It was ascertained that the resort at Graham Springs is a new project, and is not fully developed at this time, but perhaps mineral baths may be obtained there at this time; also, that the resort at Dawson Springs has run down a great deal, and presently is not attracting a very large clientele.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent F. W. Nicol:

AT DAWSON SPRINGS, KY.

Agent interviewed Mr. J. W. Toombs, Manager, Landsdown Bath House, who advised that the Landsdown Bath House is the only resort open at Dawson Springs at this time, which gives mineral baths. Photographs of Subject Alvin Karpis and Subject Harry Campbell were exhibited, and he stated that he was certain that these persons had not been at the Landsdown Bath House during recent years. Identification Orders #1218, and #1236, were left with Mr. Toombs, and he was requested to immediately contact the Louisville Bureau Office by long distance telephone collect, in the event that he should see anyone resembling the photographs of Subjects appearing thereon, at his resort. He stated that he would gladly cooperate with the Bureau in this matter, and would notify the Louisville Office if he received any information.

Mr. T. I Vincent, the lessee of the New Central Hotel, which is operated in conjunction with the Landsdown Bath House, was also contacted. He stated that he would take this matter up with all of his employees, and instruct them to be on the lookout for Subjects Karpis and Campbell. He advised after contacting several of his employees that he was certain Subjects had not been to the New Central Hotel. Copies of Identification Orders #1218, and #1236, were left with Mr. Vincent. His cooperation was enlisted, and he promised to notify the Louisville Bureau Office immediately if any persons answering the descriptions of Subjects Karpis and Campbell appeared at the New Central Hotel.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent J. E. Thornton:

Agent sontacted Town Marshal, Fred Cox, New Consert, Ohio, who advised that Tom and Sam Miller are two brothers operating a filling station in New Concerd and that Tom Miller had reported to him that a man driving an Auburn Sedan (year not known), with 1958 Virginia license #356,441, had purchased some gasoline at his station and that he had appeared to be in a very great hurry and had acted very suspiciously. Further, he advised that Tom Miller had advised after looking at some photos of men that the driver of the car resembled Alvin Marpis, very much. Marshal Cox advised that Tom Miller is on his toes and has been responsible for the recovery of three cars this winter, as upon becoming suspicious of persons buying gas he writes down the license number and immediately calls Cox.

that on 4-2-36 about 1:25 P.M., a well dressed man driving an Auburn, 4 door convertible sedan, with a kind of khaki top, drove into his station and gave evidence of being in a great hurry and purchased some gasoline paying for same by giving \$2.01. This man was accompanied by a woman, who did not get out of the car and who made no comments whatsoever. The man inquired as to where the rest room was located and gave the keys of the car to the woman while he retired to the rest room. The rest room is in the rear of the house and when the man came out of the rest room he actually ran through the other rooms and got into the car as if he were afraid of someone coming to the ear.

Tom Miller described this man, as follows: Age, about 50, height 5*6*, weight 140%, complexion fair, dress, well, dark suit and overcoate

Miller was unable to give any description of the woman at all. At the time the ear left the filling station it was going West. Miller believes that he saw the ear go back through town headed East on 4-3-56 about 10:50 A.M., but is not sure as the car was travelling at a great rate of speed. Miller also advised that he believes that this same man stopped at his filling station sometime in January of 1936, and at that time he was accompanied by another man, who got out of the car and attended to the gas and water, etc. This second man is described, as follows: Age 30-35, height, 5*19-11*, were light overcoate.

Agent inquired of Miller if he had seen any pictures of Karpis or Campbell and he advised that he had, on many occasions, and for this reason was struck by the resemblance of this man to Karpise

Agent allowed from Miller to look at the photos in the Pocket I.O. Booklet and he immediately picked the photo of Karpis as the first man described. He also stated that the man who had been with him in January greatly resembled Harry Campbelle.

Sam Miller, the brother, was located and contacted in this regard and he advised that he was not present on 4-2-36 when this couple came into the station but that he was present last January when he waited on the two men who were driving a similar car and that he thought that the man who remained in the car was very similar in appearance to Alvin Karpis, although he could not give a description of him as he remained in the car. Sam Miller was allowed to examine the photos in the I.O.'s and he picked out the photo of Karpis but did not pick out Harry Campbell as the second man. Sam Miller also advised that he has seen photos of Karpis and Campbell previously.

Agent learned that two other men had been in the station at the time that the man and the woman stopped for gas and these two were Leon Waddell and John Cloude

Both of these two men are well up in years and apparently just loaf around this filling station most of the time. They were allowed to examine the Pocket I.O.'s and after slowly going through the booklet stated that they were unable to pick out anyone who resembled the man who had purchased gas. After they had failed to select any one, Sam Miller asked John Cloud if the photo of Karpis did not resemble the man who purchased the gas and after again looking at it he stated that Karpis resembled the man. Leon Waddell after having his attention called to Karpis' photo still failed to identify him.

Marshal Cox later advised that if the Millers were incorrect that he knew that they were both very sincere and zealous in their desire to help and that both of them were interested in the activities of law enforcement agencies and were on the alert at all times and paid particular attention to the activities of persons coming to the station for gase

It is noted from the letter of the Washington Field Office dated April 4, 1936, that the Virginia license plates above mentioned were checked and it was found that they had not been out of the State of Virginia, hence the information reported by the Miller brothers is apparently erroneous in this respect, also

AT CINCINNATI, OHIO

At 5:35 P.M., on April 5, 1956, a telephone call was received from Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brantley at Oklahoma City, advising that he had just received a telephone call from Major Wint Smith, Superintendent of the Kansas Highway Patrol, calling from Lyons, Kansas, at which time Smith had stated that he has recently had two men watching an alleged hideout of some of the associates of subjects of this case, and that one Art Hulbrook, an ex-convict, had bragged several times about being with Earpis on some jobs.

According to Smith, Hulbrook is supposed to have left Fayetteville, Arkansas at 9:00 P.M., on April 2, 1936, by train for Cincinnati, Ohio, which train would go through St. Louis. Smith described Hulbrook as follows: Age, not given, height 5*10-11*, build slender; wearing dark suit; light hat; brown hair, brown eyes; diamond pin in tie.

Smith advised that he was furnishing this information inasmuch as he did not have facilities to cover the matter. The above information was later confirmed by conference teletype to the Bureau and the Cleveland, Chio and Cincinnati, Chio offices.

