Dear Sir:

The New York Office is in receipt of a report from Special Agent P. M. Plunkett, Boston, Massachusetts, dated January 22, 1936. In this report Agent Plunkett stated that letters were to be directed to the Bureau requesting the Bureau to attempt to locate records and photographs of certain confidence men set out in Agent Plunkett's report. George L. Farry, with aliases, last known address 1149 Commonwealth Avenue, Boston, Massachusetts, George D. Kennedy, last known address 1401 Beacon Street, Brookline, Massachusetts and Jay E. Hayes, alias Eddie Hayes, last known address 1454 Beacon Street, Brookline, Massachusetts, were among those whose records and photographs were to be requested.

The New York Office is in receipt of information from Post Office Inspector Graham, New York City, with reference to the criminal records of these men and this information is being forwarded to you so that in the event that the criminal records of the above named individuals have not yet been located, the information set out in this letter may be of assistance in locating same.

Inspector Graham advised that George Farry was arrested in Chicago, Illinois in 1908 under the name of Frank Wilson on a bunco charge; that he was arrested in St. Louis, Missouri on January 9, 1909 under the name of Frank Brown; that he was arrested in Omaha, Nebraska in May, 1909 but the name used by him is not known, nor is the charge.

In 1930 Farry was under investigation by the Chicago Police Department for the sale of three \$10,000.00 bonds to the Federal Reserve Bank, Chicago, Illinois. These bonds were taken in a confidence game from Mrs. Ola Budd, 18 Elk Avenue, New Rochelle, N. Y.

Detectives O'Mallory, Murphy and McSwiggen of the Chicago, Illinois Police Department, were investigating this case. Inspector Graham was unable to state whether or not Farry was arrested at that time.

Inspector Graham advised that George D. Kennedy was arrested several years ago at Los Angeles, California under the name of D. J. Ringsley, Los Angeles Police Department No. 9350; that Kennedy had also been indicted on a mail fraud charge in Atlanta, Georgia on January 5, 1922 and in 1925 he pleaded guilty to this indictment and was fined \$700.00.

Information was also received from Inspector Graham that Eddie Hayes was arrested at Miami, Florida in January, 1933, Miami Police Department No. 5584 and was returned by that Department to Cary, Indiana to answer charges for a \$14,000.00 confidence game worked at Gary, Indiana; that it is his understanding that Hayes made restitution and was released.

As stated before, this information is being furnished to the Bureau to be of assistance in locating the criminal records of the above named men.

Leads will not be set out to the various field offices to make investigations at the places where these men were arrested as listed in this letter until the Bureau has had time to endeavor to locate the criminal records as requested by the Boston Office. However, copies of this letter are being forwarded to the interested field offices so that in the event the Bureau is unable to locate the criminal records of Farry, Hayes and Kennedy the respective field offices may be requested to make investigations of arrest records of these men in their territory in an effort to obtain their complete criminal records.

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Illinois, and he declined to furnish additional information with reference to telephone 6913. Mr. E. J. Howells, District Manager, Illinois Telephone Company, Jefferson Building, was likewise contacted in an effort to obtain information concerning long distance telephone calls emanating from telephone 6913; however, to date this information has not been obtained.

Mr. Earl Jeffries, Supt. of Mails, U. S. Post Office, Peoria, allowed an examination of all forwarding address requests for 1935, and although this examination failed to reflect any information with reference to Carl Johnson or G. L. Jordan, it nevertheless did reveal a card addressed to the Postmaster, Peoria, postmarked at Aurora, Illinois on December 11, 1935, which read as follows: "Please forward my mail from your gen-Del-to Billy Jordan, General Delivery, Aurora, Ill."

The above mentioned card is being attached to the copies of this report designated for the Chicago Bureau Office.

A further examination of the Peoria, Illinois Post Office Directory, present General Delivery Directory, and the 1935 Post Office Box Subscribers was unproductive of information.

Mr. Ben Rediger, U. S. Postal Carrier, serving 210 Hamilton St., edvised that C. A. "Red" Mellon, James Carrigan, and Margaret Campbell resided and received mail at that address. Photographs of Volney Davis, John Sampson, Richard Craham, Lloyd "Blackie" Doyle, Tony Moreno, and Mike Moreno were exhibited to Rediger, without any identification. Rediger stated that he was certain that he had never delivered mail addressed to Carl Johnson or G. L. Jordan at 210 Hamilton Street. Photographs of Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell were exhibited to Rediger, without any identification being made; however, he promised to observe the occupants in the Tavern at that address in the future, and to immediately notify the St. Louis Bureau Office in the event he observed anyone who resembled these fugitives.

An examination of the Peoria Police records disclosed that J. R. Grosslein, 616 East Maywood Ave., Peoria, reported on February 20, 1935 the theft of his 1935 Illinois license plates #695-359.

An examination of the 1935 Peoria City Directory reflects that J. R. Grosslein is a Superintendent of the Caterpillar Tractor Company, 600 West Washington, East Peoria, Illinois.

Mr. J. R. Grosslein, 616 East Maywood Avenue, stated that at approximately 8:00 P. M. on February 20, 1935 he parked his automobile, bearing 1935 Illinois license plates #695-339, at the corner of Fayette Street and Madison Avenue in Peoria, Illinois, and upon returning at approximately 11:20 P. M. he observed that both license plates had been stolen. He further stated that he immediately walked to a nearby telephone and notified the Peoria Police in regard

to this fheft, and then started back to his automobile, at which time he observed an automobile parked directly in the rear of his car, which then pulled away from the curb and drove north on Madison Street at a rapid rate of speed. He contended that he was of the opinion that these thieves intended to steal his automobile, inasmuch as there was considerable parking space on the street at that time and apparently no necessity for anyone parking directly in the rear of his parked automobile. Mr. Grosslein related that he was never closer than seventy-five yards to the automobile in question, and consequently was unable to determine whether the same was a sedan or coupe; however, he contended that in his opinion this automobile was an old model Nashe

In connection with the present investigation, it is noted that the 1935 Ford coupe, motor No. 18-1618818, serial No. 18-1643348, bearing 1935. Illinois license plates No. 1-037-708, which was stolen from Dixon Friedman Company at 100 S. Washington Street in Peoria, Illinois on March 26, 1935, was in the possession of Volney Davis at the time he was arrested by Bureau Agents at Chicago, Illinois on June 1, 1935.

Mr. Alvin Streitmatter, Manager, Pyke's Studio, 116-A South Adams Street, allowed an examination of the customers' records, which reflected that the names of Carl Johnson and G. L. Jordan were not included therein. It should be noted that the name of each customer during 1935 was examined in the hope of effecting some connection between the same and the instant case; however, this procedure was unproductive. Mr. Streitmatter recalled the letter enclosing a photograph of a baby found in an apartment in Madison, Wisconsin, but stated that he was unable at that time to furnish any information, inasmuch as the photograph in question did not contain an identifying number. He stated that he assumed the original inquiries were being made for the purpose of locating individuals who had departed without paying their rent, and that consequently he did not include in his answer facts which he hereinafter reletes.

In this connection he advised that during the Summer of 1935 a couple appeared at the Studio with a young baby approximately six months old, for the purpose of securing photographs of this young child. He stated that judging from the actions of these individuals he reached the conclusion that they were the perents of the baby. He recalls that this couple insisted that the photographs be taken immediately, if possible, in order to accomodate them. This was done, after which they payed him and departed, with the understanding that they would call for the photographs the following day. He further stated that all customers are required to furnish their names and addresses, but is unable to remember the name of the above mentioned couple; however, he recalls that the couple in question furnished a name, but declined to furnish an address, after explaining that they were more or less transients.

Mr. Streitmatter continued to relate that the following day the couple failed to call for the photograph, but approximately three days thereafter he received a letter postmarked Madison, Wisconsin, directing him to forward the above mentioned photographs to General Delivery, Madison, Wisconsin. Mr. Streit-

matter carefully searched the records at the Studio in an effort to locate the above mentioned letter, but the same was unsuccessful. He stated that in compliance with the above request the photographs in question were forwarded to Madison, Wisconsin, by mail, without being registered or insured.

Kr. Streitmatter further advised that he was unable to furnish a description of this couple, but does remember that the man was much older than his woman companion, who, in Mr. Streitmatter's opinion, was approximately eighteen years of age.

In this connection, it should be noted that the usual group of photographs were exhibited to Mr. Streitmatter, and he was positive that none of them resembled the male individual in question, with the possible exception of the photograph of John Sampson, which he contended appeared familiar to him, and although he declined to identify the photograph of John Sampson, nevertheless he contended that undoubtedly Sampson had been a customer at the Studio during 1935.

Mr. Streitmatter further advised that from time to time, in his spare moments, he would systematically exemine the numerous negative records for 1935 in an effort to locate the photograph of the baby in question, and at the same time would continue to search for the letter received by him from Madison, Wisconsine

Dr. W. B. Whipple, 119 South Adams Street, upon examination of his patient records advised that the same contained no information concerning Carl Johnson or G. L. Jordan. Upon being requested he allowed the writer to exemine these records for the months of April, May and June, 1935, and the same failed to reflect any information of value with the exception that it was ascertained that Mary Hallam, 513 Hamilton Street, appeared at his office on May 21, 1935, and left a "Enear" for his examination. He stated that he did not maintain a record of the report of this examination, but continued by relating that it was customary for patients in these cases to call for their report the following day; however, in this particular instance Mary Hallam did not return until June 10, 1935. Dr. Whipple further stated that he was certain Mary Hallam was alone on both occasions, but he was unable to furnish a description of this individual, with the exception that he was positive that she had blond hair and was between 25 and 30 years of age.

Mr. Tom W. Webster, 610 Sixth Street, advised that prior to August 1935 he resided at 513 Hamilton Street, and at that address became acquainted with Miss Mary Hallem of Eureka, Illinois, to whom he rented a room during Jenuary of 1935. He stated that Mary Hallem, to the best of his recollection, was not absent from Peoria, Illinois for any considerable length of time during this period, but recalled that she did associate with numerous men during these months. Upon being further questioned he admitted that he was not femiliar with the types of automobiles driven by her associates, but contended that he was of the opinion that he could identify the photographs of her companions. Photographs of Volney Davis, John Sampson, Richard Graham, Lloyd Doyle, Tony Moreno, Mike Moreno, Alvin Karpis,

and Harry Campbell were exhibited to Tom Webster, without identification.

It should be likewise noted that Tom Webster contended that he was not acquainted with a G. L. Jordan or Carl Johnson, and that he had never observed an automobile bearing Georgia license plates at his residence.

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After numerous inquiries, Mary Hallam was located at 1000 Main Street, Peoria, Illinois, and she advised that at present she was a student at Felt and Tarrant Comptometer School, 239 North Monroe Avenue; that she was single, 20 years of age, born and raised in Eureka, Illinois. She named as her associates during 1935 a number of young men who reside in Peoria, Illinois, and whose names are not included herein, inasmuch as they have no connection with the present investigation. Upon being questioned, she stated that she had never visited a Studio in Peoria, Illinois, but stated without being furnished any information that whe called upon Dr. W. B. Whipple, 119 S. Adams Street, on two occasions during 1935. She denied associating with the owner or driver of a 1935 Ford coupe bearing Georgia licenses, and contended that she had never traveled out of the State of Illinois, and in this respect she alleged that she lived continually in Peoria, Illinois during 1935, with the exception of occasional visits to her home in Eureka, Illinois. Similar photographs as exhibited to other individuals at Peoria, Illinois were displayed to her, without identification.

