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ABSOLVES POLICE FOR ESCAPE OF ALVIN KARPIS

Atlantic City Force Is Shy Equipment.

Atlantic City, N. J., Jan. 28.—[Special.]—Public Safety Commissioner William S. Cuthbert today absolved the Atlantic City police in the escape last Sunday of Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1, and Harry Campbell, and praised his men for trying hard in an unequal gun battle with inadequate equipment. Cuthbert blamed lack of specific information in teletype messages from Jacksonville and Miami. He admitted that while identities were not given, the pair were described as "dangerous" and "caution advised."

Asks for Machine Guns.

One aftermath is a determination by Cuthbert and Police Chief James McMennamin to buy six machine guns for their department. They hope to obtain an appropriation in the 1935 municipal budget for this. Letters to newspapers meanwhile are demanding to know why the draw bridges on the five main boulevards off this island were not opened at once to cut off the gangsters' escape, and why they are not directly connected by telephone to police headquarters.

Rumor Is Ignored.

Comment also is growing on a report that a Negro police sergeant on the patrol wagon forbade the veteran driver to park across a garage exit, bottling Karpis and Campbell inside while they were stealing a car for a getaway. This tale has been officially ignored, however. Clamor also is growing for a training school for policemen and their selection by examination and fitness, rather than alleged political influence. Commissioner Cuthbert declared department of justice agents also had liberated his men.

ILLINOIS TRAIL OF KARPIS LOST IN MAN HUNT

The hunt for Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1, and his companion, Harry Campbell, centered in Illinois today with Chicago police and federal agents ready with a "shoot to kill" reception for the fugitives should they attempt to enter this city.

Latest reports that the desperadoes were in the vicinity of Moline had law officers on guard over routes into the tri-cities and at the approaches to the Mississippi river bridge.

Moline officers were notified by Sheriff George Nash of Henry county that two men, believed to be the fleeing gangsters, passed through LaSalle and Peru, headed for Moline. The trail of the pair was not picked up again.

Meanwhile, authorities sought to link Karpis and his accomplice, objects of a nation-wide manhunt, with the robbery of the Trivoli, Ill., bank near Peoria. Two bandits got \$3,000 in a raid there yesterday.

KARPIS SHELTERING SUSPECT IS HELD

Arrest of Miami, Fla., Man An-
nounced by Justice De-
partment.

Arrest of a man named Adams in
Miami, Fla., on a charge of having
harbored Alvin Karpis, Bremer kidnap
suspect, was announced today at the
Justice Department.

The department said it was not sure
of the man's first name and refused
to comment on reports that a portion
of the \$200,000 paid for the return of
Edward G. Bremer had been recov-
ered.

Karpis and Harry Campbell are
being sought following their recent
escape from a police trap at Atlantic
City.

The two men are believed by the
Justice department to have been in
Florida shortly before 15 Federal
agents shot and killed Fred Barker
and his mother, Kate, at Oklawaha,
Fla.

Arthur (Doc) Barker, co-leader with
Karpis of the band charged with the
abduction of Bremer, is under arrest
in St. Paul. Twenty-two have been
indicted for the kidnaping.

The total deposits during that time, the witness said, was \$5,377.97, made up as follows: 1924, \$200; 1925, \$1,126.38; 1926, \$1,865; 1927, \$2,186.59. Total, \$5,377.97.

Q.—All these deposits were made before the date of the Lindbergh baby's kidnaping. A.—Yes.

Cites Deposits

Mr. Frank testified \$3,750 was drawn out of the Schoeffler account in October, 1927. The following January the account was converted into a joint one in her name and that of her husband and it so continued until March, 1933.

The balance of the account, on January 16, 1928, was \$411.16 and a joint Anna and Richard Hauptmann account was opened. In addition to the \$411.16 there was deposited in 1928 \$2,125; 1929 \$1,598.35; 1930 \$1,417.50; 1931 \$619.25; 1932 \$3,146.52.

Up to March 25, 1933, when the account closed out, \$2,710 had been deposited for that year.

Mr. Reilly tried to bring out that Hauptmann had extensive bank transactions prior to the Lindbergh kidnaping. He said:

"You see here where the defendant in 1929 made a withdrawal of \$2,800, don't you?"

"Yes."

Q.—And here is a withdrawal in 1930 of \$500, and another of \$950, and deposits of \$200 and \$116. A.—Yes.

Q.—And here in 1931 is a withdrawal of \$640? A.—Yes.

Q.—Followed by a deposit a month later? A.—Yes.

This continued for several minutes, Mr. Reilly lingering over every bank deposit or withdrawal made by the Hauptmanns, prior to April 2, 1932.

Mr. Frank admitted the total transactions of Mr. and Mrs. Hauptmann in one joint bank account, prior to the kidnaping, totaled \$12,830.28.

Total Deposits

When the Hauptmann account was joined, in 1928, there was \$411.16 in Anna's name and \$802.50 in Bruno's name. In 1928 there was deposited \$2,125, making a total for the year of \$3,338.66.

Q.—(By Reilly): Tell me how much was deposited in the joint Hauptmann account at the Central Savings Bank from the time it was opened until it was closed in 1933? A.—The total was \$12,830.28.

Q.—What happened in 1933, when the joint account was closed out? A.—When the joint account was closed out on March 25, 1933, the balance of \$2,538.35 was placed in the account of Anne Schoeffler in the same bank—Central Savings Bank. In 1933 there was deposited \$2,512.50 in the Anne Schoeffler account, and that deposit was within \$700 of the deposits prior to the kidnaping.

Hauptmann Confident He Will Be Freed

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 21 (I.N.S.).—Hauptmann is unafraid.

He expects acquittal. He thinks the State has failed to prove he kidnaped the Lindbergh baby. He feels now, with the end of the prosecution's case in sight, that the victory is his.

Hauptmann declared in an interview through his counsel, C. Lloyd Fisher:

"I am anxious to take the stand. I have listened to a lot of lies in that courtroom; now I would like to do my own talking and tell what is really the truth. I want a chance to say I didn't kill that baby."

He was asked: "Do you think the jury will believe you?"

"Yes."

"Are you worried about facing cross-examination?"

"Not a bit. They can ask me anything, and I will tell the truth. I am not afraid."

He sat in his cell in Flemington jail poring over deposit slips, bank records and photostatic copies of brokerage accounts. He said:

Mr. Reilly then turned to the brokerage accounts.

Mr. Reilly brought out that as early as November 1, 1929, Hauptmann opened his first brokerage account with the firm of Carlton Mott and Company. He asked:

"So, two and one-half years before the kidnaping, Hauptmann was in Wall Street?"

"Yes, sir."

Referring to Hauptmann's stock transactions, Mr. Reilly, at one point, asked:

"And he paid \$1,000 for Super Can?"

"They are going to try to prove that money was ransom money, I will explain it with these papers. I am going over them in my mind. I will tell how this is 'repeat' money. It was used over and over again. That happens in the stock market. It wasn't Lindbergh ransom money. You can bet on that!"

He was asked:

"Don't you think the State proved a good case against you?"

"What did they prove? That is only their side yet. Wait until I tell the truth. You know, there were a lot of lies told on their side. I mean Sisk, most of all. Then I mean Hochmuth. The old man who said he saw me in Hopewell, and he must be crazy. He is an old man, and I think he is just crazy. And that Miss Alexander, she was lying—or she was mistaken. Even Dr. Condon said she was mistaken. But that Sisk—that man is the worst liar of all. He lied on purpose, and he knew it. That is why I got so mad."

Mr. Frank went back to the stand. Mr. Reilly called his attention to the July, 1930, account where Hauptmann had purchased 100 shares of Indian Motorcycle stock. Mr. Reilly asked:

"Yes."

Sold at Loss

Hauptmann, it was brought out, sold the stock in October.

Justice Trenchard finally calmed the opposing attorneys. The judge said:

Mr. Wilentz, in arguing that he should be allowed to ask the witness about airplane stocks, said: "I am trying to show his (Hauptmann's) familiarity with airplane stock, and that his interest in it shows he may have been interested in the man most prominent in aviation in the world."

Mr. Reilly, shouting, declared Hauptmann not only traded in airplane stocks but in liquor stocks as well.

Q.—Did it come from the Hauptmann bank accounts? A.—It did not.

Deposits Bared

Q.—Was any money deposited in the bank account? A.—On July 20, 1933, there was deposited in the joint account in the Central Savings Bank \$2,177.50.

Q.—In cash? A.—Two thousand dollars cash, balance a check covering interest on the mortgage.

Q.—How much cash was paid into the bank accounts of the Hauptmanns after April 2, 1932? A.—\$9,072.

Q.—How much cash was paid into the Hauptmann brokerage accounts in that same time? A.—\$16,942.

Mr. Wilentz wound up his redirect examination by having Mr. Frank add up once more the cash and stock possessions of Hauptmann and his wife at the time of Hauptmann's arrest, including the \$14,600 ransom money and the money the Hauptmanns had invested in the market since April 2, 1932. Once more the witness gave the figure as \$44,486.

On recross-examination Mr. Reilly asked:

"Have you ever known a dollar of the money Hauptmann put into stocks at the Steiner House or any other firm to be sent back by the Federal Reserve Bank for investigation as one of the Lindbergh ransom bills?"

Mr. Frank replied: "No."

The next witness was Edward F. Morton, who testified he was construction timekeeper for the Majestic Apartments in March, 1932.

Q. (by Wilentz)—Did you know Bruno Richard Hauptmann at that time? A.—Yes; he worked there.

Points to Losses

Q.—Did you check the men who worked there in and out each day? A.—Yes.

Q.—Do you recognize this (holding up a card)? A.—Yes. It's Hauptmann's time card, written in my writing.

When Mr. Frank took the stand this morning, Attorney General Wilentz asked him if he had made a study of the banking and brokerage records of Mr. and Mrs. Hauptmann. Mr. Frank replied he had.

Mr. Wilentz continued:

"How much cash did Mr. and Mrs. Hauptmann have to their names on April 2, 1932?"

The agent referred to a sheaf of papers and replied:

"They had \$203.90 in the Central Savings Bank."

Q. (by Wilentz)—Does that represent all the cash in their name at that time as shown by the exhibit? A.—Yes. That is all.

Q.—What stocks did they have in their name on April 2, 1932? A.—They had 50 shares of Warner Brothers stock which cost \$987.50.

Q.—What was the market value of that stock on that day? A.—\$100. The stock was selling for \$2 a share that day.

The prosecution has indicated previously that it expects to prove \$49,907 more than Hauptmann's income passed through his banks between April 2, 1932, the date the ransom was paid, and the time of his arrest in September, 1934.

Mr. Wilentz dwelt on the amount of Hauptmann's resources on April 2, 1932.

Q. (By Wilentz)—On April 2, 1932, the total cash and stock holding of the Hauptmanns was \$203.90 in cash and \$100 in stocks? A.—Yes.

said that in the year 1933, the total stock transactions in the name of Hauptmann and his wife amounted to the staggering figure of \$256,442.14.

Under a lengthy cross-examination by Mr. Reilly, Mr. Frank admitted Hauptmann had "played the market" before the kidnaping. His operations, however, were on a much smaller scale at that time.

Mr. Frank said the defendant had no luck as a stock plunger either before or after the kidnaping. Hauptmann's net losses before the abduction of the baby amounted to \$3,304.66. On one account alone after the kidnaping ransom was paid, Hauptmann lost \$5,728.63.

Hauptmann listened to the testimony with the closest interest. So did his wife, Anna, who, attired in black, sat only five feet from her husband. Hauptmann looked embarrassed whenever Mr. Frank referred to the "beatings" he had taken in Wall Street.

The prisoner's bank accounts were disclosed in detail. They showed that his deposits on April 2, 1932, amounted to \$203.90 but after that date he had deposited \$9,073.25 in banks.

Mr. Frank was still under cross-examination when court was adjourned at 1:45 p. m.

Ladder Returned

The kidnap ladder was carried into the courtroom just as the afternoon session began, indicating the State would make a last attempt to have the ladder admitted as evidence.

Mr. Frank resumed the witness stand and Mr. Reilly continued his cross-examination. Mr. Reilly again took up Hauptmann's brokerage accounts of May, 1933. His question was:

"On the 18th of May, 1933, Hauptmann sold about \$2,500 worth of stock and bought \$2,400 worth, correct?"

"Yes."
Q.—He made a profit of \$360?
A.—Yes.

Q.—And the next day he sold stock yielding a profit of \$550?
A.—\$558 profit.

On the day after that Hauptmann's stock transactions netted \$73, Mr. Frank admitted. The witness said the defendant was leaving his profits in his account.

Profits Shown

Mr. Frank continued to point out profitable stock transactions. The records showed the carpenter had made part of May, and

"Is it not unusual for a man to buy stocks in 100-share lots?"

"No."

"Some men operating the market buy and sell in 1,000-share lots, don't they?"

"He had a debit balance of \$7,973.72."

Mr. Reilly brought out that at the beginning of that month he had a credit balance of \$3,841.79. Hauptmann also had put in \$2,225 cash on a margin call. Total transactions for the month aggregated \$50,531.

\$16,000 in Day

In July, 1933, Hauptmann's first deal came on July 3, when he made 12 sales, and his transactions for that day totaled \$16,000.

Between July 17 and July 31, Hauptmann made sales of approximately \$13,000. He had to deliver \$4,500 more margin.

Mr. Frank testified that at the end of July, 1933, Hauptmann had a debit balance of \$4,038.04.

Q.—At the beginning of August he began to unload, didn't he?
A.—Well, he sold every month.

The witness said Hauptmann made \$40 on a purchase of Bethlehem Steel in a single day, buying it August 1 for \$3,527.50 and selling it the next day.

Hauptmann did some trading in Schenley liquor stocks in August, 1933. On August 18, he bought \$3,715 worth of Schenley shares and the same day sold them for \$3,918, profiting \$203. On August 11 he bought \$9,458 worth of National Distillers and sold these shares August 21 for \$9,500 for a profit of \$142.

