Will testify concerning

HERBERT AKERS

and will state that he has been friendly with AKERS for several years, and that on the morning of March 30, 1936, while Federal Agents were engaged in raiding the Woodcock home, commonly known as the Fairchild place, on Malvern Road, AKERS stopped by ROARK'S place and exhibited some photographs to him, among which was the photograph of ALVIN KARPIS, but which ROARK was unable to identify as being a resident of the Woodcock home, or as a visitor to his fishing camp.

This witness will state that the last activities he noticed in connection with the occupants of the Woodcock house prior to March 30, 1936, was on the preceding Friday, March 27, 1936, on which date he recalls that while he was fishing he was annoyed by someone apparently target shooting on the hill upon which the Woodcock home is located; that on this occasion he did not see any of the parties who were doing the shooting, as the Woodcock house is some distance from his place.

Will testify with reference to

HERBERT AKERS.

and state that during 1936 he was employed as a rural route carrier on Route #2; that this route extends out Malvern road for a distance of about ten miles to the County line; that the Woodcock home, which was raided by Bureau Agents and Post Office Inspectors on March 30, 1936, is located on the route which he served, and that he recalls the time when the Woodcock family moved out of the house, and some other parties moved into it about February, 1936; will state that he made one delivery of mail each day except Sundays and holidays, and that he usually reached the Woodcock home about 9:30 each morning; that after the Woodcock family moved out of the house, he recalls that he often observed a dark colored Buick coupe parked on the hill by the house, and that this automobile would sometimes come down the driveway from the house after he had left mail in the mail box; that this car often appeared to be occupied by a man and a woman, and he sometimes noticed the car proceeding to Hot Springs after the occupants thereof had picked up any mail which he might have left in the mail box; that he did not become acquainted with these people and at no time did he have any conversation with them or have any occasion to observe them closely.

This witness will further testify that he recalls a large Buick sedan, maroon in color, which was sometimes parked by the Woodcock home; that he has been acquainted with Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS for many years, and that during the period of February to March, 1936, he passed AKERS almost daily on the Malvern road while he, the witness, would be proceeding out this road on his route, and that AKERS would be coming toward Hot Springs; that he never saw AKERS drive up to the Woodcock home during this period, and that he presumed that Akers was coming to town from his place on the Lake Catherine, which is located approximately two miles past the Woodcock house.

MRS. ELZIE MOORE.

Will testify with reference to

HERBERT AKERS

and will state that she lives about a mile past the Woodcock residence on the Malvern Road; that at the time that Federal Agents raided the Woodcock home in March, 1936, she was living in a small house on the Malvern Road about a quarter of a mile toward Hot Springs, from the Woodcock residence and that her house was the nearest one to the Woodcock home on the Malvern Road, but that she was unable to clearly see the activities of persons living in the Woodcock home from her residence; that she recalls the time when the Woodcock family moved out of the place and some strange people took possession during February, 1936, and she recalled that after these strangers moved in she saw a large green coupe frequently pass her home, which coupe would enter the driveway leading to the Woodcock home and this car was occasionally occupied by a woman and at other times by one or two men; that she never got a close view of these persons; that during the months preceding the raid conducted by Federal Agents on the Woodcock home, she was employed as a seamstress in the W. P. A. Sewing



Room in Hot Springs, Arkansas, and her duties required her presence there at 8:00 o'clock each morning; that throughout this period, from February through March, 1936, while the unknown people were occupying the Woodcock home and while she was employed as above stated at Hot Springs, Arkansas, she almost daily passed Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS on the Malvern Road, as she was proceeding to Hot Springs to work, at about 7:30 A. M. and that AKERS was always driving out the Malvern Road in his automobile, away from Hot Springs, Arkansas; that she knew at that time that AKERS had a country home located on Lake Catherine about a mile and one-half beyond the Woodcock home; that she never noticed AKERS drive up to the Woodcock home, or turn into the driveway leading to same; that occasionally during that period she observed AKERS proceeding toward Hot Springs, Arkansas, on the Malvern Road in the afternoons as she was returning to her home, after completing her work in the Sewing Room in Hot Springs.

GEORGE MOORE,

This boy will testify that he is eleven years old and the son of Mrs. Elsie Moore and will state that about two years ago, just prior to the time that the Federal Agents raided the Woodcock home on the Malvern Road, he noticed a large black dog around the Woodcock home, which dog apparently was owned by the persons then residing in that house. He will identify a photograph of ALVIN KARPIS as being the likeness of a man he saw drive along the Malvern Road one day, as he, the witness, was alighting from a bus in front of his house and that he recalls that KARPIS was driving a green coupe, which was either a Chevrolet or Buick; that he watched the car and noticed that it turned into the driveway leading to the Woodcock home after it passed him.

This witness will also state that during that time he frequently saw Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS drive along the Malvern Road, at times going toward Hot Springs and at other times driving in the opposite direction.

ERCELL BROCK

Will testify with reference to

ALVIN KARPIS  
FRED HUNTER  
CECIL BROCK  
HERBERT AKERS

Will state that he worked as a cab driver in Hot Springs, Arkansas, for many years, and up until April, 1936; that he has known GRACE GOLDSTEIN ever since she operated a cheap house of prostitution near the Broadway Hotel; that when the building burned where she was operating she started up a place in the 1300 block on Central Avenue in Hot Springs; that around this time he first became acquainted with CONNIE MORRIS, who had come to Hot Springs from Oklahoma and established herself in GRACE GOLDSTEIN's house; that two prostitutes named GRETA and GINGER were the other girls who worked for GRACE GOLDSTEIN around this time.

Will state that after the Sheriff's Office raided and closed GRACE GOLDSTEIN'S place on Central Avenue, she moved to 123 Palm Street, Hot Springs, and took CONNIE MORRIS, GRETA and GINGER with her; that this was around May of 1935; that she remained at 123 Palm Street for only a short time, and then moved to the Hatterie Hotel.

This witness will identify photographs of

FRED HUNTER

and will state that he knew FRED HUNTER as CONNIE MORRIS' boy friend; that he never saw ALVIN KARPIS to his knowledge, and

therefore is unable to identify a photograph of him; that the first time he recalls having seen FRED HUNTER was shortly after GRACE GOLDSTEIN moved to the Hatterie Hotel; that on this occasion, and on other occasions thereafter, he would see CONNIE MORRIS and FRED HUNTER walk together away from the Hatterie Hotel, along Bath House Row and up the mountain in the rear of Bath House Row; that he once asked CONNIE whether her boy friend was, and she replied that he was a night club owner from Ohio, and indicated that he was living at the Arlington Hotel; that he also learned from CONNIE MORRIS that GRACE GOLDSTEIN was running around with some rich Canadian, and she was expecting to marry him.

Will state that he recalls that CONNIE MORRIS left Hot Springs, Arkansas, on Armistice Day (November 11, 1935) and supposedly went to her sister's home in San Antonio, Texas, with her boy friend, FRED HUNTER; that he did not see CONNIE MORRIS again until some time around the first of the year 1936; that on this occasion he saw her buy a newspaper at the Southern Club, and then walk into the Waukesha Hotel.