Detective Sergeant Leo Kamins, a reliable officer of the Peoria Police Department, in charge of the Automobile Bureau, produced correspondence which is set out in this report in substance for information.

Letter from the Chief of Police at Madison, Wisconsin, dated September 12, 1935, reflecting that on May 16, 1935 an individual using the name Gerald Brown, 425 Clemons Avenue, Madison, Wisconsin, made application for a 1935 Wisconsin license for a 1933 Ford V-8 Coach, motor No. 488-173, at which time he presented an Illinois certificate of title, No. 1270030, issued in 1934 to Gerald Brown, Havana, Illinois. This title stated that the car in question was purchased from Samuel Johnson at Havana, Illinois on September 4, 1934.

The above letter further reflects that John Sampson moved into the premises at 425 Clemons Avenue, Medison, Wisconsin, and at that time used the alias Sam Johnson, and gave Aurora, Illinois as his previous address. It also appears that on June 7, 1935 the Wisconsin Motor License Bureau addressed a letter to Gereld Brown at 425 Clemons Avenue, Medison, Wisconsin, instructing him to produce his automobile for inspection, inasnuch as licenses had theretofore been issued to George W. Lowes, 115 Vita Avenue, Beaver Dam, Wisconsin, for a similar automobile. This letter continues to relate that on June 13, 1935 a letter was received, signed Gerald Brown, 210 Hamilton Street, Peoria, Illinois, advising that he was unable to find work in Madison, and requesting that they return the \$9.35 formerly paid to them by him.

Letter from the Secretary of State, Detroit, Michigan, dated

September 23, 1935, reflecting that a certificate of title, No. 0274146, was issued to John Sampson, 10147 Orange Lawn Avenue, Detroit, Michigan on October 9, 1933, for a 1933 Ford coach, motor No. 488-173. This letter also indicates that the car in question was purchased by John Sampson from A. W. Ruster Company, 8811 East Jefferson Ave., Detroit, Michigan on October 2, 1935, under a conditional sales contract of even date in favor of General Discount, Detroit.

This letter further reflects that an assignment of title, No. 0274146, was made by John Sampson to Samuel Johnson, 3515 Cass, Detroit, Michigan on May 12, 1934, and Certificate of Title No. A-0274146, was issued to Samuel Johnson under date of May 16, 1934.

On October 3, 1934 the General Finance Corporation, 510 New Center Building, Detroit, Michigan, filed an application for new certificate of title, to which was attached an affidavit of repossession and certified copy of the chattel mortgage, which reflects that the car in question was repossessed from John Sampson on September 24, 1934 by reason of default in the condition of a certain chattel mortgage.

A letter from the Automobile Protective and Information Bureau at Chicago, Illinois, dated November 13, 1935, reflects that the Motor Acceptance Corporation of Evanston, Illinois sold the automobile in question to E. Pentler, a used car dealer in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on November 14, 1934, and it was subsequently sold by them on January 26, 1935 to George W. Lowes, 115 South Vita Ave., Beaver Dam, Wisconsin.

Reference is now made to page ten of the report of Special Agent R. L. Shivers, submitted at St. Louis, Missouri on February 23, 1935 in the instant case, wherein it appears that the records of the Canton, Illinois Police Department reflect that a Ford V-8 Coach was wrecked on September 20, 1934 near Canton, Illinois; that the two men then reported in the automobile disappeared; that a check of the license number not now recalled revealed that the same had been issued to Sam Johnson, Aurora, Illinois. The Aurora Police Department at that time advised the Canton Police Department that a warrant was outstanding for Sam Johnson for contributing to the delinquency of Evelyn Westphal. On September 21, 1934 Gerald Brown of Havana, Illinois called for the above mentioned automobile, and exhibited some sort of receipt, but his request was refused, and on September 22, 1934 Sam Johnson and Evelyn Westphal were arrested when they came for the automobile, and Johnson, who was subsequently returned to Aurora, admitted that Jack Summers of Cube, Illinois was his companion on the night of the wreck.

In this connection it should be noted that the records of the Automobile License Bureau in the Office of the Secretary of State, Springfield, Illinois, reflect that on December 3, 1934 Illinois license No. 12-113 for 1935 was issued to Gerald Brown, Havana, Illinois, for a 1934 Plymouth Sedan, motor No. PE 88-315.


These records further reflect that on May 8, 1935 Illinois license No. 1-178-892 for 1935 were issued to Gerald Brown for a 1933 Ford coach, motor No. 488-173, said car being purchased by him on September 20, 1934 from Sam Johnson, 102 North 4th Street, Illinois. It should be noted that the signature of Gerald Brown appearing on this registration was decidedly different from that appearing on the one above. It also appears that undoubtedly 102 North 4th Street, . Illinois, refers to the home of Matt Gleason in Aurora, Illinois.

An examination of the above information appears to indicate that 1935 Illinois license 1-178-892 was undoubtedly purchased for, and in all probability by, Sam Johnson on May 8, 1935, with the assistance of the assignment of title made by Sam Johnson to Gerald Brown on September 20, 1934, and it would also appear that this assignment of title was made on the date of the above referred to wreck at Canton, Illinois, in order that Gerald Brown might present the same to the Police at Canton in an effort to obtain the 1933 Ford coach them in their possession, and # the property of John Sampson.

et (1994), part of the contract of the second In this connection it should be noted that 1935 Illinois license plates No. 1-178-892 were issued on May 8, 1935 for a 1933 Ford coach, motor No. 488-175, which had theretofore been repossessed from John Sampson on September 24, 1934 by reason of default in the condition of a certain chattel mortgage.

The records of the Peoria Police Department were examined, and prothe same reflect the following information with reference to CARL JOHNSON, a local criminal character, whose description is as follows:

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Carl Johnson, 2515 N. Adams Street, advised that he was employed as a mechanic at the Caterpillar Tractor Company in East Peoria, Illinois, under the name of Earl Johnson, Employment Number 1161-N, and that the above alias had been adopted by him for employment purposes, in view of some past difficulties he had with the Rock Island Railroad, by whom he was formerly employed. He further stated that during 1935 he was employed continually and reported monthly to the local State Probation Officer, and that his one-year probation period had recently expired.

Upon further questioning it was apparent that this individual was not identical with Carl Johnson previously reported at Madison, Wisconsin, and thereafter photograph of Volney Davis, John Sempson, Richard Graham, Lloyd Doyle, Tony Moreno, Mike Moreno, Alvin Karpis, and Harry Campbell were exhibited to Carl Johnson, without identification.

In order to verify the above information, a detailed examination of the employment records was made at the Caterpillar Tractor Corporation in East Peoria, Illinois, with reference to Earl Johnson, No. 1161-N, and it was ascertained that the description, life history, and present address of this individual correspond with that previously furnished by Carl Johnson. It was also noted that Earl Johnson was employed continuously during the months of May and June of 1935.

Mr. W. A. Faber, 321 Main Street, advised that he was formerly employed by the R. J. Kennedy Jewelry Store at 313 Main Street, and in that capacity he opened this store at approximately eight A. M. on February 28, 1935, and shortly thereafter someone grabbed him from behind and at the same time pushed him towards the rear of the store. Faber further related that he turned around and saw the man who was holding him and immediately decided that Russel Rummell, a local friend, was playing a joke, but at the same time was unable to understand why Rummell was using these rough tactics. He further stated that he then realized that the individual holding him was not Russel Rummell. Faber explained that Rummell, a local interior decorator, who resides at 869 Linn Avenue in Peoria, was approximately six feet in height, and a life-long acquaintance, and continued by relating that the individual who was then holding him was a dead ringer for ... Rummell as far as facial features were concerned, but at the same time was noticeably of much smaller stature. Faber further stated that this stranger did not have a gun; that he was very cool; that he was polite but commanding, and the type that immediately impressed you as being unafraid. He further advised that this stranger more or less gently pushed him into a small room in the rear of the store and securely wired his hands and legs, after which he was forced to lie down on the floor. He recalled that the stranger removed his glasses and said "I'll put these up here for you." He also recalled that the stranger placed a piece of paper under his head and made some remark about the floor being dirty.

Faber further stated that he did not observe this stranger's compenion, but remembers hearing a voice in the front of the store complaining about the stranger taking so much time with the old man. He stated that he was of the opinion that the companion was older than the stranger. He also recalls that the stranger smiled at his companion's remark. Mr. Faber further related that the companion was apparently taking the jewelry while the stranger was wiring his hands and legs, and remembers that the stranger, just before he departed, said "Would you like me to give you a gentle tap on the head, so they won't think that it's an inside job?" and then smiled and said goodbye.

A description of the stranger, as furnished by Mr. Faber, is as

follows:

27-30. Age Height 5 ft. 7 in. Weight 135 pounds Complexion Light Build Medium Nationality American 🦪 White 18 hard Race Dress Ordinary business clothes Peculiarities Long chin.

In connection with the present interview, it should be noted that Chief of Police Fres Nussbaum of the Peoria Police Department had previously advised that numerous photographs of possible suspects had been exhibited to Mr. Faber, without any identification being made, and that consequently he was of the opinion that Mr. Faber, either because of his age (approximately sixty) or because of fear, would not identify the stranger.

With the above information in mind, the recent photograph of Volney Davis was exhibited to Mr. Faber, and he immediately exclaimed "Who is this man?" but before being answered he continued by asking "Do you know Russel Rummell?" and upon being answered in the negative he stated "This photograph resembles Russel Rummell."

Mr. Faber would not positively identify the photograph of Volney Davis as the individual heretofore referred to as the "stranger" who held him captive, but he did contend that this photograph greatly resembled the stranger.

Mr. Russel Rummell, an interior decorator, was located at his residence, 869 Linn Street, Peoria, Illinois, and it was ascertained from observation and interrogation that he was 27 years of age, 6 feet in height, weight 187 pounds; that he had a fair complexion, blue eyes and blond heir, and it was noted that the facial features of this individual resembled those of Volney Davis to such an extent that it seemed plausible for Mr. Faber to have mistakenly confused these two individuals for a moment. An effort to procure a photograph of Russel Rummell for comparison purposes was unsuccessful.

For possible assistance in future investigation, it is noted herein that 210 Hamilton Street in Peoria, Illinois is located directly in the rear of the Mayer Hotel, and separated therefrom by an alley. The Building at this address is a three-story structure with two front entrances, one leading directly to the second floor and the other into the St. Elmo Tavern operated by "Red" Mellon, which likewise has a stairway leading to the second floor.

In connection with the present investigation, it should be noted that the Peoria Police Department is required to maintain a record of all taverns located in Peoria, Illinois, with the name of the operator; however, an exemination of these records of approximately four hundred such establishments indicated that the Tavern at 210 Hamilton Street was not among those listed, nor were the names C. A. "Red" Mellon or James Carrigan included in the group of owners and operators.

