SYNOPSIS OF PACTOR Edward George Bremer, Victim

WILLIAM KERIN moved from Shorehem Worth Hotel Rienzi advises Marrison has not contacted Kerin there. Gilbert Kaplan alleged to have made telephone call from Chicago, Illinois to George Browns, Hen Tork City on June 4, 1935 in which name of KARPIS was ment at tioned in a suspicious conversation. Surveillance of the Ogden Grill operated by Kaplan, from June 5 30 15, 1935 failed to establish that Karpis is frequenting that place. Telephone observations and covers on ... telegrams and mail produced no results. Browne interviewed at Chicago, Illinois denies knowing Karpis. Ale Officer Conroy, Chicago, alleged to have been in company with Karpis recently. Informant not definite in this regard. Suspicious individual who was residing at the Colonial Motel, Sterling, Illinois identified as being J. H. Hauber, now at liberty under \$15,000 hond in meil fraud case. Individual driving car with Maryland license for 1935, number 205106 at Bensenville, Illinois so parently has no connection with this case. DETAILS: This report covers activities of the various Agents who have conducted investigation concerning this case, the names of the investigating Agents being set forth hereinafter in the details of this report.

With further reference to the investigation covering the activities of WILLIAM KERIN, who had been residing at the Shoreham Motels Chicago, Illinois, Special Agent R. C. Suran on the morning of June 1. 1935, was advised by Mr. Scott, Assistant Manager of the Motel that Keria was checking out of the hotel that day. Previous information had been the tained from that Kerin had under consideration obtaining a gambling establishment at Colorado Springs, Colorado. It was thought possible that Kerin might proceed to that point after leaving the Shoreham Motel. Special Agent in Charge M. M. Purvis communicated with Assistant Director Marold Nathan in Washington by telephone to ascertain if authority would be granted by the Bureau to follow Kerin in the event he left the Chicago district. The authority being telephonically gives to Mr. Purvis, arrangements were made for Special Agents Murnene, Whitson, Kuhnel and Stewart of the Chicago Bureau office to maintain a surveillance of Kerin after he left the Shoreham Motel, and instructions were issued to these Agents to follow Kerin regardless of his destination. Kerin was observed to leave the Shoreham Motel at about 11 A.M. on the morning of June 1, 1935, at which time he was driving the Graham Paige coupe previously seen in his possession, bearing Florida license D-5088. The first of the second of the

The above named Agents followed Kerin to the Hotel Rienni, 500 Diversey Parkway, Chicago, Illinois, and observed that Kerin removed his bags from his car and apparently checked in at the Hotel Rienni.

On June 1, 1955 about 1 o'clock in the afternoon, Special: Agent Lish Whitson was instructed by Special Agent in Charge M. H. Purvis 🕮 to register under an assumed name at the Motel Rienzi, \$00 Diversey Parkway, Chicago, Ellinois, to observe the activities there of WILLIAM KERIMe Agent Whitson registered in room 306 under the name of Leslie Whiting. 🔀 It was noted that William Kerin was occupying room 510, and that a friend? of his named Reefe allegedly from South Bend, Indiana occupied room 803. Reefe did not answer the description of any of the subjects in the instant case. The Rienzi hotel is frequented by hoodlums and individuals? of questionable character, and it was noted that the general topic of discussion at the hotel lobby among the guests during the date on which 🎋 Agent Whitson registered was the Weyerhaueser kidnaping in Tacoma. No remarks were made regarding this kidnaping however, which would be indicative of any knowledge on the part of those discussing the matter \mathbb{R}^d which was gained from sources other than newspapers. From and the second of

William Kerin returned to the Rienzi Motel about 5 P.M. and spoke to C. R. Hudson, desk elerk and left the hotel immediately in his automobile, a blue Graham Paige bearing Florida license tag D-5088. About 11 P.M. two men came to the deak at the hotel and inquired for Kerin, the first of these men being described as follows: Age 55 years, height 5 ft. 10 inches, weight 170 pounds, hair black, eyes brown, very. heavy beard - smooth shaven, well dressed, dark suit, light gray hat, American. The second was described as follows: Age \$5 years, height 5 ft. 7 or 8 inches, weight 200 pounds, hair black, eyes brown, complexion dark, dressed in slovenly fashion, nationality Jewish or Italian; alightly intoxicated. These two individuals sat around the lobby for a about one half hour during which time an individual fitting the general description of BABS MORAN called them outside. This third individual was apparently a resident of the hotel and addressed the first described person. as Mr. Thomas. It was noted that a copy of the June issue of the Cosmopolitan magazine was at that time in William Kerin's box behind the deske realistic Kerin himself returned to the hotel at 1.20 A.M. with Reefe and was told by the man at the deak that a call had come in for him at five minutes ... past one. Upon receiving this information Kerin left the hotel to park his car in the parking lot immediately east of the hotel and returned to have his room. Special Agent Harry Stewart who was in the vicinity of the hotel at that time with a Bureau automobile was in readiness to follow Kerin but when Kerin retired for the night Agent Stewart returned to the Chicago Bureau office.

On June 2, 1935 Kerin did not leave his room until 1.30 P.M. He left his car in the parking lot and proceeded west on Diversey Parkway to Broadway, where he engaged in conversation with several biterers.

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It should be noted that Kerin is very well known and apparently waits was popular among the employees, guests and frequenters of the Rienzi Motella-At about 5 o'clock Kerin returned to the parking lot and le-

drove his car into the alley adjoining the hotel. He them loitered Min the vicinity of the hotel for a few moments after which he drove off in his ear. He returned to the Rienzi at about 10 Pam. where he was joined by the individuals who were inquiring for him the night before. These two ?!persons had been in the hotel earlier in the afternoon and on making inquiry for Kerin were told by the switchboard operator that a call had some & in for Kerin during the afternoon from an unknown person, and they registere. ed considerable surpise and asked the switchboard operator if she had told arphithe party where Kerin was. She stated that she did not; that she had not talked to the person calling but just rang his room, and that the party at the hung up. This call came from the Chicago Bureau office as the result of 🚲 a phone call from Agent Whitson who was unable to ascertain whether Kerin's 'baggage was still in his room after the latter's automobile had pulled away from the alley entrance of the hotel. The call was made under pretext to determine if Kerin had sheeked out.

Kerin left the hotel about 8.50 P.M. and returned with his car at about 11.30 P.M. After loitering in the vicinity of the hotel and along Diversey Parkway he parked the car in the parking lot at the side of the hotel and retired at approximately 5 minutes past 12. Surveillance maintained by Agent Whitson until 2 o'clock did not reveal any individuals soming into the hotellobby making inquiry for Kerin who had in the meantime changed his room after his friend Reefe had apparently checked out of the hotel.

On June 3, 1935 at about 9 A.M. Agent Whitson noticed an individual answering the general description of William J. Marrison in front of the Rienzi: Motel. This individual had been noted by Agent Whitson conversing with Kerin on a previous occasion, and was believed to a second be a guest at the Rienzi. Agent Thitson followed this person to the Embassy Motel, one block east of the Rienzi, where he boarded a bus bound for the loop. Agent Whitson accompanied him to the corner of State and [1885] Washington Streets, where Agent Whitson finally become satisfied that the individual was William Marrison, and accosted him, requesting that the man and accosted him, display his fingertips. The index finger of William Harrison is known to in have a distinctive tented arch. This individual possessed a set of fingerprints which obviously had not been altered, and had a right forefinger and had a right forefinger pattern of a very large and distinct radialloop with no semblance of a large tent. Agent Whitson disclosed his identity to the individual but did not divulge the fact that the man was suspected of being William Harrison. . .

The man's description is as follows: Age between 35 and 40 years; height 5 ft. 6 inches or 7 inches, weight 170 pounds, hair brown, with gray at temples, eyes greenish blue, complexion fair, build stocky, teeth missing.

Me identified himself as JOSEPH KAHN, 600 Diversey Parkway, Chicago, Illinois, office address Jacob Lasker and Sons, 1118 Straus Building, Chicago, Illinois, and papers in his possession showing him to be manager of the Villa Theatre, Cicero, Illinois.

On Instructions from Special Agent in Charge M. H. Purvis, Special Agent Whitson immediately thereafter checked out of the Rienzi Motel. It was noted at that time, about 11.15 A.M., that Kerin's automobile was still parked in the lot adjoining the Rienzi Motel.

Agent Suran interviewed verified the fact that Kerin was living at the mienzi, and stated that he was in a position to and would immediately advise this office in the event that villian Harrison contacted Kerin.

On June 10, 1935 again was interviewed by Agent R. C. Suran, and advised that he had seem Kerin frequently, and that apparently Kerin had not contacted Harrison.

The state of the s A review of the Chicago file reflected that in April, 1954, William J. Graham of Remo, Mevada who is known to be a friend of Alvin Karpis, telephoned Kaplan while passing through Chicago, Illinois from 🖺 New York, to Reno, Nevada. The telephone calls also made by Graham and his party, including McKey, indicated that they visited the Ogden Grill while in Chicago on April 15, 1934. In this connection it appeared possible that inasmuch as Graham and Karpis are friends, Kaplan might also be asquainted with Karpis in view of the circumstances indicated in the telephone conversation In connection with GEORGE BROWNE, it is known that he was in some way connected with the Mational Organization of the Motion Picture Operators Union, and after the local business agent at Chicago, Thomas Malloy, was slain several months ago Browne came from New York City to take over the local of the Motion Picture Operators Union. Previous investigation by this office regarding

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Thomas Malloy who was a known contact of the Karpis-Barker gang, called GEORGE BROWNE at New York City - Pennsylvania 0945, which in all probability was a call in connection with the operation of the Motical Picture Operators Union. Thomas Malloy was a close friend of ED DONOVAN and JOHN BALL, who were definitely identified as being associates of members of the Karpis-Barker gang. Furtherinvestigation concerning the Motion Picture Operators Union disclosed that on March 5, 1935, a call was made from the Motion Picture Operators Union to George Browne at Circle 7-2700 in New York City. It is further known that some member of the Karpis Barker gang called the Motion Picture Operators Union in Chicago, Illinois from Miami, Florida in Movember, 1934. Further it is known that FRANK FOSTER, called New York City telephone number Circle 7-2700 resent-ly from Miami, Florida.

In view of the above circumstances as related it appeared possible that the telephone conversation overheard by was important, and that if vigorous investigation was conducted concerning Kaplan and Browne it might develop that they were actually in contact with Karpis. The above information was telephonically furnished to the Bureau by Special Agent in Charge Purvis under date of June 4, 1935, and the Bureau directed that this information be immediately furnished to the New York City office for appropriate action.

Immediately after the receipt of the information. Special Agents R. C. Suran and John L. Madala proceeded to the Ogden Grill to make observations, but no one was seen there answering the description of Alvin Karpis. These agents then attempted an outside observation, but it was determined that the outside colored doorman at this place observed all individuals in the vicinity, and it was considered inadvisable to maintain an outside observation from parked cars.

Special Agent Suran interviewed Mr. Frisby of the Carl
M. Whetten real estate company, Board of Trade Building, Chicago, Illinois
and made arrangements with Mr. Frisby for the use of the vacant second
floor of the building at 189 North Clark Street. The results of the observations of Agents of the Chicago office from this point will be hereinafter reported.

On June 4, 1935, Special Agent in Charge Whitley at New York City advised that telephone number Circle 7-2700 at New York was issued to the Warwick Motel, and as had previously been reported by the New York office, BROWNE was registered at the hotel with an individual by the name of HARLAND HOIMDEN.