That approximately a week or ten days prior to the raid on the Woodcock home on March 30, 1936, a Post Office Inspector by the name of Haynes contacted him and showed him photographs of FRED HUNTER and ALVIN KARPIS; that Haynes told him at this time that HUNTER was wanted for a mail robbery in Ohio, and was supposed to be running around with a prostitute in Hot Springs; that from the description of this prostitute as furnished by Haynes, and after viewing the photograph of FRED HUNTER, he immediately knew that Inspector Haynes was checking up on CONNIE MORRIS; that he did not tell Inspector Haynes at this time that the girl for whom he was looking was CONNIE MORRIS; that he, however, later that day, after giving the matter further thought, came to the conclusion that he would be doing CONNIE MORRIS a favor if he could get her boy friend, FRED HUNTER, out of the way; that he then immediately got in touch with Haynes at the Howe Hotel, and told him everything he knew about CONNIE MORRIS and GRACE GOLDSTEIN; that thereafter Haynes asked him if he could discreetly obtain

a photograph of CONNIE MORRIS, which he did that same night, having gotten it from her album which she had at the Hatterie Hotel.

This witness will further testify that on the morning following his first meeting with Inspector Haynes, the latter introduced him to Joe Anderson, a Kansas State Patrolman, at the Howe Hotel, where he also met Colonel Wendt Smith and another Post Office Inspector; that upon meeting Joe Anderson and the Post Office Inspector, Mr. Haynes, they contacted him frequently; that on one occasion shortly after he met Joe Anderson, this being possibly a day or two later, Anderson asked him whether he thought that HERBERT AKERS could be trusted to the extent of cooperating with them in their investigation at Hot Springs; that he advised Anderson against it, stating that AKERS would do anything for a dollar; that after he advised Anderson against contacting AKERS, Anderson desired to talk to his brother, CECIL BROCK, and attempt to enlist his cooperation in efforts to locate FRED HUNTER and ALVIN KARPIS; that Anderson called him one day and had him drive him to his brother's home on Dall Street, where CECIL BROCK was living at that time; that another cab driver by the name of Jeffries was with him on this occasion, and that they drove to CECIL BROCK'S house by coming down West Mountain rather than proceeding to it by way of Park Avenue and down Dall Street; that Anderson talked with CECIL BROCK privately for about thirty minutes, none of which he overheard nor was advised about later on; that he believes that this contact with Cecil Brock took place a day or two prior to March 25, 1936.

This witness will further testify that on March 25, 1936, Post Office Inspector Haynes contacted him and gave him three or four dollars to go to the Hatterie Hotel and fill a date with CONNIE MORRIS and thereafter get from her whatever information he could relative to the whereabouts of ALVIN KARPIS and FRED HUNTER; that he went to the Hatterie Hotel around 9:00 P.M., that night, March 25, 1936, and found CONNIE MORRIS there, and that they had a few beers, and that CONNIE did not seem upset and acted her natural self all evening; that he drank considerable beer on this

particular evening and became quite intoxicated; that he probably told CONNIE MORRIS all about his contacts with the Post Office Inspectors, and probably persuaded her to turn FRED HUNTER in to the officers for the reward offered for his apprehension; that in view of his intoxicated condition he cannot recall just what he told CONNIE MORRIS on this particular evening; that he left CONNIE at the Hatterie Hotel around midnight, March 26, 1936, and that as far as he knows he did not excite CONNIE MORRIS to any extent with what he told her.

That on the following morning, March 26, 1936, when he proceeded to work, he observed CONNIE MORRIS walking with a small brown dog which belonged to Pauline, one of the inmates of GRACE GOLDSTEIN'S house at that time; that CONNIE was walking toward the Hatterie Hotel, and he did not stop to talk with her; that this was the last time he ever saw CONNIE MORRIS.

Will testify that he did not immediately see either Joe Anderson or Inspector Haynes after his contact with CONNIE MORRIS on the night of March 25, 1936; that some time after 9:00 A.M. on March 26, 1936, Jeffries got in touch with him and told him he had just seen CONNIE MORRIS leaving the Hatterie Hotel, and she walked over to the White Front Cigar Store and stepped into a black and white cab; that he reported this observation to Joe Anderson at the Goddard Hotel, and that Anderson suggested that he contact the cab driver who drove CONNIE MORRIS and ascertain where he drove her; that he did this and learned that CONNIE was driven to the Marquette Hotel.

That later that day, possibly around 2:00 or 3:00 in the afternoon, he received a telephone call at the Country Club from HERBERT AKERS, who told him to come to the Police Station immediately; that when he arrived at the City Jail, AKERS "jumped all over him" for disclosing to CONNIE MORRIS the previous evening the fact that Government men were in town looking for FRED HUNTER and ALVIN KARPIS; that AKERS told him that the town was "swarming with G-men" and "hell would be popping from then on"; that while AKERS was talking with him he observed Inspector Haynes standing behind the partition in AKERS' office, attempting to conceal himself; that he could not understand where AKERS

got this information relative to his contact with CONNIE MORRIS the previous evening, and about his conversation with her, but he later learned that GRACE GOLDSTEIN probably told him about it, as he understood that she was interviewed by AKERS and Joe Anderson a short time prior to his arrival at the City Jail that day (March 26, 1937).

This witness will further testify that that night (March 26, 1937) when he checked off from work at about 8:00 P.M., he received a telephone call from GRACE GOLDSTEIN to come to the Hatterie Hotel as soon as he could; that he immediately went to the Hatterie Hotel, and GRACE GOLDSTEIN talked with him about an hour; that she was considerably angry with him for having had anything to do with the Government authorities, and also for having frightened Connie the previous evening by telling her that she would wind up in prison if she did not reveal the whereabouts of FRED HUNTER; that GRACE GOLDSTEIN further informed him at this time that after she talked with CONNIE MORRIS the previous evening, she was too frightened to stay in town, and that the following morning she picked up CONNIE in the rear of the Marquette Hotel and drove her to the intersection of Highways #67 and #7, near Arkadelphia, Arkansas, where she left her off; that thereafter she saw CONNIE catch a ride in a bakery truck which took her into Arkadelphia, Arkansas; that GRACE GOLDSTEIN further indicated to him at this time that she had been interviewed by AKERS and ANDERSON earlier that afternoon, March 26, 1937, and that she had told them the same story about CONNIE MORRIS as she told him; that GRACE endeavored to find out from him what Government men had contacted him, what they looked like, and where they were from; that the only one she appeared to know was Joe Anderson.

This witness will further testify that one day during the latter part of April, 1936, CECIL BROCK called on the telephone and told him that a woman had called him and said that ALVIN KARPIS was in Hot Springs, and that he had better leave town immediately; that this frightened him very much and he immediately left for Graysonia, Arkansas.

Will testify that he participated in the arrests of SAM COKER and HARRY CAMPBELL at Toledo, on May 7, 1936; that HARRY CAMPBELL was taken into custody at his apartment at 2132 1/2 Monroe Street, and that following his apprehension, the witness and other Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation arrested SAM COKER at the home of Bobbie Robbette, 439 Arcadia Street, Toledo, Ohio, and that SAM COKER was brought to the apartment of HARRY CAMPBELL, 2132 1/2 Monroe Street and there very briefly questioned by the witness.

