Reference is made to the report of Special Agent W. S. Compbell. Butte, Montana, dated April 7, 1956, which sets forth the information that Mrs. Maybelle: Campbell, alleged wife of Clell Campbell, is presently residing at Weiser, Idaho with her nother, are, J. W. Millians. It is further noted in the report of Agent Compbell that Expelle Compbell apparently has been married to Giell Campbell, brother of Marry Compbell for several years.

Provious investigation in this case has revealed that Mrs. Menriette Campbell, 535 Compton Boulevard, Compton, California, Is the wife of Chell Campbell, and that Chell Campbell deserted Mrs. Menriette Compbell and their two children on or about October 25, 1935, and Mrs. Campbell has not known his whereabouts since that date, There is also some information to the effect that a warrent had been issued for Clail Gampbell for wife desertion.

It would therefore appear that the woman posing as Mrs. Maybelle Compbell is not in fact the wife of Ciell Compbell, or if it is true that Clell Compbell went through a wedding coronony with Maybelle Compbelle this marriage was a bigemous one.

It is requested that the Butte Office endeaver to secure further information at Weiser, Idaho concerning the alleged marriage of Maybelle Compbell to Clell Compbell, as it might be desirable in the fature to farnish this information to Mrs. Bearletta Gaspball, as well as to advise Mrs. Hearlette Compbell of the present theresbouts of Giell Campbell. 

The Los Angeles Office should verify whether a warrant for the arrest of Glell Cambell is presently existing.

The original purpose in circularising the various benks in the United States concerning \$1,000 bills bearing serial numbers within the above stated group was to determine if possible the present whereabouts of the fugitive members of the Barker-Karpis gang, instruct as it was noted that several of the bills coming within this group were recovered from the Barkers after their deaths at Oklawaha, Florida on January 16, 1935. It was believed that alvin Karpis and Harry Compbell might be in possession of \$1,000 bills bearing serial numbers coming within the group as above stated.

It is noted in your letter that you request advice as to whether the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta should place these bills in circulation. It is presented that your office has endeavored to trace the source of these bills when the recovery of some has been reported to your office, and although none of the said bills with the exception of those traced to the Barkers have been traced to members of the Barker-Karpis group, it is not believed advisable that they should again be placed in circulation instead as all of the banks in the United States have been furnished with the social numbers of this group of bills in question.

If these bills, which are now being held by the Federal Reserve Benk at Atlanta, were to again be placed in circulation, they probably would respect in some other benk and couse unnecessary investigation

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by some field effice in an effort to trace the bills to their search.

It is believed that you should suggest to the Federal Reserve Bank at Atlanta that the bills now being held by that institution should be forwarded to the Treasury Department at Rashington, D. C. for matilation and redemption.

Therefore, the informant did not meet this girl.

It has now been ascertained from the divorce records at Hot Springs, Arkanaes, that Grace Goldstein under the same of Jewell Lavarne Grayson secured a divorce from A. P. It is noted that a copy of the report of Special Agent in Charge Peterson above referred to was furnished your office.

Tou will further note in the signed statement executed by Arthur Stross that he refers to one San Goldstein. It is possible that you might obtain information through the Police Department at Gary as to whether this individual is presently frequenting that place. If Goldstein is presently in Gary or vicinity, it would appear that he might be a logical contact for Earpis should the latter appear at that place.

For possible additional assistance to you in conducting investigation in the northern district of Indiana, I desire to advise that on December El, 1935 one Edward Otis was released from the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Esnass, and he proceeded innediately to Chicago. It is personally acquainted with Otis and he received the information from Otis that he was to make several contacts on behalf of Elman Former, who has been convicted in connection with instant case and is presently confined in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth.

On the night of April 1, 1935 Special Agents , J. Rose and L. C. Taylor, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. BOHERT BUGENT, Mrs. Mogent being the Chief Clerk at the Pittsburgh Office, visited several accalled night clubs in Monaca, Pennsylvania, and vicinity, having in mind that the above referred to alub might be located at Monaca. It was ascertained, however, that only the chaspest places of entertainment were afforded in this vicinity and casual inquiries developed the information that no gambling places existed in Monaca.

Mr. and Mrs. Engent reside in Beaver, Pennsylvania, which town is located just across the river from Monaca. They have lived at this place for several years and Mr. Mugent is employed as an accountant by the Jones & Laughlin Steel Company at Aliquippa, Pennsylvania. Meither Mr. nor Mrs. Mugent had any recollection of a club known as the Monaco Club in or near Monaca, Pennsylvania.

On April 2, 1936 Special Agents E. J. Rose and L. C. Taylor interviewed W. L. AMEROSE, Chief of Police at Aliquippa, Pennsylvania, who informed that he has no information concerning the existence of a Monaco Club at Monaca, Pennsylvania, or in Beaver County. He informed that a few months ago a small poolroom at Monaca, which was operated by the McClane Brothers, ran a small poker game in the rear of the poolroom but that this place was frequented only by working men and had been raided and closed by the Beaver County authorities not long ago.

Chief Ambrose is known to the Pittsburgh Office as a man of good reputation and it was felt from past experience that he could be contacted in this matter. He, of course, was not advised of the real purpose of the inquiry.

Special Agent in Charge R. L. Shivers confidentially ascertained from WILLIAM T. BUFFY, Marcotic Agent in Charge, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and WALTER MOMAGHAM, Allegheny County Detective, also of Pittsburgh, that a club known as the Monoco Club at one time was sperated by THOMAS COINS, brother of State Senator Jones L. Goyna, at 3802 Forbes Street, Pittsburgh, but that this almb was no longer

on April 1, 1935 revealed that the premises were boarded up and the door padlocked. Inquiry at a shoeshine stand across the street from the address developed the information that the place had been closed several menths ago but that it was to be re-opened in the near future by the proprietor of TITO'S CABIN CRITIC, which is located at 3712 Forbes Street, Pittsburgh.

The current Pittsburgh telephone directory lists telephone number SCHENLEY 8968 for the Monaco Beer Garden, 3802 Forbes Street,

Pittsburgh, and it was ascertained through the Bell Telephone at Pittsburgh that this telephone was contracted for by HENEY MAINE of 3211 Shady Avenue, Pittsburgh; that the telephone had been disconnected on February 4, 1936 and that a refund check for 514.54, which had been mailed to Mr. Beigle at the Shady Avenue address had been returned to the telephone company with a motation that he was unknown. at that place. To date the refund has not been collected from the talephone company.

The 1934 and 1935 Pittsburgh city directories list WILLIAM C. CAULT, lawyer, and wife, ELEANOR, at 8211 Shady brome, with effices at 229 Bakewell Building, Pittsburgh, Pa.

W. J. COTTER mail carries, covering the Enady Avenue address, informed that the name Henry Beigle is not familiar to him and that Mr, and Mrs. Qualt have resided at 3211 Shady Avenue during the past two years. He stated that recently a young girl has moved into their home. He further informed that the house located at this address, prior to the occupancy by Mr. and Mrs. Geult, was occupied by a number of persons againstionable character, the name of the persons being unknown to him, but one of whom was a person by the name of COURTMEY. He informed that these persons mysteriously left the address without leaving any forwarding address for their mail, and that he subsequently ascertained through conversation with another carrier, J. E. McMAHON, that these persons had moved to 2826 Beechwood Boulevard, which is in the vicinity of the had moved to 2826 Beechwood Boulevard, which is in the vicinity of the Shady Avenue address.

McMAHON informed that these persons lived at the Beechwood. Boulevard address until some time in the Spring of 1984 when they disappeared without leaving any forwarding address for their mail. The only name Mr. McMahon could recall was Courtney.

Both McMahen and Cotter were shown a picture of Fred Hunter and they stated that it resembled one of the men who had lived at both

the Shady Avenue and Beechwood Boulevard addresses.

McMahon stated that the premises located at 2826 Beechsood Boulevard were evened by a Tamily by the asse of SLAYEN, 48 Borth First Street, Duquesne, Pennsylvania. However, inquiry of Mr. and Mrs. Slave developed information that they lost the house on the mortgage during Pebruary, 1932 and that information concerning its tenants since that date could be obtained from the mortgage department of the Reonies Pittsburgh Trust Company Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania

Inquiry was made at the California Seanch of the Pittsburgh. Post Office, and it was learned from FRANK A. BROWN, carrier who delivers mail to 3802 Forbes Street, that the Monaco Beer Garden had been operated under the name of HENRY MERCELES, until around January 1, 1936

Pribet dale, Pennsylvania, a tated that he had resided in that vicinity for the more than twenty years and had served as County Detective for the past seven years. He further stated he had been personally acquainted with archie Hegleman for at least ten years; that Hegleman during most of that time had been a bootlegger, although he had operated a restaurant in Webster, Pennsylvania. Helative to the reliability of information. Hegleman might give he stated that Wegleman was undoubtedly a confirmed liar, and at many times in the past Hegleman had given him considerable information and although he realized some benefit from it, the vast majority of the information was absolutely worthless and unreliable.

He was further questioned regarding Wegleman's associates and he stated that Wegleman in all probability had connections among the outlaw element and information along this line might be reliable although he would be inclined to put little credence in it.

He was further asked relative to Megleman's mother and sivised that it was his understanding that Megleman's mother had been dead for more than twenty years but that he did not know this to be an absolute certainty, however, he did know that she had never lived in Webster, Belle Vernon, or on what is known as the Megleman farm; that Megleman's wife is from a very good family in Webster, Pennsylvania, and that he seriously questions her association with any of the friends of Megleman and was positive that she took no active part in his criminal activities.

The Arcade gambling establishment was visited by the writer and Agent Greaney and a dice game was in progress, at the time, and the place appeared to be wide open. A close inspection was made of all persons present, none of whom were the Subjects in this case or Fred Hunter.

The Shadow Inn was also visited but there was no gambling there at that time. In casual conversation with the owner of that place it was learned that Manmareno was the one who was going to be interested in The College Inn, rather than the Shadow Inn.

Having previously learned from Sullivan that the Havana Time at New Kensington, operated by one STEMOS BOZANOS, was a favorite night of club for all classes of people in that vicinity, and that gamblers, as well as other types of persons, are known to frequent this place. For this reason Agents conducted investigation there but neither Subjects nor fred Hunter could be seen.

From the information received at New Kensington it would appear that the information previously received relative to Fred Hunter's being connected with a gambling joint there is at least premature, if at all reliable, inasmuch as a thorough investigation among the gambling element in New Mensington disclosed that all of the gamblers now operating there are local, with the exception of one employed at the Arcade, who is from Pitteburgh, Pennsylvania, and who is not any of the Subjects or Fred Hunter.

On April 1, 1936, Special Agent in Charge J. P. Mac-Farland of the Cleveland Office telephonically advised the Detroit Bureau Office that Fred Hunter, present associate of Alvin Karpis, may attempt to secure a position as a stick man in a dice game from either "Lefty" Clark or Fitzpatrick, these men being gamblers who are well known. Mr. MacFarland advised that the description of Fred Hunter is as follows:

Alvin Karpis and Fred Hunter were alleged to be driving a 1936 blick Sedan, marcon or red in color, bearing 1936 Arkansas tags #5732; the motor number of this car was given as 63052198. Mr. MacFarland advised that it would be advisable to conduct appropriate investigation to ascertain if Fred Hunter was at present associated with either "Lefty" Clark of Fitzpatrick.

Investigation revealed that the larger gambling establishments in the metropolitan area of Detroit, Michigan are carried on in Macomb County, Mt. Clemens, Michigan, being the County seat for Macomb County. Mr. W. Rosso, Chief of Police, Mt. Clemens, Michigan advised that Danny Sullivan operates the gambling establishment located at 10 Mile Road and Gratiot Avenue in the City of Detroit. Michigan and stated that his most recent information is that "Lefty Clark has recently become associated with Danny Sullivan in the above mentioned establishment. Mr. Rosso advised that "Lefty" Clark formerly operated a gambling establishment at 16 Mile Road and Van Dyke Avenue. A subsequent inspection of this address revealed that same has been closed for approximately one year. Mr. Rosso advised that the Chalet. which is located at the 8 Mile Road and Gratiot Avenue was formerly known as ritzpatrick's place. Mr. Rosso advised that he had no additional information concerning these two gambling establishments but stated that the above information was true according to the information which has been brought to him during the past few months.

The above mentioned establishments were visited by reporting agent on April 1 and 2, 1936. A thorough examination of the above mentioned premises revealed that a successful plant could not be placed on either location as the Chalet has no adjoining buildings and a plant which would reveal any worthwhile information would be impossible. A thorough examination of the premises of Danny Sullivan's gambling establishment reveals that a worthwhile plant could not be established at this location. Both of the above mentioned premises were visited during the day but no information

of value was secured. Both of the above mentioned places were visited by reporting agent on April 1 and 2, 1936 from 8:30 P.M. to approximately 3:30 A.M. No person was seen who resembled Fred Hunter and the only red or maroon 1936 buick Sedan which was noticed on the premises of the above mentioned establishments bore 1936 Michigan license plates I.-8. An examination revealed that this car is owned by william J. Scripp, 54 Tauraine Road, Grosse Point Farms, Michigan. This individual is an official of the Detroit Daily News in Detroit, Michigan.

