
Mr. Ferris assured Agent that he had not heard from his daughter since her elopement with Milton Lett and he said that he was very anxious to locate her, and that for that reason he would cooperate with the Bureau in any way possible in locating Milton Lett.

Agent was further advised by Mr. Ferris that one George Gobler, a former deputy sheriff at Coffeyville, Kansas, is alleged to have some information concerning Milton Lett's whereabouts, and he suggested that Mr. Gobler be interviewed. Mr. Ferris said that he had never had an opportunity to contact Mr. Gobler. A lead is being set out to contact Gobler.

It was Mr. Ferris' opinion that Lett and his wife are not in Wichita, Kansas, at this time because he said if his daughter were living in Wichita he believes that she would either contact him or that he would indirectly receive information concerning her presence in Wichita, and he has never heard that they are residing in Wichita.

Accompanied by Don Brink, agent interviewed PEGGY MIZE and her husband, RAYMOND MIZE, at their home. Mrs. Mize stated that she was a sister of MILTON LETT, but that she had not seen him for some time, and that the last occasion on which she saw him was at their mother's home. She stated that she had no information concerning the present whereabouts of Lett, and in the event she did have such information she would refuse to furnish it to law enforcement officers. Mrs. Mize assumed a very belligerent and uncooperative attitude during the interview, and stated that she had been contacted several times before in connection with her brother; that she felt that her brother was being persecuted by the authorities; and that her idea in the matter was that if the authorities wanted her brother for questioning, or for any other reason, it was their duty to locate him, and that she did not wish to assist in any way whatsoever.

Mrs. Mize refused to state whether MILTON LETT was younger or older than she was, whether she was in communication with him, and also refused to say when she last saw her brother Milton. She stated that she had written letters to her mother, and that she was aware of the fact that the Postmaster in Mojave, Calif., was watching her mail, and also stated that to her knowledge no one else in Mojave was corresponding with her mother so that any letters received by her mother from that city must have come from her.

Mrs. Mize stated that she is perhaps closer to her brother Milton than any other member of her family, but advised that she did not believe he would contact her, although she did state that should he do so she would not report the fact to the authorities.


During the interview with Mrs. Mize and her husband, it was casually ascertained that her husband had lost his job on the aqueduct project by reason of the fact that he had gone on strike, and that all of the strikers had been refused the right to return to work; that Mr. Mize contemplates obtaining a job on a State highway project for a period of sixty days in the near future; that the Mizes have three small children whose ages are approximately seven a four years and six months; that they are living in a poor sort of dwelling and are renting out rooms.

During the conversation, Mrs. Mize also made the remark that Milton Lett had been married "under the very noses of the authorities", but when questioned regarding this she refused to state where this marriage had taken place, or when, although from other portions of her conversation it may possibly have been in Wichita, Kansas.

Deputy Brink stated that he is presently making arrangements to assist RAYMOND MIZE in obtaining work on the State highway project, and that for this reason he believes that the Mizes are adopting a more friendly attitude toward him. Brink promised that he would maintain a close watch on the Mizes, and in the event he learned that MINTON LETT was contacting them he would immediately advise the Los Angeles Division.

On July 26, 1937, the Detroit Office was telegraphically advised by the Cleveland Office to discontinue investigation regarding BENSON GROVES, confirmed by letter from the Cleveland Office under date of July 28, 1937.

Pursuant to the request of the Cleveland Office, as contained in letter from that office dated July 28, 1937, to interview DOLORES DELANEY at Milan, Michigan, regarding her personal property, that office was advised by letter from the Detroit Office, under date of August 3, 1937, of the fact that Dolores Delaney had already been interviewed as set forth in the letter from the St. Paul Office to the Bureau under date of May 6, 1937. Under date of August 4, 1937, the Chicago Office advised this office of the results of a review of its file on this case regarding the above matter.

Pursuant to letter of reference from the Cleveland
Office dated August 5, 1937, a letter was directed to Mr. Leon D.
Case, Secretary of State, Lansing, Michigan, on September 10, 1937,
requesting that this office be advised if 1935 Ford V-8 Tudor
Sedan, Motor #2044337, or Plymouth Sedan, 1935 Model, Motor
#PJ-322772, Serial #2619857, had been registered in Michigan durling the current year. Subsequently, the Secretary of State advised that these cars were not registered. A stop notice was
placed against these cars by the Secretary of State, and this office will be notified in the event an attempt is made to register
them at some future date.

Deputy Chief of Detectives WILLIAM COLLINS, Police Department, Detroit, Michigan, was contacted as to any information he might have had regarding Anthony American, but advised that he had nothing new of importance.

Mrs. Bruce (Paisy) Young, 14666 Prairie Avenue, Detroit, Michigan, was re-interviewed and advised that she had heard nothing new regarding Anthony Amersbach; that she had ascertained from Francis/Ferris, 15457 Greenlawn, Detroit, Michigan, that her mother, Katel Means, was supposed to be living with her sisters, Alpha/Price and Grace Swank, at 2063 - 25th Street, Detroit. She further advised that Anna/Gordon, an old friend of Phil Amersbach, resided at 15003 E. Jefferson Avenue, Detroit, Michigan.

Detective E. D. KINNEY, 13th Precinct, Detroit Police Department, was interviewed and advised that he would check, through an informant, as to whether Subject Amersbach was contacting Eileen Clark's place on Cass Avenue near Palmer in that precinct. He subsequently advised that no information was de-

veloped that any contact was being maintained by Amersbach with this woman. Detective Kinney also advised that he had covered the gambling houses in Hamtramek, Michigan, but had found nothing to indicate that Amersbach had been frequenting these places.

Detective WALLACE McGRATH and Detective MYRON JACOBS, 9th Precinct, Detroit Police Department, were interviewed regarding 666 Lothrop, the tavern reported in reference report as being a likely spot for Amersbach to contact if he came to Detroit, Michigan. This address is covered by the above precinct. They advised that they had an Anformant named Martin Click who worked next door to 666 Lothrop who would be the best party to contact regarding the possibility of Amersbach's contacting Charlie Fisher, and that it would do no good to see Fisher as he probably would not co-operate. Contact was made with Martin Glick, who stated he knew one of the boys very well who worked at Fisher's who would know if Amersbach were contacting that individual and he would see him. He was subsequently interviewed and advised that he had been unable to obtain any information that Amersbach was frequenting this place.

Acting Sergeant WILLIAM S. BASTIEN, Grosse Pointe Park Police Department, was interviewed and advised that he knew of no woman by the name of Anna Gordon residing at 15003 E. Jefferson Avenue, located just outside of the city limits of Detroit in Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan. John Poneikis, 15005 E. Jefferson Avenue, Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan, was interviewed by the above officer and agent and advised that Anna Gordon had formerly resided in Apartment 3, 15003 E. Jefferson, but that she had moved and her present whereabouts was unknown to him. He advised that when Anna Gordon lived there she was occasionally visited by a man from Cleveland who was the door man at some gambling place in that city. Violet Rollins, Apartment 5, 15003 E. Jefferson Avenue, was interviewed and advised she knew nothing about the people formerly in that apartment. She advised the apartments were owned by John Cutler, residing at Fairfax and Balfour.

H. BOYCE, Carrier #1461, New Fairview Branch Post Office, covering 15003 E. Jefferson Avenue, Grosse Pointe Park; Michigan, was interviewed and advised he had no forwarding address on Anna Gordon from that address.

The Record Bureau of the Detroit Police Department showed that Katherine Means, alias Bernice Price, 438 Selden, Detroit, #33623, had been arrested for receiving stolen property on September 13, 1928 and that she was discharged on a writ of habeas corpus on September 17, 1928, after having been finger-printed and photographed.

Carrier FRED WETBY, \$1675, Roosevelt Park Annex Post Office, assigned to the route covering 2065--25th Street, Detroit, was Turnished with a description of Amersback, but stated he had never seen anyone fitting that description at the address mentioned. He stated that a letter comes every week for a person hamed Price, first name hot recelled, but the name Amersbach was not familiar to him.

On August 26, 1937, the Detroit Office was advised by the Cleveland Office, by letter, that Anthony Joseph Amersbach was apprehended at Indianapolis, Indiana, on August 24, 1937, by agents of the Bureau, and that investigation regarding this individual should be discontinued.

Deputy Chief of Detectives, William Collins and the other members of the Detroit Police Department mentioned above in this report were contacted and advised of the above information, as was the Grosse Pointe Park Police Department, in order that stop notices might be removed from their files. Similarly, the warden of the Michigan Branch Prison and House of Correction, Marquette, Michigan, was notified by letter under date of September 10, 1937.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent W. H. Espey:

Prison records of Edwinners, alias Phillip Amersbach, #3764, Michigan Branch Prison and House of Correction, Marquette, Michigan, were reviewed and a list of all correspondents, relatives and friends of Summers was obtained. The records were also searched for the names of visitors and the dates on which they visited Summers, along with the names of persons who credited money to Summers' account at the prison. The information obtained is not being set out in detail due to the receipt of information that Amersbach has been taken into custody. The notes of Agent Espey are being retained in the Detroit Office file on this case.




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

Concerning the various relatives of Milton Lett as set out in report of reference, Mrs. Collins advised that Lela Mize, who was formerly Lela Forth, is now living at Mojave, California; that Ethel Walker, sister of Lett, is now located on Rural Route #1, Coffeyville, Kansas; that Fred Collins, nephew of Lett, is now located at South Coffeyville, Oklahoma; and that another brother, Sig Lett, is now at the home of his mother, Maggie Lett at Wann, Oklahoma.

It was ascertained that the Collins family receive their mail through the Caney, Kansas Post Office and in the absence of the Postmaster, Post Office Clerk G. S. Carinder was requested to place a 30 day cover on the mail of the Collins family.

At Iola, Kansas.

Sheriff Clarence Warren advised he has been keeping close watch on Lewis Ray Thornton, friend of Milton Lett and is quite certain Lett has not contacted Thornton recently. He stated Thornton has been bootlegging at Iola for the past year and that he intends to see to it that Thornton leaves Iola in the near future. Sheriff Warren further advised he believed that one Hiram Lieurance, who is now in the Kansas State Penitentiary at Lansing, could furnish information as to Lett's whereabouts since Lieurance was quite friendly with Lett at one time.

Agent accompanied by Sheriff Warren contacted Lewis Ray Thornton who resides on RR#1 3 miles west of Iola, who admitted he is and has been a good friend of Milton Lett but stated he has not seen Lett since Bureau Agents started looking for him. He stated further that he had no idea where Lett is at this time but is quite certain Lett was not in Kansas because he is too well known to remain very long without being arrested. He was interviewed at length but no information of value to this investigation was obtained and it is not believed that Thornton would be inclined to give information concerning Lett's whereabouts even if he had such information.

