

Pursuant to telephonic instructions received from Special Agent in Charge Werner Hanni on February 12, 1934, Special Agent C. C. Dewey

and at about 8:30 p.m. that date, a tap was placed on the following telephones of Mr. Vernon Lynch, an attorney of Des Moines, Ia.:

> Telephone No. 3-3271 Office of Vernon Lynch, 601 Des Moines Building, Des Moines, Iowa.

Telephone No. 5-0425, Residence of Vernon Lynch, Apartment 9, 3927 Ingersoll Avenue, Des hoines, Iowa.

Information of the above mentioned tap was furnished to Mr. H. H. Clegg of the Division during my telephonic conversation with him on February 15, 1934, the information also having been furnished prior thereto by me to Assistent Director H. Nathan at St. Paul. RECORDED

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Further telephonic conversation was had with Mr. Clegg of the Division by me relative to the period this tap should be maintained, and on February 19, 1934, a telegram was received from the Division of that date indicating that the tap should be maintained under the present arrangements for a week.



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During my conversation with Mr. Clegg, I further advised that Special Agent L. D. Nichols, who was at Des Moines, had told me that he understood Vernon Lynch might leave for Washington, D.C., this coming Thursday, February 22, 1934; Agent Nichols has been instructed to obtain further information concerning the contemplated departure of Mr. Lynch and to keep this office advised.

Mr. Clegg requested that in the event Lynch departs from Des Moines, Iowa, he be shadowed by Agents of this Division, and these instructions will be followed closely.

For the Division's information, Special Agent Dewey has advised that Vernon Lynch is a lawyer associated in practice with William(Newt)Lynch, a relative, at the office address given above. Ralph Lynch resides at Apartment 6, #3612 Ingersoll Avenue, Des Moines, Iowa, Telephone Number 5-7142.

Agent Dewey advised that Vernon Lynch is believed to be a graduate of Georgetown University, Washington, D.C., and represents most of the hig brewing companies in Iowa. He is reputed to have a close contact with the Underworld and has defended many bootleggers in court. It is alleged that he made considerable money practicing law; he is a flashy dresser; was recently married; was recently sued for failure to remit a collection he made for a client. He is not regarded in Des Moines as a reputable lawyer.

Special Agent Dewey has been advised to follow the telephone tap on Mr. Lynch's telephones very closely and to submit information regularly concerning the results of the tap, and, in event any information of apparent importance is received from the tap, he, Dewey, has been instructed to communicate the same immediately direct to the St. Paul office. Mr. Nathan has been advised of these arrangements, during telephone conversation with him.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. CLEGG

Reference is made to Mr. Larson's letter dated February 9, 1934, particularly to the third paragraph on page one, wherein it is noted that Kathryn Kelly states that she and her husband have known LaRue (Edward Doll, Identification Order #1214), for a number of years; that he had visited them in Texas on several occasions; that she and Kelly spent a good deal of the time with him in and around Chicago and St. Paul; that between two and three years ago George Kelly left her in Texas and proceeded to Chicago, ostensibly for the rumpose of engaging in some gambling enterprises; that he was gone for a considerable time when she received a communication from him instructing her to proceed to Kenses City, Missouri, and upon her errivel in Kansas City she was met at the station by Kelly and LaRue, and all three proceeded to the Phillips Hotel, which is near the Muchlebach Hotel, where she and George Kelly registered as P. G. Shannon and wife, and she recalls that LaRue registered as L. F. Lang, or Fern. Kathryn Kelly further described how George Kelly and LaRue

Corroborative of the above information, attention is invited to the Kenses City letter dated September 13, 1933, addressed to the Chicago Office, in the Kenmo Case, wherein it is noted that investigation conducted at Kansas City disclosed that an individual using the name "L. F. Lang", registered at the Stats Hotel, Kansas City, between the dates Mey 13, to 17, 1933. During the time of his stay at this hotel, he telephoned the local number, Harrison 6995, which developed to be a house of prostitution operated by Mrs. Mamie Hightover, alias Memie/Goss. The Kensas City letter points out that irs. Hightorer is an unreliable character, but she, however, after several interviews, finally identified the telephone call as being for one of the prostitutes at her house named Maxine Miller, whose that she has never seen the party who true name is called Maxine, out that she understood that Maxine met this individual some time on or about April 15, 1933, when he was stopping at the Muchlebech Hotel, under some unknown alias; that Maxine later met him and spent the night with him at the Stats Hotel, at which time he refused to give her any money; that thereafter Maxine procee

kichaped a Mr. colverton, a wealthy manufacturer of South Bend, Indiana. (A letter from the Chicago Office, dated February 10th, sets forth that this kidnaping took place during February, 1932.)

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The Kansas City letter further reflects an interview with Mrs: Emma Hitchings, 1629 Central Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, which is the same building occupied by Mrs. Hightower.

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Mrs. Hitchings stated that she has known Maxine Miller for some time; that Maxine is a close friend of William Weisman (one of the suspects in the Kanmo case, who is closely associated with the criminal underworld of St. Paul, Minnesota); that Maxine informed her, Mrs. Hitchings, that she is well acqueinted with Louis Stacci, and that she formerly stayed at the O-P Inn in Chicago. Mrs. Hitchings further explained, during the interview with her, that the reasons for Maxine's hurried departure from Kensas City, was that she had "rolled" a mon at the Phillips Hotel in Kansas City for the sum of {150 and that the victim of her dishonesty was a very close friend of John Lazia, a noted gangster politician of Kensas City. Mrs. Hitchings also furnished information which indicated that the man from whom Maxine stole the money is the same man with whom she had been in telephone communication while he was registered Et the Stats Hotel. This is indicated by the fact that Mrs. Hightower, above referred to, mentioned that the man with whom fixine essociated had won {400 at a gambling establishment operated by Freddie Stross, at Kensas City, and that Mrs. Hitchings had also made reference to the same fact. Mrs. Hitchings further stated that Maxime is a very dangerous and treacherous woman, and that her entire game is that of "rolling" the men with whom she associates, but that she is well entrenched in the underworld gang in Chicago, with which Stacci is associated. Her home is in Dubuque, Iowa.

Mrs. Hitchings further stated that Maxine Miller told her that shortly after the murders committed at the Union Railway Station, at Kansas City Villiam Teisman informed her before he left Kansas City that John Lazia and his gang had a part in the actual shooting. Mrs. Hitchings identified a photograph of Veisman which was exhibited to her, and stated she personally saw Weisman, together with three or four other men, in the apartment of Mrs. Hightower on the day which she recalls to have been June 16, 1933 (the day before the Kansas City shooting), but could not identify other photographs exhibited to her as being likenesses of other men in company with Weisman, and stated that she did not notice them as closely as she did Weisman. She stated, however, that Mrs. Hightower handles liquor and that the men in company with Weisman were purchasing liquor from her on the occasion when the saw them.

The Kansas City letter also contains this paragraph:

"The situation in Kanses City is somewhat delicate politically, due to police connections with the John Lazis faction, and, therefore, very discreet action is being taken with reference to identification of the man at the Phillips Hotel who was presumably robbed by Maxine Miller."

The Kansas City letter also lists a number of long distance telephone calls made from the apartment of Mrs. Hightower which should be given careful consideration.

With reference to the letter from the Kansas City Office deted February 7, 1934, outlining the investigation to be made in connection with the Kansas City Massacre case, under section one, it is noted that attention is being given to the "Curly" angle. Briefly, an individual identified as "Curly" was seen to leave Chicago the day before the Kansas City shooting, according to information obtained by the Chicago Office from a confidential informant named

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Three days after the Kansas City shooting, Dr. Farr, accompanied Sheriff Tom Bash to the Kansas City Office, and related how an underworld character, whom he had known during the past fifteen years solely by the name of "Curly" had approached him in Cas Welch's place on 15th Street, between Troost and Forest Avenues, and asked him if he wanted to make some ready cash, and upon being told that he was agreeable to the proposition "Curly" stated some gangster in the city had been wounded. Dr. Farr agreed to meet "Curly" later in Cas Velch's place, but in the meantime reported the matter to Sheriff Bash and in turn to the Kansas City Office, where it was arranged that Dr. Farr should meet "Curly" and render the medical

sid desired and then to immediately advise Sheriff Bash where he went and to whom he had rendered sid.

Dr. Farr met "Curly" in accordance with the appointment had with him and was advised that the plans had been changed; that the wounded man was being taken to Seminole, Oklahoma, the following morning (January 21, 1933), where a negro doctor would take care of him temporarily, and that they would return him to Kansas City the following morning or Tuesday, in the event serious complications set in. "Curly" advised Dr. Farr that he could be reached over telephone Victor 6550, where he should simply ask for "Curly". This appears to be the Schuyler Hotel.

A letter from the Oklahome City Office, dated June 29, 1933, addressed to the Kenses City Office, reflects that a letter dated June 21, 1933, was received from the Sheriff's Office at Chickasha, Oklahoma, containing information concerning a Cadillac Sedan, driven by an individual giving the name of VLindsay", of Kansas City, Missouri, who was referred to as a racketeer. It does not appear that investigation was made of this matter, although the Sheriff in his letter indicated suspicious circumstances concerning this car and its occupants. The letter from the Oklahoma City Office, dated January 13, 1994, addressed to the Kansas City Office, reflects that investigation at Chickasha, Oklahoma, discloses that a green Cadillac Sedan, bearing Missouri tag numbers 313-398, and its occupants, had been in the vicinity of Chickasha, Oklahoma, from June 15 to June 25, 1933, as nearly as can be established by witnesses interviewed. Deputy Sheriff Al Marlow et Chickasha, places the date as June 14, 1933, when he was called to a residence two miles south of Chickesha to investigate a drunken driving charge, it being alleged that the operator of the above described sedan was driving the car in a reqkless manner. The car was driven to the residence of a Mrs. Belle Downey, and when the Sheriff errived, the sedan was parked in front of the house. The owner of the car gave his name as George Lindsey, Jr.

Mrs. Downey was interviewed by Special Agent T. M. Birch, whom he describes as being a very flashy woman, very indiscreet in her conversation, and under the influence of intoxicating liquors at the time she was interviewed. Mrs. Downey stated that Lindsey had married the daughter of her husband by a previous marriage, and that she had no use for the Lindsey family because of their underworld connections, and that she would certainly like "to see the law get them." Mrs. Downey places the date as June 15, 1933, when Lindsey

and his associates arrived at Chickasha, and stated that they had been on a drinking party. She also described the sedan as containing a recess back of the rear seat wherein two machine-guns, and a various assortment of pistols and ammunition were kept; that the drinking party at her house lasted until the night of June 16th, when George Lindsey received a telegram from Kansas City, and upon receiving this telegram he made several long distance calls from the McFarland Hotel, in Chickasha to Kansas City. Immediately upon making these telephone calls, George Lindsey announced that he and his two associates were going to Fort Worth and Dallas, departing about 8:00 o'clock; that Lindsey and his associates returned to Chickasha on the morning of June 13, 1933, between 12:00 and 2:00 o'clock; that they slept all day and night; that during their stay they requested a negro boy, who lives near her, to go to Chickasha and obtain all the papers, and their conversation seemed to center around the Kansas City Massacre.

