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THREAT SPURS KARPIS SEARCH

Letter to J. Edgar Hoover Accelerates Hunt for Pub- lic Enemy No. 1.

MISSIVE IS 'AUTHENTIC'

Mailed at Dayton, O., Month Ago, Details Unknown— Revenge Motive Seen.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP).—Government agents tonight were reported pursuing an accelerated search for Alvin Karpis, following his mailing of a death threat letter to J. Edgar Hoover.

While the director of the bureau of investigation refused comment, a justice department spokesman said "we have been pushing a vigorous search for Karpis for months."

Details of the letter were lacking, but it was reported to have been post-marked at Dayton, O., a month ago. Officials pronounced it "authentic," indicating that handwriting and finger-print experts had scrutinized it.

Karpis, co-leader with the slain Fred Barker, of the notorious Barker-Karpis gang, has been hunted for eighteen months, frequently in Ohio in connection with the \$200,000 abduction of Edward G. Bremer, of St. Paul.

More than once agents have been hot on his trail, only to find their quarry had flown. He is known to have spent several weeks in vicinity of Toledo, O., after the kidnaping.

Last fall he and Barker lived for several days in Cleveland but left just before a raid by detectives after some of their woman companions had engaged in a hotel brawl.

Perhaps his closest brush with the law came last January in an Atlantic City (N. J.) hotel, where he sprayed officers with machine gun fire and fled with a pal, Harry Campbell.

Karpis forced a frightened Pennsylvania motorist to drive him to near Cleveland. The automobile later was found abandoned near Detroit.

The death threat gesture apparently was prompted by the killing of Barker and his mother, Kate ("Ma") Barker, during a five-hour battle with federal agents and police at Oklawaha, Fla.

The "G-men" found evidence that Karpis and Campbell had left the Florida resort only a few hours before the gunfight. Their trail led to Atlantic City, but again the man who succeeded "Pretty Boy" Floyd and John Dillinger as public enemy No. 1 managed to elude them.

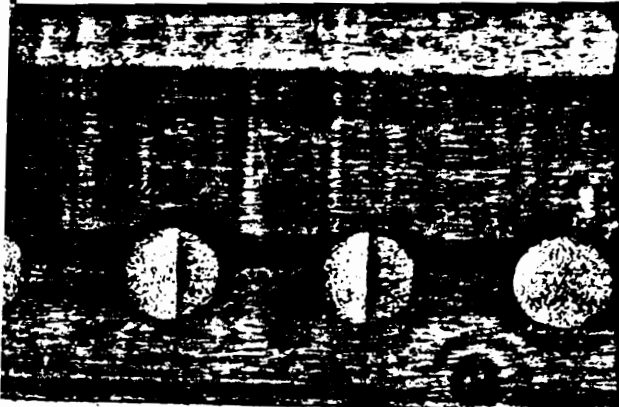
It was recalled today that Dillinger, before agents cut him down in front of a Chicago motion picture theater last summer, had sent sarcastic post-cards to Hoover. George ("Machine Gun") Kelly, now serving a life sentence at Alcatraz prison for kidnaping, also threatened to kill every one connected with the prosecution of his pals.

Karpis is 36 years old, nearly six feet tall and weighs about 180 pounds. The only other kidnapers of "public enemy" stature reported still at large are William Mahon, wanted for the George Weyerhaeuser abduction at Tacoma, Wash., and Thomas W. Salsbery, sought for the kidnaping of...

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KARPIS' THREAT FOR J. E. HOOVER, CITING 2 BARKERS

[Chicago Tribune Press Service.]
Washington, D. C., Aug. 20.—[Special.]—The country's public enemy No. 1, Alvin Karpis, has announced that he is gunning for the country's No. 1 "G-man," J. Edgar Hoover.

That was disclosed today when the department of justice officially admitted that more than a month ago Hoover, director of the bureau of investigation, had received a letter from Karpis threatening the life of the chief federal sleuth. The department withheld all further details.

Revenge for his pal, Fred Barker, whom federal agents killed with his mother, Kate (Ma) Barker, in a machine gun battle at Miami, Fla., in January, is reported to be the motive for Karpis' threat to rub out J. Edgar Hoover.

The head of the "G-men" declined to discuss the letter, but other officials said it definitely had been identified as from Karpis, presumably through his fingerprints or handwriting, and that it had come from a middle western city. Agents have tried unsuccessfully to use the letter as a clue in their nation-wide search for Karpis.

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Public Enemy No. 1 Sends Death Threat To "G-Men's" Chief

WASHINGTON (D.C.), Tuesday.

J. EDGAR HOOVER, chief of the "G-Men," has been threatened with death by Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy Number One, who is still at large.

This threat came about a month ago in a letter mailed from Ohio by Karpis.

He is a slender, blue-eyed man who looks harmless, but he is quick on the trigger and relentlessly vindictive. He has never forgiven Hoover, at whose orders "G-Men" have shot and killed three of his underworld friends.

He has been sought for a year and a half since he kidnapped a man. The police trailed the desperado across the United States.

CORNERED, BUT—

He was cornered by them in an Atlantic City hotel, but he got away. It was found he had lived in Havana, Cuba, and spent the kidnapping money there.

Last year, when "G-Men" shot and killed the notorious "Ma" Barker and her son Fred in Florida it was learned that they had harboured Karpis. That was the last known about him until Hoover got the death letter.

Hunt Is Renewed in Ohio for the Fugitive Wanted in Bremer Kidnapping.

 WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Alvin Karpis, who is listed as Public Enemy No. 1, has written to J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Justice Department's Bureau of Investigation, threatening to kill him.

The letter is understood to have been mailed several weeks ago from Dayton, Ohio, but even after admitting today that it had been received the department refused any further official disclosures.

Agents in the bureau were able to identify the letter definitely by fingerprints and handwriting as coming from the man who reputedly has led kidnap gangs.

Revenge for the killing by Federal agents of his associate, Fred Barker, is reported to have been the motive for Karpis's threat to kill Mr. Hoover. Barker and his mother, Kate (Ma) Barker, died in a machine-gun battle with Federal agents at a Miami, Fla., hideout in January. Karpis had just left Miami, and shortly afterward he shot his way out of an Atlantic City hotel and forced a motorist to carry him to Cleveland.

This is not the first time Mr. Hoover has received threatening letters from criminals. John Dillinger sent him several taunting postcards before the government men finally shot him down in Chicago.

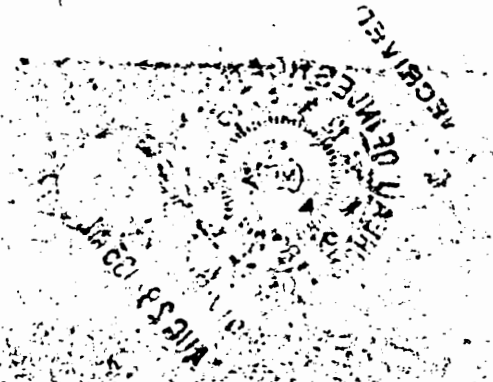

Sought by Federal agents since

seen by officers when he escaped
from a trap in an Atlantic City
hotel early last winter.

He and Harry Campbell at that
time abandoned their girl friends,

KARPIS' WARNING SPURS U. S. AGENTS

Threat to Kill Hoover Gives Impetus to Search for Public Enemy No. 1.

With a brazenly worded death threat to their chief as a fresh clue on which to work, special agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation today were conducting an intensified search for Alvin Karpis, who succeeded the late John Dillinger as so-called public enemy No. 1.

Department of Justice officials guarded against a threat by Karpis on the life of J. Edgar Hoover, director of the bureau, but it was reported the gangster sent his warning several weeks ago in a letter mailed from an Ohio city.

In characterizing the letter as authentic, officials declined to reveal whether identification of Karpis as the author was accomplished through handwriting or fingerprints. It was recalled that George ("Machine Gun") Kelly affixed his fingerprints to letters threatening death to all Federal authorities responsible for the capture and trial of his pal, Harvey Bailey, for the Urschel kidnaping.

Hoover Scoffs at Threat.
Apparently the letter is in the custody of experts attached to the bureau's technical laboratory here. Hoover, it is said, does not regard the threat seriously, holding that Karpis would not send a warning in the event he intended to do him harm.

Karpis, it is believed, wrote the letter in a spirit of revenge for the slaying by Hoover's men last January of his close companions in crime, Fred Barker, and the latter's mother, Kate (Ma) Barker. The Barkers were killed when they opened fire on G-men who surrounded their hideout on Lake Weir, Fla., and demanded their surrender.

Trail Led to Ohio.
The trail of Karpis had led to Ohio repeatedly in the past. He and several members of the Karpis-Barker gang—kidnapers of Edward G. Bremer, Minnesota bank president—are said to have hidden in Ohio after the kidnaping of Bremer. Last Fall he is reported to have been one of a group of men who escaped from a Cleveland hotel when police arrived to investigate a fight.

