today.

Mr. Atkins, the only person familiar with
the records of the factory, is confined to his bed because of ill-
ness and consequently was not interviewed. Arrangements were made
to complete the investigation on February 20th, at which time Mr.
Atkins will be available.

It was, however, ascertained from ~~INVESTIGATION~~
Rothenberg, Production Manager of the United States Electric Manufac-
turing Corporation, who has been in the employ of this company for the
past twenty seven years, upon examination of the flashlight received
from your office in order to restrict the search of sales to a par-
ticular date and district, that this particular flashlight was probably

made about two years ago, the identifying feature being the insulation of the top end of the tube which has a discontinued type of insulation. The reflector head seats itself on this insulation cap and is a defect which feature has been corrected by a later manufacture.

The difficulty in determining the exact date of the manufacture of this particular flashlight arises from the fact that its assemblage parts are interchangeable. For example, the end cap is of standard size and may be used on either 2, 3, or 5 cell tubes. The heads are interchangeable and may be used on 3 or 5 cell tubes. However, it is not customary to use the large reflector head on the 2 cell size flashlight. The spring in the cap used to hold the battery in place and known as the battery spring, is not the type used by this particular company and the possibility therefore arises from an examination of the tube that because of certain corrosive features on the inside of this tube, new wells were inserted and that the battery spring had become corroded from the action of the zinc chloride of the dead cells and was no longer able to be used. To further determine whether this probability occurred, new cells were placed in the flashlight and it was found that the flashlight was in working order.

A complete record will be obtained of all sales of this particular flashlight so that the possibility of any sales might not be missed and this search will start with the records appearing in the year 1928 up to and through the present date.

Dear Sir:

In response to your telegram of February 15, 1934, in which you asked that the firm of Hendrie and Bolteff, Denver, Colo., be contacted for the purpose of securing a record of the persons or concerns to whom they have sold their sirens, permit me to advise the following which was received from Agent Val C. Kinner of this office stationed at Denver, Colo.:

At the office of this company located at 1639 - 17th Street, Denver, Colo., it was learned that the company manufactures and sells sirens that are used as general alarms for municipalities such as fire and police alarms, and also as alarms in coal towns. The company does make a few smaller sirens that may be used on automobiles, such as are suitable for police and fire automotive equipment. However, no record of the persons, concerns or municipalities to whom these latter described sirens are sold is maintained. The general alarm sirens are recorded and they are manufactured in sizes from 3' square and weighing approximately 300 pounds, up to and including sirens weighing a ton or more.

From Mr. C. E. Drennen of that company, a list of the towns wherein their siren is sold within the territory of Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, North Dakota and Eastern Nebraska was secured and you will find that list attached.

The siren sold in the communities listed is known as the "Denver" siren. This is a large siren used only in general alarms as described above. The company does manufacture and sell 6 Volt sirens used on automotive equipment but it is not possible to furnish the names and addresses of the purchasers of this type of siren.

Dear Sir:

With reference to your telegram of February 16, 1934, concerning forth the locations of the H. L. Green Chain Stores in the middle west district, where the flashlights involved in this case probably were sold, please be advised that investigation of those stores will be conducted as early as possible.

In the meantime, interview was had with Mr. F. D. Bennett of the U. S. Electric Manufacturing Corporation, 525 West Polk Street, Chicago, who, after inspecting the original exhibits in this case, advised that it is very probable that all three of the flashlights were purchased at the same store. He said that he is practically certain that this type of flashlight was not shipped by his company to any mail order house, and that in all probability, it was sold to small chain stores.

Mr. Bennett said that the type of end cap attached to these flashlights is one of which not very many have been sold; further, that this type of end cap has never been sold through the Chicago office of the U. S. Electric Co., but were shipped direct from the factory in New York. Mr. Bennett suggested that one of the black flashlight cases, together with the end cap, be submitted immediately to the factory in New York for inspection, as he believes that it will be possible to determine exactly where these particular flashlights, bearing these particular end caps, were sold in the middle west.

Mr. Bennett had a sample of the silver base flashlight identical with the silver flashlight case exhibit in this case in his U. S. Office, and he is today forwarding his sample to the factory, together with a letter describing all of the flashlights and advising the factory that an agent from the New York office will call there for further information. The sample flashlight case which Mr. Bennett is

forwarding to the factory is identical in every respect except that it does not have the silver top cap," Mr. Bennett said this and was a very important part of this exhibit and would greatly aid the factory in determining the places where these flashlights were sold.

In accordance with Mr. Bennett's suggestion, there is being forwarded to you today by air mail one of the black flashlight case exhibits, and it is respectfully requested that you immediately present this to Mr. Henry Hyman, president of the U. S. Electric Manufacturing Corporation, 222 West 16th Street, New York City, for his inspection, and obtain all possible information regarding the places where these flashlights were sold. When the flashlight exhibit has served its purpose, it is to be returned by air mail to this office, to be used in further investigation of this matter. ANY information you obtain from the U. S. Electric Corporation likewise is to be forwarded to this office by air mail.

Your attention is invited to the communication from your office, dated February 7, 1934, recording memorandum received from Special Agent Dewey of Davenport, Iowa. This office is of the opinion that the statement made by Mrs. Mary Drew of 2340 East High Street, Davenport, relative to the identity of individuals residing two doors from that house and certain incidents alleged to have occurred therein should be thoroughly investigated.

It is believed that an Agent should gain admission to the house in an "undercover" capacity. This has been done in this jurisdiction by an Agent claiming to be connected with [REDACTED] and entering for the purpose of inspecting [REDACTED]

However, the guise under which the Agent enters the house, of course, depends upon local conditions and must be decided by the Agent conducting the investigation in the light thereof. Close scrutiny should be made of the location of the various rooms in the house in question. For this purpose, there is transmitted herewith a sketch showing the location of the various rooms and appurtenances on the floor of the house in which the Victim was held, according to the statements of the Victim himself. This is, of course, not guaranteed to be correct in every particular but does reflect specific statements made by said Victim and can, of course, be used for the purpose of deciding whether the location of the various rooms, et cetera, in this house or in any other house suspected in the future, coincide therewith.

I am forwarding under separate cover a rough drawing of the wall paper design, which is the best possible conception this office can obtain from Victim Brewer, of the wall paper design which was in the room of his confinement during his abduction.

It is believed that there were only four trees to each complete design, there being two trees on a horizontal line above two trees and a cluster of flowers seemingly attached to what appeared to be a branch between each two trees. The flowers, which appeared on these clusters and also on the trees, were similar and of a four leaf clover effect. Victim Brewer stated that these flowers were of different colors but that his only recollection is that some were purple and that he does not believe that any were red or green.

The victim believes that there were four sections of a fence in the design and that the fence at the upper left hand portion of the design consisted of eleven parts; that there were two upright posts followed by a horizontal post to each fence and that the upper left hand fence appeared very close to a tree, which tree appeared to cut in half the last portion of the fence which was on upright post. Victim believed that the fence in the lower left hand corner of the design had only upright posts between the tree and the closest horizontal post to the tree. Victim appears to be quite certain that the posts on the right hand side of the design, both upper and lower, contained only nine pieces to the fence but that he means nine including horizontals and uprights.

Victin believes that there were approximately six inches between the base of the upper trees and the top of the lower trees and that this space contained no design and was of a dull yellow color. He believed that to the immediate right and left of the trees there was a vague design of branches without any color which he can recall. He believes that this paper had a dark border at the top but cannot describe the design therin. From his description, it is apparent that the paper is of a cheap variety rather than an expensive one.

Inquiry at Minneapolis, Minnesota, has disclosed to this office that ROBERT GRIFFIN of the United Wall Paper Company, 157 West Side, Jersey City, New Jersey, is the acknowledged expert in wall paper patterns in this country. This information was furnished by MRS. FRANK KIRCHFIELD, who advises that Griffin is cognizant of practically all wall paper designs. It is requested that you immediately contact Mr. Griffin and advise him of what information you have concerning this design and solicit his cooperation in the identification of the patterns. In contacting Mr. Griffin, it is suggested that the name of Mrs. Frank Kirchfield of Minneapolis be used as she claims to be a very close business associate of Griffin.

It is requested that this design be immediately photostated by the New York Office and three copies furnished the Chicago Division Office in order that it may continue investigation in its district for the purpose of identifying this pattern. This lead should be given EXPEDITIOUS ATTENTION.

It is also requested that two photostatic copies of this design be furnished to the St. Louis Division Office; two to the Kansas City Division Office; and six to the St. Paul Division Office.



Rich and Special Agent J. H. Rice, covering a period from 1928 to 1934, but no patterns were found to resemble the design in question. This company was organized in 1928.

It has been further ascertained that the United Wall Paper Company, Joliet Branch, Joliet, Illinois, was formerly known as the Standard Wall Paper Company, this company having been covered in my letter of February 15, 1934.

Mr. L. E. Gedette, in charge of the Chicago Warehouse of the Imperial Paper & Color Corporation, Inc., 3801 South Ashland Avenue, Chicago, advised Special Agent Earl Van Wagoner, that the W. H. S. Lloyd Company, importers of wall paper, 434 South Wabash Ave., Chicago, might have samples of paper not manufactured by American manufacturers and a report covering the examination of the samples of paper of this company will be submitted immediately.

Agent Rich secured the attached sample of wall paper, marked 7-H, from Mr. F. G. Snedden, Secretary of the Superior Wall Paper Company, Joliet, Illinois, No. 7979, as requested in the letter from the Philadelphia Division Office, dated February 13, information having been received from the Enterprise Wall Paper Company, South Langhorn, Pa., that they recently purchased a design, resembling that described by BREWER, from the Superior Wall Paper Company, Joliet, Illinois. Zimmer of this office contacted Mr. Rowland K. Goddard, Operative in Charge, United States Secret Service, Denver, Colo., and Mr. Goddard informed Agent Zimmer that he had received a wire from his Chief at Washington, D. C. requesting that this Division be furnished with the desired information.

Mr. Goddard informed Agent Zimmer that the mint robbery case was a very old one and that while he had been very familiar with it, he was unable to furnish all the needed facts at once due to the lapse of time. and a letter from the Cincinnati Division office dated February 15, 1934,
in connection with the above entitled matter.

The W. H. S. Lloyd Company, 434 South Wabash Ave.
Chicago, Illinois, wall paper importers and jobbers, was contacted by
Special Agent W. C. Jamison, and approximately 2,200 samples of wall
paper were examined. Nothing resembling the design described by victim
was found. Mr. F. Tebbetts advised that the Lloyd Company handled prin-
cipally imported papers, most of the designs coming from England, but
that they had a few French and German designs. It was the opinion of Mr.
Tebbetts that the design described by victim would probably be found in
the so-called "scenic" wall paper, or may be obtained by putting together
two or more different patterns of wall paper. To illustrate this second
point he furnished a page from one of their catalogues, which is trans-
mitted herewith marked A-1, which shows the effect obtained by putting
together six different designs of paper. Mr. Tebbetts further advised
that it might be possible that the design described would be found in
the imported German papers, and that the Schottenberg Company, Marshall
Field Annex, Chicago, which handles a large line of German wall papers,
should be contacted.

Mr. Schottenberg advised Agent Jamison that the design
described by victim would in all probability be found in a domestic
rather than an imported scenic wall paper. Mr. Schottenberg stated that
he has been in the wall paper business all his life, and had specialized
in imported paper, and that he could not recall any design in imported
paper which resembled in any way the paper described by victim. He further
stated that scenic wall paper is quite expensive, both domestic and im-

In compliance with your telegram of February 18, 1934, all news dealers in Chicago, handling Saint Paul and Minneapolis newspapers, were contacted.