It was ascertained at the Union Station, Cincinnati, Ohio, that the only train which could be taken from Fayetteville, Ark, on the evening of April 2, 1936, was at 8:34 P.M., and that it would have been possible to make connections in St. Louis, so as to arrive on either of two trains at Cincinnati, Ohio, on the afternoon of April 5, 1936, prior to the time this information was received at Cincinnation

Special Agents G. F. Bickley, R. H. Klett and H. D. Harris covered all trains arriving at Gincimnati, Ohio, on the evening of April 5, 1956, which could have brought a passenger from Payetteville, Arkansas, and this check was continued on the morning of April 4, 1956. These Agents also covered all out-going connecting trains, as well as all trains leaving for the northern part of the State of Ohio, in an effort to locate Hulbrook, in the event he was proceeding to one of the peints where subjects of this case have had hideouts. This check not only included an observation of the passengers, but additional check was made of Pullman reservations, in the hope that Hulbrook might have had a reservation under his name, and a check was also made of Pullman porters, for a passenger answering this description. All of the above efforts were fruitless, and by a conference teletype on April 4, 1956, the Bureau and the Cleveland and Oklahoma City offices were accordingly notified.

Special Agent R. H. Klett ascertained that the Mineral Springs located in the territory of the Cincinnati Office, as listed in the "Mineral Waters of the U. S. and American Spas" are, as follows:



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



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be in the vicinity of one of the above mentioned three places. Mr. Anderson promised to treat the inquiry in absolutely confidence and stated he would gladly assist representatives of the Bureau in any way he could be of service.

Since the submission of reference report of this agent, the residence of C. C. Peters, 1619 Pennsylvania Avenue, Fort Worth, Texas, has been observed at 😥 every available opportunity, which was almost daily, and on numerous days the premises were visited numerous times. At no time during the period were any strangers observed about the premises, neither was there any strange car observed in Peter's garage, which is visible from the streets. Owing to past contacts had with Peters, a decision was made to openly interview him. Accordingly contact was made with him C. C. Peters near his farm, which is located about seven miles North of Fort Worth on the Grapevine Road, on the morning of March 23, 1936. Special Agent F. S. Dunn of the Dallas Bureau Office, who is well acquainted with Peters and apparently well liked by Peters, assisted Agent in the interview with Peters. In substance, Peters stated he has been a professional bondsman for more than thirty years at Fort Worth and has become acquainted with numerous underworld characters while working in that capacity. He stated he does not know Harry Campbell, however, he claimed to have met Karpis at Dallas, Texas, several years ago, the date being fixed by him at the time of or before the Lindbergh kidnaping. In this connection he was unable to supply any definite information as to Karpis' contacts, if any at Dallas, except one All Mosich, who Peters stated is presently serving a ten year term in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, having been convicted at Fort Worth about four years ago on a charge of Forgery; that Mosich is originally from Chicago, but he believes this man will return to Fort Worth when he completes his sentence; that Mosich is very bitter on account of his conviction, and it would be useless to interview him for information; that on one occasion Mosich told him that he would get some money from Karpis if he could locate Karpis, however, this was while Mosich was in custody at Fort Worth and before his conviction.

During the course of the interview Peters mentioned that Slivers McBride, who resides in the vicinity of Kansas City, Missouri, telephone: Westport 3821, was a good contact in Kansas City, and that McBride had called him by telephone on Movember 20, 1935, for the purpose of securing bail bond for a woman held by the Fort Worth Police Department under the name of Dorthey Pavis on a charge of shop lifting. That Tom Carney, St. Louis, Missouri, since deceased, also called him regarding the woman. He stated a Jewish man going under the name of Henry Orenstein, who claimed to be the husband of the Davis woman was in Fort Worth at the same time and was stopping at the Metropolitan Hotel.

A subsequent check at the Fort Worth Police Department verified the fact that Dorthey Davis, Fort Worth Police Department No. 7866 and F.B.I. File No.203662, was arrested at Fort Worth on November 16, 1936, on a charge of theft over \$50, and was subsequently released. Discreet inquiry of employees in the identification bures of the department reflected this woman had been released without trial. She was arrested with Henry Orenstein, who was immediately released, after his fingerprints were taken. His number was #Ex19926, and his classification was 1/1 R/R a/a 9/13. His photograph was not taken and he did not have a previous criminal record according to a report from the Bureau. Orenstein had in his possession a 1934 or 1935 black Buick Sedan, Motor No. 2972177, bearing 1935 Minnesotal license No. 53-840. The

records indicated Porthey Davis is a prefessional shoplifter, with numerous arrests for that offense in various sections of the United States.

Continuing, Peters stated if Karpis Is frequenting Kansas City he probably has the assistance of Slivers McBride or McBride probably has knowledge of Karpis' presence when he is in Kansas City. He stated that he would be willing to assist the Bureau in any way he possibly can and that he would within the next month or two, if possible, induce McBride to visit with him at Fort Worth and would secure any information McBride may have as to the whereabouts of Campbell and Karpis or any other badly wanted fugitives in which the Bureau is interested.

As a point of information Peters suggested Karpis may be known to Lee Colburn, a local man of Fort Worth, who can be located generaly in the place operated by "Boot" Simpson on 3rd Street in Fort Worth, which is the headquarters for a policy racket. Peters' name should be treated in confidence.

Efforts to locate Jack Fortune, 1822 Cadiz Street, Dallas, Texas, reflects he is unknown at that address, which is a cheap rooming house, and that his name does not appear in any of the Dallas directories for the past five years. Inquiry in the vicinity of the above mentioned address also failed to reflect that Fortune was known. He is unknown to the officials of the Dallas Police Department and has no criminal record at Dallas under the above mentioned name. There is no record of a forwarding address for Fortune from 1822 Cadiz Street on file with the Post Office at Dallas.

The racing season at Arlington Downs, located between Dallas and Fort Worth Texas, is open from March 27, 1956 to April 25, 1956. Identification orders relating to Karpis and Campbell were distributed to the members of the race track police, and their scoperation was promised in the event any individuals appeared there who appeared to be identical with either of these subjects.

