

Floate to advised that no confidential informate have been employed by the St. Faul office during that period. I understand there is a confidential informant employed at the present time under Er. Borer in connection with the Broner Eidneping Costs.

In the Res Verne Senkey, with alleses (deoccased at als Charles Scottcher II, Victim, Kidnaping Case one was employed, however, this employeest was affected not through the St. Paul office but originally through the Division and the Fortland, Gragon office. It is my understanding that this informent was not given any specifie or stated compensation other than transportation

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belief that this inquiry was connected with this case was not was a this agent, but after fursher discussion with Mr. Creech he stated that was his opinion that Beardstown, Ill, was a locality where all with the noises referred to in the form letters could be detected. Write Creech then stated that there was a loud, stationary siren on the City Hall and that this siren was of a deep tone and was sounded three times whenever there was a fire; further, that there was a second siren located at the City Square across from the Telephone Dompany which was a shrill siren used by the telephone sperator to summon police; only at night when they could not be reached by telephone.

Mr. Creech further stated that possibly a siren might be used by a school and stated Chief of Police George Farrar would be able to advise agent relative thereto; further, that the citizenry of Beardstown maintained several churches, all of which had bells, and all of which could be heard from any one point. It was also ascertained from Mr. Creech that the C. B. & Q. R. R. runs directly through Beardstown, parralel to the main highway intersecting that village, and also that the village was accessible from the north and east only by crossing a bridge.

Relative to an airport in the vicinity of Beardstown, Mr. Creech stated there was none, however, that a man from Aronsville, Ill. owns a plane and might possibly fly over Beardstown. It was the opinion of Mr. Creech that the noise referred to as that of an airplane was probably that of a four cylinder outboard motorboat, he pointing out that these two noises were very similar.

Concerning any trouble had by Game Wardens with individuals violating the game laws, particularly those laws relative to the eatching of fish, Mr. Creech stated that at all times net fishing and pole fishing out of season was troubling the State Game Wardens in the vicinity of Beardstown, Ill.

According to Mr. Creech, there is no other locality in the territory covered by him in which the sounds and noises set forth in the form letters referred to above may be heard. Mr. Greech's territory includes that portion of Illinois north of an imaginary line drawn between Hannibal, Mo. and Denville, Ill. and all of the State of Indiana, north, of a line drawn from the State line of Indiana to Terre Haute, Ind., Including Indianapolis and Elkhart, north to Lake Michigan and to Michigan City; further, Mr. Creech works upon special assignments throughout the United States, particularly in Wisconsin.

for the purpose of locating a house in which a kidnaped victim had been held, stated that same might possibly be a housebest, and in this connection that there was such a houseboat located on the Illinois River near Beardstown. Ill., formerly owned by Frank MacKrlane, now deceased, which houseboat was a very elaborate affair and frequented by numerous Chicago hoodlums. This houseboat has its own lighting and water systems and is heated by modern stoves. Mr. Creech then stated that he felt that he should be supplied with additional information as to the nature of the case in question, inasmuch as through him, and only him, the hideout in the Dr. Barker kidnaping case in Peorie, Ill., was located, he feeling he sould be of considerable assistance to the Bivision in any case where a hideout in his territory was sought.

St. Bloomington, Illinois, was interviewed by Special Igent B. L. Demron of this office. Mr. Butler exhibited an invoice showing the receipt of two \$524. Gesco goggles with \$6 Gescoweld Iens, the invoice being fated October 14, 1932. He stated that this invoice also contained a memorandum to the effect that one pair of these goggles was sold to the Hub Welding Company of Bloomington, but they had no record of the disposition of the remaining pair. Upon questioning his employees it was ascertained that it was believed the remaining pair was sold to an employee of the machine shops of the Alton Railway. These goggles were sold at retail and no record kept of the sale.

Mr. Butler stated further that by invoice dated August 18,2 1938 they received eight additional pairs of these goggles, but the same are now in stock,

Mr. Sam W. Morris, of the Hub Welding Company, 512 S. Center St., Bloomington, stated to Agent Damron that during the Fall of 1932 he had the Keiser-Van Leer Company order a pair of these goggles for his partner, W. T. Wolcott, to be used by Mr. Wolcott in the business and over his usual glasses; that subsequently they received a pair of these goggles from the Keiser Van-Leer Company and Mr. Wolcott used them in his business, but about July, 1955 someone stole them from him while working in the machine shops of the Alton Railway; that they then obtained another pair from the Keiser-Van Leer Company, but a short time later Mr. Wolcott found the missing pair and they now have both pairs.

one pair of these goggles was, at the time of the interview, being used by an employee, and the goggles were examined by igent Demron. Interview with Mr. W. T. Wolcott, 606 Hove Avenue, Bornal, Illinois, disclosed that he still has the other pair of goggles, and neither of them has been out of his possession except for the six days that pair number one was missing. The second pair of goggles was located and examined at the Hub Welding Company.

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Upon interviewing Chief of Police George W. Farrar of Beardstewn, Ill. he stated that there was a loud, deep toned siren mounted on top of the fire station in Beardstown, which siren blows wally when there is a fire and then it is blown in three long blasts. This siren is never sounded at any stated time.

Upon interviewing Bobert Stinson, Fire Chief, Beardstown, be examined his records and advised that there was not a fire in Beardstown on January 28, 1934, however, on January 29, 1934 at 11:45 P. M. there was a fire, at which time the fire siren was blown in three blasts for the purpose of summoning all voluntary firemen. The Fire Department in Beardstown is a voluntary department, there being no paid efficiency.

Chief of Police Parrar further stated that there is a gires on the C. B. & R. R. bridge across the Illinois Biver and also one on the wagon bridge crossing the Illinois River, which sirens are blown only to signal to boats which desire to have the draw in these bridges used to permit their passing under the bridge; that there is also a siren used by the police which is mounted in the City Square of Beardstown and operated by the local telephone operator. This siren is of the same tone as that used by the above referred to bridges and is sounded mile at night when police officers are desired and cannot be reached by telephone. None of the last three mentioned sirens blow at any stated times and when the police siren is sounded it continues blowing until answered by some police officer.

Concerning a factory whistle, Chief Farrar stated that the C. B. & Q. R. R. have a large deep toned whistle which blows two times at 6:30 A. M. and one time at 7:00 A. M. every day except Sunday; further, that this whistle also blows at moon, 1:00 P. M. and 4:00 P. M. every day, except Sunday, the whistle being used for the purpose of informing the C. B. & Q. employees of the time of day. According to Chief Farrar there are no other whistles in Beardstown and he knows of no whistle which only blows during the morning of week days.

Perry, head bridge tender on the wagon bridge, U. S. Highway 67, crossing the Illinois Biver between the points of Beardstown and Bushville, Illinois beardstown and State of Beardstown and Bushville, Illinois Biver beardstown as in use. Mr. Perry added that this siren sounds one blast when a boat coming down or going up the river is to stop. The draw bridge is then moved and the siren is sounded in two blasts to signal the boat to pass under the bridge. An examination of Mr. Perry's records concerning the number of boats and when they passed under the wagon bridge at Beardstown during the month of January, 1934 developed there was

not a single boat which necessitated the use of the draw bridge.

in any event there was no siren on this bridge of that time.

On interviewing Mr. E. A. Williams, Bridge Tender for the C. B. & Q. R. R. on the railway bridge crossing the Illinois River between Beardstown and Rushville, Ill., he advised that his bridge has been equipped with a siren for several years and that this siren was used to signal to pilots of boats whenever the draw bridge was opened. During the month of January, 1954 the C. B. & Q. draw bridge was opened for boats to pass up or down the river on the 9th, 11th, 18th, 15th, 16th, 20th, 25rd and 25th. The siren on this bridge is of a shrill tone and is sounded in four Masts when a boat is signaled to stop end await the moving of the draw bridge and after the bridge is moved the Goncerning the ringing of thurch bells or school bells in

Beardstown, Chief Farrar stated that there are no church bells in that city which are sounded on Saturday afternoons, however, there are a number of churches, all with bells, approximately six in number, which are sounded on every Sunday morning and all of these bells can be heard from any point where any one bell can be heard. These church bells are sounded at about 9:45 &. M. on Sunday for Sunday School and at 11:00 1000

A. M. on Sunday for church;

Concerning the noise of a switching lecomotive, Chief Farrar advised that Beardstown is a C. B. & Q. railway division point and that the roundhouse and yards are located about 12 miles away from the city proper; that there are three switch engines in use during the daytime and two switch engines in use during the night in the railroad yards. The Beardstown division is considered a coal hauling division and there are numerous freight trains passing through that city, however, it is impossible to hear switch engines in use from the city proper of Beardstown.

In this connection agent obtained from R. W. Shaw, station : agent, C. B. & M. R. F., the following schedule of trains which passed through Beardstown during the month of January, 1956r.

Chief Farrar then stated that there is no hirplane landing field in the vicinity of Beardstown, Ill.; that Beardstown is not located on any regular air mouth on any regular air route and that no planes are usually heard or seen flying over or about Beardstown,

Chief Farrar stated that to his knowledge he had heard of no trouble occasioned by the Game Wardens of the State ar the Bowersment in connection with Illegal fishing foring the month of Fashary, 1934.

When conducting investigation at Macomb, Ill., Chief of Police C. G. Paulsgrove and Detective (investigator) Paul Eakle of the Local Police Dept. were contacted at which time it was learned that Hemp & Co. has a small, shrill toned, siren which is used for the purpose of informing their employees of the time of day.

Agent interviewed Mr. C. R. Wright, manager of Hemp & Co.
North White St., Macomb, Illi, who advised that the airen used by his
company is sounded at 7:00 A. M., 12:00 noon, 3:00 P. M. and 4:00 F. M.
daily, except Sunday. During agent's presence at Hemp & Co. this siren
was heard, it being a very shrill tone and not large enough to be heard
over several blocks from the plant, in fact this siren cannot be heard
at the City Hall in Macomb, which is located approximately 12 to 15.

This is the only siren which blows at stated times in the Bity of Macomb, Ill. Mr. Wright was interviewed concerning the possibility of the sounding of this siren on January 28, 1934 and advised that he had no record of the siren being blown on that date.

Concerning any other sirens located in the city of Macomb.

It was ascertained that the Fire Department had three movable, loud, a deep toned sirens mounted on the three fire trucks, but that these sirens did not blow at any stated time and only when a fire was reported.

Fire Chief F. D. Wilson advised from his records that on
January 28, 1934 there were three fires reported, one at 5:40 P. M.,
another at 5:30 P. M. and another at 9:00 P. M. The 5:40 and 5:30
fires were in the country east and north of Macomb and the 9:00 fire
was in the city proper, iccording to Chief Wilson the sirens are very
seldom used when going to a fire unless the fire truck must pass through
a congested district.

Concerning the blowing of a factory whistle, it was ascertained that the Dickey plant west of the sity proper of Macomb and the Buckeye Pottery plant both have whistles which blow at 7:00 A. M. in the morning and also at noon, but not in the evening. These whistles can be heard for quite some distance, however, the siren cannot be heard at such distance as can the whistles.

In Macomb, Ill. the sity reservoir, better known as the City Lake, is stocked with game fish. Mr. Alfred Rush is saretaker of this reservoir or lake and he advised he had not in many years had any trouble with anyone endeavoring to take fish from the lake.

Ray Vail, the State Came Warden, at Macomb, according to information received from him by Mr. Takle upon agent's request, has had no trouble with children or anyone else catching fish illegally or out of season in the vicinity of Macomb.