Karpis and another member of the gang, Harry Campbell, forced a Pennsylvania motorist to drive them to

near Cleveland last January after the pair had shot their way out of a police trap at Atlantic City.

Karpis is not the only kidnaper for whom Federal agents are searching. William Mahan, indicted as a principal in the Weyerhaeuser kidnaping at Takoma, Wash., and Thomas H. Robinson, Jr., wanted for the abduction of Mrs. Berry Stoll of Louisville, Ky., also are at large.

The Arrogant Mr. Karpis.

The long list of "public enemies" which mushroomed out of the prohibition era has dwindled under the merciless impetus of federal law enforcement officials until now only the redoubtable Alvin Karpis remains to lend distinction to the name. In their day the Capones, the Dillingers, the "Legs" Diamonds, the Barkers, the "Pretty Boy" Floyds and a hundred others of their kind cut a wide and bloody swath in the calendar of crime. They were a swashbuckling crew, and their piratical contempt of law made history of a sort.

Most of them now are dead or in prison, but the wily Mr. Karpis continues his game of hide-and-seek with singular success. As a fugitive from one of the most efficient official dragnets in the world, he has even achieved something of a record—for 18 months he has outwitted and outfought and outrun the best brains of the bureau of investigation. His latest piece of arrogance is a letter containing a death threat sent to J. Edgar Hoover, head of the federal bureau.

Mr. Karpis, it is true, has demonstrated a certain diabolical cleverness in flight. By all the best standards of the criminal world, he is undoubtedly a slippery customer. But if any such reflections dispose him to congratulate himself as the black-plumed knight of crime, any connoisseur of fables could quickly and infallibly predict that the end is not far distant. Any kindergartener knows that the pride that goeth before a fall is shortly about to deliver him for his comeuppance. Reports of his death or capture in tomorrow's headlines would almost come as an anti-climax; they might point a moral, but they wouldn't be news.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 21.—A platoon of Federal agents rushed to a postal telegraph office here today upon receiving word that a man representing himself as Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. 1, had tried to send a telegram to J. Edgar Hoover, head of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington.

Charles Gorman, manager of the office, said the sender had attempted to telephone the message from a pay station and that it had been refused after the subject matter had been taken down with the sender's name.

Since the message came just a day after the Department of Justice had revealed in Washington that Mr. Hoover had received a threatening letter from Karpis last month, the telegraph office manager immediately communicated with the Federal agents. R. George Harvey, head of the Division of Investigation here, treated the matter lightly following an inquiry.

Asserting that the message contained no definite threat, Mr. Harvey said there was a "Karpis crank" in this city. Whenever a bank is looted or a grocery store is robbed or two automobiles collide, he said, this unidentified person telephones the Federal agents to insist that Karpis was at the bottom of it. Mr. Harvey thinks the same man tried to send the telegram to Mr. Hoover.

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DOUBT KARPIS IS IN CITY

Department of Justice Agents Busy Hunting for Desperado

Agents of the Department of Justice here feel reasonably sure that Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. 1, is not in Philadelphia.

Despite this, however, they spent a busy night "hunting" for the western desperado.

Three telephone calls, one of them to the home of R. George Harvey, agent-in-charge of the local office, kept them on the streets in cars most of the night.

All three calls were from anonymous parties who felt sure that Karpis was hiding out somewhere near their homes. Harvey said he believed at least two of them were "crank" calls. The other was from a householder who was suspicious of some recently moved-in neighbors.

G-Men Spur Hunt for Desperado After Tip on Phoned Message.

A man who said he was Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. 1, was in Philadelphia yesterday.

The man used a pay telephone in an effort to send a telegram which Federal agents said threatened the life of J. Edgar Hoover, chief of all the "G-men."

R. George Harvey, head of Department of Justice agents here, refused to take the incident more than half seriously. Nevertheless, every "G-man" in the Philadelphia area began a renewed manhunt for the desperado.

Telegram Not Sent.

The telegram, addressed to Hoover at Washington, was not sent to him by the telegraph company.

The call came just before 11 A. M. to the Postal Telegraph Company branch office at 112 S. 9th st. A stenographer began taking the dictated wire.

It told Hoover, in effect, to "lay off, or else."

When the caller told the stenographer:

"Sign it Alvin Karpis."

Attempt to Trace Call Fails.

She asked him to drop the toll into the telephone coin box, meantime signaling the office manager.

The manager tried vainly to trace the call. But the caller hung up.

The manager notified Harvey's office. It was revealed that several times in the last four days, mysterious callers have tried to send similar telegrams to the local bureau and to Hoover.

Harvey was inclined to regard the caller as a "nut." He said yesterday was the first time the mystery man had sought to identify himself as Karpis.

Wire Offices Watched.

If the caller here was Karpis, local agents thought he might be back-tracking over the route he followed last January after he and his lieutenant, Harry Campbell, shot their way out of a police trap in Atlantic City.

The quickly mustered agents covered the central city in squad cars, each containing one or more machine guns. All midtown telegraph offices were placed under surveillance.

Karpis, 35, is dark complexioned and of average stature. He has long been known as a cold-blooded killer.

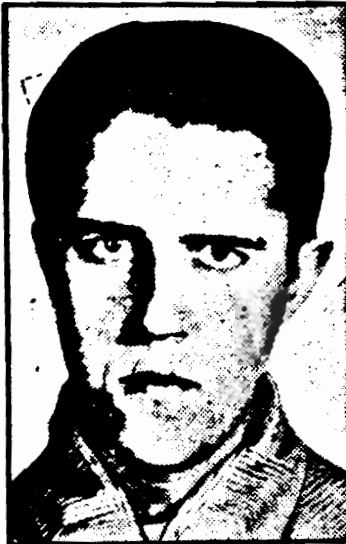

'HEADLINES FOR KARPIS.

Maybe Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1, feels he has been slighted in the headlines recently and seeks to outdo the late Mr. Dillinger in the matter of press notices. If so, the long-sought fugitive has chosen an effective way to gain publicity by sending threatening missives to Edgar Hoover, chief of the G-men.

It became known Tuesday that the director of the efficient department of investigation had received a death threat signed by Karpis, sought for the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer in January, 1934. Since then news dispatches revealed a second threat from a Philadelphia telegraph office, signed "Alvin Karpis."

One or both of the messages may have been sent by a crank. Of course the secret service operatives are investigating. It seems hardly possible that such an elusive criminal as Karpis has proved to be would jeopardize his life and freedom by making known his whereabouts, even for the satisfaction of seeing his name and photograph emblazoned across the pages of leading newspapers. Such yearning for publicity may sound far-fetched; nevertheless, other notorious bandits have been known to take great pride in news accounts of their murderous exploits.

No matter who sent the threatening notes, however, the life or freedom of Karpis is in a precarious state, for Uncle Sam's operatives stay on the trail of public enemies until death or capture ends the quest.

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More Bremer Suspects Seen

St. Paul, Minn., Aug. 24—Discovery of new money changing activities in the \$200,000 kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, was indicated Saturday.

The federal government, it was learned, plans to seek an extension of the "time of conspiracy" contained in the original indictments when the grand jury meets Sept. 18. The indictment now terminates the conspiracy May 1, 1934. The government will ask that this be extended to Jan. 1, 1935.

The extension would permit prosecution of money changers who are believed to have come into the picture after May 1 and the government is expected to ask for additional indictments.

Plans also were being made for reindictment of Harry Sawyer, alleged "finger man," now held in the Ramsey county jail. His attorneys have announced that Arthur (Doc) Barker, leader of the kidnap gang, and others already convicted, may be brought back from various federal prisons to testify for Sawyer "if it becomes necessary."

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**REPORT KARPIS FLED FROM

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Hamilton was bloody notorious when, after serving two years of a 25-year term for motor car banditry, he became one of the ten felons who escaped from the Michigan City penitentiary in September, 1933.

Dillinger the Escape Leader.

Dillinger was named as the "brains" of the escape and several of the fugitives formed the nucleus of his band.

The first accusation of murder was lodged against Hamilton shortly afterward when three gunmen stormed the jail at Lima, O., where Dillinger was then held, and killed Sheriff Jess Sarber in effecting their chief's release.

He subsequently was named in two other killings of peace officers. December 14, 1933, Sergt. William T. Shanley walked into a garage on Chicago's North Side and was shot to death.

Later, after his arrest in Tucson, Ariz., Dillinger boasted it was he who drove Hamilton out of Chicago after Hamilton killed the sergeant.

Hamilton was also accused of the machine-gun slaying of a policeman in the East Chicago Bank robbery of January, 1934.

Named in Many Other Crimes.

Among the other bank robberies in which Hamilton was accused as a participant were forays at Greencastle and South Bend, Ind., and St. Mary's O.—perpetrated in October, 1933, soon after the Michigan City break—and the robbery of the American Bank and Trust Company at Racine, Wis., the next month.