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vised that he originates from Wann, Oklahoma and was acquainted with the Lett family at that place; that about a year or so ago he had occasion to make inquiries in Bartlesville for several Kansas officers for the purpose of assisting them in locating Eddia Lett to determine if Milton Lett might possibly be contacting him, and at that time he had ascertained that the Lett family at Bartlesville had moved to Kansas City and he was unable to secure their address. Gimlin mentioned that he knew a Hattia Lett who had indulged in bootlegging activities and who at the present time is believed to be living in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

At Coffeyville, Kansas

Mrs. Esther Twilley, 1311 Spruce Street, advised that Edith Morris is presently residing with her husband, Early Morris, at 108 North Cherry, Commerce, Oklahoma. Mrs. Twilley stated that she has received no information since the last interview with Agent concerning the whereabouts of Milton Lett or his wife. She advised Agent that within the next few weeks she expects to visit several persons whom she knows at Wann, Oklahoma, at which time she will make discreet inquiries concerning Lett. Mrs. Twilley related that she feels fairly certain in her own mind that Mrs. Constance Ferris, who resides with Mrs. Bessie Haggard at 605 West 10th Street in Coffeyville, positively knows the location of her daughter, Lucille. When Agent inquiried of Mrs. Twilley whether she was acquainted with Bessie Haggard, she stated that she knew her and that in her opinion Mrs. Haggard would not furnish any information relative to the Ferris family, particularly Lucille Ferris.

Bessie Haggard, 605 West 10th Street, upon interview advised that Mrs. Constance Perris is still residing with her and is working at the WPA sewing room in Coffeyville. Mrs. Haggard stated that she has on warious occasions conversed with Mrs. Ferris relative to her daughter Lucille and that Mrs. Ferris told her that she does not hear from her daughter and that she has not seen her since she left home. Mrs. Haggard related further that she has never seen any mail which appears to have come from Lucille Ferris, nor has she seen anything to indicate that Mrs. Ferris might possibly know the location of her daughters.

The individual mentioned in the report of Special Agent S. B. Landrum, Kansas City, October 15, 1957, as George Gobler, a former Deputy Sheriff, is no doubt identical with George Tobler, who is a former Deputy Sheriff and resides at Coffeyville, Kansas. This person is known to the writer and has been contacted on numerous occasions in the past relative to this case and although Tobler is cooperative, he has not been able to secure any definite information as to the location of Lett.

Virginia Thurston, timekeeper and foreman of the WPA sewing room, old City Hall, and who is a sister of George Tobler, advised Agent that

her brother had told her some time ago that Lett was no longer wanted. Upon being advised by Agent that Milton Lett is wanted by the Bureau she stated that she would cooperate with Agent in every possible way in an effort to locate Lucille Ferris Lett, whom she stated she had known when she lived in Coffeyville with her mother, Constance Ferris; who presently works under her in the WPA sewing room. Miss Thurston stated that she feels quite certain Mrs. Constance Ferris knows of the location of her daughter but that the will not under any circumstances reveal any information that might indicate her location. Miss Thurston stated that a lady friend of hers the is well about nited with the Lett. family might be of some assistance in this case and that she would contact her as soon as possible and solicit her assistance and cooperation in locating Lucille Ferris Lett. Miss Thurston stated also that she is acquainted with several girl friends of Lucille Ferris in Coffeyville, Kansas and through them, as well as others whom she will attempt to develop," will endeavor to assertain if they have heard anything from Lucille Ferris since she left Coffeyville. She stated that immediately upon receipt of any information as a result of her inquiries she would notify the writer at Tulsa, Oklahoma. During the course of the interview Virginia Thurston related also that F. B. Hanlon, whom she knows and who has been mentioned in previous reports of the writer, has telephoned her several times in the past month in an effort to solicit her help in locating Milton Lett for him. In this connection Miss Thurston eteted that she would not go out of her way to assist F. B. Hanlon because she did not like him. While Agent was at Coffeyville, Kansas, several attempts were made to locate F. B. Hanlon for interview but he was not found at his office or at his residence. Miss Thurston stated further that Lucille Ferris has one brother named Lyle Ferris, who is about seventeen or eighteen years old, who is presently attending the Junior High School or the High School in Coffeyville: that Lyle Ferris, to her knowledge, is living with his mother, Mrs. Constance Ferris, at 604 West 10th Street.

Ferris is presently enrolled in the Field-Kindley High School,

Victor Klotz, Principal, Field-Kindley High School, edvised that Lucille Ferris was known to him when she was enrolled in the high school and that her brother, Lyle Ferris, is presently attending the Field-Kindley High School. Mr. Klotz expressed his desire to cooperate in every way with Agent and stated that he would attempt in a discreet manner, through the medium of teachers as well as known associates of Lyle Ferris, to determine the present location of Lucille Ferris. A franked envelope was left with Mr. Kletz in order that he might immediately furnish any information that he secured through this sources.


Bert Zigenfuss, who resides about five or six miles from the Lett family, near Wann, Oklahoma, stated that since Agent last contacted him he

has been developing contacts and informents in that vicinity in an effort to locate Milt Lett. He stated that he received what he considered reliable information several days ago that Milt Lett about three or four weeks ago was at Neodesha. Kapsas. He stated he has received no definite information indicating that Milt Lett has contacted or made visits at his mother's place near Wann, but that he feels positive in his own mind that Maggie Lett knows the location of her son. He related that the mail carrier on the route on which the Lett family is located is a good friend of his and will advise him of any pertinent information relative to this matter. It was Mr. Zigenfuss' opinion that one M.D.L. Cox, a negro attorney at Coffeyville, Kanses, keeps in close touch with the Lett family and because of the fact that he was very well acquainted with Milton Latt, may possibly be in possession of information that would assist in locating Milton Lett. Zigenfuss stated, however, that an open interview with Cox would be of no avail and that he had recently been in touch with a rather close acquaintance of Attorney Cox, who he stated will endeavor to secure what information he can through that source. Mr. Zigenfuss stated that any andall information that may be of any assistance whatsoever in this case which he might receive will be immediately transmitted by him to Sheriff Bugh Owen at Nowata, Oklahoma, who in turn will immediately contact Agent at Tules, Oklahoma.

At Nowata, Oklahoma

Sheriff Hugh Owen stated that he has received no information relative to this case since Agent last contacted him. Sheriff Owen advised Agent that Bert Zigenfuss is a good man to keep in touch with in connection with this case because of his connections in the vicinity in which the Lett family resides and stated that Zigenfuss, who is a former peace officer, is a reliable individual.

Agent in company with Sheriff Owen contacted Bill Lett at his residence at Nowata, at which time Lett advised the writer that he is positive his cousin, Eddie "Doc" Lett, is presently residing somewhere in Bartlesville, Oklahoma. In this connection he stated that he had about a week or two ego talked with Eddie Lett, at which time Lett stated he was married and living in Bartlesville. During this interview Bill Lett related that he considered Eddie Lett as being an unreliable individual and that very little credence could be placed in anything he might say. At the request of Sheriff Owen and the writer Bill Lett agreed to drive his mother to the home of Maggie Lett at Wann, Oklahoma within the very near future in order that either himself or his mother might in a discreet manner secure some information from Maggie Lett concerning the location of her son, Milton Lett. Arrangements were made whereby he would immediately furnish whatever information he might secure during this visit to Sheriff Owen, who would transmit same to the writer.

Our reporter who covered the story does not remember whether he obtained his information on Guarante from you or from Mr. Herbert S. Phillips, U.S. District Attorney here.

I shall be under obligations to you if you will give me whatever information you have about Guarante that may be useful to us in defending his suit.

It was ascertained that Mr. Elliston had moved from 1520 N. McClafflen and information was obtained from Mr. George Norvy, Superintendent of the Kenton Postoffice station that on February 5, 1937 Elmer Elliston left the forwarding address of leadyflie, Missouri, and Vern Ferris left the forwarding address of 604 N. E. Couch, Portland, Oregon.

Estate Apartments, 204 N. E. Grand, and who was the former landlady at 604 N. E. Couch, that Vern Ferris lived at the latter address alone and moved to 217 S. E. 7th Street, Portland, Oregon, during May of 1937.

Mrs. Brown stated that Ferris was employed by the Asbestos Material Co., Portland, Oregon, and she was of the opinion that he later left Portland and went to Suleck, Eashington, where he was employed in a mill. Mrs. Brown stated that before Ferris had moved to her place he formerly lived with his sister, Mrs. Bernice Elliston and that she understood that Mrs. Elliston and her husband Elmer, had left Portland for the middle west, and just shortly after Ferris moved to the South 7th Street address, his sister lrs. Mrs. L. D. Kunkel, Landlady at 217 S. E. 7th Street, advised that Mr. and Mrs. Elliston and Vern Ferris resided at her place; that Ferris first moved in and later Mr. and Mrs. Elliston, together with Mrs. Elliston's brother and wife, Clarence and Irms, together with their father came from Missouri, and that her brother and his wife and their father stayed a couple of weeks, and presumably went back to Missouri; that Elliston and his wife moved to 1635 S. W. Alder Street sometime in June and Vern Ferris left to go to Tacoma, Washington, where he is employed by some asbestos or roofing company. Mrs. Kunkel stated that she had never seen anyone resembling the photograph of Milton Lett visit either of the Elliston's or Ferris, and had never heard any of them mention Lett's wife.

Mrs. L. Young, Landlady of the Norris Hotel, 1635 S. W. Alder Street, advised that Mr. and Mrs. Elliston, together with a 3 year old girl, resided at her hotel for a short while and left about 2 or 3 months ago for Home Valley, Washington where they are employed on a farm owned by Mr. Frank Bergenfeld. Mrs. Young likewise could not identify the photograph of Milton Lett as resembling anyone who had ever visited the Ellistons.

Water Street, to the effect that Vern Ferris had left his employment on June 23, 1937 for the purpose of going to work for the Tacoma Roofing Co., at Tacoma, Washington. In this respect, it was ascertained that Vern Ferris left a forwarding address of general delivery, Tacoma, Washington on July 30, 1937.

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he had given all the information in his possession concerning this incident to Special Agents A. E. Farland and S. B. Landrum in a signed statement made to them on July 3, 1937. Paden made an additional statement, amplifying the remarks made by him to Agents Farland and Landrum, as follows:

Hutchinson, Ransas October 27, 1937

*I, Preston Leroy Paden, make the following voluntary statement to James M. O'Leary, who has identified himself to me as being a Special Agent, Federal Bureau of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice. No threats or promises having been made to me.

Igents A. E. Farland and S. B. Landrum of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and I am making this statement for the purposing of adding to the statement made to Agents Farland and Landrum.

"Concerning the 1934 Chevrolet Panel body truck mentioned in my statement I wish to state that this truck was purchased by Volney Davis in the State of Ohio during the year 1934. I believe this truck was purchased in Toledo or Cleveland, Ohio, and was purchased by Davis under the name of J. E. Hansen. At the time this truck was purchased Volney Davis traded in an old Buick Sedan and paid the balance in cash. I'do not know the name or address of the dealer from whom this truck was purchased. During the summer of 1934 this truck was licensed in the State of Montana and Davis had a Montana title for same. This Chevrolet truck of which I am speaking is the one which I signed over to Hugh Larimer of Topeka, Kansas, and which he in turn sold to the Blevins Chevrolet people at Topeka, Kansas. I later learned that the Blevins Chevrolet Company sold this truck to a dairy in Topeka, Kansas, as I have seen the truck on the streets of; Topeka, Kansas, with a dairy sign painted on the sides. This truck was painted black and had a well fender for spare tire on the right front fender and it also had a spetlight on the drivers side. This spotlight is the type that is operated from within the drivers compartment.