On March 29, 1936, press reports reflected A. O. Powers, reported to be a big Hot Springs, Arkansas, gambler was killed near Naples, Texas, in an automobile accident. As to what actually happened or details to the identity of the man, the reports were conflicting. Inasmuch as it appeared the man had been in Hot Springs and there was considerable confusion as to the facts surrounding him, it was decided to make a check for the purpose of determing whether he was a subject of this case or an associate of any of the Subjects.

on April 2, 1936, Mr. J. B. Floyd, Undertaker, Naples, Texas, was contacted and he stated he handled the body of Powers after his death which occurred about three and a half miles east of Naples on March 28, 1936. He stated he learned from a woman who represented to be the wife of Powers, that Powers had been living in Dallas, Texas, for the past two or three months, and that he had appeared in Texarkana, Texas, or Arkansas, at the home of his wife, reported to be located at 810 East 8th Street or West 8th Street on March 27, 1936, and that she departed with him on the 28th of March; that Powers was reported to have been extremely drunk and driving at a high rate of speed when he wrecked his automobile and he was instantly killed. He stated Powers was about 47 years old; about six feet tall; weight about 185; blue eyes; dark hair and olive complexioned. Through Mrs. Powers he learned Powers had deserted his first wife and that his sister-in-law a resided

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at Hot Springs, Arkansas, and had custody of Power's two children; that he communicated with Paul Heady, undertaker, Hot Springs, Arkansas, and found that not accept Powers body, and that Powers had been a resident of Hot Springs for a number of years, but apparently had no living relatives. He stated on instructions from Mrs. Powers he burried the body of Powers at Naples on the morning of March 28. 1936. Mr. Floyd further advised that there was no calls other than the one from the contract that the Heady giving instructions as to the disposition of the body. He stated press reports to the effect that he had received telephonic instructions to bury the body as quickly as possible were without foundation, and started by representatives of the Texarkana papers. Mr. Floyd further stated that Mrs. Powers had attempted to keep her marriage to Powers from becoming public and asked their cooperation in not mentioning her name; that she had been living in under the name of and that they did assist her in keeping her identity from the newspapers, which caused the papers to become quite inquisitive, and to state the couple were accompanied by anothe individual. Mr. Floyd further advised that Powers appeared to be a cheap gambler, as he had about a half dozen decks of crooked cards and about a dozen pairs of crooked dice in his effects, which were taken by Mrs. Powers and returned to Texarkana, and that Mrs. Powers returned to Texarkana on March 28, 1936.

An examination of the Plymouth Coach used by Powers was made at the Chevrolet Garage in Naples, where it was taken after the accident. This car was a battleship grey 1935, model, bearing Motor No. P2*95369* and Serial No.9027228, and 1936 Arkansas License No. 5-195. Mr. Floyd stated it was his understanding that the car belonged to Mrs. Powers, who had purchased it under the name of This automobile was completely demolished and an examination of same for lingerprints was without results.

Dr. William Smith, Naples, Texas, stated he went to the scene of the accident on March 28, 1936, at or about 2:45 p.m., and observed that there apparently were only two persons in the car at the time of the accident, they being Powers and his wife; that Powers was dead when he arrived and Mrs. Powers' collar bone was broken. He stated, had other persons been in the automobile they would in all probability been seriously injured or killed, and that he received no information to the effect that the Powers were in company with other nersons. He stated Mrs. Powers stated she resided with a family by the name of at an address as be He stated the family remembered being was contacted by him via telephone and came immediately to Menlas: that are Powers, who apparently was using her previous married name, remained in his office from the time she was brought to Naples on the 27th of March until the following day, but did not receive any telephone salls and no one attempted to communicate with her at Maples. 

Identification of the Body of William J. Harrison

William J. Harrison was born in St. Louis, Missouri, September 27, 1900. He spent the major portion of his adolescent years in St. Louis. In about 1926 he went to Calumet City, Illinois, where he operated numerous "Speak-easies" and dispensed alcoholic beverages during the prohibition era. He became associated with the Capone syndicate of Chicago and fraternized with persons of such notoriety as Gus Winkler, Big Homer Wilson and "Killer" Burke. Fred Goetz, alias George Zeigler was one of the leading Capone henchmen, and spent much of his leisure in pleasant golf games with Harrison who was a golf professional.

Harrison became acquainted with members of the Barker-Karpis gang through Fred Gostz. Harrison had become a man of wide experience in his travels, and, as a result of his underworld activities was able to furnish to members of the Barker-Karpis group, some of their most valued contacts, and without whom many of their sinister designs would not have been consummated.

When plans were being formulated in Chicago and St. Paul, for the abduction of Mr. Edward George Bremer, arrangements had to be made for the removal of the women members of the gang from St. Paul, and finding them apartments which would serve as a safe rendezvous for their gangster companions. This task fell to Harrison, who lodged the women in pleasant apartments on Chicago's South Side, which were operated by a Micht guy". During Mr. Bremer's twenty-two days of confinement in the Bensenville, Illinois, hideout, Harrison served as an outside "contact man" for the gang, thus insuring its continued safety during the abduction period. Harrison, despite his precarious undertakings, was a man of wit and humor, and served as the "court jester" or "court fool" to the amusement of his gangster affiliates.

Temporarily, after the release of Mr. Bremer, the gang quit Chicago, Harrison providing safe refuge, entertainment and invaluable contacts elsewhere. When it appeared to the gang, however, that the "heat was off", certain members returned to Chicago, using Harrison to rent apartments, thus allaying suspicions which might have arisen had the more notorious members of the gang secured the apartments themselves.

Harrison was trusted, and even his garrulous nature had not, up to this time, given rise to doubt on the part of his companions. Unwittingly, however, he communicated to other associates of the gang who were not in the "inner circle", certain information which, it was felt, should not have been divulged.

Using a ruse, Harrison, on the night of January 5, 1935, was lured by his companions to an abandoned barn in the vicinity of Cntarioville, Illinois. When he entered the barn in the hope of effecting his mission he was shot to death by several of his erstwhile associates. His body was then soaked in gasoline, placed in an appropriate position and the barn was set on fire. The structure was completely demolished. On the following day, January 6, 1935, the charred outline of an apparently unidentifiable body of a human being was observed, lying in the smoldering embers. Only a torso remained.

The Sheriff's Office at Wheaton, Illinois, was notified immediately, and the body was removed by the Du Page County coroner to an undertaking parlor at Roselle, Illinois. An x-ray examination of the body disclosed it to be that of a male individual. The x-ray also disclosed the location of a bullet which was found embedded in the lower part of the right shoulder of the corpse. A ballistics examination of this bullet reflected that it had been fired from a .32 calibra automatic pistol.

