

For the Bureau's information, I wish to advise that while lunching with Mr. John Carlisle of The Detroit News on January 51, 1938, he informed me that Mrs. Cassius McDonald has been telephoning him on an average of three times a week and is now trying to get him to write a story concerning the Bureau's activities in the Ross kidnaping case.

Mr. Carlisle stated that in conversing with Mrs. McDonald she informed that Victim Ross had been killed because the case had been mishandled by the Bureau and that the public should know about these facts.

Mr. Carlisle advised that he is satisfied that this woman is mentally deranged and that he does not wish to have anything further to do with her. He informed that he made his mistake in listening to her the first time, because now she insists on conversing with him every time she contacts The

In connection with a carbon copy of a letter dated December 22, 1933, addressed from the Kansas City Office to the Oklahoma City Office concerning VOLNA DAVIS, FRED BARKER, and ALVIN KARPIS, with various aliases, who have been reported to the Kansas City Office as possibly implicated in the slayings in connection with the case entitled VERNON C. MILLER, Deceased, et al, Conspiracy To Deliver Federal Prisoner, you are advised a search of the fingerprint files of this Unit discloses criminal records of individuals who may possibly be identical with those named, as follows:

Loyd Barker, our file #132278.

As Loyd Barker, alias Lloyd Anderson, #1916, arrested Police Department, Tulsa, Oklahoma, January 15, 1921, charge investigation.

Dis description at that time is as follows:

Sex Male Hair Chestnut - medium Age 23 years Beard Sandy Height 5-62 Eyes Blue Weight 150 Complexion Florid.

As Lloyd Barker, alias Lloyd Anderson, #17243, received U. S. Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kensas, January 16, 1922, from Kansas City, Missouri, convicted of robbing U. S. Mail; sentenced to serve 25 years - minimum term to expire October 29, 1938 - eligible to parole May 15, 1930. No photograph of this individual appears in our files.

Volney Davis, our file #100411.

As Volney Davis, #1025, Police Department, Tulsa, Oklahoma, arrested at Kansas City, Missouri, February 5, 1919, charge grand larceny; turned over to Tulsa County.

Dear Sir:

Please refer to my letter of September 27, 1937 in which I stated that pawnbroker Harry Goldstein of Tulsa, Oklahoma would be interviewed at a later date regarding his failure to take clear fingerprints of the purchaser of the gun which was later found in Karpis' possession.

Special Agent L. E. Kingman has advised me that on February 18, 1938 Chief of Police Roy Hyatt, Tulsa, Oklahoma, in his presence summoned Goldstein to his office. At that time Chief Hyatt told Goldstein in no uncertain terms that Goldstein's failure to comply with the city ordinance in clearly fingerprinting purchasers of guns had been the means of causing the Federal Bureau of Investigation a lot of trouble and unnecessary work, and that through his negligence the Bureau had been unable to ascertain the identity of the person to whom he sold the gun. Chief Hyatt in strong language told Goldstein that all of his pistol sales were being closely watched not only to see that he took clear fingerprints but to learn whether he sold any firearms to any suspicious persons.

Goldstein was told by Agent Kingman that the Bureau was also very much interested in him and that it felt he, himself, was under suspicion due to his lack of complying with the city ordinance and the meager information he had been able to furnish regarding the purchaser.

Agent Kingman has advised me that Goldstein was very much frightened efter this conference and that he promised faithfully thereafter to carefully fingerprint purchasers of guns.

ALVIN KARPIS

ANNOUNCER: Alvin Karpis, bank robber, kidnaper and number one of the most desperate criminals of modern times, is now serving a life sentence at Alcatraz - the Federal Government's penitentiary where so many of our most desperate criminals are confined. Station is happy tonight to bring you the true facts concerning his life. Through the courtesy of J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, I am happy to have with me tonight, Mr., Special Agent in

Division.

ANSWER: I am indeed happy to be with you tonight, Mr.

Charge of the FBI's

ANNOUNCER: Mr. , I imagine every Special Agent in the FBI heaved a sigh of relief when Alvin Karpis finally entered Alcatraz.

ANSWER: Indeed they did, Mr.

. Many are the Special Agents who have worked, day after day, night after night, covering lead after lead, hoping to be led to the hide-out of Karpis and his associates. One by one they were located and their criminal careers brought to an end, either by the Federal Government, or by the guns of their own associates.

ANNOUNCER: And the FBI performed almost a miracle in rounding up the Karpis-Barker Gang. Every one of them was a desperado of the worst type. But to get back to Karpis, he became public enemy No. 1, almost over night, did he not?

ANSWER: No, not quite, Mr. . You see, we of the FBI have never dignified our more notorious criminals by calling them "Public Enemy Number 1."

After all, their degree of crime is relative yet cumulative until they reach the point where nothing matters but their continued freedom and plunder. Criminals are made, not born.

ANNOUNCER: I know that our many listeners would be interested in learning a little of Karpis' background and of some of his activities.

ANSWER: His life is typical of so many of our public enemies and for about ten years, practically all of his activities were unlawful. Most of his associates were from the underworld. Alvin Karpis was born in Montreal, Canada, in August of 1907, and was christened Alvin Karpovics. When Karpis was two years old, his family moved to Topeka, Kansas, where they remained until 1923, after which they moved to Chicago. Because he was sickly, he was petted by the family. He was pampered and babied.

Otherwise he was quiet and rated as a good student at the grammar school.

ANNOUNCER: Wasn't it Karpis who gained quite a reputation as a crack marble player when a boy, particularly when he was playing for keeps?

ANSWER: Yes, you are right. Shortly after his family moved to Chicago, young Alvin was found to have a leaky heart and returned to Topeka. It was shortly thereafter that Karpis decided on a career of crime, for soon a series of burglaries began in his home town. Police traced the loot to Karpis. He was convicted and sentenced to serve 10 years in the State Industrial Reformatory at Hutchison, Kansas, where he was received in February of 1926.

ANNOUNCER: Was that his first skirmish with the forces of law and order?

ANSWER: Not exactly. Prior to this conviction, Karpis was arrested many times.

In Chipley, Florida, for instance, he was arrested in October of

1925, for train riding and served a brief jail sentence.

ANNOUNCER: Tell me, how long was Karpis in the Kansas Reformatory?

ANSWER: About three years. While serving his time there he was assigned as a baker's helper. This required long hours on duty which was not to his liking. Accordingly he violated many of the prison rules and served many days in solitary confinement. There his mind was not idle and he planned many ways of escaping. One of his schemes was successful and with a friend he effected his escape in March of 1929.

ANNOUNCER: Where did he go?

ANSWER:

ANSWER: He immediately joined his parents in Chicago.

ANNOUNCER: They knew he was an escaped convict. Didn't they notify the authorities?

No. They thought he was leading a law-abiding life after his escape and refrained from notifying the authorities. Soon another young hoodlum joined Karpis and he turned away from his parents. In March of 1930, about one year after his escape, Karpis and his associate were arrested in Kansas City, Missouri, for car stealing and safe blowing. It was here that Karpis began using aliases and before Director Hoover and a detail of Agents captured him in New Orleans, we knew him by 51 names. His friends always called him Ray.