Mrs. Downey's statement is corroborated by a mechanic at Chickasha named Bob Bostwick, or Boston, in that he states that the Cadillac Sedan, driven by Lindsey, was equipped with puncture proof tires, shatterproof glass throughout, and made the statement to Special Agent Birch that "no damn machine-gun could ever have hurt anybody in that car".

An unsuccessful check was made of the telephone calls emanating from the McFarland Hotel on the night of June 17th. The Oklahoma City letter simply sets this information forth for what it is worth. It appears from this letter that considerable additional investigation should be conducted at Chickasha, relative to the above facts.

Returning to the corroboration of the statement made by Kathryn Kelly to Special Agent in Charge Larson, reference is made to a letter from the Chicago Office, dated November 13, 1933, addressed to the Kansas City Office, reflecting an interview had with Maxine Miller. She was interviewed by Special Agent J. J. Keating, in apartment 407, 1430 North Dearborn Street, Chicago, Illinois, where she was found to be residing, and she stated that during the month of April, 1933, she met a Mr. Martin, who was a guest at the Muehlebach Hotel; that she took this man to a gambling establishment, operated by Freddie Stross, of Kansas City, Missouri; that he cleaned up the dice game with loaded dice; that because she was a sporting woman she stayed with him that night at the Stats Hotel; that on this occasion

Mr. Martin gave her \$20.00; that she later met this man again in Kensas City, Missouri, and that she visited him at the Phillips Hotel where she ascertained that he was registered under the name of L. E. Lang; that she stayed with him all night, and that on this occasion he refused to pay her, stating that he only had \$45. She stated that due to the fact that this individual appeared to be a "wise guy", while he was out of the room she ordered a quantity of cosmetics and other toilet articles and charged them to his bill.

A photograph of George Bates, one of the subjects in the Urschel Kidneping Case, was exhibited to her for the reason that up to this time it was believed that L. E. Lang was identical with Bates, but she stated that the party known to her as Martin, or Lang, was not Bates.

She selected the photograph of Edward Doll, alias Eddie LaRue, as being identical with the individual known to her as Martin or Lang. She also identified the photograph of William Veisman, who beat her up in Kansas City, Missouri, during July, 1933, and stated that this individual at that time was living with a gambler named "Red Ward", in a double room at the President Hotel, and that he was vorking in a gambling house at 1104 and 1106 Baltimore Avenue, Kansas City, taking bets; that this gambling establishment is near the President Hotel; that Weisman is a close friend of Sammy Sadlow, who operates this gambling house, and that Sadlow would give no information relative underworld connections. She further advised that Veisman follows the races very closely and may be found in Florida during the winter time.

Maxine Miller agreed to supply the Chicago Division Office with any information which she might obtain relative to the possible whereabouts of Weisman.

She also advised that she is a native of Dubuque, Iowa, but disclaimed any knowledge concerning the Kansas City Massacre case.

The above information is submitted for your consideration in connection with the efforts now being made to locate LaRue, as the principal suspect in the Bremer Kidnaping Case.

It was ascertained that none of the above mentioned news stands sell St. Paul or Minneapolis Newspapers, except A. R. Mendelson and William Krell at 8th and Olive Streets. This news stand is not located in any building, but the above parties operate same on the street corner at 8th and Olive Streets during the day time only, and no information was obtained from them as to the identity of any person who may have purchased either St. Paul or Minneapolis papers under suspicious circumstances. 

Special Agent G. B. Norris conducted the following investigation at Lincoln, Illinois:

Sec. 4. Agent Norris interviewed Sheriff William A. Moore and Lynn Parker, abstracter, who stated they have been life long residents of Lincoln, Illinois; that Lincoln has a population of 12,855, and that Mr. Parker, who is a highly respected citizen, has been an abstracter of titles to real estate for a period of twenty years in Lincoln. Sheriff Moore and Mr. Parker stated that there are two coal mines in the vicinity of Lincoln, Illinois, one known as the North Mine, and the other as the East Mine, both being owned by the Brewington Coal Company, an Illinois corporation; that the East Mine has not been in operation for a long period of time, however, that the North Mine is in operation. Mr. Parker stated that he is certain that there is no yegg owning coal mining property in Lincoln or vicinity, and that to his knowledge there is no yegg in Lincoln who owns property in the coal mining section; that he does not believe there is an old man in Lincoln who goes about in a wheel chair; that if there is any such character in Lincoln, Sheriff Moore

would know of and have information about such a character.

Sheriff Moore stated that Lincoln does not have a former safe cracker as described by George Kelly Barnes; that the man who have windered in Lincoln, in his opinion, could not open the safe if they knew the combination; that Thomas Moos, alias from the Boy, has always been a bootlegger in Lincoln and vicinity, and is yidely known among the criminal element of Lilinois; that he owns about one block of improved sity property in the vicinity of the East Mine, and that the basement windows of one of his houses looks out toward the open prairie land; that Moos often harbors criminals who pass through Lincoln, Illinois, and that undoubtedly George Kelly Barnes knew him; that he, Sheriff Moore, has known Moos since childhood and attended school with him; that Moos has never been a year, but has always been a bootlegger

that moss has been arrested twice for liquor law violations and convicted on both occasions, but that he has never been convicted of any other offense.

Agent Morris made a careful search in the vicinity of the Morth and East Mines in Lincoln, Illinois, for other houses which would tally with the description furnished by Kelly. The majority of the houses in the vicinity of the Morth Mine are said to be owned by business men of Lincoln, Illinois, and the majority of them conot have basements. Said houses are in groups.

Agent Morris ascertained that the house near the East Mine owned by Moos, which tallies with the description furnished by George Kelly Barnes, is occupied by Ross James and family. This family moved into the house on January 26, 1934, after the house had been redecorated throughout. Moos attends to the rental of his property and it was learned through a neighbor of Moos, who is a personal friend of Sheriff Moore, that the house now occupied by the James family was vacant for more than three months prior to January 26, 1934.

Agent Borris ascertained at the Illinois State Home for Feeble Minded Children, Lincoln, Illinois, that Mr. and Mrs. James have been employed at that institution since January 14, 1930; that James is employed as a painter and bears a good reputation. He has two children attending school in Lincoln, Illinois.

The address of the above mentioned house is 1428 Pekin Street, Lincoln, Illinois. This house was examined by Agent Norris and a plan of it drawn. It is a two story frame house with a cement basement, approximately 25 feet by 282 feet, having five windows in it. The house is heated by a

hot air furnace. The basement has a coal recu and a shower bath room. There is a small coal laundry range in the basement. The rear door of the house serves as an entrance to the basement and the kitchen. Isside of this door there are live steps leading to the basement and live steps leading to the kitchen. The first floor of the house has a kitchen, dining room, living room, and bedroom. There is no bath on this floor. However, there is a closet off of the bedroom and a pantry off of the kitchen. There is a gas range in the kitchen, however, it appears that this gas range replaced a coal range as there are fresh soot marks on the chimney in the kitchen. The walls of the first floor are decorated with what is known as "catmeal" paper, and the hall; on the second floor is also decorated with the same kind of paper. Mr. James stated that all of the walls were painted prior to the time when the house was redecorated shortly prior to the time when he moved in. Mr. James is a painterand stated that he could tell that the walls had not been papered until recently. The second floor of the house has two bedrooms, a hall, and a bath. The walls of these rooms, except the hall, are painted. There are two wall lights in the bathroom and the switch for these lights is in the hall near the bathroom door. The tub is built in and extends the length of the bath room. Further details concerning the plan of this house are set out in the house plans drawn by Agent Norris, which are being forwarded to the St. Paul Division Office with its copies of this report.

No wallpaper of the pattern described by victim was observed, it being apparent that this house does not fit the design of the house where victim was held.

The following description of Thomas Moos was furnished to Agent Morris by Sheriff William A. Moore of Lincoln, Illinois:

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He states that on each afternoon a short time after the blowing of the factory whistle he heard what appeared to be a horn, or whistle, which was on a moving object but he is unable to give any information indicating, whether this sound came from a bus, a truck, or a small railroad truck, He stated that, at the time, he wondered if it could be on one of the small sleet trie, or gesoline propelled, railroad trucks. He sannot describe this sound and stated that he does not know whether it was a horn, or whistle. Further questioning failed to elicit any additional information conserning this sound, which would lead to identify it as belonging to a bus, a truck, or a reliroad conveyance. He does not know whether this sound was heard on Sundays.

Victim was questioned concerning the various times when he signed, or wrote; any notes; or letters. He was handed a photostatic copy of the first note which was delivered to CHARLES MCGEE and which; according to Victim's pres vious statements, were signed on the morning of his abduction and at the time he was transferred from his own automobile to one of the kidnapers. When he first glanged at this photostat, he stated that the only writing which was on the note he signed it was the last two lines above his signatures Victim had previously stated that, due to the fact that blood was in his eyes, he saw nother ing after being struck that morning and did not see the paper which he signed. After making this statement as to the contents of the paper which he signed he appeared to realize that he had previously stated that he saw nothing and recalled his statement and said that he does not know what was on the paper and that his remark concerning there being two lines thereon applied only to subsequent letters, which he signed. He cannot say whether this first note was signed before he was taken from his own sars or after being placed in the kidnapera car

elaims that the next time he was requested to sign anything was on the second night at the hideout, which was midnight, January 18, 1934; that; after being asleep for some time, he was awakened by a man and that he estimates it was approximately midnight; that the man who was most instrumental in awakening him and getting him to sign his name was the roughest and harshest of the lot and handled him roughly; that; on that occasion, he wrote three letters, one of which was to Dr.NIPPLRT, another was addressed to his wife, as "Dearest Pat", and the third to WALTER MACEZ, addressed: "Dear Walter", He stated that he was told to write Fridey at the top of each of these three letters, although they were written by him at midnight, Thursday, January 18, 1934,

The second time he was called upon to write; or sign, any leteters was approximately the Wednesday prior to the second Saturday of his capativity. He fixes this date by the conversation concerning the bet of the box

eigers that he would soon be returned, on this occasions letters on which were typed only two lines. Some time prior to the second writing, or at the second writing, he recalled that he wrote a letter to Father Beers, which he is quite sure was not delivered. In this connections he stated that he complained to the kidnapers that the man for whom he had previously signed notes and letters was too rough in handling him and that he would not sign any more for him. Whereupon, the kidnapers told him that he would not be salled upon to sign any more letters for that person inasmuch as that person and another man had gone to St. Paul; where they had been picked up by the police in a berber shop. He does not recall just what was in the first letter to Father Deere but stated that the contents were somewhat similar to the contents of the second letter to Father Deeres which letter was received by Deere. The third time he was called upon to write letters was on the last Sunday of his septivity at which time he wrote one letter to MISS DICKMARS one to FATHER DEERE; one to his wife, and one to his father. He stated that these were written prior to his usual bed time.

