

After swooping down on the "Osbornes" Sunday morning, the federal agents rushed their prisoners to Jacksonville, boarded a plane and whicked them to St. Feat for questioning.

With respect to the record of a telegram sent from Egan's office to Aurora, Ill., on May 10, 1935, which was charged to his office telephone, Special Agent R. H. Klett ascertained from Mr. Emmert, Superintendent of the Western Union Telegraph Company, Dayton, Ohio, that they had no record of such a telegram:

Agent Klett then contacted Mr. F. A. Harris, Manager, of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company at Dayton, Chio, who furnished Agent with a copy of a telegram sent by John Egan on May 10 to Aurora, Ill., which reads, as follows:

Aurora, Ill., which reads, as follows:
"Thos McGinty, c/o Leland Aurora Hotel, Aurora, Ill. Can you recommend starter Wire answer Collect. John Egan".

This message was telephoned to the Postal Telegraph Company at Dayton; Ohio, at 7:43 P.M., on May 10 and the message apparently is requesting a tip on a horse.

On August 21, 1935, Lt. Thomas Scully, Assistant Chief of Detectives, Columbus, Ohio, Police Department, telephoned the Cincinnati Office and advised that he had secured some information indicating that Karpis might have been in Columbus.

Lt. Scully was interviewed by Special Agents W. C.
Robinson and M. J. Boyd, at which time he advised that one Henry Dohmann whose father, Pete Dohmann operates the Royal Tavern located at 418 E. Main Street, Columbus, Chio, had advised that a man known as Bill Manners had called to see his father, at which time Manners was accompanied by another man and that his father had told him this man was Karpis.

It. Scully advised that Manners is about 50 years of age, is very small in build and that he has served time in Joliet, and Michigan City: further that he has a brother now serving time in the Ohio Penitentiary at Columbus. He also advised that Pete Dohmann formerly lived in Chicago, Ill., and that he has been a bootlegger. He also advised that Pete Dohmann could under no circumstances furnish any information

Agents Robinson and Boyd interviewed Henry Dolmand, who repeated the information as set out above, advising that about 28 8-20-35 Bill Manners had wisited his father, Pete Dohmann, at which time he was accompanied by a man and a woman. He stated that he had only a glimpse of these people and could furnish practically no description of them, advising that the woman was about 35 years of age,

and very small and that she had dark hair. He advised that after they had talked with his father, these people went to the tourist camp known as Cabintown at 3456 E. Main Street and that his father later told him that the man with Manners was Karpis and also told him that Manners had some "hot" diamonds worth about \$100,000.00 which he had offered to the elder Dohmann at a hot price and that Dohmann had told Manners to return later.

The Agents then interviewed Pat J. Carmedy, Proprietor of Cabintown, who advised that two men and a woman had occupied a cabin there on Monday night, August 19, and had eaten at the Rock Garden Tea Room, 2918.E. Main Street, Columbus. Photographs of various persons connected with this case were shown to Carmedy but he was mable to make any identification. His sister, who was present, was also unable to identify a picture of Karpis.

Walter Marrs, owner of the Rock Garden Tea Room, and the various waitresses at this Tea Room were also contacted and were unable to make any identification.

Henry Dohmann advised that he would immediately contact Lt. Scully of the Columbus Police Department should Manners and his companion return. Dohmann also advised that Manners was driving a 1929 or 1930 model Ford two door Sedan, blue in color with a dent above the rear fender and that this car was carrying Ohio license plates 768 VN. It was ascertained, however, that no plates have been issued with this number.

On September 10, 1935, Deputy United States Marshal Fred Pugh, Dayton, Ohio, advised Special Agent R. H. Klett that & Mrs. Filburn had some information about subject Karpis. AgentKlett interviewed Mrs. Filburn, who advised that a man and woman using the name of Mr. and Mrs. Blane Hulswitt had been living in a summer resort operated by the Filburns at Lake Laramie, near Sidney, Ohio and had stayed there from the latter part of June until the 28th of August. Mrs. Filburn advised that her son, Granville, had apparently become infatuated with the woman travelling as Mrs. Hulewitt and it was her belief that the Man known as Blane Hulswitt was subject Karping Mrs. Filburn positively identified photograph of subject Karpis as being identical with Hulswitt. Agent Klett interviewed the two daughters of Mrs. Filburn, Dorothy Filburn and Mrs. B. J. Heir, who both advised that the individual known as Hulswitt was considerably older than Karpis and not, in their stimation identical with or even resembling Karpis.

Agent Klett then interviewed Granville Filburn, who admitted that he had been intimate with the woman, known as Mrs. Hulswitt and who further advised that Blane Hulswitt was a War Veteran and that he had accompanied Hulswitt to Columbus, Ohio, on a visit to the Veterans Bureau where Hulswitt went to discuss his compensation and that Hulswitt was approximately 45 years of age. He further stated that the woman known as Mrs. Hulswitt had told him that she was not married to this man, inasmuch as he had been divorced in Florida and could not re-marry and that she wanted to leave Hulswitt and live with him, Granville Filburn. He advised that this woman called him from Dayton, Ohio, on September 6, 1935, and that he went to see her, at which time she told him she had left Hulswitt and was working in Dayton. He claimed that he did not know her present address.

Reference is made to the teletype from the Boston Office on September 11, 1935, advising that Karpis was reported seen with three other men between Belfast and Camden, Maine, in a Cadillac or Lincoln Seden with Ohio license plates KD 882. It was ascertained telephonically from the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Columbus, Ohio, that Ohio license plates KD 882 were issued on March 2, 1935, to Karl Pajello, 8813 Empire Ave., Cleveland, Ohio, for a 1930 Buick Sedan, Motor number 2605595, serial 2430853 and that there is no record of any transfer or theft report on this automobile. This automobile is covered by Cuyahoga County Bill of Sale, file #2145727.

The above information was transmitted to the Cleveland Office by teletype on September 11, 1935, with the request that the Clevelend Office conduct the necessary investigation concerning the owner of this automobile and the presence of these license plates in Maine.

Agent interviewed Sheriff R. Jack Allen and Undersheriff Bob Owens, who stated that their Deputy Sheriff John Buckmaster, located at Midwest, Wyoming, had received word from Ben Gillam, Midwest, Wyoming, that Karpis and Campbell had been into Midwest in the early part of June, 1935.

AT NIDWEST, WYOMING

Agent immediately checked the above information at Midwest, and accompanied by Deputy Buckmaster, interviewed Mr. and Mrs. Ben Gillam, who are considered reliable citizens of Midwest. Gillam holds a responsible position with the Standard Oil Company.

Gillam stated that the above-referred to rumor was circulated by one, A. W. Westbrook, Midwest, Wyoming, who had circulated the story around Midwest and Casper that Karpis and Campbell had been in that vicinity, accompanied by one "Red" Fonda, and that Fonda and Karpis had been visiting the Gillam's on two occasions. The Gillam's advised that they knew Harry Campbell, as he worked in that vicinity some years ago, but that they did not know Karpis. They further stated that they knew Fonda and his description will be set out later in the report.

Before displaying any photographs of persons wanted by the Bureau, Agent secured a description from Mr. and Mrs. Gillam of the man whom Westbrook described as Karpis. They described this unknown party as follows:

Various photographs were displayed to the Gillam's and none answered the description of the stranger visiting them. Eventually, after reviewing numerous photographs, they asked which ricture was that of Karpis, and the writer pointed out Karpis. They then stated that while the picture resembled the stranger somewhat they did not feel that the stranger was Karpis.

The Gillam's further stated that these two parties were driving a blue 1934, when a Chevrolet Sedan, with a New Mexico license number unknown thereon. The New Mexico ico license, they stated, was explained by the fact that Fonda now lives some where in New Mexico.