The list included also the holdup of a bank messenger at Gas City, Ind., and raids on police stations in Auburn and Peru, Ind., in the gang's search for weapons.

"This winds up the Dillinger gang," said Melvin H. Purvis, retired chief of Chicago federal men, when told today of Hamilton's fate.

Hamilton was the ninth follower of the hoodler hoodlum to meet violent death. Dillinger was slain July 22, 1934, by federal agents as he left a theater on Chicago's North Side.

Of the ten who escaped from the Michigan City penitentiary, none now remains at liberty. Four were recaptured almost immediately. Two others, Joe Fox and Joe Burns, minor hoodlums, were seized later.

Four Into Dillinger's Gang.

Hamilton and three others—Harry Pierpont, Russell Clark and Charles Makley—became trusted members of the Dillinger crew. Clark was sentenced to life in the Ohio penitentiary for the murder of Sheriff Sarber. Makley was shot to death when he attempted to escape from the prison, and Pierpont was electrocuted there October 17, 1934, for the Sarber slaying.

Approximately a score of harborers of the Dillinger gang have been convicted in the government campaign against associates of the terrorists. Among them was Mrs. Isaac Steve of Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., a sister of Hamilton, accused by the government of having given refuge to her brother and Dillinger after the Michigan City escape.

Hamilton was thrown into a childish rage. He placed "Baby Face" Nelson in the same category. But Hamilton, Hoover said, like Harvey Bailey, Wilbur Oak, and old "Ma" Barker, was "cool and calculating."

Under Hamilton's direction, the Dillinger gang applied science to crime.

"They had road maps they made themselves—far more complete than any motor association ever produced," Hoover disclosed. "They showed every bump, every curve, the condition of the road every ten miles, weather conditions, hideouts, everything."

"And when the gangsters pulled a job, they planned it to the finest detail. They studied the layout carefully, and then they practiced."

"For two weeks before they were going to rob a bank, they'd practice driving every inch of the road, from their hideout to the scene, and then on to the next hideout. Sometimes they'd drive over hundreds of miles of road, over and over, until they knew the thing perfectly. Every movement, every curve, every bump, every man's job."

Hamilton was the last of more than thirty gangsters and "fixers" who were "put away"—in death or prison—for the murders, bank robberies and prison breaks of the group led by Dillinger.

Women companions of all the leaders are serving prison terms.

"And the girls are as bad as the men," Hoover said. "They do the fixing. They go out and rent apartments and look over the lay of the land while the men stay in hiding. Then when everything is ready, the gangsters swing into action, quick. And their women follow them."

Doctors, nurses, lawyers, relatives—everyone who sheltered the hunted "rats," gave them food; bound their wounds; changed their faces with surgery; tried to turn off the "heat"—were corralled and led to trial.

Hoover related.

Chasing the gang from spot to spot, picking up a lead here, a fugitive there, the federal men heard in May, 1934, that Hamilton was dead. Two bloody battles had been fought at Little Bohemia, Wis., and South St. Paul, just before. Hamilton had been there.

But the federal agents were not satisfied. They kept on the gangster's trail. About a year after the "death tip" had come, the federal agents found the approximate location of the grave. For weeks they dug, until today they found the remains.

A maroon roadster, bearing Oklahoma license plates, drew up in front of an apartment house at 118 E. 22nd St. early today. A man got out, entered the building and went to a fifth floor apartment.

Had he glanced out of the window a few minutes later a strange sight would have met his eyes. The street swarmed with police and G-men. They surrounded the building. A half dozen men, with machine guns and tear gas bombs were stationed at each exit. A cordon of police was posted at each corner of the block.

The federal men, carrying tear gas bombs, machine guns and sawed-off shotguns, took up positions in the hall outside the fifth floor apartment.

When all was in readiness one of

the G-men, posing as the superintendent of the apartment house, called the apartment.

"You'd better come down and put up the top of your car," he said; "it's raining."

When the man emerged he almost fainted at sight of the heavy artillery trained on him. "Stick 'em up, Karpis!" came the command. He reached for the ceiling and was searched, but no weapons were found. He identified himself as an Oklahoma business man. His friend in the apartment confirmed the identification, and the police and G-men, after profuse apologies, withdrew.

A tenant in the building, thinking the stranger resembled Alvin Karpis, much sought Public Enemy No. 1, had phoned the Department of Justice that Karpis was in town.

Federal agents co-operating with city and State police threw a cordon around Manhattan yesterday to trap Alvin Karpis, the St. Paul kidnaper-killer.

Railroad and steamship terminals were picketed and bus stations were placed under surveillance. Airports and interstate bridges and tunnels were guarded. Aides of Attorney General Cummings admitted they possessed evidence that the outlaw was secreting himself in the city awaiting an opportunity to flee.

RAID

Proof of their belief came when they raided an apartment at 118 E. 22nd st. Basis for the invasion was a red automobile at the curb carrying an Oklahoma license. The car owner proved a Tulsa business man utterly unlike Karpis in appearance and apparently unaware of the fugitive's existence.

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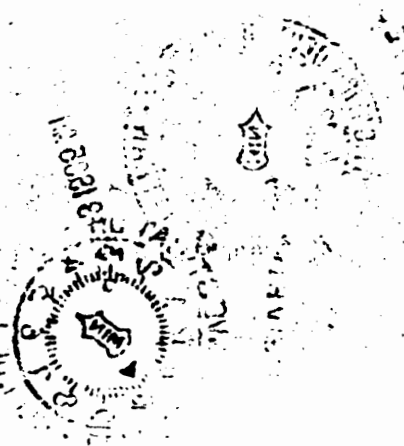

at large, although Alvin Karpis, its reputed co-leader and Harry Campbell still are fugitives.

First word received here this afternoon led to the belief that it was Karpis, public enemy No. 1, who was being brought from Chicago. It was not until the plane arrived that this belief was dispelled.

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Mob Lived at Apartment.

It was in the apartment of Myrtle Eaton that plans for the Bremer kidnaping were made, the government charged early this year at the St. Paul trial of ten persons accused of the abduction, for which Arthur (Doc) Barker was sentenced to life imprisonment.

Testimony by Wynona Burdett, sweetheart of Harry Campbell, at the trial, revealed that several of the mobsters lived in the Eaton woman's apartment during the fall of 1933 until Bremer was abducted.

Weaver is 36 years old and the Eaton woman 33. He was paroled from the Oklahoma penitentiary at McAlester in 1931 after serving part of a life term for murder.

Subsequently, in August, 1932, he was arrested in St. Paul for carrying concealed weapons and posted \$500 bond. He forfeited the bond and his parole was revoked a few months later. Since that time he has been sought.

Twenty-two Indicted.

Twenty-two persons were originally indicted in the Bremer kidnaping. Of these, eleven went to trial in United States District court here April 17 last.

Charges against two of these, Mrs. Edna (Rabbits) Murray and Jess Doyle, were dismissed. Five, Barker, Harold Alderton, John J. (Boss) McLaughlin, Chicago politician; James Wilson, and Oliver Berg, were convicted. During the course of the trial Byron Bolton and Elmer Farmer pleaded guilty.

WEAVER SEIZED WITH WOMAN IN FLORIDA HOME

Federal Agents Rush Pair From Jacksonville to St. Paul by Airplane.

Karpis and Campbell Only Principals in Crime Still Sought by U. S.

Two more of the 22 persons charged with complicity in the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, were captured by federal agents and brought to St. Paul by airplane Monday to stand trial.

They are William Weaver, who is charged with being one of the actual kidnapers, and Myrtle Eaton, a St. Paul woman, who is under indictment as an accessory after the fact.

Arrested in Florida.

They were arrested by federal agents early Sunday morning at a chicken ranch just out of Allendale, Fla., on federal highway No. 1. There they had been living for some months under the name of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Osborne.

Picked up with them and brought to St. Paul was a two-year-old boy whom they said they had adopted. Federal agents said the capture was made without event, the two surrendering quietly when the agents closed in on them.

They were taken to Jacksonville, Fla., Monday morning, put aboard a plane with four agents and a woman matron as guards and flown to the Twin Cities, landing at the St. Paul airport about 5 p. m.

Taken to County Jail.

There they were met by another delegation of federal agents who took them to the offices of the department of justice for questioning and later to the Ramsey county jail.

In charge of the federal agents was E. J. Connelley, who is in charge of the Cincinnati office of the bureau of investigation, and who has been placed on a special assignment to run down the Bremer kidnapers.

It was he who arranged the capture of "Doc" Barker in Chicago on January 8, and it was he who led the attack on the hideout of Fred Barker and his mother in Florida a week later—resulting in a gun battle in which the outlaw and his mother were slain.

Will Be Arraigned Today.

The chicken ranch on which Weaver and Mrs. Eaton were found is only 50 miles east of the old Barker hideout, he said.