In addition to photographs of the subjects mentioned in your wire; namely, "Doc", Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis, photographs of Edward Doll, alias Edward LaRue, Eddie Bentz, James Lawson, Harry Campbell, Arthur E. Barker and Velney Davis were exhibited to these news dealers. The complete survey showed that fourteen places in Chicago handle Saint Paul and Minneapolis newspapers, and the total sales do not average more than thirty copies per day. Of these fourteen news dealers, only five were of the opinion they had, at one time or another, seen anyone resembling any of the parties whose photographs were shown them.

Mr. McDonough, of the news stand at the Morrison Hotel, 79 West Madison Street, was positive in his identification of Edward Doll, alias Edward LaRue, as a man who had purchased Saint Paul papers from him on five or six occasions, the last time, he believes, being the week-end of February 10, 1934. When asked to describe the man he identified as DOLL, Mr. McDonough stated he recalled very distinctly, this party's peculiar laugh or big smile. He said he had had no conversation with this party but that on at least one occasion, after buying a Saint Paul paper, this man had asked for a Minneapolis paper. McDonough said he thought at the time this was rather peculiar, for the reason that no customer wanting one of those papers, ever considered taking the other, as a general rule.

Mr. McDonough described the man he identified as DOLL as being of slender build, better than five feet ten inches tall, weighing about 160 pounds, neat in appearance, about twenty-five years of age, and usually wore dark clothes. He stated he had never seen this man with any other person.

A check was made at the Transportation Desk, the Hotel Desk and at Headquarters Office, of the Morrison Hotel, but no one at these places recognized the photograph of DOLL as a likeness of anyone who had stayed at the hotel. Mr. Party, Chief House Officer, Morrison Hotel, said DOLL's photograph looked familiar, but he did not believe this party had registered at the hotel. Mr. Party suggested that DOLL might have stayed at one of the smaller hotels in the neighborhood of the Morrison.

Accordingly, a check was made at the Hotel Harding, #29 North Clark Street; the Brevoort, #130 East Madison Street; the Grant Hotel, at Dearborn and Madison; and the Saratoga Hotel, #50 South Dearborn Street, all being located in the vicinity of the Morrison Hotel.

At the Saratoga Hotel, the Clerk stated he has seen DOLL many times but did not recognize the photographs of any of the other subjects mentioned. He was not sure where he had seen DOLL but said he was certain he had not registered at the Saratoga Hotel. At the other hotels mentioned, no identifications were made in connection with the photographs shown the various clerks at these hotels.

At the Palmer House, State and Monroe Streets, the news dealer said that DOLL had purchased at least one Saint Paul newspaper at his stand, but was not sure of the date and not certain enough of the identification to give any description. The Room Clerk, the head porter and the house officer at the Palmer House, failed to recognize the photographs of subjects shown them, as the likenesses of any persons they had ever seen.

Miss Drama, of the City Hall Book Shop, 111 North Clark Street, identified the photograph of DOLL as that of a party who had come in there for Saint Paul papers. She said at the time he purchased this paper, there was one on the stand outside the store and she purchased this for him. She said she could not give any description of the man, but she thinks there was another man with him and that the party the claims resembled DOLL, wore a leather coat and a cap at the time. Her identification was not positive.

At the Queen City News Stand, State and Randolph Streets, the party interviewed stated he believed ALVIN KARPIS purchased Saint Paul and Minneapolis newspapers at that stand about three weeks ago. He was not positive as to this identification and could give no description of the party he thought resembled ALVIN KARPIS, merely stating the photograph of Karpis looked like a person who had obtained Saint Paul and Minneapolis papers at that stand.

At the Post Office News Stand, 65 West Randolph Street, Chicago, it was ascertained that parties resembling ALVIN KARPIS and VOLNEY DAVIS purchased Saint Paul newspapers there. They were unable to give any descriptions of these parties and their identifications were not positive.

At the Morrison Hotel, the Transportation Clerk was shown pictures of the subjects in question and asked if he could recall any of these parties making reservations for air travel. He failed to recognize any of the subjects as resembling persons who had called at that office.

At the office of the American Airways, 812 South Michigan Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, a check was made of the lists of passengers making flights south from February 7 to February 11, 1934, as it was thought that DOLL might have gone to Florida by plane with a companion. The lists revealed that only six persons had booked passage to Florida during the period indicated and none of these persons could be identified as DOLL.

In the near future, inquiries will again be made at the news stand where ALVIN KARPIS and VOLNEY DAVIS are believed to have been identified, in the hope it may be ascertained these parties are making regular trips to the news stand.

On the afternoon of February 17 Acting Special Agent in Charge Spears of the Kansas City, Missouri office telephonically contacted this office and advised that he had communicated with you and that it was deemed necessary to again interview Kathryn Kelly at Milan, Michigan for the purpose of securing additional specific information regarding the association of herself and George Kelly with Doris Barton and Eddie Larse, this information being essential in order to properly interrogate Doris Barton, who denied knowing Kathryn Kelly.

Confirming my telephonic communication with you yesterday, please be advised that I had a further talk with Kathryn Kelly and she informed me that about June 1, 1933 George Kelly, through pre-arrangement, met Eddie Larse and George Bates at the Post Office in Cleveland, Ohio. She states that the reason for this meeting was to attempt to negotiate some bank robberies in that vicinity; that Larse had proceeded to Cleveland, originally from Chicago, in his maroon colored Chevrolet Coupe with Doris Barton and her eight year old nephew and that George Bates had arrived there from Denver by train. She stated that the following day after this meeting both she and George accidentally ran into Doris Barton and Larse at a parking lot same unknown. She further advised that Bates stayed in Cleveland, a day or two and then proceeded by train to Indianapolis, Indiana; that Doris Barton and Eddie Larse, together with the eight year old boy, proceeded to Aurora, Illinois where Larse informed the Kellys he was to leave Doris Barton and the boy. The Kellys purchased a new 16 cylinder Cadillac on June 4 and the proceeded to Indianapolis. A few days later Bates, Larse and Kelly met in the Post Office at Indianapolis and further discussions were held regarding bank robberies in that vicinity, Larse having driven to Indianapolis from Aurora. She states that the gang purchased another Chevrolet Coupe or Sedan which was to be used in the robberies. Before any robberies were negotiated, Larse, Bates and Kelly became engaged in an altercation with the result that no robbery was committed and Bates and Larse proceeded back to Chicago, the Kellys going to Texas. Kathryn Kelly states that when a few miles outside the city of Indianapolis, Kelly, Larse and Bates matched for the machine-gun and Bates won. This, she states, was the machine-gun found in the possession of Bailey when he was apprehended at Paradise, Texas.

Mrs. Kelly states that she later learned that Larue, Doris Barton and the eight year old boy had been living in the Stevens Hotel, Chicago, as indicated in my communication of February 9. She further states that while she and Kelly were residing at 4900 St. Charles Street, New Orleans between November 20, 1932 and December 5, 1932 that Larue and Doris Barton were then living at the Ponthierian Apartment Hotel, which is also on St. Charles Street, New Orleans and it was during this period that Kelly, Bates, Bailey and Larue robbed the Toledo, Mississippi bank. She states that Larue stopped at the Kelly home in Fort Worth, Texas several times, but that Doris Barton was not with him there. She states that about two years ago Doris Barton and Larue stopped at the Adolphus Hotel, Dallas, Texas and departed from that point for Maine. This was at the time when Larue stated he was going to Maine with Doris for the purpose of becoming married. Mrs. Kelly states that about three or four months before the Graceland kidnapping, which occurred in July, 1933, Larue and Doris Barton were residing at the Berkshire Arms, Kansas City, Missouri, probably under the name of Long and that Kathryn and George Kelly had dinner with them in that apartment and also Kathryn on one occasion had lunch with Doris Barton. This definitely proves that Doris Barton is acquainted with Kathryn Kelly and there is every reason to believe that Kathryn Kelly is telling the truth.

During my interview with her Saturday night, Kathryn Kelly was somewhat apprehensive about giving any information regarding Doris Barton, stating that Doris was a nice girl and that she, Kathryn, did not want to do anything which would harm her, further stating that she did not know definitely if Doris Barton had knowledge of the crimes that Eddie Larue was engaged in, but from her actions it was indicated that evidently Doris Barton should have been as familiar with the gang in view of her association, as was Kathryn Kelly.

Mrs. Kelly stated that on one occasion in Chicago Larue remarked that Doris had become somewhat disturbed because he had not brought home enough money and at that time he had \$9,000 in cash which had been taken from some bank robbery and that he then stated that he was going to throw this money over the transom when he got to the apartment of Doris Barton so that she could have an opportunity to see it before he attempted to open the door and walk in. Kathryn Kelly stated that she could not remember from which particular robbery this money was secured.

With regard to Doris Barton's apartment on Sheridan Road, Chicago as indicated in my letter of February 9, Kathryn Kelly now states that she had on several occasions driven Eddie Larue to this place but that she does not remember ever having actually visited Doris Barton in this apartment.

Kathryn Kelly was questioned as to where Eddie Larue and George Kelly lived in Chicago in February 1932 when Mr. Woolverton was

kidnaped at South Bend, Indiana and she stated that she did not possess that information but it was her thought that evidently Larme was living with Doris Barton in the apartment on Sheridan Road and that Kelly probably was either residing there with Larme or was living in some hotel in Chicago. As I advised you yesterday, George Kelly has admitted his participation in the kidnaping of Mr. Woolverton and has implicated Eddie Larme in same. I am transmitting herewith for your information in questioning Larme regarding the Woolverton kidnaping, a copy of the statement given by Edward A. Woolverton of South Bend, Indiana to Special Agent J. T. Martin, Chicago and also copy of report of Agent Martin dated 2/12/34, which sets forth the results of the investigation at South Bend. Also a copy of a letter from the Kansas City office dated February 9 showing the result of interview had with Kelly at the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth. You will note in this material that Kelly and Larme evidently secured the sum of \$8,000 in ransom in this case. Further information with regard to this particular matter is set out in my report of February 18, 1934, of which copies were forwarded to your office.

Mrs. Kelly also informed me that Harvey Bellay, Ed Bentz, "Big Homer" (full name unknown) and Eddie Larme perpetrated the bank robbery at Lincoln, Nebraska. It is suggested that Larme be carefully interrogated as to the full name of "Big Homer" which might be of future value in the instant case. Also, he should be questioned regarding the location of the house between Chicago and Joliet where Woolverton was held which, Mrs. Kelly states, was the home of Larme's brother. To date this house has not been found. It will be noted in the statement made by Mr. Woolverton that he has given a very good description of Larme including the hacking cough and the soft voice and undoubtedly will be able to immediately identify Larme.

Referring to letter of even date in the above matter, and supplemental thereto, it is believed desirable that in the event it is ascertained that the house mentioned in said letter, or any other houses located in future investigations, appears to be similar with the floor plan transmitted to you by the U. S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE that the following details be checked with a view to establishing the identity of both house and location.

The Victim reports that he heard two separate sounding church bells during his confinement; that one church bell rang on Saturday nights at approximately 6:00 o'clock and again several times at varying intervals during the following Sunday mornings. He also heard a different bell, presumably from some other church, on Sunday morning only. In other words, there would be two church bells to locate in two churches. It is thought from the time of the ringing, that the first bell, i.e., the one ringing Saturday night and Sunday morning is that of a Catholic church.

