AGENTS BALKED In Bremer Clue

Although federal agents found \$5,006 in a safe deposit box which they drilled open after finding it was held by the mother of Arthur R. Barker, kidnaper, they were forced to admit yesterday that it was not part of the \$200,000 ransom paid by Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker.

Melvin Purvis, head of the Department of Justice, said the number of the box in the Woodlawn Safe Deposit Company vault had been obtained six months ago in a search of the rooms of Mrs. Catherine Barker, the outlaw's mother,

at 2373 E. Seventieth st.

Mrs. Barker and her son, whom the agents hoped to find with her, had fled, and since then, Purvis stated, the box had been under constant observation. Neither the mother, Barker nor Alvin Karpis, his confederate, ever returned, and it was finally decided to open the box. Serial numbers of the bills are being checked against loot in various other kidnapings and roboteries.

Hide Girl To Thwart Kidnapers

Fearing that she may be kidnaped by gangsters, six-year-old Francine Sawyer has been secreted somewhere in the vicinity of the

cine Sawyer has been secreted "somewhere in the vicinity of the Twin Cities."

The girl was in custody of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Sawyer from May, 1933, until Mrs. Sawyer was jailed in a raid by Cleveland police Sept. 5. In another raid a few minutes later police barely missed capturing three men they believe to be Arthur (Doc) Barker and Alvin Karpis and a third man thought to be either Sawyer or Fred Barker, brother of Arthur. Karpis and "Doc" Barker have been identified as the kidnapers of Edward B. Fremer and suspected of complicity in the William Hamm, Jr., kidnaping.

The Sawyer girl was brought back to St. Paul by airplane Saturday and was placed under turisdiction of the Ramsey county thild welfare board. Today she was turned over to the state board of centrol's childien's division.


Miss Gertrude E. Caramack, executive secretary of the Ramsey county child welfare loard, said today that there would be no information given out concerning the child's whereabouts.

"Gangland would turn over every stone in an attempt to find her," she said, "if they believed the child could tell federal authorities secrets about the underworld. The child is bright and intelligent for her age."

"Mrs. Sawyer shows a genuine fondness for the girl." Miss Dorothy E. Grawford, board investigator, sad, "and gave her the best of care. The child had beautiful clothes and seemed to be unusually happy."

While held in custody in Clevelland, Francine is said to have told authorities much concerning the activities of the Sawyers, and her talking is alleged to have resulted in the raid on the suspected headquarters of Karpis and the Barkers.



Finding of Four \$10 Notes by Bank Tellers Reveals Recent Presence of Gangsters in Buffalo.

A substantial clue to the kidnapers of Edward G. Bremer, 36-year-old banker of St. Paul, who was released only after \$200,000 in small bills had been paid, was uncovered here today when four of the many \$10 bills were identified by tellers of the Manufacturers & Traders' Trust company.

One of the bills was received on Sept. 4 by Charles Dearing, teller of the Grant-Boyd streets branch, who found another one shortly thereafter.

Two others were turned in at the main office at Main and Swan streets a short time after the first bill was found. They have been identified by Tellers Walter Ackerman and Robert Hanlon.

At the same time it was reported that several Federal Reserve notes whose serial numbers were the same

as those on another list of ransom bills had been found in banks in Lockport and Niagara Falls.

Federal agents are making a check to determine whether these too were part of the Bremer case or anythe of several others in which ransom money was paid.

money was paid.

Positive identification was made by comparing the serial numbers on the bills with a list of numbers taken from the bills paid as ransom to the kidnapers.

Bank officials were high in their praise of the careful work of the tellers. This information immediately was turned over to George V. Doherty, acting special agent in

Federal agents, the Buffalo Evening News revealed on Aug. 15, were seeking Alvin Karpis and Ar-thur Barker, Midwest gangsters, in Buffalo because they had definite information these men, believed to have kidnaped Bremer, were in the neighborhood.

Suspicions Confirmed.

The fact that the bills were un-covered shortly thereafter proved their information correct.

These men were believed at the time to have been on their way to Canada because the search for them in their usual haunts in the Midwest was becoming too uncomfort-

The coincidence of their sojourn in Buffalo and the kidnaping of John S. I abatt a short time later led Federal agents and Canadian authorities to the belief that Karpis and Barker had kidnaped the wealthy Canadian brewer.

Both agencies agreed that the kid-naping of Mr. Labatt was the work of Americans and this fact served to strengthen the link between the Midwest gangsters and the "snatch-ing" of the Canadian brewer.

Federal Reserve Notes.

The bills of the Bremer kidnap-Reserve notes, the type of money handed to the kidnapers before they released the young banker.

Mr. Bremer was kidnaped in St.
Paul on Sept. 17 a short distance

from the school to which he had escorted his young daughter. A car crowded his own machine to the curb, a gun was pressed against his side and/he was driven out to the haunt of his captors.

After a few weeks of negotiations the young banker was thrown out of a car near Rochester, Minn. The largest ransom on record, \$200,000 in \$5 and \$10 bills, was paid by his family.



Dr. Moran, Once Convicted of Manslaughter, Suspected in Kidnaping.