Deals Expanded

The testimony showed Hauptmann's transactions were growing all the time. He would buy on margin as much as 50,000 and 60,000 shares a month along about this time, late in the summer of 1933.

Q.—(By Reilly)—There is nothing unusual in a man going into Wall Street with \$5,000 or \$10,000 and trade in the market. A.—No, sir.

Q.—And if he makes a profit, that is not unusual? A.—No.

Mr. Frank said Hauptmann had a credit balance of \$1,242.41 on September 14, 1934. Hauptmann was arrested on September 19,

more than \$50,000 and was trading in 1929?"

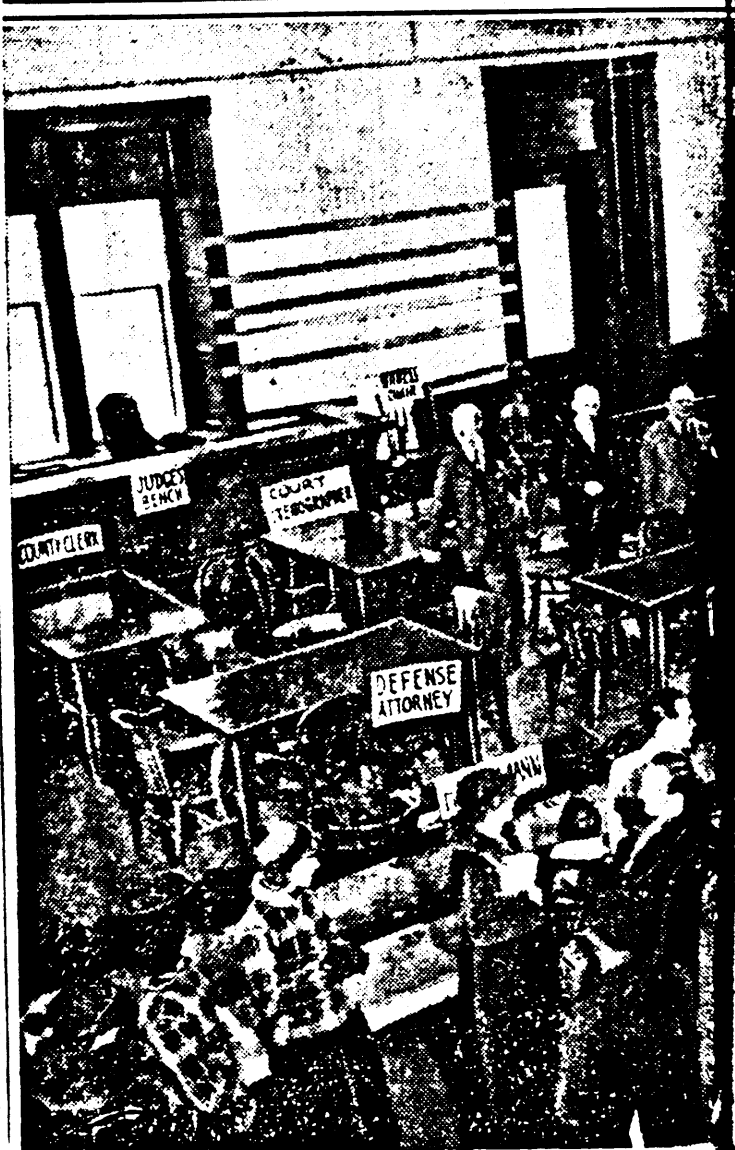

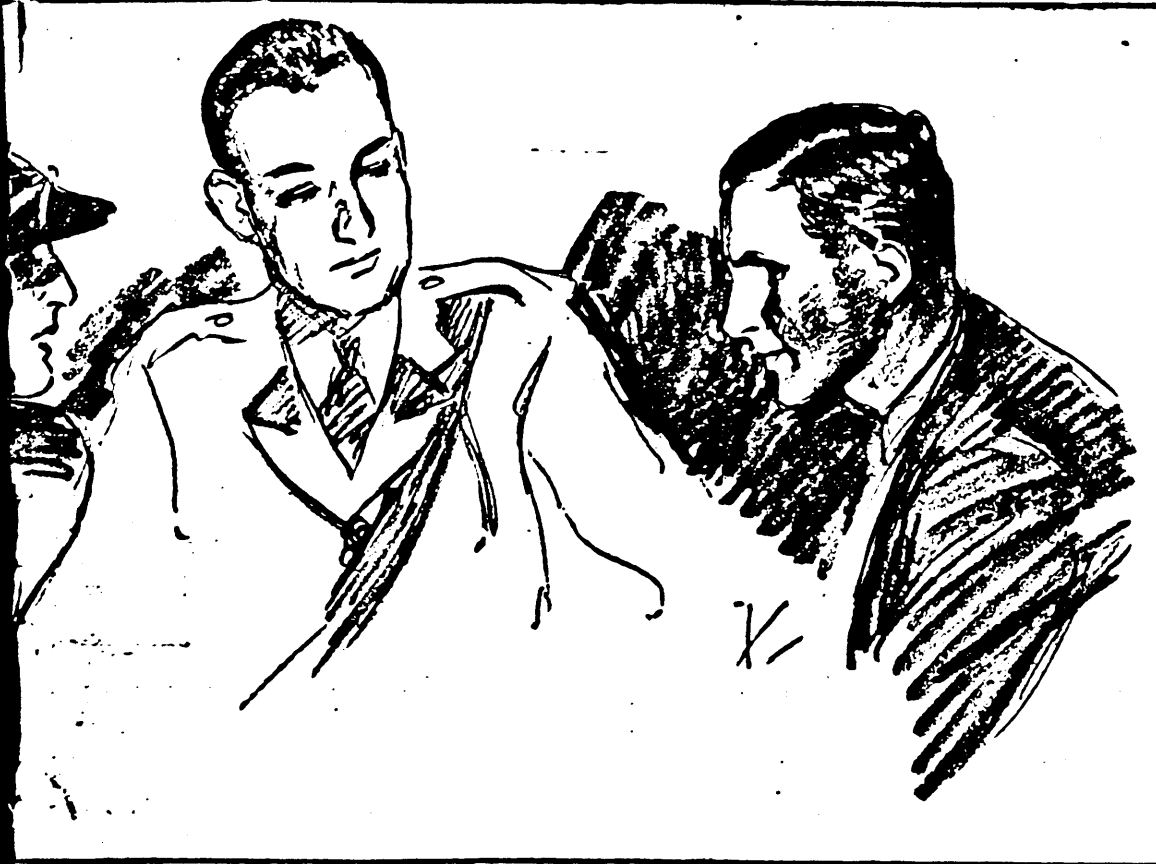

Worth \$44,486
Defense counsel objected vigor-

Hauptmann scanned photo-

Judge's bench, beside the witness. He said:

The witness complied. The court grew rather tense at this procedure. Mr. Reilly ordered:

"Write 'Richard Hauptmann,' please. Write 'Richard Hackett,' please."

The witness did so. Mr. Reilly compared the writing with the writing on the card and looked satisfied.

Mr. Reilly then asked Mr. Morton if a James Davis had not been hired before Hauptmann came on the job. Mr. Morton replied in the affirmative.

Q.—Who hired him. A.—James M. Furth.

Q.—Did you write Hauptmann's name on this card before you saw him or afterward? A.—Afterward.

Q.—Who hired him? A.—James M. Furth.

Q.—Did the men work under the Blue Eagle? A.—No.

Q.—Did they work Saturdays? A.—Yes.

Hauptmann was portrayed earlier today as a Wall Street speculator whose dealings in stocks after the date of the Lindbergh ransom payment, April 2, 1932, amounted to more than a quarter of a million dollars.

William E. Frank, accountant of the United States Internal Revenue Bureau, produced figures which not only drew a surprising picture of Hauptmann as an aggressive stock gambler but showed the difference between the assets of Mr. and Mrs. Hauptmann before the kidnaping as contrasted with what they were last September 19, when Hauptmann was arrested.

Testifying in cold, level tones, the Government agent presented some of the most damaging testimony yet given against Hauptmann when he said that on April 2, 1932—the day the \$50,000 Lindbergh ransom was paid—Hauptmann and his wife, Anna, were worth only \$303.90 in cash and securities.

But on the day of Hauptmann's arrest two and one-half years later, the Hauptmanns were found to possess \$44,486 in actual cash and securities. This included the \$14,500 ransom money found in Hauptmann's garage.

The spectators seemed surprised when Mr. Frank reeled off large sums which Hauptmann had invested in well-known stocks.

Defense 'M' Now Ha

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 2 (I.N.S.).—Bruno Richard Hauptmann, who is now "masterminding" his defense at his trial for the murder of Baby Lindbergh today came into court with clear mental picture of the State exhibits concerning his financial affairs from April 2, 1932, the date the \$50,000 Lindbergh ransom was paid, until last September 19, when he was arrested and found with \$14,600 of the tainted money.

Hauptmann spent his entire week-end studying photostatic copies of brokerage and banking records in the name of himself and his wife—records which the State was to introduce as evidence today—in the Hunterdon county jail.

How much was deposited in this account in 1934? A.—There was a single deposit of \$111.50.

Under further cross-examination by Mr. Reilly the agent admitted that Hauptmann had another bank account, before the kidnaping, which once had a balance of \$2,538.25.

Mr. Reilly stopped at times to puzzle over photostatic copies of the defendant's financial records.

Q.—Then there was the Mount Vernon Trust Company account. In whose name was that? A.—Richard Hauptmann.

Q.—When was that opened? A. June 1, 1932—two months after the ransom payment.

Account Small

Q.—And he opened that account with the large sum of \$55? A. The sum of \$55.

Mr. Reilly rattled off a list of figures and asked if they were deposits. The witness replied:

"Yes."
"And when the bank suspended in 1933 his balance was \$198.33, is that right?"

"Yes, sir."
Mr. Reilly turned to another bank, the Manhattan Savings institution. He brought out that Hauptmann's total deposits there had amounted to only \$260.

The witness consulted his records before answering questions. At one point Mr. Reilly suddenly said:

"Are you now through with bank accounts?"

Mr. Frank shot back:

"Are you?"
Everybody laughed, including Mr. Reilly.

Mr. Reilly then showed Hauptmann had closed out an account in the Bronx Borough bank with a balance of \$783 before the date of the kidnaping.

Q.—So you can say Hauptmann and his wife transacted business at banks both before and after the kidnaping? A.—Yes.

Q.—And the deposits amounted to more than \$2,800 a year before

The witness soberly corrected: "Super Power."

The spectators laughed and a grin spread over Hauptmann's face.

Mr. Reilly went into Hauptmann's various brokerage transactions, including his cross sales and repurchases. The defense attorney had a sheaf of papers in his hand as he questioned the witness.

Hauptmann, it was disclosed, had been dealing in various stocks, including Fox Film, National Cash Register, and Fairbanks preferred, in May, 1930.

Mr. Reilly said:
"Now, these transactions were all prior to the kidnaping, weren't they? Now, let's see: Here on the date of April 30, 1930, we find he purchased 100 shares of Fairbanks preferred for \$950. Isn't that so?"

"Yes, sir."

Figures Deceptive

Mr. Reilly then attempted to show the large figure involved in Hauptmann's stock transactions gave a misleading impression of the amount of money actually used because of the fact that Hauptmann had traded on margin. The lawyer asked Mr. Frank:

"The amount of stock bought on margin on the purchase side does not show the amount of money he put up, does it?"
"No, it does not show his equity in the stock."

Hauptmann continued to listen to the testimony with the greatest interest. So did his wife, Anna.

She was attired entirely in black. She sat five feet from her husband.

Inferentially Mr. Reilly criticized a brokerage house method of booking. The defense lawyer at one point remarked:

"Unaccustomed as I am to Wall Street, I cannot figure this out."

The witness, Mr. Frank, straightened him out.

Mr. Reilly showed the jury the exhibit which had confused him.

A five-minute recess was ordered during which Hauptmann and his wife chatted vigorously.

When court was reconvened,

Hotel Official Held on Charge He Hid Karpis

Miamian Faces Jury Quiz
on Claim He Aided
Kidnap Suspect.

"Joe" Adams, hotel operator and dog track manager, was arrested in Miami, Fla., yesterday by Department of Justice agents, charged with harboring Alvin Karpis, Bremer kidnaping suspect, who recently shot his way out of a police trap at Atlantic City, N. J.

The Department of Justice, which announced the arrest here, said that Karpis was reported to have stayed at his hotel in Miami.

He will be held in custody until next Monday, agents said, and at that time evidence against him will be presented to the grand jury. Later he will be taken to St. Paul, Minn., it is expected. It was in that city that Edward G. Bremer was kidnaped and held for a \$200,000 ransom, which was paid.

Karpis and Harry Campbell, who are being sought intensively by Justice agents following the Atlantic City affray, are believed to have been in Florida shortly before Fred Barker and his mother were shot to death in a skirmish with 15 Federal agents near Oklawaha, in that State.

Reports from the South to the department today, according to the Associate Press, were that no portion of the Bremer ransom had been recovered as a result of the capture of Adams.

Adams claimed he rented the winter home of his business associate, Carson Bradford, at Oklawaha, to a man and woman, later identified as Fred Barker and his mother. Adams said he handled the rent transaction for Bradford last November.

Department of Justice agents already have taken into custody a man booked as Henry "Duke" Randall, employe at the dog track operated by Adams. He is charged with harboring and concealing the fugitive.

**MIAMI MAN ARRESTED—
IN HARBORING OF KARPIS.**

Washington, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Arrest of a man named Adams in Miami on a charge of having harbored Alvin Karpis, Bremer kidnap suspect, was announced Tuesday at the Department of Justice.

The department said it was not sure of the man's first name and refused to comment on reports that a portion of the \$200,000 paid for the return of Edward G. Bremer had been recovered.

Karpis and Harry Campbell are being sought following their recent escape from a police trap at Atlantic City.

The two men are believed by the Justice department to have been in Florida shortly before fifteen Federal agents shot and killed Fred Barker and his mother, Kate, at Oklawaha, Fla.