Both Weaver and Mrs. Eaton will be arraigned Tuesday morning in federal court and then bound over for trial.

Weaver is 36, and the Eaton woman 23. He was paroled from the Oklahoma penitentiary at McAlester in 1931 after serving part of a life term for murder. Subsequently in August, 1932, he was arrested in St. Paul for carrying concealed weapons and posted \$500 bond. He forfeited the bond and his parole was revoked a few months later. Since that time he has been sought.

The capture of Weaver and Mrs. Eaton leaves only two of the principals in the Bremer kidnaping case still at large. One of them is Alvin Karpis, now public enemy No. 1. The other is Harry Campbell, who has been named as one of the principals in the kidnaping.

11 Tried in April.

Of the 23 originally indicted, 12 went to trial in United States district court in St. Paul April 17. Charges against two of these, Mrs. Edna Murray and Jess Doyle, were dismissed.

Five, Barker, Harold Alderton, John J. "Boss" McLaughlin, Chicago politician, James Wilson, and Oliver Berg were convicted. Phillip Delaney and William Vidler, both of Chicago, were acquitted.

During the course of the trial Byron Bolton and Elmer Farmer pleaded guilty. McLaughlin received a five-year sentence. He was charged with a part in disposal of the ransom money.

Alderton, of whose Bensenville, Ill., home Bremer was held captive for 21 days, received 20 years. Farmer also got 20 years and Wilson, former Northwestern university medical student, got five. Barker and Berg both received life terms.

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U. S. Agents Catch Three in Crime War

Man and Woman Nabbed in Bremer Kidnap—Ex-Convict Held in Gem Theft

WASHINGTON (AP)—Agents of the Department of Justice today sought fresh clues from the underworld after three important arrests in two sensational crimes.

The "G-men" directed their activities toward tracking down the four remaining members of the notorious Barker-Karpis gang after capturing William Weaver, a paroled convict, and Myrtle Eaton, convicted shop-lifter, on a chicken ranch near Alledale, Fla.

They were wanted in connection with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer of St. Paul. Weaver is under indictment in St. Paul in connection with the kidnaping and the Eaton woman as an accessory.

Federal agents said that when found the couple had a 3-year-old boy they "adopted somewhere in Florida."

Agents also caught Robert C. Nelson, another paroled convict, in Brooklyn as the "fence" in the \$185,000 Miami-Biltmore Hotel jewel theft at Miami, Fla., last January 26. The jewels were stolen from Mrs. James E. Bell, formerly of East Orange, who later married Harry Content, New York broker. Content and Mrs. Bell had gone from the Hialeah race track to Mrs. Bell's suite when the bandits held them up and bound them.

Agents claimed that Nelson "sold" the jewels to Noel C. Scaffa, private detective, for \$45,000 through money supplied by Lloyd's of London, which had insured them, to recover them.

Scaffa was subsequently indicted and convicted on a perjury count in connection with the "recovery" of the gems for their owner.

The agents now are seeking Alvin Karpis, Harry Campbell, W. J. Harrison and Joseph P. Morgan.

Government Men Fly Them to St. Paul for Trial in \$200,000 Kidnapping Case.

The AAA, which never wanted a potato program, would like to throw all the spuds back to the authors of the bill in congress.

Philippine Doctor Claims He Can Predetermine Sex

MANILA, P. I., Sept. 3.—(INS)—The age-old enigma of sex determination today had been solved according to the claim of Dr. I. Garcia, professor of parasitology at the University of the Philippines school of hygiene.

In at least two cases Dr. Garcia claims to have been able to produce boy or girl babies at will.

By a method similar to electrolysis by which positive and negative elements are separated in a solution by passing an electrical current through the liquid, Dr. Garcia claims to have succeeded in separating the male and female germs in spermatozoa.

Application of whichever germ was desired was made by means of "impregnation," an artificial method of impregnation. This method of impregnation heretofore has been used successfully, to a considerable extent, on animals.

Dr. Garcia claims that as a result of his tests two baby boys have been born in experimental cases.

Lives Saved As Rain Cuts Down Holiday Motoring

Rain and abnormally cool weather over a major portion of the United States saved more than 200 lives Monday, insurance actuaries estimated today.

Fewer than 170 persons were killed in Holiday traffic accidents, whereas on Labor days for three years back the toll has exceeded 350.

Insurance statisticians had predicted that more than 400 would die on highways Monday. Only the rain and cold, keeping picnic parties at home, holding crowds at resorts to ordinary week-day figures, and enforcing cautious automobile driving prevented the prophecy from being fulfilled, they said.

A national survey by the United Press revealed 162 traffic accident fatalities reported to police departments.

... found not guilty by a jury. With him was Myrtle Eaton, St. Paul underworld in whose Portland ave. apartment the "snatching" of G. Bremer, Commercial State bank president, was carried up. a happy, smiling, 3-year-old boy the fugitive had adopted in an effort to throw relentless G-men off their trail.

Captured Sunday morning at their chicken farm near the little town of Allendale, Fla., the two underworlders were returned to St. Paul by airplane, arriving late Monday; Weaver to answer to charges that he aided in the kidnaping of Mr. Bremer Jan. 17, 1934, and possibly to charges of the attempted murder of Roy McCord, Northwest Airlines radio operator, and the Eaton woman for kidnaping conspiracy.

In vain were the last-minute efforts of the fugitive pair to attain an appearance of respectability, by adopting as "Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Osborne," the tow-headed youngster who rode his kiddie-car up and down the aisle of the plane and demanded to know why the five strange men who rode with them had put "iron rings" on "my mommy's and my daddy's hands."

Offer No Resistance.

Fruitless were their efforts to drop "the past"—for Weaver to forget that he was wanted in Oklahoma for violating his parole from the state penitentiary by Gov. W. H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murray, in St. Paul on an attachment for jumping \$500 bail after being jailed on a charge of carrying concealed weapons, for questioning in the later \$50,000 Railway Express Co. holdup, and on the kidnaping indictment; for Myrtle to forget that for years she was "Doc Eaton's girl," that the federal government charges she participated in the arrangements for the Bremer abduction.

The couple put up no resistance when they found their Florida home surrounded by submachine-gun-armed officers Sunday, and insisted that they were just a couple of chicken-raisers and egg-sellers with a young son to raise—but the "G-men," headed by Agent E. J. Connelly, found a half dozen rifles, automatic pistols and revolvers on the premises.

In St. Paul, they spent all Monday night in the offices of the federal division of investigation in the old federal building, and their "son" was happy in the custody of a woman agent. Today agents questioned them, hour after hour, but no statement was forthcoming as to whether the two had admitted their alleged parts in the \$200,000 kidnaping.

Present Order For Widening Kellogg Blvd.

A preliminary order for widening Kellogg blvd. from Market st. to Seven Corners, first actual step in the improvement, was introduced in the council today by Works Commissioner Milton Rosen.

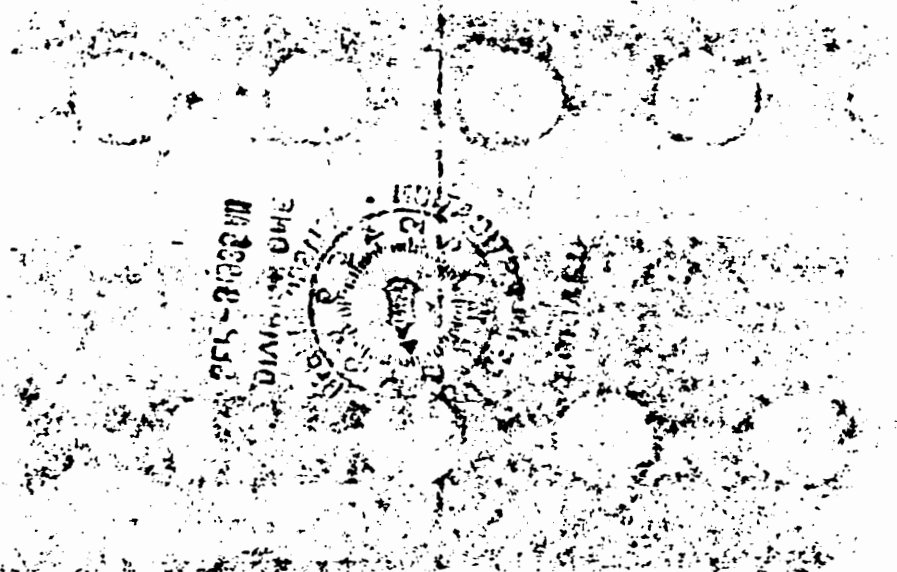

William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, brought to St. Paul as alleged members of the gang that kidnaped Edward G. Bremer, were transferred today from the Federal building to the county jail as their adopted son, 2-year-old, tow-headed "Bobby Osborne," frolicked in Federal building halls with Department of Justice men and a matron.