Concerning the noise of a switch engine in the vicinity of Macomb, Ill., the following train schedules were obtained from Mr. A. J. Peterson, C. B. & Q. station agent at that point:

The Macomb railroad yards are located on the outskirts of the city limits about a mile from the Hemp & So. factory and from 9:00 to 12:00 A. M. one switch engine is in use. From 12:00 to about 5:50 P. M. this switch engine is at Bushnell, Ill. and from 5:30 to about 5:00 P. M. is in use at Kacomb, Illinois.

During agent's presence in Macomb, Chief of Police Roy Stine of Bushnell, Ill. was interviewed at which time he referred to the letter directed to the Division/atcst. Paul, Minn. by Mayor A. Brady on February 27, 1934 and advised that Bushnell had a small siren which sounded only when there was a fire and that the other noises set forth in the form letter were not to be heard in Bushnell. In view of this contact no further investigation was made at Bushnell, Ill.

In an effort to ascertain the identity of the individual Homer Wilson, aliases, "Big Romer", "Big Jim", "Big Moses", Charley Stone and Charley Potatoes, Chief of Detectives Fred Montgomery and Chief of Police Williams of Peorie, III, advised no such individual was known to that that is the individual described in the reference report under the name of "Big Homer", however, Chief of Detectives Montgomery did recall having taken into custody one George Austin, alias Johnis, from East St. Louis, Ill. during the month of June, 1928 charged with auto larceny. Chief Montgomery stated he specifically recalls going to East St. Louis where

he obtained custody of George Austin. Chief of Detectivel Montgon expressed a belief that perhaps George Austin might be the individual known as "Big Homes", but insisted he had never heard at such an eleast for Austin.

Through the assistance of the Superintendent of Identifica tion, Peorie Police Bept., William P. Busch, a photograph of George Austin, alias Yoknis, Peorla PD #5128, was obtained from which it is



A request for the fingerprints of Austin has been made, however, to date said fingerprints have not been received at the St. Louis Division office.

Chief of Police Williams and Chief of Detectives Montgomery then advised that the only individual who, in their opinion, corresponded with the description of "Big Homer", as set forth in the reference re-

port, was one Opie Wilson who operates the Palace Arcade, a gambling establishment at Madison and Main Sts., Peoria, This individual is described as being fifty years of age, 5' 2" to 4" In height, weigh ing 225 pounds, bair gray, eyes light, eriminal record note. The state of the s

Chief of Police Williams and Chief of Detectives Montgomery advised Opic Wilson has never been arrested in Peoria or elsewhere, to their knowledge, however, it was well known in the mast that his estabe lishment was often frequented by John Klutas and Edward Boll when they were operating in the vicinity of Peoria.

On March 16, 1954 Special Agent J. M. Baker of this office interviewed Mr. Ross Saunders at the American Hotel, St. Louis, Mo., at which time Mr. Saunders stated he could not produce a photograph .... of "Big Homer" Wilson and that so far he had failed to obtain this photograph.

Upon contacting George W. Hartmann and Frank R. Hartmann operating what is known as the Hartmann News Agency, room B-1, Central. National Bank Bldg., Main and Adams St., Peoria, Ill., it was ascertained that this news agency has been handling the Minnespolis, Minn. Tribune gewspaper for possibly the past ten years, receiving two kissisters, copies thereof daily, which newspapers have been sold over a news stand to any individual who salled for same. The Hartmann News Agency has no special customer for this particular paper and it is the only paper from the Twin Cities which has been handled by Them.

Upon further inquiry Mr. George Hartmann stated he had sold

a March 2, 1934 edition of the Minneapolis Tribune to an individual who inquired as to whether the Hartmann New Agency carried the Sunday edition of this paper and when this individual was advised in the affirmative he inquired as to whether said news agency ever handled the Journal and also inquired as to whether St. Paul papers were sold at said agency. Said individual was advised that the only paper which was handled by this agency was the Minneapolis, Minn, Tribune. On Monday, March 5, 1954, at about 5:50 P. M. this mane individual called at said news stand and purchased a Sunday, March 4, 1931, copy of the Minneapolie Tribune, This purchase was made from Frank R. Hartmans.

Upon displaying the group photograph of Alvin Karpis, Volume Dayis, Fred Barker, Arthur R. Barker and Harry Campbell, to Mr. Frank R. Hartmann, he stated that the picture of Alvin Karpis looked similar to the individual who had purchased the Sunday paper mentioned above, however, he added he did not observe this individual closely and could not state in fact whether he was identical with Alvin Karpis. This same

group photograph was shown to George Hartmann who was adable to even attempt an identification, adding he had only slightly noticed the individual who purchased the Friday edition of the Minneapolis Fribane as reflected above.

Inamuch as it was possible that alvin Marple was the individual who purchased the Sunday edition of the Mismeapolis Tribune, agent maintained a surveillance of the news stand of Hartmann Bros. from 4:00 P. M. on March 5, 1934 to 9:00 P. M. and from 10:00 A. M. to 9:00 P. M. on March 7, 1934 for the purpose of observing any individual who might call for a Minneapolis or St. Paul newspaper, This surveillance was maintained without result inamuch as no one called for the papers referred to.

Agent caused the Hartmann Brothers to examine the sixture of Alvin Karpis, as well as the other photos appearing on the same panel, in detail, and requested that in the event anyone bearing a resemblance to these individuals called for a St. Paul or Minneapolis newspaper that the St. Louis Division office be advised immediately by telephone, the address and telephone number of said office being supplied both the Hartmann brothers.

If questioned Clen Roy Wright at length concerning his association with Marry Campbell, the Barkers, Alvin Karpis, and others of this gang; however, the only information which Wright would furnish was that he and Campbell had been associated together a great deal. He would make no statement as to where Harry Campbell was located at the present time; nor would he give any information regarding the Barkers or Alvin Karpis. Wright talked at length regarding various robberies which he had committed. He has now been removed to Stillwater, Oklahoma, where he is awaiting trial on a charge of robbery with firearms.

I also interviewed Charles Cotner, but he stated he had no information regarding the Barkers or Karpis.

"I, W. Moltos, when interviewed, advised that he had never heard of Fred or Dox Barker, or Alvin Karpis, He states of that he had just arrived at the farm a day or no prior to the reid and was not acquainted with any of the men who were apprehended there.

"I also interviewed Grace Cuckler and Winnie Merrise Winnie Horris admitted that she had been traveling around the sountry with Charles Dotner, and Grace Cuckler stated that she had been associated with Frank Downey. Both of these woman professed not to know enything regarding the astirities of their respective men scapeniess.

### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

In connection with the request made by Mr. Conray of the Kansas City effice concerning a comparison of the latent fingerprints found in the house occupied by Termon C. Miller, 6612 Edgevale Most, Kansas City, transmitted to the Mivision by letter dated February I3, 1934 (Contrary to my statement to you, while Mr. Anderson was in Washington he stated that these prints had been located in the Kansas City file by him just prior to his coming to Washington and I was under the mistaken impression that the prints were received by the Division at about that time), I talked with Mr. Edwards and he advised that over 50 latent prints had been developed from the material submitted by the Kansas City office and each had to be compared with all of those in the single fingerprint files; that he had one men working constantly on this case and it would take approximately two months to complete same.

I requested that a progress report concerning this search be made and forwarded to Mr. Conroy. On February 21, 1934, a telegram was sent to the Kansas City effice requesting to be advised shy these prints had been held from June of 1933 until February of 1934 without submitting them to the Division, in reply to which the Kansas City office advised on February 21, 1934 that in the excitement is connection with this investigation, at a time shortly after the massacre happened, the submitting of these prints to the Division was overlooked, which oversight seems to have been continued until February 13, 1934.

The latent fingerprints were, of course, immediately compared with outstanding suspects in the Kenses City case and also suspects in the Brewer case, without success. Mr. Edwards, as stated above, will have a progress report prepared immediately and ferward it to the Kanses City effice.

MIGHORANDUM FOR MR. CLASS

Reference is made to Mr. Cowley's memorandum of March 15, 1934, addressed to the Director, in connection with the latent fingerprints submitted by the Kansas City Office found in the Miller house in Kansas City.

The last paragraph indicates that the remining unidentified latent prints in connection with this case have been compared with suspects in the Bremer Case. Such a comparison has actually been made only with the outstanding 3 remer Case suspects, particularly, known members of the Alvin Karpis Gang. Mr. Cowley was sequeinted with this fact and he suggested it was desirable that the comparison be completed with all maned suspects in the Bremer Case. This work will proceed, one employee being assigned to it emplusively in the Single Fingerprint Section. There remain of the Kansas City latent fingerprints approximately eight which afford good ridge detail and characteristics sufficient to be of value. There are to date \$65 suspects listed in the Bremer Case and comparisons with all of these will be made. It is estimated comparisons between these remaining latent prints and the fingerprints of the suspects can be effected in approximately three weeks' time.

Special igent H. B. Mr. H. Warshauer, sales manager, 1625 Van Mess ive., stated that he has only a faint recollection of the above transaction and believed that irthur Barker was one of the men as he particularly remembers the high forehead.

Special agent V. E. Criss, at Secremento, Calif., made lists of automobiles from the Middle West States entering the State of California during the period Yeb. 11 to Feb. 19, 1934, showing license number, place of entry, make of war, in some instances the motor number of ear, for reference purpose in case any ear used by suspects was identified, Copies of said list are attached to this report as follows: 3 to the Division, 2 to St, Paul, 1 to Sait Lake City and 1 to the San Francisco copy.

Capt. Dullea, in charge Inspectors, San Francisco, Police Department, stated that a Mack Harris and Jack Harris, formerly of St. Paul, Minn., and friends of Gloomy Cus Schaffer, are now operating a beer joint at 74 Embarcadero, San Francisco, and that the place has the reputation of being a hangout for gangsters from out of town; that Jack Harris and Gloomy Cus Schaffer pulled a jewelry job in St. Paul some years ago and both served a term at the Minnesota State Penitentiary at Stillwater, Minn.

Capt. Trotter, in charge of Inspectors, Cakland Police Department, stated that within the past few days he has received an unconfirmed rumor that a number of gangsters are occupying an apartment in Cakland and have a number of machine guns with them; that he is endeavoring to confirm the rumor and will notify the San Francisco Division Office when he receives any information.

heard them discussing the job; that they first intended taking him, Roll, in the job, but decided not to do so; that there were seven men who robbed that bank, and they were Lawrence Devol, Boc Berker, Fred Barker, Jess Boyls, Miliscott, Alpin Karpis, whom he knew only as Bayl, and Verne-Miller, whom he knew only as Werne- and supposed that he was Ferne-Senkey until he saw Miller's photograph in a newspaper. Hull stated that the money obtained on this bank job was divided seven ways at 906 or 926 Grand Avenue, St. Paul, by Verne Miller, Fred Barker and Lawrence Bevol; that Lawrence was eaught by officers at this address and he had some sixteen or seventeen hundred dollars on him when arrested; that Verne Miller took the Liberty Bonds to Kensas Sity which same out of this bank job, but does not know where or who handled them in Kansas Sity.

Hull stated that he thought for some time that the men whom he knew paly as "Verne", a member of the Barker gang, was Verne Sankey, because he never heard his surname, and supposed it was Sankey until he saw Verne Miller's photograph in the newspaper and recognized it as the person whom he knew only as "Verne" and thought was Verne Sankey.