On April 3, 1936, reporting agent and Special Agent J. D. Cunningham visited both of the above mentioned locations from 9:00 P.M. to 5:30 A.M. but no person was noticed who resembled Fred Hunter and no red 1936 Buick Sedan was noticed on the premises of either location.

An examination of the report of Special Agent R. B. Miller, Detroit, Michigan, dated 2-24-36 in the case entitled UNKNOWN SUBJECTS; MERCHANES NATIONAL BANK DUNKIRK, NEW YORK - BANK ROBBERY; NATIONAL MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT ACT; NATIONAL STOLEN PROPERTY ACT; UN-IAWFUL FLEEING TO AVOID PROSECUTION" reveals that Assistant United States Attorney, William G. Comb, Detroit, Michigan, secured information from a friend of his that Harry Bishoff alias "Lefty" Clark was presently residing in Miami, Florida. This information was to the effect that Harry Bishoff is the correct name of "Lefty" Clark and that "Lefty" Clark was undoubtedly living in Miami, Florida as Harry Bishoff. As Buffalo was the office of origin in the above mentioned case the Detroit Bureau Office was not advised as to the results of a the undeveloped lead set out to the Jacksonville, Florida Office. The Detroit Bureau Office has requested the Buffalo Bureau Office to advise concerning the results of the undeveloped lead set out in the above mentioned report. The above mentioned report reveals that "Lefty" Clark resides at the Book Cadillac Hotel when staying in Detroit, Michigan and appropriate arrangements were made during Febmary, 1936 so that the Detroit Bureau Office will be advised if and when "Lefty" Clark again registers at the Book Cadillac Hotel.

Mr. W. J. Lefler, Special Agent in Charge of the Intelligence Service of the Internal Revenue Department, Detroit, Michigan was interviewed and he advised that approximately two years ago he investigated "Lefty" Clark, Danny Sullivan, Fitzpatrick and others relative to a violation of income tax payments. Mr. Lefler stated that he has not been in close contact with these gamblers since that date but understands that Fitzpatrick is furnishing the money for Danny Sullivan's gambling operations located at the 10 Mile Road and Gratiot Avenue. Mr. Lefler advised that the gambling situation was muddled and the prominent gamblers in Detroit are interested in several different gambling establishments.

Mr. Snell, Inspector of the Vice Squad, Detroit Police Department, advised that Fitzpatrick is furnishing money to Danny Sullivan at the present time. Mr. Snell stated that Danny Sullivan owns the building located at 10 Mile Road and Gratiot Avenue but that he understands that Fitzpatrick is financing Danny Sullivan. Mr. Snell contacted a confidential informant of the Vice Squad and he latter advised that this confidential informant had advised him that "Lefty" Clark is operating a gambling establishment in Cincinnati, Ohio at the present time. No additional information could be secured concerning "Lefty" Clark's present operations in Cincinnati, Ohio.

On the night of April 6, 1936, reporting agent visited both the Chalet, formerly known as Fitzpatrick's place, and the gambling establishment operated by Danny Sullivan. All of the stick men were observed and it was learned that none of these men resembled Fred Hunter or Subjects in instant case. Observation was had on the outside of each of the above mentioned establishments but no 1956 red Buick Sedan was observed. Various other employees of both of the above mentioned establishments were observed but no person was seen resembling Fred Hunter or Subjects in instant case. Similar investigation was conducted on April 10, 1956 by Special Agent W. H. Davis and reporting agent with like results.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent J. D. Cunningham:

Special Agent E. J. Wynn telephoned from the Cleveland Office and advised that recently information had been received that Harry Campbell had been married and that possibly he was married to one Marie Taylor. This woman was at one time married to one Storman but has since been divorced. She is the daughter of John Taylor, former Sheriff of Toledo, Ohio, who is reputed to be a gambler. Marie Taylor is described as follows:

that might give information as to Marie Taylor and the possibilities of her living with or contacting Harry Compbell.

He further stated that Mr. Connelley wanted this information kept strictly confidential and that there should be no local publicity inasmuch as such action would interfer with plans they already have at Toledo, Ohio. Agent Wynn also stated that Mr. Connelley requested that the large binoculars assigned to the Detroit Office be mailed to B. M. Hirsh, 516 Hillcrest Hotel, Toledo, Ohio. He further requested that a check be made on 1936 Michigan license plates #1948. These plates were seen on a black Suick Sedan.

In reference to the above, the following investigation was conducted by Special Agent W. H. Davis:

Mrs. Marie Taylor claims to be the wife of one Russell Taylor who is presently engaged in the real estate business in Cleveland, Ohio; that she has been separated from him for some time and that her closest relative is one Catherine Berger, 5621 Broadway, Cleveland, Ohio. Mrs. Marie Taylor claims that she came to Detroit about 1950 from Chicago.

was in April of 1934, at which time, when she was interviewed at 460 Prentis Avenue, she stated that she had moved to this apartment a few days prior thereto. She refused to give any information relative to her occupation, stating that she had plenty of money to receive credit in that she had \$2,500 in a Post Office Savings Account, the number of which was \$159098, and further that she had a savings account somewhere in four figures with the Detroit Savings Bank in the name of Irene Wells, which she claims was her maiden name. A notation on the file further reflects that she stated that she had an income from a friend. Mrs. Marie Taylor gave as references one Br. Elmer Drolshagen, 10 Peterboro Street, Detroit, and one Mr Kilbourne of the National Bank of Detroit.

At the Social Hygiene Branch, Detroit Board of Health, it was ascertained by Agent Davis that there were several Marie Taylors who had been given physical examinations or treated for various ailments, but none of the Marie Taylors gave the address of 460 Prentis Avenue, Detroit. It was explained to Agent Davis that the only girls of whom the Board of Health has records are the ones arrested by the Police Department as being prostitutes or those who come in voluntarily for examination or treatment.

The records of the Postal Telegraph Company will be checked to ascertain additional information which might be of value in this case.

An examination of the records at the Identification
Bureau of the Detroit Police Department revealed approximately one handered Marie Taylors who have police records in Detroit. A thorough search was made but none of the Marie Taylors listed in the Detroit Police Department files was recorded as living at 460 Prentis Avenue, Detroit.

Special Agents W. H. Davis and W. B. Matney viewed the premises located at 460 Prentis Avenue, Detroit. It is worthwhile to note that this address is a large, old fashioned building, which has apparently been transformed into an apartment building. The location in which this building is situated is an undesirable one due to the class of people that reside in the general locality and therefore an open surveillance of this location would be difficult.

In view of the fact that the Detroit Office was advised that the above mentioned information is to be kept in strictest confidence, the Detroit Office is awaiting instructions from the Cleveland Office before conducting additional investigation at 460 Prentis Avenue.

In confirmation of my wire on this date, please be advised that 1936 Michigan license #L-948 is issued to Ernest G. Church, 211 East Pottsnatomia, Techumseh, Michigan, for a 1936 Suick Sedan, motor number 43000296. This information was obtained from the local office of the Michigan Secretary of State.

The binoculars which you mentioned in your conversation today have been mailed by Parcel Post to Special Agent B. M. Hirsh, 516 Hillcrest Hotel, Toledo, Ohio.

The premises located at 460 Prentis Avenue, has been periodically viewed by reporting agent without results.

As the Michigan Bell Telephone Company records concerning wires charged to Marie Taylor's phone number did not agree with the Western Union records, Mrs. K. Rogan, Record Clerk, Michigan Bell Telephone Company, phone Cherry 9900, was contacted and the telegrams charged to the phone number of Marie Taylor were found to be Western Union wires. Mr. Peter Wiggle, Assistant Postmaster, Detroit, Michigan, examined the Postal Savings Records in his possession and advised that Postal Savings Account #149098 is listed in the name of Irene Wells, 940 Prentis Avenue, Detroit, Michigan. It is worthwhile to note that when Marie Taylor was contacted

she advised that the bank account which she has in Detroit is listed in the name of Irens Wells. This Postal Savings Account reveals that same was opened on June 4, 1935 and during July, 1935 deposits were made which brought the total deposits up to \$2,500, which Mr. Wiggle explains is the maximum amount that can be carried in a Postal Savings Account. This account has been dorment since July, 1935- and no withdrawals have been made.

The information obtained from the Post Office records reveals that Irene Wells formerly lived at 5764 Woodward Avenue, Detroit, and at the time the account was opened gave her occupation as unemployed the According to Post Office records Irene Wells was born at Louisa, Ken- at tucky, December 25, 1905 and gave her parents names as Henderson Wells and Laura Wells. An examination of the Postal Savings account revealed that same had three fingerprints which are apparently the fingerprints of Marie Taylor alias Trene Wells. This card also revealed the signa-. ture of the purported Irene Wells. Four copies of these fingerprints and two copies of the signature of Irene Wells were secured and are being forwarded to the Cleveland Office so that they may determine definitely whether the Irene Wells living at 460 Prentis Avenue, Detroit, Michigan, is identical with the Irene Wells which their information leads them to believe may have married Harry Compbell.

Mr. J. A. McGraw, Superintendent of the Alfred Street Substation Post Office in Detroit, Michigan, was contacted and advised that he would personally attend to the mail tracings at 460 Prentis Avenue. MEMORANDUM FOR DIRECTOR, FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION TO A L.M.

Re: ALVIN KARPIS, with allases ONE

During the latter part of January, 1935, I was a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and was making an investigation in Miami, Florida. Special Agent John Hanson and others were also on this investigation. I was registered at the Alcazar Hotel. John Hanson, two or three other Agents, and I went to the Tamiamia Hotel and arrested one 'Duke' Randall and Greg Codomo. We took Duke Randall to my room at the Alcazar Hotel, Greg Codomo being taken to the room of one of the other Agents in another hotel. John Hanson and I did most of the questioning of Duke Randall at this time. After talking to him an hour or so, he admitted certain things in regard to a machine gun that had been turned over to him by Joe Adams. He also admitted several other important facts in connection with this investigation, as reflected by his statements. At no time while Mr. Randall was in the Alcazar Hotel was he threatened or abused in any manner, and no means of duress used to obtain these confessions. It is true that my room contained something like fifteen machine guns. rifles, and other equipment, they being the guns used by Agents in the action we had on January 16th at Lake Wier. Some of these Agents had been sent to Havana, Cuba, and left their guns in my room. They were left in that particular room for the reason that there was a large closet in which they could be stacked and locked securely. At different times while Randall was in the room various Agents would come in and get a machine gun in a case and carry it on an investigation, but at no time was a gun rudely displayed in his presence in order to frighten him. It could be possible that on one or more occasions the cases were opened and machine guns inspected before a man went out on his particular assignment. I do not recall just how many nights Randall stayed in my room at the hotel, but I think it was three. On several occasions while I had him in my room I asked Randall if he preferred that we file a complaint against him and send him to the Miami Jail, and each time I mentioned this to him he stated that he much preferred staying in the room with me. He was not treated very much like a prisoner while in the room except to this extent: At night I took all of his clothes, my clothes, and all the guns and everything that might be under the beds in cases and put them in the closet, locked them up, and put a safety lock in the key hole so that if Ran-

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
dall should decide to try to leave during the night he would have to leave in his underclothes. He slept on a bed next to the window, on the eighth floor I believe, and his left hand was handcuffed to the iron bed rail. This was done more for his protection than as a matter of precaution against escape on our part. After Randall had been secured to the bed and after he had fallen asleep, I, myself, hid the key to the closet and went to sleep for the rest of the night. In the mornings Randall and I would shave and take our shower, and go to breakfast together in the Alcazar Coffee Shop. He was treated more like a guest than a prisoner; and at any time he was being held in the total he could have been sent to the Miami Jail at his suggestion, except that he specifically requested that he be held at the hotel.

With reference to the interview with Joe H. Adams, Special Agent John Hanson and I first contacted him in the El Comodoro Hotel of which he is the manager, the hotel being owned by his father-in-law, a Mr. ) Knight. We made ourselves known to Mr. Adams, talked to him several minutes in his private office in the lobby of the hotel, and at his suggestion we went to a more private place to talk, a vacant apartment in the hotel. After spending most of the afternoon talking with Mr. Adams, he having denied every statement of fact with which he was confronted, Mr. John Hanson and I decided to let him rest until the next day. We also decided that due to the fact that Mr. Adams was well known at Miami, having been there a number of years and being outwardly a successful business man, and that his wife was in delicate health, we could not gain anything by putting him in jail after that first interview. We told him all these things, but did take the precaution of taking his fingerprints at that time, and told him it was for the purpose of identifying him at a later date should be be so foolish as to try to make a get-away. We also told him at that time that we were confident that after he discussed these matters with his attorneys and his father-in-law he would change his statements and tell us the truth about all of them; and we, at that time, made an appointment with him for the next morning at 10 o'clock. About 9 o'clock the following morning Mr. Joe Adams contacted us and wanted to see us immediately. We went to his hotel and he was waiting for us in the lobby and told us he had decided to tell us the truth. We suggested that we go to Mr. John Hanson's hotel; the name of which I have forgotten at this time, and discuss the different things we had gone over the evening before. When we got to Mr. Hanson's froom, Mr. Adams seemed to be in very high spirits and very much relieved that he had decided to do the right thing. We were very desirous at that time of knowing the identity of one "Cash", who, as the files will reflect, was referred to in many instances by members of the Karpis-Barker gang. Mr. Adams told us this man was Cassius McDonald, and gave us all the information he had in his possession as to who Cassius McDonald was and where he could be found at that time. At this point in the conference Mr.

