PHONE. BREKID BOSTON HERALD AND BOSTON GLOBE TODAYS ISSUES, ARE CARRYING STORIES TO HE EFFECT THAT AN ATTEMPT HAD BEEN MADE BY ALLEGED KIDNAPPERS TO LURE JOSEPH A TOMASELLO, PROMINENT BOSTON CONTRACTOR, TO DETROIT WHERE HE WAS TO BE THE HELD FOR RANSOM. THE BOSTON POST CARRIES AN ARTICLE TO THE EFFECT THAT AN ATTEMPT HAD BEEN MADE TO LURE TOMASELLO TO DETROIT LAST JULY IN AN EFFORT TO SWINDLE HIM OUT OF \$250,000. UPON MAKING APPROPRIATE INQUIRY IT HAS BEEN DETERMINED THAT THE KIDNAPING ALLEGATION IS ABSOLUTELY WITHOUT FOUNDATION. FRANK W. TOMASELLO, ASSISTANT U S ATTORNEY HERE, BROTHER B OF ALLEGED VICTIM, ADVISES THAT THE SWINDLE IN QUESTION WAS ATTEMPTED IN JUNE OF 1934 BY WELL KNOWN CONFIDENCE MEN. IN THIS CONNECTION PLEASE REFER TO MY LETTER DATED 11-8-35 ADDRESSED TO THE DETROIT BUREAU OFFICE, CAPTIONED "BREKID" CONCERNING THE REQUEST CAPTAIN SHEEHAN OF THE BOSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT MADE OF THE DETROIT POLICE TO HOLD FOR EXTRADITION CASSIUS MCDONALD. THE SAME MOB RESPONSIBLE FOR THE SWINDLE OF JOHN THE CAPOBIANCO, CONTRACTOR, BRIGHTON, MASSACHUSETTS, REFERRED TO IN SAID LETTER IS RESPONSBLE FOR THE ATTEMPTED SWINDLE OF TOMASELLO.

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was approximately 35 years old, weighed about 155 pounds, had brown hair and appeared to be of very fine character. He also stated that she drove an old Cord automobile, either a roadster or coupe; that she was in the vicinity of Daytona Beach and the Weaver home on a vacation; that her husband owns and operates a furniture business in Chicago. He did not know the address of this furniture establishment, nor did he recall the name of the woman. He also advised that upon one occasion he and the woman went to Weaver's house to cook crabs which they had caught. Upon this occasion Weaver was away from home and he is confident that Weaver does not know the woman. He expressed the opinion that the name of this woman could be obtained from the hotel register or from anyone in Gill's Saloon, adding that everyone in the latter establishment knew her. White was confident that this woman did not have any connection with or any part in the Bremer case and that she did not have any knowledge of the Karpis gang.

White also advised that he was confident that Weaver did not have any contacts of a criminal nature in that vicinity and he knew of no one who might have approached him at his home in connection with the Bremer case. He further stated in this regard that no suspicious persons ever contacted the home while he was there. White expressed the belief that the ransom money which Weaver was alleged to have had in his possession was changed to good money on various weekend trips which Weaver took away from his home. White did not know where Weaver went on these trips and is of the opinion that no one in that vicinity would have knowledge of such facts.

White advised that while he was at the Weaver home he had many girl: friends who were tourists and local girls but that he felt certain that none of them had any connection with the Karpis gang or with any other criminal element. He was of the belief that Weaver was entirely out of contact with underworld characters; that the money which he had was changed at small stores and the like and that none of it reached the underworld for this purpose. To substantiate this position, White related that at the time the Barkers were killed in Florida Weaver expressed amazement that they were so close to their location.

Agent questioned White as to his knowledge of Hyrtle Eaton's part in the kidnaping and also as to whether Hyrtle Eaton was apprized of the fact that Weaver was wanted for kidnaping. This was done to establish any passible harboring charge which the government might bring against Lyrtle Eaton. White expressed the belief in this regard that Lyrtle maton had no knowledge of Weaver's activities in regard to the Bremer case. He added that he could not state this positively but

that his belief was based upon Weaver's "close-mouthed" attitude. He reflected, however, that it was entirely possible that she did have this knowledge because of the promiscuous placing of Identification Orders and because of the amounts of money which Weaver had to enable him to live in that fashion.

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The picture of G. W. Hout, which was received from the Oklahoma City Office with reference letter dated October 28, 1935, was exhibited to James White. White advised that he had no recollection of having seen this individual and does not know him. He also stated, upon being informed of the prison record of Hout at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, that Hout was incarcerated there prior to White's prison sentence.

The photograph forwarded by the letter received from the Chicago Office dated October 31, 1935, in which letter it was stated that Mrs. Thompson advised she did not know the identity of some persons in the picture but that the third person reading from left to right is a Mr. Marsh, , the fourth person Myrtle Raton and the fifth person Mrs. Marsh, was exhibited to James White. James White stated that he took this picture at the filling station operated by Thompson; that the identity of the individual appearing on the extreme left of this photograph is a chauffeur who drove the car belonging to a Catholic Priest, namely Father Stanley. Father Stanley is the second person from the left and White advised that he is a Priest from Scranton, Pa. and is very well known in that community, being a public character such as Father Coughlin, of Royal Oak, Michigan. He was of the opinion that Father Stanley was a highly respected person and of course had no connection with the criminal element. He also advised that the first person appearing in the photograph, namely the chauffeur of Father Stanley, was connected in some way with religious practices and was probably a Brother in the Catholic Faith. White informed that the third person from the left appearing in the photograph is Mr. Clem Morris, who is referred to in the letter of reference, as Mr. Marsh. white stated that Clem Morris is a highly respected person; that he resides near Scranton, Pa. and is a good friend of Father Stanley; that he is a man approximately 70 years old, very short, about 5'4", weight about 160 pounds and a very generous and likeable individual. He also stated he was formerly a Sheriff in the community in which he resided near Scranton, Pa, and that anybody in that vicinity would know Clem Morris. White then stated that the fourth person from the left appearing in the picture was Lyrtle Katon and that the fifth person or the one on the extreme right was Mrs. Clem

Morris who was also a friend of Father Stanley and who came to know Myrtle Eaton and William Weaver by their vacation expedition into that part of Florida. White also advised that the automobile which appears immediately in back of the persons whose pictures were described above is a Buick owned by Father Stanley and operated by his chauffeur and that the picture of the automobile appearing on the extreme right of the photograph is that of the Oldsmobile owned by William Weaver.

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white was certain that none of the persons whose pictures appeared had any knowledge of Weaver's criminal activities or of the activities of any other criminal element. No had is being suggested for the office of origin to interview any of these persons as same is being left to its discretion.

According to White, these persons came to Florida merely as vacationists and they had no other purpose in visiting the Weaver family.

white also advised that W. H. Thompson, who operated the filling station near the home of Weaver wanted to sell out to Weaver, who intended to have James White operate the station. James White operated the station for approximately two weeks "to try it out" and because of the insufficient income, he was not interested in following this occupation. He advised that he hung around the filling station quite often; that he would meet tourists in that manner and none of those he met appeared to have any particular connection with Weaver,

According to White, W. H. Thompson met the woman he described as a blonde girl and whose identity was more closely established in the beginning of this report through James White; that she and James White were traveling down the highway in the Cord automobile; that they passed Thompson and took him to his destination which was a very short distance away, namely the mail box where Thompson received his mail. White expressed the belief that this was the only time Thompson had ever come in contact with the person whom he describes as a blonde girl.

Report of Special Agent J. B. Dickerson, New York City, 11-2-35.

#### AT MERIDIAN, MISSISSIPPI

Colonel Bob Dalton is quite a well known character around Meridian, Mississippi, where he has resided for the past three or four years. He spends most of his time in the East and around Chicago. Chief of Detectives Harbour, of Meridian, is well acquainted with Dalton and says he is thoroughly unreliable and the biggest liar in the South. He has had two oil promotions between Meridian and Newton, Mississippi, neither of which has been more than just something for Dalton to use in selling stock. He boasts of his ability to go to the big rich fellows on Wall Street and unload his stock on them. He always puts on a "6-gallon hat", boots, etc., to make him appear thoroughly western when he calls on these persons. He usually walks in without knocking or ringing and explains that he was raised out where men are men and he doesn't know anything about door bells and glass doors, etc. He prides himself on his ability to take the money from the rich and also that he has never taken a cent from a working man. He boasts that he is personally acquainted with any prominent person that might be mentioned and whenever any high-powered crook is mentioned, he always claims a personal touch there, too. It was not surprising to Chief Harbour that the Colonel had

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boasted in New York that he was in possession of into metich about Earpt.

Colonel Bob Dalton, (whence the Colonel, no one inows), was the ject of an impersonation investigation by the New Orleans Office several months ego, having represented himself to the Postmaster at Clarksdale, Mississippi, as a Deputy U. S. Marshal and requested the Postmatter to sea if he had some mail, this after closing time. On interview, Dalton denied having made such representations but said that he is a Deputy Sheriff in about six countles of Mississippi. Also, when interviewed at that time by this agent, he said that he would go to his personal friend, Jim Farley, and "get" that Postmaster's job for having reported the matter.

In company with Chief of Detectives Harbour, the writer went to Dalton's home, about a mile from Meridian, and interviewed him. The writer first approached him by saying that the Bureau had received information that he was well acquainted with Karpis and knew his present whereabouts. Dalton reddened and then started to say that he had made no such claim and knew nothing. The writer followed up with the statement that it was understood that he told certain persons in New York City that he had known Karpis well and that he had said that Karpis is at present in the Republic of Mexico: Dalton then said, yes, he had known Karpis all his life and that Karpis is at present in Mexico, but that he, Dalton, wants to go down there himself and bring him out and turn him over to the Department of Justice or turn him over to his very good friend, Chief of Detectives Harbour, to whom it would mean so much to have it said that he, Harbour, had maptured him. Dalton does not want to go down there and assessinate Karpis and does not want to go down there and get killed himself so he will have to work it out to his own satisfaction, or, if the Department of Justice will pay the expenses of Dalton and the writer to go into Mexico to get Alvin, he will conduct the writer to that section where he is supposed to be and where Delton will have contacts through whom he can go right to Karpis and get him. He is in the section of Guadalagara, Mansanio and Colima; somewhere in one of those places or in the 🕾 section of country, covering about 500 miles, in which they are located. There are not more than a dozen white men in this section and every one of them is a fugitive criminal from the United States. It's a bad section, full of bad men, Mexicans and those criminals from the United States. Dalton thinks Karpis is at a seaport. ready to set sail any time someone is closing in on him, end that he will go to Rio de Janeiro, where he would go to a hotel that is all granite and marble, the finest there, but into which only criminals can come as it is operated by a ... criminal. "Karpis looks enough like a Mexican to be taken for one." He wears a 45 automatic in the small of his back where it is likely to be overlooked by anyone searching him. Karpis is very erect and for that reason is able to wear a gun that way without it being noticed. He is the only man the Colonel knew who could do that. The Colonel, (self-styled, so far as can be learned), says that he has known Karpis all of his, Karpis', life. Karpis got his schooling from Jess Literiel, formerly of Marlow, Oklahoma. Literiel was in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary with Karpis and was the brains that taught Karpis things. Literlel has gone straight now, studied law while in the pen and is now practicing law at Marlow, Oklahoma.

Dalton also related to the writer his intimacies with the great men of L'exico, the past and present President, and others, each of whom he calls by

first name. He is also a buddy of John Garner, Joe Burphy and Colonel Starling, Pelix Garcia, Rodriquez, etc.

A STORES Dalton is convinced that the writer is his friend and he is willing to tell the writer the source of his information that Karpis is in Mexico, but only on the writer's solemn promise to him, Dalton, that the information will not be passed on to Washington as he knows there have been leaks from the Department of Justice and he doesn't want to be the cause of the assassination of the man who .\* gave him the information. He indicated that the one who gave him the information had formerly been a convict, had gone straight for the past twenty years, like 1991 Dalton has, is married and has a family; that this fellow saw Karpis some time ago in the United States and that Karpis, in the United States, told this friend that he, Karpis, is hiding in Mexico. Dalton did not know what was the occasion for Karpis' trip back to the United States, but understood that he is surrounded with a bunch of men down there, including "that fellow from Walla Walla, Washington."/ Dalton was assured that any information secured by the writer would be kept in the confidence by the Department but he shook his head and declined to give anything ... definite. > -

Dalton said that an attempt was made to assassinate him a few months ago and exhibited scars on his abdomen and legs, which looked like gun shot wounds. He explained that he was "sitting down when he should have been standing up", and would make no further explanation about it. The report got out here in Meridian several months ago that he had been pretty badly shot up by a Chicago posse following a bank stick-up, but no definite information could ever be secured nor could anything intelligible be obtained from him by persons in Meridian to whom he is supposed to be very friendly.

Dalton's wife was present part of the time he was being interviewed and she was asked what relation she was to Huey Long. She replied that her mother was the first cousin of Huey Long's mother. She appears to have caught the spirit of the Colonel's hot air. She calls him Colonel Dalton in the presence of others. On one occasion she had to call the police to come out and stop him from shooting holes through the ceiling of his bedroom.

It is realized that the above details have no real interest to this investigation but they are given in order that it might be better understood what character of man is claiming to know Alvin Karpis' whereabouts.

Dalton asked who, in New York, had said he told of knowing Karpis. He was told the Washington Office had just advised that information had been received to that effect. He then set himself to wondering whom he had told that to. No doubt he has told fabulous tales to many and does not remember to whom he told this particular one.

Reference is hereby made to letter from the Chicago Office to the Oklahoma City Office, dated November 5, 1935, letter from the Detroit Office to the Bureau, dated November 6, 1935, and Mr. Connelley's teletype to the Oklahoma City Office, dated November 9, 1935, in the above entitled case. (Bureau file 7-576.)

With reference to the report of Special Agent Paul Hansen, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, dated May 31, 1935 (not 1925), which contains an undeveloped lead to endeavor to locate a 1,600 acreyranch near Clinton and Taloga, Oklahoma, it is noted from the report of Agent Paul Hansen, dated September 7, 1935, pages 7 and 8, that an investigation regarding this matter has been made by Agent Welles, of this office. Further attention is being given this angle at this time and a report will be appropriately submitted.

With reference to letter from the Pittsburg Office, dated June 24, 1935, requesting investigation in the vicinity of Kansas and Spring Creek, Oklahoma, the report of Agent Paul Hansen, dated at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, July 8, 1935, page 2 contains a report of inquiries that were made in this matter to, I think, a logical and definite negative conclusion.

