There are attached hereto the logs for January 16, 1937 covering the taps on telephones listed to the Whief of Police, City Jailor, and Mayor's Office, all located isex in the City Hall at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

The George McLaughlin mentioned in the call recorded at 7:30 A.M. is a brother of Mayor McLaughlin. It is reported that he is part owner of the Chicago Ber, one of the many gambling places in Hot Springs.

That call recorded at 8:01 A.M. over the Mayor's phone from W. S. Jacobs to Atty. Louis Tarlowski at Little Rock, Arkansas definately discloses that Jacobs was present at the meeting which the Mayor called together the night previous, to be had at in his office.

Rie Referring to that call recorded at 8:15 A.M. between Nayor McLaughlin and State Representative Lee Nichols, Secretary to the Legislativ Committee, it can be seen that Nichols, at least, as determined to show the Mayor no favors.

Note the call at 3:01 P.W. between Mayor McLaughlin and his estranged wife. It is not known what Governmental agency interrogated !'rs. McLaughlin, if anyone did, and it likewise is not known from what source she obtained the information that Hot Springs and Little Rock was flooded with Government men to investigate the Mayor in the hopes of impeaching his Note particularly the intimation of the possibility that W. S. Jacobs might endeavor to bribe the Legislative Committee for the benefit of the Mayor at himself.

Attached hereto is a clipping taken from the Hot Springs Sentinel-Record, dated January 17, 1937.

ORDERED TO REAPPEAR

Chairman Nichols Says Testimony Has Resulted in "Definite Progress" in Investigation - Hearing Kept Secret.

Jan 16-(P)-Rep. Little Rock. Lee Nichols said tonight that testimony of 16 public officials and club operators from Hot Springs taken by him today resulted in "definie progress" for a sweeping legislative investigation of charges of "general lawlessness" at the state's world-famous pleasure resort.

Nichols, secretary of a house in-

vestigating committee, questioned the witnesses at a semi-public hear-ing in the house chambers of the state capitol ithis morning while four other members of the investigating body pursued secret individual quests.

Circuit Judge Earl Witt, Mayor Léo P. McLaughlin and Sheriff Marion Anderson were among the officials appearing before Nichols under subpoenaes served by state rangers. W. S. Jacobs, owner of the Belvedere and Southern Club entertainment show spots at the spatwas the first of the group the guestioned. Young of the Ohio club, filed my exhibits with the committee and Nichols continued the hearing until 9 a.m. Monday with a warning that unless required records are meunless required records are pre-

sented at that time, contempt proceedings will be instituted.

Nichols left Little Rock tonight for an unannounced destination.

Other members of the committee could not be located. The investigations could not be located. The investigation is being conducted under authority of a house resolution adopted Thursday. The resolution charged that Hot Springs peace officers were allied with the underofficers were allied with the under-world, that a "political machine" controlled elections through law violations, and that open gambling was rampant.

Judge Witt, specifically attacked Judge Witt, specifically attacked in the house resolution, said after testifying today that he had "nothing to fear from a fair investigation" and expressed belief that no one would want to hurt a fine, beautiful city like Hot Springs."

The witnesses today were quiet but apparently good natured. They declined to pose for photographers but made no objections when news-men snapped them as they took seats at Nichols' witness table.



Legislative Probe Of Spa Voted By House, Investigators Named

The house authorized the investigation by a vote of 72 to 21.

Earlier, by a vote of 48 nays and 46 yeas, it rejected a motion by Campbell seeking postponement of action until next Tuesday.

The resolution authorized appointment of an investigating committee of five house members and appointment of an attorney by the governor to aid the inquiry, proposed to cover the 18th judicial district, composed of Garland and Monigomery counties.

Montgomery counties.

Speaker Bransford tonight named to the committee Thompson, chairman, Jones of Montgomery, vice-chairman, Nichols of Logan, Robinson, of LaFavette and Murray of Dallas.

Fighting for postponemert, Campbell told the house: "I never knew of a case being tried in our courts in Arkansas without giving the defendant time to make a proper investigation of the charges preferred against him."

Campbell charged open horse race betting in Little Rock and inquired why no investigation of Little Rock conditions had been urged.

Thompson said he did not know of the Little Rock conditions referred to and replied on the motion to postpone:

"The or ly purpose delay can serve will be to give the Hot Springs gamblers time to get their money to work."

Nichols of Logan, backing the investigation, and Campbell of Garland, attacking the resolution, carried the burden of debate in a heated afternoon session before firal adoption.

Campbell, at one point, said:
"I've heard it said that this was sponsored by Governor Bailey but I don't believe a word of it."

"The situation in Hot Springs has been a gradual growth, beginning when the people started winking at law violations and officers started neglecting their duty," said Nich-

"If something is not done about it, my and your inalienable rights will be affected. They regard human life as meaning practically nothing in Garland county. Criminal classes have undoubtedly been in close alliance with the officers and judiciary of Hot Springs."

The Logan legislator referred to the recent death of John Dickson, Hot Springs jail prisoner, which resulted in indictment of seven policemen there, and said:

"I make the prediction that if the

"I make the prediction that if the house doesn't get, behind them, they will turn those men loose. I can prove it is the custom and habit of the officialdom of Hot Springs to torture men. When (Charles) Luciano was arrested, the whole gang down there tired to thwart investigation.

"J. Edgar Hoover in a national magazine article said that Chicago in its Capone era didn't have a thing or. Hot Springs. A department of justice agent told me there was not a more dangerous point in the United States for his agents than Hot Springs and not a safer place for the criminal element. " "

"If these charges are proved, it is our purpose to see that the circuit judge is impeached."

Campbell told the house he had "heard this same charge of unfair elections ever since I have been in public life."

"There is not a bit of truth in the allegations they are making," in each. "About the John Dickson case, I say to you that the Hot." Springs police department and that of every city in the United States resorts to what they call third degree methods in their zeal to protect law-abiding citizens. I'm not condoning any policeman for using brutality in handling any prisoner in his custody. It may have been natural for those policemen to retaliate against the man who knocked their police chief in the head, disabling him for life.

"The only question here is wheth-

"The only question here is whether local self-government in the counties shall be broken down.

"We have as fine a circuit judge as you will find anywhere in Arkansas or the United States."

Campbell said the proposed investigation would cost between \$10,000 and \$15,000 and added: "These probes don't amount to a hill of beans. They just furnish an avenue for some one to make a big raid on the treasury."

The Thompson resolution made the following allegations:

That it was common knowledge that open gambling houses were conducted in Hot Springs.