Detective Leo Kamins advised that Margaret Campbell formerly operated a house of prostitution at 518 North Adams Street in Peoria, Illinois, and has for many years been considered the common-law wife of "Red" Mellon. He stated that approximately a year ago she discontinued the house at 518 North Adams Street, and moved her establishment to the second and third floors of the St. Elmo Tavern, located at 210 Hamilton Street, and since that date has in fact operated a house of prostitution at that address. He further stated that James Carrigan, the brother of a former City Alderman, resides at this address, and for political purposes is considered the owner; however, it is generally known that "Red" Mellon, the operator, is the actual owner.

Detective Kamins further advised that these two men were not the type of criminals that actually participated in the crimes committed, but on the other hand would harbor gangsters and finger jobs for these associates; however, in this connection he related a fact that is well known, namely, that Peoria, Illinois will tolerate the gangsters in the event they direct their criminal activities elsewhere. He continued by stating that in his opinion "Red" Mellon fingered the Kennedy Brothers Jewelry robbery, but admitted that he reached this conclusion after reading the letter from Madison, Wisconsin with reference to John Sampson.

Detective Kemins further advised that Gerald Brown, Harry Hunter, and Jack Summers of Havana, Illinois, also James Myers of Canton, Illinois, are frequent visitors at 210 Hamilton Street.

In this connection it should be noted that all of the above individuals are mentioned as suspects in the report of Special Agent D. S. Hostetter, submitted at St. Louis, Missouri on December 23, 1935, in the case entitled "Unknown Subjects (Hijacking of Truck Driven by George I. Staley, Kimbel Truck Lines; Hijacking of Truck Driven by Charles Darrow, Shepherd Trucking Company) Theft from Interstate Shipment, which case at that time involved numerous thefts of whiskey, valued at approximately \$30,000.00.

A description of Jack Summers, as obtained from the above mentioned report, is as follows:

JACK SUMMERS, with aliases: John Summers: Name Simmons; Gerald Brown. 36 (1935) Height 5 ft. 102 in. 193 pounds Weight 4 Eyes Blue Hair Dark chocolate Havana, Canton, Peoria, and Springfield, Illinois, Residence Heavy Build Cuba, Illinois Birthplace PD, Des Moines, Iowa #10436. Police No.

In this connection it should be noted that Jack Summers in his early days associated with the deceased Fred Goetz at Springfield, Illinois, and it is believed that Mr. T. P. Sullivan, in charge of the Illinois State Investigation and Identification Bureau, Springfield, Illinois, is in a position to furnish a complete history of this individual, and consequently a lead requesting this investigation is being set out at the conclusion of this report.

It should be noted, however, that it is apparently impossible, judging from the descriptions, for Jack Summers to be identical with Carl Johnson or G. L. Jordan; however, a further investigation will be conducted with reference to these mentioned, and their connection with the mentioned hijackings, and at that time appropriate inquiries will be made with reference to Volney Davis and his possible association with members of this mob subsequent to his escape at Yorkville, Illinois.

Reference is made to a letter dated July 18, 1934, addressed by the St. Louis Bureau Office to the Omaha Bureau Office in the case entitled "John Herbert Dillinger," wherein it appears that under date of June 27, 1934 Postmaster Leo H. Borgelt of Havana, Illinois advised the St. Louis Bureau Office that there were a number of suspicious characters entering and leaving the Windsor Hotel in Havana, Illinois. Mr. Borgelt advised that Roy Freeman and Elmer Johnson of Des Moines, Iowa, and John Summers were among this gang of suspicious characters, and he reported that many Missouri, Wisconsin and Iowa cars were going to and from this hotel in Havana, Illinois.

Further reference is made to a letter directed to the St. Louis Bureau Office in the Dillinger case on September 24, 1934, by Postmaster Borgelt, together with a newspaper clipping from a Des Koines, Iowa paper, reporting the arrest of Roy Freemen at the Sportsman Club, 565 Seventh Street, Des Moines, Iowa, and the identification of Gele Johnson in connection with the payroll robbery of the Rider Coal Mine near Grimes, Iowa on November 10, 1933. This item further indicates that telephone calls had been traced from Freemen at Des Moines, Iowa to Havana, Illinois.

With reference to this last mentioned letter, it should be noted that Mr. Leo H. Borgelt advised that Bessie Johnson, 1716 East Logan Street, Des Moines, Iowa, and Mrs. Ida Belle Boyles, 2250 Yorkshire Road, Columbus, Ohio, c/o Rexene, were corresponding with members of the above mentioned gang; however, it appears that an investigation with reference to the last mentioned individuals was never conducted.

As a matter of information, it should be noted that during the investigation of the case entitled "John Klutas, with aliases, National Motor Vehicle Theft Act," it was ascertained that John Waters, alias Go-About Riley, of Des Moines, Iowa, was seen driving an automobile bearing licenses which had been issued to John Summers, a gangster of Havana, Illinois.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE OMAHA BUREAU OFFICE: At Des Moines, Iowa, will secure all available information concerning the identity, reputation, and criminal connection of Bessie Johnson, who formerly resided at 1716 East Logan Street, Des Moines,

THE CINCINNATI BUREAU OFFICE: At Columbus, Ohio, will conduct a similar investigation with reference to Mrs. Ida Belle Royles, who formerly resided at 2250 Yorkshire Road, and received mail in care of Rexene.

THE MILWAUKEE BUREAU OFFICE: At Madison, Wisconsin, will interview the Police authorities for the purpose of determining whether Volney Davis might have possibly assisted John Sampson in the robbery of the Jewelry Store at Madison, Wisconsin on May 23, 1935.

Will attempt to secure the photograph made by Pyke's Studio at Peoria, Illinois, which is supposedly in the possession of Mr. Arthur A. Frautschi, 120 East Wilson Street. In the event this photograph is obtained, it should be forwarded to the St. Louis Bureau Office for possible assistence in the investigation which will be conducted in the future with reference to these circumstances.

Will obtain a description of the Graham Paige automobile which was in John Sampson's possession at the time of his arrest by the Madison, Wisconsin Police Department.

Will examine the forwarding address requests made at the U. S. Post Office during June, 1935, for the purpose of determining whether any information is available concerning the alleged Mrs. G. L. Jordan, who departed on June 8, 1935. It is believed that there is a possibility that this woman is from Peoria, Illinois.

THE CHICAGO BUREAU OFFICE: At Aurora, Illinois, will endeavor to ascertain the identity of Billy Jordan, the writer who requested the Postmaster at Peoria, Illinois on December 11, 1935 to forward mail to General Delivery at Aurora, Illinois.

Will interview Mrs. John (Evelyn) Sampson at 216 North 4th Street, Aurora, Illinois, in detail, with reference to her friends and associates in Peoria and Havana, Illinois. She should be questioned in regard to the following individuals: Gerald Brown, Harry Hunter, Jack Summers, James Myers, all of Havana, Illinois, and A. C. "Red" Mellon, James Carrigan, and Margaret Campbell, of Peoria, Illinois.

Information should likewise be obtained with reference to the age of her baby and the possibility of this child being identical with the one appearing on the photograph found at 120 East Wilson Street, Madison, Wisconsin. In this connection, it should be noted that previous statements made by Mrs. John Sampson indicate that she is unreliable.

THE ST. LOUIS BUREAU OFFICE: At Springfield, Illinois, will interview T. P. Sullivan, Illinois State Bureau of Investigation and Identification, with reference to the personal history and past criminal activities of Jack Summers. Information should be obtained with reference to his past association with Fred Goetz, who is now deceased.

At Jacksonville, Illinois, will conduct the investigation requested in the report of reference.

At Havana, Illinois, will conduct the investigation requested in the report of reference.

At Peoria, Illinois, will, upon the receipt of the information requested in this report, conduct an investigation for the purpose of developing possible herboring charges against any individual who assisted Volney Davis subsequent to his escape at Yorkville, Illinois on February 6, 1935.

Reference is made to your letter of the 17th, requesting that a summary be submitted as to the physical condition of ELLLAN BRYAN BOLTON, defendant in this case.

BOLTON was last examined by Dr. A. Josewich, specialist in pulmonary diseases, U. S. Veterans Administration, which examination was made upon BOLTON'S claim that he was physically disabled by reason of tuberculosis, service connected.

Dr. Josewich reported that from his examination of the Veteran and considering his previous case history as contained in the files of the Veterans Administration, he diagnosed the Veteran's ailment as chronic tuberculosis, moderately advanced, and classified him permanently and totally disabled, which classification was subject to further examination.

FEB 27 JJU RECORDED 7-576-962

Dr. Josewich further reported that the examination as made by him was not entirely satisfactory due to the
conditions under which it was made, that is, at the Raisey
County Jail, and accordingly, he would not render an opinion
as to whether confinement over an extended period of time would
result fatally, as his opinion in this regard would necessarily
have to be based on an examination to be made at some future
time and under more favorable conditions. He reported that
in his opinion the condition of the Veteran would not be improved by his confinement in jail with the attendant worry


over the welfare of his family. He had not been examined for six years prior to the physical examination referred to above; that, however, prior to that time his case history indicated that his affliction was such, which coupled with the symptoms indicated at the most recent examination, that he should be classified as permanently and totally disabled.

I am informed that the Veterans Administration conducts physical examination of persons so afflicted each year, and it has been suggested that should a communication be directed to the Manager of the Veterans Administration at Minneapolis setting forth that you are desirous of ascertaining this Veteran's present physical condition, that Dr. A. Josewich will be assigned to conduct another physical examination. His findings will be forwarded to you.



Kirdly refer to your letter of January 28th, 1936, to the Director with copy furnished to this office, in reference to the testimony of Harry Somper in the trial of this case in Federal Court at St. Paul, Minnesota.

Assistant United States Attorney Ambrose C. Epperson, Omaha, Kebraska, who was formerly a Commissioner on the Nebraska Supreme Court and in such eapacity was empowered to render opinions, was consulted relative to the various questions you asked in reference to the testimony of Sawyer, who declined to answer, in his cross examination, when he was asked if he had ever been convicted of a felony. Ir. Epperson gave this matter considerable study and research, whereupon he forwarded this Bureau Office the following letter: 🚉

"The question has arisen as to the legal adoursey of certain evidence given by Harry Sawyer, when on trial in Federal Court, aceveed of a felony, and the propriety of introducing certain contradictory evidence.

"The situation, as I understand it, in which your Department is interested, is as follows;

"Harry Sawyer, on trial charged with a felony in January, 1936, was asked if he had ever been convicted of a folony, which question he refused to answer.

We stated that he refused to enswer on the advice of counsel. His counsel then stated to the court that the advice which he had given to his client was to answer "No". [

"The attorney justified his attitude because of an appear ently populiar ruling in Nebrasks, in which state proceedings had boen had against the defendant, as Harry Sandlovich. The action in Nebraska was in the year 1914, wherein the defendant was accused of burglary with explosives, and was placed on probation for three years and discharged from the probation in the year 1917. Apparently his attorney argued that such proceedings had in the District Court were not such as to amount to a conviction.