The prisoners arrived at the jail about noon. Weaver was locked up in the former cell of Arthur (Doc) Barker, who was sentenced to life imprisonment for his part in the kidnaping, and Mrs. Eaton was confined in the women's cell tier.

Weaver is isolated from every one except jail attendants, and is allowed to see no one except under special permission of department of justice agents.

The "parents" will await arraignment, which will not be for some time, according to George F. Sullivan, United States attorney. Bail bond of \$100,000 for Weaver and \$15,000 for Mrs. Eaton was set by a court order when the two, and twenty others, were indicted.

FEDERAL POLICING AGAIN.

Federal policing again proves its claim to a permanent place in the network of law-and order spread against the professional underworld by the capture of William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton in Florida.

These members of the Karpis and Barker gang would have run small danger of detection had the search for them been confined to the local police in communities where they have committed crimes. No local police department is equipped to conduct a nation-wide hunt continuing over months and years, to run down leads that may appear simultaneously in half a dozen states, and to check up on every detail which may contain solution of the crime.

But the Federal Department of Justice, with an organization extending over the whole country, equipped to make the most of every piece of information that comes to hand, can do these things and is doing them. The unremitting pressure of the Federal justice agents dooms these professional criminals to certain capture.

The roving gangs of criminals which sprang into existence as the illicit liquor traffic began, to wane are being rapidly exterminated. When those criminals have disappeared the first phase of the special police problem they created will be concluded. It is estimated, however, that there are about ten thousand persons in this country, mostly minor crooks and hangers-on in the professional underworld, any of whom might become important public enemies. The permanent phase of the national policing job will be to deal with these potential recruits for new gangs.

GRAVE SEEN AS TIP-OFF ON WEAVER

CLUE MAY HAVE BEEN WITH JOHN HAMILTON

Chief of 'G' Men Sped to
Florida by Plane After
Autopsy for Mobster.

The grave of John Hamilton, Dillinger mobster, may have yielded the clue which led to the capture of William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, it was learned Monday night.

E. J. Connelley, in charge of the "G-men" who made the capture at Allendale, Fla., was present at the opening of Hamilton's grave Wednesday it was revealed, attended the autopsy the following day, and Friday chartered a special fast plane for Florida. The arrest of Weaver and the Eaton woman followed two days later.

Weaver, under indictment for the actual abduction of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, and Mrs. Eaton, charged with conspiracy, had been living under the names of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Osborne. They had legally adopted a 2-year-old boy and were known to neighbors just as chicken farmers. When federal agents made the arrest early Sunday, however, they found half a dozen guns in the house.

Working under the direction of E. J. Connelley, special agent handling the Bremer case, federal men surrounded the ranch shortly after daylight Sunday and waited for Weaver to arise. When he stepped into the yard to feed the chickens several agents slipped up behind him and thrust guns in his back. They then entered the house and arrested Mrs. Eaton, who likewise offered no resistance.

Taken to Ramsey Jail.

The plane bringing the two prisoners and the child here Monday was met by armed federal agents in five cars when it landed at Holman Municipal airport at 5 P. M. Weaver and Mrs. Eaton were speedily taken to the Federal building where they were questioned for an hour before being lodged in the Ramsey county jail.

The prisoners, the child, a nurse and five Bureau of Investigation agents left Jacksonville, Fla., for St. Paul at 7:30 A. M. Monday, stopping for gas at Louisville and Chicago. Weaver and Mrs. Eaton were quiet throughout the trip, Connelley said. The baby, 2 years old, rode a small tricycle up and down the aisle of the plane, a fifteen-passenger transport piloted by H. J. Hough of Atlanta.

When the plane arrived at the airport here it first landed in front of the Northwest Airlines hangar, where it was met by the five Department of Justice cars. The pilot was then signaled over to the municipal hangar, the cars providing an escort on the way.

Mrs. Eaton Hides Face.

One autoloader of luggage was taken from the plane first. Then an agent stepped out with the tricycle and was followed by Mrs. Eaton, who hid her face from photographers. The maid threw a blanket over the baby before leaving the ship.

Weaver stood in the doorway with his head down while the cars were adjusted so he could step directly into one of them. As he left the plane he pulled an agent to whom he was shackled along with him. The other agents got in cars and left for the Federal building. Connelley said the prisoners will be arraigned in Federal District court this week, possibly today.

Weaver's indictment here January 22 of this year climaxed a long criminal record for the 39-year-old Arkansan.

As P. O. Donald he was arrested at Joplin, Mo., July 20, 1918, on a charge of vagrancy. On May 26, 1922, under the alias of Phoenix O'Donald, he was arrested for automobile theft at Sapulpa, Okla., but was released without prosecution. As R. A. Nelson he was arrested at Garden City, Kan., July 26, 1922, on a charge of attempting to assist in a jail delivery.

He was convicted in April, 1925, on a charge of murder and sentenced to life imprisonment in the Oklahoma state penitentiary. He was paroled June 20, 1931, but the parole was revoked August 15, 1932, following his arrest here on a charge of carrying concealed weapons.

At the time of his capture here, Weaver gave his address as Great

Lake. He was taken to police court and there permitted to post \$500 bail pending a decision whether a state or city charge should be filed against him. The bail was forfeited when Weaver failed to appear for trial.

Mrs. Eaton, 32 years old, is the former wife of Clarence (Doc) Eaton, a paroled life-terminer from Stillwater penitentiary. Under the name of Ruth Martin she was arrested by Minneapolis police on January 27, 1930, and charged with shoplifting, drawing a \$100 fine. She was arrested twice thereafter on minor charges which were dismissed.

The arrest of Mrs. Eaton and Weaver leaves Alvin Karpis, long sought as Public Enemy No. 1, and Harry Campbell, his henchman, the only ones of any importance still at large in the Bremer case. Of the others indicted for the actual kidnaping of Bremer, Harry Sawyer, former St. Paul bootlegger, is being held in jail here pending trial; Arthur (Doc) Barker, leader of the Barker-Karpis gang, is serving a life sentence for the abduction; Elmer Farmer is serving twenty years; Harold Alderton also is serving twenty years; Byron Bolton is held in the county jail here pending sentencing; and Volney Davis is serving a life term.

Others sentenced on conspiracy charges are John J. McLaughlin to five years; James Wilson to five years, and Oliver Berg to life imprisonment.

Bremer was abducted the morning of January 17, 1934, at the corner of Goodrich and Lexington avenues as he was on his way to work.

BREMER KIDNAP SUSPECTS TAKEN

William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton Are Held in St. Paul.

By the Associated Press.

ST. PAUL, September 3.—William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, among 22 persons indicted in the \$200,000 Edward G. Bremer kidnaping, were held in the county jail here today pending arraignment in Federal District Court.

Brought here late yesterday by airplane by Federal agents, following their capture Sunday on a chicken ranch near Allendale, Fla., the two were questioned here about the abduction and then jailed.

Weaver is charged with the actual kidnaping of the St. Paul banker January 17, 1934, and Mrs. Eaton is accused of conspiracy.

Weaver and Mrs. Eaton had been living in Florida as Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Osborne. They had legally adopted a 2-year-old baby the first of the year and were known by neighbors as chicken farmers.

In their house about two miles from Allendale, however, were found a half-dozen guns, including a shotgun and two automatic pistols.

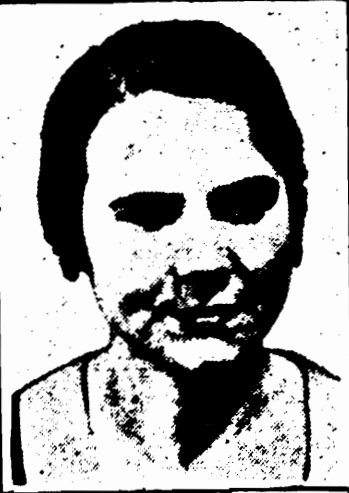
Only Two Still at Large.

Arrest of Mrs. Eaton and Weaver left Alvin Karpis, long sought as public enemy No. 1, and Harry Campbell, his henchman, the only major principals still at large in the Bremer case.

Of the others indicted for the actual kidnaping, Harry Sawyer, former St. Paul bootlegger, is being held in jail here pending trial; Arthur Barker, leader of the Barker-Karpis gang, is serving a life sentence; Elmer Farmer and Harold Alderton, Bensenville, Ill., are serving 20 years; Byron Bolton is in the county jail here pending sentence and Volney Davis is serving a life term.

Others sentenced on conspiracy charges are John J. McLaughlin to five years, James Wilson to five years and Oliver Berg to life imprisonment.

PROGRESS IN GEM CASE

In announcing the arrest of William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton yesterday, the Department of Justice also reported progress in solving the Miami-Biltmore jewel theft case as agents arrested Robert C. Nelson of Brooklyn, believed linked with the case, in New York City. Nelson is being charged with conspiracy to violate the national stolen property act.