2. That slot machines were operated near the public schools and "frequented almost exclusively by school children."

3. That public officials are owners or part owners of some of the sambling devices.

4. That public officials received ay for part-time services in samble thouses.



5. That the 18th Judicial District circuit judge interferred with investigation of alleged shortages by Montgomery county officials.

6. That the primary election laws were violated in 1936, in the selection of pell officials.

tion of poll officials.
7. That Mayor Leo P. McLaughlin of Hot Springs threatened city and county officials and employes of gambling houses that if they did not vote "the entire machine ticket" they could not work in the city of Hot Springs.

8. That the "political machine of Garland county" printed 10,000 marked ballots and that election clerks handed these ballots to voters

in the August primary.

9. That the "political machine" purchased 4.000 tax receipts and distributed them to transients and other illegal voters.

10 That Gibson Witt, Jr., and Curtis Ridgeway "made a deal" by

He will soon have completed two decades of service to his people as their respect-ed judge. Never in all these years has his integrity been attacked by the people he serves—the citizenship of Garland and Montgomery counties. They won't attack it now. I regret that those who do not know him see fit to quesion him."


In this we believe they will be joined by Circuit Judge Earl Witt. Judge Witt has served the people of this county and district for many years, and our people have confidence in his integrity and ability. We believe that had Judge Witt known that his character and integrity were being challenged he would have been first in demanding an investigation.

Rumors were rife on the street last night that the resolution authorizing the investigation was sponsored and prepared by a long-time resident of Hot Springs. This seems incredible and we all know the old adage about the bird that befouls its own nest. It is a fact, however, that some of our own people are largely responsible for much gossip in the state reflecting upon our people and our officials. Too frequently defeated candidates and some of their supporters, instead of accepting the verdict at the polls, make charges of corruption and speak disparagingly of the very voters whose support they have been soliciting.

We believe we are at least an average Arkansas and American community, and that the investigation will substantiate this. There are attached hereto the logs for January 14, 1957 covering the taps on telephones listed to the Chief of Police, City Jailor, and Mayor's Office, all located in the City all at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Reference is made to telephone call at 7:27 P.M. between Chief Ras-Berry and one Nickels. If this individual is identical with Fred Nickels who is owner of the Chicago Bar, a gambling place, the letter under discussion might have something to do with the operation of his place, having in mind the resolution that was passed lett this afternoon.

The call at 9:25 P.M. between "Dutch" Akers and his wife bears out the fact that she is working at the Belvedere Club, the information having it that she is a shiller out there. The Otis mentioned in the conversation is undoubted - ly 0 is McGraw, personn 1 manager for W. S. Jacobs.

The hayor's telephone was quite active today, principally because of his interest in suppressing the resolution that was adopted this afternoon.

Note the call made at 5:25 A.M. to telephone number 2115, an unpublished number, assigned to W. S. Jacobs. The individual named "Watt" mentioned in the conversation is undoubtedly Sam Watt, an employee for Jacobs at the Belvedere Clift is not known who "Brad" is.

Note the call at 9:34 A.M. between Mayor McLaughlin and Representative Burkle, where the Mayor is soliciting Burkle's aid in an effort to block the said resolution. Mr. Burkle a parently doesn't feel very sympathetic toward the Hot Springs Administration, after having seen the photographs of John Dick on's body which were taken at the .me of the autopsy.

Note that call at 10:05 A.K. between Major Kclaughlin and State Representative W. K. Toney of Jefferson County, Arkansas. It may be that Mr. Toney, if preparing sufficiently influenced by Kclaughlin, will be a "stooge" for the local administration.

Note that call at 10:25 A.M. between Judge Ledgerwood and Mayor Mc Laughlin. There's a great deal of logic in the Mayor's statement.

In that call recorded at 10:55 A.W. between Judge Ledgerwood and Major McLaughlin, note what the Judge has in mind should the resolution is question be passed. The Mayor apparently finis a lot of solace in thinking things and then presenting them to Judge Ledgerwood, who it has been doesn't is his closest colleague.



In that call recorded at 12:01 P.M. between Major McLaughlin and Ben Harris alias Ben Harrison, it should be noted that Ben Harris is the owner of the Citizens Cigar Store, one of the town's largest hand book place.

Note the conversation recorded at 12:05 P.M. between Mayor McLaughlin and A. T. "Sunny" Davies, City Attorney of Hot Springs, wherein Davies suggests "fixing" the Committee who will make the proposed investigation in Hot Springs. From the Mayor's reaction to "Sunny" Davies' Exgressings suggestion about the Exercities investigating c mmittee, it appears that he has already layed his plans

It would appear from the calls recorded at 12:15 P.M. and 5:20 P.M. that Representative Carrol Hollingsworth is working for the City Administration in this matter. The individual named "John" in the conversation at 12:17 P.M. undoubtedly refers to John Bransford, Speaker of the House, and with whom the Administration is unusually close.

That conversation at 5:25 P.M. between Mayor McLaughlin and Judge Ledger cod indicates that are going after the personnel of the investigating committee with ful force.

Note the conversation but een Major McLaughlin and Charles Goslee, general manager of the Hot Springs Sentinel-Record newspaper, had at 4:06 P.M. The result of their conference is reflected in the attached editorial which appeared in the morning issue of the Sentinel-Record on January 15, 19:7. It The person that they are striking at in this editorial is undoubtedly Scott Wood who is reported to have written the resolution asking for an investigatio of Hot Springs.

There is also attached hereto clippings taken from the Hot Sirings New Era for January 14, 1927, and clippings taken from the Hot Springs Sentinel-Record for January 15, 1937.

It appears that Pave Fowler is a new m mber of the Hot Springs Police Department.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

At 4:50 P.M. on this date Mr. Suran communicated with Acting Special Agent in Charge A. H. Johnson, of the Chicago Field Division, and instructed that Special Agent J. M. Jones proceed to Hot Springs, Arkanses for the purpose of establishing additional telephone taps in that city in connection with the investigation of the harboring situation which is presently being conducted there. Mr. Johnson was advised to have Agent Jones proceed to Little Rock, Arkansas, where the appropriate information would be furnished to him by Mr. Little; that it was desired consideration be given to placing telephone taps on the home telephones of Mayor McLaughlin, Chief of Detectives Herbert Akers and William Pacobs, prominent gambling club operator of Hot Springs, Arkansas, and also consideration should be given to the placing of a telephone tap on the Belvedere Club, operated by Jacobs. Mr. Johnson stated that Agent Jones would leave Chicago on the night of January 19, 1937.