An attempt was made to locate A. W. Westbrook, the originator of the above rumor, but he was not in Midwest on the date Agent was there, and he will be interviewed,

Agent, however, discussed this matter with Deputy Sheriff John Buckmaster, City Marshal Less Snow, and Special Officer Charlie Davis, all of Midwest, and they stated that they ran the rumor down at the time, and that nothing was ever disclosed to show that Karpis and Campbell had actually ever been in Midwest at that time. These officers further stated that Westbrook seems to get a delight in circulating such stories, and that they, the officers, have checked numerous stories of his in connection with this case, as well as other local cases, and they have always found his information to be "sour". They did state, howevery, that in all probability Westbrook does know Campbell, as both were in the oil fields a few years back, when Campbell was working in that neighborhood,

AT CASPER, WYOMING Upon Agent's return to Casper it was learned from Undersheriff Bob Owens that while an energetic and well-meaning officer, Deputy Sheriff John Buckmaster, Midwest, Wyoming, had apparently in his excitement erroneously reported the information referred to above, as he, Buckmaster, had previously advised Sheriff Allen and himself, Deputy Owens, that Gillam had stated that Karpis and Campbell

had visited him on two occasions. This was erroneous, as reflected by Agent's ininterview with Gillam in the presence of Deputy Buckmester.

Sheriff Allen and Undersheriff Owens, as well as Captain William Miller, Casper Police Department, all of whom have been valuable contacts in instant matter. advised that Westbrook was a braggart, and though he probably knew Campbell personally, they did not believe that he, Westbrook, had seen Campbell for some time, and felt that Westbrook got a "kick" out of circulating these false ru-

Undersheriff Bob Owens advised that he had heard another rumor to the effect that Karpis and Campbell were to come to Casper about August 17, 1935; that this rumor originated from down on "the Bar", Casper's red-light district; but that nothing ever came of this rumor. According to the information of Deputy Owens, Kerpis and Campbell were to occupy the shack in back of the residence owned by one Ammon right, at 241 B. Street. This place is located in the red-light district, and at present is occupied by two or three prostitutes. The shack, behind this residence, is occupied at present by two negros. apparently man and wife. Deputy Owens further advised that Ammon Wright, the owner of this place, is himself an unreliable character, and interviewing him. would not be deemed advisable, as he would only warn Karpis and Campbell, should this rumor be true.

Frequent checks by Deputy Owens and the writer in this neighborhood were of no avail, and it is now the Sheriff's Office's opinion that possibly this rumor was instigated by Westbrook.

AT ALCOVA, WYOMING

AT ALCOVA, WYOMING

Inquiry at the Alcova Postoffice developed the fact that Dan Tubbs, mentioned in reference reports of Special Agents Gere and Hansen, has been away from Alcova for some time, and that he is now shearing sheep somewhere in Montana or Idaho. The writer was advised that his, Tubbs', whereabouts, may be ascer-

tained through Judge Tubbs, Dan Tubbs father, who is living at Casper, Eyoming.

Agent did not return to Casper after receiving the above information, and Tubbs will be interviewed at a future date. It may be mentioned here that Undersheriff Owens, Casper, Wyoming, advised that when Deputy Sheriff Bob News lin, Alcova, went to Evansville, Wyoming, to "flush" Oscar Felt's place, at the time Karpis and Campbell were there, Tubbs is supposed to have tipped Felt off and Karpis and Campbell are supposed to have fled before the arrival of Deputy Newlin. This alleged visit was supposed to have occurred in the fall of 1934, and is discussed elsewhere in the file.

AT CODY, WYOMING Agent contacted Sheriff Frank Blackburn, who stated that the Jimmy Lovewell,

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mentioned in the reference report of Special Agent in Charge E. P. Guinane, is a responsible citizen of Cody, and that Lovewell married the daughter of an ex-county assessor, and at present is working for the Texaco Company at Cody.

In company with Sheriff Blackburn, Agent interviewed Lovewell, and he advised after looking at various photographs, that he did not recognize any of them and when shown specifically the photographs of Karpis and Campbell Lovewell advised that he could not recall having seen either them at Felt's place at Evansville, Wyoming.

Lovewell advised that he lived at Oscar Felt's in Evansville, Wyoming, about the time that Karpis and Campbell were supposed to be there. This he ascertained when advised of the dates of the supposed visit of the pair at Felt's. Lovewell further stated that he lived with Felt for two weeks, and that during this stay he, Lovewell, had met various strangers, but that he never paid much attention to any of them. Lovewell was closely questioned as to any suspicious actions on the part of Felt or any of his guests, and he, Lovewell, advised that he did not recall any efforts on the part of Felt or his guests which would tend to appear suspicious. He added, however, that he would not "put anything past" Felt, insofar as harboring fugitives was concerned, as Felt appeared to be that type of person.

While at Cody, Wyoming, George Stine, Special Agent, Chicago, Burlington, and Quincy Railroad, Casper, Wyoming, stated that one Mat Goad was working for the reilroad at the roundhouse at Casper, and that he knew Campbell at Oklashoma some years ago. Stine further stated that he "had something on Goad" in connection with some difficulty with the railroad, and that he, Stine, felt that he could secure valuable information through Goad. Stine advised that he would interview Goad, and then submit the information to the Denver Office. Stine further stated that after he talked with Goad it might be advisable that an Agent interview Goad.

AT DENVER, COLORADO
On the evening of August 24, 1935, Frank Ewing, of the Associated Press, made inquiry of this office regarding a report he had received from a member newspaper at Sheridan, Wyoming, to the effect that Alvin Karpis had been seen at Sheridan on that date, and was being pursued by the police.

Special Agent L. M. Chipman telephonically communicated with Mr. John Hendrickson, Chief of Police, Sheridan, who stated that some informants who had been fishing on a stream approximately twelve miles from Sheridan informed him that a man was fishing on this stream who resembled Karpis; and he with other officials went to this location and interviewed this man, who gave his name as Mr. Sam Ross, 863 Monroe Street, Denver, Colorado. Ross was driving a 1934 Buick Sedan, carrying Colorado license No. 1-8809.

Mr. Hendrickson described this individual as being about 30 years of age, 5 feet 11 inches in height, weight 171 pounds, fair complexion, dark hair, green eyes.

The Chief stated that this man did not resemble Karpis in any respect, and that he compared his description and fingerprints with the Identification Order on Karpis, and that he was certain they were not identical, so he did not take Ross into Custody.

Agent ascertained at the Denver Police Department that Colorado license No. 1-8809 was issued to Albert Ross, of 1460 Larimer Street, Denver, on a 1934 Buick Sedan, motor No. 42912215.

The Denver telephone directory discloses that a Sam Ross resides at 863 Monroe Street, Denver. Agent discreetly telephonically communicated with Mrs. Sam Ross, who stated that her husband works for his brother, Albert Ross, as a salesman, and that he is at the present time in ayoming on business.

In view of the fact that the identity of the suspect was established, no further investigation was made regarding this report.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE EL F.SO OFFICE: at Santa Fe. New Mexico, is requested to ascertain the address of Floyd "Red" Fonda through the automobile license bureau, with a view toward locating and interviewing him as to the parties accompanying him on his visit to Midwest, Wyoming, in the spring of 1935.

THE DENVER OFFICE: at Midwest, Wyoming, will located and interview Mr.

A. W. Westbrook concerning the rumor, which apparently originated from him, to the effect that Karpis and Campbell were in Midwest in the spring of 1935. He is said to be working for the Sinclair Producing and Refining Company, Station No. 15. At Casper, Wyoming, will keep in touch with the Sheriff and Chief of Police for any material developments, and will ascertain the present whereabouts of Dan Tubbs, through the cooperation of Sheriff R. Jack Allen and Judge Tubbs, who is said to be a resident of Casper. Tubbs will be interviewed along the lines set out in reference report of Agent Hansen. Will interview George Stine, Special Agent, C. B. &. Q. Ry., to ascertain whether anything of value was secured in his interview of Mat Goad, and whether an interview by an Agent of this Bureau with Goad would be deemed advisable.

Special Agent in Charge C. D. McKean of the Boston Office telephoned me with reference to my previous call to him concerning press dispatches appearing in the Washington papers indicating the presence of ALVIN KARPIS in the vicinity of Belfast, Maine. He said that in connection with his inquiry into this matter, he contacted the Maine State Police at Thomaston, Maine, where he was advised that about 4:00 P.M., yesterday, September 10, 1935, one Carver, attached to the Alcohol Tax Unit of the Treasury Department at Lincolnville, Maine, reported to the High Sheriff that between three and four o'clock P.M., he saw a black Lincoln or Cadillec Sedan, bearing Ohio license plates KD-882, proceeding from Camden toward Belfast, Maine. This automobile contained four men, one of whom was believed by Carver to resemble Karpis. The High Sheriff, in turn, reported this matter to the Thomaston Barracks of the Maine State Police, who took appropriate steps to have the highways covered and guarded; however, no such automobile has been found as yet.