Arthur (Doc) Barker, co-leader with Karpis of the band charged with the abduction of Bremer is under arrest in St. Paul. Twenty-two have been indicted for the kidnaping.

BARKER LINK IN SO. ST. PAUL KILLING SEEN

**Discovery of "Getaway Chart"
in Cleveland Apartment
Revealed.**

A recently discovered "getaway chart" and a copy of the Pioneer Press were seen today as clues which may link the Barker-Karpis mob with the \$30,000 South St. Paul payroll robbery August 30, 1933, in which one patrolman was killed and another critically wounded.

As a result of these leads it is expected that witnesses of the hold-up will view Arthur (Doc) Barker, held in the Ramsey county jail as one of twenty-two persons under indictment for the \$200,000 kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker. Others who authorities believe may have taken part in the robbery include Fred Barker, "Doc's" brother, recently slain by Federal agents in Florida, and Alvin Karpis, who is sought in the Bremer case.

The "getaway chart" was found by Federal operatives in an apartment in Cleveland in which three alleged women members of the Barker-Karpis gang were arrested and later released. One of the women was Mrs. Harry Sawyer, whose husband is under indictment for the Bremer abduction. Another was Winona Burdette, who was with Karpis and his gangster pal, Harry Campbell, when they shot their way from an Atlantic City police trap ten days ago. The Burdette woman still is under arrest in Atlantic City.

According to the Associated Press, the chart is of the area around South St. Paul, with tenth-mile markings of the roads.

The copy of the Pioneer Press believed to have been wrapped around a machine gun was found at the scene of the South St. Paul holdup and slaying. The paper told how the Barker-Karpis gang eluded St. Paul police when the latter raided a Vernon avenue home in search of the abductors of William Hamm Jr., St. Paul brewer kidnaped in June, 1933, and held for \$100,000 ransom. Fingerprints on beer bottles found in the house identified its occupants as Barker-Karpis mobsters.

JOE H. ADAMS ARRESTED BY U. S. AGENTS

Charge Harboring Karpis
and Transfer of Ma-
chine Gun

\$5,000 BOND GIVEN
PENDING HEARING

Gangster Is Reported To
Have Stopped At Hotel
Adams Managed

Warrants charging Joe H. Adams, general manager of the Biscayne Kennel club, with harboring and concealing Alvin Karpis, fugitive gangster, and with possessing and transferring a machine gun which was said to show the marks of much usage, were issued last night by Lloyd C. Hooks, United States commissioner.

Adams posted a \$5,000 temporary cash bond pending hearing, the date of which was not definitely set. Adams who was reported under questioning for several days by Department of Justice agents investigating the activities of Karpis in Miami, came to the federal building accompanied by his attorney, Robert G. Lane, his business associate, Carson Bradford, and John C. Knight and Bob Knight.

The group gathered in the office of W. Sanders Gramling, United States assistant district attorney, for a lengthy conference. Two United States deputy marshals and the commissioner finally were called.

Hooks emerged from the office with the warrants in his pocket. Neither he nor Mr. Gramling would discuss their contents or the topic of the conference, although they admitted that Adams had been placed under arrest. The department of justice agents were non committal. They are said to have obtained the warrants upon instructions from their superiors in Washington after it became generally known that they were investigating Adams.

One of the warrants charges that Adams, who manages a hotel in Miami, harbored Karpis in Miami last January, Karpis is reported to have

stopped at the hotel before he went to the house at 1121 N. E. Eighty-fifth street from which Karpis, Harry Campbell, Delores Delaney and Winona Burdette fled after Fred Barker and Mrs. Kate Barker, his mother, associates of Karpis, were shot and killed in a house at Oklawaha, Fla. The Oklawaha house, owned by Bradford, was said to have been rented to the Barkers by Adams, while the Barkers were guests at the hotel in Miami.

Another warrant against Adams charges that he was in possession of a machine gun, the tax on which had not been paid; and the third that he transferred the gun to Hendry "Duke" Randall without a proper form. These warrants are based on the national ammunition act adopted a year ago in connection with the federal government's war on crime. It provides that machine guns must be properly marked with numbers, and identified, and are subject to the payment of a \$200 tax upon transfer or sale.

Randall, identified as an employee in the mutuels plant of the Biscayne Kennel club, was charged last Friday with harboring and concealing Karpis for whom he is alleged to have acted as agent in the purchase of an automobile in Miami.

Four other warrants, issued by Commissioner Hooks here last week charged Delores Delaney and Winona Burdette with harboring Karpis and Campbell. These warrants were sent to Philadelphia where the two women were held following their arrest in an Atlantic City hotel, from which Karpis and Campbell escaped during a gun battle with police. The four had gone to Atlantic City after fleeing from Miami.

Karpis is the subject of a nationwide hunt as the suspected leader of the gang which kidnaped Edward G. Bremer, Minneapolis banker and brewer, and released him upon payment of \$200,000 ransom. Federal agents are said to have traced some of this money to Miami.

Evidence gathered in Miami in connection with the case will be presented to the federal grand jury which convenes at Jacksonville next Monday, it was reported.

ADAMS IS HELD; MORE ARRESTS ANTICIPATED

Bremer Extortion Money
Reported to Have Been
Recovered Here

AGENTS ARE SILENT

Harboring Karpis, Ma-

Further Miami arrests and re-
ports a substantial sum of Bremer

MORE ARRESTS OF KARPIS AIDS ARE PROMISED

Hoover Says Investigation Here Will Be Pushed by U. S.

(Special to Miami Daily News)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The arrest of all persons suspected of harboring, aiding or abetting the Karpis-Barker gang in Florida, was promised here today by J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice.

Hoover said evidence gathered against Joe Adams of Miami would be presented to the federal grand jury in Jacksonville next week, but denied earlier reports that Adams would be taken to St. Paul. The denial was interpreted as discounting rumors that some of the Bremer kidnaping ransom money had been discovered in Adams' possession.

Hoover declined to name other persons under investigation in Florida, but said:

"It is entirely possible that other persons may be indicted at Jacksonville next week. Our investigations are continuing and we have greatly enlarged our force of investigators in Florida."

Hoover said the drive against abettors of the gang would be extended to all parts of the country and persons aiding any member of the gang indicted at St. Paul for the Bremer kidnaping would be hunted down and prosecuted.

Agents Silent

As Adams Held

Further Miami arrests and reports a substantial sum of Bremer kidnap money was returned to fed-

eral men here, are latest developments in the department of justice investigation which centered here when it was learned that Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1, had been harbored here.

Joe Adams, general manager of the Biscayne Kennel club, arrested last night by federal men, was held on \$5,000 temporary bond, pending hearing after he was charged with harboring and concealing Karpis, and transferring a machine gun to Hendry "Duke" Randall, without a proper form. The federal warrants also charged that Adams was in possession of the machine gun, the tax on which had not been paid.

Robert C. Lane, attorney for Adams, early this afternoon issued the following statement:

"After conferring with Mr. Adams, I am sure that he has not violated any law or laws of the United States, and will be able to clear himself of any apparent suspicious circumstances at the proper time. He had no earthly reason to believe that these criminals were using assumed names and he has done nothing illegal or improper, and we will be able to show that to the satisfaction of all."

Despite well-founded reports of more Miami arrests pending, and the equally well-founded reports that a substantial sum of Bremer kidnap money was returned here, department of justice agents cloaked their activities in silence and refused to comment on any aspects of the case.

Adams' arrest late yesterday was a surprise move and he was in custody of federal agents before either the U. S. commissioner here or the assistant U. S. district attorney knew he was to be arrested.

After the Miami Daily News had learned from its Washington representative that a "man named Adams" had been ordered arrested here, department of justice agents, investigating the activities of Karpis in Miami, entered the federal building with Adams, accompanied by his attorney, Robert C. Lane, Adams' business associate, Carson Bradford, and John C. Knight and Bob Knight.

Behind closed doors in the office of W. Sanders Gramling, assistant U. S. district attorney, they gathered for a lengthy conference, joined later by two U. S. deputy marshals and Lloyd C. Hooks, U. S. commissioner.

Hooks later left the office with the warrants in his pocket, but none of the principals would discuss the case.

One of the warrants, it was learned, charges Adams with harboring Karpis in Miami last January, when Karpis is said to have stopped at the El Comodoro hotel, before moving to a house at 1121 N. E. 85th st. It was from this house that Karpis, Harry Campbell, Delores Delaney and Winona Burdette fled after Fred Barker and his mother were killed in a gun battle with federal men at Oklawaha.

HEAVILY ARMED FEDERAL AGENTS SWARM MIAMI

Desperadoes Wanted by Government, Objects of Wide Hunt

A large squad of department of justice agents, which heavily armed makes nightly forays from downtown hotels where they are quartered, has been active in Miami for almost a month it was learned today.

Equipped with machine guns, tear gas bombs, and automatic rifles, the squad members comb Miami from dusk to dawn for desperate characters wanted for offenses against the government.

The agents now in Miami are an independent body. They work under the direction of one of their number designated as field agent in charge, and have no connection with other local government agencies. Most of them are members of the squad which engaged Fred and Kate (Ma) Barker in a gun battle at Lake Weir, two weeks ago. The Barkers died in the five-hour exchange of shots.

Hot spots of the Miami area's night life are under the watchful eye of the federal sleuths, and one of the objects of their search it is understood is one of the few surviving members of the Dillinger mob.

Believed holed up here for the winter, this desperado who aided Dillinger and other gang members to shoot their way to freedom from the Crown Point, Ind., jail is known to be ready to kill, or die himself before submitting to capture, and the federal men, always hopeful of coming upon their quarry, go heavily armed at all times.

The activities of Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1, have been the object of exhaustive investigation by the D. J. men.

What he did, where he went, who he associated with, how he spent his money, where he obtained guns and ammunition, what part if any he took actively or passively in the Lake Weir gun battle that ended in the deaths of Fred Barker and his mother, Kate (Ma) Barker, Karpis mob members, have been gone into minutely.

Karpis and a woman supposed to be his wife spent about six weeks in Miami. So far as can be learned they lived unobtrusively in a house in the northeast section.

Both received medical attention while here, Karpis amusing himself by shooting craps with his doctor after each treatment. The doctor knew the killer as "Mr. Clements."

When the guns of the Barkers and the federal men roared for more than five hours in the Carson Bradford home at Lake Weir on Jan. 16, Karpis, and his woman companion were in the northeast section house.

Warned by a mysterious telephone call, they fled in a car alleged to have been purchased for them by a Miami go-between. They made their way to Atlantic City where they were joined by Harry Campbell, Karpis' lieutenant, and a woman companion of Campbell.

Atlantic City police located the quartet in a boardwalk hotel, after Miami police had broadcast a pick-up request for them.

Karpis and Campbell, the latter believed to be seriously wounded, shot their way to freedom, and after kidnaping a Pennsylvania doctor, stole his car and drove to the vicinity of Detroit. They are now believed to be in hiding somewhere near that city.

Their women companions were arrested, although the desperadoes tried vainly to take them away from police after their arrest. Karpis' woman friend was wounded in the leg by a bullet, which police claim was fired by Karpis.

In the meantime the federal agents push their relentless investigation in Miami.

They see much, they know much, but they tell nothing.

Federal Agents Seeking Others in Karpis Case

Hoover Says Probe Here To Continue

The arrest of Joe Adams, general manager of the Biscayne Kennel club, and part owner of El Comodoro hotel, has by no means cleaned up the local connection of the Barker-Karpis kidnap gang, it was learned yesterday as department of justice agents sought others believed to have helped in harboring Alvin Karpis, fugitive desperado, and his associates.

Evidence against Adams, accused of assisting in harboring Karpis, and also with transferring a much-used machine gun to Henry (Duke) Randall, a Biscayne Kennel club employe, now held in the county jail in default of \$25,000 bail, will be presented to the federal grand jury in Jacksonville next week.

In Washington, J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice, issued the significant statement:

"Our investigation is continuing. We have greatly increased our force in Florida, and it is possible there will be additional indictments in Jacksonville next week."

That the investigation is centering here was indicated by Hoover's statement denying reports Adams would be taken to St. Paul, the scene of the \$200,000 kidnaping of Edward J. Bremer, millionaire banker. This statement tended to break down reports that some of the Bremer ransom money had been found on Adams.

Adams had nothing to say yesterday, though Robert C. Lane, his attorney, issued the following statement:

"After conferring with Mr. Adams, I am sure that he has not violated any law or laws of the United States, and will be able to clear himself of any apparent suspicious circumstances at the proper time. He had no earthly reason to believe that these criminals were using assumed names, and he has done nothing illegal or improper and we will be able to show that to the satisfaction of all."

GETAWAY CHART LINKS KARPIS TO ST. PAUL MURDER

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 30.—[Special.]—Members of the notorious Barker-Karpis gang were linked today to the slaying of a St. Paul policeman a year and a half ago. This added charge followed finding of a minutely drawn "getaway" chart by federal agents in a Cleveland hideout of the mob.

Discovery of the chart, though announced today, occurred several months ago when three women members of the mob were arrested in Cleveland. The chart contains markings of every tenth of a mile of the road the slayers of the policeman expected to traverse in making their escape.

Policeman Leo Pavlak, 38, was mowed down by machine gun bullets in front of the South St. Paul postoffice on Aug. 30, 1933, in the sensational \$30,000 pay roll holdup of the postoffice. The markings on the chart start from immediately in front of the postoffice and lead to an adjacent state.

The chart was found in the Cleveland apartment of Mrs. Harry Sawyer. Her husband is under indictment in the \$200,000 kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer. She and two other women were arrested by federal men in that flat. One of those other women was Winona Burdette, who accompanied Public Enemies Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell when those gunmen shot their way out of a trap in Atlantic City, N. J., ten days ago. The women, however, were captured when the two outlaws escaped.

22 ARE INDICTED FOR KIDNAPING OF E. G. BREMER

Several Already Arrested

FOUR IN CONSPIRACY DEAD

Cummings Declines to Tell How
Many Are in Custody in

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (A. P.).—Indictment of twenty-two persons in connection with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer was announced today by Attorney-General Cummings. The indictment was voted by a Federal Grand Jury in St. Paul.