At 5:00 P.M. on this date Mr. Suran communicated with Special Agent in Charge Little, Little Rock, Arkansas, and advised him that Special Agent Jones was proceeding to Little Rock and that the situation at Hot Springs should be looked over by Agent Jones, to determine if it was practical to place tdephone taps on the telephones above referred to without in any way interfering with our present setup there in connection with the telephone taps presently being operated on the office telephones of Mayor McLaughlin, the Police Department and the City Jail. Mr. Little was advised that after the situation had been looked over he should communicate with the Eureau and obtain authority for the installation of the taps.

He maintained he had never been arrested upon any charge amounting to a felony, and added that at present he has an application in for a position as a policemen with the Chicago Police Department. When asked as to whether any police officers would vouch as to his reputation, he stated that his father-in-law, CHARLES EITZ, is a retired police sergeant from the Chicago Police Department; that he has an uncle, JOHN O'CCNVELL, who was just recently retired as a police sergeant also from the Chicago Police Department; that he knows LT. EDWARD KELLY in charge of the Pickpocket Detail of the Chicago Police Department. He claimed not to personally know CHIEF OF DETECTIVES JOHN L. SUILIVAN, or POLICE COMMISSIONER JAMES P. ALLMAN.

DECEN claimed to be living with his wife, and that he is the father of three children ranging in age from two to seven; that his wife is expecting another child shortly; that he has lived at his present address for about one year, and prior to that lived at 3812 North Troy Street for about seven or eight years, which building belonged to his father.

A review of the files in this case reflect that subsequent to May 7, 1934, or the date of the issuance of the first bench warrant for the arrest of ALVIN KARPIS, he was only in Chicago on one occasion for one or two days, or between the period September 5, 1934 and September 8, 1934. This review indicated the whereabouts of ALVIN KARPIS between the date of May 7, 1934 and May 1, 1936, or the date of his arrest at New Orleans, Louisiana, as follows:

(In the following the letter and number in parenthesis will indicate the report and page number, which will be found listed at the end of this summary.)

March 21, 1934 - DOLORES DELANEY left for Toledo, Ohio, ALVIN KARPIS arriving several days later. (A-p.11)

May 15, 1934 - DOLORES DELANKY sent to Chicago on an errand from Toledo by ALVIN KARPIS. During the above period DOLORES DELANEY and ALVIN KARPIS were living in Toledo. Shortly after May 18, 1934 DOLORES DELANEY and ALVIN KARPIS moved to Cleveland, where they rested an apartment on 159th Street. (A-p.15)

June, 1934 - DOLORES DELANEY sent to Chicago to get meil for ALVIN KARPIS which he expected. She thought she was followed. KARPIS believed by DOLORES to have subsequently sent someone else. KARPIS thought that the police or Government men followed her. (A-p.13)

September 5, 1934 - ALVIN KARPIS and DOLORES DELANEY left Cleveland.

Three girls, paramours of mob, were arrested in Cleveland and came
to Chicago. DOLORES went to live with "MA" BARKER on Diversey Avenue.
It is unknown where ALVIN KARPIS lived. (A-p.15,16,17)

On September 8, 1934 - ALVIN KARPIS and DOLORES DELANEY left Chicago, Illinois, for Miami, Florida (A-p.17). KARPIS states this was the last time he was in Chicago. He elaimed not to have seen his reletives since December, 1933. (K-p.19) They arrived in Miami and left immediately for Cuba (A-p.17).

December 10, 1934 - They left Cuba and came back to Miami, Florida (A-p,20,21), having remained in Cuba during this period.

January 17, 1935 - They left Miami, Florida when FRED and "MA" BARKER were killed (A-p.21) at Lake Oklawaha, and fled to Atlantic City. They had lived in and around Miami during the period of December 10, 1934 to January 17, 1935.

January 19, 1935 - KARPIS arrived at Atlantic City (L-p.277).

January 20, 1935 - KARPIS and CAMPBELL fled Atlantic City (L-p.29).

On January 22, 1935 - KARPIS and CAMPBELL arrived at Toledo (L-p.29), and went to the Casino Club, then to EDITH BARRY'S where they were visited by HUNTER.

February 2, 1935 - ALVIN KARPIS left EDITH BARRY'S and Toledo. (M-p.10). They had remained at EDITH BARRY'S during the interim.

March 1, 1935 - KARPIS returned to Toledo with CAMPBELL, went to EDITH BARRY'S. He was unshaven (M-p.15).

Some time during the months of January or February, 1935 - KARPIS visited the Rochat Farm with HUNTER (F-p.27) Ter days later he revisited this farm.

March, 1935 - KARPIS and HUNTER visited HALL at Youngstown (F-p.12).

Merch 26 to April 1, 1935 - KARPIS returned to Toledo and lived at EDITH BARRY'S (M-15).

April 3 and 4, 1935 - KARPIS again returned to Toledo to KDITH BARRY'S where he lived (M-p.16).

April 21, 1935 - KARPIS was again at EDITH BARRY'S (M-p.18).

April 24, 1935 - KARPIS was in the mail robbery at Warren, Ohio (F-p.2).

May 15, 1935 - KARPIS visited CAMPBELL at Toledo (L.p.Sl).

July, 1935 - EDITH BARRY elaimed to have kept KARPIS in her house during the previous four months (M-p.19).

During June or July, 1935 - KARPIS and HUNTER visited HAIL and stayed a few days with him. They stated they had been in the state of Minnesota (F-p,12).

During July or August, 1935, - EDITH BARRY received a letter from KARPIS postmarked from Canada (M-p.19).

About September, 1935 - EDITH BARRY made a trip to Chicago for KARPIS (Map. 19).

From sometime in June, 1935 to October 2, 1935 - KARPIS lived in a cabin at Hot Springs, Arkansas (R-).

September 1 to October 2, 1935 - KARPIS rented a cabin on Lake Hamilton (C-p.10).

On October 8, 1935 - KARPIS visited CAMPBELL at Toledo (L-p.52).

On October 19, 1935 to November 1, 1935 - KARPIS visited CLAYTON HALL for several days at Youngstown, Ohio (B & F-p.12).

Movember 1, 1935 - KARPIS visited the Rochat Farm (F-p.28).

Hovember 4, 1935 - HROCK visited KARPIS at KDITH BARRY'S in Toledo (F-p.25).

November 5, 1935 - KARPIS visited CAMPBELL (L-p.2).

Hovember 7, 1935 - KARPIS was identified as being in the Carrettsville train robbery (F-p.20).

Hovember 8, 1935 - KARPIS flow from Pt. Clinton to Hot Springs.
Arkansas.

November 11, 1935 - or thereabouts - KARPIS arrived at Hot Springs, Arkansas (C-p.11).