Under date of June 7, 1935 the New York office also advised that George E. Browne was registered at the Governor Clinton Motel New York City, and received a telephone call from Chicago - number Central \$466, but that Browne was not in the hotel at the time the call was received. A check of the telephone company's records at Chicago developed that this telephone number was issued to the Chicago Theatrical Protective Union, local, 160 North LeSalle Street, Chicago, which is also the address of the. Motion Picture Operators Union. Also on June 7, 1935 the New York City office advised that Browne had attempted to make telephone calls to Chicago telephones Central 2131, and Euclid 5341. It was determined that Central 2131 is issued to the law firm of Dawson and Dawson, 58 South Dearborn Street, Chicago, and that telephone Euclid 5541 is an unlisted number issued to William Berg, 1128 Washington Boulevard. As will be noted subsequently in this report it is believed that William Berg is identical with William Bioff, who from time to time has been known to be with Browns at the Warwick Hotel in New York City.

On June 5, 1935 Special Agents M. L. Stewart and Lieb.
Whitson began observation of the activities in and around Gibby's Ogdan
Grill, 192 North Clark Street, Chicago, from the second floor at 189 North

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Illinois license 1-122-031, appearing on a 1930 Dodge. Together with wire wheels was observed by Agents Stewart and Whitson. It was noted that this car carried a card with the word "Press" on the windshield. It was determined that this car was issued to Irvin Owen, 2231 East 67th Street, Chicgo, Illinois, and the car was observed at the Ogden Grill on several occasions

On sume o, 1930 Agents Stawart and Whitson observer a 1935 Buick Master Six, 5 passenger tan colored sedan, with six wire wheals, bearing Illinois license 398-097. A check of this license number indicated that it was issued to Gilbert Kaplan, 4500 Lake Shore Drive, Chicago, Illinois. Also on this date these Agents observed a 1935 Master Six Buick Sedan, T black in color, bearing Illinois license 506-882, which was issued to 🚕 William C. Ryan, 47 North Ogden Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. The observations of the Agents determined that this individual is also a frequent visitor of at the Ogden Grill. On this date a Dodge sedan bearing Illinois license 386-686 was observed and it was determined that the car was registered in the name of William J. Wolff, 2094 Estes Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. From 🐇 the observations made by Agents Whitson and Stewart inside of the Ogden Grill it was determined that William J. Wolff is the head waiter at that place. Also on this date a green Auburn coupe bearing Florida license D7-286 . approached the Ogden Grill and the occupants thereof entered that place. A telegram was sent to the Jacksonville Bureau office, which office advised under date of June 11, 1935 that this license was issued to Mary Ellen: Crosier, 836 South West 15th Street, Mismi, Florida at which place she to resided with her husband W. Crosier, field representative for Colliers magazine. The Jacksonville office advised that in March 1935 Crosier left for Tampa, Florida, but that his wife remained in Miami until April, 1935 when she left for an unknown destination. The reputation of these individuals according to the Jacksonville office is considered good. Republic

Also under date of June 7, 1935 Agents Stewart and Whitson observed between 1 and 1.50 A.M. a short stocky man standing in front of the doorway at 189 North Clark Street, who appeared to be covering the entrance to the Ogden Grill. He kept his hand in his left coat pocket as though holding a gun. Upon a signal from a man in the doorway of the Ogden Grill this individual walked to the corner of Clark and Lake Sts. erossed the street and approached the entrance to the Ogden Grill. After several minutes this individual got into a Chevrolet coach, 1933 model, blue in color, which was parked in the alley mert to the Ogden Grill, and drove north rapidly on Clark Street. The second man re-entered the Ogden Grill.

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It was also on this date that Kaplan, who is commonly known as GIBHY KAPLAN, was observed driving the car of Irvin Owen. Surveillance as the Ogden Grill wasmaintained by Special Agents Emrich and Gillen on June 9, 1935, and these agents observed several cars which appeared to have no someotion with this case. At 2.15 A.M. on June 10, 1935 Special Agents Emrich and Gillen observed Kaplan, Wolff and three women leave the Ogden Orill. Wolff walked south on Clark street and the three women, whose identities are unknown, entered Kaplan's ear. Kaplan's actions were suspicious in that he permitted the women to drive away in the car, he watching them and then turning and running rapidly on Lake Street.

On June 11, 1935 Special Agents Whitson and Gillen maintained the observation of the Ogden Grill. At about 10.25 P.M. a Chevrolet :: coupe bearing Illinois license 852-976 was seen to approach the place. This car was found to be registered in the name of Harry Edward Rondau. 719 Grand Avenue, Waukegan, Illinois. While the agents were attempting to get the number of this ear a stockily built man wearing a brown suit and the light gray cap, apparently of foreign extraction, entered 189 Morth Clark St. and apparently observed the agents. He did not continue past the door but retraced his steps mort . He soon came up to the door and placed his supped hands are ind his eyes and against the glass of the door and for a ahort time looked into the door. Agents Whitson and Gillen then left the place of surveillance and entered the Ogden Grill, remaining there from the that time until about 2 A.M. On this night Agent Emrich joined Agents Whitson and Gillen for the purpose of trailing Kaplan when he left the Ogden Grill. At about 5.10 A.M. on the morning of June 11, 1935 Kaplan and another individual thought to be Owen, emerged from the grill and drove north on Clark Street with the above named agents trailing them. These agents determined that Kaplan proceeded to the Seneca Motel, 200 East Chestnut St. Chicago. The Agents waited outside of the Seneca Motel until 4 A.M. but neither Kaplan nor his companion emerged.

At 1.50 A.M. on June 15, 1935 Agents Emrich and Gillen again trailed Kaplan and two women to the Seneca Hotel, and it appeared that Kaplan was making his home at that address. Surveillance of the Ogden Grill was discontinued on June 15, 1935.

Due to indications that Kaplan resided at the Seneca Hotel, Special Agent Emrich ascertained that the hotel is at the present time in the hands of a receiver, and that the present manager is Thomas Kettering, who is reputed to be a very reliable and trustworthy man. Agent Emrich interviewed Mr. Kettering, but did not question him concerning Kaplan. However Agent Emrich displayed photographs of Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell,

William Harrison, William Weaver, Doctor Moran, C. J. Fitzgerald, and Myrtle Eaton to him, all of which Mr. Kettering failed to recognize ab being likenesses of any persons who had been observed at the Seneca Motel during the past few months. Upon the suggestion of Mr. Kettering the photographs were likewise shown to Mr. Williams, Assistant Manager of the hotel and Mr. Roberts the day slerk, and the results were likewise negative.

The identity of Harrison of course is unknown. This information was furnished to the New York City office for their informations. another maniations conversation occurred on June 2 30mm

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the identities of Willis and Los could not be determined a immediately by an investigation at the Ogden Grill. Movever the Agents making the observations on the grill observed no one in that Vicinity answering the description of Marrison. It being known that Los Turner is a friend of Willie Marrison, a telephone call was placed to the St. Louis office to ascertain if it was possible to determine whether Turner was in St. Louis on the date of the call. If it were found that he was absent from St. Louis on that day there would have been a probability that this sould have been Los Turner speaking. However the St. Louis office advised that on June 12, 1935 Lee Turner was in jail at St. Louis.

Another indication that Kaplan resides at the Seneca Motal is a telephone call placed from the Ogdan Grill on June 14, 1955 at 1.88

Numerous other telephone conversations were recorded but nothing of value was obtained therefrom other than identifying the various individuals who frequent that place, namely Gilbert Kaplan, Nate Kaplan, Irvin Owen and George Browne, and individuals called Herb, Jimmie, Elmer, Dick (Kaplan's bartender), Jim, Mr. Richards, Ruby, and numerous others which will not be listed herein.

The above telephone observations were discontinued at 1 A.M. June 15, 1955.

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A list of the telephone calls emanating from the Ogden Grill from January 16, 1935 was obtained to the list received, numerous long distance telephone calls were made, and it is believed impractical to sheek all of them.

Under date of May 22, 1955, the Los Angeles office was requested to check telephone number at Los Angeles - Trinity 8345, to ascertain if that number had any connection with the instant case, as it was known that various members of this mob frequented California from time to time. The Los Angeles office will report the result of its investigation regarding this number.

On May 1, 1955 it was noted a Western Union tellessent to Cleveland, Ohio by Kaplan, the same having been tellessent or The Western Union Telegraph Company of the Western Union Telegraph Company of that this telegram was addressed to Miss Kitt & beet, Union Airport, Cleveland, Ohio, reading as follows: Without fail call me from airport at Cleveland Dearborn 1987 reverse charges. In connection with the Buick car which was observed at the Ogden Grill and registered in the name of Kaplan, the St. Louis office was requested to sheek through the Secretary of State's office at Springfield in an effort to ascertain where this car was purchased, as it was believed possible that the motor company from which Kaplan obtained the car might have sold cars to the fugitives in this case. The St. Louis office advised that the car was sold to Kaplan by the James Levy Motor Company, 2255 S. Michigan Boulevard, Chicago. Under date of June 15, 1935 Special Agent D. P. Sullivan interviewed Mr. John McLean of the James Levy Motor Company, 2255 S. Michigan Boulevard, Chicago. Under date of June 15, 1935 Special Agent D. P. Mr. McLean failed to recognize any of them. However a search of the records of the motor ecompany disclosed that on September 80, 1934 a Buiek coupe bearing 1934 Illinois license 750-974 was serviced by the company for Mr. T. Elackburn, 718 Waveland Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. These plates were issued to Mr. T. C. Blackburn, 114 Walnut Street, St. Charles, Illinois, and it will be noted in report of Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley, Chicago, Illinois dated February 3, 1935 that the Buick coupe recovered from Fred Barker at Ocala, Florida bore the above license plates.

Under date of June 8, 1935 the New York office advised by teletype that George E. Browne had reserved a seat on T.W.A. Plane No. 7 for Chicago, Illinois from New York on June 7, 1935; that the trip was sangelled on account of weather conditions; that the New York office had determined that one D. C. Browne had transferred this reservation from the T.W.A. Plane to a United Air Lines plane leaving New York City at 7.50 P.M. and arriving in Chicago at 2.02 A.M. June 8, 1935. The records of the latter line indicated a reservation for D. C. Browne from Chicago, Illinois to St. Louis via the American Air Lines, leaving Chicago at 8 A.M. and arriving in St. Louis at 9.57 A.M. June 8, 1935, and it was believed desirable to ascertain the point of Brown's destination in Chicago. The above information was therefore telephonically communicated to the St. Louis office, which office has reported the results of its investigation at that place.

On June 6, 1935 Special Agent D. S. Hostetter of the St.

Louis Bureau office telephoned this office and advised that George
E. Browne left St. Louis, Missouri at 11:45 P. M. on June 8, 1935
via the Chicago and Alton Bailroad, which was due to arrive at
Chicago, Illinois at 5:45 A. M., June 9, 1935; that Mr. Browne and
previously made reservations on the United Air Lines for gransportation to Chicago, Illinois; that on this reservation he gave his address as 212 South Maple Street, Oak Park, Illinois. However, he
failed to traval to Chicago by air but instead proceeded by reilroad.

Investigation at 212 South Maple Street, Oak Park; Illinois discloses that this is a large apartment building, and a sign located in the front of the building indicates that same was owned by the Pleasant Avenue Realty Company, 1119 Pleasant Avenue, Oak Park, Illinois. The sign further read that Mr. F. Fippinger, 200 South Maple Street, Oak Park, Illinois, was the agent on the premises.

