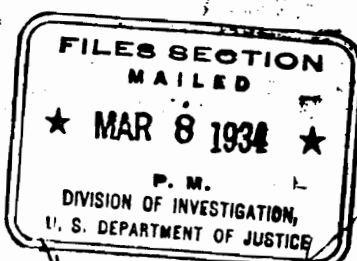
Reference is made to the memorandum of Special Agent O. G. Hall dated at St. Paul February 26, 1934, in connection with the investigation being conducted with a view to locating the Corona typewriter used to write ransom notes in the case entitled Unknown Subjects, Edward George Bremer, Victim.

It is noted that the memorandum describes the Corona typewriter in the possession of one Pete Keras of the Cozy Lunch Room, followed by the statement that this does not appear to be the machine sought. The reasons why this conclusion is reached are not set forth in the memorandum. The typewriter is described as having had, at one time, a Ectograph ribbon which is purplish and slightly smudgy. For your information, this is the type of ribbon used when writing the Hamm kidnaping notes.

It is further noted Agent Hall sets forth, as typical exemplars to be taken of suspected typewriters, three short sentences. In making comparisons of typewriting specimens the Division prefers sample writing of every letter on every key of the suspected typewriter and further desires that the questioned material be copied in detail several times with a varied degree of pressure on the keys.

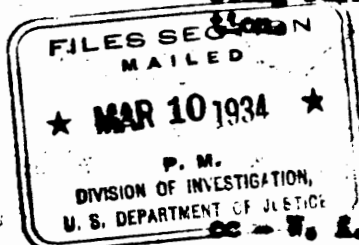

Re: Police Conditions in St. Paul

On the afternoon of January 23, 1934, at a conference at which were present Adolph Bremer, Adolph Bremer, Jr., Otto Bremer, Walter Magee, C. E. Newcome, Chief of Police Dahill of St. Paul, and myself, the Chief of Police and I were handed four letters consisting of three handwritten notes from Victim Edward Bremer to Dr. H. T. Nippert, Walter Magee, and Victim Bremer's wife, and one letter, typewritten, addressed to "Charles Magee" by the kidnapers. These letters were given to the Chief of Police and myself, and assurance of the strictest secrecy was given by both of us. We were cautioned to tell no person whatsoever and agreed so to do. The conference ended at about three o'clock.

I came to the St. Paul office; and the letters, which had been wrapped in cellophane, were forwarded by air mail at approximately four o'clock to the Division at Washington for possible development of latent prints thereon. About thirty minutes later there appeared on the street in an extra edition of the St. Paul Daily News an article to the effect that a bottle had been hurled through the glass door of the vestibule of the house of Dr. H. T. Nippert a few days previous thereto containing two "ransom notes". The ransom notes in question, as indicated in the foregoing, were as a matter of fact delivered in the manner described on the morning of Friday, January 20.

I immediately communicated with Chief of Police Dahill and asked him to come to my room at the hotel. He arrived there about seven o'clock. I told him that we were "on the spot", and that I understood the only persons who knew of these ransom notes in addition to those present at the conference on the foregoing occasion were the two of us, and that either he or I had been guilty, or should be considered guilty, of making public these notes or permitting them to be made public. I told him that I had told no person inasmuch as I had not communicated with any newspaper representative myself and the information could not have leaked from the St. Paul office.

Chief of Police Dahill told me that he had told his two chief assistants, Charles Tierney, Chief of Detectives, and Tom Brown, Detective in Charge of the kidnaping squad, who was formerly chief of police in St. Paul. At this juncture, he asked whether Mr. Hanni knew anything about it and could be present. I told him that Mr. Hanni did not know anything about it, but if he wished it, Mr. Hanni could be present. He said he preferred to have Mr. Hanni present because Mr. Hanni is acquainted with police conditions here. Previously, Mr. Hanni had telephoned him at my request telling him that I would not be able to furnish Chief Dahill with photostatic copies of these notes as I had promised, the reason being that he could not be certain that any photostat operator could be trusted in a secret matter of this kind. Mr. Hanni came to the hotel room and I reiterated what I had said to the Chief as outlined above. Dahill then said that there is only one man responsible and he knew it; that it was Tom Brown, who had been a source of information and contact for the St. Paul Daily News. The St. Paul Daily News, it should be noted, had been vigorously attacking the administration of the city of St. Paul and the police. Dahill was very emphatic in his denunciation of Tom Brown and said, "It is my belief now that he (meaning Brown) 'caused' both the Hamm and the Bremer case."

I then told Dahill that in some manner the matter must be placed before Adolph Bremer inasmuch as I was involved equally with him; and Adolph Bremer would naturally believe one or the other of us to be guilty of this leak. Dahill stated emphatically that nobody but Brown could have given this information to the Daily News.

We then proceeded to the residence of Adolph Bremer. I told Bremer that in connection with the publicity, of which he was already aware, I had asked the Chief of Police to go to his home with me; that as far as I was concerned, the information I had received from him had been given to no person whatsoever and that the Chief would make his statement to him. Dahill then told Adolph Bremer that he had imparted the information relative to the ransom notes to Charles Tierney and Tom Brown; that there was no question in his mind that Brown had imparted the information to the Daily News and that Brown, in his opinion, was implicated in both the Hamm and the Bremer kidnapings. Adolph Bremer expressed considerable surprise, stating that he had been responsible for Tom Brown's being made Chief of Police and felt very badly that any suspicion could be raised against him.

Adolph Bremer then telephoned for Walter Magee; and upon Walter Magee's coming to the office, Dahill repeated his statement to the effect that Brown was implicated in both the Hamm and the Bremer kidnapings. Magee also expressed his surprise and narrated at some

length the political indebtedness of Tom Brown to Adolph Bremer.

Both Chief of Police Dahill and myself left the house shortly thereafter. In the meantime, however, Adolph Bremer had expressed his regret that Dahill had not kept his word to him and had imparted the information relative to the ransom notes to both Tierney and Brown. Dahill said that he had to do that because Tierney and Brown were working with him on the case and in order to work efficiently, they should be in possession of all the information.

Mr. Charles Tierney, Chief of Detectives, St. Paul, advised that Myrtle Eaton was known to St. Paul Police Department and had been arrested in St. Paul on December 10, 1930, for shoplifting, St. Paul Police Department No. 22402; and that Myrtle Eaton was at present living at 565 Portland Avenue, Apartment 101, and is being kept up by one Andy Rothmeyer, a saloon keeper of St. Paul.

It is suggested that as "Doc" Eaton is listed as a possible suspect, the fingerprint file should be checked in single print file with prints of Myrtle Eaton. 4?

In connection with the above captioned case, it is imperative at this time that every effort be made to determine the location of stores which retail the socks worn by the Victim in this case and in connection with which investigation has been conducted by your office.

Special attention is called to the report of Special Agent Charles Jenkins, dated at Chicago, Illinois, February 21, 1934. It would appear that the distributor of these socks was the Chicago Mail Order Company of 511 South Paulina Street, Chicago, Illinois. The details of the interview had by Agent Jenkins, at this place, have been carefully noted. It is felt that some record should be available at the office of this concern which would supply the names of stores to whom they have sold this article and it is requested that further investigation be made at the Chicago Mail Order Company with a view of determining this information. If the records are meager and complicated, it may be possible that the search could be narrowed to a territory covering the northern half of the State of Illinois.

If this concern, above referred to, will make its books available so that an agent, or even several agents, might be permitted to inspect them to secure the desired data, the management should be informed that we will volunteer the services of agents to examine the records to obtain as much detailed information as possible as to the location of purchasers of this particular article.

Will you kindly give this matter immediate attention and advise me at once.

MEMORANDUM FOR S. A. G. WERNER HANST:

Re: ALVIN KARPIS, with aliases,

In compliance to your request to check the possibility of locating the hideout in this case by means of checking airplane flights in the vicinity of approximately 150 to 200 miles south or southeast of Portage, Wisconsin, the following information was obtained:

The victim has stated rather definitely that on January 23th, this being the second Saturday after his capture, while held at the hideout, he heard a plane flying almost directly over the hideout. He fixed the time of his hearing this plane at a very short interval of time before the ringing of a church bell; that the church bell always (on week days) rang shortly before the blowing of a factory whistle. He fixed the blowing of the factory whistle as being late afternoon or about five or six o'clock. In this connection, he stated the sound of the motor of this particular airplane had hardly become extinct before the church bell started ringing. Thus, the church bell, the factory whistle and the airplane were heard within a period of fifteen minutes at the most. It seems logical to believe the plane passed over the hideout shortly before five or six in the afternoon.

The victim stated that on other days he would hear airplanes often more than one in a day, which appeared to be passing his hideout some distance away. He stated that on some days and sometimes for two or three days he would hear no noises of airplanes passing. Thus possibly indicating the hideout was not located very close to an established air line.

Agent interviewed R. E. MIDDLESTADT, Chief Dispatcher and F. W. WHITTIMORE, Operations Manager, Northwest Airways, Inc., at the offices of that company, located at Holman Municipal Airport, St. Paul, Minnesota, on this date. Both stated the average citizen would be unable to distinguish between the noises created by single and tri-motored ships. In fact, MR. WHITTIMORE, who claims he has been flying for eighteen years, stated he is not always able to distinguish between the two noises unless there was some difference in the R.P.M. of the motors of a tri-motor ship or unless the ship were comparatively near. He stated that, of course, a tri-motored ship or a bi-motored ship creates a louder exhaust noise than does a single motored plane but that should a pilot of a single motored plane be bucking a strong head wind, he would probably be "gunning" or racing his motor at

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a greater speed than when cruising in good weather and his motor would thus create a much louder exhaust and possibly give persons on the ground the impression that a bi-motored or a tri-motored ship was passing.

The persons then interviewed then checked airport weather charts for weather in the Chicago area on the afternoon of January 28th, which showed that weather conditions in that vicinity were bad; that an 80-mile wind was blowing from the northwest and the ceiling in the Chicago area was but 1,000 feet. Upon further checking the weather they stated Northwest Airways regularly dispatches a ship out of Chicago for St. Paul, Minnesota, at 4:30 p.m.; that this plane's route takes it straight into Rochester, Minnesota, but because of the before mentioned bad weather, the ship was grounded and did not take off at all.

As to possibility of commercial planes, not connected with airline service, flying on that date, both stated such a presumption was impossible because of the weather condition and further, at this season of the year and because of the depression, there is practically no flying being done other than by the airlines. In fact, he (MR. WHITTIMORE) stated if anyone were flying on the afternoon of January 28th for pleasure purposes, they were "crazy".

