On the afternoon of July 12, 1935, Special Agent A. H. Johnson of the Chicago Bureau Office received a telephone call from one an informant in this matter, who informed Agent Johnson that he was meeting several men coming in from St. Louis at the Norford Hotel, 1508 North Crawford Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, and that one of these men would be John Russell Moran, alias Bad" Moran, alias Babe, St. Louis PD #21181. No time was mentioned as to when would meet these persons or in fact did he give any information that the meeting would take place on July 12.

Special Agents J. B. Dickerson and W. J. Devereux went to the Norford Hotel at 1508 North Crawford Avenue on July 12, 1935 and Agent Devereux made discreet inquiries at the hotel and ascertained that no one had checked into the hotel on July 12, 1935. The hotel was kept under surveillance for several hours and no groups of persons were seen leaving or entering the hotel. In view of the meager information furnished by the was not believed advisable to continue said surveillance.

On the afternoon of July 12, 1935, the Chicago Bureau Office received a teletype message from the Kansas City Bureau Office to the effect that John Karpavicz was presently leaving Topeka, Kansas, on Route #4 to St. Joseph, Missouri, on Route #36 to Springfield, Illinois, and on Route #66 to Chicago, driving straight through in a Buick coach, pea green color; aluminum spot light, left front; small green sunshade, center of windshield; spare tire on rear; Illinois, 1935, license #719-755.

In discussing the advisability of taking action on the information with Special Agent in Charge D. M. Ladd, it was decided that in view of the indefiniteness of the message as to when John Karpavicz was leaving Topeka, Kansas, it would not be advisable to cover Route #66 into Chicago inasmuch as the trip from Topeka, Kansas, to Chicago would take at least twelve hours and if the person involved had left Topeka, Kansas about three o'clock he would not arrive in Chicago until about 2:30 o'clock on the following morning.

On the morning of July 13, 1935, Special Agents Dickerson and Devereux proceeded to the home of Mrs. Koehler, 2846 North Frencisco Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, which person resides next door to the building where John Karpavicz and his wife live, which address is 2842 North Francisco Avenue.

Mrs. Koehler, who has been sontacted in the past regarding the Karpavicz family in the building next to her, informed Agent that John Karpavicz had not returned to his home since he left it on June 28, 1935; that at the time he left he was driving his green Buick automobile and seemed to be taking extraordinary precautions to hide a bundle wrapped in white which he placed in the car. Mrs. Koehler stated that Mr. Karpavicz arranged the rugs in the back of the car to conceal the bundle; that he placed the bundle therein and rearranged the rugs a number of times until he was satisfied that no one looking into the car could see what was contained in the back.

Mrs. Koehler stated that as she has promised Agents in the past she would immediately telephone the Chicago Bureau Office in the event that anything of interest transpires at the home of John Karpavicz and that she and other members of her family are taking an unusual interest in watching every movement of the Karpavicz family who live in the building at 2842 North Francisco Avenue.

As has been noted before the Koehler people are ideally situated to watch all activities in the Karpavicz building.

On the afternoon of July 13, 1935, Mrs. Koehler telephoned the Chicago Office and advised that Mr. Karpavicz, father of Alvin Karpis, had just returned to his home.

On July 17, 1935, Agent Crews of the Kansas City Office telephonically communicated with Special Agent in Charge, D. M. Ladd, and requested that information be immediately obtained to determine whether John Karpavicz was still in Chicago or had recently left Chicago; that it was essential to obtain this information at once inasmuch as Special Agent in Charge Conroy was then conducting an investigation in this matter. In accordance with the above, Special Agent D. P. Sullivan telephonically communicated with Mrs. Koehler, who advised that Mr. Karpavicz and his family were still at their home and had not left it since he had returned from Tokepa, Kansas; that his automobile was at the time Agent conversed with Mrs. Koehler parked in the rear of the apartment building.

The following portion of this report was dictated by Special Agent M. J. Cassidy, and covers the investigative activity of that Agent and Special Agent L. A. Beckstead:

The Chicago office is in receipt of a telegram from the Kansas City office dated July 11, 1935 to the effect that a special delivery letter had been received by subject Karpis' father in Topeka, Kansas from 1535 or 535 wood Street, Unicago Lineols, and contained a request that this matter be investigated and that office advised.

Contained in the files in this case in the Chicago office is the information that Mrs. ROBERT VENUTE, sister of subject Karpis resides at 525 North Wood Street, and it was thought because of the fact that the Kansas City office was not certain as to the address from which the special delivery letter was sent, that in all probability the letter had been sent, by Mrs. Venute to her father. Accordingly Agents proceeded to the vicinity of 525 North Wood Street where a surveillance was made of the home of Mrs. Venute and the surrounding neighborhood, but no unusual activity was observed, nor were there any cars parked in the vicinity of the Venute home.

At the Wicker Park Branch Post Office, 223 North Paulina Street agents conferred with Superintendent of Mails Balters backoust advised that covers had been placed at various lines on the mil of Rebert Venute and femily at \$525 North Wood Street and that instructions had been given by him to the carrier to be on the lookout for anything of a suspicious nature occurring at that address.

Carrier William Rodgers of the above station advised that he has been keeping a sharp lookout for any suspicious circumstances or any indications that subject Karpis might be visiting the Venute family at 525 North Wood Street, but he stated that to date he had not seen any that he considered worthy of reporting to the Chicago Bureau office. Carrier Rodgers advised that Robert Venute and family reside in the front flat on the second floor at 525 North Wood Street and all mail destined for than has been brought Venute, whose name is either Michael or Raphael Venute, resides at 529 North Wood Street, which is a one family dwelling, and the mail going that address has also then scrutinized closely but there is no indication that any mail is being received from subject Karpis at the latter address.

With reference to the address 535 North Wood Street, as contained in the telegram from the Kansas City office, carrier Rodgers advised that the premises at 535 North Wood Street are occupied by Joseph Sernel and family who own the building which they occupy, as well as the building at 541 North Wood Street; that the Sernel family has resided in that neighborhood for the past thirty years and is considered highly respectable, and not given to associating with the neighbors. It was carrier Rodgers opinion therefore that the Sernel family would not consent to receive or send mail for Wenute or Karpis family.

while in the Wicker Park Branch and the state of a street post office which bore the postmark Topeka, Kansas 10.50 A.K. July 11, 1935, addressed to Mrs. Clara Venite, 525 Morth Word Street, Chicago, Illinois and bearing the return address of E. Grooms, 34 North Monroe Street, Topeka, Kansas.

It appears that the special delivery letter received by Karpis' father and the mailing of the letter described at the in the nature of an ordinary exchange of mail between father and daughter and no sound this exchange of letters is occasioned by the fact that the siner Karpis was contemplating a trip to Chicago at the time the letter was written. The Kensas City office was advised by teletype that there was no indication that subject Karpis was presently at 525 North Wood Street, and that ellipse was also advised of the letter received by Mrs. Clara Venute at 525 North Wood Street.

A cover was placed on all first class mail and special delivery letters addressed to Robert Venute and family at 525 North Wood Street, Chicago, Illinois, and results of this cover will be noted in subsequent reports.

ACTION OF THE PROPERTY OF THE

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent F. M. Headley on July 16 and 17, 1935; in connection with a teletype message from the Bureau on July 16, 1935, requesting that it be ascertained whether 1934 Ford V8 sedan motor number 18-763750 had been reported stolen:

Sergeant S. J. Downs of the Stolen Auto Detail of the Chicago Police Department advised telephonically on July 16 that the records of the local department did not indicate that a 1934 Ford V 8 sedan Motor Number 18-763750 had been reported stolen. This information was teletyped to the Director on the evening of July 16, 1935.

Mr. C. W. Rigoll of the Automobile Protective and Information Bureau, 166 West Van Buren Street, room 1717, Chicago, Illinois informed Agent Headley that their records did not indicate that a 1934 Ford V 8 bearing the above motor number had been reported stolen.

This information was also teletyped to the Director on July 17, 1935.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agents Sullivan, Cassidy and Jones on 7/20/35.

It was deemed advisable, and with Special Agent in Charge D. M. Ladd's permission, the above mentioned Agents visited the Arlington Race Track, Arlington Heights, Illinois, in an effort to locate William J. Harrison, who is known to frequent horse and dog race tracks. The above agents visited the race track and covered the \$10.00, \$20.00 and \$50.00 betting windows between races and made a surveillance of the grand stand during the races. Agents observed an individual in one of the boxes who resembled a description of Harrison and it was thought advisable to definitely establish the suspect's identity. The suspect was in the company of what appeared to be a man, his wife and two children and at the conclusion of the races suspect and his party left the track and boarded a Chicago and Northwestern train for Chicago.

Agents Sullivan and Cassidy proceeded to Chicago by automobile and Agent Jones boarded the train with suspect and his party. While on the train Agent Jones recognized Special Agent J. H. Heilker, who had attended the races. At the Chicago terminal Agent Jones spoke to Agent Heilker and advised him of the individual's suspected identity. The suspect boarded a taxi and proceeded to Dearborn Street, between Madison and Monroe, where he and his party entered the 13-13 Restaurant. About ten minutes later suspect left the restaurant and visited two shoe stores on Dearborn Street and then entered the Hemilton Club. Upon entering the Club, suspect greeted the doorman and was recognized by the doorman. As the suspect had been recognized by the doorman and seemed to have been known, Agent Jones deemed it advisable not to conduct any further investigation at that time and proceeded to the office and reported the above facts to Special Agent in Charge D. M. Ladd.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent J. H. Heilker at Chicago.