Mr. Fippinger was interviewed relative to George E. Browns and he advised that he had been employed as janitor of the building for only six weeks; that George E. Browns was living on the premises at the time of his arrival and therefore he was unable to state the exact date on which Mr. Browns moved into the building. He further stated that he has never seen Mr. Browns, nor does he know what business connections he has; that Mr. Browns is married and has a daughter about twelve years of age; that he occasionally drives a Buick automobile bearing an Illinois license. Mr. Fippinger also stated that the records of the building are in the custody of Mr. Decker, Fr. who is manager and renting agent of the building and that same can be secured from him.

In the vestibule at 212 South Maple Street, Oak Park,
Illinois, Agent observed the name George E. Browns on the mail box
indicating that he is occupying the second floor apartment at that
address. There was also observed parked in front of the building
a five-passenger Buick sedan, 1935 model bearing 1935 Illinois
license tegs 710-250. At the time Agent noted this automobile a
man who appeared to be a tough character was sitting in the car, apparently waiting for someone; that after a few minutes Agent observed
a woman expensively dressed, who was accompanied by a young girl,
come out of 212 South Maple Street, and enter the above mentioned
Buick automobile, after which the oar drove away.

There was also observed in front of that address a 1935 model Dodge coups, Illinois, 1935 license tags No. 639-805.

A check of the Illihols sutomobile registration records for 1935 disclosed that license No. 639-805 was assigned to Free George E. Browne, 728 Selbourne Road, Riverside, Illinois for a Dodge automobile, motor no. 3682785, serial no. NEE-5818.

Dodge automobile, motor no. 3682785, serial no. KDR-5815.

With reference to license No. 710-850, it was ascertained that this number was assigned to the Chicago Theatrical Protective Union, Local No. 2, 160 North LaSalle Street, Chicago Illinois on a Buick automobile.

It is apparent that both of these automobiles belong to Mr. Browne and that the woman and girl whom agent observed leave in the above described Buick automobile were Mrs. Browne and her daughter.

It appeared that the numerous trips made by George L.

Browne were in connection with the operation of the International
Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees, and Moving Picture Machine
Operators of the United States and Canada, and it was considered
advisable to interview Browne to ascertain if any information could
be obtained concerning Alvin Karpis.

On the morning of June 15, 1935 Special Agent John & Madala located Mr. Browne at 218 South Maple Street, Oak Park, Illo and brought him to the Chicago office where he was interviewed by Special Agent in Charge M. H. Purvis, and subsequently by Special Agents Madala and Suran. Ho inquiries were made of Browne soncern ing Kaplan or the purported telephone call in which the name of Karpis was mentioned. Browns denied knowing Karpis or any of the fugitive members of this gang and stated that subsequent to the death of Thomas Malloy, the Moving Picture Operators Union was moved from its Ashland Avenue address to 160 North Wabash Avenue, Chicago, and that he as president of the International Alliance of Theatrical 🛆 Stage Employees and Motion Picture Machine Operators of the United party States and Canada was called upon by the local of the Motion Picture Operators Union to adjust their affairs; that the allegations were that Malloy had defrauded the Motion Picture Operators Union of huge sums of money. Mr. Browne stated that the home office of the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees and Motion Picture Machine Operators is located at the Earle Theatre Building in -Mashington, D.C. and that he is the president of this organization. Browne stated that this alliance embodies all of the various unions connected with the motion picture and theatrical industries, such a second as the Motion Picture Operators Union and the Stage Employees Union.

He stated that Wr. Marland Moluden is the third Tice President of th International Alliance and resides in Chicago at the Bismark Motel, although his home is in Gleveland, Ohie at which place he spends much much of his time. He stated that Holmdon is now acting as a field represent tative or business agent of the local Motion Picture Operators Union taking the place of Thomas Malloy who was assassinated. Mr. Browns stated that during the time that Malloy was the business agent of the Motion Picture Operators Union Thomas Reynolds was president of the organization; that Frank Clifford was the assistant business manager of the Local Union and Ralph O'Hara was the organizer. "We stated that in addition to these individuals Malloy had numerous other "hangers on" and named such individuals as Eddie Donovan and Johnnie Ball. He stated :that while Malloy had arranged to pay Ralph D'Mara, Donovan and Ball & Sal money out of the labor union treasury, they really had no official and the sonmection (with the exception of Ralph O'Hara) with the union, The stated that after Malloy's death the Motion Picture Operators Union Design of was requested to move its offices from the South Wabash Avenue address -and the offices were then moved to 160 Morth LaSalle Street, Chicago, Illinois, where the Stage Employees Union also has its offices. He stated that the only individuals who acted in an efficial capacity under Malloy and were connected with the Motion Picture Operators Union were John Smith, commonly known as a stewart or field man, and Ed Moore, who is also a field man or commonly known as a business agent. He stated positively that the above mentioned Eddie Donovan, John Ball and Ralph O'Hara do not hang around the present offices of the Motion Picture Operators Union; that although they know numerous individuals in that organization, their connections ceased when Malloy was alain, ... Browne further advised that William Bioff is employed by him in connection with the operation of the International Alliance and resides. at 1128 Washington Boulevard, Chicago, which it will be noted is the address given for William Berg, related to previously in this reports

On Sunday, June 2, 1935 a telephone call was received at the Chicago Bureau Office by Special Agent Val C. Zimmer from a lady, who refused to give her same. She stated that who resided in the vicinity of Halsted and 54th Street, Chicago, and advised she has a neighbor who is a Policeman by the name of Conroy, whose address is 749 54th Street. She stated that on the night of June 1st, she saw a man drive in the rear of Conroy's residence in a small car, green in color, a Sedan with Illinois license plates, the number of which was not noticed. This man got out of the car and went into Conroy's home from the rear and departed from the front with Conroy a short time later.

She stated that from the pictures she had seen in the papers of Alvin Karpis, Subject of this case, she believed this man resembled him. She stated that she was not trying to get Officer Conroy in trouble for spite, but noticed the above and believed same should be reported to this office.

Special Agent H. A. Martin conducted the following investigation on June 10, 1935:

Investigation in the neighborhood of 749 54th Street, indicated that the only house from which a surveillance could be made of the rear of the premises at 749 54th Street, the residence of Conroy mentioned above, was 747 West 54th Street.

Agent called at this address and there interviewed an elderly lady who gave her name as Mrs. Cantlon. The Agent exhibited to her pictures of the Subjects of this case still at large and 🖄 questioned her concerning the activities of Conroy's acquaintances. She picked out the photograph of Alvin Karpis as somewhat resembling a person who had rented a flat from Conroy in his home at the above 1000 mentioned address, and had driven a small black car with red wheels, and a Florida license, the make of which she did not know. She and a stated that he no longer resided there, but had moved some time ago, a the exact time she did not remember. When questioned concerning the relations between herself and Conroy, she indicated that they were not very cordial, stating that Conroy was ugly and mean and not a good neighbor, and there seemed to be considerable ill feeling between herself and Conroy. Mrs. Cantlon asked Agent how he had \$. happened to get her name and address, and whether or not he had come in response to her phone call. This would seem to indicate that Mrs. Cantlon was responsible for the anonymous phone call reseived at this office on June 2d by Special Agent Val C. Zimmer.

Agent H. A. Martin conducted the fellowing investigation on June 3d and 5th, 1935:

The writer interviewed Mr. A. F. Meeb, Superintendent of the Fort Dearborn Post Office Station, Chicago, Illinois, relative to the general character of the inhabitants of 19 East Belleview. Place. Mr. Heeb stated that Mr. Andrew Cummings at the present time was carrier of the route covering this district and in the presence of Mr. Heeb, the Agent interviewed Mr. Cummings, who stated that he had delivered mail at the above address for a Mrs. H. Huff, who operated these premises as a rooming house, a Dot Ohmart, who is about eighteen or mineteen years old, and a D. C. Short, who now had his mail forwarded to 950 Rush Street, second apartment. He stated that carrier McElroy probably would have further information to give since he had been the carrier there prior to himself.

While the Agent was waiting for carrier McKlroy, Mr. Cummings brought a letter which was addressed to Mr. D. C. Short at the above address with the return given as Marie Wuhr, Freeburg. Illinois, Box 222.

Carrier Sam McElroy, colored, was also interviewed in the presence of Superintendent Meeb, and stated that a Mrs. Ida Chmart, who resided at the address in question, had a daughter about twenty-two or twenty-three, whom he thought was known as Dorothy. He stated that at the present time Mr. D. G. Short was under indictment in the Sir Francis Drake Estate Mail Fraud Case, and that he, Mr. McElroy, had been subposenced as a witness in the same case.

Agent exhibited photographs of all Subjects of the instant case to carriers Cummings and McKlroy, but neither could identify any of the pictures as having visited the premises in questions

Agent called at 19 West Belleview and there discreetly interviewed Mrs. H. Huff. In answer to inquiries concerning the Ohmart family, she stated that she did not know their initials; that they had lived there about two years; that Mr. and Mrs. Ohmart were about forty-five years of age, had two daughters, one in grade school, the other about nineteen years of age, who lived at home with her mother; that they were a splendid family and had high regard for them; that they paid their bills promptly. Mrs. Huff could not identify any of the pictures of the Subjects of the instant case who are still at large as having at any time visited at her premises. She stated that she had never heard of a person known as Mr. J. Nolte.

The agent interviewed the Post Office Inspector 4. Purcell at the New Post Office building, Van Buren and Canal Streets, Chicago. Mr. Purcell stated that the D. C. Short who had formerly resided at 19 West Belleview, was at the present time under Andiple ment in the Drake Estate case and was at large under a \$15,000 bonds. He described Mr. Short as being a heavy set short fellow, and stated that he did not meet the description of Mr. J. Molte. Me stated Belleview, was also under indictment in the same case, and had been released under a \$15,000 bond. Mr. Purcell identified the description obtained of Mr. J. Nolte at Sterling, Illinois as being that of one J. H. Hauber, one of the principals of the Brake estate case, who also is out at the present time under a \$15,000 bond. Mr. Furcall stated that Mauber was originally from lows and that during his " stay in Chicago he lived at the Croydon Motel under the name of C. W. Williams. It is thought very likely that the Mr. Holte found at the Colonial Motel in Sterling, Illinois is Mr. J. M. Nauber, since hearth laundry marks found there on the laundry of Mr. J. Welte were "T. H. H.",

on June 6, 1935 Mr. A. P. Hime of the Western Union Telegraph Company, whose home is in Bensenville, Illinois advised that om June 5, 1935 he had observed a car, make unknown, at Elmer's Tavern in Bensenville, a known hangout for members of the Karpis-Barker gang; that this ear which bore 1935 Maryland license 205106 was at the tavern several hours. He stated that he did not have an opportunity to observe the occupants but funished the license number to this office for what value it might have. Under date of June 6, 1935 the Washington Field office was requested by telegram to check this car. The latter office advised by teletype under date of June 8, 1935 that the above license was issued for a Plymouth sedan motor number 73390, registered in the name of Thomas F. Shanahan, 517 Ashland Avenue, Riverdale, Maryland, who was employed as principal fiscal accountant under the comptroller, Agricultural Adjustment Administration. It would therefore appear that this individual would have no connection with the fugitives in this case.

In compliance with the lead set forth in the report of Special Agent V. E. Griss, San Francisco, California, May 22, 1955, Special Agent H. A. Martin sonducted the following investigation on June 7, 1935:

Agent called at the Western Motors, Inc., and there interviewed Mr. C. E. Gunn, manager, who stated that the records of their company reflect that the 1934 Chevrolet sedan, motor No. 4543656, serial No. DA07-49267 was purchased by them from the O'Brien Motor Sales, 8032 Drevel Avenue, Chicago, which organization is operated by one John O'Brien, who resides at the same address. Mr. Gunn stated that they had done business with Mr. O'Brien on several prior occasions and thought him to be a reputable dealer, although all of his business is transacted from his home at the above address.