Mr. McKean advised that he then contacted one of the lieutenants at the Thomaston Barracks, who advised that he had nothing further to add to this matter, with the exception of the fact that about four A.M., this morning, one of the officers, Thompson, at the Bathe, Maine, Barracks, arrested at Bathe an intoxicated man who was driving a Plymouth Coupe bearing New York license plates. The State Police have communicated with New York relative to these license plates, but as yet have not received a reply. In this connection, Mr. McKean advised that he contacted Officer Thompson at Bathe, Maine, who advised that he was holding on charges of driving while drunk a man who gave his name as Edward L. Kennedy, 6551 - 77th Street, Middle Village, New York. The car in which Kennedy was driving is a Plymouth Coupe, 1934 Model, New York license plates N-4884. Thompson advises that the age and weight of Kennedy do not agree at all with Karpis. However, he is fingerprinting Kennedy and will send the prints to his headquarters at the Thomaston Barracks.

Mr. McKean said that he will dispatch at once a telegram to the proper Ohio office to check the license plates reported as being on the automobile mentioned in the first paragraph of this manufacture.

In addition to the above, Mr. McKean advised that there had just been brought to him an evening paper published in Boston which reports Karpis as being in Boston. The article says that Karpis was reported as being seen leaving the Back Bay Station in Boston last evening. The local police, it is reported, placed searching automobiles and parties in that vicinity, but no arrests have been made.

In connection with the other matter, Mr. McKean said that he is sending one of his Agents from Portland to Bathe, Maine, to conduct an inquiry relative to this matter. I instructed him to give this matter vigorous attention, and exhaust all possible leads.

Chase at the Ford Motor Sales Company, 2220 Michigan Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, please be advised that arrangements were made with the management of this sales agency, which apparently is legitimate, whereby this office would be immediately notified should Meade either attempt to purchase a new car at this sales agency or attempt to have the credit balance transferred to any other Ford agency in the United States. The management has notified each of the departments with which Chase may have negotiations, especially selesman L.H.Hart, with whom Meade has had business dealings for the past 6 or 7 years, to notify him immediately should any inquiry be made concerning the above credit balance being held in the name of C.C.Chase,

Catherine Meade is still residing at 1533 Fargo Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, in an apartment house located at the above address. This apartment house is owned by Catherine Meade. Discreet inquiry in the neighborhood resulted in information that William Elmer Meade has not been seen in the vicinity for more than two years, however, arrangements have been made whereby this apartment house can be kept under surveillance. Inasmuch as William Elmer Meade is reported to have been arrested by the post office inspectors as he was leaving the above address in the fall of 1933, it is deemed unlikely that he will personally visit this address again. However, it is possible that Catherine Meade may meet him away from their home. For this

He states that he does not recall who introduced him to her or just who else was present; that at the time he did not connect her as being the mother of the Barker Boys, but afterwards learned of this fact; that sometime after meeting Mrs. Barker at Lake Tahoe, Nevada, possibly in the early spring of 1933, he was walking down the street in San Francisco, California, and Mrs. Berker came up and spoke to him but he only talked with her a few minutes and as he now recalls she stated to him that she was in San Francisco having her eyes treated. She was alone, did not say where she was stopping, and he has not seen or heard from her since, except reading an account of she and her son, who he never knew, being killed.

Nr. Filliams also stated that he never knew or heard of Ed Bentz and his geng; that he had no information except what he has already given the Bureau as to the Barker-Karpis gang or any other gangs.

Cuyahoga County bill of sale #2145727 covers a Ford DeLuxe, four-door seden, motor #1563056, which is the property of K. H. Painter, Inc., automobile dealers, 13805 Euclid Avenue. Title to this car, however, appears to be in the name of Thomas F. Brick of the same address. It was mentioned at the office of the Clerk of Cuyahoga County that possibly the bill of sale covering the car of Mr. Pajello might have been registered in one of the outlying districts of the county.

The investigation would seem to establish the fact that the owner of Ohio tag #KD 882, to-wit, Carl Pajello was in New England last week and is presumably there at the present time.

As you are working for the Government, I thought it would be best to let you handle this case.

As I want my name and address shelded from newspapers, I do not wish to take any chance on dealing with the police. Here is a man I recognized on Fulton Street, Brooklyn, and I follow him to 43 Fulton Street, Lenox house, Brooklyn, N.Y.

As I watch him standing on the outside of the Lenox House, 43 Fulton St. the last two days Alvin Karpis wented in Minneapolis for KIDNAP-ING. Please hand this letter to the Chief of police.

The original of this letter and the original envelope in which it was mailed are being placed in the New York file in this case. The envelope is a plain white one and is addressed to Mr. Francis Sinnott, Post Master, Washington Street, Brooklyn, N. Y. It is postmarked Brooklyn, N. Y., September 3, 1935, 9:30 A.M. Mr. Sinnott stated that he was not acquainted with the writer of instant letter.

The Lenox (lodging) House, for men only, 43 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, New York, is located near the waterfront and under the entrance to the Brooklyn Bridge, Brooklyn side, and is owned and operated by H. M. Lyons & Company, 92 Bowery, New York City. The Lyons Company, which bears a good reputation, operates 13 lodging houses located on the Bowery, New York City, and 7 in Brooklyn, 3 of which, the Brooklyn, Henry and Concord, are located in the immediate vicinity of the Lenox House,

Discreet investigation through interview with the postal carrier covering the lower end of Fulton Street, also with an investigator of the Emergency Relief Bureau, having revealed that the clerks in charge of the Lenox House were individuals who could be trusted, agent interviewed B. J. Chudack, day clerk at the Lenox House. Mr. Chudack informed agent that the Lenox House has 338 rooms, all of which are rented every night as well as during the day, the rates being 25¢ and 30¢ per day; that practically all of the lodgers

are unemployed, 75% being referred to the Lenox House by the Emergency Relief Bureau, 262 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, New York, who reimburse the Lenox House for the room rent.

In the course of the aforesaid conversation with Mr. Chudack, a photograph of Alvin Karpis was displayed to him, and after carefully examining same, he, Chudack, advised that he had seen an individual resembling Karpis, although it might be possible that his recollection of the photograph was based upon his having previously seen a reproduction of same in a newspaper. Mr. Chudack stated that he would refresh his memory as to how he arrived at the conclusion that he had met an individual resembling Karpis, and arrangements were made for agent to contact him in the near future. Several copies of I.O.#1218 were left with Mr. Chudack, he having evidenced a keen desire to cooperate with the Government.

L. J. DuBartell, Special Investigator in charge of unattached and transient division, Emergency Relief Bureau, 290 Fulton Street Brooklyn, New York, informed agent that he was in charge of all persons on relief who resided outside of New York State and in New York State but outside the city limits; that these individuals are assigned to the various lodging houses located on Fulton Street, the individuals, receiving meal tickets for their meals on restaurants located in that locality. He stated that the assigning of these men came directly under his supervision and lodgers, after being originally assigned to a lodging house, have to report to him every two weeks while on relief. Mr. DuBartell did not recognize the photograph of Alvin Karpis as anyone he had come in contact with. He stated, however, that from now on he would pay more attention to the individuals whom he assigns to the lodging houses on Fulton Street, Brooklyn, New York, and should any lodger resemble the description of Karpis, he would immediately get in touch with the New York office. Several copies of I.O. #1218 were left with Mr. DuBartell at his request.


Based on information received at this office at 2 A.M. on August 50, 1935, from the New York City Police Department, to the effect that Alvin Karpis had been identified as a resident of the apartment house at 118 East 22nd Street, New York City, Agents Tollett, Binns and Dafley of this office made appropriate investigation at the latter address and learned that the suspected individual was Charles Haskell Smith of Oklahoma City, who is residing with R. R. Stone of Amarillo, Texas. Neither of these persons resembled Karpis or Harry Campbell, A teletype summary of the aforesaid investigation was forwarded to the Bureau on August 30, 1935.