From December 10 or 12, 1935 - CLAYTON HALL, Youngstown, received a teletram from KARPIS, then at Hot Springs. HALL drove to Hot Springs and stayed a week visiting KARPIS (E-p.13).

During letter part of December, 1935 - KARPIS went to Corpus Christi fishing (E-p.14).

December 9 to 12, 1935 - KARPIS is shown as being at Corpus Christi (H).

December 27, 1935 - KARPIS visited CAMPRELL at Toledo (L-p.33).

December 31, 1935 to Jamuary 3, 1936 - KARPIS again at Corpus Christi (H).

January 3 to 11, 1936 - KARPIS was again at Corpus Christi, Texas (H).

January 14, 1936 - KARPIS visited HALL at Youngstown, Ohio (E-p.ll).

January 15, 1936 - HALL drove KARPIS to Toledo (E-p.12).

January 18, 1936 - GRACE COLDSTEIN flew to Canton, Ohio, to visit KARPIS (E-p.13).

January 21, 1936 - CLAYTON HALL picked up by KARPIS in Hot Springs, Arkansas, and visited with him until January 29 (E-p.13).

January 29 to February 1, 1936 - CLAYTON HALL and KARPIS went to Corpus Christi, Texas, to fish (E-p.15), where they lived at an auto camp (C).

February 10, 1936 - KARPIS and GRACE COLDSTEIN moved to Woodcarp Place near Lake Catherine, Arkansas, which place was rented for six months by CLAYTON HALL (E-p.14).

Merch 12 to 15, 1936 - KARPIS was at Orlando, Florida (J).

March 26, 1936 - KARPIS left Hot Springe, Arkansas for Corpus Christi.

April 1 to May 1, 1936 - KARPIS lived in New Orleans or vicinity (0-p.5 and P).

April 24, 1936 - KARPIS left New Orleans (I-p.2).

April 25, 1936 - KARPIS was in Hot Springs (I).

May 1, 1936 - KARPIS was arrested at New Orleans (Q).

During the period from August 22, 1935 to August 29, 1935 and from October 26, 1935 to May 10, 1936, Agents of the Chicago Field Division maintained a surveillance over the parents and relatives of ALVIN KARPIS. (R)

From the above summary indicating the whereabouts of KARPIS during the above mentioned period it seems to be appearent that KARPIS was undoubtedly afraid to come to Chicago. If he wanted errands performed in Chicago he always sent someone else. Thus it seems that the alleged harboring by FRANK FOGARTY of ALVIN KARPIS with the knowledge of CHIEF OF DETECTIVES JOHN L. SULLIVAN of the Chicago Folice Department, is merely the statement of a crank, as the files nowhere reflect information to substantiate this statement. Further investigation along this line seems clearly unwarranted.

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated December 24, 1936 (7-576) in which it was requested that Bureau agents contact Piss Juanita (Pobbie) Pobletto and diplomatically advise her that the Eureau is not obligated to her in any way.

This is to advise that on January 18, 1937 Special Agents H. B. Bill and A. Dickstein contacted Miss Juanita (Bobbie) Robletto at her home, 439 Arcadia Street, Toledo, Chio and the matter in question was discussed with her. She stated that she did not expect ε reward, nor did she request one. The advised that if she did request a reward, it was due to her excitement over the publicity given her in the Toledo, Chionewspapers; that since the apprehension of Harry "Comptell and Sam toker the excitement subsequent thereto had made her a nervous wreck; that her job had not been secure since that time. She requested that the Bureau endeavor to obtain a position for her; that she did not care what kind of position, if it afforded her enough funds to support her mother and herself. She was diplomatically advised by agents that she did not possess the necessary qualifications to become a Bureau employee and the Bureau does not make a practice of obtaining employment for anybody. She further stated that her disagreeable attitude in this matter was caused by the "constant hounding" by newspaper reporters.

Miss Robletto expressed her regrets for the way she has acted towards the Eureau with reference to this matter, advising, as mentioned above, that such actions were caused by the persistance of newspaper reporters. Her attitude towards agents and the Eureau appeared to be somewhat changed. On previous visits by agents, Miss Robletto displayed a very belligerent attitude towards agents and the Eureau; however, during the occasion of this interview she appeared to be very calm and collected and displayed an extremely friendly attitude.

RE: GEORGE TIMINEY; DR. JOSEFH P. PORAN, with aliases - FUGITIVE; I.O. #1232, ET AL EDWARD GEORGE ERENTR - VICTIM KIDNAFING; HARBORING OF FUGITIVES; OBSTRUCTION OF JUSTICE; HATIONAL FIREARDS ACT.

For the information of the Fureau there is quoted below a menorandum submitted by Special Agent B. F. Fitzsimons with reference to an interview with Prestor Lercy Faden, the son of dna urray. This interview was conducted pursuant to a letter received from Lr. F. W. Ford, Parole Officer, Kansas State Industrial Reformatory, Butchinson, Kansas, in which he stated an inmate of that institution desired to discuss some outside crime problems with an Agent of the Bureau. Fending further instructions from the Bureau no action is being taken on this memorandum, which is as follows:

While at the State Industrial Reformatory on January 18, 1937, on other matters, Agent interviewed one PRESTON LEROY PADEN,

register #12184, who is serving a life sentence for murder. Paden 937 stated that he is a son of Edna Lurray, and that he had information he desired to furnish to the Bureau concerning the activities of one Hugh Larimer, an attorney at Topeka, Kansas.

Prior to his conviction, on April 7, 1936, Paden claims that he was associated with Volney Davis and various other members of the Earker-Karpis gang, but was most usually in company of Volney Davis. In April and Pay of 1934, Faden claims that he was working for one Coy Fales, a gambler and racketeer of Aurora, Illinois, at the Fox Gardens, a gambling place operated by Bales and located across from the racetrack at Aurora. While working for Bales, he claims that he frequently saw Fred, Doc and Ha Barker, also Willie Charrison, Willie Leaver and Lyrtle Laton, all of whom frequented the Fox Cardens. Subsequently, Faden claims, Volney Davis began the operation of a night club, known as The Collywood Inn, located near the dam in the vicinity of wheeler, Londana, and he hired Bales to