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With reference to the undeveloped lead set out in report of Agent S. L. Fortenberry, Detroit, Michigan, dated June 27, 1935, requesting that information be obtained concerning a man named Mel, who was formerly a close friend of Campbell, please be advised that the report of Special Agent Paul Hansen, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, dated August 2, 1935, on pages 6 and 7, describes the locating of this man named Mel, who is Milton O. Brooks, of Tulsa. This report further sets out a successful interview with Brooks at Tulsa. The report of Agent Hansen dated November 2, 1935, on page 4, relates that Brooks, who is incorrectly referred to as Melvin Brooks, has been arrested and is now in jail at Sedan, Kansas.

With reference to the undeveloped lead set out in the report of Special Agent in Charge E. P. Guinane, Denver, Colorado, dated July 28, 1935, requesting information as to the identity of the person who was arrested with Campbell, be ascertained from the Oklahoma City Police Department or the Tulsa Police Department, has not been investigated to date but will be handled in the very near future.

Concerning the Bureau letter, dated September 16, 1935, requesting that a photograph of a person known as "The Stuttering Kid" be displayed to a confidential informant please be advised that the report of agent Hensen, dated at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, November 2, 1935, on page 4, discloses that numerous efforts have been made to contact the informant at Tulsa, but with only negative results. Other unsuccessful efforts have been made since the dictation of this report. He will be interviewed at the earliest possible date and a report on that matter will be appropriately submitted.

The request to interview Dr. Fred D. Sparks, Ponca City, Oklahoma, regarding a man said to resemble Karpis, as set out in Bureau letter, dated October 9, 1935, has been completed and is set out in the report of Agent Paul Hansen, dated at Oklahoma City, November 2, 1935, on pages 5 and 6.

Each of the above mentioned reports by Agent Hansen indicate that a copy was sent to the Chicago Office and if that office has not received a copy of each of these reports one will be furnished upon request.

With reference to Mr. Connelley's teletype to this office, dated November 9, 1935, and to the letter by the Detroit Office, to the Bureau, dated November 6, 1935, it appears that Mrs. Richard D. Wilson and Mildred Jones, sisters of Wynone Burdette, have great fears of Earry Compbell and Marris celling on them. This would indicate

that they do not want them to come; that they are not looking for them for any definite reason and would not willingly do anything for either of them should they show up at either place. With respect, however, to Mr. Connelley's suggestion that the homes of these two sisters be immediately kept under surveillance, please be advised that Mildred Jones lives on the Gillespie oil lease, about three or three and one half miles northeast of Turley, Oklahoma. The house in which she lives is close by five other houses, located on this oil lease and occupied by oil workers. It appears that it would be an impossibility for a constant surveillance to be made of the house in which Mrs. Jones lives, without the whole community knowing about it. A set up of this description was made in the Jones home last May and -kept for several days but it was impossible to do it without the neighbors knowing that officers were in her home and the news spread to the Tulsa Police Department as well as other officers in Oklahoma. Reports of Agent Hansen in this case contain an arrangement with Omer S. u/Herris, a close neighbor to Mrs. Jones, who is apparently intimately acquainted with her and with Mr. and Mrs. Gillespie, owners of this oil lease, to advise Agent Hansen or the Oklahoma City Office of any suspicious callers Mrs. Jones has. The Gillespies are reputable people and apparently have the confidence of Mrs. Jones, and it is believed that they can be relied upon completely. Mildred Jones has repeatedly promised agent Hansen that she will cooperate by immediately transmitting any information she receives regarding Harry Campbell, and it is believed, from an observation of her actions in the past, that she is truthful in this regard and that she will supply Agent Hansen with any information she comes into possession of.

With respect to the home where Mrs. Richard D. Wilson lives, until recently she was living with her husband at Arondale, Oklahoma, which is located on what is known as "Section No. 8" and her husband is a pumper on that lease. This house is located in a remote section of the country and could not be successfully kept under constant surveillance for any length of time. Mr. Charlie Cox, who works for the same company as does wilson, and his wife, Mrs. Cox, who are neighbors to the Wilson, have both agreed to cooperate with Agent Hansen and the Oklahoma City Office by supplying information they obtain from the Wilsons with respect to Harry Campbell or anything that affects him. It is noted from the letter referred to above by the Detroit Office to the Bureau that Mrs. Wilson is now living in Hominy, Oklahoma, which is a short distance from Arondale. Further investigation will be made in this respect at Hominy, Oklahoma, to establish some confidential informant who will be able to observe the Wilson home. In this connection, however, it is to be noted that both Mr. and Mrs. Wilson have, on numerous occasions, expressed their willingness to cooperate with

Agent Hansen by furnishing him any information they obtain regarding Campbell. As stated below, Mrs. Wilson will be interviewed by Agent Hansen in an effort to obtain how she came into the possession of the information that Harry Campbell has visited his home at Tulsa recently.

For sometime the Oklahoma City Office has had under consideration obtaining, in some way, a suitable surveillance, possibly the renting of a house near the home of Campbell's parents, in order that a constant surveillance might be made. I discussed this matter over the telephone with Mr. Tamm November 11, 1935, and he stated that an arrangement of this kind is desired by the Bureau. An effort will, accordingly, be made immediately to make this desired set up, particularly for the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, so that Bureau agents may have the Campbell home under surveillance constantly over this holiday period.

With reference to Mr. Connelley's teletype referred to above, about Campbell visiting his mother, regarding which no prior notice had been given than the letter from the Detroit Office, referred to above, it is to be noted from Agent Paul Hensen's report dated at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, September 7, 1935, on page 2, that information was obtained as to a visit Campbell is alleged to have made to his home, being driven to Tulsa by "a boy" whose name is, in all probability, Milt Letts. Oklahoma City Office is making a concentrated effort to locate this Letts fellow to solicit his cooperation in locating these fugitives. As reported before by Agent Hansen, Mrs. Lond Smith, widow of J. Karl Smith, who was apparently killed by Harry Campbell and others, and who is bitter toward Campbell and desires his apprehension above all other things in the world, lives most of the time with her sister, Rub Blackwell, at 820 South Rockford Street, in Tulsa, next door to the Campbell home. She and her sister have promised to maintain a close surveillance at their home. If Campbell has been home to see his mother twice since Wynona's arrival at the United States Detention Farm, Milan, Michigan, it was surely without the knowledge of these two informants. It is thought that Mrs. Smith, who is personally acquainted with Campbell, is a fortunate person to have living next door to the Campbells.

Agent Hansen will interview Mrs. Wilson at Hominy, Oklahoma, in the very near future and endeavor to obtain from her, without informing her of a knowledge of her conversation with Wynona, how she knows Harry has been to see his mother two different times since Wynona has been at Milan.

The reports made in this case by the Oklahoma City Office reflect that Agent Hansen has established confidential informants from the Kansas border south to Tulsa, Oklahoma, and vicinity. These informants are both reputable citizens and underworld characters and most of them are personally acquainted with Campbell and are persons that Campbell is likely to contact should be come to Oklahoma. Some of these informants are likewise personally acquainted with Karpis. Agent Hansen is devoting practically all of his time on this case in the Oklahoma City Office district and I feel that the case is being handled to the best interests of the Bureau.



Recently, while Special Agent M. A. Loughren of this office was at Eldorado. Illinois, discussing fingerprint work with the Chief of Police, igent Loughran showed him the fingerprints as the first page of the new Identification Order Booklet, and in each doing the Chief sew the pisture of Alvin Karpis. He immediately stated that he had seen that person during the past month; that John there had been a collision between a new Ford Y-8 Sedan, dark in color, with Illinois license plates, not noted, in which the only person occupying the car was the man identified as Karpis. He stated that there were two other local people in the other ear and that the two ears had amashed fenders; that Karpis was very rough in his talk and though admitting that he was to blame stated that he was not going to pay for the damage; that the Chief had a feeling that its he was plenty tough and for that reason was somewhat afraid to try and arrest him; that he even failed to take the license sumber and S was unable to recall who the people were who were in the other ear. although Agent Longhran elosely questioned him in this regard. He recalled remarking to the other police officer afterwards that the man who was the etranger certainly looked like a convict and that 🔞 he felt momenhat afraid of him. He did not seem to be sure where the escident had occurred but believed that it had originally happened at the intersection of Eighways #1 and #14 on the edge of town. Chief Ritchey did not recognize the name of Empis and was somewhat A surprised when agent explained that he was the most sought after man ". in the United States by law enforcement authorities. Agent Loughran contacted the filling station attendants and the woman running a week. pullmen food stand at the above intersection, but none of the persons interviewed recalled the particular accident nor were they able to identify the photograph of Earpis. Agent also presented the photograph to the officers of the local state bank in Eldorado, but they stated they had never seen anyone fitting his description.

Apperently there is no further detailed information

available at this time. The Chief simply thought he saw Karpis.

Re: Alvin Karpis, with aliases, Fugitive I. O. #1218; et al. Edward George D Bremer, Victim. Kidnaping.

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated October 31st, 1935, addressed to the St. Paul Bureau Office, copy of which was furnished the Omaha Bureau Office.

On November 7th, 1935, at the Nebraska State Penitentiary, Lincoln, Nebraska, Special Agent G. H. Wilson interviewed JESS DOYLE, Number 12369, who at first was reluctant to talk at all unless assured that anything that he might say would not in any manner be allowed to be placed in any newspaper. stating that in the past various things had been printed in the newspapers and attributed to him, which had no basis in fact. Doyle was assured by Agent Wilson that enything he might say in this interview would not be given publicity in the newspapers.

Doyle stated that it was erroneously claimed and believed that he had been, in the past, intimate and closely associated with all the associates and friends of the Barkers and of Karpis, but in reality his acquaintance with such of those that he did know, grew out of his intimate friendship and association with Fred Barker, from the time he was a very small boy.

Doyle maintains that he was not implicated with the Bremer kidnaping, having split away from the gang prior to that time. When questioned as to any known connections or higher-up contacts of the gang in St. Paul, Doyle stated, "I can tell you one thing, when they got an apartment in St. Paul they would put in one telephone and assign it to the man in the State Apprehension Bureau at the State Capitol, and that telephone was never used for anything except to receive calls from that man. On one occasions a call came to that apartment and no one was there to receive it, so it was switched to Harry Sawyer's place". When asked to explain the calls received over that telephone and whether they were tip-offs, Doyle stated that they were tip-off calls through that source. When asked who the man was in the Capitol, Doyle stated that he did

not know, other than he was a large and heavy set man. When asked specifically if it were Tom Brown or Bill Crumbley to whom he referred, Doyle stated that he does not now recall those names.

Doyle claimed not to know Dr. Moran, although he at one time lived in Maywood, Illinois, and knew that Dr. Moran had an office there at the same time. Doyle stated that at one time he saw Kate Barker, Fred Barker and William Harrison together at the race tracks at Aurora, Illinois. When any reference was made to any member of this gang, Doyle would state that he certainly would not lose any sleep when he learned that either, or both, Karpis or Campbell had died, since he had personal reasons to desire that they no longer remain at large; that he knew in the past that they had made efforts to get him, Doyle, out of the way. When questioned further along this line, Doyle stated, for example, that while he, Doyle, was in the County Jail at Fairbury, Nebraska. on June 12th, 1935, waiting to be moved that same day to the State Penitentiary at Lincoln, Nebraska, for safekeeping, he observed, from out of the jail window, Alvin Karpis, alone, getting out of a Dodge Sedan and walking across the street in Fairbury, and that shortly thereafter he returned to the car and drove away. Doyle was emphatic in this statement, stating that he could tell Karpis' walk at a distance, since it was half-way between a fast walk and a "lope". .

Doyle stated that at present he could not furnish any information as to the present location of either Karpis or Campbell, but that in the future such may be possible. At this point in the interview Doyle appeared confidential and stated that just prior to his arrest in February, 1935, he knew that the place of AL/SHERWOOD, South Coffeyville (Kansas-Oklahoma Line) was not too hot and afforded the most logical and accessible contact for the various members of the gang; that at that time and at that place, he observed a letter in the hands of one of the boys, inviting them to come on down and just fish and hunt, and that plenty of liquor was available; that he, Doyle recognized the handwriting as that of Karpis (since Doyle declares that Karpis writes a left-handed scribe) and although he did not actually see the postmark, he was of the opinion that it was from a point in Oklahoma, about one-half day's drive from South Coffeyville. Doyle stated that he had previously furnished this information to Agent Hansen, of the Oklahoma City Office. Doyle offered the statement that in the event that a check was made of al Sherwood's place and community, that it would be most inadvisable to make open inquiry, or to drive into that community in a Hudson automobile.

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Doyle stated that it is a fact that Kamis does have contacts from coast to coast, and in his opinion some of the higher ups implicated in the Bremer kidnaping have not been apprehended. No further information was obtained from Doyle at this time. In the future, the Bureau will be advised of any additional information obtained from this source.

Reference is made to the Bureau's letter of October 8, 1935 (7-576), transmitting copies of a letter dated September 22, 1935, purporting to have been written by one Dick Tate, in which Mr. Tate indicated that one Edgar Knowles, owner of the Park Filling Station at Tarpon Springs, Florida, may be harboring fugitives, and requesting that an appropriate discreet investigation be made to determine whether Knowles is presently harboring or assisting any fugitives in this case.

Please be advised that Special Agent F. F. Yearsley, Resident Agent at Tampa, Florida, has developed that one J. J. Gilchrist, 533 East Tarpon Avenue, Tarpon Springs, Florida, was the author of the aforementioned letter. By interviewing Gilchrist and his son, Murry Gilchrist, the latter being employed by Edgar Knowles, they both identified the photograph of L. D. VHunt, with aliases, a notorious character in Florida, as an associate of HUGH CANT, who is the subject of the case entitled HUCH GANT with aliases-FUGITIVE, NATIONAL MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT ACT, with Birmingham as the office of origin, as the man they thought might possibly be Alvin Karpis. Agent Yearsley observed A. D. Hunt at the service station of Knowles during the night of November 12, 1935. The Gilchrists also identified Hugh Gant's photograph as that of a person who has in times past visited the Knowles filling station with A. D. Hunt.

The Hugh Cent case is presently receiving the vigorous attention of the Jacksonville office in efforts to effect his apprehension.

### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Special Agent in Charge Alt telephoned Mr. Richmond from the Jacksonville Office and said that he wants to call to the attention of the Bureau
an apparent conflict of instructions relative to the disposition of three
confiscated automobiles which are being held by him, particularly as to the
disposition of that automobile which belonged to Kate and Fred Barker at the
time they were killed by Bureau Agents at Ocala, Florida.