That in HARRY CAMPBELL'S apartment HARRY CAMPBELL and SAM COKER were in the same room in the presence of each other; that SAM COKER was questioned with reference to his association with HARRY CAMPBELL and he denied knowing HARRY CAMPBELL or ever associating with him and denied that any of the clothing in the apartment belonged to him.

Will testify that he was a member of the Hot Springs Police Department during 1935 and 1936, and which position he held until January, 1937, when he was discharged after being indicted, along with six other officers for the murder of John Dickson; that while he was a member of the Hot Springs Police Department he recalls that there was a large circular containing a photograph of ALVIN KARPIS, at the Police Department, which circular indicated that KARPIS was wanted for the killing of Sheriff Kelley at West Plains, Missouri, in 1932; that this circular was hung on the wall of the Hot Springs Police Department, and that it was later covered up by a calendar and some old license plates, and which were still there when he left the Police Department in January, 1937; that to his knowledge the photograph of ALVIN KARPIS, as contained on this circular, is probably still hanging under the above mentioned calendar.

Will testify concerning

JOSEPH WAKELIN  
HERBERT AKERS

and will state that he came to Arkansas in July, 1933, and from that time up until January, 1934 he worked at various places in and around that City; that shortly after his arrival in Hot Springs he became very friendly with ROBERT L. MOORE, who was Night Captain of Police and that MOORE was instrumental in getting him a position as Special Officer in the Hot Springs Police Department, his employment beginning around the middle of January, 1934, and that he worked about three days a week, merely filling in as an extra in the place of those officers who would have a day or so off at times; that he was so engaged as a Special Officer until October, 1936.

This witness will state that he recalls that a large reward circular on ALVIN KARPIS and FRED BARKER hung on one of the doors of the County Jail during the time he was employed as a Special Officer by the Hot Springs Police Department and that he is of the opinion that this circular was still hanging on the door in the City Jail at the time he left the employ

of the Hot Springs, Arkansas Police Department in October, 1936.

Mr. PRESTON will further state that he has known HERBERT AKERS since 1922 and that he has been acquainted with GRACE GOLDSTEIN since 1934 and 1935; that she was operating a house of prostitution on Central Avenue near the 505 Service Station when he first became acquainted with her; that at that time he was living in Oaklawn and would frequently see GRACE GOLDSTEIN and the girls employed by her sitting on the front porch when he went past the house; that he recalls the Sheriff's Office raided her house during the Spring of 1935 and that shortly thereafter he learned that she opened a place at 123 Palm Street, but remained at this address only a short while before moving to the Hatterie Hotel, where she was still located when he left Hot Springs in October, 1936.

This witness will testify that while GRACE GOLDSTEIN was operating a house of prostitution at 123 Palm Street, she occasionally came to the Hot Springs City Jail and talked with Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS and Chief of Police JOSEPH WAKELIN, privately in WAKELIN'S office; that at times the GOLDSTEIN woman would come by herself and at other times she would be accompanied by a small blonde girl, who PRESTON undoubtedly will be able to identify as CONNIE MORRIS; that the GOLDSTEIN woman would generally park her car in front of the Chamber of Commerce, which is located near the Police Department and at other times she would park by the Rock Island Railroad Depot across the street; that he recalls at that time GRACE GOLDSTEIN was driving a green Chevrolet Coupe, which he first saw while she was living on Central Avenue.

This witness will further testify that he definitely recalls that during the months of October

and November, 1935, he frequently saw GRACE GOLDSTEIN visit the Hot Springs Police Department and talk privately with Chief of Detectives AKERS; that on one occasion he saw AKERS sitting in the GOLDSTEIN woman's automobile when it was parked in front of the Chamber of Commerce Building, GRACE GOLDSTEIN also being in the car; that he and the other officers were not permitted to hang around AKERS' office while GRACE GOLDSTEIN was there; that he oftentimes observed that while GRACE GOLDSTEIN would be talking with AKERS, Lieutenant CECIL BROCK would go into the lavatory adjoining AKERS' office and occupy same so that no other persons in the Police Department could enter and possibly overhear any conversations in AKERS' office.

Mr. PRESTON will testify that a few days after the raid that was conducted by Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on March 28th, 1936, on the Woodcock home near Lake Catherine, he happened to be in the City Jail talking with Chief of Detectives AKERS about the latter's Summer home on Lake Catherine; that prior thereto AKERS had frequently contacted him in regard to having the American Legion raffle off this Summer home and that on the above occasion AKERS showed him five \$100.00 bills, which he took from his pocket and remarked to the witness that he, AKERS, had gotten this amount as an option on the sale of his Summer home and that if the raid for KARPIS on the Woodcock home had been delayed a few days he would have sold his Summer home to KARPIS for \$15,000.00, and that after KARPIS was arrested he would have gotten his home back and would have been that much ahead.

This witness will testify that during the time he worked for the Hot Springs Police Department in relieving other officers from duty, he never recalls any occasion where GRACE GOLDSTEIN or any of her prostitutes

were arrested for violating the law.

(This witness is somewhat indefinite  
and unstable in his statements and  
it is difficult to pin him down to  
definite statements.)

Will testify that he is Special Agent in Charge of the Little Rock Field Division, and that he has custody of the Federal Bureau of Investigation records contained in the files in the Little Rock Office of the Bureau; that on October 14, 1934, the Little Rock Office received the following temporary wanted notices from the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Washington, D. C., reflecting the fingerprints and photographs of the individuals who were being sought by the Bureau in connection with the BREMER kidnaping case:

Will testify that in connection with these wanted notices, the Little Rock Office was definitely instructed to have an Agent personally call upon the Chiefs of Police or the persons in charge of Identification Bureaus located in the larger cities of the Little Rock District, for the purpose of causing a search to be made for previous arrests, names of associates and other data which might have been helpful in bringing about the location and apprehension of members of the BARKER-KARPIS gang.

This witness will also testify that further instructions from the Director of the Federal

Bureau of Investigation were that the above wanted notices and Identification Orders which are being set out below, should be furnished to police departments contacted, with the request that any information received by them relative to the whereabouts of these fugitives be promptly furnished to the Little Rock Office of the Bureau.

This witness will further testify that the Little Rock Office was likewise instructed that the following Identification Orders should also be included with the above wanted notices when contact was had with the local police departments in the Little Rock District:

Will state that he was a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation during 1934, and that he was assigned to the Little Rock Field Division; that on October 18, 1934, he contacted former Lieutenant of Police CECIL BROCK, head of the Identification Bureau of the Hot Springs Police Department, and had him make a search of his files for previous arrests, names of associates and other data which would have been helpful in bringing about the location and apprehension of members of the BARKER-KARPIS gang who were at that time being sought in connection with the BREMER kidnaping.

That he left with CECIL BROCK on this occasion, wanted notices and Identification Orders reflecting the fingerprints and photographs of the following individuals:

Will testify that Lieutenant CECIL BROCK searched the files of the Hot Springs Police Department for names and aliases, fingerprints and photographs of the above named individuals, and that he advised this witness that none of the individuals wanted had ever been arrested by the Hot Springs Police Department, and that there was no data in the files regarding them.