Mr. Gunn stated that they had sold the car to the Kelley Kar Company, Los Angeles, California, and that the car had been transported there by a party of three musicians. The only record they had of the names of these individuals was the name of McGregor. Mr. Gunn stated that it was sustamary to take references, etc. on persons so entrusted with automobiles to be driven to the west coast, but that once the cars were so delivered these records were destroyed.

He stated that the car in question left Chicago on October 13, 1934 and since no notation appeared on the record sard it is presumed that it arrived there in good condition and with no trouble. He stated that people so entrusted with automobiles were required to mail a postcard everyday indicating their progress and since no record of any irregularities appear, it is presumed that the car proceeded directly to its destination.

At 8052 Drexel Avenue, Chicago, Illinois Agent located the apartment of Mr. John O'Brien, but was informed by a woman's voice through the speaking tube that both Mr. and Mrs. O'Brien were, at the present time, in California and would not return for two or three weeks. The voice stated that it was the maid who was speaking.

At the Illinois State Penitentiary, Joliet, Illinois, Special Agent Charles Jenkins inspected the only record on file in the medical department relating to Joseph P. Moran, prisoner number 2582E, which was eard on which was entered the result of a medical examination given subject Moran on Movember 17, 1928, by Dr. C. J. Carlin, a prison physician, which reads as follows:

Agent Jenkins was informed by Doctor Carlin that all X-ray films are destroyed after one year.

Dr. C. J. Carlin, 208 Scott Street, Joliet, Illinois stated that he is one of the physicians of the Illinois State Penitentiary; that in such capacity he examined subject Moran on Movember 17, 1928, and found Moran's condition as set forth above; that he did not recall the location of the bullet wounds on any part of his body except the chest; that later an X ray examination disclosed that Moran had a foreign sub stance in his lung tissue which was probably a piece of shrapnel which should still be lodged in his body and easily located and that at the time he examined Moran probably seventy five other prisoners were awaiting attention so that the examination was not as complete as would be the case if same were conducted under different circumstances.

In the jacket of this prisoner in the files of the record select of the Illinois State Penitentiary Agent Jenkins found the following memorandum which reads as follows:

"Memo. from Dr. J. Chmelik, prison physician to Warden M. C. Hill, March 10, 1930, re immate Joseph P. Moran, No. 2582E:

In response to the request of the Division of Pardons and Paroles for a report on the physical sondition of the above immate, permit me to submit the following:

Our records show that he received the following wounds shile serving in the World wart bullet wound left leg; bullet wound right leg; three ribs fractured left side; three fingers fractured right hand and a bullet wound in the chest.

I ray shows that he has a piece of foreign body in the left lung, about the size of a pea and a cavity about the size of a dollare. This cavity in my opinion, is a pus pocket.

Me is suffering from shroule bronchitis of both lungs, more pronounced in right. This condition resembles Tuberculosis. He has had four hemorrhages, the last one about a week ago.

To has rable in left lung and his temperature runs between 100 and 101 degrees and in my opinion this condition may develop into active tuberculosis of both lungs.

I am submitting under separate cover an X ray film in this

In the records of this prisoner Agent Jenkins found a letter dated November 17, 1928, Ottawa, LaSalle County, Illinois in which subject Moran's military record is set forth as follows:

Joseph Moran enlisted in the Army at San Antonio, Texas the day after war was declared.

On Now 8, 1917

On May 8, 1917, received commission as a lieutenant in Gavalry, at Camp Funston, and for three months patrolled the Mexican border between Lorado and Brownsville.

Transferred to the Air Service at Kelly Field, Texas, where he remained three months.

Sent to Georgia Technical College, Atlanta, Ga. for machine gun training - 2 months.

Transferred to Rantoul as commanding officer of Air Squadron No. 168 where he remained three months.

Sent to Wilbur Wright Field at Dayton, Onio for the purpose of testing the new Marlin machine guns where he remained about three months. While there he was wounded by a machine gun explosion due to imperfect breech lock construction. He was struck in the leg and face receiving deep flesh wounds and was in the hospital ten days.

Transferred to France through Comp Merritt, New Jersey.
Went overseas with the Send Storm Division, Field Artillery. Landed at Southhampton, England, thence sent to Cherbourg thence to Issodoum where he entered the Air Service as a Lieutemant. Transferred to Clichy Field and participated in the air patrolling of Paris. Transferred to First Army Corps at Behonne in the Verdun sector where he remained four months.

He was injured due to the falling of a plane in which he was riding. His left arm and shest were injured, two ribs broken and two fingers of his right hand fractured.

Following his recovery he was sent to headquarters of the 76th Division at St. Amand where he remained until the conclusion of the war-

Discharged at Camp Merritt, New Jersey, 1919.

Six months after his discharge he was sent to the Veterans
Bureau Mospital at Boston, Mass, where his left breast was removed. He
remained at this hospital about six weeks.

Ryan related that from 1950 to 1955 he lived in Cicero, Illinois and also in Kansas City, No. He was unable to furnish his place of residence in Cicero, Ill., but stated he lived at 1507 North Seventeenth St., in Kansas City. He said he worked for the Chevrolet, Garage on Main Street in Chicago, Illinois, and in Kansas City he was employed by a Ford garage on Twelfth Street, under one Henry Allen, and at a Chevrolet garage on Sixteenth Street under one Bill Moran. Prior to 1930 he ulaimed to have lived for a great part of the time in St. Louis, No. He stated he had been sentenced at Fort Worth, Texas in 1922 on a liquor charge and had been an immate of Leavenworth Penitentiary during the years 1922 and 1925. He said that on several occasions he had furnished information to Postal Inspector Welbora at Cincinnati, Chio; that he knew the Government paid well for information and that he had some information concerning "Al" Karpis which he thought the Government would like to have.

He releted that on the afternoom of June 7, 1935 a woman named Mae Collins, whom he described as being between 27 and 50 years of age, 5' 7" in height, weight, 155, hair bleached, complexion fair, good looking and a neat dresser, came to the Oldfield Garage in a Chevrolet town sedan, 1935 model, black body with gold stripe, bearing this year's Indiana license plates \$110-345 (Ryan was uncertain about the last two numbrals); that it was about 4:50 P. M., when she came to the garage; that she had a dark brown Gladstone bag, also a dark brown traveling bag; that she had just come from Indianapolis, she said, and wanted her car fixed and then put under cover; that she asked him if there were any that feet in town; that she said her "cutie, Alvy" would be in town within forty eight hours; that his pal was coming with him; that another

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woman was also soming into town, she thought, from Louisville, Tyrian and that the four of them were going up into Michigan to a hideout.

Ryan said that this woman gave him a \$5.00 bill and maked him if he knew Rose Schooffer; that she was looking for a relative of Rose Schaeffer's who lived on Marth Exclid Avenue in Dayton; that ? she did not want to go through town so she asked him to drive her to 2 the Euclid Avenue address. Ryan said he drove the woman to the address which she said was in the 1200 block on Morth Euclid Avenue. He said 🚉 the building in question was a two-story frame house located on the east side of North Ruclid Avenue; that the house was equipped with awnings over two upper windows and also had a two car garage. He said that Mae Collins went into this house and remained about five minutes and upon returning said everything was 0. K. He said she requested : him to put her ear in one of the garages which he did, and that he returned to his place of business via street car. According to Ryan, this woman told him that she yould see him on the following evening at 7:00 P. M., at the Wagon Wheel which is a very popular restaurant and ber located in the Hotel Van Cleve in Dayton, Chief The Cleve

With respect to Mae Collins, Ryan informed that he had known her since about 1921, the meeting having taken place at Kansas City. He said he had seen her in Kansas City, Chicago, and Batroit, Miches with Alvin Karpis. He stated the last occasions on which he saw her was in Covington, Kentucky during 1934 at the time of the Latonia races, and on this occasion, Mae told him she was visiting Dago Rose, who is a friend of one Bob Zwick.

Ryan also stated he asw Alvin Karpis during the Latonia races in 1934, the occasion being by accident when they met in the lobby of the Hotel Sinton in Cincinnati, Chio. He said he first met Karpis in Kansas City in about 1921. When asked what Karpis looked like, he described him, as of 1921, as being 19 years of age, 5° 5° tall, weight about 150 pounds, and as having dark brown hair.

Ryan also said he was acquainted with Harry Compbell, Bill Weaver, Verne Miller and Vern Sankey, stating that he met all of these men in and around Kansas City about 1921 and again during the early part of 1933. He aliaded to the fact that all of them have t received considerable newspaper publicity. Ryan claimed to have been acquainted with Frank Hash, and said he knew about the Kansas City Massacre. He stated he was living in Kansas City just prior to the massacre and knew that Verne Miller was making his home at that time with some Italians. Ryan also said that he did not know the Barker boys personally, but had seen them occasionally.

Special Agent S. K. McKee was instructed to proceed to Dayton, Chio to assist Special Agent Donald McGovern in questioning. John Ryan and in conducting any other necessary investigation. Ryan was questioned concerning the details of the story he told and in seanection with the descriptions of various criminals whom he stated he knew. The descriptions he furnished of such persons as Karpie, Verne Miller, Vern Sankey and the Barker brothers, differed greatly from the true descriptions of these persons. true descriptions of these persons. Photographs of Velney Davis, Fred Berker, Alvin Karpis, Doe Berker, Herry Compbell, Dr. Joseph P. Moran, R. William Weaver, Russell Gibson, Jess Doyle, Harry Sawyer and Kate Barker were displayed to this man and he could not identify any of them. He first picked out the photograph of Russell Gibson as being the likeness. of Karpis, but later selected the correct photograph of Karpis, Although & he said he was acquainted with both Harry Compbell and Bill Weaver, he 2 passed completely over their pictures. It should be stated that Ryan became very nervous at the time he was looking at the photographs and aropped them on several occasions.

It was the belief of Agents McGovern and McKee that the story told by Ryan was a hoax and that his purpose in coming to the Marshal's office was an effort to secure remuneration of some sort for his alleged information.

Agents McGovern and McKee preceded to the 1200 block on Morth Euclid Avenus in Dayton, and noted that there is only one dwelling on the block. This dwelling is a two-story apartment building of brick construction, containing no awnings and designed to accommodate four families. The only other building on this block is a large school house located on the opposite side of the street. Agent McGovern informed here that during the early part of the interview, Ryan had remarked that there was a number of houses on the east side of the street along with the frame house, alleged to have been entered by Mne Collins.

Agents drove several blocks in each direction from the 1200 block on North Euclid Avenue, in an effort to find a house fitting the description given by Ryan, but with negative results.

Mr. Conny stated that John K. Egan is generally known in Dayton as Jack Egen. He said that there is a close connection between Inspector Si Yendes of the Dayton Police Department and Egan, and that these the men angineered the deal in which John Dillinger was apprehended in ... Dayton and turned over to the Lime, Ohio authorities to be tried for bank robbery, instead of being returned to the Indiana authorities for parole violation. As stated It is common talk that these two men . received a monetary consideration for turning Dillinger over to the Lima authorities. Mr. Canny related that he has known Egan practically all of his (Canhy's) life; that Egan is a criminal lawyer who represents such type of criminals as pickpockets and confidence men, although as the has been attorney for several bank robbers and mail robbers. He advised that Egan was attorney for one Red McGenn, a safe blower; else that he represented some safe blower from Toledo, Ohio, who was arrested in Dayton, Ohio, and in this connection he stated that he had several Police Difficers from Toledo come to Dayton and testify to the good character of this man. He also advised that it was common talk that Egan had fixed " several cases through Judge Patterson and secured the release of his clients; that Egan at one time represented one of the Bob Zwick gang in a murder case, but lest the case, his client being electrocuted.