ANNOUNCER: And was he prosecuted in Missouri for these crimes?

ANSWER: No. He was returned to the Kansas Reformatory and later transferred to the State Penitentiary. "I got out of that easily," Karpis later boasted. "They put me to work in the coal mines. In there you're allowed good time on all the coal you mine over a certain amount. Well



making a few dollars. I agreed to pay them retail price on all the extra coal they'd mine for me. I turned all this in on my account and got good time for it. Later I paid every convict who'd helped me, except one fellow I couldn't find." Karpis walked out, a free man, on May 31, 1931. By pre-arrangement Karpis met Fred Barker, his pal and former prison associate, in Tulsa, Oklahoma, a few days later.

And the Karpis-Barker gang that was to spread terrorism in the hearts

ANNOUNCER: And the Karpis-Barker gang that was to spread terrorism in the hearts of thousands came into existence.

ANSWER: Right. But within ten days after his release from prison, Karpis was arrested in Tulsa with Fred Barker. On September 10, 1931, Karpis entered a plea of guilty to the charge of burglary, and the following notation appears upon his criminal record: "Sentenced --- to serve 3 years. State Reformatory, Granite, Oklahoma. Paroled from bench same date to his attorney." Fred Barker also escaped serving a penitentiary sentence. Together they went to Thayer, Missouri. There they were received by that female demon, "Ma" Barker.

ANNOUNCER: Soon terror began to spread. On December 18, 1931, Karpis and Fred Barker robbed a store at West Plains, Missouri, using a car which the Sheriff of West Plains recognized on the following day. When he walked toward the two bandits, they shot him down in cold blood.

ANSWER: And Karpis, Fred and "Ma" Barker fled to the home of Herb Farmer at Joplin, Missouri, who was later convicted in Federal Court. From there they went to St. Paul, Minnesota, where Karpis met Harry Sawyer and Jack Pfeiffer, two St. Paul hoodlums who were later to figure prominently in both the Hamm and Bremer kidnaping cases. Sawyer is now serving a life term at Alcatraz, and Pfeiffer committed suicide after his

ANNOUNCER: Wasn't it here that Karpis and Barker also met "Shot Gun" George
Zeigler, a college graduate?

ANSWER: Yes. And they later murdered him with his own favorite weapon - the shot gun - after he was of no more use to them.

ANNOUNCER: By now Karpis was a post-graduate of crime. Even his own gang was afraid of him. A gun moll who was not above consorting with a professional murderer, gave him the underworld name of "Old Creepy" because of his cold stare and precision in carrying out his crimes.

ANSWER: His sense of humor was also distorted. Once he spent an entire day composing a poem which had as its catch phrase, "The G-Men will get you if you don't watch out."

ANNOUNCER: Mr. , there was more truth than poetry in that line.

ANSWER:

Karpis' true character came out in many of his activities. There was the bank robber friend, for instance, who was fatally wounded when the gang robbed a bank at Fairbury, Nebraska. They propped him up in the back of the car and drove him to the home of a professional killer in Kansas City. Under cover of darkness, gangland had a burial. The bandit's mother heard that her son had been killed and began a search for his body in order that he might be given a decent burial. Certain members of the Karpis-Barker gang wanted to tell her where his body could be found. Karpis vetoed, saying, "If she goes and digs up that stiff the cops may hear about it. They might find a clue that would start them after us."

ANNOUNCER: Yes. That was Alvin Karpis. Cold as ice, thinking always of himself.

Time after time he demonstrated that the name given him - "Old Creepy"

was an appropriate one. Early in his criminal career, he married a girl and promptly deserted her. When police located him in Atlantic City with his common-law wife who was about to become a mother, he thought only of his own get-away.

ANSWER: But to get back to Karpis' chosen career. Bank robbery after bank robbery occurred in the Middle West. The gang recruited new members. Contacts were established all over the United States. Persons masquerading under the cloak of respectability were ready to furnish them with a haven of refuge for a price. To date, over 35 members of this gang have been convicted in Federal Courts.

ANNOUNCER:

The Karpis-Barker gang then switched to kidnaping. Karpis, the leader, schemed and planned the details of these snatches. Karpis himself was the driver of the kidnap car. The gang's toll mounted to include the killing of four law enforcement officers and one citizen. Finally on June 15, 1933, they kidnaped William A. Hamm, Jr. Six months later, Edward G. Bremer was their \$200,000 ransom prize. But this cunning and versatile gang had not reckoned with J. Edgar Hoover and his G-Men. They stepped in and trailed this mob from one end of this country to the other. Director Hoover personally directed the investigation. One by one the gangsters were brought in - some alive and others dead - after fierce gun battles. Karpis and his kill-crazy confederates were being thwarted at every turn.

ANSWER: Yes, Karpis became desperate. He had received news that the men of the FBI were getting closer and closer. One-time friends turned on him saying "he was too hot." Rage overtook him. Mr. Hoover, our Director, received a letter one day from Karpis advising that the latter was

going to come into the Department of Justice Building with a machine gun. Mr. Hoover, however, does not easily frighten. Again Karpis considered shooting the Special Agent in Charge of our Los Angeles Office, then flying east by plane to murder the Special Agent in Charge of the Bureau's New York Office. Then he planned to circle back to Chicago, to murder the Chief Special Agent there. He even said he considered calling one of our offices and giving them a tip. Then as the Agents appeared he would shoot them from ambush. When his rage would subside he would exclaim to himself, "They're nothing but Special Agents. They've got to do what they're told. Their boss is the one I want to kill - Hoover!" Always his crazy thoughts returned to the Director of the FBI.

ANNOUNCER: Yes, but Karpis, like other criminals, was not so courageous when it came time for him to act and when he didn't have a gang back of him.

ANSWER: Finally one day a rumble was heard by alert Special Agents. Rumors began to spread. Routine checking had picked up the trail. It led to New Orleans.

ANNOUNCER: And out of the night came a plane load of Agents, led by J. Edgar Hoover, the Chief of the G-Men, whom Karpis had vowed to get. The battle line was formed. Victory was in sight. Precautions were taken to protect everyone but Karpis and the men of the FBI, who know no fear. The word was given. The line moved forward. Karpis had sworn he'd never be taken alive. Luck was against him. He came out of the apartment house. He was captured by Director Hoover and handcuffed before he could whirl for his gun. Now "Old Creepy" will kidnap and rob no more.

ANSWER: And Mr. , from the solitude of his cell at Alcatraz comes this word from Karpis to one whom he loved: "I suppose by now you realize that all that glitters is not gold. In other words, when you are released from prison, stay on the straight and narrow path. Of course, you will think that rather strange coming from me, but I should know."