In connection with the statement by the kidnapers that two of their men had been picked up in a barber shop in St.Paul, by the police.

Victim stated that a few days after this conversation by the kidnapers; they read to him from a newspaper to the affect that VERNE SANKEY had been picked up by Government men in a barber shop in Chicago. Victim stated that the facts which they read to him concerning the arrest of SANKEY corresponded with the facts which they had furnished him previously in connection with the arrest of two of the kidnapers in a barber shop in St.Paul. Further intensive questioning failed to elicit any further information from Victim in connection with this matter.

It may be stated here that on at least four previous occasions.

Victim had been questioned thoroughly as to whether the name of SANKEY, or several other criminals, whose names were specifically mentioned to him, were ever called, or discussed, by the kidnapers and each time he replied that no name was ever mentioned. On this occasion, it appeared that he unwittingly mentioned the fact that SANKEY'S name had been called in his effort to explain the kidnapers' statements concerning the arrest of one of their ment He stated that nothing further was said concerning SANKEY and they, in no way, indicated they knew him.

On several occasions, previously, Victim was specifically quese tioned as to whether the kidnapers ever discussed the payment of ransom with Victim, and whether any amount was ever mentioned, and each time he stated that ransom, amount, or payment, was never discussed. Upon questioning, he now admits that shortly after his arrival at the hideout the kidnapers questioned him very thoroughly as to how much money could be raised quickly and that he explained to them the large financial losses of his father in

recent years. Victim was asked what amount he told them is father could raise and replied that he "never went above \$100,000,000".

Reference is made to letter from the St. Paul Office to the Kansas City Division Office; dated February 6,1934; concerning MARTIE -WUNDERLICH; who claims to have, at one time; borrowed \$200;000;000 from E.G.BREMER'S bank, When Victim was first questioned in this connection, he stated that WUNDERLICH did not borrow \$200,000,000 but only \$100,000,00 for which he gave as security a \$100,000,000 liberty bond and subsequently paid his indebtedness of \$100,000,000. Victim was, subsequently questioned at more length in this matter and he stated that on the 4th of July, two or three years ago, WUNDERLICH came to him and told him that on the previous day he had visited the Plantation Night Club at White Bear [Akaj Minnesota, with a women, who was not his wife, and had lost \$6,000,00 gembling; that he had given an I.O. U.s. and asked BREMER what to do about it. Victim stated that, on that occasion, he arranged with the owner of the Plantation Night Club to settle WUNDERLICH'S indebtedness for either \$100@000\_00 or \$200@000\_000 He elaims that in connection with the \$200,000,00 loan to WUNDERLICH; that WUNDERLICH came to him and stated that he needed \$200,000,000 in order to obtain road contracts in the State of Kentucky; that WU DERLICH, at that time, had on deposit a little more then \$100,000,000 and Victim loaned WUNDERLICH \$200,000,000 in currency; at which time WUNDERLICH secured the debt with certificates of deposit in 4 something more then \$100,000,000 and, subsequently, sold liberty bonds in the extent of \$100,000,000, or a little more, and paid off the debte Victim was asked whethers in view of the various rumors which had been circulated during his absence in connection with this affair, if he would not welcome an investigation of this loan by this Division in order to clear his own name, whereupon, he replied that he would not welcome the investigation; He was told that positively this Division would necessarily investigate this loan and the record of the bank in order to clear the matter and Victim was asked if he would cooperate with Agents and he stated that he would. He suggested that WUNDERLICH be interviewed for a verification of Victim's statement. After Victim was told that an investigation of the bank record would be made, he explained that this loan was made shortly after the bank holiday and that Victim was afraid that the money of the brewery would be tied up and had withdrawn approximately \$100,000,000 of the brewery money and placed it in a safety deposit box and that the \$100,000,000 which he loaned to WUNDERLICH was this money,

Victim was questioned as to any further notes which he wrote during his captivity and he stated that he addressed, in his own handwriting, a letter to JOHN MILLER, the MILLER, TOX He stated that he does not recall

what was in this letter but that the contents mentioned the fact that "HACKE was to be the contect man. He stated that "HILVER FOX" is a nickness which he has always called MILLER. This is the first information which this office has obtained concerning such a letter and inquiry of JOHN MILLER. WALTER MACKE, and ADOLPH BREMER, failed to disclose that such a letter was received and it is probable that it was not delivered, just as the latter first written to FATHER DEERE was not delivered. In checking over the letters which Victim explained that he wrote, it was found that this office had not obtained one letter which was addressed by Victim; in his own had writing, to 1 "My dear Pa". This letter, together with a typewritten letter addressed to: "Charles Mages, or Adolph Bremer", was obtained from the home of ADOLPH BREMER, where it had been placed in a drawer, These two leters were immediately dispatched to the Division by air mail.

A check of the records of this office disclose that the bleek hand bag, which had been placed by the kidnapers in a locker in a St.Paul Bus Station, had not been obtained by this office and it was found at the home of ADOLPH BREMER and immediately transmitted to the Division. This hand bag had in it a sofa pillow, which was forwarded to the Division. This bag is the one which contained a letter of instructions to MACKE to proceed to a hotel in lows and register.

Victim was, again, questioned thoroughly concerning the circumstances surrounding the occasion on his return trip when gesoline cans were taken from the car and the tank filled. He now states very positively that he believes the ear he was in on the return trip; at about the helf-way mark of the journey to Rochester, Minnesota; turned eff from a paved road and, after ten or fifteen minutes; appeared to pull to the side of the road and the two man in the front seat and the one in the rear got out and took out of the sar at least two tin sens containing gesoline; one of which was taken from the front, and the other from the rear. Victim cannot say whether there were more than two cans of gasoline in the car but stated that it is possible that three or four cans could have been there. He now says that he is quite sure that no other car was present at that time and that it took only approximately five minutes to put in the gasoline and leave. It is his belief that the car he was in turned around and went back down the road on which it had come and re-entered the main highway.

Investigation by Special Agent S.K.McKee; at the point where four or five gallon gasoline cans were found, disclosed that the car which left said cans was not accompanied by another car and that the car which discarded the cans turned around thereafter. Agent McKee's investigation

disclosed, however, that this par stayed there approximately thirty Victim stated that, at the time the car stopped to put in gasoline, on this occasion, he is quite sure that the two men in the front seat and the man in the back seat got out of the ear while Victim remained sitting on the floore He was questioned as to whether the shot gun remained in the sar beside him and he stated that it did. On the return trips Victim claims to have remained on the floor of the ear until about one and one-half hours before arriving at Rochester: Minnesota; at which time he was permitted to sit on the rear seat because of darkness. Victim appears quite certain that gesoline was not put into the ser but once on his return trip and that the point at which it was put in was approximately at the half-way distance point. He believes that efter putting the gasoline in the car; he travelled between four and five hours before reaching Rochester, Minnesota, If this is true, then Victim left the hideout at approximately four to five hours before reaching the point where gasoline was changed and, consequently, left the hideout during daylight. When these facts were brought to Victim's attention on this oce casion, he stated emphatically that he is positive that he now believes that he did leave the hideout during daylight; that he is quite sure that he was permitted to get out of bed on the last day three or four hours earlier than usual and that he usually got up at approximately 10:00 A.M.; that he believes he arose on the last morning at approximately 6:00 A.Mea after which he sat at the table in his room beside the window and was shaved. He claims that, while being shaved, he noticed that it was daylight outside and he could see the light reflected through the crack in the window. On the last morning. when the factory whistle blew, he believes he had not then been shaved. He estimated that he left the hideout on the last day at between 9:00 and 10:00 A.M. but admits that it could have been a little later; but he is convinced that it was before moon. If it can be relied upon, as Victim states, that the kidnapers put in additional gasoline at the half-way point, they then had travelled, at the most, not more than five hours before reaching that point. He stated that it is possible that he left the hideout as late as 11:00 A.Mas but does not believe that it was later. Concerning the number of cens of gesoline in Victim's ear on his return trip, he stated that he is positive that there was at least one can in the front of the car and at least one can in the rear, on which he rested his elbow and, upon further ; questioning, admitted that it is possible that more cans were in the care He said he could furnish no information which would indicate more than two cans. In connection with the shape of these cans; on the first day that they were discussed with him, he stated that he believed they were round, He now said that it is possible that the cans were square with rounded corners but that he is sure that they did not have sharp corners or these corners would have impressed themselves against him in such a manner that he would have noticed them.

Further questioning of Victim concerning the food which he had at the hideout elicited information that, on one occasion; he was furnished with fresh fish of the size of from six to eight inches in length; which he believed to have been perch. He stated that the men told him that some of them had cought these fish by breaking the ice and fishing through a hole, Further questioning in this connection elicited information from the Victim that some five to seven days prior to his release, a short time after darke one evening, an outsider, a man, paid a visit at the hideout; that on the occasion; two of the men at the hideout same quickly into the Victim's bedroom and partially closed the doors turned out the electric light, and sat on Vice tim's bed during the entire time that the caller was at the house, which was approximately one hour. He stated that during the time that this caller was there he is quite sure that two of the kidnapers remained in the living rooms which was adjacent to Victim's bedroom, and that the door between the living room and the kitchen was closed and that one of the kidnapers stayed in the kitchen where the caller was received and that the caller spent the entire time in the kitchen and that the other four men made it a point to keep quite still and not let the caller know that they were in the house. He stated that his captors explained to him that the saller was an old trapper who lived near the lake and he gained the impression that they had met him while they were fishing. Absolutely no further information concerning this old trapper was obtained except that Virtim was told that he was very fond of dogs. Further questioning concerning fishing, by the kidnepers, disclosed that Victim was told that the Game Warden in that vicinity was having trouble with the chile dren and Victim believes that he was told that the trouble was occasioned because the children were fishing with more than one line. Concerning the return trip of Victim; he stated that the person who drove the entire way was the same man who drove most of the way on the day of the abduction and who took the wheel on the day of the abduction about threeof the abduction and who took the wheel on the day of the abduction about threefourths of an hour after leaving St.Paul; that he was, undoubtedly, a much
better driver than the one who first drove and who drove, what the Victim beelieves to have been a roadster on the morning that he left the hideout. Victim
is not certain as to whether one of the men got out of the car with him when

he got out in Rochester, Minnesota, but he recalls that a man took him by the
shoulders and turned him in a particular direction, facing the direction from
which his car had come, just before they drove off.