Henson deemed it necessary that he inform the Bureau in regard to the identity of Cassius McDonald, and left the room. I asked Mr. Adams to give further proof that he was trying to do the right thing by himself and the Government by telling all the things he knew without being prompted and questioned. At that time he drew a \$1,000. bill from his vest pocket, telling me that it was the rest of the money that had been left at the hotel by the man he later identified by photograph as Alvin Karpis. For your information, he had denied all these allegations on the day before. In addition to this he told us verbally and made a statement regarding a machine gun that was left at the hotel by one Willie Harrison. He had also denied this statement the day before. After Mr. Adams had made these statements on this date, Mr. John Hanson contacted the United States Attorney and decided that it would not be necessary to take Adams before a Commissioner and file a complaint at that time so we released him. We talked to him on several occasions after this, the last being at the time he made his detailed sworn statement to Mr. John Hanson and major assure you that this man was not abused or mistreated in any manner; he was, on the other hand, given every consideration possible under the circumstances.

Reference is made to telephonic communication from Mr. Tamm of the Bureau on April 13, 1936, advising that the Chief of Police, Akron, Ohio, had communicated with the Bureau by long distance telephone on April 13, 1936 concerning the possible presence of subject Karpis in that city.

Investigation was conducted by Special Agent E. J. Wynn as follows:

Police Officer J. H. Layne was interviewed and he stated that about November, 1935, in the People's Drug Store, Pioneer and Goodyear Avenues, Akron, Ohio, he observed a young man purchasing bandages; that he inquired of O. C. Zimmerman, manager, as to the customer's identity, but Mr. Zimmerman did not know the individual; that on Saturday, April 11, 1936, Mr. Zimmerman advised that the customer had again called and purchased some merchandise, and that he, Zimmerman, had ascertained that the customer was employed by the A. & B. Fast Freight Company; that Officer Layne secured photographs of Karpis and exhibited them to Mr. Zimnerman and Mr. W. C. Klein, clerk, who both identified the photographs as a likeness of the customer.

Mr. O. C. Zimmerman and Mr. W. C. Klein were interviewed separately, but gave substantially the same facts, i. e., they selected the photograph of Karpis from a large group as being a likeness of the customer; they stated that this person first came to the store about November, 1935, and occasionally since, last appearing in the store on April 11, 1936.

Mr. Zimmerman advised that on one occasion he had cause to go to the A. & B. Fast Freight office and there talked with the dispatcher, one Mr. Wilson, a person he identified as the customer who resembles Karpis.

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11 MAR 24 1965

Mr. Miles Wilson, dispatcher, A. & B. Fast Freight Company was interviewed with the assistance of Officer J. H. Layne, and it was observed that he was not identical with subject Karpis. With his consent fingerprint impressions were taken of his left ring and right index fingers, compared with fingerprint impressions on I. O. #1218, which comparison positively established Mr. Wilson as being another than subject Karpis.

Chief of Police Boss had no first hand information in the matter, it appearing that Officer Layne advised the Chief of his suspicions, whereupon the Chief immediately communicated with the Bureau.

A teletype summary of the results of the investigation was furnished to the Bureau and Special Agent in Charge E. J. Connelley on April 13 and 14, 1936.

At Clarksdale, Miss.

Mr. J. W. Beck, desk clerk, Alcazar Hotel, advised that he had not noticed a woman with a big black dog, a Great Dane, and he could furnish no information relative to possible suspicious characters at the hotel on or about March 22, 1936.

Miss Flo Bruik, also desk clerk at the above hotel, furnished negative information in this respect, and it was indicated that none of the following names has registered at the hotel:

Grace Goldstein, Milton Lett, Fred Hunter, Connie Morris and Ruth Hamm.

The pocket identification booklet was displayed to Mr. Beck and Miss Bruik, including photos of Karpis and Campbell, all names and descriptive data being covered by this agent, but no identifications were effected.

Mr. Beck stated that the hotel registry was maintained by card system, rather than by book, and he produced such registrations for March 22, 1936, which are as follows:

Nicholas, Swift & Co. - Checked out 3/27/36 John Poulter, 310 North Main Street, Mt. Pleasant, Iowas - (0.K.) Rivers Braham, Lula, Miss. - Checked out 4/23/36 (0.K.) R. L. The indication O.K. besides the above names signifies that these parties are personally known to Mr. Beck as regular patrons of the hotel.

With regard to A. H. Rabin and Belle Graham, listed above, Mr. Beck advised that Rabin registered for both of these parties, as well as for one Clytee Swanner, of St. Louis, Mo., who registered on 3/23/36. It was stated that either the Graham or the Swanner woman demonstrated

cosmetics at local Woolworth's 5 and 10 Cent Store for several days.

No record is preserved at the Alcazar Hotel of incoming long distance calls, but the list for outgoing long distance calls as of March 22, 1936, is as follows:

For possible information purposes, agent made a tracing of all registrations as of March 22, 1936, as well as the above indicated registrations relative to outgoing long distance telephone calls for March 22, 1936. These tracings are being forwarded to the Bureau for possible future reference.

Mr. Beck also advised that in a great many instances, long distance telephone calls are received at the P.B.X. switchboard of the hotel, with a request that the designated party be paged in the lobby. There are also a number of pay stations located in the lobby of the hotel.

It should also be stated that the telephone number for the P.B.X. switchboard at the hotel is 860, and it is therefore believed that in-

stant call from Hot Springs, Ark. was made direct to the Alcazar Hotel, rather than an individual Al Cozar.

It was further stated that Mr. Stewart Vaughan, the regular night clerk at the Alcazar Hotel, left Clarksdale the past Sunday, April 12th, and is presently connected with the Edwards Hotel at Jackson, Miss.

Homer Childs, colored bell hop, advised that about three o'clock one afternoon, he believes a Sunday, about two or three weeks ago, three men and one woman, entered the lobby, and one of the men placed a telephone sell from the pay station booth. Childs stated that these strangers lounged in the lobby for about 15 or 20 minutes, and upon leaving, one of the men asked the bell hop directions to Route 61 North, which leads to Memphis, Tenn.

Childs also stated that he knew for a fact that these persons were driving in two automobiles, because he heard one of the mem ask another if he was driving with him, whereupon the latter replied he would drive with Mrs. - name not recalled. Childs did not see the automobiles, and he could not offer a description of the people, other than that the men were neatly dressed and large in stature.

Photographs in the pocket identification booklet were displayed to Childs, but he advised in the negative in this connection.

Mr. J. M. Hurt, manager of the local office of the Southern Bell Telephone Company, advised that he maintained a record of all long distance telephone calls, but stated that he could not furnish information relative to records of March 22, 1936, without a court order. Mr. Hurt was finally prevailed upon to ascertain whether calls had been placed from Clarksdale on March 22, 1936 for Greenville, Miss. No. 1537; New Orleans, La. No. 4590, and Hot Springs, Ark. No. 3421. Mr. Hurt later advised Agent that all records from March 15, 1936 to date are at the main office at Jackson, Miss., and will not be available at Clarksdale until April 19th or 20th. He stated that Mr. J. C. Hay is the Mississippi state manager of the telephone company, and Mr. John Skinner is the local manager, and these parties have offices in the Telephone Building, at Jackson, Miss.

Mr. Hurt requested, as a matter of protection to himself, that when contacting these parties relative to possible information, no mention be made of the fact that Mr. Hurt had conducted a search relative to specific telephone numbers, and further requested that Mr. Hurt be quoted as stating that the records for March 22, 1936, were filed at the main office at Jackson.

Mr. R. E. McGill and Mr. J. C. Carter, of the 1200 Tire Co.,

were contacted for possible information relative to a Ford coupe - gun metal color - and the marcon colored Buick sedan purported to be operated by Karpis (identity not disclosed) but no information was developed in this respect.

Mr. James Fields Day and Nite Service Station, and Mr. Charles Harlow of the Visible Service Station, were also interviewed with negative results.

The registrations of the Clarksdale Hetel, as produced by Mrs. Marie Baker, and the Traveller's Hotel, as produced by Mrs. Laura McAuley, were examined with negative results, it being indicated in both instances that the persons registered on March 22, 1936 were well known by the proprietresses of the respective hotels.

Discreet inquiries at Clarksdale failed to develop information relative to a woman with a Great Dane dog, or other persons indicated in this matter.

Replying to Bureau communication of April 10th, 1936 (7-526), in connection with the above entitled case, wherein inquiry is made as to the reason for sending to the Technical Laboratory the articles referred to in letter from this office dated April 1st, 1936 instead of having the articles processed for latent fingerprints by the Special Agents of this office, you are advised that at the time of the raid near Hot Springs, Arkansas and the discovery of this material, the agents who engaged in this raid made a careful inspection of all of the material referred to but failed to find anything which would indicate a latent fingerprint, to be dusted. It was evident to those present that the material submitted to the Technical Laboratory may have been exposed for some days and it was felt that there was little liklihood of securing latent prints from this material. In view of the importance of the matter under investigation, however, it was deemed appropriate to forward this material to the Bureau for a more expert examination in the Technical Laboratory, with the hope that the Laboratory might be able to find a print of one of the subjects in this investigation.

The comment of the Bureau relative to the packing of these articles for shipment has been noted and every care will be taken in the future when forwarding articles to the Bureau to



#### MEMORANDUM

#### Re: BREKID

Investigation in the Little Rock District disclosed that the maiden name of Grace Goldstein, an associate of Kerpis, is Jewel Laverne Grayson, from Paris, Texas, or vicinity.

On April 15, 1936, Special Agent W.L. Buchanan and I proceeded from Little Rock to Paris, Texas, stopping enroute at Hot Springs, Arkensas, where Agent Buchanan, in an undercover capacity, went to the Hatterie Hotel, a house of prostitution, operated by Grace Goldstein at Hot Springs, and learned that she was not there. I made a telephone call to this establishment, in an undercover capacity, and talked to the negro maid there, who informed me Grace Goldstein was out of town visiting some of her people and probably would be gone for an indefinite duration.

Agent Buchanan and I arrived at Paris, Texas about 9:30 P.M., on April 15, 1936, where we met Special Agent H.T. Arterberry of the Dallas Bureau Office, who is well acquainted in that part of Texas.

On the morning of April 16, 1936, Agent Arterberry checked the tax rolls of Lamar County at Paris, Texas, and found a record of Bryan Grayson & Wife, Blossom, Texas, Route #3, near Paris; and J.N./Grayson & Wife, Blossom, Texas, Route #3; also one C.S. Grayson, 51 West Washington Street. It was learned that C.S. Grayson is a cotton buyer, and it is not believed at this time he has any connection whatever with the Graysons, who are relatives of Grace Goldstein.

William Russell is the postmaster at Paris. He is an ex-hardware merchant, and presumed to be well acquainted in Paris and the outlying community. He is considered trustworthy. He was interviewed by Agent Arterberry and me, and furnished information to the effect that his office serves Leonard P. Grayson & Family, and Mrs. Maggie Grayson, Route #6, Box 263, out of Paris. Also,

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had a record of Ivan Grayson, Joe, Ola and Bill Grayson, c/c E.H. Johnson, Route #5, Box 580, out of Paris; that a Mrs. Sarah V. Grayson lives at 205 North 26th Street, Paris, (thought to be a negro) and that Mr. & Mrs. C.S. Grayson and Elizabeth receive mail at 51 West Washington Street in Paris, and that Mr. C.S. Grayson is a cotton buyer, and in 1932 moved to 17 Union Street, Selma, Alabana, and has since moved back to Paris. To the postmaster was divulged no information as to persons we were looking for or the reason for these inquiries, and no one at the post office was informed that Agents were conducting investigation concerning Karpis or any of his associates.