ANNOUNCER:

Thank you, Mr. . Even Alvin Karpis, bandit, murderer, kidnaper and thief, has finally learned that "crime does not pay." He should know. What a life he led. Plunder and bloodshed always followed his activities. One of the most feared and desperate gangs of mad men whom we have known in recent years. A contact man was shot and then burned. A doctor, according to underworld rumor, who had operated on Karpis attempting to alter his facial features without success, and obliterate his fingerprints, was knocked unconscious by the gang and his body allowed to settle in a barrel of cement which now lays on the bottom of Lake Erie. Politicians were enlisted by Karpis to assist in exchanging the ransom money. Others protected him. Would-be criminal lovers bought cars for him. Always, when he was hiding-out, Karpis tried to be natural and avoid trouble. When cornered, however, like a gnashing rat, he fought back. He attempted to buy good-will by contributing several thousand dollars to a mayorality campaign. May we never see the return of his kind. Society, at least need not fear him, thanks to the FBI, as long as he is incarcerated.

"MA" BARKER

ANNOUNCER: In their war on crime, Uncle Sam's G-men face desperate criminals.

For the most part these desperadoes are men. Occasionally some female demon is the object of the man hunt. Such a person was "Ma" Barker, who mothered a brood of some of the worst outlaws this nation has ever known. Mean, base, and depraved, "Ma" Barker represents American motherhood at its very worst. Without her corrupting influence to guide them, her outlaw sons might have developed into normal, respectable citizens. But "Ma" didn't care. Under her protective wing, her boys became public enemies and, like so many criminals, died a gangster's death, unwept and unsung. Tonight, through the courtesy of J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, we present Mr. , Special Agent in Charge of the FBI's Division, who will discuss the exploits of this female demon.

ANSWER: Indeed, "Ma" Barker was a demon, Mr. . The last twenty
years of her life were sordid. As you say, they represent motherhood
at its very worst. Graphically they portray some of the many causes of
crime. The life of "Ma" Barker is an object lesson to all parents.
Yet through the mist of corruption and debauchery radiates many of the
virtues of motherhood - perverted as they are.

ANNOUNCER: I am sure, Mr. , our listeners will be interested in hearing of this strange woman.

ANSWER: She was born in the Ozark Mountains near Joplin, Missouri, a little over sixty years ago. Christened Arizona Donnie Clark, friends called her Arrie. She came from an ordinary family. Her early life was characteristic of the gay nineties - picnics, candy pulls, pie socials in the little red school house, hayrides, and most of all, community sings, Sunday school and church sociables. She was given the nickname of "Kate" by whom, we don't know.

ANNOUNCER: And then she married - scarcely out of her teens. In Missouri, where
Kate and George Barker made their home, were born their sons, Herman,
Lloyd, Arthur and Freddie.

ANSWER: "Ma" Barker, in those early days, was a good housewife and a fair housekeeper. She was well-versed in all village happenings and could always be relied upon to engage in choicest gossip. At times she was seized with a fanatic religious frenzy. Frequently she engaged in evangelistic activities. Always she took her boys to Sunday School "I don't know just why," her husband has since said, "because when I'd try to straighten them up she would fly into me."

ANNOUNCER: Mr. , I don't suppose "Ma" Barker was very much interested in her sons' educational training.

ANSWER: No, she wasn't. They were all more or less illiterate, yet they were cunning and shrewd.

ANNOUNCER: When did the Barker boys first run afoul of the law?

ANSWER: As early as 1910. It appears that the family migrated to Oklahoma while the boys were still young. There they resided near Tulsa.

Before they moved, however, Herman, the eldest boy, was arrested near Webb City, Missouri. He was released after being questioned. "Ma" Barker went into a frenzied rage. "We'll move out of this town," she cried.

"Ma" moved to Oklahoma with her brood of future desperadoes. That is, all except Herman. He already had innumerable aliases. He went out into the world to plunder. "Ma" always kept in touch with him by mail.

ANNOUNCER:

In Tulsa, "Doc," Freddie, and Lloyd Barker joined the old Central Park gang. Many of these hoodlums became notorious criminals -Sam Coker, Harry Campbell, Glenn Leroy Wright and several others.

ANSWER:

"Ma's" boys were known by the neighbors as rowdies, window-breakers and petty thieves and when complaints were made to their father he would always say, "Talk to mother - she handles the boys." When "Ma" was approached she would berate the accusers. Her boys could do no wrong. When they were arrested for petty infractions she would storm down to the police department. Her boys were the best in town. They were being persecuted. Then she would break down and weep - she could act better than any professional mourner. When these tactics failed to bring about the release of her sons, she would dig down into her purse, still admitting, of course, no wrong on the part of her children.

ANNOUNCER:

Here, Mr. , I believe, is perfect evidence of the old adage -"Spare the rod and spoil the child." Certainly this case illustrates what your Director, Mr. J. Edgar Hoover has in mind when he says the American home is responsible for the upbringing of our youth. Discipline with "Ma" Barker was a lost art.

ANSWER: Except, Mr. , whenever her boys got into trouble she would give them a bitter tongue lashing - for getting caught. All the time "Ma's" reputation was spreading among the lawless. At her home gangsters were received with open arms. "Ma" was always ready to counsel with a crook. She was much more intelligent than any of her sons. She ruled with an iron will. They were always obedient.

ANNOUNCER: "Ma" Barker, had she desired, undoubtedly could have made good citizens out of her sons, but such was not the case.

ANSWER: That is correct, Mr. . . In 1918, "Doc" Barker was arrested for car stealing. He broke jail in a few days, was apprehended, and again effected his escape. In 1928, during a hospital robbery, "Doc" Barker killed a night watchman. He was convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment in the Oklahoma State Prison.

ANNOUNCER: Then Freddie was caught. He was charged with bank robbery, burglary and assault with intent to kill. Time and again he was released on bond. Always he jumped his bail which his mother was ever ready to raise. Then he was sent to the Kansas State Penitentiary.

ANSWER: Lloyd went in for mail robbery. He is now serving a long term in a Federal prison. In 1927, a police officer at Newton, Kansas, was killed. Herman Barker was identified. "Ma" Barker said it was a lie. The next day Herman's body was found near Wichita, Kansas. Rather than be captured, he had committed suicide.

ANNOUNCER: In 1928, "Ma" separated from her husband. All the time she was sinking to lower levels. Yet her sons never committed a wrong in her opinion.

She clung to them tenaciously. In that respect we see an expression of mother love - perverted though it was.

ANSWER: Always, when her sons were released from prison or jail, they returned to "Ma." Fred Barker, her favorite, shortly after his release from prison, was joined by Alvin Karpis. Together they went to "Ma's" home -

this time near Thayer, Missouri. In December, 1931, Fred and Karpis, according to reports, killed a sheriff at West Plains, Missouri.

Immediately Fred, Karpis, "Ma" Barker and her lover, Arthur Dunlap, fled to St. Paul, Minnesota. There they were joined by Willie Weaver, who had just been paroled after serving only a few years of a life term for murder. In St. Paul, they soon aroused the suspicions of neighbors, for Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis always carried a violin case whenever they left or returned to their home. The police were notified.