The before mentioned gentleman were then given an idea of the approximate position of the point to be located; that of a point approximately 175 or 200 miles south, southeast or southwest of Portage, Wisconsin; also the fact that a city having street cars and traffic signals, which city is located approximately 70 to 90 miles from the point, the location of which is desired. MR. WHITTIMORE then stated he knows of his own knowledge that the only city south of Madison, Wisconsin, now having street cars (the first city south of Madison) is Rockford, Illinois. Rockford is a city of 85,000 population. The next cities south of Rockford, having street car systems are Elgin and Aurora, Illinois, according to MR. WHITTIMORE. Elgin is 54 miles southeast of Rockford and Aurora is 75 miles from Rockford, located southeast. Joliet is located 95 miles from Rockford. Both of the above named gentlemen dismissed the possibility of the point attempting to be located as being on or near the route of the Northwest Airways from Chicago to Rochester, Minnesota.

They stated the only established airlines operating straight west and southwest out of Chicago are United Air Lines, operating straight west of Chicago over Aurora and Sterling, Illinois, operating three ships each way each day and American Airways, operating southwest of Chicago over Joliet, Morris, Streator and Peoria, Illinois. Both stated that the records of these airlines would show the positions of airplanes being operated by

than between five or six o'clock at any point close to Chicago on January 28th; that the pilots of regular airline ships radio their position every half hour; that since a strong wind was blowing from the northwest, the ships flying at that time could easily have been off course and if backing the wind, motor or motors would be speeded up and persons on the ground would gain the impression the ship was closer than usual; that possibly the wind was blowing in such a way that persons on the ground at a certain point would hear it very distinctly although the location be ten or fifteen miles away.

MR. WHITTMORE suggested that records of both the American Airways and the United Air Lines be checked at Chicago with reference to the above and impressed agent that it was entirely possible to locate airplanes (positions of) operated by those companies at almost any time during the afternoon of January 28th.

There is attached hereto a map showing the routes traveled by the airlines mentioned and showing the distances from Portage, Wisconsin.

One of these circulars has been sent to a State Game Warden living in Peoria, and I am very much afraid that so far as being confidential, a great mistake has been made there, because it has been discussed with others.

I gather from this letter and newspaper accounts that it has to do with a certain kidnapping in your city. Two years ago I was responsible for the apprehension and the prosecution of some twelve people for the kidnapping of a Doctor in Peoria.

No. 6001 is either NEFF'S Missouri State Penitentiary number or his St. Joseph, Missouri, police number. Both of these men are white, and NEFF is about thirty-five years old. I do not possess any further identifying data regarding either.

Ray Harrington, Superintendent of the Minneapolis Police Bureau of Identification, advised that the Minneapolis Police Department received a letter dated December 17, 1933, from Mr. B.T. Andrews, Chief of Police, St. Joseph, Missouri, in which he stated he had received information from a confidential source that the above mentioned men borrowed a large sum of money and left St. Joseph about three weeks prior to the date of the letter above mentioned, with the intent, according to his informant, to stage a bank robbery in this vicinity. In compliance with your letter of February 16, 1934, regarding captioned case, I am attaching hereto St. Paul Police Department photograph No. 23, 979, which is a photograph of THOMAS CARROLL, alias TOMMY CARROLL alias T. L. CARROLL alias JAMES RAY BROOK, alias FRANK SLOAN alias FRANK SLOAN and a supply of circulars, issued by the Post Office Department.

With reference to the Ford Deluxe Coupe, Motor No. 40-283751 purchased from the Ford Motor Sales Company, 117 West University Avenue, St. Paul, Special Agent O. G. Hall and Special Agent R. C. Coulter interviewed Herbert Imholte, Sales Representative of the above mentioned company at the St. Paul Division office. He claimed to recall the transaction, but not to be able to identify Carroll as the purchaser, stating the transaction involved their acceptance of a Chevrolet coupe. He later sent the company's original records to this office, at the request of Agents. These records disclose T. L. Carroll, 668 Central Park Place, St. Paul, purchased the Ford Coupe in question on May 13, 1934, at which time 1933 Minnesota Motor Vehicle License No. B337821 was assigned to the car in his name. Payment was made by actual allowance on Chevrolet Victoria 1931 Model coupe, Motor No. 2460114, serial No. 21430613, bearing 1933 Minnesota Motor Vehicle license No. B316962, at \$365.00 and cash balance of \$421.04, with refund to Republic Finance Co. of \$115.00.

Agent Hall and Agent Coulter interviewed Mrs. Adella Filben, Apartment 101, Filben Court Apartments, 668 East Central Park Place, who stated she had read about Carroll in the newspapers and through that source knew who he was. However, he had never lived in that apartment building. She stated there was a girl by the name of Carroll who had occupied an apartment there, whom she believed to be a night club entertainer, but she left last winter and it was her understanding this girl went to New York. However, she left no forwarding address, and Mrs.


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Filben stated that she knew none of this girl's associates. Mrs. Filben is the mother of Tom Filben, who substantially controls the slot machine racket in Ramsey County, of which St. Paul is the seat of Government. Filben is reported to own the apartment house in question and has become rather wealthy, although he has the reputation of associating with criminals.

A check at the Minnesota Motor Vehicle License Bureau disclosed that 1933 Minnesota motor vehicle license B316-962, were issued to Ben Frank, 872 W. Smith Avenue, St. Paul, and later transferred to the Ford Motor Sales Co. The date of transfer was given as October 20, 1933; however this was the date the Ford Motor Sales Co. sold the car to another individual, and is in accordance with the usual mode of sales.

The signature of T. L. Carroll appearing on the retail buyer's order was checked with the signature on the St. Paul Police identification records and was found to be identical.

The 1933 St. Paul City Directory lists Thomas (Sally) Carroll, Apartment 106, 668 East Central Park Place.

Post Office Inspector John Strech, Post Office and Customs Building, St. Paul, who handled the postal cases against Carroll and others, informed Agent Coulter that he interviewed Sally Carroll, wife of Tommy Carroll, after he became a fugitive and that he definitely recalls that she told him that she and Carroll visited the Century of Progress at Chicago for a week after his release from the Ramsey County Jail, and that she told him where they had lived, but owing to the fact that it had no bearing on the inquiry he was making, he made no note of the above information. Strech stated Sally Carroll is a radio entertainer and is now residing at 3242-16th Avenue, South, Minneapolis, Minn. He stated Carroll, who originally came from the State of Oklahoma, had never been in any serious trouble until after his release on bond in connection with the Post Office burglary; that the bond, which was in the amount of \$10,000 was returnable at LaCrosse, Wisconsin the third Tuesday in September, 1933; that Carroll was not present on that date and it was continued until October, 1933, when Carroll failed to put in an appearance.

He stated during the latter part of October, 1933, the First National Bank of Brainerd, Brainerd, Minnesota was robbed, and a week or two later the Minneapolis Police received a call that a bank robber was living at 637 E. 17th Street, which is the residence of Carmel Tremont, this woman having assisted Carroll in providing bail bond on the Post Office burglary charge; that two detectives called at this address and found Carroll there with \$1400.00 in a suitcase, and possibly a machine gun, with which he attempted to escape. He was arrested by one detective and left in custody of the other while the first completed a search of the house. Before the return of the first detective, Carroll slugged the second detective and escaped. He was positively identified, and later the money was reported to have been positively identified as a part of a shipment to the First National Bank of Brainerd from the Federal Reserve Bank. Carroll next appeared in San Antonio, Texas, with one Fisher, who was recently returned and sentenced to a term in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, on a charge of Post Office burglary from St. Paul, Minnesota. In addition to the Post Office burglary charge, Carroll is wanted for the murder of a San Antonio, Tex. Police Detective, which crime was committed at the time Fisher was arrested, or within a day or two of that time.

Mr. Streech further advised that investigation at San Antonio, Texas, disclosed that Carroll was associating with one Jimmie Williams, age thirty, blonde, about five feet six inches tall, and who weighed about one hundred and fifty pounds. He has a blonde wife, about thirty years old, and a child four or five years old, sex unknown. *Jimmie Williams*

Also with one Wayne Huttner, thirty-five years old, six feet tall, one hundred and seventy-five pounds, who had a dark haired wife. Both Williams and Huttner were reported to be driving new Essex Terraplanes, bearing California license plates, numbers not secured. Nothing further is known regarding these men.

Carroll was further reported to be associating at San Antonio with one Tommy Cannon, a St. Paul character, who drives a Buick Victoria coupe, listed in the name of Anderson at the tailor shop, next door to Harry Sawyer's former speakeasy on Wabasha Avenue, St. Paul.

Mr. Streech further advised that one Morris Goldberg was the person who arranged for Carroll's bond here, and that it is his understanding that Tom Filhen put up a ten thousand dollar note to the

principal owner of the real estate, when it became apparent that Carroll and Fisher were intending to jump their bonds and that Morris Goldberg received a fee of \$4,500.00 for securing the bonds and Mr. Streech stated he was confident that Carroll would have stood trial had it not become known that he had been identified as one of the participants of the Train and bank robbery. He stated after that time Carroll got "big" as he knew he would be sentenced to serve a life term in connection with that crime.

Mr. Streech stated he knew that Carroll was a friend of Karpis and the Barkers and that all were friendly with Harry (Dutch) Sawyer, and that they as well as Cannon appear to have substantial connections in St. Paul, as nothing ever happens to them here, although he has reported to the St. Paul Police Department instances when Cannon was well supplied with money and told them what bank it was reported to have come from. He stated, from a confidential source he heard that Carroll was in St. Paul on January 19, 1934. However he doubts that Carroll will attempt to communicate with his wife, as he was living with another woman, name unknown, when the trouble occurred in San Antonio. He further advised that he had been informed that the Burns Detective Agency had found where Carroll had been living in Topeka, Kansas, and that it had also been determined that Karpis and the Barkers had been residing in Topeka at another address. He stated that Karpis, the Barkers and Carroll are reported to have gone to Chicago after the unsuccessful attempt to rob the bank at Topeka, Kansas.

At a later date, if found advisable, Sally Carroll will be interviewed for information regarding the trip to Chicago with her husband. Some of the foregoing information does not appear relevant to the investigation at present, but has been recorded as received for whatever value it may be for future reference.

It is noted in the memorandum of Special Agent H. D. Bray, Kansas City, Missouri, dated February 16, 1934, that reference is made to Sylvester Waters. There is a possibility that this man is an escaped convict from the Texas Penitentiary, as he is known to Special Agent R.C. Coulter of this office, who stated he was sentenced to a term in the Texas State Penitentiary, during or subsequent to 1925. He thereafter escaped, but was apprehended within a year or two, being arrested on a charge of robbery while armed, and was sentenced to serve a term

of 99 years in the Texas State Penitentiary. Neither of these sentences was under the name of Sylvester Walters. However he is listed under that name as well as Stanley Stewart in the Identification Unit of the Division.