Will further testify that subsequent to the above occasion he frequently had occasion to go to the Hot Springs Police Department and interview Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS; that on these occasions he usually talked to AKERS about ALVIN KARPIS and other members of the BARKER-KARPIS gang, and at one time left photographs of KARPIS and his gang with AKERS, both for the Police Department files and for AKERS' own personal photograph album which he kept of wanted persons; that on one occasion he recalls walking down the street in Hot Springs, with AKERS and AKERS pointed out to him a man and woman sitting in a car on the main street of Hot Springs, stating that they were BONNIE PARKER AND CLYDE BARROW; that at that time BONNIE PARKER and CLYDE BARROW were apparently not wanted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, but were wanted in several States; that he asked AKERS why he did not pick these individuals up, and AKERS answered, "Why should I? There is no reward out for them".

This witness will further testify that on May 3, 1935, he and Special Agent in Charge R. L. SHIVERS went to Hot Springs, Arkansas, pursuant to a telephone call from Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS; that on this occasion he and Mr. SHIVERS interviewed AKERS at the Hot Springs Police Department, and AKERS informed them that he had a man in jail named MYRON THOMPSON, who was from California, and who claimed that he knew ALVIN KARPIS, and that he had recently seen KARPIS in a gambling house in Marked Tree, Arkansas.

Will state that subsequent investigation by him and Special Agent in Charge Shivers in connection with this information disclosed that MYRON THOMPSON was a mental case, and the information provided by him was unfounded.

and will state that during the years 1934 and 1935, he was a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and that during March, 1934, he interviewed former Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS at Hot Springs, Arkansas, primarily for the purpose of obtaining information concerning HARRY CAMPBELL, who was then believed to have been involved with ALVIN KARPIS and ARTHUR E. "DOC" BARKER in the kidnaping of Edward George Bremer; that during the course of this interview, or sometime shortly after this interview, he displayed to Chief of Detectives AKERS a composite photograph of VOLNEY DAVIS, FRED BARKER, ALVIN KARPIS, HARRY CAMPBELL and ARTHUR E. "DOC" BARKER and that to the best of his recollection he loaned this particular composite photograph to Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS, who stated that he desired to borrow the same in order that Lieutenant CECIL BROCK then in charge of the Identification Bureau of the Hot Springs Police

Department, could prepare copies of the same for AKERS' personal records.

This witness will testify that AKERS informed him that he kept individual records of his own, which records contained photographs of underworld gangsters and which records were separate and apart from the Identification records of the Hot Springs Police Department.

This witness will also testify that from the first of May, 1935, to the latter part of November, 1935, he delivered a copy of the Arkansas Gazette, a Little Rock newspaper, to the residence of AKERS at 345 Harrell Avenue each day.

and will state that some weeks prior to the raid conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation on the Woodcock home near Lake Catherine on March 30th, 1936, he had occasion to talk with former Police Lieutenant CECIL BROCK, who was at that time employed by the Hot Springs Police Department; that BROCK showed him some black dog hair which was on the upholstery of Chief of Detectives AKERS' car and that BROCK stated, in referring to this hair, that it came from a dog which was owned by ALVIN KARPIS and that AKERS had been transporting this dog around in his automobile.

HERBERT AKERS

and will state that at different times between the dates of October 5th, 1935 and March 29th, 1936, he was in Hot Springs, Arkansas, on official business and that on several occasions he conferred with Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS, but that at no time during this period did AKERS mention to him that he was informed of the fact that ALVIN KARPIS was frequenting or residing in Hot Springs, Arkansas, or that he, AKERS, knew that KARPIS was visiting the Hatterio Hotel and other places in Hot Springs, Arkansas, with GRACE GOLDSTEIN and that AKERS did not at any time during this period indicate that he had any information that GRACE GOLDSTEIN was associating with ALVIN KARPIS and that in fact, AKERS during this period indicated that he did not know the identity of the two women who had visited ALVIN KARPIS and FRED HUNTER at Dyer's Landing during the Summer and Fall of 1935.

This witness will testify that at different times after October 5th, 1935, Chief of Detectives AKERS indicated to him that he, AKERS, had received the original information of KARPIS being at Dyer's Landing from the newspaper man who told AKERS

he saw one or two suspicious men entering a store in the vicinity of Wilson's Tavern and purchase medical supplies that are commonly used to treat wounds and that this was the beginning of his, AKERS', inquiries concerning these two men, who later turned out to be KARPIS and HUNTER.

Agent Duren will further state that on March 28th, 1936, about eleven days after Post Office Inspectors came to Hot Springs, Arkansas, seeking information concerning ALVIN KARPIS and after the Post Office Inspectors had contacted AKERS in an effort to learn the whereabouts of KARPIS, he, the witness, received word that Chief of Detectives AKERS desired to see him and that he contacted AKERS, who advised that two Post Office Inspectors had called on him and made inquiry concerning GRACE GOLDSTEIN, a madam of a house of prostitution at the Mattorio Hotel, 233 1/2 Central Avenue, Hot Springs, Arkansas; that AKERS further stated that the Post Office Inspectors had learned that CONNIE MORRIS, a prostitute employed by GRACE GOLDSTEIN was the girl friend of FRED HUNTER and that he, AKERS, and the Post Office Inspectors had interviewed GRACE GOLDSTEIN who had admitted that CONNIE MORRIS was keeping company with FRED HUNTER and that she admitted that she was keeping company with a young man, who she would not identify as being ALVIN KARPIS and that AKERS indicated that this was the first information he had received which pointed to the fact that KARPIS was going with GRACE GOLDSTEIN.

The witness will state further that this was the first time that Chief of Detectives AKERS had dropped any hint, or suggestion, to him that he knew that GRACE GOLDSTEIN was either acquainted with or an associate of ALVIN KARPIS.

This witness will testify that he conferred with AKERS regarding obtaining a photograph of CONNIE MORRIS and that AKERS took him to an address, which is now unknown to him, but which was known to AKERS, where an interview was had with a prostitute named "GINGER", who the witness will identify at this time as being identical with DELLA MAY JEFFRIES and who the witness understood, from the conversations of AKERS and "GINGER", was formerly an inmate of GRACE GOLDSTEIN'S house of prostitution and that during these conversations "GINGER" identified a photograph of FRED HUNTER as being identical with a man called Harold King and identified the photograph of ALVIN KARPIS as being identical with a man called Ed King, who kept company with GRACE GOLDSTEIN and CONNIE MORRIS and that "GINGER" at that time provided information concerning some of the past activities of ALVIN KARPIS and FRED HUNTER during the time they were in Hot Springs, Arkansas, and that "GINGER" thereupon gave to the witness a small photograph of CONNIE MORRIS, which she took from her album.