Victim also stated that, from his place of confinement, he heard a stationary siren each morning, with the exception of Sunday morning, at about 7:00 o'clock. Incidentally, on one Sunday morning this siren gave three or four toots, or soundings, of lesser time duration than the regular sounding on week day mornings. Further, the Victim stated that he heard a whistle each morning with the exception of Sunday morning; said whistle might be located a mile or so distant and appeared to be on the order of a factory whistle. This different whistle blew simultaneously, or almost simultaneously, with the blowing of the week day siren re-

evening at approximately 6:00 o'clock.

This will confirm telephonic request of Special Agent in Charge R. A. Alt, of Tampa, Florida on February 17, 1934, to me to the effect that George Kelley Barnes should be interviewed at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, relative to all information possible concerning Doris Barton and Eddie LaRue.

Mr. Alt stated that it was particularly desired that George Kelley be questioned as to whether he and Kathryn Kelley met Doris Barton and Eddie LaRue at a parking station in Cleveland, Ohio on or about June 1, 1933. He also stated that all possible information to show acquaintance and relationship between the Kelleys, LaRue and Doris Barton be obtained.

Mr. Alt further requested that the Detroit Office be contacted and that office be requested to further interview Kathryn Kelley in line with information set out in letter written by Special Agent in Charge Larson under date of February 9, 1934, the desired information to be obtained from Kathryn Kelley to be similar to that requested from George Kelley. I immediately telephoned the Detroit Office, speaking to Agent Nicholson, and requested the desired interview with Kathryn Kelley and instructing, pursuant to information from Mr. Alt, that the facts obtained be immediately telegraphed to Mr. Alt, in care of the Tampa Terrace Hotel, Tampa, Florida.

Special Agent A. E. Farland interviewed George Kelley Barnes at the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, on the afternoon of February 17, 1934, at which time Kelley advised that he and Kathryn Kelley had met Eddie LaRue and Doris Barton at Cleveland, Ohio at a parking lot during the first part of June 1933, at which time the Kelleys had Kelley's 12 cylinder convertible Cadillac Coupe.

Eddie LaRue and Doris Barton were in a red Chevrolet Convertible Coupe. George Kelley stated that he recalled that this meeting with Eddie LaRue and Doris Barton at the parking lot had been on the day previous to that on which he purchased his 46 cylinder Cadillac at Cleveland.

By reference to the report of Special Agent H.C. Chapman, dated at Detroit, Michigan, September 5, 1933, in the Urschel Kidnapping case, it is noted that Mr. J. W. Park, Credit Manager of General Motors Acceptance Corporation, at Cleveland, Ohio, advised Agent Chapman that Kelley had purchased a V-16 Cadillac on Saturday afternoon June 3, 1933. From the above information it would appear that the Kelleys saw LaRue and Doris Barton at Cleveland on June 3, 1933.

Kelley further stated that Eddie and Doris had just come from New York and were going to see "Grand Hotel", a moving picture in Cleveland, Ohio, and they asked the Kelleys to accompany them; however, this invitation was refused as George and Kathryn had previously seen the picture.

Kelley further stated that he believed Doris Barton had been a "call girl" in Chicago, and had a nice apartment at an address which he believed was 5524 Lake Shore Drive, Chicago, Illinois, although Kelley was not positive about the street address. He recalled that this apartment was across the street from the Edgewater Beach Hotel, in Chicago. He further stated that Eddie LaRue and Doris Barton lived together for approximately two years prior to the time they were married in New York City, about September 1932, Eddie and Doris having stopped at some big hotel in New York City, the name of which Kelley did not know.

Kelley further stated that he had known Doris Barton for about two or three years, his acquaintanceship with her having been through Eddie LaRue; further stating that Kathryn Kelley had only met Doris on one or two occasions, these meetings having been while Kathryn was with George.

A telegraphic summary of the above information was furnished Special Agent in Charge R. A. Alt, in care of the Tampa Terrace hotel, Tampa, Florida, on February 17, 1934, the telegram

February 12. The letters addressed to Charles McGee or Honest Adolph, to the Payoff Man, and to Adolph Bremer by the kidnapers were written on the same typewriter as the other extortion letters. The stationery used measures 10.87 by 8.5 inches, is .0032 inches thick, and weighs from 3.4631 to 3.5189 grams. This paper has a laid finish and no water-mark. It is such as is made for 8½ by 11 typewriter business paper. All three sheets of the above letters are identical stationery.

The envelope addressed Walter McGee or Payoff Man measures 9.49 by 4.13 inches, is .0049 inches thick, and weighs 6.1550 grams. The envelope addressed Walter McGee or Adolph Bremer is approximately the same dimensions, is the same thickness, and approximately the same weight. It is concluded that this is identical stationery. The typewriting used in addressing these envelopes appears to be the same as that used in writing all of the letters.

The envelopes addressed to Adolf Bremer, Rev. John Deeve, Miss Lillian L. Dickman, and Ed Bremer's Wife are considered identical stationery, measuring 6.51 by 3.62 inches, being .0049 inches thick, and of various weights approximating 3.6 grams. This is probably a small size envelope made to go with the larger size just described and sold in the same box with the typewriter paper. There are no water-marks in these small envelopes or in the larger size envelopes, one of which was used in the letter addressed to Adolf Bremer.

The stationery used in the personal letters of Edward Bremer to his family, such as the letters to "My Dear Father Deeve", "My Dear Father", "My Dearest Patz and Hertz", and "My Dear Lil", is that containing the watermark "Eaton's Highland Linen". This is a note paper made with a woven finish measuring 10.18 by 6.42 inches when spread out, as it comes folded in the middle. It is .0049 inches thick and the letters average about 4.96 grams in weight in their present condition. This paper is manufactured by the Eaton Paper Company, Pittsfield, Massachusetts. A teletype message was forwarded February 12 to the St. Paul Office with this information in order that the retail source of the paper may be ascertained.

On the letter addressed to Adolph Bremer there was stuck a thin film of substance about 1/4 of an inch in diameter, to which adheres some hair and other debris. This was cut off and a further report will be made after it has been examined thoroughly.

The typewriting on these three extortion letters addressed to Charles McGee or Honest Adolph, to the Payoff Man, and to Adolf Bremer, is identical with the typewriting in the previous extortion letters. The handwriting in the personal letters of Edward Bremer to his family is identical with the handwriting of Edward Bremer.





Agent learned that the Decot sirens are operated electrically and are of the following horsepower: 1-1/2 h.p.; 3 h.p.; 5 h.p.; and 12 h.p.

MR. DECOT stated that there are only a few 1-1/2 and 12 h.p. sirens in existence, the most commonly used being either the 3 or 5 h.p. siren. The 1-1/2 h.p. siren can be heard for about a mile under favorable weather conditions; the 3 h.p. siren from 1-1/2 to 2 miles; the 5 h.p. siren from 10 to 15 miles; and the 12 h.p. siren from about 10 to 15 miles.

It was also stated that all of the sirens set out above are used for the purpose of fire alarms and curfews with the exception of several of those located in the State of Minnesota in which instances the sirens are used by mining companies in the respective towns. The Minnesota towns in which the sirens are used by mining companies were furnished as McKinley, Keewatin, and Hibbing.

It was further stated that the Decot siren is the only double-tone siren on the market, the double tones of same being a combination of the keys of "G" and "G". In this connection, MR. DECOT stated that a good idea of the tone of his siren could be obtained through striking the "G" and "G" cords on a piano.

There will be found attached hereto a pamphlet published by Decot's Machine Works in connection with their sirens.

Telephone call was received at two-fifteen P.M. from Special Agent D. O. Smith at Tampa, requesting that Post Office Inspectors at Jacksonville be immediately contacted with reference to a possible robbery of the mails in Effingham, Illinois, last fall in which five pouches of mail were stolen during a transfer from the Pennsylvania Railroad to the Illinois Central Railroad.

Agent Smith advised that evidently this mail robbery was an attempt to steal registered mail, but that by error regular pouches were taken rather than registered pouches.

Immediately, efforts were made to contact local Post Office Inspectors and it was ascertained that those assigned to Jacksonville as headquarters were not available but that Inspector H. S. Smith of Atlanta, Georgia, was on temporary duty at Jacksonville. He was contacted and stated that he had no independent recollection of any such robbery, but that he would immediately get in communication with the Post Office Inspector in Charge in Chicago, Illinois, and request complete information concerning such a robbery.

At about six P.M., Mr. Smith telephoned the Jacksonville Office and read the following telegram, which was immediately dispatched to Special Agent in Charge R. A. Alt, Tampa, Florida:

Reference is made to my letter dated February 10, 1934, outlining an interview with Julius A. (Babe) Jones, relative to Eddie LaRue, Subject of Identification Order #1214; Clarence "Dad" Eaton, John Eaton alias "Po-Shot" Beilley, "Private Tutor", and others.

Jones, upon being interviewed by Special Agent Ray C. Johnson at the Cook County Jail, Chicago, Illinois, advised that he had never heard of George Kelley before the Drexel Kidnapping and did not know that LaRue had been involved in the Woolverton Kidnapping, believing this latter kidnaping was the work of some Indiana Mob.

Further outlining contacts of LaRue, et al., Jones stated that Beilley has a good friend named Gerry Bailes, who is originally from Mount Vernon, Iowa, but who is now operating a gambling place, known as The Fox River Gardens, located across from the Exposition Park (race track), in Aurora, Illinois. Bailes also has a residence in Montgomery, Illinois. He is known, not only to Beilley, but to LaRue and Eaton and will not hesitate to hide any of these persons in the event they are being sought.

Jones advised that in either the fall of 1931 or the spring of 1932, Beilley, while being hunted by the Iowa State Authorities, was at the residence of Gerry Bailes in Montgomery, Illinois, ill for several weeks. Bailes is described by Jones as being about 50 years old; 5 feet 10 inches tall; weighing about 200 pounds; gray hair; dark complexion; is coarse talker, has deep bass voice.

Further, according to Jones, one "Uncle" Hopkins, former alcohol runner in Des Moines, Iowa, is now with Bailes. This person is between 30 and 45 years of age, about 6 feet tall, weighs about 200 pounds, is large build and has dark complexion. 7-576-555

Jones also stated that La Rue, Eaton and Beilley have a good friend, named Jimmy Meyers, a former bootlegger, who now operates a saloon in Peoria, Illinois, and who is also well known to the FBI as 1934 police in that city.

Elaborating further on the connection of Harry Sawyer, a Saint Paul saloon keeper, with La Rue, Mr. Jones stated that it is possible Sawyer was the "fixer-upper" in both the Hamm and Bremer kidnapings. Jones stated that in 1932, La Rue had a green colored Chrysler Imperial 80 Sedan and Eaton had a maroon colored middle-sized Chrysler Sedan with green colored wire wheels, both of which cars were purchased from Harry Sawyer's brother-in-law, name not known, who was the Chrysler Dealer in Lincoln, Nebraska. This man, according to Jones, was in on the Lincoln, Nebraska, bank robbery in 1931 and is an all-around questionable character, not hesitating to harbor fugitives, or to equip cars with concealed platting for such persons. Jones stated that Eaton furnished him this information and stated that in the purchase of his (Eaton's) car, this brother-in-law of Sawyer's extended him \$900.00 credit, through Sawyer.