Meanwhile, agents are pressing their search for Alvin Karpis, leader of the St. Paul mob and high ranking public enemy of the moment. Karpis shot his way out of a police trap in an Atlantic City, N. J., hotel last January and has been reported in many sections since.

Two Others Hunted.

Two other "big shot" kidnapers also still hold places on the department's "must" list, these being Thomas H. Robinson, Jr., abductor of Mrs. Berry V. Stoll, Louisville Junior Leaguer, on October 10, 1934, and William Mahan, linked with the snatching of young George Weyerhaeuser in Tacoma, Wash., last May.

There have been rumors that Robinson suffered the same fate that ended the career of John Hamilton, Dillinger gunman whose body was found last week in an Illinois gravel pit. Reports that the ransom bills have been slow to appear have strengthened the belief that the once-crazed kidnaper may be dead.

A "lone wolf," Robinson cannot be traced through underworld connections, it has been pointed out. He has been reported in many parts of the United States.

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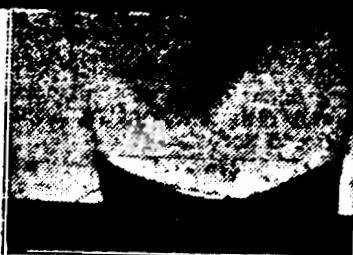
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Bremer was held blindfolded in a house now believed to have been in Bensonville, Ill., 25 miles from Chicago.

RANSOM PAID

The ransom was paid, after several hectic days and nights of note-writing, running want ads and telephone conversations. The money, in two black suitcases, was taken by Walter Magee to a lonely road near Fairbault, Minn., where he was met by members of the gang.

Bremer was released on the night of February 7 on a dark street in the residential section of Rochester, Minn., after a ride he estimated as being from 10 to 12 hours.

Immediately upon notification of Bremer's release, every resource of the nation was thrown into the manhunt, without the restrictions which hampered the officials during the negotiations with the kidnapers.

Found on flashlight and a gasoline can believed to have been used by the abductors were fingerprints which the Government sleuths immediately pounced upon in their search for the "snatchers."

On March 16, 1934, Federal men trapped eight persons in a gang hide-out near Mannford, Okla., and announced for the first time that the two men chiefly sought were Arthur "Doc" Barker and Alvin Karpis, both former Oklahoma convicts. Barker's brother, Freddie, was also wanted for questioning.

HAD LONG RECORDS

Arthur Barker had been jailed in Oklahoma and Missouri for larceny, murder, jail breaks and attempted bank robbery, using various aliases. Karpis had been jailed six times in Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri.

On May, 1934, G-men arrested John J. "Boss" McLaughlin, his son, John, jr., and two other men in Chicago. Philip Delaney, bartender, and William Vidler, an ex-convict. All four were charged with having in their possession part of the Bremer kidnap ransom money.

In December, 1934, Federal men raided an apartment and arrested Barker. Then on January 16, 1935, G-Men trailed "Ma" Barker, mother of Arthur Barker, and her son, Fred, to their Florida hideout. There the long-sought suspects were killed in a furious six-hour machine-gun battle.

"Ma" Barker, 55, died with a machine-gun in her hands. Fred Barker's body was found inside the house with 14 bullets in it.

No officer was injured in the battle. The agents found \$15,000 of the Bremer ransom money in the house, besides \$25 upon the person of Fred Barker, \$50 hidden in parts of his clothing, and \$1,000 sewn in a belt. On "Ma" Barker they found 10 \$1,000 bills and \$250 in smaller denominations.

Following the arrests of several other suspects, last January, a Federal grand jury in St. Paul returned indictments against 22 persons. Among those named in the indictments were Doc Barker and Karpis.

TWO GIVEN LIFE

After deliberating 20 hours on May 17, a jury brought in guilty verdicts against Arthur Barker, and four others of the Barker-Karpis gang in the abduction of Bremer.

Barker and "Izz" Berg, the latter already a "lifer," immediately

were sentenced to serve life terms in prison. Two others of the gang had pleaded guilty before the trial ended.

At the end of the five-weeks' trial the record stood:

Convicted: Arthur (Doc) Barker, ringleader in the actual kidnaping, sentenced to life.

Oliver (Izzy) Berg, sentenced to life.

Byron Bolton, machine gunner for the Barker-Karpis gang, pleaded guilty.

Elmer Farmer, at whose home Bremer was held, pleaded guilty. Delaney and Vidler, arrested with McLaughlin in Chicago were acquitted.

Alvin Karpis is still a fugitive. Several times he has been almost within the grasps of Federal men or local police, but has always managed to elude them. The last trap from which he escaped was one set at Atlantic City last May.

G-MEN ARREST TWO IN BREMER KIDNAPING CASE

Paroled Convict, Woman Are Rushed to St. Paul; Hoover Tersely Tells of Gang End

G-men have seized a paroled convict and a woman as the central figures in the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, wealthy St. Paul banker, it was announced late yesterday at the Department of Justice.

Special agents, acting under the personal supervision of J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Bureau of Investigation, captured William Weaver alias Phoenix Osborne, 38, and Myrtle Eaton, 32, on a chicken ranch near Allendale, Fla., early Sunday.

Flown to St. Paul

After 36 hours of grilling at the Jacksonville, Fla., office of the bureau, the pair were hustled aboard a special plane guarded by G-Men and taken to St. Paul, where they were placed in jail last night.

E. J. Connelly, agent, in charge of the Cincinnati office, who is especially assigned to the Bremer case, led the raid on the chicken ranch. Connelly was in command last January when a squad of G-Men swooped down on Fred Barker and his mother in a Florida hideout and killed the pair in a pitched battle.

He said no difficulty was encountered in arresting Weaver and the Eaton woman, who had been living on the ranch as "Mr. and Mrs. Osborne" and had adopted a 3-year-old boy under that name. Connelly refused to divulge any details concerning the boy, who was brought on the plane trip.

Connelly and four agents went to St. Paul via Atlanta, Louisville and Chicago. They were met at

the St. Paul airport by five more agents and rushed in closed cars to the Federal building. The boy was excited over his first plane ride. The prisoners, however, were sullen.

FOUR STILL FREE

Score in the Bremer case now stands:

Fifteen members of the Karpis-Barker gang in prison, one murdered by other gangsters, two slain by Federal agents, two waiting trial and four at large. Alvin Karpis, one of the ringleaders; Harry Campbell, W. J. Harrison and Joseph P. Moran are those still at large.

Details of the arrest Sunday were not revealed. In a terse official announcement it was stated the G-men captured Weaver and the Eaton woman two miles south of Allendale. Both have long criminal records and are expected to plead guilty.

WEAVER WAS GUARD

Weaver, it was stated, was one of the gang to capture Bremer, and guarded him en route from St. Paul to Bensonville, Ill., where the banker was held captive pending the ransom negotiations.

He is also declared to have arranged for the treatment of Bremer's wounds received in the kidnaping.

The Eaton woman, it was stated, maintained an apartment in St. Paul during the time when the kidnaping was being planned, and kept headquarters for more than a dozen members of the Karpis-Barker gang.

Weaver, who was born in Little Rock, Ark., in 1896, began his recorded criminal career at Joplin, Mo., in 1918, where he was arrested for vagrancy. He ran through a series of minor crimes until 1922, when he was arrested at Garden City, Kan., for attempted jail delivery.

GOT LIFE TERM

In 1925 he was sent to the Oklahoma State penitentiary on a life term for murder, and there met "Doc" Barker. He was paroled in 1932 about the same time Barker left the Oklahoma prison and the pair joined up in St. Paul's gang life.

Man, Woman Are Arrested In Daytona

Couple Flown at Once
to St. Paul By U. S.
Agents.

Are Among 22 Indicted
in Case; Karpis Is
Still at Large.

Two more persons, a man and a woman, have been arrested by Federal agents in Daytona, Fla., in connection with the Bremer kidnaping case, it was announced late yesterday at the Department of Justice.

They are William Weaver, alias Bill Scott, alias Phoenix Donald, and Myrtle Eaton. Both were among the 22 persons indicted for the kidnaping.

Already eight gangsters, including Arthur ("Doc") Barker, are in various penitentiaries for the Bremer kidnaping, some of them committed for life.

The two men most wanted, however, are still at large. They are Alvin Karpis, ranked as public enemy No. 1, and Harry Campbell. Karpis was leader of the "mob" that kidnaped Edward G. Bremer, wealthy St. Louis man, January 17, 1934, and held him until a ransom of \$200,000 was paid.

The Department of Justice also announced yesterday the arrest in Brooklyn of Robert C. Nelson, sought as a "fence" in the spectacular \$248,000 jewel robbery in the Miami-Biltmore Hotel in Coral Gables, Fla., last January.

Flown to St. Paul.

The jewelry was taken from Mrs. Margaret Hawksworth Bell, a former Follies dancer. The thieves, who were armed, took a watch and \$100 in cash from Harry Content, 71-year-old New York broker, a friend of Mrs. Bell.