On Saturday, July 20, 1955, Agent Heilker was in the company of a personal friend, former Special Agent William I. Conway, Chicago attorney. Upon alighting from the train at Chicago, Agent noticed that Mr. Conway spoke to a person who left the train at the same point. This person, as Agent found out later from Special Agent Jones, was the suspect whom he was following. Agent inquired of Mr. Conway as to whether he knew this individual and Mr. Conway said that he thought it was a Chicago attorney by the name of Johnson, although he was not positive. It was too late at this time to notify Agent Jones of this fact.

Agent thereafter called the Chicago office and learned that the suspect had gone to the Hamilton Club, which is the Republican Club of Chicago. Mr. Conway is associated in the law business with Mr. Oscar Carlstrom, who is president of the Hamilton Club here.

Upon being requested by Special Agent Sullivan to make certain of the suspect's identity, this Agent accompanied by Mr. Conway went to the Hamilton Club and requested Mr. Carlstrom to identity the man. Mr. Carlstrom was unable to do so at this time, but said that one of the assistant managers of the club, Mr. O'Grady, would be able to establish the person's identity. The suspect at this time was in the main dining room of the club in the company of two other men and a woman. Mr. O'Grady went to the dining room and upon seeing the man stated that he was Morris T. Johnson, Chicago attorney with offices at 7 South Dearborn Street. His records reflected that Mr. Johnson lives in Woodstock, Illinois and that his club membership number is 4428.

The identity of the suspect having been established, no further investigation was made.

questing information concerning the identity of and her associates, with the request to ascertain whether she was related to suspect in the Gaynor Kidnaping, Special Agent John L. Madala consulted Sergeant Charles O'Regam of the Detective Bureau, Chicago Police Department for information concerning the kidnaping of Thomas A. Gaynor, and with particular reference to but was advised that John L. Sullivan, Chief of Detectives, was more conversant with this case than any other person connected with the Chicago Police Department, inasmuch as he personally worked on the case, and in view of this he suggested that an Agent interview Chief Sullivan upon his return from his vacation on July 13, 1935.

On July 8, 1935 Agent John L. Madela discreetly ascertained from confidential informant that

She further advised that she distinctly recalled the Gaynor kidnaping case and that in her opinion the following persons were implicated in the case: Harold Conliff, Vincent Conliff, Harold Allderton and persons whom she knows only as Sheeney Alberts, Gee, Harry and Joe; that to the best of her knowledge Thomas Gaynor was held captive in Joe's house at Cary, Illinois; that on one occasion when Gaynor became ill as a result of being held in an ice box for a long period of time, Harold Conliff's mother visited the hideout and gave Gaynor medical care. Further stated that she believes that the ransom paid in this case was fifty thousand dollars and that to her knowledge none of the above mentioned persons were ever convicted of this crime.

The informant advised that approximately a year following the Gaynor kidnaping Harold Conliff who was being sought by the Police

also advised Agent Madala that Harold Con- 67d liff formerly sold bootleg liquor in and around Bensenville and that he had strong connections with the Capone syndicate of Chicago; that he was very well acquainted with Fred Goetz, Byron Bolton, Harold Allderton and Elmer Farmer.

Regarding reference letter of the Bureau dated July 8, 1935, requesting that the files of the Coroner's Office in Chicago be carefully examined for further information concerning the killing of Officer Myles Cunningham at Chicago, Illinois, on September 22, 1933, inquiry was first made at the Chicago Police Department and the following information was obtained by Special Agent D. P. Sullivan:

Shortly before midnight September 21, 1933, two messengers and two guards of the Federal Reserve Bank, Chicago, Illinois, were carrying three mail bags from the Post Office to the Federal Reserve Bank in Chicago. On the corner of the intersection of Jackson Boulevard and LaSalle Street, five men, sitting in two automobiles, held up the men transporting the above mentioned mail bags with machine guns. One of the cars described as a Hudson Sedan set up a smoke screen. The men thereupon got into the Hudson Sedan, abandoning a 1933 Dodge Sedan, motor #DP2600 at the scene of the holdup. This Dodge Sedan was checked and it was ascertained that it had been stolen two months before from Stanley Skiehuit, 5440 South Sawyer Avenue, Chicago. At approximately 12:25 a. m. the same night, being September 22, 1933, the above mentioned Hudson Sedan collided with another car at Adams and Halsted Streets, Chicago. The occupants of the car, five men, were described by witnesses as follows:

All five of these men wore handkerchiefs over their faces. Officers Cumningham and Fitzgerald were standing on the corner and proceeded towards the two automobiles that had collided to investigate. The five men in the Hudson Sedan got out and immediately began firing at the two Officers, Cunningham being killed almost immediately at the outset of firing. Three of the men, according to witnesses, were believed to have had machine guns; the other two men carried brief cases and bags. One of the men wore a chauffeur's cap. The five men then abandoned the Hudson Sedan in which they had been riding and commandeered a Buick Sedan which happened to be passing, and drove away. This Buick Sedan was later abandoned. The Hudson Sedan abandoned at the scene was a 1953 model, black in color, bearing

serial #251172, motor #63752, and bore Florida license plates #112-185. Investigation of the above mentioned license plates by the Chicago Police Department resulted in ascertaining they were issued to Dan Burke, care of the Billboard, 281 West 42d Street, New York, Hew York, for a Chevrolet Sedan, motor #2226444. A duplicate license was issued on March 31, 1933 to Dan Burke for this same car. The New York Police Department checked same, but could not locate Burke. The issuance of the duplicate license plates indicates that the plates originally issued to Burke may have been stolen. In the Hudson Sedan abandoned by the bandits was found:

A tam leather brief case containing a .45 caliber Thompson Sub-machine gun drum #3308, and five clips for a 401 caliber automatic rifle,

5, .45 caliber clips containing 25 cartridges for use in a Thompson Sub-machine gun,

#### A First-Aid Kit

A Chicago Vehicle Tag #B5897, and the following sets of license plates:

1933 Georgia plates #34245 1933 Minnesota plates #B-139930 1933 Minnesota plates #B141186 1933 Minnesota plates #B287166

Likewise found in the car was a set of 1933 Illinois plates £699494 issued to J. J. Rosenberg, 3818 West Roosevelt Boulevard on a Buick Sedan. A bill of sale was likewise found in the car for the above mentioned Buick Sedan, which had been traded in on April 29, 1933, for the Hudson Sedan abandoned by the bandits. This car had been purchased by J. J. Rosenberg from the Broadway Hudson-Essex Company, 5657 Broadway.

Investigation at 3818 West Roosevelt Road failed to elicit any information concerning J. J. Rosenberg, who was unknown at that address.

1933 Georgia plates #34243, above mentioned, were issued to Henry J. Miller, 468 West Peachtree Street, Atlanta, Georgia. The Atlanta Police Department checked, but could not locate Killer, who

left no forwarding address.

1933 Minnesota plates #Bl41186 were issued to Nell B. Condict, 1726 East First Street, Duluth, Minnesota, for a Ford Coach. Duplicate plates were issued for this car, indicating that the original plates had been stolen. These plates, according to the Chicago Police Department file, were identified as being the same plates on an automobile used in the payroll robbery at South St. Paul on August 30, 1933, in which a Police Officer was killed.

The remaining Minnesota plates mentioned above were likewise checked by the Chicago Police Department, and it was ascertained that these plates had been stolen.

Two Colt revolvers with 4-inch barrels, serial numbers 153654 and 145098, in the possession of the Federal Reserve Guards at the time of the stickup, were taken from them by the bandits. The above mentioned Hudson Sedan was found to have a siren and apparatus for making a smoke screen, a bullet proof glass in the left front door beside the drivers seat, and in the rear window steel armor plate had likewise been installed around the sides of the car. Further check resulted in information that this equipment had been installed by Joseph Courtney, 4501 Washington Boulevard, owner of the West Town Auto Body Company, 4610 West Washington Boulevard at the request of Joe Miller, salesman of the Bergl Motor Sales Company, Cicero, Illinois. Miller could not be located, and Bergl, when interviewed by the Police, denied that he knew or had any information concerning the installation of the siren, the smoke screen, or the armor plate on above mentioned car, stating that if it had been done at the request of one of his salesman, it was without his knowledge. In the abandoned Hudson Sedan was found the name and address of Elmer Howe. residence 6214 North Washtenaw Avenue, telephone Sheldrake 7993. who operates a garage at 2747 Lawrence Avenue, telephone Sunnyside 1601. Howe was interviewed, but denied having any information concerning the identity of the bandits. It is to be noted, however, that the name Elmer Howe was an alias used by William J. Harrison in January of 1935 at the time that Mildred Kuhlman was residing at the Morrison Hotel, Chicago. It is possible that Harrison may be acquainted with the above mentioned Kimer Hows.

The Chicago Police Department files in this case indicate that some shells and fragments of bullets had been recovered

at the scene of the shooting, but that these exhibits were in the Coroner's Office, Cook County. The killing of Officer Cunningham has never been solved.

At the Coroner's Office, Gook County, Illinois, the following described bits of ballistic evidence were obtained, which had been found at the scene of the killing of Officer Cunningham:

Interview was had with the Chief Deputy Coroner, who advised that inasmuch as the Cunningham murder had not been solved, it was still considered an open case; that for this reason it was desired to retain custody of the above mentioned ballistic evidence, but permission was obtained to forward the above fired cartridges and shells to the Bureau laboratory at Washington for comparison with the exhibits now on file at the laboratory. A request was specifically made, however, that these exhibits be returned immediately upon completion of the laboratory comparison. On July 20, 1935, the above mentioned exhibits were forwarded to the Technical Laboratory.

has been interviewed on several occasions. On July 19, 1935, she was interviewed and advised that she had been in communication with Postmaster Bartholomew of the Bensenville Post Office and with Mike Marino, hoodlum frequenting Melrose Park since last contacted by Agent J. L. Madala, who has since that time been transferred from the Chicago office.