This witness will state further that on the following day, March 29th, 1936, he and HERBERT AKERS went to the Hatterie Hotel and interviewed GRACE GOLDSTEIN; that he thereafter had frequent occasion to interview Chief of Detectives AKERS during the next three weeks; that on April 11th, 1936, he talked with AKERS as to the identity of GRACE GOLDSTEIN and AKERS stated that to his knowledge this woman had been in Hot Springs, Arkansas, for the last eight or ten years and that the first place that he recalled where she operated was a hotel or rooming house in the back of the old Princess Theatre, which building has since burned; that AKERS stated he did not know much

about GRACE GOLDSTEIN'S husband, or anything about her personal history, but that he understood this woman and her husband were divorced in Hot Springs, Arkansas.

and will state that between six and seven P. M., on October 8th, 1935, he received orders to proceed with Special Agent B. L. Dameron to Hot Springs, Arkansas, and to contact Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS, regarding some information which AKERS possessed possibly in connection with some men involved in the kidnaping of Edward George Bremer; that in accordance with a suggestion made by his superior, he, the witness, and Agent Dameron took along some fishing equipment for possible use in conducting an undercover investigation at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Will testify that he and Agent Dameron arrived in Hot Springs, Arkansas, about 8:30 or 9:00 P. M., the same day and that they proceeded immediately to the Hot Springs Police Department and contacted Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS and that Police Lieutenant CECIL

BROCK possibly was present at that time, although the witness cannot definitely state that he was; that AKERS told the witness and Agent Damron about two men who were staying in a cottage on Lake Hamilton, who had a Hudson Coupe with Ohio license plates and that he had driven by the place on one occasion and had noted the license number and that he had wired the Ohio State Motor Vehicle Bureau and learned that the plate had been registered to E. F. Parker, Youngstown, Ohio, and that he, AKERS, then wired the Youngstown Police Department for further information on Parker and had been advised by the Youngstown Police Department that Parker was unknown and that AKERS then produced the two telegrams which the witness elsewhere has previously identified and which were introduced into evidence in this case and that AKERS thereupon delivered these telegrams over to the witness; that AKERS further said that he had never seen the man called Parker, but advised that one of the men at the cottage on Lake Hamilton might be ALVIN KARPIS; that AKERS did not say from what source he had received his information; that AKERS also said it was his understanding that one of the men wore dark glasses when he came into Hot Springs and that AKERS then drove out to Lake Hamilton with Agent Damron and the witness and while driving along the road AKERS indicated a cottage where the men had been staying.

This witness will further state that AKERS did not say that the man, possibly KARPIS, and his companion, had been associating with any local women, nor did he, AKERS, indicate that this was the fact and AKERS did not mention the names of any women in connection with these men; that AKERS said on different occasions that he had never seen either of the men and

that he had only made the one trip to Lake Hamilton for the purpose of obtaining the license plate number on their car.

This witness will further state that on October 4th, 1935, a day previous to Saturday, October 5th, 1935, when AKERS contacted the Little Rock Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and advised of information concerning suspicious men living on Lake Hamilton, he, the witness, had interviewed AKERS relative to an official matter at Hot Springs, Arkansas and that AKERS said nothing to him at the time of this interview on October 4th, 1935, regarding any suspicious persons residing in a cottage on Lake Hamilton, near Hot Springs, Arkansas, who might possibly be identical with ALVIN KARPIS and some of his gang and that AKERS made no mention of having received any information of any suspicious men in the vicinity of Hot Springs, Arkansas, who were in possession of a Hudson Coupe, bearing Ohio license plates.

Will testify that on April 3, 1936 he jointly interviewed HERBERT AKERS and JOE WAKELIN, at which time he asked them if they knew who the persons were that were in the Woodcock home on Sunday night, March 29, 1936, and that they both stated that they knew nothing about this particular angle.

Will testify with reference to

HERBERT AKERS  
ALVIN KARPIS

and state that he was a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation during 1935, and 1936, and that in the spring of 1936 he was especially assigned to the KARPIS case in Hot Springs, Arkansas; that shortly after the raid on the home of Mr. E. E. Woodcock on March 30, 1936, this witness had occasion to talk with HERBERT AKERS about ALVIN KARPIS, and that AKERS at this time discussed with him in detail the activities and movements of ALVIN KARPIS and FRED HUNTER from the time he first reported to the Little Rock Office the presence of some suspicious persons living in a cabin on Lake Hamilton, until April, 1936; that AKERS told him that he had received information that some suspicious persons were on Lake Hamilton, and he obtained the license number of their car, which he checked and later advised the Little Rock Bureau office of the same; that he was later informed by someone that one of the suspicious persons was FRED HUNTER, who was not wanted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation; that later the Post Office Inspectors told him as to the characteristics of FRED HUNTER and ALVIN KARPIS, and the airplane trips to and from Hot Springs, Arkansas, and that GRACE GOLDSTEIN and BONNIE MORRIS had been associating with HUNTER and KARPIS; that after he was informed of this information by the Post Office Inspectors he recalled having seen some man in the company of GRACE GOLDSTEIN, but did not connect them with

the men who had occupied the cabin on Lake Hamilton, and did not know that it was KARPIS and one of his friends.

This witness will further testify that AKERS also told him that he was told by the Post Office Inspectors that a cab driver by the name of BROCK, a brother of former Lieutenant CECIL BROCK of the Hot Springs Police Department, had gotten drunk and told CONNIE MORRIS of the efforts being made by Post Office Inspectors to apprehend KARPIS and HUNTER, and that CONNIE MORRIS immediately left town; that prior to being advised of these facts by Post Office Inspectors, he and Special Agent DAMRON had conducted an investigation as to the men who occupied the cabin on Lake Hamilton, and that in his opinion, if BROCK had not blown the matter up, he and Agent DAMRON would have been successful in locating KARPIS and HUNTER.

This witness will also testify that AKERS further told him that because of other pressing matters, he had been unable to devote much time to the KARPIS case, but that he had arranged for a prostitute named "GINGER" to operate at the Hatteris Hotel for the purpose of obtaining information as to the activities of GRACE GOLDSTEIN and her connection with ALVIN KARPIS; that he felt that in due course of time, through his informant, "GINGER", and other sources of information, he would be able to get a real line-up as to the location of ALVIN KARPIS and FRED HUNTER if such was known to GRACE GOLDSTEIN or her associates.

HERBERT AKERS

and will state that on May 9th, 1936, he and Special Agent in Charge Chapman Fletcher, interviewed the then Chief of Police, JOSEPH WAKELIN and HERBERT AKERS, who was then Chief of Detectives at the Hot Springs Police Department and that at that time HERBERT AKERS stated that just prior to Agent Dameron talking with him around the latter part of March, 1936, Post Office Inspector Haynes had talked to him as to any information he might have as to ALVIN KARPIS and that later Special Agent Frank Smith of the Federal Bureau of Investigation talked with him and that Inspector Haynes broke the whole thing, or blew it up. In referring to the efforts to capture ALVIN KARPIS, when Haynes went to the Yellow Taxi Cab Company and contacted "that fellow", namely, ERCELL BROCK, for the

purpose of having BROCK contact CONNIE MORRIS; that the contact got drunk and gave CONNIE MORRIS everything he knew; that on another occasion Ira Ross, Post Office Inspector stationed in Little Rock, Arkansas and Post Office Inspector Cordrey called him to the Post Office and discussed with him the general situation as to what was being done in the investigation to locate KARPIS.