Nelson, who is alleged to have received the stolen jewelry, has been charged with conspiracy to violate the national stolen property act.

William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, the two arrested in connection with the Bremer kidnaping, were placed in an airplane at Daytona yesterday and, guarded by Federal agents, were flown to St. Paul. They landed there at 5 p. m.

Mr. Bremer, son of Adolph Bremer, wealthy brewer and a leading Minnesota Democrat, was taking his child to school on the day that he was kidnaped. He told police later that the gang that seized him numbered from 10 to 12 men.

He was held prisoner until February 7, when he was slugged and thrown out of an automobile at Rochester, Minn., about 85 miles from St. Paul. By that time the kidnapers had collected the \$200,000 ransom.

Alvin Karpis, regarded by Federal agents as one of the most vicious killers in the land, is now the object of a widespread search. Like Weaver, he had used Florida as a hide-out. But last January Karpis and Harry Campbell, together with their women, journeyed to Atlantic City, and there engaged in a spectacular gun battle when police flushed them in a small hotel.

of using money supplied by Lloyds to recover it from Nelson.

Scafa staged a "public recovery" of the jewelry in the safety deposit department of a Miami bank. He later was indicted and convicted of perjury, the Government contending that he had lied in his explanation of how he got the loot.

Nelson, who was convicted of theft in 1931, was paroled after serving only a few months of a sentence that was to run from four to eight years. He is described by New York police as one of the biggest "fences" in the country, and they estimate that he has handled \$500,000 worth of stolen jewelry in the last few years.

Gang Nemesis Released

Seven other persons already are in jail in connection with the Miami-Biltmore robbery.

The arrest of Weaver and the Eaton woman yesterday was engineered by E. J. Connelly, manager of the Cincinnati bureau of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the nemesis of the Karper-Barkis gang.

It was this gang, one of the most desperate in America's crime annals, that kidnaped Edward G. Bremer, wealthy St. Paul man, in January, 1934, and held him until a \$200,000 ransom had been paid.

Agent Connelly led a raid in Florida last January which resulted in the killing of "Ma" Barker and her son Fred. Just previous to this, in Chicago, he had picked up Arthur (Doc) Barker, the woman's other son.

Arthur is now serving a life term, one of eight who are behind the bars in connection with the kidnaping.

The one man the Federal agents want most for this crime, however, is still at large—Alvin Karpis, ranking public enemy on the Government's list.

He, too, had been hiding in Florida last winter. But when Ma Barker and her son were killed he and Harry Campbell, together with their women, fled to Atlantic City.

A lookout had been broadcast for them and Atlantic City police located them in a small hotel in the resort town. There ensued a spectacular battle. Using sub-machine guns, Karpis and Campbell fought their way out of the hotel and, stealing an automobile, fled to the West.

They left their women behind them. One of them was an expectant mother.

The only others of the Bremer kidnaping gang who are still at large are W. J. Harrison and Joseph P. Moran.

Weaver and Mrs. Eaton (she is

the former wife of Clarence "Doc" Eaton) were living on the Florida chicken ranch as "Mr. and Mrs. Osborn." They made no fight when Agent Connelly and his men swooped down on them.

The couple, together with their 3-year-old adopted boy, were taken to Jacksonville and there placed in an airplane. With Connelly and four other agents guarding them, they flew to St. Paul, arriving at 5 p. m.

Five more agents met the plane at the airport and took the prisoners to the Federal building. The little boy appeared to be enjoying the adventure and was extremely friendly with the Government men.

Weaver, according to an Associated Press dispatch from St. Paul, is a man of many aliases. He was born in Little Rock, Ark., 39 years ago.

In May, 1922, he was arrested for stealing an automobile at Sapula, Okla., but was turned loose. At that time he gave his name as Phoenix O'Donald.

A month later he was arrested in Garden City, Kans., on a charge of attempting to assist in a jail delivery.

He was convicted in 1925 on a charge of murder and sentenced to life imprisonment in the Oklahoma State Prison. However, he was paroled in 1931.

In St. Paul, Minn., a year or so later, he was arrested and charged with carrying a concealed weapon.

He was released in \$500 bond and then "jumped" the bond.

The Eaton woman was arrested by Minneapolis police in 1930 on a charge of shoplifting. This later was changed to petit larceny and she was fined \$100. She was arrested several times thereafter on minor charges.

Federal Agents Capture Couple In Bremer Case

Kidnap Suspects Flown From Allendale, Fla., to St. Paul.

Federal agents struck hard over the week-end, capturing two more suspects in the Bremer kidnaping case and a man described as the "fence" in a \$185,000 jewelry robbery in Coral Gables, Fla. last January.

William Weaver, a paroled killer, and Myrtle Eaton, a convicted shoplifter, were arrested on a chicken ranch near Allendale, Fla.

They were among 22 who had been indicted in the celebrated Bremer "snatch," Weaver being named as one of the actual kidnapers and the Eaton woman as a conspirator.

When arrested Sunday morning the couple had a 3-year-old boy with them. They had "adopted" him somewhere in Florida.

Announcement of the arrest of Weaver and his companion was made late yesterday at the Department of Justice. At the same time the department announced the arrest in Brooklyn of Robert C. Nelson, a paroled Sing Sing convict, wanted in connection with the big jewelry robbery in the Miami-Biltmore Hotel in Coral Gables.

The victims of the robbery were Mrs. Margaret Hawksworth Bell, a former "Follies" dancer, and Harry Content, 71-year-old New York broker. Mrs. Bell has since married Content, and they are now on honeymoon in Europe.

Nelson, arrested Saturday as he returned from the Saratoga race track, is accused of receiving the stolen jewelry and of selling it to Mel C. Scafa, well-known private investigator, for \$45,000. The jewelry was insured by Lloyd's of London for \$185,000, and Scafa was accused

BREMER KIDNAP SUSPECTS TAKEN

William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton Are Held in St. Paul.

By the Associated Press.
ST. PAUL, September 3.—William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, among 22 persons indicted in the \$200,000 Edward G. Bremer kidnaping, were held in the county jail here today pending arraignment in Federal District Court.

Brought here late yesterday by airplane by Federal agents, following their capture Sunday on a chicken ranch near Allendale, Fla., the two were questioned here about the abduction and then jailed.

Weaver is charged with the actual kidnaping of the St. Paul banker January 17, 1934, and Mrs. Eaton is accused of conspiracy.

Weaver and Mrs. Eaton had been living in Florida as Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Osborne. They had legally adopted a 2-year-old baby the first of the year and were known by neighbors as chicken farmers.

In their house about two miles from Allendale, however, were found a half-dozen guns, including a shotgun and two automatic pistols.

Only Two Still at Large.

Arrest of Mrs. Eaton and Weaver left Alvin Karpis, long sought as public enemy No. 1, and Harry Campbell, his henchman, the only major principals still at large in the Bremer case.

Of the others indicted for the actual kidnaping, Harry Sawyer, former St. Paul bootlegger, is being held in jail here pending trial; Arthur Barker, leader of the Barker-Karpis gang, is serving a life sentence; Elmer Farmer and Harold Alderton, Bensenville, Ill., are serving 20 years; Byron Bolton is in the county jail here pending sentence and Volney Davis is serving a life term.

Others sentenced on conspiracy charges are John J. McLaughlin to five years, James Wilson to five years and Oliver Berg to life imprisonment.

PROGRESS IN BREMER CASE

In announcing the arrest of William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton yesterday, the Department of Justice also reported progress in solving the Miami-Baltimore jewel theft case as agents arrested Robert C. Nelson of Brooklyn, believed linked with the case, in New York City. Nelson is being charged with conspiracy to violate the national stolen property act.

Meanwhile, agents are pressing their search for Alvin Karpis, leader of the St. Paul mob and high ranking public enemy of the moment. Karpis shot his way out of a police trap in an Atlantic City, N. J., hotel last January and has been reported in many sections since.

Two Others Hunted.

Two other "big shot" kidnapers also still hold places on the department's "must" list, these being Thomas H. Robinson, jr., abductor of Mrs. Berry V. Stoll, Louisville Junior League, on October 10, 1934, and William Mahan, linked with the snatching of young George Weyerhaeuser in Tacoma, Wash., last May.

There have been rumors that Robinson suffered the same fate that ended the career of John Hamilton, Billinger gunman whose body was found last week in an Illinois gravel pit. Reports that the ransom bills have been slow to appear have strengthened the belief that the once-greased kidnaper may be dead.

A "lone wolf," Robinson cannot be traced through underworld connections, it has been pointed out. He has been reported in many parts of the United States.

COUPLE SETZED IN BREMER KIDNAPING

Man, Woman Arrested In Florida to Face St. Paul Trial

ST. PAUL, Sept. 3 (I.N.S.). William Weaver, 38, charged with being a member of the Barker-Karpis gang who kidnaped Edward G. Bremer, wealthy St. Paul banker, and his sweetheart, Myrtle Eaton, 32, were under heavy guard in the Ramsey County jail today, where they will wait arraignment.