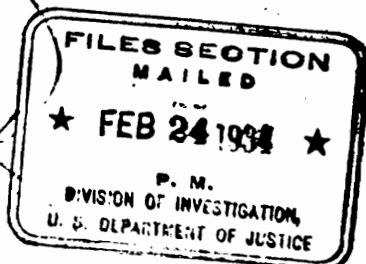

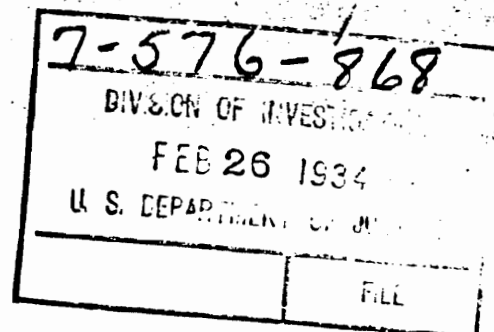

Dear Sir:

I am enclosing herewith a copy of a letter yesterday received from the County Attorney of Lancaster County, Nebraska. It appears that the State of Nebraska is very anxious to prosecute LaRue for crimes alleged to have been committed by him in that state.

I believe that you are thoroughly familiar with the case pending against LaRue in our district. It is a case in which, to say the least, a successful prosecution would be very doubtful. We have been holding it upon our docket largely in order to assist the Department in the apprehension of LaRue. It is our suggestion that LaRue should be released to that jurisdiction which has the best chance to convict him for one of the more serious crimes which he is alleged to have committed, such as bank robbing, kidnapping, etc.

We have forwarded to the United States Attorney at Florida the necessary documents for the return of LaRue to this district, but believe that the subject-matter of this communication should be given careful consideration by your service before a removal order is actually entered. If LaRue is removed to this district, it might thereafter become more difficult to surrender him to some other jurisdiction for trial than it would be under the present circumstances.

Andersen from Tampa, Florida, informed that this subject during the past twenty-four hours has become despondent and very much depressed, fearing that when removed he will be taken to South Bend, Indiana, for prosecution in connection with the kidnaping of Howard A. Woolverton, and that he constantly is making inquiry as to whether his brother, Harry Doll, has been picked up in Chicago. He intimated that if his brother, Harry, is taken into custody in Chicago on the information that he has furnished to Division agents at Tampa he, Edward Doll, might attempt to commit suicide. He maintains that when Mr. Woolverton was abducted and confined in his brother's, Harry's, home near Lockport, Illinois, his brother had no knowledge of the fact that Woolverton had been kidnaped and was being held for ransom, and that if Harry is prosecuted in connection with this matter the part he took was at the instance, suggestion and arrangement of his own, Edward Doll's.

Please be advised that in the first place the flash lights, nor the lenses, were available at the time the St. Paul Division Office instituted local inquiry; that on February 11th, telegraphic information was obtained from the New York office that a certain concern in Minneapolis was manufacturer of the particular flash light. Inquiry was immediately started by an agent to ascertain from that concern, the distributors of that particular flash light. It was found that such a concern did not exist in Minneapolis. The New York office was advised and immediately at the same time, the agent assigned was instructed to check all electrical concerns with a view to ascertaining the identity of the manufacturer of the particular flash lights in order to find where they were being distributed. Subsequently, information was received as to the dealers in film-lenses, and upon receipt of that information only a few stores were named, and one agent could properly take care of that assignment. Later, this office was advised that the flash lights were being distributed by a certain chain store, of which there is only one located in St. Paul and Minneapolis, and the same agent was assigned to this lead. The investigation in this case was such that there were no leads that could have been checked quicker by more than one agent, unless a store to store canvass would have been undertaken. The same is true with reference to the film-lenses.

During this period other agents at that time at the St. Paul office were engaged in investigative work in connection with the case. In fact, all agents were at all times engaged in carrying out leads in the Bremer case. The flash lights proper have never been available for investigation here, and investigation to ascertain places where such flash lights were being sold was undertaken on the strength of the name only and leads as to distributors. I think the records in the file will indicate this matter was given appropriate and prompt attention.

The identification made by the saleslady on February 20, 1934, was made on the strength of the photographs the Division furnished of these flash lights.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL.

Concerning the kidnaping of Mr. Edward G. Bremer, of St. Paul, Minnesota, I desire to advise you of the following circumstances that have been reported to me by the Special Agents at St. Paul:

A Special Agent was stationed in the home of the father of Edward G. Bremer, and on the night that Mr. Bremer was released by the kidnapers upon his arrival at his father's home, the Special Agent in this home advises that one of his first inquiries was whether the serial numbers of the currency delivered as ransom had been turned over to the Federal investigators. He became highly indignant upon learning that these had been delivered to our Special Agents, indicating that the kidnapers had threatened that members of Mr. Bremer's family would be killed or injured should this information become known.

An employee of Mr. Bremer's bank by the name of Miss Dickman, who occupies a position similar to that of Secretary to Mr. Edward G. Bremer, received one of the ransom notes, but when Special Agents questioned her she claimed that she could not tell whether the individual delivering the note was tall or short, fat or thin, because it was too dark. Special Agents have examined the premises and have found that there is, even at night, sufficient illumination for an identification to be made on the porch where the note was delivered.

On February 12, 1934, the Mr. Bremer who had been kidnaped cried during the course of the questioning of him and expressed fear that his daughter would be killed in the event he talked and he indicated that he would not make a positive identification, but shortly thereafter he tried to convince the Special Agent that he had told him everything that he knew. He admits not being blindfolded for several days during the course of his incarceration but he continues to claim that he cannot identify any one of his kidnapers and to represent that he did not even see their shoes or any part of their bodies. It was in the daytime that he was kidnaped but he denies that he can give any description of the individuals who participated in this kidnaping.

Mr. Bremer has, during the past few days, given some details concerning the description of the place where he was held. Due to his

attitude, however, the Special Agents are unable to conclude whether these details are true or false. He gives the appearance of being a thoroughly frightened individual. Of course, his attitude is not one which is very helpful to the Special Agents of this Division who are attempting to identify and cause the apprehension of the kidnapers.

With reference to our recent conversations concerning this situation, I desired to advise you of these additional facts. In the event you consider it advisable to issue any statement concerning this matter I am submitting, attached hereto, a suggested draft of such a statement for your consideration.

The most recent reports from Special Agents at St. Paul are to the effect that the apparent hostility of Mr. Bremer is not believed to be personal but is thought to be a hostility that is general toward all those who would seek the solution of this crime.

Reference is made to my telegram dated February 26, 1934. In connection therewith, Special Agent E. P. Burruss was advised by Mr. J. C. Dale, Financial Service, Veterans Administration, that check payable to Mrs. Paula Harmon in the amount of \$1585 was mailed to her, care of General Delivery, Winnie, Texas, on October 19, 1932. This check was returned and was subsequently sent to her on November 3, 1932, care of C. H. Pennoek, Post Office Box #732, Beaumont, Texas.

Mr. Dale further informed Agent Burruss that the file reflected that Charles Preston Harmon, while serving in the army during the World War, made application for a \$10,000 insurance policy and that same was discontinued effective June 6, 1919, on account of non-payment of dues. The file also indicates that his mother, Martha A. Harmon, resided at Mount Enterprise, Texas. Agent Burruss arranged with Mr. Dale of the Veterans Administration to have a flash placed in the Veterans Administration file pertaining to Charles Preston Harmon, IC-825449, to notify the Washington Field Office should any further correspondence of any nature whatsoever be received from Paula Harmon or anyone else having interest in this case.

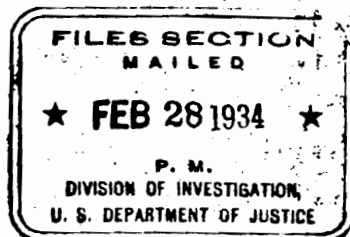

The outside envelope measures 7.11 by 3.93 inches. It has a linen finish and there is no water-mark. The inside envelope addressed to Adolph Bremer measures 5.75 by 3.79 inches. It is a heavy cream paper with a mottled water-mark finish. There is no water-mark design of the manufacturer. This envelope is lined with solid brown colored paper which extends completely over the flap and is as wide as the envelope and extends 2.8 inches further. This lining is .0021 inches thick.

The three pages of the letter are written on identical paper measuring 7.88 by 4.98 inches. The paper has green lines .35 inches apart and there is no water-mark. The handwriting on the envelopes and on the letters is identical but this is not like other handwriting in this or other cases.

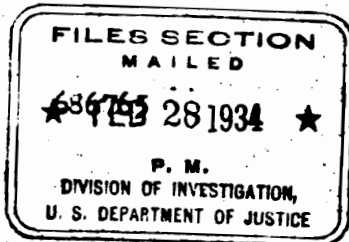

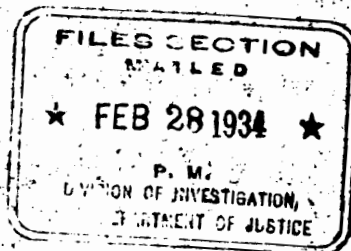

Reference is made to a telegram from the St. Paul office to this office, dated February 27, 1934, requesting that specimens of handwriting other than signatures be obtained of Volney Davis, Arthur (Doc) Barker, and Harry Campbell.

Please be advised that search of the files in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary failed to show any handwriting of these individuals other than signatures.

The office of the Parole and Pardon Attorney, state of Oklahoma, has a record on Davis and Doc Barker. Five letters written by Davis, when he was in the McAlester State Penitentiary, were found in this file, were borrowed, with the promise that they would be returned, and are transmitted herewith. These letters were receipted for and should be carefully preserved as it was definitely requested that they be returned when they have served their purpose.

The records of the Pardon and Parole Attorney do not disclose any specimens of handwriting of Arthur (Doc) Barker other than signature. I am transmitting herewith three parole reports purporting to bear his signature; one for February, 1933, rendered February 27, 1933 at Neosho, Missouri and witnessed by M. M. Roley, S. A. Keller and G. E. Barker, and in this parole report Doc Barker states that he was employed sixteen days during that month by S. A. Keller at Neosho, Missouri. Another for March, 1933, rendered at Neosho, Missouri, with the return address, Box 174 of that town, dated March 28, 1933, in which he stated that that would be his address indefinitely and that for eighteen days he worked for different parties as a common laborer at \$1.50 per day, and witnessed by Jack Ziller and Rannie Farmer. The third report is for January, 1934, rendered at Neosho, Missouri, return address Post Office Box 174 of that town, dated January 30, 1934, in which he states that he will be at this address indefinitely, and that he has worked twenty days for different

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parties as a common laborer and has earned \$54.00. It is witnessed by Jack Ziller and Mrs. Rannie Farmer.