A search for identifying items left at the scene of the crime disclosed an Elgin wrist watch and gold link wrist bracelet lying beside the body. There was also found what remained of a pair of octagon shaped eye glasses. In addition thereto there was found an empty five gallon gasoline can and a crank for a Model A Ford automobile.

Investigation by the wheaton, Illinois, Sheriff's Office at the Elgin Watch Company, Elgin, Illinois, reflected that the watch had been assembled in 1928 and had been sold on February 15, 1929. There were no records, however, disclosing the identity of the firm to which the watch had been sold. The watch we described as grade 428, model 6-0, movement 32,166,666, chrome nickel plated case #0,211,813. All jobbers handling Elgin watches were circularized by the Wheaton, Illinois, Sheriff's Office in an effort to trace the watch, but without results. The Sheriff's Office also caused this watch to be submitted to scientific analysis. The examination disclosed a jeweler's repair number C-633 which had been scratched on the inside of the case. Pertinent information concerning the watch and the repair numbers were published by the Sheriff's Office, during the month of June 1935 in a magazine issued by the Jewelers' Association, in an effort to effect an identification, but without results.

Meanwhile the investigation of the Federal Bureau of Investigation had been progressing in an effort to locate and apprehend the remaining fugitives who were responsible for Mr. Bremer's abduction, including William J. Harrison. Information was uncovered from time to time to the effect that Harrison had been murdered by members of his own gang. These whisperings of the underworld became quite current. Investigation loaned credence to the report Special Agents learned from scurces intimately associated with Harrison that he had worn, prior to his death, a wrist watch which had been fastened to his wrist by a gold link bracelet. This bracelet was found beside the corpse. It had also been definitely determined that Harrison, immediately prior to his death, was wearing rim glasses of an octagon shape. 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Investigation by the Wheston, Illinois, Sheriff's Office at the Elgin Match Company, Elgin, Illinois, reflected that the watch had been assembled in 1988 and had been sold on February 15, 1989. There were no records, however, disclosing the identity of the firm to which the watch had been sold. The watch was described as grade 428, model 6-0, movement 32,166,656, chrome nickel plated case #0.811,815. This is a joint report of investigations conducted by Special Agents R. C. Connell, Bussell Bryon, G. A. Callahan, and the writer.

At Butte, Montanae

Beforence is had to Chicago Office letter to the Burezu, dated March 20, 1936, relative to contacting health resorts and furnishing them with a copy of the Identification Order No. 1236, issued on Subject Harry Campbell. An this connection, Special Agent Russell Bryon interviewed Mr. George Wirod, Manager, Lava Hot Springs, Idaho, which is the only health resort in Idaho where baths and treatments are given, and effected the necessary arrangements whereby this Office will be notified in the event Campbell appears at that place. A copy of Identification Order No. 1256 was left with Mr. Elrod for his use in this respect.

Similar arrangements were also effected and interviews had with Mr. J. A. Farley, Manager, Soulder Hot Springs, Boulder, Montana, and Mr. M. J. Sullivan, Manager, Alhambra Hot Springs, Alhambra, Montana, by Special Agent G. & Callahan, on March 16, 1956.

Due to the impassability of the roads to Camas Hot Springs, Montana, which is an inland town, the manager there was contacted by mail and furnished with a copy of Identification Order No. 1256,

Epon receipt of conference teletypewriter message from the Salt Lake City Office on March 17, 1956, regarding the identification of an individual as Sabject Karpis by one Louis Royal at Salt Lake City, Utah, Special Agent Russell Bryon was furnished this information by long distance telephone at Roise, Idaho, and Special Agent R. C. Connell, who was at Twin Falls, Idaho, was also advised. Both were instructed to contact peace efficiers in southern Idaho, particularly those at Pocatello, and on the highway from Salt Lake City, Utah to Pocatello, Idaho and West, in an effort to obtain information relative to the individual and automobile described by Louis Royal. In this connection, the following investigation was conducted by Special Agent R. C. Connell:

At Boise, Idaho.

In accordance with the instruction contained in the letter of Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley, Chicago, Illinois, March 19, 1936, and previous instructions received from the Butte Office, Agent contacted Chief of Police Jack Balderson, Pocatello, Idaho, via long distance telephone and furnished him with the information regarding the reported appearance of Karpis in Salt Lake City, Utah, at which time he inquired as to the route to Posstello, Idaho, particularly with the description of the ear in which he was riding and the machine gun which he is reported to have had across his lap. Chief Balderson assured the writer that he would have his men make a thorough eity-wide check for this ear and its driver, and would transmit the information to the Sheriff's office and the Portneyf Cheeking Station of the State Department of Law Enforcement through which Karpis would have had to pass, as it is situated on the highway between Salt Lake City and Potatelle. and would immediately advise the Butte Office of any results of value obtained.

Agent personally contacted Commissioner Emmett Pfost, of the Idaho State Department of Law Enforcement at the Capital, Boise, Idaho, and furnished him with the above information, with the request that he transmit the same to his men. Mr. Pfost advised that he would issue a confidential bulletin to all numbers of the State Highway Patrol, advising them of this information, and instructing them to maintain a close check for a car ensuring this description.

With regard to the Buick Coups, bearing Massachusetts license No. 250-218, mentioned in the report of Special Agent E. M. O'Donnelle Butte, Montana, March 25, 1936, a further investigation was made by Special Agent Connell at Boise, Idaho, where it was ascertained that an error had been made in reporting this tag number to the Butte Office; that the correct tag number was Massachusetts 25-212, and not 250-212. Special Agent Connell erally advised the writer that the results of further investigation concerning this car revealed that instant car had been purchased in Boise, Idaho, by a well-known businessmen there and had no connection with instant case. Consequently, no further investigation is being conducted in this matter.