run the place for him. Volney Davis and Edna Purray, according to Faden, visited in Kansas City, probably about July or August, 1934, and shortly thereafter, Volney, Edna Eurray and Paden went to Wieeler, Montana. On their arrival there Paden claims that Bales advised Volney the G-Men had been there looking for him; that Eales thought they were still in the vicinity and that Volney had better "blow". Paden claims that Volney and Edna Lurray left immediately for Kansas City, taking Pader with them. Shortly after their arrival in Mansas City, Faden claims that Volney sent him back to Theeler, Lontana, to see if Volney's night club was still operating and whether the G-Len were still around there. Faden claims that Volney bavis, at that time, had a 1934 panel model Chevrolet automobile, which he gave to Pader to make the trip to Lontana, and which car, Paden claims, Volney Davis gave to him outright. When Fader reached Theoler, Montana, he claims that he learned that Bales had sold the night club and had apparently returned to his home, located at 202 High Street, Aurora, Illinois. Paden returned to Kansas City and advised Volney Davis of what he had learned. Shortly thereafter, as near as Faden recalls, he and Volney Davis went to Topeka, Yansas, in Volney's Chevrolet. They stored the car there in a private garage and went to visit Hugh Larimer at his home. Paden claims that Larimer has been a friend of his for several years, since 1925, when Larimer assisted Faden's relatives to escape prosecution for alleged violations of the National Prohibition Act.

Paden claims that Volney Davis accompanied him to Larimer's home and that Faden introduced Davis to Larimer merely as "Curly". However, later in the evening, before they departed, Paden claims that he informed Larirer that "Curly" was in fact Volney Davis and tiet he was wanted as a fugitive, by the Eureau. On subsequent occasions, Faden claims, Volney Davis visited Larimer, alone, but Paden claims not to know what the nature of his business with Larimer was. Shortly thereafter Paden claims that Volney was apprehended by Bureau Arents, and while being transported by them, effected an escape. Paden claims that he was in Topeka at the time of Volney's apprehension, and he drove to Kansas City, Lissouri, in his 1933 Chevrolet coupe, accompanied by Earl Stucklich, Paden's uncle. Thile in Mansas City, Faden claims that Stuchlich was apprehended, by Bureau Agents, near Twelfth and Broadway, while Stuchlich was sitting in Faden's coupe. Paden claims that he learned of Stuchlich's apprehension and was afraid to claim his coupe which was taken into possession of Sheriff Bash and Paden returned to Topeka, where, he claims, he contacted Larimer and sought Larimer's assistance in getting his coupe from the possession of Sheriff Bash. According to their agreement, Paden claims that he signed the title to his coupe to Larimer, who went to Kansas City, obtained possession of the car and sold it, keeping the money he obtained, except \$100.00, which that his agreement with Larimer was

plus 325.00 attorney's fees, and give Paden the balance of the money. Shortly thereafter, Paden clairs, Larimer, knowing the location of Volney's panel sedan in Topeka, obtained the car, by breaking the lock on the garage where the car was stored, took the car and sold it, either to the Chevrolet or Ford Garage at Topeka, and retained possession of all the money he obtained from that sale.

Fadem's complaint against Larimer is that Larimer knew the identity of Volney Davis at the time he was wanted as a fugitive by the Bureau; that Larimer knew of Volney's location and could have advised the Bureau, but failed to do so. Paden claims that in prior conversations with Special Agent Madala, he advised Agent ladala of Larimer's knowledge of Volney's identity and location; also of Volney's association and activities with Coy Bales, but claims he made no mention of the automobiles to Madala, although Faden gathered, from his interviews with Madala, that Madala knew of Volney's possession of the panel Chevrolet Sedan.

Faden further volunteered that Larimer and one Euddy Middleton, a Kensas City, Lissouri, attorney, were the instigators of an alleged extortion plot, for which one Frances Taylor was convicted in Federal Court, Topeka, Kansas, wherein she attempted to extort money from a preminent Topeka lumber man through photographs, which Faden claims, pictures Frances Taylor and the lumber man in acts of sexual perversion. Paden was rather indefinite in his statements concerning the extortion case and could not adequately explain how Larimer and Middleton were involved, except to state that they urged Frances Taylor to attempt the extortion, and that Hugh Larimer was her attorney at the time she was tried.

Paden claims that he gave to Post Office Inspectors, valuable information which cleared up an alleged robbery of a Fost Office mail truck in which Jess Doyle, Clarence Spargur, Johnny Langdon and Jack Rich were involved, near Coffeyville, Kansas, in 1931. Since giving that information to the Fost Office Inspectors, Feden claims that he has received a letter from his mother, Edna Lurray, in which she advised him that Agent Shanahan, of the Bureau, had recently visited her at the Vissouri State Penitentiary and had informed her that "several people were going to be indicted on harboring charges". He said that his mother was quite worried, but gave him no details of the alleged harboring charges and he assumed that the charges were an outgrowth of information he had furnished to the Jost Office Inspectors.

Paden declined to reduce his statements to writing, claiming that he was interested only in "seeing that Larimer got his". He further stated that he had previously given similar information, concerning Larimer, and others herein mentioned, to one Joe Anderson, of the Kansas State Highway Patrol, and that Anderson had exacted

a promise from him that he would not disclose his information to any one else. When questioned as to why he desired to volunteer the information herein contained, Paden stated that he wanted to "help the Government" and to see that Larimer is prosecuted. He expressed a willingness to testify against Larimer and to the statements he has made against others. He further stated that Joe Anderson had promised to help him, but when questioned as to what promises Anderson had made, Faden claimed that he just said he would help him, and did not indicate in what specific manner."

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MEMO: ANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Harboring Investigation at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

SAC Little telephoned me from the Little Rock Office with regard to the above entitled matter. He said that he has been sending the Bureau some newspaper clippings relating to the activities of the Arkansas State Legislature in investigating conditions at Hot Springs. He said that they have appointed at this time a legislative committee to investigate conditions down there.

List night, one of the members of this committee contacted Agent Calhoun while he was having dinner at the Marion Hotel in Hot Springs, and said the committee would like to submit some information to the Little Rock Office concerning violations of Federal laws, etc. Mr. Calhoun called Mr. Little about this, and Little told Calhoun to tell this committee that we would, of course, be glad to receive any information from any source indicating a violation of any Federal law within the investigative jurisdiction of the Bureau, but that we weren't conducting any investigation into the general situation at Hot Springs. Mr. Little was wondering how far they should go with the information which is furnished by this committee.