He made this assertion as search for Alvin Karpis, coleader of the Karpis-Barker gang named as responsible for the abduction, was being pressed without success.

The Attorney-General said the indictments were in two classes. Those accused of the kidnaping itself were named as Arthur R. (Doc) Barker, Volney Davis, Harry Campbell, Elmer Farmer, William Weaver, Harry Sawyer, William J. Harrison, Byron Bolton, Karpis, Joe Doe, Harold Allderton and Richard Roe.

Charge Conspiracy.

The second series of indictments charged a conspiracy to carry out the abduction. These defendants were: Oliver H. Berg, Joseph Patrick Moran, John Joseph McLaughlin, William Edward Vidler, Paul J. Delaney, James J. Wilson, Jess Doyle, Edna Murray, Myrtle Eaton and a person called Whitey whose true name is not known.

Commenting on the second series of indictments, the Attorney-General said:

"It is interesting to note that those named in the conspiracy indictment are charged with having conspired with several persons now dead. These are Kate (Ma) Barker, Fred Barker, Russell Gibson and George Zeigler."

It was understood at the department that several of the persons who have been arrested in connection with the case have made confessions.

Cummings would not disclose the number of those indicted who have been actually taken into custody.

KARPIS SOUGHT IN CHICAGO LAIR

CHICAGO, Jan. 23 (US).—Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell, sought by authorities for kidnaping and other crimes, have eluded a dragnet spread through Ohio, Michigan, Indiana and Illinois, but are believed to be safely hidden here, police said tonight.

The usual rumors of the outlaws being identified in many places, almost at the same time, were prevalent today. Reports from Birch Run, Mich., said two men answering the outlaws' description were seen in a small car, heavily armed. A few minutes later a bank cashier west of Peoria, Ill., reported two men resembling the outlaws had robbed a bank there and were heading toward Moline, Ill.

No definite word of either has been obtained however, since they released Dr. Horace Hunsicker in Ohio and fled with his car to Monroe, Mich., where they abandoned it.

Barker Captured.

Doc Barker for one, however, has been captured. His mother and brother, Fred, were killed by Federal agents in a gun battle at Oklawaha, Fla., several days ago.

Karpis and Harry Campbell escaped a police trap at Atlantic City last week end when they routed a squad of policemen with a blast of machine-gun fire.

A published report that Byron Bolton one of those arrested and indicted, had confessed to participation in the St. Valentine's Day massacre in Chicago in 1929 was described by Summings "as completely erroneous."

Evidence which was laid before the Grand Jury and led to the indictments consisted largely of fingerprints found at hideouts occupied by the gang at Portage, Wis.; Zumorta, Minn., and Bensonville, Ill.

Goetz Killing Explained.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 24 (U. P.).—Fred Goetz, Chicago gangster, was slain on a "ride" last March because he tried to flee with the entire \$200,000 ransom paid for the release of Edward G. Bremer, it was disclosed today on good authority.

The revelation came within twenty-four hours after reports that Byron Bolton, held here under indictment for the Bremer kidnaping, had confessed participating in the St. Valentine's Day gang massacre in Chicago. These reports were officially denied but they persisted today.

Goetz, a university graduate and an army aviator, was shot down in front of a Chicago restaurant less than a month after the ransom was paid and Bremer released.

Allegedly on the firing line against Goetz was Arthur (Doc) Barker, coleader of the Barker-Karpis gang, and one other. Barker is under two indictments in connection with the Bremer kidnaping and is under heavy guard here awaiting trial.

The United Press learned that, after payment of the ransom by Walter Magee, St. Paul contractor and close friend of the Bremer family, it was handed over to Goetz with instructions to take it to Reno, Nev.

Instead, Goetz attempted to flee with the entire amount. Arthur Barker and the other man, who may have been Alvin Karpis, pursued him, it was alleged.

It was Goetz, they said, who rented the hideout at Bensenville, Ill., where Bremer was held captive for three weeks during ransom negotiations.

Watch for Karpis.

MOLINE, Ill., Jan. 24 (A. P.).—Reports that Alvin Karpis and his companion, Harry Campbell, were headed this way, today kept law officers on guard over highways.

Moline officers were notified by Sheriff George Nash of Henry county, Ill., that two men, believed to be the fleeing gangsters, passed through LaSalle and Peru, Ill., yesterday, apparently headed for Moline.

The trail of the pair was not picked up again.

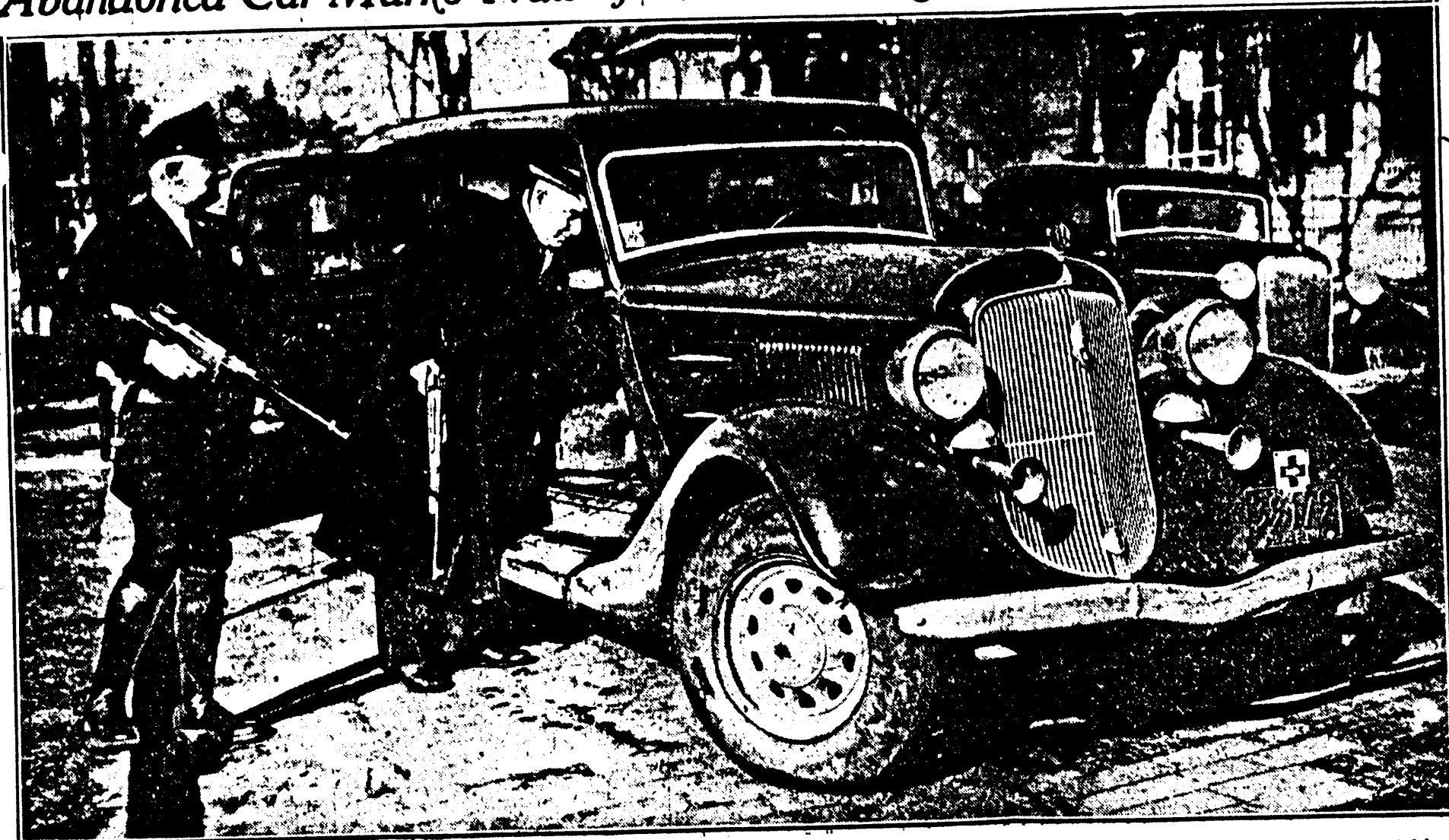

KARPIS-BARKER GANG INDICTED

Attorney General Homer S. Cummings today announced that indictments have been returned in St. Paul against the members of the notorious Karpis-Barker gang and several others in connection with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, wealthy St. Paul banker, just one year ago.

Indictments were returned by a Federal grand jury Tuesday charging 10 with the actual kidnaping of the banker and 14 others with conspiracy to kidnap.

Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. 1, leads the names of those indicted for the kidnaping. He is now the subject of a nation-wide hunt.

Three others of the Karpis-Barker gang, Arthur R. Barker, Volney Davis, and Harry Campbell, are also named. Barker was arrested by Federal agents January 8 in Chicago, when Russell Gibson, who is charged with conspiracy, was fatally wounded.

The kidnaping indictments were returned also against Elmer Farmer, Harold Alderton, William Weaver, Harry Sawyer, William J. Harrison, and Byron Bolton.

Among the 14 conspiracy indictments, four defendants have been killed in battles with Federal agents. Those four are Gibson, Kate "Ma" Barker, Fred Barker and George Zeigler. The two Barkers were killed a few days ago in Florida.

Posses Scour Illinois for Karpis, Campbell

CHICAGO—An army of state police and sheriff's posses cruised ice crusted Illinois roads with new fervor today in quest of Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell.

The chase which began in Atlantic City, N. J., Sunday when Karpis and Campbell shot their way out of a Justice Department trap turned toward Iowa after they were reported speeding west last night thru La Salle and Peru, Ill.

Police of Trivoli, Ill., and Peoria were convinced that it was Karpis and Campbell who yesterday robbed the Trivoli State Bank of \$3000 and fled in a car bearing Michigan license plates.

Both are wanted for the kidnaping a year ago of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker. Arthur (Doc) Barker, former co-leader of a Southwestern outlaw gang with Karpis and the slain Fred Barker, is under arrest in St. Paul with Byron Bolton, Elmer Farmer, Harold Allerton and James Wilson, others accused of the abduction.

Reports persisted here, despite emphatic governmental denials, that Bolton had confessed participation in the St. Valentine's Day massacre of Chicago, in which seven gangsters of the George (Bugs) Moran Gang were mowed down in a North Side garage.

In his announcement, the Attorney General explained that those under indictment are divided into two classes, those charged with the actual kidnaping and those charged with conspiring to carry out the abduction.

James J. Wilson, Moran's chauffeur.

Edna Murray, whereabouts unknown.

The identity of another person included in this class is not known. He is referred to simply as "Whitey."

New Angles Revealed.

With the names of a majority of those under indictment made public, several hitherto unknown "angles" of the Bremer case came to light.

For one thing, it was learned from a reliable source that Harry Sawyer is alleged by Federal authorities to have been the "finger man" in the abduction, pointing out the victim to his kidnapers. Although well known to St. Paul police, Sawyer

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Campbell's Sweetheart Held In \$50,000 Bail

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 24.—Hiding her face from the lens of cameras,

Winona Burdette, former radio singer and alleged sweetheart of Harry Campbell, gangster accomplice of Alvin Karpis, was held in \$50,000 bail here today. The girl had nothing to say at arraignment. She will be turned over to the federal district court in Southern California and prosecuted on charges of harboring criminals.

Karpis' alleged girl friend, Dolores Delaney, 22, held under guard at a hospital here where she is an expectant mother, will be given a private hearing this afternoon, on a similar charge.

Miss Burdette and Miss Delaney were captured in an Atlantic City hotel last Sunday after Karpis and Campbell shot their way out of a police trap. Authorities charge the girls left the Barker-Karpis gang hideout at Oklawaha, Fla., a few hours before department of justice operatives fought a six-hour gun battle there, killing Arthur (Doc) Barker and his mother.

Martin's car bore Texas license plates issued to Frank G. Bennett, Dallas, Martin admitted the plates did not rightfully belong on the car.

Pinkerton detectives in Sioux City to investigate the robbery, are expected to accompany Sioux City police to St. Paul.

U. S. CITES 12 AS KIDNAPERS OF BREMER, OTHERS CHARGED WITH AIDING IN CONSPIRACY

Sawyer Named As 'Finger Man;' Goetz Slain In 'Crossup' On Ransom, Agents Reveal.

(Pictures On Page 2.)

Harry Sawyer, successor to "Dapper Dan" Logan as St. Paul's underworld kingpin, was the "finger man" in the kidnaping last year of Edward G. Bremer, president of the Commercial State bank.

This was reported known to federal agents today as the names of 12 persons indicted Tuesday by a federal grand jury in St. Paul in connection with the Bremer "snatching" were revealed by the United States department of justice in Washington.

Charged with the kidnaping were Alvin Karpis, Arthur (Doc) Barker, Volney Davis, Harry Campbell, Elmer Farmer, Harold Allerton, William Weaver, Sawyer, William J. Harrison, Byron Bolton, "John Doe" and "Richard Roe."

Charged with conspiracy to kidnap were Oliver A. Berg, Dr. Joseph P. Moran, John J. McLaughlin, William E. Vidler, Paul J. Delaney, James J. Wilson, Jess Doyle, Edna Murray, Myrtle Eaton and a man known as "Whitey."

Barker, Farmer, Allerton, Bolton and Wilson are known to be under arrest and in the Ramsey county jail.

Meanwhile it was learned today (Continued on Page 2, Col. 2.)

that Fred Goetz, Chicago gangster, who wielded a submachine gun in the St. Valentine's day massacre in Chicago in 1929, signed his own death warrant by trying to make off with the entire \$200,000 of Bremer ransom money.

This was revealed today as deputy United States marshals and agents of the department of justice in St. Paul continued their roundup of 22 persons indicted in connection with the kidnaping of Bremer, Jan. 17, 1934.

Goetz was slain in gangster "ride" fashion in Chicago last March, less than a month after Mr. Bremer, held captive for three weeks at Bensenville, a Chicago suburb, had been released upon payment of the ransom money by Walter W. Magee, St. Paul contractor, and a close friend.