Hull also stated that on the robbery of the Third Northwestern Bank robbery in December, 1932, Jess Doyle wore a chauffeur's cap, and drove one of the two cars used on the job; that two police officers were killed during this robbery, and he was in the spartment used by the Barkers at Cleveland and Marshal avanuatin St. Paul, and heard an account of the robbery ever the radio, also heard the members of the Barker gang discuss it later. Hull stated he understood from Doc Barker that the boys were "ribbed" to do this robbery by the man "Harry" in the State House at St. Paul, and by the man "Jack" who operates the Hollipock road-house; that this job was pulled to put the "heat" on Mr. Keehan, City manager, because they claimed they put Mechan is office and he double-crossed them and did not stay "hitched."

Hull stated that after the Barker gang pulled the robbery of the Third North-western Benk, in Minneapolis, they drove to St. Paul, Minn., in two cars, and near a park, which he thinks was Como Park, they had a flat tire and had to change cars and the money, which was in a sack and a suitcase, and while making the shange some citizen in an automobile drove past them and tried to see their liceanse number, and Doc Barker shot this man in the head, and later when they got to the apartment Verns Hiller gave Doc Barker a sursing for shooting the man.

Bull stated that in addition to Lawrence DeVol being convicted of robbing the Third Northwestern Benk, in Minneapolis, Lawrence's two arothers, whose in Christian names he does not know, were also convicted and given life sentences, but they were not implicated in the robbery and did not participate in sems. Also, that Doc Barker stated to him, Hull, after Lawrence DeVol was arrested on this bank robbery, that if he, Barker, could get Lawrence out of the jail he would take him for a ride because Lawrence talked about the bank job in the pres-

ence of some woman. Hull stated that Harry Compbell was not with the Marker and gang when he was with them, but he heard Doc and Fred Barker talk about Compbell, and when asked why Compbell was not with them, boc Barker informed him. Hull, that they sould not find him. Hull stated that he sever heard my of the Barker gang mention they had stolen \$15,000 for any money from Lawrence Bolton, although they may have done so, but would not talk about it if they had that Verne Miller owed Lawrence DeVol one or two thousand dollars at the time Lawrence was arrested by the efficiers.

Henry Hull also stated that while he was with the Barker gang in St. Paul he never heard them mention and never knew that Ed Bentz was ever connected with them. Also never heard or knew of a connection of theirs by the name of Doc or Jack Pfeiffer; that he never knew of a dentist being connected with the Barker gang; also does not know "Frinco Butch" Steinhardt, Leon Gleckman, Fom Banks, Harry Sawyer, Barney Berman, Isadore Blumenfield, alias Kid Can or Jap Gleckman.

Hull stated that while he was with the Barker gang is Hene, Mewada, is January, 1933, he and Jess Doyle stayed two days at the Anderson Hotel, then moved to the Gibson Apartments at Second and Stevenson Streets; that the day after they moved from the Anderson Hotel, Jess Doyle came into the spartment and said "There is some "Fuz" in town; that when asked what he meant, Doyle stated "Federal officers; that one of them was from Denver and he knew him. Hull stated that several days later the Barker gang ment to the Anderson Hotel for purpose of taking the Federal men for a ride, but they had left town. He stated from what conversation he overheard between the Barkers and Jess Doyle, that shortly after the bank robbery in Minneapolis, Lawrence Devol had supressed a trunk from St. Paul to Reno, and when arrested by officers in St. Paul, the express receipt was found on his person, and some officers went to Reno, Nevada, to watch for associates of Devol on the bank job.

Hull stated that the Karpis-Barker gang have a connection in Coffeyville, and he does not know whether it is in South Coffeyville, Oklahoma or Coffeyville, Kansas; that he often heard the Barker boys mention the name of the man who is a very good friend of theirs, but he cannot recall the name of this man. Bull stated that the Barker boys manted to send him down to stay with this man during the Winter of 1932, and told him, Hull, that he could steal cigarettes with this man and make some money until Spring and until after they had hed their recation.

Hull stated that if the Karpis-Barker gang went to Remo, Mevada, alter getting the Bremer remson money, then the man Graham in Remo would probably be keeping the money for them, but if they stayed in St. Paul, then the man Jack sho was proprietor of the Hollyhocks roadhouse, would keep the money for them.

Hull stated that he is confident that if the father of Doc and Fred Barks is not already with them, and if old man Barker is carefully satched he still sooner or later go direct to where Doc and Fred are located; that if old man Barker does leave his filling station mear Mismi, Okini, to Join his own time. Doc and Fred, he will not likely take any baggage,

Henry Bull stated he cannot furnish any further information about the

Karpis-Berker gang, as he has not been connected with Shem since Jenuary, 1955.
With reference to Carol Tenkersley, alies Carol Hamilton, ax wife of Herman Barker, Mr. L. E. Hewitt, Superintendent of Mails, Calveston, Texas, advised they have no record of Carol Tankersley, alias Hamilton at Galveston Poster pffice. Mr. F. H. 
Charges by the United States Department of Justice that Arthur R. Barker and Alvin Karpis were linked with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer of St. Louis in Januar, add another indictment against the vicious, politically-con trolled Oklahoma parole system. Both Barker and Karpi are on parole from the state penitentiary at McAlester Barker served 10 years of a life sentence for murder and Karpis was released after serving part of a four-year sentence for burglary. Both were criminals to the core, and neither has shown any indication of a desire to reform since they were given their freedom.

Citizens of Oklahoma who pay taxes to maintain the police and sheriffs' forces, the courts and prisons, should be able to understand that a large part of the costs is directly attributable to such paroles as were given Barker and Karpis. Scores of criminals who have been through the courts and prisons of the state are operating in Tulsa's underworld. One Tulsa lawyer, playing politics with his friend, the governor, can undo the work of all our courts by obtaining paroles for criminals convicted in Tulsa.

The people should not only elect legislators pledged to take this power from the governor, but they should get after the political lawyer who, posing as a respectable citizen, conspires with criminals for their freedom and for continuation of their criminal careers.

Reference is made to the kidneplan of Mr. Edward G. Bromer et St. Paul, Minnesota and recent items of publicity unich have arisen relative to the investigative steps which have been to been in receding a solution of this matter.

In this conjection, it has been definitely determined that the type of wall paper which appeared on the walls of the room in thich he was held captive. The definite identification of this wall paper, however, has subsequently been established by the fivicion and there has been an amblicity brown at to my attention relative to the icentification.

In this connection, it has been definitely determined that

Mr. Edward G. Bremer personally gave out information to the press ar to
the type of wall paper which appeared on the walls of the room in thich
he was held captive. The definite identification of this wall paper,
however, has subsequently been established by the fiviation and there has
been no publicity brought to my attention relative to the identification
of this wall paper. Its identification was effected by having a drawing
made, based on Mr. Bremer's recollection of the wall paper pattern, following which investigation was made at the various wall paper manufacturing
establishments in the United States and from one of the samples selected
as being similar to the pattern prepared, Mr. Bremer has made definite
identification.

Ine flash lights, which were used by the kidnapers, were located by Special Agents of the Division. They were photographed and the photographs were enlarged as an aid to effect identification of these flash lights. It became necessary to canvers manufacturers and wholesale dealers in these flash lights and in the conduct of this investigation, the photographs were exhibited to these manufacturers and dealers. It would appear logical that this information could have reached newspaper men through any one of the many contacts made in this connection. It is to be pointed out, however, that there has been no publicity as to the identity of the store where the flash lights were purchased or the identity of the saleslady who sold these flash lights to Alvin Karpis, one of the kidnapers. This information is known only to the Special Agents.

Concerning the publicity relative to the gasoline cans in which the reserve supply of gas was stored and placed in the automobile in which Mr. Bremer was returned, photographs and complete descriptive data relating to these cans were obtained and numerous injuiries were made of can manufacturers as well as many gasoline filling stations along the road known to have been followed by the kidnopers, in an effort to effect a

Memorandum for the Attorney General March 26, 1934. positive identification of the kidnapers by photographs. The publicity relative to the fact that these cans have been found could have been based upon information furnished newspaper men by any one of the numerous operators of filling stations or dealers in this type of equipment. Although mention was made of the fact that fingerprints were found on the cans and the flash lights, this could be a logical assumption on the part of newspaper men due to the necessity for some link to exist to show that the cans and flash lights had been in the possession of the kidnapers. Fingerprints would be the logical method of establishing such a connection; however, it is to be noted that although fingerprints were found on the gasoline cans, no fingerprints have been found on the flash lights, which shows that this portion of the published information is not based on fact. The investigation of this matter is continuing in an effort to determine the source of the information which appeared in the neverpapers. However, it is gratifying and significant to note that there has been no mention of the fect that a cap worn by one of the kidnapers has been identified and this cap was found in the kidnapers' car, which further tends to definitely establish the identity of the kichspers. It would \*appear, if the information is based on data furnished by any employee of this Division, that the identity of the cap would have been an important element. Likewise a further fact, known to the Special Agents of this Division, is the identity of the saleslady selling the flash lights and the store where they were sold, which has not appeared in the press. Although incorrect information has appeared as to identifying Fingerprints on the flash lights, at the same time there has been no publicity concerning the definite identification of the wall paper pattern. Upon receipt of any additional information bearing on this publicity, I shall be glad to immediately advise you. Respectfully,

Black examined the Criminal Appearance Docket at Henryetta, Oklahoma, which discloses that Alvin Karpis, alias George Haller, on September 17, 1931, upon plea of guilty to a charge of burglary, before Superior Court Judge J. H. Swann, sitting in the Henryetta Division of the Okmulgee County Superior Court, was sentenced to serve three years in the State Reformatory at Granite, Oklahoma and was paroled by Judge Swann from the bench on the same date to M. M. Alexander, his attorney, who was the former Judge of the District Court at Okmulgee, Oklahoma, there being no commitment of Alvin Karpis to the Reformatory.

Special Agent H. E. Hollis communicated by telephone with Mr. R. A. Shackelford, Record Clerk at the State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, and made inquiry as to whether or not Alvin Karpis had ever been confined in that institution. Mr. Shackelford stated that he recently received a copy of the fingerprints of Alvin Karpis from the Department of Justice at Washington and, after receiving this, he searched through his fingerprint files and definitely determined that Alvin Karpis had not been confined in the State Penitentiary.

The information as to Alvin Karpis and others mentioned herein was developed as follows:

At Okmulgee, Oklahoma, Mr. Edgar Johnson, Court Clerk, who is the Clerk of the District, Superior and County Courts, Okmulgee, was interviewed. Mr. Johnson stated that J. H. Swann is the Judge of the Superior Court of the Okmulgee, Oklahoma district. Mr. Johnson stated that the records in connection with the trial of Alvin Karpis

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at Henryetta, Oklahoma (which is in Okmulgee County) are maintained in the office of the Deputy Court Clerk, Henryetta, and there is no record in this connection at the Court Clerk's office at Okmulgee.

Sheriff John Lenox, Okmulgee, produced his records and in Jail Record Book No. 1, Page 274, under date of June 12, 1931 appears this entry.

Alvin Karpis; charge burglary; sentenced three years; paroled September 17, 1931.

By reference to the Sheriff's Criminal Fee Record Book No. 9, for Okmulgee County, at Page 149, the following entry was shown:

State of Oklahoma versus Fred Barker, Sam Coker, Alvin Karpis, Joe Howard, J. L. Swanson, charge burglary. Warrant received June 12, 1931; returned found June 16, 1931.

Further, by reference to the Sheriff's Jail Record Book No. 1, Page 21, under date of June 12, 1931, the record shows that Fred Barker on a charge of burglary, made bond on July 5, 1931, but there is no further record as to Barker.

In the same book, Page 72, the record shows that Sam Coker, on a charge of burglary, was sentenced (date not shown) to serve thirty years in McLester State Penitentiary and was sent there on June 19, 1931.