"Section 545, Chapter 28, Nebraska Compiled Statutes, 1929, imposes a penalty of imprisonment in the penitentiary for life 'or for any other term not less them twenty years', for burglary with explosives.

"Section 2214, Chapter 29, Mebraska Compiled Statutes, 1929, provides:

In case said judge should find from the age of the accused, his former course in life, disposition, habits and inclinations, or that the offense of which he is found guilty is his first offense, and that from all the information obtainable the judge should be of the opinion that the accused would refrain from engaging in, or committing further eriminal acts in the future, the court may, in its discretion, enter an order, without pronouncing centence, suspending further proceedings and placing the accused on probation under the charge and supervision of a probation officer, or other suitable person.

*The provisions of this section were first enacted in the year 1915. Prior to that time the Nebraska Legislature had never provided for a Court Probation System.

"The theory of Sawyer's attorney finds support in a very early decision of the Nebreska Supreme Court, dated back in the year 1884, in the ease of Marion against State, 16 Nebreska, 349, s. c. 20 N. W. 289, wherein it was heldy

When in a prosecution for marker the defendant on his trial becomes a witness in his own behalf, it is incompetent on eross examination, for the purpose of affecting his eredibility as a witness, to ask him if he had not plead guilty to a penitentiary offense in another state; the entering of a plea of guilty without judgment or sentence not being a conviction within the meaning of Section 338 of the civil code of Nebraska.

This old ruling of the Nebraska Supreme Court has never since been modified or overruled. The opinion of the Court supports the ruling on the theory, adopted from Massachusetts, that the word 'convicted' when used in an imposchment question and propounded to an accused, implies a judgment of the Court, and that there is no judgment unless followed by sentence founded upon a plea of guilty or a vertict of guilty.

"It is the opinion of the undersigned that if a similar question would arise at this time in Nebraska, and would reach the Suprema-Court of Mebraska, that the Court would hold that the order provided : for in Section 2214, Nebraska Compiled Statutes, 1929, is such a judgment as would support the theory of a conviction, but apparently the trial courts in Nebraska have given defendants in criminal cases the benefit of a doubt or else such trial courts do not agree with the opinion of the undersigned. In any event, the practice of presecutors in the State Courts of Rebraska is to avoid the danger of reversible error, and, therefore, do not prove farmer conviction unless a sentence is imposed under the Statute violated.

"In 1907 our Nebraska Supreme Court did render a decision] which I wink is somewhat inconsistent with their earlier decision. However, the competency of the impeaching question was not involved in that decision. The case was Leiby vs. State, 79 Nebraska, 486, s. c. 113 N. w. 125, in which it was held:

"A plea of guilty to a eriminal complaint is equivalent a to a finding of guilty and will sustain such an order".

hesitate to "hide out" Mead if he was offered any money. Dr. Bell stated he knew this man operated a still and sold whiskey to tourists during the summer months.

Dr. Bell also advised that Mead's equipment, including a portable Victrola, camp cooking utensils and other articles pertinent to camping out were still stored at his cabin at Cliff Lake, Montana. Dr. Bell also stated he was firmly convinced Mead was not in the northwest during this time of year, inasmuch as the last time Dr. Bell saw him he had a blood pressure of eighty when the normal man of his age should have blood pressure of about one hundred and fifty; consequently, Mead was unable to endure cold weather.

Dr. Bell continued he did not expect to go to Cliff Lake, Montana until spring as he advised it was impossible to get into that country until after the snow melted, unless one used skis, but that he would make discreet inquiry among the residents there as to whether or not they had heard anything concerning the whereabouts of Mead, as well as contact the man who was a particular friend of Mead's and ascertain if he has heard of Mead's whereabouts. place contacted Mr. J. B. Thompson, manager, who stated that he is certain Campbell was a customer at his bath house possibly during April of 1935, and that if Campbell returns to the bath house he will cause his apprehension.

Agent again contacted C. Simmons, colored, masseur at the Buck Head Bath House, who stated that he is also certain that Campbell was a customer at the bath house, and that he worked on Campbell possibly during the month of April, 1935.

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Mr. Thompson was questioned as to whether or not he maintained any records of the persons who took baths at his establishment, and in reply stated that at the time a customer applied at the bath house he was given a small card much on the nature of a meal ticket, which card was punched each time a bath was taken; also that the cards were filled out by the customers themselves at the time of the purchase. Mrs. Thompson advised that these cards were taken up and maintained as a permanent record upon completion of the series of baths. Mr. Thompson exhibited several boxes of these cards to Agent, and stated that because of the fact that the customers themselves filled out the data on the cards they are largely incomplete as to dates and addresses, but that all the cards sold by the Buck Head Bath House are retained in the boxes which were exhibited to Agent.

Agent noted that there were possibly between two thousand and twenty-five hundred of these cards; also that the dates were noted on some and not on others, and that there was no order maintained in the arrangement of the cards. Thereupon, Agent went through the bath house cards and compared the signatures thereon with the signature of Harry Campbell as shown on Identification Order 1236. Twenty-nine of these cards were sorted from the entire lot because of the fact that the signatures on these twenty-nine cards did in some respects compare with the signature of Harry Campbell mentioned. These selected cards are being forwarded to the Technical Laboratory of the Bureau with a request that the writing thereon be compared with the known handwriting of Harry Campbell, in an effort to determine the name used by Campbell at the time he is alleged to have taken baths at the Buck Head Bath—House in Mineral Wells.

It is well to note that Mr. Thompson is certain that Harry Campbell did sign a card at the time he purchased baths, and that the card signed by Campbell is presently maintained in the records of the Buck Head Bath House. Mr. Thompson stated further that if necessary he will make his entire record files available to the Bureau for examination.

Agent subsequently discussed the matter with Chief of Police J. E. Lawrence in an effort to determine whether or not there are any known hoodlums or other persons in Mineral Wells, Texas, with whom Harry Campbell might possibly have made a contact. Chief Lawrence was unable to furnish any information along this line.

Reference is made to your letter of the 17th instant, having to do with the installation of a telephone tap on the telephone of JOHN EXDAVENPORT.

Experience has indicated that telephone calls made from the semi-public phone of DAVMIPORT located at the Third Street Buffet at 301 Hennepin Avenue, Minneapolis, if made by someone connected with the Buffet, have been in connection with the business of the cafe or by the general public, while telephone calls emanating from the residence telephone of DAVENPORT at 4109 Columbus Avenue, Minneapolis, have been made to persons connected with the old Capone syndicate in Chicago, wherefore it would seem more desirable to place a tap on the residence phone of DAVENPORT, rather than on the semi-public phone in the Bar.

An inquiry of the manager of the apartments located at 4106 and 4112 Chicago Avenue, which are across the alley from DAVENPORT'S residence on Columbus Avenue, disclosed that these apartments are all occupied and that no vacancy will occur until the next rental season in May.

A vacant house was found at 4128 Chicago Avenue, and Mr. Andrew Pearson, rental agent of 3428 - 16th Avenue South, was contacted and agreed to the rental of this dwelling house, at \$30.00 a month.

It was noted that an aerial cable came from under ground at 41st Street in the alley between Chicago and Columbus Avenues, ran to a terminal box, then through the length of the alley to 41st Street to a terminal box, and then underground.

Special Agents M. M. Notesteen and J. E. Brennan interviewed Mr. Frank Bracelin, General Manager of the Morthwestern Bell Telephone Company, and stated to him that certain information was desired relative to the location of cables and lines of his company in connection with a major investigation now being conducted by this Bureau.

Mr. Bracelin called in Mr. H. L. Tyson, District Plant Superintendent, and informed Mr. Tyson that information concerning the location of certain lines of the company was desired; that of course the company would not be a party to violation of any Minnesota statute and nothing had been said relative to tapping a telephone line; that he personally desired to cooperate by furnishing such information as he could in connection with an investigation being conducted by the Bureau, the nature of which he did not know and did not want to know.

It was ascertained through Mr. Tyson that the aerial cable in the alley on the north side of Columbus Avenue, does not contain an unused pair, and that this cable goes directly to the exchange, wherefore if there was a house located on the north side of Columbus Avenue available, no tap could be maintained from this side of the street. There is no vacant dwelling in the 4100 block on Columbus Avenue.

The serial cable in the alley between Columbus and Chicago Avenues has an unused pair, which could be used to serve 4128 Chicago Avenue. As there formerly was a phone at this address, there is a set of drops to the house. There is no multiple of the pair connected to the telephone in the residence of DAVENPORT. It was found, however, that the unused pair runs to the terminal box on 42nd Street, as does the pair serving DAVENPORT'S telephone.

It was tentatively arranged pending authority from
the Bureau to tap DAVENPORT'S phone, to hold the unused pair
for a service so that when 4128 Chicago Avenue is rented by this
office and direct line service is requested, the unused pair
will be connected to the telephone at 4128 Chicago Avenue. As
it would be necessary to splice a pair of drops to the aerial
cable in the installation of a new telephone, it would be
necessary to have this installation made by the telephone company, as if done by some other person it could be readily

noticed by a lineman. For this reason it will be necessary, in order to procure telephone service at 4128 Chicago Avenue, as well as the tap, to order a direct line and a two party line, (two direct lines not being available) and when this installation is made, the telephone connected to the direct line, which will be to the unused pair, will be disconnected and the line itself will be disconnected at the exchange, on a wire chief's order, thereupon the pair can be joined at the terminal box to the pair serving DAV NPORT'S telephone, thus rendering telephone service on a party line and a direct tap through the serial cable to DAVANPORT'S phone, and the two sets of drops to the house having been installed by linemen, will not excite suspicion on the part of employees of the telephone company.

Authority to rent the house above referred to, incur necessary expense of furnishing, fuel, and telephone installations, was requested of the Bureau by teletype, on February 20, 1936, and authorized telephonically February 21, 1936, by Mr. Tamm.

DETAILS: Mr. Jerome Wilhelm, 430 South Union Street, Traverse City, Michigan, the Postmaster of Traverse City, advised that the Traverse City Airport has not been actively operated for more than a year and that Don Clothier was the person who operated this airport up to the time it was discontinued. Mr. Wilhelm examined the records in his possession and advised that he does not have any record of an Ed J. O'Donnell or a Harry Jennings. located west of Honor, Michigan, is covered by rural delivery routes out of Honor, Benzonia, Beulah and Frankfort, Michigan.

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Mr. Don Clothier, 252 East 9th Street, Traverse City, Michigan, advised that he operated the only airport in or near Angelia. Traverse City for approximately four years; that during 1933 the city officials of Traverse City discontinued their finencial support of the alrport and subsequent to that time no records were kept. Mr. Clothier advised that he formerly operated a filling station in connection with the airport and after he discontinued keeping records for the airport that he rented the filling station to an old man by the name of J. Statistical Williams, who died in Traverse City during 1935. Mr. Clothier advised that he left his record book in the above mentioned filling station, which is closed during the winter months, and that he did not believe the filling station attendant had kept any record of the planes landing at the airport. At the suggestion of Agent, Mr. Clothier agreed to secure the record book. He was questioned concerning any planes which landed at the Traverse City Airport during 1935 and stated that he was not in Traverse City during 1935 but was located out of town, having operated a boat livery during that year.