She advised that on July 18, 1935, Marino called at her house and during the course of the conversation stated that he and his wife were going to have dinner with some friends at Berwyn, Illinois. In a half-joking fashion, Marino asked if she desired to accompany him. She replied that she did not desire to go because she did not know any one in Berwyn, Illinois, whereupon, Marino passed the remark that she might be surprised if he told her who he was to have dinner with. Several half-joking remarks were passed after that, Marino indicating that she did know the persons that he was to see, but did not volunteer any information as to their identity. It was

that the persons referred to by Marino were some members of the Karpis-Barker gang. In this connection, stated that when Postmaster Bartholomew asked her if she wanted to see some of the "boys" about three weeks ago, he indicated to her that Harry Campbell was one of the Fugitives he was speaking about, and stated upon questioning that they were residing at Berwyn, Illinois, not Burnham, Illinois, as previously reported, and were residing on the same street Fred Goetz, alias "Shotgun" Zeigler, formerly lived on. It is known that Fred Goetz prior to his assassination at Cicero, Illinois, in March of 1934, lived with Irene Dorsey at 2141 Gunderson Avenue, Berwyn, Illinois.

was driving on the occasion when he visited her and requested her to take a message to Harry Sawyer at St. Paul, Minnesota, was a 1935 model blue coupe, make unknown. Agent pointed out to her various automobiles and from her description, she finally selected a 1935 Dodge Coupe as being the make and type of car that Harrison was driving.

Cecilia Nieland, who is employed at the gas station operated by Ruth Heidt's father, 6000 West 5th Avenue, Gary, Indiana, during an interview, advised that about six weeks ago while standing on a street corner at Gary, Indiana, a man driving a 1935 blue Dodge coupe passed by with two young women in the car. This man wore dark glasses and his hair was black, but kiss Nieland emphatically stated that she was certain that the man driving the car was Alvin Karpis. It is to be noted that Karpis has visited the gas station operated by Ruth Heidt's father at Gary, and hiss Nieland has seen him. She was quite positive in her identification. She stated that she was unable to get the license numbers of the car, but believes that they were Indiana plates on the Dodge coupe.

further stated that in April 1935 Constance Copeland, sister of a former nurse employed by Dr. Joseph Moran, visited the home of an aunt of Betty Tracy. While there she met Betty Tracy, and her sweetheart, Dr. Moran. Stated that Constance Copeland is residing at Kankakee, Illinois Arrangements will be made to interview Constance Copeland in a discreet fashion to ascertain more definite information concerning this report.

apparent close connection of Postmaster Bartholomew with members of the Karpis-Barker gang, she would not be surprised if they did not receive mail through the Bensenville Post Office.

is well acquainted with a young clerk, Rose Robey, who has been employed at the Bensenville Post Office for the past six years. Inasmuch as Bartholomew himself spends little time at the Post

Office, she is actively in charge that Rose Robey has little male companionship, but it is opinion that if approached properly Rose Robey would disclose any information that she might have in her possession to an Agent who became friendly with her without disclosing his identity.

Arrangements were made whereby Special Agent M. J. Cassidy and the writer on the evening of July 25, 1935, made an arrangement with the state of the evening together. Further contact will be made by Agent Cassidy with Miss Robey and it is felt that she will disclose any information she might have concerning Fugitives not yet apprehended in this case.

Chief William Higgins, Villa Park, Illinois, was interviewed, and he advised that
was the informant who stated he had seen Alvin Karpis at the
Foxhead Tavern located on Lake Street near the Elmhurst Air-Port
a week or more before Volney Davis was apprehended. With Chief
Higgins was interviewed and shown all photographs of
members of the Karpis-Barker gang, which he failed to recognize
except the photograph of Karpis. He stated that he was in the
Tavern and book making establishment mentioned above, which was
operated by Ed Schweppe, and a man named Knicker, and noticed
Karpis, but could not recall where he had seen the man or his
photograph before. He said he studied the man closely and later
when shown a photograph of Karpis by Chief Higgins, immediately
identified him.

Agent ascertained later that this Tavern and book making establishment has been closed since July 1, 1935. Turther stated that Elmer Farmer immediately before he was apprehended by Bureau Agents, had an apartment on Duane Street, Glen Ellyn, Illinois; that he had been so informed by L. L. Hare, local real estate man.

Agent and Chief Higgins proceeded to the Foxhead Tavern, which from the description is identical with the tavern mentioned by F. Worchol in report of D. P. Sullivan, Chicago, Illinois, dated July 3, 1935, as the place where he had seen Volney Davis some months ago, and the tavern mentioned in the report of J. L. Madala, Chicago, Illinois, dated July 12, 1935, page 24, covering the information provided by This tavern is located at the Testern end of the Elmhurst Air-Port. At the Eastern end of the Air-Port Agent ascertained that a book making establishment had

just recently opened and is being operated by Al Wilde, who formerly operated a book making establishment at Kahn's Tavern before the Kahn family left for Germany. Agent ascertained that an old man named Metz is employed and taking bets at this book making place. Immediately across from this joint is located the Log Cabin Gas Station. Interview was had with rural mail carrier Heineman of the Elmhurst Post Office, who advised that this gas station was run by Monroe Fisher; that Fisher was reputable and dependable.

Monroe Fisher, the Log Cabin Gas Station, was interviewed and was shown photographs of the members of the Karpis-Barker gang, which he failed to recognize.

Chief Higgins stated that he would keep this book making establishment operated by Wilde under surveillance and would immediately notify this office should he notice anything suspicious about the place.

L. L. Hare, real estate, Villa Park, was interviewed, and he stated that a few days before Bureau Agents arrested Elmer Farmer in January past, Elmer Farmer came to him seeking an apartment and stated that he wanted an apartment of four or five rooms in an apartment building where people would not notice occupants who would be gone for a week or more. He indicated that an apartment he had on Duane Street, Glen Ellyn, Illinois, was not large enough.

Agent interviewed Mr. Tauber who operates a meat market on the corner of Main and Duane Streets, Glen Ellyn, Illinois, and an apartment located over the meat market, and likewise interviewed V. J. Spaulding, real estate, Main Street, who manages the only other two apartments located on Duane Street, and showed them photographs of all members of the Karpis-Barker gang, which they both failed to recognize as any persons who had ever occupied any of their apartments.

Chief Higgins stated that Harrison had played at the Butterfield Golf Course, Villa Park, Illinois, last summer. With Chief Higgins Agent interviewed Bob Bennett, caddy master at this club, and Mervin Johnson, Assistant Professional, and showed them photographs of Harrison. Bennett could not identify Harrison's photograph, but Johnson stated that he felt certain that Harrison had played golf at this course last summer. Both of them advised they would notify Chief Higgins should Harrison again appear at this golf club.

Higgins further stated that Jack Frost, former Chief of Police at Bensenville, Illinois, was now employed as a Policeman at Lombard, Illinois; that he had information that Frost up until the past month was residing with Myrtle Eaton. Chief Higgins would not disclose the source of his information, stating that it was confidential. Further investigation will be made in this matter.

With reference to Bureau letter dated July 17, 1935, Agent interviewed Chief Leeseberg, Melrose Park Police Department, with regard to newspaper report that two of his Officers had engaged in a gun battle with what were believed to be members of the Karpis-Barker gang in Melrose Park in the early part of July 1935.

Chief Leeseberg stated that on the evening of July 5, 1935, Officers Dan Boni and W. E. May, while cruising in a squad car noted four or five men in a 1924 Ford V-8 Sedan, black in color with red wire wheels bearing a trunk on the back and two tail lights. The two Officers attempted to overtake this car, which pulled away. They chased the car to the outskirts of Melrose Park. At 23d Avenue, the car stopped and the occupants got out and began firing at the Police car, placing 20 bullet holes in it. The Officers took cover and the assailants escaped. Chief Leeseberg stated that there had been several holdups of golf clubs in the vicinity of Melrose Park in the last few months; that he believed the men responsible for these holdups were identical with the men firing upon his two Officers and he had no information indicating that the above assault was perpetrated by members of the Karpis-Barker gang, but local newspaper men attempted to make a story out of it by placing the responsibility on members of the Kerpis-Barker gang for the shooting. Two 12-gauge kleanbore nitro long range express shot gun shells, a .30 caliber luger Remington U. M. C. cartridge shell, and eleven bullet fragments picked up at the scene of the shooting, were turned over to Agent by Chief Leeseberg. On July 23, 1935, these exhibits were forwarded to the Technical Laboratory of the Bureau for comparison with shells, cartridges, and bullets believed to have been fired by guns in possession of the Karpis-Barker gang.

On the morning of July 18, 1935, Iouis "Two Gun" Alterie, mentioned as a contact for members of the Karpis-Barker gang, was shot down in front of his residence at 922 Eastwood Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, in typical gangland fashion. A .351 rifle with telescopic sights and an automatic shotgun, later recovered in an apartment immediately across the street, were recovered by the Police.

This murder has not been solved. Several theories have been advanced, one of which is that Alterie was quite friendly with Thomas Maloy, former gangster and head of the Motion Picture Operators' Union in Chicago, who was slain during the early part of this year; that Alterie had attempted to supplent Maloy as head of the local union.

At Gary, Indiana, Agent interviewed John McGinty, care of Cassidy Brothers, 6th and Washington Streets. Mr. McGinty stated that he had made inquiry of numerous people at Calumet City, Illinois, and Hammond, Indiana, since last contacted by Agent, but had been unable to obtain any information concerning Harrison.