ANNOUNCER:

But before they could strike, "Ma," Dunlap, Karpis, and Fred Barker fled. The next morning Dunlap's body was found perforated with bullets fired at short range, stripped of all clothing, on the shores of Lake Frensted in Wisconsin. Near by was found a woman's glove - caked with blood. Karpis and Fred Barker had killed Dunlap because they thought he had called the police. "Ma" Barker must have been near by.

ANSWER:

Then the boys went in for bank robbery on a big scale. The gang joined forces with old-time thugs. Most of their names have since been headlined as Public Enemies No. 1, for a brief period. In 1932, Harvey Bailey was arrested in Kansas City, Missouri. A Tulsa lawyer was instructed to defend him. Bailey, however, was convicted, and on August 13, 1932, the lawyer was instructed to meet Fred Barker in Tulsa. The next day his bullet-riddled body was found on a golf course. Underworld rumor has it that "Ma" ordered the lawyer "put on the spot" because of his failure to free Harvey Bailey. For the next couple of years the gang operated out of St. Paul, Minnesota. By now, "Doc" had been released

from prison. The Karpis-Barker gang was spreading terror throughout the Middle West. Always, "Ma" was directing their operations. From the time the boys left for a bank robbery until their safe return, "Ma" would sob and weep and carry on, fearing her boys might be injured.

ANNOUNCER: And "Ma" always got her share of the proceeds. She liked to live well. She purchased expensive clothing and furniture. She surrounded herself with costly things - but yet, she did not fit into the picture. She was rooted in the lean years of her early life. She ruled with an iron hand. Jealous of her boys, she was constantly on the alert to spread gossip about their girl friends. She crusaded against liquor for it loosened the tongue. Yet when Alvin Karpis' common-law wife was about to become a mother, "Ma" Barker stepped in and provided an elaborate layette.

> But all this time, Mr. , the Federal Bureau of Investigation was powerless to act. The gang carefully avoided Federal violations.

Right. But, during the latter part of 1933, "Ma" decided that bank ANSWER: robbery was beneath the dignity of her brood. It was too petty for the gang to bother with.

ANNOUNCER: So they went in for "the snatch." First William A. Hamm, and then Edward George Bremer. From these two kidnapings the gang received three hundred thousand dollars. They knew everybody of importance in the underworld. Well-organized, they had contacts in most large cities. Then, to their sorrow, they learned of the G-Men. They beat a hasty , how did you finally get on their trail? retreat. Tell me, Mr.

ANSWER: After Mr. Bremer's release, Director Hoover personally took charge of the investigation, coordinating the activities of the Agents. His instructions were that no lead or clue was to be overlooked. In tracking down every bit of evidence, a gasoline can was found along a road leading from Saint Paul, as the result of an organized search by Special Agents. It was rushed to the Crime Laboratory of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington. A chemical test brought up a single fingerprint. Immediately, efforts were transferred to our Single Fingerprint File. There the single fingerprint impressions of nearly fourteen thousand of America's most desperate criminals are filed. The search began. Card after card was examined, running onward through one file and then another, into a third. And there stood emblazoned the fingerprint which matched the one on the gasoline can. It was the print of one of the fingers of Arthur "Doc" Barker. We then knew who to look for. We trailed "Doc." We trailed his brother. We trailed his companions - Volney Davis, Russell Gibson, Bill Weaver, Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, and a host of others. One by one, the Federal Bureau of Investigation brought members of

ANNOUNCER:

this gang in. The job was a long one. It tested the ingenuity and perseverance of the G-Men. Time meant nothing to them. Sleepless nights were customary rather than the exception. Then came a cold night in January, 1935. "Doc" Barker and his girl friend were apprehended in Chicago. Later that evening, Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation surrounded another apartment in Chicago. Their commands to surrender were answered with gunfire. Russell Gibson was killed resisting arrest, and Bryon Bolton was taken into custody. A map was found in the apartment. A penciled mark had been drawn around a lake.

ANSWER: And then, Mr. , our Agents heard about an old alligator called "Old Joe" for whom Fred Barker and Karpis frequently hunted. Mr. Hoover sent the special kidnap detail to Florida by plane. In the vicinity of Ocala, Florida, where the ring was drawn around the map, the Agents picked up the trail of "Old Joe," the alligator. They also picked up the trail of an old woman who was living in an expensive cottage with her son. That woman was "Ma" Barker, and her son was Freddie. Under the cover of darkness, the Agents surrounded the house. Every precaution was taken. The stage was set. They knew they were to face a desperate siege. In the meantime reinforcements were being rushed there. Director Hoover spent a sleepless night in his office for you see there were literally hundreds of ramifications to the case because of the widespread activities of the gang and Mr. Hoover had to consider all of

ANNOUNCER: Tell us, Mr. , just what happened.

them and plan accordingly.

ANSWER: At the crack of dawn every man was in his place. The Inspector in Charge rapped on the door. He announced the place was surrounded by Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. There was no answer. An Agent shouted, "Unless you come out, we'll use tear gas to force you out." This time he received an answer. "All right, go ahead," cried "Ma" Barker, firing a burst from a machine-gun. The battle began. It raged for several hours, then silence from within the house. The Agents entered the building. There on the floor was Fred Barker holding a rifle with a death grip. "Ma" Barker's machine-gun with a hundred shot drum, lay across her body; the barrel was still smoking. Both were dead.

ANNOUNCER: Fortunately the raid had been planned well and J. Edgar Hoover's G-Men suffered no casualties.

ANSWER: And on a bleak afternoon, sometime later, the unkept hillside graveyard, full of undergrowth and weeds, near Welch, Oklahoma, received the bodies of "Ma" and her favorite son, Freddie. Only a few relatives and curious onlookers attended the services. The funeral sermon was preached to the living rather than to the dead.

ANNOUNCER: Thank you, Mr. . . The Federal Bureau of Investigation rendered a great service to this nation by bringing to an end the criminal career of "Ma" Barker. Her life emphasizes the necessity of proper home training if children are to be turned away from crime. May you never have another such female demon. Thank you, and good night!

Morton dated October 4, 1937, in the Brokid case. This report, it will be recalled, sets out information regarding one Ola/Martin, a prostitute residing in Newphis. Tennessee, who professed to be an intimate acquaintance of Grace Goldstein.

On February 28, 1936, Ola Martin voluntarily aspeared at the Memphis Field Office and there contacted Special Agent William T. Morten. She informed that she went to Hot Springs, Arkansas, on February 16, 1938, and returned to Memphis on February 20, 1938. During her stay in Hot Springs, she resided at the Valley Hotel using the name of "Miss Ola", While there she visited Grace Goldstein and through these visits she secured the following information:

A mob consisting of about eight men have recently come to Not Springs from Chicago and St. Louis, and met up at Grace Coldstein's house. The identities of all the members of this mob are unknown, but Cla Martin stated that one of the members goes under the mane of The Baron': that he is supposed to be residing at the Arlington Notel in Not Springs, Arkaheas, and is "keeping up" Connie Norris at some unknown place in St. Louis, Missouri.