In the same book, Page 202, the record shows that Joe Howard, on a charge of burglary, made bond August 8, 1931, no further record v being shown.

In the same book, Page 475, the record shows that J. F. Swanson was arrested June 11, 1931; charge investigation; released by the Sheriff, June 17, 1931.

The Sheriff's records contained no reference to George Haller.

At the Identification Bureau, Okmulgee Police Department, Mr, W. O. Greenhaw, after a search of the records, advised there is no record on file of George Haller, but the fingerprint records disclose that on June 10, 1931 Alvino Korpis, alias Alvin Karpis, alias R. E. CHamilton, alias George Dunn (with question mark notations after Dunn)

under Okmilgee Police Department No. 1609, was arrested by the Okmulgee Police on a charge of burglary (burglarizing Black's Jewelry Store, Henryetta, Oklahoma) and turned over to the County, fingerprints being forwarded to the Division on June 10, 1931.

Under Okmulgee Police Department No. 293 records disclose that Fred Barker was arrested June 10, 1931 on a charge of burglary and turned over to the County. There is a previous card on Barker which shows his arrest December 19, 1925 at Okmulgee, Oklahoma; charge investigation - "turned over to Fort Smith, Arkansas authorities for burglary."

Under Okmilgee Police Department No. 1610 records disclose that Joe Howard was arrested June 10, 1931 and turned over to the County, charge burglary.

Under Okmulgee Police Department No. 1608 records disclose that Ralph Kelson, alias Sam Coker, was arrested June 10, 1931; charge burglary; turned over to the County.

Under Okmulgee Police Department No. 1603 records disclose 
that Jasper T. Swanson was arrested June 11, 1931, charge investigation burglary; turned over to the County.

All of the above burglary charges were in connection with the burglarization of Black's Jewelry Store, Henryetta, Oklahoma.

Mr. Greenhaw stated that he has only one photograph of Ralph Nelson, alias Sam Coker, Joe Howard and J. T. Swanson, but that he will print additional copies and forward them to the Oklahoma City office.

Mr. E. J. Collyer, Deputy Court Clerk, Henryetta, Oklahoma, produced the Criminal Appearance Docket No. 5, and at Page 163, Case No. 2250, is shown the following entry:

State of Oklahoma versus Fred Barker; Alvin Karpis, alias George Haller; Sam Coker, alias Ralph Nelson; Joe Howard, alias Joe Woodruff, alias Joe Wilson; and J. L. Swanson; charge burglary; case filed July 8, 1931.

The docket as to Alvin Karpis discloses the record as shown in the first part of this letter and in addition thereto shows that on September 30, 1931 a bench warrant was issued for Joe Howard and on October 5, 1931 for Fred Barker; bonds being furnished by both and on October 12, 1931, the defendants failing to appear, bonds were forfeited.

On October 21, 1932 Entry of Cause was put on the Retired Docket (Mr. Collyer stating that this means that the case is not likely to be called for trial.) No further record is shown and nothing is shown as to Sam Coker alias Ralph Nelson, or J. L. Swanson.

The records at Henryetta appeared incomplete, but in view of the fact that the Sheriff's record, Okmulgee, discloses that Sam Coker was sentenced to serve thirty years in the McAlester Penitentiary on a charge of burglary, being sent there on June 19, 1931, when an Agent is next at McAlester, Oklahoma, inquiry will be made to ascertain if Sam Coker is at present incarcerated at McAlester and, if so, he will be interviewed for any information he may be able to furnish relative to any of the Karper-Barker gang; also at Fort Smith, Arkansas, effort will be made to obtain the disposition of the case against Fred Barker noted above.







In my letter to you of March 19, 1934 with respect to certain articles appearing in newspapers concerning latent fingerprints which were found on gasoline cans during the investigation of this case, it will be observed from paragraph five, page six, that I stated that Agent Hollis is preparing a memorandum for me concerning the subject matter of this inquiry. The only portion of the memorandum which has been submitted to me by Agent Hollis that is not covered in my letter referred to is as follows:

"I also interviewed Jim Bracewell, Special Agent for the Great Lakes Pipe Line Company at Tulsa, Oklahoma. Bracewell was a member of the posse which conducted the raid near Mannford, Oklahoma, on March 15, 1934, and was around the court house at Sapulpa during the time the men arrested were being held there and also accompanied the officers to McAlester in transporting the prisoners to the State Penitentiary. I asked Bracewell whether or not he had heard any officers make a statement regarding fingerprints having been found in connection with the Bremer case, and he said that he had heard no such statement. He further advised me that he was one of the officers who assisted in the raid on the Cookson Hills several weeks ago and, while there, he heard officers discuss the fact that Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis had been identified in the Bremer case. He later heard something about fingerprints connected with the Bremer case. He believes this information was obtained in Kansas City, or possibly from Wint Smith of the Kansas State Highway Patrol. Mr. E. E. Kirkpatrick of Tulsa, Oklahoma was present when I talked with Jim Bracewell. Mr. Kirkpatrick, you will recall, is the person who paid the ransom in the Urschel case. Mr. Kirkpatrick stated that he was in Fort Worth, Texas, en March 15, 1934, and talked with officers Swinney and Weatherford

of the Fort Worth Police Department. These officers told Mr. Kirkpatrick that the fingerprints of Harry Campbell, or wright, or some person connected with that gang, had been found on a car door or elsewhere. This discussion with reference to the finger-prints was in connection with the Bremer kidnaping case."

I am in receipt of a letter from E. N. Martel, International News representative at McAlester, Oklahoma in which he enclosed copies of some items sent out by him in respect to this matter. They are quoted below:

Dolls and other toys of the smaller Brackett girl cluttered in every corner of the place. In the toys was a story of easy money. Some expensive, some cheap and all were out of place in a house of its type.

Road maps of practically every state in the Union were found in various parts of the house and in the room occupied by Wright was a

room occupied by Wright was a large wall highway map of the Unit-ed States. It had been snatched from its hanging place and torn badly in the process.

In the kitchen was food enough to

last for at least a week. A 200-pound sack of flour, a stalk of bananas, about 20 pounds of coffee in five-pound cans; five-gallon can of lard; pound cans; five-gallon can of lard; four sides of bacon; a case of eggs, a dozen loaves of bread and large quantities of beans, salt pork and other staples were cached about the kitchen and an untidy leanto at the rear of the house.

Quantity of Chains.

In the barn, which had been converted into a four-car garage, was a large quantity of heavy-duty chains. They were kept in what had been a corncrib. In a lean-to addition to the barn was found, after an all-day search, a new Ford V-8 truck. It had 2,989 miles on the speedometer. It had been concealed from view by the cunning arrangement of hay bales which completely obscured it but which could be removed or replaced in a very few minutes to permit egress to the hiding place.

In a corner and well hidden was found a cache containing three quarts of nitroglycerin.

The truck, believed to have been stolen recently, was equipped with a hand winch and heavy chains and long side-bars. Officers demonstrated the ease with which the group, equipped with the truck, might haul bank safes out and take them to a place where it would be refer to open In the barn, which had been con-

bank safes out and take them to a place where it would be safe to open them by explosives.

The raiders took two automatic

The raiders took two automatic rifles, one submachine gun, three Lugers, four shotguns, six .45 Colt automatics and more than 3,000 rounds of ammunition from the place. Cartridge boxes, old and weather-beaten, were common sights in the littered grounds of the little house.

A Chevrolet coupe, property of the Bracketts, was the only car left at the place yesterday. The raiding party had driven three others found there to Sapulpa. Pauline Brackett, 14, daughter of the farmer, lamented the fact that the raiders had taken the key to the coupe. She couldn't drive it to the Mannford high school for classes yesterday. Neither could her smaller sheet, fillene, 10, attend the district school about a mile away. They had no transportation. They had no transportation.

Fresh air and the peace and quiet of country life were the motives that took four men and two women to a farm west of Mannford, they had told Mrs. Lula Brackett, 41 years old, at whose home the six were arrested in a raid by a large group of officers early yesterday morning.

"They all paid me \$10 a week for room and board," Mrs. Brackett said, in explanation of their presence. "They never offered any excuse for wanting to stay out here except that the air was nice and it was quiet here.


"Times have been hard for us during the last year and when that kind of people drop in with the money to pay, their room rent has helped me pay my grocery bill."

She said that when the weather was fair the men would go out for target practice, and the women would get into their automobiles and go for drives.

"All they seemed to want," Mrs. Brackett continued, "was quiet, food and a bed to sleep in. One of the women had to leave her two pet dogs here when the officers took them away, and I suppose we'll have to give them away."

Mrs. Brackett admitted that she had been keeping roomers like that for more than a year, since they moved to the place near Mannford firm a ferm at the edge of Sapulpa. Previously, the family has lived in Bryan county near Durant, in



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



Dear Sir:

In confirmation of my telephone conversation of the 29th instant with Mr. H. H. Clegg, this is to advise that on the aforementioned date Mr. J. A. Bracewell, Special Agent, for the YGreat Lakes Pipe Line Company of Tulsa, Oklahoma and Kansas City, Missouri, called at the St. Paul office to talk generally in connection with the Barker-Karpis gang. He stated that he is in St. Paul on other business and has worked with agents from the Division and other peace officers for the past several years and is somewhat familiar with the criminal element of Missouri and Oklahoma.

During the course of our conversation he informed me that he was on the recent Oklahoma raid when Glenn Roy/Wright and others were apprehended. I asked him if at the time of that raid, he knew that this Division had identified any of the kidnapers of Edward G. Bremer, and he stated that he knew that the Division had identified Arthur R. (Doc) Barker and Alvin Karpis. I asked him how he had secured that information prior to the raid and he stated that Special Agent Paul Hanson of the Oklahoma City office had told him. He said that on February 18, 1934, the day after the Cookson raid in Oklahoma, that he was talking to Agent Paul Hanson, but that he believes that Paul Hanson merely told him that the Division had made Doc Barker and Karpis". He stated that he cannot recall whether Eanson told him just how the identification had been made.

At this point he stated that he understands the the Division is of the impression that Special Agent, H. H. Follies was, responsible for the leak to the press on the aforementioned identification. He stated that he has known and worked with Hollis for RECORDED

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a long time and thinks very highly of him and does not believe that Hollis gave out the information. It was evident that he did not desire me to believe that Hollis was responsible for this newspaper leak and consequently I asked him whether he had the information prior to the Glenn Roy Wright raid. He stated that he believes he received the information concerning the positive identification prior to the Wright raid at Tulsa, Oklahoma from Mr. Wentz Smith of Topeka, Kansas and who is head of the Kansas State Police. He stated that it is his impression that Smith informed him that he had received the information from an agent from the Kansas City office.

He stated that there were three newspaper reporters who accompanied the police officers in the raid, which resulted in the arrest of Glenn Roy Wright and others; that one of these reporters was Lir. Voight of Tulsa, Oklahoma, one was a girl, and the other a man, the names of the last two being unknown to him.

He stated that shortly after this raid he was with Agent Hollis when Hollis received a telephone call from Voight and that he overheard Hollis' conversation; that it appeared that Voight was asking for information, which Hollis considered confidential, and that he remembers that Hollis informed Voight over the 'phone that he could not furnish him the information which Voight desired.

I asked Bracewell if, to his knowledge, anyone, on the Glenn Roy Wright raid, had knowledge of how "Doc" Barker and Karpis had been identified by the Division and he stated that a peace officer named George Stewart (or Stuart) knew of the manner of identification. The above information was obtained in the morning and in the afternoon Mr. Bracewell was again interviewed, together with Mr. H. Nathan, Assistant Director.