Application for Banishment Parole bearing two signatures of Doc Barker was obtained from the records of the Pardon Attorney's office and also an Application for Clemency, dated June 16, 1931, bearing two signatures of Doc Barker was obtained at the Pardon Attorney's office and are transmitted herewith.

There was found in the file of Doc Barker at the Pardon Attorney's office a letter dated February 14, 1934, written at Neosho, Missouri, and signed George E. Barker, address Post Office Box 174, Neosho, requesting that some parole report blanks for his son, Doc Barker, be forwarded. A similar letter, dated March 28, 1933, signed George E. Barker, Post Office box 174, was obtained. There is nothing to indicate that these letters are in the handwriting of Doc Barker and are not being transmitted herewith.

All of the documents forwarded herewith have been copied and information contained therein in the nature of leads will be collated and proper investigation conducted.

The Kansas City office was apprised today telephonically of the names appearing on these parole reports.

As is indicated, no handwriting specimens could be found of Harry Campbell. Agent Hollis informs me that he has made a thorough search of the records in the Police Department at Tulsa, Oklahoma, but has been unable to obtain any specimens of Harry Campbell's handwriting there. He will conduct further investigation in an effort to obtain such specimens and, if obtained, same will be forwarded forthwith to the Division.

February 13. The pencil script with which the letter was written is the same as the envelope. The letter measures 9.9 by 8 inches and there is no water-mark in either the envelope or letter. The letter was probably torn from a pad. The scheme used in this case is similar to that used in the case entitled Unknown Subjects, Edsel Ford, et al, Victims; Extortion, and the name Harold E. Harlan under which the pay-off man was to register also compares with the name Harold C. Benson used in the Ford case in an exactly similar manner.

The fingerprint powders and iodine have stained this letter and should not have been applied in the field.

There are no particular similarities between the handwriting in this letter and in the other cases. This handwriting will be kept for comparison with other specimens as they are received.

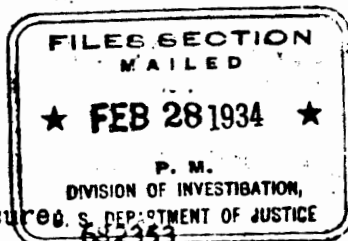



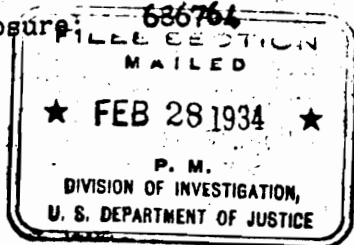

On January 26, 1934, Miss Betty Jane Guthrie called at the New York Division Office to impart further information relative to the individual R.F.D. Lemon, whom she accuses of kidnaping the Lindbergh baby. She stated that in recent months Lemon has been associating with the following individuals, who may possibly have some connection with the Lindbergh case:

SAMUEL HERSHENSTEIN, Attorney, 25 Broadway, New York City. According to Miss Guthrie, this individual is a former Assistant District Attorney in New York County, and may be "all right" as he is becoming suspicious of Lemon. Hershenstein was retained to draw up a broker's contract for Lemon and his crowd, according to Miss Guthrie.

AL HARTMAN. Miss Guthrie believes that this individual is associated with Brown & Secord, brokers, 341 Madison Avenue, New York City, who are allegedly promoting the stock of the Lava Cap Gold Mining Corp., of which Lemon is presently endeavoring to gain control. Miss Guthrie stated that Lynn N. Secord one of the partners of the above firm, is a disbarred St. Louis lawyer, and resides at the Hotel Lexington, New York City. She stated there is a possibility that this individual may be assisting Lemon in the passage of the Lindbergh ransom money.

HAROLD BROWN, 520 Bradford Street, Brooklyn, N.Y., and his brother, NED BROWN, 2662 Ocean Avenue, Brooklyn, N.Y. Miss Guthrie states that these brothers are also partners in the firm of Brown & Secord, and are not beyond suspicion in this matter.

Miss Guthrie further advised that in July 1933, Lemon ^{applied} arranged for a license to sell Lava Cap Gold Mining stock but as far as she knows the license has not as yet been granted. She stated the Federal Securities Corp. of 80 Center Street, New York City, are investigating the application and that it is her intention to appear before them and expose Lemon to the end that his application will be denied. Miss Guthrie further stated that it is her intention to appear before the Internal Revenue Bureau relative to Lemon's income tax returns and to expose him to that Bureau.

She stated that she recently learned that some of Lemon's trunks are in storage at the Davis Express Co., New York City, and that Lemon continuously visits the storage rooms and opens these trunks. Miss Guthrie gives an opinion that some of the ransom money in the Lindbergh case may be concealed in these trunks.

Miss Guthrie furnished the further information that Lemon's son, who she alleges is also involved in the Lindbergh case, is presently in a hospital somewhere in New York City. She stated that this is a suspicious circumstance inasmuch as there was a hold-up in New York City around the holidays and one of the suspects answers young Lemon's description. Miss Guthrie stated it would be wise to check up and find out whether young Lemon was in the hospital suffering from a gun shot wound as he possibly was involved in the hold-up.

Miss Guthrie further advised that Arthur Hoge, an attorney of Palo Alto, Calif., has been actively associated with Lemon for quite a long time. She stated that Mr. Hoge is a high class person and was formerly president of one of Lemon's gold companies. She stated that Lemon used Hoge in establishing a residence in California, and that Hoge innocently assisted him in establishing his alibi in connection with the Lindbergh case by procuring for Lemon, letters of introduction dated March 1, 1932.

She further stated that Lemon's business associate, Walmsley, is beginning to break with Lemon, but that it was not yet safe to interview him.

Miss Guthrie stated it is her intention to notify the New York Office when it would be safe to interview Walmsley.

MEMORANDUM FOR FILE

Re: Unknown subjects
Kidnaping and murder of
Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr.

Miss Betty Jane Guthrie, who has alleged that one R. F. D. Lemon is the kidnaper in this case, called the writer by telephone on February 2, 1934 and advised she had important information to impart. Miss Guthrie stated she was calling from the Grand Central, one block from the New York office, and would rather not come to the New York office to report her information because Lemon might see her entering the building, and cause her bodily harm, he having already threatened to throw acid in her face.

Miss Guthrie was interviewed at a nearby restaurant, selected by herself and imparted the following information.

Lemon recently called a meeting of the officers and directors of the Lavacap Gold Mining Corporation to be held in New York City at noon on Saturday, February 3, 1934. Although Lemon called this meeting himself, and everyone expected him to be there, it was not his intention to be present. His scheme, according to Miss Guthrie, was to have everyone at the meeting and out of his way while he made a secret trip out of town to a point somewhere in the middle West. Miss Guthrie stated that Lemon was desperate for money to save the Lavacap Mining Company and the purpose of his trip was to get \$60,000.00 cash in "hot money." Eventually, she stated, Lemon planned to procure one million dollars in cash from unknown sources. Inquiry was made of Miss Guthrie as to the source of her information, how she knew the money in question was "hot money" and exactly where Lemon would procure same. In reply she stated that no legitimate banker or business concern would extend credit to Lemon because he had been completely discredited in financial circles. Consequently his only recourse was to "hot money". Although she would not definitely so state, Miss Guthrie indicated that the source of her information was Miss Julia Hart, former secretary of the Lavacap who has in the past furnished Miss Guthrie with much of her information regarding Lemon's activities.

(It is pointed out that both Miss Hart and Miss Guthrie at one time were employed by Lemon.) Miss Guthrie further stated that she had reason to believe the \$60,000.00 in question was part of the ransom money paid in some kidnaping case in the middle west, quite possibly, the Bremer case. Miss Guthrie advised that she is not prepared at the present time to state how she links Lemon to the Bremer case and remarked that in her opinion it was up to this Division to find out in what way Lemon is implicated in this particular case. She requested that the New York Division office place Lemon's residence at the Beaux Arts Apartments, New York City, under surveillance over the week end and follow him when he left on his secret trip for the purpose of ascertaining the source from which he was obtaining the \$60,000.00. Miss Guthrie had many suggestions to offer concerning the proper way to investigate Lemon. Among there were the following:

Search his room.

Open his trunks in the basement of the apartment.

Listen in on his telephone conversations, and obtain all phone calls made from his apartment for the past few months and allow her to examine them and explain to the New York Office the identity of each person called and how he or she might fit into the picture.

Miss Guthrie also requested, if possible, that the New York Division office make an energetic effort to locate safety deposit boxes or bank accounts in the name of Lemon or his associates. Miss Guthrie stated that if this were done and Lemon's safety deposit boxes were opened several big crimes including a number of kidnapings would undoubtedly be solved. In connection with Lemon's bank account, it is stated that Miss Guthrie through an attorney named Nickerson is interested in a civil suit against Lemon, and it is her intention if any of Lemon's assets can be located, to have Nickerson file an attachment against them. Miss Guthrie also repeated what she had previously stated that Lemon's group and her group were fighting for control of the Lavacay Mining Company. She stated that as a result of this fight and the fact that she has brought Lemon's criminal activities out into the open he has threatened to "get her" and she no longer leaves her home at night for fear of reprisal.

In addition to the above, Miss Guthrie stated that Lemon has two new associates named Max Lehman and Al Hartman concerning whom she knew nothing except that they are of a low order. She suggested that they be checked as they may be involved with Lemon in some of his kidnaping cases. Miss Guthrie inquired as to how the investigation of Lemon was getting along, and wanted to be informed as to what had been developed to date. No information was imparted to her.

In conclusion Miss Guthrie stated that she recently had a long distance telephone conversation with Mr. Robert W. Whoolley, through whom she says, her information concerning Lemon was placed before the Attorney General. Miss Guthrie stated that Mr. Whoolley inquired of her during this conversation as to whether the Government was investigating Lemon or merely "playing around" with the information furnished. She further stated that Mr. Whoolley was awaiting word from her before seeing the Attorney General relative to the progress of the investigation. Miss Guthrie went on to state that she knew many prominent people and intended to use her influence, if necessary, to have an investigation conducted which would positively show that Lemon actually kidnaped the Lindbergh baby himself. She stated that she is at the present time arranging through a friend of hers to have an interview with Mrs. Roosevelt about the matter. As to Lemon's guilt she stated there is no question. Of this she is positive.