Inspector Connelley will testify that at this time reference was made to GRACE GOLDSTEIN, operator of the Hatterie Hotel and AKERS advised that he talked with her on a Sunday before she left Hot Springs, indicating the period as early in April, 1936; that they (the Police Department) had shown her some favors, inasmuch as she had always run a sporting house and that he tried to get her to come through with the information as to the location of KARPIS; that AKERS said that he told her that he would take her to an attorney in Hot Springs and possibly arrange to get her \$11,000.00 reward for KARPIS, as the boys, referring to the Post Office Inspectors, had told him of this reward; that he, AKERS, advised GRACE GOLDSTEIN that he would make an agreement to give her all the money; that all he, AKERS, wanted was the honor of catching the boys, namely, KARPIS and his associates and that GRACE GOLDSTEIN told him she was not going to tell AKERS what she knew about the "boys".

Inspector Connelley will state that AKERS advised that usually if there are any "hot ones" in Hot Springs, Arkansas, he, AKERS, knew of them, as he knew more about gangsters than did WAKELIN or others in the Hot Springs Police Department; that AKERS stated he believed Lieutenant BROCK of the

Identification Bureau of the Hot Springs Police Department told him of Chief WAKELIN'S license plates being on GRACE GOLDSTEIN'S car at one time and that a car with WAKELIN'S license plates had been seen around the hideout place and that he, AKERS, had advised Chief of Police WAKELIN of the rumor that he, AKERS, had heard of WAKELIN having been seen around the hideout place, namely, the Woodcock home on the Malvern Road.

Inspector Connelley will testify that AKERS stated in referring to a newspaper story which had appeared in Hot Springs, Arkansas, as to the possible kidnaping of GRACE GOLDSTEIN, shortly after the raid on the Woodcock home on March 30th, 1936, that he, AKERS, had made inquiry through the girls employed at GRACE GOLDSTEIN'S house of prostitution as to where she had gone and that these prostitutes stated that she had been taken away in a car.

This witness will testify that in referring to a newspaper story which appeared in Hot Springs, Arkansas, to the effect that KARPIS and GRACE GOLDSTEIN in an automobile had an accident with another car on a main street in Hot Springs - AKERS stated that GRACE GOLDSTEIN told him of this and that apparently it was true and that the police officer who stepped up to adjust the matter between GRACE GOLDSTEIN, ALVIN KARPIS and the third party, on the above occasion, was JOE SCOTT of the Hot Springs Police Department and that this accident occurred on the main street in front of the Sears-Roebuck Store.

Will testify concerning

JOSEPH WAKELIN

and will state that on May 9th, 1936, in company with Special Agent in Charge Chapman Fletcher, he interviewed JOSEPH WAKELIN, who was then the Chief of Police and HERBERT AKERS, who was then Chief of Detectives at the Hot Springs, Arkansas Police Department and that at that time WAKELIN stated he had been Chief of Police at Hot Springs, Arkansas, for nine years and that there were possibly six houses of prostitution in Hot Springs, Arkansas, such as the Hatteris Hotel and that these places have from three to four girls or more, as inmates.

Inspector Connolly will testify that WAKELIN stated that the first intimation that he had that possibly ALVIN KARPIS or any of his associates, were in the vicinity of Hot Springs, Arkansas, was when he heard that two parties had gone into a store in the vicinity of Dyer's Landing and made some purchases of

bandages, gauze, et cetera and that through their suspicious actions these persons had been reported to the Hot Springs Police Department and that as he recalls this matter was later reported to some Government officer at Little Rock, Arkansas, but that, however, such reporting was handled by Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS and that they had advised the Government officer in Little Rock that they believed that KARPIS was in the vicinity of Hot Springs, Arkansas; that the next thing he knew of KARPIS being connected in any way in Hot Springs, Arkansas, was when some of the "boys", referring to Post Office Inspectors, had GRACE GOLDSTEIN at his office interviewing her.

This witness will testify that WAKELIN indicated he had known GRACE GOLDSTEIN for five or six years and she had formerly operated a house of prostitution in back of the Princess Theatre and later on Central Avenue; that she was presently located at the Hatterie Hotel; that WAKELIN stated that GRACE GOLDSTEIN had always operated a house of prostitution since she had been located in Hot Springs, Arkansas; that he had never had any calls to her place of business and that the only time he was in her house of prostitution at the Hatterie Hotel was the occasion when he, together with Chief of Detectives AKERS and Special Agent B. L. Dameron went to her place and talked to her - this being either in the latter part of March or the first part of April, 1936; that Chief of Detectives AKERS came to him, WAKELIN, and advised that someone, either one of the Department of Justice Agents, or a Post Office Inspector, had said that he, WAKELIN, had been out to the hideout house,

namely, the Woodcock home on the Malvern Road, on the night before Bureau Agents raided same, in company with GRACE GOLDSTEIN and that WAKELIN at this time insisted that he positively did not accompany GRACE GOLDSTEIN to the Woodcock home on the night in question; that WAKELIN stated that after the "boys", namely, the Post Office Inspectors, had talked with GRACE GOLDSTEIN at the Police station, during the latter part of March, 1936, Joe Anderson and the Post Office Inspectors came to him and asked him to try and get something out of her; that he, WAKELIN, thereafter rode out with her for an hour or more in the country on two separate occasions at which time he tried to get information from her as to whether she knew the location of ALVIN KARPIS; that, however, GRACE GOLDSTEIN stuck out to the last that she did not know who these men were and that if it was ALVIN KARPIS she did not know it; that GRACE GOLDSTEIN advised him to the effect that, "I am in the business for what I can get out of them"; that this conversation took place after CONNIE MORRIS had left Hot Springs, Arkansas, during the latter part of March, 1936, but previous to the raid on the Woodcock home.

This witness will state that WAKELIN stated that GRACE GOLDSTEIN had promised him that she would endeavor to locate CONNIE MORRIS and that he, WAKELIN, advised her that she was not telling him the truth and that he was not going to waste any more time with her.

This witness will testify that WAKELIN stated that GRACE GOLDSTEIN came back to Hot Springs, Arkansas, after she had disappeared, subsequent to the departure of ALVIN KARPIS and others,

around the time of the raid on the Woodcock home and that he rode out on the hill with her, talking with her for approximately one hour and a half; that WAKELIN stated that GRACE GOLDSTEIN, however, would not say where she had been, although she insisted that she had been to her mother's home and that she had been patching herself up after the accident which she had in her ear and that this was the last occasion that he, WAKELIN, had talked to her.

Inspector Connelley will testify that WAKELIN advised that he raided the place on the hill, namely, the Woodcock home, where KARPIS was last living in an effort to capture "Pretty Boy" Floyd about three years ago; that, however, he did not subsequently visit the Woodcock home until after the raid conducted by Bureau Agents on some a month or more prior to the date of this interview; that on that occasion he rode out to the Woodcock home with a Deputy Sheriff.

