Reference is made to report of Special Agent
E. J. Wynn dated at Cleveland, Ohio, 4-22-36 in the above entitled
case, which indicates on page six that Sergeant Mack of the Ohio
State Highway Patrol intimated that he had checked the license
number on one of the Bureau cars.

I wish to advise that Special Agent E. D. Harris
of this office was recently at Columbus, Ohio, at which time a visit
was made to Mr. E. M. Huber, Auditor of the Bureau of Motor
Vehicles, who personally keeps the records pertaining to licenses
issued to this Bureau. Mr. Huber advised that it would be impossible
for anyone to secure information concerning these license plates,
except from him, personally. An inquiry had been made of Mr. Huber
through the State Police concerning one license plate issued to the
Cincinnati Office, which license number was erroneously reported
on an automobile involved in an accident and Mr. Huber contacted
this office before furnishing the State Police with information,
in this instance. He advised that there has been no other instance
where the State Police have requested information on license plates
issued to this Bureau, and stated that even though such further
requests should be received, he would first advise the Bureau
office concerned of the request, before furnishing any information.

During regular neighborhood patrol when I met McTaggart who has a watch adjoining mine we were comparing notes & talking when Herb Akers & Charley Sellers came down Violet St. & got into a car parked on Quapaw in front of W O Creasons House. He called me to his car & told me that he had been watching the house known as the Judge Davis home for 4 nights & that Karpis was supposed to be therein that I was not to throw any torch light around the house or into cars nearby or investigate anything around there that Karpis had never left town & for us to keep the matter quiet & say nothing to anybody whatsoever, but give him, Akers all the information I had or gathered as to what transpired at Judge Davis house. I later went to Police Hdq. Hot Springs & requested Akers to let me see their photos & identification papers on Karpis & he refused to give it to me saying he would have some more & later dope in a few days. He stated Karpis was driving a Packard Car. If you see anything that don't look right you call me. That same night about 10:30 PM a large car drove into the garage of the Judge Davis home, he turned on the light as he got into the garage to see how to take out 2 large & heavy suit cases; He got them out the car, switched off the light & took the cases into the house. I saw 3 or 4 men through the windows welcome this man. I left and went to the residence of Major Green, who is on duty at Army & Navy Hospital & called Akers. He said all right & that was all. Later on, 30 minutes, the men all left in a car that had been parked in front of the house. Nothing else of interest transpired up to 3: A.M. next morning when I went off duty. Akers informed (when I asked for Picture) me that that man I saw had left town the next night. I told him about the crowd leaving 30 minutes after I had called him & he said nothing except that he would have some more dope.

There is a car with Illinois license number - - - that is still at the house & which comes & goes at intervals. I am suspicious of the whole matter & make this statement of my free will & accord as I am employed by the Residents of this neighborhood & I don't want any battle start in my district which might endanger them. The folks whom are the tenants of the Judge Davis house are going under the name of Robinson & the place is still occupied being lighted late at night. I see a servant taking care of a little girl & a lady & some times a man, all playing a game of cards at times. The number of this house is either 207 or 209 Violet St. the 1st house on left hand side going up from Quapaw there is an alley from Fern St to Violet St which goes past the garage. The place in rear is open with a hedge fence no wiring, around the garden or house plot of the Davis home.

He reported a man arriving in a car at garage the Judge Davis house & taking 2 heavy suit cases into the house. After which a party started. Major Green states that he had chipped in \$1.50 per mo to Lynch as payment as private watchman. That he thinks he talks too much but otherwise seemed OK.

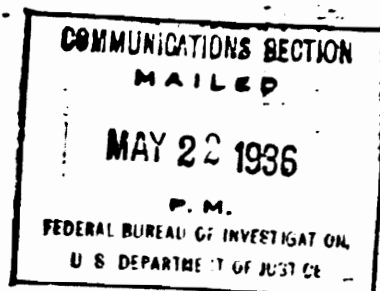

Dear Sir:

Special Agents L. F. Malone and W. John McNulty arrived at Oklahoma City to-day at 9:55 A. M. with Sam Coker. They were met at the train by agents of this office, and Coker was immediately brought to the Bureau office here. Coker was questioned further, but without results. He repeatedly stated that he knew nothing, and had no information to give.

Agents McNulty and Malone delivered to this office money and personal property belonging to Sam Coker, which is itemized on a receipt given by this office to Agents McNulty and Malone, a copy of which receipt is attached hereto for the Bureau's file.

The officials at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, had requested that Coker be placed in the County Jail at Oklahoma City, where they would take custody of him. Coker was taken from this office, and locked up in the County Jail in this city. Deputy Warden J. F. Dunn took custody of Coker at the County Jail in Oklahoma City on this date. Mr. Dunn was given the cash and other property belonging to Coker, for which Mr. Dunn executed a receipt, a copy of which is also attached hereto for the Bureau's file.

You are further advised that Special Agents V. I. Parry and M. W. Acers were withdrawn from the house at 805 S. Rockford Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma on May 8, 1936, where they had been maintaining a surveillance on the house occupied by the parents of Harry Campbell.

THE FEDERAL WAY.

THERE is another big lesson for the country.

In general and for State law enforcement in particular, we think, in the highly efficient, clean-cut, non-fumbling way J. Edgar Hoover and his federal G-men dealt with Alvin Karpis under the federal kidnaper law.

No games of tag with justice across State lines. No jurisdictional tangles. Nothing to halt the swift conveyance of Karpis from New Orleans to the custody of the federal authorities in St. Paul.

No \$1,000-a-day costs, as in the case of getting "Lucky" Luciano back from Hot Springs, Ark., to New York County.

No local clumsiness or unseemly publicity stunts, as when the late John Dillinger was photographed in the encircling arm of a smirking prosecuting attorney at the Crown Point, Ind., jail, from which the desperado shortly after escaped.

No nonsense of any sort.

When Mr. Hoover points to politicians and their hand-picked appointees as the bane of law enforcement, when he says, "Politics itself is Public Enemy No. 1," he obviously has in mind what too often happens in State criminal jurisdictions. There's sharp meaning and contrast in his statement:—

"Federal Department of Justice agents capture more than 5,000 persons annually charged with various federal violations. It is difficult to rate them. To us they are all 'rats.'"

Why not give the people of these United States even greater benefits from this cold, quick, non-political federal efficiency in dealing with criminals who become public enemies?

For example, why not extend federal law to bring into federal jurisdiction any man convicted anywhere of three major felonies who is fleeing across State lines to escape trial for a fourth?

That would be a speedier remedy than getting slow-moving States to adopt uniform extradition laws. Far speedier than cutting what Mr. Hoover describes as "the links of the underworld to politics and at times to law enforcement officials."

Few States at the present time can afford to despise federal aid and federal expertness of the kind shown in more captures than that of Karpis. Certainly not this State.