The 1933 Chevrolet Coupe mentioned in my statement was painted blue and at the time bore 1935 Missouri license

plates 37-618, and was titled in my name, Preston Leroy Paden, in the State of Missouri. This car was "legitimate" and was purchased by me from a Chevrolet dealer somewhere near 32nd Street in Kansas City, Missouri. I believe that this automobile was purchased by me in January 1935. The records of this automobile motor number should be in the files of the F.B.I. and the Sheriff at Kansas City, Missouri, as Earl Stuchlik had this automobile in his possession when arrested by Agents of the F.B.I., at Kansas City, Missouri.

"Concerning the private garage in which the 1934 Chevrolet Truck was stored in Topeka, Kansas, prior to my turning the papers for same over to Attorney Hugh Larimer I wish to state that this garage was rented by Earl Stuchlik upon the reccommendation of a friend known to me only as "Tom" This garage was on a side street on the north of west tenth street, Topeka, Kansas. I do not know in what name Earl Stuchlik rented this garage but think it was either in his name or that of J. E. Hansen.

"As to the reason for my turning the papers of the 1934 Chevrolet Truck over to Attorney Hugh Larimer I want to state that they were turned over to him for the reason that Earl Stuchlik and I were going to Kansas City, Missouri, and we both expected to be picked up by F.B.I. Agents on account of the arrests of Volney Davis and my mother. I did not want to lose the truck and did not want the papers found on my person in the event that I was arrested because I had spent four or five hundred dollars of my money in going to Montana to look after the roadhouse owned by Volney Davis and I expected to get my money back out of the Chevrolet Truck.

When I turned the Chevrolet Truck over to Hugh
Larimer I signed the title of the truck over to him. Larimer
at this time told me that he wanted me to write him a letter
as if he were absent from his office at the time I called and
that in this letter I should tell him to sell the Chevrolet
Truck and the 1933 Chevrolet Coupe belonging to me. Larimer
dictated the letter and I wrote it out in my own handwriting.
The letter was to the effect that the two automobiles were
being turned over to him as attorney's fees for defending my
aunt, Doris Stanley. I wrote the letter at Larimer's
dictation and gave the same to him at the time.

"Concerning the statement made by me to Mr. Farland

that Hugh Larimer had given Doris Stanley one hundred collars to give me as the proceeds of the sale of my Chevrolet Coupe. I wish to state that the amount was \$110.00. I was later told by Vern Stuchlik, brother of Earl Stuchlik, that flugh Larimer had told him or that he had heard that Larimer received. \$300.00 for the Chevrolet Coupe.

"At the time I was living at McPherson, Kansas, with my aunt; Doris Stanley, and I called Hugh Larimer by long distance telephone at Topeka, Kansas, on several occasions regarding the sale of the Chevrolet Truck. He always told me that he had not yet sold the truck. So I finally decided to go to Topeka and get the truck. When I arrived at Topeka, larimer told me that he had removed the truck from the private garage and had placed it with the Blevins Chevrolet people. This was late at night and the following morning when I saw Larimer he told me that he had sold the truck to the Blevins people. I went to the Blevins garage and told them that I was going to replevin the truck and they told me that Larimer had sold them the truck and that they had sold it to some dairy in Topeka. I do not know the names of any of the persons with whom I talked concerning this truck. At the time of my visit to the Bleving garage Doris Stanley and Vern Stuchlik were with me. When I questioned Larimer as to what right he had to break the lock on the private garage, remove the truck and sell it he said that Earl Stuchlik owed him that much money for defending him on some charge in Federal Court at Topeka, Kensas. Doris Stanley had come to Topeka as a result of my calling her on long distance at MoPherson, Kansas, and telling her what Larimer had done. She talked with Larimer and he told her that her ex-husband, Earl Stuchlik, owned him attorney's fees and that he was keeping the money from the truck to pay them and that he refused to turn any of the money over to me. Doris Stanley then tried to reach Agent Farland of the F.B.I. en the telephone but was unable to reach him.

While Volney Davis and my mother, Edna Murray, were living in an apartment house as Mr. and Mrs. George Harper, I do not recall the date, Davis and I went to Topeka, Kansas, because Davis wanted to "case" a jewelery store which someone had given him as a "mark". I think that Davis did not know Hugh Larimer at this time. I might mention that this visit was before the arrest of Volney Davis and the truck deal with Larimer. I believe that I suggested that we call on Hugh Larimer and we went to his home. I introduced Volney Davis as "Curly" and do

not remember if I at that time told Larimer who he was.

Larimer must have known that Davis was a "thief" because he told us about the night depository in the bank in which he had his office and how it could be "taken" some Saturday night. It may have been the next time that I saw Larimer that I told him who Davis really was. I think that it was a later date when Volney Davis was not present that Hugh Larimer told me that he had seen in the newspapers that Volney Davis had been indicted at St. Paul, Minnesota, in the Bremer Kidnapping.

That is all that I can remember which would help to make my statement to Agents Farland and Landrum any clearer.

"I have read this statement which consists of two typewritten pages and to the best of my knowledge and belief it is true."

At Lyons, Kansas.

Doris Stanley was interviewed at the speakeasy which is conducted by herself and Lexie Davis, girl friend of Preston Leroy Paden. She was questioned concerning any information which she might have relative to the alleged visit of Volney Davis to the home of Hugh Larimer. Miss Stanley stated that she desired to assist the Government in any way possible and that she had no personal knowledge of Volney Davis' visit to the home of Hugh Larimer and that her only knowledge concerning this visit was conversation which she had had with Preston Leroy Paden, in which he told her that he and Davis had visited with Hugh Larimer.

Relative to the Chevrolet truck and the Chevrolet coupe turned over to Hugh Larimer by Preston Leroy Paden, Miss Stanley stated that from about February 5 to June 1, 1935, she was in Federal custody at

Kansas City, Missouri, and that Preston Leroy Paden and her ex-husband, Earl Stuchlik, had gone to Glasgow, Montana, in connection with a roadhouse owned by Volney Davis and Corey Bales. She further stated that Volney Davis had a panel body Chevrolet truck and that this truck was in Montana and that Paden and Earl Stuchlik had brought the panel body truck back to Topeka, Stuchlik driving the truck and Paden driving his 1933 Chevrolet Coupe. She stated that Paden had informed her that, upon his arrival at Topeka, he had turned the Chevrolet truck and Chevrolet coupe over to Hugh Larimer in order that larimer might sell them for him. When she was released from custody, she states that she drove to Cardin, Oklahoma, to get Paden and that they then drove to Topeka, Kansas, where Paden requested Larimer to pay him for the two automobiles; that at this time Larimer informed them that her ex-husband, Earl Stuchlik, owed him money for attorney's fees and that he was keeping the money obtained from the sale of the cars to pay this debt. Miss Stanley states that both she and Paden advised Larimer that Stuchlik had no interest in either of these cars and that the Chevrolet belonged to Preston Leroy Paden and that the Chevrolet truck was the property of Volney Davis. Miss Stanley states that Larimer told them that he declined to pay Paden for the automobiles and suggested they go to the Federal Penitentiary at Leavenworth and visit Earl Stuchlik and inquire of him if he did not owe Larimer an attorney fee. Miss Stanley and Paden proceeded to Leavenworth but Larimer failed to keep the engagement. Miss Stanley further stated that during her conversation with Larimer in Topeka, Kansas, she had informed him that she was going to communicate with Special Agent A. E. Farland and that she attempted to get Agent Farland on the telephone but was unsuccessful. She further stated that she was of the opinion that Hugh Larimer was acquainted with Volney Davis and that Davis had visited at the Larimer home on several occasions. She stated, however, that she did not know this of her own personal knowledge but had gathered as much from conversation with Preston Leroy Paden. She further advised that while she and Paden were in Topeka, Kansas, Vernon Stuchlik, her brotherin-law, accompanied them to the Blevins Chevrolet Company, where they btained details concerning the Chevrolet truck and the sale of same by Larimer. She stated, however, to the best of her recollection, an Stuchlik had not accompanied them to Larimer's office nor

At Hill City, Kansas,

Agent interviewed Earl Stuchlik, who advised that he and Preston Leroy Paden had left Kansas City, Missouri, on Jamuary 28, 1935. in a 1933 Chevrolet coupe owned by Preston Leroy Paden and that they had proceeded to Glasgow, Montana, for the purpose of looking after a roadhouse owned by Volney Davis and Corey Bales. At Glasgow, they obtained from Bales a 1934 panel body Chevrolet truck, the property of Volney Davis. Stuchlik states that he drove the truck from Glasgow to Topeka and that Preston Leroy Paden accompanied him, driving the 1933 Chevrolet coupe belonging to Paden. Upon arriving at Topeka, Stuchlik states he drove around the city looking for a private garage and that he finally located a garage from a "For Rent" sign, but that he does not recall the address or street upon which this garage was located. He states no one assisted him in locating this garage and he cannot identify the individual, Tom, as mentioned by Preston Leroy Paden. Stuchlik stated he did not go to Hugh Larimer's office after he placed the truck in the garage, but he knows that Paden did go to Larimer's office and signed the papers for the Chevrolet truck over to Hugh Larimer in order that Larimer might dispose of the truck. He further stated he believed that Paden had turned the 1933 Chevrolet coupe over to Larimer in order that he might dispose of it, through sale. Stuchlik states he had no interest whatever in either of these automobiles and that at the time he did not owe Hugh Larimer for attorney's fees, although Larimer has represented him on several occasions. He further stated that he and Preston Leroy Paden had had no conversation relative to disposing of the title papers to the truck because they feared that they would be picked up by the authorities upon their arrival at Kansas City, Missouri. He states he was very much surprised when he was arrested at Kansas City, Missouri, and that at the time of his arrest he was driving the 1933 Chevrolet coupe owned by Preston Leroy Paden. And the coupe of Stuchlik states that he knows Volney Davis very well and that in 1927 or 1928 Volney Davis was arrested in the apartment occupied by himself and Doris Stanley in Kansas City, Missouri. Stuchlik stated that he has never seen Volney Davis in the company of Hugh Larimer and has never heard that Davis has visited with larimer. He also stated that, at the time of his arrest in Kansas City with the 1933 Chevrolet coups, Preston Leroy Paden sent Hugh Larimer to Kansas City for the purpose of effecting the release, of the Chevrolet coupe and that Doris Stanley visited him in the jail and told him that Paden had signed the Chevrolet truck over to Hugh Larimer in order that lariner might sell the same. Stuchlik advised that, if he did have any information concerning visits of Volney Davis to the home of Hugh Larimer, he would be more than glad to turn this information over to the Federal Government because "it will save me from killing him one of these days."

Earl Stuchlik advised that his brother, Vernon Stuchlik, now

resides at 1273 South Vermont Avenue, Los Angeles, California. Barl Stuchlik states that it is his intention to remain at Hill City, Kansas, as long as his father is ill, but that, upon the recovery of his father, he expects to leave Hill City but that he will leave a forwarding address in case the Bureau desires to communicate with him.