Inspector Connelley will state that Chief of Police JOSEPH WAKELIN was questioned as to his lending his 1935 Arkansas license plates to GRACE GOLDSTEIN, to be used on a green Buick Coupe which she then owned and that after some thought WAKELIN advised that he lent GRACE GOLDSTEIN the tags from one of his personal cars, to be used on her car, just prior to the time that she obtained the 1936 license plates for the green Buick Coupe, which she was then using and that these tags which he loaned GRACE GOLDSTEIN were 1935 Arkansas license plates #119-495, which were issued for an Auburn Sedan in the name of JOSEPH WAKELIN.

and will state that since April 5th, 1935, she has operated a rooming house at the above address and that about a month after she moved into this place, her nephew, GARNETT MOORE, a Patrolman on the Hot Springs Police Department, rented a room from her and has since lived with her at this address; that throughout the time that she has resided at this address, up until the present time, she has always subscribed to the Hot Springs "Sentinel Record" newspaper, which is delivered to her house each morning; that her nephew, GARNETT MOORE, generally purchases a "Sentinel Record" newspaper each morning after he gets off from work, but that when he does not have a paper, he reads the newspaper to which she subscribes and which is delivered to her house each morning.

(The above testimony is contained in a signed statement obtained from Mrs. Helen Trammel by Special Agent D. P. Sullivan, on December 4th, 1937. This statement will be available to the United States Attorney.)

Will testify that on June 23, 1937, at Hot Springs, Arkansas, he, with Special Agent D. P. Sullivan, interviewed former Police Lieutenant CECIL BROCK of the Hot Springs Police Department, during which interview, the following named persons were mentioned:

CECIL BROCK  
ALVIN KARPIS  
HERBERT AKERS  
JOE WAKELIN  
FRED HUNTER

and will state that he questioned CECIL BROCK concerning the temporary wanted notices issued by the Federal Bureau of Investigation about April, 1934, on

FRED BARKER  
HARRY CAMPBELL  
VOLNEY DAVIS  
JESS DOYLE  
MYRTLE EATON  
CHARLES J. FITZGERALD  
EDNA MURRAY  
HARRY SAWYER  
WILLIAM WEAVER,

in connection with the kidnaping of EDWARD G. BREMER, and BROCK stated that to his best recollection, two or three Special Agents of the Bureau called at the Hot Springs Police Department and delivered these temporary wanted notices to him, and CECIL BROCK stated that he cannot exactly recall what he did with these wanted notices at

that time, but that it was the usual practice to place circulars on badly wanted fugitives in a box located on the Chief of Police's desk, where they remained about a week before they were filed, this being done in order that Chief of Police WAKELIN and Chief of Detectives AKERS might have an opportunity to examine such notices; that he thereafter filed these temporary wanted notices in the police files, and that BROCK stated that these wanted notices are probably still in the files of the Hot Springs Police Department; that thereafter, from time to time, the Hot Springs Police Department received Identification Orders for

ALVIN KARPIS  
ARTHUR R. BARKER  
HARRY CAMPBELL,

and other wanted for the kidnaping of EDWARD G. BREMER; that he believed that these Identification Orders were left on the desk of Chief of Police WAKELIN for the approximate period of one week, as was the usual custom, prior to being filed by him.

This witness will further testify that CECIL BROCK stated that he recalled that shortly after the killing of Sheriff Kelly at West Plains, Missouri, in 1932, the Hot Springs Police Department received a large circular containing the photographs and fingerprints of ALVIN KARPIS and FRED BARKER, who were wanted for this killing, and that this wanted notice indicated there was a \$1,200.00 reward offered for the capture of these men; that this large circular was tacked on a door in the City Jail, directly opposite the mail box; that the wanted notice therefore was in full view of all officers employed by the Hot Springs Police Department, and directly in front of all officers when they went to get their mail; that this wanted notice was left on that door for at least a year, and until it had turned yellow with age.

This witness will further testify that CECIL BROCK recalled that GRACE GOLDSTEIN operated a house of prostitution at 1338 South Central Avenue in Hot Springs, and that she thereafter moved to an address on Palm Street, where she operated a house of prostitution; that he, CECIL BROCK, and "DUTCH" AKERS frequently toured around this district looking for out-of-state licenses that might belong to stolen cars in the possession of thieves who were receiving treatment from the U. S. Public Health Service Clinic nearby, for the reason that for each stolen car recovered, the police officer would get a reward or commission. The witness will state that he asked BROCK whether he had ever noticed a 1935 black Ford coupe bearing Kentucky license plates parked in front of GRACE GOLDSTEIN's house, and BROCK stated that he had not; that in fact, he had visited GRACE GOLDSTEIN'S house of prostitution on Palm Street on only one occasion, and then when the Police Department received a call from her, the complaint having to do with some prostitute who was leaving GRACE GOLDSTEIN'S house of prostitution without paying her bill.

This witness will state that he exhibited to CECIL BROCK photographs of

ALVIN KARPIS  
FRED HUNTER  
HARRY CAMPBELL  
SAM CONER

and other members of the BARKER-KARPIS gang, and BROCK stated that he was unable to identify any of these persons as anyone he had ever seen before; that the witness asked BROCK whether he had ever heard or knew that KARPIS had resided at Milan's Landing or Carpenter's Inn on Lake Hamilton, and BROCK denied any and all knowledge of KARPIS residing at these places; that BROCK stated that he recalled that one morning after he reported for work at 9:00 A.M., Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS asked him to take a ride with him to check a license plate, and AKERS drove to DYER'S LANDING, and pointed out a particular

cottage and a coupe which was parked in front, and AKERS  
 asked BROCK to obtain the license number, which he, BROCK,  
 did; that neither he nor AKERS got out of their car, but  
 proceeded back to the Hot Springs Police Department, and  
 later that day, he BROCK, wired the Motor Vehicle Bureau  
 at Columbus, Ohio, requesting information on this plate;  
 that to his best recollection the reply stated that this  
 plate was issued to a man named PARKER at Youngstown, Ohio,  
 and he thereafter wired the Police Department at Youngstown,  
 Ohio, requesting that an attempt be made to learn the identity  
 of PARKER, and that the Youngstown police indicated  
 in their reply that the address given was a vacant lot,  
 and that shortly after receiving this reply from the  
 Youngstown police, which was probably a day or two after  
 he and AKERS had checked the license plate on the car at  
 Dyer's Landing, Ohio, Chief of Detectives AKERS notified the  
 Little Rock Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation  
 of the information he had obtained; that BROCK was  
 questioned as to whether he knew at that time that the  
 person suspected of owning the car at Dyer's Landing was  
 in fact ALVIN KARPIS, and that BROCK at first denied knowing  
 that this was KARPIS and stated that AKERS did not inform  
 him why he was checking this license plate number, and  
 AKERS did not reveal the source of his information; that  
 BROCK later stated during this interview that undoubtedly  
 he must have known that the person owning the car which  
 they checked was wanted by the Bureau, or AKERS would not  
 have notified the Little Rock Office of the information he  
 obtained.