Arthur (Doc) Barker, co-leader of the Barker-Karpis gang, and an unnamed companion "caught up" with Goetz after the latter had disappeared following instructions to take the \$200,000 in "hot" money to Reno, Nev., and there exchange it in the gambling houses for currency negotiable without "heat."

Goetz is said to be the man who rented, for the Barker-Karpis gang, the hideout at which Bremer was held.

"See 'Beginning Of End.'"

Indictment of Sawyer and Myrtle Eaton, wife of Clarence (Doc) Eaton, paroled bank robber, two of the St. Paulites named, was heralded by the "G-men" as the "beginning of the end" of the gangland rule which for many years made St. Paul the "polson spot of crime" for the entire nation.

Sawyer, former proprietor of a Wabasha st. drinking place where at least two murders and a number of shootings have taken place, has been "on the lam" since shortly after the Bremer kidnaping. Members

Alleged Kill. Does Not Know Bolton

MARQUETTE, Mich., Jan. 24.—"I do not know Bolton." Thus Fred (Killer) Burke, serving a life term in Marquette prison, dismissed his connection with the St. Valentine day massacre in Chicago in 1929.

Byron Bolton, held in St. Paul in the Edward G. Bremer kidnaping, confessed that he, Burke and five others "pulled" the massacre in a Chicago garage.

of the Sawyer mob, if not Sawyer himself, have been charged in underworld gossip with "tipping off" Homer Van Meter, Dillinger gang "Tommy" expert, to police when the latter was slain at University ave. and Marion st., several months ago. Van Meter, it was said, had returned to the city to demand from Sawyer his share of about \$50,000 taken in a bank holdup at Sioux Falls, S. D., and left with Sawyer for safekeeping.

Recent underworld "grapevine" talk held that Sawyer was in jail and had been "talking" other members of the Barker-Karpis mob into jail and the grave.

Myrtle Eaton, following "Doc" Eaton's freeing from the Stillwater penitentiary, did not return to him, but for a while occupied an apartment near Portland ave. and St. Albans st. It was at this street location, while she was living there, that Ray McCord, radio operator, was shot and seriously wounded in a mysterious attack Jan. 12, 1934, by machine gunners. The attack took place five days before the Bremer kidnaping.

Farmer, Allerton Held.

Of those named for the actual kidnaping:

Karpis and Campbell, who engaged in a machine gun battle with Atlantic City police last week, are reported "somewhere in Illinois."

Farmer and Allerton are held in connection with the renting of the Bremer hiding place at Bensenville.

Davis is a fugitive.

Weaver, also a fugitive, came into notoriety in St. Paul two years ago when he jumped \$500 bail following his arrest on a gun-toting charge. Harrison has no local record.

Four Conspirators Unknown.

Of those named for conspiracy: Berg is not known in St. Paul. Dr. Moran is sought for giving medical attention to Bremer during his imprisonment.

McLaughlin, Vidler and Delaney are Chicagoans arrested following discovery of about \$3,000 of the ransom money in that city; at liberty on \$5,000 bonds each.

Doyle and Edna Murray are not known in St. Paul.

Identification of the "Whitey" named in the government's disclosure was in doubt.

In his announcement, Homer S. Cummings, attorney general, said: "It is interesting to note that the conspirators are charged with conspiring with people who since are deceased. These include Kate Barker, Fred Barker, Russell Gibson and George Zeigler."

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 24.—Fred
Goetz, Chicago gangster slain in
"ride" fashion last March, was
killed because he tried to flee with
the entire \$200,000 ransom paid for
release of Edward G. Bremer, it
was learned here today.

The revelation came within
twenty-four hours after reports that
Byron Bolton, held here under in-
dicement for the Bremer kidnaping,
had confessed participating in the
St. Valentine's Day gang massacre
in Chicago. These reports were of-
ficially denied, but they persisted
today.

Goetz, a university graduate and
an army aviator, was shot down in
front of a Chicago restaurant less
than a month after the ransom was
paid and Bremer released.

On the firing line against Goetz
was Arthur (Doc) Barker, co-leader
of the Barker-Karpis gang, and one
other gunman. Barker is under two
indictments in connection with the
Bremer kidnaping and is under
heavy guard here awaiting trial.

The United Press learned that
after payment of the ransom by
Walter Magee, close friend of the
Bremer family, it was handed over
to Goetz with instructions to take
it to Reno, Nev. There it was to
be exchanged in gambling houses
for negotiable currency.

Instead Goetz attempted to flee.
Arthur Barker and the other gun-
man, who may have been Alvin
Karpis, pursued and shot him down
as he stood in front of the res-
taurant.

Goetz may have operated on other
occasions with the Barker-Karpis

gang, federal agents here believed.
Goetz was one of those named as
a participant in the Chicago St.
Valentine's Day massacre in the re-
ported confession by Bolton.

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ILLINOIS WATCHES ROADS FOR KARPIS

Rock Island, Davenport and
Moline Call Out Police on
Word Bandit Is Near.

BANK IS ROBBED AT TRIVOLI

Fleeing Gunman and Companion
Are Blamed—Two Cities
Report Seeing Them.

CAMBRIDGE, Ill., Jan. 23.—
Scores of policemen carrying machine guns and bullet-proof shields were guarding roads throughout the Tri-City area of Rock Island, Davenport and Moline, Ill., tonight in a search for Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell. The hunt was organized hastily after these "public enemies" were reported to have sped through the towns of La Salle and Peru.

Police said they believed the desperadoes were the robbers who held up a bank at Trivoli, Ill., this afternoon and that they were now heading for the Tri-City area.

Sheriff George Nash received word from authorities at La Salle and Peru that the two gangsters were recognized as they sped through those towns just before 6 o'clock tonight. The men were driving a sedan, it was said.

The car was speeding toward Cambridge, about forty miles west of where the fugitive gunmen were last reported seen.

Alarm Is Spread Quickly.

The alarm was spread immediately throughout the district, State, county and local authorities sending forces out to watch the highways.

Police at Davenport guarded the government bridge between Rock Island and Davenport in the event the gangsters should try to cross the river there.

The bandits who held up the Trivoli Bank were immediately suspected of being Karpis and Campbell because of the Ohio license plates on their car. Karpis and Campbell had been reported fleeing over Ohio yesterday.

The bank robbers had to wait fifteen minutes before the time lock on the bank opened the vault, meanwhile holding Ralph Demars, the cashier, other bank employees and two customers at bay. When the vault opened the bandits took about \$3,000 in cash and sped away toward Peoria.

Massacre Confession Reported.

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—New evidence uncovered in the investigation of the St. Valentine's Day massacre of seven North Side gangsters in 1929 came to light tonight after published reports that Byron Bolton, now a Federal prisoner, had made a full confession, naming himself as one of the killers.

Despite emphatic denials from Department of Justice officials that Bolton had made a confession, either written or oral, and despite the fact that the new evidence tended to disprove many details of the

purported confession, the reports persisted that it had been made.

Attention was called to the fact that government officials have pursued a policy of denying evidence in their possession until they are actually ready to use it in court.

The new stories of the investigation of the massacre of the gangsters of George (Bugs) Moran brought to light the fact that Bolton's brother, John, had also been sought for participation in the crime, as had John Conroy, who was found dead in a New York flat two years ago.

The linking of Bolton with the multiple slaying did not come as a surprise to the police. Since shortly after Feb. 14, 1929, Bolton had been sought as one of two men who rented a room across the street from the garage headquarters of the Moran gang at 2,122 North Clark Street. There he is supposed to have watched for an opportunity to catch Moran and his entire gang in the garage at one time, and then call for the gangland executioners.

The motive for the slaying, as Bolton is reported to have told it, involved Frankie Uale, alias Frankie Yale, New York racketeer, reputedly hired by the North Siders to aid in the war against Al Capone over operations of a dog track in Lyons, Ill.

There police found the first main flaw in Bolton's story. It was pointed out that Uale was slain in New York on July 1, 1928, nearly eight months before the massacre took place.

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SPREAD WIDER HUNT FOR KARPIS

States and Canada Are Searching For Fleeing Bandit and Companion

(BY UNITED PRESS.)

DETROIT, Jan. 23. — A widening search for the notorious Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell, today extended the greatest mobilization of armed men since the days of John Dillinger, over five states and a portion of Canada.

The case pointed toward Chicago, where only two weeks ago a member of Karpis' outlaw gang was killed and Arthur (Doc) Barker, another of its leaders, captured.

Highways and byroads from Detroit and Cleveland to Indianapolis and Chicago swarmed with patrol cars bristling with riot and machine guns. Barriers halted traffic on every road leading from Monroe, southern Michigan town, where the trail, lost in New Jersey and again in Ohio, became hot again yesterday with discovery of a stolen automobile.

The car was that of Dr. Horace Hunsicker of Allentown, Pa., whom the outlaws, fleeing from a gun battle with federal officers in Atlantic City, forced to drive them about Pennsylvania and Ohio for hours Sunday.

Ontario provincial police co-operated by patrolling their own highways and posting extra guards at nearby border points. They thought it unlikely the fugitives could have crossed the river.

Police Inspector William Collins, directing 80 picked riflemen in a search of Detroit underworld resorts, gave more than casual attention to a report that two men resembling the hunted pair raced through Pontiac last night in an automobile bearing the license of a Grand Rapids resident.

Collins said it was almost certain, if the fugitives escaped the cordon thrown around Monroe, they would make for Chicago, where they have friends and know the terrain.

Indiana and Illinois state police joined remnants of the famous Chicago "Dillinger squad" in attempting to prevent the outlaws from gaining refuge in the Windy City's mazes. Department of justice agents have guarded known haunts of the Barker-Karpis gang about Chicago continually since the Atlantic City shooting.

Even in St. Paul, where "Doc" Barker was indicted yesterday for the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, guards were re-enforced around the stubby gangster's cell.

SAFETY DEPOSIT BOX IS SOUGHT IN FLORIDA

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 23. (UP) — A safety deposit box, in which Alvin Karpis and his henchmen were believed to have secreted cash during their six weeks' stay here, was sought today by federal agents.

They believed contents of the box, when located, might give some indication of the public enemy's present whereabouts.

Karpis and his wife, known as Dolores Delaney, have been identified as residents of Miami at the start of the current season.

The woman, it was learned, had expected the birth of a child. Her physician told agents the child was expected last week.

She purchased an infant's layette, but abandoned it in the house Karpis had rented for the winter in the north-east section.

CONCEALING KARPIS CHARGED IN WARRANT

**Bond For Suspect Known As
Hendry "Duke" Randall Is
Fixed At \$25,000**

A warrant formally charging a man known as Hendry "Duke" Randall, identified as an employe in the mutuels plant of the Biscayne Kannei club, with harboring and concealing Alvin Karpis, hunted gang leader, in Miami on January 15 was issued yesterday at the instance of department of justice agents. Lloyd C. Hooks, United States commissioner, fixed his bond at \$25,000 pending grand jury action and ordered him committed to Dade county jail.

Randall has been in custody of federal agents in a Miami hotel since Monday and was turned over to the United States marshal after several hours' questioning in the office of W. Sanders Gramling, United States assistant district attorney.

Karpis and Harry Campbell, with whom he escaped from a police trap in an Atlantic City hotel, are said to have purchased a new automobile in Miami through Randall.

The charge against Randall is similar to charges in four warrants against Winona Burdette and Dolores Delaney, who are held in Philadelphia and whose bonds total \$50,000 each pending action of the federal grand jury which meets in Jacksonville next month.

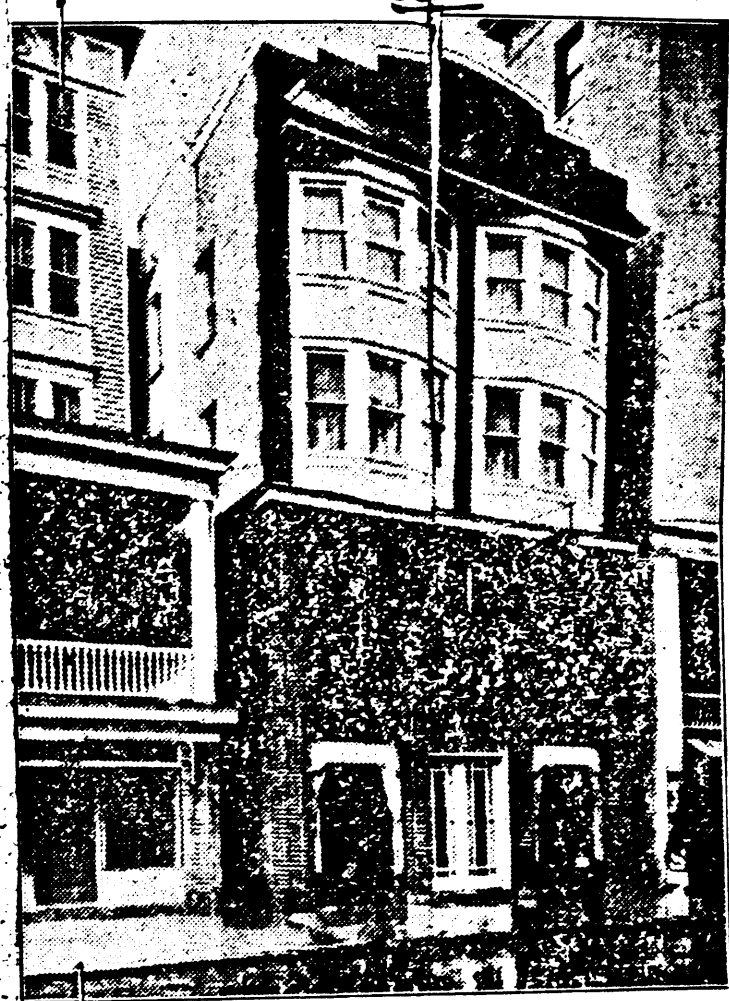

Gang Girl's Bail is Set At \$50,000

Surrounded by a squad of federal agents, each armed with a sub machine-gun, Winona Burdette, former radio singer and sweetheart of Harry Campbell, accomplice of the widely sought Alvin Karpis, incumbent public enemy No. 1, today was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner William Wacker in federal building here and was held in \$50,000 bail.