The Bureau does not desire to enter into any elterestion with properly constituted authorities as to the custody of Fobby Caborne. From the information in the possession of the Eureau it appears that Filliam Feaver and Myrtle Eston had apparent legal custody of Bobby Osborne, with the consent and knowledge of his mother and the local authorities in Florida. For this reason, no discussion should be entered into by representatives of the Eureau with regard to the quatody of this child and matters of custody must, of necessity, be determined by properly constituted

The following general information is set out for the benefit of the file in connection with the manner in which the apprehension of William Weaver and Myrtle/Eaton was effected at Port Orange, Florida at a point located on U.S.Highway No. 1, 2 miles south of Allendale, which point is also approximately 7 miles south of Daytona Beach, Florida:

At 1.30 A.M. on August 31, 1935 the information was received as supplied by informant from Washington, D.C., and arrangements were made for a plane, and Agents Brown, Cassidy, Jones, Sullivan and myself left Chicago at 7 A.M., arriving in Jacksonville, Florida at 2.50 P.M. August 31, 1935. Thereafter Agent Brown and myself with Agent LaCour of the Jacksonville office proceeded to Daytona Beach, and the vicinity of where the house of William Weaver was alleged to be located. We were able to immediately identify the house in question and the automobile he was driving in the garage at that time. This house was located, although on a main traveled highway, at a very isolated point insofar as any neighbors might be able to see who might come and go at this place, there being only one house to the right of the road going south where anyone could see any activity at the house where Weaver had located himself.

When we first observed this place there was apparently no activity around same and we could not definitely verify that anyone was in the house, and due to the isolated position of same it was difficult to approach, more particularly so inasmuch as they had a dog on the premises in addition to a number of chickens.

On the evening of this date Agent Brown and myself kept this place under surveillance and also kept under surveillance Gill's saloon on the east side of Daytona Beach, where it was reported Weaver spent considerable time. At about 11.30 P.M. on the night of August 31st we observed a woman who was undoubtedly Myrtle Eaton, and the small boy they were keeping, and a party who was believed to be William Weaver although the identification was not very definite, judging from the pictures of him available at that time. When these parties left the barroom in question we followed them to their residence about seven miles south and observed the place sufficiently to know that apparently they were the only ones occupying the premises, judging from what we could see at that time.

The balance of the Agents who were made available at Jacksonville by the Bureau on Saturday August 31, 1935 were then instructed to report to me at Daytona Beach in their automobiles, at which time they were instructed as to their various positions and shown a diagram of the objective. We immediately proceeded to the point in question in order to take up a surveillance, at about daybreak, with all the men in position. They were placed in accordance with rough draft of the diagram of the place enclosed herewith. The men were placed as indicated in order to avoid firing towards the houses to the east and also for the reason that in the wooded section in which the Agents were placed it was possible to conceal themuntil such time as Weaver would leave the house, in order to avoid any shooting into the premises, inasmuch as we knew the two year old boy was in the house at the time. The movements in connection with the apprehension of this party were carried out in accordance with the diagram, the men being equipped with .351 rifle, shotgun, machine gun and 30.06 rifle. Due to the concealed positions taken up, the extreme heat, and the expected wait for the appearance of Weaver the Agents were consulted as to which if any cared to wear the bullet proof vests, numerous suitable trees being available for protection at the time any firing started, and Special Agent in Charge Alt was wearing a bullet proof vest. The balance of the men did not avail themselves of these, and in view of the general layout of the objective this was not insisted upon by me. Due to the fact that we concealed ourselves in the wooded section around the house it was a rather uncomfortable position owing to the mosquitos and bugs which infest this part of Florida at this particular time.

When Weaver left the house he proceeded to a point approximately indicated by the letter "W" on the diagram, and was immediately covered by Agent Cassidy and myself, and required to remain in position with his

hands raised, and he was closed in on at that time, and Agents Hurt and Brown who were on the east side of the house closed in from that position, he being immediately handcuffed. Simultaneously Agent Sullivan and myself supported by Agents Jones and Peterson immediately proceeded into the house to take custody of anyone in the house. These agents also suitably covered the house at the time approach was made to Weaver, for any firing out of same. This particular maneuver could possibly have been handled also by requiring Weaver to walk toward us to our point of concealment. However, his general nervous reactions indicated that apparently he intended to run, and possibly if we had required him to walk toward us he would have made an effort to run away, requiring that he be shot, and as has been noted in previous reference to this situation he was a particularly desirable subject at this time to place on trial with Harry/Sawyer and Cash/McDonald at St.Paul, for the effect it will have upon the jury of one of the actual kidnapers being on trial with them.

The five automobiles available made it possible to block any road which he might take if he were successful in leaving in his automobile, and these men were amply protected, with the exception of Agents located at points 16 and 17 on U.S. Highway No. 1, where due to the line of fire there might be some firing in their direction, and they were definitely instructed to immediately the automobiles were placed, secure ample protection to the side of the road to avoid being hit by our fire. The Agents located at points 16 and 17 were also in position to take care of any outside parties approaching, as well as of any local officers who might appear should firing occur in connection with the apprehension. Immediately after Weaver was handcuffed he was taken into the house, the automobiles were withdrawn from the roads and the men suitably established on the outside to take care of anyone who might approach, and at the same time avoid calling attention to the activity which was occurring in this house, Weaver having appeared at 7 A.M. on Sunday morning. In this connection no one was aware of the fact that these persons had been apprehended and removed from this point at the time in question.

As is noted these people were removed on Monday morning Sept. 2, 1935 to St.Paul by plane, and after questioning they were delivered to the United States Marshal at noon September 3rd at St.Paul, Minnesota.


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

is attached to this report a map showing the outline of Crane Lake and surrounding rivers and roads; also a second map showing in more detail the west shore of Crane Lake.

On Sunday, August 18, 1935, Agents observed two persons being landed at the boat landing at Chase's Camp, at which Agents were located, in a boat owned by Captain Thomas Brown, and being run by his son James Brown. These persons had evidently been visiting at the Brown cabin, and on departing had come to the Chase Camp lodge to secure their automobile, which is a 1931 model A Ford coupe. The license number and description of this automobile were furnished by telephone to Special Agent in Charge H.E.Andersen at St. Paul, and in turn the identities of the persons leaving the Brown cabin were checked.

During the rest of the time Agents observed the Brown cabin, nothing suspicious was noted. It was also noted that Captain Brown did not approach the Chase Camp landing except on August 31, 1935, at which time he and his son James transported a great deal of household goods by boat from their cabin to the Chase landing, and there unloaded same onto two trailers which were attached to the Plymouth automobiles owned by Captain Brown, which automobiles were parked at the Chase Camp.

On Sunday September 1, 1935, at about 7 A.M. Captain Brown accompanied by his wife, and son James, age about 18, and another young man age about 17, came to the Chase landing by boat, which had been secured from the Chase landing at the Brown cottage and left in the two Plymouth automobiles for St. Paul.

It had been ascertained from various employees at the Chase lodge that Captain Brown intended to finish his vacation on Sunday, September 1, 1935, and return to his home in St. Paul, Minnesota.

In order to ascertain whether it was possible for any person to approach Brown's cottage by any other means than water, agents approached Brown's cottage through the forest in back of the same, and found that it was impossible for any person to gain access to the Brown cottage by land. Agents also ascertained from the employees at the Chase Camp that there was no means of getting to the Brown cottage except by boat, and that Brown habitually parked his automobiles at the Chase Camp and went to his summer cottage by boat from the Chase landing.

As stated before, Agents did not observe any suspicious movements on the part of either of the occupants of Brown's cottages or upon the part of any other person although surveillance was made during the day and the night hours by boat from Crane Lake. It might be stated at this time also that Agents' identities were not revealed during any time of their stay at Crane Lake, the pretense of being there for the fishing season being maintained at all times. The surveillance was kept from 8-13-35 to 9-1-35.


In regard to the photostatic copies of the maps attached hereto, attention is called to map No. 2, which reveals the location of the Brown cottages. It will be noted that the cottage located on the north side of the bay is a small one about 12 ft. square and two stories high. During the course of the surveillance it was noted that no lights were shown in this particular cottage at any time either day or night. In regard to the cottage located immediately south of the cottage mentioned, which would be on the shore facing the lake, it is apparent that this cottage was the main residence of the Brown party, and signs of life were seen at this cottage at all times.

with reference to the cleared space shown in the forest back of the Brown cottage, it might be noted that inquiry revealed that a guide lived in a house located in the clearance and maintained a residence there at all times.