The New York Division Office has been furnished with a drawing of the wall paper design on Victim's room at the hideout with the request that investigation be made to identify this patterns

On February 17,1034; after obtaining more particular information as to the place where Victim threw away the goggles at the time of his release; the goggles were found by Special Agent Glynn; together with a police officer of the Rochester; Minnesota, Police Department; These goggles were immediately trensmitted to the Division Laboratory for examination.

## MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Inspector Rorer telephoned and stated that he had received two transcripts from Agent Dewey who is working on the Lynch angle at Des Moines, Iowa; that nothing of value had been obtained from these transcripts and he desired to ascertain the wishes of the Division with regard to continuing that particular angle of the investigation.

Inspector Rorer further stated that as a result of circularization of ministers, information had been received from a Lutheran minister at Brookfield, Illinois, which coincides in part with the information relative to the ringing of bells and whistles. He stated that he had telephoned Purvis relative to this angle and had been informed that Agents were being put on the matter immediately to check that particular town with a view to locating the hide-out. Inspector Rorer also requested that the Identification Unit include in its single fingerprint file the name of Tom Carroll, St. Paul Tomo Police #22180.

With reference to tracing the manufacturer of the four 5 gallon tin cans, ir. Rorer stated that this angle was very important and he desired information as to whether any progress had been made in Washington. I advised him that no progress had been made in this direction but that he would be advised in the event any information is received along this line.

He also requested that the Technical Laboratory give immediate consideration to the cap which he had sent in with a view to ascertaining the manufacturer so that the ultimate retailer can be traced down coincident with the investigation being conducted with regard to the other clothing.

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gallon cans of different design, a handbag, a pillow, a pair of goggles. These articles are connected with the above entitled case. Mr. Coffey requested that appropriate investigation be conducted for the purpose of ascertaining the names of the person or persons who last had possession of these articles before they were found, and suggested that the names of the manufacturers of the articles be learned and from the manufacturers obtain the mames of the distributors or any others to whom the manufacturers may have sold the articles within a region of 1,000 miles surrounding St. Paul. Minn.; more specifically, in that region consisting of the States of Illinois, North and South Dakota, Iowa, Michigan, Wisconsin, Indiana and Minnesota, for the purpose of checking with each of these distributors, if necessary, in an attempt to accomplish the desired result. It was also requested that this investigation be given expeditious attention. Accordingly, the following investigation was conducted.

Special Agent R. P. Burruss interviewed Br. H. W. Bearce, Bureau of Standards, who advised that he could furnish no helpful information, except the suggestion that the several large can manufacturers in Baltimore, Md., be interviewed. The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent Hirsh.

Mr. E. H. Brown, in charge of the searching room at the Patent Office, made a search of the patents covering designs for cans. He also searched the list of mechanical patents covering end reenforcing of cans, wall structures and filling cans. The results of his search were negative. Mr. J. J. Oberlin, Chief Examiner of the Division which handles cans in the Patent Office, advised that the two 5 gallon square cans which were exhibited to him by Agent were standard cans with no peculiar wall or end construction, and that he could furnish no helpful information as to who was the manufacturer of the cans.

AT BAIT IMORE, MD.

SECTION OF BUILDING BUILDING BUILDING SECTION

Mr. C. L. Lovell, Sales Manager, of the American Can Company, Oak and 26th Streets, made an examination of the two 5 gallon cans in question, and compared them with a can manufactured by his company. The can manufactured by the American Can Company was also examined by Agent, and although the American Can Company product was

somewhat similar to the can on which appears the circular design on top, in the possession of this agent, it was not identical, and Br. Lovell stated that the two cans which were in the possession of this Agent were not manufactured in the Philadelphia or Jersey City plants of his concern. He stated, however, that because of the similarity of the design, it was possible that this can may have been made in the Chicago plant of their company, and because he was not familiar with the design of the dies used at that factory, he hesitated to express a definite opinion on this matter. Ar. Lovell, upon examining the cans originally stated that it was his opinion that they were western cans. He supported his contention by stating that the construction of the tops were not very strong, and that it was his opinion that most of the can manufacturers in the eastern States had sometime in the past begun to manufacture a can with a stronger top. Mr. Lovell described the two cans in the possession of Agent as being 5 gallon, square, oil cans fitted with li inch screws (opening), with turned wire handles and constructed of plain tin throughout. Mr. Lovell also stated that the two cans were a standard product and could have been menufactured by possibly several hundred can manufacturers. He also stated that these products were sold to any and all kinds of consumers and to distributors of all sorts. Mr. Lovell also advised that the majority of can manufacturers were located in New York and Brooklyn, and in Chicago, Ille, and that it was his opinion the best information could be obtained at the above two cities. Entropy of the second of the s

Mr. W. C. Crawford, Seles Manager of the Continental Can Company, 3500 E. Biddle Street, examined the two 5 gallon square cans in the possession of this Agent, and compared them with the can made by the Continental Can Company, and with the can made by the Southern Can Company, which company has since been taken over by the Continental Can Company. The designs on the two cans were not identical with those manufactured by the Continental Can Company. Mr. Crawford stated that the two cans exhibited by Agent were not and could not have been manufactured by his company at any of its plants. He advised that the Continental Can Company marked its cans with a "C", which is part of

the pattern contained on the can. Mr. Crawford did not concur in the opinion expressed by Mr. Lovell that the two cans in question probably manufactured in the west, but stated that he knew that several can menufacturers in New York and Brooklyn manufactured cans similar in construction to that of the cens in question. He stated that possibly the Acme Can Company, 1150 Broadway, New York City, may manufacture a 5 gallon square can which may have a pattern identical with that on one of the instant cans. Mr. Crawford stated that there were several other can manufacturers in New York and Brooklyn who might menufacture either of the two instant 5 gallon cans. If Crawford also stated that it is highly improbable that the Chicago plant of his concern manufactured the instant 5 gallon gans. suggested by Mr. Crawford, and also by Mr. Lovell of the American Can Company, that manufacturers of cans manufacture cans which contain no identifying data, but that they also manufacture identical cans which contain descriptions of some sort, i. e., names of distributors or manufacturing plants, or others. It was suggested that inasmuch as the decorated cans would carry identification data as to the name of the manufacturer of same, that should a decorated can be found which was identical with the instant cans, the name of the manufacturer could then very easily be ascertained. This information is being furnished merely for the information of the auxiliary offices. ""

At the Acme Supply Company, Carolina and Fayette Streets, Agent compared instant 5 gallon cans with that believed to have been manufactured by the Enterprise Can Company, McKees Rocks, Pa., and they were found not to be identical. The manager of the Acme Supply Company was not absolutely certain, but felt reasonably sure that the can which he handled was manufactured by the mentioned concern.

Mr. E. F. Dudley, Metal Package Corporation, S. Wolfe Street, compared the two 5 gallon cans with one of the cans manufactured by his company. The cans were not identical. Mr. Dudley advised that his concern has a warehouse in Chicago, but that the product on hand at that warehouse is identical with that shown to this Agent. It appears therefore unnecessary that the Chicago office contact the Metal Package Corporation at Chicago.

At the Maryland Square Can Company, 1130 Rankin Place, Agent compared instant 5 gallon cans with the product of the above named company. They were not identical. The Maryland Square Company makes a plain can with no design at all on it, and is only a very small company.

The above information was reported orally to Mr. J. Kdwards of the Identification Unit, who suggested that the two 5 gallon cans be forwarded to the Chicago office with instructions that the Chicago office conduct appropriate investigation. Mr. Edwards also advised that in the event the Chicago office was unsuccessful in its investigation, the two 5 gallon cans should then be forwarded to the New York office for the use of that office in making its investigation. The five gallon cans referred to were left in the custody of Mr. Renneberger of the Identification Unit to be forwarded by him to the Chicago office under separate cover for its investigative use. In the event the Chicago office is unsuccessful in determining the names of the manufacturers of the cans, that office should immediately forward the cans to the New York Office.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent

#### The Cap

Mr. Coffey advised Agent Levin that the cap bore a Union label of the Cloth Hat, Cap Millinery Workers, which label bore the stamped letter #E" and also the following serial number, 946641. In this connection, Mr. Appel of the Textile Section of the Bureau of Standards advised Agent that information could possibly be secured through the following association with resepct to the identity of the manufacturer of this cap. The association was named "Cloth Hat, Cap and Millinery Workers International Union, 621 Broadway, New York City.

## The Black Handbag

In connection with this article, Mr. Appel, above referred to, suggested that the Lutz & Company and the Becker's Leather Store, both located in Washington, could probably furnish information with

respect to the manufacturer of this bag.

At Lutz & Company, 1325 G Street, N. W., Igent interviewed Mr. Pluege, who has been connected with that firm for 53 years. He stated, his opinion was concurred in by several other members of the firm, that the bag was not manufactured by any eastern concern, and in all probability had been manufactured in or near Chicago, Ill. He suggested that Mr. Ben Hahn of Lyons & Hahn, leather dealers, Chicago, Ill., would be the best informed person in order to secure the identity of the manufacturer.

At the Becker Leather shop, 1340 F Street, N. W., Igent interviewed Mr. J. B. Kelly, the buyer of leather goods. Mr. Kelly advised that the 725 which appears on the bottom of the bag was a stock number, and that the 18 appearing on the bottom is merely the size of the bag. Mr. Kelly did not recognize the bag and felt that it had been made in the middle west. Mr. Kelly suggested, in addition to Mr. Hahn, as related above, that inquiry he made of S. Dresner & Sons, Chicago, Ill.

## The Goggles

Mr. Appel of the Bureau of Standards, stated that information could probably be secured with respect to the manufacturer of this article Either from the Bakelite Corporation, 247 Park Ave., New York City, or the General Plastics Corporation, located at North Tonewands, N. Y.

## The Pillow

Mr. Appel of the Bureau of Standards stated that in all probability information could be secured through the Silk Association of America, Inc., 468 Fourth Ave., New York City, as to the manufacturer of this article. He suggested that at that office the Textile Design Registration Bureau might have on file the particular design appearing on the cover of this pillow. With further respect to the pillow, Mr. Appel suggested that Agent check at the Patent

Office the textile designs on file there. Accordingly, igent, with the aid of Miss Hallam, room 2609 Textile Designs Division of the Patent Office, Commerce Building, checked the designs on woven fabrics of rugs, pillows and handkerchiefs, which designs had been patented, but was unable to find a design even remotely approximately the design appearing on instant pillow.