Agent Arterberry is acquainted with Mr. Jim Caviness, Vice-President of the First National Bank of Paris, Tekas, who is wall acquainted in the community and who is considered very reliable. Mr. Caviness was interviewed, and it was learned from him that Bryan Grayson of Route #3, Blossom, Texas, is a customer of the bank, and that Leonard Grayson is a brother of Bryan and receives mail on Route #6 out of Paris. Mr. Caviness did not know very much about the Graysons, and had no information to the effect that Bryan and Lemard Grayson have a sister living in Hot Springs, Arkansas. Mr. Caviness stated, however, that Mr. J.S. Sharp of Paris, Texas, is a large land owner in that county and President of the North Texas Cotton Growers Association, and is well acquainted in the county and owns thousands of acres of land in the communities in which Bryan and Leonard Grayson reside. Mr. Caviness stated that Mr. Sharp is absolutely reliable; that he can be trusted fully, and that any statements made by him are worthy of belief. Mr. Caviness introduced Agents to Mr. Sharp.

Mr. Sharp stated that he resides at 402 Pine Bluff Street in Paris, Texas, and that his belephone number is 929; that he knows Bryan and Leonard Grayson well; that he has farms adjoining the land cultivated by Leonard and Bryan Grayson, which properties are owned by a Mrs. Rucker; that the farming communities in which the Graysons reside are located approximately 25 miles North of Paris on the Red River, which is the dividing line between the States of Oklahomá and Texas. Mr. Sharp informed that while his family resides in Paris, he spends a great deal of

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time on his farm and has a room in the home of his overseer. Mr. Clyde Cox, and gets his meals there; that Bryan Grayson is approximately 33 years of age and resides in the Walnut Hills Section, which is a few miles from the Community in which Leonard Grayson is, and that the community in which Leonard Grayson resides is known as Slate Shoals. He said that Leonard is younger than Bryan and is probably 25 to 27 years of age, is not as solid a citizen as Bryan, and is given to the use of whiskey on occasions, and when he has an opportunity and money, runs around with women; that he frequently has business transactions with Bryan and knows Leonard, but has very little to do with him. He stated that the home of Leonard Grayson is located but a short distance from the home of Clyde Cox, where he spends much of his time when on the farm; that Leonard and Bryan have a sister whose first name is Jewel, and that she is supposed to be in business of some kind in Hot S rings, Arkansas; that he does not know this sister, has never seen her, and the meager information in his possession concerning her is hearsay. He was asked the source of his information, and stated that he had heard a discussion of the sister of these men at the dining table at the home of Clyde Cox, and that apparently from the best of his recollection, the visits the sister has made to the home of Leonard Grayson have caused considerable discussion and gossip among the people in the community - particularly the women.

Mr. Sharp stated that he had heard discussions of the nature referred to, concerning Jewel, substantially as follows:

That for the past several months she has made several visits to the home of Leonard Grayson, where until some time ago, the mother of Leonard lived; that Jewel brought with her "a new husband", but that he, Sharp, has never seen this man and described, so he says, by the others as approximately 30 years of age, 5'8", and weighing about 140 pounds, well dressed, carrying a large sum of money and bills of large denominations, which he displayed to the natives when he would get a few drinks; that he heard that until Jewel began to make her visits to Leonard's home, the latter had very little and very poor furniture in his home; that since Jewel has made these trips there five or six hundred dollars' worth of furniture has been purchased for Leonard;

that an outboard motor for a boat has been purchased and is now at Leonard's, which can be used on the lake, which comprises some three or four hundred acres, close to the community, and in which there is good fishing; that he understands that the automobile used by Grace and "her busband" is a new Buick Coupe, green color, which he believes he has in the past seen around that section but he paid very little attention thereto; that he heard that the husband of Grace Goldstein had some high-powered rifles in his car, and on occasions engaged in target shooting in that section; that on one occasion, according to his information, this husband came down to Leonard Grayson's and stated he was going on a hunting trip into Mexico and that he remained away for some time and come back by the place. He stated he did not recall hearing that Grace accompanied him on this occasion. He stated that according to the conversations he overheard, this husband of Jewel is supposed to be from Kansas City, Missouri, and made statements to the effect that he is part owner of a gambling establishment in Hot Springs, Arkanses

Mr. Sharp was asked whether he had heard the name used by this husband of Jewel's, and he said he had not. Mr. Sharp stated that he had no particular interest in the matter at the time he heard all of this conversation, which is the reason he is unable to recall more things he heard.

Mr. Sharp was asked whether he knows of any dance hall in connection with which there is a saloon anywhere in the community, and his answer was that some ten or more miles from that locality on the highway between Paris, Texas and Hugo, Oklahoma, just North of the Red River Bridge on the Oklahoma Side, is a dance hall where liquor is sold, which is known as Juarez". (It will be noted to the person who has no knowledge of Spanish, it might be assumed that Juarez would be spelled with the letter "W"). He stated he heard that the "new husband" of Jewel's, and Leonard Grayson made two or three visits to this dance hall. Mr. Sharp was asked whether he could recall that Jewel and her husband are supposed to have made prolonged visits or visits of short duration to Leonard's, and he stated it was his information they would remain there only a few days at a time.

Mr. Sharp informed me that some two or three or more months ago Jewel, using the name of her new husband, purchased at

Scarborough's Ford Agency in Paris, Texas, a new 1936 Ford Coupe, and registered it under that hams in Texas; that this car was paid for in cash, there being no trade in, and that this machine was left with Leonard Grayson, who now has it, and that it is his understanding that the husband of Grace Goldstein left instructions that the car was to be kept in excellent running condition at all times, full of gasoline and oil, well greased and the tires inflated, because that the husband of Jewel might come in at any time and wish to make a hurried trip in it.

Mr. Sharp was asked for more information concerning the history, background and other information concerning the Grayson Family. He stated that it is his understanding the Graysons were born and reared in the vicinity of Paris, Texas; that the father is dead but that the mother is living and is unknown to him, and that he understands that for a time she made her home with Leonard Grayson but that the mother and Leonard's wife were unable to agree and that the mother is now supposed to be residing with an older sister, whose name he does not know, approximately 12 miles North of DeQueen, Arkansas; that in addition to Leonard, Bryan, Jewel and the older sister near DeQueen, Arkansas, there is another boy, younger than Leonard, whose name he does not know but who is supposed to have participated in some hi-jacking of a truck near Mt. Pleasant, Texas, in the last few years, and this boy, he believes, received a suspended sentence and is now said to be working in the oil fields of Texas or Louisiana.

Mr. Sharp stated that within the past ten days he made a trip by truck from Paris to Dallas, Texas, and sold a load of hogs and that Bryan told him that he had a married sister in Dallas whom he had not seen for four or five years; that this sister had a daughter, 20 years of age, who is now a telephone operator in Dallas, and that they had recently moved from Corpus Christi to Dallas; that he does not know the name of this sister or the name of the niece, and that Bryan told him that while he (Sharp) was transacting business in Dallas that Bryan would visit this sister and that he wrote this sister's telephone number down and that Sharp stated he mis-placed it and would make further effort to find it and would furnish it to me. (This checks with further information furnished by an informant to the effect that Grace Goldstein has relatiges in Corpus Christie, one of whom was employed as a telephone operator.)

Mr. Sharp was asked whether he had observed a large, blak dog in that community or heard anything about one, and he stated he had, and believed the dog was there at the time. He stated this dog, which was a large black animal with trimmed ears and which he described was one of the largest dogs he had ever seen, was, he heard, the property of Jewel. He was asked if he had seen a marcon colored Buick in the locality, or had heard one had been there, and he stated he had not.

Mr. Sharp stated that due to the remoteness of the locality in which these people reside, and the small amount of traffic there, the presence of a strange automobile would be calculated to arouse the curiosity and suspicion of the people. I asked him if he would drive me into the locality and he stated he would.

I accompanied Mr. Sharp into the Slate Shoals Community during the afternoon of April 16, 1936. I was to pose as an associate of his in the Cotton Growers Association, who had been to Paris to transact some business with him and who was taking a ride with him during the afternoon. This community, as stated above, is approximately 25 miles North and East of Paris, Texas. and may be approached by two roads. Mr. Sharp stated that the better route is to travel the Paris-Hugo Highway for several miles and turn East. He, stated, however, that the road he travels and perhaps the one with which I would like to become acquainted, is an unimproved dirt road, and which is the road we took. The community is remote and isolated, and affords, I believe, one of the best hidecuts imagineable. There is no post office. There are no telephones. There is one storey, a commissary, which is operated by Mr. Sharp. I observed the lake mentioned by Mr. Sharp, which is rather large, and saw a family camped there. There were several negroes fishing. I passed by the house of Clyde Cox, where Mr. Sharp lives when he is in that section. I also observed the house of Leonard Grayson, which is a white, frame structure, which is within view of the house of Clyde Cox. As heretofore stated, Leonard and Bryan Grayson farm the same land, although Bryan resides several miles from Leonard. I saw the large black, Great Dane Dog, with trimmed ears, a few hundred yards from the residence of Leonard Grayson. He was playing with a couple of other dogs which appeared to be Mongrel Hounds of some description. I did not go into the house of Leonard

Grayson but got a good view of it, and there were no automobiles to be seen there. Mr. Sharp took me down to where Bryan was working in a field adjoining the road. Mr. Sharp talked to Bryan Grayson about farm work and about breeding some mares, as Mr. Sharp has a mare he wishes to breed, and from the conversation which was overheard, it appeared that Leonard and Bryan Grayson have mares they wish bred, and they were getting together on the finding of a suitable jackass in the community. During the course of this conversation, Bryan told Mr. Sharp that Leonard Grayson was out at the time in the car (meaning the Ford Coupe), searching for a jackass. Mr. Sharp introduced me to Bryan Grayson as Mr. Barnes, connected with the Cotton Growers Association in Dallas. Bryan Grayson bears a strong resemblance to the photograph which we have of Grace Goldstein, whose correct name is Jewel Laverne Grayson. We tarried not very long with Bryan Grayson, and proceeded toward the Walnut Hills Section in an effort to get a look at the home of Bryan Grayson. Some few miles from where we talked to Bryan Grayson, we met a new 1936 Ford Coupe traveling at a rather high speed, and which Mr. Sharp said was being driven by Leonard Grayson. There was only one person in the car. I did not get a good look at him. The car bore a Texas License, but the speed of the car was too great to read the figures thereon, and the dust was so thick that I could not get a view of it from the rear.

We proceeded to the Walnut Hills Section and had a flat tire in front of the residence of Bryan Grayson, and which was changed by us there. I got a good view of this house, which is located at a road intersection. There were no automobiles to be seen, and Mr. Sharp stated that Bryan Grayson owns no car. We were in front of this house approximately twenty to twenty-five minutes changing the tire. Bryan Grayson has no telephone, and Mr. Sharp says there are no modern conveniences in either Leonard or Bryan Grayson's residence. He says they are both "broke" and that Leonard is "money hungry".

Mr. Sharp and I returned to Paris, Texas. He informed me that it would be necessary for him to go to the farm about day-break on the morning of April 17, 1936, and while there he would make an effort to obtain, cautiously and discreetly, as much information as possible of the whereabouts of the Graysons, and that he would obtain the license number on the Form, and the telephone

number of the sister in Dallas, and if possible, more definite information as to the location of the older sister near DeQueen, Arkensas, with whom Mother Grayson makes her home.

Mr. Sharp was not informed of the identity of Kerpis. or the person we are seeking, but I told him we believed that Jewel Grayson was associating with a man badly wanted by the Bureau. Mr. Sharp stated he could realize at once it must be someone who is badly wanted or we would not be instituting a search for him. He stated he was satisfied not to know at this time. I informed him that the Bureau would pay \$2000.00 for information leading to the apprehension of the individual by the Bureau provided he is the person we think to be Karpis, but did not say Karpis to Mr. Sharp, and asked him if he were interested, and he stated he most assuredly is and he stated he would not do or say anything which would arouse the suspicion of the people in the community. I asked him of the possibility of putting someone into the home of one of his trusted tenants, and he stated this would not work for the reason the people would become suspicious of it immediately. He said, however, that the most feasible plan would be to have someone who was intelligent and one who could adapt himself and live on the farm as the natives in that community, bring a comping outfit, pay \$5.00 for camping space to one of the neighbors, dress as the people do, get acquainted with them, state he was catching fish to sell, get cistern drinking water from the home of Leonard Greyson, and he would then be able to observe everything in the community. He said such an individual would have to be a man who is acquainted with the habits of these people, sleep with them, eat with them, talk the same language, and that this person could not very well drive a new or fine looking automobile in that section, but should have an old helf-broken down machine of some kind and should not shave or bath frequently.

Between 11: P.M., and 12: midnight, April 16, 1936, Agent W.L. Buchanan and I drove to the dance hall where liquor is sold, known as Little Juarez, located on the highway between Paris, Texas, and Hugo, Oklahoma, which is just North of the Red River on the Oklahoma Side. This establishment is a frame, one story structure, in which there is a musical instrument operated by coin, where beer is sold. There was one person present when we got there who appeared to be the proprietor. We became rather friendly with him, drank some beer and asked him when he had the dances. He stated he had a dance on Wednesday night, another on Friday and another on Saturday; that

last Saturday night there were over 100 couples there and they had a big time. We asked him if he would get some girls for us, and he stated he would have some for us on Saturday night if we would come and would most certainly look for us. While we were there, two couples came in and bought some beer. He was asked who operated the place and he stated he does and said his name was Mack Flynn. We got on such terms with him before we left that we were calling him Mack, and promised to see him again soon.