The record book of the Traverse City Airport was secured and examination of it revealed that it had been discontinued by Mr. Clothier on September 17, 1933. However, there were some notations in the book subsequent to September 17, 1933. The identity of the person making these subsequent notations is unknown. The notations made in the sirport record book during 1935 are set out as follows:

The two sheets from the record book of the Treverse City Airport, containing the information above set out, are being forwarded to the Cleveland Bureau Office and should be returned to Mr. Don Clothier at Traverse City, Michigan, as soon as they have served their purpose.

Mr. Esse Martin, Postmaster at Honor, Michigan, upon being contacted refused to give Agent any information concerning his Post Office and advised that he had received recent instructions which prevented him from giving any information to anyone and that included the United States Department of Justice.

Post Office Inspector William Shulter, Traverse City, was contacted by telephone and advised Mr. Martin to furnish Agent with the desired information.

Mr. Martin then advised that Laura O'Donnell, the wife of Ed J. O'Donnell, deceased, is the owner of two summer cottages located approximately eight miles northwest of Honor, Michigan; that Mr. O'Donnell built these cottages several years ago and since his death his widow has 🖂 spent a great deal of her time at the cabins. Mr. Martin stated that these cabins are located about one and one-half miles from the rural delivery route out of Honor, Michigan. He also advised that Mrs. O'Donnell is well liked in and around Honor, Michigan, due to the fact that at a Christmas time she spends a great deal of money buying presents for the children of poor families who live in and around Honor. Mr. Partin stated that Mrs. O'Donnell is often accompanied to her summer home by one "Tubby" Rouse, who appears to be Mrs. O'Donnell's nephew. Mr. Martin advised that he visited the location of Mrs. O'Donnell's cottages during the summer of 1935 but did not see any other persons at these cabins. He also advised that the present caretaker of the cabins is a man by the name of Ed Mannings who is a resident of Honor, Michigan, and a highly respected citizen in that community. Mr. Martin stated that Ed Mannings is a personal friend of his, and that Lannings, his wife and two children live in the caretaker's cabin which is located near the two summer cottages owned by Mrs. O'Donnell.

Mr. Martin also advised that the forwarding address given him by Mrs. O'Donnell is 239 Maryland Avenue, Toledo, Ohio.

According to Mr. Martin, the summer cottage of Harry Jennings, 4854 Douglas Road, Toledo, Ohio, is located a short distance from the two summer cottages owned by Mrs. O'Donnell, and during the winter months Ed Mannings acts as caretaker for all three of the cottages, the Jennings' cottage being about a quarter mile distant from the O'Donnell cottages.

Mr. Martin examined the records in his possession and advised that he does not have any record of a Bert or Ted Angus and stated that he does not remember any such persons having been in or around Honor, Michigan.

lr. L. K. Nicol, mail carrier at Honor, Michigan, advised that he delivers mail to the summer cottages of Mrs. O'Donnell and Harry Jennings and visited these locations frequently during 1935. Mr. Nicol advised that the only people he has seen there have been Mrs. O'Donnell, "Tubby" Rouse, an older Jewish man, and a couple of young women who, according to Mrs. O'Donnell, were her weekend guests. Without revealing the identity of the persons concerned, Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Nicol were shown pictures of Ted and Best Angus, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis. They advised that they have never seen anyone resembling these pictures and stated that if such persons were in or around Honor, Michigan, they feel certain they would have seen them.

Mr. Ralph E. Peterson, Postmaster at Frankfort, Michigan, examined the records in his possession and advised that he is unable to locate any record of any party or parties using the name of Angus. Without revealing the identity of the persons concerned, Mr. Peterson was also shown pictures of Ted and Bert Angus, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis but stated that he had never seen anyone resembling these pictures in or around Frankfort.

Mr. T. W. Penfold, mail carrier for the Crystal Lake rural route delivery, advised that he visits the above mentioned territory daily but has never heard of any persons using the name of Angus and that no mail addressed to a person by that name had been delivered on his route. Pictures of Ted and Bert Angus, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis were shown to Mr. Penfold, without revealing the identity of the persons concerned. He stated, however, that he had never seen enyone resembling these pictures in or around his route.

Mr. Row W. Meddock, Postmaster at Benzonia, Kichigan, examined the records in his possession and advised that part of the rural delivery for the Crystal Lake region is covered by his office;

that he does not have any record of a person or persons using the name of Angus and that no mail addressed to a person named Angus had been received at his office. Without revealing the identity of the persons concerned, Mr. Maddock was shown pictures of Ted and Bert Angus, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis. He advised that he had never seen anyone resembling these pictures in or around Benzonia.

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Mr. Clifford F. Eastman, Postmaster at Beulah, Michigan, examined the records in his possession and advised that he does not have any record of a person or persons using the name of Angus and that no mail has been received at his office addressed to any parties using that name. Pictures of Ted and Bert Angus, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis were shown to Mr. Eastman, without revealing the identity of the persons concerned, but he advised that he had never seen anyone resembling these pictures in or around Beulah. Mr. Eastman was questioned concerning the various law enforcement agencies in his district and advised that Sheriff Jim Crawford, of Beulah, is considered to be an efficient law enforcement official, but stated that his past experiences with Sheriff Crawford have led him to believe that the latter "talks too much." Mr. Eastman advised that his friend, N. S. Robbins, Deputy Sheriff at Honor, Michigan, would be the proper person to contact if any confidential information was desired.

Deputy Sheriff N. S. Robbins was contacted at Honor, Michigan, and he advised that he is acquainted with Mrs. Ed J. O'Donnell and Herry Jennings and is familiar with the location of their summer cottages. Mr. Robbins stated that he visited these cottages several times in 1935. He advised that a Ralph Hooker was formerly employed by Mrs. O'Donnell as caretaker; that about the first of November, 1935, Mrs. O'Donnell was absent from her summer home for approximately three weeks and during that time Ralph Hooker had robbed the summer home of Harry Jennings, the robbery having been discovered when Harry Jennings returned to his cottage about November 15, 1935. Mr. Robbins advised that Ralph Hooker was arrested about December 1, 1935, by himself and Sheriff Jim Crawford at the O'Donnell place. Mr. Robbins informed that he was in and around the cabins of Lirs. O'Donnell and Mr. Jennings at that time but did not notice any strange people. Without revealing the identity of the persons appearing on the pictures, Mr. Robbins was shown pictures of Bert Angus, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis. He stated that he has not seen anyone in or around Honor, Michigan, resembling these pictures. Mr. Robbins stated that if such persons were in or around Honor it is his belief that he would have seen them. In this connection, it is worthwhile to note that the population of Honor, Michigan, is approximately 300. Upon examining the picture of Ted Angus, hr. Robbins stated that there was a Jewish man, about sixty years of age, who visited Mrs. O'Donnell frequently and that this man resembled the picture of Ted Angus although he did not believe it was the same person. After referring to his notebook lir. Robbins advised that the name of the Jewish person is Al Rickert of the Rickert Lumber Company, Toledo, Ohio; that during a conversation with Mr. Rickert during the summer of

1935, the latter told him that he owns approximately 1200 acres of timber land adjacent to the land owned by Mrs. O'Donnell. Mr. Robbins also advised that at the time he arrested Ralph Hooker he talked to Mrs. O'Donnell and there were two young women with her, whose ages were approximately 26 and 35; that Mrs. O'Donnell told him these women were visiting her for the weekend and that she often had friends visit her but that these people always paid their own way. Mr. Robbins believes that these people visit Mrs. O'Donnell and pay her by the day.

Mr. Robbins also stated that Mrs. O'Donnell has attempted to install slot machines in their county on several occasions and that Al Rickert was instrumental in the attempted installation of these machines. Mr. Robbins advised that on one occasion he asked Mrs. O'Donnell to discontinue attempting to install slot machines in the county and since that time Mrs. O'Donnell has made no further efforts in this direction. According to Mr. Robbins, Mrs. O'Donnell is well liked in and around Honor, Michigan, because she is considered a wealthy woman and always buys Christmas presents for the children of poor families in and around Honor. In Mr. Robbins' opinion, however, Mrs. O'Donnell would do anything for money and he suggested that she might harbor wanted persons.

A map of Benzie County, Michigan, was secured and the rural delivery routes from Frankfort, Benzonia, Beulah and Honor, Michigan, which cover the Crystal Lake territory were marked with a red pencil. The location of the two cabins belonging to Mrs. O'Donnell is indicated by two red pencilled circles. The location of the cabin of Harry Jennings is indicated by a blue pencilled circle. This map is being forwarded to the Cleveland Bureau Office with its copies of this report.

Groff, setting out information furnished by one Freeman Collins. Special Agent J. H. Rice conducted discreet investigation at Sallisaw and vicinity as follows: Mr. Bert Cotton, Chief of Police, was interviewed and he stated that on July 3, 1935 he arrested "Red" Tubbs, whose full and correct name is 0. for violation of the Federal Internal Revenue Laws, which resulted in the conviction of Tubbs and he was sentenced on July 9, 1935 to serve two years at the Southwestern Reformatory at El Reno, Oklahoma. Cotton stated that he had, for some time prior to Tubbs' arrest, maintained a close surveillance on the farm occupied by this individual, and that the only contacts of the Tubbs are petty bootleggers in that vicinity.

Agent Rice also interviewed Goodlow Webb, who resides a short distance from the Tubbs farm, and in a general way, he confirmed the information furnished by Bert Cotton.

Chief Cotton further advised that he had never heard of Tubbs associating with any outsiders or members of any gang. Inquiry by Agent Rice developed that Freeman Collins is a half-brother of Andy Collins of Bunch, Oklahoma. Freeman Collins is not personally known to Chief Cotton. Agent Rice asked Chief Cotton to bear in mind any outsiders contacting the farm of Tubbs, and to furnish the Oklahoma City Office with any information in connection therewith, which he promised to do.

Agent Rice interviewed Oltie Tubbs, wife of "Red" Tubbs, who confirmed the substance of the information furnished by Chief Cotton concerning the arrest and conviction of her husband.

Agent Rice presented photographs of some of the members of this gang to the Tubbs woman and it was apparent from her conversation that she had never heard of any of the gang. She is endeavoring at the present time, so she stated, to have her husband paroled. She said she knows Freeman Collins by name only. She said that she married Tubbs four years ago and that he has never remained away from home a single night until his arrest in July, 1935, and that to her knowledge, he has not been in Tulsa since their marriage.

The records of the United States Marshal at Muskogee were checked, which disclosed that O. W. Tubbs, alias "Red" Tubbs, was sentenced on July 9, 1955 to serve two years at the U. S. Southwestern Reformatory at El Reno, Okla.

It is obvious, therefore, that Freeman Collins is lying. However, O. W. Tubbs will be interviewed at the Reformatory at El Reno as to whether he knows Karpis or has any information concerning his contacts.