At Topeka, Kansase

At the Blevins Chevrolet Company, Agent interviewed Mr. Lloyd Scott, Sales Manager, who exhibited to Agent the books of the company, which reflect that on May 21, 1935, there was credited to Hugh C. Larimer, 911 Douthitt, \$289.73 for a 1934 Chevrolet sedan delivery truck, motor #4361390, serial #1DA05-31707, Montana title #27007, and that this amount was paid by Blevins check #3539.

Mr. Scott advised that Larimer had brought the truck to the garage and said that he wanted some repair work done on it as he wanted to sell it. The car was in the garage for some time and Mr. Scott stated that he learned that his salesmen were trying to sell it and he began making inquiries about it and was informed that Hugh Larimer had placed the truck there. He said there was some question in his mind as to how Larimer had come into possession of a truck and was informed by a salesman, whose identity he does not recall, that Larimer had told him that he had taken the truck in as a fee for professional services. Mr. Scott stated he then requested Larimer to come to his office and Larimer explained to him that he had taken the truck in on a fee and assured him the truck was strictly legitimate and that the title was in good order. Mr. Scott states Larimer did not tell him from whom he had obtained the truck but Mr. Scott later learned, from a source which he does not now recall, that the truck had been obtained from some person involved in the Bremer kidnaping.

Mr. Scott at this time called in Walker Jeffries, a salesman employed by his concern, who advised that Larimer had told him that he had obtained the truck at Kansas City through a deal with some men whom he had defended. Mr. Jeffries states Larimer asked him where he could sell the truck and that the truck had remained in the garage for some time when another salesman by the name of Anderson asked him who the truck belonged to and stated he had a customer who desired to purchase the truck. It was at this time that the Blevins Chevrolet Company purchased the truck from Larimer and later resold it to J. O. Fairbanks, 2735 Iowa Street, Topeka, Kansas.

At the Title Section, Motor Vehicle Bureau, Agent examined Montana title #270070 in the name of J. E. Hansen, General Delivery,



Clasgow, Montana, for Chevrolet one-half ton truck, motor \$1361390. The back of this title reflects the following information: purchaser name - Hugh C. Larimer, 911 Douthitt, Topeka, Kansas, March 21, 1935, signed J. E. Hansen. The second endorsement, also on March 21, 1935, reflects the Blevins Chevrolet Company as the purchaser and Hugh C. Larimer as the person selling the truck.

Assistant United States Attorney Gordon Sloan, Topeka, Kansas, turned over to Agent copies of statements made by Preston Leroy Paden to Joe Anderson of the Kansas Highway Patrol concerning his associations with Volney Davis and other subjects in this case. These statements amplify the incidents mentioned by Paden in his statement to Special Agents Farland and Landrum and are being quoted herein for possible future references

STATEMENT OF PRESTON PADEN

Hutchinson, Kansas, October 2, 1936

"I, Preston Paden, possessing all my mental faculties, make the following statement to Joe Anderson of the Kansas State Highway Patrol, voluntarily, knowing the same to be true, without threats or duress or promises of any nature having been made to me.

"I am mineteen years old, was born at Miami, Oklahoma, December 27, 1916. By father is George Paden who lives at Chetopa, Kansas. My mother is generally known as Edna Murray. I am at present confined in the Kansas State Reformatory at Hutchinson, Kansas.

The latter part of January, 1935, Earl Stuchlik and I drove to Montana in my car which was a 1933 Chevrolet Coupe. We had been there about two weeks when I read in the paper where Jess Doyle had hit a federal agent and escaped. I later learned that the paper had this wrong; that it was Volney Davis who had escaped instead of Jess Doyle. I was at Glasgow, Montana. Volney Davis had a night club at Wheeler, Montana. Cory Bales was running it for him. Earl and I started back to Kansas City, Earl driving Volney's 1934 Chevrolet panel sedan and I drove my car. When we got to Topeka Earl and I went to see Hugh Larimer and Earl gave Larimer the papers to this truck and told him it was Volney's truck. We put the truck in a private garage and Earl and I drove to Kansas City in my car.



Then we got to Kansas City we found that Jess Doyle and my mother were in Jail at Kansas City, Kansas, and that Doris Stanley was in Jail in Kansas City, Missouri. Earl and I stayed at the Missouri Hotel and sent to Topeka and had Larimer come to Kansas City to have him see Jess and my mother and Doris. They would not let him see Jess or my mother, but he did talk to Doris; After Larimer went back to Topeka, Earl and I saw Ralph Latshaw, Jr., who was Doris attorney. Mhen Doris was arrested she had about \$1200 on her and got in the jail with this and later paid her attorney and sent the rest to me. I believe this was \$150 which she sent me by Hugh Larimer, sending a mote with it to me.

"I then went to the Lafayette Hotel at 12th and Troost and saw Helen, John Langdon's sister-in-law and told her I wanted to contact John. She sent me to the Sportsman's Club on Southwest Boulevard and to see Eddie Nettles. I saw him and told him who I wanted to see and he called up John some-place and John met me at the Sportsman's Club that night. I gave John some money, he was broke and I think he stayed at the Puritan Hotel that night. I told him I would call him up the next morning and I went back to the Missouri Hotel. At the Missouri, Earl told me had called Chris Rucker, an attorney, and I got out figuring that Rucker would tell the G-men, and later learned that he did, or must have, as someone tipped them off to my car.

Next morning, I contacted John Langdon, and we stayed in Kansas City about two days at different hotels, and then went to the Sportsman's Club and John Langdon saw someone there he knew and got him to drive us to Osawatomie and there. I looked up Johnny Rose and he drove us to Joplin in an old Model A Pickup truck. We registered in at the Yates Hotel at Joplin and while at Joplin, John Langdon told me about robbing the treasurer at Independence, Kansas.

Davis and John Langdon and I had a hot Ford that we were using, and Volney and I spotted on Oldsmobile sedan, black, with built in trunk and six wheels. This was the kind of car we wanted and we were in Volney's Pontiac at the time. I told Volney that was the kind of car we wanted and I went over and found the car was locked. We stayed there a long time watching it and finally a man came out and got in the car and drove to a school house under construction and got out and went in the

school house. He had brief case with him. Volney Davis and I followed him and at the school house I got out and found the car was still locked. Volney said we did not to take the Oldsmobile then as we were in his Pontiac which was a square car and he did not want any heat on it. We drove back to Kansas City to get the Ford and go back after the Oldsmobile as we figured this man would be in the school house quite a while. When we got back to Kansas City, he said let's go get Jess to drive the Oldsmobile home for us. Jess wanted to take John along, so all four of us drove back to Independence, Missouri at the school house in the Ford. The man was still. in the school house, and we parked near a vacant house nearby and we went in the vacant house and when saw the man coming out, we got in our car and met him when he was almost to his car, about ten feet behind it. We stopped our car and Volney jumped out, showed him his pistol but did not put it on him, and told him to get in our car. Jess and John got out of our car and took the man's keys to his car and got in his car and drove it off. I set in the back seat of our Ford coach and, put the man in the bottom of the back seat and put him on the floor and I put my feet on him and Volney drove the Ford and I told this man not to look at me, I would shoot his head off. This man said "Boys you can have my car and money and everything but please don't take me out in the country and leave me. We drove him out in the country and took him up in some timber and tied him to a tree with clothesline rope. Going up there Volney was joking and said he did not believe he would bother to tie him up, he would just shoot him. While Volney was tieing him up, I went through his pockets and got sixteen dellars. I believe it was sixteen, it might have been fifteen. Volney said don't leave him anything to call or get a taxicab with. I started to take his watch but Volney said not to take it, it would only get me in trouble. We blindfolded him; I had already done this in the car with Volney's handkerchief, first tearing the laundry marks off. We went back to Kansas City and met Jess and John at Jess's apartment. They said they had put the car in the garage behind the Plamor.

Rose as related on first page of this statement, I asked John what he had done with the Oldsmobile. He said they had wrecked it; that they had robbed the County Treasurer at Independence. Kansas, and coming back, it was sleeting and Volney was driving and had run into a car that some niggers were pushing up a hill. John said that one of these nigger girls said "officers nothing,

look at them getting those license tags." Volney had previously told them after the wreck that they were officers chasing bank robbers. They got out on the road and heisted a 1934 Chevrolet Coach and drove back to Kansas City in it. John told me that Jess drove the car going to Independence but Volney drove coming back. John said that Jess drove and he. John and Volney, made the "heist". He also told me that they set the Oldsmobile on fire. He said they put the Chevrolet that they heisted in a garage near the Blackstone Apartments at Kansas City, and the keys were later found in his apartment. He said he knew they would trace the keys to the Chevrolet and then to the burned Oldsmobile and that he would get a rap on the Independence, Kansas job. John told me that All Sherwood had figured the mark at Independence. One time several months before this, Volney, Jess and I drove to Parsons to look over a mail robbery, and we did not see the money come in, so Volney said lets drive to Coffeyville and ask Al Sherwood more about it, so we drove to Coffeyville and to Tommy Hill's place in South Coffeyville, Oklahoma, and Tommy came out and talked to Volney and said that Al was not there, that he was home, and we drove to Al's place which is a tourist camp in Coffeyville, Kansas, and Volney and Jess went in and talked to Al, and they later told me that Al was going on the "mark" at Parsons.

STATEMENT OF PRESTON PADEN

Hutchinson, Kansas, Oct. 2, 1936.

I, Preston Paden, being in possession of all my mental faculties, make the following statement to Joe Anderson of the Kansas State Highway Patrol, voluntarily, knowing the same to be true, without threats or duress or promises of any character whatsoever having been made to me.

December 27, 1916. Hy father is George Paden who lives at Chetopa, Kansas. My mother is generally known as Edna

Murray. I am at present confined in the Kansas State Reformatory at Hutchinson, Kansas.

PART TO THE PART OF THE "In the spring of 1934, I stayed for a while with Jes Doyle and Doris Stanley, my aunt, at Wichita, Kansas. While staying with them, Jess Doyle told me about an attempted bank robbery at Topeka, Kansas, in January, 1934. The way he told it, Eddie Green got the "mark" from Hugh Larimer, an attorney at Topeka, Kansas. When Eddie Green got the "mark" he and Jess were friends but later fell out and Jess was not in on the attempted robbery. I was with Jess the day this bank was robbed and when he read about it in the paper he told me that Eddie Green had called him up and wanted to see him but that he knew what Eddie wanted and not liking him did not go and see him. Jess said that he thought Eddie Green, Tommy Carroll, Baby Face Helson, Homer Van Meter, and John Millinger did this job. At one time, Jess Doyle, Doris Stanley and Eddie Green and Bess Green lived at the Senate Apartments at Topeka. At the time Eddie Green called Jess Doyle, Jess and Doris were living Commerce, Oklahoma with Mott Stanley and Helen Stanley. Eddie Green called Pearl's barbecue which is next to Mott's. This was the job where they got the banker at the house, as I understood it, and made him open up the bank.