It is possible to proceed from Crane Lake to any number of lakes located both in the United States and Canada since Crane Lake proper is located only about four miles from the international boundary. Captain Brown may have left his summer cottage for the purpose of meeting persons at some other point either in Canada of somewhere in the United States by proceeding north out of Crane Lake into Sand Point Lake. From there it is possible to get to Lac La Croix. It was not observed, however, that any person from the Brown cottage proceeded on any fishing trip, but it was impossible to absolutely ascertain this fact. It might be noted also that both the Brown cottages are well built places and both of the boat landings are very well built; that he has two strong outboard motors which he uses on two well constructed small boats, and has besides about four well constructed row boats.

From discreet inquiry made at the Chase lodge, Agents ascertained that Captain Brown is well considered in the lake community and is known to be a police officer in St. Paul, but no information was obtained as a result of the inquiry of any improper actions on his part.



The writer immediately contacted Mr. J. J. KELLY, Assistant Special Agent in Charge of the Southern Pacific Railway, who, on August 26, 1935, advised that the shipment in question arrived that date at Los Angeles in S.P. Car No. 35035, and was housed in Shed A, freight house located at 1281 North Spring Street.

At the above address, the writer contacted Mr. F. HANSON in charge of Shed A, and Mr. E. J. KERBER in charge of the delivery office of the freight house, With the assistance of the two above named, the articles in question were located, one of which is an over-sized hat box, apparently made up specially for the owner. It appears to be of black composition material. The bag was sealed by means of a metal strap which was placed around the bag in the manner of a trunk strap, and sealed with solder. This article weighs approximately twenty-five pounds.

The other article, a trunk, steamer type, was locked and tied with numerous strands of clothesline. It bore a manufacturer's identifying plate of the Pacific luggage Company, San Francisco. On this trunk was a shipping sticker bearing the name of the Carter Hotel, Prospect Avenue, near East 9th, Cleveland, Ohio, bearing the name also of Mrs. A. J. BROWN, 3155 Broderick Street, San Francisco, care of C. V. LEE.

Messrs. HANSON and KERBER were furnished the telephone number of the Los Angeles Bureau office, and advised that if, in the event, the owner of the articles in question called for them, they would delay delivery of the articles to the individuals and call the Los Angeles office, so that the persons calling for the articles may be observed. If, in the event a trucking company calls for the articles, arrangements will be made whereby the address to which same are taken will be obtained.

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated September 11, 1935, Bureau File No. 7-576, directing me to consult the United States Attorney's Office at Saint Paul concerning the advisability of arranging to have Elmer/Farmer and Harold/Alderton, immates of the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, appear to testify before the Grand Jury when it convenes here on September 16, 1935.

Please be advised that I have conferred with United States Attorney George F. Sullivan who, in a letter to me dated September 11, 1935, asked whether Elmer Farmer would be a willing witness in this case. In Mr. Sullivan's communication, he requested that Special Agent J. R. Brennan be authorized to proceed to Leavenworth, Kansas, for interview with Farmer, in view of the friendly relationship existing between Agent Brennan and this convict. Mr. Sullivan, during our conference, stated that he felt that both Farmer and Alderton should be interviewed by Agent Brennan, as he now contemplates using them as witnesses before the Grand Jury, when their testimony will be recorded.

In accordance with the suggestion in your letter, I am transmitting to the Kansas City Office, with copy of this letter, recent photographs of William Weaver, with the request that these photographs be exhibited to Fermer and Alderton to determine whether they will identify the photographs as likenesses of a person they saw at the hideout in Bensenville, Illinois, and who was known to them as Theavy. The Kansas City Office is requested to expedite this matter and advise this office by telegram.

For the information of the Bureau, Defendant William Weaver sent word to me yesterday requesting an interview. I called to see him late yesterday afternoon, at which time he wanted to know what he could do to free Myrtle Eaton. Incidentally, Weaver claimed that Myrtle Eaton did not participate in any manner in the kidnaping, and that the only offense she is guilty of is having been with him. The United States Attorney has advised that he does not feel that he has sufficient evidence to convict Myrtle Eaton, and contemplates dismissing her indictment at a later date. Weaver stated that if some arrangement could be made whereby Myrtle Eaton would be dealt with lightly, or freed, he would consider pleading guilty. I informed him that this was out of the picture, as we had sufficient evidence to convict him and were not interested in any plea he might make.

After conversing with Weaver for some time, I pointed out that he had not endeavored in any way to help the Bureau, and that consequently he certainly could not expect favors from this office. I asked him why he did not consider furnishing information as to where Karpis and Campbell may be located. He replied that he doubted if he could find them without a great deal of trouble, even if he were on the street. After some verbal fencing, however, he admitted that through contacts known to him he felt that he could get in touch with them under ordinary conditions. He was asked why he did not furnish this information to the Government. He did not answer this question but intimated that he will give it consideration. At that time he stated that under no condition would he appear as a witness for the Government in this case.

Weaver was questioned about Charles Fitzgerald, and reiterated previous statements to the effect that his understanding was that "Old Charlie" had killed himself because of the injury to his leg. He amplified this statement by saying that he understood that tuberculosis of the bone developed in the gunshot wound in "Old Charlie's" leg, and that after fortifying himself with whiskey, "Old Charlie" blew out his brains as he was disgusted with life due to this injury. Weaver was asked if he knew where "Old Charlie" was buried and he replied that while he did not, Doc Barker could probably tell, if he would. While Weaver has not given any information of value to date, it is possible that he may at a later date, if interviewed from time to time.

With reference to the surveillance of Belle Born being maintained at Mankato, Minnesota, it may be noted that she will conduct an auction sale of her property on September 24, 1935. In the event "Old Charlie" is not dead, it appears quite likely that she may leave Mankato after that time. Every effort is being made to keep her under surveillance and to "tail" her should she leave Mankato. In the event she does not leave after this auction, advice is requested from the Bureau and Mr. Connelley as to whether it is desired to continue to maintain the surveillance in Mankato, or whether arrangements should be made to have her taken into custody for questioning. I feel that should the latter course be pursued after the auction it would be advisable to make arrangements to keep her for some time in order that she may be appropriately questioned concerning many phases of this case, and other cases the Bureau is interested in and regarding which she undoubtedly has valuable information.

The advice of the Bureau and Mr. Connelley in this matter will be appreciated.





They are also charged with misprisionment of felony and the National Firearms Act. The Jacksonville office has advised that this matter is expected to come up for trial during the month of October, 1935. Although Cassius MacDonald is under indictment in Jacksonville, Florida, it is believed that a more successful prosecution may be had against him in St. Paul, Minnesota, where he will again be indicted with Harry Sawyer, William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton. For this reason it is not definitely known whether he will be brought to trial in Florida, but it is definitely understood that he will be the subject of a new indictment in St. Paul, on or about September 16, 1935. HARRY SAWYER: CASSIUS MacDONALD; WILLIAM WEAVER; MYRTLE EATON These persons are to be the subjects of new indictments to be returned at St. Paul, Minnesota on or about September 16, 1935. Although this party is under indictment in Florida on the charge of conspiring to harbor Alvin Karpis and misprisionment of felony, the Department does not contemplate any prosecution, in view of the lack of evidence against this party. On August 31, 1935, Special Agents A, B, C, D and E proceeded to Jacksonville, Florida, arriving at that point at 2:50 P. M. Agents A, B and F immediately proceeded to Daytona Beach, Florida, and thence to a point approximately two miles south of Allandale. Florida, where they observed the home of William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton. Weaver and Myrtle Eaton had been operating a small chicken ranch at this residence. There was located in the garage a light blue or gray Oldsmobile sedan. Agents A and B then proceeded to Gill's saloon on Atlantic Avenue, Daytona Beach, Florida, and at about 11 o'clock P. M., on August 31, 1935, at said saloon, they observed a woman and a child, the woman being identical with Myrtle Eaton. Myrtle Eaton was accompanied by a man who at that time was believed undoubtedly to be William Weaver, though he had grown much heavier since this Bureau had obtained its latest personal description of him. These persons entered a light blue Oldsmobile seden, identical to the one which had been seen in the garage at the Weaver-Eaton home. Weaver and Myrtle Eaton then proceeded to the home which had heretofore been located.