Miss Guthrie went on to state that Lemon's activities since the first of June, 1934 were exactly the same as his activities in the Spring of 1932 when he kidnaped the Lindbergh baby. She stated that he is now living over again the life he led in the Spring of 1932 and is unquestionably preparing at the present time to perpetrate another big kidnaping, which will be a sort of sequel to the Lindbergh kidnaping.

Miss Guthrie was informed that the information furnished by her would be reported to the Special Agent in Charge of the New York Division office. On the day of its receipt the information furnished by Miss Guthrie was reported to S.A.C. F. X. Fay who stated no action would be taken as to same.

The report of Special Agent H. R. Philbrick dated San Francisco, 1/18/34 shows that Lemon was registered at the Stewart Hotel in San Francisco on March 1, 1932, and that he checked out of this hotel and registered at the National Hotel, Nevada City, California, on March 2, 1932 remaining there until March 14, 1932. Inasmuch as Lemon was in San Francisco on March 1, 1932 the date the Lindbergh baby was kidnaped, it would have been impossible for him to have kidnaped the child himself.

The report of Agent Philbrick indicates that Lemon was in California during the greater portions of the months of February and March, 1932, and refutes various information given by Miss Guthrie concerning this individual. In view of the above investigation conducted by the San Francisco office, no further investigative attention will be given to the information furnished by Miss Guthrie.

February 19. A comparison of the handwriting with that of George R. (Machine Gun) Kelly indicates that the latter is distinctly different. A comparison was made with the signature of Edward Doll as it appears on I. O. #1214. A signature such as this one does not show enough of the normal characteristics to enable a decision to be made; however, some of the characteristics are very similar; for instance, wherever he writes "ll", Doll makes the first "l" very much smaller than the second and the curve between the first and second is distinctive. This appears in the agreement. The slant is the same, the manner of making the "r", and several other characteristics so that it may be said Doll could very easily have written the agreement. If additional specimens of the handwriting of Doll are obtained a more positive conclusion may be made.

Vivian Childs, wife of Clyde Childs, Beaumont, Texas, met Paula Harmon at the home of Mrs. Charlie Face at 2019 Bissonett Street, Houston, Texas, when she with one of Charlie Harmon's sisters called on Mrs. Face - in the summer of 1932. Later she and Paula moved to Galveston, Texas and rented a house out near the beach where they made beer. People objected, moved out in a week.

They also stayed in two small hotels across the street from the Buccaneer Hotel, Galveston, but never registered or rented a house in [REDACTED] names. Paula Harmon had money kept in safety deposit box in a bank on Main, two or three blocks from the Rice Hotel, South, in Houston, in a new building. They came from Galveston to Beaumont together. They parted and she next [REDACTED]

while living on Madison Street. Paula moved from Madison Street to Center Street, and then left Beaumont about Easter, 1933 - and she has never seen or heard from her since.

When Paula first married Dennis Woods she was about 15 or 16 years of age, and Mr. Quinn and his wife took Paula in. He is the elder of the Quinn Brothers in Galveston, Texas.

She went with Paula on one occasion to the Red Cross Office on Fannin, a block from the Old Royal Theatre to see about Charlie Harmon's Government Insurance or Bonus Money.

She also went to the Police Station in Houston, Texas with Paula and talked with Bob Ellis, then Superintendent of the Identification Bureau, to try to get a set of Charlie's fingerprints, and while there that day - either in August or September, 1932 - Ellis took Paula's fingerprints to be sent to Washington to identify herself.

Right after Paula had her wreck in Louisiana, she bought a farm out near Cheek or Fannett, Texas, and was living with Dennis Woods, she had some photographs - small snapshots - made of herself. One she recalls Paula was wearing a green dress and she was standing by some horses.

Mrs. Velma Turk stated that she knows Paula intended to return to Beaumont when she left about the last of April, 1933, because she hired a negro girl to keep the house at 994 Center Street clean for Theo Riley.

The Arcraft, Trost & Papson Photograph Galleries' Records were checked. Paula Harmon's name does not appear therein.

Dennis Woods stated that so far as he knows Paula never had her photograph taken after her automobile accident. He stated that her brother Bird Brannon has been working at the sub-office of the County Tax Collector at Port Arthur.

Wesley Brannon, another brother, is employed by the Texas Company at Port Arthur.

A Mr. Miller is in charge of the Tax Collector's Office at Port Arthur, and it was learned that he through friendship for Bird Brannon, gave him work in that office. The necessity for his service terminated Feb. 20th. Mr. Miller was not in at the time of Agent's call, but Miller is a friend of A.R. Brantle

mon, 337 DeQueen Blvd., Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19134. Tracing furnished the office was not responsible for handling of Paula Harmon. However, it was the Superintendent of Mills of Paul Arthur Harmon, 337 DeQueen Blvd., Philadelphia, and if any can be identified as being at the Harmon Residence, 337 DeQueen Blvd., he will immediately advise the Dallas office.

The records of the telephone company at Beaumont, Texas, disclose that telephone No. 6855 was installed at 775 Madison Street in the name of Preston Harmon, October 3, 1932; removed to 994 Center Street, February 10, 1933; removed from that address May 29, 1933, "abandoned".

It was ascertained at Dallas that the Federated Metal Company is operated by Stonewell J. Smith, whose home is at Farmersville, Texas. Smith handles type and stereotype metals and stores his merchandise at a warehouse at 2301 Worth Street, Dallas, but travels all over the country all of the time.

With reference to the charge against telephone No. 6855, April 21, 1933, for Western Union Telegram, Mr. M. G. McGee, Manager of the Western Union at Beaumont, Texas, permitted Agent to read the telegram referred to as it was not paid for and was charged back by the telephone company to the Western Union in July 1933. The telegram reads:

It will be noted by report of Special Agent W.F. Trainor, dated at Kansas City, Missouri, 7-3-33 in connection with the Kansas City Massacre, on page 15, that telephone Jackson 7073, Kansas City, was the telephone in the house occupied by Verne Miller.

On page 20 of report of Special Agent Trainor, dated at Kansas City, 2-20-34, entitled UNKNOWN SUBJECTS, Edward G. Bremer (Victim) - it is stated that "with reference to report of Agent Fallon, page 3, dated at Oklahoma City, 9-19-32, in the Nash, Holden and Keating Case, *** showed that Jack Carter acted as a go-between for Karpis and Fred Barker."

The Dallas Office does not have that reference report, and it is suggested that any information the Kansas City Office may have which would indicate that Jack Baxley is the Jack Carter connected with the Kansas City Massacre, be furnished the Dallas Office.

Jack Baxley was reported recently by his wife Grace to be in Florida, and it is known that they have at times stopped in Miami, Fla.

During the middle of February, 1934, Grace Baxley still was at her father's home on W. Bow Street in Tyler, Texas, but Jack Baxley was not there. The telephone number of T. E. Smith, Grace Baxley's father, in Tyler, is 2177-N.

The information concerning long distance calls placed to Chicago and St. Paul by Paula Harmon, was furnished the St. Paul and Chicago Offices.

At the State Automobile Registration Bureau there also was found an application for driver's license, made out by Walter Johnson, Antlers Hotel, Indianapolis, Indiana sworn to before Mary Qualters, Notary Public, December 9, 1933 on which he was issued 1934 Indiana driver's license 75335. In his application the following brief description is given of him: Born 9-16-1880 white, male, 5' 11 1/2", 310 lbs., brown hair, brown eyes. Agent made a tracing of his signature from the application and the same is retained in the Cincinnati Office file in this case. 97623

At the Antlers Hotel, Auditor Bigelow found no registration of a Walter Johnson and did not remember him.

Agent found that Mary Qualters is a clerk at the Hoosier Motor Club, 1840 N. Meridian St. On calling at this place, Miss Qualters could not remember what Johnson looked like, but stated the Club had correspondence with him and she referred agent to Noble Sutton, Manager of the Club.

Mr. Sutton produced his file, showing Johnson had obtained membership in the Club, and the club had assisted him in obtaining license plates, etc. Mr. Sutton could not remember the features of Johnson. He states Johnson has lost some of his papers and he had addressed a letter to Johnson as recently as February 22, 1934 at the LeClaire Hotel, Moline, Ill. His file shows Johnson was at the Ambassador Hotel, Tulsa, Okla., 12-20-33. Johnson has sent the Club checks from eastern cities, but Mr. Sutton did not know just where the checks came from. He did not know anything about Johnson personally, but pointed out that Johnson signed his letters as Walter G. Johnson, and sometimes as W. G. Johnson. In searching his file, he finally found a letter head reading as follows: "JOHNSON'S SUPER HEATER", manufactured by Walter Grady Johnson Manufacturing Company, General office, 2069-12th St., Detroit, Michigan.

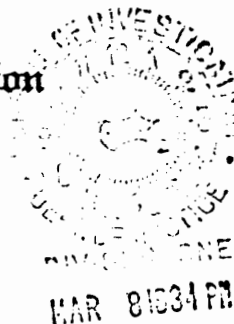

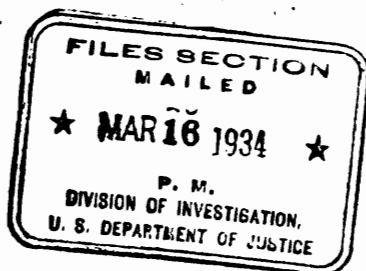

In connection with letter of the Chicago Office to the St. Paul Office under date of February 10, 1934, and the attached memorandum of Agent R. S. Reed, I am informed that photographs of Doc Eaton, Ribbley, and LaRue have been secured by Agent Noonan. However, if additional photographs are desired, I will secure same.

In regards to whether Ribbley and Doc Eaton are wanted in St. Louis, Ia. for the killing of a bootlegger's daughter, they are not wanted. I have all the details regarding same if of any value. In a previous letter I gave you all the discreet information I could secure regarding Vernon W. Lynch. The cover is still being maintained on his phone, but no information of value has been received.

In the absence of any definite information as to the perpetrators of the Bremer kidnapping, I desire to call attention to a number of likely suspects who are either residing now in Des Moines or have close connections here.