I am attaching hereto clipping from the Miami Tribune of April 16, 1936, which relates to motions filed by attorneys representing Joseph H. Adams and Henry (Duke) Randall, referred to in my letter of April 16, 1936.

Special Agent E. J. Gebben advises me that the file in the office of the United States Attorney at Miami, contains a copy of a letter dated April 15, 1936, from Bart Riley, to Special Assistant to the Attorney General Walter L. Barlow, which is to the effect that Riley will attempt to have these motions argued during the week of April 20th, and that he has in course of preparation a plea in bar to be filed on behalf of Adams, with regard to certain Detroit testimony.

The first motion filed on April 15, 1936, is in behalf of Randall and requests that he be supplied with copies of statements signed by him, and furnished to Agents of the Bureau. The second motion is in behalf of Adams and seeks to suppress statements signed by Adams in the presence of Special Agents Hanson and McKee, and former Special Agent Jones. The gist of this motion is that the Agents secured the statements of Adams by reason of their misrepresentations, that if he signed he would be aiding the Government, and that the matter in the statements was routine business and Adams would not be arrested. The motion alleges that the statements were obtained contrary to Articles 4 and 5 of the United States Constitution; that they were obtained by inquisitorial and unjust methods; that they were not voluntarily and freely signed by Adams, and that if they set out that they were obtained voluntarily they are false. The motion further alleges that the conduct of the officers disclosed that they conspired to extort and did extort statements by fraud and deceit; that they were obtained contrary to the decision of the United States Supreme Court in the Securities Exchange Commission case, and the case of Boyd vs. U.S., 116 US 616; and that they were obtained in contravention of the rights of Adams under the Florida Constitution and in derogation of his common 'law rights.

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TO DIRECTOR 4-17-36

The third motion is in behalf of Randall and alleges that Special Agents Hanson, Dunne, Nichols, Stone and Going, and former Special Agent Metcalf failed to take him before a Commissioner, and placed him in the Alcazar Hotel where he was handcuffed to a bed and threatened with machine guns, and that he was intimidated and his signature to the statements was obtained through improper inducements. This motion also sets out the additional allegations as indicated above in the motion filed on behalf of Adams.

## Double-Cross' Cried In Karpis Aid Case

Charging that department of justice agents used threats, inhuman treatment, promises of reward and violated prisoners' common law rights in obtaining evidence that was later used against them, Joseph H. Adams and Henry Randall, two

defendants accused of harboring Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. I, in Miami in January, 1935, filed motions to suppress the cases against them in United States District court yesterday.

Adams, Miami dog track and hotel owner; Randall, E. G. Mc-Donald and N. H. Heller will be Donald and N. H. Heller will be tried on charges of harboring and concealing Karpis when he fled to Miami to elude a nation-wide search. Indictments were returned against them by a federal grand jury February 7, 1935.

Adams, in the motion, claimed he was offered immunity by Gmen if he aided in the search for Karpis. He said they told him he

men if he aided in the search for Karpis. He said they told him he needed no counsel and would not be subject to arrest, but after he had written a statement and aigned it they said, "We're sorry to do this, Joe, but we'll have to double-cross you."

He said they refused to give him a copy of his statement, and that they used the evidence given by him in the statement to obtain the indictment against him, in violation of his constitutional and common-law rights.

"They (the agents) conspired to extort, by false promises and statements, disclosures that were afterward used against him," the motion declares.

Randall accuses the G-men of failing to give him a hearing before a megistrate when he was

failing to give him a hearing before a magistrate when he was arrested. They took him to a downtown hotel, where he was handcuffed to a bed and kept for five days, he charges.

He says he was guarded with a machine gun held on the lap of one of the agents, and that he was threatened with death.

Dear Sir:

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Detective Virgil Sandefer called at this of fice on April 17th, and informed that that he and his partner, Jim Norrell, had been working in cooperation with the Atlanta Police Department on the investigation of the murder of one Edward Guyal, which occurred at Atlanta, Ga., on April 23, 1935.

Detective Sandefer stated that the Atlanta police had the bullet with which Guyal was murdered and that he and Morrell had secured definite information as to the identify of theorner of a pistol which they believe fired this bullet. Test shots were taken from this gun and compared with the fatal bullet by Officer Winn, ballistic expert of the Atlanta Police Department, and that Winn hadreached the conclusion that the test bullets and the fatal bullet were fired from the same gun.

Sandefer stated that he suggested to the Atlanta police that the bullets be forwarded to the Technical Laboratory of our Bureau at Washington for comparison, but that this suggestion did not meet with the approval of the Chief of Police or the Chief of Detectives at Atlanta because they indicated a rather unfriendly attitude towards the Bureau. In view of this, Sandefer obtained the fatal bullet and the test bullets and he and Norrell have obtained permission from Chief of Police Hollums of Birmingham, and also the authority of the Atlanta Police, to take these bullets to Washington to have them compared by the ballistic experts of the Bureau. Detective Sandefer stated, however, that there appeared to be so much jealousy in the Atlanta police, that he did not want any contact made by members of this Bureau with the Atlanta police concerning this examination and did not at this time want any communications sent to the Atlanta police, but stated that he would greatly appreciate it if the Bureau would make the comparisons when he and Norrell brought the bullets to Washington. Sandefer also stated that he believesthat he and his partner can bring the guilty party to justice and convince the jury of this if they have the testimony of a Bureau expert to supplement the testimony of the local officer, Winn, and he desires to know whether the Bureau would make this examination.

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I informed Sandefer that I felt sure that the Bureau would be glad to make the examination and I believed that the Bureau would be willing to furnish an expert to testify, if necessary, and that I would communicate with the Bureau and inform him.

Sandefer further stated that from his contacts with the Police Department of Atlanta, it appears that they have not become educated to the benefits which can be derived through cooperation with this Bureau and stated that this was particularly true of the Chief of Police and the present Chief of Detectives, but that he thought a change wouldprobably be made in the police department there and a new Chief of Detectives appointed, who, he thought, would probably be Lieutenant McCrary and that this particular detective was friendly with the Bureau and that he, Sandefer, believed if the Bureau will give them some good assistance in this particular case, thatit would result in cementing the friendship between the Atlanta Police Department and this Bureau. Sandefer frankly stated that he has been working with the Atlanta police over a considerable period of time and that he knows of his own knowledge that the Atlanta Police are very unfriendly to the Bureau.

Detective Sande er and his partner, Jim Norrell, are two of the best detectives of the Birmingham police force and have rendered this office excellent assistance. It was these two officers who turned over the machine gun and 45 cal. automatics which were identified as having some connection with the Brekid case, and I should like to be informed at the earliest possible date whether the Bureau will make this examination and will, if necessary, furnish an expert to testify. In the event the Bureau will make the examination, it would be appreciated if every possible courtesy would be shown to Detectives Sandefer and Norrell when they appear at Washington, as they both can do a lot of good for this Bureau with their contacts with outside police departments.

Report of Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brantley, Oklahoma City, 3-21-36.

With reference to the report of Special Agent T. E. DETAILS: Billings, Los Angeles, 3-12-36, Special Agent A. E. Ferland ascertained from Tom Higgins, Chief of Detectives, Kensas City, Missouri, Police Department that James Hogan, alias Patty Hogan, is known to him, inasmuch as this individual has at various times been in Kansas City, Missouri, and has been errested by the local police. The Identification Bureau, Manses City, Missouri, Police Department, shows that James Hogen, elias Patty Hogan, was errested on 9-15-29; charge fugitive from Chicago, wented for murder; no disposition given. Inquiries by Agent Farland in the vicinity of the Beltimore Hotel where Hogen was known to have spent a great deal of his time while in Kansas City reflected that Hogen is not presently in Kenses City or vicinity and it was the belief that he may now be on the Pacific Coast. A check of the city and telephone directories failed to locate either Jemes Hogen or Clarence Dullard. Chief Higgins advised that in the event he should receive any information relative to the location of Hogan he would furnish same to the Kansas City office.

On 4-3-36 a letter was received from edvising that he had recently been in Coffeyville, Kansas, and had learned that Karpis put up cash for Ace Pendleton to escape from Ardmore, Oklahoma, and that they were located in Mississippi or Louisiana; that he had talked with a boy who formerly worked for the Barkers and used to chauffeur Mrs.

\*\*Colorker around and that this boy advised him that he had talked to Pendleton and Pendleton wanted him to deliver a message some place in Mississippi. This boy promise that he would try to obtain additional information and to inform him of same.

A letter was directed to the Oklahoma City office on 4-4-36 cuesting that it be ascertained whether Ace Pendleton had escaped from Andmore, Oklahoma, and to furnish photograph and description of this individual in order that it may be determined whether he is identical with E. L. Pendleton, who formerly resided at the Beebe Apertments, Kansas City, Missouri.

Brantley, Oklahoma City, 3-21-36, regarding Joseph C. Howard, a check of the city and telephone directories of Kansas City, Missouri, and Kansas failed to locate this individual. Inquiry at the Post Office, Kansas City, Missouri, and the Post Office, Kansas City, Missouri, and the Post Office, Kansas City, Kansas, likewise produced negative results. The Kansas City, Hansas, directory does not list such an address as 1009 North 7th Street, at which place Howard, while in the U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, corresponded with Ed Bray. Investigation in the vicinity failed to locate such an address. Inquiries in the 1000 block of North 7th Street were unproductive.

At the Kanses City, Kanses, Police Department it was ascertsined that Edward Albert Brey was arrested by the Kansas City, Kanses, Police, 11-7-35 on a charge of shoplifting, sentence five days. At that time he gave his address as 415 West 11th Street, Kanses City, Missouri.

With reference to the report of Special Agent W. E. Hopton, Kanses City, 3-13-36, relative to Elmer Frazier, the writer interviewed G. M. Hethaway, who carries mail to the vicinity of 2332 Monitor Place. He advised that he does not ever recall any one by the name of Frazier having resided at this address and that one Gabrie Hurtardo, a Mexican, who is employed at a packing house in Kansas City, Missouri, has lived at 2332 Monitor Place for the past year.

A letter was received from

Edvising that an individual by the name of "shorty"

Wilkerson, age about 50, frequents the 7th Street gambling concession
and is known to be a gambler in Joplin, Missouri; that Wilkerson prior
to his coming to Joplin was in the furniture business at Webb City.

In view of the fact that additional investigation has disclosed that
"Shorty" Pinson is apparently the individual mentioned by Winona Burdett,
additional investigation with reference to Wilkerson will not be conducted,
unless it appears that he may be used as an informant.

With reference to the letter from the Oklahoma City office to the Eureau dated 3-25-36, relative to Charles Bowman, it may be stated that the directions attached to the Kansas City office copy do not coincide to the street arrangement in Joplin, Missouri. However, it appears that same probably refers to the vicinity known as the Old Kansas City Bottoms and also referred to as East Town. The writer drove on practically all the streets in this vicinity and was unable to locate the house referred to in the above reference letter.

The writer interviewed J. Pierce at the Main Post Office in Joplin, Missouri, inasmuch as he carries will in that district. He covised that there is only one party by the name of Bowman who has ever resided in his territory and that individual's name was W. W. Bowman, who resided at 316 North Mineral and lived with a woman by the name of Goldie Spell, age about 52. A photograph of Charles Bowman was exhibited to Pierce, who, upon examining same, advised it was not the same individual as W. W. Bowman. He stated, however, that W. W. Bowman has a brother and that he would attempt to ascertain this brother's name and his present location. He stated further that W. W. Bowman left the above address about a month ago and has not returned, although Goldie Spell still resides there; that this individual was a rock and concrete worker.

Earl Reed, mail cerrier, Station A, 1606 Missouri Street, Joplin, Missouri, who stated that he cerries mail to the Chitwood District and that to his knowledge no one by the name of Pinson resides in that district, but that he occasionally leaves mail in a frug store at 1402 West C Street for an individual by the name of C. H. Pinson. The Joplin City Directory for 1935 listed a Charles H. Pinson, husband of Zula G. Pinson, residence 1406 D Street, and also listed Durley F. Pinson, residence Smelter Hill, 1404 West D Street, occupation given as a telephone operator for the Deluxe Cab Company, Joplin. In all probability this is the same individual mentioned by Ed Corey, interviewed at the Missouri State Penitentiary, as reflected in the report of Special Agent W. K. Hopton, Kansas City, 4-3-36. An attempt is being made at the present time to develop an informant who can advise of the Pinsons activities and contacts.