At the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, rock 3840 Commerce Building, in the office of Wharton Moore, Administrative Assistant, Agent was advised that information could probably be secured a from the office of the National Association of Manufacturers of Novelty Curtains, Draperies, Bedspreads and Pillows, Inc., 7 East 44th Street, New York City. It was suggested to Agent that perhaps buyers in large department stores located in Washington might be of some assistance in the tracing the manufacturer of this pillow. Accordingly, agent interviewed Mrs. J. C. Nourse and her assistant, Mrs. Edwards, buyers at 🤅 the Moodward & Lothrop department store. Mrs. Nourse advised that she believed the pillow to be imported, probably from Paris, France, but was unable to state who the domestic manufacturer might be. She felt however, that the top cover had in all probability been imported, and that the pillow had been made up in its entirety in the United States. Mrs. Nourse suggested that inquiry be made of large department stores in New York City, preferably B. Altman and Wanamaker's. In addition. she stated that a good authority on pillows was one Charles Bloom. 15 East 26th Street, New York City.

Mr. Miller, the upholstery buyer in Woodward & Lothrop, after viewing the pillow, could offer no further suggestion than that set out above.

The articles referred to, namely, the cap, the pillow and the goggles are being furnished the New York office by registered mail under separate cover. The bag is being furnished the Chicago Office by registered mail under separate cover. These articles, concerning which Agent Levin made inquiry, were delivered to Mr. J. J. Edwards of the Identification Unit of the Division on February 26, 1934.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS

The CHICAGO OFFICE will conduct appropriate investigation in its district to determine the names of the manufacturers of the two 5 gallon cans mentioned herein, which are being forwarded to that office under separate cover, for the purpose of ascertaining the names of the person or persons who were last in possession of these cans before they were found. If unsuccessful, that office will forward the cans to the New York Office for the use of the latter in making its investigation.

At Chicago, Ill., with respect to ascertaining the identity of the manufacturer of the bag, will make appropriate inquiry of Ben Hahn of Lyons & Hahn, and also of officials at St. Dresner & Sons.

The NEW YORK OFFICE at New York City will make appropriate investigation through the National Association of Manufacturers of Novelty Curtains, Draperies, Bedspreads and Pillows, Inc., 7 East 44th Street, also through prominent department stores and through Charles Bloom, 15 East 26th Street, all with a view to determining the manufacturer of the pillow.

To determine the manufacturer of the cap, appropriate inquiry should be made of the Cloth Hat, Cap and Millinery Workers, International Union, 621 Broadway.

With respect to the goggles, appropriate inquiry should; be made through the Bakelite Corporation, 247 Park Avenue. At North Tonawanda, N. Y., will make appropriate inquiry through General Plastics Corporation.

The New York Office will hold its investigation in abeyance pending receipt of the two 5 gallon cans from the Chicago Office. Upon completion of this investigation by the New York Office, in the event the cans are forwarded to that office, will transmit the cans to the Identification Unit of the Division or to the St. Paul Office.

I told him to defer this interview until the Agent could be released from Tampa.



Dear Sir:

In view of the fact that some doubt might be entertained relative to the credence which may be placed in the statements of victim Bremer concerning the location of his hide-out, your attention is invited to the fact that it is reasonable to believe that his statements are truthful. This is borne out by the fact that he stated that his automobile was not accompanied by another, on his return from the hide-out, and that at the half way point the gas tank was filled by means of two or more tin cans. Investigation has substantiated these statements of victim, both as to the gasoline cans and as to the fact that no car was accompanying him at the time that his tank was filled. He further stated that four or five hours after putting gasoline in his car he arrived at Rochester, which is approximately 196 miles. This checks with victim's previous statements. He further stated that about one hour before arriving at Rochester, he was taken out of the car and guarded by two men while one remained in the car and drove off for some purpose. This statement has been corroborated by investigation at Lewiston, Minnesota, which is on a route directly connecting Portage, Wisconsin with Rochester, Minnesota, which point is 38 miles southeast of Rochester.

Investigation at Lewiston further disclosed that a man driving a 1933 Buick Sedan put fifteen gallons of gasoline in the tank at precisely the time which victim was out of the car and guarded by two men. This time element is substantiated through the fact that a passenger train passed through Lewiston at that time, and victim had previously stated that a passenger train passed him while he was out of the car. Victim has stated that at that time one or more rifles or guns were in the car, which was substantiated by the filling station attendant. Victim has previously stated that he believed that the car in which he returned from the hideout was a Buick, which fact was borne out by the Lewiston filling station attendant.

In view of the fact that insofar as it has been possible to substantiate the victim's statements concerning his travel and hideout, his statements have proved to be correct, it is believed that full credence must be given to his further statements as to the location of the hideout.

The victim appears certain that an airplane passed very close to the hideout at approximately 6 P.M. January 27, 1934, or at least about two minutes prior to the ringing of the Fraces afternoon church bell. It is believed that this is an important and potential lead, and efforts are now being made to thoroughly check it. It has been ascertained that in Southern Wisconsin and Northern Illinois, on that particular day, there was a very strong wind, and flying weather was considered dangerous, and aviation officials have expressed the opinion that undoubtedly only a commercial ship would have been in the air at that time. It has been further determined that due to strong cross winds, undoubtedly any commercial ship would have been off its course.

Insofar as weather conditions described by the victim are concerned, it is believed that investigative possibilities have been about exhausted. The only definite information which we have received is to the effect that on January 28, 1934, it was extremely cold, which condition appears to have been general throughout this section of the country, and that about five days prior thereto, there was a general thaw. This thawing condition centered about Chicago, and is a large area west and south of Chicago.

Three agents are working in the Twin Cities and in South St.Paul, with a view toward developing identifications in connection with the possible purchase of the Lightmaster lantern, the Filmo-lens, the cap which was found in the payoff car, the writing paper, the gasoline tanks, and the camping or hunting outfit, which is somewhat unusual, and which was being worn by Alvin Karpis at the time when he purchased the three flashlights. It is probable that an identification will be made in South St.Paul in connection with the purchase of the high-laced boots, the cap, and a zipper wool lumber jacket by Karpis. South St.Paul is known to be a logical place wherein the subjects of this case could have resided prior to and during the kidnaping. Every

attention will be given to a thorough investigation there in connection with possibilities concerning the Shell gasoline signs, possible storage of automobiles, and purchase of gasoline, with a view toward locating the house wherein they resided.

Very thorough attention is being at this time given to the location of a Corona typewriter (portable). Every establishment in the Twin Cities and South St. Paul is being contacted to determine all concerns which sell, repair or service Corona machines. We are also endeavoring to make thorough investigations at all questionable garages and to obtain fingerprints in such places.

The Oklahoma City office advised by telephone today that subject HARRY CAMPBELL has a sister named LAURA CAMPBELL presently residing at 825 South Rockford Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma, who is believed to have received treatment while confined in a hospital in St.Louis, Mo. during January, 1934. It further advised that it is believed that her brother, Harry Campbell, who is evidently fond of her, is the source of her finances. It was further stated that information has been received by the Oklahoma City office that Laura Campbell will probably enter the Mayo Brothers Clinic Hospital, Rochester, Minnesota, during March, 1934, or prior thereto. In view of the fact that the Mayo Brothers clinic generally makes charges proportionate to the financial rating of its patients, it is not unusual for patients to register under aliases. In view of this fact the Oklahoma City office is requested to keep a close check on Laura Campbell with a view toward determining the date and the particular train on which she leaves Tulsa for Rochester, in order that Agents from St. Paul may properly determine her identity when she enters the hospital.

A request was made of Mr. Wallace Jamie for the temporary use of these files for the purpose of Photostating, but he was reluctant to comply with this request without authorization from his father. Inasmuch as it is thought possible that the Holland Bank robbery is closely allied with the Braner case, insofar as the participants are concerned, it is deemed advisable that these files be obtained for purposes of photostating, and the matter made a part of our file in connection with this case.

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





BARKER, with aliases; UNKNOWN SUBJECTS; EDWARD GEORGE ORREMER, Victim Hews Stands in Chicago handling St. Paul and Minneapolis papers show a rather positive identification of Bernard Philips as having been a recent purchaser at the Sherman Hotel and Palmer House; also Volney Davis as a possible purchaser at the City Hall Book Shop. All news stands are watch ing for suspects. Letter to St. Paul Office, dated at Chicago, Illinois, REFERENCE: 2/19/34. Letter to Chicago Division Office, dated at St. Paul, Minnesota, 2/23/34. Acknowledgement is made of receipt of letter from the St. Paul Office, dated February 23, 1934, to the Chicago Office, listing the news stands in the Chicago District handling St. Paul and was Minneapolis newspapers. An investigation at these places will go forward immediately. In furtherance of the investigation at the 14 news stands handling the St. Paul and Minneapolis papers in Chicago, igent again called on each of these places. In addition to the pictures of Volney Davis, Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis, Arthur R. As the Post Office News, 57 West Monroe, the La Salle Hotel, La Salle and Madison, the news stand at Clark and Madison, the news stand at Clark and Madison, and the news stand at Quincy and State, no information of value could be obtained.

At the news stand at State and Monroe the man in charge thought that he had seen Bernard Philips, but he was very indefinite and said that the picture may have been seen by him in a newspaper.

At the Queen City news stand, State and Randolph, he further information could be obtained but the manager again stated that he believed Karpis had purchased papers from them. He was unable to give a description.

At the Congress Hotel, Michigan and Congress Sts., the only information obtained was from the bell captain, who was of the opinion that he had seen Fred Barker at some time, but he was unable to give a description of Barker, or state how recently he had seen him.

At the World News Company, 141 North Clark Street, the man handling St. Paul and Minneapolis papers said he believed Philips had purchased papers from him, but his information was very indefinite.

At the Morrison Hotel, Mr. McDonough, who om Agent's previous visit, had identified La Rue, alias Doll, very positively, when shown the additional pictures of Bernard Philips and Mrs. Catherine Barker was unable to recognize either of them.

different person was on duty than on Agent's previous visit. On the previous visit, Doll had been quite positively identified. On the later visit, the person in charge, when shown the pictures, said that a man resembling Volney Davis has purchased papers from him within the last few weeks. When asked for a description, he gave the following: about 5.6" tall, weight about 140 lbs., not well dressed and probably wearing a gray overcoat. It should be noted that when Miss Dreama recognized the picture of Doll on Agent's first visit, she was unable to identify Davis as having been in their shop, although she did state that when Doll purchased the St. Paul paper from them, there was another man with him.