DEREK BERLOVICH now resides at 1406 Harrison Street, Des Moines, and with John Waters, alias Go-About-Ribbley operates the Sportsman's Club at 565 - 7th Street. Berlovich is known as one of the smartest crooks in the middle west. He is a well known bondsman and has connections everywhere. It is authoritatively reported that Harvey Bailey, Jack Klutas, Gus Winkler and others made their headquarters at his home following the \$2,000,000 Lincoln National Bank, Lincoln, Nebr. holdup. Berlovich was later arrested for disposing of \$18,000 worth of these bonds which he claims to have received from Eddie LaRue. A few years ago Berlovich built himself a very expensive home, and within the last year he has been hard hit and as a consequence the mortgages on his home have been foreclosed. He is bitter against local authorities for "persecution" of him on the bond deal, and feels that they were the ones who caused him to lose his home. He is in need of money, and would be the "brains" in such a matter as this kidnapping.

JOHN WATERS, alias GO-ABOUT-RIBBLEY resides at 3106 - 48th St. and is a partner together with one Mose Cohen and Derek Berlovich in the Sportsman's Club. Waters has been in the racket for years and with Berlovich furnished the brains. In 1930 Waters was the go-between for the kidnapers when Jimmy Sheridan, a local gambler was taken, and later in the kidnapping of Al Kitty, another gambler, he played a part. Neither of these gamblers would aid police, although enemies of Berlovich and Water, but every officer who worked on the case is satisfied that Berlovich, Waters, Klutas, and Eddie LaRue engineered the deals. It might be stated here that in each one of these cases conversation between the kidnapers and the victims was by whisper. Waters has a gruff whiskey voice. The local Police have called my attention to the fact within the last month Waters has been making himself very conspicuous, so much so that the officers have wondered what he is

was up to. Waters sister maintains an 87 acre farm about 25 miles from Des Moines. It is not used for farm purposes, it is well fenced and no trespassing is permitted, and Agent has received information from several sources that this is the hide-out for any visiting gangsters who are "hot". It is a very lively place for a hide-away in a kidnapping and is believed to have been the place where the two gamblers, Sheridan and Kitty, were held.

EDDIE LARUE, alias Eddie Bell recently arrested in Florida is a close friend of Dewey Berlovich, and according to the latter's statement, he secured approximately \$18,000 in stolen bonds from Larue after the Lincoln National Bank robbery in 1930.

CLARENCE "DOC" RATCH is now operating a night club at Burlington, Wis. where he is using the name of Hubbard. He is believed by local police to have been involved in the kidnapping of the two local gamblers, Jimmy Sheridan and Al Kitty. He used to frequent Des Moines often.

CURLEY CLOU SE is alleged to be another frequenter of Des Moines and is said to contact Berlovich and Go-About Nielley when in town. When in Des Moines he is said to stay with a Dorothy Wise, alias Dorothy Wise, alias Montana Dot who hustles from the Koo Apartments, operated by a man named Johnson who is unreliable. She is said to live at 914 Walnut St., Apartment 3A7. a further line up on this woman can be secured from the Narcotic Office.

PETE RAND local big dealer in the liquor business is reported to be paying up a lot of old bills that he has owed for several months. While it is not believed that Rand would actually participate in the kidnapping, he would do the "head work" for same.

SHIMMY WEIMAN an associate of Pete Rand is reported to have been out of town for about three weeks around February 1st. He went away broke and returned pretty well supplied with money. He claims to have been visiting Rick Lindsey, at South Omaha, Nebr. Lindsey is reported to be a stool for Detective Anderson of the Omaha Police Department. Weiman has been seen in company with two strangers, one goes by the name of Marsh, age about 45, height 5-9, dark, tough looking. The other is age about 36, 6ft., weight 160 lbs., dark. Both of these men are alleged to have been former prison mates with Weiman, who is believed to have served at the Nebraska State Penitentiary, Lincoln, Nebr. At the time Weiman was away his business was conducted by one Eddie Condon from Sioux City while Charlie Eaton looked after Pete Rand's business. Big Bill Hildebrandt of St. Paul is a close friend of Weiman's.

NOELIAN PORTER according to U.S. Marshal Fred Hird, Des Moines, should be considered a possible suspect in this kidnapping. He is 27 years old, height 5-9, weight 220 lbs., hair brown. His wife is Marie Porter from Newton, Ia., but he is now running around with a woman named Elsie McHenry, alias Alice Parrish. She was formerly "Tony the Wop's" woman. Tony is serving a 20 year sentence at Anamosa, Ia. This woman has been living on Logan Street. Another companion of Porter's is Gale Johnson, a safe cracker.

I visited Spirit Lake, Ia. which is near the Minnesota border last week and on authority of Mr. Harold Nathan, to ascertain if the siren in that town was blown at the same time as a factory whistle. In connection with this investigation I made inquiries at Garner, Rutherville, Milford, Spencer, Emmetsburg, Algona, Dakota City, Fort Dodge, and Valley Junction, near Des Moines, and while nearly all these towns use a siren at morning, noon and evening, none had the combination of a factory whistle and siren together. It is reasonable to believe that due to the activity of the Federal Government on kidnapping matters that Bremer was not taken out of the State of Minnesota. For this reason I call attention to the town of Eveleth, Minn. which I believe has this combination of siren and whistle, the latter coming from the nearby mines.

I am setting forth the above information as of possible value in this case, knowing that in such kidnappings several men are used. The St. Paul Office may possibly have information coupled with the above, will aid materially in identifying the subjects wanted.

The report does not indicate whether the Rockford Mills sold to any other concerns and from this report it appears probable that other sales were made. Your attention is also invited to the fact that Agent Jenkins only checked the sales for 1933, which is not satisfactory. It is requested that sales for 1932 be also checked. It is of extreme importance that a thorough and complete check concerning these socks be made for 1932 and 1933. We are endeavoring to find the retail store who also handled either the underwear involved in this case or the shirt.

Your attention is also invited to report of W. C. Jamison, February 22, 1934, Chicago, Illinois, to page 3 thereof, wherein is listed the names of the stores purchasing these shirts in the State of Illinois, out of Chicago, but not in Cook County. It is requested that a more thorough examination be made in order to determine whether there are any other dealers in the State of Illinois other than the ones set out in this report who have purchased these shirts.

Please give this matter immediate attention.

I again contacted confidential informant [redacted] in this case [redacted] on February 15th and requested that he endeavor to ascertain the following:

- (1) Through his connection with the victim's family, such fragments of the victim's story as he could obtain from general conversation with them.
- (2) The present location of KARPIS, the two BARKERS, and that gang.
- (3) The present location of the St. Paul underworld headquarters.
- (4) Present location of JACK DAVENPORT.

In conversation with him at this time, he told me that [redacted] had been approached by JACK PFLEIFFER [redacted] and PFLEIFFER had stated, [redacted] when the G. men [redacted] question us about Karpis and the two Barkers, what are you going to tell them? [redacted] replied that if the G. men came out, it would be foolish to assume that they did not know something or else they would not have come out there. JACK PFLEIFFER said, "Are you going to identify them if they show their photographs?" [redacted] said, "I am going to say that I have seen them before but that I don't know who they are." PFLEIFFER, after some discussion, thought that would be the better course to follow.

The confidential informant advised that the St. Paul and Minneapolis underworld are very much in fear of this Division but are not afraid of the St. Paul Police.

On February 15th, I again contacted the confidential informant [redacted] and he informed me that as yet he has not had an opportunity to talk to the victim but when he does, he will notify me and give me all the information he can.

Regarding KARPIS and the BARKERS and that gang, he stated that he was unable to learn where they were at the present time and doubted that the local underworld knew exactly where they are. He said that two nights ago, JACK PFLEIFFER had invited [redacted] to go for a ride. [redacted] thought he was going for a one-way ride and hesitated, and PFLEIFFER said he wanted to go over and examine the Brass Hall, a saloon in Minneapolis. On the way over PFLEIFFER asked [redacted] whether [redacted] thought KARPIS and BARKER had pulled the BREMER kidnaping, to which [redacted] stated he did not know. PFLEIFFER then stated, "What do you think?" [redacted] then stated that he did not know what to think. PFLEIFFER then stated that if KARPIS and the two BARKERS had kidnaped BREMER, PFLEIFFER would see to it that they were "bumped off" because of the heat that was being put under the local gangs.

[redacted] did not know whether JACK PFLEIFFER was leading him out to see how he felt about the case and his reaction or whether PFLEIFFER is actually in ignorance as to who perpetrated the BREMER kidnaping.

The confidential informant was not in a position to secure the address of the local gang's headquarters but secured for me the telephone number, which is Geneva 2140.

He also ascertained that JACK DAVENPORT is at the present time confined to his home because of illness. He is said to be sick in bed.

The confidential informant advised me that [redacted] told him that for some time prior to the kidnaping of EDWARD BREMER, a man known as "BIG LOUIS", a Jew from New York, resided at an apartment house about two blocks south of Goodrich on Lexington Avenue. After "BIG LOUIS" had resided in this place for some time, he was joined by a young fellow, 6 feet tall, weighing about 165 or 170 pounds, light complexioned, who, according to [redacted] who saw him once, was extremely nervous. This person stayed there until the night that BREMER was kidnaped and disappeared. [redacted] for some reason or other, indicated to the confidential informant that he was strongly suspicious that this person was implicated in the kidnaping. Because of the reliability of the information secured through this source, may I suggest that an immediate inquiry be made to locate the apartment in which "BIG LOUIS" resides, or did reside, in an effort to ascertain the identity of the young man mentioned above.

From the confidential informant and others whom I have interviewed in the last few days, as well as through verification by telephone numbers secured from a raid on the Hollyhocks Club by the County Attorney's office in Dakota County, it was ascertained that JACK DAVENPORT resides at 4109

The confidential informant also advised me that yesterday morning, some place near Hinckley, Minnesota, a Game Warden had a gun duel with two or more men at which time the Game Warden shot and nearly killed, or killed, one man in whose possession was found \$15000 in small bills. I immediately attempted to verify this by communicating with the Sheriff of Pine City and he likewise had heard the same rumor but heard that it was the Sheriff at Milaca, Minnesota; and I then called the Sheriff at Milaca and he not being present, I talked to one of his deputies, who assured me there was nothing whatsoever to the rumor and that they had not heard it.