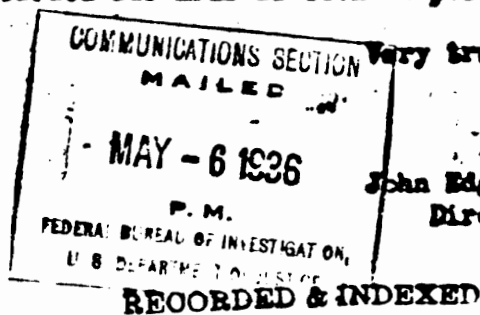

I telephoned Mr. Connelley at Cleveland and inquired the name of the person reported as going to New Orleans from the United States Attorney's office at Cleveland according to a newspaper story which Mr. Connelley had previously informed me of. Mr. Connelley stated that it was Assistant United States Attorney Wiedemann and that the story also reported a man named Hettrick and a man named Cordray as having accompanied Mr. Wiedemann. Mr. Connelley stated that he had a short while ago verified the fact that Hettrick had not left the city but that he had not been able to locate Mr. Wiedemann. I stated that Mr. Freed, the United States Attorney, had denied to Mr. Keenan having sent anyone to New Orleans; that Mr. Keenan had asked Mr. Freed to stay out of any controversy and that the matter was one to be handled by the Department of Justice. Mr. Connelley stated that he had talked with Mr. Inge at New Orleans and was advised that someone had called the New Orleans Office asking for Mr. Cordray but that there was no indication of Mr. Wiedemann being there. I asked Mr. Connelley to check the matter.

I asked Mr. Connelley if he had forwarded the memorandum concerning the cooperation of the Post Office authorities. Mr. Connelley stated that it was being prepared but that it would be forwarded air mail as soon as possible.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON
MR. QUINN

I would like to have immediate steps taken to survey our field offices in order to determine whether those offices which are located in Federal Buildings have the necessary facilities available to effect the degree of efficiency necessary for the proper handling of our work.

I recall that we have had correspondence with our Salt Lake City Office relative to its inability to obtain elevator service in the Post Office Building, and I noted at New Orleans when I was there that we did not have elevator service in the Federal Building after 4:30 p.m. In New Orleans we were located on the sixth floor and obviously it was inconvenient to take prisoners up and down stairways, which were blocked with photographers and newspaper men. It also incurred a hazard because it is entirely possible that associates of Karpis might easily have mingled with the crowd which would have resulted either in gunfire or the possible escape of Karpis.

At St. Paul we have already noted that it is impossible to carry on a telephone conversation in that office without it being heard in the hallway. In both the New Orleans and St. Paul Offices there were no detention rooms. I want steps to be taken at Salt Lake City, St. Paul and New Orleans at once so as to locate these offices in privately owned buildings where we can have the proper kind of service and the proper accommodations. If there are any other of our offices which cannot have the proper service, which are located in Federal Buildings, steps should be taken at once to remove them from.

In connection with the Boston situation, appropriate consideration should be given to moving out of the Federal Building at once due to the leak which occurred there relative to the gun training of our Agents at Boston.

The above matters are most important and I do not want any delay or procrastination in the handling of the same.

So Green Almost, But Not Quite, Assists in Capture of
Notorious Harry Campbell Here.

WASHINGTON, May 8 (UP)—Revealing that arrest are imminent in the "Cleveland area" as a result of the "harboring of the Karpis-Campbell-Barker gang" by persons accepted as respectable in their communities, J. Edgar Hoover, head of the G-men, today put Washington on its toes for expected sensational disclosures.

He intimated no persons who have aided the fugitives captured in yesterday's G-man's field day would escape.

He revealed that Karpis, taken May 1, and Harry Campbell, taken yesterday at Toledo, escaped months ago only because they had been aided by "crooked Cleveland politicians with police connections."

Washington accepted his statements as an indication that the next field of operations for the G-men will be the shadowy zone that is known to connect criminals and politicians and officeholders.

Meanwhile, the criminals who have harassed the nation for more than three years were reduced to one fugitive of major importance, Thomas Robinson, the kidnaper of Mrs. Alice Stoll of Louisville.

Driving home with some friends at the moment when J. Edgar Hoover assembled his G-men outside the apartment at 2132 Monroe Street in which Campbell and his wife were nabbed. "Gee, those guys have got ma-

chine guns. It looks like a stick-up," one of his companions said to Green.

The detective circled around, stopped his car and walked up to investigate. He halted when one of the men carrying a machine gun wheeled around and aimed the weapon at him.

"We're federal agents. Scram," he barked at Green. "Well, I'm a city detective. Can I be of any help to you?" Green answered.

Another of the agents came up to him. Green believes that this was Hoover himself. "We're grateful to you for your offer," he said courteously, "but we've got everything all lined up. We're all set. We really don't need your help and I think it would be better for you to go."

Green went. It was not until he awakened yesterday afternoon that he learned whom the G-men were after in the raid.

And it was not until he made a report on his experience still later in the afternoon, that heads of the Police Department learned by how little they missed being represented in the raid.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

I contacted SAC Connelley at Chicago and told him you desire him to get in touch with the Agents who have been working with him in the vicinity of Toledo and obtain from them statements today of all incidents of which they have knowledge which would indicate a corrupt or disorganized or otherwise undesirable situation in the Toledo Police Department. I mentioned to him the incident mentioned to you about the Police Captain having a lot of money in a savings account, etc., and Mr. Connelley said this Captain is at Cleveland instead of Toledo, and that he is being given hearings on the matter at this time. I also mentioned to Mr. Connelley you heard the Agents had to interview certain of the police officers at their homes because the officers couldn't be contacted at the police station for fear there would be advance information given to the underworld. I told Mr. Connelley that any other information on this subject should be furnished in these memoranda.

I told Mr. Connelley you also desire a memorandum of all available information concerning the activities of Sheriff O'Reilly in connection with Campbell — any indications of guilty knowledge on his part, and any other information which is available concerning O'Reilly.

Re: Alvin Karpis.

SAC Fletcher telephoned from Little Rock and advised that he had received a call from Mr. Brantley who stated that Agent Frank Smith had received a telegram from "Dutch" Akers stating "Believe I have located look box of parties you were looking for here - would bear an investigation". Mr. Fletcher stated he went to Hot Springs and Akers stated he referred to Grace Goldstein and Connie Morris who had been seen going into the Arkansas National Bank and that he, Akers thought that one of them had a look box there. Mr. Fletcher stated he told Akers the Bureau had this information and that no action would be taken unless Mr. Hoover so wished; that Akers became very unpleasant and was told that the Bureau was capable of picking up people without any assistance from him; that Akers then became profane and made derogatory remarks about the Director. Mr. Fletcher stated he told Akers he would transmit his message to Mr. Hoover; that he also told Mayor McLaughlin of the incident; that on his return to Little Rock Akers called and apologized, stating he lost his temper because he had just read in the Tulsa papers that the Hot Springs Police Department was blamed for the escape of subjects at Malvern, Arkansas. Mr. Fletcher stated he had told Joe Wakelin who stated to come to him when assistance was needed. Mr. Fletcher further stated that in the meantime the United States Commissioner had telephoned and stated that Wakelin had spent the night with Grace Goldstein at the house at Malvern on the night before the raid. I told Mr. Fletcher to find out from the Commissioner where he obtained the information.