Bracewell stated that sometime after the Wright raid that Mr. Mayer of the Tulsa World informed him that an Agent of this Division had questioned him as to the source of the newspaper story of the identification and merely advised that the Division suspected that Special Agent Hollis had given it to the newspaper.

Bracewell stated that since the Wright raid on one occasion he was at either the office or home of E. E. Kirkpatrick of Tulsa, at which time Special Agent Hollis entered on which occasion he asked Hollis if he was getting in any trouble over the newspaper leak, and that Hollis indicated that he was not. Bracewell stated emphatically that he is sure that Mr. Kirkpatrick knew of the identification of Barker and Karpis prior to the Wright raid; that he stated that he does not know where Kirkpatrick obtained the information. He stated that he is quite sure that Kirkpatrick did not obtain it from Wentz Smith. He stated that Kirkpatrick is a very close friend and admirer of Special Agent Hollis. Mr. Nathan asked Bracewell how he would consider getting to the bottom of this leak without injuring snyone and Bracewell stated that he would suggest that Mr. Nathan frankly discuss the matter with Agent Hollis with a view to determining from Hollis how the matter reached the press. Bracewell is of the opinion that Hollis did not give the information to the press; however, it is significant to note that according to Bracewell, Mr. E. E. Kirkpatrick, who maintains an office at Tulsa, had the information concerning the identification prior to the Wright raid and he could not explain where Kirkpatrick obtained it.

In discussing this matter over the telephone today with Mr. H. H. Clegg he read to me a paragraph from a letter from the Oklahoma City office in this matter in which, according to my recollection, referred to the fact that Mr. Bracewell had informed someone of the Oklahoma City office that he first obtained his information in this matter either from Texas or from Kansas City. From what Mr. Clegg read me, I am unable to determine who at the Oklahoma office secured this information concerning Bracewell. Mr. Bracewell stated that he is positive that when he was visiting with E. E. Kirkpatrick, at

which time Hollis was present, that Hollis asked Bracewell where he first obtained the information and that he told Hollis that he had received it from Mr. Wintz Smith. He stated that he is sure that this is the information that he furnished Hollis.

Mr. Bracewell stated that he is positive a George Stewart, aforementioned, who is connected with the Tulsa Police Department and on the Wright raid, had the information concerning the identification of Barker and Karpis at the time of the raid, but does not know where Stewart obtained the information.

From the above it appears probably that either Stewart or Kirkpatrick could have furnished the information to the press.

Mr. Nathan is being furnished with a copy of this letter.

HIDEOUT

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent
w. W. Peterson, on March 28, 1934, for the purpose of attempting to
locate the hideout:

Antioch, Illinois Lake Villa, Tilinois Loon Lake, Illinois Richmond, Illinois Solon Wills, Illinois Spring Grove, Illinois

#### ARTIOCH, ILLINOIS:

Mr. James F. Roran, Postmaster, Antioch, Illinois was interviewed. Antioch, Illinois has a population of about eleven hundred individuals and is situated in the heart of Lake County with its attending summer resorts. There is a stationary fire siren in Antioch which is sounded at noon each day except Sunday. The siren is sounded at no other time except in case of fire. Sirens of surrounding towns cannot be heard in Antioch. There areno factories located in Antioch and it is not possible to hear factory whistles of other towns: Three the churches are located there, namely: Methodist, Episcopalian and Catholic. -The bell of the Methodist Church is rung at 11 A.M. each Sunday and the bell of the Episcopalian Church is likewise rung on Sunday. The bells of the two churches n amed above never ring on Saturdays. With reference to the Catholic Church, Mr. Horan advised that the bell of this church is rung at 7.45 A.M. each day of the week and on Sunday the bell of the Catholic Church is rung at 7.45 A.M. and 9.45 A.M. It is never rung on Saturday afternoons or evenings. The Soo Line Railway passes through Antioch, Illinois. Following is a schedule of the trains arriving in Antioch, Illinois: (

> 6.40 A.M. - to Chicago 8.40 P.M. - to Chicago 2.20 A.M. - from Chicago 7.11 P.K. - From Chicago

There are no through trains passing through Antioch.

There are two freight trains, each of which goes in an opposite direction, in Antioch daily.

Mr. Horan stated that there is little activity in intioch Illinois during the winter months but a number of boodlums frequent; Antioch and adjoining territory during the summer. "Bugs" Moran, and Leo Mongoven, well known Chicago gangsters, own a home near Antioch. This place was formerly an old hotel but has been remodeled and affords somewhat of a refuge for gangsters during the summer months. "Bugs" Moran. and Leo Mongoven are known to Mr. Horan. Prior to his appointment as Postmaster, Mr. Horan was engaged in the freight business. In connection Therewith he frequently delivered freight to the Moran place. A description of the hideout was provided to Er. Horan but he advised that same would not compare with the Moran place. Mr. Horan further stated that "Buge" : Moran and Mongoven have not been staying in antioch since last Fall. The only individual present on the premises is a caretaker. It would have been impossible for strangers to have been staying at "Bugs" Moran's place without arousing suspicion and causing rumors among the Antioch population, according to Mr. Horan.

Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Fred Barker, Volney Davis, Arthur Bakrer, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis were exhibited to Mr. Horan. He was unable to remember having seen these individuals, although he remarked that the picture of Arthur Barker resembles an individual whom he saw in various taverns in the vicinity of Antioch prior to the repeal of prohibition. This individual was always alone and was alleged to have been handling liquor from Florida. No further information concerning this man could be developed.

E. Preenlee, Service Man, Illinois Bell Telephone Company, Antioch, Illinois, when in erviewed was furnished with a description of the hideout but he was unable to supply any information of value to this inquiry. The territory assigned to him includes Antioch, Illinois, Russell, Illin is, Charnell Lake, Lake Marie and Lake Catherine.

S. Simonson, Village Marshall, Antieth, Illinois, was interviewed and advised that his duties include the reading of all water meters in Antioch and that in connection with said duties he entered each basement located in the town. Mr. Simonson stated that there are no basements in Antioch which would be suitable for liwing quarters. A description of the hideout was provided to Mr. Simonson and he stated that he is positive that a place answering said description is not located in Antioch. Photographs of the above mentioned suspects were exhibited to Mr. Simonson without result.

C. B. Schultis of C. E. Schultis and Son, brocery Store, Antioch, Illinois, was interviewed. Photographs of the individuals listed above were shown to him, and he stated that the photograph of Alvin Larpis is the only picture that bears any resemblance to anyone he might have seen. No further information was available. Mr. Schultis was also furnished with a description of the hideout but he was unable to remember having seen a place resembling said description. According to Mr. Schultis, "Bugs Moran" and Leo Mongoven as well as one Mrs. Cassidy a sister of Mongoven, were formerly customers of the Schultis store, "Bu s" Moran's place is a three story building which was formerly a hotel. It was not believed by Mr. Schultis that the Moran place would answer the description of the hideout. He is also Secretary of the intioch, Illinois Fire Department. At the request of the writer he furnished a list of the fire calls which were received in January; 1931. This list appears below:

The Antioch, Illinois fire siren was not sounded on January

28, 1934.

Lester Osborn, Meil Carrier, 950 Lake, Antioch, Illinois was interviewed. He stated that his meil route covers a distance of thirty-five miles, a large part of which is situated in the lake region. Mr. Osborn further advised that he delivers mail to the "Bugs" Moran Home. He stated that with the sole exception of a caretaker, who is a local boy, there has been no one at the Moran place during the past winter. He further advised that the description of the "Bugs" Moranplace does not correspond with the description of the hideout. The Moranplace is built in the side of a hill. Prior to satering the first floor it is necessary to descend several steps after which it becomes necessary to walk about twenty steps farther before entering the lower floor. This floor is even with the street level and no additional descent is necessary in order to enter. The interior of the basement does not correspond with the hideout according to Mr.Osborn.

Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Berker, Fred Berker, Volney Devis, Arthur Berker, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis were shown to Mr. Osborn, but he was unable to identify same. Said photographs were also exhibited to the following individuals with negative results:

M. Ray Smith, Proprietor, Red Crown Service Station R. L. Murrie, Proprietor, Standard Oil Filling Station

. B. Ray, Filling Station Proprietor

W. A. Rosing, proprietor, F ord Garage, and also the Shell Service Station, Antioch, Illinois, has been supervisor of the township and in this capacity he had charge of granting beer licenses to taveras. Mr.Rosing stated that he has covered the township very thoroughly but within his knowledge he has not seen the individuals whose photographs were shown to him.

L. Thompson, 1551 Sherman, Northbrook, Illinois was interviewed. He is a meter reader for the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois and his territory includes Antioch, Illinois and surrounding territory. He was unable to remember having seen a basement resembling the hideout. He further stated that he had been in the basement of "Bugs" Moran's place, but it fails to answer the description of the hideout.

There are two drug stores in Antioch, Illinois. Helen Cribb, Manager, Reeves Drug Store, was interviewed. Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Fred Barker, Volney Davis, Arthur Barker, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis were shown to her with negative results. She expressed the opinion that the photograph of Volney Davis appears somewhat familiar.

H. L. Gilbraith, proprietor, Kings Drug Store, was also interviewed at which time the photographs of the individuals listed above were exhibited to him. He was unable to identify said photographs although he expressed an opinion that the picture of Fred Barker appeared rather familiar. Mr. Gilbraith stated that if he has ever seen Fred Barker it probably occurred in the drug store.

#### LAKE VILLA. ILLINOIS:

Mrs. H. M. Ballenger, Postmistress, Lake Villa, Illinois, was interviewed. There is a population of about four hundred people in Lake Villa. It is a summer resort town and there is very little activity there from about September until the following May. Lake Villa has a stationary fire siren. It is sounded each day, including Sunday, at 12 noon. It is also possible to frequently hear the siren s of ther towns at noon and evening, although said sirens are not heard regularly.

There are no factories situated in or near lake Villa. Illinois and the factory whistles of other towns are not sudible. One thurch, namely the Methodist Church, is located in Lake Villa. The bell of this church is rung on Sundays at ten o'clock and eleven O'clock in the morning. It never rings on Saturdays. Church bells located in other communities are not audible in the village. The Soo Line Railway passes through lake Villa, Illinois. The schedule of trains arriving in Lake Villa appears below:

2.50 A.M. northbound
6.55 A.M. southbound
7.00 P.M. northbound
9.10 P.M. southbound

There is very little switching in lake Villa, Illinois. Occasional planes fly overhead. There is no village mater system and no individual reads water meters in Lake Villa.

All meter readers of the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois, Northbrook, Illinois (eighteen in number) were interviewed by the writer. Said water meter readers have jurisdiction of Lake Villa, Illinois.

Fred Hamlin, Chief, Fire Department, Lake Villa, Illinois upon interview stated that the Lake Villa fire siren sounded at 12 o'slock noon on January 28, 1932, and that it was sounded again on the same date at 2 P.M. for trial purposes. Er. Hamlin stated that he has resided in Lake Villa for a period of forty years, and that he is well acquainted with the structure of the various homes in the village as well as in the surrounding territory. Mr. Hamlin advised that there are no basements in the locality which could possibly be used for living quarters. A description of the hideout was furnished to Mr. Hamlin but he was unable to provide any information pertinent to this inquiry.

Only one drug store is located in Lake Villa. T. S. Boyd, Clerk, Hooper's Drug Store, was interviewed at which time photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Fred Barker, Volney Davis, Arthur Barker, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis were shown to him. He wtated that the photograph of Voleny Davis resembles some one he has seen in Hooper's Drug Store. The individual to whom he referred has not been seen recently and the sole information which was a vailable from Mr. Boyd was that the picture of Volney Davis appeared familiar.

Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Fred Barker, Volney Davis Arthur Barker, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis were also exhibited to the following individuals with negative results:

E. 01 Hucker, proprietor, Hucker's Garage, Lake Villa.

A. Haley, Rentner and Haley Chevrolet Garage, Lake Villa

Frank Sciacero, Rentner and Haley Service Station, Lake Villa.

G. Swanson, Swanson's Garage, Lake Villa, Illinois when interviewed stated that the photographs of Volney Davis and Arthur Barker appeared familiar. After a considerable amount of questioning he stated that he is of the epinion that he saw Barker and Davis in the summer of 1933 or the fall of 1933; that they were driving a 1928 Chevrolet coach at that time; that about three or four men were in the car and that these individuals were headed for Fourth Lake. Mr. Swanson's recollection of the men in question was very hazy and he was unable to furnish any additional details. Fourth Lake is a summer resort which is located about five miles from Lake Villa.

#### FOURTH LAKE, ILLINOIS:

Investigation at Fourth Lake disclosed that practically all cottages surrounding the lake are uninhabited during the winter months. Only six families have resided in co ttages near Fourth Lake during the past winter.

Dave Theehes, Fourth Lake, was interviewed. He owns property surrounding Fourth Lake and rents boats and cottages during the summer . months. Kr. Theehes stated that it is possible to hear the siren located in Lake Villa, Illinois. This siren is sounded each day at 12 noon. There is no siren in Fourth Lake. Although no factories are situated in Fourth Lake it is possible to hear a factory whistle at 7 A.M. twelve noon and 5 P.M. A church is not located in or near Fourth Lake and no church bells are audible. The nearest trains are those passing through Lake Villa, Illinois. Occasional aeroplanes pass overheard. Mr. Theehes stated that all buildings near Fourth Lake are typical summer cottages. There are no basements in said cottages. "No strangers have been in the vicinity of Fourth Lake during the past winter months according to Mr. Theches. He stated that it would be impossible for strangers to live near Fourth Lake without his knowledge. He further advised that all individuals who have been frequenting Fourth Lake during the past several months are known to him .- Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Volney Davis, Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis, Arthur Barker and Harry Campbell were shown to Mr. Dan Theehes. He stated that within his knowledge he has never seen these individuals

and that he is positive that they have not frequented Fourth Lake during the winter of 1933-1934.

C. W. Williamson, Manager of the sub-division Fourth Lake, Illinois was interviewed at which time the photographs of the individuals listed above were exhibited to him. He stated that he is in charge of the resity surrounding Fourth Lake; that he is on the premises constantly and that he is confident that the individuals whose photographs were shown to him have not been living near Fourth Lake during the past several months. Mr. Williams stated that only six families have remained at Fourth Lake during the past winter. The members of these families are known to Mr. Williams and no strangers have been observed. There are no basements near Fourth Lake that are habitable.

Mrs. Ther Alfredson, Fourth Lake, Wisconsin was interviewed in the absence of her husband. Mr. Alfredson rents boats to individuals who visit Fourth Lake during the summer months. She stated that the cottage of Mrs. Johnson is the sole cottage near Fourth Lake which has a basement and that same is not habitable. She corroborated the statements of hr. Williamson and Mr. Theehes to the effect that no strangers have been observed near the vicinity of Fourth Lake during the past winter months. Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Volney Davis, Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis, Arthur Barker and Harry Campbell were shown to Mrs. Alfredson but she was unable to recognize same.

There are no places of business in Fourth Lake and no Post Office is located there.

#### LOON LAKE, ILLINOIS:

was interviewed. Loon Lake is a summer resort village. During the past winter months only about three families have remained in Loon Lake. The residence buildings consist solely of cottages which surround the lake. There is no Post Office in Loon Lake and the mail is delivered by the Antioch, Illinois Postal Carrier. No siren is located in Loon Lake. The siren in antioch which sounds each day at twelve noon is heard in Loon Lake however. There is no factory located near Loon Lake and it is impossible to hear a factory whistle of other towns, although a boys school located a few miles distant has a whistle which is sounded each morning at six o'clock. There are no schools or churches in Loon Lake. On extremely rare occasions the Catholic Church bell located in Antioch can be heard. The Soo Line Railway passes through Loon Lake. A train which passes through

Loon Lake at 9 P.M. enroute to Chicago stops only when signalled. No other trains stop. Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Fred Barker, Volney Davis, Arthur Barker, Harry Campbell and Alvin Karpis were exhibited to 3. Charles Cormak and to his son who is also employed in the store. They were unable to identify the photographs. Mr. Cermak stated that he has lived in Loon Lake for ten years; that he knows all individuals who frequent Loon Lake; that in addition thereto he visits almost all cottages for the purpose of making deliveries, and that he is confident that the individuals whose photographs were shown him have never lived in the vicinity of Loon Lake. There have been no strengers in Loon Lake during the ..... past winter according to Mr. Cermak.

Sales the sales that the sales H. Greenlee, Service Man, Illinois Bell Telephone Company, Antioch, Illinois was interviewed. Loon Lake lies within the territory. covered by Mr. Greenlee. Ho information pertinent to this inquiry sould and the first of the second of

All meter readers of the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois were interviewed by the writer in Northbrook, Illinois. Loon Lake lies within the territory covered by these men.

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John H. Ryan, Acting Postmaster, Richmond, Illinois, was interviewed. A stationary fire siren is located in Richmond, Illinois. It is sounded each day except Sundays at 12 noon and for fire. There are 🐑 🖰 no factories located near Richmond and factory whistles of other localities are not audible. There are three churches in Richmond, Illinois, namely: Congregational, Methodist and Catholic. The Congregational and Catholic Churches are not equipped with bells. The bell of the Kethodist Church is rung on Sundays only and is not rung on Saturdays. The Crystal Lake and Lake Geneva division of the Chicago and Northwestern Railways passes through Richmond, Illinois. A schedule of the passenger trains appears below:

Control of the second of the second of the A freight train which arrives at approximately 6.30 A.M. (no definite time) carries mail. Another freight train passes through Richmond each day. Very little switching occurs in Richmond. There are occasional aeroplanes flying over the village.

Richmond, Illinois has a population of five hundred fifty people. Two rural carriers work eat of the Richmond Post Office. Said carriers are Frank G. Motley and LeRoy Todd. The Richmond Post Office has jurisdiction over Twin Lakes, Wisconsin in which locality the home of Harvey Bailey is located. The wife of Harvey Bailey, who is known as Mrs. Brennan, and son Von Brennan, still reside near Twin Lakes. Mail is delivered to Krs. Brennan and Von Brennan by LeRoy Todd. A brother of Harvey Bailey, one Err R. Bailey formerly resided in the Twin Lakes area but moved to Bristol, Wisconsin about ten days ago.

There have been no suspicious characters seen in Richmond.

Illinois during the past several months. Photographs of Lrs. Arrie Berker,

Volney Davis, Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis, Arthur Barker and Harry Campbell

were exhibited to Mr. Ryan but he was unable to identify same.

Edith Bambas, Assistant to Postmaster John H. Ryan, Richmond, Illinois was also interviewed and photographs of the individuals listed above were exhibited to her, without results.

LeRoy Todd, Mail Carrier, Richmond, Illinois was interviewed at which time a description of the hideout was furnished to him. He delivers mail for a distance of thirty miles. Mr. Todd was unable to recall having seen a place which would correspond to the description of the hideout. Photographs of the six individuals previously mentioned were shown to Mr. Todd but he was unable to identify same.

Frank G. Motley, Mail Carrier, Richmond, Illinois when interviewed was furnished with a description of the hideout and was also shown the six photographs referred to above. No information was available concerning the hideout or the individuals whose photographs were exhibited to him.

The writer interviewed the following individuals in Richmond and exhibited to them photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Volney Davis, Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis, Arthur Barker, and Harry Campbell:

Topper, Manager, O'Brien's Pharmacy, Richmond, Ill stated that the photograph of Volney Davis resembles a man sho entered O'Brien's Pharmacy one night prior to Christmas 1933. The individual in question was accompanied by two other men. These men have never been seen prior or subsequent to that time and no additional information relative thereto was available. The other individuals interviewed were unable to recognize the photographs.

Otto Buchert, village marshal, was interviewed at which time description of the hideout was furnished to him. Hr. Buchert reads the water meters for the village of Richmond and in that capacity has access to the basements of all homes in the village. He stated that he has never observed a place corresponding to the description of the hideout. Photographs of the six individuals listed previously were exhibited to Otto Buchert with negative results.

W. I. Stamm, meter foreman, McHenry County Power and Light Company, Richmond, Illinois was interviewed. Mr. Stamm reads all meters for the above company throughout an area of six miles in width and twenty five miles in length in McHenry County, Illinois. In addition to rural territory Mr. Stamm reads meters in the following places: Grass Lake, Lotus Woods, wildwood, Spring Grove, Solon Mills, Fox River Springs, Richmond, Hebron, Alden, Big Foot and Bingwood, Illinois. He also reads meters in the subdivision located on Pistakee Lake. A complete description of the hideout and samples of the wallpaper found therein were shown to Mr. Stamm. He was unable to remember having seen a place which would correspond to the description of the hideout. Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Volney Davis, Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis, Arthur Barker and Harry Campbell were exhibited to Mr. Stamm with negative results.

Inquiry at the office of the telephone company, Richmond, Illinois developed that the installation and service work in the locality is performed by William Helm, Hebron, Illinois. Investigation at Hebron, Illinois being conducted by enother Agent.

William Freeman, Secretary, Fire Department, Bichmond, 111. upon interview produced his records which reflect that a fire call was received on January 26, 1934, and on February 8, 1934. Mr. Freeman additional that no fire call was received on January 28, 1934.

#### SOLON MILLS, ILLINOIS:

Leon Hodge, Postmester, was interviewed. Solon Mills has a population of 125 people. There is no airem located in Solon Mills, III; On very rare occasions the siren of Spring Greve is heard in Solon Mills. The siren of Spring Grove is sounded only in case of fire. No factories are located near Solon Mills and no factory whistles are audible. There is one church in Solon Mills. The bell of this church rings on Sundays only. It never rings on Saturdays. Church bells of other communities are not audible in Solon Mills although on rare occasions the Catholic Church bell of Spring Grove may be heard. This church bell rings three times each day, namely at 7 A.M., noon, and 3 P.M. The Chicago, Milwaukee St. Paul and Pacific Railway passes through Solon Mills. Only one train which arrives at 7.50 A.M., stops in Solon Mills. Mr. Hodge advised the writer that the following trains pass through Solon mills:

7.40 P.M. eastbound
4.55 P.M. westbound

Ime local freight train passes through Solon Mills each day and enother freight train passes through the village three times per week. Very little switching occurs in the vicinity of Solon Mills. Occasional aeroplanes fly over the village. Mr. Hodge stated that there have been no strangers or suspicious characters in Solon Mills during the past few months. There are only a small number of homes in the village and Mr. Hodge stated that there are no basements in the locality which could be used for living quarters. In addition to the Post Office, the only places of business in Solon Mills are a store and a tavern. Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Volney Davis, Fred Berker, Alvin Karpis, Arthur Barker and Harry Campbell were shown to Mr. Hodge but he was unable to identify same.

Haft. Turner, proprietor, Turner's Grosery, Solon Mills, III.

was interviewed and photographs of the six individuals listed above were exhibited to him. He was unable to identify said photographs and further advised that there have been no strangers in the village during the past several months. Mr. Turner stated that he has resided in Solon Mills during, his entire lifetime; that he is well acquainted with the various homes of the locality and that there are no besements which could be used for living quarters.