"In 1926 or 1927, I was staying with some people on a five acre tract on the old St. Joe road north of North Kansas City. I was staying with my aunt, Doris, who at that time was married to George Stuchlik. He was bootlegging out there. It was about five miles north of North Kansas City. Fisher Paris owned the place. Paris formerly lived at Abilene. Paris' wife's father lived on the next farm north. During that summer, George Chase and Gus Nichols, were out there and several times Sammy Moyt and Tom Underwood came out there. heard George and Gus talk about robbing the Kaw Valley State Bank at North Topeka In their conversation, I learned that Sammy Moyt and Tom Underwood were with them on the job. They said that on the way back, something happened and they had to abandon their car and grabbed a truck and made the truck driver take them to Kansas City. They hid in the truck. After they left Doris and George Stuchlik, George Chase and Gus Michols went to St. Paul. I remember they were there on the fourth of July as George Chase gave me twenty dollars on the fourth, which was the most money I had ever had up to that time. Gus Nichols is now serving time at Stillwater, Minn., George Chase is now dead; Tom Underwood is at Alcatraz, and

Sammy Hoyt is serving time at Jefferson City.

STATEMENT OF PRESTON PADEN

Hutchinson, Kansas October 2, 1936

*I, Preston Paden, being in possession of all my mental faculties, make the following statement to Joe Anderson of the Kansas State Highway Patrol, voluntarily, knowing the same to be true, without threats or duress or promises of any character whatsoever having been made to me.

"I am nineteen years old, was born at Miami, Oklahoma, December 27, 1916. My father is George Paden who lives at Chetopa, Kansas. My mother is generally known as Edna Murray. I am at present confined in the Kansas State Reformatory at Hutchinson, Kansas.

"In the fall of 1934 I was at Jess Doyle's apartment at Kansas City, Missouri. Jess Doyle and my aunt, Doris Stanley, were living at the Blackstone Apartments under the names of Mr. and Mrs. Conley. John Langdon was living in the same building, having an apartment on the floor above. While staying with Jess and Doris, I heard Jess, and John talk several times about a mail robbery at Coffeyville Which had taken place a short time before. From the conversation, Jess Doyle, John Langdon, Jack Rich and Clarence Sparger were in on this robbery. This was a stickup of a mail truck just as the truck left the depot. There was supposed to be \$19,000 in this mail, and they said they only got four dollars out of it. They said just as they made the "heist" that they had a flat tire and Sparger and Rich did not want to go through with the "heist" but Doyle and Langdon did, so they went ahead. Jess was doing the driving and Langdon, Sparger and Rich made the "heist". They were using a 1934 Ford V-8 Sedan which I think they had stolen in Kansas City, Kansas

a short time before that. From what I heard them say, Jess and John were going to kill Rich and Sparger If they had got the \$19,000 as they were sore at them. They burned the mail sacks somewhere on the road back to Kansas City. I believe

this four dollars was in one registered letter.

Jess Doyle is now serving ten years in the Nebraska State Penitentiary at Lincoln, Nebraska, John Langdon is serving ten years at the Missouri Penitentiary at Jefferson City. Clarence Sparger is serving twenty-five years, I believe, at Leavenworth, as he was wanted on the Neosho Bank robbery when arrested. I believe Jack Rich is serving time at Leavenworth for the Neosho Bank Robbery.

"I have made the above and foregoing statement of my own free will and accord without fear of intimidation or promise of reward. (SIGNED) Preston Paden

In connection with the robbery of the Blankenship brothers at Winnwood Beach in January, 1936, wish to make additional statement concerning the car used in this robbery, which was a Ford coach.

evolvey Davis had a square Pontiac. We wanted another car and one night shortly before Christmas, 1934, Volney and I were riding around in the Pontiac looking for a car and at the Safeway Market near LOth and Main, Volney saw a man get out of an Oldsmobile. We could see that the motor was running and Volney said there is just the kind of car that we want and he got out and got in the Oldsmobile and drove it off and I followed in the Pontiac. He took it to his garage at his apartment and then went to Jess's and got Jess and John and they got a Dodge that was hot, which was stolen in Osawatomie, and left the Dodge in Kansas City, Kansas, and put the Oldsmobile in the garage where had formerly kept the Dodge. This garage was near the Blackstone apartments.

"A few days later, Volney, John, Jess and I started to Oklahoma, Volney knowing where some machine guns were kept in a fire station, and we intended to get the town afire and then get the machine guns. We had twenty gallons of gasoline with us. A short distance out of Kansas City we had a wreck and flagged a car down and we took this car. There was a young fellow driving and an elderly man and woman in the car. There was a quart of homemade wine in this car, which a 1934 tan Ford Coach. We left the Oldsmobile there. The gasoline was in the car. This Ford coach we kept for some time and is the car used in the Blankenship holdup. There was a mail man's sticker in the dash box of this Ford.

"Sometime after the Blankenship robbery, Volney told me he took this Ford to Fort Scott and left it. I believe he said he burned it but am not certain.

STATEMENT OF PRESTON PADEN

Butchinson, Kansas, Oct. 2, 1936.

"I, Preston Paden, possessing all my mental faculties, make the following statement to Joe Anderson of the Kansas

State Highway Patrol, voluntarily, knowing the same to be true, without threats or duress or promises of any nature having been made to me.

I am nineteen years old, was born at Miami, Oklahoma, December 27, 1916. My father is George Paden who lives at Chetopa, Kansas. My mother is generally known as Edna Murray. I am at present confined in the Kansas State Reformatory at Hutchinson, Kansas.

"In September, 1934, I was living with my grandmother, Mrs. N. D. Stanley, at Cardin, Oklahoma. Jess Doyle, Volney Davis and John Langdon were all living in Kansas City. They had been down several times and asked me about the money transfer from the Miami bank to the Picher bank on Saturday mornings. This particular morning they drove down in a Dodge and parked it about a half mile down a dirt road from my uncle's, Mott Stanley, and Jess come up on foot and got me. This was on a Friday night that they drove down, the morning before the robbery. We drove down to Afton and stayed all night in a tourist cabin near Afton. We got up early the next morning and eat breakfast at Afton and then drove to cemetery between Miami and Commerce. We had the tag mimber of the Chevrolet used to carry the money, and waited until saw him go to Miami. We then drove out on the highway and stalled along until he passed us. We then took after him, a woman was driving and there was a man in the front seat with her. They "ranked" to us just before we got into Commerce and they started driving fast but we stayed close to her and went through Commerce. Jess was driving and John was in the front seat and Volney and I were in the back, Volney on the right side. When hit the car on the curve between Commerce and Cardin she opened the Chevrolet up and we took after her and tried to catch here: Volney and I were masked; black silk stockings and Volney had on brown unionalls over his suit and I had overalls over my suit. We stayed crouched down coming through Commerce and when hit the second curve between Commerce and Cardin, Jess said raise up and we would take her and he caught them on the ourve and just as got up to them, John stuck a shotgun out the window, and as he did the young woman pulled the emergency brake and stopped the care Volney and John got out of the cars ... John carried a shot gun and Volney a pistol and Volney "poked" them up and got them out of the car and they turned their backs and John searched the car, pulled the silver out and set it down and there was a bunch of windshield stickers in the car which he thought was money and he put these and the silver in

the car. Volney said put up your hands and asked the boy where his pistol was and he said behind my ear and the woman said "he said pistol, silly, not your pencil". He told them where it was and John get it out of the dash pocket of the Chevrolet. We took the keys of the car and her purse and went north and straight north on a dirt road and as we started out, John threw the keys of her car out on the road. We then drove to Kansas city and cut the money at the Blackstone Apartments. There was \$1165 all in silver. We out this even four ways.

Why name is Preston Paden. I am nineteen years old, was born at Miami, Oklahoma, December 27, 1916. My father is George Paden who lives at Chetopa, Kansas. My mother is generally known as Edna Murray. I am at present confined in the Kansas State Reformatory at Hutchinson, Kansas. I am in possession of all my mental faculties and am making the following statement to Joe Anderson of the Kansas State Highway Patrol, voluntarily, without threats or duress or promises of any character whatsoever having been made to me.

Missouri, staying with Jess Doyle and Doris Stanley who is my aunt. We were living in an apartment that I believe was an Locust Street. I think the number was 1012. In the same building in another apartment John Langdon and Francis Taylor were living, using some Irish name. Jess Doyle and Doris Stanley were known as Mr. and Mrs. Conley. My mother, Edna Murray, and Volney Davis, were living on Broadway, south of 32nd Street. They had a ground floor apartment in the second apartment building from the north in the row of apartments on east side of Broadway at that location. They were known as Mr. and Mrs. Hansen.

"While living there, Volney Davis got the "mark" on two old men by name of Blankenship who lived at Winwood Beach and who were supposed to carry thirty grand around with them. Volney and I drove over there one night in his Pontiac and he sent me down to the house to knock on the door and see if they would answer at night. I got the name of a neighbor off a mailbox and when they answered the door, I asked them about these people and they told me where they lived. I then went back to the car and Volney and I drove back to Kansas City. The purpose of this was to learn if they would answer the door at night.

"About a week later, Jess Doyle, John Langdon and I were all at Jess Doyle's apartment and Volney Davis came over and got us in his Pontiac. We got our guns and got in the Pontiac. John Langdon had a 38" revolver; Jess Doyle and Volney Davis and I each had a 15" Colts Automatic. In the car were a 303 Automatic Rifle and a sawed off Remington automatic shotgun. We went to Volney's apartment on Broadway and parked the Pontiac in front of his apartment. Volney had a "hot" Ford coach which he had stolen in Kansas City and which he kept in a garage in back of the Plamor at Kansas City. We walked from the apartment to this garage and got the Ford. We had the rifle and shotgun in cases and carried them with us.

When we left the garage in back of the Plamor in the Ford, it was about six or seven o'clock in the evening. Volney drove the car; Jess Doyle was with him in the front seat and John Langdon and I were in the back seat. We drove to North Kansas City using the bridge near the airport, and on to Winwood Beach. We drove to Blankenship's house and Jess Doyle and John Langdon went up to the house. Volney and I could hear what was said. Langdon knocked and someone said what do you want" and he said he wanted to talk to Baker or some off name, and they would not let them in.

Langdon and Doyle came back to the car and we went

Langdon and Doyle came back to the car and we went back to Kansas City. Going back to Kansas City, Volney asked them why they did not go in and asked Langdon what in the world he said Baker for instead of Blankenship and I do not remember just what John answered. Volney also asked Jess Doyle why he didn't go in the house and Doyle said "that old man had a pistol" and Volney said, "you've got one haven't you" and said if it had been him, he would have kicked the door down and went on in; also said "what do you think we came out here for, we

came out to rob those people, didn't we". We drove back to the Plamor and put the car in the garage, them walked to Volney's apartment and he took us home in his Pontiac.

"About six o'clock the next morning Volney came to our apartment and asked Jess and I if we wanted to go on over there and get that money; said that he had not slept all night, thinking about it. He sent me to John's apartment to get him up, which I did. Volney was in the Ford when he came over. I got John up and we dressed and went out and got in the car. We had the same guns that we had the previous night but I do not believe we had the shotgun and the rifle.

We drove to North Kansas City, then to Winwood Beach and drove up right in front of Blankenship's house. Volney had a brass colored badge and he, Velney, John and Jess, went to the front door and I went to the back door. Velney knocked on the door; I do not know just who answered, but Volney had got the tag number on the Blankenship car and when the door opened, Volney gave them the rush act; said I'm an officer, showed them his badge, said who has been driving that marcon colored Ford and told them the tag number. The three of them crowded into the house and I came around from the back and went in behind them.