Upon receipt of reference telegram from the El Paso Office, dated March 25, 1936, edvising that Clarence G. Campbell, Midland, Texas, brother of Subject Marry Campbell, had received an airmail letter, post-marked Weiser, Idaho, and bearing no return address, and that the hand-writing thereon was very similar to that of Subject Campbell on Identification Order No. 1236, this information was immediately telephoned to Special Agent Russell Bryon at Boise, Idaho, who was instructed to proceed to Weiser, Idaho, where he conducted the following investigation:

at the Maskington County Court House, Agent interviewed Mro-George B. Gilrey, County Pressurer, one of the eldest residents of the city, and who bears a very high class reputation. Mrs Gilrey advised

that Mrs. J. W. Williams was Mabel Williams, and that she had been rais in that country and had lived there all her life. Her maiden name was Belle Brooks, and she had also gone by the name of Mabel Dodds, a name by a former marriage, and her reputation in the community was very shady. Mr. Gilroy further advised that she has a daughter who had married a fellow by the name of Campbell a few years back and had then moved out of the country, but that she had returned to Beiser recently and was now living there. A sister of Mabel Williams, Mrs. Mary Owens, a widow, operates the Palace rooming house in the city, at which place Mabel William her husband, and her daughter were presently living there. Mabel William has one brother, Arthur Brooks, Weiser, Idaho, reputation good, and a halfbrother, William Westervelt, 5585 Floming Avenue, Oakland, California, reputation unknown. Another sister, Mrs. Sophie Oldfield, also resides in the vicinity of Reiser. Mr. Gilroy also savised that the husband of Mabel Williams, usually works as a sheep shearer, but is at present, ployed on the W. P. A. project at Weiser,

Agent returned to the Post Office and succeeded in locating Burt Kimball, the Assistant Postmasters Mr. Kimball savised that subsequent to the visit of Special Agent Russell Bryon, he had made a check in order to ascertain the identity of the person who had mailed the airmail letter received by Clarence Campbell at Midland, Texas, recently, and that he believed this letter was posted by Mrs. Maybelle Campbell. Regarding this women, Einball stated that he has known her for several years, during which time she had lived in Weiser. She had married a man named Campbell a few years back and had left the country with him, and was away until a few weeks ago when she had returned alone. She is presently living at the Palace rooming house, and is working at Hulse's Cafe, Waiser, As the Palace rooming house is directly across the street from the Post Office. Mr. Kimball was asked if he had noticed any strangers going or coming from the place or any unusual activity, but replied that although he was in a position to observe the place from his effice window, he had not noticed smything of this nature, but promised to match more carefully for any signs of activity at that place. A mail cover was requested from Mr. R. J. Wood, the Postmaster, on all mail eddressed to the Palace Rooming house , and particularly on that addressed to Mrs. Mabel Williams, Mrs. Maybells Compbell, Mrs. Mary Owens, and J. W. Williams. Mr. Wood also advised that he would have a match placed on all mail sent by any of these people.

Agent contacted Deputy Sheriff Frank Kennedy, Weiser, Idaho, to escentain if he had beened of any unusual activity at the Palace rooming house, or if he had seen any strangers there during the past few weeks. Mr. Kennedy advised that due to the fact that this place bears a very poor reputation, he had made a practice of discreetly keeping a watch on it by means of some informants of his, but that he had not received any information regarding any strangers having been at the place recently. Regarding

J. W. Williams, Kennedy advised that he is an ex-bootlegger and is an all around "rat", who is capable of anything crooked, and would undoubtedly hide out any criminal, if paid for the job. Kennedy stated that he had been trying to get something on Williams, who is known as "Scarface", for a long time but had not succeeded. He was requested not to press him too strongly because of the instant setup, but, however, not to fail to stick him if he should be able to make a case against him, regardless of this condition. Sheriff Kennedy advised that he would continue his surveillance of the Palace rooming house, and would also cover Mrs. Maybelle Gampbell as closely as possible, without having her become sware of the fact.

At Butte, Montana.

As a result of the mail cover placed on the mail of the above hamed parties, a communication was received from Mr. R. J. Wood, Acting Postmaster, Weiser, Idahe, on April, 1, 1936, advising that an airmail letter, postmarked Jal, New Moziso, March 27, 1936, had been received by Mrs. Maybelle Campbell, Weiser, Idaho, bearing the return, C. Campbell. This letter is apparently from Clarence Campbell, her husband.





Mr. Connelley telephoned me and said that he believes we are going to have a little trouble with the Kansas State Police in connection with the investigation in Hot Springs, Arkansas. He said that Joe Anderson, the Kansas State Policeman, was told to keep his hands off Grace Goldstein in Hot Springs, and also to keep his hands off Clayton Hall. Joe Anderson said he thought the Bureau was giving him the "run-around" in this matter; that he thought he ought to be permitted to talk with Hall before Hall makes his contacts. Mr. Connelley said he teld SAC Fletcher that none of those persons down there were going to touch Hall until he makes his contacts, and further, they are not going to touch him after that. Of course, we won't tell them the latter. After Joe Anderson was told this, he immediately called up Wint Smith, the head of the Kansas State Police, who, with one Captain Edwards, who apparently has been in Little Rock all of this time, is coming down there, and the three of them are going to have a conference, ostensibly for the purpose of seeing how they can "trim" us on the setup in Hot Springs. Mr. Connelley said he has asked SAC Fletcher to diplomatical keep these men out of the picture until we can let Hall make a contact, and if he gets a direct answer from the woman, we will them just pick her up and take her away somewhere until the affair is over. In this connection, Mr. Connelley said he had in mind suggesting that SAC Brantley of the Oklahoma City Office be instructed to go over to Hot Springs, so that someone with some real backbone will be on the grounds in the event those fellows try to put something over on us. 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

At my request through Mr. Connelley, SAC Brantley at the Oklahoma City Office telephoned me before departing for Arkansas in connection with the anticipated difficulties with the Kansas State Police in connection with the above entitled matter. I told Mr. Brantley about the meeting which the three Kansas State officers are going to have in Little Rock tonight ostensibly for the purpose of determining what demands they are going to make on the Bureau concerning the informant in this case. I pointed out to Mr. Brantley that if and when he is contacted by these men, he should try to reason with them along the logical lines of this matter; that is, that the fost Office Inspectors have turned this informant over to us, the informant has to make certain contacts and does not desire to be interfered with during his work; that the informant does not desire to deal with every police or investigative agency in the United States on this matter; that we are not going to try to scoop them or anything like that, but we want to protect our rights and our informant in connection with this very important case. I further pointed out to Mr. Brantley that if they will not listen to reason, and start to making demands on what they want and what they are going to do, we will just have to lay down the law to them, and ask them what they are doing over in Arkansas trying to function in the first place. Mr. Brantley and I discussed this situation at some length. and I believe Mr. Brantley understands our position in this matter, and will act along the lines as outlined to him. He said that he would seek the counsel of the Bureau in any controversy which arises, and would keep the Bureau advised of any developments in any of the angles down

there.

In reference to your telegram of April 11, 1936, the following information is set out in confirmation of telegram forwarded to your office by the Detroit Bureau Office this date.