The girl had nothing to say at the arraignment. She will be turned over to the federal district court in southern Florida and prosecuted on charges of harboring criminals.

Fearing an attempt might be made to liberate the gang moll, federal agents, armed with machine-guns, surrounded her as they marched from the U. S. marshal's office to the hearing room. Throughout the arraignment, the armed agents encircled the defendant, who hid her face from the lens of newspaper cameras.

Private Hearing for Dolores

Karpis' moll, Dolores Delaney, held under guard at a hospital here as she is an expectant mother, will be given a private hearing later. Commissioner Wacker and federal agents will visit her bedside for the proceedings. She also is charged with harboring criminals.

The girls were captured in a small Atlantic City hotel after their lovers escaped from a police trap by promiscuous use of submachine-guns. In trying to arouse the girls to the danger and get them to join them in flight, Karpis poured a barrage of bullets through their hotel-room door, one of the slugs striking the Delaney girl in the leg.

R. George Harvey, head of the bureau of investigations, department of justice, here, asked Wacker to set \$50,000 bail for the Burdette girl and indicated a similar amount will be requested to assure authorities that the other girl will remain behind lock and key.

The Delaney girl expects the stork's arrival within a few days.

The girls and the gangsters left the Barker-Karpis gang's southern hideout at Oklawaha, Fla., a few hours before federal agents descended upon it and fought a six-hour gun battle with Arthur (Doc) Barker and his mother, killing both of them.

KARPIS HUNTED IN ILLINOIS; ROADS BLOCKED

Gangster Reported Seen; Net Is Drawn.

Moline, Ill., Jan. 23.—[Special.]—Policemen carrying machine guns and bullet proof shields were guarding roads throughout the Tri-City area tonight in a search for Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell, which was hastily launched after the quick shooting public enemies were reported to have sped through the towns of La Salle and Peru.

It is believed the much sought desperadoes were the robbers who held up a bank at Trivoli this afternoon and that they are now heading for the Rock Island, Davenport, and Moline area.

Report Gangsters Are Seen.

Sheriff George Nash received word from authorities at La Salle and Peru that the two gangsters were recognized as they sped through those towns shortly before 6 o'clock tonight. The men were driving a Chevrolet sedan, it was said.

The speeding car was headed toward Cambridge, which is about 40 miles west of where the fugitive gunmen were reported seen.

The alarm immediately was spread throughout the district, state, county and local authorities sending well armed forces out to watch the highways the two public enemies are expected to traverse.

Guard Davenport Bridge.

Police at Davenport, Ia., closely guarded the government bridge between Rock Island and Davenport in the event the gangsters try to cross the river there.

The bandits who held up the Trivoli bank immediately were suspected of being Karpis and Campbell because of the Ohio license plates on the car used by the bank robbers. The widely sought desperadoes were reported fleeing over Ohio yesterday.

The bank robbers had to wait 15 minutes before the time lock on the bank opened the vault, meanwhile holding Cashier Ralph Damars at bay. When the vault opened, the bandits took about \$3,000 in cash and speeded toward Peoria.

Seize Illinoisan in Hunt.

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 23.—[Special.]—A new figure, James Wilson of Spring Valley, Ill., was being held in the Bremer kidnaping case today. Two others were reported detained for questioning. One had been seized in an automobile carrying four bullet holes in its body and a smashed windshield.

The automobile was seized on a downtown street. Police refused to discuss what possible connection the driver had with the kidnaping, but disclosed that the other man arrested had been questioned once before about the case. In the car they found a registration card made out to Martin Sims, Secor hotel, Toledo. Wilson was reported as among the dozen persons named in secret indictments by a federal grand jury yesterday. It was said he is charged with having aided in the conspiracy to kidnap Edward H. Bremer, St. Paul banker, held for twenty-three days a year ago until he paid \$200,000 ransom.

KARPIS FLEES ILLINOIS POSSE

Armed posses of hundreds of policemen and citizens ranged through the country between La Salle and Moline in west-central Illinois last night after Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell escaped sheriff's men at La Salle.

Posses blocked roads leading into the tri-cities of Rock Island, Moline and Davenport and searched the countryside around ten other towns searching for the nation's No. 1 outlaw and his companion in their four-day cross-country flight, starting with their escape in a gunfight Sunday with Atlantic City police.

GUARDS PUT AT RIVER

Sheriff George Nash of Henry County flashed Moline that the fugitives had got through him, and, at his suggestion, guards were established at bridges crossing the Mississippi River into Iowa.

Presence of the gangsters in that part of the country indicated that it was Karpis and his companion who, earlier in the day, held two bank officials and two customers under guns for fifteen minutes until time locks let them in to snatch \$2,750 from the vault of the Trivoli State Bank, near Peoria.

USE OHIO LICENSE TAGS

The robbers were in a coach bearing Ohio licenses. Karpis and Campbell passed through that state Monday.

The next trace of them before they were reported in Illinois was when their stolen getaway car was found abandoned Tuesday at Monroe, Mich.

INDICT 22 IN BREMER KIDNAPING

Washington, Jan. 24 (AP).—Indictment of 22 persons, in connection with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, by a federal grand jury in St. Paul was announced today by Atty. Gen. Cummings.

He made this assertion as search for Alvin Karpis, coleader of the Karpis-Barker gang named as responsible for the abduction, was being pressed without success.

The attorney general said the indictments were in two classes.

Those accused of the kidnaping itself were named as Arthur R. (Doc) Barker, Volney Davis, Harry Campbell, Elmer Farmer, William Weaver, Harry Sawyer, William J. Harrison, Byron Bolton, Alvin Karpis, Joe Doe, Richard Roe and Harold Alderton.

The second series of indictments charged those named with having conspired to carry out the abduction.

Defendants named were: Oliver H. Berg, Joseph Patrick Moran, John Joseph McLaughlin, William Edward Violer, Paul J. Delaney, James J. Wilson, Jess Doyle, Edna Murray, Myrtle Eaton, and a person called "Whitey" whose true name is not known.

"Killer" Burke Silent in Massacre Confession

Fred (Killer) Burke stubbornly refused today to discuss the reported confession by Byron Bolton naming him as one of the six assassins in the St. Valentine's day massacre of 1929.

The notorious machine gunner, now a lifer in the Michigan branch prison at Marquette, growled a curt "I'll make no statements" and strode out of the warden's office after being told of the confession.

The fact that Burke did not give the flat No to the accusations was interpreted as adding credence to reports of the confession which have been denied by department of justice officials. In fact, the belief had arisen that the federal government might use Bolton's story to send Al Capone to the electric chair.

Bolton, in his reported confession,

attributed the vicious killing of the seven George (Bugs) Moran mobsters to the Capone mob. America's first public enemy No. 1 now is serving time at Alcatraz for income tax evasion. It was said that sticking this murder rap on Capone would end all future worry about "Scar-face."

BROTHER ALSO SOUGHT

Another development backing up the belief that Bolton had made a detailed accounting of the massacre came from the police themselves. It became known that they had not only been seeking Bolton as the "finger man" in the mob murder, but also wanted to question his brother, John, about the crime.

The Bolton brothers and Robert Conroy, who was rubbed out in New York two years ago, were regarded as suspects shortly after police started working on the case. Byron Bolton was reputed to have admitted renting a room across the street from the Moran gang's garage headquarters in which the wholesale murder occurred.

Reports of the confession were read to him. Permitting not the slightest sign of emotion to cross his face, Burke replied: "I'll make no statements," and walked out of the office.

While federal agents emphatically ridiculed the reports that Bolton had told all, Chief of Dets. Sullivan viewed the confession itself as "possible and containing a certain degree of logic, but not any too probable."

Karpis is accused as a kidnaper in the Bremer case. Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, was taken by a gang and held prisoner in a house in Bensenville, 19 miles west of Chicago, for three weeks until a ransom of \$200,000 was paid for his release.

That happened in January, 1934. It has taken a year for the law to get close enough to Karpis to shoot at him. ...ner at St. Paul, are among the persons charged with directing the actual kidnaping.

Karpis has been sought by police and government throughout the nation since he shot his way out of a police trap at Atlantic City, N. J., earlier this week.

Fred Barker and his mother, "Ma" Barker, who were shot to death last week in a machine-gun battle with federal agents in Florida, would have been among those indicted had not death intervened, it was revealed.

Cummings' Comment.

Attorney-General Homer S. Cummings, commenting on the indictments, said:

"It is interesting to note that those named in the conspiracy indictment are charged with having conspired with several persons now deceased."

He mentioned the two Barkers, Gibson and Goetz.

The inference was left by department officials that several of the persons who have been arrested in connection with the case have made confessions.

The attorney-general would not disclose the number of those indicted who are actually in custody. Evidence given the jury consisted largely of fingerprints found at hideouts occupied by the gang at Postage, Wis.; Zumorta, Minn., and Bensenville, Ill.

Seized in Chicago.

McLaughlin, Vidler and Delaney were seized last April in Chicago, where McLaughlin had long been a political power. The three were accused of passing part of the Bremer ransom money.

They were removed to St. Paul in bonds of \$100,000. These bonds were later reduced to \$30,000 each. The men gained their liberty. The government plans to rearrest them and have them arraigned under the new indictment.

In view of the fact that Goetz was shot and killed in Cicero some weeks before McLaughlin was seized in Chicago, there was speculation whether an argument over a splitup of Bremer ransom may have brought his death.

Bremer was kidnaped Jan. 17, 1934. He was held captive for twenty-two days, some of the time at Bensenville, a Chicago suburb. Then contact was established with the kidnapers and \$200,000 in \$5 and \$10 bills was handed over to them on a lonely Iowa road. Bremer, after his release, told a harrowing tale of the brutality of his abductors.

Moran Long Sought.

Government agents have been hunting the wily "Doc" Moran ever since the seizure of McLaughlin. They believe that he can reveal some of the Karpis-Barker gang's activities not only in the Bremer kidnaping but also in the \$100,000 abduction of William A. Hamm, St. Paul brewer.

Government men said that they had definitely linked Moran and McLaughlin in the circulation of Bremer kidnaping money. They learned that a room used by McLaughlin in a hotel on Chicago's northwest side had been rented by Moran. The seizure of McLaughlin, they said, was the signal for Moran's abandonment of his apartment and office in Chicago.

Plans Rushed For Trial of 8 In Bremer Plot

'Doc' Barker Had 21 Aids
in \$200,000 Kidnaping,
U. S. Will Charge.

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 24 (AP).—Federal authorities today revealed for the first time the full magnitude of the \$200,000 Edward G. Bremer kidnap plot as they pushed plans for trial of 8 of 22 persons indicted in the abduction.

Five of them, including Arthur (Doc) Barker, coleader of the Karpis-Barker gang alleged to be executors of the plot, are held in jail here; three others, named as having handled part of the huge ransom, are free on bond.

United States District Attorney George F. Sullivan said tonight this group would go on trial in the April term of the Federal district court here. Attorney General Cummings, in Washington, made the announcement of the long list of those indicted, two days after the grand jury here completed consideration of the case.

Meantime, it was reported here, but without verification from Washington officials, that another of the alleged conspirators was killed shortly after the kidnaping because he "talked too much." He is Fred Goetz, slain in Chicago.

CHICAGO—Harry Sawyer, once a satellite to John Dillinger, Alvin Karpis and the Barker brothers, was revealed by Federal sources today as the "finger man" in the \$200,000 Edward G. Bremer kidnaping.

Federal operatives said he studied Bremer's daily routine, learned his wealth and gave the kidnapers information which enabled them to seize the banker. With 20 others, Sawyer was indicted by a special Federal grand jury at St. Paul Tuesday.

Former underworld allies of Sawyer have issued orders for his execution in the belief he gave Federal agents information that sent Homer Van Meter into a police death trap, resulted in the slaying of Fred Barker and his mother, capture of Arthur (Doc) Barker, capture of Byron Bolton, and the slaying of Russell Gibson.

But Federal men say they are anxious to locate Sawyer as any underworld agent. He disappeared after the \$50,000 robbery of the Securities Bank of Sioux Falls, S. D. Van Meter was trying to collect his part of the loot from Sawyer when police killed him.

Another disclosure made yesterday was that Fred Goetz, Chicago gangster taken for a "ride" last March, was killed because he tried to escape with the entire \$200,000 Bremer ransom.

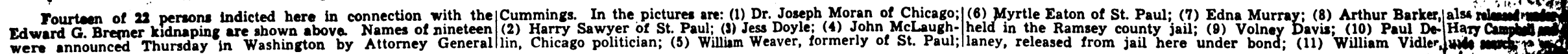

known here. The night of August 2, 1932, when Chief of Police Thomas E. Dill had ordered a roundup of gunmen and hoodlums, Weaver and James E. Colton were arrested, both armed.

Arrested Near Sawyer Place.

The arrests took place during a brawl in the rear of a speakeasy at 545 Wabasha street, then operated by Sawyer.

Subsequently, a St. Paul business man, said to have been influenced by a request from Sawyer, "went to the front" for the two men. They were released on a total of \$500 bail for appearance in court five days later. They jumped the bond.

A year later, Colton, under the name of Clarence Colton, was arrested in connection with the robbery of the Third Northwestern National bank in Minneapolis. He was taken in company with others who were convicted of the robbery, but he was acquitted.

After John Dillinger escaped from an apartment on Lexington avenue last year, Department of Justice agents investigating the case shot and fatally wounded Eddie Green, St. Paul gangster, who according to the agents confessed a part in aiding Dillinger's escape. When he was shot, Green had an auto the license numbers of which were registered to "E. W. Coulton," said to be a brother of Clarence Colton.

Auto Partially Identified.

Partial hookup between the bullet-pierced car found here and the Sioux City robbery has been established through telegrams. Chief of Police M. J. Culligan announced Thursday that two bottles of jeweler's acid and a set of jeweler's scales discovered in the car in which Martin was arrested were stolen from a New York salesman in the Iowa city Tuesday. A telegram from G. F. Wheelock, chief of detectives at Sioux City, states that the auto used in the holdup resembles the one seized here.