Jones further advised that on one occasion, he heard Beilley mentioned having a "right plant" (meaning hideout) in Springfield, Illinois; however, Jones has no information concerning the identity of the person residing here.

Jones further stated that Beilley always drives small cars, such as Plymouths; however, that La Rue and Eaton usually drive much larger cars and La Rue's cars were usually loud in color; further, that Beilley, while being sought by the authorities, usually hides out on a farm and is believed to own two farms somewhere in Iowa; however, Eaton usually hides out in cities.

In the summer of 1933, according to Jones, Beilley was operating a roadhouse, name not known, located somewhere on the outskirts of Des Moines, Iowa. Again Jones reiterated his contention that these men were in on the Hamm Kidnapping, stating that in July and August, 1933, Beilley had an enormous amount of money, whereas, shortly before that time, he had very little.

Jones further advised that "Doe" Eaton had an ex-wife, name not known, residing in Saint Paul, Minnesota. This person has been arrested there for shoplifting and while Eaton was in the Minnesota State Penitentiary at Stillwater, she "fleeced" some Saint Paul millionaire out of approximately \$30,000.00. Eaton is believed by Jones to have gone back to this woman, subsequent to his release from Stillwater and she might have assisted in some way in the kidnaping of Hamm and Bremer.

Jones stated that in the fall of 1931 or the spring of 1932, La Rue gave Joe Hamm, a restaurant owner and radio entertainer of Kansas City, Missouri, \$10,000.00 to hold for him so that it would be available in the event, he (La Rue) were arrested. When La Rue later got in touch with him, he found the latter had spent this money.

In connection with this information, Jones advised that Bailely informed him that because of this incident, La Rue asked "Bump off" Burns; however, according to Jones, all three of the persons mentioned, namely, La Rue, Bates and Bailely, might contact Burns for protection.

Referring to the letter from the Kansas City Office to the Saint Paul office, under date of February 14, 1934, Jones was questioned concerning "Old Charlie", a supposed Chicago Police character. He stated that the only "Old Charlie" he had ever heard of, was an old man whom he knew to be a "case man" for the Bailely, Bates, Burns, Winkler mob. This individual originally resided in Saint Paul, Minnesota, but occasionally came to Chicago on jobs, when requested to do so by members of this mob. According to Jones, this "Old Charlie" was arrested in Chicago with Burns and several others in 1928 or 1929 and was released. He has a long criminal record and is an Irishman with a Dutch name. Jones stated he believed this person died sometime last year.

Referring to "Big Homer", Jones stated that this person is also known as "The Big Moose". Jones stated he saw him on two or three occasions, but advised that he knew very little about him, aside from knowing him to be an associate of the persons mentioned. He described this person as follows:

Name:	"Big Homer"

	Is very good looking.

Jones stated he last saw "Big Homer" sometime in 1933 at Ballard & Frasier's, a sea food restaurant located on Lake Street near State Street in Chicago, which place, at that time, was reported to be owned by Gus Winkler. Aside from operating as a restaurant, this place also has a "Hand Book" located in the basement.

Upon being pressed for further information concerning "Big Homer", Jones stated that he knew this person to have been married in Chicago in either 1923 or 1934, to a Chicago girl, who is of the Catholic Religion; that this Chicago girl bears a very good reputation and does not know that "Big Homer" is a hoodlum, but believes him to be a prosperous broker. Jones rather reluctantly stated that a

friend of his was a witness to this marriage, which was performed by a Catholic priest, but that under no circumstances would he give the name of this friend. He also stated that he did not know from what source they were married and stated that although he had heard "Big Homer's" name, he did not remember ever meeting him.

When probed for further information, he stated that it is possible "Big Homer" is known to Captain Daniel Gilbert and Lieutenant Frank Johnson of the State's Attorney's Office, Chicago, Illinois. These persons have been out of town for several days but an interview will be had with them immediately upon their return.

Referring further to "Big Homer", Jones stated that this person has a very good friend, known as Willie Harrison, who is a former Saint Louis Police character and who now operates a saloon at Calumet City, Illinois. Harrison was arrested, according to Jones, in 1930, 1931 or 1932 by the Police Department of Chicago, Illinois for participation in a bank robbery at Jefferson, Wisconsin; however, he is believed to have been released without extradition.

The Chicago Division Office, if unsuccessful in securing more definite information concerning "Big Homer" from Captain Gilbert or Lieutenant Johnson, of the State's Attorney's Office, Chicago, Illinois, will reinterview Julius A. (Babe) Jones in an effort to ascertain the name of the friend who was a witness of "Big Homer's" marriage.

The date of Jones' sentence in connection with the kidnaping of James Eackett, has been postponed in State Court at Chicago to April 31, 1934.



There are attached to this letter and to copies transmitted to the Division and to the Salt Lake City Office, carbon copies of a telegram of this date from the Kansas City Office to the Salt Lake City Office, relative to the possible identification of Homer Watkins, as the same individual known as "Big Homer" and "Swede Billy", who was mentioned by convict Arthur Johnson of the Colorado State Penitentiary and set out in the report of Special Agent A. R. Gere, dated at Salt Lake City, November 24, 1933, in the case of Vernon C. Miller, et al, Conspiracy to Deliver Federal Prisoner. You will note that "Big Homer" is also mentioned in the report of Special Agent W. Carter Baum, dated at Chicago, Ill. Sept. 13, 1933 in that case, and in several other reports in the file. "Big Homer" appears to be an important suspect in this matter. Apparently the Chicago Office was unable to develop his true identity by investigation there, based upon the information furnished by convict Johnson to Agent Gere.

With a letter from the Salt Lake City Office in the Vernon C. Miller case, dated August 4, 1933, was transmitted a page from the American Banker's Association Journal for August 1933, which page bore photographs of Jim Clark and Bernard Phillips, suspects in the Miller case. A photograph of Homer Watkins also appeared on the same page. It is noted that Watkins is said to have served in the state penitentiaries of California, Colorado, Washington and Missouri; released from the Colorado institution May 27, 1932. It has occurred to the Agent handling the file of the Massacre case here that Homer Watkins may be identical with "Big Homer".

A record of "Big Homer" is being sought at the Missouri State Pen., and since the discovery of the name Homer Watkins a record of that individual will be secured there, as they may be identical.







Reference is made to your letter dated February 16, 1934, wherein you set forth information obtained from the records of the Kansas State Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, concerning one "Big Frits", with aliases.

It appears from a review of the file entitled John Hammond, with aliases, et al., National Motor Vehicle Theft Act., St. Paul the office of origin, that "Big Frits", is identical with subject Hammond who, on December 11, 1933, at St. Paul, Minnesota, was found guilty of violating the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, and on January 8, 1934, was sentenced to serve one year and one day in the United States Penitentiary, at Leavenworth, Kansas. The records of the Bureau of Prisons, Washington, D. C., reflect that this individual was received at the latter institution February 10, 1934.

In connection with telegraphic conversation this afternoon with Mr. Clegg in the matter of comment on the part of a newspaper at Red Wing, Minnesota, in which Special Agents of this Division were accused of giving publicity to the wall paper and serial number phases of the Bremer case. I beg to state as follows:

Information along these lines was not given to the press by any Division employee in the St. Paul jurisdiction. I am thoroughly convinced of that. When the wall paper story first appeared, I considered it extremely damaging from an investigative standpoint. It first appeared in this jurisdiction in the St. Paul Dispatch, a newspaper with Associated Press connections. I called in a Mr. Thompson, a reporter for the St. Paul Dispatch, and expressed my opinion to him of the nature of this publicity, and told him that while I assumed he would not be very eager to inform me as to the source, yet I would like to know it, and told him that if I secured it, and if he so desired, I would keep the information confidential. He told me that it had come to him from the Associated Press.

I then spoke to a Mr. Mackey of the Associated Press, who in turn told me that he secured it from matter received from the St. Paul Dispatch. I also told him that if I secured the source, and if he so desired, I would keep it confidential.

I have not yet secured the source from either of these individuals and I doubt that they care to tell me.

With regard to the complicity of the members of this Division in the matter of the serial numbers story, the same may be stated. I am confident that it did not emanate from here. I was not so much concerned about this story as I was about the wall paper story inasmuch



as I feel that it did not require any source or leak to enable a newspaper man well versed in these cases to guess at this procedure. However, I am entirely unaware as to the original source upon which this story was based. In this connection, and only as a surmise, I might point out that the Bremer family is numerous and they have many friends. They are socially inclined and I am told that in the evenings both at Adolph and Edward Bremer's house there are many callers who play cards and drink beer, etc., until a rather late hour of the night. I feel that it is quite possible for considerable discussion to ensue over various phases of the case in both households. I feel also that it is quite possible for leaks to emanate therefrom. The Bremer family were, of course, well aware that the serial numbers of the ransom notes were in our possession, Otto Bremer and the officials of his bank having furnished us these numbers and having discussed inaccuracies in certain numbers with us on many occasions. It is also true that the police, who had a day guard in this bank, were probably aware that we had these serial numbers although I did not ever discuss this with them nor do I recall hearing it discussed.

Should I receive any further information along the above lines, I will furnish it at once.

This is a joint memorandum of Special Agents Neenan, Brennan, Glynn, and Blake.

At Clear Lake, Iowa, on February 12, 1934, EVERETT WOOLRIDGE pointed out the house occupied by MRS. ZOBEL and WILBUR HUGHSON and the number is 514 Vincent Street and not 415. He also advised that the house in question was or had been owned by a MRS. KNUDSON who lived next door to 514 Vincent Street.

Agent Blake called at the home of MRS. KNUDSON and upon interview with her and her sister ascertained that the present occupants of the house consist of MRS. ZOBEL, an elderly woman invalided by rheumatism, who now owns the house; her son Henry Zobel; and a woman who poses as his wife, WILBUR HUGHSON and his alleged wife, who is a daughter of MRS. ZOBEL Senior.

HUGHSON and his wife have been living at 514 Vincent Street since March, 1933, having previously lived in Sioux City, Iowa, and St. Paul, Minnesota.

HENRY ZOBEL is employed by the C.W.A. and works two days a week, Thursday and Friday.

The house consists of two bedrooms, living room, dining room and kitchen, all on the ground floor. There are no second story rooms. There is a cellar entrance to which is had through a trap door in the bathroom.

HUGHSON drives a 1933 Model Chevrolet Sedan, wine colored, with Minnesota license plates. He left Clear Lake on February 8, 1934, at 2:00 P.M., going in an easterly direction accompanied by a man who had been in Clear Lake with him about three weeks. During the three weeks, these two men were in Clear Lake, they seldom went out during the day but were frequently away from the house during the night. This man was described as about 25 to 30 years of age, 5'10" tall, light complexioned and having brown hair, and wearing a brown overcoat with fur trimmed collar and cuffs. ²⁹¹ Leaving, appeared as if he had not shaved for a

week or more. During the stay of these two men at the house, the shades were noticed to be drawn upon only two occasions and no other men were seen to arrive at or depart from the house although apparently the informant noticed the house rather closely. When leaving, the men put three nice looking large suit cases in the car. One night, a woman was seen at the house who was not MRS. ZOBEL or her daughter or daughter-in-law. A son of the informant was said by her to have been told by HUGHESON that he was a detective. The son saw two sawed off shot guns in HUGHESON's care. There is no telephone in the ZOBEL house and no children are there and none have been there since the ZOBELS have lived there, although children do play in the streets. There is no bathtub in the room called the bathroom. Church bells and a public school bell are audible at the ZOBEL home. The cellar is bricked up with side walls but there is no way to heat it.