Ola Martin observed some man walk into Grace Golditeia's house, during her recent visit, and Grace greeted this person under the mistaken impression that this person was "The Baron". Ola Martin observed this person, believed to resemble "The Baron". To be short and stocky, dark complectable about Life years of age, slight build and either fewish or Italian. The person reported to resemble the "Paron" has recently been released from Alcaires or, at any rate, has recently returned from a visit to that place and it appears that he and the other members have the information that Karpis has a considerable sum of money "planted" at some place and that this money could not be reached until 1938. Now they are laying plans to secure this money, but for some reason the securing of money is surrounded with risky circumstances and they are having difficulty in obtaining a person win is willing to take the chance of securing this money. The reason for securing the money is to give it to Grace Goldstein and one of the sisters of Alvin Karpis. They are supposed to take the money and open up a night club in Het Springs, Arkaneas.

The sleter of Alvis Carpie, referred to, is supposed to be the one with two small children, one boy and one girl. This sister is residing at some point on the southern outskirts of Hot Springs, Arkensas and is supposed to be supported financially by Grace Coldstein, the latter estaining the furniture for the house wherein the sister resides. Grace Goldstein has complained about this situation, explaining that she, hereolf is in bed financial condition and has recently berrowed money, neing her furniture and automobile as collateral, .

During the above medicated period of Ola Martin's visit in Hot Springs, she informed that Grace Goldstein advised that agents of this Durosu had questioned her very severely in the Little Rock Field Division, at which time she had been "given Hell", It is Ola Martin's information that immediately after this questioning, Grace Coldstein took s trip to Dallas, Texas, in her automobile, Ola Martin was in Het Springs when Grace Goldstein returned from this trip about 6:30 P. M., on February 19, 1938. At the time of her return, she was met out on the highway by Chief of Police Joe Wakelin. Grace Goldstein, at this time, informed that she had visited her mother in Dellas, Texas.

According to Ola Martin, Grace Goldstein is now receiving mail at the Brown's Beauty Parlor in Not Springs, Arkaneas, under the name of Helen Foods.

Ole Martin, who also uses the name of Krs. J. L. Swibel, appeared to be sincere in furnishing her information and Is laboring under the impression that she is in derious trouble and that Bureau agents are keeping a close watch ever her. The above information appeared to be all that she had at this time. She requested that It be kept strictly confidential that she furnished this information, in view of the design it would place her in, should she return to Not Springs, Arkansas, to practice her profession.

The is presently residing at 275 South Third Street in Homphis, Tennessee, and has stated she would be available for further interview. At the time of this interview, her fingerprints were taken and are being forwarded to the Bureau.



Specimens Q1 and Q5 are plain white envelopes containing no watermarks and measuring approximately 5qx5g*. The addresses on these envelopes are typewritten.

Specimens QR and Q4 are typewritten on pieces of plain white typewriter paper, 8.35° wide and cut to an approximate length of 5° from a larger sheet. The original size of the sheet was probably approximately 82x11". Specimen Q4 is a carbon copy of specimen Q2. The cut edges of the bottoms of each of these sheets show that both were cut at the same time.

All of these specimens are written on a Corona or Smith Corona typewriter equipped with Pica type, spaced 10 to the inch.

The delay in this interview was occasioned by the fact that when telephonic contact was made with Lawrence in the first instance, he insisted that the interview be postponed until such time as he could personally come to the Miami Office, stating that he preferred not to have it known to anyone that he was furnishing information.

Lawrence stated that he is employed at the Biscayne Kennel Club in Miami, Florida. He advised that he had written the letter to the Bureau in regard to one Harry A. Lowe. He stated that Lowe is a race track follower; that he claimed to have formerly raced horses and to have indulged in fixed races; that Lowe put him next to several good bets at the Hialeah Park Race Track several seasons ago as a result of which they became closely associated. He advised that during the trial of Joe Adams at Miami, Florida, in June, 1937, on charges of harboring Alvin Karpis, that Lowe informed him that he was one of the persons who had helped change some of the Transom money in instant kidnaping, and without ever having been caught. Lawrence stated that he had casually questioned Lowe concerning this statement, whereupon Lowe told him that he had purchased \$1,000 worth of the ransom money and had taken it to Cuba, where he had changed it at the gambling houses there.

Other than these alleged statements, Lawrence could furnish no further information connecting Lowe with this case. He was unable to advise the name of the person from whom Lowe had originally purchased the ransom money, but stated that it was probably the individual who was prosecuted for same. He no doubt refers to Cassius McDonald.

Lawrence was asked why he did not report this matter previously in view of the extensive investigation which had been conducted in Mismi and vicinity in regard to this case and he advised that he did not want to cause Lowe any trouble at that time as he had considered him a friend. Continuing, Lawrence advised that Lowe had disappeared from Miami at the close of the season and had reappeared some time later; that upon this latter reappearance Lowe had claimed to be in on a promotional scheme in connection with a dog track at Fort Lauderdale, Florida and had told him to put up \$385.00 as an investment, promising a rich return on the money.

Lawrence advised that Lowe had told him at that time he was connected with one James Egan, owner of the Bristol County Kennel Club at Boston, Massachusetts. Lawrence stated that after he advanced money to Lowe that Lowe had disappeared from Miami and that after making numerous efforts to locate him, had come to the conclusion that he had been swindled. He said that he then recalled Lowe having told him of having been connected with the Karpis crowd in Havana and that he thought the Bureau would probably be interested in Lowe for that reason and he also felt that he could be afforded some assistance in locating the man and securing the return of his money.

Lawrence was informed by Special Agent Danner that the Bureau would only be interested in Lowe if it developed that he had violated some Federal Law within the investigative jurisdiction of this Bureau and that no assistance could be rendered him in connection with the collection of his money.

In view of the fact that the ransom money in this case was changed in Havana, Cuba during the month of Sentember, 1954, as the statute of limitations has run upon said changing and as there is no other information concerning Lowe in this file with the exception of the alleged information supplied by Lawrence, no further action is being taken in this regard unless instructions to the contrary are received from the Bureau.





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

During September 1936 a man giving the name of Robert Hudson called on Mr. W. C. Woffard, an attorney at Taylor, Texas and attempted to negotiate a loan on certain bonds amounting to \$7000. It was leter learned that these bonds were part of the loot taken by Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell et al in the Carrettsville, Ohio mail train robbery November 7, 1935. Information has been received that Karpis had these bonds at Hot Springs, Arkansas during the early part of 1936 and that thereafter he took them to the home of Grace Goldstein's mother at Paris, Texas where he allegedly buried the smae. The identity of the man ROBERT HUDSON, is not known as yet nor have may of the instant bonds shown up since the occasion mentioned above.

PECORDED & INDICATE.