Georg Hahler, 2515 Main Street, Joplin, Missouri, lissouri State Highway Petrolman and an individual who is considered V a very reliable officer and one who has resided in Joplin practically all of his life, upon interview, confidentially advised the writer that in the latter part of November, 1935, he received a telephone call from an informent of his to the effect that Alvin Karpis was eshort time prior that day at the gembling establishment over the House of Lords in Joplin, Missouri, and that he had overheard a conversation to the effect that Karpis would be back there later that evening; that immediately upon receiving this call Kahler attempted to get in touch with other Highway Patrolmen but was unsuccessful and as a last resort called two city detectives and the three of them took places in the immediate vicinity of the House of Lords on Main Street. Shortly after arriving there he noticed that one of the detectives left his post and did not return; that surveillance on his part that evening produced no results. Severel days later he had received information from an informant that he was playing cards with Herbert Farmer and an individual by the name of Gentry, connected with the gambling operations in Joplin, at which time Herbert Farmer made the remark that it was certainly a close call for the "Kid" the other night and he probably would have been in a bad spot if it were not for the telephone call. It was Kahler's belief that the city detective who left his post in all probability made a telephone call for the purpose of advising Karpis that they were watching for him.

Kahler advised further that an individual by the name of Carol Hardwick, who, together with Mickey Carey and one Gentry operate one of the largest gembling establishments in Joplin, same being the Silver Dollar, the gambling concessions over the House of Lords, as well as the gambling establishment in the basement of the Connor Annex; that Hardwick is closely allied with the political bosses in Joplin and holds an officer's commission in Joplin. It will be noted that Jimmy Lawson upon interview by Special Agent Farland, as reflected in the report of Special Agent W. E. Hopton, Kansas City, 4-3-36, stated that Carol Hardwick was one of the contacts of Harry Campbell.

Kehler further advised that Jimmy Gould formerly operated a night club and gembling concession in Joplin, Missouri, but at the present time he is not operating any concessions, but does frequent gambling establishments and is often seen at the 10th Street Drug Store in Joplin, Missouri. His residence is 210 Pennsylvenia Avenue, Joplin. He stated further that an individual by the name of Billy Baker is a close friend of Jimmy Gould and that Baker is proprietor of the Log City Cabins located on highway #66 between Joplin, Missouri, and Springfield, Missouri. This apparently is the place referred to by James Lawson in the above mentioned interview. Kabler advised further that Baker is known to harbor various fugitives, errong whom was Clyde Berrow; that he attempted to develop an informant at the Log City Cabins, same being e young man by the name of Paul Erwin. Kahler advised also that there are two possibilities in an attempt to devalop an informent that is close to the activities of Hardwick and he Gould and that is an individual by the name of Logan and one by the name 57d of Telberth; that Telberth would be the better of the two. Kehler was of the opinion that the individual by the mame of Talberth is probably an acquaintance of He mentioned also that information had come to him recently that Lewell Johnson was contemplating purchasing the old Shertell Club House near Southwest City, which is known as a hideout for criminals and that he had heard that Jewell is attempting to contact Harry Campbell.

Kahler suggested that an interview be had with Roscoe Smith of Southmest City, who was very well acquainted with conditions in that vicinity and also suggested that an interview be had with Dallas Gross of the Alcohol Tax Unit, Kensas City, Missouri, who was acquainted

with one Art Jackson, a former bootlegger in Joplin, Missouri, and also is acquainted with the individual Cerl Meyers calls in Kensas City, Missouri. This apparently is the same Art Jackson mentioned by James Lawson as being an acquaintance of Harry Campbell. He stated also that the Cozy Apartments on 13th and Joplin Streets, Joplin, Missouri, bears a very poor reputation and is a hangout for the underworld, which is probably the result of the fact that it is managed by Gentry, who is mentioned above.

Agent interviewed Clay Parker, former Deputy Sheriff Et Noel, Missouri, and who is the individual who apprehended Gene Johnson nea Gentry, Arkansas. Parker advised that one Ivalitchell, Sepeca, Missouri, and not Jewell Johnson is contemplating buying the old Shartell Club House near Southwest City, Missouri. Parker advised that he has not been keeping tab on Jewell Johnson in the past few months, but prior thereto he was watching her movements rather closely, inasmuch as she et various times has threatened to kill him; that his investigation revealed that she was in close touch with an individual by the name of Feemster (phonetic) who operates a tourist cabin and gasoline filling station near Gentry, Arkansas; that some time are an individual, who went by the name of W. C. Moore, purchased a tract of land near Gentry, Arkenses, and that this individual is a close associate of Feemster and Jewell Johnson. He suggested that an investigation of this may produce some information of value and in this connection stated that an individual by the name of Brogden, an ex-night watchman  $\varepsilon t$  Gentry, Arkensas, is femiliar with these individuals and would be a good person to interview.

It is noted in the report of Special Agent J. P. Lacour, Little Rock, 3-1-36, that Deputy Sheriff A. Brodgen of Benton County, Arkensas, has been interviewed relative to this matter. However, it is suggested that in future investigations in that vicinity appropriate inquiry be made concerning the identity and activities of the person mentioned by Clay Parker, namely W. C. Moore. It is noted in the above referred to report that the Little Rock office is contemplating interviewing Feemster pending a request of the Oklahoma City office and by Mr. Connelley.

On 4-7-36 Special Agent W. John McNulty telephoned the Kenses City office and advised that he had received information from Captein Howard, Missouri State Highway Patrol, Springfield, Missouri, that a Buick Sedan had stopped at the Stone City Camp between Springfield, Missouri, and Joplin, Missouri, containing several men, one of which was believed to be Alvin Karpis.

Special Agent E. L. Cochren proceeded to Stone City Camp on highway #66, about eleven miles east of Carthage, Missouri, and inter-

viewed James Morrell, proprietor. Morrell stated that he had been asleep during the afternoon when the car in question was at his camp, that his wife and son George, age 15 years, were taking care of the camp. Mrs. Morrell, upon interview, stated that her son sold ten gallons of gasoline to the individuals in the instant car; that the car was a blue Buick Sedan; that she did not know what year or model, but it looked to be new; that it had wire wheels and bore Arkansas license, the first three numerals of which were 151; that the men came to the camp about 12:30 P.M. and left about 1 P.M.; that there were six men in the car; that they all came into the lunch room where she served them; that they were pleasant and agreeable and that they had no guns as far as she could determine; that they each paid for their own meal. Mrs. Morrell described the six men as follows:

#1. Age - 23 years Complexion - light
Height - 6 feet Heir - curly
Weight - 150 pounds Eyes - brown
Puild - slender Had a worried look.
Dress - tan jacket and trousers, by re logded.

Age - 50 years

Height - 5 feet 7 inches

Weight - 200 pounds

Dress - dark gray overcoat, dark hat.

#3. Age - 27 or 28 years Build - slender
Height - 5 feet 9 inches Hair - light
Leight - 150 pounds Nice looking.
Dress - blue striped suit, bare headed.

#4. Face - red Build - medium
Dress - brown suit, care headed.
His left ear was peculiar in appearance, appeared
to be cut and shriveled.
Called "Butch" by other members of the party.

#5. Age - 30 to 35 years Complexion - dark
Height - 5 feet 11 inches Eyes - dark brown
Weight - 175 pounds Hair - dark brown
Dress - dark brown suit
Solemn looking, ate nothing, but drank beer.
(At one time while these men were eating #4 said to the rest, "Be quiet, don't talk so much.")

#6. Height - E feet 11 inches Weight - 175 pounds
Eyes - brown
Nice looking.

Mrs. Morrell advised that one of these men was called "Tiger" but she does not recall which of the six men it was.

Agent Cochren exhibited to Mrs. Morrell his Pocket Identification Order Book. She stated that the individual designated as #1 closely resembled Alvin Kerpis; that the mouth and eyes were similar, but the hair was not the same. She was unable to select any of the others in the Identification Order Book as the men in the lunch room.

George Morrell was not available for interview at the time of Agent Cochran's call, he having gone to Carthage to attend a picture show.

After leaving the lunch room the men drove in the direction of Springfield, Missouri; that they had come from the direction of Joplin, Missouri. The Morrells have owned this camp for about one year.

On 4-7-36 Missouri State Highway Patrolman George Kahler of Joplin, Missouri, advised the writer that in the early afternoon of 4-7-36 a friend of his by the name of Cordee, who is a salesman for the Hehigh Company, called him on the telephone and advised that he had just left the Stone City Tourist Camp and that he had been advised by the young man and lady at that camp, who apparently were the wife and son of the proprietor, that a new Buick Sedan, either blue or maroon in color, had stopped at that place about a half an hour prior thereto and that one of the individuals closely resembled Alvin Karpis; that the boy edvised him that while he was putting gasoline into the car he noticed that there was a machine gun and two shotguns on the floor in the back of the car, described as a sedan; that the young man and ledy seemed to be very nervous and that the lady had told him that she has seen a number of pictures of Alvin Kerpis in the peper and that one of the persons very closely resembled those photographs. Kahler advised that upon receiving this telephone call he telephoned the patrol office in Springfield and furnished them with this information; that he then drove to the Stone City Camp at which time he attempted to interview the boy, who had sold the gasoline but each time he would ask the young men a question his f: ther would interrupt and prevent him from answering it; that the proprietor told him that he was present when the men came in and that they were appearently tourists who had stopped there for something to eat and that there was nothing suspic lous about them as far as he could see. In view of the demeanor of the proprietor of the cemp Kahler edvised that he is at the present time conducting investigation to determine his identity, as well as the place from which he came. He advised that the results of his investigation would be furnished to the writer.

Northern Oklahoma and in the vicinity of Coffeyville, Kansas. Smith stated that he would be very pleased to make inquiry among his informants in an effort to locate these individuals and in the event he should receive any information of value he would immediately notify the Kansas City office. He advised further that Ida Jennings' mother resides in Joplin, Missouri, and that she married a man by the name of Moyer. Smith advised that Moyer's address could be furnished by Ed Portley, Chief of Detectives, Joplin, Missouri. He advised also that the location of Mildred Lawson could be secured from the Postmaster at Neveda, Missouri; that Naomi Smith was unknown to him, but that he had an informant at Caney, Kansas, from whom he thought perhaps he might secure information relative to her location and present activities.

The writer called on Ed Portley, Chief of Detectives, Joplin, Missouri, Police Department, and in a casual conversation with him he mentioned that Ida Jennings' mother merried a man by the name of Moyer and they resided at 902 Ohio Street, Joplin; that Ida apparently is not in Joplin at present and her present location is not known to him.

The Joplin Directory reflects that Thomas Moyer, 902 Ohio Street, his wife's name being Clydia, and his occupation shown as painter. The mail carrier on that route stated that the Moyer family is unknown to him.

lives ecross the street from PC2 Ohio Street and in all probability is acquainted with the Moyers. An attempt is being made to obtain the address of Ida Jennings through a neighbor of the Moyers.

that he is well acquainted with the father of one Talberth at Joplin, mentioned above by Patrolman Kehler, and that he had recently talked to Talberth's father at which time he stated that his son was presently in Dallas, Texas, with a group of gamblers and is expected to return on Monday night, 4-13-36, and that he would arrange a meeting between and his son on Tuesday, 4-14-36. He advised that his son is in a position to obtain pertinent information relative to the underworld in Joplin and that he felt sure that Talberth would work with him.

John M. Moss, Postmester, Neveday Missouri, was interviewed by the writer at his home, 920 Mest Cherry Street, in the night of 4-9-36. He advised that Ted Thornton and Earl Morris recently moved to Coffeyville, Kensas; that he has their address at his office and would immediately furnish same to the Kansas City office. He advised also that Mildred

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Lawson presently resides in San Francisco, California, and that he will obtain her address in the next day or two and furnish it to the Kansas City office. He mentioned that Mildred Lawson is believed to be working in some hotel in San Francisco, ina much as that is her line of work and that in the year 1933 she worked as a switchboard operator at the Colonial Hotel in Springfield, Missouri. It appears that in all probability it was through Mildred Lawson that the connection for the gang was made at the Colonial Hotel which contact was mentioned by James Lawson in the recent interview had with him. Moss suggested that one Deshner fawkins, clerk at the Colonial Hotel, Springfield, Missouri, and a very close friend of Postmaster Moss, be contacted in the event any information is desired regarding individuals at the Colonial Hotel.

On 4-13-36 a letter was received from Postmaster John M. Moss, Neveda, Missouri, advising that the present address of Ted Thornton is P. O. Box #3, South Coffeyville, Oklahoma; also that Mildred Lawson presently resides at 449 Gough Street, San Francisco, California.

On 4-7-36 Special Agent G. H. Franklin interviewed Louis "Snipe" Thornton at the County Jail, Iola, Kansas, at which time he advised that he has not heard anything of value since his confinement and that if he is released on bond or is acquitted on the present charges he will endeavor to learn something pertaining to Milton Lett. He stated that in the event he should receive any information while he is in jail he will endeavor to get word to the Kanses City Bureau office through his wife and have an Agent see him in a discreet manner. Thornton advised that Joseph C. Howard and Sam Cooper are unknoth to him. Sheriff Clarence Warren, Iola, Kansas, advised that Thornton's case will go to trial at Iola, Kansas, sometime in the latter part of April, 1936.