I told Mr. Little that if the information furnished by this committee Lower & Parkall pertains to a violation of Federal law within the investigative jurisdiction of the Bureau, they should go the limit on it. I told him 37 that they should, of course, avoid any activities which would form the basis of charges that we are in on any partisan investigation; in other words, the investigation should not be instituted or conducted in such a manner that we will be charged with catering to the desires, of a Democratic legislature or a Republican legislature or anything of that kind. Our position, I told him, should be clearly that we are investigating violations of specific Federal Statutes which are referred to us for investigation, and it should be indicated that the Bureau is conducting no joint investigation with this committee. On the other hand, I told Mr. Little he should say to no one that we are not investigating the police department at Hot Springs; that any questions with this purport which are asked should be evaded by no comment, because the Buresu may be in a position later on where we will want to disclose the evidence in our files to some local tribunal, and we wouldn't want it on record that we had denied we were investigating the police department at Hot Springs.

DETAILS: AT CHICAGO, ILLINOIS:

MRS. C. J. PETERSON, 500 South Oak Park Avenue, Oak Park, Illinois, was reinterviewed relative to the statement that she made while at the Chicago Division on Movember 5, 1936, to the effect that ROSE CURREN, MRS. PETERSON'S sister, stated that DR. JOSETH P. MORAN is not dead, and that she, MRS. CURREN, might possibly know his present whereabouts; further, that if the basements of the rooming houses owned by MRS. CURREN, located at 249 North California Avenue, and 174 Leamington Avenue, were searched something might be found. MRS. PETERSON stated that one day while she was visiting RCSE CURREN, ROSE read in the newspaper where DR. JOSIPH P. MCRAN was supposed to have been killed and his body dumped into Lake Erie; that ROSE, upon reeding this, stated that she doubted if he were dead; that he was smart and undoubtedly would start such a rumor to stop police from searching for him; that ROSE CURREN made this statement only as an opinion, and made no positive statement to the effect that DR. MORAN is alive.

With reference to the statement to the effect that something might be found in the basements of the said rooming houses MRS. PETERSON stated that one GEORGE KELLY, brother of MELLE KELLY, who used to live with EDWARD/McFADDEN, present paramour of ROSE CURREN, a "dried up and believed narcotic user", lives in the basement of the rooming house at 174 Leamington Avenue and acts as a janitor, and undoubtedly has narcotics with him.

MR. and MRS. PETERSON when asked if it might be advise able to contact FRANK BECKEP, husband of KATE BECKER, a sister of ROSE CURREN and MRS. PETERSON, advised that he was a politician in the 42nd Ward on the north side of Chicago; that he is believed to be a collector of graft for police from houses of prostitution; that he is not married to KATE BECKER but marely lives with her; that he has a wife and grown up shild living at La Grange, Illinois. BECKER has been an informant of this Division.

In checking through the Chicago Division files it is noted that FRANK BECKER had informed Agents of this Division that in
the first part of April, 1955, he had heard his wife and ROSE CURREN
talking, and ascertained from the conversation that JIMMIE TRACY,
brother of BETTY TRACY, DR. JOSEPH P. MORAN'S fiances, had received
two letters from MORAN, who was then in Biloxi, Mississippi; that a
letter was also received in Merch, 1935, from MORAN who was then in
Atlanta, Georgia, working as a travelling salesman for a surgical

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instrument company; that BETTY was receiving mail e/o Chicago Civil Service Commission, for whom she worked; that on April 17, 1935, ROSE CURREN, had told his wife, KATE that MORAN was expected to visit Chicago over the weekend. On another occasion in August, 1935, BECKER claimed he overheard a conversation between his wife and ROSE CURREN wherein it was stated that BETTY TRACY had received a letter from MORAN and that JULATE TRACY, her brother, had shipped some medical instruments to him.

BECKER. when interviewed on December 10, 1936, as set out in the reference report of Special Agent Devereux, stated that he was positive his wife, KATE, and RCSE CURREN, did not know the present whereabouts of DR. JOSEPH P. MORAN; that BETTY TRACY, who was engaged to DP. MORAN, had worn an engagement ring for a long while after his disappearance, feeling sure that he would turn up somewhere, but that she is appearently reconciled to the fact that he is dead as she is now going out with a police lieutenant.

From the information to be set out subsequently in this report the Bureau files reflect that DR. JOSHFE F. MORAN was undoubtedly killed during July or during the summer of 1934. The above information set out as received from FPANK BECKER is thus inconsistent and questionable. It may be stated here that FRANK BECKER died about January 6, 1937.

MR. and MRS. WILLIAM BRENHOCK, 1651 Horth Katchez Avenue, Chicago, were interviewed. MRS. EREPNOCK advised she was a niece of ROSE CURREN, KATE BACKER and Mrs. PETERSON, and that she had lived at the home of ROSE CURREN for a short period during 1935; that she had visited with her on occasions since then. She stated that she has never heard any statement made by ROSE CURREN to the effect that IR. MORAN is alive; further, that she had never heard any statement to the effect that BETTY TRACY had received any letters or was in touch with DR. MDRAN. MR. and MRS. BRENNOCK stated that they do not at present associate with ROSE CURREN or her sister, KATE BECKER, as they are very low morally. When asked whether or not FRANK BECKER could be considered reliable if he were interviewed, they advised that he was a ward politician on the north side of Chicago; that his life was always in danger due to the fact that he collected money from various people promising to get them positions with the city, but that he was always unable to do so; that he had even gone so far as to collect money from police officers promising to get them promoted; that he was a notorious liar

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and seemed to get much pleasure out of trying to make people think that he was a powerful politician, and had contacts with various city officials.

ROSE CURREN and KDDIE KCFAPDEN, peramour, who was formerly considered a member of the Touhy gang, were interviewed. MCFADDEN stated that he was undoubtedly one of the best friends that DR. JOSEPH P. MURAN had in Chicago; that when MDFAN was released from the Illinois State Penitentiary he, McFADDEN, who was then an officer of the Teamsters Union, had furnished Moran with an office and set him up in business, and through the union sent him considerable business; that undoubtedly if MCRAN were alive he would get in touch with him, McFADDEN, or if he should come to Chicago he would undoubtedly visit him, but he has never received any word from nor has he seem JOSEPH P. MOPAN since some time in the spring of 1934, when MRAN disappeared from Chicago. He feels that if IR. MORAN were still alive and a fugitive, that he was foolish for not turning himself in to the Government in that he is merely charged with harboring, and would undoubtedly only receive a short sentence; that being in the penitentiary is nothing to MORAN, and when he would be released he could then start out again and rehabilitate himself. He stated that if MORAN should contact him he would gladly notify the Bureau, but he feels certain that IR. MOPAN is dead.

ROSE CURREN, upon interview, stated that she at no time had ever made any statements to the effect that DR. MORAN was alive after he had disappeared from Chicago in the spring of 1934, though she did feel, when reading in the paper about his supposed murder at Toledo, Ohio, that he might have set up such a rumor, but it was merely her opinion. She also stated that if MORAN should come to Chicago undoubtedly the first place he would visit would be her home.