Canny related that Egan cannot be approached by Officers for information. He said that Egan has established guite a reputation as a criminal lawyer; that whenever a big time crook gets into trouble around Dayton, Egan is always called into the rass and Egan has gone to Toledo and Cleveland on many occasions to try criminal cases. Mr. Canny could not recall the names of any of the criminals, however, Canny stated that Egan is a crook and has never represented himself to be otherwise. He is a married man, has no children, and is reputed to be worth several hundred thousand dollars, all of which he made in his practice of criminal law. He stated that Egan's law practice has fallen for of late, however, and that he is now interested in the race track at Dayton, with former Judge Roland Baggott, former Common Pleas Judge, who was forced to resign.

Mr. Canny stated that Egan has never taken any great part in politics, that is to the extent of running for office, but has always had his finger in the selection of a judge.

Mayor of the City of Dayton, used to be a law partner of Egan, and could probably furnish information concerning him. Mr. Canny stated that in his opinion Brannan is a very ethical and high type attorney and for that reason, he could never understand his association with Egan.

Dayton. Ohio, was interviewed by Special Agent Donald McGovern and he advised that he was associated in the practice of law with John E.

Egan from January, 1929 to February, 1934, at which time he [Brennam] took over the duties as Mayor. He advised that Egan represented "Jew"

Bates, who was later killed either in Covington or Egypart, Kantucky.

Bates was associated in a robbery along about 1930 with one Bob Adwas.

He also said Egan represented Dillinger at the time of his arrest at Dayton, Ohio; that he had represented a number of post office robbers whose names he could not recall; that he was attorney for one Jimmy Wilson, a safe blower from Toledo, Ohio, who was arrested in Dayton in possession of explosives and later sentenced to the penitentiary; that Egan and U. S. District Judge Robert Hevin represented Rad McGann who, with one Cowboy Hill, was charged with robbing the West Carrollton.

Ohio Bank in 1924, and that he represented numerous criminals during the time he has been practising law.

Mr. Bremman stated that John E. Egan lives about fourteen miles outside of Dayton; that he owns an old Lincoln automobile, also a new Ford Y-B and employs a colored chauffeur to drive him. Egan is about 65 years of age, 5° in height and weighs about 200 lbs.

Inspector Si Yendes, Dayton, Ohio Police Department, was interviewed by Special Agent Donald McGovern and he furnished information in line with that furnished by Mr. Brennan. Inspector Yendes was told of the letter which Egan had written inquiring for information regarding Delores Delaney and he stated that he was well 🝸 acquainted with Egan and believed he could secure information from him without arousing his suspicion. He said he thought he would run into 🐇 Egan during the same afternoon at the race track and that Egan would probably be drinking and would not suspect a casual question. Inspector Yendes was contacted on the following day and he said Egan told him he was securing information regarding Delores Delaney for a Catholic priest. Yendes said he felt he could not ask questions regarding this priest without arousing Egan's suspicion. Yendes also stated as being of possible value that about two weeks ago Egan made a trip to Chicago, presumably when the control of the c to purchase some clothes; that Egan's mother-in-law resides in Chicago, her name being Ford, and that he also has a brother-in-law living in

He said that a former police officer in Dayton hamed Jim Crumby, who was discharged from the police force and who later ran a pool room in Dayton, is a great friend of Egan; that after Crumby , seased operating his pool room, the building was torn down and a large and number of various types of pocketbooks were found; that Crumby had been : known to associate with pickpockets and the police thought that his association with persons of that type was one of the reasons he was so friendly with Egan:

Inspector Yendes also said that he helicane

Inspector Yendes also said that he believes Crumby was connected with the St. Paul, Minn., Police Department at one time, but was also discharged by them. The second secon

Since leaving Dayton, Crumby has returned on several occasions and has always visited Egan. Yendes also volunteered the information that during 1929 Egan represented one Thomas B. McAuley on 🐇 a burglary charge in Dayton, McAuley having been returned to this city? from St. Louis, No. This man was also wanted in Oklahoma at that time for robbery. McAuley was later sentenced to the Ohio Reformatory at Manefield, Ohio.

It is to be noted that Thomas B. Mcauley is the individual who was sentenced to the Chio Penitentiary in the fall of 1934 from Toledo, Chio, for robbery and who, while being held by the sounty authorities in Toledo, furnished information to Bureau agents regarding to the connections of various members of the Dillinger mob in Chicago. McAuley has recently communicated with the Cincinnati Bureau Office and *... stated that he was in a position to furnish valuable data concerning crimes, individuals, and dates of crimes in Chicago, Illinois, and would be willing to do this if the Bureau would make a recommendation to the Governor of Ohio which would help him to secure a parole.

Frank Wiley, auditor, and Jos Ogg, recorder of deeds, County Court House, made a search of their records, but no information was found relative to any real estate transactions by one Harold Moore, or Frank Nitti

George McCormick, Clerk, Treasurer's Office, informed Agent there was a Harold R. Moore, a former hall insurance salesman for the Farmers Mutual Hail Insurance Association of Iowa; that he had funt formerly been in Creston, lowe and was possibly the man being sought; however, Er. McCormick could furnish no information as to the present whereabouts of Moore.

J. I. Ewing, Sheriff, made a search of his records and found that one Harold B. Moore had been arrested at Creaton on February 2, 1931, on a charge of illegal possession of intoxiceting liquer:

Cruzen, Chief of Police, informed Agent that Harold Moore was a brother-in-law of Len Lenniger, a bootlegger at Creston, Iowa; and he believed he could obtain from Lenniger, information as to Moore's whereabouts, but Lenniger, at the present time, was out of the City and could not be contacted.

At Des Moines, Iowa Agent interviewed Loren Miller and Bill Scheffer, detectives of the Des Moines Police Department. Detective Miller advised Agent he had obtained information, just two days prior to the time of Agent's visit,

E. Dyson, of Des Moines, love. The hospital kept no record of visitors, consequently no further information could ?: be obtained there regarding Ruby Jones, or her associates.

Agent interviewed Dr. J. E. Dyson relative to his signing the commitment papers of Ruby Jones, to the University Hospital, Iowa City, Iowa. Doctor Dyson informed Agent he was merely a member ; of the county board and signed these papers only as a matter of form; that the family physician, who had attended Ruby Jones, was Dr. R.J. Harnagle, 915 Bankers Trust Company Bldg., Des Moines.

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Agent interviewed Dr. Harnagle, who advised that he had been requested to attend Ruby Jones, by a woman from a nearby town, whose name he could not recall; that as his fee had been paid on this; case, he had no further record of it; however, Doctor Harnagle informed Agent that he had known of the Eatons for a number of years, but had 🚟 never served any of them prior to that time and he did not know that 3 Ruby Jones was a sister of MYRTLE EATON until he was informed of that fact by this Agent.

The lead in reference report of March 20, 1935, suggests that Mr. Clark Lamont, State Liquor Enforcement Officer at Des Moines, Iowa, be interviewed relative to a possible gang hideout at Davenport.

Investigation disclosed that Mr. Lamont, a former Police officer of Devenport, Iowa, who has recently been employed by the Iowa Liquor Commission, had been discharged a few weeks prior to Agent's visit and was presently living in Devenport.

Agent contacted Reed Phillips, detective of the Davenpert, Ious, Police Department, who advised that Clark Lemont had been discharged from the Davenport Police Department, January 31, 1930, the reason for his dismissal being that Lemont was arrested on a charge of burglary and had subsequently received a sentence on that charge. He further informed Agent that during the time Lemont was on the Davenport Police Department, he had been mixed up with various underworld characters and had been positively identified on several hi-jacking jobs; that during Lemont's term on the Police Department, he had been an associate of Rex R. Carzole, who had been sentenced to life on June 28, 1929, from Cook County, Illinois, on a kidnaping charge, but his sentence was later commuted; a further, that Rex Carzole's record dated back to 1925.

Detective Phillips Further informed Agent that another of Lamont's associates was Mike Talarico, who is presently incarcerated at Alcatrez, on a kidnaping charge. It was Mr. Phillips' opinion if there was any contact of the Karpis gang in Davenport, it was probably Clark Lamont.

It is further moted that at the end of the get-away chart used in the robbery of the Stock Yards National Bank, South Saint Paul, Minnesota in August of 1933, the address "Myrtle and End Street."
Davenport, Iowa" appeared and Clark Lamont at that time lived at 1005, Second Street, which is a half block from the corner of Myrtle and Second Street. Further, that the Biwens Auto Supply Company, located on the corner of Myrtle and Second Streets, was operated by a very close personal friend of Clark Lamont; however, this man bears a very good reputation and it is not thought he was connected with any gang; further, investigation in that neighborhood failed to disclose anyone harboring the instant gang.

Detective Phillips suggested that possibly Floyd Buck Metzger, a bootlegger of Davenport, Iowa, might be able to furnish some information regarding Lamont and his associates. Mr. Metzger was accordingly interviewed and he informed Agent that Clark Lemont and Peter C. Kuehl, also a former police officer of Davenport, were very close friends and were both closely associated in unlawful activities; that both had been recognized and identified in a number of hi-jacking jobs and had numerous friends among the underworld; that if there was anyone who could give information concerning the activities of

Lamont it was Kuehl as Kuehl and Lamont had since become bitter engales and if it was possible for Kuehl to give any information which would implicate Lemont in any way, without implicating himself, he felt sure he would do it. Detective Phillips checked the record of Peter Kuehl while on the Police Department, and found that Kuehl was discharged from the Department on account of having been mixed up with various bootleggers and that Kuehl had admitted, on the witness stand in Peoria, Illinois during the fall of 1933, that he had accepted a \$3,000.00 bribe from bootleggers. Kuehl is presently living on a farm at Hempstead, Texas. The same of the sa

The following description of Clark Lamont was obtained from the records of the Davenport, Iowa, Police Department:

Detective Phillips informed Agent that he would endeavor to obtain further information relative to there having been a gang hideout near Myrtle and Second Streets in Davenport.

At Fort Madison, Lows Agent interviewed Gale Johnson, at the Iowa State Penitentiary, where he is incarcerated for life on a charge of murder. He was questioned with reference to his having been with HILL WEAVER at the time WEAVER purchased a car from the O'Day Chevm let Company in Des Moines Iowa. Johnson admitted being with WEAVER at the time the car was purchased but informed Agent he would give no information whatsoever regarding WEAVER, as WEAVER had befriended him at one time and had also loamed him money at various times and he would not do anything to harm WEAVER

At Ames. Iowa

Police Chief William Cure informed Agent that Charles Shockley, father of Nina Snyder, the alleged wife of "Go-About" Riley, of Des Moines, Iowa, and a close personal friend of MYRTIE EATON, would probably harbor snyone if asked to do so; that Shockley's reputation was not very good at ames and that his residence was usually watched; very closely by the officers at all times. It was Chief Cure's opinion if anyone would come into Ames or to the residence of Shockley, it would be noticed by his man and he has instructed them to keep a careful watch for anyone answering the description of MYRTIE EATON in that neighborhood.

At Fort Dodge, Iowa

Chief of Police James J. Huebsch was interviewed relative to Maude Wells and "Big Grace", who are friends of MYRTLE EATON, and he informed that Maude Wells was running a house of prostitution at 217. South 9th Street and that "Big Grace" was an immate of that house; further, that these houses were investigated regularly by officers of the Department and it was his belief if MYRTLE EATON would come to Fort Dodge, her presence would be known at once.