The group arriving today will attempt to establish a definite connection between the car and the robbery. Martin has insisted he is a Chicago bootlegger. Arrested with Martin was Russell (Flea) Husten, St. Paul bootlegger.

Despite denial by Department of Justice officials that a reported confession by Bolton of his part in the Chicago St. Valentine's day massacre, in 1929, the prisoner's alleged story was being further investigated Thursday by Lieutenant Otto Erlanson of Chicago's homicide squad, the Associated Press revealed.

Dispute Over Facts.

The lieutenant, who has devoted much of his time to the massacre since the seven henchmen of George (Bugs) Moran were executed, said the purported disclosures were substantially correct. Other officials reported they found several discrepancies in the tale, however.

Bolton was supposed to have named Fred Burke, Murray Humphreys, Claude Maddox, Gus Winkler, Fred Goetz and himself as the slayers.

"If Burke would talk," Lieutenant Erlanson said, "the whole case would be cleared up."

But Burke, serving a life sentence for murder in the Michigan state prison at Marquette, refused to discuss the case.

Lieutenant Erlanson said a letter addressed to Bolton had been found in the room overlooking the massacre scene and that he fitted the description of the man who had rented the quarters.

Names of nineteen of the 22 persons indicted here for the Bremer kidnaping and announced by Attorney General Cummings are in two classes, those charged with the actual kidnaping and those charged with conspiring to commit the crime. The complete list follows:

Those in the first class:

Harry Sawyer, St. Paul bootlegger sought by authorities since last summer.

Arthur (Doc) Barker, leader of the Barker-Karpis gang now in jail here.

Alvin Karpis, another leader of

the gang who shot his way out of an Atlantic City police trap Sunday.

Harry Campbell, Karpis' partner in the Atlantic City battle.

Elmer Farmer, in jail here.

Harold Alderton, in jail here.

Byron Bolton, in jail here.

Volney Davis, whereabouts unknown.

William Weaver, whereabouts unknown.

William J. Harrison, whereabouts unknown.

Two other men included in this class are under indictment merely as "John Doe" and "Richard Roe," and authorities refuse to disclose their identities.

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**GOVERNMENT KIDNAPING (BREMER)
 KIDNAPER SHIELDS**

Any Who Protect Karpis Gangsters Will Face Criminal Proceedings.

Warning that criminal proceedings will be launched against anyone harboring any of those indicted for the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, was issued today by the Department of Justice.

Department officials pointed out that this was the purpose of announcing the names of nineteen of the twenty-two persons named in the abduction indictments returned here this week by a Federal grand jury.

They expressed belief that, with the names known, the defendants still at liberty will have difficulty in finding hiding places, as those to whom they might otherwise turn for concealment will have a justifiable fear of the consequences.

Although making every effort to round up the remaining suspects in the Bremer abduction, which was perpetrated in January, 1934, Department of Justice agents also are giving their attention to the kidnaping of William Hamm Jr., St. Paul brewer, who was abducted the previous summer.

In the Chicago area particularly, the Associated Press reported, authorities were keeping a sharp lookout for Karpis and Campbell. A trap set for the gunmen at Moline, Ill., after they were believed seen traveling in that direction following a Trivoli, Ill., bank robbery Wednesday, remained empty. This led police to conclude the pair had turned toward Chicago in the hope of eluding the intensified search.

Other moves on the crime front Thursday were:

Revelation here that Fred Goetz, slain Chicago gangster, was killed by the Barker-Karpis gang because he "talked too much" about the \$200,000 kidnaping of the St. Paul banker.

Word that former underworld allies of Harry Sawyer, St. Paul bootlegger, have issued orders for his "execution" in the belief that he has given several "tips" to police.

Announcement that witnesses of the \$125,000 Sioux City gem robbery will reach St. Paul today in an attempt to identify a bullet-torn car found here and the driver, Harry Martin.

Goetz was killed a few weeks after Bremer was released. He is said to have been one of the original plotters of the kidnaping. Sawyer also is alleged to have studied the banker's actions closely

for several weeks before the crime and to have been the "finger man" in the case.

Federal officials, it was learned, were told by Byron Bolton, held in the Ramsey county jail here, that Goetz, a friend of his, "talked too much about the abduction" and that this displeased other members of the gang, particularly Arthur (Doc) Barker, co-leader of the gang, also in jail here, and Karpis.

Four Here "Talked Freely."

It was also learned that Bolton and three others in jail here, have "talked freely" concerning their respective roles in the abduction. The others are Harold Allderton, in whose home at Bensenville, Ill., Bremer allegedly was held prisoner; Elmer Farmer, who operated a tavern five blocks from the kidnap hide-out, and James J. Wilson, chauffeur for Dr. Joseph P. Moran, Chicago physician. Dr. Moran, who was reported to have performed "face lifting" operations for members of the gang and to have tried to conceal their finger-prints through surgery, is among those indicated but still at large.

Contrary to earlier report, Goetz was not killed because he attempted to flee with the Bremer ransom money, it was said. The same source stated that Barker, whose brother, Fred, and mother were slain by Federal agents in Florida last week, has not confessed anything to Federal agents.

Barker, arrested in Chicago the night Russell Gibson, gang member, was killed by Federal agents, likewise has not revealed any part he allegedly played in the crime and contrary to previous reports, did not betray his mother and brother.

Tavern Was Meeting Place.

Members of the kidnaping gang, it was learned, would assemble in Farmer's tavern while Bremer was held prisoner to make "contact" with each other, choosing to congregate there rather than run the risk of meeting in Allerton's house.

Sawyer, reports said, is accused by the underworld of having given information that sent Homer Van Meter into a police death trap here this summer, resulted in the slaying of Fred Barker and his mother, the capture of "Doc" Barker and Bolton and the killing of Gibson. He disappeared after the robbery of the Securities bank of Sioux Falls, S. D.

Records here show William Weaver, named as one of the kidnapers, has a criminal record and forfeited bond here. This was regarded as an indication of a tieup between the kidnap gang and Sawyer.

Weaver, records show, was committed in 1925 to the Oklahoma state penitentiary for murder. How he obtained his release is not

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U. S. to Charge Karpis Mobsters Kidnaped Hamm

Justice Department Prepares Evidence Linking Abductions of Brewer and Bremer for Presentation to Federal Grand Jury Here; Will Seek Indictments of 10 or More Cited Wednesday in Bremer Case.

McLAUGHLIN SAID TO HAVE CONFESSED ARRANGEMENTS TO PASS RANSOM MONEY

Washington, Jan. 25.—Indictments against ten or more members of the Barker-Karpis mob charging them with the \$100,000 abduction of William Hamm are to be sought by the Federal government, it was indicated here today.

Evidence that links the Hamm and Edward G. Bremer cases as the work of the same gang is being given final touches in the Department of Justice preparatory to turning it over to George F. Sullivan, United States attorney in St. Paul for presentation to the Federal grand jury.

In all probability indictments charging conspiracy to abduct Hamm will be sought against four Chicagoans who were indicted Wednesday in St. Paul as conspirators in the Bremer case. They are John J. (Boss) McLaughlin, Dr. Joseph Patrick Moran, William Vidler and P. J. Delaney.

Information to Sullivan is expected to name the same principals for the Hamm case that were indicted in the Bremer kidnaping and implicate the four Chicagoans for the handling of the ransom money. The government is said to be preparing to press for these indictments soon.

In confessing his part in Bremer's abduction, McLaughlin, according to the Department of Justice, said he first contacted Frank Wright in a Chicago hotel lobby and was introduced by him to two individuals known as "Izzy" and "Slim." Through them he is supposed to have arranged to trade the ransom money on a 5 per cent commission basis with the understanding, given him by "Izzy" and "Slim," that the first \$100,000 to be handled would be Hamm money and that \$200,000 paid by Bremer's release would be forthcoming. None of the Hamm money has been found.

Further, Department of Justice inquiry has disclosed that "Izzy" and "Slim" met in Chicago hotel rooms arranged for by a Dr. Joseph Patrick Moran, now a fugitive from justice. Vidler and Delaney already are under indictment for passing in Chicago ransom money they said

Gangsters Held In Jail Are Viewed By Vic- tims Of "Jobs."

John DeCourcy, St. Paul criminal lawyer, today was granted permission to interview Arthur (Doc) Barker in the Ramsey county jail, accompanied by agents of the federal department of justice, to explain that he had been retained in Barker's behalf. Mr. DeCourcy, granted this right by Federal Judge M. M. Joyce, refused to state who had retained him.

St. Paul, once the nation's "poison spot" of crime, today became the Mecca toward which dozens of kidnapping, shooting and holdup victims and witnesses turned their eyes for solution of "jobs" which netted more than \$1,000,000 in loot and ransom and cost a half dozen lives.

As the federal government proceeded secretly about its self-appointed task of cleaning up St. Paul's underworld, evidence trickled in to the hands of agents which revealed that a majority of major middle west crimes of the last several years had been planned in this city.

Search for the fugitive indicted in the kidnaping of Edward G.

Bremer Jan. 17, 1934, continued throughout the nation as Arthur (Doc) Barker and Byron Bolton, machine-gunning gangsters now held in Ramsey county jail, were viewed by a number of persons for possible identification in the earlier kidnaping of William Hamm, Jr., and in other crimes.

A strict silence was maintained by Harold Nathan, chief aid to J. Edgar Hoover, national head of the investigation division of the department of justice, as to whether any

of the efforts had resulted in a positive identification.

Major Jobs Planned Here.

Among major "jobs" planned in St. Paul, reports hold federal agents have learned, are:

The \$100,000 kidnaping of Mr. Hamm June 15, 1933.

The \$200,000 kidnaping of Mr. Bremer Jan. 17, 1934.

The \$46,000 holdup of the Securities National bank of Sioux Falls, S. D., March 6, 1934.

The \$52,000 holdup of the First National bank of Mason City, Ia., March 13, 1934.

The \$32,000 holdup of the First National bank of Brainerd, Minn., Oct. 13, 1933.

The \$100,000 heldup of the
Third Northwestern National
bank of Minneapolis, Dec. 16,
1932.

The \$30,000 holdup of a Swift & Co. payroll messenger at South St. Paul, Aug. 25, 1933.

The \$80,000 holdup of an American Railway Express Co. truck in St. Paul, Sept. 11, 1933.

"Badly wanted" by the federal government in connection with the investigation is Harry Sawyer, one of 22 persons indicted for the Bremer kidnapping, former gangland kingpin in St. Paul, and now allegedly a fugitive. Although the federal men insist Sawyer is not under arrest, underworld reports hold that he has been apprehended and has "talked." A gangland order to "get Sawyer" has gone out.

Mapped Plans At Hogan's.

It was at the now notorious Wabasha st. bootleg parlor of "Dapper Dan" Hogan, "the hot dog man," that "big shots" in the nation's underworld gathered to map their plans, to split up the proceeds and to arrange for hideouts and protection, the federal government's in-

formation reveals, it was learned today.

Two murders at that gangland hideout, and several shootings, focused too much public attention on it after the auto-starter-bomb slaying of Hogan in 1928, at which time Sawyer, a former convict, succeeded to his throne.

The place was the hangout of such notorious characters as Eddie Green and Homer Van Meter, slain in St. Paul in the Dillinger gang roundup; Tommy Carroll, another Dillinger gangster, slain at Waterloo, Ia.; "Doc" Eaton, paroled from a life sentence for bank robbery, whose wife Myrtle also is indicted in the Bremer case; both Arthur and the late Fred Barker; Alvin Karpis, William Weaver, alias Donald Phoenix (Arthur Barker, Karpis and Weaver all are named in the Bremer indictment); Charles Fisher, postoffice bandit; Bobby Walker and other members of the old Denver mint gang; George (Machine Gun) Kelly, George Bates and other members of the Urschel kidnap mob and countless other gangland "big timers."

Allowed To Stay Here.

For many years these gangsters made St. Paul their rendezvous, following the practice in vogue since the regime of Police Chief John J. O'Connor. O'Connor's theory of crime prevention—in his own home town—was to permit the city to be used as a haven of refuge and a headquarters so long as the visitors "pulled no jobs" locally.

It was the continuation of this practice by other police chiefs during and through the prohibition era which was largely responsible for the brand put upon the city by Atty. Gen. Homer S. Cummings.

While the federal government "is not interested" in the local crimes in which the Barker-Karpis mobsters and their satellites have been involved it was significant today that the several prisoners in Ramsey county jail were being viewed by officers and business men of a number of middle west cities.

In the event of failure of the federal government to obtain convictions for the Bremer kidnaping it was held certain local charges would be filed at once.

HAMILTON DEATH STORY NOT ACCEPTED BY U. S.

Washington, Jan. 25.—(P)—Justice Department officials said today reports that John Hamilton, outstanding member of the Dillinger gang, is dead, are arriving with increasing frequency from various underworld sources.

They asserted, however, that they would not accept this as accurate until discovery of Hamilton's body.

Hamilton, a native of Byng Inlet, Ontario, was a prison pal of Dillinger in Indiana and later was at the side of the notorious gang leader in various escapades throughout the Midwest.

ANGERED PALS KILLED GOETZ

He Tried to Steal Entire
\$200,000 Bremer Ran-
som, Is Disclosed

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 24.—Fred Goetz, Chicago gangster slain in "ride" fashion last March, was killed because he tried to flee with the entire \$200,000 ransom paid for release of Edward G. Bremer, it was learned today.

The revelation came within 24 hours after reports that Byron Bolton, held here under indictment for the Bremer kidnaping, had confessed participating in the St. Valentine's Day gang massacre in Chicago.

Goetz, a university graduate and an army aviator, was shot down in front of a Chicago restaurant. The gunmen were Arthur (Doc) Barker, co-leader of the Barker-Karpis gang, and one other gunman. Barker is under heavy guard here awaiting trial.