At Hammond, Indiana, and Calumet City, Illinois, Agent contacted Frank Moose, 300 State Street, and Herman Miller, 2112 State Street, and "Pop" Snyder, owner of the Savoy Hotel, Hammond, Indiana, with negative results. "Pop" Snyder mentioned to Agent that approximately six weeks ago

stopped at his hotel with a man irrend. Snyder sted he did not know the identity of this man; that he questioned whether she had heard from Harrison and she stated she did not know where he is located. It is noted that the man friend of during the time of this interview was Special Agent John L. Madala, which has been reported in a previous report.

Your letter to the Chief of Police was brought to my attention today. 

On July 17, 1935, Inspector McCann, of the San Francisco Police Department, Robbery Detail, called at this office, and advised that through a confidential informant, who had possibly been in Florida, he had learned that a man by the name of Thomas, who, according to the informant is an associate of the Karpis - Barker gang, is now connected in some way with the dog races at the Laden Race Track, Can Francisco, California.

Inspector l'ecann stated that he had determined that Thomas, whose initials he did not possess, and his wife, Grace, entered California at Yuma, Arizona, May 15, 1935, drivin Clamobile Coupe, notor //147427, 1935 Florida license /D12032.

Insector McCann further advised that his informant had told him that numbers of the Karpis - Barker gang had rented a house from Thomas, in Mismi, Florida, in November or December, 1934, and furnished him considerable information concerning the arrest of Adams, Randell, and others, in connection with the Bureau's investigation. He suggested that this informant might have obtained these details from newspaper accounts, or might have been in Mismi, Florida, at the time of the investigation.

A review of the report of Special Agent in Charge J. H. Hanson, Jack conville, Florida, dated February FO, 1935, discloses that apparently Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Thomas cooperated with the Bureau during the time the investigation was being conducted at Mismi, Florida, in connection with this case, and it does not appear from the files of this office that Thomas is wanted by the Bureau.

Inspector McCann advised that if Thomas was wanted by the Bureau, his Detective would place him under arrest. However, Inspector McCann was advised that this individual was not wanted.

He stated that his Detectives had Thomas under surveillance, but to date had noticed nothing suspicious in his actions. However, a limited surveillance would be continued, and unless further information was obtained, Thomas would not be taken into custody by the San Francisco Police Department.

No further action is being taken in connection with this matter by this office, unless advised to the centrary.

that it would be relatively simple to get a copy of this magazine either from a subscribing contractor or by direct application at his office at 89 Broad Street, Boston. Mr. Hoitt was shown a photograph of Meade as was his secretary and only employee. Neither of them recognized him nor did the files of the office show a listing of his name as a contributor. The agent has obtained another copy of the May 4th issue of "The Nerva" containing a list of the contractors mentioned in the report of reference. This copy is being retained in the files of the Boston Office.

Mr. A. R. Doyle, contractor at 44 Perkins, Boston, when contacted by this agent did not recognize the photograph of Meade and stated that outside of occasional telephone calls by magazine agents no one unknown to him has approached him with any sort of proposition within the last six months.

This agent called on Herbert F. Callahan at his office at 43 Tremont Street, Boston. Mr. Callahan as has been previously stated is one of the outstanding criminal Tawyers in this city. In reply to agent's questions he was most deliberate. He stated that he had not known when he obtained the release of C. E. Carter that Carter was identical with William E. Meads. He denied that he had received information concerning Meade's arrest from any source except one. His activities he stated as follows:

He had been called at his home in the afternoon of Saturday July 13th by one who introduced himself as Frank Sweeney who had given him briefly the story that C. E. Carter was under \$200.00 bond at Northampton, Massachusetts for improper registration of an automobile. At Sweeney's request Callahan had telephoned Northampton to verify this fact subsequently meeting Sweeney at the Cocoanut Grove (a night club in Boston) where Sweeney had given him the cash and requested that Callahan arrange for Carter's release. He had wired the cash to James Mahoney, a Springfield, Mass. lawyer after telephoning the latter and requesting him to arrange the details at Northampton. He states that he only heard that Carter was identical with Meade after his release. He stated further that he has never done any previous business with James Mahoney nor with Frank Sweeney although he says that he has seen Sweeney at various places in Boston previously. He stated that he was unable to give any information which would help locate Sweeney. Under persistent questioning he gave agent a meagre description of Sweeney as follows:

Age: 38 to 40.

Height: 5 feet 9 inches.

Weight: 170 lbs.

Does not wear glasses.

Smooth shaven.

He stated further that he has not seen Sweeney since and that it was his impression that Sweeney was driving to Northampton immediately to bring Carter back to Boston. Callahan did admit that he has previously met William E. Keade in Boston. He says that this was a little over a year arowhen Meade came into the office to discuss the facts of a case in Florida pending against him involving his operation of a "confidence" game. Callahan refused to

discuss what Meade had said to him in that connection and stated that he had done nothing about that case. He stated that this was his only contact with William E. Meade. Callahan will be contacted further in the course of this investigation and questioned again he to the details of this transaction since it is felt by the agent that his story is not true. It may be noted here that an independent investigation of Callahan as well as of James Mahoney of Springfield in this connection is being conducted by the Boston Office, the facts of which will be set out in a separate report.

This agent contacted Jack Dalton, employee of the Charlesgate Garage, Boston, stationed at the Kenmore Hotel, Kenmore Square, Boston. Dalton had previously telephoned the Bureau Office that he was acquainted with Meade whose picture had appeared in the papers. On interview he stated that he resides at 80 Wood Street, Mattapan and that in the course of his duties at the door of the Kenmore Hotel he had met Meade first on June 30, 1935 when Meade had asked him to get some girls and go on a party with him. Delton had said that he would make the arrangements if Meade would supply the money whereupon Meade said that money was no object and that he had plenty of it. He gave Dalton no name telling him that he could be reached at the Miles Standish Hotel in Room 713 and that at that number he could ask for "Henry". A week later Dalton had been called on the telephone by Meade who stated that he was now at the Bradford Hotel in Boston. Meade again requested Dalton to make the arrangements for a party but Dalton neglected to so because he was. somewhat suspicious of Meade's ability or intention to pay the expenses. He confirmed the identification from a photograph shown him by agent. He stated further that apparently Meade's main interests were liquor and women and that he spoke of little else except when he mentioned on the first occasion that he was planning a fishing trip in New Hampshire as soon as a companion arrived in Bostone

At the Miles Standish Hotel, Boston, agent interviewed Mr. Newton, manager. Mr. Newton had not been in his office on the occasion of the first interview by this agent of Miss McDuffy, the Night Clerk. Mr. Newton did not recognize the photograph of Meade and at first stated that his records did not reflect that any C. E. Carter was registered at that hotel, However, when the occupants of Room 713 wers checked it was discovered that that room had been occupied by C. E. Carter whereupon a further search ... showed that the papers in this connection had been filed incorrectly under the letter "D". The registration card (in the possession of the Boston Office) reflects that C. E. Carter registered at that hotel on June 28, 1935, was assigned to Suite 713 at \$3.00 a day and checked out on July 1, 1935. A notation on the register showed the total bill to be \$9.10, the 10¢ for a telephone call. Mr. Newton stated that the number called is no longer of record since it is destroyed after the guest has paid the bill. The register of the hotel also shows a previous registration for C. E. Carter on May 20, 1935 when he had occupied Room 309 at \$2.50 a day. He had given his address on this occasion as the Henry Grady Hotel, Atlanta, Georgia. On the occasion of June 28th he had written his address as the Atlanta-Biltmore Hotel, Atlanta.

Control of the Contro

Agent interviewed Bellboy Joseph Leonard at the Miles Standish Hotel, who recognized Meade's picture and stated that he had seen a woman go into Meade's room on five or six occasions. From her appearance he judged her to be an ordinary hotel prostitute. He further described her as about thirty years of age; five feet seven inches in height, and weighing about 125 pounds, blonde hair and blue eyes.

Richard Snell, bellboy at the same place, recalled that he had shown Carter to his room and believes that Carter had only one suitcase as baggage. He stated that on one occasion a woman had been brought to the hotel by a taxidriver, which woman he described as being five feet nine inches, 150 pounds, of heavy build, black hair and aged about thirty-five. Snell believes that this woman could be located through the taxidriver and states that when that driver appears at the hotel again he will take his number and phone it to this office. Snell has been contacted several times since but reports that he has not as yet seen the driver.

Fohn J. Lundergan, Desk Clerk, also recognized Meade from his photograph and stated that he believed Meade to be the owner of a Rolls-Royce Touring Car of faded sand color with Georgia plates which had been parked near the hotel during the time that Meade had been registered there as C. E. Carter. Agent has contacted garages in the vicinity of the Miles Standish but is unable to find that any Rolls-Royce touring car was in those garages within the last two months.

At the Hotel Bradford, Boston, agent contacted Mr. James B. Wells, Assistant Manager. Mr. Wells searched through his registrations for the months of June and July but was unable to find any record of Meade's registration. The photograph of Meade was shown to both hotel detectives, to the desk clerks and to bellboys of the hotel. None of them recognized him. Further efforts are being made at the Bradford to locate the registration of Meade under his other aliases. It is impossible to check at that place for the handwriting of this individual since registrations after the departure are filed alphabetically with other previous registrations for the past year.

Sergeant Kelly of the Northampton, Mass., police has advised this office that he has received a letter from Charlie Stalder of Mt. Gilead, North Carolina, which letter requests that the Northampton police forward a photograph of the Carter recently arrested in that city to Stalder; the letter is dated July 16, 1935, and enclosed a self-addressed stamped envelope for reply. It may be noted here that C. Fine, a Springfield, Mass., attorney, is seeking to recover Meade's automobile from the Northampton police and has presented a bill of sale for the same from Carter to James Mahoney the Springfield attorney mentioned previously. The investigation of this phase of instant case will be reported separately.