Accompanied by Police Chief Huebsch, Agent endeavored to interview Kaude Wells, but ascertained she was out of the city and would not be back for a week. Agent and Chief Huebsch made investigation covering all known houses of prostitution in the city of Fort Dodge, but no information could be obtained at any of these places relative to MYRTLE KATON.

At Sioux City. Iows

Investigation at Sioux City, Iowa was made relative to obtaining information regarding MYRTLE EATON having stayed with Mr. and Mrs. Walters at 4122 Pearl Street, who operate the Valley Gardens at 409 Pearl Street. Joe Young, Police Inspector at Sioux City, informed Agent that Harold Walters and his wife, who operate Valley Gardens, do not have good reputations; that Walters, himself, would probably motharbor MYRTLE EATON, but his wife would do anything. Mr. Young further informed Agent that Carlos W. Goltz, an attorney at Sioux City, had represented Walters in different cases, but Goltz had publicly emnounced he would have nothing whatever to do with anyone mixed up in a kidnaping case and it was Inspector Young's belief that Goltz would help this Bureau in every way he could, where a kidnaping case was involved and he suggested that Agent interview Mr. Goltz.

Mr. Goltz was interviewed at his office, 287 Orpheum Bidge, and informed Agent he was well acquainted with practically all the underworld of Sioux City; that he had been a criminal attorney for a number of years, but when it came to kidnaping, he had no use for such criminals and would to all he could to bring anyone implicated in such crimes to Justice. He further informed Agent that Harold Walters and his wife would put out no information regarding anything they had done, but he believed Walters would not be mixed up in harboring criminals; however, his wife might be, as "she had the face of an angel and the heart of a devil". He further informed Agent that Mrs. Walters' brother John Dillon, was a bootlegger and in his own mind, John Dillon thought bootlegging was all right and that there was nothing wrong in engaging in that business; however, Dillon had no use for anyone involving in a kidnaping case. It was Mr. Goltz' belief that Dillon could and would get any information desired regarding Walters and his wife.

Mr. Goltz endeavored to contact Dillon but found he will presently in Arkansas and would not be back to Sioux City for probably two weeks.

Agent endeavored to interview abe Kraloff, 919 Pierce Street relative to having been a forwarding agent for the mail of the Karpis Gang. Abe Kraloff's brother, Archie Kraloff, advised Agent that abe was out of the city and that his present whereabouts were unknown; however, Inspector Joe Young informed Agent that Abe Kraloff was mixed up in a graft investigation being conducted at Sioux City and that he would be included in an indictment returned by the coming session of Grand Jury.

At Breda, Ione

Investigation at Breda disclosed that Post Office Box fill was assigned to Henry Bruning, of Breda, Iowa, and was used by him and his family; that Mr. Bruning had had this same box for the past twenty years. Postmaster A. A. Ricke advised Agent that the Bruning family has lived around Breda, Iowa, all his life and at present, there was one son, Edmund, and a daughter, Adelaide, living at home; that Mr. Bruning was engaged in the real estate and monument business and that the son, Edmund, was a radio mechanic.

Agent interviewed Mr. Bruning and his son and daughter, at their home, with reference to their possible acquaintance with Dorothy Commert, \$19 East Bellevue Street, Chicago, Illinois. Mr. Bruning and his family denied knowing any such person as Dorothy Commert and informed agent that the only people they knew in the State of Illinois, was an aunt, who lived at Niles Center, Illinois.

After interviewing the Bruning family, Agent again went to the Post Office and interviewed John M. Schulte, Assistant Postmaster, who informed agent that he had never noticed any correspondence whatever, going out of Breda from the Bruning family, to Chicago, Illinois, or being received at Breds for the Bruning family from Chicago, around business letters received by Edmund from different radio houses in Chicago. He further advised be was familiar with the handwriting of all members of the Bruning family and suggested if it was possible to obtain a specimen of the handwriting of Dorothy Cmart, he might be able to be of some assistance in this investigation.

SAN ANTONIO DIFICE: At Hempstead, Texas, Vill locate and interview Peter C. Kuehl, said to reside on a farm near Hempstad. He 🔀 should be questioned relative to any information he can give regarding w a gang hideout, or underworld contacts in Davemport, Iowa. Mr. Kuehl is known to be acquainted with a number of underworld characters at Davenport, Iowa.

EL PASC OFFICE: Will make appropriate investigation with with reference to the information that Myrtle Eaton and Bill Weaver are said 🛴 🔆 to be in and around El Paso, or across the border in Mexico. This approximately information was furnished the El Paso Office by Special Agent O. C. Dewey on June 5, 1935.

CHICAGO OFFICE: At Chicago, Illinois, will interview Dorothy Omart, #19 East Bellevue Street, relative to her possible acquaintance with the Bruning family of Breda, Iowa, or with any ether person in Breda, Iowa.

OMAHA OFFICE: At Mount Ayr, Iowa, will locate Harold R. Moore

and interview him with reference to the farm he is supposed to have sold

to Frank Nitti.

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

Reference is made to your letter dated June 17, 1935, in connection with the above matter, in which this Office is instructed to assign this case to the Agent who is best acquainted with its background and which Agent should at all times be familiar with the various local contacts.

Upon the return of Special Agents Suran and Madala from the trial at St. Paul, this case was assigned to Special Agent Suran and he and Special Agent Madala have worked on this matter constantly since that time. However, at the time when Special Agent Val C. Zimmer left Chicago to attend the training school in Washington, it was necessary to have Special Agent Suran take over the desk of one of the supervisors of the Chicago Office. A separate letter is being addressed to the Bureau concerning the ability of Special Agent Suran today.

While Special Agent Suran has taken over the duties of a supervisor here, he still remains assigned to that case and spends a great deal of time on it. Special Agent Madala is also assigned to it permanently and is also from time to time performing work on the Jodil case, which work has consisted of covering a few leads in connection with the preparation of the Piquett case.

Special Agent Madala is familiar with all of the cr angles of this case but it is believed highly advisable to allow it to remain assigned to Special Agent Surad N 22 1935

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A separate letter is being addressed to the Bureau today showing the leads in this case which should be covered. Some of these indicate the desirability of wire tapping and other surveillances.

Special Agent Suran is able to function as a supervisor in the absence of Special Agent Zimmer and also to remain assigned to this case and continue to keep entirely familiar with the case.

It is therefore respectfully suggested to the Bureau that this procedure be followed at least until the return of Special Agent Zimmer. It is also suggested that the Bureau in considering this matter, consider the other two letters mentioned herein in connection with same.

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated June 18, 1935, wherein it is stated that the instructions given to at the time of the apprehension of Volney C Davis to leave the scene were incorrect and that such procedure is very undesirable, and in this connection the following information is submitted.

From the very first contact with it was obvious that it would be necessary to deal with her in a discreet and confidential fashion, it even being necessary to prevent her family from knowing that she was aiding the Government in this respect. The background of her family is unknown to me, but she has at all times informed employees of this Office that she could not under any circumstances allow her father and mother to receive knowledge of this situation.

She stated on several occasions that she did not care if Volney Davis later learned that she had informed against him and the plan was, at her suggestion, to have Davis apprehended at the time he should depart from her home after visiting her. While, of course, even though she might have been willing to allow Volney Davis to know that she was assisting the Government, this procedure would not have been followed.

At the time of Davis' arrest it was considered advisable to have leave the scene at once before she was noticed in company with Volney Davis by any persons 1 1935 who might appear on the scene as did not desire to be arrested in company with Volney Davis, which would undoubtedly have resulted in unfavorable publicity for ler

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and her family. As a matter of fact, her family did later learn something about this matter but did not suffer the embarrassment of having their daughter placed under arrest.

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Immediately upon placing Volney Davis in the car after his arrest, he informed me that he did not want any suspicion to be cast upon this woman because he knew that she did not have anything to do with it. He believed that a tap had been placed upon her wire as a result of her telephone number having been found in his possession at the time of his previous arrest.

With these facts in mind, I believed it advisable to instructions to leave the scene, and this procedure was followed. It is believed that this was the best way to handle this particular matter. However, the Bureau's instructions will be carefully followed in the future.

The title of this report is being changed to drop the name NEURO PUTAS since he was discharged by the District Court at St. Paul, Minnesota, an May 6, 1935. The following investigation was made by F. G. Millman on June 18, 1935: WILLIAM BHYAN BOLTON was questioned at the Runesy County Jail relative to the identity of the party who had informed GIBSON that Government Agents had made inquiries concerning a Ford Victoria Sedan. BOLTON stated that upon arriving in Chicago he was informed by GIBSON that the car was "hot" and that he, GIBSON, was going to sell the car fer that reason. BOLTON further stated that GIBSON made no reference to the person from whom he had obtained this information, and that he does not know

if A. C. or A. If Hewquist, or an employee of the Verba Motor Company had advised GIBSON of the Agents' inquiries. However, BOLTON believes that this is the source of GIBSON'S information basing his belief on the fact that GIBSON had purchased several care from this company.

On the morning of June 19, 1935, Assistant U. S. Attorney, George
Helsey, St. Paul, Minn., advised Special Agent in Charge, H. S. Andersen,
that he, Helsey, had heard rumors to the effect that Subject BOLTON is
losing his mind. Mr. Helsey suggested that inquiry be made along this
line immediately in view of the fact that BOLTON will be a very material
witness in future trials in this case, and at the same time Mr. Helsey
suggested that if it were ascertained that BOLTON is in fact losing his
mind, proper steps should be taken to change his place of incarceration
and see that he was given proper medical attentions

Accordingly, the following investigation was made by the reporting Agent: BILL GOSSELIE, jailor at the Remsey Gounty Jail, St. Penl, Minn., edvised that he has been in almost constant association with BOLTON ever since the latter was placed in the above jail. He advised that BOLTON is now kept in a cell alone; that he was first lodged in a separate cell during the course of the BREMER trial in order to keep him away from DOC BAHKER and other defendants on trial; that no other person has been placed in the cell with BOLTON since that time in view of the fact that BOLTON is suffering from tuberculosis, and it was feared that other persons occupying the same cell might be exposed to the disease.

MR. GOSSELIN advised that the physical condition of BOLTON has in no way changed, except for the fact that he has lost a considerable amount of weight during his incarceration; that the ill effects of tuberculosis are no more apparent now then when he was first incarcerated in said jail. He stated that BOLTON has complained from time to time that he, BOLTON, has some difficulty alsoping at night. It is noted, however, that GOSSELIN informed the reporting agent that he has observed BOLTON doing a great deal of eleoping during the daylight hours. This may possibly be the reason for his inability to sleep at night. MR. GOSSELIN advised that BOLTON is a fairly good eater. He further stated that he occasionally converses with BOLTON and that on two or three occasions BOLTON expressed the wish that he, BOLTON, were deed, and on one occasion he stated that he, BOLTON, ought to be cut to pieces; that on one occasion BOLTON expressed the desire to be placed in a larger prison such as Leavenworth, where he would have more of an opportunity to move about and get some exercises.

Mr. Cosselin further stated that on one occasion he looked through a peep hole and observed BOLTON climbing the bars of his cell and looking

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out the window. GOSSELIN stated, however, that in his conversation with BOLTON the latter was always coherent in his speech and that his sentences were always connected. GOSSELIN advised Agent that there are no other persons in the Remsey County Jail who are in a position to advise as to the mental condition of BOLTON in view of the fact that he is in association with moone.

The reporting agent then visited with BOLTON for approximately 25 hours. No effort was made to quie BOLTON along any particular lines but efforts were made to observe the nature of his conversation and his general conduct, in order to determine whether or not his mind has become effected during his inscreenation.