The Bureau is at present conducting intensive investigation looking toward the location of these bonds, and is also peoling to watablish the identity of Hudson and his connection with either Karpis or Grace Goldstein. Grace Goldstein has repeatedly been interviewed relative to the bonds in question but has emphatically maintained that Alvin Karpis buried these securitles shortly prior to his appreadance on May 1st at New Orleans. This of course is untrue as the bonds in question showed up at Taylor, Texas during September 1936 as previously stated.

Recently a confidential informant of the Memphis office advised Agents that she was in Hot Springs, Arkansas during the week of Bebruary 15, 1938 and that while on this visit she called on Grace coldstein at the Hatterie Hotel. She indicated that the Goldstein woman told her at that time that a mob of about eight men was then hanging out in her house of prostitution and that these men were from St. Louis, Missouri and that the leader appeared to be a man to whom everyone referred as the "baron". It was recently determined that the "baron" is identical with John Sonnen, against whom the St. Louis office has a White Slave Traffic Act case under investigation. He is also the present consort of Connil Marris who was in the company of Alvin

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Karpis and Fret Hunter at the time of their arrest. The informant further advised that it was her information that John Sonner recently returned from a trip to Alcatraz Island and that he and the other members of his gang received information that Alvin Karpis has a considerable sum of money or securities cached somewhere and that this money could not be recovered until 1938; that it appears that Sonnen and his friends are contemplating securing this money but for some reason the recovery of same is surrounded by considerable risk, and they are having difficulty in finding someone who is willing to take the chances in securing the money. The informant indicated that the real reason for desiring this money is to give it to one of Karpis' sisters who is alleged to comtemplate opening up a night club with the money in Hot Springs, Arkansas. It is believed that this sister is Clarat Venute, who is presently residing at 7006 Talman Ave. Chicago, Illinois.

In a recent interview had with Grace Goldstein she narrated that about the middle of January 1938 the sister of Alvin Karpis, Clara Venute, came to Hot Springs with her two children; that Clara who had left her husband had no money when she moved to Hot Springs; that she (Grace Goldstein) obtained a house for the Venute women at 212 Hudson Street in Hot Springs and furnished the house for her; that thereafter she supplied Mrs. Venute from time to time with money for living expenses. Grace Goldstein stated that it was quite a drain on her to support Mrs. Venute and her children as she was the sole means of income; that she believed that Alvin Karpis had "blown his top" inasmuch as he had suggested to Clara Venute that she come to Hot Springs with her children where Grace would get her a job and take care of her. She indicated that Karpis should have known that there was practically no chance to obtain any kind of employment in Hot Springs and she stated she had difficulty in getting Clara Venute out of Hot Springs, the latter finally leaving for Chicago on or about March 7, 1938.

Grace Goldstein gutther stated that while John Sonnen and his friend James Dougla Simmons were in Hot Springs, a daughter of Maxine, a prostitute at the Hatterie Hotel, was living with Clara Venute and this girl and Clare met Sonnen and Simmons through Maxine and frequently thereafter Clara and Maxine's daughter went out with these men. She stated that Clara went around with a number of men and on one occasion the Venute woman indicated she desired to remain in Hot Springs and practice prostitution, but Grace did not like the idea and was greatly relieved when she finally got Clara out of town. The foregoing minformation probably was greatly colored by the Goldstein woman as it is known that she did not have any qualms about transporting her own niece from Texas to Hot Springs in 1935

and thereafter inducing her to engage in prostitution. It would appear that Alvin Karpis, Clara Venute and the rest of the Karpavicz family feel that Grace Goldstein is undoubtedly indebted to them, otherwise there would be no reason for Karpis and the Venute woman to expect Grace Goldstein to obtain a job for Clara Venute and support her children in Hot Springs. This indebtedness of Grace Goldstein to Karpis and his family probably consists of the money and bonds from the Garrettsville. Ohio mail robbery, left by Karpis with Grace Goldstein,

Recently Clara Venute was located at 7006 Talman Avenue, Chicago, and upon interview disclaimed any knowledge of bonds or money left with the Goldstein woman by Karpis. However she turned over to Agent M. J. Cassidy of this office a letter which she received from Alvin Karpis her brother on or about March 9, 1938, the same having been addressed to her in care of 212 Hudson Street, Hot Springs, Ark. The letter in part reads as follows:

"What are you talking about you don't want to impose on me or Grace etc. Lots call a spade a spade. did you tell her hom much money you needed a week? did you tell her I asked for her to give it to you? here is the thing as brief as I can make it, if you did and Grace doesn't care to do it, let me know by Air Mail. also the amount you will need to get by on a mo.for an apt.living expenses etc.because if she isn't giving you the amount every week naturally, we will call it d day" "Now in regard to letting you know something definite about what I have in mind for you etc. the best I can do at this time is promise it wont be longer than Dec. of course I expect to have results by the next 30 days but you know how things go but I can promise no later than Dec.anyway I can let you know in my next letter whether or not you will have to wait until Dec. **"新闻"的"新"是一个"一"的"一"的"一"的"一"**

It is apparent from this letter and from the remarks made by Grace Coldstein to the confidential informant that Alvin Karpis is of the opinion that the statute of limitations with regard to the matter of disposing of the stalen bonds from the Carrettsville train robbery will run out in December 1938.

carry on his plans by correspondence inasmuch as it is believed that the subject matter of his letter to his sister Clara Venute probably pertains to the money and bends which Karpis turned over to Grace Goldstein. It is my suggestion that your office immediately contact the Warden of the penitentiary at Alcatraz and arrange through him

if possible to provide the Bureau with copies of all of Alvin Karpis' outgoing and incoming correspondence for a period of possibly thirty or sixty days. It has been suggested to me that possibly the prison authorities at Alcatraz make and retain copies of all incoming and outgoing letters of inmates for their own files, and if such is the case it is desired that you examine this correspondence which may be on file and forward all pertinent data to this office as well as to Inspector E. J. Connelley at New York City, and the Little Rock and San Antonio offices, the latter office being the office of origin in this case.

Kindly give this matter your expeditious attention and advise at an early date the results of your contact with the Warden at Alcatraz Island relative to this matter.

Reference ismade to your letter of April 13, 1938, wherein it is suggested that arrangements be made at Alcatraz in order that we obtain incoming and outgoing letters of ALVIN KARPIS, AZ-325, so that we might be apprised of any developments in this case.

Please be advised that on April 1, 1938 we picked up several letters from an informant at Alcatraz, which were from Karpis to his sister, Mrs. C. Venute, 212 Audson Street, Hot Springs, Arkansas. Copies of these were sent to Little Rock and to the Bureau as we felt, not being familiar with the investigation being conducted in Hot Springs relative to harboring cases, that they may have some significance in view of the fact that they were addressed to his sister at Hot Springs.

I have found in our files an additional photostatic copy of a letter dated February 20, 1938 which I am forwarding to you for your files with regard to this matter.

Not knowing here exactly what the set-up was, we immediately made arrangments, upon receipt of the first letters, to cover his mail and also thought has been given by us to having the mail gove over with ultra-violet light in order to determine whether or not there may be any secret writing on Karpis' original letters. It will be noted that Special Agent A. E. Farland personally provided the prison authorities with a personally-owned ultra-violet outfit for this purpose. It is doubtful whether any secret writing will appear on any of these letters due to the fact that the original letter is never sent, but a copy is made which is sent by the authorities.