Agent Glynn, under the pretext of being [REDACTED] gained access to the house and found MRS. ZOBEL, HENRY ZOBEL, his wife, MRS. HUGHESON and a MISS SMITH there. MRS. HUGHESON said her husband was at the Rogers Hotel, Minneapolis, Minnesota. AGENT GLYNN found the cellar to be about four feet by seven feet and no bed there. The design of the wall paper was a vase with flowers.

At Clear Lake, Iowa, on February 12, 1934, the photographs of all the KARPIS-BARKER gang were shown to FORD LEE, clerk, and MRS. CARROLL, postmaster, but they could not recognize any of them as being parties who had called there recently for mail, or who had been seen around the address of WILBUR HUGHESON.

MR. LEE, above mentioned, who had requested that his name be left out of this matter, directed a letter to Agent following this interview, which letter was received on February 13, 1934, and he stated that the number of the house where HUGHESON has been residing is 414 North Wisconsin Street and not 415 as previously he had advised. He also stated that he had made further inquiries and the only description he had been able to get of the other party who had been seen at this address, this being an additional party who had been seen at this address other than the one known as M. J. HOGAN, was that this party was about six feet tall, and weighed about two hundred pounds, was of rather hulking build and "dumb" looking and acting.

At Mason City, Iowa, RAY OUDMAN of the Identification Division, Police Department, found a record of one, EMMET WARREN HUGHESON, Mason City Police #4320.

OUDMAN could not find the fingerprint card of this party at the time nor had he found same the following day when he forwarded pictures of HUGHESON to this office. He had the following classification however:

I, Mrs. John (Grace) Miller wish to make the following statement voluntarily to R. L. Wells, Special Agent, Division of Investigation, United States Department of Justice.

Two weeks ago last Friday, as near as I can recall, it was January 26, 1934, just about dusk, sometime between six and seven p.m., I went into my living room in the front of home which is located at 1209 Hague Ave., St. Paul, Minn. At the time I had a cup of tea in my hand and intended to sit in one of the easy chairs and drink it. I decided to try the night latch on the front door and proceeded there, opened the door and stepped out on the porch for a little air. Just as I stepped onto the porch, I observed a man walking rapidly, almost in a trot, down the drive way of a vacant house which is located to the right of my home. My attention was attracted to some shiny object which this man was holding in his left hand and apparently was trying to conceal. I did not notice this man's features at all though I did observe that his shoulders appeared rather broad, average height. He had a dark cape or coat thrown around his shoulder. His trousers were a very light gray. This man did not look towards me but when passing me he spurred up a little and proceeded across the street where he entered a car which was parked on Hague Ave. facing east just about four doors up from Dunlap. I observed that it was a dark car, either sedan or coach. I did not observe whether anyone was waiting in the car and I failed to observe the license plates. I was on the porch just about a minute.

When I came back into the house I sat down in the living room and my chair was facing the street. I had no more than seated myself when a light flashed through the window into my face. I believed it to be a flashlight. This light more or less startled me. I arose from my chair and moved toward the center of the room at the same time glancing through the front window where I observed a man or boy dressed in a dark uniform and what appeared to be high boots on the porch. I stood back thinking the door bell would ring. However, the bell did not ring and I again glanced through the window observing at this time that the person in uniform had left the porch and was at the foot of the steps. The flashlight was showing back towards the front door. This person in uniform then moved down the street in easterly direction and flashed the light on the house situated to the left of my house and I lost sight of him in the darkness.

A few moments later I went to the front door and opened it. I felt something against the storm door and stooped to look at it. I observed a Hill's Brothers coffee can and gave it a kick with my foot. I saw it had been opened and found in the can a large white envelope, long envelope, such as are used for business letters. I picked the envelope up and observed

that it was marked personal and addressed to Adolph Broemel and better notes. I left the can on the porch and placed the letter in front of my husband. I immediately went to the telephone and called our husband, Mr. John Miller, informing him that he had better come home for a little while. I did not tell him for what purpose.

Mr. Miller came home immediately and I related to him just what had happened. I gave Mr. Miller the envelope and he went out on the porch and brought the coffee can in. Mr. Miller made no comments to me whatever about the note. He picked up the telephone book and I left the room. I do not know whether he made a call or not and I did not want to stay around any longer since I did not care to be mixed up in the affair.

The note was not opened while in my possession. Mr. Miller never informed me as to the contents of the note and even to this date I am unaware as to the contents of the note.

The things that impressed me about the man I saw in the driveway were the heavy shoulders, swaggering walk, and the manner in which he held his head down, apparently to hide his features. His dress was funny and bulky. It appeared as though he was wearing more than one suit of clothes.

The above has been read by me and is true as written.

The St. Paul Division office was in receipt of a telephone call from a party at 1015 Pioneer Building, advising that he had some information of value to this investigation.

MR. W. D. FRITZ was contacted at the above address and advised Agent that he owns a parking lot at 56 Eighth Street; that about two weeks ago while he was present at the lot, three men drove in, in a Ford V8 Sedan, 1933 model, and two men remained in the car after it was parked. These men were gruff when spoken to, and he believed them to be suspicious characters. He was unable to give any record of the license number, and when Agent contacted TED PAJESKI, caretaker at the lot, PAJESKI was unable even to recall the circumstances. MR. FRITZ was unable to describe the parties in the car other than that the driver was a large man with a round face, ruddy complexion and sandy hair.

I again contacted confidential informant [REDACTED] this case [REDACTED] on February 15th and requested that he endeavor to ascertain [REDACTED] the following:

(1) Through his connection with the victim's family, [REDACTED] fragments of the victim's story as he could obtain from general conversation with them.

(2) The present location of KARPIS, the two BARKERS, and that gang.

(3) The present location of the St. Paul underworld headquarters.

(4) Present location of JACK DAVENPORT.

In conversation with him at this time, he told me that [REDACTED] had been approached by JACK PFEIFFER [REDACTED] and PFEIFFER had stated [REDACTED] when the G. men [REDACTED] question us about Karpis and the two Barkers, what are you going to tell them? [REDACTED] replied that if the G. men came out, it would be foolish to assume that they did not know something or else they would not have come out there. JACK PFEIFFER said, "Are you going to identify them if they show their photographs?" [REDACTED] said, "I am going to say that I have seen them before but that I don't know who they are." PFEIFFER, after some discussion, thought that would be the better course to follow.

The confidential informant advised that the St. Paul and Minneapolis underworld are very much in fear of this Division but are not afraid of the St. Paul Police.

On February 15th, I again contacted the confidential informant and he informed me that as yet he has not had an opportunity to talk to the victim but when he does, he will notify me and give me all the information he can.

Regarding KARPIS and the BARKERS and their gang, he stated that he was unable to learn where they were at the present time and doubted that the local underworld knew exactly where they are. He said that two weeks ago, JACK PFEIFFER had invited [REDACTED] to go for a ride. [REDACTED] thought he was going for a one-way ride and hesitated, and PFEIFFER said he wanted to go over and examine the Brass Rail, a saloon in Minneapolis. On the way over PFEIFFER asked [REDACTED] whether [REDACTED] thought KARPIS and BARKER had pulled the BREMER kidnaping, to which [REDACTED] stated he did not know. PFEIFFER then stated, "What do you think?" [REDACTED] then stated that he did not know what to think. PFEIFFER then stated that if KARPIS and the two BARKERS had kidnaped BREMER, PFEIFFER would peg to it that they were "bumped off" because of the heat that was being put under the local gangs. [REDACTED] did not know whether JACK PFEIFFER was leading him out to see how he felt about the case and his reaction or whether PFEIFFER is actually in ignorance as to who perpetrated the BREMER kidnaping.

[REDACTED]
The confidential informant was not in a position to secure the address of the local gang's headquarters but secured for me the telephone number, which is Geneva 8140.

He also ascertained that JACK DAVENPORT is at the present time confined to his home because of illness. He is said to be sick in bed.

The confidential informant advised me that [REDACTED] told him that for some time prior to the kidnaping of EDWARD BREMER, a man known as "BIG LOUIS", a Jew from New York, resided at an apartment house about two blocks south of Goodrich on Lexington Avenue. After "BIG LOUIS" had resided in this place for some time, he was joined by a young fellow, 6 feet tall, weighing about 165 or 170 pounds, light complexioned, who, according to [REDACTED] who saw him once, was extremely nervous. This person stayed there until the night that BREMER was kidnaped and disappeared. [REDACTED] for some reason or other, indicated to the confidential informant, that he was strongly suspicious that this person was implicated in the kidnaping. Because of the reliability of the information secured through this source, may I suggest that an immediate inquiry be made to locate the apartment in which "BIG LOUIS" resides, or did reside, in an effort to ascertain the identify of the young man mentioned above.

From the confidential informant and others whom I have interviewed in the last few days, as well as through verification by telephone numbers secured from a raid on the Hollyhocks Club by the County Attorney's office in Dakota County, it was ascertained that JACK DAVENPORT resides at 4109 Columbia Avenue South, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

The confidential informant also stated he had information that some place near Minocqua, Minnesota, a man with a gun and two or more men at which time the same Martin shot and killed him. A sum of one man in whose possession was found \$15,000 in cash. I immediately attempted to verify this by communicating with the Sheriff of Pine River, Minnesota, who likewise had heard the same rumor but heard that it was the Sheriff of Hibbing, Minnesota; and I then called the Sheriff of Hibbing and he not being present, I talked to one of his deputies, who assured me there was nothing whatsoever to the rumor and that they had not heard it.

I then called MR. McFARLAND, Deputy Commissioner of Conservation, Minnesota, who is a friend of mine, and he likewise telephoned to various sections of northern Minnesota, advising me that he could not obtain verification of the rumor but would continue to make inquiries, advising me immediately if it appeared the rumor was of some merit.

I intend to see the confidential informant again tomorrow.

M. PASSOLT, State Bureau of Criminal Apprehension, stated that Sheriff Brichoffer at Glencoe, Minnesota, telephoned him on February 14, 1934, advising that the day before a young man, THORERUM, from Hopkins, Minnesota, who was working with the Civil Relief for highway department at Madison, Minnesota, on a survey crew, was hitch-hiking and was picked up by two men near Norton, Minnesota, with a green Hudson sedan.

After getting in the car with these men, THORERUM observed a number of guns therein, and decided he was in bad company, so upon reaching Glencoe he left the car at a filling station where he went into the rest room, locking himself in, and refused to proceed further with the men. The filling station attendant at Glencoe notified the Sheriff and furnished Minnesota 1933 license # B30-527, stating that he believed same to be the number appearing on the car in which the young man came to the filling station. (Plates this number issued to ALBERT SYRINE, 767 Thomas Street, St. Paul, Minnesota.)

MR. PASSOLT thinks there may be some connection with the BREMER case and suggests that THORERUM can be located through ELWOOD LAMERE, foreman of survey crew, Madison, Minnesota.



EVERETT FAIRBANKS, previously reported as being in possession of the automobile bearing Minnesota license 176-876, which car, according to bus driver GEORGE WILLIE, followed the bus to Rochester on the night the ransom was paid, advised concerning his employment that about the 16th of December, 1933, while he was residing with his family at Federal Dam, which is his permanent location, he obtained a position through the Cass Lake Indian Census authorities to work on Indian census, the purpose being to obtain tabulations as to the family and the housing conditions of the Indians in northern Minnesota, and Wisconsin.