Mrs. Certrude Aubert, Clerk, Turner's Grocery, Solon Mills.
Illinois was also interviewed. She was mable to remember having seem any individuals resembling the six photographs which the writer exhibited to her. Said photographs are those referred to previously.

W. C. Stamm, meter foremen, McHenry County Power and Light Company, Eichmond, Illinois upon interview advised that he reads meters for seid company in Solon Mills, Illinois. He was unable to provide any information which might assist in locating the hideout.

There is no water system in Solon Eills.

#### SPRING GROVE, ILLINGIS

Bertha L. Esh, Postmistress, Spring Grove, Illinois was inter viewed. There is a population of 249 people in Spring Grove. No drug stores are located in the town and only two grocery stores are situated therein. Spring Grove has a fire siren which is used only for fires. The last fire call was received in Spring Grove in December, 1933. There have been no fire calls during January, February or March, 1934. Sirens of other towns are not audible. No factories are located in Spring Grove, Illinois. The whistle of the Bowmen Dairy Company, Ringwood, Illinois can be heard if the A. the wind is favorable. This whistle is sounded at 7 o'clock A.M. and at the sounded at 7 o'clock A.M. and at the sounded at 7 o'clock A.M. 12 o'clock noon. There are two churches in Spring Grove, Illinois , namely-The Community Church and the Catholic Church. The bell of the Catholic Church is rung each day of the week at ? o'clock A.M. 12 noon and five P.M. On Sunday the bell of the Catholic church rings at eight o'clock A.K., and ten o'clock A.M. The bell of the Community Church rings only on Sundays. A church bell is not heard on Saturdays other than the Catholic Church bell which rings at the usual hours of 7 A.M., noon and 5 P.M.

The Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railway passes through Spring Grove, Illinois. A schedule of the passenger trains appears below:

7.45 A.M. eastbound
10.40 A.M. westbound
4.30 P.M. westbound
7.06 P.M. westbound
6.21 P.M. westbound
7.35 P.M. eastbound

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Very little switching occurs. Occasional aeroplanes pass over Spring Grove Illinois but a Grove Illinois. There is no willage water department in Spring Grove and no individual is employed to read the water maters. No basements in the vicinity of Spring Grove are suitable for living querters.

A description of the hideout was furnished to Mr. Stamm but he was unable to provide any information pertinent to this inquiry.

The telephone service man for Spring Grove works out of Hebron, Illinois. Another agent is conducting investigation in Hebron.

#### CURNEE. ILLINOIS:

Kimball, Postmester, Curnee, Illinois upon interview vised that the siren of the Gurnes, Illinois fire department is sounded each day at noon and in case of fire. There are no factories in the village of Gurnes. Illinois which has a population of about five hundred people. When the wind is favorable it is possible to hear a factory whistle of a neighboring town at noon. It is also possible to hear the fog horn of Waukegan, Illinois. There is only one church in Gurnes, Illinois, the bell of which church rings only on Sunday and never rings on Saturday. The Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railway passes through Gurnee. A train from Chicago enroute to St. Paul stops in Gurnee at twoo'clock each afternoon. No other trains stop in the village although trains pass through almost hourly. The Chicago and Northwestern Railway passes near Curnee but no trains stop and this line does not have a station in Gurnee. There is very little switching in the vicinity of Gurnes. Mr. Kimball advised that the greater number of homes in the village are one family homes. There is no water system in the village and consequently no individual is employed to read water meters. Mr.Kimball stated that he has not observed any suspicious characters in the vicinity of Gurnee, Illinois. Photographs of Mrs. Arris Barker, Volney Davis, Alvin Karpis, Harry Compbell, Arthur Barker and Fred Barker were exhibited to Er. Kimball but he was unable to identify same.

Joseph Dada, Chief, Fire Department, was interviewed. He advised that the sirenof Gurnee is sounded only at noon each day. At the request of the writer he produced his records which reflect that the Gurnee Fire Department received no calls in January 1934, and that the only fire which occurred in February was on the fifteenth of February, 1934. He corroborated the information provided by Postmaster W. K. Kimball to the effect that there is only one church in Gurnee and that its bell is rung only on Sunday.

Cherles Hook, trouble shooter, warren Mutual Telephone Co.
Gurnee, Illinois was interviewed. He was provided with a description of the
hideout but was unable to furnish any information which might aid in this
inquiry.

upon interview advised that he has not observed a dark colored Buick sedan in which there were suspicious cheracters during the past few months. A service station is operated in connection with McClure's Carage and photographs of Volney Davis, Mrs. Arrie Barker, Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, Arthur Barker and Fred Barker were shown to all employees of said garage and service station. Said employees are R. W. McClure, proprietor, Rollo Worth, Virden Lamb, Everett W. McClure and Joseph Dada.

Everett W. McClure, McClure's Garage, Gurnee, Illinois that the photograph of Harry Campbell is that of an individual who attempted to defraud him on March 23, 1934. This individual is stated to have attempted to sell him some literature pertaining to the retail gasoline business. Everett W. McClure asked him the price of the literature and the only feply he received was "You have a bill haven't you?". According to Everett Ecclure, the individual attempted to compel him to give him a bill without disclosing the price of the literature he was selling and thereafter absconding with all money he received. No further information could be developed concerning this individual although Everett McClure advised that he was traveling with another man and a woman in a 1933 Chevrolet coups. This car was painted black and had black wire wheels. Everett McClure did not have an opportunity to observe the companions of the individual in question and could not describe them. It appears rather unlikely that Hamry Campbell would be connected with a "sheep recket" of this nature, but Everett McClure was rather positive of the photograph identification. Everett McClure was alone in the garage when he was approached with reference to the retail gasoline literature. The two men and one woman left Gurnee, Illinois in the literature. the Chevrolet coupe in an easterly direction.

#### MILLBURN, ILLINCIB:

proprietaris in the contract of the state of the proprietary of the state of the contract of the proprietaries and the state of E. Groebli, Gameral Store proprietor, Miliburn, Illinois upon interview advised that Millburn is a village of less than 100 inhabitants. There is no Post Office in Killburn and the village is not incorporated. The Groebli store and the E. A. Martin general store are the only places of business in the village. There is no siren located in Millburn. If the wind is fevorable it is possible to hear the siren at Antioch on rare occasions. There are no factories in or near Millburn and it is impossible to hear the whistles of factories situated in other towns. There is one church in Millburn. The bell of this church is rung only on Sunday and is never rung on Saturday. No railways pass through Killburn. The Soo Line and the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railways pass through Lake Villa, Illinois which is about four miles from Millburn. There is no water system in Millburn and no individuals are employed to read water meters. An air mail route is located over Millburn and air mail planes pass overhead each day. Mr. E. A. Martin, General Store, Millburn, Illianis was also interviewed. Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Volney Davis, Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, Arthur Berker and Fred Barker were exhibited to Mr. E, Groebil and Mr. E. A. Martin with negative results.

J. H. Kelly, Postmaster, upon interview advised that Russell has a population of sixty people. There is no siren in the willage and it is impossible to hear the siren of surrounding towns. There are no factories in Russell and it is only on rare occasions that it is possible to hear a factory whistle of a Zion, Illinois factory. There is one church in Russell namely the Baptist Church. It does not have a bell. Church bells are not rung in the vicinity on Saturdays. With reference to the trains which pass through Russell, Mr. Kelly advised that one passenger train stops in Russell each day et 2.14 P.M. This train is northward bound. There is one freight train each day but very little switching is done. Trains switch in Russell about two or three times each week. Two air mail planes pass ever Russell each night. Mr. J. H. Kelly operates a general store in connection with the Post Office. The garage operated by Mr. Baneck and the Kelly store are the only places of business in Russell.

G. J. Kelly, Russell, Illinois was interviewed. He is employed . 30 as a clerk in the Kelly store. Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Volney Davis Alvin Earpis, Harry Campbell, Arthur Barker and Fred Barker were shown to J. H. Kelly and G. J. Kelly but they could not identify same.

#### WADSWORTH, IL! INOIS:

Mrs. C.Patch, Postmistress, Wadsworth, Illinois, upon interwiew advised that Wadsworth has a population of one hundred people. There is no siren in Wadsworth and it is impossible to hear the sirens of surrounding towns although when the wind is favorable it is possible to coasionally hear a siren located in Zion, Illinois. There are no factories located in the vicinity of Wadsworth. It is possible to occasionally hear factory whiatles located in Waukegan, Illinois. Said whistles are sounded in the mornings and evenings. Only one church is situated in Wadsworth. This church has no bell and it is not passible to hear church bells located in surrounding localities. The Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific 🧢 Railway passes through Wadsworth. A train arriving at 2.10 P.M. from the soth stops in Wadsworth. No other trains stop although there are thirty . two trains passing through Wadsworth each twenty four hours. Gas and electricity is furnished to the village of Wadsworth, Illinois by the North

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Shore Gas Company and by the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois. The meter readers of said companies have been interviewed. The telephone service is rendered by the illinois Bell Telephone Company, Waukegan, Illy. Arrangements are being made to interview the employees of that company.

Mr. C. Patch, proprietor of the store which is operated in conjunction with his wife's Post Office, Wadsworth, Illinois was interviewed. The information which he furnished is identical to that provided by his wife. Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Volney Davis, Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, Arthur Barker and Fred Barker were exhibited to Mr. and Mrs. Patch with negative results.

J.Foster, Foster's Store, Wadsworth, Illinois when interviewed stated that he has observed no suspicious characters in the vicinity of Madsworth. Photographs of the individuals listed above were exhibited to him but he was unable to identify same.

Mrs. Frank Shea, Shea's Garage and Service Station, Wadsworth Illinois was interviewed in the absence of her husband who was out of town, at the time of Agent's visit. Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Volney Davia Harry Campbell, Arthur Barker and Fred Barker were shown to her with negative results. She assists her husband in the operation of his place of business.

## WINTHROP HARBOR, ILLINOIS:

Lydia Bostetter, Fostmistress, Winthrop Harbor, Illinois was interviewed. Winthrop Harbor has a population of 661 people. There is no siren in the village but is possible to hear the siren on the lace factory located in Zion, Illinois at noon and five o'clock. There is no factory in Winthrop Harbor, Illinois, but factory whistles of Zion may be heard when the wind is favorable. Said factory whistles sound at the following hours: 6 A.M. 7 A.M. 8 A.M., noon, and 5 P.M. The community church is the only church in Winthrop Harbor. The bell of this church is rung at 10 A.M. and 11 A.M. on Sundays only. It never rings on Saturdays. The Chicago and Northwestern Bailway passes through Winthrop Harbor, Illinois schedule of said line appears below:

6.30 A.M. = southbound
3.30 P.M. = northbound
5.50 P.M. = northbound
7.12 P.M. = northbound

There is very little switching in Winterop Harbor. Photographs of Mrs. Arrie Barker, Volney Davis, Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, Arthur Barker, Lydia Bostetter, without results.

John T. Johnston, Winthrop Harbor, Illinois was interviewed, Lr. Johnston reads the water meters in Winthrop Harbor. He also owns and operates a garage and in addition thereto Mr. Johnson is a motorcycle officer. A description of the hideout was furnished to Mr. Johnston. He advised that he has never seen any place which would answer this description. Photographs of Volney Davis, Mrs. Arrie Barker, Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, Arthur Barker and Fred Barker were exhibited to Mr. Johnston but he was unable to identify same,

Winthrop Harbor, Illinois was also interviewed at which time photographs of the individuals listed above were shown to her. Nellie Anderson was unable to provide any information concerning said individuals.