For the information of the Atlanta and Charlotte Offices, William E. Meade, as C. E. Carter, was arrested by the Northampton, Mass., police at Northampton July 12, 1935 on the charge of improper registration of an automobile. While his identity was still unknown he was released on

bond of \$200.00 which he has subsequently defaulted. This person is wanted by the U. S. Marshel at Jacksonville, Florida for a bond forfeiture, by the U. S. Post Office Department at New York City and by this Bureau for questioning in connection with the Bremer case. His aliases are as follows: J. W. Reed; J. H. Parker; John Henry Foster; J. W. Request is being made of the Bureau today by the Boston Office that photographs of Meade be forwarded for the use of these offices.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS: THE BOSTON OFFICE will continue the investigation as set out in the report of reference.

Will re-interview Herbert F. Callahan for further details with respect to the story he gave agent on the occasion of his first questioning.

Will continue investigation at the Bradford Hotel in Boston in an effort to locate Leade's registration at that place.

Will continue efforts to locate the woman or women with whom Meade consorted while at the Miles Standish Hotel.

THE ATLANTA OFFICE at Atlanta, Georgia will conduct appropriate investigation at the Henry Grady Hotel and at the Atlanta-Biltmore Hotel for any information concerning William E. Meade.

THE OKLAHOMA CITY OFFICE will investigate Oklahoma 1935 license plates 105A907 for information relative to William E. Meade.

THE CHARLOTTE OFFICE at Mt. Gilead, North Carolina will contact Charlie Stalder, showing him a photograph of Meade and obtain whatever information he may have concerning that individual.



Undersheriff Owens further advised that the party with whom Campbell was at that time could be further checked by setting out a lead for the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, as both parties received substantial sentences for their crime in Oklahoma.

It should be mentioned in this connection that J. Reynolds is one of the aliases used by A. T. Davis, now confined in the Wyoming State Penitentiary, Rawlins, Wyoming, who is said to be closely acquainted with William J. Dainard with aliases of the Weynap case. When interviewing A. T. Davis in regard to the Weynap case, Agent asked him if he were acquainted with Harry Campbell and he advised that he did not know who he was, nor did he know Karpis. This, it is thought, is a gross exaggeration, but A. T. Davis refused to divulge any information concerning Karpis or Campbell and stated that they were too "big shots" for him.

Captain William Miller, Casper Police Department, advised that he had been working on the Bremer case since Agent Mann had contacted him some time in the early part of 1935, and that he had received information from an informant, whom he did not care to name, that Karpis and Campbell were associated with a Jimmie Lovewell of Cody, Wyoming. Captain Miller had little information in regard to this other than the fact that his informant had told him that, in all probability, Lovewell would know something in regard to Karpis' and Campbell's activities around Casper, Wyoming. Captain Miller further stated that Lovewell works for a refinery at Cody, Wyoming, and that he, Miller, could not suggest any one to contact there who might be acquainted with Lovewell.

Sheriff R. Jack Allen, Undersheriff Bob Owens, and Agent called on Mrs. Sullivan, Postmistress, Evansville, Wyoming, which is a little from about two miles east of Casper. Mrs. Sullivan has been frequently contacted by Agents of this office in regard to one Oscar Felt, with whom Sheriff Allen stated that Karpis and Campbell stayed while they were there in August and September, 1934. This matter is covered by a previous report made by this office.

Sheriff Allen further stated that a short time ago Felt left for Detroit, Michigan, under the presumption of going to his mother's funeral there. Sheriff Allen advised that in view of the fact that Karpis and Campbell are believed to have connections at Detroit, he, Allen, was suspicious of Felt and did not believe he was going to Detroit for the purpose asserted. Sheriff Allen advised that he immediately got in touch, at that time, with Special Agent in Charge Newman, who was in charge at that time of the Denver office, and that he supposed Newman covered the matter through the cooperation of our Detroit office. In this connection it is noted that Oscar Felt was interviewed in Detroit by Special Agent Meekins in April, 1935.

Captain Miller also advised the writer that he had heard a party bragging on the street one evening about having been in a fight with Harry Campbell. Captain Miller advised that he appeared to be disinterested in the matter at that time as he intended to make a thorough check in a more discreet manner. This party's name, Captain Miller stated, was A. W. Westbrook, and witnesses to the alleged fight were supposed to be Pat Gillhan, Red Fonda, and Paul Lowrie, all pipe linemen around Casper. Captain Miller advised that he would look into this matter and no doubt have some information for the Denver office the next time an Agent is in the vicinity of Casper.

#### UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE OKLAHOMA CITY OFFICE at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, will determine from the Oklahoma City Police Department the name of the party who was picked up in connection with the robbery with Subject Campbell, and will furnish the Denver office with the name, description, criminal record, and latest information regarding the whereabouts of this individual. It is noted that the criminal record of Campbell shows he was arrested at Tulsa, Oklahoma, and it may be that the information above refers to Campbell's arrest at Tulsa, Oklahoma rather than Oklahoma City.

THE DERVER OFFICE, will keep in contact with the Police and Sheriff's office at Casper, Wyoming.

At Cody, Wyoming, will make a proper contact to obtain further information regarding Lovewell and any associates he may have had.

It made me feel like crying - and if I hadn't forgotten how I probably would have. Your card and Bud's were really sweet and it made me feel so good to know that you remembered. Mr. & Mrs. Karpis wrote to me the first of the month and said that they hadn't seen or heard from any of my family for quite awhile. What's the matter - not interested? I do wish you would stop over there once in awhile Mugs and see how things are. When Bud wrote he said he had been over - that was after I heard from Mr. Karpis.

How about those pictures you were going to send me? I am trying to wait just as patiently as possible but I do so want to see if you have changed any. I want to see if Dick looks the way I remember him, too. How about sending me a few scenery pictures, too. I am developing an awfully good imagination and I figured I could look at them and imagine myself there - wherever it is. Take some in Jackson Park and on South Shore Drive.

Have you heard any kind of news lately? Write and tell me anything you know, will you? Haven't heard anything new in so long - it's pitiful.

What have you been doing lately? Do you go to any dences? I asked Mumsey if she did and she said she hedn't gone hardly any place since she went to see you at Madison. I do wish she would snap out of it and try to enjoy herself some. That is another reason I want her to move to Chicago. I figured you and Bud might be able to help her. Hey, have you and Dick fixed anything up yet? I sure would like to know if you're really planing on being Mrs. Dick, or what?

I am making some rompers for Ray. They aren't so terribly nice but I want him to wear something I have made for him. I don't know when I will be able to send them to him or anything but I think they will let me send them Christmas. I am making them for a year old baby so I guess that will be just about right.

Pat says to say "hello" and asks how you are. She hasn't been feeling well lately at all. You remember I told you she had an operation - well - that is hurting her and she gets some swful cramps. She's in-pretty bad shape.

We have twenty girls here now and when I came there was only thirteen besides myself. We are filled up now but one of the girls is going home a week from Wednesday. She's done a three year sentence

and is she excited! Boy, I don't blame her I would be, too. I don't think I could eat or sleep or anything. Helen is the next to go then. She goes in September - the latter part. I think she has the short time fever, too. Seventeen of the girls in here will leave before I do and there will probably be a bunch of others come in and go out between now and then.

What kind of a place do you live in? Why don't you send me a picture of that, too? Does Dick still have the same car he had when I saw him? I think it was a roadster, wasn't it? Send me pictures of everything and anything, will you? This looks more like a questionaire than a letter but there are so many things I want to know.

Has Mumsy told you that Frances wasn't so well? It made me feel so bad to hear that 'cause Fritzie has never had any real happiness and I want to do something for her when I get out. I do hope it won't be too late.

Don't forget the pictures. I want Wynona to see what you look like.

Goodbye for now and write soon.

Captain Malone, of the New Orleans Police Department, early on the morning of July 25, 1935, telephonically advised me at my residence that he had arrested the above entitled individual whom he suspected of being Harry Campbell, of the Bremer Kidnaping case, or someone closely allied with the subjects in that case.

The writer proceeded to the New Orleans Police Department, Detectives Headquarters, and there interviewed subject Frederick Bombard, who advised that that was his correct name; that he was born at Ware, Massachusetts, on February 24, 1903. He stated that he served in the Massachusetts State Reformatory as Frederick Bombard, #22941, and his photograph and fingerprint classification were found from this institution at the New Orleans Police Department, which are identical with those of subject. Subject Bombard states that he served in the United States Benitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, #39727, as William Baker, on a Dyer Act charge from El Paso, Texas, in October or November 1930; was released during January or February 1932 or 1933. Frederick Bombard states that he was in Florida about the time that Karpis and Barker were known to have been there and claims that although he had no connection with these individuals he was informed that he was wanted for questioning. He stated that he appeared in Washington, D. C. for personal interview with Honorable Homer Cummings; that at Washington, D. C., he was referred to, he believes, Inspector E. E. Tamm for interview. Frederick Bombard admitted a larceny sentence in the State of Kansas and states that he served time in the Kansas State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, as M. Snyder, and while there, for a time, was a cell mate of subject Karpis. He denied having any connections with or information concerning any of the Bremer kidnapers.

Frederick Bombard stated that he may be wanted in Philadelphia,

This individual, as William Eaker, in New Orleans Office of Origin National Motor Vehicle Theft Act case, New Orleans File 26-1791, was sentenced at El Paso, Texas, on October 9, 1951, to serve twenty months in the Leavenworth Penitentiary for violation of the National Motor Vehicle Theft Act.