MR. FAIRBANKS further stated that he was assigned to work with a man by the name of CASWELL and that he received his instructions from the Indian Agent at Cass Lake, Minnesota; that in accordance with the suggestion of the Indian Agent, he (FAIRBANKS) went to Paribault, Minnesota, about December 20th and borrowed an automobile, which was a Ford 1933 model V-8 Sedan, from his brother-in-law, MR. OSTROM, MR. OSTROM being the owner and operator of a grocery store in Paribault.

MR. FAIRBANKS took this automobile, which carried license plates 176-876, Minnesota 1933, and drove same to Cass Lake where he again met MR. CASWELL, also an Indian census agent, and he and MR. CASWELL, upon instructions from the Indian Agent, proceeded to Milaca, worked there for about three days and went from there to a point near Deer River and thence to the area north of Bemidji, finally coming to Orr, Minnesota, on January 15th, where he stored the Ford car in the only garage in the town of Orr. The car was locked, according to MR. FAIRBANKS, and the garage itself, being for dead storage only, was also locked, and the key taken by the owner of the garage who lives approximately a block away. MR. FAIRBANKS is unable to supply the name of the garage owner. It further appears from the statement of MR. FAIRBANKS that MR. CASWELL had previously used this garage for storage and when it was decided to leave the FAIRBANKS car because of the condition of the roads and to proceed with the work on foot, MR. CASWELL suggested storage at the garage in question.

20 MAR 18 1965 After leaving Orr on the 15th of January, MR. FAIRBANKS, according to his statement, went to his home at Federal Dam and worked in that vicinity for several days, later working in the neighborhood of [redacted] then returning

to Federal Dam, then to Milaca and from there he advised to Faribault, Minnesota, over the weekend of February 11th where he was located by this agent.

MR. FAIRBANKS advised that the reports in the Government offices of the Indian Service, census section, at Cass Lake, would reflect his exact movements, day by day, through his reports on the work done since the day of his entering the census service. MR. FAIRBANKS also stated that his mileage reports while using the car would indicate the exact mileage covered with same and the mileage on the automobile at the time of its storage in the garage at Orr.

MR. FAIRBANKS is the father of a small daughter about twelve years of age who is living with her uncle and aunt at Faribault while attending school.

Concerning MR. CASWELL, MR. FAIRBANKS advised that he knew very little about him other than that he had been approved for the Indian Service by the Cass Lake authorities and was a resident of northern Minnesota.

When agent visited the OSTRUM family at Faribault for the purpose of bringing MR. FAIRBANKS to the St. Paul Division office, MR. OSTRUM, who was the owner of the automobile, was very much worried over the possibility that his automobile had been stolen from storage at Orr inasmuch as he carried no insurance. With this in mind, MR. OSTRUM insisted on coming with agent and FAIRBANKS to the St. Paul Division office to ascertain whether or not the car and the license plates were still intact in the garage at Orr. As previously reported, through Game Warden MUNSON at Orr it was ascertained that the car was still in storage in the garage where it had been left on January 15th.

MR. FAIRBANKS' fingerprints were taken at the St. Paul Division office and both he and MR. OSTRUM were instructed that the automobile in question should not be moved until further notice from the Division, to which they agreed.

MR. FAIRBANKS left St. Paul on the afternoon of February 11th to return to Cass Lake for further instructions in the census work. He was accompanied by MR. CASWELL, who was not present at the St. Paul Division office, but according to MR. FAIRBANKS, he (FAIRBANKS) was to meet CASWELL at the Vendome Hotel in Minneapolis on Monday, February 12th, and they were to proceed together to Cass Lake from there.

With reference to the 3-5/8 inch Filmolens used by the kidnappers in the signal lights it may be noted that Reinhard Bros., Minneapolis, were again contacted and through MR. MURCROSS, Purchasing Officer, it was noted that records of this concern reveal that on January 3rd, 1934, under order No. 15427, twenty-four 3-5/8 inch Filmolens were shipped to the Aberdeen, South Dakota, branch of Reinhard Bros. Inventory for January 1st reflected that 27 of these lens were on hand in stock and that on January 9th, '34 were received from the factory. Two were sold over the city desk on February 5th, making a total sale of 28 during the month of January and depleting the stock on hand to 73. Physical check of stock showed that Reinhard Bros. now have on hand in fact 80 of the 3-5/8 inch Filmolens, the additional 7 of which they are unable to account for.

As before stated, a poll of the clerks at the city desk failed to develop any information as to the sale of the two filmolens from the retail store. None of the employees of Reinhard Bros. had any recollection concerning this sale.

The Western Auto Supply Company at 9th and Hennepin, Minneapolis, was visited and the Manager, MR. HOOTON, was interviewed, MR. HOOTON advising that only three Filmolens were sold during the month of January, none in December, and none in February, from the Hennepin Avenue store. All clerks in this establishment were interviewed personally and they advised that they had no recollection whatever concerning the sale of three Filmolens.

The Western Auto Supply Company, Lake Street branch, was visited and MR. C. KRANZ, the Manager, was interviewed, MR. KRANZ indicating after an examination of his records that 13 3-5/8 inch Filmolens were sold by the Lake Street store during the month of January. All of the clerks at this store were interviewed personally, several recalling the sale of one lens, but none having any recollection of a sale of more than one at a time. The photographs of the following persons were exhibited to clerks in this store without any identification being made:

The Western Auto Supply Company on East Hennepin Avenue in Minneapolis was contacted through Manager H. BRADLEY and it was ascertained through the records of the store that only three Filmolens were sold by this store during the month of January, none in February, and none in December. All the clerks in this store were polled and none had any recollection as to the sale of these Filmolens, although each clerk insisted that he was positive not more than one was sold to a customer, otherwise such fact would have been impressed on his mind.

The Western Auto Supply Company at 1551 University Avenue was contacted and MR. ALBERTSON, the Manager, interviewed. MR. ALBERTSON advised that during the month of January, thirteen Filmolens were sold by that store. Examination of the clerks reflected that no clerk had any recollection of the sale of any of these lens, all insisted that not more than one had been sold to a customer.

The Western Auto Supply Company at 60 Sixth Street, St. Paul, was visited and MR. GEORGE DERSE, General Manager and official in charge of all Twin Cities Western Auto Supply Company branches, advised from his records that no Filmolens were sold by the branch at 60 Sixth Street but that 78 Filmolens, 3-3/8 inch size, were sold in the Twin Cities stores during January, 1934, and between January 1st and January 12th. MR. DERSE stated that this is an unprecedented circumstance and that never in the history of the company during the past few years has such a large stock of this article been disposed of through the local stores.

MR. DERSE further advised, after an examination of all mail orders to the Twin Cities stores, that no shipments of more than one Filmolens had been made during the month of January to any one party. In this connection, MR. DERSE advised that he would call a meeting of all managers of the Twin Cities stores for tonight, February 15, and the matter would be carefully gone into and in addition, he would notify the auditor's office at Kansas City, Missouri, today and request that all sales slips for all stores in this territory covering the sale of this article, which is listed as G-159, be forwarded immediately to the St. Paul store at 60 Sixth Street. MR. DERSE stated that with all the sales slips at hand, he would be in a position to determine positively what lens were sold, when, and where, and in what quantity. This information will be available on Monday, February 19th. It is understood from MR. DERSE that each sales slip for each item is forwarded to the Kansas City auditor's office and bears the name or the initials of the clerk making the sale. Therefore, positive information concerning the purchases of this article in the Twin Cities will be available.

In connection with the Merit Product Flashlight, and in addition to the information previously submitted, it may be noted that the lights in question have been forwarded to the Chicago office to be presented to the United States Electrical Company of Chicago in an effort to identify the manufacturer of this product. The following additional stores in Minneapolis were visited on this date, it being noted that none of these stores sells a Merit Product flashlight:

MR. JOHN MARTHALER of the John Marthaler Company, manufacturers of machinery and more particularly the Eric siren, was interviewed and he presented a list of all sirens now in operation which were manufactured by that company. From this list, agent took the names of towns in North Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, and Wisconsin, in which sirens are now located which were so placed by this company.

MR. MARTHALER further presented a mimeographed sheet showing all towns in the State of Minnesota in which Eric sirens are now in operation.

MR. MARTHALER further stated that the Eric siren Company does most of the business in the Middle West but that further information in this connection might be obtained through the Federal Siren Company, 8740 South State Street, Chicago; the W. S. Nott Company of Minneapolis; the Sterling Interstate Machine Products Company, Rochester, New York; and the Hendrie & Bolthoff Manufacturing & Supply Company at Denver, Colorado. It further appears from the statement of MR. MARTHALER that the Federal Siren Company is the most prominent one of these listed and that the W. S. Nott Company, insofar as he knows, is the only representative of any other siren other than the one manufactured by him.

All of these companies, with the exception of the W. S. Nott Company, were contacted by mail from the St. Paul Division office on February 15, 1934.

On February 18, 1934, agent interviewed MR. W. S. HODGES, who is in charge of fire siren sales for the W. S. Nott Company in Minneapolis, MR. HODGES advising that the Eric siren, which is manufactured by MR. MARTHALER, is by far the most efficient and the most satisfactory siren on the market today and has practically all of the business in that line. It appears that the W. S. Nott Company is really an agency for the Eric siren and the patentee and owner of this siren is the Eric Siren Company at Canby, Minnesota. The siren, however, is manufactured, as before stated, by the JOHN MARTHALER COMPANY and is sold through MR. ERIC of the Eric Siren Company of Canby, Minnesota, and by MR. HODGES of the W. S. Nott Company in Minneapolis. The only available list in the

means in which to obtain complete records of all sirens in this state would be direct through the Erie Siren Company of Cokato, Minnesota.

It further appears from the statements of MR. HODGES that in his opinion not more than three or four sirens manufactured by any of the other companies are now in operation in this locality; that the siren manufactured by the Federal Siren Company has been proved unsatisfactory because of necessity for considerable service and that the same may be said for the Sterling Interstate Machine Products Company siren which has not stood up in this climate.

Concerning the Denver Company, the HENDRICK & POLTHOFF concern, MR. HODGES stated that there is no competition in the Middle West between the Erie Company and this concern because of the freight rates and that, insofar as he knows, there are no Denver sirens in operation in the Middle Western States.

According to MR. HODGES, all of the sirens manufactured by the Erie Siren Company are sold directly to municipalities and they are manufactured for that purpose rather than for factory or institution uses; that the type of siren used in institutions as an alarm signal is considerably different from the heavy type, regular siren manufactured by the Erie Siren Company. In MR. HODGES' opinion, all other sirens not made by the Erie Company might be eliminated from this survey because of their type and qualifications.

Inquiry was made at the Episcopal Church diocese office covering the diocese of Minnesota located at 2344 Nicollet Avenue, telephone Bridgeport 2568, in Minneapolis and MR. E. R. COPPAGE of that office advised that the Episcopal churches do not ring their bells Saturday at all in the diocese of Minnesota or any other diocese that he knows of.

Inquiry was made at the Presbyterian church headquarters, 1040 Plymouth Building, Minneapolis, Minnesota, and W. R. HARSHAW of that office advised that it is not a practice of the Presbyterian church to ring the bell on Saturday afternoons or evenings.

Inquiry was made at the Twin City Baptist Union, 706 National Building, Minneapolis, Minnesota, and the same information was received to the effect that the bells in that church are not rung on Saturday.