In accordance with the above request I am attaching hereto memorandum submitted by Special Agent D. P. Sullivan of this office, setting out the results of a review of the Chicago file.

A memorandum which was submitted by the same agent on May 9, 1936 and forwarded to the Bureau, contains additional information concerning these matters.

MEMORANDUM FOR SPECIAL AGENT IN CHARGE
E. J. CONNELLEY:

PERSONAL & CONFIDENTIAL

The Chicago Bureau office file has been reviewed and the following additional information indicating connections between hoodlums, especially members of the Barker-Karpis gang, and law enforcement authorities at Cleveland, Ohio, as well as Toledo, Ohio, has been obtained and is set forth in the following memorandum. It may be mentioned that the memorandum of the writer dated May 8, 1936 which was forwarded to the Bureau by letter the same date, sets out information concerning the connections, especially with the Barker-Karpis gang, and hoodlums with law enforcement officials at Toledo, Ohio. In accordance with Bureau instructions the following memorandum is broader and likewise includes information in the file concerning the corruption of law enforcement authorities at Cleveland and Toledo, Ohio.

Reference has been made on several occasions to the incident occurring on September 5, 1934 following the arrest of Gladys Sawyer, Paula Harmon and Wynona Burdette by the Cleveland Police Department. Early the following morning, September 6, 1934, the male members of the Barker-Karpis gang left Cleveland, Ohio. There is an indication that the gang was tipped off by the Police Department in some manner. In this connection reference is made to the report of Special Agent E. J. Wynn, Cleveland, Ohio, dated February 13, 1936 where on Page 18, paragraph 3, is set out the following information: "Inspector Frank Story of the Cleveland Police Department has been cooperating closely with the Cleveland office in this matter, and recently advised Special Agent C. E. Smith and this Agent that he had determined that a member of the police department, now deceased, made a call to the Harvard Club at the time of the aforementioned arrest of these women, it being Story's opinion that possibly this was an innocent call, inasmuch as the officer was of the opinion that the women were associated with some gambler employed at the Harvard Club. He further advised that the information was that on the following morning, Captain Potts, then captain of detectives, also called the Harvard Club with reference to the arrest of the women, but that he, Story, could not learn definitely the circumstances under which Potts called, or just what he said during the conversation."

This information is borne out by the opinion of Frank J. Noonan head of the Frank J. Noonan Detective Agency, Cleveland, Ohio who indicated to Special Agent R. D. Brown that he had information that a "tip" had come from the headquarters of the Detective Bureau in Cleveland. In speaking of Noonan, the following is quoted from the memorandum of Special Agent R. D. Brown to Special Agent in Charge J. P. MacFarland dated December 11, 1935 where in paragraph 2, on page 3, in speaking of this conversation the following is quoted: " - - - he stated he is satisfied the 'tip' came from the headquarters of the detective bureau in Cleveland. However, he did not give the writer any indication as to the identity of the person who gave this tip".

The circumstances under which Alvin Karpis and other members of the gang left Cleveland on the morning of September 6, 1934 indicate that members of the Barker-Karpis gang had some information of the arrest of Wynona Burdette, Paula Harmon and Gladys Sawyer. The following is quoted from the signed statement of Delores Delaney set out in the last paragraph on Page 15 in the report of Special Agent J. L. Madala, dated February 6, 1936: "On or about September 5, 1934 Alvin and I went to bed about 9:00 P.M. Willie Harrison, who had been living with us, left Cleveland, Ohio, with some of his clothes four or five days previous. I do not know where he went. At about 11:00 P.M., while Alvin and I were in bed, Harry Campbell, Fred Barker and Doc Barker came to the house. Alvin went to the door to let them in. At this time Fred told Alvin that Wynona Burdette, Gladys Sawyer, Paula Harmon and I had been arrested, and Alvin stated that I was not arrested, that I was in bed. Freddie then told Alvin that Wynona, Gladys, and Paula were arrested at the Cleveland Hotel for causing some sort of a disturbance. Alvin thereupon told me to get dressed and go into the living room and maintain a lookout. Harry Campbell and Doc Barker laid down to get some sleep while Fred and Alvin talked privately, none of which conversation I overheard. About an hour or so later Alvin and Fred went out and returned about 45 minutes later stating that there were cops and squad cars all around Fred's house. I was still maintaining a watch when I observed at about 4:30 A.M. two police squad cars drive slowly by the house, and it appeared that they were watching our place. They apparently drove up the block some distance and returned again driving slowly by the house. I immediately called to Alvin and told him of what I had seen. He then instructed me to start packing the things that we would absolutely need and to forget about the rest. I started to pack and about fifteen minutes later Alvin awakened Freddie, Doc and Harry and we departed at about shortly before 5:00 A.M. in three automobiles. Alvin and I drove away in our Pontiac coupe."

At any rate the house at 4419 West 171st Street, which Alvin Karpis and Delores Delaney occupied, was not raided until 5:00 A.M., Sept. 6, 1934 by a squad under Lieutenant Kirk Gloeckner.

In connection with the investigation conducted with reference to the Harvard Club an effort to identify Arthur W. Heberbrand and James "Shimmy" Patton as being contacts for members of the Barker-Karpis gang, information was incidentally obtained which indicated that these individuals had strong connections with the law enforcement officials at Cleveland, Ohio. In this connection mention may be made that Frank J. Noonan owner of the Detective Agency bearing his name, is likewise connected with the Heberbrand and Patton, and is reported to be retained by these men in connection with their gambling interests at Cleveland. Mention is made of the activities of Frank J. Noonan at Cleveland, Ohio in a letter signed "XYZ" and is apparently written by a member of the Cleveland Police Department to Mr. J. M. McGrath owner of a detective agency at Cleveland, which is quoted on Page 20 of the report of Special Agent E. J. Wynn, Cleveland, Ohio, dated February 13, 1936. Particular attention is directed to paragraph 2 of this letter which makes reference to a Rabshaw who apparently was formerly a member of the Cleveland Police Department, and the following is quoted: "Rabshaw is telling the race track people that if they do not employ Noonan Sheriff Hanratty will not let them race. The reason of this is that Rabshaw and Noonan and Joe Ball are going 50-50 on the profits. If the race tracks open watch these fellows work together". Paragraph 4 of the same letter is herewith quoted: "You can use this letter for whatever it is worth. Only last week Rabshaw and Noonan were at the Hollenden Hotel in a conference with Ed Stronge and his bunch making arrangements to protect Thistledown. If you want to know any further about Rabshaw ask Emmett Potts, Inspector Cody, Andy Hagan or John Toner".