Doyle Follingworth, 427 South Washington Street, Wichita, Kensas, was interviewed by Special Agent B. P. Cruise on the afternoon of 4-7-36 at which time he advised that his sister, Vivian antooth, had returned home on the evening of 4-6-36, at which time she was driving the automobile that had previously been furnished to her by a Post Office Inspector and that she had been away for approximately two weeks; that Vivien hed stated to Mrs. Hollingworth that the Post Office Inspector would call for the car. He advised further that his sister, Vivian Mentooth, had told his life that she had been in the vicinity of Coffeyville, Kenses, attending dances and other forms of entertainment; that the only mention she made of Milton Lett was that she had seen him in Cherryvale, Kansas, on one occasion during her absence. It was Hollingworth's opinion, however, that she was not telling the truth and that she had not seen Milton Lett at all. He felt that she had no intention whatever of locating Milton Lett for the Post Office Inspectors, but merely led them to believe that she would in order that she could use their automobile for her own convenience.

#### UNDE VELOPED LEADS:

OblANOMA CITY OFFICE at South Coffeyville, Oblahoma, will conduct appropriate investigation to ascertain where Ted Thornton is presently residing and endeavor to ascertain whether Milton Lett might be contacting him at that place. As stated in the body of this report, he left a forwarding address at Nevada, Missouri, as P. C. Box #3, South Coffeyville, Oklahoma.

SAN FRANCISCO OFFICE at San Francisco, California, will conduct investigation to determine whether Mildred Lawson is presently residing at 449 Gough Street and also ascertain her present activities. She should be interviewed relative to contacts of Harry Cempbell, bearing in mind that her husband, James Lawson, who is presently confined in the Kansas State Reformatory, has stated that Karpis and Campbell are known to have had a contact at some hotel in Springfield, Missouri, and it was his belief that it was the Colonial Hotel, at which place Mildred Lawson worked in 1933.

KANDAS CITY OFFICE at Kansas City, Missouri, will attempt to locate and interview Ed Bray, 415 West 11th Street, relative to the present location of Joseph C. Howard. Will inquire of Chief of Detectives Tom Higgins the present location of Elmer Frezier.

At Joplin, Missouri, will interview J. Pierce at the Mair Post Office for the purpose of ascertaining whether he was able to secure any additional information relative to W. W. Bowman and the name and address of his brother.

With reference to the names set out in the report of G.C. Callam, Philadelphia, Pa. dated 3/18/36, JOHN S. MC GOVERN, 706 Walden Avenue, Buffalo, N.Y. with whom DAY has been communicating, was not contacted due to the fact that it was deemed inadvisable to communicate with him as he is unreliable. MR. MC COVERN is a former Assistant U.S. Attorney, a capable attorney, but suffering from a mental collapse which resulted in his no longer maintaining an office in Buffalo. He has been defense attorney for innumerable racketeers in the city and is one who makes the most of any opportunity to secure publicity. It is known that he would not, if he possessed any information, furnish it to any law enforcement officer, and unless specific request is made, he will, therefore, not be presently interviewed.

It was ascertained through ASST. U.S. ATTORNEY J.J. DORAN that ATTORNEY W. L. CLAY, 510 Powers Bldg., Rochester, New York, assisted in the defense of SUBJECTS DAY AND PORTER in the trial for a postal violation; that ATTORNEY CLAY bears a good reputation in Rochester, and he, therefore, will be interviewed at a subsequent date.

M. EDWARD KAYE, 1024 Liberty Bank Bldg., Buffalo, N.Y. it was ascertained bore a good reputation. He was contacted, at which time he stated that he was called upon to defend MR. DAY in connection with his trial flor a postal violation, this request having been received by MR. JAMES A. MCORE, Attorney, for whose firm he, KAYE, was working at that time. MR. KAYE brought the writer to the office of JAMES MOORE, 1906 Liberty Bank Building, and the file of DAY was examined.

It was there ascertained that an attorney known as ROGER MARCHETTI in Los Angeles had requested MR. MOORE to represent DAY. However, the file reflected that the total sum of \$300.00 was received by them from one HERMAN DOEHRING, brother-in-law, in Shovlin, Manitoba; \$125.00 of which they retained, the balance going to DAY'S wife. In view of the fact that they did not receive any additional money, they withdrew from the case. MR. KAYE stated that DAY at no time indicated his complete activities, and it was discreetly ascertained, had never mentioned the name of WILLIAM E. MEAD.

A photograph of MEAD was displayed to ATTORNEY KAYE and he stated that while he contacted some of the friends of DAY, he did not recall meeting anyone who resembled MEAD. MR. KAYE, being very willing to cooperate in every manner possible, stated that at the request of DAY, he had gone to New York City in an effort to secure some funds from friends of DAY; that at DAY'S request, he had contacted JACK DELESEY at his regtaurant in New York City in an effort to locate one JIM MC KAY and MOE BARNET, who are supposed to be confidence men and individuals who were closely associated with JACK DEMPSEY; that he contacted JACK DEMPSEY and he advised that while MC KAY and BARNET were

known to him, he had not seen them for a considerable period of time.

LR. KAYE at DAY'S request contacted one H. S. MCRGAN, also known as

STEVE/MCRGAN, at the Hotel Forest in New York City. He described
said individual as 40 years of age; 5° 5"; 180 pounds; dark complexion;
stocky build and corpulent. DAY had requested him to see MCRGAN in
order to secure funds and to have MCRGAN communicate with his, DAY'S,
friends, namely: CLAUDE/KING: TCLMY C'DELL: JIMMY KNOWLES and
STERLING REYNOLDS; that he did contact MCRGAN at the Hotel Forest
but did not secure any funds from him, and MCRGAN informed him that he
would communicate with DAY'S friends. However, they failed to render
any assistance.

MR. KAYE stated that MORGAN was unquestionably a racket man and would be in contact with all types of racketeers. He, however, was unable to state whether or not MORGAN would furnish any information. MR. KAYE, although interrogated at length, stated that he was unable to furnish any additional information concerning DAY or his associates, and thet while DAY has occasionally written to him, he has had no further business dealings with him; that in the event any information comes to him concerning DAY or his associates, or possibly, WILLIAM E. WEAD, he will gladly transmit same to the Buffalo Bureau office.

It was ascertained from ASST. U.S. ATTORNEY DORAN that in the trial of DAY AND PORTER, a police officer named JANES F. NALLY of the New York City Police Department, had been contacted by DAY. However, MR. DORAN was unable to fully explain MR. NALLY'S association with the confidence men. He did state, however, that NALLY was in communication with one MORRIS ADELSON of the Brent Hotel, New York City, ADELSON being one who dealt in "hot" securities. It is believed that NALLY might be in possession of information through ADELSON and others, as to the possible location of MEAD.

For the further information of the office of origin and the Atlanta office, it was discreetly ascertained from ASST. U.S. ATTORNEY DORAN that during the trial of DAY AND PORTER, PORTER indicated a willingness to supply information and did confidentially furnish considerable information to MR. DORAN, which subsequently led to the apprehension of other members of that particular conspiracy. MR. DORAN also stated that PORTER has a wide knowledge of the activities of all confidence man, and if appropriately interviewed, unquestionably could furnish very valuable information. However, no lead is being set out for an interview with either DAY OR PORTER, this being left to the discretion of the office of origin.

#### UNDEVELOPED LEADS

NEW YORK OFFICE through Jack Dempsey and Officer James Nelly

will secure all information which might lead to the location of Mead, having in mind the various names referred to in the body of this report as being associates of DAY, a confidence man, who is now serving a term in the Atlanta Penitentiary.

ST. PAUL OFFICE, if it has not already been done, will contact Herman Doehring in Shovlin, Manitoba, in view of the fact that as the brother-in-law of Bay, he furnished him money. It is believed that he may have knowledge as to Day's associates and possibly Mead.

BUFFALO OFFICE at Rochester, N.Y. will contact William L. Clay, 510 Powers Bldg. to ascertain what information he may possess concerning William E. Mead.

Agent telephoned Mrs. Vosburg at Long Beach, California, Telephone 443-07, and at her request arrangements were made to meet her at a designated spot in Long Beach.

Ers. Vosburg, when interviewed, advised that approximately a year ago she had been interviewed by Special Agent Findlay of this office and at that time she furnished all information in her possession regarding KATE BARKER and her sons. In this connection attention is called to the report of Special Agent J. G. Findlay, Los Angeles, California, dated February 4, 1935.

Mrs. Vosburg advised that she is only a half sister of KATE BAR-KER and that their mother is MRS. EMMA REYNOLDS, who is 87 years of age and resides at Tulsa, Oklahoma. She declined to give the address of her mother stating that she did not think it advisable for Agents to contact her. Mrs. Vosburg could not advise as to the name of Kate Barker's father nor could she state as to where Kate was born. She stated that to the best of her recollection the Reynolds' femily was living in Webb City, Missouri, at the time Kate was married to George Barker and that she, Mrs. Vosburg, was still very young at that time. After the marriage of Kate, Mrs. Vosburg and her mother moved to Tulsa, Oklahoma, and some time thereafter the Barkers also moved to Tulsa but the boys were very young at that time and Mrs. Vosburg knows very little of their activities since that time. She stated that while her mother was a good Christian woman she never insisted that her children attend church nor did she encourage them to secure educations; however, according to Mrs. Vosburg's recollection, Kate Barker had a normal childhood and was certainly not involved in any difficulty until her boys began engaging in law violations.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. EDWARDS.

Re: Brekid.

In connection with the above-entitled case there ere started with the Little Rock office certain beer bottles, milk bottles, gingerale bottles, water tumbler, and miscellaneous paper specimens, which were taken from a house near Potash Sulphur Springs between Malvern and Hot Springs, Arkansas, which is alleged to have been occupied by Karpis and his associates. This house was raided by Bureau Agents on the morning of March 30, 1936.

As the result of a fingerprint examination of the specimens submitted a total of thirty-two latent fingerprints and seven latent palmar areas was developed. Thirteen of the latent fingerprints were eliminated as those of Special Agents John C. Mertz, C. A. Mahan, and A. P. Barber. The remaining latent impressions were compared with the fingerprints of Alvin Karpis, #FBI-199217; Harry Campbell, #FBI-419856; Milton Lett, #FBI-1008739; Fred Hunter, alias Fred Henderson, #FBI-54440; and Grace Golde, #FBI-619046, but no identification was effected.

The examiner has noted that several of the latent fingerprints show indications of having been scarred in the delta and possibly the core areas. It is not possible to determine with certainty that the scars are the result of deliberate attempts at mutilation.

In view of the above it is suggested that the investigative unit compile a list of suspects in addition to the five named above and submit it to the Laboratory in order that the fingerprints of these additional persons may be compared with the unidentified latent prints.



Through Postmaster O. L. Godwin, Sebring, Florida, Agent ascertained that J. R. Cleary did not have an address in Sebring, Florida, and had not spent much time there in the past several months, however, he received his mail at Sebring, and one Morrison Coker, an employee of the local post office, who was a close friend to Cleary, had been handling his mail, and sending it to Cleary at addresses supplied frequently. Morrison Coker stated that the above facts were true and that he could not tell in advance just where Cleary might be found as he stayed in one place for only short periods of time, spending most of his time traveling and fishing. Mr. Coker then stated that last week Cleary had been in Bradenton, Florida, and had then instructed that his mail be sent to General Delivery, St. Cloud, Florida, however, he does not know that Cleary is now at that point and does not know just when Cleary will again appear in Sebring, Florida. Mr. Coker also stated that most generally Cleary can be located at the Elks Club if there is such a Club in the town where he might be temporarily located.

In view of the above situation a letter is being directed to Mr. Cleary seeking a definite appointment in order that he might be interviewed along the lines suggested in Bureau letter dated December 2, 1935.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent R. B. Donaldson at Miami, Florida:

With respect to mail tracings obtained from Jack Davenport's mail by the St. Paul Office and especially that tracing postmarked February 24, 1936, at Miami Beach with return address of the Floridian Hotel, it has not been possible to ascertain the author of such communication. This particular hotel during the winter season is generally filled to capacity, approximately 485 guests. On April 1, 1936, it will be entirely closed. Sam W. Clark, House Officer, and reported to be reliable as the average person in this vicinity stated that he was positive that no one had registered here this winter from the Twin Cities. Nearly all the guests come from New York and New Jersey and they are about 100 per cent Jewish. He permitted Agent to inspect a private list he maintains of all guests and also spent an afternoon checking long distance phone calls from the Hotel records without any results.

Clark states that a gambling room was conducted in this hotel in a quiet way by one Barney Stahlmaker, alias Stallmaker. He operates and lives at the Normandie Hotel on Miami Beach. He is reported to be well connected in gambling circles. Clark states that gamblers of all parts frequented this particular joint when in full swing. It is possible that some of this crowd could have written Davenport on the hotel stationery while actually living at some other address.