This witness will further testify that  
 BROCK stated that shortly after AKERS notified the Federal  
 Bureau of Investigation office at Little Rock, two agents,  
 one of whom he believes was Agent Coulter, called at the  
 Hot Springs Police Department; that BROCK stated that he  
 does not believe that he was present when AKERS spoke  
 with these agents, but that he recalls that a few days  
 later, some medicine bottles that were supposedly taken  
 from the cottage at Dyer's Landing after the Bureau's  
 investigation at that place, came into possession of the  
 Hot Springs Police Department, but that he does not recall  
 who delivered these bottles; that he does remember that

the labels on the bottles indicated that the prescriptions were given by Dr. PAUL Z. BROWNE; that he took one of these bottles and interviewed Dr. BROWNE and learned that the prescription was issued to a man named HUNTER; that he was certain that he never conducted any investigation at Dyer's Landing except for the one occasion mentioned above, when he and AKERS checked the automobile license plate, and he knew of no other investigation conducted there by any other officer, either before or after the Bureau's investigation at Dyer's Landing; that some time during the period that the investigation was being conducted at Dyer's Landing by Bureau agents, and by Akers and himself, he learned that KARPIS may possibly have been suspected of having resided at this place, but that he could not recall whether he heard this from AKERS or from the Bureau agents who made the investigation.

Special Agent SUTTLER will further testify that BROCK stated that he did not again hear anything indicating that KARPIS might be in Hot Springs, Arkansas, after the above investigation conducted at Dyer's Landing on Lake Hamilton, up until around the first of the year 1936, at which time GRAY ALBRIGHT, Superintendent of the Arkansas State Police, mentioned to him in a casual conversation that KARPIS and his gang might visit Hot Springs, and that in view of this possibility, a lookout should be maintained for this man; that the witness questioned BROCK concerning the period immediately preceding the raid conducted by Bureau agents on the home of E. E. Woodcock on March 30, 1936, and that BROCK indicated that from the time of his conversation with ALBRIGHT, around the first part of the year 1936, up until about a week prior to the above raid, he did not receive any information as to KARPIS residing at Hot Springs, Arkansas; that he recalled that about a week prior to the Woodcock raid, Joe Anderson and another Kansas State Trooper, and a Post Office Inspector who he believes was named Smith, came to Hot Springs; that these men particularly contacted Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS and that he, BROCK, at first did not know that they were

checking on KARPIS; that Anderson did contact him after his arrival at the Police Department and inquired of BROCK concerning the Hatterie Hotel; that he, BROCK, cannot recall that he knew that Anderson was checking on ALVIN KARPIS and GRACE GOLDSTEIN; that up until this time he did not know that GRACE GOLDSTEIN was connected with ALVIN KARPIS; that he is certain that "DUTCH" AKERS had never informed him up until this time of GRACE GOLDSTEIN associating with ALVIN KARPIS; that a day or two later Anderson again contacted him and he learned for the first time that Anderson had gotten in touch with his, BROCK'S, brother, named ERCELL BROCK, a Yellow Cab driver, in an effort to obtain information concerning the activities at the Hatterie Hotel, because ERCELL BROCK was supposed to be keeping company with the prostitute, CONNIE MORRIS; that BROCK stated that he is not certain, but that it is probable that it was around this time that he first learned that ALVIN KARPIS was associating with GRACE GOLDSTEIN; that thereafter he heard that his brother had gotten drunk and informed CONNIE MORRIS of the investigation being conducted by Post Office Inspectors and Joe Anderson; that when he, BROCK, learned this, he got his brother out of town, as he was afraid that KARPIS or some of the gang might harm him; that he, BROCK, stated that he believed that AKERS was in close contact with the Post Office Inspectors and Joe Anderson during this time, and on one occasion he saw AKERS leave a hotel where Joe Anderson was staying.

This witness will state that he questioned BROCK concerning the raid conducted by Bureau agents on the home of E. E. Woodcock near Lake Catherine, and that BROCK advised that the first he learned of this was one morning when he reported to police headquarters about 9:00 A.M., and found quite a crowd there; that a man named BEN MURRY, a bondsman in Hot Springs, was relating how he was stopped on his way to town out on Malvern Road, and that BROCK stated that this man MURRY lived near the Woodcock home and had to drive his hogs across the road near there every morning, and that this was the first word that he, CECIL BROCK, had heard of the raid conducted by



Bureau agents on the Woodcock home; that after he heard from Murry about the raid, he, BROCK, Chief of Police JOSEPH WAKELIN, Chief of Detectives HERBERT AKERS, and two newspaper men named WALTER EBEL and KENT RUSH, all went out to the site of the raid, but that Federal agents had the road blocked, and would not allow them to go into the house; that BROCK stated that at this time he noticed that JOE WAKELIN had black dog hair all over him that morning, as if he had been playing with a dog; that Kansas State Trooper Joe Anderson later told him that Chief of Police WAKELIN had been at the Woodcock house with GRACE GOLDSTEIN on the night preceding the raid.

Special Agent BUTLER will testify that BROCK stated that in November of 1936, while he and Chief of Police JOE WAKELIN were enroute to Sawyer, Oklahoma, to arrest a prisoner named JOHN PRICE, they passed through the town of Arkadelphia, Arkansas, and that just as they got to a tourist camp outside of the city limits of Arkadelphia, on the left hand side of the road leading into Arkadelphia from Hot Springs, WAKELIN pointed out to BROCK a tourist cabin, and stated that this was the place where ALVIN KARPIS stayed the night after Bureau agents raided the Woodcock home. This witness will state that he questioned GECIL BROCK as to whether he knew how it came about that ALVIN KARPIS and GRACE GOLDSTEIN rented the Woodcock home, and BROCK indicated that he did not know how this happened, but that BROCK informed that City Attorney A. T. "SONNY" DAVIES is a brother-in-law of Mr. Woodcock, and that Mrs. VERNE LEDGERWOOD, wife of the City Judge, is a sister of former Chief of Police JOSEPH WAKELIN; that BROCK was questioned whether he knew of any places frequented by KARPIS and his associates in Hot Springs, but he indicated that he did not know of any places frequented by KARPIS other than GRACE GOLDSTEIN'S different houses of prostitution, and did not know of any other persons who associated with KARPIS in Hot Springs, Arkansas; that upon questioning, BROCK stated that he had no information that KARPIS ever resided at the country home of HERBERT AKERS, located on Lake Catherine, near Hot Springs, Arkansas.



This witness will further testify that sometime during July, 1937, he, together with Special Agent John L. Madala, interviewed CECIL BROCK at the Eastman Hotel, and that BROCK at this time informed that sometime shortly after GRACE GOLDSTEIN purchased her new Buick coupe, this being on December 11, 1935, Chief of Police Wakelin sent him to the Hatteria Hotel with the instructions that he take the license plates off GRACE GOLDSTEIN'S Buick coupe; that WAKELIN informed him at this time that he had previously loaned these plates to GRACE GOLDSTEIN in order that she could make a trip out of the State; that he went to the Hatteria Hotel in pursuance to WAKELIN'S orders, and with the assistance of GRACE GOLDSTEIN, removed WAKELIN'S license plates from her Buick coupe, which was parked in front of the Hatteria Hotel; that he took the license plates to the Police Department and turned them over to Mr. WAKELIN.