A first-rate surgeon whose scalpel became shaky under the influence of alcohol was the subject of a search by department of justice agents today, proving that science has kept up with crime, or vice versa.

The man sought is Dr. Joseph P. Moran, ex-convict, and one-time up-and-coming surgeon of LaSalle, Ill. It was learned today that the government has sent out a circular requesting his apprehension for questioning in the kidnaping last January of Edward Bremer, St. Paul

capitalist and brewer.

The entire resources of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice, incidentally, are at present concentrated on the solution of the Bremer case, a particular cinder in the eye of the organization.

Such gangster parties as the bureaus suspected and hoped to pin down to the crime have been disposed of through death or penitentiary sentences in the state courts.

Melvin H. Purvis, the brooding, silent head of the Chicago office of the department of investigation, declined today to discuss the hunt for Dr. Moran, but it was learned from an elevator man in his building that the surgeon was suspected of having handled the \$200,000 paid for the Bremer ransom.

Dr. Moran, it was said, is a veteran of the American air service and carries decorations from several allied governments. He was educated at Tufts college and Harvard, it was said. Settling in Lasalle after his graduation, he achieved a reputation as a surgeon, only to begin slipping under the influence of LaSalle county liquor, notorious throughout Illinois.

Convicted for Murder.

Dr. Moran came to grief in 1928 when he was convicted for manslaughter as a result of what investigators said was his first illegal operation. He spent slightly over two years in Stateville and while there performed a number of operations

on prisoners.

Scores of his grateful patients are now at liberty, investigators said and were more than willing to had their dormer benefactor in any settlemented manner suggested.

His license to practices was revoked, but was restored following his final release late in 1931. For a time he maintained an office in Maywood and later at 4861 Irving Park boulevard.





WIDOW OF SLAIN GANGSTER IS AR-RESTED IN MINNESOTA.

Secrecy Surrounds the Holding of Woman Whose Husband Was Killed in Union Station Massacre Here.

(By the Associated Press.) DULUTH, MINN., Oct. 3.-Mrs. Frank Nash, widow of the gangster slain in the Kansas City union station massacre more than a year ago, was taken by federal agents from the home of her parents in Aurora, Minn., last Priday, it was learned today.

Mrs. Nash was taken out of the county and presumably rushed either to St. Paul or Kansas City, authorities here said.

AGENTS ARE SILENT.

D. M. Ladd, chief of the St. Paul department of justice office, said he knew nothing about the case, although it was recalled the former gangster's widow was taken in custody after authorities had seized three persons in connection with the Homer

Van Meter case. St. Louis County authorities did not know whether Mrs. Nash was still held and St. Paul operatives of the justice department denied knowledge

of her.

She had been under surveillance for a month and a half by St. Louis County deputy sheriffs before she was picked up by them at the request of federal operatives.





Nash Widow Nabbed For **Kidnap Clue**

Arrested At Aurora In Abduction Of Hamm And Bremer.

Mrs. Frank Nash, widow of the outlaw slain in Kansas City massacre June 17, 1933, is under arrest in connection with the kidnapings of Edward G. Bremer and William Hamm, wealthy St. Paulites.

Mrs. Nash, who has been living since last December under the name of Mrs. George Miller, the name under which she married Nash, was arrested at Aurora, Minn., northwest of Duluth, by St. Louis county and department of justice agents.

Her husband and four officers were killed in a desperate underworld attempt to free the outlaw as he was being taken to Leavenworth federal prison. The machine gun barrage took place in daylight at the Union Station plaza in Kansas City.

Alvin Karpis and Arthur (Doc) Barker, Ok'ahoma outlaws, coming from the same vicinity as Frank Nash, have been named as the actual kidnapers of Mr. Bremer.

It is understood that a short time after the Bremer anatching, federal agents were at Mrs. Nash's home in Aurora, waiting several days in hopes that the kidnapers would show up.

Duluth, Oct. 3.—(F)—Mrs. Frank Nash, widow of the gangster who was slain in the Kansas City Union station massacre more than a year ago, was spirited from the home of her parents in Aurora, Minn., Friday by U. S. Department of Justice

her parents in Aurora, Minn., Friday by U. S. Department of Justice Agents, the Herald learned today. Although no official information was revealed, it is presumed that she is being held for questioning in connection with the Bremer and Hamm kidnapings.

Sheriff Sam M. Owens and his chief deputy, Ed B. Hansen, arrived in Aurora Friday morning with two justice agents. They placed Mrs. Nash under arrest and left town immediately with the woman in custody. The agents were accompanied to the county border by the St. Louis county officers and from there they presumably went to St. Paul.

The agents did not reveal where they were taking the woman or what was their purpose. It was learned from unofficial sources that they had received a tip that she knew "something" about the St. Paul kidnaping cases and that she had withheld information when previously questioned about these and other criminal matters.





"Did you ever at any time accompany your husband on trips to collect ransom money?"




"I did not," Mrs. Sankey replied.

ONE FREED IN BREMER CASE **AS TRIAL OF THREE OTHERS**

IS POSTPONED UNTIL APRIL

The federal government late Wednesday dismissed charges against one of four Chicagoans held in connection with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer and postponed trial of the other three from November to April, it was learned today by The Daily News.