During the entire course of the conversation this agent failed to observe anything unusual in BOLTON'S speech or behavior. His conduct is identically the same as it was at the time he was taken into custody in Chicago on January 8, 1935.

This Agent inquired as to BOLTON'S health. The latter informed him that he was in fairly good physical emdition except that he had now started eoughing a bit. This Agent, however, failed to observe any coughing on the part of BOLTON during the course of the entire interview. It was explained to BOLTON that if he ever needed any medical attention or if he desired a physical examination, proper arrangements would be made. BOLTON was very cordial during the conversation and declared that he did not need any more room and did not care for a change in environment. He said he was well satisfied and as happy in his present surroundings as he could be in any other penal institution.

During the course of the conversation BCLTCN condemned himself quite meverely for having become involved in the present kidney matter, but he was in no way violent in condemning himself, and expressed only the usual condemnation that is so often expressed by convicted persons.

that occasionally his hands and feet become mumb as if they were going to aleep. He explained that this was undoubtedly due to his lack of exercise. It was noted here that his quarters are somewhat small, but when it was suggested that it might be possible to secure larger quarters he stated that he was satisfied with his present accommodations. He advised that at times he does become blue and lonely for his children and that that is the real cause for his melancholy attitude at times. This statement on the part of BOLTON is undoubtedly true in view of the fact that this Agent has interviewed BOLTON on numerous occasions, and at all times, from the time BOLTON was first apprehended, he always has expressed concern over his children and has mentioned his londiness in being separated from them. At this point

in the conversation BOLTON advised that his children are coming to visit him sometime in the near future and he requested that he be permitted to the permitted to t to visit with them at a point other than the County Jail. Agent explainod to him that as soon as he learned the date on which his children were the to visit him, he should make known his desires to Special Agent in Charge in of the St. Paul Office and that proper arrangements could undoubtedly be made for him to visit his children at a point other than the County Jail,

During the entire course of the conversation it was particularly noted that BOLTON'S speech was well connected and he in no memor wandered an from subject to subject. His thoughts were expressed clearly and in well chosen language. BOLTON was well able to continue along one line of thought and to reason logically. BOLTON expressed his continued willingness to 👙 cooperate with the Federal Bureau of Investigation at all times. He did not suggest that he in any way is becoming restless because of the fact that he has not yet been sentenced.

Company of the second BOLTON furnished agent the following interesting information. He stated that he dops not believe that members of the KARPIS-BARKER geng . assassinated Fred Goetz. He gave as his reason for his belief that several 🤲 of the members of the gang had given him their share of the ranson money to keep for them until arrangements equid be made for changing it into good -money. He further stated that Goetz was in the possession of bonds to the wanter value of approximately \$75,000, which members of the KAHPIS-BAHKER gang had secured through various bank robberies. He declared that no members of the KARPIS-BARKER gang knew where Goetz was keeping this money or the bonds and that it would be ridiculous to believe under those circumstances, that any members of the gang would kill him without first securing the money and the bonds. He declared that he does not know who killed Goets, but he does know that Goetz had numerous enemies in Chicago who would put Goets : on the spot. BOLTON advised that up until the time of his death, Goetz received ... from the Capone Syndicate in Chicago between \$1200 and \$1400 per month and that this money was only one-twentieth (1/80) of 80% of the net income of ... the Syndicate. BOLTON explained that the Syndicate is controlled by 84 men; that the major control is lodged in four persons to wit: ALFONSE CAPCHE. who is now serving a sentence in Alcatran Penitentiary; JACK COUR, who is serving a sentence in the Federal Penitentiary at Louisburg, Pa., FRANK NITTI, and JOHN PATTON. Control of the second of the s

BOLTON stated that when all of the monthly earnings of the Capone Syndicate are collected they are pooled; that all of the expenses of the Syndicate are then paid and that the remainder is divided as follows: 80% to the above four mentioned persons and 20% to the other twenty persons. the state of the state of the state of

BOLTON did not know the identity of the twenty persons, other than the four named.

BOLTON characterized AL CAPONE as being cumning and erafty and stated that CAPONE'S word even today is the law among the underworld of the entire United States. He stated that it is the belief of many law emforcement officers that the atrength of the Capone Myndicate has declined since the return of legalized liquor. He declares that this is a mistake, that the Syndicate has gained strength in view of the fact that mob wars are at an end; that the deadwood and old timber of the Capone Syndicate has now been weeded out and that a very strong organization remains; that the chief income of the Syndicate is from beotleg beers and liquors which they produce at various distilleries which are unknown to the Alcohol Beverage Unit and other taxing authorities. He further advised that a large amount of their income is derived from gambling devices including alot machines.

He declared that the Syndicate is still interested in racketeering; that they compel hundreds of small business men to pay tribute to the erganization in order to escape having their places of business bombel. He further stated that the Syndicate still compels beer joints and salooms to handle beers and liquors which are produced by the Capone Syndicate. He declared that the Syndicate is the master of numerous unions operating in Chicago.

He further edvised that CAPCHE has every opportunity to become a powerful underworld leader and influence after his release from Alcatras, and in order to substantiate this statement BOLTCH stated that the underworld of Chicago particularly, still pays tribute to AL CAPCHE and that CAPCHE'S share from the various items mentioned above is being set aside for him during the entire period of his incorceration in the penitentiary. He advised that when CAPCHE is released he will even be a more daring figure in view of the fact that he has learned how to conduct himself in order to avoid Federal prosecution in the future.

BOLTON further advised Agent that during the height of AL CAPONE'S reign in Chicago, Capt. ASTENCE who is now a Captain of Detectives on the Chicago Police Department, was then Chief of Detectives, and was being pull \$5,000 per week by the Capone Syndicate for complete protection. BOLTON declared that he knows this to be the absolute truth because GOETZ furnished him this information confidentially, and he declared that he has in me instance found GOETZ to be untruthful to him.

He edvised that one of Capt. Stagge's duties to the Capone Syndicate was to keep track of the mobsters of "HUGS" MORAN and to put them on the spot for the Capone Syndicate whenever possible. BOLTON declared that he

knows positively that it was Capt. Stegge, then Chief of Detectives, who "put on the spot" the MCRIM mobsters who were assassinated during the course of the St. Valentime's day massacre in Chicago. He declared that the entire set-up was arranged by Stegge. BOLTOM advised that STEGGE is still on the payroll of the Capone Syndicate and that it is his duty to the Syndicate to furnish confidential information as to certain plans of the Chicago Police Department in its war on the underworld. BOLTOM declared that STEGGE is unsermpulous and if he secures any information as to any plans of this Bureau he will impart this information to underworld characters.

In order to impress upon Agent the truthfulness of his assertions BOLTON declared that if he is ever released by the government and is picked up by the Chicago Pelice Department in sommection with the St. Valentine's day massacre, he will have no fear of punishment at the hands of the Chicago police in view of the fact that he will be able to put Capt. Stegge on the spot and Stegge will do everything in his power to prevent this.

In view of the fact that BOLTON is considered a very valuable witness to the government in the above entitled case, it is believed advisable that an Agent from the St. Paul Office visit him perhaps two or three times a week at the Ransey County Jail in order to keep him in the proper spirit.

It was ascertained at the office of the U. S. Attorney, St. Penl, Minn., that on May 28, 1935, the U. S. Attorney forwarded to the U. S. Attorney and the U. S. Marshel at Chicago, Illinois, certified copies of the sentence, judgment, and commitment of OLIVER A. BERG, which papers are to serve as a Federal detainer against him at Joliet Penitentiary, Joliet, Illinois.



Information was received at this effice June 19th, 1935, from Deputy United States Marshal Carl Thomason, Batesville, Arkensas, that a person by the name of Jack Williams was seem in Batesville on June 15th, 1935 and had been identified by Mr. J. A. Grooms of that eity as Phoenix Denald. This man was driving a Ferd V-8 Coupe or Coach, bearing Georgia 1935 license for 30-966. He is reported to own a tem-scre farm at Mountain View, Arkensas, where he resides at intervals and it was stated that when he makes periodic visits to his farm he is often times accompanied by women and has visitors who appear to be of the gangster type.

Teletypewriter communication with the Atlanta Office disclosed that Georgia 1935 license for 20-966 was issued to Jack Williams, 31 Houston Street, Atlanta, Georgia for a 1934, Ford V-8 Coach, motor #653445. The Atlanta Office was requested to ascertain information as was available concerning Jack Williams that would enable that office to establish his identity as Phoenix Donald.

Special Agent R. P. Shanahan of this office conducted immediate investigation at Batesville and Mountain View, Arkansas, after receipt of this advice from the Deputy United States Marchal at Batesville and he has

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informed me that the men known in the vicinity of Mountain View, Arkaneas, as Jack Milliams, owns a ten-acre tract of land there which he uses as a rest camp for hunting and fighing. He has owned that place for about two years and the offer Dood is recorded in the name of Jack Williams. Persons in Mountain View who know this man, after viewing the photograph of Phoenix Denald, state that Williams is not identical with ? this Fugitive. However, Mr. J. A. Grooms, the person who furmished the original information, partially identified Domald's photograph as being that of Jack Williams. Assorting to 🕾 information received at Mountain View, Arkenses, Williams is reported to be a genbler and frequents Memphis, Tennesses, Saint Louis, Missouri and R. St. Louis, Illinois. It was learned by Special Agent Shanshan that Williams left Mountain View, Arkansas in the evening of June 19th, 1935, for E. You will observe from reports rendered in this case that Donald has been reported by several informants as evning a farm somewhere in Arkeness along the Oklahoma er Missouri border. 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





weeks time and resulted in the conviction of defendant Barker and
others, and, it goes without saying, was regarded by the Government
as a case of great public importance.

Wynona Burdette was brought here under a writ of habeas corpus and testificandum and at the trial was placed on the witness stand by the Government. In her testimony, used by the Government, she told about the movements of "Doc" Barker and his confederates before, at the time of and after the kidnaping. Her testimony, including identifications, was of great value to the Government and contributed largely to the successful result of the trial.

MEMORANDUM FOR SPECIAL AGENT IN CHARGE M. H. PURVIS

There is attached to this memorandum a letter addressed to me from Mr. George F. Sullivan, the United States Attorney at St. Paul, Minnesota, and also a letter by Mr. Sullivan directed to the United States Parole Board. Department of Justice, Washington D. C., which Mr. Sullivan transmitted to me for my attention.

It will be noted in Mr. Sullivan's letter to me that I had indicated to Er. Heisey that it might be well to advise the proper authorities concerning the assistance rendered by Wynona Burdett to the Government in the Bremer kidnaping case.

With reference to the above matter I desire to advise that I, at no time, made any such indications to either kr. Heisey or kr. Sullivan, and in no instance did I ever intercede for Liss Burdett. For your information I was instructed by Mr. Sullivan through the St. Paul Bureau office to proceed to St. Paul, Minn. five days preor to the commencement of the trial for the purpose of talking with Wynone Burdett and Edna Murray with a view to havens them testify for the Government. After conversing with Miss Burdett on several occasions, she agreed to be a government witness, giving the reason that she wanted to clear herself and get out of the racket. At no time did I ever promise her any consederation in exchange for her testimony. A few days prior to Wynona Burdett's appearance in court, she inquired of me whether her action in testifying for the Government would have any favorable effect on her eligibility for parole. I advised her that this was possible, providing it were called to the attention of the Parole Board. However, I did not promise her that I would initiate, any action in this regard, nor did I promise her that I would prevail upon the United States Attorney to write to the Parole Board at Washington D. C. calling to their attention the assistance and cooperation rendered by her in connection with this case.