Information obtained from a telephone tap maintained on the telephone of Arthur Heberbrand, 3909 West 158th Street, Cleveland, Ohio, telephone Clearwater 0717 from February 6, 1936 to March 5, 1936, resulted in the information that Arthur Heberbrand was actively engaged in making plans to open a new gambling joint following the closing of his old gambling establishment called the Harvard Club in January, 1936; that as a result Heberbrand and Patton decided to open a gambling joint at 42nd Street and Harvard Avenue, Newburg Heights, which location is situated approximately four blocks from the old Harvard Club; that this new location was opened on approximately February 14th, 1936 but Heberbrand and Patton remained in the background.

The above information is contained in the report of Special Agent E. J. Wynn, Cleveland, Ohio, dated March 24, 1936, on page two. The first paragraph on page 3 of this report is quoted herewith: "Preliminary to opening the new location, the telephone conversations indicated definitely the fact that certain officials were being 'fixed', namely, the mayor of Newburg Heights, Jerry Sticha, and the village marshal, Frank Ptak. The latter, in a conversation with Art Hebebrand threatened to forestall the opening of the club unless his demands were met. However, several meetings were arranged between Art Hebebrand, Shimmy Patton, the mayor and the marshal and things were worked out satisfactorily."

Referring to the raid made by local authorities on the Harvard Club, Cleveland, Ohio, in January of 1936, Mr. W. G. Harper, Operative in Charge, U. S. Secret Service, Treasury Department, Cleveland, Ohio, was interviewed by Special Agent E. J. Dowd on February 24, 1936. Mr. Harper had the following to say concerning the above raid on the Harvard Club, which information is contained on page 13 of the report of Special Agent E. J. Wynn, Cleveland, Ohio, dated March 24, 1936; "Mr. Harper stated that Hebebrand, who has never been known to have welched on a gambling debt, is said to be a 'gentleman' gambler; that James 'Shimmy' Patton is an entirely different type, being hard boiled and not considered a friend of anyone; that when the Harvard Club was closed by the local authorities, information is that the raid was so planned so as to give Elliot Ness, recently appointed Safety Director of Cleveland, a political build-up".

With reference to the above mentioned raid which was conducted by the County Prosecutor's office on or about January 10, 1936, newspaper clippings from the Cleveland Press dated January 11, 1936 forwarded to the Chicago Bureau office by the Cleveland office giving details of the raid on the Harvard Club mentioned that John Sulzman, Sheriff of Cuyahoga County took no part in the raid, but the raid was conducted by the office of the County Prosecutor, who enlisted the cooperation and aid of 25 private detectives, and armed with search warrants endeavored to serve said warrants at the Harvard Club. However, they were met with forcible resistance by "Shimmy" Patton, who threatened to "mow down" the raiding party with machine guns, and held them at bay for six hours, during which time all the gambling equipment at the Harvard Club was moved away by trucks. It was finally necessary for the Safety Director of Cleveland to proceed to the Harvard Club, located just outside the city limits, with a party of policemen, to gain entrance to the club. This action was necessary because the Sheriff when called by the Prosecutor's raiding party for aid, refused to send assistance, even though his office was

notified that the prosecutor's raiding party had been threatened with machine guns. It is evident that the proprietors of the Harvard Club were closely connected with politicians and those in power in Cleveland Ohio.

The following is quoted from the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Cleveland, Ohio dated June 1, 1935, page 4, which sets forth interview had with [REDACTED]

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[REDACTED] questioned as to close associates of Heberbrandt, Patton and the Mitchells. He stated that a gambler known as "Smoke" Sharkey, who also acts as a guard at the Harvard Club, appears to be a personal bodyguard of Art Heberbrandt; that this man is a former prize fighter, and resides somewhere near West 98th Street and Madison Avenue. He indicated that Sharkey is the outside contact for Heberbrandt and makes the necessary arrangements to meet the various politicians in Cleveland and vicinity who permit this gambling house to operate. [REDACTED] a detective whose name he believes to be Noonan, is a very good friend of both Heberbrandt and Patton. He advised that during the past three or four weeks Noonan has made frequent trips to the club at night and confers with both Art and "Shimmy".

Tony Amerabush, formerly an employee of the Harvard Club and reported to have been a bodyguard for Patton and Heberbrandt [REDACTED] is probably the "pay off" man for Heberbrandt and Patton in graft collected by officials in Cleveland, Ohio.

Reference is made to letter from the Cleveland office to the Cincinnati office dated January 14, 1936, wherein mention is made that Tony Amerabush is one of the outstanding gangsters of Cleveland, Ohio and is very active around the Harvard Club, and once killed a Police officer at Toledo, Ohio for which offense he was sent to the State penitentiary. The following is quoted from paragraph 2, page 1, of the above mentioned letter:

"The confidential informant has been recently interviewed with reference to Tony and he advised that Tony is very close to Art Heberbrandt and Shimmy Patton and undoubtedly has acted as payoff man for them in so far as various officials are concerned, and that he is a gangster of the strong-armed type and has been out of the penitentiary about three years, it being the confidential informant's understanding that he was sentenced to the penitentiary for having killed a police officer at Toledo".

William J. Mitchell of the real estate firm bearing his name is likewise reported to have had an interest in the Harvard Club. In this connection it may be mentioned that Alvin Karpis and Dolores Delaney rented two residences at Cleveland, Ohio during the time they resided there in the summer of 1934. During the time they resided at 18109 Flamingo Avenue they apparently were visited by C. N. Mitchell, a relative of William J. Mitchell. Reference is here made to report of Special Agent D. E. Hall, Detroit, Michigan dated April 9, 1935, which sets out interview had with Mrs. M. A. Dunn, 18113 Flamingo, who was questioned concerning the residence of Alvin Karpis and Dolores Delaney at 18109 Flamingo. The following is quoted from this conversation: "She further advised that she had seen on several occasions Mr. C. N. Mitchell talking to this couple; that C. N. Mitchell resided at 18105 Flamingo, which is the first house on the same side of the street east and adjacent to the residence at 18109 Flamingo". Investigation to date has been unsuccessful in definitely showing that the houses rented by Karpis were rented from the Mitchell real estate firm, due to the hoodlum connections of this firm, but it is significant that Mitchell is reported to be financially interested in the Harvard Club.