On the morning of September 1, 1935, at 4 o'clock, Special Agents A to Q, inclusive, under the direction of Special Agent A, surrounded the home occupied by Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, and made appropriate arrangements to prevent any escape therefrom.

At 7 o'clock A. M., on September 1, 1935, William Weaver emerged from the front door of his home and proceeded to the road, a distance of about thirty feet, to get his morning newspaper. At this time he was taken into custody by Special Agents A end C, who were supported in this apprehension by the above mentioned Agents. Immediately thereafter, Special Agents D, E and H, together with Special Agent A, proceeded into the house, taking Myrtle Eaton into custody.

Both William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton readily admitted their identity. It was ascertained that these persons had been living in said house since the fall of 1934, using the name of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Osborne.

There was recovered from a purse and dresser drawers \$1,002.32, which was claimed by Weaver and Myrtle Eaton. A comparison of the serial numbers on this money with the serial numbers on the Bremer ransom money failed to disclose that any of it was the Bremer ransom money.

The following weapons were located in the Weaver-Eaton home:

One .22 calibre Colt automatic "Woodsman" pistol.

Two .380 calibre Colt automatic pistols.

One Winchester repeating .410 gauge shotgum.

One .45 calibre United States Army 1917 Colt revolver.

One .12 gauge Remington automatic shotgun.

One .45 calibre Colt automatic pistol, "U. S. property - U. S. Army", model 1911.

There were also found a quantity of ammunition for the above mentioned guns, a small black leather blackjack and a .45 calibre extension clip trade-marked "Multi-Shot".

Weaver indicated that the house in question had been purchased in November 1934, by Myrtle Eaton, under the name of Jane Osborne, for \$1,600.00. Weaver admitted further that the Oldsmobile sedan was purchased in Johnson City, Tennessee, in the name of Jane Osborne.

On September 2, 1935, at 7:30 A. M., Special Agents A, B, C, D and E, accompanied by a matron, left Jacksonville, Florida, by airplane, arriving in St. Paul, Minnesota, at 4:40 P. M., on the same date. William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton had signed waivers of removal prior to their departure.

On September 3, 1935, Weaver and Myrtle Eaton were taken before the Clerk of the United States District Court at St. Paul, Minnesota, and their bonds were fixed at \$100,000.00 and \$15,000.00, respectively. In the absence of Federal District Judge Joyce, Weaver and Myrtle Eaton have not been arraigned.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TAM

Re: Bremer Case.

On September 3, 1935, Mr. George A. Tomeraasen, 359 Aberdeen Street, Dayton, Ohio, upon being referred from your office, advised that he was formerly employed with the Bureau of Fisheries, and later with the Isaac Walton League, and is presently seeking a job with another Governmental agency. He said that a few days prior to the time Alvin Karpis was reported as being in Atlantic City, New Jersey, he saw Karpis in Miami, Florida. Mr. Tomeraasen said that about 8:00 P.M., he observed Karpis, who he identified from having seen the Identification Order in the Post Office, standing across the street from the McAlester Hotel in front of the American Railway Express Office. A moment later, Karpis was joined by another man, who he described as being clean cut, reserved, about five feet 10 inches in height, 35 years of age, light hair, fair complexion, and well dressed in a brown serge suit. These two men walked up Flagler Street to the Tamiama (phonetic) Bar. Mr. Tomeraasen followed them as far as the corners of Flagler and Miami Streets, and observed that Karpis was very nervous, constantly looking around, and that both men were carrying shoulder and hip holsters with guns, which he observed by the bulge of their coats. At the corners of Miami and Flagler Streets, he notified a traffic policeman, who, in turn, called two plain clothes policemen from a cigar store. Mr. Tomeraasen then left the scene and did not observe what actions were taken by the police, nor what the results of such actions were.

He said, however, that he noticed an automobile with Illinois license plates, in which some people were sitting, including a man and his wife and apparently some children; that these people seemed to recognize Karpis and his companion, and were staring at them as though they were frightened. He further said he heard the people in this automobile mention the name Campbell, but he did not talk with the people. Karpis at this time, according to Mr. Tomeraasen, was attired in a brown ensemble similar to that worn by the other man, including a square cut brown coat and brown hat.

Mr. Tomerassen further said that in May of 1935, the date of which he fixed from the calendar as being May 18, he was in Chicago, Illinois, having accompanied a friend there from Baytol Ohio, who was attending a conservation meeting of the Isaac Walton League at the

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Merchandise Mart. About 4:30 P.M., he was standing in front of the Sherman Hotel in Chicago with DeWitt Heffron, 14-year-old son of DeWitt Heffron, the Ford dealer at Dayton, Ohio. At this time, he saw Karpis and the companion who was with him at Miami come out of the Sherman Hotel and enter a Packerd Sedan which drove up at that moment. This automobile had no license plates, but was believed by Mr. Tomeraasen to have been a 12-cylinder Packard, 1934 Model, Five-Passenger Sedan, faded green in color. A small man was driving the car, described as being about 25 years of age, five feet six inches in height, dark hair, white face, and whose eyes looked large. This man was in shirt sleeves, and climbed out of the driver's seat and into the rear seat, while Karpis and his companion entered the front seat. At this time, Karpis was dressed in dark clothes with dark hat and top coat of the raglan type. He took off the top coat as he got into the automobile. He was carrying a large black kit bag which was about 25 inches in length and 18 inches in height, and which had two straps sewed into its sides. The automobile drove away, and he, Tomeraasen, did not report the matter for the reason that he did not know how to locate an interested agency, and was for the moment confused.

Mr. Tomeraasen was shown the photographs of Karpis, Campbell, Moran, Weaver and Harrison, and while he could not identify Karpis' companion, he observed that this man resembled somewhat the photograph of Campbell, except that the jaw was not as square as that revealed by the photograph of Campbell.

Mr. Tomerassen was questioned considerably as to how he was able to identify Karpis, and explained that in his duties with the Bureau of Fisheries and the Isaac Walton League, he became well acquainted with Detective Bruce of the Colorado Springs Police Department, who is noted for his photographic eyes, and as a result, he had practiced the observing of people in photographs so that he was able to identify Karpis from having seen his picture on the Identification Order in the Post Office.

There appear to be no leads of immediate value resulting from this interview, and accordingly the information is being submitted in this form.

M., September 9, 1935, and stated that during May of 1934, the exact date he does not recall, he was in the "Little Ritz Night Club" in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and was introduced to a party that he is sure since seeing pictures of Alvin Karpis was Karpis.

Kenneson, before being shown a photograph of Karpis, gave a good description of him, and atates that he did not connect Karpis with the party he met in the night club in Philadelphia until he saw a picture of Karpis a few days ago.

Renneson was unable to give the street address of the "Little Ritz Night Club" in Philadelphia or the name of the party that introduced him to the party that he now believes was Karpis.

Kenneson, who is a young chap about 20 years of age, advised me he expects to return to his home in Lancaster, Pennsylvania in the next few days, and that it is possible he can find out just who it was that introduced him to the party he now thinks was Karpis.

Deer Sir:

In interviews had with Volney Davie prior to the last few weeks, he has been questioned concerning his activities irradiately subsequent to his escape at Yorkville. Illineis, on the night of February 6, 1935. On the occasions on which he was interviewed be expressed his disinclination to make any statements concerning this patter. However, inamuch as he has provided valuable information since the above interviews concerning the activities of other markers of the Karpis Barker gang, it is suggested that he again be interviewed intensively concerning his activities immediately subsequent to his escape at Yorkville.

An effort should be made to escertain in chronological order the persons he saw and conversed with, places he visited during the evening of February 6, 1935, and the two following days, February 7 and 8, for the purpose of disproving any statement that Eatthew Cleason, against whom prosecutive action for herbering Davis is still pending, may make to the effect that he did not know Volney Davis was a fugitive on a Federal charge at the time that Davis contacted him at Aurora on the evening of February 6th and the day following. In this connection your attention is directed to the statements made by Natthew Cleason and other witnesses as contained on pages 30 to 48 inclusive in the report of Special Agent K. R. McIntire dated February 26, 1935.