Advices have been received from Special Agent Paul Hansen, who is working in the vicinity of Wann and South Coffeyville, Oklahoma, and Coffeyville, Kansas, in an effort to pick up Milton Lett, that some of his informants are alleged to have seen Milton Lett on the streets of Coffeyville on February 12, 1956. Agent Hansen further advises that this information was partially confirmed when he interviewed Mrs. Twilley of Coffeyville, who informed Hansen that her son, Edmund, told her that he saw Milt Lett and another boy driving on Willow Street in Coffeyville in the 1400 block during the afternoon of the 12th of February. This information indicates that Lett is still in that vicinity.

Recently Roy Bridgess, Narcotic Agent at Oklahoma City, informed the writer that he had contacted Melissa Bevan in Tulsa, mentioned on previous

occasions in connection with investigation underway in this case in this district, and that she said that she wanted to see Agent Paul Hansen, who, at the time, was out of Tulsa. Agent Hansen was instructed to contact this woman, which he did. She stated that a Mrs. Rockwell, the wife of an oil field driller, near Turley, Oklahoma, told her that Harry Campbell is out around "those oil fields" all the time and that her husband saw him about a week before January 27th. She did not know who Rockwell is, whether he knows Harry Campbell, but the Bevan woman informed Hensen that before she looked up Mrs. Rockwell's address, she was of the opinion that this woman lived near Hominy, Oklahoma. She stated also that she heard Tom Carpenter and Milton Brooks, who are in jail in Kansas, would know where Harry Campbell is. These two men have been interviewed previously aby Agent Hansen and by Agents of the Kansas City Bureau Office. It is not believed that a further interview with these men is worth while at the present time, although they are said to be former associates of Campbell, _

With reference to the request contained in the personal and confidential letter of SAC Connelley, January 27, 1936, directed to the Kansas City Office, concerning Frank Smith, Agent Paul Hansen has advised that the Frank Smith mentioned by him and interviewed by him at Tulsa, is an elderly man. This Frank Smith is James Franklin Smith, with aliases, subject of Oklahoma City File No. 26-4940, James Franklin Smith, with aliases, Et Al, National Motor Vehicle Theft Act, office of origin, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. This individual was arrested by the U. S. Secret Service Agents and the Tulsa police, on October 2, 1935 on a counterfeiting case. He is described as follows:

The aforesaid individual was recently sentenced to serve five years in the U.S. Penitentiary on this counterfeiting charge. He has been in jail continuously since his arrest. It appears, therefore, that he is not the Frank Smith, who is attempting to dictate terms to the Bureau in connection with his so-called efforts to ascertain the whereabouts of Karpis.

Special Agents C. J. Endres, D. I. McCain, and W. S. Advices have been received from the Washington Field Office to the effect that the War Department, Ordnance Division, has circularized the nine ordnance depots and arsenals without finding any report of theft or loss of .45 calibre Colt automatic pistols, Model 1911, Nos. 149295 and 235445 or 555445. Pistol No. 286289 is reported as having been shipped June 28, 1928 to the Adjutant General, War Department, Porto Rico, and subsequently reported by the National Guard at Porto Rico as having been destroyed by fire there during June, 1932.

Special Agent L. F. Kingman of this office advised that he was in a conversation with Lieutenant Earl Gardner of the Tulsa Police on February 16, 1936 and that Gardner inquired of him whether he could get and set up a telephone tap in Tulsa. Gardner said that he is positive that listening in on conversations of Burrhead Keady's girl, Tulsa, whose telephone number is 4-6848, located at 2142. East 18th Street, would definitely reveal the where sbouts of Karpis and Campbell. Agent Kingman rendered Gardner no promises and no comment with respect to this matter, but told him he would refer it to this . office. Agent Kingman had observed Gardner in close conversation with Post Office Inspector George Hill at Tulse, and he was heard by Kingman telling InSpector Hill that the police recently observed Sam Coker and Burrhead Keady A at 2142 East 12th Street, Tulsa, but that the police were unable to arrest them. This would appear to indicate that the Post Office Inspectors have very likely asked the Tulsa police to pick up Coker and Keady. It is believed that Gardner is an honest officer and appears cooperative, but he is flighty, promiscuous in his talk concerning a matter of a confidential nature. It is also rumored in Tulsa that he is desirous of making the Sheriff's race there. The writer is not inclined to reveal investigative procedure of a confidential character to Gardner. The metter of this telephone tap was submitted by teletype to the Bureau and to SAC Connelley on February 17, 1936, for considerstion and advice to this office as to their desires concerning the same. 
MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

In a recent letter addressed to the Bureau, Mr. Connelley stated in connection with the Bremer case that the Bureau had authorized the destruction of a quantity of the original Bremer ranson money which was located in a Federal Reserve Bank in Havana The Bureau did not authorize the destruction of this money but paid \$13 to the National City Bank, in order to take this money out of circulation, with the understanding that it would be mutilated but not destroyed. It appears that thereafter, the Treasury Department destroyed the money on their own initiative.

In a telephonic conversation with Mr. Alt on May 10, 1935, he informed me that Mr. McKee in Havana had advised that the National City Bank would hold this money out of circulation for a fee of \$1 per thousand, and accordingly, I authorized the expenditure of \$13 to take this money out of circulation. It does not appear that the Bureau has ever been notified that the money had been destroyed, by the Treasury Department.

In September, 1934 at Clevelend, Ohio, the premises at 3973 West 140th Street were raided by the Cleveland, Ohio police, said premises having been occupied by subject Karpis and Dolores Delaney, who resided there as Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Milgreth. As a result of this raid there was found in the house a Bureau transcript of the criminal record of Charles Carroll, FRI #30222, who is understood to be presently incarcerated in the lowe State Fenitentiary, Fort Medison, Iowa, as Jack Carroll, #16745, where he was received on March 20, 1935 on a charge of largeny and centenced to five years.

Investigation conducted at Cleveland and vicinity developed the information that the Bureau transcript of the criminal record of Charles Carroll found in the promises occupied by Alvin Karpis, was secured from the Bureau by the Sheriff's office at Chardon, Chio, at the request of Mr. Frank JA-Hoonan, who operates a private detective agency at Cleveland. and who is reported to be engaged in local rackets in Cleveland. Er. Noonan, when called upon for an explanation as to the presence of the criminal record in the premises occupied by Karpis, advised that as bestbe could recall he was policing certain recetracks in the vicinity of Cleveland and through some source obtained the information that Charles " Carroll was frequently at race tracks in the vicinity of Cleveland, and that he, Moohen, desired advance information with reference to his criminal history. Consequently, he, Moonan, utilized the services of the Cheriff's office at Chardon for the purpose of securing the record. He was at a loss, however, to account for the Bureau transcript of the record being in the premises occupied by subject Karpis.

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he was arrested in Lorain in connection with robberies perpetrated in the state of New York, and as a result was sentenced to serve thirty years in Attica, New York prison, where he is presently confined; that in the early part of February, 1936, he sent Jerome Latz, an exconvict to her home in Lorain, Ohio, with a message that she was to contact James Burns in the Ohio State Penitentiary, Columbus, Ohio, and from Burns obtain the address of Sam Gallagher in Detroit, and having secured this address she was to proceed to Detroit and contact Gallagher, who in turn would place her in touch with a woman and the latter would contact Karpis and from the latter she would receive \$2,000, it being Mrs. Morgan's understanding that Duffy desired this sum of money for the purpose of aiding in his release from prison.

It appears, according to Mrs. Morgan, that she, in the early part of February, 1936, made a trip from Lorein to Columbus with one Eddie Kafouri, Lorain, Ohio Police Department #2551, a narcotic addict, with whom she has been living for some time. At Columbus she visited James Burns and from him obtained the information that Sam Gallagher may be contacted at Detroit at 27 Grand Boulevard, near Belle Island, at a beer garden. According to Mrs. Morgan, Burns was not advised as to just why she was seeking this information. With further reference to Burns she advised that the latter is a friend of Charles Carroll Duffy, and that while Burns has been incercerated in the Ohio State Penitentiary, she has been corresponding with him under the guise that she is his niece, and in her communications with him she has been using the name of Mrs. Duffy.

Mrs. Morgan makes no claim that she knows Alvin Karpis, stating in this regard, that her sole information with reference to subject Karpis was furnished to her by Jerome Latz. Agent exhibited to Mrs. Morgan a large number of photographs and she very readily identified the photograph of Karpis, and in explaining this identification she stated that at the time Jerome Latz called on her he had a photograph of Karpis which very greatly resembled the photograph which she identified in the presence of Agent.

Jerome Latz was recently taken into custody at Lorain, Ohio, as a parole violator from the state of New York, and was returned to the New York State Prison at Attica, New York.

Mrs. Morgan is presently under state indictment in Lorain, Ohio in connection with a violation of the state narcotic laws, it appearing because of her interest in Eddie Kafouri, who is a dope addict, she has been securing prescriptions of morphine from a doctor, under fictitious? Which fact was discovered, the result being that she was indicted. She is not a narcotic addict, and on the whole gives the appearance of being sound in her reasoning.

According to Inspector E. Knapp, Superintendent of the Identification Bureau, Lorain Police Department, Mrs. Morgan, in the past, has furnished information to local authorities concerning criminals in Lorain. He further advised that she is in a position to furnish information concerning criminals inasmuch as during the period that Charles Carroll Duffy resided with her in Lorain he brought a great many of his criminal associates to the house.

The Bureau is being referred to this report, in a separate letter, and a request made that the Bureau grant authority for the necessary expenditure to send Mrs. Morgan to Detroit for the purpose of making contact with Sam Gallagher, inasmuch as she has promised to cooperate in this matter by making such contact if financed. In the meantime no investigation is being requested of other offices in this

a radio station in any part of Canada. Closely examined his records and advised that no radio station has been established as the result of a gold strike in Canada, and stated that if Jim Buchanan had been employed by the Canadian Government, he would not have been allowed to transport radio equipment into the United States and subsequently into Canada.

Mr. C. N. Gray, Detroit, Michigan, phone number Townsend 6-7711, advised that he is intimately acquainted with all of the gold developments in Canada for the past twenty-five years, and stated that the following are the only recent gold discoveries in Canada which are in any way substantial developments:

Location #1 is located twenty-five miles southwest of Franz, Ontario, and is known as the Michipacouran District. Mr. Gray stated that Franz Junction is located about 200 miles north of Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, and is the junction of the Canadian Pacific and the Algoma Central Railway. Mr. Gray advised that mining operations in this location have been general for the past four years.

Mr. Gray advised that Location #2 is located at Scribner, Ontario, and is near Hearst, Ontario, which is 100 miles north of Franz, Ontario. Mr. Gray advised that Hearst, Ontario, is the crossing point of the North Algoma Central and the Canadian National Railways.

Mr. Gray advised that Location #3 is located at Little Longlac, Ontario, and is near Geraldton, Ontario. Mr. Gray stated that the location at Little Longlac was discovered during the latter part of 1934, and a small community resulted through the gold strike at this location. Mr. Gray advised that Little Longlac is the outstanding gold strike in Canada during the past five years.