Cecil Knapp, 938 Muirfield, Waukegan, Illinois advised that he reads meters for the Northshore Cas Company, Waukegan, Illinois in Winthrop Harbor and Zion, Illinois. A description of the hideout was furnished to him but he could provide no information relative thereto. Numerous meter readers for the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois Waukegan, Illinois was interviewed with negative results.

#### ZION, ILLINOIS:

Florence Higley, Assistant Postmistress, Zion, Illinois was interviewed. Zion, Illinois has a population of 6000 people. The Zion fire department has a siren which is used in cash of fire, and occasionally for police calls and at no other time. There are several factories in Zion. The whistles of said factories are heard each morning noon and evening except on Sundays. The Christian Catholic Apostolic Church of Zion, Illinois of which W. S. Voliva is overseer, controls over two thirds of the population, in addition to this religious organization there are fourthurches, namely: Methodist, Baptist, which has no shurch building. Christian Assembly, and the Grove Missionary. The only bell in Zion is located on the Zion Home. This bell is rung each week day at the following hours: S.A.M. S.A.M. 6 P.M. and 9 P.M. The bell at 9 A.M. and 9 P.M. rings for the purpose of causing the inhabitants of the town to pause for prayer and at the end of a two minute period the bell is rung again. On Sundays the bell on the Zion Home is rung only at 9 A.M. and 9 P.M.

D. DePaw, 2904 Eschol Street; A. C. McCulloch, 2806 Elizabeth Street, C. J. Ross, 2614 Elisha Street, and alex DePaw, 2315 Elisha Zion, Illing's were interviewed. These individuals are mail carriers working out of the Zion Post Office. A description of the bidecet was furnished to them but they were unable to provide any information of value to this inquiry.

Florence Higley advised that the Chicago and North Post Chicago and North

Florence Higley advised that the Chicago and Northwestern Steam Railway and the Northshore Electric Railway pass through Zion.
Electric trains arrive in Zion every hour. Following is a schedule of the Chicago and Northwestern trains arriving in Zion, Illinois each day:

There is no Sunday train service in Zion, Illinois.

E. W. Cdsperson, Chief, Fire Department, Zion, Illinois was interviewed. Mr. Casperson is also chief of the Zion Police Department. The records of the Zion, Illinois Fire Department reflect that fire calls were received on January 20, 1934, January 28, 1934, and January 30, 1934. Two calls were received on January 28,1934. The first call was received at 2 P.M. and the second call was received at 3 P.M. The fire sirem sounded only at 2 P.M. Mr. Casperson advised that the Zion, Illinois fire siren is used only for fire and Police calls. There are four factories in Zion, Illinois. The mistlesof these factories are sounded at \$ A.M. 7 A.M. 8 A.M., apon and 5 P.M. The whistle on the lace factory, which is so nded at noon and fixe o'clock P.M. sounds quite similar to a siren. Mr. Casperson advised that he has inspected the greater number of homes in Zion, Illinois for fire purposes and that he has never seen any basements which would resemble the hideout.

R. Bauris, Fire Department, Zion, Illinois was also intercled ed. The information which he provided was similar to that furnished by Chief Casperson. Erwin M. Craig, Assistant Superintendent, Water Department, Zion, Illinois, upon interview stated that he reads the water meters in Zion, Illinois; that he visits all homes thich receive water from the city of Zion, and that he has never seen a basement answering the description of the hideout. James J. Craig, Superintendent, Water Department, Zion, Illinois was also interviewed but no additional information sould be developed.

Photographs of Ers. Arrie Barker, Volney Davis, Alvin Karpis
Harry Campbell, Arthur Barker and Fred Barker were exhibited to the
following individuals with negative results: E. W. Casperson, Chief of
Fire Department, R. Baurle, Paul Stewart, Erwin M. Craig, and James J.

Cecil Knapp, 938 Muirfield, Waukegan, Illinois apon interview advised that he reads gas meters in Zion, Illinois and Winthrop Harber, Illinois for the Northshore Ges Company, Waukegan, Illinois. A description of the hideout was furnished him but he was unable to provide any information relative thereto. Meter readers of the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois, Waukegan, Illinois, were also interviewed without results.

On March 23 and 24, 1934, investigation was conducted by Special Agent W. C. Ryan at the following places, relative to the hideout:

BARRINGTON, ILLINGIS: It was learned through Postmester E. J. Langdorf that the sireh located here blows each Saturday at noon and for fires; that no factory whistles are heard here, the Jewel Tea Co. being located in the northern, section of town, but this has no whistle, and the closest town at which a factory with a whistle is located is algonquin, a distance of eight miles, which whistle can be heard only on exceptionally clear days; that there are six churches in town, one of which

the St. Paul Lutheran, rings its bell at 6 P.M. on Saturdays and all the rest ring at various times on Sunday mornings; that the mail plane to Madison and StlPaul flies directly sverhead at 4,55 P.M. daily.

The town is served by the Chicago & Northwestern RR. which runs a suburban service to Chicago, and the Elgin, Joliet and Rastern
Railroad, which is entirely freight. The following schedule of trains

Only the trains marked "local" stop at Barrington. All of the above are freight trains.

It was ascertained through the station agents at both railroads that all trains on both lines blow their whistles several times at crossings before arriving at Barrington and that the whistles on all trains are ordinary train whistles.

H. W. Blood, Station Agent, R. J. & E. R.R. advised that a switch engine on his reilroad moves cars from the Jewel Tea Co. to the main tracks from noon to 6.00 P.M. each day and that this engine has an ordinary train whistle which it blows at numerous instances while moving cars.

Postmaster Langdorf and rural carriers Charles Hutchinson, F.L. Bennett and S. L. Landwer, were exhibited pictures of the suspects in this case with negative results. The rural carriers at Barrington serve an area of approximately five square miles around the town, which includes the rural routes out of Leke Zurich, Ill. and the rural district to the south of Wauconda, Ill. They were questioned concerning any house Which might answer the description of the hideout and as a result Carrier Landwer suggested the possibility of the cottage of one Frank Kazimour, located on the Fox River, on route 1, out of Barrington, which place is operated as a saloon. Agent accompanied Mr. Landwer to this place and on the pretext of looking for a good fishing location Agent and Landwer engaged a son of Kezimour in conversation and succeeded in viewing the basement. It was found to be approached by five cement steps from the outside but upon entering the basement was found to consist of only two rooms, one of which is used for a store room and the other being formerly used for a bar. The wall of the basement was found to be plain brick and the floors cement, and it did not appear that anyone could have stayed in this place for any length of time due to the dampness.

Paul Purcell, town marshall, and water meter reader, was interviewed. He had been previously interviewed by Agent in connection with case and advised that he had not thought of or discovered any probable places since he was last interviewed. He recognized none of the pictures of suspects as persons he has seen. In the absence of the fire chief. Mr. Purcell

obtained, for Agent, a list of all fires at Barrington between the dates of January 17 and February 7, 1934. The dates and time of these fires are as follows: January 19th at 11,00 A.M. January 25rd at 9,50 P.M. January 51 at 9.30 A.M. Mr. Purcell advised that the siren sounded for each of these fires which was a long continuous blastee

Charles Miller, Town assessor, and confectionery store operator, was interviewed and he advised that through his duties as assessor he has been in and appraised gractically 95 percent of the houses in and the around Barrington. He stated that he knew no one house which would answer the description of the hideout house. He also failed to recognize the photographs of suspects as parties who had ever dealt at his store.

Agent also interviewed V. H. Lageschulte, a coal dealer, and Charles Wint, a coal truck driver, inorder to ascertain if these parties had dealt with any strangers in a house of the hideout description, or had sold coal to anyone resembling suspects, but this was without result.

Inquiry was made at all grocery stores, filling stations and the drug store and pictures of suspects exhibited with no result.

AT ELA, III.

Inquiry was made by Agent of the operator of the only gasoline station and grocery store in the town, which consists of approximately ten houses. It was learned that no siren is located here or ordinarily heard; that no factory whistles are anywhere nearby; that no churches are closer than three miles, at Lake Zurich; that the closest railroad, the C. & N.W. is four miles distant. Photographs of suspects were exhibited with no results. All houses in this town were wiened by Agent and none appeared to hold any possibilities. There is no Post Office here.

Agent was advised by Otto Frank, Postmester, that no siren is located here; that only on infrequent intervals are the sirens from Barrington and Wauconda heard; that there are no factories or factory whistles here; that the bell of the Evangelical Church is the only one which rings here and this rings only three times on Sundays. It was determined that the only trains running through this town are freight trains over the E. J. & E. RR, and the schedule for these trains would differ only approximately 15 minutes from the schedule of those trains obtained at Barrington, listed

John Cherke, whohad been previously interviewed by Again lative to the fideout was again contacted and he advised that he had not thought of or discovered any possible houses since the inquiry was made, also failed to identify photographs of suspects as persons he has seen Cherke is town marshal and water meter reader.

Inquiry was also made of grocery stores and all gasolise stations at Lake Eurich and photographs of suspects exhibited with negative 

Lent found this town to consist of approximately twenty houses no Post Office being located here. &. B. Umbenstock, Fire Chief and garage operator was interviewed. He advised that the siren blows here daily at noon; that the only fire during the months of January and February, 1934, was on February 1 at 4.40 P.M. at which time the siren blew. He further advised that there is but one church here which church rings its bell on Sunday mornings only; that the mearest train line is the Soo Railroad running entirely freights. at a distance of three and one half miles; that there are no factories anywhere hear the town and no whistles are heard. The Umbenstock claimed to be familiar with all houses in the vicinity and statedthat he knew of no house in the vicinity which would in any way resemble the hideout. He also failed to less truly you those of any persons he has seen. the hideout. He also failed to identify the photographs of suspects as

VOLO, ILLINOIS It was ascertained through H. Michaelson, who conducts the general store there that there are no sirens, church bells or whistles located in this town and none are heard; that there is no railroad within five miles and no trains are ordinarily heard. He was exhibited photographs of suspects but failed to identify any of them as persons ever having dealt at his store. He further advised that there are no water meters contained in houses here and stated that he is familiar with all houses in the signify but that he knew of none which would possibly hit the description of the hideout. There is no Post Office here and by driving about town every house was viewed with none appearing prospective

MRUCONDA, III. It was determined that the stream bere blows only on Saturday at moon and for fires; that no factories are located here and nowhistles are heard; that there are two churches, the Catholic and the Federated, neither of which rings a bell on Saturday afternoon; that the closest railroad is the E. J. & A. RR which is mix miles distant and operates only freight trains. There is no mail delivery or rural routes out of here.

That the only fire within the period in adeation was en January El, 1934; that this was a grass fire and according to the policy of his department no siren was blown for such fire. With reference to a siren, Mr. Frostice advised that a siren located at the Maier's Dairy Farm, two miles west of Wauconda, has a siren which blows at different times. Inquiry at Maier's Farm disclosed that this siren is blown daily at noon and on Sunday, but at no other times.

George Jepson, Town Marshall and water meter reader, stated

deorge Jepson, flown Marshall and water neter reader, stated that no houses which might enswer the description of the hideout are located at Mauconda. He viewed the photographs of suspects but stated he could recall seeing no one resembling any of them.

The photographs of suspects were exhibited to attendants of all gasoline filling stations at Wauconda with negative results.

In conjunction with the investigation at the above group of towns the photographs of suspects were also exhibited to attendants of all gasoline filling stations encountered enroute between these towns, but at none of these were they identified as patrons at any time at any ofthe stations.