Davis should likewise be questioned further concerning statements made by him after his arrest by Bureau Agents at Chicago, at Illinois on June 1, 1935, with regard to the automobile in his possession at the time of his arrest. Davis at that time stated that he obtained this ear through Tony Mareno. In this regard your attention is directed to pages 19 to 22 inclusive in the report of Special Agent

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R. C. Suran, Chicago, Illinois dated June 10, 1935 setting out in detail the statement made by Davis concerning the menner in which he obtained possession of the above mentioned car. It is noted that Davis upon later interviews denied that he obtained this car from Farenc. It is believed that he may possibly be attempting to cover up Marenc. I am attaching hereto a photograph of Mike Marenc, who is believed to be identical with Yony Marenc mentioned by Davis. It is auggested in the interview to be had with him that this photograph be shown to Davis for the purpose of identification. Davis should be questioned thoroughly as to the menner in which he obtained possession of the above mentioned car.

It is noted that your office has copies of both of the above mentioned reports.

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there, which is described as a tan house; that on August 21, 1935; the Doctor related, three men came to his office, which is a one-story wooden structure situated on the main road, in a large new automobile stating that a friend of his had informed them that he was well acquainted? with the Greek fishermen at Tarpon Springs and Cedar Key, Florida; and that they desired that he go with them to charter one of the fishing vessels for a few days' pleasure trip. Doctor Dyess related that in approximately 1921 he administered medical aid to the Greek fishermen ... located at these two points and was well acquainted with many of them, and stated that it was his belief that many of them would do anything for money. Identification orders of various wanted bank robbers and kidnapers were displayed to Doctor Dyess and, in his ebriated condition, he identified the photograph of Avery Simmons as the man with whom he had talked. He further stated that the second man, who was named or called Hamilton, represented himself to be a Department of Justice Agent but when requested to furnish his credentials stated that he had left them at his hotel: Doctor Dyess stated that he could not identify or give description of the third man who remained in the rear of the automobile, as it was quite dark.

The descriptions of Mrs. Densel Woodley and of Hamilton, as given by Doctor Dyess, are as follows:

Constable Ed Butler was next contacted and, when questioned concerning Doctor Dyess, stated that the Doctor had been intoxicated for a period of approximately six weeks and it was his belief that had anyone offered him any amount of money, no matter what their mission, he would have assisted them. However, Constable Butler, through an informant, ascertained Mrs. Densel Woodley's name for the writer and stated that her brother, Percy Halveston, is a rather "tough customer" about Clewiston and is known to have been a rum runner and was recently released from a state penitentiary, name unknown

Justice of the Peace Small, who has rendered this Agent assistance prior to this interview, stated that in his opinion no credence or credulity should be placed in any statements of Doctor Dyess because of his ebriation.

It is to be noted that substantially the same information as given herein by Doctor Dyess has been covered in a letter dated February 23, 1935, from the Jacksonville office to the Bureau in the same subject matter.

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lead Toller, stated that on the afternoon of September 10, 1935, he received the deposit of Fenner and Beane, a local brokerage firm, which contained five one thousand dollar bills; that i mmediately upon receiving the deposit he checked the bills and found that only one bore the serial number heretofore mentioned. Mr. Lowe stated that he then called Fenner and Beane and requested information concerning the source of the thousand dollar bills contained in their deposit. He stated that he was informed that Fenner and Beane had received the thousand dollar bills from one Kingman Moore, a customer and former manager of that company. Mr. Lowe exhibited the bill in question to Agent and it was determined that the bill is of the issue of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, bearing serial number F-00022487-A.

THE PROPERTY OF THE PARTY OF Vernon Badham, Manager for Fenner and Beane, 120 Shoreland Arcade, stated that he recalls that Kingman Moore had paid something in excess of \$5,000.00 on his account on or about September 9, 1935 and that the money was deposited to the account of Fenner and Beane with the First National Bank of Miami on September 10, 1935. Mr. Badham stated that he has no knowledge of the source from which Mr. Moore obtained the bill in question. However, he stated that he has known Moore for several a seek years; that Moore was, until about May 1, 1935, Manager for Fenner and Beane at Miami, for two or three years; that he is wealthy in his own right; of highest character and not the type to be involved in shady it transactions. Mr. Badham stated that Moore has meintained a home in Coral Gables for the past several years and that he was assured Moore would cooperate fully in tracing out the source of the money The second second


State of the Kingman Moore, 1113 Castile Avenue, Coral Gables, when interviewed stated that on or about April 24, 1935, he drew a check against the account of Fenner and Beane, payable to himself, in the amount of approximately \$7,000.00; that he personally cashed the check at the First National Bank and placed the money in his safety deposit box at that bank. By referring to the records of Fenner and Beane, it was definitely deter-s mined that Moore withdrew from the account of that company on April 24, 1935, by check, the amount of \$7,200.58. The records further disclosed that on or about July 12, 1935, Moore gave to Fenner and Beane \$2,100.00 in each to cover stock transactions, and again on September 9, 1935, Moore gave to Fenner and Beane \$5,100.00 in cash for the same purpose. Mr. Moore stated that on both occasions he obtained the money from his safety deposit box at the First National Bank and that the money comprised the cash he had received from the First National Bank on April 24, 1935, as above noted. Mr. Moore stated that it is his practice frequently to withdraw money from his checking account at the First National Bank and to place it in his safety deposit box. Mr. Moore was very frank in his statements and expressed his willingness to cooperate in any manner possible:

Upon receipt of the information from Mr. Moore, contact was again had with officials of the First National Bank. Mr. Lowe, above mentioned, the Head Teller, stated that he did not hold that position in April, 1935, and that he therefore, knows nothing concerning the receipt of the thousand dollar bill in question. He stated that Mr. Milton Campbell, above mentioned, was the Head Teller during that time. Mr. Compbell could offer no information concerning the manner in which the First National Bank came into possession of the bill in question. He stated that prior to the receipt of the letter from the Jacksonville Office dated June 24, 1935, requesting cooperation in an effort to identify outstanding ransom bills mentioned therein, the bank made no scrutiny of thousand dollar bills other than to determine their genuineness. Therefore, no check was made of the thousand dollar bills given to Mr. Moore on April 24, 1935, and it was impossible to determine the source from which the First National Bank had obtained them. In order to verify Mr. Moore's claim, at Agent's request, Mr. Campbell checked the account of Fenner and Bene and advised that a withdrawal had been made on April 24, 1935, in 🔆 the amount of \$7,200.58, which it appears, is the amount withdrawn by 🖓 Moore and which likewise is substantiated by the records of Fenner and Beane.

Mr. Compbell stated that he personally is acquainted with Kingman Moore; that he is a reputable citizen end a reliable depositor with the First National Bank.

The thousand dollar bill in question is being held by the First National Bank of Miami pending receipt of instruction as to its disposition.

HEMORANDUM

The parents of Alvin Karpis are Kr. and Mrs. John Karpsvics, who are Lithuanians, having been born in Russia. They migrated to this country, first living in New York, thence moving to Grand Rapids, Michigan, thence to Montreal, Canada, where they remained for two years. During this period Alvin Karpis was born in Eontreal in November, 1909. When Alvin Karpis was two years of age, his family moved to Topeka, Kansas. In 1923 Alvin moved to Chicago, Illinois, with his family, where he worked in various bakeries. Examination by a physician disclosed that Alvin had leakage of the heart and he was advised to take an extended vacation.

Monroe Street, Topeks, Kansas. While here he became involved in a burglary and was sentenced to serve ten years in the Kansas State Industrial Reformatory at Hutchinson, Kansas. He escaped from this institution on March 9, 1929. He rejoined his parents in Chicago. The parents, while appearing to be substantial citizens, refrained from notifying Kansas state authorities of the location of Alvin Karpis. While with his parents on this occasion, Karpis secured employment with a concern that sold medical equipment.

While an escape and while living with his parents, Karpis was joined by Lawrence De Vol, who is now serving a life sentence in the Minnesota State Penitentiary, Stillwater, Minnesota, charged with participating in the robbery of the Third Korthwestern National Bank at Minneapolis, Minnesota, in which two officers and a civilian were killed. Karpis and De Volthen "drifted" to Kansas City, Missouri, where Karpis was apprehended as Raymond Hadley by the Kansas City, Missouri, Police Department on March 23, 1930, on the charge of auto larceny and safe blowing. On March 25, 1930, Karpis was returned to the Reformatory at Hutchinson. He was transferred to the Kansas State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas, on May 19, 1930, to serve the balance of his sentence on the charge of burglary, second degree.