In the house were the two old men, a girl who looked to be about twenty or twenty-two but who was probably older as she had an eight year old boy, her husband, who looked to be in his late twenties or early thirties, and who was taller than I, heavy set and looked husky enough to be a wrestler. He was dark complexioned. The girl, I believe, was the niece of the Blankenships. There was also a little boy about eight years old who was the son of the girl and the heavy set fellow. They had been eating breakfast and Volney had them all on their feet when I got in and he called the big guy from the kitchen, saying to him, "you've been driving that our too, haven't you."

Off to the right of the living room was a bedroom and the kitchen was straight back from the living room. The kitchen and dining room were together. They were all in the living room when I got in, and all of we four were in there, Volney, Jess, John and I. Just as I came in, Volney, Jess and John "drug" their pistols and told them to lay down on the floor. One of the old men put up a "scream" about it; said he had never been arrested in his life and he didn't think officers were supposed

to treat people like that. They all got down on the floor, however, and John went in the bedroom, tore up some sheets, and started tieing these people up.

Both of these Blankenships looked to me to be past seventy. One of them said he could not lay down because of his rheumatism but he finally got down after Volney convinced him he did not have it so bad. I also remember one of these old men told the other, "Eddie, you've got your feet in my face." We tied them all up and the mother of the little boy kept screaming that she wanted the little boy near her, and Volney finnally "boxed" her and then laid the little boy by her. When he "boxed" her, her husband started to raise up and Volney asked him if he wanted to be "boxed" too and he laid back down. I helped tie this big boy up and tied his feet with some baling wire that I found. This big boy reached in his pocket for something, he was wearing overalls, and I told him to jerk that hand back out and Volney jumped over there and put his pistel right in this man's ear.

Jess Doyle and I stayed in the living room with these people and Volney went out in the kitchen and poured out the flour, sugar, etc., thinking might find some money in there. John Langdon went in the bed room and under the mattress and in a striped canvas sack and the money was pinned in the sack with a safety pin. The sack was made out of mattress cover. In the sack was \$2500. There was one hundred bill on the outside, and \$21,00 in tens and twenties, mostly in tens, ten in a bundle, each bundle tied with a rubber band, and the twenties was in bundles of five. The rubber bands were so old they had stuck to the money. John searched them and got their purses and got several five dollar pieces and some five dollar gold pieces that had been used for watch charms. We also got as old fifty dollar bill and an old twenty dollar bill of their persons. This was the old type bills, larger than the new bills. The old man had several things wrapped up with names of them; had an old silver dollar. We also got a Spanish type 38" pistol and a 410 shotgun pistol. Volney and I later threw these in the rivers. John searched them and took their purses and after searching them put them back in their pockets, keeping the money, of course.

car and if it had not been wrecked, we would come back in and untie them. The young man knew we were robbing them but the two

old men seemed to think all the time that we were officers. We then went back to Kansas City and at Volney's apartment, Jess and John went in the apartment and Volney and I put the Ford in the garage and walked to the apartment and "cut" the money. The guy that give Volney the "mark" got the gold and the old time money, probably a hundred and fifty collars. I do not know who this was; Volney took care of this. The rest of it was split even and I got five hundred and something for my share. We were back to Volney's apartment by about nine o'clock that morning.

STATEMENT OF PRESTON PADEN

Hutchinson, Kansas October 5, 1936.

"I, Preston Paden, possessing all my mental faculties, make the following statement to Joe Anderson of the Kansas State Highway Patrol, voluntarily, knowing the same to be true without threats or duress or promises of any nature having been made to me.

The car we used in the Drexel, Mo. Bank Robbery was a 1934 Oldsmobile (8) Sedan. We stole this car at 40th & Main. Sts., in Kansas City, Mo. This car was a big black sedan with six wheels, trunk rack and it had a heater in it. Jess Doyle and Vellney Davis had a trunk put on the rear. We intended to put a heater on the car but we wrecked it. We kept this car in a private garage at 39th and Broadway in an alley across from the Blackstone Apartments.

John and I got in car with two sawed off shot guns, a high power rifle and we all had a pistol, we had a crowbar, chisels and a hammer to get thru a brick wall. About 10:30 P.M. we started to Drexel, Mo., intending to get there about midnight but we had

trouble with the fuel pump on the car and we didn't get to
Drexel until about 3:00 A.M. We drove up behind the bank and
John and Vollney got out. Jess and I then drove to the high
school and turned 3 blocks to the right then 2 miles left.
John and Vollney walked down the railroad tracks to where we
were carrying all their tool and guns, they were loaded down.
They met us there about daylight and told us they couldn't get
in the bank because they didn't have time. They had broken into
a store and tried to get thru the brick wall of the bank from
the store. The store they broke into was just to the left of
the bank (I don't remember the directions).

Vollney Davis had on a grey suit, greyish blue top coat, grey hat and had on a pair of high galloshes or overshoes with his pants tucked into them. Jess Doyle was wearing a heavy (double breasted) blue overcoat and a grey hat. I was wearing a greyish blue suit and tan top coat.

"We then decided to drive to town and rob the bank as it was opened. We drove to town and Jess and I filled up the car with gas while the other boys stopped at a cafe. Jess and I drove on a side street close to the bank and waited for the bank to open.

"Davis and John Langdon walked to the back of the back and run a crowbar thru the door and ran around in front to see if the alarm would go off, the alarm didn't go off so they went back and went in the rear door of the bank and waited for the employees to come to work. When the employees came in John and Vollney put them to "work" just as if they were doing their regular job. I was across the street in front of the Post Office - A postal employee, a mail carrier, I think, was loading sacks of mail into a truck. This man had a pistol and he kept watching me -- Jess was down the street a ways with the high powered rifle and it would have been bad if this postal employee had "shook" me

I waited across the street where I was in a position to look thru the bank window to where I could see the vault. The time lock had gone off when the man came into the bank that opened the vault and John put a gun on him and teld him it was a robbery and for him to open it up. He got excited and started to grab at John's gun - Vollney would have shot him if John hadn't prevented it.

"When I saw the man open the vault I got back to the car and Jess was under the wheel. I got in and we pulled up behind the bank in the alley. Just as we got there Vollney came out first, John behind. John had a big pasteboard box in his arms, it was used to carry the money out in, John had put. the bills, money trays and silver into the box. Just as they were coming out of the rear door of the bank a big fellow came walking down a wooden stairs (outside stairs) from a building near the bank, he evidently saw what was going on and he turned and started to go back but Vollney caught him and told him to get on the side of the car if he was bothered with nose trouble he could go along but on the way to the car the fellow got a building between him and Vollney and started to run down the alley. Jess told me to jump out of the car and catch him - I jumped out of the car and put a sawed-off automatic shotgun on him and brought him back to the car. We put him on the running board on the left side where Vollney could watch him (Vollney was sitting on the left side) Vollney told him if he jumped off he would shoot him thru both kidneys. However, when we got about two blocks away Vollney pushed him off.

"We then drove back to Kansas City, and just as we were near the Missouri Kansas line, down close to the old police station, Vollney and I took the paper money (Jess & John kept the silver) put it in our coat pockets and went to a saloon. Jess and John put the car in a garage. After Vollney and I had a drink we took a cab to his apartment and got his own car and drove to Jess's and divided all the money."

STATEMENT OF PRESTON PADEN

Hutchinson, Kansas October 5, 1936.

I, Preston Payden, possessing all my mental faculties, make the following statement, as told to me by Jess Doyle, to Joe Anderson of the Kansas Highway Patrol, voluntarily, knowing the same to be true, without threats, or duress, or promises of any nature having been made to me.

Jess Doyle, Freddie Barker and Doc Barker, Alvin
(Karpis, Vern Miller, Frank Nash and Larry DeVol robbed the

Concordia Bank about July 26, 1932, obtaining some \$22,000.00. It 1932 Model 7 passenger Hudson Sedan was used in this robbery. This car was disguised somewhat, they having put on different hubcaps. Upon robbing the bank, they had trouble with the President of the Bank. He wouldn't open the vault, and they had to whip him for 45 minutes, using 45 caliber pistols. The president still refused to open the vault, so Barker got a girl stenographer and brought her in in front of the president, threw her on the floor at his feet and threatened to shoot her head off if he didn't open the vault. The president said he would gladly open the vault, but that he wasn't physically able to do so due to the violent beating; however, he wrote the combination out, and they opened the vault themselves and got the money.

Paul, Minnesota, and went to a saloon in St. Paul. This hangout was known as "Harry Sawyer's Place".

FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

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It is also to be noted that extensive investigation has been conducted by the Post Office Inspector's department to cause the apprehension of Lett in connection with the Garrettsville, Chio, mail train robbery which occurred on 11-7-35.

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A review of the file reflects that Milton Lett's name was first directed to the attention of the Bureau as possibly being associated with the Barker-Karpis gang in the report of Special Agent Paul Hanson, dated at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on 9-7-35, wherein advised Agent Hanson

that Harry Campbell had been driven

Oklahoma, during elemer april or May, 1935. It was also noted that about the same time he drove Campbell to the home of Mildred Jones near Turley, Oklahoma, where Campbell left \$50.00 for Mark Whinnery. However, Hanson indicated that from the various conversations he had previously had it was his opinion that this boy without a doubt was the son of Maggie Lett who resided at Wann, Oklahoma. Lett was contacted shortly thereafter and his cooperation solicited to serve as an informant of the Oklahoma City office in causing the apprehension of the subjects of this case, and more specifically the apprehension of Harry Campbell.

The next apparent incident of interest concerning Lett is contained in the report of Agent Hanson, dated 11-25-35, wherein information is set forth concerning the discovery of the fact that Lett's mother had received five registered letters from Cleveland and vicinity from May 6, 1935, to October 7, 1935. At that time it was thought that HarryCampbell was the author of these letters and was using the Lett address as a post office whereby he could maintain contact with his relatives in that vicinity.

The report of Special Agent Paul Hanson, dated 12-11-35, reflects that great difficulty was experienced in locating Lett for an interview although he had indicated he would act as an informant for the Oklahoma City Office. He was finally located and interviewed at his mother's home at Wann, Oklahoma, at which time he informed that his absence from his mother's home was occasioned by the fact that he had obtained a position with Ted Thornton, who operated a tavern near Nevada, No. Subsequent investigation has developed that Lett could not have been steadily employed by Thornton at that time, inasmuch as investigation at Cleveland, Ohio, and vicinity disclosed his presence in those places at approximately the time he claimed he was working for Ted Thornton. At the time Lett claimed he was employed by Thornton

at his tavern at Nevada, Mo., which was known as the "State Line Tavern", the tavern was operated by Thornton and his brother-in-law, Earl/Norris. These persons as well as his mother-in-law, Mrs. Esther Twilley, Coffey-ville, have since been interviewed from time to time to locate Milton Lett, with negative results. It is to be noted that this tavern is presently being operated by Verne Griffin, who is acquainted with both of the former owners and he has likewise been interviewed with negative results. However, he has indicated his desire to cooperate and has been interviewed periodically without any information of value being developed.