Similar inquiry was made of the Swedish Evangelical Free church with offices at 1225 Washington Avenue South in Minneapolis where PETER HENSEN, trustee of that church, advised that no services were conducted on Saturday and no bells were rung in that church on Saturday.

It was the general statement of the parties interviewed above that in the Twin Cities, very few of the churches have bells or if they have them, they are not rung, either on Saturdays or Sundays.

Rev. OTTO LEONARDSON, retired, present address 415 Harvard Street, Lutheran minister, stated that he is acquainted personally with every Evangelical Lutheran minister in the United States. He stated that it is the custom in some communities for the Lutheran church to ring their bells Saturday afternoon. It is personally known to him that the Lutheran church at East Union, near Cologne, Minnesota, rings the bell regularly at four o'clock Saturday afternoons and that at the Lutheran church at Dunnell, Minnesota, the bell is rung at six o'clock every Saturday and also at Center City, Minnesota, the Lutheran church bell is known to be rung at either five or six p.m., on Saturdays. Rev. LEONARDSON stated that the custom of ringing the bell is an old custom and if practiced, is usually in a community made up mostly of Norwegians or Swedish people. The theory of this bell ringing on Saturday is to ring in the Sabbath and the time the bell is rung is to indicate the hour that the daily toil should be dropped for the Sabbath Day.

Rev. LEONARDSON turned over to agent a Directory containing approximately 300 names of all the ministers of the Lutheran church and further consideration is being given to the circularization of the ministers located in the Northwest States.

Inquiry was made at the Rectory of Archbishop JOHN MURRAY of the Catholic Church in St. Paul where Father SCHENK, Secretary to the Archbishop, was interviewed. He stated that the fact that the church bells were rung numerous times on Sunday would perhaps indicate that it was a Catholic Church, but that it was not the usual practice for Catholic Church bells to be rung on Saturday afternoons or evenings. There is a possibility, he stated, that children's instructions might be held on Saturday afternoons and that the church bell would be rung calling the children to such instructions. However, he also offered the opinion that if it was a Catholic church that was heard ringing, it would in most instances be rung at 6:00 p.m., and also at 12:00 noon, which is the usual ringing of the angelus. He also stated that in some places, pastors have the bell rung for Saturday confessions, but these instances are very few. Father SCHENK submitted a complete list of church and pastors for the archdiocese of St. Paul covering the Twin Cities and most of the Western part of Minnesota, and turned over to this office for its use 1933 Directory of the Catholic Churches in the United States, also making notation as to the places in the Directory where the dioceses could be found which cover the Northwest territory.

United States Attorney GEORGE F. SULLIVAN, St. Paul, called at the St. Paul Division office today and advised that a MR. F. D. WHITLEY, a Minneapolis patent attorney, had called him by telephone indicating that some acquaintance of his (MR. WHITLEY'S) had some information which might be of value in this investigation.

Agent interviewed MR. WHITLEY, who is a prominent Minneapolis lawyer, practicing exclusively in the field of patents, at his offices at 911 Foshay Tower and was advised that he (MR. WHITLEY) had known ARCHIE COUTRE, a barber in the Foshay Tower Shop, for several years and had acted in the capacity of business advisor for MR. COUTRE; that through this association, he had come to know MR. COUTRE intimately and placed every confidence in him.

At the instance of agent, MR. COUTRE was called from the barber shop by telephone and was interviewed in MR. WHITLEY'S office.

MR. COUTRE advised that for approximately a year, one OSCAR KISER, his brother JOHN KISER, and several other persons associated with the KISER brothers, had occupied space in the Foshay Tower and were in some promotion scheme which had resulted in OSCAR KISER'S being indicted in the State Court for fraud. It appears that the KISER brothers are both at present on \$7,000 bail in connection with the above matter.

MR. COUTRE further stated that the KISERS have a very bad reputation and came to Minneapolis from Milwaukee where they were involved in some doubtful activity; that up until about the 10th of January, he (MR. COUTRE) has done the barbering for the KISERS almost daily since they arrived in the Foshay Tower; that about January 10th, they disappeared or, according to MR. COUTRE, they no longer came to his shop and he saw nothing of them until the 9th of February when OSCAR KISER came to the shop with a week's growth of beard and made some joking remark about not being able to get a shave. When MR. COUTRE inquired whether MR. KISER had been ill, MR. KISER stated that he had not been ill but he had been out of town.

Examination of the building directory in the Foshay Tower failed to reflect the name KISER but it was noted that Room 608 is occupied by the First National Properties and the Acme Development Company. MR. COUTRE was again contacted and he indicated that these companies were the ones in which the KISERS were involved.

MR. COUTRE described OSCAR KISER as being about 5 feet 10 inches in height, very dark complexioned, and approximately 190 pounds in weight. Both of the KISERS, according to MR. COUTRE, are Jewish, and have black hair and brown eyes. JOHN KISER is about 5 feet 10 inches in height and about 170 pounds in weight. According to MR. COUTRE, the KISERS are very aggressive and insolent in their manner and on occasions have made statements to the effect that they are afraid of no one on earth.

It is MR. COUTRE'S opinion that the KISER'S, because of their reputation and connections, are involved with gangsters and racketeers in Minneapolis. MR. COUTRE could give no facts to substantiate his belief but stated that "he knew it was so".

Agent visited the KISER offices without making any inquiry and noted that several men were sitting around in a private office and a stenographer was apparently occupied in the typing of forms. It was also not believed advisable at this time to contact the building management.

Concerning the wall paper design which has been somewhat indefinitely described by MR. EDWARD BREMER, the victim, as being on the walls of the room in which he was confined, it may be noted that on the basis of first information furnished to the St. Paul Division office that this wall paper pattern was manufactured by the Smith Horning Company of Cleveland, Ohio, the only Twin Cities distributor for Smith Horning paper was contacted, this company being the FRANK HIRSHFIELD COMPANY of Minneapolis, and all paper manufactured by the above concern was exhibited to MR. BREMER, MR. BREMER advising that none of the patterns viewed were the type on the room in question. It appears that the Smith Horning paper is a very expensive and exclusive quality of paper and is used generally only in high-class homes.

An effort was made at the Hirshfield Paper Company through MR. and MRS. HIRSHFIELD, who have been in the wall paper business for the past 40 years, to obtain samples of the paper which contained a representation of a fence together with a tree bearing flowers of four-leaf clover design. All specimens of this type of paper have been shown to MR. BREMER, without result.

MR. CHRIEAMAN, a wall paper designer and decorator, residing at 3710 East 34th Street, Minneapolis, Minnesota, was contacted and he accompanied agent and MR. SMITH, the General Manager of the Hirshfield Paper Company, to the St. Paul Division Office where, with the assistance of MR. EDWARD BREMER, MR. CHRIEAMAN endeavored to obtain sufficient data on the desired paper to draw a design.

The design prepared by MR. CHRIEAMAN was brought to the St. Paul Division office on February 16th and was shown to MR. EDWARD BREMER, who indicated that same was not exactly like the design of the paper on the room in which he was held. Certain changes were indicated by MR. BREMER, and an effort will now be made to have MR. CHRIEAMAN make up a further design reflecting a type of paper more similar to that believed by MR. BREMER to have been in the house in which he was held a prisoner.

Through the assistance of MRS. FRANK GRIFFIN, Agent was informed that one ROBERT GRIFFIN, United Wall Paper Company, 137 West Side, Jersey City, New Jersey, was the most prominent manufacturer of wall paper in the business today and made it a point to obtain all designs of wall paper in all companies now operating. It appears that MR. GRIFFIN is the

through his business connections, has in the past become conversant with every design prepared by the wall paper trade.

In accordance with the above information, a letter was dispatched to the New York Division office for the purpose of contacting Mr. CHRISTEN and obtaining his assistance in locating a paper with the required specifications.

Reference is made to the memorandum submitted by Special Agent S. L. McKee under date of February 13, 1934.

In this connection, all of the persons interviewed on the occasion of the previous investigation were re-questioned, but they only related similar stories.

ERNEST MILISCH, referred to in the previous memorandum, was interviewed and he stated that following the interview between the writer and his father, he and his father talked over the matter of the gasoline cans having been found on the road leading to REUBEN GROSSMANN'S home and he has come to the conclusion that the date on which he saw an automobile parked at the corner where the cans were found was Wednesday, February 7, 1934, and not the following day. He stated that he remembers this date to be Wednesday because of the fact that he and his brother skipped hauling tamarack logs on one day of that week and there is no doubt in his mind now but that the day skipped was Tuesday, and he is positive that the day on which he saw the car was the day following that on which he and his brother did not haul logs.

Further with respect to this automobile, ERNEST MILISCH said that on Wednesday, February 7, 1934, he laid off work early and went to the school house at 3:30 p.m., from which place he brought his young brother and three neighbor "kids" home from school. He said that at about 4:00 p.m., he was standing by the barn near his home, unhitching his team when he noticed a coffee brown colored automobile drive up the road past his house from Route No. 10. He said he thought this car was a late model Nash automobile of the sedan type and advised that the only persons in same were two men, both of whom were in the front seat. He said further that from the glances he obtained of these men as they passed, they both appeared to be around 30 years of age, were fairly well dressed, wore overcoats and felt hats, and he believes that the one who was not driving wore a light gray overcoat and light colored hat. MILISCH said this car passed him at a distance of about five yards and drove past his house where it turned on the left fork of the county road and stopped at the corner where the gasoline cans were later found. He said that he did not notice the license plates on this car.

He said further that when the car had stopped at the corner in question, he went to a point near his house and tried to observe what was going on inasmuch as he was curious, and he noticed that both men got out of the car and walked to the back of it where they appeared to be "fooling" with the spare tire.

He said further that the car and men remained at the spot where the cans were found for about half an hour, following which they drove back past his house and to Route No. 16. MILLISCH was unable to state which direction the car drove on Route No. 16 after leaving the county road.

With respect to the information supplied by RUBEN GROSSMANN as related in the prior memorandum of this agent, ERNEST MILLISCH said that he is positive that MARIE GROSSMANN, the six-year-old daughter of RUBEN GROSSMANN, did not go home from school on Wednesday, February 7th, but on the other hand went to the home of her grandmother, where she remained for some time before going home. He said that in order to reach her grandmother's home, the little girl would not have to pass the corner where the cans were found but that she in all probability did "cut" another corner, which no doubt accounts for the statements made by her father.

The twin brother of ERNEST MILLISCH was question but he advised that on Wednesday, February 7th, while his brother was at home, he was in the swamp with his father, cutting tamarack logs and for that reason knew nothing regarding the automobile or the gasoline cans in question.

It should be stated here that the writer was in error in his previous memorandum when he stated that the ground to the right of the spot where the cans were found was occupied by a field covered with corn stubbles. That ground is occupied by a field which is presently covered with timothy and clover stubbles. The corn stubble field referred to is located approximately 50 yards down the road toward Route No. 16 from the spot where the cans were found. Aside from the description of the spot as set out in the previous memorandum of this agent is correct.