It will be noted in the letter by Karpis to his sister,
Mrs. A. E. Grooms, 1234 N. Monroe Street, Topeka, Kansas, dated April
8, 1938 - a photostatic copy of the original and a photostatic copy of
the typewritten copy being forwarded herewith - that he mentions having
lost his mail privileges, which is true since he was in the "hole", a
knife having been found in his mattress.

Please be advised that arrangments have been made whereby we will have immediate information on the receipt of any mail addressed to him and the forwarding of any mail by him, and copies will be made available to us immediately upon their receipt.

It will be noted that it is not the routine of the Alcatraz authorities to retain copies of all incoming letters but special arrangements have been effected through our connections there for us to get this special service from now on in the case of Karpis.

From discreet inquiries made from our confidential informants at Alcatraz we have learned that Karpin is sort of "softening up" but it is doubtful at this time whether we could interrogate him successfully, and if this is contemplated it will be necessary for us to know exactly what is wanted of him and time will be necessary in order that we an put a "feeler" out through other inmates who are inclined to talk to us as to what Karpis' reactions may be.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

I telephoned Judge Wood of the Parole Board with reference to the Bureau's memorandum of June 26, 1936, concerning Wynons Eurdette, who was sentenced in March of 1935 to serve five years for harboring members of the Barker-Karpis Gang, in which memorandum the uncooperative attitude of the Delaney woman as compared with that of the Burdette woman was pointed out. I told Judge Wood that the Director merely wanted to bring to his attention the situation with reference to the Burdette girl; that the Director did not want to send through a formal memorandum on the subject, but that the Director would appreciate it if the Parole Board would give the case of the Burdette girl consideration from time to time in order that she would not receive exactly the same treatment as that afforded to the Delaney girl, because of the fact that the Burdette girl has always cooperated and testified against various members of the gang while the Delaney women refused to do anything for the Government.

Judge Wood stated that they proceed with a great deal of caution in connection with these "gun molls" stating that they just don't give consideration to their applications for parole unless they become respectable. He said with reference to affording them extra consideration because of their turning state's evidence, they feel that this is a matter which should be considered by the Court; that if the Court wants to make any concessions with reference to the sentence in a case of that kind, it is for the Court to decide and the place for it to be done is in the Court. Judge Wood said that when any of these "gun molls" come before the Board they have to show enough character and development so as to justify the placing of confidence in them before they are considered, regardless of what they did or did not do for the Government. Judge Wood said "we just haven't paroled any of those gun molls, and I don't think we are going to do it. RECORDED & INDEXED

I told Judge Wood that the Bureau and the Director could very well appreciate and understand his attitude in this situation; that the Director, as indicated, did not want to do or say anything which would or could be construed as any interference or suggestion; that the Director just wanted to make sure that the case of the Burdette woman did receive consideration, and we know that this is being done by the Parole Board. Judge Wood said that we could be ... assured the case of this woman is receiving all of the consideration which they think she warrants, but that if the Director wanted to send through a formal memorandum on the subject, he would be glad to see that further and due consideration is given to the situation, but that as the record stands at this time, they are not going to parole any gun molls.

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

Dear Mr. Hoover:

This office is in receipt of a letter from the Attorney in Charge of Pardons transmitting Bryan Bolton's application for commutation of sentence, for our advice and recommendation, as well as that of the Honorable Matthew M. Joyce, Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota who imposed sentence upon Bolton.

Bolton, as you will recall, testified for the United States in the William Hamm and in the Edward G. Bremer kidnaping cases. The information he furnished the Bureau after his arrest and during the time he was held in the Ramsey County Jail at St. Paul, Minnesota, pending trials of the Karpis-Barker gangsters was of incalculable value, and his testimony on behalf of the United States in the three cases actually tried was indispensable.

Judge Joyce, when he sentenced Bolton on August 25, 1936, to a three-year term of imprisonment, stated privately that he could not impose a lesser sentence without offending public opinion at that time, though he realized fully the inestimable value to the United States of the assistance rendered by Bolton, stating further that any greater leniency could be extended by the Attorney General through the avenues of commutation or parole should the Attorney General see fit to adopt such a course in the future. Our recollection is that at the time sentence was imposed on Bolton the Honorable Joseph B. Keenan, the Assistant to the Attorney General, was in personal touch with Judge Joyce concerning the matter.

From the standpoint of importance, the matter of this application seems to justify reference to you personally, inasmuch as you or kr. Keenan or both of you may have some special interest therein; and accordingly I am taking the liberty of writing you respectfully.





MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TANK

(Reference is made to letter from the New York City Office dated May 21, 1938, in the case entitled Leoral Feirel, with aliases, Fugitive, et al, Victims (Atlantic City, New Jersey Ring) White Slave Traffic Act - Harboring - Conspiracy.

In this regard interview is set out by Special Agent J. C. Ellsworth with Acting Chief of Police Captain Arthur Highee, wherein Captain Highes referred to the incident where Alvix Karpis, Harry Campbell, and their two feminine companions, Dolore Delaney and Wynona CFurdette, were located in Atlantic City on January 20, 1935, and Campbell and Karpis made their escape. Higher at that time indicated that the first information his department had received concerning this matter was in the form of a teletype message requesting that his department watch for a certain Florida license. He indicated that from the text of the teletype he gathered that the parties were wanted in an abortion case and he had no idea of the dangerous character of these persons. He further indicated that he had wired either Baltimore or Fashington, requesting more information as to the identity of the individuals and had received a reply from either Paltimore or Washington: *Washington will notify you in a couple of days. In accordance with the instruction of Mr. Foxworth, the writer has reviewed the Rremer Kidnaping file in order to determine the exact facts of this matter,)

Hanson at Miami, Florida, advised the Jacksonville Office that Karpis and Delaney had proceeded from Miami on January 16, in a Tudor Buick Sedan, 1935 Model bought at Miami during 1935, license tag D-5306, Motor Humber 4949155, Serial Mumber 2783525. The information supplied by Mr. Hanson indicated that the Miami Police Department had notified other departments in that vicinity and had broadcast the description of the car in which the fugitives were traveling. SAC Alt indicated that immediately thereafter he called the Police Department at Jacksonville furnishing (him with) a description of the car and its occupants but furnished no names. He requested that a broadcast be made over the police chain radio which it was indicated would be done immediately. At approximately the same time, Mr. Alt called the Bureau furnishing instant facts. At

2:50 A.M. telegrams in code went out to 21 of the Fureau's field offices located mostly in the eastern section of the United States to the following effect: "Notify by radio broadcast and teletype all law enforcement offices your district to be on watch for 1935 Tudor Buick Sedan Neto: Mumber 4949155 Serial Number 2783525 last seen with Florida license number D-5306 bearing Alvin Karpis IO 1218 and Dolores Delaney Stop Karpis reported accompanied by Dolores Delaney who is in pregnant condition on verge of childbirth Stop notify all offices of dangerous character of Karpis To exercise all precautions in effecting their apprehension Stop car and occupants last seen in Florida several days ago."