Considerable correspondence has passed to and from the Bureau and the Kansas City Office, copies of which are in the possession of the Jacksonville Office, and between the Jacksonville Office and the Kansas City Office, and between the Kansas City Office and Mr. Frank Dixon, who is one of the coadministrators of the estate of Kate and Fred Barker, relative to the disposition of the automobile which is presently in the possession of the Jacksonville Office, and which is the property of the estate of Kate and Fred Barker. Mr. Alt pointed out that in all the correspondence up to November 1, 1935, the Bureau and the field offices have steadfastly maintained the position that the Bureau had absolutely no interest whatsoever in the confiscated 3 automobiles, and that upon the presentation of due claim of ownership, the same would be released. To this end, the Jacksonville Office the other day  $\sim$ received a letter from Mr. Frank Dixon, mentioned above, to the effect that pursuant to the attitude of the Bureau, he was sending his wife to Jacksonville to take possession of the Barker automobile and drive it back to Kansas City. Mr. Dixon in his letter explains that due to the press of business matters, neither he for his attorney is unable to come to Jacksonville to get the car, and that the same should be turned over to Mrs. Dixon. This morning, Mrs. Dixon made her appearance at the Jacksonville Office, having in her possession a letter of introduction from Mr. Dixon, and also several letters which had been written to Mr. Dixon from the Kansas City Office stating that they could have the car. Mr. Alt said that there is no doubt in his mind but that the lady who came in the office this morning is as a matter of fact Mrs. Dixon. He continued that while he believes under the circumstances that this automobile should be turned over to her, he called attention to Bureau letter of November 1, 1935, which states in pert that the Bureau was trying to make arrangements whereby the confiscated automobiles in the possession of the Jacksonville Office could be turned over to some other Governmental agency, and that the Jacksonville Office would be advised in due course. Mr. Alt pointed out that previous correspondence from the Bureau had instructed him to turn the Barker automobile as we'l as the other confiscated automobiles over to their legal owners. He wanted to know what he should do under the circumstances.

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Mr. Richmond in considering the correspondence relative to the matter, which Mr. Alt read to him, stated that when Mrs. Dixon calls for this automobile, a different set of circumstances from those contemplated in the correspondence arises. For instance, the correspondence states that the automobile may be turned over to Mr. Dixon or his representative, meaning, of course, his attorney. In view of this, Mr. Richmond said that the United States Attorney should be consulted to see if he wants the Bureau to release the automobile in question to the party who is calling for it, i.e. Mrs. Frank Dixon, and to see if the Bureau would be relieved of all responsibility which might be the outgrowth of such a transaction.

Mr. Richmond conferred with Mr. Glavin relative to the letter of November 1, 1935, mentioned above, and Mr. Glavin prepared a telegram to Mr. Alt instructing that the automobile in question should be turned over to Mrs. Dixon, provided the United States Attorney gives his official approval.

I suppose May feels bad about it. so scotty is still in there with you. I didnt think May would want him to leave there as she always liked him also Nick. I didn't here from Chub. Blanche writes to me every week and the tells me about him as he comes over to see her each week. I dont? think you better write up to Sullivan any more at least not now he wouldnt do any thing untill after this next rrial anyway and if things dont turn out alright for him then you better not write to him for some time. I couldn't help him no way in this trial and told him so, he was shure I could and said that why he had me brought back up there. I told him I didnt know those people and Harold told him the same thing. so we were both on our way back here the next day. I didnt take the stand in my own trial so why should is take it now. I cant do myself any good and might make it worse for some one else. so lil told you mick was getting along alright where he is at. Leavenworth Kansas Nov 5, 1935

Dear Blanche

Received your letter on friday night also the ten dollars in it. I had plenty of money last month as I had four dollars left when I came back from St Paul and you sent me five more so that was plenty for last month. all I can spend it ten each month. I dont spend it all for tobacco most of it I spend for fruit and candy also papers and magazines. you can only buy five cent bars of candy thay come twenty for in a box they sell for one dollar a box so I get about two boxes of thoes each month, you can't send me any clothes down here as all the clothes if furnished by the government for us. I didn't get placed to work this week as the warden was not here so hope he gets back this comming week and puts me to work. Its raining here today and is getting colder but it wont be long now untill winter is here. so chub weighs 210 lbs. now. I hope I never get to weight that much he better look out for him self as peopl with that much fat dont last long. I excicise every day at least for one hour and I think its doing me good. thats what thub should do every day and he would feel much better. I eat three meals every day and feel fine also sleep good at night, thats some thing new for me as I was up most of the night when I was out. so you and Gifford take a walk each night. I think that will do you good as I dont think you go out much. I will let you know when I think some thing can be done in my case. then you can write to Mc Meeken about; it. I think he will get things fixes up for him self up in St. Paul as I read the St. Paul paper every day and he seems to be alright up there now. so if he is later on there he can ar range things up there to have my time cut, he told me when I was up there he could do much more for me after I was down here for a while, so he was paid plenty for the little he did so far. now when the proper time comes let him get me out. I dont suppose Gifford ever did get to talk to Reed. If you could get some one to talk to him he might do some thing: he is right down there where the right people are and if I get my time cut it will have to be done in washington so that why I thought it would be nice if some one could talk to him for me, the sooner thay get this case all cleaned up the better it will be for me, then I can start to have my time cut, that case in St Paul wont come up untill Jan 15-1936 Best regards to you and Gifford

I guess you did have a lot of trouble with those old hoxes I suppose, but and a lot of expense too., but I do think you could have gone along a lot better than Jim but of course I would think that I hope you do get out when you are fifty years old. That certainly seems like a long time for when you are fifty years old. That certainly seems like a long time for you to be there for not doing anything at all but be a good fellow, it is all seems so unfair, when that Monte will get a small sentence I bet. Leavenworth Kansas Nov. 9, 1935

Dear Helen:-

Received your two letters also one from Nick. was sure glad to hear from him and hope he gets better soon, he told me all about how he is feeling in it, also that he could not eat, and he didn't know just how it would turn out. I sure feel sorry for him and hope he get better real soon. I sent Harold Nick's regards also told him how he was feeling, he said he hope Nick would get alright soon also sends his regards.

I am not working yet and don't think I will very soon, the Covernment agents were here again to see me Friday and will be back and again some time this coming week. there were from Kansas City and es long as they keep comming to see me I wont be placed to work. I tolk them I had nothing to say and didnt want them comming to see me, but thay told me there was no law aginst calling on me so what else can I do. I may be up in St. Paul again, but I dont see how thay can do it with hurting there case. I don't know any one in the case up there so what good would I do them. I hope you have better luck than I do about getting work. Your cousin might be able to help me down here if he knew anyone in Washington. yo u might ask him about it. you cant send me anything down here now onley on kmas and dont know just what you can send then but will let you know later on. so Ray was over to see Nick. I bet Nick liked that as he thinks quite a lot of him how is he getting along? give him my regards. I havent changed any since I left St Faul just about the same it will be ten months the 16th of this month that I have been locked up and was only out in the sun shine about seven times and then onley for about one hour and helf. so you see how its been for me. I am in my cell twenty three is hours each day except when I go to meals and that takes about twenty five minutes for each meal. I read most of the time and when I am not reading I sleep so thats the way I pass the time away. the priest can write to me here and when I here from him will let you know, about you writing to any one now for me I dont think it would do any good so let it go for the time being. I hope you are working the next time I here from you then things. will be much better for you. also that Nick is much better. May sure has her hands full now but hope things turn out alright. so scotty is there yet and in good standing. Well I will say good by for now best regards

Information as obtained from files of several major cases investigated by the Bureau set out herein which definitely establishes collusion between Harry Sawyer and Jack Pfeiffer of Bt. interviewed by Special Agent T. Y. Mullen and the writer at her place of business in Wilmington, Illinois, for any information she could supply regarding the activities of Harry Sawyer, Tom Brown and Bill Crumbley in connection with this kidnaping case. Irens Dorsey advised that she and Fred Goetz at no time ever lived in St. Paul, Minnesota, that they frequently made trips to that city during the years 1931 to 1933 and on these occasions they always remained in hotels. She stated that she was only casually acquainted with Harry Sawyer, having met him for the first time in St. Paul, Minnesota, in either 1931 or 1952; that the last time she saw Harry Sawyer was in Chicago, Illinois, during September of 1933 at which time he and his wife, Gladys, visited the World's Fair and also visited them at their home on several occasions.

Irene Dorsey advised that she is not acquainted with Tom Brown or Bill Crumbley and that to her recollection Fred Goetz had never mentioned them in his conversations with her; that she knows of no information which would indicate that these two individuals were in any way connected with Harry Sawyer, nor has she any knowledge whatever of Harry Sawyer being implicated in the instant case in any manner.

Miss Dorsey advised that the information as set out in the report of Special Agent J. L. Madala, dated at Chicago, Illinois, October 30, 1934, is her entire knowledge of the activities of the Barker-Karpis gang and of the instant case.

For the information of the Bureau and other offices who were requested to develop information relative to this matter, there is reflected in the files of this Office considerable evidence which clearly indicates that Harry Sawyer and Jack Pfeiffer had connections with the St. Faul Police Department which situation made it safe for the Barker-Karpis gang as well as the Dillinger mob to live and operate in St. Paul without any interference by the St. Paul Police Department. This information which is being set out hereinafter was gathered from the files in the Chicago Office of several important cases which the Bureau has investigated in the past.

The first information obtained which indicated that Harry Sawyer had connections with the St. Paul Police Department is contained in the report of Special Agent W. F. Seery, St. Paul, Minnesota, dated September 14, 1931, in the case entitled,

Frank Nash, with aliases, Fugitive, 1.0. 1166 - Escaped Federal PRISOLER. In this report there is recorded that Special Agent. in Charge Werner Hanni and Agent Seery were confidentially informed by an Officer of the St. Paul Police Department that it; had been well established that Harry Sawyer and Leon Gleckman, the two outstanding leaders of the St. Paul underworld \*stood in with the heads of the St. Paul Police Department and that no real assistance could be expected from that Department in the apprehension of an associate or henchman of Gleckman or Sawyer. The identity of this informant was furnished to the Bureau under personal and confidential letter and is not known to this office. An examination of the files in this case fails to reflect any further information from this informant concerning the above allegation and it is possible that this individual can furnish further information which might be of value in connection with the investigation now under way. >

In the report of Special Agent O. G. Hall, St. Paul Minnesota, dated Earch 7, 1934 in the instant case, it will be noted that several members of the Barker-Karpis gang lived at 1280 and 1290 Grand Avenue in St. Paul during the latter part of February and the first part of March, 1933. In investigation at this address revealed that Lr. P. Ja Parnell, located at 1299 Grand Avenue, St. Paul, Linnesota, was the custodian of these two buildings. According to the above mentioned report Mr. Parnell, upon being interviewed, advised that the building 10cated at 1290 Grand Avenue is owned by Mr. W. Westfall, an attorney, located in the Guardian Building, and that the adjoining apartment building, 1280 Grand Avenue, is owned by the Hemlin University; that Mr. Coy O Hardwick was employed by Mr. Westfall as an outside man to check on his properties and to recommend any necessary repairs, but that he had nothing to do with the rentals. Mr. Parnell further advised that it was customary for him and his wife to handle all rentals and collections in these buildings, and that they have always exercised great care in selecting tenants for same, renting only to those persons showing satisfactory references. Mr. Farnell further stated that Hardwick had never attempted to rent any of the apartments prior to the renting of apartment #106, 1290 Grand Avenue, and apartments #102 and #302, 1280 Grand Avenue, and to the best of his recollection had not rented any since that time. Parnell advised that around the middle of February, 1933, Hardwick came to him and informed that he, Eardwick, had a brother-in-law, Ray Steger, who was

in with a bunch of rounders from down south and that two or three of the vacant apartments could be rented to this bunch. Parnell stated that he was not very anxious to allow Hardwick to do any of the renting, but Hardwick finally prevailed upon him to permit him to do so and assured that everything would be satisfactory; that on February 18, 1933, or thereabouts, Hardwick came to him and stated that he had rented apartment \$106, 1290 Grand Avenue and requested him to put it in shape immediately since it would be occupied at once by Mr. C. EAkoore who would be joined in a few days by his alderly mother who was supposed to be enroute from California; that he and his wife prepared the apartment for occupancy the same day, but no one showed up until a few days prior to March 1, 1933, at which time he observed several men moved into the apartment; that the day after these men moved in he questioned Charlie Miller, janitor, with reference to the occupants and Miller informed him that two men moved in, one of whom gave the name C. E. Moore, but that no woman was with them. He stated that he subsequently saw many strange cars with foreign license tags come to the apartment and this aroused his suspicions and he began checking on the cars of visitors coming to the apartment.

Mr. Parnell further related that a few days after. the men had moved to apartment #106, 1290 Grand Avenue, Mr. Hardwick came to him and told him to get two more apartments ready for 5 o'clock the same day, specifying apartments #102 and #305, 1280 Grand Avenue. Ir. Hardwick seemed to be quite excited and Mr. Pernell informed him that he had rented apartment #305, which was already occupied, so Hardwick immediately substituted apartment #302. Parnell stated that he inquired of Hardwick whether the prospective tenants had examined the apartment in question to which he replied that he had driven the prospective tenants past the building and they said the apartments would be all right, and that they knew what the apartments were like on the inside because they had previously visited a friend who lived in the building at one time. Parnell stated that he requested Hardwick to give him the names of the prospective tenants and Hardwick told him that he did not know their names at that time, but that the apartments were being rented in the name of J. J. Burns, who would occupy apartment #302; that this man was in the land business and would have considerable visitors coming in and out due to the fact that he had some land matters to take up with members of the State Legislature.

Mr. Parnell further advised according to the above mentioned report that on the night of March 3 or 4, 1933, at about 10 p.m., he and his wife were returning home from a basketball game and passed the alley which runs in the rear of 1280 and 1290 Grand Avenue and observed several automobiles in the alley and considerable moving in and out and back and forth between the buildings; that he observed several men in cars around the neighborhood who appeared to be placed as lookouts. He stated that he recognized ? some of the cars and men as being those who had visited the above three apartments and immediately surmised that something was wrong and that the gang was preparing to make their getaway. He stated that he immediately went to his quarters and telephoned Lieutenant Talbott, with whom he had already spoken about his suspicions of the gang, and Lieutemant Talbott arranged to have a squad car sent out immediately. Parnell stated that while waiting for the arrival of the Police he proceeded to 1290 Grand Avenue and secreted himself in the laundry room where he watched the operations of the gang; that during these operations he accidentally pushed against a door which squeaked and one of the men in the group wheeled about hurriedly, displaying a large shiny revolver, but he, Parnell, kept motionless for a brief time and the man turned around and continued on down the hall. Mr. Parnell stated that the photograph of Arthur R. Barker bore a very striking resemblance to the parson he saw with the gun.