After payment of the Bremer ransom by Walter Magee, St. Paul contractor, and close friend of the Bremer family, it was handed over to Goetz with instructions to take it to Reno, Nev. There it was to be exchanged in gambling houses for negotiable currency.

Instead Goetz attempted to flee with the entire amount.

9 MACHINE GUNNERS GUARD KARPIS' GIRL AT HOSPITAL 'COURT'

Winona Burdette and Dolores Delaney Held in
\$50,000 Bail.

A pretty 19-year-old blonde sat on a hospital cot smoking a cigarette yesterday while nine worried Federal agents, armed with machine guns, helped a U. S. Commissioner hold her in \$50,000 bail.

The agents temporarily turned the maternity ward of Hahnemann Hospital into an armed camp, for fear friends of Alvin Karpis, U. S. "Public Enemy No. 1," might try to rescue his sweetheart, Dolores Delaney. Five machine gunners ranged themselves around the bed; four more paced up and down the hall outside Room 1018.

Dolores, due to become a mother in a few days, was held for trial in Florida, on a charge of "harboring and concealing" Karpis. The girl has a bullet wound in her leg, received when Karpis and his pal, Harry Campbell, shot their way out of a police trap in Atlantic City Sunday night.

Under Close Guard.

U. S. Commissioner William S. Wacker read the warrant for the girl's arrest on the Federal charge. She smiled and said, "Yes, I understand," and bail was fixed.

The girl is under constant guard, and no one is allowed to see her except doctors and nurses. The armed guard even answers the room telephone.

Wacker yesterday held Campbell's girl, Winona Burdette, 21, in the same bail on the same charge. Her hearing was conducted in the Grand Jury room at the Federal building for greater safety. Before she was arraigned Federal agents, carrying machine guns, searched the room. They stood guard during the brief proceedings.

Feared Gang Rescue.

The commissioner asked R. George Harvey, head of the Bureau of Investigation here, why Winona was not held in Atlantic City, where she was arrested.

"We had to bring this woman to Philadelphia," Harvey answered, "for fear some of her mob would try to free her. We have better facilities here for keeping her safe."

No one offered to post bail for the young women.

The girls will be returned to Florida for trial as soon as Dolores can be moved.

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GIRL FRIENDS HELD FOR HIDING BANDITS

Karpis' and Campbell's
Chums Go to Miami;
Arraigned in Hospital

A 22-year-old expectant mother and a blonde 21-year-old former radio entertainer were held in \$50,000 bail each here yesterday, charged with "harboring and concealing" two killer gangsters.

Dolores Delaney, sweetheart of Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. 1, lay on a cot in Hahnemann Hospital where she expects to bear Karpis' child in a day or two, and smoked a cigarette as U. S. Commissioner William S. Wacker held her for the Federal District Court at Miami, Fla.

Armed U. S. Agents Stand By

In the room were nine Federal agents and deputy marshals, armed with sub-machine guns and ready for any attempt by gang friends to rescue the girl.

Two hours earlier the same men and the same guns ranged the walls of the Grand Jury room in the Federal Building, 9th and Market sts., as Winona Burdette, ex-singer and "moll" of Harry Campbell, was held in bail for extradition to Florida.

Fifteen hundred miles to the west Department of Justice operatives continued in relentless pursuit of Karpis and Campbell, who shot their way free of a police trap in Atlantic City last Sunday night when their girl companions were seized.

Delaney Girl Unconcerned

The Delaney girl, in the maternity ward at Hahnemann Hospital, did not seem to take proceedings very seriously yesterday afternoon. She smoked continually during the brief hearing and smiled as Wacker read her the warrant.

"Yes, I understand," she said, when it was explained that she was held for the Florida Federal courts because the two girls harbored the men down there.

She has a bullet wound in her leg from Sunday night's shooting.

Winona Burdette was brought quietly from whatever secret hiding place Federal men have been keeping her in, and moved speedily into the Grand Jury room for the hearing in the late morning.

"Why was the defendant not held in Atlantic City?" queried Wacker.

GANG GIRL IN \$50,000 BAIL

Federal Jury Names Twelve in
Karpis-Barker Gang and
Ten as 'Conspirators.'

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 24.—The Federal grand jury has indicted twenty-two persons in connection with the \$200,000 kidnapping a year ago of Edward G. Bremer, local banker. Several persons arrested in the case have made confessions. Four others indicted are dead, two slain by Federal agents.

Named as two of the actual kidnapers were Alvin Karpis and his companion, Harry Campbell, who are being sought throughout the country.

Others accused of the actual kidnapping were Arthur (Doc) Barker, Byron Bolton, Harold Allderton, Joe Roe and Richard Roe.

Ten charged with having conspired to carry out the abduction were Dr. Joseph P. Moran, John J. McLaughlin, William E. Vidler, Paul J. Delaney, James J. Wilson, Jess Doyle, Edna Murray, Myrtle Eaton, Oliver H. Berg and a man known only as "Whitey."

Five of those named are in the county jail here. Dr. Moran, who was reported to have performed "face-lifting" operations for members of the Barker-Karpis gang, is still at large.

Girl Held in \$50,000 Bail.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 24.—In a court room guarded by Federal

agents armed with sub-machine guns, Winona Burdette, 21, former radio entertainer and recently companion of Alvin Karpis was held in \$50,000 bail today for a Federal court in Florida.

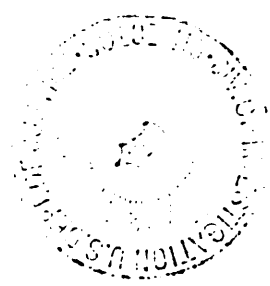

WARRANTS OUT FOR KARPIS FRIENDS

U. S. Charges Two Women With Harboring Fugitive and Harry Campbell

Four warrants charging Winona Burdette and Dolores Delaney with harboring Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell, fugitive gangsters, in Miami were issued here on Tuesday by Lloyd C. Hooks, United States commissioner. W. Sanders Gramling, United States assistant district attorney, reported yesterday.

The warrants were ordered by Gramling at the direction of department of justice agents and forwarded to Philadelphia, where the women were kept in custody legally pending further investigation, Mr. Gramling explained. Whether the women will be returned to Miami to answer to the charges will depend upon the department of justice's decision, Mr. Gramling said.

The women were arrested in an Atlantic City hotel, from which the two men escaped during a gun battle with police. Washington, D. C., Jan. 25.—Continuing its determined drive to wipe out forever the notorious band of Barker-Karpis kidnapers and bank robbers, the federal government will seek additional indictments against ten or more members of the mob charging them with the \$100,000 ransom abduction of the wealthy William A. Hamm of St. Paul, it was indicated today.

Secret evidence that links the kidnappings of Hamm and Edward G. Bremer to the Barker-Karpis outfit is being given final touches in the department of justice preparatory to being turned over to District Attorney Sullivan in St. Paul for presentation to a federal grand jury there.

In all probability indictments charging conspiracy to abduct Hamm will be sought by the government for four Chicagoans, already accused in one indictment returned recently which characterizes them as conspirators in the \$200,000 kidnaping of Bremer.

McLaughlin Is Included.

They are John J. ("Boss") McLaughlin, one-time Chicago politician; Dr. Joseph Patrick Moran, a fugitive physician; William E. Vidler and Philip J. Delaney. All four are alleged to have "fenced" the money the gang collected in ransom from Bremer, and it is likely that they will be charged with the same offense in the Hamm case.

Actual abduction of Hamm will be laid to the same principals of the gang named in the score of indictments returned against them by a federal grand jury in St. Paul

three days ago for the Bremer kidnaping. The government plans to ask for the indictments some time in the near future.

In confessing his part in the

Bremer abduction, McLaughlin, according to the department of justice, stated to special agents that he first negotiated with one, Frankie Wright in the lobby of a prominent hotel in Chicago and that later he was introduced by Wright to individuals known as "Izzy" and "Slim," Barker-Karpis emissaries.

Agree on Commission.

Through them McLaughlin agreed to exchange ransom money on a 5 per cent commission basis and understood from information furnished by "Izzy" and "Slim" that the first \$100,000 to be handled was the Hamm ransom, and that the \$200,000 paid by Bremer for his release would be forthcoming at a later date.

None of the Hamm money has been located, however.

Special agents also learned that McLaughlin had visited "Izzy" and "Slim" at a hotel on Irving Park boulevard, near Cicero avenue, in rooms rented by Dr. Moran for the rendezvous.

Vidler and Delaney are already indicted for passing in Chicago banks ransom money they said they received for that purpose from McLaughlin.

Although guarding closely the evidence upon which they will seek indictments for the Hamm kidnaping, justice department officials declared:

Karpis Is Missing Link.

"We think we will clear up the Hamm kidnaping case when Barker and Karpis are captured."

Arthur ("Doc") Barker, co-leader of the gang, is now in federal custody and his cochieftain of the roving mob, Alvin Karpis, is the object of hot pursuit by special agents in the middle west.

Chicago's one-time "terrible Touhy" gang was tried en masse in a federal court in St. Paul for the abduction of Hamm but the government failed to convict them. Since then federal agents have conducted a painstaking investigation of the case and have emerged with evidence considered strong enough to send the Barker-Karpis gang to trial for the offense.

ONE POISON SPOT LESS

ROUNDUP of the alleged Bremer kidnapers and their friends and allies by the federal authorities bids fair to take all the underworld "poison" out of St. Paul.

Some of the men now under arrest and those still sought—and likely to be apprehended or killed before long—for the \$200,000 abduction of Edward G. Bremer are believed also to have had part not only in the kidnaping of William Hamm but in the planning and execution of a number of bank and payroll robberies.

Federal agents as usual are secretive about the matter but there is good reason to believe that the gangsters who did these major kidnapings had aid here and from past revelations of friendly relations between them and the police it does not stretch the imagination to conclude that many of their forays on banks in nearby communities had their conception in St. Paul hangouts which were permitted to exist unmolested.

At any rate this belief is quite strong throughout the state and of recent years the nation. It led to the charge that St. Paul was one of the "poison spots" of the nation and the campaign of The Daily News for a cleanup of this unwholy alliance between the police and the gangsters. This alliance was indicated by the freeing of such suspects as Tommy Carroll and William Weaver, among others, when accidentally picked up by uninitiated patrolmen for minor offenses.

St. Paul has suffered badly in reputation of late years because it began paying the price for the system of policing inaugurated and developed by the late J. J. O'Connor—registering the crooks, even making life pleasant for them here, provided they did not ply their trade in St. Paul. This sort of policing while effective from a local standpoint at the time has been quite costly for the city—especially when the maestro himself passed on and left the system in the hands of far less competent police chiefs.

The federal agents in cleaning up this mess have done this city and the nation a good service—and demonstrated beyond any doubt that any working alliance between the police and the crooks is too expensive to be tolerated.

Now that St. Paul is about to be cleaned out as a haven for the underworld, let's keep it that way.

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SEIZE SUSPECT IN HARBORING OF ALVIN KARPIS

Miami, Fla., Jan. 25.—[Special.]—A formal charge of having harbored Alvin Karpis, fugitive head of the Barker-Karpis gang, was lodged today against Henry [Duke] Randall, an employé of a greyhound track. Randall was held in the county jail in bond of \$25,000.

Authorities learned Karpis had lived here for six weeks. Randall, accused of having aided the gangster in avoiding arrest, was seized by department of justice agents Monday and had been held in a hotel room.

While a search went forward for Karpis and Harry Campbell, friends of George Barker, father of several members of the gang, were attempting to obtain for him the \$10,000 found in the Oklawaha, Fla., home where his divorced wife and their son, Fred, died in a six hour fight with federal agents on Jan. 16.

The law abiding father, now 70, was deserted by his wife, Kate [Ma] Barker, and their four sons. He has been a miner and now is caretaker of a tourist camp at Joplin, Mo.

Barker Denies Bremer 'Job' And Double-Crossing Charge

Claims Federal Agents Beat
Him, Questioned Him For
Number Of Days

(Copyright, 1935, By The Associated Press)
ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 25.—(AP)—A denial that he participated in the \$200,000 kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer was made tonight by Arthur (Doc) Barker in an interview from his solitary confinement cell, as he displayed body bruises he claimed were caused by federal agents.

"I was in Chicago with my mother and brother the day of the kidnaping and I can prove it," Barker, member of the Karpis-Barker gang, said.

"And it's a lie, too, that I double-crossed my mother and brother by tipping off the feds that they were in Florida. I didn't tell them anything."

MOTHER, BROTHER SLAIN

Fred Barker and "Ma" Barker were slain by federal officers at Oklawaha, Fla., January 16.

Harold Nathan, assistant director of the justice department investigation division, informed of Barker's charges that he was beaten, branded and allegations "absurd."

John DeCourcy, St. Paul attorney, was the first to interview Barker after a three day wait before obtaining permission from the federal government to see his client.

"Even after obtaining permission from the federal court to see my client," DeCourcy asserted, "I had to submit to a search and remove all my clothes except my trousers, socks and shoes before I could see Barker privately."

Barker told how, after his capture 16 days ago in Chicago he "lost track of the hours and days" and finally was taken to Detroit, Mich., and kept there two days while numerous witnesses—apparently victims of various crimes—viewed him.

NABBED BY "FEDS"

"I was coming out of a Chicago apartment about 6 o'clock the night of January 8," Barker said, "when the feds nabbed me. There were lots of them. They took me to the Bankers building, up to the 17th floor, and there they handcuffed my hands behind me and shackled my legs to the chair."

"After questioning seven days, catching a little sleep in between times while seated in a chair, they took me to Detroit. They asked me about every crook I ever heard or read about. They wanted to know whether I knew them and they tried to make me confess crimes that I didn't ever hear about."

"I was in Florida with my brother and mother about 10 days before I was picked up in Chicago. And I didn't know that my mother and

brother were killed until I got to St. Paul."

Barker said he did not believe his mother had a machine gun in her hands when she was picked up dead.

Barker said he had \$300 in his pockets when he was captured and alleged that it was seized by the federal authorities.

"None of that money was ransom dough, either," Barker said. "My mother and I had \$6,000 in a safety deposit box in Chicago."