At the Palmer House, State and Monroe Streets, a Miss Williamson was on night duty. She is a different person than the one selling papers on agent's provious visit. She says that recently she has sold quite a few St. Paul papers and believes that Philips was buying St. Paul papers there week before last, However, as she works in the lunch room at times. It may have been, there that she saw him. She was quite positive of her identification. The description of Philips as given by her was that he was about 5.9" tall, weighed about 180 lbs., was elumsy, fat, had big ears, curly hair, and no matter how good his clothes were, they always looked sloppy. She believes he was wearing a black the or dark blue overcoat made of a curly material. This information was obtained on February 25, 1934, and on February 24, 1934, another visit was made at this news stand, and the person then on duty stated that Philips' picture looked femiliar, but she could not identify him. In view of the fact that Miss Williamson was quite sure that Philips had purchased papers from her, or that All she had seen him, a check was made of all employees including the house detectives, and pictures of all suspects were displayed. No additional information could be obtained.

At the Post Office News, 65 West Randolph Street, the same person was interviewed as on the previous visit, and he again stated that he believed Karpis and Davis had purchased papers from him, but his information was very vague.

in the state of a At the Sherman Hotel, Clark and Randolph Streets, Miss Sheldon on night duty, 2/22/34, was positive that Philips bought in St. Paul papers from her last week. She stated that he bought three days in succession, and then stopped. She gave the following description of the person she thought was Philips: he had a rather dark complexion, was of stocky build, broad shouldered, had a long nose, was not very tall, wore a dark overcoat, a dark slouch hat, and was rather untidy looking. At a subsequent call, on 2/24/34, at the Sherman Hotel, the lady at the stand during the day time said that a short stocky man, somewhat resembling Philips had purchased a St. Paul paper that morning, and had been purchasing the same paper most every day recently. When Agent asked her to give a description of this man, she said she was unable to give any description other than that he was short and stocky. Mr. Dallas, the chief house detective, was out, but

his assistant, Mr. Crows stated that he had seen Philips; that he believes it was at Keikeefers Billiard Parlor at 32 Mast Randolph Street. Mr. Miller, a house detective, was positive he has seen Philips in the hotel, but he could not say how recently. Both Mr. Crows and Mr. Miller suggested that a surveillance of the hotel is be made between the hours of 12:30 and 2 P.M. on any day other than Saturday or Sunday, as it was at this time that the tough guys met at the hotel. On 2/26/34 Agent kept the news stand at this hotel under surveillance from the time the St. Paul papers arrived, at 9 A.M., until 10:30 A.M., but no one resembling any of the suspects in this case purchased any paper, and no St. Paul paper was sold. Before leaving, Agent requested that Mr. Dallas, Mr. Miller and Mr. Crowe keep a look-out for any of the suspects whose pictures were displayed to them.

At the suggestion of Mr. Dallas, Agent went to the Keikeefers Billiard Parlor at 32 East Randolph Street, but was unable to identify anyone there as a suspect in this case.

At all the places where St. Paul and Minneapolis papers are being sold agent asked the person on duty to make a close inspection of anyone calling for one of these papers, and to ask who ever relieves him to do the same, as a subsequent call would be made to determine the description of anyone who might purchase one of these papers,

UNDEVELOPED LEADS: A close check will be kept by the Chicago Office on all news stands where any of the suspects have been partially or positively identified, and an occasional visit will be made to all news stands handling St. Paul and Minnespolis papers to determine the identity of persons purchasing them. On each call pictures of suspects will again be displayed.

A review of the list of stands in the Chicago District, handling St. Paul and Minneapolis papers, as shown in the letter of the St. Paul Office to the Chicago Office, dated 2/23/34, and received on this date, will be made for the purpose of covering these places.

This is a large building owned and operated by the Manufacturers Trust Company, and the manager of the building is absolutely reliable. The building holds a number of liquor dealers and tements with unenviable reputations. Captain Leady said that in the building are Johnny Torrio, Tamed New York and Chicago gangater and liquor operator, Ciro Terranova, the artichoke king and friend of Torrio, Pauly Amercie, bondsmen for "Dutch" Schultz. It is also observed from the telephone directory that Hyman Togelstein, attorney for the alot machine interests, is also located in this building. Captain Leahy said that the gang has beadquarters on the 12th and 22nd floors and that on the 22nd floor is the consern known as the Long Island Drug Company, which is a blind, and that on the other floor is located an Italian genealogist by the name of Margano. He said that photograph of Floyd, #5999, has been identified by the elevator operators as a person who comes into the building once or twice a week and gets off at the 22nd floor, and that his most distinguished characteristic is the coft Southern drawl of his voice. Captain Leaby said that he received 🔞 information from the manager of the building that Floyd came in around five o'clock Wednesday, February Rist, but the manager, was anable to get in touch with him; however, since that date he has had two men planted in the building in the office of the manager, and should the person who is supposed to be Floyd some in the building, they will be notified.

This information was immediately conveyed to the igent in Charge and steps are being taken whereby this office will work in conjunction with the two detectives assigned to this building.

Agent Nathan was advised to take each request of this kind up with the Division prior to taking any action thereon. He was also advised of the policy of the Division that information is not paid for until it has been proven worth while.

Mr. Schenken called from the Washington Field Office, yesterday, February 21, 1934, and stated that the Baltimore police had arrested one Richard Villiams, elias Albert Newman, alias Robert Jackson, alias Charles Bowell, and Angeline Filliams, nee Angeline Frets, on February 20, 1934, and that they are now being held on a charge of violating the White Slave Traffic Act; that the victim had stated she was acquainted with four of the Bremer children, and that some newspaper men had been making some inquiries as to whether they were being held in connection with the Brezer case.

Mr. Schenken stated that Mr. Traub had interviewed both of them, and there was no indicated that they had any information concerning this kidnaping case, but in view of the fact that the newspaper men were making inquiries concerning same, he thought it best to advise the Division so that in the event any newspaper articles appeared concerning these people, the Division would be informed.

February 16. An examination was made of the above exhibits and there is nothing about them which was discovered. They are being treated for latent fingerprints. It should be noted that the flap of the envelope (only) was apparently used by Mr. Bremer for the purpose of a memorandum of the following: "Wickersham 2-5900, extension 1348" which is on the outside, and a word which is not clear but which may be either "hanni" or "hamm" 2-77-88 on the glued side. This has been folded for a long time and is thoroughly stained from the leather. The latter notation locks like a combination for a safe or something of that sort, whereas, the other is surely a telephone number. While these numbers probably have no significance, it might be advisable to ascertain their meaning.

Mr. Borer called from St. Paul (10:25 A. M.). We stated that before the Attorney General made his recent announcement concerning conditions in St. Paul and Minneapolis Mayor Mahoney, of St. Paul, had planned to call for a Grand Jury investigation. This Grand Jury investigation will take place immediately and he has assounced that he will call the Attorney General and the Special Agents of the Division under subpoens before this Grand Jury to testify as to the conditions in St. Paul. Mr. Rorer thought the Director should be informed in advance of the fact that these subpossage were likely to issue.

In connection with the Brewer case, Mr. Rorer believes it will be advisable to issue a release to the newspapers concerning the fact that the ranson numbers are available. We stated that the fact we that the Division had these numbers had already been given publicity . and he thinks that something might be gained by informing the public that if they receive any large amount of money or receive money under unusual circumstances they might go to the bank or the Police Department and make a comparison of the numbers with the lists furnished.

I inquired of Mr. Borer as to whether the latent fingerprint of Frank Mash found on a beer bottle and identified by the Division had subsequently been discussed with the Police Department at St. Peni so that they knew that the identification had been made. When

I inquired as to whether the photographs of the Barker-Karpis gang had been shown to Father Delle and Mrs. Dehmer, and others, who mitnessed the kidnaping for identification purposes. Mr. Borer said that he had ordered all witnesses to be re-interviewed for this purpos

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE LIRICTOR

Mr. Purvis telephoned. He had in his office James Wiertin, alias James Moore, alias James Lawrence, a man who admittedly had a previous record, who claims that he was acquainted with Frisco Dutch in St. Paul, and for the sum of \$50 and his travel expenses he offered to go to St. Paul to aid in determining if Frisco Dutch were involved in the Bremer Kidneping. Mr. Purvis had previously requested the criminal record of Martin, and inquired as to why it had not been sent. An examination of the records at the Identification Unit revealed that this record had been sent to Mr. Purvis, by air mail, on February 20th, the date he requested it. However, the record, as furnished by telephone from the Identification Unit, was read over the telephone to Acting Special Agent in Charge Smith, at Chicago.

In the meantime I had talked with Mr. Porer in St. Paul, and inquired as to whether the services of this man would be desired. He indicated that if Martin really knew of conditions in the twin cities, and really could serve in obtaining information about Frisco Dutch, he might be valuable, but that someone in Chicago should talk with him and advise him as to whether the man was a hoar, and in the event Mr. Rorer believes that he can subsequently be of value, he will telephone the Division.

Mr. Saith was informed as to this and stated he would have Martin interviewed in order to try to reach a determination as to whether his services would be of value to Rorer, and he would then inform Rorer as to his conclusions.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Edward G. Bremer is the President of the Commercial State Bank of St. Paul, Minnesota. His father, Adolph Bremer, is reported to have made a considerable amount of money in the brevery business, and also controls a chain of banks in the Northwest, on, of which is the Commercial State Bank, which is known as the Facketeer Bank of St. Paul." A majority of the racketeers and those engaged in questionable enterprises have their accounts at that bank. Edward G. Bremer is said to be personally acquainted with all of these parties. Many of the depositors in this bank have their accounts under assumed names, presumably with the consent and knowledge of Edward G. Bremer.

This bank is a depositary for Leony Bleckman, who is known as the leader of the underworld at St. Paul. Gleckman is not the subject of an income tax inquiry, and it is reported that Edward G. Bremer was called upon to testify for the Government before Grand Jury proceedings against Gleckman. A true bill was returned, but the officials were disappointed in the character of the testimony afforded by Mr. Bremer, it being expected that he would be in sympathy with the Government's investigation.

Ann Cannon, 2219 Railroad Avenue, Beaumont, Texas, former wife of Dennis Woods of Port Arthur, Texas, Paula's first husband, stated that she knew Paula but all she knows about where she went upon leaving Beaumont is what Theo Riley and Dennis Woods have told her, and they said she went to Chicago, Ann Cannon went to Port Arthur and searched through Dennis Woods' trunks, but could find no letters or photographs of Paula. She suggested, however, that Phillip Mauhar (pronounced Mohair), husband of one of Charlie Harmon's sisters who was very much in Paula's company in Beaumont in 1932 and early part of 1933, might have her photograph and may know where she is.

Tombaugh's and the Art Craft Photograph Studies' indexes were searched at Beaumont. No record of Paula being photographed.

Jack Etie stated that he was in Chicago between July 15 and August 1, 1935, and thought he saw Paula on a No. 5 street car going toward South Chicago. He was not sure it was she, but the car was crowded and he lost her in the crowd about 10 miles out of the principal business district.