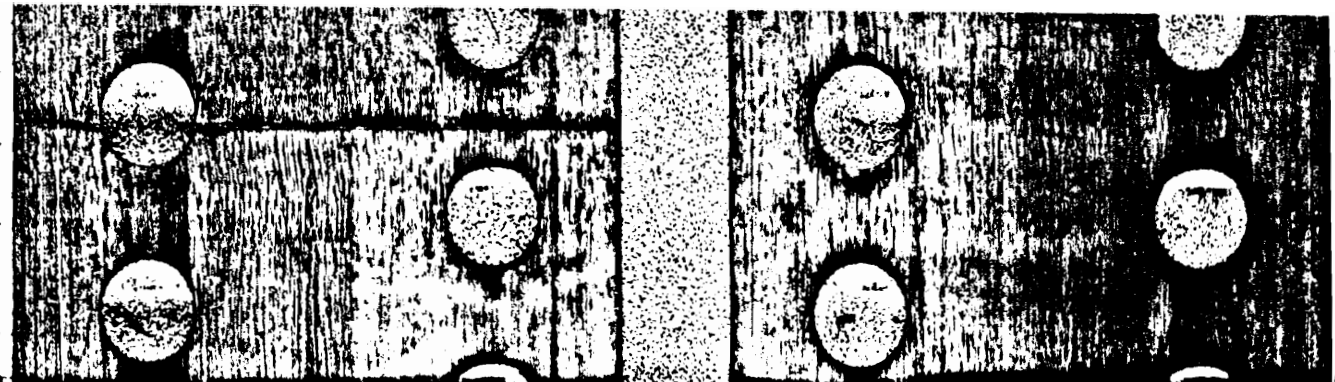
I then called MR. McFARLAND, Deputy Commissioner of Conservation, Minnesota, who is a friend of mine, and he likewise telephoned to various sections of northern Minnesota, advising me that he could not obtain a verification of the rumor but would continue to make inquiries, advising me immediately if it appeared the rumor was of some merit.

I intend to see the confidential informant again tomorrow.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Mr. Rorer telephoned Sunday afternoon and advised that the telephone tap on the telephone lines of Attorney Lynch at Des Moines, Iowa had been unproductive of any valuable information in connection with the Bremer kidnaping case. Mr. Rorer recommends that this telephone tap be discontinued in view of its cost and lack of profitable information. There is some information that this attorney will leave Des Moines soon for another town and I inquired of Mr. Rorer as to the advisability of having him shadowed to the place where he is going and Mr. Rorer thought this might be well. Accordingly, he was told to make any arrangements which he believes necessary, with the Kansas City office, relative to the shadowing of this attorney.

As stated, Mr. Rorer recommends that the telephone tap be discontinued and if this is agreeable, the attached telegram should be transmitted to the Kansas City office.

Mr. Rorer stated that they had received information concerning a place located 38 miles below Rochester, Minnesota where it is now believed that the kidnap car was refueled with gasoline, on the occasion when Mr. Bremer states they put him out of the car for a time, shortly before their arrival in Rochester. An Agent has been sent there to check the details of this information and he further stated that the Chicago office was conducting an investigation in a little town in Illinois where, according to a Minister, it appeared that the bell siren and whistle arrangement may have been heard by the victim.

Reference is made to telephonic instructions received from Mr. Clegg of the Division to contact Mr. Alexander Jamie at the Willard Hotel to secure information concerning the Woolverton kidnaping case at South Bend, Indiana and the First State Bank robbery at Holland, Michigan.

Special Agent L. Levin interviewed Mr. Jamie at the Willard Hotel and ascertained that Mr. Jamie does not have with him at Washington any of his files. He stated that he had received a letter from his son to the effect that Agent John Madala had obtained from his son the Woolverton kidnaping file. Mr. Jamie also told Agent Levin that it would not be necessary for him to wire any authorization to his son to furnish the Chicago Division Office with other information inasmuch as his son already has blanket authorization.

In connection with the robbery at the First State Bank at Holland, Michigan, Mr. Jamie commented that Lieutenant Hutson of the Michigan State Police at Lansing, Michigan has spent considerable time investigating this case and is very well informed with reference thereto.

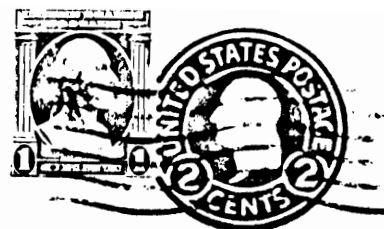

HAVE FEW CLUES IN BREMER CASE

But Federal, State and City
Officers Working Hard
To Find Trail

RETELLS EXPERIENCES

Will Be Able to Identify the Two Who
First Captured and Beat Him;
Alcorn Gets Life.

St. Paul, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Three weeks of pain and hunger, punctuated by threats of being chained to the bed in a darkened room by his kidnapers, left Edward F. Bremer still in a state of semi-collapse today.

Pinched by the memory of vicious blows rained upon his head with pistol butts, the 37-year-old banker interrupted the recital of his experiences today by sobbing once, and almost swooning.

Simultaneously, federal, state and city peace officers were working feverishly to track down the band that Bremer believes numbered 10 or 12, which collected \$200,000 ransom before his release Wednesday night at Rochester, Minn.

Have Few Clues.

The clues they had to work on: Bremer's ability to identify two of the gang; the two who beat him 15 or 20 times about the head and face until blood blinded his eyes when they stopped his automobile Jan. 17.

His memory of the wallpaper design on the room in which he was held prisoner 22 days.

Meager details of the ransom payment trip made through Faribault, Minn., on a lonely road Tuesday night by Walter Magee, wealthy contractor friend and intermediary, and the strange car the gang placed at his disposal for the trip.

TRAIL IS WARMER

Federal Agents Find New Clue
As To Bremer Kidnapers

DEVELOPMENTS WITHHELD

Vernon Avenue Gang In St. Paul Now
Suspected; Dillinger Gang Is
Removed to Ohio.

St. Paul, Feb. 10.—(AP)—The possibility that the same gang engineered both the Hamm and Bremer kidnappings which netted \$300,000 was investigated tonight by police.

Automobile registrations supplied a possible link between the two crimes. It was learned, with the disclosure that an unidentified man and woman had fled from an apartment here the day after Edward G. Bremer's abduction Jan. 17.

A few days before William Hamm, Jr., millionaire brewer, was seized for \$100,000 ransom last June 15, a suspected gang abandoned a house on Vernon avenue, a good residential district here. Their automobile was disposed of through a second hand car dealer.

Bought Small Coupe.

About the same time a new small coupe was purchased from an agency and registered in the name of the used car dealer, since gone out of business. Authorities intimated they had evidence indicating the new car was purchased by the Vernon avenue mob.

It was this same coupe that the unidentified man and woman owned and presumably used to flee from the apartment house a day after Bremer was kidnaped and several hours before his abduction was made public.

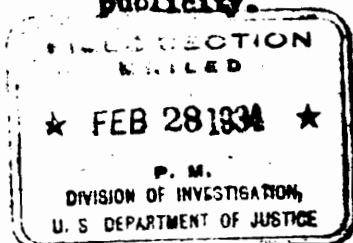

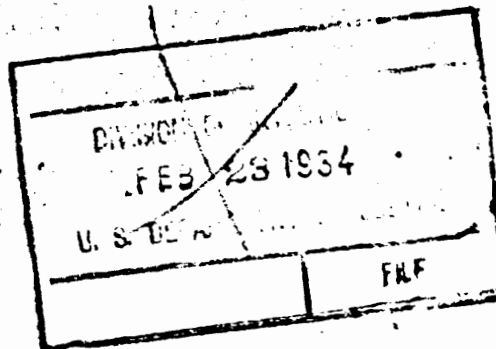

Agent called at the Jackson Park Post Office Station, 6115 Langley Avenue, at which place the carrier covering the address, 1115 East 62nd Street, was unable to identify any of the following photographs: Mrs. Katherine Barker, Arthur Barker, Fred Barker, Volney Davis, Harry Campbell, Alvin Karpis, Bernard Phillips and Mrs. Mary Phillips. The carrier informed he had observed no one, answering the descriptions of these parties, frequenting the vicinity of 1115 East 62nd Street.

It was understood that a Mrs. McQuade is the landlady at 1115 East 62nd Street, and that she bears a good reputation. Inquiry of her disclosed she remembered Winnie Williams having a room at her house from September 27, 1933 until October 4, 1933. During Miss Williams' stay there, she informed Mrs. McQuade she had had some trouble with her husband and was planning to leave him but when she took her departure she told Mrs. McQuade she had decided to go back to her husband. Mrs. McQuade advised that a man called for Winnie Williams when she left her place. Mrs. McQuade was unable to identify any of the above named photographs, as those of persons who had frequented her home and vicinity.

It is noted that Winnie Williams formerly lived at 8400 Paxton Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, with a family by the name of Ross.

Agent interviewed both Mr. and Mrs. Ross concerning Winnie Williams and was informed that sometime during the summer of 1933, Miss Williams was introduced to them by one Gus Hackenyos. The Rosses informed Agent that Winnie Williams remained there during July or August and during that time, none of the persons represented by the photographs above noted called on Miss Williams, or were seen in the vicinity.

Agent observed the premises at 1441 West Adams Street, which was listed as one of the previous addresses of John and Anna Karpis and it was observed this is a disreputable rooming house, frequented by extremely undesirable characters, and in the best judgment of this Agent it would have been, not only fruitless but unwise to make any inquiries concerning the Subject, or his father and mother at this place. It is noted, however, it had already been ascertained that the mother and father of KARPIS are now living at 2842 North Francisco Street, Chicago, Illinois, under the name of Karpavicz.

At the Humboldt Park Post Office Station, Agent displayed the photographs aforementioned to carriers who deliver at 1108 and 1141 North Francisco, but they were unable to identify these photographs as being those of any people they had seen either around these premises or on their routes.

Agent was informed that at 1141 North Francisco, families by the names of Sidel, Gaep, Vilatzer and Hazel, received mail there.

On the premises at 1108 North Francisco is a dwelling house and the carrier stated no mail has been delivered there for sometime. He did not know the names of the occupants of these premises.

Agent called at the premises, 1141 and 1108 North Francisco, observed to be the former addresses of Mrs. P. H. Newbold, sister of KARPIS, and ascertained from the mail boxes at the first address, that the names appearing thereon were identical with those given by the carrier, and it was noted there was no name on the mail box at 1108 North Francisco.

At the North Center Post Office Station, 3855 Lincoln Avenue, Agent interviewed the carrier, who delivers mail to 3010 Addison St., and displayed to him the aforementioned photographs. He was unable to identify any of them. It is noted that 3010 Addison Street is the former residence of KARPIS' father and mother. He stated that the entrance to 3010 Addison Street is a large apartment building, but that only three flats are occupied at the present time by families whose names are Badi, Johnson and the janitor of the building, whose name he did not recall.

At the Wicker Park Post Office Station, 1221 North Paulina Street, Agent ascertained that the address of Mrs. H. Venute (correct spelling, not Vemute) had been changed from 1831 West Grand Avenue to 1835 West Grand Avenue.