Mr. Parnell further stated that shortly thereafter, six detectives, whose names he could not furnish, came to his apartment in answer to the call made to Lieutenant Talbott; that the gang was still in the process of moving when these officers arrived; that they made no move to stop them, but merely seated themselves comfortably in his apartment. One of the office cers exhibited a photograph to Mr. and Mrs. Parnell, which they partially identified as being that of one of the persons seen by them entering the apartments in question. The officer explained to Kr. Pernell that he need not worry about this fellow: that he had a nice wife and daughter and ran a place on Wabasha Avenue where the officers went to drink and were treated fine. Parnell further stated that the Police officers spent considerable time in his apartment this particular evening while these people were moving out and when he prevailed upon them to get busy and do something the officers merely looked at one another and winked; that they finally left his apartment after the gang had left and went over to the apartments previously mentioned;

that either the same night or the following morning the Police patrol drove up and took considerable clothing and bedding from the apartment, but left the gang's silverware and dishes, which were subsequently called for by a drayman on April 26, 1955, and turned over to the drayman by him; that the drayman presented a pencil note addressed to Mr. Hardwick and signed by J. J. Burns, C. E. Moore and S. E. Lockwood.

It was the belief of Mr. Parnell that the black suitcases removed from the apartments on the night in question were delivered to the Hollyhocks Inn, though he could not furnish anything definite concerning this. He also stated that he had heard from some source which he was unable to recall that this same gang moved to 1035 or 1055 Roberts Street in West St. Paul, Minnesota; that the owner of this property or the man who managed the same became aware of the identity of this gang and was given a good position at the State Capitol in St. Paul to remain silent.

Neither Mr. nor Mrs. Parnell could definitely identify occupants of any of the apartments, but stated they observed the group moving freely from one apartment to another and it was not possible to determine just which of the apartments the various members did in fact occupy. They stated that to the best of their knowledge, apartment \$106, 1290 Grand Avenue, was rented to C. E. Moore and was occupied by two men, although a woman about 35 or 40 years of age and a girl about 14 years of age were seen coming out of this apartment; that apartment \$302, 1280 Grand Avenue was occupied by J. J. Burns and son, and apartment \$102, 1280 Grand Avenue, was being occupied by Lockwood.

Numerous photographs were exhibited to Mr. and Mrs. Parnell and they advised that the photographs of Harry B. Olson, St. Paul Police Dept. #22611, Vernon C. Miller, Arthur R. Barker, Alvin Karpis and Volney Davis bore striking resemblances to persons observed by them as going in and out of the three apartments in question.

Mr. Coy 0. Hardwick, above-mentioned, was interviewed and after telling several conflicting stories concerning his part in the renting of the above mentioned apartments, he finally admitted that his brother-in-law, Rey Steger, came to him prior to March 1, 1933, and inquired if he, Hardwick, had a vacant house which could be rented to a certain party; that Hardwick informed Steger that he had no such vacancy, whereupon Steger talked with him about vacant apartments. Although Mr.

Hardwick would not state definitely that Steger recommended these people to him he, however, left the impression with the interviewing Agents that such was the case and that Steger prevailed upon him to rent the apartments to these people. According to Hardwick, Steger had previously been employed as a bartender for Danny Hogan, now deceased.

With reference to Danny Hogan, the report of Special Agent O. C. Dewey, Omaha, Nebraska, dated March 15, 1935, reflects that this individual was, up to the time of his death in 1927, the underworld boss in St. Paul, Minnesota; that after Harry Sawyer's trouble in Nebraska in 1925, he moved to St. Paul, Minnesota, and became associated with Hogan, who was later killed when a bomb was attached to the starter of his car. It is said that Harry Sawyer subsequently assumed Hogan's position in that city.

The report of Special Agent Hall mentioned above further reflects that Ray Steger, who was then employed as a personnel investigator for the Minnesota Highway Department, etteched to the office of the Attorney General, advised upon interview that he did not know anything concerning the persons who occupied apartments at 1280 and 1290 Grand Avenue. He also defined that he had anything to do with the renting of these apartments or had any conversations with Hardwick relative thereto. Steger did admit, however, that he worked for J. J. Kohn, located at 9th and Wabasha Streets, St. Paul, Minnesota, during the period 1927 to 1933, and also as a bartender for two years for the late Danny Hogan.

The identity of J. J. Kohn and the nature of his business is not reflected in the files of this Office, but it will be noted that the address of this individual is within a short distance from the place previously operated by Harry Sawyer.

Lieutenan Talbott, St. Paul Police Department, was interviewed and he advised that he definitely recalled the telephone call which he received from the Parnells with reference to the occupants of the apartments on Grand Avenue; that he was off duty when the call came, but that he immediately telephoned Lieutenant Mondike, who was on the night desk and requested him to immediately send a squad to Parnell's place, instructing him how to get there through an alley without being seen by the occupants under suspicion. Lieutenant Talbott advised that Parnell informed him that the people were apparently

making a getaway and that he prepared a statement of facts at the time for filing in the effice, however, Lieutenant Talbott was unable to locate his written report covering this matter. Lieutenant Talbott did not recall the names of the officers who responded to his alarm, but expressed the belief that detective Louis Schultz was one of the officers.

/ Interview was also had with Inspector of Defect tives Charles Tierney who stated that there was every indication that there had been a tip off in this case. He explained that the matter occurred just shortly after he assumed his present office and that no doubt it was some officer in the group who was not in favor of the then present administration and was 🧢 responsible for what had happened. Inspector Tierney stated that he was unable to determine just what officers enswered the call and had no idea as to the identity of the people who were occupying the apartments under suspicion. Inspector Tierney could not locate the written report of Lieutenant Talbott nor could be locate any report made by the officers who responded to the call. The only thing which Inspector Tierney was able to locate touching on the matter was a report of Officers Mckahon and McGinnia, dated March 4, 1935, which disclosed that these two officers reported for duty at 8 a.m. and conducted the investigation at 1280 and 1290 Grand Avenue, apartments \$102 and \$302.

As evidence which definitely substantiates the participation of Harry Sawyer and certain members of the St. Paul Police Department in the activities of the Barker. Karpis mob, attention is directed to the satement made by Jess Doyle which is contained in the report of Special Agent R. P. Shanahan, Kansas City, Lissouri, dated February 21, 1935. With reference to the above related matter, it will be noted that according to Doyle the Barker-Karpis gang left Reno, Nevada, around the first part of 1933 and went direct to St. Paul, Minnesota, where Fred Barker, "Doc" Barker and he rented an apartment on Grand Avenue, the exact address, unknown; that Early Christman and his wife, Helen Ferguson, also came to .... St. Paul at this time and rented an apartment on Marshall Avenue near Cleveland Street; that Volney Davis, "Doc" Barker. and Kate Barker left Reno, Revada, two days later. Doyle further advised that on or about the third day while in St. Paul at this time, he came home alone one evening and observed Gladys Sawyer, the wife of Harry Sawyer, sitting in an automobile parked in front of the building. She intercepted him

him and a sked where Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis were and when he replied that he did not know, she stated that he had better look them up as the Police were contemplating raiding their apartment in the morning. According to Doyle, he went downtown to look for Fred and Alvin, but could not find any one of the gang. He stated that when he returned Gladys Sawyer was still in front of the building and she informed him at this time that Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis had been there and had moved out; that they would meet him, Doyle, at her husband's place on Wabasha Street. Doyle stated that when he arrived at Harry Sawyer's place, Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis were there and heytold him that they had seen Volney Davis, "Doc" Barker and Mother Barker, and that they were on their way to Chicago, Illinois. He stated that the three of them, meaning Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis and himself, left for Chicago that night in Fred Barker's Chrysler Sedan.

It is possible that Helen Ferguson could furnish valuable information relative to the tip off of the contemplated raid mentioned above.

Another incident which clearly indicates that Crumbley and others of the St. Paul Police Department made it safe for the Berker-Karpis mob to remain in St. Paul, Minnesota. is reflected in the report of Special Agent J. D. Glass, St. Paul Minnesota, dated November 1, 1932, in the case entitled, FRANK NASH, with aliases - FUGITIVE, I. O. 1166. - ESCAPED FEDERAL PHISONER. In this report information is set out to the effect that about three months prior to April 25, 1932, Alvin Karpis, Fred Barker and Kate Barker, together with her husband, George 🚙 Anderson, lived in a house at 1031 South Roberts Street, West 🛷 St. Paul, Minnesota. The woman who rented them this house resided nearby at 1035 South Roberts Street and she became suspicious of these people and noticed that Karpis and Barker would, when leaving the house or returning to it, each carry a violin case. She told her son, Nick Hannegrath, who resides with her, & of her suspicions and he closely observed these people. Shortly ... thereafter on April 25, 1932, Nick Hannegrath noticed the photographs of Alvin Karpis and Fred Barker in a Detective magazine, 🔅 which stated that these two men were wanted for the murder of the Sheriff at West Plains, Missouri. He readily recognized the pictures in the magazine as likenesses of the two men living in his mother's house. About 1 a.m. on April 25, 1932, Hannegrath reported the matter to Chief of Police Dahill and Police Inspector James Crumley of the St. Faul Police Department. Fred

Barker, Alvin Karpis, Kate Barker and George Anderson were at that time asleep in the house at 1051 South Roberts Street. The St. Paul Police Department for some unknown reason delayed going to the house to apprehend these people until about 8 a.m. that morning; that at about 7 a.m. Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis and their companions had packed their belongings and left the house.

On April 28, 1932, Mayor Mahoney, St. Paul, in his campaign made a speech in which he said the St. Paul Police Department had tipped off Barker and Karpis so that they could make their escape.

In further connection with this matter, attention is invited to report of Special Agent W. F. Trainor, Kansas City, Missouri, dated July 3, 1933, in the case entitled, VARNON C. MILLER, with aliases, Deceased; CHARLES ARTHUR FLOYD, with aliases - Fugitive, I. O. 1194; et al. CONSPIRACY TO DELIVER FEDERAL PRISONER (FRANK NASH). It will be noted that J. Glenn Harrison, Assistant Editor of the St. Paul Despatch, Pioneer Press, advised that he had received information from a confidential source that about five weeks ago three men and a woman rented the house at 204 Vernon Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota, from a man and his wife who had moved to a lake; that their actions were very suspicious, and when brought to his attention he reported the matter at 11:30 p.m. on June 19, 1933, to Chief of Police Thomas Dahill and on the following morning to County Attorney, Mike Kinkead, St. Paul, however, he did not believe that the Police had made any investigation in the matter. Inconnection with the above, the owners of the premises at 204 Vernon Avenue subsequently positively identified the photograph of Pauls Harmon as the woman who rented the house and stayed there during the entire time that the house was occupied.

At the time of Paula Harmon's detention in the Chicago Bureau Office for questioning, she furnished the following information relative to the above matter.

She stated that after Fred Barker was released from the hospital where he underwent an appendicitis operation she rented a house at 204 Vernon Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota; that Fred Barker and Arthur Barker lived with her at this address. She further stated that they were visited while living at this place by Fred Coetz, alias George Ziegler, Alvin Karpis, Volney Davis, William Weaver, Russell Cibson and Frank Nash. She stated that on the date William Hamm was kidnaped in St. Paul, Minnesota,

she noticed that Arthur Barker was missing from 204 Vernon Avenue and did not return at any time thereafter, to this address, and neither did Alvin Karpis call at her home during the period from June 15 to June 19, 1933. She stated that about midnight June 19, 1933, Jack Pfeiffer called at the house and told her she had better move; that Jack Pfeiffer assisted her in moving their belongings out of 204 Vernon Avenue and took her to a cottage on White Bear Lake where she spent the night along, Jack Pfeiffer subsequently made some comment to the effect that the newspapers carried an article describing a woman who had moved out of 204 Vernon Avenue.

It will be noted that Paula Harmon, according to the latest information concerning her is still confined in the Texas Hospital for the Insane at Rusk, Texas.

To show that the Dillinger mob operated with the protection of the St. Paul Police Department, attention is invited to the report of Special Agent W. R. Ramsey, Jr., San Francisco, California, dated January 22, 1935, in the Dillinger case, particularly to the statement obtained from Joseph Raymond Regri, alias "Fatso" Negri, a close associate of Lester Joseph Gillis, alias "Baby Face" Nelson, and John Paul Chase. In this connection Negri stated that while they (Gillis, Chase and Negri) were staying at the Mount Grant Lodge at Walker Lake, Nevada, they learned over the radio that Homer Van Meter had been killed; that they drove into Fallon, Nevada, and obtained a newspaper which Negri believed was a San Francisco paper. The names of the officers who killed Van Meter were set out in this newspaper. According to Negri when Gillis and Chase read these names, they remerked, "The ----, he is the fellow that we paid a thousand dollars. Perhaps he was in a spot where he had to go along. Negri conjectured from this conversation that Dillinger, Gillis and Chase and Van Meter, had paid this officer a thousand dollars for giving them a tip that their car or cars had been spotted and were being watched, although he was not definite as to this.

With reference to the killing of Homer Van Meter, it was noted in the report of Special Agent D. L. Nicholson, St. Paul, Minnesota, dated August 28, 1934, also in the Dillinger case, that Chief of Police Cullen, Detective Tom Brown and Detective Thomas McMahon and Jeff Dittrich were in the party that killed Van Meter.

There is also interesting information relative was to to this matter contained in the letter to the Bureau dated April 15, 1934, from Inspector H. H. Clegg at St. Paul, Minnesota. In this letter there is recorded the statement obtained from Bessie Green in which she advised smong other things that she was informed by Homer Van Meter that on the day of the shooting at Lexington Avenue, March 31, 1934, and about ten or fifteen minutes before the shooting, John Hamilton together with Pat Cherrington and Upal Long had departed from Dillinger's apartment and drove away expecting to be gone but a short time; that Hamilton and these two girla-subsequently returned to within one block of the apartment and upon seeing the excitement about the building they hurriedly departed from the vicinity. According to Bessie Green, Van Keter further advised her that Hamilton and the girls then drove to St. Faul, Minnesota, to Pat Reilly's home, but he was absent, after which they drove to McComick's restaurant where someone took them away in a Ford Sedan. She stated that it was her information that Harry Sawyer was in the restaurant at the time and that he furnished the car or had instructed someone to procure a car for this getaway; that Hamilton and the two girls drove to some one's place in the country which Harry Sawyer knew about and it is the belief of Bessie Green that this place was Harry Sawyer's farm, She stated that Sawyer's farm was raided on Saturday night of that week, but that prior thereto an individual by the name of McMullen of the St. Paul Police Department tipped off Harry Sawyer that the maid was about to be conducted, whereupon he escaped the trap and word was sent to Hamilton and the two girls in sufficient time for them to make a getaway.