This individual did not have an automobile in his possession while at New Orleans, Louisiana.

A telegram was directed to the Bureau on July 25, 1935, requesting advice whether this individual was wanted. The Bureau was furnished arrest numbers and fingerprint identification. Bureau teletype message of the same date indicated that this individual was possibly identical with Milton Snyder, mentioned in Detroit Bureau Office letter dated July 21, 1934, on the John Dillinger case, copies of which were furnished all field offices. This teletype message indicated that subject as Harold B. McBride, was sentenced March 6, 1935 to eighteen months, suspended sentence, placed on probation for five years, for absconding with evidence funds in a Narcotic Bureau case at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, but that no Wanted Notices were posted against the record of this subject in the Identification Division.

The Philadelphia Bureau Office teletype message of July 29, 1935, advised that the United States Probation Officer at Philadelphia would contact the United States Probation Officer at New Orleans, Louisiana, with a view to having subject held as a Probation Violator, and that the United States Probation Officer at Philadelphia advised that he would handle the matter in its entirety.

Arrangements were made with the New Orleans Police Department to hold subject under a vagrancy charge pending action of the Probation Officer at Philadelphia.

In conversation with Frederick Bombard, who recently has been using the name of Harold B. McBride, it appears that he has been working as a gambler and house man in and around St. Louis, Missouri, and East St. Louis, Illinois, at the Mounds. He claims to be well acquainted with and to have worked for Red Allen, formerly a member of the "Cuckoo Gang" in St. Louis, and stated that he intended to go to work for Red Allen, who now operates the "Riverview Club" a gambling establishment in St. Bernard Parish. He states that he has had an offer to work in New Orleans with Johnny Jones and Joe Brown, well know local gamblers at New Orleans, Louisians.

No further investigation is being conducted on this case at the New Orleans Bureau office.

It is also understood that this same individual likewise furnished unwarranted information to the Washington Field Office about that time.

A search of the files in this office reveals that in 1931 one James Felton, colored, complained to agents of A.H. Hemilton in the vicinity of Vicksburg, Mississippi. In this connection when Special Agent in Charge Connelley came to this office with agents from Chicago and proceeded to Mankato in response to notification of the presence of Belle Born in Mankato, as reflected in the report above referred to, no expression was obtained from Mr. Connelley as to what he intended to do in the event she was found in Mankato. Upon his return to St. Paul he agreed that due to its location, her home would be exceedingly difficult to cover,

I am, of course, informed of the association of this woman with CHAS. FITZGERALD in California, Ohio, and elsewhere, and of the fact that FITZGERALD has been known to have been in contact with various members of the Karpis-Barker gang before and subsequent to the Bremer Kidnaping; however, I would appreciate any suggestions the Bureau may have to offer as to a course to follow in the event this office receives information indicated ing the return of Belle Born to Mankato.

While in St. Paul, Minnesota for the trial of Arthur "Loc" Barker, et al., I became acquainted with Elmor Farmer, who received a twenty year sentence for his participation in the above entitled kidnaping.

while in St. Paul, Minnesota attending the trial, resided at the Lowry Hotel, which is the same hotel at which I stayed. I saw her almost every day in the courtroom and in the lobby of the hotel and as a result, sprang up a speaking acquaintance with her. In my early conversations with this girl, we talked about the trial and St. Paul, Minnesota generally. During one of these conversations, she indicated that she was personally acquainted with William J. Harrison, one of the subjects in this case and that she has known Byron Colton and Fred Goets for approximately six or seven years. Believing that she was in a good position to assist the Bureau in the location of the remaining members of the Berker-Karpis gang, I began dating her in an effort to gain her confidence. On the day I left St. Paul for Chicago, I had a long talk with

she believed she could locate Willie Harrison for me. I promised that I would contact her upon her return to Bensonville, Illinois, which is only a few miles from Chicago, Illinois.

Two days after my return to Chicago I received a letter from her from St. Paul, Minnesota, in which she stated that she contemplated leaving St. Paul in two or three days and that I should not forget to call her upon her arrival in Bensonville. I, however, meglected to telephone her and shout a week later she called me at the office and I met her that same day on the West side of Chicago at her request. She advised that she had recently heard that Willie Harrison was in Havana, Cuba, where he was teaching golf. She likewise furmished other information in connection with this case, all of which was promptly submitted in a reporte

In the weeks that followed, I contacted her at an average of once a week and as our moetings became more frequent, she allowed herself to be more confidential with me. I wish to mention at this point that Special Agent in Charge M. H. Purvis and Special Agent: Suran of the Chicago office who supervised the Brekid case in Chicago around this time had complete knowledge of my contacts and meetings with this girl. The pertinent information supplied by her was always promptly submitted to the Bureau so, therefore, the Bureau likewise was fully eware of this contact.

67c At no time did ask for any monetary consideration in exchange for her information, nor did she ever indicate to me that she was furnishing same for the purpose of gaining leniency for Elver Fermer. On the contrary, she repeatedly expressed her hatred for both Elmer and Jim Former, stating that they have caused nothing but heartgriefs. The only explanation I could exact from for her assistance and interest in this case is that she was doing it for me personelly and in this connection stated that it was not her intention or desire to cooperate with the Bureau in any way. She repeatedly advised that were it not for the fact that I was assigned to the case, she would not, under any conditions, offer any assistance or information.

During the early part of July, she received word from one Bartholomew, who was recently appointed Post Master at Bensonville, Illinois, to the effect that he talked with Harry Campbell and that Campbell wanted him to bring her, to Berwyn, Illimois, as he wanted her to do something for him. She at first refused to

go, having in mind to talk to me concerning what she should do. I discussed this matter with Kr. Purvis and I suggested to her that she make the contact and then immediately call me, advising of his whereabouts. To date, Bartholomew has not as yet again approached her in this regard.

advised me that Willie The following week Harrison contacted her personally at her home in Bensonville, Ill. and remained with her for about an hour. He informed her at this time that they wanted her to go to St. Paul, Minnesota to deliver a message to Harry Sawyer at the Remsey County Jail. She told them that she would think it over and then let him know in a few days. Vendeavored to reach me at my home that same day but was unsuccessful and on the following morning she telephoned me at the office and when I later met her she related to me the incidents of the preceding day. She asked my advice as to what she should do in . the motter and after talking sume over with Mr. Purvis, it was arranged that she agree to go to St. Paul as requested but that she should reveal the message to me, if possible, before leaving Chicago. All of the above information was transmitted to the Bureau by teletype message and the details of same were subsequently submitted in a report.

About a week after I received my transfer to New York, I informed her that I was leaving Chicago permanently but hoped that the change would not affect the then present arrangement. She, however, at this time firmly refused to work with another agent on the case and reiterated that her only reason for her assistance is that she wanted me to receive credit for whatever she does in this connection with this case. However, after much persussion she finally agreed to contact another agent of the Chicago office should willie Harrison agein contact her or should Bartholomew take her to the hideout of Harry Campbell.

On the day I left Chicago for New York City, I brought her to the Chicago office and introduced her to Mr. Purvis. This was the first time she appeared in our Chicago office and it was accomplished only after much persuasion. At this time Hr. Purvis and I went over the entire matter with and it was arranged that she call Mr. Purvis should she again hear from either Willie Harrison or Harry Campbell; that in the event Mr. Purvis was absent from the office she was to talk with Special Agents D. P. Sullivan or W. J. Devereaux. Upon my departure from Chicago, I promised to correspond with

On July 84, 1955, I received a lengthy letter from in which she stated that Special Agent Sullivan had contacted her on several occasions for information and although she endeavored to assist him in this respect she in the future does not desire to continue under the present circumstances.

The following excerpts taken from her letter will elearly show her attitude in this connection:

- I was rather surprised when I read about Mr. Purvis resigning and did feel funny about things. -- On the following Tuesday after you went away, Mr. Sullivan called me and asked me to meet him. I did not want to, but remembering what you had told me and not wanting to displease you in any way, went to meet him. He took me for a ride up North and parked the car. I never knew anyone who could ask so many questions. However, he did not get very far as, after all, I was not in custody. He brought me to the Depot after about two hours and I went home. He asked mo to meet him Friday night and I was not going to and was going to stand him up, but again knowing you would disapprove of me doing that, consented.
- Sullivan wants me to get that girl from the Post Office and arrenge a double date for him end I and another agent he has selected by the name of Cassidy and go out, then have other dates, and Cassidy is to try and get her to fall for him and pump her for information in regards to the Post Office. Johnny, must I do that? You started out with me on this case. Thy can't you continue. Everything I told you I told you voluntarily for the simple reason I wanted to help you and the only reason I have bothered to do whatever Sullivan told me was because I thought you would went me to, but Johnny, if it means . helping him I am afraid I am going to stop. I would do anything for you and follow any instructions you give me, but for you only. He wants me to show him where the Syndicate have their 'Book' in Melrose Park and he wants me to do a lot of things that I am not going to do. He just thinks I am, but he is going to be fooled. I was

but Mr. Sullivan begged

me to wait so I will until the first of next week.

I cannot be waiting - you know, Johnny, the circumstances
after all - I don't want to go broke. I am perfectly
frank with you and I told you a lot of things.

Bartholomew and Mike (Mike Marino) know where I am at
and try and arrange things and Johnny, I will let you know
all developments on the case. I heard you were no longer
connected with this case so all in all wes going to fold
up but now that I have heard from you - when you write
to me again send me instructions what to do about Sullivan,
just what you think I should do and I will follow them.