Jackie Reynolds, 2590 Sabine Street, Beaumont, Texas, a prostitute, stated that she only met Paula Harmon a time or two, but Vivien Childs was a close friend of Paula .

Williem Sekely, pertner of DeLotte, at the Pool Hall, Beaumont,

Texas, stated that the Cosmopolitan Magazine still comes to the Pool Hall, addressed to Preston Harmon; that about four months ago a letter came from the Cosmopolitan Publishing Company; that he opened it, and the company advised that the contract could not be cancelled, as though she had written the Publishing Company to stop sending the magazine to her; that the magazine is addressed to 994 Center Street, Besumont, but is delivered to the Pool Hall, because Theo Riley ordered the Post Office to do so.

Mrs. Velma Turk, 2540 Magnolia Street, Beaumont, Texas, again was interviewed and now states that either shortly before or after Easter Sunday, 1933 not more than two weeks before or after Paula Harmon left Beaumont, that before leaving Paula same by and asked her for Mrs. Mora Manhar's address in Mansas City, Kansas; that Mrs. Mauhar is a sister of Curtis Preston Barmon, alias Charlie Harmon; that she gave Mrs. Mauhar's address to Paula; that Paula was gone about a week and returned on a Thursday to Beaumont. Upon her return Paula stated that she had missed seeing Mrs. Mauhar in Kanses City as she had moved to Houston, Texas; that Paula also stated she had arranged for a room in a hospital, had engaged a physician and two nurses in Chicago, and wes going to have a plastic operation on her nose; that she would be gone four weeks, and would write and let her know when the operation was performed and also the address to which she (Mrs. Turk) could forward mail to Mer; that Paula left here on the Saturday following the day of her return on the first trip.

Mrs. Turk further stated that Phillip Mauhar, and his wife Nora have been separated for eight years; that Mauhar and Mr. Matt Turk have been berrel stave making in East Texas for many years; that Phillip Mauhar was very fond of Paula, and he was at her house 994 Center Street the day she departed the last time; that Phillip said Paula was going to Chicago, and get rid of Theo Riley of whom she was afraid, and when she came back they (Mauhar and she) were going to be married; that Phillip Mauhar and her husband, Matt Turk, now are making barrel staves six miles from Evergreen, Texas.

Mrs. Turk stated that while Paula Harmon was living in Beaumont with Theo Riley they lived at 775 Madison Street and also at 994 Center Street, and at each place she had a telephone. The number at each place was 6855.

That the first time she saw Paula after Charlie Harmon's death, was after Paula had been in the automobile accident at Lake Charles, La.; that Paula came to her home in Beaumont one Sunday afternoon accompanied by a woman whom she introduced as Mrs. Madeline Snyder, a friend of mine from Chicago, that Paula has told her about operating a beer flat in Chicago, and said she sold whiskey and beer for a year or three years, and said she was never bothered by the law; that she mentioned the fact that she had been arrested a few times with Charlie Harmon, but she never said where those arrests occurred.

Paula associated with Vivian Childs (a prostitute) in Beaumont, Texas

Mrs. Turk in her conversation with Agent referred to a Government Check Paula Harmon received, as Cherlie's bonus money. As he was in the Navy during the Torld War.

Karas used to be part owner of the Cozy lunch. Karas typewriter at one time had a Hectograph ribbon which is purplish, and slightly smudgy. The machine is a Corona No. 5, number 656647, and he bought the machine on October 31, 1932 new, Karas once lived at 76 West Summitt. He is 40 years of age, medium complexion, brown hair, slightly gray, slender, five feet eight inches. Karas can be located at 469 Wabasha.

Reinhard Brothers in Minneapolis, one of the original wholeselers to whom shipments of Filmo lenses have been made by the factory, has sold only two Filmo lenses at retail during the period December, January and February, Otherseles, as previously reported, were made at wholesele to branch stores in South Dakota. Employees have no recollection concerning the retail sale of two lenses.

Western Auto Supply Company stores have checked all of their records with sales slips, and all Filmo lenses have been accounted for through retail sales of single units, concerning which the employees have no recollection except in the case of the University Avenue store, where a check has

developed that a shortage of eleven Filmo lenses exists. Through the efforts of the General Menager of the Western Auto Supply Countries, a check of stock, sales slips and invoices has been made, and according to Mr. Derse, the General Manager, they are unable to account for the shortage of eleven of the lenses, except through thefts. All other lenses sold by the Western Auto Supply stores in the Twin Cities have been accounted for through individual sales of one unit, and concerning which none of the map ployees of the various stores have any recollection. The shortage in the general store which was previously reported has been accounted for through shipment of 24 Felmo lenses on December 27, 1933, to the Wichita, Kansas branch store, 24 Filmo lenses on December 27 to the DesMoines, Iows branch store, and 24 Filmo lenses to the Kansas City branch store on December 29, 1933. Leads in this connection have already been set out for the Kansas City office.

Investigation at the Topnotch Tire Company and Central Organization Stores has previously been reported, indicating only wholesele shipments to South Daketa, in connection with the Central Organization, and no sales whatever during the period in question by the Topnotch Tire Co.

At the wholesale house, Nichols, Deen and Gregg, all sales alips were checked in an effort to determine sales either to local garages or individuals, during the period in question, and it was ascertained that so sales of this item were made in January or February.

Agent was particularly advised by Mr. Parnell, in charge of automobile accessories, that no retail sales whatsoever have been allowed by this concern during the past six months.

With reference to Farwell, Ozmun and Kirk, wholesalers, St.

Paul, with the assistance of Mr. E. P. Aurelius, Manager of the stock
accessories division, check was made of all invoices and sales slips, with
the result that it was noted Pearl Brothers Garage purchased a dozen Filmo
lenses last August, and the Arcade Garage also purchased a dozen of these
lenses in September. Records of the wholesaler were again shecked to determine specifically whenter a sales of this article might have been made to
Herb's garage, St.Paul. Herb's Garage, it will be remembered, is a concern
of doubtful reputation, and has been for some months past under suspicion.
Through the assistance of Mr.Aurelius, Errangements were made with Mr.Ingman
a salesman, to visit Herb's garage with various types of tail light equipment

in an effort to determine whether or not here's garage carries Filmo lenses in stock. It was believed advisable to use Mr. Ingman in this connection, insemuch as the proprietor of the garage has frequently been contacted by Agents of this Division concerning other matters. Mr. Ingman reported that Herb's garage carried no Filmo lenses in stock, and apparently had sold none for many months.

At the Minneapolis Iron Store, through Mr. George Kelley, Manager in charge of automobile accessories, it was determined efter checking all sales records, that no retail sales had been made for Filmo lenses during the period in question, and no record of wholesale shipment for garages or truck fleets was found.

At the Salute Auto Supply Company, 389 Rice St. St. Paul, through Max Salute, proprietor, it was ascertained that Mr. Salute operates his business solely through the purchase of bankrupt stocks, and although he has seven Felmo lenses on hand, he claims that he has sold none during the past four or five months.

At the Arcade Garage, 1007 Arcade St. St. Paul, it was ascertained that this institution has only two Filmo lenses in stock, which were purchased last Fall from Farwell Ozmin and Kirk; that none have been sold since the first of December, and that all of those purchased from Farwell, Ozmin and Kirk were placed by the garage on truck, as demands for same were made. Joe Brukow, proprietor, indicated that from time to time truck drivers stopped at his place of business for repairs, and up until quite recently he has carried Filmo lenses in stock to repair teil lights for these truckers; that during the last few months there has been very little demand for this article, and he has allowed his stock to become depeleted.

william Pearl, Manager of Pearl Brothers Garage, 1198 Arcade St, advised that he has carried no filmo lenses in stock for approximately one year and has sold none during that period.

None of the other concerns contacted carry the Filmo lenses in stock, or have sold same during the past six months.

With reference to the Lightmaster, Sears and Roebuck, Lake Street, Minneapolis was again contacted, and the two persons employed in the electrical department were again interviewed, and advised that they have no recollection whatsoever concerning the sale of this item, although two Lightmasters have been sold since the 15th of January. Photographs of all

subjects under suspicion were exhibited to both Mr. indreseen and Mri Chatterton, and the description for Alvin Karpis as he appeared at the Grant Silver store, without result, contains employees stating that they had no recollection whatsoever concerning these sales.

The Sears Roebuck Store on West Broadway in Minneapolis was visited, and Agent was advised that this branch had carried no light-masters in stock since August last year, and had made no sales of this

In connection with the attempt of this office to connect the kidneping with known local hoodlum characters, known in the past 16 he friendly with the Karpis and Barker gang, telephones of the following individuals were checked for toll records during the period Movember 20, 1933 to February 22, 1934. Memoranda submitted by Special Agent Nells in this connection are not incorporated in this report, but are attached hereto for the information of the Division. The St. Paul office is analyzing the toll records, and such leads as are indicated will be set out by letter.

Edward George Bremer was given a shirt, pair of sox and a suit of underwear upon his release by the kidnapers. Investigation conducted by the Division and other offices developed the source of the above garments. Other information showed the names and addresses of the retailers. A table has been drawn, cross indexing the various towns and cities where two or three articles were sold. As a result of this cross index it was learned that the Mueller Clothing Company of Windon, Minnesota, sells both the shirt and the underwear, and that the J. H. Conley Co. Watertown, B.D. sells the underwear and shirt. Information received at the office as a result of investigation by Special Agent E. N. Notesteen a few minutes prior to the dictating of this report indicates that Karpis purchased some clothing in South St.Paul, Minn. This phase of the investigation is being developed as rapidly as possibles.

Investigation is also being conducted to locate the typewriter used in writing the ransom notes. When developments occur as to this phase of the investigation the Division will be promptly notified. In this connection there is attached to this report copy of a memorandum of Special Agent 0. G. Hall, regarding investigation performed by him in an effort to locate the typewriter.

Investigation is being conducted by Special Agent E. N. Notesteen to locate the store in which the Filmo lens used by the kidnapers in the signal lights at the time of the payoff were purchased. In this connection there is attached hereto copy of a memorandum submitted by Special Agent E. N. Notesteen. This phase of the investigation is also progressing.

As has been previously stated in reports in this ease, walter Mages, contact man, was instructed by the kidnapers to proceed to 969 University Avenue, St.Paul, on the night of the payoff, where he would find a Chevrolet coupe identified by a Shell sign on each door, which car he was to drive in accordance with further instructions to be found in the car. This car was found to have been stolen on December 22, 1935, from Dr. J. L. Tomasek. Special Agent S. L. Fortenberry conducted the following investigation concerning the automobile:

On the morning of February 23, 1934, I examined the Chevrolet Coupe used by WALTER MACEE to deliver the ransom money in the BREMER case, and ascertained that the exact mileage on the car is 10,710.7 miles. I called the insurance company, the Northwestern Casualty Insurance Company, which company carried the insurance on the car, and they informed me that the mileage reported on the car at the time it was stolen was 8,000 miles; however this was an estimate and the exact mileage is not known. This is the same statement given by DR. J. L. TOMASEE, who said that as near as he sould remember, it was 8,000 miles but that he could not say the exact mileage.