Wynona Burdette, United States Detention Home, Milan, Michigan, was again interviewed relative to the exact location of the tin cracker box containing a picture of Harry Campbell. At the time of this interview Miss Burdette talked more freely and stated that if given more time to think it over she may advise the Bureau as to the location of this tin c racker box. During the interview Miss Burdette indicated that the picture is not located in a tin cracker box but is in the possession of one of her relatives. Miss Burdette will be subsequently interviewed relative to the above mentioned picture of Harry Campbell.

Inspector McKenzie of the Hotel Squad, Detroit, Michigan, advised that Vernon W. McCoy, General Manager of the Lenox Hotel, is very cooperative with law enforcement officers, and states that if he were contacted, he would give the Bureau Agents full cooperation.

Mr. Vernon W. McCoy, General Manager of the Madison— Lenox Hotel, Detroit, Michigan, advised that the Madison and the Lenox Hotels are located adjacent to each other and at the present time are operated by the same firm. Mr. McCoy advised that he personally manages both of these hotels and stated that the proceeds from these hotels are given to different charitable institutions. Mr. McCoy advised that he has worked in the above hotels as manager for the past eight years.

Mr. McCoy and reporting Agent examined the records of the Lenox and the Madison Hotels from August 1, 1934, to December 30, 1934, and checked these records against the true name and aliases of Harry Sawyer. These records were also checked against anyone using the surname James. No record was found which would indicate that Harry Sawyer stayed at the Madison or Lenox Hotels during the above mentioned period.

Mr. McCoy voluntarily stated that he is running an orderly hotel, and in this connection stated that it was impossible for him to keep "some crooked people" from staying in his hotel, but stated that when anything irregular occurred in his hotel he asked the irregular parties to move. Mr. McCoy stated that information has come to him that the underworld in Detroit considers the Lenox and Madison Hotels as "the right place". Mr. McCoy was shown a picture of Harry and Gladys Sawyer without disclosing the identity of these people, and advised that although he has been working in the hotel daily for the past five years, he has never seen anyone who resembles either Harry or Gladys Sawyer. Mr. McCoy stated that if at any future date he could cooperate with the Bureau or any other law enforcement agency he would be glad to do so.

On February 18, 1936, SAC J. P. MacFarland and Special Agent E. J. Wynn of the Cleveland office called over long distance telephone at 10:40 A.M. and stated that they had received information to the effect that Narcotic Agents, particularly Mr. Oyler, In Charge

of the Narcotics Office at Detroit, Michigan, were making an investigation with a view of locating and apprehending Alvin Karpis. The facts given generally were these: It appears that one John Hesse, an undercover Narcotics Agent who worked for Oyler, had recently been at Lorain, Chio, and had heard that one Jean/Morgan, of Lorain, Chio, had information to the effect that Sam/Gallagher, now in the Chio State Penitentiary, Columbus, Chio, could put Mrs. Charles Duffy, 960 Broadway, Lorain, Chio, in touch with a woman at 2327 Belle Isle, Detroit, Michigan, who in turn could put her in touch with Alvin Karpis. It appears that Hesse secured this information and gave it to Mr. Cyler, who instructed him to proceed with the investigation for information as to Karpis whereabouts. The Detroit Bureau office was requested to contact Mr. Cyler and secure any information in his possession relative to the above mentioned facts.

SAC H. H. Reinecke and reporting Agent contacted Mr. Oyler in his office located in the Federal Building, Detroit, Michigan, and as a result of this interview Mr. Oyler submitted the following memorandum, which he stated was all the information in his possession relative to the above mentioned incident:

February 18, 1936

Memo to Mr. H. H. Reinecke

Detroit, Michigen

The following information was received from Jean Morgan, now held under a charge of violation of the State Narcotic Laws in Lorain, Ohio:

She states that one Charles Carrol Duffy, an inmate of the Attica, N. Y. State Prison, sent a recently paroled man to her house in Lorain, Ohio, directing her to make contact with James Burns, an inmate of the Ohio State Prison, Columbus, Ohio, that she did so - that Burns wanted her to make a trip to 27 Grand Boulevard near Belle Island, Detroit, Michigan, a beer garden and night club, there to make contact with Sam Gallagher's woman, deliver to her an oral message and she in turn would take her to a woman who would contact Alvin Karpis, now in Detroit disguised as a woman, that Karpis would reimburse her for expenses of the trip and give her a large sum of money, approximately \$2000.00 to be delivered to Burns in Columbus. She is willing to complete the assignment given her by Burns. She further stated that while in her car in Columbus with Eddie Kafoury, now wanted for violation of the State Narcotic Law, they were joined by an Italian, a drug addict and ex-convict named Rich; that Rich was well dressed

and told Kafoury in answer to his question, how come all the good front, that he had taken part in the Warren, Ohio, mail robbery and had made a clean getaway, but was compelled to kick back half of the proceeds to help free Sargent and the other defendant recently convicted in Cleveland for that robbery. She does not know anything further about Rich other than he was supposed to have done a bit in Oklahoma for robbery. He does live in Columbus, Ohio. It is further thought a large supply of drugs may be seized should Karpis be located and his plant raised.

Jean Morgan is out on bail in connection with the State charge pending against her and advises that she intends to again interview James Burns as soon as she can arrange to make the trip to Columbus, Ohio, State Prison.

Narcotic Agent Jack Hesse made the investigation of Jean Morgan and is now in Cleveland. It is suggested that you have one of your agents confer with him there and I will instruct him to proceed to Lorain, Ohio, to give you all the assistance he possibly can.

The information contained in the above memorandum submitted to SAC H. H. Reinecke was given to Special Agent Wynn, Cleveland, Ohio, on February 18, 1936. The Detroit Bureau office is holding this matter in abeyance until definite instructions are received from the Cleveland Bureau office as to any necessary investigative work in the Detroit Bureau office territory.

Investigation at Detroit, Michigan, revealed that George L. Benton, 9437 McQuade Avenue, Detroit, Michigan, is employed by the Monogram Sales Company, 2970 West Grand Boulevard, Detroit, Michigan. Mr. Benton was interviewed at the above mentioned address under pretext, and it was disclosed that Mr. Benton has been employed by the above mentioned company as manufacturing agent for the past four years, and prior to that time was employed by the General Motors Paper Company. Mr. Benton bears no resemblance to any of the Subjects in instant case.

An attempt was made to contact Mary D. Forth, 3872 Garland Avenue, Detroit. Investigation at this address revealed that John S. Forth, the brother of Mary D. Forth, lives at this address, and is employed by the C. M. Hall Lemp Company, 1035 East Hancock, Detroit. Miss Mary D. Forth was interviewed at 12545 Charist Avenue, Detroit, under pretext, and advised that until recently she acted as housekeeper for her brother who lives at 3872 Garland Avenue, Detroit. Miss Forth was questioned concerning the car which is set out in reference report, and advised that her brother, John S. Forth, had originally purchased this car, but as he was unable to make the payments on this car, she has been making the payments recently, and has had the title transferred to her name. Miss Forth is living with her mother and two brothers at the present time.

An opportunity was afforded Agent to view the brothers of Miss Mary D. Forth, and none of these people resembles any of the Subjects in instant case.

Miss Forth advised that the car which is registered in the name of Mary Forth is a 1933 Ford tudor sedan, motor #414201.

Miss J. Boyle, Associates Investment Company, Maccabees Building, Detroit, Michigan, advised that instant car was originally purchased by John S. Forth, brother of Mary Forth, and stated that payments at this time have been assumed by Miss Mary Forth.

Mr. George E. Benton, 3670 Van Dyke Avenue, Detroit, Michigan, is an employe of the Chevrolet Motor Company in Detroit, Michigan, and has been working at the Chevrolet Plant, No. 4, for five years. Mr. Benton's employment record was checked at the above mentioned plant and revealed that he has been actively employed by that firm for the past five years. Mr. Benton was interviewed under pretext, and it was disclosed that Mr. Benton does not resemble any of the Subjects in instant case.

The following interview was conducted by Special Agent
(A) N. E. Menson.

On February 18, 1936, Mr. Charles Perucca, 598 Connor Avenue, Detroit, Michigan, called at the Detroit Bureau Office and stated that he is an employee of the Chrysler Corporation and wished to give some information about Karpis and Campbell. Perucca stated that on two occasions he believes he saw Karpis and Campbell in a White Tower hamburger store located at the corner of Clairepointe and East Jefferson Avenues, Detroit. The first occasion was about the middle of May, 1935, and the second time was about the middle of June, 1935. Perucca stated that on the second occasion he made a record of the license plate of the car which memorandum he said he has since lost, but that he is positive the number was either 74772 or 72774, being 1935 Michigan license plates. He stated that the car was a new black 1935 Studebaker sedan. He stressed the fact that he was certain of the make of the car.

Perucca described a tall slender man as wearing a sweater and that his head tipped somewhat toward his left shoulder; that his hair had been apparently dyed, resembling a color between a light oak and a light shade of red. His little man, as he described Campbell, wore an oxford grey suit. He stated that one of these individuals sat in the car while the other went into the store and took out some sandwiches and passed them to two girls in the rear seat and then drove away. The shades in the car were pulled down so that Perucca said he was unable to see the women in the car.

Agent exhibited various pictures to Perucca and he was asked whether he could positively identify these two persons as being Karpis and Campbell. He stated that he could not positively identify them but that the pictures bore a strong resemblance to the two persons he saw. Perucca stated that he was very sure of his description of the Studebaker automobile and license plates and through a check up of the car perhaps some valuable information could be secured.

Perucca also informed Agent that he is in the habit of reading several detective magazines.

Agent was informed by the Detroit Police Department that no letter of the alphabet appears between the numbers on a Michigan license plate, but that if a license did contain a "Y", it would prefex the numbers.

It was ascertained that license number 7472 was issued to William Wamsley, 1164 West Euclid Avenue, Detroit, on a 1933 Plymouth car. William Wamsley is listed as an electrician in the Detroit City Directory.

License Y-7274, it was ascertained by Agent, was issued to Robert A. Cottrell, 4860 Lakeview Avenue, Detroit, on a 1929 Nash sedan. The Detroit City Directory lists a Jerry L. Cottrell at 4860

Lakeview Avenue, a janitor for a public school.

In view of the inaccurate information supplied by Perucca and his delinquency in reporting same, no further investigation was made.

I called Mr. Brantley at Oklahoma City in connection with the surveillance being maintained at Tulsa of the parents of Harry Campbell. I advised that I had discussed this matter with Connelley, who was of the opinion that the Agents should continue the surveillance at Tulsa until the rent runs out, the rent on the house occupied by the Agents having been paid up for another month, since it may be possible that Campbell has no means of communicating with his family, in which event he might come blundering in there. I asked Brantley to call the Bureau several days before the rent runs out, at which time a future cours of action will be decided upon. MAR 4

Mr. Brantley advised that he had interviewed the informant of Billie Woods, of the Burns Detective Agency, at Tulsa, and that he had submitted a memorandum to the Bureau on it today by air mail, special delivery.