In connection with the above incident it will be noted in the report of Special Agent D. L. Nicholson, dated July 16, 1934 at St. Paul, Minnesota, that Pat Cherrington, sweatheart of John Hamilton, furnished the following information to Special Agent G. J. Gross and this Agent, while she was awaiting sentence in the Dade County Jail, Madison, Wisconsint

With reference to the shooting in St. Paul on March 51, 1934, Miss Cherrington advised that she and Hamilton had been in the apartment which Dillinger and Evelyn Frechette occupied; that she and Hamilton had accompanied Dillinger and Evelyn Frechette to a movie house on two or three occasions near by this apartment, and explained that she just happened to be away from the apartment at the time Dillinger made his escape. She went on to state that subsequent to the above mentioned shooting she and her sister, Opal Long, together with John Hamilton went to Detroit, Michigan, where they contacted Homer Van Meter, who took them to Harry Sawyer's cottage near St. Paul, Minnesota, where they remained four days; that they received a tip that the place was to be raided and left about 6 0 clock in the evening and returned to St. Paul, Minnesota, where they met Tommy Carroll and "Baby Face" Nelson and remained overnight in St. Paul.

It is possible that Pat Cherrington can furnish more detailed information with reference to the tip off mentioned above.

The following undeveloped leads were dictated by Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley.

### UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

The ST. PAUL BUREAU OFFICE. With the idea in mind of developing any prior association of Harry Sawyer with the Police of St. Faul, which it is believed represented the usefulness of Sawyer to the mob, that is in keeping them advised of the Police activities and also as to furnishing them with places of concealment and bases of operation, particularly during the period Bremer was held, the following investigation should be conducted:

This information will probably definitely indicate the association of certain individuals of the St. Paul Police Department with Harry Sawyer and others, but should be carried out very discreetly in order not to create any impression that an inquiry is being made of the Police Department's activities and should be estensibly for the purpose of getting the background of Harry Sawyer, and which information of sourse will be of value to us and can be used in the trial of this individual on January 6, 1936. The files of the St. Paul Office should be reviewed together with any confidential information submitted to determine any possible leads, however, such review should not delay the immediate necessary inquiry in this in order that it will be ready for use before January 6, 1936. The confidential informant referred to on pages two and three, a Police Officer,

if still reliable should be contacted for the present general setup and any knowledge he may have of the activities of Harry Sawyer and and his associates.

In connection with Coy O. Hardwick and Ray Steger, brother-in-law of Hardwick, the latter being indicated as an investigator for the Minnesota State Highway Department under the office of the Attorney General, in the renting of apartment \$106, at 1290 Grand Avenue and Apartments #102 and #302 at 1280 Grand Avenue, by the members of the Karpis-Barker gang in February and March, 1933, further inquiry should be made particularly of Charlie Miller, the janitor at 1290 Grand Avenue, as well as Hardwick for any information which identifies the members of this gang as being at this address and particularly as to whether or not Harry Sawyer appeared there at any time or whether Mrs. Gladys Sawyer appeared there. It is noted that reference is made to the fact that the gang apparently rented a place at 1035 or 1055 Roberts Street, West St. Paul, where supposedly the manager became aware of their identity and in order to keep him quiet thereafter, he was given a position in the State Capitol. It is believed that this may refer to Nick Hannegrath, 1035 South Roberts Street, West St. Paul, and the incident wherein he reported to the Police on April 25, 1932 the location of the Karpis-Barker gang at 1031 South Roberts Street, West St. Paul and inquiry should be made to see whether or not Hannegrath was ever approached particularly by James Crumley as to taking a Government position, it being indicated that Crumley is now with the State Identification Division of Minnesota, possibly Hannegrath might be willing to disclose any conversations he has since had with Crumley as to his, Hannegrath's, knowledge of the apparent disregard of the information as to the location of the gang at this address.

Reference is made to Officers McMahon and McGinnis, the former possibly being one and the same as the present Detective Thomas McMahon, who reported they conducted investigation at 1280 and 1290 Grand Avenue as to apartments \$102 and \$302, and these officers should be approached without disclosing the purpose of the inquiry to determine if possible who the other officers were participating in this, as possibly an honest officer may be in the group who will advise us what occurred and whether there was a tip off and whether or not Harry Sawyer had any part in the picture. These officers might be induced to make such identifications themselves particularly if Sawyer and other members of the mob who were at this address at the time in question.

The CLEVELAND BUREAU OFFICE. Helen Ferguson,
Toledo, Ohio, should be contacted without definitely disclosing
to her the purpose of the inquiry and she should be questioned
as to her being at the address on Grand Avenue, St. Paul, during
February and March, 1933, with Marl Christman, and effort should
be made to ascertain if Harry Sawyer was involved at any time
and whether or not the Police tipped them off to get out of
this location.

The DETROIT BUREAU OFFICE. Interview should be had with Pat Cherrington as to her prior statements as to this and particularly as to any information she has as to whether or not the Police warned them to get out; also as to any knowledge she may have as to the association of Sawyer with any of the gangs at St. Paul.

Not only was there no facial resemblance, but the doctor who had recently come to Ava was about sixty years old, whereas Dr. Moran is much younger.

Reference is made to my letter dated November 6, 1935, relative to the above entitled matter.

On November 7, 1935, Special Agent Albert Franz of this office interviewed Captain Leo Kinney of the Madison, Wisconsin Police Department relative to the robbery of Nelson's Jewelry Store at Madison, Wisconsin on May 23, 1935, and the connection of Volney/Davis relative thereto. Captain Kinney stated that a Mr. D. MacIntyre, Attorney at Law, Madison, Wisconsin is trying to prove that Volney Davis was the individual who really robbed Nelson's Jewelry Store on May 23, 1935. NOY

MacIntyre represents one Richard Graham, who was arrested with Sam Johnson in connection with the robbery of the Nelson's Jewelry Store. He is also said to have been to the newspapers with his story. and Agent Franz did not deem it advisable to interview MacIntyre feeling that MacIntyre might make something of the inquiry of Agent Franswhich might harm the State's case against Graham. 4-576-8053

At 120 East Wilson Street, Madison, Wisconsin, Agent Frank F MYESTEATE I interviewed Mr. Arthur A. Frautschi, who maintains a high class undertaking establishment. Mr. Frautschi stated that he did not see the 1930 1930 man who was supposed to be Volney Davis, but that the apartment rented to a men and woman who gave the names of Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Jordan was actually rented through Mr. Frautschi's secretary, John H. Schantz.

Mr. Frautschi, however, exhibited a photograph of a baby which he found in the apartment after Mr. and Mrs. Jordan did not return. The photograph was made by the Pyke Studio, 1162 South Adams Street, COPIES DESTROYED

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IL S. Department of Justice

Inquiry at this studio relative to the identity and whereabouts of the Jordans disclosed that they were unknown.

A card of Dr. Walter By Whipple of 119 South Adams Street, Peoria, Illinois was also found in the apartment of the Jordans, and he too denied knowing the Jordans.

Mr. Schantz informed Agent Franz that on May 24, 1935, the Jordans rented the apartment at \$45.00 per month from him, paying \$7.00 down at that time, and paying \$22.50 additional on June 1, 1935. On June 8, 1935, they advised Mr. Schantz that they were going away for the weekend, but they never returned. He further informed that at the time the Jordans rented the apartment from him, they brought some cheap dishes and groceries, which they left behind.

Agent Franz also interviewed Norbert Reining and Lloyd Miline, of the same address, and they together with Mr. Schentz gave the following descriptions of Mr. and Mrs. Jordan:

All the persons interviewed at 126 East Wilson Street, Madison, Wisconsin advised Agent Franz that the Madison, Wisconsin Police Department exhibited a photograph of Volney Davis to them, but that he in no way resembled Mr. Jordan, who resided at that address. The pocket identification orders were exhibited to these individuals, but they were unable to find anyone therein who resembled Mr. Jordan.

Subsequent to the inquiry made by Agent Franz on November 7, 1935, Special Agent J. L. Madala of the Chicago Office conducted investigation in Madison, and it is presumed the results of his investigation will be reported by the Chicago Office.

With reference to Bureau letter of November 8,1935, file number 7-576, as to the possibility that the Treasury Department might be able to print two or three hundred thousand dollars of a particular type of money which could later be identified by some marking or characteristic after it had been used in the paying of ransom in a kidnaping case, the following observations are set up both for and against the promotion of such an idea.

In my opinion the foremost and most important consideration in this situation is that it is very doubtful whether or not the Bureau could in safety, both from a legal standpoint and the possibility of future unfavorable criticism should any project fail in consumetion, be so definitely and conclusively identified with the matter of the actual payment of the fransom money in a kidnaping case. It is realised of course that we possibly might at a safe distance at such a time make suggestions to the persons arranging to pay such a ransom, which of course has been the procedure in the past. This situation, however, is one which in the future particularly, requires very definite and diplomatic handling as to just how far we should have an interest, if any, in the payment of the ransom, particularly as to a case of this kind. Making available through the Treasury Department money which could be identified, and by reason of which definite identification, would definitely identify our association with the project to the public, that is, there would be no question as to the fact that we had had definite knowledge and understanding as to the payment of this ransom, and that this information would be generally furnished to banks who would be asked to look out for the money by reason that we had used money previously prepared for this purpose. With the above observations in mind it is not believed that there is much to be considered in the way of opinions for end against the use of the method indicated in reference letter.

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However, the following additional observations are set out, based upon the assumption that my first observations would be disregarded, and the plan carried into action.

One possible reason for not having a large amount of this money made up in this manner would be that a definite arrangement for marking of this kind having been arrived at, it is not believed that it would be safe thereafter to use this, except in one identical ease. The information as to this being given generally to the banks, if not te any others, would undoubtedly result in it becoming known to the public the method by which we are detecting these bills, and of course any subsequent ransoms paid would be examined by the kidnapers for not only the indicated marking, but any other concealed marking if a number of markings were employed, and provided they found the money delivered in this manner we would not only lose the ransom money, but might possibly endanger the life of the victim still being held, and prevent the release of the victim. As I stated, we might use this as to only one kidnaping, and it would be effective and the victim would be released before it was known that they had been given marked money of this type.

There would also be presented the situation of a special issue of money, which by reason of such special designation, would have certain additional value among collectors of different types of money, and if this were a small ransom, it might make the bills used to pay such ransom of sufficient value to cause certain individuals to withhold the information from us that they had one of such bills, for the possibility that they might at a later date cash in on its added value. There is no question but what these would have an added value to persons who collect rare or old coins or currency.

There are a number of arguments in favor of such procedure, that is, the issue of special money for the payment of ransom, which would materially enhance the possibility of apprehending kidnapers or passers of this money. It is believed that it is practically an impossibility for the ordinary teller in a large bank to make any adequate check of bills by the numbers, and if a certain identifying mark were all that it was necessary to look for, a teller could immediately detect one of these bills if handed to him without any ransom list being available to him. It is believed however, that if identifying marks were placed upon these bills, it still would be necessary to maintain a list of the

serial numbers, for use as evidence in the case, particularly if the only bills found had the identifying mark removed from them, inasmuch as while this would be a circumstance indicating that it was one of the ransom bills, it is not believed it would be conclusive unless we had more identifying information.

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If such plan were carried out, it would be necessary to make some identifying mark on the bills which would not be readily detected, and the adding of a prefix or suffix letter to the serial number it is believed would be such as to make it readily detectable to anyone observing same. The change should be made as to a regular bill in general circulation, and this possibly could be arranged by some change in the scroll, in such a place that it sould not be readily removed by mutilation. As to the Federal Reserve notes, as to which a supply would have to be made up for twelve different districts, possibly the addition of the letter A after the words "series of 1928 B" would be possible without this readily being detected, in preference to placing such a designation before or after the serial number. It is not believed that the addition of an "A" after the "B", or before the "B" in connection with the words "Series of 1928 B" would be readily detected, but would be such a mark as would be very definitely called to the attention of anyone handling this bill, immediately it was observed. It is not believed that any bills have been prepared which would indicate the series as other than series of 1928, or other date year, with other than a single letter following it, or without a letter, and the placing of two letters after this would undoubtedly definitely identify either the notes of the Federal Reserve banks or the National currency. This would be a very simple change in the bills, and could of course be followed as to any and all bills which were to be arranged in this manner. It is not believed that a definitely different type of bill . would be possible without serious possibility of the ransom being rejected . It is very possible that a kidnaper will designate a definite type of bill to be received, and of course to be readily available we would have to have groups prepared in this manner as to all types issued by . either the Treasury Department as National currency, or for the Federal Reserve banks.

Another suggestion which has been brought to my attention is that of having stemped across the bill in large letters "ransom" or some similar word, in an invisible ink which could not be seen and which

due to the pigment of the special ink used could be brought out by reading same through a colored glass, which of course would require each bank to equip itself with such a reading glass, and therefore it should be a color and type of glass readily obtainable. However the possibility and feasibility of this is something which it is suggested that the Laboratory of the Technical division work out, if such a plan were to be put in operation. This system, if possible, would probably be preferable to having the Treasury Department have anything to do with the issuance of the money, and could probably be carried out by an expert in connection with any group of money assembled. This of course has the same limitations as indicated above as to the changing of the bill, that is, that it would only be absolutely practicable as to the payment of one ransom, although possibly a series of colors might be worked out which could be detected only by the use of a certain color glass, and a certain type of glass as used in the first instance having been exposed, the kidnapers might overlook the fact that the second set of money was so marked in the same manner.

A general observation is that if and when the Treasury Department would issue any such money this should be an operation carried on between the bank of the party who was paying the ransom, and the Treasury Department, that is, the bank for a suitable exchange of currency, would receive a like smount of currency from the Treasury Department, and the bank of course then would have to arrange for the furnishing of this money to the party who was to pay same, and this would necessarily remove us somewhat from the scene of the operation, if this general plan were carried out.

Mr. Edward A. Ivans, President of the Evans
Fingerprint Supply Company, Chicago, Illinois, called at
this office on Movember 15, 1935 stating that he desired
to interview Cassius McDonald, inasmuch as he had been
intimately acquainted with him in the past. He further
stated that his wife, who died about a week ago, was a
very close friend of Mrs. McDonald, and that the latter
had requested that he talk to McDonald in the Ramsey
County Jail here in an effort to learn the details of the
charges against him, stating that he had kept her in
complete ignorance of them.