It has been previously mentioned that Frank J. Noonan of the Frank J. Noonan Detective Agency was retained by the Harvard Club when Alvin Karpis and Dolores Delaney vacated their residence at 3973 West 140th Street early on the morning of September 6, 1934, after the arrest of Gladys Sawyer, Wynona Burdette and Paula Harmon by the Cleveland Police Department. Pay envelopes of the Frank J. Noonan Detective Agency were found at this address, and a Bureau abstract of the criminal record number 30222 of Charles Carroll which was obtained by Frank J. Noonan through the Sheriff's office at Chardon, Ohio was found at 4419 West 171st Street, Cleveland, Ohio, which premises were occupied by Paula Harmon, Fred Barker, Gladys and Harry Sawyer. See report of Special Agent D. E. Hall, Detroit, Michigan dated December 21, 1934. Dolores Delaney has stated that Alvin Karpis carried with him during the time he was at Cleveland, a commission card bearing his picture, from the Frank J. Noonan Detective Agency. Noonan has been interviewed on numerous occasions but has denied any personal acquaintanceship with Alvin Karpis.

Concerning the situation at Toledo, Ohio, this town has been notorious as a place of refuge for badly wanted criminals for several years. Reference is here made to the report of Special Agent D. E. Hall, Detroit, Michigan April 9, 1935, page 27, wherein interview is set out with Benny Hastings, 429 French Street, business address Coffee Shop Restaurant, Adrian, Michigan. The following is quoted:

(C

"He left there over a year ago, but has kept in very close touch with crime conditions in Toledo. He was not acquainted with any of the subjects in this case, but he advised the writer that Ted and Bert Angus were known in the underworld largely as men who hide criminals who are "hot" and went to cool off there, and are reported to have taken care of a lot of them. He stated it was generally their practice to place such individuals in private residences in Toledo, or to take them to Middle Island located in Canadian Waters on Lake Erie; that some two years ago Ted Angus used the residence of a sweetheart, Mrs. Addie Baystrom, located on Reed Road about one and one half miles south-west of Hillsdale, Michigan".

It appears from the file that the Angus Brothers have been notorious in Toledo for some years. Reference is here made to the report of Special Agent D. E. Hall, Detroit, Michigan dated September 25, 1934, and particularly page 4, which sets out interview with Detective R. L. Peters at his residence 1801 Monroe Street, Toledo, Ohio. Peters therein gives information obtained from one Ben Wise, an informant. The following is quoted:

CC's
"Wise however, told him that Theodore Angus was a notorious hoodlum and was one who would not hesitate to harbor anyone for sufficient remuneration.-----Wise further informed Peters that during the prohibition era Ted Angus was the Toledo agent of the Capone gang or syndicate, and had the franchise to sell liquor for that gang or syndicate; further that Ted Angus has a third brother whose name is not known who is in Chicago at the present time. This brother is a member of the Capone gang, still believed to be connected with the remains of that gang and residing in Chicago".

Concerning Middle Island, investigation has resulted in the information that this island formerly was operated for a time by the Angus brothers. One Guy Tibbles is reported to be part owner of this island. Concerning Tibbles, the following is noted from page 6 of the report of Special Agent R. D. Brown, Cleveland, Ohio dated July 27, 1935:

"The report of Mr. Reems' investigators further advised that Edith Barry and Theodore Angus are good friends; that the telephone number of Edith Barry's 524 Southard Avenue address is Adams 4612. The report also states that Ted Angus is friendly with one Guy Tibbles an ex-police sergeant of Toledo, who is a wholesale bootlegger residing, during the summer months on Kelly's Island, near Marblehead, Ohio; that Tibbles has speed boats and spends considerable time at Danbury, Sandusky, Port Clinton, Put in Bay, Pelee Island, Huron, Lorain, and

and Catawba, and has a home at Catawba Cliffs; also that he entertains the Angus brothers and others at Kelly's Island; that Tibbles is a known abetter of fugitives both from Canada and the United States. The report further shows that Ted Angus is a known bank robber, ~~Kence~~, etc.; that he was recently apprehended in Indiana with the loot from a Michigan bank robbery; that he paid off and the case never came to trial".

Joe Roscoe, who operates the Dutch Village Inn, and the 42nd Street Cafe at Toledo, Ohio is likewise reported to have an interest in Middle Island. This man is reported to control gambling operations at Toledo, Ohio, and also is reported to have connections with Heberbrandt and Patton at Cleveland, Ohio.

Investigation in this case has resulted in information, particularly in regard to Captain Timeney, more than other Police officers, probably because he is closely connected with Ted and Bert Angus. Captain Charles Hennessey of Toledo, Ohio, residence 4109 Kingsbury Ave. provided the following information, contained in paragraph 4, page 5, of the report of Special Agent D. E. Hall, Detroit, Michigan, September 25, 1934:

Quoting Captain Hennessey: "He could supply no further information concerning Ted Angus or other people in connection with this case, but did advise that he had heard rumors and had ascertained from confidential sources that Captain George Timeney was an almost nightly visitor at the Casino Club operated by Ted Angus, and is supposed to have an interest therein; that they were inseparable friends".

Mention was made in the memorandum of Special Agent D. P. Sullivan submitted on May 9, 1936 bearing on the connection between members of the Karpis Barker gang and the law enforcement authorities at Toledo, Ohio, that Art Langdorff of the Toledo Police Department was reported to be an officer who was not honest and reliable. A tap placed on the telephone of the Casino Club in January 1935, resulted in the following information concerning Art Langendale. Langendale is undoubtedly identical with Langdorff. This information is set out on page 22 of the report of Special Agent D. E. Hall, Detroit, Michigan, February 25, 1935:

"On February 3, at 8 P.M. a call was received by Bert Angus at the Casino Club, the caller evidently being Art Langendale (phonetic spelling). Art asked Bert if Flo or Chloe was there. Bert answered

that they were and wanted to know if Art wished to speak to them. Flo then talked to Art and stated that she was eating dinner, and doing a little drinking. Art then asked Flo "Who do you have with you, Fitzgerald?". Flo laughed and stated "You know damn well I don't have Fitz with me". Art answered, "Well, we'll drop around in a little while. Will you be there?" Flo stated, "I am leaving right after dinner and won't be there. It's too bad Fitz picked on the girl he did". Art then asked her "Who do you mean?" Flo answered and said "You know who I mean. You've had her out riding". Art then asked "Do you mean the black haired girl?" Flo said "Yes". "She asked him, (Fitz) for \$100.00 to have a party. Then he offered my sister \$10.00 and of course, she refused". Art then said "he (Fitz) must be getting good in his old age. Where are you going after you leave the club?" Flo stated that she was going home right after dinner as she had baked a cake and had quite a bit of stuff to eat at home. Art then said "I will call you within an hour at your home and maybe will drop around. You know we were supposed to have dinner last night. Have whiskey sour in my drinking". Flo said she would."

The Fitzgerald mentioned is thought to be identical with Charles J. Fitzgerald. The black haired girl apparently has reference to Helen Ferguson, a Bureau informant.