Agent interviewed the carrier on this route and displayed to him the photographs in question, none of which he could identify.

At the North Town Post Office, 2626 Devon Avenue, Agent made inquiry of the carrier concerning Mrs. Margaret Lee and Mrs. Allen, of 6144 North Washatenaw. He was informed by the carrier that these two ladies received mail at this address and that for some previous investigation, the nature of which he did not know, he had been instructed to keep an eye out on their mail for sometime for a letter from Florida. He stated that about the only unusual thing in their mail that he had observed was that about twice a week they received letters from some one in the Illinois State Penitentiary, Joliet, Ill. He was unable to state who this was who was communicating with them from that place. Inasmuch as this carrier was interviewed at his home Saturday afternoon, February 24, and the Post Office had already closed, Agent was not able to make further inquiries of the Superintendent of this Post Office concerning the return address of these letters.

Agent observed the premises at 6144 North Washatenaw Ave. and noted them to be a very fine three-family apartment building in a very nice neighborhood of Chicago. The name, Mrs. Allen, appears on the mail box for the flat on the third floor of this building.

Mrs. Winnie Williams, the former wife of Bernard Philips, was interviewed at the Chicago Division Office on February 26, 1934, by Special Agent K. R. McIntire. She advised she is living at 7050 Merrill Avenue, Apartment 607, telephone Dorchester 4097. She stated if she cannot be located at that place, she may be reached through Mrs. Frank Ross, 8400 Paxton, Chicago, Illinois. In view of the fact it is known Bernard Philips was closely associated with ALVIN KARPIS and the BARKER BROTHERS, Miss Williams was questioned along this line with the hope of securing some information with regard to the habits and the places which are known to be frequented by these parties. She disclaimed any knowledge with regard to KARPIS, the BARKER BROTHERS, Volney Davis, Harry Campbell and Mrs. Katherine Barker. She stated that in December of 1932, while living in Kansas City with Bernard Philips, the latter stopped on the street one day and spoke with KARPIS, but did not introduce her to Karpis. She stated she never did hear his name but recognized the picture of Karpis. She declared she had seen him at no other place and that her husband did not disclose his hangouts. She stated she has definitely ascertained that Bernard Philips is now dead; that sometime about October, 1932, she and Philips were living at an unnamed address in New York; that he left her, for reasons not stated, and never returned. She advised that she returned to Chicago and at a subsequent date, she learned from an underworld character, that Bernard Philips had been killed and that his unidentified body had been picked up in a sewer or a river in the vicinity of the Bronx, New York. She declined at all times to disclose the source of her information. She admitted Philips associated with Keating and Holden and other criminals, who are now confined in various penitentiaries, but she disclaimed any knowledge as to the places through which any well known criminals could be located.

Miss Williams advised that she and Bernard Philips and Francis Keating and his wife, lived together in an unnamed apartment in Saint Paul and during this stay, she heard Keating and Holden speak of PAULA HARMON, though she heard nothing more with regard to Paula. She declared she has never seen Paula Harmon and does not know any of Paula's connections.

Miss Williams denied knowing that Bernard Philips had at any time lived with KARPIS and the BARKER BROTHERS in Saint Paul. She stated Bernard Philips has a brother, Lee Philips, now serving time in the Illinois State Penitentiary at Joliet, Illinois, who is reported to be the husband of Mrs. Margaret Lee, living at 6144 North Washatenaw Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. It is apparent this is the party from whom Mrs. Lee is receiving letters twice weekly from said penitentiary. Miss Williams believes that Mrs. Allen, who lives with Mrs. Margaret Lee, is the sister of the latter. Miss Williams also informed that her mother (not her sister) Mrs. Jessie Wertz, is living in Wilton, Connecticut.

Miss Williams was questioned at length with regard to well known criminals and prominent crimes committed in the Middle West during the past few years, in the hope of securing information with regard to the suspects in the Bremer Case, but without results.

Copies of this report are being furnished the Kansas City Division Office at this time for their information only.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

CHICAGO DIVISION OFFICE: It is observed that no telephone is listed for R. Venute, but this office will ascertain, through the Illinois Bell Telephone Company, whether the Venute people have a telephone and will then check all toll calls and telegraph messages made to and emanating from the Venute residence at 1835 West Grand Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. Will also consider the advisability of interviewing Mrs. Venute, the sister of Alvin Karpis.

At 7144 North Washatenaw Avenue, Chicago, Illinois - will consider the advisability of interviewing Mrs. Margaret Lee and Mrs. Allen, sisters-in-law of Bernard Philips.

At Joliet, Illinois, at the State Penitentiary, will interview Lee Philips for information as to the associates of Karpis and the Barker Brothers and the places where they might be located. Will also ascertain the duration of Lee Philips' sentence.

Reference is made to Division letter dated March 3, 1934, addressed to the Chicago Office in the above entitled case, a copy of which letter was furnished your office, wherein it is noted that Winnie Williams, former passenger of Bernard Phillips, subject of Identification Order #1196, during August, 1932, registered at the Balvidere Hotel in New York City with Bernard Phillips as Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Patton.

There have been persistent rumors to the effect that Phillips is now dead. Winnie Williams has recently been reinterviewed by the Chicago Office and the results of that interview are set forth in the report of Special Agent Arthur McLashon, dated at Chicago, Illinois, February 28, 1934, a copy of which report is transmitted herewith for your information.

It is noted on page four of this report that Miss Williams is said to have stated that in December of 1932, while living in Kansas City with Bernard Phillips, the latter stopped on the street one day and spoke with Karpis, but did not introduce her to Karpis. She also stated that she never heard his name but recognized the picture of Karpis. This information seems to be inconsistent with the following quoted portion from the report:

"She stated she has definitely ascertained that Bernard Phillips is now dead; that some time about October, 1932, she and Phillips were living at an unnamed address in New York; that he left her, for reasons not stated, and never returned. She advised that she returned to Chicago at a subsequent date she learned from an underworld character that Bernard Phillips had been killed and that his unidentified body had been picked up in a sewer or

"a river in the vicinity of the Bronx, New York. She declined at all times to disclose the source of her information. She admitted Phillips associated with Keating and Golden and other criminals, who are now confined in various penitentiaries, but she disclaimed any knowledge as to the places through which any well known criminals could be located."

In view of the persistent rumors to the effect that Phillips is now dead, and considering information set forth in Division letter dated March 3, 1934, and the report transmitted herewith, you are instructed to give immediate consideration to this angle with a view to establishing its authenticity. It is suggested that the Homicide Squad of the New York City Police Department be contacted for the purpose of ascertaining whether an unidentified body was recovered during the Fall of 1932 under the circumstances related above. The Division desires that this rumor be thoroughly investigated. Incidentally, you will recall that the Division received persistent rumors that Vernon C. Miller was believed to be dead prior to his appearance in Chicago, Illinois, on November 1, 1933.

Similar information is set forth in laboratory report dated February 26, 1934. Mr. Notesteen indicated that they believed they had located a retailer on the south side who had sold the cap in question.

I advised him the Washington Field office was at present conducting an investigation with a view to determining the headquarters of the cap makers union and would set out leads for the tracing of the cap through that source. He stated he believed this investigation should continue and that were the cap definitely established in St. Paul, telegraphic advice to discontinue the investigation would be sent out.

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent F. F. Yearsley, dated at St. Louis, Missouri February 9, 1934, in the case entitled UNKNOWN SUBJECTS; EDWARD G. BREMER - Victim; KIDNAPING.

In connection with this matter, I am enclosing herewith a letter and envelope in celluloid cover, which was turned over to this office by the Post Office Inspector at St. Louis, Missouri on February 23, 1934. This letter was received in response to the advertisement which was run in the St. Louis papers as referred to in the above mentioned report. It is noted that this letter was mailed to the Hotel Statler subsequent to the release of victim Bremer. Although the Hotel Manager had advised Special Agent H. G. Maynor that they would notify this office of any communications received subsequent to the withdrawal of the "plant" at this hotel, they failed to report the receipt of this letter, and on the contrary, on February 20, 1934 they forwarded same to the St. Louis branch of the dead letter office, at which place it was opened, and whereupon learning the contents of same, it was forwarded to the Post Office Inspector at St. Louis, Missouri, thereafter being turned over to this office.

This letter was freely handled by the clerks of the dead letter office, as well as by the Post Office Inspectors, prior to delivery to this Division, and so same will undoubtedly bear numerous latent fingerprints. It is however being forwarded to the Division for examination in the laboratory.

Upon receipt of this letter, an examination was made at the point of contact as furnished in this letter. However, at this time, there was no indication of any note having been fastened to a telephone pole in the alley as stated.

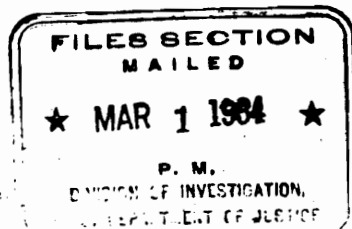

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent R. C. Coulter, dated at Saint Paul, Minnesota, February 24, 1934 in the above-entitled case that an examination is being made of toll calls for the period November 20, 1933 to February 2, 1934 over the telephones listed in the names of certain outstanding members of the underworld at Saint Paul and Minneapolis.

It is suggested that an examination be made of telegrams sent and received at Saint Paul and Minneapolis during the period that Bremer was held by the kidnapers, that is from January 17 to February 7, 1934.

The Division understands that in making such an examination there is no particular name or telephone number to be considered at the present time, but it is suggested that one of the agents attached to the Saint Paul Office who is acquainted with the prominent members of the underworld in that district should make a cursory examination of copies of telegrams on file for the purpose of locating a briefly worded telegram such as, "Will call you at 8:00 P. M.", "Communicate with me over phone number _____", or one similarly worded, which telegram may have been sent from Chicago or a point in northern Illinois or southern Wisconsin.

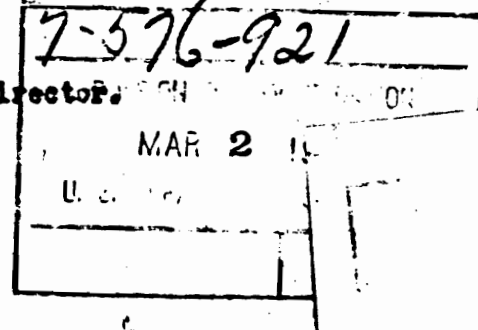
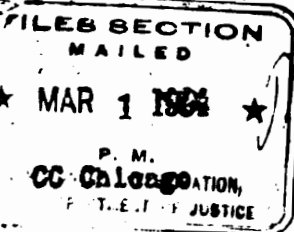