The report of former Special Agent J. R. Sharp, Philadelphia, dated February 5, 1935, indicates that the Atlantic City Police Department received a broadcast teletype message which had originated in a radio cast from Jacksonville, Florida, and relayed through Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. This message is stated to have been received at 2:30 A.M., January 20, 1935 and is as follows: "G.B. 454 dated 1-20-35 police information wanted by Jacksonville Florida police on a serious criminal charge white man five feet ten dark complexion dark hair dark eyes very slender build accompanied by woman who will become mother in few days driving 1935 Buick Sedan 1935 Florida license D-5306 Motor 4949155 he is armed with 45 calibre automatic and rifle reported to be dangerous use extreme caution in apprehension left Miami Wednesday January 16, 1935 headed north wanted by Jacksonville Florida police on a criminal charge contact above police for charges if apprehended radio Fest Harrisburg Pennsylvania 2:30 A.M."

A memorandum from Special Agent J. Heffler of the Philadelphia Office, dated January 20, 1935, indicated that the investigation conducted by the Atlantic City Police D partment was based on the teletype sont by the Miami, Florida, Police Department. Mr. Heffler was reporting information which he received from former Special Agent Sharp, the author of the report last above mentioned.

In view of this conflicting information in the Bureau file it is not known definitely whether the first word received by the Atlantic City Police Department came from the Miami Police Department or from the Jacksonville Police Department. In any event, if the same was received from the Miami Department there is no indication in the file that the Bureau had any connection therewith and in the event the same was based on the message from the Jacksonville Police Department, appropriate advice was furnished of the dangerous character of the persons sought. The Atlantic City Police Department received this message at approximately 2:30 A.M. and about 3:30 A.M., the automobile in question had been located. Thereafter, according to the Bureau files, Karpis and Campbell were located

in the Danmour Notel and the exchange of gunfire between them and Atlantic City Police officers occurred at about 6:30 A.M.

Copy of memorandum signed by SAC R. A. Alt of the Jackson-ville, Florida, Office, dated January 20, 1935, indicates that at about 7 o'clock A.M. on January 20, 1935, Captain Cannon of the Jacksonville Police Department called him by telephone advising him that the Jackson-ville Police Department was in receipt of the following telegram; dated at Atlantic City, New Jerseys

Located Buick Sedan Florida 1935 tag D-5306 covering to apprehend occupants wire details and charges will advise when apprehended signed James McMenamin Chief of Police.

This memorandum states that Mr. Alt immediately contacted the Bureau furnishing the facts contained in this telegram. He was advised that the matter would be handled out of Washington. Thereafter the file reflects that at 7:30 A.M. the Bureau called the New York Office and instructed that an experienced Agent proceed immediately to Atlantic City with a group of Special Agents to handle the instant investigation. Instructions were also issued for the Philadelphia Office to have Agents proceed at once to Atlantic City. There (does not appear) in the file, in so far as the writer has been able to find, any mention of the telegram allegedly sent to the Atlantic City Police Department to the effect that additional information would be supplied to that department within a couple of days. It is to be observed, however, that if such a message was in fact sent to the Atlantic City Police Department it could not possibly have been sent from the Bureau or from any of the Bureau's offices for the reason that the first notification of the fact that the Atlantic City Police Department had wired to the Jacksonville Police Department stating that the car of Karpis and Campbell had been located and requesting additional information, did not come to the Bureau's attention until 7 o'clock A.M., approximately one-half hour after the exchange of shots had occurred and Karpis and Campbell had escaped.

In the letter of reference, Captain Highe also complained concerning the Bureau taking possession of the Buick car abandoned by Karpis and Campbell when they fled from Atlantic City.

There was some difficulty had by Special Agents when they attempted to take possession of this car an January 23, 1935, as Chief of Police James A. McMenamin refused to turn it over. Previously on January 20, 1935, he had agreed to release it and had turned over all keys to the car, it being explained to him that the car was needed as possible evidence in this case. Thereafter the file indicates that a search warrant was issued at Trenton, New Jersey, on January 31, 1935, the United States Attorney indicating that this was the proper procedure to obtain the car. Special agents proceeded to Atlantic City on February 1,



May 25, 1938.

1935, with this warrant, but Chief McNenamin's attitude had changed in the interim and apparently as an act of cooperation, the car was voluntarily relinquished without ill-feeling. The Agents didn't use the search warrant and diplomatically didn't ev n mention it. Letter from the Philadelphia office, March 22, 1935, indicates that order was thereafter entered by Federal Judge George A. Welsh of the Eastern District of Pennsylvania ordering that the car remain in the possession of the FBI for its use. Upon examination by Agents, the motor number of this car was found to have been incorrectly listed in all broadcasts and mcssages previously. It is 42949155.

Reference is made to your Personal and Confidential letter of May 21, 1938, concerning the interview of Special Agent J. G. Ellsworth with Acting Chief of Police Captain Arthur Highes of the Atlantic City Police Department on May 18, 1938.

Please be advised that in connection with the matters mentioned by Captain Higher with reference to the escape of Livin Carpis and Harry Campbell at Atlantic City on January 29, 1935, a review of the Eureau files has been made and the following is supplied for your informations

At about one ofclock A.M. on January 20, 1935, SAC J. M. Hammon at Miami. Florida, advised the Japksonville Office that Karpis and Delaney had proceeded from Mismi on January 16, in a Tudor Buick Zedan, 1935 Eddel bought at Miami during 1935, licenze tag D-5300, Motor Sumber 4949155, Serial Eumber 2783525. The information supplied by Ar. Hansen indicated that the Blami Police Department had notified other departments in that vicinity and had broadcast the description of the car in which the fugitives were traveling. SAG Alt imicated that 😹 insolistely thereafter he called the Police Department at Jacksonville furnishing a description of the ear and its occupants but furnishing no manes. He requested that a breadcast be made ever the police chain radio which it was indicated would be done immediately. At approximately the seme time, Mr. Alt collect the Durses farmishing instant facts. Copy of memorandum signed by SAC R. A. Alt of the Jacksonville, Floride, Office, deted January 20, 1935, Indicates that at about 7 o'clock A.M. on January 20, 1935, Captain Cannon of the Jackson-Police Department called him by telephone advising him that the Jacksonville Police Department was in receipt of the following telegram deted at Atlantic City, New Jerseys

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This menurandum states that Mr. Alt immediately contacted the Bureau furnishing the feets contained in this telegram. He was edvised that the matter would be handled out of Washington. Thereafter the file reflects that at 7:30 A.X. the Bureau called the New York Office and instructed that an experienced Agent proceed immediately to Atlantic City with a gr up of Special Agents to handle the instant investigation. Instructions were elso issued for the chiledelphia Office to have Agents proceed at once to Atlantic City. 