She thinks that, possibly through those two sources, she may obtain some information, although she has nothing definite at this time. Dutch Monteith is an ex-convict recently released from the Kansas Penitentiary and the Kansas Highway Patrol have been trying to get him to finger this bunch for them. He states he knows them but has not seen them for some time. Brantley stated he told this woman that this Bureau would, of course, pay no money to her until information was received which resulted in something tangible. She apparently is not in dire need

The only consideration under which she would try to secure any information would be to go on the payroll for about thirty days at so much per day. According to this woman, Dutch Monteith has a brother who owns some greyhounds who are running at some tracks in Florida, and Dutch has been talking about a trip to Florida with Burrhead Keady. Brantley stated he had not made any recommendation about this informant, and asked that I let him know what I think about it after the complete memorandum is received and reviewed.

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

S. Attorney and suggesting that sentence be deferred for a while longer.

I told Mr. Stein that this is a situation which I would have to discuss with you and possibly Mr. Connelley; that he would be advised of the Burau's decision in due course.

I telephoned Mr. Stein back about the above matter informing him that the matter has been discussed with you and with Mr. Connelley; that it is agreed it is rather undesirable to sentence this man at this time because of his potential value in the Hamm Case, and in further view of the fact that if he gets a probationary or suspended sentence and gets out on the streets, someone is likely to kill him. I told Mr. Stein to go to Bolton and tell him that the U. S. Attorney is going to be consulted for the purpose of having the passing of sentence deferred for a period of about 60 days; that he should thereafter go to the U. S. Attorney and tell him that Bolton has furnished some information concerning another case, upon which we are now working, and we would like to defer sentence for a couple of months.


Mr. Stein said he would take care of this, and would advise the Bureau what arrangements are made.





Reference is made to the telephone call of Special Agent J. F. Little on February 21, 1936, in which he advised that Lucille Forris at Coffeyville, Kansau, had left a note for her mother that morning advising that she yas proceeding to Wichita, Kansas for the purpose of marrying Filter lett. The information supplied by Agent Little was immediately communicated to Special Agent B. P. Cruise, at Michita, Mansas, and the following is his memorandum with reference to investigation conducted there.

Agent Cruise immediately proceeded to the Narriage License Bureau in the Court House, Wichita, Kansas, and interviewed Miss Irone Waggoner, who is the principal clock in the Varriage License Office. Irene Waggoner showed Agent Cruise the two marriage licenses issued that day. The licenses issued were as follows:

> San Good (21) Wichita, Ransas Loah Schmidt (over 18) Whitewater, Kansas.

Andy Drietenstein (32) Korton, Kancas, Ann Sadowsky (25) Newton, Kausas.

- RECORDED & INDEXED Agent displayed to Irone Waggoner a photograph of Filton Lett, but she stated that neither of the above rentioned non rescalled the photo of kilton Lett. Agent displayed this photo so obtain other clorks of the Parriage License Bureau and they also stated that kilton had not been in the office that day. OND
- Agent remained in the office of the larriage Dicense Bureau until it closed at 5 P.M., but no one else applied for a marriage license, and no one appeared resembling the photograph and description of Milton left or the description of Lucille Ferris.
- Irone Paggoner informed that the next day being a holiday. the marriage license office would not be open. She stated, however, that in the event anyone applied for a marriage license the following day the custodian of the court house would telephone one of the cleris of the Parriage License Bureau to come down to the office to make out the licence. She advised Agent Cruice that she would per-

sonally see to it that in the event anyone applied for a marriage licence on February 22, 1936, Agent Cruise would be notified by telephone at the Broadview Hotel, Michita, Kansas.

- During the evening of February 21, 1936, Special Agents V. R. Clary and B. P. Cruise cruised about the city of Wichita in an automobile, going from one address to another where Wilton Lett was known to contact; namely, the addresses over which mail covers had been placed by Special Agent Little, of the Oklahoma City Office, which addresses have previously been set out in memorandum of Agent Cruise dated February 9, 1936, but were unable to locate the automobile above described. During the course of this investigation on the night of February 21, 1936, Agents Cruise and Clary stopped at the rooming house, 925% East Douglas Street, Michita, Kansas, where Agent Little of the Oklahoma City Office advised Agents, that informant Fenneth lang had stayed on the night of February 6, 1936.
- The landledy at this address was shown photographs of Kenneth Leng, who had done the registering at this rooming house, and of lilton Lett, Akron, Ohio, \$26337, dated 10-20-35. She partially identified the photo of Lett as that of the companion of lang who stayed with lang the night of February 6, 1936. She stated, however, that she had paid little attention to lang's companion and that she would probably not be able to recognise him on the street should she see him again. She added, however, that lang and his companion purported to be tinners and that they had talked to another goomer named Frank Hereford, who was a tinner by trade.
- Frank Hereford was contacted by Agents and stated that just one of the two parties who stayed at the rooming house the might of February 6, 1936 had come into his room to talk about securing a job as a tinner. Frank Hereford stated that this individual talked to him in his room for approximately forty-five minutes, stating that he had practiced the tinning trade in Coffeyville, Kansas. Hereford stated that this individual appeared to be well familiar with the tinning trade. Hereford was requested to describe this individual and the description given by him fitted elosely the description of Filton Lett. Hereford was then shown a photograph of Milton Lett, Akron, Ohio, \$20,337, and positively identified the photograph as that of the individual who talked to him about tinning.
- He further stated that he had emple opportunity to view the man since the two talked together in the room for approximately forty-five minutes, and that he was certain that the photograph of Lett was that of the man with whom he talked, and who stayed that night in the next room on the same floor with a companion. He

stated that the following day this same individual appeared at the room alone and gathered up the belongings of the two and left, and had not been seen there since.

Agent Leckie remained in Kl Paso during this period. On party's arrivel at El Paso they stayed at Hilton Hotel, covered by Leckie. Archer left Carlabad on 2-14-55 Via bus for El Paso, Andrews







MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR The Bureau is in receipt of a teletype from the St. Patl Office requesting Bureau authority to place a telephone tap in the residence of John B. Davenport, and also requesting authority to pay \$60.00 per day For rental on a house from which to maintain the tap. I talked with SAC Stein at the St. Paul Office asking him what this is all about. Mr. Stein said that there has been an error in the transmission of this message, since the rate should be \$60.00 per month, rather than per day. John B. Davenport is said to be a sort of "post office" for the underworld in Minneapolis. Fitzgerald has been communicating with him. Davenport is also the post office for Belle Born, she having sent Fitz-gerald money through Davenport. It was Mr. Connelley's idea that a telephone tap be placed on the telephone of this person, either at his place of business or at his residence. A survey revealed that the proper place to place this tap is on the residence telephone of Davenport. They made a further survey relative to a place from which this tap could be maintained, and the only possible place was to rent a vacant house in that neighborhood, the rental for which 45 \$6.00, per month. Division, (home-Bucyrus, Chio) and Morman G. Parr, Assistant Director, Administration Division (home: New Philadelphia, Chio). These calls were probably in connection with liquor licenses and hence no further check will be made of them.

MAIN 5221 (5 calls) ADAMS 0100 (2 calls)

The first number is that of the Neil House.

The second number is that of a pay station in the lobby of the Neil House. The Neil House is under the same management as the Hollenden Hotel in Cleveland, and as the latter is frequented by the operators and patrons of the Harvard Club, the same persons may frequent the Neil House although the latter hotel has always enjoyed an excellent reputation.

The reference report indicates that of the calls made from the pay station in the Neil House, one was made by a Miss Morgan and one by a Miss France.

Through the courtesy of A. W. Meacham, The Ohio Hotels
Protective Association, with offices in the Beggs Building, Agent was
able to check the registrations of the Neil House without making any
request of any of the clerks. Mr. Meacham has access to the registration
records. The records reflect that an Eva Morgan of Waverly, Ohio, was
registered at the Neil House on October 12th and checked out on October 16th
and that she paid her bill. There was also a Katherine Morgan registered
at the Neil House on October 18 and 19, 1935, and her address was given
as 103 David Ave., Jackson, Ohio. There is no record of any Miss France
being registered at the hotel during the entire year of 1935.

Mr. S. A. Gary, Assistant Manager of the Neil House two days later and asked him concerning these Miss Morgans and he looked up their records and found that they had both paid their bills and incidentally stated while going over their accounts that they had not made any local calls or in fact had not made any calls at all. He inquired as to why agent was checking on them and agent informed him that he wished to secure their forwarding address in connection with an official investigation in which they might have some information. Nothing was said concerning any phone calls and he advised that he did not know anything about these persons as they have not been regular patrons of the Meil House.

In regard to the lead set out in the reference report to ascertain the identity of George R. Benton, who is reported to be living on Rural Route #2, Flushing, Ohio, this matter has been covered in a previous report. This is the same George Benton who formerly lived at Quaker City, Ohio, according to Postmaster C. S. Hendershot of Quaker City, and who recently moved to Flushing, Ohio. Mr. Hendershot advised agent that he had so advised the Cleveland office in response to an inquiry received from that office some time ago.

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Pred Pierpont stated that the stranger resembled the photograph of Russell Cibson only in the characteristic that both had a pointed face, although the stranger was an older man and appeared elightly more intelligent-looking than Gibson. Agent did not exhibit to Pierpont the photograph of Alvin Karpis until last, but Pierpont immediately identified this photograph as that of the stranger. Perpont appeared certain of the identification, although he stated that it was possible that he might be mistaken. Agent did not comment on the fact that Karpis is apparently two or three years younger than Gibson was. Pierpont stated that he would not attempt to describe the stranger now, almost a year after seeing him, but he was sure that the photograph of Lappis was one of the stranger who represented himself to be "Dock Pay."

When asked by Agent how he renembered the address of 3010 South Franklin Street, Marion, Ohio, as given by the stranger as the place he wanted Pierpont to deliver a ear to John Hamilton, Pierpont removed in Agent's presence a small calendar from the wall in his garage, and on the wall where the calendar had been Agent saw written in pencil, which Pierpont stated was in his handwriting, # 5010 South Franklin." Pierpont stated that he was positive this address was given for the State of Ohio and not Indiana or any other state; that if the address was fictitious, it was because the stranger did not wish to give a true address until Pierpont agreed to deliver the ear.

Pierpont saw the stranger only twice, about one week apart, the stranger asking Pierpont to deliver a ear before being paid.
While the road in front of Pierpont's garage was closed in June and July of 1935 for repairs, the stranger drove up in the Hudson from the rear of the garage and called Fred Pierpont by name, stating he knew Pierpont although Perpont did not knew the stranger; that Pierpont had once tried to get in touch with him as "Doe" Day in Illinois and that he had been in the same jail with Pierpont at Kokomo, Indiana. Pierpont informed Agent that he had been in jail at Kokomo, Indiana, as the stranger indicated; that "Doe" Day was the only man Pierpont had ever tried to get in touch with under the circumstances indicated by the stranger.

Pierpont promised agent that, if this stranger ever returned or attempted to communicate with him, he would immediately notify the Indianapolis Bureau Office. Upon prior authorization from the Bureau, Agent reminded Pierpont that, if the stranger was the man whose photograph he identified and Pierpont assisted in his apprehension, there would be a reasonable amount of compensation for such assistance.

Agent took this step inamuch as Pierpont has previously indicated that he thought he was entitled to receive some reward if he furnished information which was instrumental in effecting an apprehension.