Er. Peter Wiggle, Assistant Postmaster, Detreit, Michigan, examined the records in his possession and advised that Post Office Savings Account \$139098 is listed in the name of Irana Hells, 460 Prentice Street, Detreit. This account was epened on June 4, 1935, and during July, 1935, deposits were made which brought the total deposit up to \$2500, which Mr. Wiggle explains, is the maximum amount that can be carried in a Post Office Savings Account. This account has been dermant since July, 1935 — no withdrawals having been made.

The information obtained from the Post Office records revealed that Irone Vells formerly lived at \$764 Boodward Avenue, Detroit, and at the time the account was spend gave her escapation as unsupleyed. According to the Post Office records, Irone Vells was born at Louise, Kentucky, December 25, 1905 and gave her parents names as Henderson Wells and Laura Wells.

The above is all of the information which the Post Office authorities have with regard to Irone Wells.

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

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Vicinity and there are yet a few farm houses near that place; however, the nearest town or trading center is Broaddus, Texas, which he believed to be four or five miles north of Warsaw. Mr. Greer stated that he believed he would have been notified had any strange cars come into the vicinity of Warsaw or Broaddus. He further stated that he was down in that vicinity the past week and that he often fishes in the vicinity of Warsaw, but that he had never seen any person fitting the description of Subject Karpis, and that he had never seen any dogs fitting the description of the dog allegedly belonging to Karpis and Fred Hunter. He stated that Warsaw is only a cross road located about 25 miles west from a point running off State Highway \$ 147, about four miles south of Broaddus, Texas. He further stated that the cross roads in question were wagon trails and were impassable during bad weather.

Mrs. Thomas T. Brantley, Assistant Postmaster of BROADUS, TEXAS, was contacted on the morning of April 6, 1936, and inquiry regarding the Subjects in this case was made of her under pretext. She stated that persons answering the description of Karpis and others had not been observed by her, and she did not believe any such persons had been in the vicinity of Broaddus; and in this connection, she further advised that no strangers had come to that vicinity any time recently. Mrs. Brantley stated further that the community known as Warsaw was served from that post office, and that Roman D. Griffin, Jr. is the rural carrier, and that she considered him thoroughly reliable.

Roman D. Griffin, Jr., Broaddus, Texas, was immediately contacted, and he stated that he is the rural mail carrier serving the ecumunity known as Warsaw, as well as other points between that place and Broaddus. He stated that the route is very light, and that he make only three trips a week; that there are only three families living in the immediate vicinity of Warsaw, being Jones Stanley, a Mr. Bales, and a Mr. Womack. He stated that Mr. Stanley and Mr. Womack have long been residents of that community, and that Mr. Bales recently came to the community for the purpose of operating a saw mill. He is a very large man and formerly resided at Beaumont, Texas. He further stated that there were few other people residing south of Broaddus, one family being Leon Stanley; that the bettoms in the vicinity of Warsaw flood and the water rises from four to five feet during heavy rains, and that there are no houses or eabins located along the Attoyac and Angelina Rivers in that vicinity.

Mr. Griffin stated that in his opinion no one fitting the description of the Subjects in this case, or automobils or dogs mentioned in this report, could have possibly come into the Warsaw community without his having knowledge of it, as he is quite familiar with the persons he serves. He stated that he did not believe it would be possible for any person to come into that community and live without his receiving some information regarding that fact. Mr. Griffin stated that he would keep the matter in mind, and in the event he received any informa-

which he thought might be beneficial to this office he would immediately communicate with the Dallas Office by telephone.

A physical inspection was made of the community in the vicinity of WARSAW, TEXAS, and it was found that the roads are very bad and almost impassable for automobile traffic. It was evident that the water rises as indicated by Mr. Greer, this being evidenced by water marks on the traes.

In the community known as Broaddus there was observed one cheaply built house, which apparently has been abandoned for several years; the windows and doors are missing, and the place is generally in a run down condition.

All persons interviewed were carefully selected before before being contacted, and they were requested and agreed to keep the inquiry in absolute confidence.

A report covering additional investigation conducted in connection with reference message will be submitted within the near future by Special Agent in Charge F. J. Blake, who is ill at the present time;

A teletype from the Oklahome City office to the Cleveland office, dated April 8, 1936, which is quoted below, indicates the possibility of Coker and Milton Lett proceeding to St. Louis.

Post Office Imspector George Hill, through informant, Claremore, Oklahoma, ascertained that last Saturday morning, April four, this year, Sam Coker sems into Claremore by train not fully elothed was picked up by taxi driver of long acquaintence and taken to Mill Regers hotel,

"Milton Lett later exrived by Frisco Lines train and was taken to will begore Notel by some text driver. This text driver called to hotel by Coker who drove Coker and Lett to a house in the _____ (not decipherable) 15 miles from Claremore, They carried two bags and were in the house about helf an hour taking our keys to prevent driver leaving. They came out with the bags talking as if nobody home and drove down the road a short may where they met a man driving a sedan, who was halled by Coker. This wen unknown to driver but may be man whose house was visited. They talked a few migutes and Coker and latt gave this men some money, Still further flows the road they met e now Studebaker sedan which was halled by Lett, the driver of which was unknown to the taxi driver. Meither Lett nor Coker discussed Karpis or Campbell and no red Buick sedan or other eers observed around visinity similar to those used by gang. Taxi driver purchased a cost for one of the men at Penneys. Coker and Lett apparently shocked out Will Rogers Hotel on

departure and had supper at the taxi driver's home where they waited until train time. They would not permit the texi driver out of their sight even to buy groceries having some delivered to house. They purchased two tickets to St. Louis with Julian reservations and intended leaving on evening train but observed an officer at the station, who was unknown to them and had the taxi driver take them to Collinsville, Okinhama where they purchased two tickets to an unknown destination. Paid taxi driver one hundred eighty dollars for the day, including the tickets to St. Louis. Had plenty of money and apparently intended to go to St. Louis. From Conversation Lett and Coker had not seen seen other for some time. Lett asked for News but Coker did not talk loud enough to be heard. Agents Smith and Dauron with Joe Anderson returning Hot Springs, Arkansas, tomorrow morning. Agents : this office continuing working with Post Office Inspectors vicinity Tulsa. EAC Brantley remaining Tulsa tonight."