I did not answer bove letter and on July 26, 1935 I received another letter from her. The following excerpts were taken from this letter:

I thought I would hear from you this morning, but I did not, so wanted to scribble you a note. —
I was waiting until I heard from you before arranging a double date with the girl from the Post Office, Cassidy and Sullivan and I. You know, Johnny, I was not so keen about going out like that, after all I did not understand that I had to be dating Sullivan when I promised you I would do what I could for you. Sullivan and Cassidy had a lot of things they went me to do and, Johnny, I am getting tired of it. I cannot be doing all the things they want me to as I have to go to work. Honestly, I do.

I told you how things were out hereand that I had planned on moving soon

I go to the city and I am working, I won't be running around with Sullivan. -- I can find out things for you and will do just as you told me to do and will keep in touch with Bartholomew and Mike and all the connections. -- It will not make a bit of difference if I live in Benson-ville or not, so don't be alarmed, just continue to write

"to me. -- I went to the city the other night, Wednesday
to be exact and drove in with my sister and her boy friend
and as we passed Bartholomew's house there was a dark
haired man sitting on the porch with him. He was a
stranger to me. However, he waved and Bartholomew did
too. I do not know if that means anything or not.

Tou know I prefer working with you and no other agent and would rather keep you informed but how am I going to get rid of Sullivan. You got me into this, now you get me out. If those people are captured you won't get any credit at all and all this is being done for you. If it had not been for you, I would never have tried to help anyone else. What do I care about them. Let them find them themselves."

From the above portions of her letters, it is obvious that she is unwilling to assist in any way under the present conditions and it is feared that a continuance of same will antegonize her to a point where she will not furnish information under any circumstances.

I am unable to understand why neither Willie Harrison nor Harry Campbell have not made any further efforts to contact her. I do not think she has any ulterior motive for furnishing false information and wish to state that whatever she has given us in the past proved to be correct. Some of this information was new and some was already contained in our files as obtained from other sources. At no time did she ever question me about this case, nor did I in any way advance information to her.

I sincerely believe that has been reliable and valuable as an informent in the pest, and in view of her connections and relationship with Jim Farmer, it can readily be seen that she is in a very excellent position to further assist the Bureau in the location of the remaining members of the Barker-Karpis mob. For this reason I believe it highly inadvisable to further antagonise her and suggest that we comply with her request and not have another agent from the Chicago office contact her again.

I talked this matter over with Assistant Special Agent in Charge J. H. Hanson the other day and informed him of

attitude and he agreed with my suggestion that arrangements be made with her to telephone me at this office collect, should willie Harrison or Harry Campbell again contact her and if she received any information which does not require immediate investigative attention, she should furnish same to me by air mail, special delivery letter.

I outlined the above arrangements to her in a letter last week and she expressed willingness as noted in her last letter dated July 26, 1935 to follow out this plan. However, if you does this procedure inadvisable I believe I can effect other arrangements with her whereby she will call the Chicago office direct in the event Willie Harrison or Herry Campbell again contact her and write to me should she receive anything which does not require immediate attention.

I will be in Chicago on Friday, August 2, 1935, for a conference with the County Prosecutor of Fairbury, Mebraska, in connection with the case JESS DOYLE and with your approval I will discuss this matter with Special Agent in Cherks D. M. Ladd and Agent Sullivan. I will also arrange to use and I am quite certain that she will do anything that I suggest.

Reference is made to your letter of July 24, 1935, requesting the Chicago Office to conduct further investigation for the purpose of ascertaining definitely whether or not the individual known as Karnie" is Ernie Laballa, who is manted by the Lucas County I resecutor's Office for Europe.

Please be advised that Special Agent A. Dickstein of this office interviewed the person known as "Ernie" at A. E. Flerming's Hardware Store, 1943 Central Street, Evanston, Illinois, at which place he is now employed, his true name being Ernest Henry Surmaister.

Mr. Burmeister is a man about fifty-three years of age, bears an excellent reputation at Evanston, Illinois, is married and has two married daughters, twenty-five and twenty-three years of age. Er. Eurmeister has been employed by the A. E. Flemming Eurdware Store for the past eight years and prior to such employment, worked for Er. Rake for eight years, Er. Bake having sold the Hardware Store to Er. Flemming.

Kr. Burmeister is a mechanic and he drives a 1927 Chevrolet coach, motor £3117,635, 4-cylinder with overhead valves. The instant car is gray in color, black fenders, disk wheels painted red, and bears 1935 license plates £467-618. Mr. Burmeister further stated that the instant plates had been transferred from an old model-T Ford about three months ago to the 1927 Chevrolet coach. This

Chevrolet couch was bought by Kr. Flamming about three months ago at Evanston, Illinois, and he, Mr. Burmeister, was the only person driving this car, and the car has never been driven out of Evanston, Illinois. Furthermore, Kr. Burmeister stated that the Chevrolet coach bearing license §467-618, would not survive the trip to Ohio if it were driven to that place.

Reference is made to your letter dated July 24, 1935, in the above captioned case, wherein it is suggested that inquiries be made to determine if Alvin Earpis ever served any time at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary.

This angle has been thoroughly investigated by the Oklahoma City Office and former Agent Earle N. Black personally examined the criminal appearance docket at Henryetta, Oklahoma, which discloses that Alvin Karpis, alies George Haller, on September 17, 1931, upon a plea of guilty, on a charge of burglary, before Judge J. H. Swan, sitting in the Henryetta division of the Okmulgee County, Superior Court, was sentenced to the State Reformatory at Granite, Oklahoma, and was paroled by Judge Swan from the bench on the same date, to N. M. Alexander, his attorney, who was the former Judge of the District Court at Okmulgee, there being no commitment of Marpis to the reformatory.

This record has been further confirmed by the records of the Sheriff's Office at Okmulgee, Oklahoma. The Jail Record Book #1, Page 27, shows the following entry: "Alvin Karpis; charge burglary; sentenced 5 years; paroled September 17, 1931." There is a discrepancy as to whether Karpis was sentenced to three or four years in these County Records.

The fact that Karpis was never committed to any penitentiary on this charge is further confirmed by several officers in Okmulgee County who have advised Agent Hansen, of this office, that he was never sent to a penitentiary and the reason for this is generally understood to be the fact that some restitution of the stolen jewelry was made and that Karpis and his friends made some deal with Judge Swan and the Black Jewelry Store of Henryetta, for the sentence he received.

GIVEO

The above facts are further confirmed by Dorothy Karpis, who was married to Alvin Karpis at the time of this robbery and sentence, and by her aunt, Carol Tankersley, the former wife of Herman Barker, who have told agent Hensen, upon numerous occasions, that Karpis was never sent to a penitentiary on this burglary charge, but received "some kind of a parole".

It is, therefore, certain that Karpis was never committed to a penitentiary on this particular charge and as far as has been developed, by the Oklahoma City Office, he was never committed to any penitentiary in Oklahoma.

With reference to report of Special Agent in Charge E. E. Conroy, Kansas City, Missouri, dated July 22, 1935, the following information was secured by Special Agent C. J. Endres, of the Oklahoma City Office, regarding James L. Kelly, with aliases, the informant mentioned in that report, said information having been secured from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary:



It will enable me to present your version, should occasion arise, before the New England Association of Chiefs of Police. It is my belief that this may occur if I read rightly between the lines of Chief Bresnahan's letter to me. it the next annual meeting of the New York State issociation of Chiefs of Police which takes place at Utica the end of next month, I shall request a resolution be drawn, as I will later before the New England Association, that State laws be formulated making it mandatory to hold any prisoner without bail, whose fingerprints show evidence of deliberate mutilation until such time as may be required to determine his identity. If you have any additional suggestions along this line I will be glad to receive them. The value of these parties as informants and the future use of them to obtain information, I believe, depends solely upon what information they now possess as to specific cases or fugitives and this can best be determined after they have been contacted at an armined after they have been contacted at a contacted at this time and such new information that they possess obtained, and this information then associated with information they have previously furnished and the reliability, or rather the possibilities of what can be expected of these persons is dependent upon what they have furnished in the past and the value it was found to have at that time. These informants, and most informants of any value to a case, are developed in connection with specific individuals and cases, and while they have rather definite information in the particular case in which first approached, this does not indicate they will be able to furnish valuable information in miscellaneous cases, and if such latter is the case, my experience has indicated that their possibilities in other cases are to a great extent limited. These informants sometimes, if followed up too closely, are led into becoming what are really professional informants, and in order to be retained they enceavor to obtain information in order to justify their retention and many times this information is obtained only by inquiry made indiscreetly by them to the detriment of the search being made for a particular Tugitive.

As to the above indicated possible informants, Bo personal contact with any of these and their possibiliti dapend solely upon what can be obtained, in my opinion, in the

manner indicated above, and I personally would not recommend the retention of these parties as informats under a paid arrangement unless they have some definite back-ground which would assure us the possibility that they can obtain definite information on specific cases. These parties, of course, should always be encouraged to maintain their sontact with the office of the Bureau in which territory they are located with the assurance that if anything developes whereby we can use them, we will take advantage of their services, paying them accordingly.

The following three persons, among others, were mentioned in the anonymous communication:

#### O'DELL

The Bureau's attention is invited to my report of September 26, 1933, in the case entitled VERNON C. MILLER with aliases - FUGITIVE IDENTIFICATION ORDER 1195; et al; OBSTRUCTION OF JUSTICE ( ENDEAVOR TO DELIVER FEDERAL PRISONER FRANK NASH).

This report covers the investigation made at Tybee Beach, Georgia, near Savannah. Prior to the investigation in that report Agent Kingman. Resident Agent at Savannah, learned that there was a man at the Beach with

a 1929 Lincoln Sedan, bearing Arkansas license tags 119 017, with Hot Springs, Arkansas, City tag 2299. It was believed that this person was connected with the VERNON C. MILLER case.