Mr. Evans also advised that he had viewed the indictment against McDonald, which is in the possession of Mr. Barnard, McDonald's Detroit lawyer, and was much impressed by the details of it. Judging from its definiteness Evans stated he believed the Government had a very good case against McDonald, and that his sole purpose in interviewing him would be to persuade him to make a full disclosure of his actions to the Government and enter a plea of guilty in the hope of expecting leniency from the court. Evans advised that for the past four years he has not been acquainted with McDonald's activities, and would not be surprised if he had engaged in somewhat shady enterprises.

from 1901 to 1905 he was the Superintendent of Identifical Investigation at Washington, D. C., which was later absorbed by 3554. M. this Bureau, that his father is Inspector Emmett Evans of the Chicago Police Department.

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This request for interview was communicated to United States Attorney George F. Sullivan, who approved of same provided Special Agent Clinton Stein could be present. Accordingly, Agent Stein and Mr. Evans proceeded to the Ramsey County Jail, where Evans talked to McDonald. McDonald's first statement was that the Government was accusing him of participating in the conspiracy to kidnap Edward Bremer, but that he could prove that he was talking to the "American Ambassador" in Cuba in the latter's home at the time that Mr. Bremer was kidnaped. Evans explained to McDonald that he was not charged with the actual kidnaping but with assisting in the exchange of ranson money. This explanation seemed to clarify McDonald's mind.

Evens also advised him that he would be foolish to attempt to make bond at this time and to spend a lot of money to retain a lawyer, inasmuch as the Government would never have indicted him unless they had a strong case against him. Evans further advised him that it would be to his best interests to consider his activities in this case thoroughly, with the view in mind of making a full disclosure to the Government in the hope of receiving mercy from the court. McDonald advised that he would consider this matter thoroughly and would later communicate with Mr. Evans or this office as to the decision he has reached.

United States Attorney George F. Sullivan was advised of the outcome of this interview.

Reference is made to Bureau letter of November 11, 1935 file 7-576, as to the statements made by Mrs. Walter (Georgette) [Marsh, the former wife of Gus Winkeler, particularly as to her ability to learn from Lillian\Holden, Chicago, the address or location of Charles J. Fitzgerald.

CHICAGO,

In my opinion Mrs. Walter Marsh does not possess as much intimate definite detail as to the supposed mob previously associated with her former husband Gus Winkeler as she would have one believe, and it is believed that her knowledge is based principally on the fact that she knows these parties by name, and it is not believed that she would be accepted under conditions which would make her particularly valuable to us, to any mob still located in Chicago.

The above observations are further indicated by the fact that there has appeared in the December issue of Famous Detective Cases, a detective story magazine issued by the McFadden Publications, Inc., the story previously promoted by Mrs. Winkeler as to her life with Gus Winkeler, and the first installment of this story appears in the issue above referred to, on page 4, entitled "I'm on the spot - facing death" - "Public Enemy's Widow tells all, by Mrs.Gus\Winkeler\*. This first part of her story follows closely the story which has previously been made available to the Bureau, copy of which was furnished some time in the past.

In view of the alleged exposures set out in this story, and the possibility of what further disclosures she is supposed to make in the future, it is doubtful whether she would be acceptable to anyone who would be in a position to have any information of value to us in this or any other case. There is also the possibility that she might, by making

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direct inquiry of certain people, definitely interfere with the investigation being made to locate the subjects in this case.

However, as to the possibility of her getting any information from Lillian Holden, which in my opinion is a rather doubtful possibility, it is not believed that any harm would be done by having her communicate with this woman or visit with her, in accordance with the suggestion set out in the last paragraph of Bureau letter of November 11, 1935.

In view of the fact that the bill of sale was written in longhand the same will be transmitted to the Technical Laboratory with a request that the writing be analyzed and compared with the known specimens of various subjects' handwriting now on file at the Laboratory.

Information relative to the above automobile transfers is set forth in the report of this Agent dated at Cleveland, Ohio, November 4, 1935.

### AT GATES MILLS, CEIO

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Cleveland, Ohio, Fuly 27, 1955, wherein it is stated that a check of the toll calls from the Silver Grill, West 28th and Detroit Streets, revealed that number 564 at Gates Mills was called.

A search of the telephone directory revealed that number 364 is listed to George H. Stanbridge, Berkshire Road.

Mr. Ralph Jacobs, postmaster, upon interview advised that
Mr. Stanbridge is one of the old time residents of the village and
insofar as he knew he bore an excellent reputation, and that due to
Mr. Stanbridge's age he was now retired and living with his son-in-law,
J. Bolsom. Mr. Jacobs stated that his clerk could probably give Agent
more information about Stanbridge as he had known him for several years.

Mr. H. A. However, he was unable to state the name of the furniture company, nor the capacity in which Bolsom was employed. Mr. Emery advised that insofar as he knew, Bolsom also bore a good reputation.

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Billie Fitch was interviewed by Special Agents A. and D. M. Brightman, and, although several hours were spent with her, no information of great value was obtained. She advised that although at one time she had associated with Harry Campbell for a period of about a year at Tulsa, Oklahoma, she had not seen or hear from him since five years ago when she left Tules to take up her residence at Kansas City, Missouri. Since her departure from Tulsa, however, she informed, that she had made frequent visits to Tulsa and South Coffeyville, Oklahoma, and had corresponded with Campbell's mother at regular intervals up until a year ego when she began to live with Ray Palmeri? who is a local marcotic peddler, who formerly resided at Bridgeport, Conn. She informed that since her association with Falmeri, Campbell's mother has had nothing to do with her, and that no efforts between them have been made to correspond since that time; that at no time, however, during their correspondence, did ers. Campbell ever inform her of Campbell's whereabouts, nor had she ever made an effort to inquire about him or attempt to contact him, and that she is no longer interested in him. She believes \_\_\_ however that if Mrs. Campbell were aware of her son's whereabouts, she would not divulge the same to anyone, and that it would be worse than useless for her to endeavor to ascertain that information through inquiry of Mrs, Campbell. 100 mg 

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When questioned concerning possible associates and contacts of Campbell, she was at a loss to furnish any, stating that since her departure from Tulsa, she had had no contacts with anyone there other than her sister. At the time she associated with Campbell, she said, Glen Le Roy wright was extremely friendly with Campbell and although she was a schoolmate of Volney Davis and Fred and Arthur Barker she did not recall that Campbell had anything to do with them during the period that she associat. ed with him, stating that she believes Davis and the Barkers were incarcerated during that period. She further informed that she was positive that Campbell would not endeavor to contact her at Kansas City as she had broken all ties with him a number of years ago and as her present husband was of a jealous disposition and would resent such attention, she would make no effort to help them in the event Campbell or his friends did contact her. She was informed that the Eureau would pay \$1,000.00 for information

leading to Campbell's arrest and, although she believed she could be of no possible value to the Bureau, she agreed to immediately notify the Kansas City office in the event that she has any information of value to report concerning Campbell or Karpis.

She was further advised that if she contemplated a trip to South Coffeyville or Tulsa in the near future, she should advise the Karsas City office, so that appropriate plans could be made for her to secure information of value concerning Campbell. However, she did not express a willingness to do so, but she will again be contacted in the every near future in an attempt to enlist her cooperation and to secure information of value from her.

Relative to the letter from Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley, to the Kansas City Bureau office, dated September 27, 1935, advising that John C. Prendergast, Chief of the Uniformed Officers of the Chicago Police Department, had advised that he had been informed that Thomas Kelley, Register No. 45350, Ralph Parr, Register No. 45351 and James Myers, Register No. 45352, now confined in the Missouri State Penitentiary at Jefferson City, had passed some of the Bremer ransom money, Special Agent A. J. Norstrom and J. B. Brown interviewed the above named parties at the Missouri State Penitentiary, but were unable to secure any information of value.

James Myers when interviewed advised that for a number of years prior to repeal of the National Frohibition Act he had lived in St. Charles, Minnesota, and had engaged in the manufacture and distribution of illicit alcohol in the vicinity of Ottawa and Minneapolis, Minnesota. In November of 1931 he was sentenced to three years in the U.S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, for violation of the National Prohibition Act and was released from that institution in November of 1933. He disclaimed any acquaintanceship or knowledge of various Subjects in the Bremer case, although he admitted having had extensive dealings with numerous bootleggers in Minneapolis, including Tom Skelly, a brother of Cliff Skelly, convicted for his part in passing some of the Urschel ransom money. Livers advised that he was not personally acquainted with Cliff Skelly, although they had been incarcerated at the U.S. Fenitentiary at Leavenworth at the same time. Myers further advised that in October of 1934 he was sentenced to serve ten years in the Lissouri State Penitentiary with Farr and Kelley(or Kelly) for the burglary of a grocery store at marysville, missouri. (probably maryville). He stated that his acqueintanceship with Farr and Kelley dated to the night prior to the burglary when they had met in a Kansas City saloon and having become intoxicated were proceeding to Farr's home at Clarinda.

Iowa, stopping enroute at Maryville, Missouri; that they broke
into a grocery store and while in the process of burglarizing
this store they were arrested by an armed posse. Myers stated
that neither Farr nor Kelley had ever mentioned any of the Subjects in the Bremer case to him and that he doubted that either of
them had any acquaintanceship in either St. Paul or Chicago.

Ralph Parr was also interviewed and denied any knowledge or acquaintanceship with the various persons connected with the Bremer case. He stated that although he had been to Chicago on one occasion his activities had been confined solely to the neighborhood of Clarinda, Iowa. He further advised that he had served a two year sentence in the U.S. Fenitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, for violation of the National Motor Vehicle Theft act and had met Kelley at that institution when he was also serving a term for another violation of the National Motor Vehicle Theft act. Farr stated that he has no acquaintanceship with anything or anybody concerning this case and was at a loss to account for the fact that his name had been suggested as a possible possessor of some of the ransom money.

When Kelley was interviewed he refused to make any statement whatsoever other than to state he had nothing to say to anyone, and
that he was not implicated in any way as far as the instant investigation was concerned relative to his having passed some of
the Bremer ransom money. He also denied any acquaintanceship or
knowledge of various persons in this case. It is to be noted that
Kelley is the Subject in the case entitled GERAID H. DAVIS, with
aliases, et al, National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, K.C.File 26-4609.
He has been interviewed on numerous occasions for information concerning that case and at no time has been willing to divulge any
information whatsoever.



RE: ALVIN KARPIS, with aliases, Fugitive; I. 0. #1218, et al; Edward George Bremer, Victim Kidnaping.

Please refer to my letter of September 17, 1935 in this matter (Bureau file #7-576) and your letters of September 50, 1955 and November 7, 1935 relative to Joseph T. Miller of Tulsa, Oklahoma, representative of the Federal Laboratories.

You are advised that my attention was brought to the alleged activities of Joseph T. Miller by Lieutenant Robert Houston of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation. Houston's remarks concerning Miller were more or less vague, indefinite, and no basic data or first-hand information were furnished by him as to Miller's activities. It was apparent from Houston's remerks to me that his information was obtained from some of his confidential informants.

I know Miller personally, and have seen him several times. In addition to his activities as a representative of the Federal Laboratories, he is a "private investigator", insurance adjustor, and according to his own statements to me has done some work for some mining companies in northern Oklahoma within the last several months, in order to break some strikes and effect the cessetion of said labor disorders. He bregged to me about how much he was being paid per day for his services, how long it took him to bring about the desired. results, but that he was successful, and that the mining companies who employed him were entirely satisfied with his services. In this connection I have heard rumors to the effect that Miller in his activity in connection with the labor disorders, and perhaps in other matters has been deceitful. RECORDED & INDEXED

Houston in his conversation with me

within the last few years sold a Thompson submachine gun to the City of Ada for the use of its Police Department, and when Joe Neal, the Chief of Police who was holding office when this gun was purchased, went out of office he took with him the submachine gun; that Miller subsequently recovered it, and was alleged to have sold it to some outlaws, not naming any suspect to whom he was supposed to have sold the weapon. I had Special Agent R. N. Butterworth of this office make inquiry at Ada concerning this machine gun, and Chief of Police Somer Jones informed Agent Butterworth that Neal did take the submachine gun when he left the Police Department, but that it has since been recovered, and is now in the possession of the Ada Police Department. It was personally examined by Special Agent Butterworth, and is found to bear #3276, model of 1921 Thompson submachine gun.

In my conversations with Houston concerning Miller I asked him whether he had any information to the effect that Miller is supposed to have had any traffic with members of the Barker-Karpis mob within the last few years, and he stated that he did not, but that he "believed possibly that he has had". He was unable to furnish anything tangible, or any specific leads, as is indicated above.

I interviewed Carol Tenkersley, widow of Herman Barker, deceased brother of Fred and Doc Barker, and she informs me that she knows Joseph T. Miller, has known him for many years, and that she considers him unreliable, not dependable, a liar, a fence for stolen property, and not worthy of the confidence of anyone who is endeavoring to enforce the law. She stated that her knowledge of and experiences with Joseph T. Miller date back several years. She stated that when she and Herman Barker were married, and during the activities of the members of the mob, she recalls that one evening she and Herman were at the house of Miller in Tulsa, Oklahoma, where Herman had taken her to discuss with Miller a "business proposition", apparently fencing some stolen stuff; that some police officers came by, knocked on the door, which was opened by Miller, and these officers asked Miller if he had seen Herman Barker, to which Willer replied that he had not; and that Herman Barker was at that moment hiding behind the door within a lew feet of Miller. She stated that she knows Miller personally, but has had no direct dealings with him herself with respect to stolen goods or other unlawful activities, but that she has heard that he has fenced stolen stuff, and the foregoing statement of hers, if true, and I believe it is, will be corroborative of what she has heard. The Tankersley woman mentioned that Miller had been employed by some mining companies in northern Oklahoma during the past several months in connection with some labor disorders, and it is generally believed that he was possibly as active in fomenting these disorders as he was in quelling them, for

the reason that he was paid a large sum for his work in connection therewith by the mining companies to break the strike.

Carol Tankersley told me that she does not know that Miller ever sold any of the Barkers any weapons of any kind, and that she is pretty certain that he never sold them any Thompson submachine gum while she was running with the mob, which was, of course, prior to the death of Herman Barker. She stated that she had heard a sister of Ali Purdy, now in the penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma, make a remark to the effect that Miller may have supplied Al Purdy with some weapons, but not machine guns, several years ago, but as to definite information concerning this she has none; that she does not believe Purdy's sister or Purdy himself would reveal information concerning Miller, and she, under no circumstances, would like for either of these persons to be approached concerning this for the reason that they are both outlaws at heart, and possibly would suspect her of revealing the information, which would destroy her usefulness as an informant.