A memorandum submitted by the writer and forwarded to the Bureau on May 9, 1936, contains additional information concerning the connection of hoodlums with the law enforcement authorities at Toledo, Ohio, and the corrupt condition of the police department in that city. There is little information in the Chicago office file regarding the events transpiring in the Cleveland office district in the past two weeks. It is assumed that information pertinent to the subject of this memorandum bearing on the recent arrest of Harry Campbell and Sam Coker at Toledo, Ohio will be covered in a separate memorandum submitted by the Cleveland office.

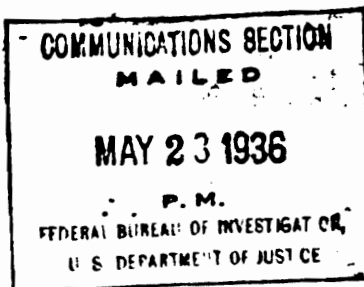

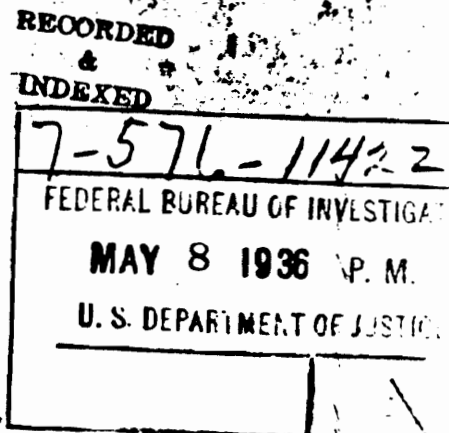
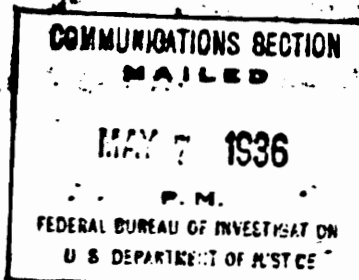
Mr. Keenan telephoned and stated he had wired District Attorney Freed at Cleveland to advise if Assistant District Attorney Wiedemann had gone to New Orleans or elsewhere on the Karpis case and had received an answer to the effect that Wiedemann had not left the city nor would any one do so in connection with the Karpis case. I told Mr. Keenan I would send him the article that appeared in the Cleveland papers; that I thought his action in warning them at Cleveland would help us dispose of the case.

I stated that Hunter was held on bond at New Orleans and that the U. S. Attorney is writing to the Department for instructions; that I thought it would be better to proceed with the harboring charges at New Orleans inasmuch as Hunter will undoubtedly plead guilty, and to then release him to the Postal authorities if desired. Mr. Keenan agreed stating that the U. S. Attorney at New Orleans had received a request from U. S. Attorney Freed at Cleveland; that the former had been advised the Department would issue instructions in due time.

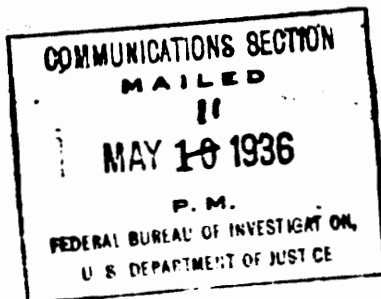

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. Tamm

Re: Alvin Karpis.

Mr. Connelley telephoned from Cleveland and stated that he had checked on the story that Wiedemann had gone to New Orleans; that Wiedemann is in the city today although he was away yesterday; that Wiedemann stated that he was not out of town. I told Mr. Connelley to forward the clipping on the story to me. Mr. Connelley stated that he has located Hetrick and Conroy in Toledo working on the case with their own men. Mr. Connelley further stated that the Post Office men were going to interview a man named Roscoe and an ex-sheriff named Taylor whose daughter was supposed to have married Campbell. Mr. Connelley stated that he has ascertained that this is not the right party; that they asked Mr. Connelley if they could go ahead with this and he told them that it was all right.

I inquired if Mr. MacFarland had been successful in getting a story in the Cleveland papers and Mr. Connelley stated that he has not seen the stories although Mr. MacFarland talked to a press representative. I advised Mr. Connelley of the story in the Washington papers this morning relative to the obstruction of our work by the Post Office Inspectors and the information received by the Bureau from the Post Office Department. I further stated that at the end of the story I was supposed to have been interviewed relative to the tip-off to the Bureau by the Post Office Department and that I was quoted as saying that there is not a scintilla of foundation to it; that we received no information from the Post Office Department and that I was quoted as saying further that as a matter of fact we had not received their cooperation. I told Mr. Connelley that

Mr. Nathan I was preparing a memorandum to the Attorney General from his, Mr. Connelley's
Mr. Tolson letter and told him of other steps I had taken in connection with the lack of
Mr. Baughman cooperation by the Post Office Department. Mr. Connelley stated that Hetrick
Chief Clerk was quite frightened and would not do anything today without calling the Bureau

Mr. Coffey that Hall has been sent over to contact Coker who knows Campbell. I told Mr.

I told Mr. Connelley that I hoped the women would not talk; as I had publicly indicated there was no tip given and no reward paid. I stated the Bureau should always protect the informant. Mr. Connelley stated he would talk to her in a couple of weeks when she returns to the Little Rock district.

Mr. Connelley informed that they have arraigned Hunter in New Orleans and when they finish talking with him tonight, they will place him in a federal jail there. I told Mr. Connelley to have SAC Magee hold Hunter incommunicado. Mr. Connelley stated that the Post Office Inspectors wanted to talk with Hunter but that Hunter would not talk with them because they arrested his father. I told Mr. Connelley to tell Agent Buchanan that no one should be allowed to talk with Hunter unless he, Buchanan or one of the Agents were present at the interview. I advised Mr. Connelley that Hunter should not be interviewed by anyone other than the Post Office Inspectors. I further stated that Buchanan or the Agent representing the Bureau should not interrupt the Post Office Inspectors while they are questioning Hunter; that we can question afterwards if it is desired. I told Mr. Connelley to instruct Buchanan to let no state or local authorities interview Hunter and to advise the Superintendent of the prison that such orders have come from headquarters. I stated that Hunter should be kept in the hands of the Bureau until we can get a conviction or plea from him. I stated that Agent Buchanan should remain in New Orleans until this matter is cleared up.

Mr. Connelley stated that he had talked to the St. Paul office and that they advised him that Karpis is not talking much and that he is very careful but he says so that he will not involve anyone; that he has given enough to convict himself in the Hane and Bremer cases. I asked Connelley if Karpis is going to plead guilty or stand trial. Mr. Connelley stated that Karpis will not plead guilty except to one charge and in that case the other charge will have to be dismissed. I told Connelley to call Mr. Stein and tell him to get hold of the U. S. Attorney and turn the case over to him and to

ascertain what the U. S. Attorney wants to do; that if he wants to bring his trial, it should be done immediately; if the U. S. Attorney wants to talk to Karpis and get him to plead, that is up to him. I told Connelley that we will not make any deal with Karpis. I told Connelley to have Karpis held incommunicado; that he should be placed in a private cell and not allowed near Byron Bolton.