After examining the route taken by WALTER MAGEE from 969 University Avenue to his return to the Schmidt Brewing Company at 882 West 7th Street, as nearly as could be ascertained, he drove between 135 and 140 miles on his trip.

ARTHUR R. BARKER alias \*DOC\* PARKER, and FRED BARKER, ALVIN KARPIS, EDWARD W. BENZ, THEODORE BENZ, MRS. KATE BARKER, to the men in the check room at the Bus Station and to various other employees at the Bus Station, and none of them were able to identify any of the above pictures as having been seen in the Bus Station at any recent date or at any time, as far as they could remember.

H TIME

For possible future use the St. Paul office obtained a list of all passengers arriving and departing from Minneapolis and St. Paul by Northwest Airways during the period January 16, 1934 to February 10, 1934, inclusive. This list is being kept in the office.

An investigation has been conducted by various agents in the effice in an effort to determine where the paper used by the kidnapers and the kidnaped victim, during the period of his abduction, was purchased. This investigation has failed to produce results to date, but is being continued. In this connection there is quoted herewith a memorandum submitted by Special Agent John E. Brennan:

> "Referring to letter from the Boston office dated Teb. 19, 1934, and list of "Purchasers of Note Paper described", attached hereto, the undersigned made inquiry at the places listed in St. Paul and Minneapolis, but found mone where the salesmen, salesladies or clerks had any recollection of the persons who had purchased this paper. Summerizing the warious interviews it appears that the paper in question is the most staple kind available for public consumption, the most common bond paper in use, and requires no salesmanship to dispose of. The firms listed as above referred to have been direct purchasers from the Eaton Paper Company, but are by no means the only places in the Twin Cities where the paper may be purchased. They are, in fact, the largest purchasers, buying direct in order to obtain a larger discount, and in some instances pool their orders with smaller concerns, that the it may be large enough, and in some instances act as jobbers, selling to drug stores and the like. The paper, particularly in lots P 202 and 42351, is available in many corner drug stores in Minneapolis and St.Paul.

Due to the many sources from which a box of this paper may be obtained and the remoteness of obtaining an identification of a purchaser, at the suggestion of Inspector Rorer, further inquiry is being deferred in favor of other matters in which the time element is an important factor, and in which there is a somewhat larger possibility of identifying the kidnapers.

Reference is made to the incident in which it is claimed that Karpis, the two Barkers, and Tomay Sarroll entered the home of a bank cashier at Topeka, Kansas, and attempted to force him to surrender the key to the bank of which he is an employee, for the purpose of robbing same. During their stay at the bank employee's home, they dropped a purse containing a conditional sales contract, of which Tommy Carroll was a party. The following investigation was conducted by this office regarding this phase of the investigation:

With reference to the Ford DeLuxe coupe, Motor No. 40-283351, purchased from the Ford Motor Sales Company, 117 West University Avenue, St.Paul, Special Agent O. C. Hall and R. C. Coulter, interviewed Herbert Imholte, Sales Representative of the above mentioned company at the St. Paul Division office. He claimed to recall the transaction, but not to be able to identify Carroll as the purchaser, stating the transaction involved their acceptance of a Chevrolet coupe. He later sent the company's original records to this office, at the request of Agents. These records disclose T. L. Carroll, 668 Central Park Place, St.Paul, purchased the Ford coupe in question on May 13, 1933, at which time 1933 Minneapolis Motor Vehicle license No. B337821 was assigned to the car in his name. Payment was made by actual allowance on Chevrolet Victoria 1931 model coupe, Motor No. 2460114, serial number 21 AE30515, bearing 1933 Minnesota Motor Vehicle license No. B316962, at \$365.00 and cash balance of \$421.04, with refund to Republic Finance Co. of \$115.00.

Agent Hall and this Agent interviewed Mrs. Adelia Filben,
Apartment 010, Filben Court Apartments, 668 East Central Park Place, who
stated that she had read about Carroll in the newspapers, and through that
source knew who he was. However, he had never lived in that apartment
building. She stated there was a girl by the name of Carroll who had occupied an apartment there, whom she believed to be a night club entertainer,
but she left last winter and it was her understanding this girl went to
New York. However, she left no forwarding address, and Mrs. Filbenstated
she knew none of the girl's associates. Mrs. Filben is the mother of Tom
Filben, who substantially controls the slot machine racket in Ramsey County,
in which St. Paul is the seat of Government. Filben is reported to own the
apartment house in question and has become rather wealthy, although he has
the reputation of associating with criminals.

A check at the Minnesota Motor Vehicle license bureau disclosed that 1933 Minnesota motor vehicle license B316-962, was issued to Ben Frank, 372 N. Smith Avenue, St. Paul, and later transferred to the Ford

Motor Sales Co. The date of transfer was given as Gotober 20, 1935, However, this date was the day the Ford Motor Sales Co. sold the car to another individual, and is in accordance with the usual mode of sales.

The signature of T. L. Carroll appearing on the retail buyer's order was checked with the signature on the St. Paul Police identification records and was found to be identical.

The 1933 St. Paul Directory lists Thomas

Post Office Inspector John Streeh, Post Office and Customs Building, St. Paul, who handled the postal cases against Carroll and others, informed me he interviewed Sally Carroll, wife of Towny Carroll, after he became a fugitive, and that he definitely recalls that she told him that she and Carroll visited the Century of Progress at Chicage for a week after his release from the Ramsey County Jail, and that she told him where they had lived, but owing to the fact that it had no bearing on the inquiry he was making, he made no note of the above information. Streek stated Sally Carroll is a radio entertainer and is now residing at 5242-16th Avenue, South, Minneapolis. He stated Carroll, who originally came from the State of Oklahoma, had never been in any serious trouble until after his release on bond in connection with the post office burglary; that the bond, which was in the amount of \$10,000,00, was returnable at LaCrosse, Wisconsin the third and the standard of the Tuesday in September, 1933; that Carroll was not present on that date and it was continued until October, 1933, when he was present, but again continued until November 16, 1933, when Carroll failed to put in an appearance. He stated during the latter part of October, 1933, the First National Bank of Brainard, Bareinard, Minnesota, was robbed, and a week or two later the Minneapolis Police received a call that a bank robber was living at 637 E. 17th Street, which is the residence of Carmel Tremont, this woman having assisted Carroll in providing bail bond on the Post Office burglary charge; that two detectives called at this address and found Carroll there with \$1400.00 in a suit case, and possibly a machine gun, with which he attempted to e scape. He was arrested by one detective and left in custody of the other while the first completed a search of the house. Before the return of the first detective, Cerroll slugged the second detective and escaped. He was positively identified and later the money was reported to have been positively identified as a part of a shipment to the First National Bank of Brainard, from the Federal Reserve Bank. Carroll next appeared in San Antonio, Texas,

with one Fisher, who was recently returned and sentenced to a term in this United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, on charge of Post Office burglary from St. Paul, Minnesota. In addition to the Post Office burglary charge Carroll is wanted for murder of a San Antonio, Texas Police detective, which crime was committed at the time Fisher was arrested, or within a day or two of that time.

Mr. Strech further advised that investigation at San Antonio, Texas, disclosed that Carroll was associating with one Jimmie Williams, age thirty, blonde, about five feet six inches tall, and who weighed about one hundred and fifty pounds. He has a blonde wife, about thirty years old, and a child four or five years old, sex unknown.

Also with one Wayne Huttner, thirty-five years old; six feet tall, one hundred and seventy-five pounds, who had a dark haired --wife. Both Williams and Huttner were reported to be driving new Essex Tarraplanes, bearing California license plates, numbers not secured. Nothing further is known regarding these men. and a state of the state of

Carroll was further reported to be associating at San : 12 Antonio with one Tommy Gannon, a St. Paul character, who drives a Buick Victoria coupe, listed in the name of Anderson at the Tailor Shop, next door to Harry Sawyer's former speakeasy on Wabasha Avenue, St. Paul. The second of the second

Mr. Street further advised that one Morris Goldberg was the . person who rrranged for Carroll's bond here, and that it is his understanding that Tom Filben put up a ten thousand dollar note to the principal way owner of the real estate, when it became apparent that Carroll and Fisher were intending to jump their bonds and that Morris Goldberg received a fee of \$4,500,00 for securing the bond. Mr. Strech stated he was confident that Caroll would have stood trial had it not become known that he had been identified as one of the participants of the Brainard bank robbery. He stated ... after that time Carroll got "big" as he knew he would be sentenced to serve a life term in connection with that crime.

The production of the production of the Mr. Strech stated he knew that Carroll was a friend of Karpis and the Barkers and that all were friendly with Harry (Dutch) Sawyer, and that they as well as Gannon appear to have substantial connections in St. Paul, as nothing ever happens to them here, although he was personally reported to the St. Paul Police Department instances when Gannon was well supplied with money and told them what bank it was reported to have come from. He stated from a confidential source he heard that Carroll was in St. Paul on January 19, 1934. However, he doubts that Carroll will attempt to communicate with his wife, as he was living with some other woman, name

unknown, when the trouble accurred in San Antonio. He further advised that he had been informed that the Burns Detective Agency had found where Carroll had been living in Topeka, Kansas, and that it had also been determined that Earpis and the Barkers had been residing in Topeka at another address. He stated that Earpis, the Barkers and Carroll are reported to have gone to Chicago after the unsuccessful attempt to rob the bank at Topeka, Kansas.

At a later date, if found advisable, Sally Carroll willbe interviewed for information regarding the trip to Chicago with her husband. Some of the foregoing knformation does not appear relevant to the investigation at present, but has been recorded as received for whatever value it may be for future reference.

It is noted in the memorandum of Special Agent H. D. Bray,
Kansas City, Mo. dated February 16, 1934; that reference is made to
Sylvester Walters. There is a possibility that this man is an escaped
convict from the Texas penitentiary, as he is known to Special Agent R.C.
Coulter of this office, who stated he was sentenced to a term in the Texas
State Penitentiary during or subsequent to 1925. He thereafter escaped, but
was apprehended within a year or two, being arrested on a charge of robbery
while armed, and was sentenced to serve a term of 99 years in the Texas
State Penitentiary. Neither of these sentences was under the name of Sylvester Walters. However he is listed under that name as well as Stanley
Stewart in the Identification Unit of the Division.

The investigation is continuing, and no leads are being set