DETAILS:

At San Francisco, Californias

Following receipt of reference teletype from the Salt Lake City Bureau Office, agent ascertained from the records of the Clark of the United States District Court, San Francisco, California, that a letter had been received by that office from Attorney M. H. Atkinson, Reno, Nevada, dated Jenuary 15, 1936, which letter enclosed a certified check for \$2,000,00 in payment of the fine of Frank Cochrame.

Inquiry was made of the Federal Reserve Bank of . San Francisco by the Clerk's Office and it was ascertained that the above mentioned certified check was drawn on the First and Virginia Street Branch, First National Bank of Nevada, Reno, Nevada.

The above information was obtained from Mr. George Murphy, Clerical Assistant, Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, who stated that it was his recollection that the above check was drawn by the Air Service Garage, Rano, Nevada, the garage which was formarly owned and operated by Frank Cochrane.

The above information was furnished by conference teletype to the Director, the Chicago Bureau Office, the Salt Iake City Bureau Office, the Cincinnati Bureau Office and the St. Paul Bureau Office on February 18, 1936, with the request that the Salt Iake City Bureau Office verify the above information at Reno, Neveda.

Special Agent W. R. Remsey and the writer interviewed John Moyles, who, it will be recalled, is the proprietor of the Bank Buffet, \$286 - 22nd Street in San Francisco, California, and who was formerly proprietor of the Theatrical Club, a speakeasy lecated at 54 Hyde Street, San Francisco, California. Moyles advised that since the recent conviction of Anthony "Sonp" Moreso and Louis "Bones" Tembini in connection with sauggling charges, that he had employed Tony Moresoo and Vincent Marcovich as bartanders at the Bank Buffet. He advised that Virginia Moreso, the wife of "Soap"

Moreno, was still residing at her apartment on 21st Street in San Francisco and that Enthorine Parente, sister of Mrs. Morene and wife of Joe Parente, the was also convicted with "Seep" Morene and Louis Tambini was residing with Virginia Morene at her apartment. He advised that he (Moyles) was still residing with Gladys Butler at 1075 Valoncia Street, Apartment 1.

Mayles was again alosely questioned with reference to the members of the Barker-Karpis gang who might have come to the Theatricel Club formerly operated by him at 34 Myde Street and which is undoubtedly the alub referred to by Dolores Deleney in her statement set out in report of Special Agent Madala, insemuch as this alub is located within a block and a half of the William Taylor Hotel in San Francisco, California. He admitted that admission to this alub was granted only to persons who were known and therefore that if persons entered it would be necessary that they be known either to the bartenders at the club or himself.

After studying photographs of all members of the Barker-Karpis group, including the girls, he desied that any of these persons had ever been in the Backrical Club or the Bank Buffet and stated that no person sould be produced in the Barker-Karpis group who could truthfully say that they knew him. He admitted that such persons might have been known to "Soap" Moreno or "Bones" Tumbini but positively stated that they had never made any remarks or statements to him, at any time, indicating such knowledge.

Moyles solemnly reiterated that he would de all in his power to cooperate with this Bureau and that if he received any information what seever regarding any members of this group, or a fugitive wanted by this Bureau, he would immediately communicate the same to this office.

In this connection it should be noted that Teny Moresco and Vincent Marcovich were proviously involved in an investigation in this district in the Jodil case and that both have long criminal records in San Francisco, California, Marcovich having been arrested many times in connection with Vagrancy and

violation of the Marcotic Law and Moresco having been arrested on several occasions, as a vagrant and also as a bank robbery suspect.

It was ascertained that Moresco resides at 260 Chenery Street, San Francisco, and was last errested in San Francisco by the San Francisco Police under No. 8560S on a charge of vagrancy, from which he was bailed.

It was ascertained that Vincent Marcovich was last arrested by the San Francisco Police on November 9, 1935, in connection with a vagrancy charge as San Francisco Police No. 27945, which charge was dismissed.

Photographs of both Moresco and Marcovich were obtained from the San Francisco Police Department and are being placed in the San Francisco file of this matter for use in commection with future investigation in this district.

A mail cover has been placed upon all the mail of John Moyles at his residence, 1075 Valencia Street and on all the mail addressed to the Bank Buffet in San Francisco, California.

A disposition sheet is being submitted in connection with the above referred to errests of Moresco and Marcovich.

In regard to reference letter from the Cleveland
Bureau Office dated December 16, 1955, a request was directed to
Miss Ruth Assalena, Matienal Automobile Theft Bureau, lecated at
the California Division of Motor Vehicles, Sacramente, California,
to furnish this office with a list of registrations of automobiles
and eperator's licenses of parties by the names of George Benton
and Mary Forth. Such a list was furnished this effice by Miss
Assalena, at which time it was noted that mone of the descriptions
contained therein, fitted that of subject Harry Campball and all
were noted as having resided in California for see time.

In view of reference letter from the Chicago Bureau Office, dated March 4, 1936, no further investigation concerning the above registrations is being conducted by the San Francisco Bureau Office.

Following receipt of reference letter from the Chicago Bureau Office, dated March 10, 1936, a list of the mineral springs and similar health resorts located in the Sen Francisco Office & And District was compiled from the Yacation Guide" of the Peck-Judah
Travel Service Company, 672 Market Street, San Francisco, Californ mis. All of the mineral springs in this district were eirquistized by letter, advising them of the allments of subjects Karpis and App Compbell and enclosing an identification order of each of these subjects, with the request that the information furnished them be considered strictly confidential and that the San Francisco Bureau Office be immediately notified in the event either of these subjects attempted to receive treatment at their resort during the coming

Under date of January 30, 1936, a letter was received by the San Francisco Bureau Office from Dr. R. A. Quahman, M.D. Medical Superintendent, Mendocino State Mcapital, Talmadge, California, which enclosed a letter from one Charles Crammer, a patient. Cremer's letter indicated that he had information which would lead to the apprehension of subjects Tarpis, Campbell and a large of . Dr. Joseph Morea.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR:

RE: ALVIN KARPIS, with aliases, FUGITIVE, I.O.#1218; et al; EDWARD GEORGE BREMER, VICTIM; KIDNAPING; HARBORING OF FUGITIVES; OBSTRUCTION OF JUSTICE; NATIONAL FIREARMS ACT.
El Paso File 7-6.

Reference is made to copy of Bureau letter dated April 2nd, 1936 which was forwarded to the El Paso Office requesting that Agent submit a complete and detailed memorandum concerning his activities in connection with the investigation of this case at Miami, Fla., in November, 1934.