The report of Agent Zimner cited in reference requests that identity of Pearl La Holzman at the Admiral Hotel, 1020 Meridian Avenue, Mismi Beach, Florida, be ascertained. After some survey of the matter careful inquiry of the Manager of this Hotel was deemed appropriate. He is Mr. Haron Rauzin. Upon producing his records of registration it was found that this person registered here on December 11, 1935, and is still here. Her address is shown to be 425 Surf Street, Chicago, Ill., and she has been alone since coming here. She is somewhat crippled in one limb, and this is noticeable when she walks. She is reported to be of medium size and nearly 30 years old. Mr. Rauzin surmises that her folks may be engaged in the fish business judging from her mail which is generally from Chicago. Further than this he could supply no information. It is likely she will be leaving here soon as this hotel will probably close for the season.

with reference to the letter dated March 25, 1936, from the St. Paul Office, which concerns a letter addressed to Jack Davenport, and mailed at Miemi, Florida, March 20, 1936, bearing return address, T.J. 432 - 12th Avenue, N.W.", Special Agent C. B. Winstead ascertained that this address in Miemi is shown to be the residence of Esther Lipton. Through inquiry at the Miemi Police Department it was determined that there is no record of this woman and that she is unknown.

On March 29, 1936, Agent Winstead called at this address under

pretext of

versation with Esther Lipton, Agent Winstead ascertained that she has been living at this address for more than a year. However, she stated that she probably would give up the house in approximately one month unless she could rent her rooms, and that she would probably proceed to New York or New Jersey. This woman spoke of having lived in El Paso, Texas, Los Angeles, California, and various other points. It was noted by Agent Winstead that a slot machine was in one of the rooms in the house. He was advised by the Lipton woman that she had two other roomers, one man and one woman. She advised that the man was from out of town and in discussing the advantages of the room she had to rent she stated that this man does not require the use of the bath room early in the morning as he apparently has no occupation which requires him to report at work.

For possible future reference it is noted that Esther Lipton appears to be of either Jewish or French descent, about forty years old, 5' 3" in heighth, weight about 100 pounds, dark brown hair, brown eyes, thick lips, wears glasses with very thick lenses.

It was further ascertained by inquiries conducted by Agent Winstead that the individual occupying the room at the above address uses the name of E. J. Curran. He is described as being about 45 years of age, Height 5' 9", weight about 200 pounds, brown hair, wears glasses and has thick protruding lips and a double chin. Curran is not known to the Miami Police Department.

It is noted that the above described individual does not answer the description of any of the subjects of this case.

Upon receipt of teletype message from Mr. Connelley, instructing that Willie Heeney be located and kept under constant surveillance, inquiries were immediately instituted at Mismi and vicinity by Special Agent C. E. Minstead. It will be recalled that Heeney was observed by Special Agent Fitzsimons of the Jacksonville Office at a prize fight at Mismi, and on this occasion Heeney was introduced to Detective Sergeant Ed Melchen of the Mismi Police Department by one Jake Silver, known locally as "Jake the Plumber". It will also be recalled that Heeney is known on sight by Jack Warren, Chicago, Detective, who was on duty temporarily at Mismi during the past season. Agent Winstead made contact with Melchen, Warren and Detective Joe Shimon of the Washington, D. C. Police Department, to whom Heeney was also known on sight. The cooperation of these individuals was enlisted and during the period of March 26 to April 6, 1936, continuous efforts were made to locate Heeney.

Detectives Warren and Shimon were on duty at the Tropical Park Race Track daily and maintained a close watch for Heeney but advised that he was not observed by them.

Agent Winstead was advised that Jake Silver has an interest in a place known as the Arena Bar, which is located on Biscayne Blvd, about two blocks from the Alcazar Hotel, and that this spot is known to be frequented by various hoodlums. Frequent visits were paid to this place by Agent Winstead, and observations were also made at that place by Shimon, Melchen and Agent ritzsimons.

In view of the possibility that Heeney had an interest in the Miami Beach dog track, in which the Capone family is reported to be interested, observations were made from time to time at that point without results. A check was made through officials of the Racing Commission of the State of Florida, but it could not be determined that Heeney is shown to have any interest in this track. Inquiry was made by the Agent to determine the possibility that Heeney might be residing at 93 Palm Island Drive, Miami Beach, where the home of Al Capone is located. However it was determined that this house was not opened during the last season, and that the only person residing there was a caretaker. It was ascertained that Jake Silver maintains a room at the Robert Clay Hotel, but inquiry at that place failed to disclose that Heeney was staying there.

Telephonic contact was had by Sergeant Melchen with Jake Silver during the course of this investigation, at which time Melchen inquired of Silver concerning a book issued by one Mills", which contains instructions as to the proper adjustments for slot machines. This inquiry was made on the theory that the Police Department desired to properly test slot machines in connection with a new Miami City Ordinance. At that time Silver advised Mr. Melchen that he might be able to obtain such a book from Marty Guilfoyle, but that if unsuccessful, "Heeney is leaving Saturday, (April 4) for Chicago, and I will get him to send me one of the books and give it to you". Reservations by both train and plane, from Miami to Chicago and Hot Springs, Ark., were checked on April 4 and 6, 1936, without developing any information indicating that Heeney was leaving by such means. It should be noted that during the course of this investigation rumors were heard to the effect that Heeney had departed or was departing for Chicago, Hot Springs or Detroit, but none of these rumors could be substantiated.

With reference to Marty Guilfoyle, it should be noted that this individual is reported to be a former Chicago Hoodlum, now in control of the slot machine racket in Miami and vicinity. Guilfoyle has recently been designated by the Director of Public Safety at Miami, as Public Enemy No. 1 in that City. However, it was determined that Guilfoyle was not known to the members of the Miami Police Department. It was ascertained that Guilfoyle's residence is shown in the City Directory to be 2469 Collins Avenue, Miami Beach, which place is located next to the Surfside Hotel, and in close proximity to the Wofford Hotel, mentioned in the report of Special Agent in Charge Connelley dated March 26, 1936. Observations were made at the Collins Avenue address

but it appears that the house was closed although the garage contained an old model Cadillac Sedan, with 1936 Illinois license 946,649. At a subsequent date observations at this house revealed that a man, a woman and two children were in the house. However, their identities were not definitely established. No telephone is listed at the Guilfoyle residence and a check at the Surfside Hotel disclosed no information concerning Heeney. Observations were made from time to time at the Miami Beach Golf Course, and Detective Warren observed the players at this course on occasions with field glasses, but Heeney was not seen.

On April 6, 1936, Sergeant Melchen was again advised by Jake Silver that Heeney was proceeding to Chicago on that night's train. However, the passengers boarding this train at Liami were observed by Special Agent Fitzsimons and Heeney was not among them.

Numerous other inquiries were made in an effort to locate Heeney, but no definite information was obtained. As stated, various rumors as to his departure from Miami were heard. Detective Warren advised Agent Winstead that during the course of his stay in Miami he observed Heeney at the Miami Beach dog track on only one occasion. In view of the fact that the racing season is over at Miami, it appears unlikely that Heeney is remaining in that City, and it is believed that he has probably returned to his home in Chicago.

It should be noted that the available photograph of Heeney is reported by those who have seen him, not to be a good likeness. However, Agent Winstead was advised that he has a very noticeable trait in that while seated he jerks his head from time to time as if from some nervous disorder.

Immediately upon receipt of copy of letter from Mr. Connelley, deted at Little Hock April 2, 1936, informing that Buick Sedan, Motor No. 63052198, Serial No. 2895972, is reported to be in the possession of Karpis, a stop notice was placed with the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles at Tallahassee, Floride, in order that the Jacksonville Office may be immediately notified should any information be obtained concerning this car.

## UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE CHICAGO OFFICE is requested to endeavor to locate willie Heeney, who is reported to reside at the Northwest corner of 16th Street and Austin Elvd., Cicero, Ill. Attention is

called to the fact that by teletype dated March 25, 1936, Mr. Connelley instructed that Heeney should be kept under constant surveillance to determine the identity of persons contacting him.

THE JACKSONVILLE OFFICE at Miami, Florida, will continue efforts to determine whether Willie Heeney is still in that vicinity.

Interview will be had with Joe Cleary if his whereabouts can be determined and general investigation will be conducted in an effort to develop information as to the whereabouts of the fugitive subjects.

Reference is made to the telephone call made by Mr. McIntire of the Bureau to the Oklahoma City Office on April 14, 1936, concerning a letter addressed to the Bureau by Mrs. R. L. Hammett of Holdenville, Oklahome, dated April 10, 1936, concerning a conversation overheard by her at Claremore, Oklahoma, which, it was believed, might have some bearing on the reported activities of Sam Coker and Milton Lett at Claremore, Oklahoma on April 4, 1936 es reflected in the teletype message to the Bureau from this office dated April 8, 1936.

Mrs. R. L. Hammett, 805 North Hinkley Street, Holdenville, Oklahoma was interviewed by Special Agent R. N. Butterworth and stated that on Saturday night "about three or four weeks ago", apparently March 21st or 28th, 1936, she drove to Claremore, Oklahoma with her husband, where they parked their car in front of the Will Rogers Hotel and she lay down in the front seat while her husband transacted some business; that just before 11:00 P. M., two men came to the car parked to the left of their's, and she heard one of the men say "If Bill Plippen does not quit letting Karpis hang around, he will get in trouble with the Federals." Mrs. Hammett states that she was too frightened to raise up and look at the men and only did so after they had driven away in their car end she observed only that it was a black automobile. She ascertained from her brother-in-law, James Hammett of Claremore, Oklahoma, that Bill Plippen bears a bad reputation as a bootlegger and gambler in Claremore and owns a ranch of several hundred acres on the Verdigris River near Claremore, where he maintained a club house protected by several gates, making it impossible for a stranger to approach the club house unobserved.

Special Agent Paul Hansen advises that he is acquainted with the name of Bill Plippen as an underworld character in Claremore. Agent Hansen has been in contact with Post Office Inspector George Hill of Tulsa, Oklahoma, who advises that he is now positive that Sam Coker and Milton Lett were in Claremore, Oklahoma on April 4, 1936 as reported by his taxi driver informant, based upon Hill's further contacts with this informant who continues to say

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that Lett was with Coker and Coker called his companion "Lett".

Inspector Hill further advises Agent Hansen that Tom Dean, a former police officer of Claremore, Oklahoma, approached this informant's employer in Claremore and advised him that the informant was hauling Coker around Claremore and to endeavor to find out where the informant had taken Coker and his companion on the night that they left Claremore (April 4, 1936). The informant denied to his employer that he had hauled Coker and was advised by his employer that under the circumstances, he could no longer work for him and discharged him. This employer of Hill's informant is Bill Flippin (apparently the Bill Plippen previously referred to), who with Jack Miller, (a participant in the robbery of the Okemah National Bank and the First National Bank at Okemah, Oklahoma, who was granted immunity for his testimony for the Government, and believed to still be of value to the Oklahova City Office as an informent on activities in the vicinity of Claremore, Oklahoma), and Chicken Smart, Claremore gambler and outlaw, seemed to be in some sort of combination together with the Chief of Police at Claremore, in running the town. One Ray Parks is believed to be connected with these men and is reported by Hill to be an enemy of Coker's. This combination has apparently conceived the idea that Hill's informant was hauling Coker around in order to give him an opportunity to kill Parks. The taxi driver is denying all these reports and Hill is endesvoring to get his job back for him, which is most necessary in order that he can maintain his contact with Coker.

Further information from the informant, reported by Hill, is that the informant is positive that Coker will return to Claremore within thirty days; that Coker told the informant that "they" plan to pull a big bank job in Arkansas between May 4th and 15th, 1933, after which Coker wants to come to the informant's home, alone, "for a coupled days". The informant believes that Coker will arrive in Claremore on the same morning train from Arkansas on which he arrived on April 4th, and in the event any bank job is pulled in Arkansas around the dates mentioned the informant plans to meet the train.

Hill further states that as he was driving his informant around, they passed the Claremore airport, whereupon the informant stated "That reminds me of another thing, Sam said 'We've lost our pilot', and he wanted to know if I could get another pilot for them". Coker seemed to want someone who was familiar with the Claremore airport as a pilot, but did not decide on anyone. The informant reports that while he was in Coker's hotel room in Nowata, Oklahoma, sometime ago, or in his hotel room in the Will Rogers Hotel on the last visit, Hill is not sure which, the informant reports to have seen a lot of money in Coker's bag, most of it being in twenty dollar bills and apparantly new. The informant described some of this money as being in long sheets of several bills to a sheet. This currency could either be counterfeit or new uncut currency, taken in some bank robbery.

It is requested that the bank robbery files of the Bureau be checked to determine whether there are any unsolved bank robberies being investigated by the Bureau in which new and uncut currency has been taken.

Agent Hansen is continuing discreet efforts to determine the activities and connections of Bill Flippin in and around Claremore, Oklahoma.