She took Agent and showed him the basements in her rooming houses, and stated that the back door to her house and the basements were always open; that if at any time the Covernment felt she might be herboring DR. MORAN or any other fugitive they were absolutely entitled to raid and search her rooming houses.

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When questioned relative to the place in Glenview, Illinois where JOHN FACTOR was kept while he was supposedly held by the Touhy mob, she stated that she was the woman in the green dress referred to in the trial of the Touhy mob relating to the kidnaping

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of JOHN FACTOR, who was seen to have visited the cottage at Glenview, where FACTOR was supposed to have been kept. She stated that she did not testify, nor make her identity known because it would be of no avail, but she could have testified that at the time she visited this cottage FACTOR was not there; that she merely want there to see EDWARD MCFADDEN, who with one of the Touly brothers, had rented the cottage at Clenview for the purpose of hiding as the Cepone gang were after them. She stated that the picture of this cottage appeared in the newspaper during the trial of the said case; that she cannot remember the address of the cottage, but offered to go with Agent and show him the building. She stated that she would obtain this address from EDWARD McFADDEN and advise Agent of it. ROSE CURREN further stated that she doubted the actual kidnaping of JOHN FACTOR in that BASIL BANGHART had told her that FACTOR would pay any sum of money to keep from being turned over to the British authorities for trial, as if he were turned over it would mean conviction and the serving of eight years in the dungeons.

MRS. KATE BECKER was interviewed and stated that she did not know IR. MORAN very well, but had seen him on several occasions when in 1933 he attended her mother at the instance of ROSE CURREN; that positively at no time did ROSE CURREN ever tell her that BETTY TRACY had received mail from IR. JOSEPH P. MIRAN, or that BETTY TRACY knew where DR. MORAN was. She had no knowledge of her cam, or from information that she might have heard, to the effect that DR. JOSEPH P. MURAN might still be alive; that it is her information that IR. MORAN was killed at Toledo, Ohio, though her information to this effect is based merely upon what she read in the newspapers.

MISS ELIZABETE TRACY, 2718 North Ridgeway, Chicago, was interviewed and stated that she had never heard from/seen IR.

JOETPH P. MORAN since he left Chicago in about April, 1934; that she rever sent any instruments through her brother toDR. MORAN, but on the other hand, that if her brother knew where DR. MORAN was he undoubtedly would take other measures toward inferring that he felt he would kill DR. MORAN for the way that he had treated her. She stated she had eften wondered where DR. MORAN'S instruments were as he had a couple of pictures of her among his personal effects, and she wanted to get those back, but was always afraid to go to the places where DR. MORAN had maintained his office or lived for fear that she might create some suspicion toward herself.

March 18 Carlo

Agent had previously on December 51, 1936, New Year's Eve, shadowed Betty Tracy and observed that she was picked up at her home by a man driving a Lincoln Sedan, bearing 1936 Illinois license plates 706-530, motor #70435, which was registered to JAMES VA CURRENS, 5432 Jackson Blvd., Chicago, business address = 130 Morth Wells Street.

At the Lincoln Agency Agent ascertained that JAMES V. CURRENS resided at 3424 West Jackson Blvd.; that he purchased the said car in 1932. He at that time gave his business address as 130 North Wells Street. It was ascertained that he was an officer in the Jacitors' Union; that he was single and resided with his parents; that he had a brother who was a physician.

Ho one resembling DR. MORAN was observed to contact with BETTY TRACY or enter home on December 51, 1936.

DR. LED MACKEY, 3315 North Milwaukee Avenue, was interviewed, and he steted he formerly occupied an office with DR.
JOCETH P. MORAN at the time he disappeared; that DR. MORAN never returned to obtain any of his instruments; that about two months after his disappearance he and the janitor of the building boxed up DR. MORAN'S instruments and equipment, and stored them in the basement of the said building; that no one ever called for these instruments and equipment except the firms from which MORAN was buying them on time; that he can positively state that BETTY TRACY or none of her representatives ever called for any of DR. MORAN'S equipment or personal effects. He stated that his information covers up until approximately November, 1935; that as far as he knows DR. MORAN'S personal effects are still stored in the basement of the building where they had their office, 4861 Irving Park Blvd.

DR. MACKEY went on to state that he had never heard from DR. MORAN since his disappearance, nor has he heard anyone else state that they had heard from or knew that DR. MORAN was still alive. He has always felt that DR. MORAN might still be slive, but he has no facts upon which to make such a statement other than his own opinion.

MR. FRANTITAMEACK, Janitor, 4861 Irving Park Blvd., the building in which DR. MCRAN and DR. MACKET had their joint office, was interviewed and stated that he and DR. MACKET personally packed DR. MORAN'S equipment and personal effects and stored them in the

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becoment of the building; that subsequently the firms from whom DR. MORAN was buying his equipment came and claimed this equipment, but before it was turned over the Federal Bureau of Investigation was notified, and that Bureau stated that it would be all right that the equipment be turned over; that the personal effects of DR. MORAN, including two pictures of BETTY TRACY and a discharge from the Army, were kept in the basement up until about Hovember, 1936, when he received permission from the Manager of the building to destroy this property as it was in the way, and he understood that DR. MORAN was dead. It will be noted here that MR. WAMBACK'S statement as to the pictures of BETTY TRACY substantiate what she stated.

A review of the files reflects the following information concerning the death of DR. JOSKPH P. MORAN:

On March 10, 1934 DR. MORAN operated upon the fingertips of ALVIN KARPIS in Chicago (Summary report of Special Agent E. J. Wynn, Cleveland, Ohio, dated 10/25/36, page 26).

On May 11, 1934 JAMES WILSON and DR. MORAN registered at the Ft. Meigs Hotel, Toledo, Ohio, (Summary report of Special Agent E. J. Wynn, Cleveland, Ohio, dated 10/25/36, page 27).

On June 3, 1934 JAMES WILSON and DR. MORAN were living with HARRY CAMPBELL and WYNONA BURDETTE (Summery report of Special Agent E. J. Wynn, Cleveland, Ohio, dated 10/25/36, page 55). WYNONA FURDETTE stated that after DR. MORAN operated upon HARRY CAMPBELL'S fingers he came to live with them, and lived with them until June 5, 1934, at which time she left and went to the hospital. She stated that she had observed DR. MORAN in the Casino Club at Toledo during the month of May.

On page 67 of the aforementioned report PAULA HARMON states that DR. MORAN and JAMES WILSON were brought to Toledo by FRED BARKER and ALVIN KAPPIS after DR. MORAN had operated upon their fingers. MORAN stated that he was getting out of Chicago.