Miller is a personable sort of an individual, knows most of the peace officers in Oklahoma, goes to all the peace officers conventions, frequently contacts the officers, and I am informed is generally liked. He is the type of individual who goes about bragging of his friendship and acquaintance with this, that and the other person, usually naming some individual in a more or less responsible official position, as an intimate friend of his. I am somewhat inclined to share the views expressed by Lieutenant Houston and Carol Tankersley that Miller is possibly unreliable, and would not be the least backward in going in to a shady deal in fencing some stolen stuff that could be readily disposed of, if the remuneration therefor were sufficiently attractive. I likewise am inclined to think that he possibly would sell outlews guns, if he could do so without it becoming known to officialdom. In support of my opinion, as expressed, that Miller would possibly handle stolen stuff, I recall a conversation some months ago with him, which was of very short duration, concerning the possible recovery of some of the jewelry that was stolen in the robbery of the Benjamin Goldberg jewelry store in Tulsa last spring, and concerning which the Oklahoma City office has a file under the National Stolen Property Act. It is my recollection that Miller stated that he believed that Goldberg would want him to assist in the recovery of some of the jewelry, and that he believed that with his contacts and his experience that he could possibly produce some results. I asked him whether he had any definite information concerning the location of any of the jewelry, and of course, he informed me that he did not have. I told him that I should like very much to see Goldberg recover all of his property, but that this Bureau is perheps a bit more eager to obtain evidence concerning fences for stolen stuff than it is for the actual thieves, and that I would do my best

to see that whoever was found in possession of the property was prosecuted vigorously, and I should like to receive any information of this character coming to his attention. Miller very shortly discontinued the conversation concerning the Goldberg metter.

The foregoing constitutes the extent of my information concerning Miller, as developed by the several inquiries I have made concerning him and his activities.

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Shortly after this convers tion between these men Special Agent Farland called at the Kansas City, Kansas. Police Department where information was obtained from a confidential source [the name of this informent will be furnished at a later date), that Karpis. Campbell and their mob had been in and around Kansas City, Missouri, for the past two or three weeks. Karpis was revorted to have plenty of ready cash; that Campbell had come here with him and there was also a man who is known as "Pineapple" Mackson, his true name being unknown at this time, with them, and they were about to go into the cleaners racket. There was also a short heavy set man who is known as "Cowboy," true name not being known at this time.

This mob has three automobiles, a Studebaker Sedan, tan color, new; a Buick Sedan, color blue or black, new; and a new Ford Coupe, painted black, the Ford being used to do their running around the city. An effort will be made to obtain the license numbers of these cars. Recently Karpis was reported to have left for some place in the North, leaving Campbell here. He was reported to be about to make a trip to Oklahoma.

The informent who furnished this information to Agent Farland's confidential informant claims that he will make an effort to have these parties meet in some certain place and would then furnish the information to the confidential informant in Kansas City, Missouri, Arrangements are being made at this time to have the informant call at room of Special Agent A. E. Farland in the Schuyler Hotel, and if this can be accomplished, arrangements will be made to secure the adjoining room where the conversation can be overheard.

The following information was dictated by Special Agents D. M. Brightman and V. I. Parry as result of investigation by them in this case; the same having been previously dictated in memorandum form by those Agents:

On November 12, 1935, informant #3 called the Kansas City Bureau Office and requested that Special Agent D. M. Brightman contact him within the next two days as he had some information he wanted to furnish. Accordingly, on November 12, 1935, Special Agents D. M. Brightman and V. I. Parry contacted informant #3 at St. Joseph, Missouri, at which time informant #3 stated he knew the Bureau wented Karpis but was not sure about Compbell. Informant then stated that both these men were in Karpis City and that his information was that they had joined up with the Sparter, Langdon and Loyle crowd and were presently meeting in the

apartment of Blackie Doyle in Kansas City, this apartment being located in the neighborhood of 35th and woodlawn. He stated that he was sure this information was correct and felt, when questioned about the expenditure of any money for maintaining a plant in this neighborhood, that such money would be well spent. His further information was that both Karpis and Campbell were broke and had joined up with this mob with a view to staging some crime that would get them some money.

**C**:

Informant #3 was advised at this time of the amount the Bureau would pay for information furnished to the Bureau alone regarding information leading to the apprehension of Karpis and Campbell and said that he would immediately take steps to secure more definite information, and arrangements were made so that Agents would be immediately advised.

Upon returning to the Kansas City Bureau office a telephone call was awaiting and informant #2 asked Special Agent D. M. Brightman to meet her at the Grand Avenue Garage, Kansas City, Missouri. Accordingly, Special Agent D. M. Brightman contacted the informant at the Grand Avenue Garage and she advised that she was the party who had given the information to informant #3.

informant stated that she had been playing

around with this crowd for some time since

and that they had the utmost confidence in
her, and that she ascertained from Sparger and Langdon that at the
present time they were staying with Blackie Doyle who was still unable
to join them in their escapades as he was shot in the shoulder in St.

Joseph, missouri, and was recuperating; that his arm was in a very bad
condition at the present time and that a doctor, whom she thinks is a
Mexicandoctor who had formerly attended both Blackie and Jess Doyle
and Edne marray and who has the reputation of attending any wanted man,
is probably attending Doyle.

This contact told Sperger and Langdon, in the informant's presence, that the bank at most any time would have around \$20,000.00, but both Subjects later explained that they wanted more money because it was to be split five ways, that is, with Campbell. Rarpis, and blackie Doyle; that it would take five men to pull this stick-up; and that they would need more than \$4,000.00 apiece out of it. Informant stated that she was sure they would ask her to go with them the next trip they took to further case the bank as they need a woman along, as it would not attract so much attention when they sit in the car looking the bank over.

At all times during the conversation between Langdon and Sparger, they brought up the names of Karpis and Campbell and stated that Karpis and Campbell were in and out of Kansas City quite often and at times they would all meet at Blackie Doyle's. From the conversation, informant thinks that Karpis and Campbell are out of money, which she thinks eccounts for their contacting additionalmen to pull a big job. She further stated that in the conversation to between these two men, they stated that Karpis had lost his machine gun and was now on the lookout for more guns.

chase was killed they were in need of a new automobile and thought they could go to Nebraska and steal two new cars off the floor from some show-room which would not be as hot as cars stolen in this vicinity.

Informant then accompanied Special Agent D. M. Brightman to the Kansas City Bureau office, at which place she was further interviewed by Special Agents M. C. Spear, V. I. Parry and D. M. Brightman,

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and at this time she gave substantially the same version but stated to Agents that she was sure that she would come to Kansas City within the next day or two and positively locate the hideout of Blackie Doyle; also, that when the Canton (?) bank was robbed, Sparger, Karpis, Langdon, Campbell and an unknown man were to go to licher, Oklahoma, as that was the closest good hideout they had; also, that she herself may be invited to go with them the night the bank is to be robbed, and possibly other places, but at this time she had not decided whether it would be best or whether her life would be endangered if she were to go.

She advised she would keep in close communication with the Kansas City Office and would inform this office of any contact which was to be made by any of the above mentioned parties.

It is to be noted that the informents who are referred to by number in that part of this report which was submitted by Special Agents Brightman and Farry have been previously named in a recent communication from the Kansas City office to the Bureau in the case entitled:

For the information of those offices receiving copies of this report who did not receive a copy of the letter in question setting out their names it may be noted that that

Attention is also called to the fact that while Informant No. 2, who talked to Agents Brightman and Parry indicated that the place of the contemplated bank robbery was Canton, Missouri, it is thought that probably the place is Holden, Missouri, in view of the indication by this informant that the place in question was somewhere in the vicinity of Warrensburg, Missouri, and was but a short distance from Kansas City, Missouri.

Further appropriate investigation is being made relative to the above information received, and proper steps are being taken by the Kansas City office in an endeavor to ascertain the bank which the individuals mentioned above may have in mind in order that that bank may be appropriately warned and notified to be on its guard for such a robbery.

It is noted that the modus operandi contemplated by the above named with individuals in the proposed bank robbery at Canton(or possibly Holden). Missouri, is practically identical with the modus operandi used by "Irish". O'malley and his gang in the robbery of the bank at Okemah, Oklahoma, which is carried under a case entitled: "Dewey Gilmore, with aliases, et al, Okemah National Bank, Okemah, Oklahoma; Bank Robbery; this 🛠 🛠 modus operandi also being identical with the tin the attempted robbery of a Strte bank at Blythedals, Missouri. The modus operandi in both of these robberies was that the robbers entered the bank at night preceding the robbery through the ceiling or top of the building and week. waited in the bank for the arrival of employees the following morning at which time the robbery and attempted robbery, respecttively, took. place. Information concerning the Blythedale attempted robbery will be found in the case entitled: martin John Langdon, alias John Langan, alias martin Rogan; Clarence Sparger; Charles Arbogast; Lee Fletcher, (Deceased), National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, particularly in the report of Special Agent A. L. Farland dated at Kansas City, Missouri, S ptember 21, 1935.

Referring to letter from Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley to the Kansas City office dated at Chicago, Illinois, November 12, 1035, requesting investigation at Michita, Kansas, to ascertain the location of Milton Letts, Special Agents A. E. 

## Identification of the Body of William J. Harrison

William J. Harrison was born in St. Louis, Missouri, September 27, 1900. He spent the major portion of his adolescent years in St. Louis. In about 1926 he went to Calumet City, Illinois, where he operated numerous "Speak-easies" and dispensed alcoholic beverages during the prohibition era. He became associated with the Capone syndicate of Chicago and fraternized with persons of such notoriety as Gus Winkler, Big Homer Wilson and "Killer" Burke. Fred Goetz, alias George Zeigler was one of the leading Capone henchmen, and spent much of his leisure in pleasant golf games with Harrison who was a golf professional.

Harrison became acquainted with members of the Barker-Karpis gang through Fred Goetz. Harrison had become a man of wide experience in his travels, and, as a result of his underworld activities was able to furnish to members of the Barker-Karpis group, some of their most valued contacts, and without whom many of their sinister designs would not have been consummated.

When plans were being formulated in Chicago and St. Paul, for the abduction of Mr. Edward George Bremer, arrangements had to be made for the removal of the women members of the gang from St. Paul, and finding them apartments which would serve as a safe rendezvous for their gangster companions. This task fell to Harrison, who lodged the women in pleasant apartments on Chicago's South Side, which were operated by a Picht guy". During Mr. Bremer's twenty-two days of confinement in the Bensenville, Illinois, hideout, Harrison served as an outside "contact man" for the gang, thus insuring its continued safety during the abduction period. Harrison, despite his precarious undertakings, was a man of wit and humor, and served as the "court jester" or "court fool" to the amusement of his gangster affiliates.

Temporarily, after the release of Mr. Bremer, the gang quit Chicago, Harrison providing safe refuge, entertainment and invaluable contacts elsewhere. Then it appeared to the gang, however, that the "heat was off", certain members returned to Chicago, using Harrison to rent apartments, thus allaying suspicions which might have arisen had the more notorious members of the gang secured the apartments themselvos.

Harrison was trusted, and even his garrulous nature had not, up to this time, given rise to doubt on the part of his companions. Unwittingly, however, he communicated to other associates of the gang who were not in the "inner circle", certain information which, it was felt, should not have been divulged.

Using a ruse, Harrison, on the night of January 5, 1935, was lured by his companions to an abandoned barn in the vicinity of Onterioville, Illinois. When he entered the barn in the hope of effecting his mission he was shot to death by several of his erstwhile associates. His body was then soaked in gasoline, placed in an appropriate position and the barn was set on fire. The structure was completely demolished. On the following day, January 6, 1935, the charred outline of an apparently unidentifiable body of a human being was observed, lying in the smoldering embers. Only a torso remained.

The Sheriff's Office at Wheaton, Illinois, was notified immediately, and the body was removed by the Du Page County coroner to an undertaking parlor at Roselle, Illinois. An x-ray examination of the body disclosed it to be that of a male individual. The x-ray also disclosed the location of a bullet which was found embedded in the lower part of the right shoulder of the corpse. A ballistics examination of this bullet reflected that it had been fired from a .32 calibre automatic pistol.

A search for identifying items left at the scene of the crime disclosed an Elgin wrist watch and gold link wrist bracelet lying beside the body. There was also found what remained of a pair of octagon shaped eye glasses. In addition thereto there was found an empty five gallon gasoline can and a crank for a Model A Ford automobile.

Investigation by the Sheaton, Illinois, Sheriff's Office at the Elgin Watch Company, Elgin, Illinois, reflected that the watch had been assembled in 1928 and had been sold on February 15, 1929. There were no records, however, disclosing the identity of the firm to which the watch had been sold. The watch is described as grade 428, model 6-0, movement 32,166,666, chrome nickel plated case #0,211,813. All jobbers handling Elgin watches were circularized by the Sheaton, Illinois, Sheriff's Office in an effort to trace the watch, but without results. The Sheriff's Office also caused this watch to be submitted to scientific analysis. The examination disclosed a jeweler's repair number C-633 which had been scratched on the inside of the case. Pertinent information concerning the watch and the repair numbers were published by the Sheriff's Office, during the month of June 1935 in a magazine issued by the Javelers' Association, in an effort to effect an identification, but without results.

Meanwhile the investigation of the Federal Bureau of Investigation had been progressing in an effort to locate and apprehend the remaining fugitives who were responsible for Mr. Bremer's abduction, including William J. Harrison. Information was uncovered from time to time to the effect that Harrison had been murdered by members of his own gang. These whisperings of the underworld became quite current. Investigation loaned credence to the report. Special Agents learned from scurces intimately associated with Harrison that he had worn, prior to his death, a wrist watch which had been fastened to his wrist by a gold link bracelet. This bracelet was found beside the corpse. It had also been definitely determined that Harrison, immediately prior to his death, was wearing rim glasses of an octagon shape. Remnants of such glasses were found beside his body. It was ascertained that Harrison was last seen by certain members of the gang on the morning of January 5, 1935. It was also learned that Harrison had an appointment to meet a certain woman companion of the gang on the night of January 5, 1935. This appointment was not kept, and Harrison was never seen thereafter.