While in the Kansas State Penitentiary, Karpis becase closely associated with Fred Barker, who was serving a sentence of from five to ten years on the charge of burglary and larceny. Karpis and Fred Barker also became friendly with Jess Doyle, who was likewise serving in the Kansas State Penitentiary at this time.

Fred Barker was released from the Kensas State Penitentiary on Harch 30, 1931, and Kerpis was released on May 31, 1931. Karpis and Fred Barker then joined Kate "Ha" Barker at the home of Herbert A. Farmer at Joplin, Hissouri. Farmer has been sentenced to serve a two year sentence for conspiracy

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to obstruct justice in connection with the Kanmo Case. It was at Herbert Farmer's home that Karpis learned to know such notorious characters as Frank Nash, Vernon C. Miller, Francis Keating, Thomas Holden, Harvey Bailey, Charles Harmon and others.

On June 10, 1931, Karpis was arrested at Tulsa, Oklahoma, and was delivered to the Police Department at Okmulges, Oklahoma. On September 10, 1931, he was sentenced to serve four years in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary on a charge of burglary. On the same date the court paroled him.

On December 18, 1931, Karpis and Fred Barker robbed a store at West Plains, Missouri, and on December 19, 1931, as they were being approached by Sheriff C. R. Kelley of West Plains for questioning concerning this robbery, Karpis shot and killed the Sheriff. Fred Barker and Karpis then fled, leaving their car at a home occupied by William Weaver at Thayer, Missouri. Weaver, Fred Barker and Karpis thereupon fled to St. Paul, Minnesota, where they lived with Kate "Ka" Barker and her paramour, A. W. Dunlop. At this time Karpis became acquainted with Harry Sawyer and Jack Pfeiffer. At Jack Pfeiffer's place Karpis learned to know Fred Goetz, slias "Ehotgun" Zeigler.

On April 25, 1932, Karpis, Fred Barker, Kate Barker and A. W. Dunlop escaped from a police trap in St. Paul. On the following morning the nude and bullet-ridden body of A. W. Dunlop was found on the shores of Lake Frensted near Webster, Fisconsin. A blood-stained woman's glove was found near the body. Although there is no proof, it is popularly believed that Dunlop was murdered by Kate and Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis, in the feeling that he had "tipped off" members of the gang to the St. Paul Police.

where they took residence in the fushionable Country Club Plaza district. Here they gathered together a group of nationally known gangsters which, on June 17, 1932, robbed the Fort Scott, Kansas, bank. The following persons participated:

On July 7, 1932, Keating, Holden and Bailey were arrested by Bureau Agents and Kansas City, Kansas, and Kansas City, Missouri, peace officers on the Old Mission Golf Course. Karpis, Fred Barker and Kate Barker immediately departed from their Kansas City apartment, proceeding to St. Paul, Minnesota. They took quarters on White Bear Lake, a well known summer resort. Here they

were joined by Helen Ferguson and her paramour, Earl Christman, who later died of wounds received in the robbery of the Fairbury National Bank, Fairbury, Mcbraska.

After the release of Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis from the Kansas State Penitentiary, they hired Jack Glynn, a private detective and former Chief of Police of Leavenworth, Kansas, to secure the release of Doc Barker and Volney Davis, who had been sentenced to life imprisonment in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary on the charge of murder. Doc Barker was released on a conditional pardon on September 10, 1932. On November 3, 1932, the release of Volney Davis was effected in the same manner. Doc Barker and Davis immediately joined the others at St. Paul, Kinnesota.

On December 16, 1932, the following persons participated in the robbery of the Third Northwestern National Bank in Minneapolis, Minnesota:

In this robbery two officers and one civilian were killed. Larry De Volwas arrested, whereupon the gang fled to Reno, Nevada, where members of the Karpis-Barker crowd had contact with William J. Graham and James C. McKay. You will recall that Graham and McKay have been considered the contacts for members of the Dillinger gang also.

This gang returned to St. Paul, Minnesota, during February, 1933. On March 4, 1933, their presence was reported by the manager of their apartment, but before a police raid could be staged, Gladys Sawyer had warned Jess Doyle, Karpis and Fred Barker. The gang then met at Harry Sawyer's saloon and departed for Chicago, Illinois.

Using Chicago as a headquarters, the gang planned and executed the robbery of the Fairbury National Bank at Fairbury, Mebraska, on April &, 1933, the following persons participatings

Christmen was wounded in this robbery and later died at the home of Ternon C. Miller at 6612 Edgevale Road, Kansas City, Missouri.

After this robbery Karpis and the gang frequented the road house of Louis Cernocky at Fox River Grove, Illinois, a rendezvous equally sinister to that provided by Harry Sawyer in St. Paul. On June 15, 1933, Karpis and his gang kidnaped William Hamm, Jr., releasing him on June 19, 1933, after the payment of a ransom of \$100,000. Our best information is to the effect that the Hamm abduction was effected by:

It has been intimated that this ransom money was disposed of through the gambling houses of Graham and Lakey in Reno, Mewada.

On August 30, 1933, the Stockyards Mational Bank of South St. Paul, Minnesota, was robbed, in which robbery two police officers were shot. Bessie Green has advised that this "job" was "pulled" by Karpis, the Barkers, and her husband, Eddie Green. It will be recalled that C. J. Fitzgerald is alleged to have been shot in this robbery; that the machine gun taken from Doc Barker in Chicago, Illinois, on January 8, 1935, was identified as having been stolen from Officer Yoeman during this robbery, and that the "getaway" chart for this robbery was found in the apartment of Fred Barker in Cleveland, Ohio, during September, 1934.

During December, 1933, plans were formulated in the spartment of William Reaver and Myrtle Faton at 565 Portland Avenue, St. Paul, for the abduction of Brener. Harry Suwyer fingered Brener for the crowd. Brener was kidnaped at about 8:45 A.M. on January 17, 1934, at the intersection of Lexington and Goodrich Avenues in St. Paul. Two automobiles were used and Byron Bolton reports that the following persons were active participants:

Fred Barker
Alvin Kerpis
Doc Barker
Harry Campbell
William Weaver

According to statements made by Karpis and Campbell to Elmer Farmer, Karpis and Campbell are the actual abductors who entered Bremer's car and beat him over the head. Bremer was held in the Bensenville, Illinois, hide-out until February 7, 1934, when he was released at Rochester, Minnesota. Karpis actually drove Bremer to the hide-out, acted as a guard during Bremer's confinement, purchased flashlights and batteries at the Grand Silver Store in St. Paul, and returned Bremer to Bochester.

Thereafter Karpis and the gang moved to Toledo, Cleveland, and Sandusky, Ohio, where they spent the summer of 1934. Karpis was accompanied by his paramour, Dolores Delaney.

On September 7, 1934, Gladys Sawyer, Paula Harmon and Wynona Burdette were arrested in Cleveland, Ohio. Thereupon Karpis and the gang fled to Florida, where much time was spent in Miami and Havana, Cuba. Immediately upon hearing of the shooting episode at Oklawaha, Florida, where Kate and Fred Barker were killed by Agents while resisting arrest, Karpis, Campbell, Dolores Delaney and Wynona Burdette fled to the Danmoor Hotel in Atlantic City, New Jersey, where they were routed by Atlantic City Police officers on January 20, 1935, effecting their escape in a stolen car after a gum battle. Karpis and Campbell abandoned the stolen car on the following morning near Quakerstown, Pennsylvania, where they commandeered the car of Dr. H. H. Hunsicker, forcing Hunsicker to accompany them over country roads until they reached Guilford Center, Ohio, at about 9:30 P.M. They bound Dr. Hunsicker hand and foot, leaving him in a building nearby. The car of Dr. Hunsicker was found abandoned with the motor running on the morning of January 22, 1935, about fourteen miles north of Toledo, Ohio.

On January 22, 1935, Karpis was indicted at St. Paul, Minnesota, charged in one indictment with the substantive offense of kidnaping and in the second indictment with conspiracy to kidnap.