LITLIAN MAREA, slies LOU/POOLE, upon interview stated that during the summer of 1934 EDITH BARRY telephoned to BERT ANGUS relative to the whereabouts of DR. MORAN as he owed her, EDITH BARRY, some money. BERT ANGUS stated that he, DR. MOPAN, had gone on his last roundup. LOU POOLE stated that the girls often remarked upon this. (Report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, Cleveland, Ohio, deted 10/24/36).

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JAMES WILSON, upon interview, stated that "DOC" BARKER told him that he last saw IR. MORAN in Toledo during the middle of July, 1934; that he and two others left MORAN drunk in a car in front of a restaurant, and when they came out he, IR. MORAN, was gone. WILSON further stated that MORAN had to travel with the gang on account of the operations which he had performed upon them; that "DOC" BARKER subrequently claimed to have seen IR. MORAN in a "swanky" night club in Cleveland, and he was with a girl enswering the description of BKTTY TRACY, though he, "DOC" BARKER, later told WILSON to go to Chicago and get money from BETTY TRACY due to him, WILSON, which statement puzzled him. (Report of Special Agent D. P. Sullivan, Chicago, Illinois, dated 11/3/36, page 3).

CONSTANCE BURKHARDT, an enterteiner at the Casino Club during June and July, 1934, when interviewed stated she started to work at the Casino Club on June 19, 1934; that about the second week she was there three of the gang, referring to the KARPIS-BARKER gang, took DR. MORAN from the Casino Club on account of his being drunk and talking too much; that she did not see DR. MORAN after that. One of this gang who took DR. MORAN out, she remembers was "SLIM" GIBSON, who came back minus his shirt, washed up, and after that the gang seemed very nervous, and several days later at the suggestion of BERT ANGUS went to Middle Island to fish. (Report of Special Agent J. V. Murphy, Cleveland, Chio, dated 11/3/36, page 6).

at Toledo, Ohio, advised that MAUDE SWING told him that several members of the gang took DR. MORAN from the Casino Club one night; that through a ruse they kept WILSON at the Club. MARY PAILEY, who was a cook at the Casino Club, told of "SLIM" CIBSON getting a towel and hot water to wash off with; that this was the last time she had seen MORAN. (Report of Special Agent R. C. Suran, Cleveland, Ohio, dated 8/22/36, page 12).

JACK SCHAIDT, alias "COME COME", upon interview advised that he had told BERT ANGUS about being abused by DR. MORAN, whereupon BERT ANGUS stated he would take care of him. MORAN had threatened SCHMIDT with a gun. (Report of Special Agent E. J. Wynn, Cleveland, Ohio, dated 7/17/36, page 6).

CLAYTOK TALL advised that ALVIN KARPIS told him that the man who had operated upon him was dead. (Report of Special Agent C. E. Smith, Cleveland, Ohio, dated 7/21/36, page 12).

tender at the Casino club in 1934 had told him that MORIN was bumped off at the Club for being too boisterous, and was dumped in the lake after being placed in a barrel of sement; that the body was taken to TED ANGUST cottage on the lake where it was kept for two days. (Report of Special Agent D. P. Sullivan, Chicago, Illinois, dated 6/15/36).

BRUNO AUSTIN, upon interview, claimed that during the summer of 1934, probably in August, while he, AUSTIN, was in Toledo with BYRON BOLTON, "DOC" BARKER and "SLIM" GIBSON said they would have to take care of IR. MORAN, which they did, and they mentioned that they would obtain concrete from a saloon keeper. (Report of Special Agent D. P. Sullivan, Chicago, Illinois, dated 2/25/36).

BERT ANGUS, upon interview, claimed that the last time he sow DR. MORAN was in the summer of 1934; that "DOC" BARKER, "SLIM" GIBSON and DR. MORAN were in an argument in the Camino Club; that he, BERT ANGUS, left, and after that he never saw DR. MORAN again. (Letter of Inspector E. J. Connelley to the Director dated 3/14/36).

EDMA MURRAY, upon interview, told about DR. MORAN leaving with some of the geng in a boat at Toledo; that MORAN did not come back with them; that the same day FRED BARKER said DR. MORAN would never cut on suyone else unless he cut on some fish in Lake Eric. (Report of Special Agent W. E. Hopton, Kansas City, Missouri, dated 4/3/36).

VOINEY THVIS, upon interview, told of DR. MORAN being taken out in a toat by "DCC" BARKER and "SLIM" GIBSON, and that he was never seen after that. (Teletype from the Chicago Division to the Bureau dated 10/25/35; report of Special Agent A. E. Farland, Kenses City, Missouri, dated 10/23/35).

WILER/FARVER, upon interview, stated that "DOC" BARKER told him that WILLIK HARRISON and "DOC" MORAN were two persons who would never testify against him; that VOLNEY DAVIS told him that "DOC" BARKER and "SLIM" GIBSON killed MORAN, when MORAN stated that he had the garg in the palm of his hand. (Teletype from the Kanses City Division to the Bureau dated 9/8/35).

From the above statements, which are from witnesses who have given reliable information, it would appear that DR. MORAN was

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undoubtedly killed by "DOC" BARKER and "SLIM" GIRSON. The information furnished by FRANI BECKER, as stated above, was inconsistent and as there is absolutely no evidence shown that DR. MORAN is still alive, it would seem that further investigation tending to locate him at this time through BETTY TRACY is not warranted.

A check of the records in the District Court at Chicago, Illinois, reveals that the case pending against MATT GLEASON was stricken from the calendar on December 24, 1936 with the right to reinstate. ASSISTANT UNITED STATES ATTORNEY AUSTIN HALL was interviewed, end he stated that at this time he did not know just what he would do as to reinstating the case.

In the report of Paul Kitchin, Cleveland, Ohio, dated 9/8/36 he set out a lead to interview FRANK WAUGHN, 1836 Grant Street, Evanston, Illinois, relative to his information concerning the present whereabouts of MELTO LEAT. A check at the above address revealed that FRANK VAUGHN had moved away. It was noted that he formerly lived with GEORGE EARTHOLIC, who is presently living at 918 Hollywood Avenue, Desplaines.

MRS. GEORGE BARTHOLIC on being interviewed stated that FRANE VAUGHN bed left for California some time during the summer of 1936; that she did not know his address there, though undoubtedly his address could be obtained from his parents who live near Waynesville, Missouri.

Agent checked at the Evenston Post Office, es well as the Desplaines Post Office, for a change of address left by VARHE, but he left none.