During the last days of August, 1935, Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation ascertained definitely that Harrison had been murdered by certain of his companions, and that his body had been burned in an old barn to prevent identification. Immediately thereafter the location of this barn was learned, and certain material facts were disclosed which clarified the circumstances surrounding the murder of the unidentified man. Exhaustive inquiry covering a period of more than one and one-half years had disclosed the habits, the contacts and the places where William J. Harrison had lived and operated. Agents secured from the Shcriff's Office at Wheaton, Illinois, pertinent data concerning the wrist watch which had been found near the corpse. Systematic inquiry in the vicinity of Hammond, Indiana, and Calumet City, Illinois, where Harrison had "held forth" during his more favored years of hoodlumism, disclosed that on August 21, 1933, Harrison had had a wrist watch repaired by a jeweler friend in Hammond, Indiana. The jeweler had scratched his repair number C-633 on the inside of the case, and on his charge slip had referred familiarly to his friend and patron as Billic Harrison. The watch repaired was an Elgin wrist watch, which according to the jeweler's records bore movement number 32,166,666, nickel case #0,211,813. It had needed a new mainspring. That was the watch found beside the murdered and burned body of Harrison.

A memorandum submitted by Special Agent (A) C. S. Duggan to A Acting Special Agent in Charge Louis D. Wine, dated August 20, 1935, with reference to investigation conducted at St. George, Utah, as requested in report of reference, has never been reported, and accordingly is being submitted hereinafter as follows:

"At St. George, Utah, on August V, 1935, Sheviff John H. Cottam, and Postmatter William Brooks, were interviewed regarding the identity of the woman who meiled a letter from St. George se the Beaumont apartments, Kansas City, Mez. Both stated that they had no knowledge as to the identity of this woman, and knew of no woman was a resident of St. George, Utah, who had been in Kansas City, Mo, within the past two years.

The register of the Liberty Hotel, St. George, Utah, was furnished to agent for his inspection. No registration could be found which would in any way indicate that subject Volney Davis had registered there at any time within the past year.

Mr. G. W. Hale, manager, and Charlie Andrews, clerk, were questioned regarding subjects. Photographs were displayed to them but they stated that they were unable to furnish any information, and could make no identification of photographs.

He gave the names of the parties who had been his employees there, as James Warman, his assistant; Eddie Betts, a solored man; Bessie Smith, a colored cook; Mr. and Mrs. Walsh, house-keepers, and Freddie Freed, as a part-time operator. He refused to divulge the names of the persons who stayed at his house, but would admit or deny when asked concerning particular individuals. He admitted that Farrell, Gondorf and Upshew had been there, at various times, when asked by this Agent. He denied emphatically, however, that William Elmer Meads was there, and denied that he had ever seen the latter included.

Mr. Finn is aware that some of his patrons are confidence men, but states that he allows them to genele at his places as long as he does not know them to be fugitives from justice. He says that he has been operating gambling establishments in Boston all of his life, and intends to continue to do so. He states further that he sannot operate if fugitives from justice some to his place, and that he has always tried to keep them out. He expressed a desire to help in the capture of Meade, and states that if this Bureau will guard his confidence, he will transmit to this office any information he may pick up relative to Meade. His private telephone humber, which he gave to this Agent, is Longwood 6284.

Mr. Finn explained his reluctance to telk of his other customers, on the ground that since he does not know them to be wanted and because many of his customers are respectable business men, he cannot efford to talk about them since it would ruin him. However, he states that he would have no scruples about telling of Meade's whereabouts, if he knew them.

This Agent called at the Personal Book Shop at 95 St. Jones Avenue, Boston, in an attempt to learn the whereabouts of Fred P. Farrell. Miss Clark, Secretary, after conversation with the attendants at the Brookline Branch, stated that Mrs. Farrell had been in that Branch we few days before and had mentioned that she was now residing at the Myles tandish Hotel, in Boston.

At the Myles Standish Hotel this Agent contacted Mr. James on, Assistant Manager. The registration in Farrell's handwriting, at that he registered on August 28, 1935 and had been given Suite 906. given his previous address as Craigville Beach Road, Hyannis, Mass.

Mr. Wilson interviewed an elevator boy whom he stated could This boy said that Farrell was there frequently with a party

in room 514, mamed Graham. The boy identified at once, the picture of Fred Gondorf as being identical with Fred Greham. Graham on checking in had given his former residence as \$70 Biverside Drive, New York Citye

This Agent was furnished with a list of telephone calls made by these individuals, and Mr. Wilson assured that all mail would be traced. A check of the telephone musbers called, revealed calls made to George Kennedy at 1401 Beacon Street, J. E. Hayes, 1454 Beacon Street, Brookline, and George L. Farry at 1944 Commonwealth Avenue, Brighton, Mass. Many calls had been made to the Fenagate Motal on Beacon Street, and at this place later investigation revealed the presence of James Borker, who is apparently "the Englishmen" mentioned in the anonymous communication, as set out in the last report of reference. 

At the Boston Police Headquarters this Agent was unable to find any record of Kennedy, Hayes or Farry. The records of Gonderf and Parrell have been set sut previously.

At a conference with Special Agent in Charge, C. B. Helben - 10 it was felt that in view of the apparent temporary nature of the stay in the of these individuals, they should be interviewed in the near future. Accordingly a teletype message was sent to the Bureau on October 81, 1956, advising of the presence of these men, and requesting information as to whether they were wanted. The Bureau replied by telegram on the same date and stated that Farrell and Gondorf are apparently not wanted. 

Accompanied by Special Agent T. E. Myere, this Agent interviewed Farrell at his room at the Myles Standish Hotel. Farrell readily admitted his profession as a confidence man and stated that he know \_\_\_\_\_\_ 35 William Elmer Meade but had not seen him in mars. He believed the last time was in Mismi, Florida in 1955. Farrell stated that he and his friends had no use for Meade and would "hot foot" it out of town if they knew Meade to be there, since they knew the latter individual to be "hot". He stated that the consensus of opinion in confidence circles was that Meade was a fool to run away from a rap which they believed be could beate. The further opinion is that Meads is not the type to mix in a kidnaping. and his acquaintances are all very such surprised to read of his comnection with this case.

Farrell emphatically denied that he was the Fred mentioned in the wire to Callahan, stating that he would not cross the street to help Meade because he knew him so slightly. He explained that in his business no money could be made by mixing up with fugitives from justice, because the nature of his business required him to be always in the opens

among his own eroud, he stated, it is sort of the code that only ca a warrant has been issued for one of its members, he surrended hime self and try to beat the rap with legal skill. He stated that Boston is his home town but that he does not operate here, but would give no further history of himself. He was informed by this Agent that his name was definitely linked with that of Moade and that he would be kept under the eye of this Bureau until Meads's apprehension. He stated that, of course, he was sorry to hear this and that it might seriously interfere with his operations, but that under no consideration would be ever try to obtain any information concerning Meade, or should be obtain any, would be turn it over to this Bureau. He Stated that this was not a defiance of the Bureau but was simply a statement of a code that had been his all his life. As reason for this he gave that he and his friends had to depend on other members: of their profession in keeping their secrets, and that he had nothing but the greatest detestation for a stool pigeon. He stated that he would not attempt to fool this Bureau by any statement that be would be of assistance when it should be quite obvious that he would not be. As consequences were pointed out to him he, in most polite terms, continued to state that no matter what happened to him or his family, he would never violate the code of his profession. He stated that although it would apparently make no difference to this Agent, he could quite truthfully say that he had no idea where Meade is at the present time, nor as to how he could locate him. He absolutely refused to discuss the whereabouts or connections of any other person in his profession, or, in fact, any memo mentioned to him. He claimed that he did not know that Meade had been \$2 100 Boston last summer until he read of Meade's capture at Morthampton 

The same evening this Agent interviewed Fred Condorf with substantially the same results as had been obtained from Ferrell. Condorf admitted that he had known Meade for thirty wears originally in Denver when that city had been the gathering place of the confidence men. He stated, however, that his connection with Meade had grown less and less in later years, and that he has not seen him since one time in Chicago in 1933 when they met in the lobby of a notel. Condorf stated that he had had his medicine for wrangling with the United States Government at one time, and that he, Gondorf, is now very careful not to infringe on Tederal laws. He was equally polite in his statements to this Agent, that if he had any information concerning Monde he would not turn it over. giving the same reason as had farrell. He added that Meade trave elled with a different crowd than theirs and was regarded generally as having become something of a fool for spending his time in trying to evade the law and fleeing over the country from a charge

that he, Gondorf, believes could be beaten. He also stated that it was a written rule in the profession that one did not ask questions of other members not in his own set, so that he, as a matter of fact, had no knowledge of who Meade's present connections might be. He also expressed his incredulity that Meade would be foolish enough to be involved in the Bremer case, and received the statements of this Agent with polite but firm refused to ever give any information regarding a member of his profession. The day following this interview this Agent was informed that Gondorf had left the Mylas Standish Hotel with his wife, stating to the clerk, that he was going Beste

Subsequently J. B. Heyes was interviewed at his aparta ment at 1454 Beacon Street, and George Farry at his apartment at. 1949 Commonwealth Avanue. The interviews with these men were substantially the same as were those with Farrell and Gondorf. Farry denied that he had ever known Meads and Hayes stated that he had only seen him once. They were also informed, as had been the others, that being known by this Bureau to be friendly with Meade, they would be constantly bethered by Bureau Agents and that in all probability any plans they might have for future operations might be seriously endangered. However, each of them stated his regret that any such thing might some shout, and admitted that it might be very hard on them, but still stated that they had been in the business too long and were too old to change or deviate from a rule against any stool pigeon activity, which had been an integral part of their whole life. They readily admitted that it would be to their advantage to have Meade eaught, since it would removed this unwanted pressure from the Bureau, but they firmly and politely stated that they would never by a means thereof. Each of them also stated that they held high regard for the Department of Justice and would not be foolish enough to try and sell this Agent that they would assist in the search when he, as well as they, knew that they would note

At the Regent Apartments at 1401 Beacon Street it was discovered that Kennedy had given my his apartment and moved the day that this agent had interviewed Farrell and Condorf. The Manager, Mr. A. S. Doucette gave this Agent the names of J. R. Mayes and James Barker, who had been frequent callers on Kennedy in his apartment, and Mr. Doucette stated that Kennedy was apparently from Mismi, Floridae

At the Fenngate Botel it was discovered that James Barker had checked out on the same day as had Kennedye However, inquiry at the hold revealed that he was somewhat friendly while there, with one T. E. Cary. Upon interview Cary stated that he was in Boston attempting to recover from asthma, from which he was ebviously suffering. He stated that he had met Barker eccasionally at that hotel, sometime before, but knew nothing whatever someorating him. Cary finally admitted, however, that he was a gambler himself but refused to discuss his affairs any further.

At the deak of the Pensgate Hotel Earl Bronk, Clark, stated that his records showed that Barker had been there on two occasions, the first being from April 29th to June 21, 1935, and subsequently, from August 28th until his last departure. Each time he had given his previous residence as the Brady Apartments at Mismi, Florida. In the interval between these two dates he is reputed to have gone to Europe. His wife had resided with him at the Fensgate Hotel.

It may be noted here that all of these men paid each in payment of rente

Subsequently this Agent interviewed a Frankie Duris in his apartment at the Westminster Hotel. Duris had been previously ascertained to have been a long time resident of Boston and a former bootlegger. When interviewed he admitted his former activities and stated that he is friendly with the confidence men previously comtacted by this Agent but has never been one of them himself. F He stated that they had discussed the visit of this Agent to them in his, Duris', presence, and that they had all agreed that they did not believe Meade was guilty of any connection with the Bremer kienaping, since such activities were so foreign to his makeup. Duris also said that this crowd was superior to Meade and had nothing to ... do with him, and that from their conversation he was certain they did not know where he was. He was equally certain that if they had any information they would not turn it over to the law under any circumstances. As for himself, Duris stated that he shared their epinion in this matter. He stated that while he did not know 🦠 Meade, nor had he any information concerning him, he would make no attempt to discover any er to give it to the Bureau. He refused to discuss the whereabouts of Barker or Kennedy or Odell, or any thing in connection with their business.

It may also be noted here that the only hint dropped by any of the persons interviewed, was that Meade's friends were probably those who worked with him at the time of the swindle for which he was last indicted. In this connection it is thought advisable

to contact Inspector Grahem of the Post Office Department at Mer York City, and ascertain, if known, whose Meade's confederates were at the time of the swindle for which he was indicted.

There is being set out below the description of Bayes. Bonnedy, Berker and Farrell, together with what information is known of them. Ine descriptions of Ferrell and Gendorf have been set out in previous reports.

RE: CASSIUS McDONALD

Reference is made to my telephonic conversation with you this morning, at which time I suggested that it might prove desirable to permit the St. Paul office to give certain information to the press at a propitious moment concerning Cassius McDonald.

The only information available in the file regarding the recent charges brought against Cassius McDonald in Boston, Massachusetts is to the effect that on November 7, 1933 the Boston Police Department wired the Detroit police asking that a hold be placed upon Cassius McDonald since he was wanted in Boston for the larceny of \$30,000. It was accordingly explained to the Boston police that McDonald was being held by the Government and that a warrant must necessarily be lodged with the United States Marshal at St. Paul, Minnesota.

The Bureau has received a copy of a letter, directed by the Boston office to the Detroit office, dated November 8, 1935, which discloses that McDonald and three others have been identified as the parties who on June 1, 1934, by means of an old pay-off swindle, took \$30,000 in cash from John Capobianco, a contractor at 129 Chiswick Road, Brighton, Massachusetts. The other parties to the swindle are John Poeifield alias John/Nack alias John/Achamara; John/Nobile alias/Fallo alias/Allen alias Costello. The third party to the swindle is Charles Phillips alias Al Caplan. The fourth person is John Patterson. Mr. Capobianco, upon interview by a Bureau Agent, stated that he is almost positive that the picture of Cassius McDonald is that of John Patterson.

Mr. Capobianco and his attorney, Philip Adams of Boston, are presently considering a trip to St. Paul for the purpose of identifying McDonald, since the Boston police have indicated that they are not obtaining a warrant until Capobianco is positive of his identification of McDonald. It is suggested that if a positive identification is made of McDonald, it might be advisable to permit the St. Paul office to furnish this information to the press.

RECORDED & INDEXED

A review of the press items discloses that only one brief patch appeared in the St. Paul papers and is quoted herewith as follows: Allow

Cassius McDonald, Held In Bremer Case, Also Wanted At Boston.

Troubles keep piling up for Cassius McDonald, reputedly wealthy Detroit sportsman who is charged with passing \$72,000 of the Bremer kidnap ransom.

Word was received here today that the Michigan politician is wanted in Boston on a warrant charging him with a \$30,000 larceny.


In the meantime McDonald is in the federal detention home at Milan, Mich., and has until Saturday to raise \$25,000 bond or be moved immediately to St.—Paul.

McDonald along with Harry Sawyer and William Weaver, now in Ramsey county jail as Bremer kidnap suspects, are to go on trial here Jan. 6, 1936.