Mr. Connelley stated that they had picked up in Chicago, Charles Long, an associate of Elmer Heade, the man who had changed his fingerprints. Mr. Connelley stated that Long and Heade were in on the Wunderlich "shake-up"; the Chicago Police have \$200 reward out for Long and know he is in the custody of the Bureau. Mr. Connelley stated that Long made a proposition that if he was turned loose he would turn in Heade. I told Mr. Connelley that it would not be possible for us to release Long on that basis because he is a fugitive from justice and such an action would subject us to great criticism. I stated that if Long won't talk that he should be turned over to the local



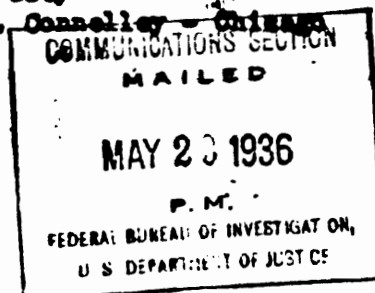

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

On May 8th Mr. Stanley Carroll dropped by the office and stated that he had just talked with Mr. Ambrose in Mr. Farley's office and had been advised by Mr. Ambrose that if an investigation was made to determine the status of the recent allegation to the effect that the Post Office Inspectors had not cooperated with the FBI, the Post Office Department would "blow us clean out of the water." Mr. Ambrose stated that he was then going to see Mr. Farley in an effort to have him issue a statement concerning this entire matter.

I told Mr. Carroll that we had nothing to worry about in this connection and that the facts as he first heard them were true; that we had received no cooperation and that as a matter of fact every obstacle was placed in our way in an effort to frustrate the apprehension of both Karpis and Campbell.

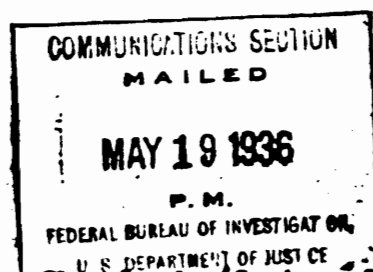

MEMORANDUM

Charles O. Long was apprehended by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on May 5, 1936, at Chicago, Illinois, at which time he was questioned to determine whether he had violated a Federal Statute over which this Bureau had jurisdiction. Long will be turned over to the authorities of the State of Illinois by whom he is wanted on a charge of receiving stolen property and bail bond forfeiture. His criminal career as reflected by his first arrest began on July 30, 1917, at which time he was taken into custody by the Police Department at Omaha, Nebraska, on a charge of vagrancy and pandering. He was fined \$10.00 and costs and released the following day.

Long is 45 years of age, is of medium stature and dark complexioned. His criminal activities in recent years have been directed to the pursuit of swindling innocent persons through the so-called "confidence game" racket. He has associated himself with numerous well known racketeers who have preyed upon innocent persons and fleeced their victims by the use of the "get rich quick" sales talk.

Long has moved about the country maintaining residences at strategic points. He has also maintained brokerage offices which are used to give him the necessary front for his illegal business operations.

Noting his criminal career as reflected by arrests supported by fingerprints on file in the Identification Division of this Bureau, it is observed that he has been engaged in robbery, has been arrested for vagrancy and pandering and is presently wanted by the Illinois authorities for receiving stolen property and bail bond forfeiture. He has engaged in the "confidence game" racket in Palm Beach, Florida, in Peoria, Illinois and Sacramento, California. These arrests are an index of the partial extent of his criminal activities. A copy of the complete criminal record of Charles O. Long as reflected by the files of the Identification Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, is attached hereto together with his photograph.

Reference is made to my letter of May 5, 1936 concerning the "leak" in the post office building by which information concerning the departure of Bureau agents for target practice was made known to the newspapers resulting in a news story that this office was engaged in a hunt for Alvin Karpis.

Post Office Inspector Cronin, who is still engaged in the investigation of this case, advises that his confidential informant has still been unable to locate the source of information. This is also true of the informant previously contacted by this office. Inspector Cronin further advises that the list of employees he has obtained as stated in my letter of May 1st is not of much value because of the large number thereof, being some twenty.

For the Bureau's information the possibility in this case is also being considered that the information furnished the press may have come from some source other than the Post Office Department. The basement under this building consists of a semi-circular driveway in which deliveries not only of mail but of all heavy goods to anyone in the building by any outside corporation are made. The basement is also used for the parking of the cars of various Federal employees and for the van of the United States Marshal. There is no way of determining which outside vehicles or persons were present in the basement at the time of the departure of the Bureau agents for target practice.

It may be further noted that the agents in this office have always departed for target practice from the basement of the Federal Building previously and of course were seen by postal employees. This is the only time, however, that any information ever reached the press concerning such departure. It would therefore appear that the likelihood of this information coming from some outside source is strengthened. Nevertheless, the investigation will be continued.

Confirming my telephone conversation with you last night you are advised that on the morning of May 6th, 1936, I received a long distance telephone call from Special Agent in Charge Dwight Brantley, at which time Mr. Brantley advised that Agent Frank Smith of his office, who was presently ill, had just received a telegram from Herbert Akers, Chief of Detectives, Hot Springs, Arkansas, to the effect that he, Akers, had located a lock box of the parties which Agent Smith had been looking for and that Akers considered this information might bear investigation. Mr. Brantley informed me that he had talked with Agent Smith, who did not have any definite knowledge of discussing the location of any lock box with Akers.

In accordance with previous instructions issued by you it had been my purpose to frequently contact Akers and other persons at Hot Springs in order that I might be fully conversant with the situation at that point and be informed immediately upon the return of Grace Goldstein, therefore, this telegram to Agent

Smith afforded me a further opportunity of approaching Akers regarding his activities in connection with the investigation of the case entitled - ALVIN KARPIS, with aliases - FUGITIVE, I. O. #1218; ET AL, EDWARD GEORGE BREMER - VICTIM; KIDNAPING; HARBORING OF FUGITIVES; OBSTRUCTION OF JUSTICE; NATIONAL FIREARMS ACT, I therefore, proceeded to Hot Springs for that purpose.