It is to be noted that shortly after the last indicated interview with Milton Lett, he disappeared from South Coffeyville, Okla., and no definite information has been developed concerning his whereabouts since 2-21-36, on which date he married Lucille Ferris at Oswego, Kansas, and on 7-31-37, on which date one Mac Goodwin, who claimed a personal acquaintance with Lett, stated she had observed Lett walking in the direction of the Hollingsworth home, 427 South Washington St., Wichita, Kansas. This last information concerning Lett's whereabouts is reported in report of Special Agent L. H. Richmond, dated at Kansas City, Mo., on 8-31-37.

At approximately the same time as the investigation which is set forth in the above reports, of Special Agent Paul Hanson, investigation at Cleveland, Ohio, and vicinity developed that Lett had been associated with Karpis and Campbell from about April, 1935, to May, 1936. It was established that he had been employed as a "shill" at the Harvard Club, Cleveland, Ohio, a notorious gambling establishment, from April to September, 1935. It was also determined that Lett was in close contact with Harry Campbell at Toledo, Chio, from 10-1-35 to 5-1-36.

The first definite information indicating that Lett was an associate of this gang is contained in a letter directed to the Bureau by Inspector E. J. Connelley, dated at Chicago, Ill., on 1-27-36, which informed that Lett had been identified as a person who under the alias Carl Baker had purchased the automobile which was used in the Carretts-ville, Chic, mail train robbery on 11-7-35, this identification having been effected through an arrest record of the Akron, Ohio, Police Department, where Lett was arrested under the alias Thomas J. Shaw, on 10-19-35. It is to be noted that the automobile, a 1935 Plymouth Sedan, Notor PJ 322772, Serial 2619857, which was used in the Carretts-ville robbery has not been recovered to date.

The Kansas City Division was also advised by letter from Inspector E. J. Connelley, dated at Chicago, Ill., 1-28-37, that Lett's apprehension was desired, together with other pertinent information concerning Lett's connections in Coffeyville, Kansas. A summarization of the investigation conducted in connection with this letter

is set forth in the report of Special Agent L. H. Richmond, dated at Kansas City, No., on 8-31-37, and although active investigation was immediately instituted, no information was ascertained concerning Lett's whereabouts.

It has been definitely established that Karpis and Campbell participated in the Carrettsville robbery. It has also been established that Lett did not participate in this robbery although it has been positively determined that Lett purchased the automobile, namely the Plymouth Sedan, which was used in the robbery, inasmuch as through his criminal record and other information, it developed that he voluntarily surrendered himself to the authorities at Coffeyville, Kansas, on the day of that robbery, apparently to establish an alibi for himself in order that he could vindicate himself of being a participant in the robbery in the event he was identified as the purchaser of the bandit car.

Considerable investigation has been conducted by the Oklahoma City and Kensas City Division offices to date to locate and apprehend Lett, with negative results. During the course of this investigation, it was ascertained, as set forth in the report of Special Agent W. E. Hopton, dated at Kansas City, Mo., on 3-2-36, that Lett married Lucille Ferris of Coffeyville, Kansas, at Oswego, Kansas, on 2-21-36. Investigation has likewise been conducted by the above offices to locate Lucille Ferris with a view of thereby causing the apprehension of Lett, with negative results.

It is to be noted that a review of the file looking towards the apprehension of Milton Lett was made by the Cleveland Division Office, as set out in report of Special Agent A. Paul Kitchen, dated 3-22-37, and that another review was made by the Kansas City


Division on8-31-37, as set out in the report of Special Agent L. H. Richmond of that date.

A review of the file further reflects that all of the leads set forth in the report of Special Agent Kitchen have been covered but no information of value developed thereby. It is noted that the report of Special Agent Richmond contains numerous leads to be covered by the Ensas City Office but the review fails to reflect that the majority of these leads have been covered by that office. In accordance with Bureau instructions, the Kansas City Office is being requested to expedite the investigation as outlined in Agent Richmond's report. Attention is being directed to the fact that most of the investigation looking towards the apprehension of Milton Lett is confined to the territorities covered by the Kansas City and Oklahoma City Divisions, and accordingly these offices are being requested to conduct prompt and virogous investigation in order that Lett's apprehension may be effected in the near guture. Particular attention is directed to the fact that in view of the approaching holiday season, appropriate mail covers should be placed on the mail of the immediate relatives of both Lett and his wife and that any tracings which indicate any possibility that Lett or his wife is communicating with their relatives, should receive immediate attention. In this connection, a letter is being directed to the Bureau requesting that this office as well as all interested offices be furnished with available specimens of Lett's handwriting for comparison purposes in connection with these tracings.

The report of Special Agent W. E. Hopton, dated at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on 4-5-37, reflects that information was developed through George Tobler, 305 Ellis Street, Coffeyville, Kansas, to the effect that Mrs. Constance Merris, who is employed in a W.P.A. sewing room at Coffeyville, Kansas, made the remark that "her daughter was smart", in that she was living down south in New Orleans where they don't have cold weather. This information was advanced to Mr. Tobler by his sister, who is employed as superintendent of the W.P.A. sewing room.

Attention is directed to the fact that investigation has also developed, as indicated in report of Special Agent F. R. Hammack, Kansas City, on 1-2-37, that Mrs. Eva Hooper had left for New Orleans, La., during the early part of January, 1937; further that a confidential informant of the Cleveland Office identified Lett's picture as a person known to him as "Willie" from New Orleans. In view of these facts, it can be presumed that Lett has visited New Orleans in the past and that further efforts should be made to determine whether or not he is presently located in that city.

In this respect, it is suggested that the Oklahoma City Office



It is also believed that Mrs. W. T. Wiley, 1109 South 33rd St., St. Joseph, No., should be re-contacted at this time to determine whether or not she might be able to furnish further information indicating that lett is presently at New Orleans, Ia. It is being pointed out that at the time she was interviewed, Mrs. Eva Hooper was a neighbor; however, that Mrs. Hooper is presently residing at Springfield, No., and in view of this fact, it is believed that possibly Mrs. Wiley will be more inclined to furnish all information in her possession due to the fact that Mrs. Hooper is no longer a neighbor. It is noted that Mrs. Wiley received a post card from Mrs. Hooper, dated at New Orleans, La., on 1-8-37, and in view of this fact, there is some possibility that Mrs. Wiley was in closer contact with Mrs. Hooper than she indicated at the time she was interviewed by Agent Hammack.

It is noted that reports of Special Agent R. M. Pranke, Los Angeles, dated 7-2 and 9-7-37, set forth interviews with LenyJordan, Long Beach, Cal., who is an acquaintance of Lett and that Jordan has assured the Bureau of his cooperation. He should be periodically contacted in order that his present cooperative attitude be maintained. Attention is also being directed to the fact that although Len Jordan has indicated a cooperative attitude, it is believed that appropriate contact should be made with the present manager of the apartment where Jordan lives to maintain a surveillance of the Jordan home in event Lett or his wife should appear at that place. Investigation as set forth in the above mentioned reports of Special Agent Pranke indicates that Jordan has furnished all the information in his possession concerning Lett. However, it is noted that he indicated he believed Lett might visit him in event he knew of his address at Long Beach, Cal. In view of this fact, it is believed that appropriate arrangements should be made with the present custodian of the apartment in order that the Los Angeles office be immediately notified in event anyone answering the description of Lett appears at Jordan's home. This action is deemed advisable inasmuch as it is felt that lett might depart from the Jordan home prior to the time that Jordan would be able to get word to the Los Angeles office of Lett's presence at his home.

It is also noted that Peggy Mize, a sister of Lett, who resides at Mojave, Cal., has been interviewed several times and has maintained a very belligerent attitude towards Bureau Agents. On one occasion she flatly stated that she would not divulge any information concerning the whereabouts of Lett if she was in possession of such information. It is noted that arrangements have been made whereby Don Brink, Deputy Sheriff, at Mojave, Cal., will maintain a surveillance of the Mize residence for Lett. It is suggested that Brink be contacted at intervals to be sure of the fact that this surveillance is being maintained.

It is also suggested that if possible, some one residing in the immediate vicinity of the Mize home be developed to serve as an informant in likewise maintaining a surveillance of the Mize home. In this connection it is to be noted that the Bureau has authorized the payment of any sum up to \$50.00 for information leading to the location and apprehension of Lett.

It is to be noted that 13 mail tracings were forwarded to the Cincinnsti Office, with the report of Special Agent R. M. Pranke, dated at Los Angeles, 9-7-37. An exemination of these tracings reflects that there is only one bearing a return address which should receive further investigation, that being the letter directed to Miss Bertie Jordan, 526 Orange St., Apt. #15, Long Beach, Cal., bearing postmark Wichita, Kansas, 7-1-37, and also bearing the return address, Mrs.C.W. Traup, 1815 South Broadway St., Wichita, Kansas. Investigation should be conducted at this point to ascertain the identity of Mrs. C. W.

It is noted that the report of Special Agent W.E. Hopton, dated at Oklahoma City, Okla., on 8-21-37, reflects that Constance Ferris was working at the W.P. A. sewing room, Coffeyville, Kansas, at that time and residing at the residence of Bessie Haggard, 605 W. 10th Street. This report reflects the last active investigation by the Oklahoma City office and that office is being requested to immediately conduct the investigation requested in the leads set forth in that report. It is being pointed out that the character and reputation of Mrs. Haggard should be determined before she is approached with a view of causing her to act as an informant for the Oklahoma City Office. It is believed that if she is determined to bear a good character and reputation she may possibly be induced to serve as a confidential informant and has the confidence of Mrs. Ferris to the extent that Mrs. Ferris might divulge the whereabouts of subject Lett and his wife to her.

This report further reflects that Mr. F.B. Hanlon informed that he had recently heard that a young brother of Lucille Ferris is now living at Coffeyville, Kansas, with his mother and suggested that possibly the brother might know the present location of his eister lucille. It is noted that one Yern Ferris (his relationship to the Ferris family is not indicated) is presently residing with Mrs. Bernice Elliston, an aunt, at Portland, Oregon. This individual may be the younger brother of Lucille Ferris. However, the Oklahoma City Office should bear this matter in sind when conducting interviews with various relatives of the Ferris family in that vicinity, with a view of etermining the name and present whereabouts of this brother.

A review of the file of the Kansas City Office, as contained in the report of Special Agent L. H. Richmond, dated at Kansas City, Mo., on 8-31-37, discloses that this report contains several outstanding leads which should receive immediate attention. Inasmuch as investigative action to be taken in connection with these leads is clearly set forth in Agent Richmond's report, no further comment will be made concerning them. It is also noted that investigation which was conducted by Special Agent S. B. Landrum at Wichita, Kansas, is reported in this report. It is noted that a lead is contained therein to maintain an appropriate contact with Jack Goodwin, Santa Fe Special Agent, and his informant Mae Goodwin. This lead should receive preferred attention and appropriate arrangements made whereby Lett can be apprehended in event he appears in the vicinity of the Hollingworth home in the future.

Detective Esra O'Connor of the Wichita Police Department should be contacted at frequent intervals in order that he in turn may contact William Thompson who resides two doors from the Hollingworth home, in order that assurance may be had that William Thompson is actually maintaining a surveillance of that place.