After Miss Burdett finished her testimony in court, I paid her a visit at the County Jail in St. Paul, Minn., and on this occasion she inquired whether I had knowledge of Mr. Sullivan writing to the Parole Board concerning her. I informed her truthfully that I did not know, whereupon she requested me to talk with Er. Sullivan concerning this matter. At this time she agreed to testify for the Government in any subsequent trial in this case, providing, however, that Harry Campbell is not the defendant on trial.

On the following day I related mix-conversation with Miss Burdett, as above outlined, to Mr. Heisey in his office, at which time he stated that he would suggest to Mr. Sullivan that a letter be written to the Parole Board informing them of the valuable assistance rendered by this individual.







Please be advised that Special Agent John L. Madala on June 19, 1935, conferred with Captain E. A. Evans, inspector in charge at the Bureau of Identification, Chicago Police Department with reference to this matter. He advised that his files reflected that three automobiles, a liquor flask, an automatic clip and a first aid kit, all of which were abandoned by the bandits at the scene of the shooting, were processed by his men for latent fingerprints with negative results.

For the information of the Bureau, the following has thus far been obtained from various sources, shich indicate 1 -TIBATION that the above referred to shooting was possibly perpetrated by of the members of the Barker-Karpis mob.

It will be recalled that some time ago, Irane Dorsey, who was the paramour of Fred/Goetz, now deceased, advised Bureau Agents that it was her belief that the bank messenger holdup which preceded the shooting of Officer Cunningham was staged by the Barker-Karpis gang. She based her belief in this connection on the circumstances which took place on the evening of the shooting, and also on a subsequent conversation which she had with Fred Goetz. She stated that on the night, in question she and Fred Goetz were wisited by Gladys and Harry Sawyer of St. Paul, Minnesota; that at about 8 P.M., Fred Gostz and Harry Sawyer left their apartment and did not return until some time after midnight. When they returned to the apartment both Fred Goetz and Harry Sawyer appeared very much excited, and Goetz made the remark "The boys sure did "bungle" up that job". Irene Dorsey further stated that a few days later Fred Goetz told her that whoever "cased" that job did not know what it was all about, as all they found in the bags were a lot of valueless papers.

ے72 A few days ago advised Agent Madala that on the night of the shooting of Police Officer Cunningham, Elmer Farmer immediately turned on the radio to receive police calls. at that time thought it strange that Elmer Farmer should do this, and on the following morning when read in the newspapers concerning the hold-up and subsequent killing of a Chicago police officer concluded Elmer Farmer had some previous knowledge of this crime. however, that at no time did Elmer Farmer ever discuss this matter either with or in presence.

further stated that about one month ago, engaged in a conversation with one Mike Marino, who is now living in Bellwood, Illinois, concerning the testimony of Byron Bolton during the trial for the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer just past. stated that in discussing Byron Bolton, Marino remarked that it would be just too bad if someone started to talk about him; that at this time he indicated to the informant that Fred Goetz and Byron Bolton were two of the participants in the shooting of Officer Cunningham.

Brennan, St. Paul, Minn., dated June 7, 1935, on the third page of which is set forth information furnished by Byron Bolton concerning machine guns, etc., which he states he threw into the Des Plaines River at a concrete bridge located on 22nd Street.

On June 17 and 18, 1935, Special Agents E. F. Emrich and M. J. Cassidy made a search of the river bottom at the point indicated by Bolton but their efforts to locate these firearms were unsuccessful. The river bottom was found to be littered with a miscellaneous assortment of junk and water-logged brush, which hampered them considerably in their efforts to drag hooks along the bottom of the river, and the recent rains have caused the river to be considerably higher than usual. A further search will be made of the river as soon as the conditions permit.

It might be stated that it was raining most of the time that this dragging was in progress.

Mr. Devenport stated, after emmination of the bills, that they were part of a let make from plates manufactured by one William Davis. These plates were recovered in New York City, New York about May 22, 1935, in the possession of one Victor Lucting, alias "The Count", who was arrested by the secret Service. Lucting formerly emme from Syringfield and Kanses City, Missouri. Mr. Davenport stated he is a very close personal friend of Frank Detaye, alias "Chee Chee" Deliaye, former beer baron and underworld leader of Kanses City, Missouri. Deliaye is reported by Mr. Davenport to be a fence for steles bends or other securities coming out of bank robberies. He has a home at 2904 Benton Boulevard, Kanses City, Missouri, but is now residing in Languist, Texas, where he has been cagaged in the oil business.

In connection with the above it may be noted that this office addressed a letter to the Milwankee Office an June 18, 1938, presentiting information received from Mr. Wint Smith, Experintendent of the Kanasa State Righway Patrol, to the officet that one Andy Yelma, a bootlegger of Topoka, Ennes; his friend and undergonly, N. B. Dr. Megill stated that he was the family physician for the Page family; that he was not acquainted with any of the other above named individuals and has no knowledge of the alleged association of 🗞 🦥 said individuals with Esther Page. He further stated that on or about March 2, 1935 Mrs. Ruth I. Page mother of Esther Page, called at his office and informed him that her daughter had disappeared and that her whereabouts were unknown. It should be further noted that Esther Page called at Br. Magill's office while agent was present and consulted with Dr. Magill just prior to the interview now being mentioned. Br. Magill stated that Esther Page consulted him regarding the scar resulting from an appendectomy which, she advised him was the result of an operation which had been performed by a doctor in Alabama. Dr. Magill and his secretary Mrs. Ambers both stated that Esther Page could not be depended upon to tell the truth; that she had a vivid imagination; that she was unreliable and that statements made by her were usually false,

Police Officer Glen Kerwin stated that in his opinion Esther

The Compbell them that she had a lawyer in St. Louis named Johnson who was handling 🔆 the Hoxico estate; that on several occasions Esther insinuated that $\frac{1}{2\pi i \pi^2}$ she had called this dawyer from Decayur by long distance telephone 😹 and that it was necessary for her to leave Decatur and contact the lawyer in question at St. Louis, Missouri; that on one occasion the Compbells drove Esther to Taylerville, Illipois where the saught the train to St. Louis, Missouri for the above alleged purpose; that on another occasion she informed them that she had communicated 🕾 with this lawyer and had been advised that he was at the Abraham --Lincoln Hotel Springfield, Illinois and that the Compbells took her to Springfield, Illinois where she entered the hotel and returned shortly thereafter stating that it was impossible for her to remain therein becames she did not have any baggage. The Compbells advised & Officer Kerwin that they purchased a handbag for her together with other articles of apperel and that she re-entered the hotel after the advising them that she intended to remain there for several days. They further advised the above efficer that on March 2, 1955 Esther Page left Springfield and later commission with the Compbells by telegram from Salt Lake City, Utah, Les Angeles, California and some city in Alabama and in each instance requested money stating that she was traveling with a private detective named Davidson regarding the her estate; that upon receipt of the above mentioned telegram from Los Angeles, the Compbells communicated with Officer Kerwin and he communicated with the Los Angeles Police and ascertained that Johnson and Esther Page had departed from Los Angeles for Tennessee. Kerwin further asated that he had obtained a sertified copy of the birth certificate of it Esther Page and had presented it to the Compbells and that this certificate indicated that Esther was born in Decatur as issue of Mr. and Mrs. James ... D. Page. Kerwin further advised that in his opinion Lefty Lewis, Johnson, Davidson and Burras are fictitious individuals, however he did state that Esther Page undoubtedly had traveled throughout the United States with some men whose real identities she has failed to disclose,

Sheriff Emery Thornell was interviewed concerning the character and reputation of Esther Page and he stated that in his opinion she was

one of the biggest liars in the county. He corroborated the statements made by officer Kerwin as set out above. He advised that Esther Page's parents are respectable law abiding citizens but that it is his belief that Esther Page is partially insmed

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent V. J. Wolfe, Decatur, Illinois and is recorded by him in a memorandum submitted to the St. Louis Dursen Officer

Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Campbell, 317 W. Macon St., corroborated the information given by Police Officer Glen Kervin and further stated that in their epinion Esther Page was mentally unbhlanced. Mr. Samplell emphatically denied any knowledge as to the identity of Lefty bell emphatically denied any knowledge as to the identity of Lefty Lewis and both Mr. and Mrs. Compbell stated that they had been unable to ascertain the identity of the individual referred to as Johnson, to ascertain the identity of the individual referred to as Johnson. Mrs. Compbell was of the epinion that Mr. Johnson was some level included with whom Esther Page was illicitly associatings.

Mr. Ga mybell cited the case where Esther Page had informed him that Lefty Lewis, a notorious character, was to arrive in Decatur on a certain day at a certain time. Mr. Compbell, in all sincerity, notified the Police Department and arrangements were made to meet the specified train. A man who happened to enswer the description of the mythical Lewis was apprehended and later identified as an individual who had arrived to visit his mother at a local hospital. Mr. Compbell further advised that Esther Page has repeatedly referred to Lewis and that every one of her stories to him had been groundless. The writer made numerous attempts to contact Sheriff Thornell for the purpose of interviewing Ester Page in his presence but in each instance the Sheriff was absorbe.

It would appear after examining the above memorandume that a further investigation is unnecessary in attempting to ascertain the identity of the individuals mentioned by Esther Page.

Sopies of this report are being furnished to those of fices which have heretofore received copies of the report of reference, in order that they might be advised concerning Esther Page's reputation for verecity and truthfulnesse.



Reference is made to Bureau letter dated June 5, 1935, in which it is requested that this office initiate an investigation with a view to locating the various dog tracks throughout the country in which Pat O'Hara and his associates have an interest.

A review of the files in this case in the Chicago Office disclosed that Edward J./O'Hare is President of the National Jockey Club, which organization owns and operates the Sportaman Park Race Track located at Cicero, Illinois. Although the correspondence and records of this race track indicate that O'Hare is the President thereof, it has been established that Johnnie Patton, Mayor of Burnham, Illinois, and a prominent member of the Chicago Capone syndicate, is in fact the controlling head of this organization.

Special Agent John L. Madala of this office visited the Translation Sportaman Park Race Track on June 20, 1935, and ascertained COPIES DESTRUITATiongh a conversation with the Maintenance Superintendent Sheets 20 DMAR 23 Boston Massachusette To another force are presently in Boston, Kassachusetts. It was further learned that this group recently opened a dog track known as the Bristol County Kennel

Club at Taunton, Massachusetts, which is located immediately outside of the city limits of Boston; that it is expected that O'Eare and his associates will be established at this Kennel Club until September of this year when the races commence at Sportsman Park.

It is believed that the Boston Bureau Office should make a thorough check at the Bristol County Kennel Club, Taunton, Massachusetts, with a view to determining whether Subject William J. Harrison is employed by or is frequenting this dog track. For the information of the Boston office, William Harrison is very closely associated with Edward J. O'Hare and his associates, and that during the years 1931 and 1932 he was employed by O'Hare as a ticket seller at the Miami Beach Kennel Club, Miami Beach, Florida.

A copy of this letter is being transmitted to the Boston Bureau Office for their information, and with the request that a discreet investigation be conducted at the Bristol County Kennel Club, Taunton, Massachusetts, in an effort to ascertain whether William Harrison is employed there or is frequenting the track. It is desired that this matter be given prompt attention.

Mrs. Wise stated that she made inquiries of the persons who resided downstairs, who informed her that they heard no sounds from the apartment upstairs during the daytime but at night the occupants seemed to be moving about throughout the night and that it would appear as though the occupants of the apartment had been sleeping in the daytime.

Krs. 