Upon my arrival at Hot Springs I proceeded immediately to the police department with Special Agent B. L. Demron of this office, as I felt that I might, in view of Akers' character and reputation, need a witness in the event anything might occur. Akers was found in the alley-way outside of the police department, as was also Joe Wakelin, Chief of Police, Lieutenant Cecil Brock, in charge of the Bureau of Identification and other members of the police force, who were unknown to me. I took Akers to one side and informed him of the receipt by Agent Smith of his telegram and Akers advised me that it was his information that both Grace Goldstein and Connie Morris had been seen on numerous occasions going into the Arkansas National Bank and that he thought one or the other of these women had a lock box there and that we should take some steps to look into this box. I informed Akers we appreciated the information but that we had already known this for a considerable time and that no action was being taken by this office in the absence of instructions from you; that in view of the fact I had received no instructions from you to pick up anyone in connection with this case, I wanted it made perfectly

clear to him that he should not pick up Grace Goldstein, Connie Morris, or any other person, with the view in mind that he was aiding this Bureau in any manner. Akers then in boisterous tones asked me whether it was not our purpose to arrest Grace Goldstein and I informed him that I did not know what your wishes were in the matter, but that as I had stated to him before, I would take no action in the absence of instructions from you. Akers then replied that he felt if we did not pick up Grace Goldstein that we might as well release Karpis. I then said to Akers, in the presence of Joe Wakelin, the Chief of Police, and the others above mentioned, that you would not tolerate his picking up Grace Goldstein, Connie Morris, or even his Chief of Police Joe Wakelin, for this Bureau; that I felt you were perfectly capable of picking these parties up if you cared to do so without any help from him or anyone else, which had been done in the case of Karpis. Then Akers in most vulgar and obscene language informed me that he would pick up anyone he liked and in effect said that you would have nothing to do with who he picked up, the exact wording being so obscene that I am unable to repeat it in this communication. Akers seemed inclined to carry on this argument, but I informed him that it had never been my purpose to engage in any argument with him and that the only action I intended taking, and that to be done immediately upon my return to Little Rock, was that I would communicate with you by telephone and inform you of his exact message to you. At this point Akers indicated to me that in the future he did not intend to cooperate with this Bureau, at which time I informed him that if his cooperation in the future was no better than it had been in the past, our loss would probably not be very great.

Before leaving Hot Springs I called upon Leo P. McLaughlin, the Mayor of Hot Springs and informed him of the message that Akers had asked that I transmit to you and told Mr. McLaughlin that the purpose of my visit to him was in order that he should be fully informed as to the actions of Akers and the fact that his statements were made in the presence of the Chief of Police, who did not make any comment whatever or attempt to reprimand Akers; that inasmuch as Akers worked directly under him I felt that he was entitled to know just what had passed between us.

Mayor McLaughlin informed me that it was his belief the reason Akers acted as he did was that he lost his temper, being already angry over the thought that Grace Goldstein could have furnished him information as to the whereabouts of Karpis and Fred Hunter and that she failed to do so, thereby making Akers lose his chance of collecting the reward in this case. Mr. McLaughlin stated that he wanted to at all times cooperate with this Bureau and that he would personally see that all of his officers cooperated fully and that in the event they did not, he personally would conduct any investigation desired by this office. I might say here that I am not any more favorably impressed with Leo McLaughlin than I am with Akers and the Bureau probably shares this view, having been previously advised as to the character of this individual.

McLaughlin seemed to be of the opinion that it was Akers' purpose to harass Grace Goldstein as much as possible upon her return to Hot Springs merely for the reason that he was angry with her. I informed McLaughlin

that neither I nor the Bureau had any interest whatever in Grace Goldstein, Connie Morris, or any other Hot Springs prostitute and that we would do nothing whatever to protect any of them and that if they had cases against them locally they could, of course, cause their arrest, but that I did not feel that Grace Goldstein or anyone else should be made to suffer by reason of any personal feeling that Akers had against me or the Director of this Bureau.

Upon my return to the Little Rock Office I was informed by Miss Dorothy Nease, the Chief Clerk, that an attempt had been made by Herbert Akers to reach me by telephone and that he had asked Miss Nease to have me see him again before I left Hot Springs in the event I should call the office and that otherwise I should communicate with him by telephone immediately upon my return, as it was important that I do so.

As stated to you in my telephone conversation, I did talk with Akers, at which time he informed me that he was truly sorry of what had occurred in Hot Springs and that the only excuse he had to offer was that he had just read in a Tulsa newspaper an article which placed the blame on the Hot Springs Police Department for the escape of Karpis and Hunter, at the time of the raid on the Woodcock house near Malvern, Arkansas, by agents of this Bureau. He asked that I not inform you of the message he had sent you and that the matter be allowed to drop. He informed me that it was always his purpose to

cooperate with this Bureau and its agents and that he has always done so; that he did not want me to feel that he had any personal feeling against me whatever; that he only wished to be afforded the opportunity of continuing his contacts with agents of this office and the writer personally and that he would show us that he was sincere in his regrets over the occurrence yesterday afternoon. Akers informed me that he was at that time preparing a letter to you offering his apology and that he would send the letter over to me in order that I might have the information as to its contents before it was mailed to you. I now have this letter before me and I am sending it to you under obscene cover, in view of the fact that Akers has included in this letter the exact language he used towards you during our conversation. I am keeping no record of this letter at the Little Rock Office, as I feel that the expression used by Akers is too vulgar for anyone else to ever read.

Akers in transmitting the above referred to letter, wrote me a letter also, the original of which is being forwarded to you and I am retaining a copy of this letter in our files in the Little Rock Office.


It is my opinion that Akers did not place the telephone call to this office or have in mind writing his letter of apology until after I had seen Mayor McLaughlin and I am firmly convinced it was due to instructions received by him from McLaughlin that prompted

There are transmitted under separate cover the following articles taken from Harry Campbell at Toledo, Ohio, on May 7, 1936:

One (1) Colt Automatic, Government Model, No. 162893;

Seven (7) .45 caliber automatic clips - empty.

The secret number on the .45 automatic was found to correspond with the number stamped on the frame.

One of the above mentioned clips, and a box of .45 automatic cartridges manufactured by the Western Cartridge Company were found in the trailer belonging to Harry Campbell at the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Billeter, who resides on Kopernic Avenue, Toledo, Ohio. At the time this clip was found it was loaded with six .45 caliber automatic cartridges.

The Cleveland office is retaining in its files the thirty-three (33) loose .45 automatic cartridges and the box of Western .45 automatic cartridges, which were the property of Harry Campbell.

The Bureau is requested to make a laboratory examination of the instant .45 caliber automatic pistol and a comparison should be made of the test bullets fired from this gun with the evidence bullets on file at the Bureau.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: CAMPBELL PICTURES

At this time I called Mr. Stein regarding the wire from the St. Paul Pioneer Press and Dispatch, requesting that pictures of Campbell be released. Mr. Stein advised that photographs had been taken of Campbell and that the St. Paul Pioneer Press and Dispatch had requested some pictures from the St. Paul Office before wiring their request to Washington. I advised Mr. Stein that the Director has instructed that pictures of Campbell be released, but Mr. Stein stated that unless they were held up until Monday morning for general release to all the papers, there would be a great deal of resentment. I therefore advised Mr. Stein that in view of such circumstances it would undoubtedly be desirable to wait until Monday and call all of the papers at the same time. Mr. Stein said he would do this.

Mr. Stein advised that Campbell was still being questioned and had accounted for everything except the 21 days which cover the period that Bremer was held. He stated that Campbell would be held until Monday morning and that the Bureau would be immediately advised of any important developments.