It is also noted that Mr. A. E. Ferrie, father of Milton Lett's wife, was interviewed at Wichita, Kansas, without any information being secured as to Lett's whereabouts, he stating that he had not seen his daughter since her elopement with lett. It appears that Mr. Ferris has told the truth at the time of this interview. However, it is suggested that appropriate arrangements be made either through his employer, the Yingling Brothers Motor Company, Wichita, Kansas, or some employee of that company, to secure Mr. Ferris' confidence to actually determine whether or not he has been in communication with his daughter in the past. There is also some possibility that Lucille Ferris might attempt to communicate with her father by directing a letter to him at his place of employment. Arrangements could be made with officials of this company whereby information concerning any letters which might be received by Mr. Ferris, might be immediately relayed to the Kansas City Office. Mr. Ferris should also be contacted in the immediate future to determine whether or not he has been successful in developing any information through Mrs. Eva Hooper concerning the present whereabouts

of Lett.

It is also believed that an informant should be established in the immediate vicinity of Mrs. Hooper's home at Springfield, No., in order that the Kansas City Office might be immediately advised in event any one answering the description of either Lett or his wife appear at the Hooper home. It is also suggested that a mail cover be placed on the mail of Mrs. Hooper and that it be maintained over the Holiday period.

Under date of 10-11-37, the Kansas City Office forwarded two mail tracings to this office by letter. One of these tracings did not contain any return address while the other, which was directed to Mrs. D. C. Hollingsworth, 427 South Washington, Wichita, Kansas, bore the return address, "Mrs. M. C. Johns, 1924 Locust St., Omaha, Nebraska". It is not known who Mrs. Johns is and accordingly the Omaha Division is being requested to conduct appropriate investigation in the vicinity of the Johns' residence to ascertain the identity of this individual. A photograph of Milton Lett is being forwarded to the Omaha Division with two copies of this report for its assistance in conducting investigation.

A letter was directed to the Chicago Division by this office under date of 8-5-37 with copies to all Field Offices, setting forth information concerning 1935/Ford V-8 Tudor Sedan, Motor 2044337, and 1935 Plymouth Sedan, Motor PJ 322772, Serial 2619857. The Ford automobile was registered in Kansas in 1935 under the name of J. M. Lett, 113 Ea. 8th St., Coffeyville, Kansas, and the Plymouth automobile was registered in Chio during 1935 in the name of Carl Baker, who is identical with Milton Lett. Neither of the above cars have been recovered to date. All offices to whom the above letter was directed were requested to make a re-check to ascertain if either of these cars is registered in their territories at the present time and if no registration was found, to place appropriate stop notices against these cars.

Attention is directed to the fact that in event any information is received concerning the whereabouts of these automobiles, immediate investigative action should be taken to develop all information concerning them, with a view of causing the apprehension of lett.

No leads are being set forth for the Oklahoma City and Kansas City Offices, inasmuch as most of the investigation looking towards the apprehension of Lett is confined to the territories covered by those particular offices and in view of Bureau instructions, those offices are requested to give outstanding leads in their divisions preferred and vigorous investigative attention.

Each of the other offices to whom copies of this report

have been designated should carefully note the contents thereof and conduct any investigation which might come to their attention, with a view of causing the apprehension of Lett.

Particular attention of the New Orleans Division is being directed to the fact that information has been developed from several sources that Lett was reported to be residing at that city. It is suggested that Police officials in charge of vice and gambling squads of that city be contacted and fully informed of the gambling activities of Lett, with a view of soliciting their cooperation in canvassing the various gambling establishments at New Orleans, with a view of causing the apprehension of Lett. Lett is known to be a gambler and to have been employed by gambling establishments in the past and it is believed that he will continue to follow this line of endeavor.

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Likewise no leads are being set forth for the Cleveland Office but it is being pointed but that Lett has been formerly closely associated with the proprietors and employees of the Harvard Club at Cleveland, Ohio. It is to be noted that several people interested in the operation of this club have recently been prosecuted at Cleveland, Ohio, in connection with this case and it is not believed that any information of value could be secured from them concerning the whereabouts of Lett. However, the Cleveland office will consider the advisability of approaching Shimmy Patton, one of the owners of the Harvard Club, to ascertain if he has any information concerning the present whereabouts of Lett. It is also entirely possible that Lett might be in communication with some of the employees of that club at the present time. However, inasmuch as this office is not familiar with the present set—up of the club at this time, no further suggestion is being made in this connection.

Attention is also directed to the fact that Lett was likewise closely associated with Clayton Hall, Youngstown, Ohio, who has served as an informant in this case in the past. There is some possibility that Lett might be in communication with this individual and the Cleveland Office will aikewise consider the advisability of re-contacting him for this purpose.





UNKNOWN SUBJECTS: MARTIN WUNDERLICH, VICTIM CONFIDENCE GAME.

Tommy Thompson, a reporter for the St. Paul Dispatch, telephoned me on November 12, 1937, inquiring whether we had any information indicating that John J. Curry, with aliases, subject of case entitled "John J. Curry, with aliases; Robert Ballentine, Victim; NSPA; Confidence Game", had an alias of Meade. I informed Thompson that I did not recall whether Curry had such an alias and asked him why he was inquiring. He stated that he had just received a tip from an informant of his that a fellow named Meade was one of the sonfidence men who swindled Martin Wunderlich out of \$200,000 in 1933, and that his informant had advised him that he believed John J.Curry, who at present is on bond on the charge filed against him at St. Paul in connection with the confidence game perpetrated on Robert Ballentine, was probably the Meade who was involved in swindling Wunderlich. Thompson stated that he had perused his files at the newspaper office and had found an Identification Order issued by this Bureau on William Elmer Mead and that his inquiries had indicated that John J. Curry had not used the alias of Meade. He believed that the informant was mixed up on the information he was giving concerning the connection between Mead and Curry, but that he believed his informant probably had some good information indicating that William Elmer Mead was connected with the swindle of Wunderlich. Thompson informed me that he was digging into the matter further and was again contacting his informant and that he would let me know if he obtained any good information. Thompson, of course, if he obtains any definite information, will undoubtedly write a newspaper article concerning 76. him. 1482

After the telephonic conversational whith Athonic Stigation reviewed our files for information doncerning the Martin Wunderlich and found a memorandum by Special Reed, who was then attached to the Kensasucity office

February 11, 1934, in our file on the Bremer case,

was transmitted to this office by letter of SAC Conroy, Kansas City, dated February 11, 1934, in the case UNKNOWN SUBJECTS; EDWARD GEORGE BREMER, Victim; Kidnaping. This letter was in response to a letter dated February 6, 1934, at St. Paul by Assistant Director Harold Nathan, requesting the Kansas City Office to interview Martin Wunderlich concerning the confidence game perpetrated on him, because at that time it was thought that the confidence men probably had some connection with the kidnaping of Edward George Bremer.

In reading this memorandum covering the interview with Martin Wunderlich, it appears that the modus operandi employed by the confidence men in the Wunderlich case compares very closely/with the modus operandi employed in the case entitled TOM MESSICK, with aliases, et al; Henry C. Husman, Victim; NSPA; Conspiracy Confidence Game.

In this connection, please refer to the memorandum of Special Agent R. G. Reed in the Bremer case above referred to relating the modus operandi employed in the Wunderlich case, and the report of the writer dated September 16, 1937, at St. Paul, and report of Special Agent A. G. Berens, St. Paul, dated September 28, 1937, in the Messick case.

On page three, paragraph one, of the memorandum of Agent Reed in the Wunderlich case, it will be noted that the steerer, Layton, and Wunderlich were waiting for the "old man" and that Layton recognized an acquaintance in the hotel who identified himself as Billy Farley and that he put up a hard luck story of undue publicate which was about to cause him his job with the syndicate and later displayed several newspaper clippings with his picture appearing therein and later exhibited checks on the New York Exchange, Incorporated.

In connection with the Messick case, please refer to page three of my report of September 16, 1937, beginning at the first paragraph, wherein Husman, the victim, and Messick, the steerer, were loafing in the Warrior Hotel and Messick recognized a party whom he introduced as Bennett, a stock broker, and Bennett indicated he had been making big money in stock deals as the result of which he had been suspended from the brokerage house with which he was connected in Kansas City or Joplin.

I do not find this reflected in the report, but I recall that the Victim, Husman, stated that Bennett at this time exhibited newspaper clippings indicating that he, Bennett, was to be suspended from the stock brokerage house. The other modus operandi employed in both cases, in the Wunderlich case with reference to bidding on a horse race and in the Messick case with reference to buying stock, indicates almost identical modus operandi.

It is noted in the report of Special Agent J. L. Flood, dated July 23, 1936, at Omaha, Nebraska, in the case entitled ALVIN KARPIS, with aliases; DR. JOSEPH MORAN, with aliases, FUGITIVE, I.O. 1232, et al; EDWARD GEORGE BREMER, Victim; Kidnaping, etc., covering the interview with William Elmer Mead upon his apprehension at Omaha, Nebraska, on July 8, 1936, it is stated on page 16 of this report, that Mead would not admit that he participated in swindling Martin Wunderlich at St. Paul. It may be that Meade gave further definite information concerning the Wunderlich case, but I am unable to locate it at this time in our files.

It is realized that the confidence game employed on Wunderlich did not at that time constitute a Federal offense, but I thought that because this is still apparently one of the largest unsolved swindling cases that the Bureau might be interested in having photographs of the subjects in the Messick case and the subjects in the case entitled John J. Curry, etal, Robert Ballentine, Victim, displayed to the Victim, Martin Wunderlich, who is indicated by the telephone directory as now residing at 530 Desnoyer Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota.

It is also thought that the Bureau, in view of the large file on well known confidence men now in possession of the Bureau, might desire to forward photographs of confidence men answering the approximate description of the confidence men as described in the memorandum of Agent Reed, and show same to Wunderlich in an effort to have the identification of the confidence men made at least, even though the same would probably not result in any Federal prosecution, but of course might possibly result in State prosecution.

I do not know the exact status of the State prosecution and do not at this time desire to make any inquiries in view of the activity of Thompson of the Dispatch.

Will the Bureau please advise me in the premises?



The Bureau has recently instructed that every effort be made to apprehend kilton Lett in order that he may be guestioned in connection with harboring investigations in this case. The file reflects that he was a contact of Karpis and Harry Compbell and purchased the automobile which was used by Karpis, Campbell, et al. in the Gerrettsville, Ohio train robbery. However, at the present time, no Federal process is outstanding for him.

On November 10, 1957, Sheriff Hugh Owen, Nowata, Oklahoma, telephonically edvised this office that Sergeant Andrew Bidwell of the Oklahoma State Highway Patrol, Bartlesville, Oklahoma, had learned through Anita McDonald, a waitress in the Snack Shop at Bartlesville, Oklahoma, that Milton Lett, accompanied by a girl enswering to his wife's description, ate lunch at the Snack Shop on November 9th and 10, 1957. She stated that the woman who was accompanying Lett had a badly sourced face, apparently from an automobile accident. She reported that Lett was driving a 1956 gray Ford coses, ligense unknown.

"Doc Lett, has been assisting this office in securing information as to Milton Lett's whereabouts. On November 12, 1937, ADA Tett, pecchipanied by Special Agents L. E. Kingman and V. E. Bopton of this office, proceeded to Independence, Mansas where "Doc" Lett interviewed Irallett, a cousin of his and Milton, who was confined in the pounty jail there on a grand largeny charge under a year's sentence. 