In company with Deputy Sheriff HARRY BIRNER of Portage, Wisconsin, the writer covered the territory within a mile of the spot where the cans were found and it was ascertained that there is only one dwelling house located within the area aside from the houses occupied by the persons who have already been interviewed. This house is located on Route No. 16, about one-fourth mile northwest of the intersection of Route No. 16 and the county road on which the MILLISCH home is situated and is occupied by

An aged couple. Interview with a Mrs. MECHE, who resides in Falls Dells, resulted in the statement by her that she had been confined to the house with illness for the past two weeks and had not observed anything that had taken place on the outside. She stated further that her husband has not been around the house during the daytime in the past two weeks. Inasmuch as his work, namely cutting tamarack logs, has kept him in the swamp during working hours.

In company with Deputy Sheriff HARRY HENNER, the writer called at all gasoline filling stations located in Portage, Wisconsin, and in the surrounding roads on Route No. 15 between Portage, Wisconsin, and Wisconsin Dells, Wisconsin, and the surrounding roads on a county highway leading from Wisconsin Dells to Biggsville, Wisconsin, and thence back into Portage. None of the filling station operators could furnish any data regarding the filling of four 5-gallon gasoline cans on February 7th or on any other date. It should be stated that none of these persons could remember having filled any 5-gallon gasoline can for a person other than a regular customer.

During the course of these interviews, however, one HERMAN PETERSON, operator of the Standard Oil Station at Wisconsin Dells, Wisconsin, related that one day last week, which would be the week subsequent to February 4, 1934, two men in a sedan automobile, make, color and license unknown, stopped at his station and purchased a quart of oil and secured some water. He said these men were in a hurry as there were two other cars in the station at the time they pulled up and they asked the occupants of the other cars if they would mind letting them be waited on first. PETERSON said that while waiting on these two men, he noticed several round shaped 5-gallon gasoline cans in the back of the car with a blanket thrown over them but that he could not state how many cans the car contained.

It should be stated here that there is a Wisconsin law making it necessary that all cans in which gasoline is sold be painted red and in this connection attention is called to the fact that the four cans found by REUBEN GROSSMANN were not painted but on the other hand were bare tin. During the course of the numerous interviews with filling station operators, the writer formed the opinion that a person would experience much difficulty in having four unpainted gasoline cans filled at almost any filling station in the State of Wisconsin inasmuch as filling such cans would make the station proprietor liable to a fine of \$50.

It should be stated here that in some instances, it was found that more than one person operated filling stations where interviews were conducted, and in this connection arrangements were made whereby Deputy Sheriff HIRNER would be notified if any of the operators had filled the four 5-gallon cans in question. It should also be stated that Deputy Sheriff HIRNER told the various filling station operators at the time they were interviewed that he was not interested in the "painted can law" in connection with making the instant inquiries.

Reference is made to the letter received from the Chicago office under date of February 20, 1934, in connection with an anonymous telephone call received by that office in which information was furnished to the effect that one MEL WOLDENBERG of Madison, Wisconsin, was possibly involved in the kidnaping of EDWARD G. BREWER.

Chief of Police W. H. McCORMICK, Madison, Wisconsin, and Chief of Detective LEO KINNEY of the same city, were interviewed and they advised that the MEL WOLDENBERG concerning whom agent was inquiring was no doubt MALCOLM WOLDENBERG. Both of these men furnished descriptions of MALCOLM WOLDENBERG and same are almost identical with the description set out in the letter from the Chicago Division office. It was stated by the above officers that MALCOLM WOLDENBERG comes from a very prominent Jewish family who have been residents of Madison for many years; that the father died about five years ago; that MEL WOLDENBERG left Madison about two years ago and is thought to be present residing in Chicago but that his two brothers, namely CHARLES and SAMUEL WOLDENBERG, still live in Madison. It was stated that CHARLES operates a department store, while SAMUEL is engaged in the real estate business and is also said to be the distributor of a fairly large number of "whiffle boards". It was stated that CHARLES and SAMUEL WOLDENBERG have been closely associated with the Progressive Party in Wisconsin for many years and are intimate with the LAFOLLETES. Chief McCORMICK said, however, that he did not believe MEL WOLDENBERG had ever been active politically.

It was stated further that there had never been a rumor around Madison of MEL'S having been connected with any racketeers or hoodlums.

Chief MCCORMICK told the writer that about three weeks ago he received an inquiry from one REUBEN MECKERMAN of the Meckerman Insurance Agency concerning MEL WOLDENBERG. MECKERMAN stating at the time that he had a civil judgment against him. The Chief called MECKERMAN on the phone in agent's presence and it was stated that the inquiry was made in view of the fact that he (MECKERMAN) had heard that WOLDENBERG was in town. At this same time, MECKERMAN related that MEL WOLDENBERG has been away from Madison for about two years, is living in Chicago, Illinois, and is thought to be employed as a salesman by some wholesale liquor house.

At the request of the writer, Chief McCORMICK made telephonic inquiry of E. A. HAYDEN of the Madison Drug Company, through whom it was learned that MEL WOLDENBERG was in town about four weeks ago, at which time he called on the Madison Drug Company as salesman of liquor for the Midstate Distributors, 139 North Clark Street, Chicago, Illinois. It was stated by MR. HAYDEN that WOLDENBERG appeared to be uneasy at the time of his call. Chief McCORMICK said that in his opinion, the apparent uneasiness of WOLDENBERG could be attributed to the fact that several civil judgments are outstanding against him in Madison.

Assistant United States Attorney H. E. HANSON was interviewed and he advised that he had heard of MEL WOLDENBERG but had never heard of his being associated with racketeers or other type of law violators. He stated that the WOLDENBERG family was rather prominent in Madison and that he had never heard anything against the name.

An examination was made of the City Directory for Madison, Wisconsin, for the year 1933 and it was ascertained that MEL WOLDENBERG is not listed therein. The name CHARLES L. WOLDENBERG, residence 1050 Sherman Avenue, business, President of Woldenberg, Inc., was noticed, as was the name of SAMUEL A. WOLDENBERG, residence 119 East Washington Avenue, business real estate.

H. C. JAMIESON, Vice-president of the First National Bank, Madison, Wisconsin, was interviewed and he stated that he knows all of the

WOLDEMBERG denied that he had ever been involved against the Rosenberg family.

JAMESON said he had never heard of NEL'S being associated in any way with hoodlums and that he did not believe he had ever been active in politics.

MR. JAMESON stated further that NEL has spent most of his business connection with his immediate family, he having worked for his father in the department stores operated by him prior to his death, and following the death of his father, he having been involved in real estate operations with his brother SAMUEL.

Agent was advised that NEL WOLDEMBERG left Madison about two years ago and is thought to have made a connection with some securities or investment concern in Chicago, and in this connection MR. JAMESON mentioned the name JACOB KULP as being the firm with whom NEL WOLDEMBERG is thought to have gone.

On February 16, 1934, while in Sioux City, Iowa, Agent contacted Assistant Chief of Police WHEELOCK, Sioux City, Police Department, who advised that the confidential informant, whose name he preferred not to disclose at this time, told him that on February 7, 1934, between three and four o'clock in the afternoon on Route 76 he noticed a Buick Sedan in which four men were riding and that one of the men in the rear seat had his head bandaged. The informant recognized the driver as a man known to him as "SLICK" and he advised MR. WHEELOCK that former Prohibition Agent BURRIS of Sioux City, Iowa, knew this man by his proper name.

Accordingly, MR. WHEELOCK contacted former Prohibition Agent BURRIS and the man known as "SLICK" was identified by BURRIS as FRED KOPKA, who is a police character in Sioux City and has put in time in the Iowa State Penitentiary and is at present on parole from the State Penitentiary.

MR. WHEELOCK further advised that KOPKA has been known to have attempted extortion in the past, and furnished the writer with police photograph and description of KOPKA; and further advised that MELTON NELSON, known as "TOAD" NELSON, of 2500 Vine Street, Sioux City, Iowa, is a companion of said KOPKA.

At the Pioneer Press & Dispatch office, this advertisement was found to have been put in by one F. R. CARNEL under box No. 9931 of the Dispatch. It was also found that another ad was placed in the same paper under the same date by the same person, as follows:

"Wanted. Portable typewriter.
Must be practically new and cheap
for cash."

This last named ad was under Box 9930.

On February 14, 15 and 16, a watch was kept at the Dispatch & Pioneer Press office to determine who might call for replies to these advertisements, there being five replies on file to the request for painter and decorator and none with reference to the request for a portable typewriter. No one called, however, and agent was advised that it was possible someone might have called for the replies to these ads the first day or two after they had been placed in the paper and received the desired replies and therefore had not returned for the others.

Arrangements were made through JOHN X. LEWIS, in charge of the classified advertising section, who stated that these box numbers would be posted and if anyone called for the replies therein, a man would be sent from the Dispatch office to determine where the party collecting the replies goes to or, if he gets into an automobile and they were unable to follow him, his license number would be obtained and any information secured would be immediately turned over to this office.

With reference to the information furnished by ROBERT KELLY concerning JAMES WILLIAMS alias "SPEDY" WILLIAMS alias FRANK WILHEUR. It may be noted that although KELLY has stated that WILLIAMS was employed by the Ford distributor company at Minneapolis up until one year ago, information furnished by the Ford factory in St. Paul indicates that the only Ford distributing company in Minneapolis was discontinued about seven years ago and there has been no Parts Division or Ford branch in Minneapolis since that time. The records of the Ford plant in St. Paul do not include the name JAMES WILLIAMS or FRANK WILHEUR or ROBERT KELLY.

The above information was furnished to agent by the General Manager of the Ford plant.

Concerning the reference made by ROBERT KELLY to WILLIAMS' having been involved in a Duluth bank robbery, MR. PASSOIS of the State Bureau of Criminal Apprehension advised agent that there has been no bank robbery in the city of Duluth within his recollection and none in the past several years; that about two years ago there was some talk of a bank messenger having been held up but even this rumor was never substantiated in fact.

Concerning WILLIAMS' having lived at the St. Paul Hotel under the name of JAMES WILLIAMS or JACK WILHEUR, investigation made by Special Agent Hall indicates that no such party was registered at the St. Paul Hotel in 1933, and neither was there any registration in 1933 for ROBERT KELLY.

It is noted that KELLY was supposed to have lived at 418 Beach Street, Minneapolis, Apartment 6-A, and that he worked up until two weeks ago at the caterpillar tractor company of Minneapolis. According to records in the Minneapolis Police Department and City Directories, information being presented by Lieutenant Ray Harrington, there is no Beach Street in the city of Minneapolis.

Concerning the alleged employment with the caterpillar tractor company, agent visited this concern at 2207 University Avenue Southeast, Minneapolis, and was advised that the caterpillar tractor company, including its plant and general offices, moved more than a year ago to Peoria, Illinois. The five employees now working at the warehouse advised that the personnel office has also moved to Peoria, Illinois, and none of these employees had

over head of JAMES WILLIAMS, JACK WILBUR, or ROBERT KELLY. Approximately 300 employees were thrown out of work by the caterpillar tractor company about a year ago when this company discontinued operation in the Twin Cities.

With reference to the information furnished that two men, JACKSON, employed at the Oldsmobile Agency on Minnesota Avenue had told KELLY that WILBUR was driving a Ford which stopped the victim in the BREMER kidnaping case, it may be noted that according to investigation made by Special Agent Hall, there is no Oldsmobile Agency on Minnesota Avenue.

With reference to the information furnished by KELLY that WILLIAMS had been arrested for drunken driving in 1930 by the Minneapolis or St. Paul Police Department, it may be noted that records of these departments as presented by Lieutenant HARRINGTON at Minneapolis and SIDNEY MOORE of the St. Paul Police Department do not reflect any such arrest.