This action was taken pending a court of appeals decision in the appeal of Edward Berman, Minneapolils, from a five-year sentence imposed in connection with the kidnaping of Charles F. Urschel in Oklahoma last year. Berman was found guilty of having some of the ransom money in his possession—the same charge faced by the Chicagoans in connection with the Bremer snatching.


Freed was John J. McLaughlin, Jr., youthful brokerage clerk who has been at liberty on \$5,000 bonds since shortly after arrest of the quartet in June.

Postponed to April were the cases of John J. McLaughlin, Sr., Chicago political boss and alleged gambling overload; Philip J. Delaney and Edward Vidler. McLaughlin has been at liberty on \$15,000 bonds. Vidler and Delaney have been held in Ramsey county jail. They will be released on \$5,000 bonds each.

2 BREMER SUSPECTS FREED PENDING TRIAL

Vidler and Delaney Released
Without Bail Pending
Court Ruling

Two men charged with handling the ransom money in the Bremer kidnaping case were released Wednesday from the Ramsey county jail on their own recognizance, it was learned today.

The men are William E. Vidler and Philip J. Delaney, arrested last summer in Chicago with John J. (Boss) McLaughlin and his son, John J. McLaughlin Jr., who are charged with the same offense. All were brought here for trial, but the McLaughlins were released under bond. The other two were unable to raise bond and remained in jail.

Release of Vidler and Delaney was recommended by George F. Sullivan, U. S. district attorney, when it was decided that they would not be tried until the term of Federal court here next spring. Originally, the four defendants were scheduled to go on trial at the term starting here Tuesday, but this plan was changed when a question arose as to whether the federal kidnaping law covers the handling of kidnap ransom money.

Due to this question, it was decided to postpone the trials here until the point is settled by an appeal now pending before the U.S. Circuit court of the Third district. This appeal was made by Edward (Barney) Berman of Minneapolis, under a five-year prison sentence for handling ransom money paid for the release of Charles F. Urischel, kidnaped Oklahoma City millionaire.

The money which Vidler, Delaney and the McLaughlins are accused of handling was part of the ransom paid for the release of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, who was kidnaped last winter.

In recommending release of the first two, Mr. Sullivan pointed out that, so long as they cannot make bond, postponement of their trials will mean their serving nearly a year in jail before their cases are disposed of. He agreed to the release after a conference with their attorney, L. L. Drill.

Bad News for a Tough.

Alvin Karpia, Chicago tough, had no occasion to give thanks yesterday, when he was accorded the doubtful honor of promotion to the rank of Public Enemy No. 1. There was more bad news than honor in the designation which virtually constitutes a sentence of death. The position of No. 1 has become a very, very temporary one.

A good many newspaper readers will probably want to know who in the nation is Karpis? His name hasn't figured so prominently and sensationally in the news as have the names of some of his now defunct predecessors. When the federals have to pick out an obscure and virtually unknown gangster for the place it just goes to show how heavy the mortality has been among the Number 1 men. It wasn't long ago that there were candidates all over the place.

A bizarre tale by Alfred Geonia, released a week ago yesterday from the Kansas state penitentiary, named Aivin Karpis, public enemy No. 1, and Clyde Nimerick, Missouri and Kansas criminal, as the men who poisoned him Thursday near Joliet, Ill., where Geonia is being held

Geonia said he was in prison at Lansing at the same time Karpis served a term there. He went to Northern Illinois, following his release last week, and met a man named Fred Parker, who was accompanied by Nimerick. They arranged for him to go with them to meet Karpis. Geonia recounted, on St. Charles highway near Joliet, Thursday. The four men went to a tavern, where a drink from a ginger ale botthe was proffered Geonia. Karpis remarked to him, Geonia related:

"How do you feel? You're going to

die."

Geonia said Karpis told him the poisoning was punishment for warning prison officials of prison breaks. He said also that he had acted as an undercover man for federal agents,

undercover man for federal agents, but federal authorities denied the assertion.

If there is truth in the story, Nimerick has merged a criminal talent hardened by years of lawlessness, with that of one of the nation's most sought gangsters, Karpis, who is wanted in the Edward G. Bremer abduction. Nimerick has been involved in crimes including bank robberles and burglaries in Missouri and Kansas for several years. He served six years of a 20-year sentence in the Kansas penitentiary for the robbery of the Walton, Kas., State Bank of \$140,000, January 19, 1924. He previously had served two years in the Missouri penitentiary for possession of burglary tools.

Nimerick was named as one of the large products of the Missouri penitentiary for possession of burglary tools.

Nimerick was named as one of the six bandits who robbed the Inter-State National Bank, in the Live-stock Exchange building, of \$45,000, December 10, 16:0. He was arrested in Des Moines December 29, 1931, and returned here, where he was released under \$20,000 bond. He failed to appear for preliminary-hearing March 21, 1932, forfeiting the bond and has been a fugitive since then. Police officials of Missouri and Kansas regard him as a desperate criminal, although Geomia's story is the first indication he might be associating with mationally known criminals.