The investigation at Tybee Beach disclosed that the person under observation was one THOMAS BRADLEY. The writer associated with Bradley while under cover, for five or six hours. It was determined by all Agents assigned to this investigation that he in no way resembled any of the persons involved, but all were of the consensus of opinion that Bradley had all the earmarks of a clever and slick con man.

After the investigation with reference to Bradley was concluded, it appears that Bradley was in fact THOMAS J 0'DELL, and that he was wanted in Deland, Florida, for having swindled Henry WJ Wilmont, a wealthy New Yorker, out of \$100,000.00 in the old race horse game.

Bradley, alias O'Dell in October, 1933 was arrested on an affidevit signed by Wilmont, charging that on April 22, 1935, at Deland, Florida, O'Dell obtained from him \$100,000.00, representing that he had information on a horse race. Later O'Dell was extradited from Savannah, Georgia, to Deland, Florida, where he was presented for trial and convicted by a Jury, whereupon the Judge sentenced him to serve five years in State Prison, or pay a fine of \$1,000.00. Quite naturally O'Dell elected to pay the fine, after which he was released.

It appears that this is the "kick" relative to O'Dell that the anonymous author of the communication referred to.

#### FARRELL

In the Jacksonville Office file #47-0 there is a memorandum, dated March 25, 1932, submitted by former Special Agent John V. Anderson, which refers to information received by the Jacksonville Office that a number of high powered confidence men were operating at West Palm Beach, Florida, among whom was one George L. Farry, who was accompanied by a table silver haired woman, supposedly his wife; later several other woman came to West Palm Beach, and Farry held them out as being his relatives. It is believed that they were confidence women, who had come to West Palm Beach to assist the gang put over their swindles.

It also appears that at this particular time O'Dell, aforementioned, appeared at West Palm Beach. He was then driving a car, bearing 1932 New York/license plates 5 Y 755, and residing at 308 Barcelona Road. Type of car was unknown.

It appears that this gang of con men were operating from Mismi as far North as Stuart, Florida, the county seat of Martin County.

Our 32-0 file shows that in October, 1933, the then Chief of Police H. A. Fausett, Ocala, Florida, had informed that John Sutton with aliases Arthur R. McCune, J. R. Farrell, Frank Ford, A. R. Cune, Frank Hart, Charles Livingston and Roy John Sims, a notorious con man was then in custody of Chief of Detectives Shoemaker, Chicago, Illinois, being held for Ocala State authorities, who contemplated returning him to Ocala where he was under indictment for swindling.

Postal Inspectors at that time advised that they were of the opinion that John Sutton with aliases was the subject of an investigation being conducted by Post Office Inspector Graham, who, at the time, was en route to Jacksonville, Florida, to handle the aforementioned swindling case.

The name John Sutton appears in the criminal record furnished the Jacksonville Office, October 3, 1933, by the Bureau, its number 3116.

One Farrell is also mentioned in the anonymous communication dated February 23, 1934 at Reno, Nevada, which letter is set forth in the report of Special Agent in Charge Reed E. Vetterli, Salt Lake City, Utah, April 5, 1934, in the case entitled UNKNOWN SUBJECTS - ROY FRISCH - Victim, Kidnaping.

#### WINTER

The name FRANK WINTERS, a con man, is mentioned in a transcript of the criminal record of FRANK R! MORAN, Bureau # 28216, copy of which was furnished to the Jacksonville Office on August 19, 1934, in the case entitled VERNON C. There is no indication that Kerin is acquainted with Harrison except the inference that he may be because of his close acquaintanceship with John Russell Moran.

Horan and Kerin have, at various times, resided at the Rienzi Hotel, Diversey Parkway, Chicago, and at the Shorehau Hotel, 3618 Sheridan Road, Chicago, Illinois. An informant has advised on several eccasions that he has seen Kerin and Moran in the company of a man he believed to be identical with Harrison, although this office has never been able to varify this information.

There is no definite information in the file indicating that John R. Moran is in frequent communication with Harrison, although he is known to be a close friend of Harrison's and it is possible that Harrison may contact him on various occasions.

On July 29, 1935 Special Agent Hostetter of the St. Louis office advised that a Graham Paige coupe, bearing Florida license number D5089, which car was known to have been in the possession of hilliam Kerin, was seen at St. Louis, Missouri. It was suggested that inasmuch as Earrison's home is at St. Louis, Missouri, that the occupants of this car be kept under surveillance during the time they are in St. Louis.

On July 30, 1935 the question as to the appropriate procedure to take in regard to covering Korin and Moran was discussed with Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley, who was visiting the Chicago office at the time. He suggested that the above mentioned car be kept under surveillance while at St. Louis but that Koran or Kerin should not be constantly followed while in Chicago inasmuch as these men would undoubtedly soon become aware that they were being followed and suggested that an occasional check be made to ascertain their whereabouts.

Pending further developments and a report from the St. Louis office, appropriate leads will be set out for your office in case it is believed advisable to take further investigative action in your district in regard to Eoran and Keria.

This office is in receipt of a letter from Edna Murray. register number 28973, Missouri State Penitentiary, Jefferson City, Missouri, advising she wished to see a representative of the Bureau in that "she had changed her mind about some things".

Special Agent A. E. Farland, of this office, interviewed Edna Murray at the Penitentiary and was advised that if something could be done to reduce the time she will have to serve at the penitentiary she could render some assistance to the Bureau that would possibly be of value.

During a recent interview with Elmer Farmer at the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, Farmer made the assertion that Edna Murray could possibly give information which would lead to the apprehension of William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, in that he believes she knows the location of a farm on which he alleges Weaver and Myrtle Eaton are presently living. Farmer also stated that Edna Eurray possibly knows the location of the place where the body of John Hamilton is alleged to be buried.

It is my belief that W. W. Graves, Prosecuting Attorney, Jackson County, Missouri, from which county Edna Murray was sentenced, would be willing to cooperate in reducing her sentence in the event she gave valuable information to this Bureau which would lead to the apprehension of some of the remaining Fugitives in this case.

Captain of Detectives Leo J. Kinney and the writer ascertained there was no such address as  $304\frac{1}{2}$  West Wilson Street, Madison, Wisconsin, but ascertained that an ex-convict named Paul Waller resided at  $304\frac{1}{2}$  East Wilson Street. He was interviewed by Agent and stated that Patsy, whose correct name is Maxine Cooley, and Chubby resided at his place for several days a month or two ago; that as soon as he ascertained that they were prostitutes, he directed them to leave, and believed they were residing in some house on Blount Street.

Inquiry was made by Agent and Captain Kinney on Blount Street, and it was ascertained that Maxine Cooley and Francis Downes were residing at the home of Harry Dalton, 108 North Blount Street, but inquiry at this address disclosed that the girls effects were still in their room, but that they had not been seen for some time.

Rumerous resorts in Madison were visited by Agent and Captain Kinney in an effort to locate Maxine Cooley and Francis Downes, and an order was issued to the police to bring Maxine Cooley and Francis Downes to the police station for questioning if they were located in Madison.

On July 13, 1935 Lexine Cooley was brought to Folice Headquarters by Patrolman Frank Ingram in response to the alarm, but Francis Downes, who was with Lexine Cooley, ran when she saw the officer approaching. It was ascertained that Francis Downes was paroled to Lrs. George Hiller, who resides at Edgerton, Wisconsin.

lexine Cooley was interviewed by Agent and a photograph of volney Davis was exhibited to her. She stated that she did not know Volney Davis, end claimed that she did not know the identity of Walley, who was supposed to have picked up these two girls in a 1935 Ford V-8 Coupe. Maxine Cooley was also shown photographs of the other members of this gang who are still at large, and she claimed that she had never seen any of them.

Maxine Cooley advised that her home was formerly in Boscobel, Wisconsin, but that she had been in Madison for several months and was acquainted with Don Martin, who sold tickets at the

fortune teller's stand at the Sols-Liberty Carnival. She stated that she had not stayed with any man for two nights in recent months, and that she had not made any engagement to meet anyone at Galesburg, and Illinois.

Agent located Francis Downes at the home of Mrs. George Hiller, three miles south of Edgerton, Wisconsin, and she admitted that she had been friendly with Laxine Cooley for some months. A photograph of Volney Davis was exhibited to her and she stated that she had never seen this individual. Photographs of the other members of this gang still at large were exhibited to Francis Downes, but she stated that she had never seen any of them anywhere. She advised that she is originally from Kentucky and with Maxine Cooley, who is known as Fatsy, she had been engaged in prostitution at Madison, Misconsin; that their usual method of operation was to have a taxi driver pick them up and take them to various hotels and houses of ill fame in Madison.


Francis Downes stated that "Walley" was a taxi driver and was one of those who took Maxine Cooley and herself to the various places; that she did not know Walley's last name and did not recall the incident when he picked them up in a 1935 Ford V-8 Coupe, referred to in the report of reference. She described Walley as being over six fee in height, and weighing about 185 pounds.

Francis Downes advised further that she left Madison when she saw the police officers take Maxine Cooley into custody as she had been told by the Madison Police to get out of town and stay out of town; that she knew of no one answering the description of Volney Davis and that as far as she knows, Patsy never made an engagement to meet anyone at Galesburg, Illinois.

Francis Downes advised further that Mexine Cooley and her mother had both been inmates of houses of ill fame in Dane County, Wisconsin.

In accordance with the request contained in the letter of reference, all banks in the State of Wisconsin have been circularized for the purpose of securing information relative to the thousand dollar bills issued by the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, Georgia, which might be in the possession of Karpis and Campbell. As soon as replies have been received from all banks, a report will be submitted thereon.