On Bureau instructions Agent departed from Nashville, Tenn., in company with other Agents on November 16, 1954, arriving at Miami, Fla., at about 2:45 p.m. on November 17, 1934. Agent had been advised by Special Agent in Charge J.H.Hansen that the purpose of the trip of the Agents, including the writer, to Miami, Fla., was to investigate the possession in that City of 1934 modell(Ford Coupe, motor #18-1,037,480, which had been purchased in Cleveland, Ohio, by subject Karpis under the alias of Charles M.Bronson, and had been recently registered at Miami, Fla., by one Duke Randall, El Commodore Hotel, and was assigned Florida license #202-978.

Agent was further advised that upon arrival of the Agents in Miami, Fla., they would be met at the airport by the then resident Agent, Roger L.Main, from whom additional information would be forthcoming on arrival at Miami. Agents were met at the airport by former Agent Main, who advised that Agents were to take no steps in connection with this matter pending the arrival of former Inspector S.P.Cowley and Agents from the Chicago Office, who were due to arrive in Miami early the following morning.

On November 17, 1934, Agent received instructions from Special Agent in Charge Hansen to proceed to the Room of former Inspector S.P.Cowley and former Special Agent H.E.Hollis at a local hotel, the name of which Agent does not now recall, in company with other Agents on this detail. The writer proceeded to Inspector Cowley's room and was there instructed by Inspector Cowley to proceed with Agent H.C.Douglas to the El Commodore Hotel for the purpose of observing the premises with a view of seeing the above described car and obtaining any information available relative to the above mentioned Duke Randall, and anyone with whom he might be seen at this Hotel.

At about 9:00 a.m. on Nevember 17, 1934, Agent proceeded to the El Commodore Hotel and registered as R.E.Redlands, which Agent believes, but is not positive,

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was the assumed name used by him on this occasion. Agent was assigned to Room 1001 or 1005 at the El Commodore Hotel. Arrangements had previously been made between Agent and Agent Douglas whereby the writer was to be on surveillance in the lobby of this Hotel and would be relieved there in several hours time by Agent Douglas, at which time the writer was to proceed to his room in order that the two Agents might not be in the lobby of this hotel on duty at the same time. At approximately 1:00 p.m. Agent Douglas entered the lobby of this Hotel, whereupon the writer proceeded to his room and remained there until about 6:00 p.m., at which time Agent returned to the lobby.

Upon arrival in the lobby Agent observed Agent Douglas just to the rear of the door leading from the Hotel to one of the two streets on which the Hotel was situated. Agent proceeded past Agent Douglas, without any sign of recognition of course, and upon arriving on the sidewalk in front of the hotel door observed the above described Ford Coupe standing at the curb. A short distance down the street, Agent observed Inspector Cowley and Agents Hollis, Hansen, Hurt and Campbell. Agent turned to the right upon leaving the Hotel door and received a nod from Inspector Cowley indicating that Agent was to follow Inspector Cowley down the street, which was done.

Inspector Cowley there informed Agent that the above described Ford Coupe had been observed by Agent Douglas, who had immediately called Inspector Cowley's room; that he, Inspector Cowley, had communicated this information to the other Agents, and all had proceeded to the vicinity of this Hotel. Inspector Cowley at this time instructed Agent to return to the immediate vicinity of this car, to purchase a newspaper, and to stand there, just back of the Hotel door, and to engage in reading this paper but to notice the car and the occupant: at the same time. Inspector Cowley further stated that upon Agent's arrival at the door of this Hotel, Agent Douglas would return to a position further up the street; that if anyone was seen to enter this car and appear ready to drive away Agent was to give the signal by lifting his hand to the brim of his hat and holding it there for a few seconds. Agent did as instructed by Inspector Cowley, and in a few moments noticed two men, whom he later learned were Duke Randall and on-Codomo, and a young woman who appeared to be about 22 or 23 years of age come through the lobby of the Hotel and proceed to the curb near this car. Randall and the woman entered the car and Codomo returned through the Hotel entrance. Randall then proceeded to back the car out to a position where he could pull away from the curb, whereupon Agent gave the prearranged signal, and as the above described Ford Coupe was being driven down the street, Agent observed Special Agent in Charge Hansen, Agent Douglas, and other Agents follow this machine in a car which had previously been stationed a short distance up the street.

While in this Hotel during the period above set out, Agent alternated with Agent Douglas in maintaining continual surveillance in the lobby of this Hotel. Agents were under strict instructions from former Inspector Cowley not to engage Randall, or any of his associates, in conversation, and Agents were further instructed that they should use every precaution to see that their presence and identity were not known by those under surveillance.

Agent remained in this Hotel until approximately 5:00 p.m. on November 18, 1934, at which time he received a telephone call from Inspector Cowley that Agent and Agent Douglas were to check out of this Hotel immediately and meet him at his room in another Hotel. Agent communicated this information to Agent Douglas, and the writer and Agent Douglas checked out of this Hotel and proceeded to Inspector Cowley's room as instructed.

Before leaving this Hotel, Agent had observed Duke Randall in the above described Ford Coupe on one other occasion, which was when Randall passed the main entrance of the Hotel at a slow rate of speed in this Ford Coupe at about 10:00 a.m. on November 18, 1934. To the best of Agent's recollection, Randall was being followed on this occasion by a car containing Special Agent in Charge Hansen and other Agents.

After checking out of the El Commodore Hotel, Agent was instructed by former Inspector Cowley to make a check of all automobile agencies in Miami to determine if anyone answering the descriptions of the subjects in this case had purchased automobiles at any of these agencies. Agent called on a number of automobile agencies in the City of Miami, where photographs of the fugitives in this case were exhibited, but Agent did not at any of these agencies find anyone who could identify the photographs as being those of anyone to whom automobiles had been sold. Agent remained in Miami for two or three days after checking out of the El Commodore Hotel and during this period, on instructions from former Inspector Cowley, Agent was engaged in checking dance halls, saloons, and gambling houses in an effort to obtain some trace of the fugitives in this case.

Agent did not at any time speak to any of those whder surveillance in this case which includes Randall, Codomo, Joe Adams, and Robert Knight. All of these individuals were observed by Agent at one time or another during the time Agent was on duty as above set out in the El Commodore Hotel but, as stated, Agent did not at any time speak to any of these people or have anything whatsoever to do with any of them further than to keep them under surveillance as much as possible.