They were captured by Department of Justice agents at a chicken ranch near Allendale, Fla., Sunday, and rushed here by plane yesterday.

Bremer, popular young banker and heir to brewery millions, was kidnaped January 17, 1934, and held for \$200,000 ransom. He was held for 21 days in a house at Bensenville, Ill.

The Eaton woman is charged with maintaining an apartment here as headquarters for the abduction gang, and with aiding in the preliminary arrangements.

A paroled convict and a woman have been arrested by G-men as the central figures in the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, wealthy St. Paul banker, the Department of Justice announced.

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Four Still Free
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Weaver, it was stated, was one of the gang to capture Bremer and guarded him en route from St. Paul to Bensenville, Ill., where the banker was held captive pending the ransom negotiations.

The Eaton woman, it was stated, maintained an apartment in St. Paul during the time when the kidnaping was being planned, and kept headquarters for more than a dozen members of the Karpis-Barker gang.

Weaver, who was born in Little Rock, Ark., in 1896, began his recorded criminal career at Joplin, Mo., in 1918, where he was arrested for vagrancy. He ran through a series of minor crimes until 1922, when he was arrested at Garden City, Kan., for attempted jail delivery.

In 1925 he was sent to the Oklahoma State penitentiary on a life term for murder, and there met "Doc" Barker. He was paroled in 1932 about the same time Barker left the Oklahoma prison and the pair joined up in St. Paul's gang life.

Weaver, according to Federal agents, was one of the chief organizers of the Bremer kidnaping. He was described as an obscure but desperate criminal.

The Eaton woman, a native of Des Moines, Iowa, has a long record as a shoplifter and has associated with criminals practically throughout her adult life, according to officials.

RETURN 2 AS KIDNAPERS

RECALL GRAVE OPENING.

The two year old boy was adopted by the Eaton woman four months ago, Connelley said, evidently in an attempt to give the couple a cloak of respectability that would help hide their identity.

Connelley refused to reveal how the hideout was located. However, the grave of John Hamilton, Dillinger mobsman, may have yielded the clew which led to the capture, it was learned last night.

Connelley was present near Oswego, Ill., at the opening of Hamilton's grave, Wednesday, it was learned, attended the autopsy the following day, and Friday chartered a plane for Florida. The arrest of Weaver and the Eaton woman followed two days later.

SERVED PRISON TERM.

They were accompanied by a squad of federal agents, who said the pair were arrested on a chicken ranch near Allendale, Fla., where they had been living as Mr. and Mrs. Osborne with a boy, 3, whom they said they adopted a year ago.

Just what connection the man and woman had with the abduction of Bremer in January, 1934, would not be divulged. Federal agents simply said they would be charged in connection with the kidnaping, for which \$200,000 was paid in ransom.

U. S. AGENTS RESUME KARPIS GANG HUNT

Only 6 of 22 Indicted in Bremer Kidnaping Still at Large.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 3.—(AP)—Federal agents, encouraged by the arrest Sunday of William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, resumed their hunt today for a steadily dwindling band the government wishes to call to account for the \$200,000 Edward G. Bremer kidnaping. Of twenty-two persons indicted, only six still are hunted.

Today, a little more than a year and a half since the young banker was abducted and held twenty-one days, agents surveyed this record of the persons indicted for the crime: Convicted and serving prison terms up to life, seven, including Arthur (Doc) Barker, a leader of the gang.

Four Held in County Jail.

Held in the county jail here awaiting sentence or arraignment, four. In this group are Mrs. Eaton and Weaver, arrested near Allendale, Fla.; Harry Sawyer, alleged "finger man," and Byron Bolton, Chicago, who has pleaded guilty to conspiracy.

Acquitted, two; charges dismissed, three.

Still sought, six; Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1; Harry Campbell, his associate; William Harrison, former St. Louis (Mo.) golf pro; Dr. Joseph P. Moran, alleged to have cared for members of the Barker-Karpis gang, and two men indicted as "John Doe" and "Richard Roe."

Several others, including Fred and Kate (Ma) Barker, were slain before the indictments were returned.

George F. Sullivan, United States district attorney, said the last two to be caught in the government net probably would be arraigned in "a couple of weeks" and tried at the November term of Federal Court.

William Weaver, who will go on trial in federal court next November charged with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, Commercial State bank president, is alleged to have been in one of the "lookout" cars at the time of the snatching.

The federal government will charge that Weaver was in a Buick sedan driven by Harry Campbell, fugitive suspect. It was to this car that Mr. Bremer was transferred on Edgumbe rd., where Mr. Bremer's car was abandoned.

Weaver and Myrtle Eaton, his sweetheart, were captured in Florida Sunday morning and brought to St. Paul Monday. They are both in Ramsey county jail, the former under \$100,000 bond and the latter's bond having been set at \$15,000. The Eaton woman is charged with conspiracy.

Weaver is alleged to have received \$12,000 as his end of the \$200,000 ransom paid to kidnapers for the release of the St. Paul banker. He is alleged to have received his share in the split of the money in George Ziegler's apartment in Chicago. Ziegler was later slain by gangland "pals."

Weaver had less than \$1,000 on his person when captured. However, federal agents say that he had paid cash for the chicken ranch, where, with Myrtle Eaton, he had been living since November, 1934. He also had two small cars that he had paid cash for.

Weaver and the Eaton woman will go on trial along with Harry Sawyer, alleged finger man, who has been in Ramsey county jail since last April.

The capture of Weaver is considered by Federal agents almost as important as that of any of the so-called Barker-Karpis gang leaders, of the lot because of his excellent shooting ability. It is said that his mob mates respected his ability so much that one night in Bensenville, Ill., where Mr. Bremer was being held captive, Weaver took a punch at Alvin Karpis, one of the mob's co-leaders and Karpis did not hit back.

Weaver "divorced" himself from the split up of the money and under

Roy McCord, radio operator who was shot and critically wounded a few days before the kidnaping in January, 1933, allegedly by members of the Barker-Karpis mob, was expected to view Weaver later today or Thursday in an effort to identify the gangster as one of his assailants.

Department of Justice officials pointed out that the McCord shooting was a St. Paul police case and not under their jurisdiction, but they said they would be glad to permit the police to take McCord to view the prisoner.

Gus Barfus, acting police chief, said today he was making arrangements for a comparison between the bullets fired at McCord and those fired when Alvin Karpis and his henchman, Harry Campbell, escaped from a police trap in Atlantic City, to see if any had been shot from the same gun. The acting chief said that if this were the case it would connect the Barker-Karpis mob even more definitely with the St. Paul shooting.

**County Jail
Becomes Fort**

**Four Bremer Suspects
Closely Guarded.**

Ramsey county jail once more has been turned into a heavily defended fort as four Bremer kidnap suspects await either trial or sentencing.

Myrtle Eaton, charged with conspiracy in connection with the \$200,000 ransom snatching, is expected to be released on \$15,000 bond within the next few days.

In the meantime William Weaver and Harry Sawyer, two of the 12 men charged with the actual kidnaping, are heavily guarded by deputy United States marshal.

Byron Bolton, who pleaded guilty several months ago and later turned state's evidence, is awaiting sentence. He is expected to be the federal government's principal witness against Sawyer, Weaver and the Eaton woman when they go to trial in November.

From Chicago came a United Press dispatch saying that another Bremer snatching suspect was held there by federal bureau of investigation agents. The suspect is said to have been brought from Detroit by plane and is due to be taken to St. Paul in a few days.

Weaver today is believed to have beaten two additional "raps."

One was the failure of Roy McCord, sensational shooting victim in January, 1934 to identify Weaver as one of the men who in cold-blooded manner shot him down in an alley in the rear of an apartment occupied by Weaver and Myrtle Eaton.

The other was word from West Plains, Mo., authorities who said they would not ask for his return in connection with the slaying of Sheriff Kelly there in December, 1931.

**WEAVER VIEWED
BY BULLET VICTIM**

**Kidnap Suspect Resembles
One of Men Who Shot Him,
McCord Says.**

William Weaver, Barker-Karpis mobster now being held in Ramsey county jail, was said today by Roy McCord, radio operator, to resemble one of the men who shot and seriously wounded him a few nights before the Edward G. Bremer kidnaping in January, 1933, with which Weaver is charged.

McCord visited the jail and viewed the prisoner this morning. He was accompanied by Tom Grace, St. Paul police detective. The radio operator said it was impossible for him to make a positive identification, as it was dark when the shooting occurred and difficult for him to see his assailants, but that Weaver had the same general appearance as one of them.

The shooting took place at Portland avenue and Grotto streets, when McCord drove his automobile beside a car in which were several alleged members of the Barker-Karpis gang, who opened fire without warning. Apparently without any motive, the shooting is believed to have taken place because they mistook McCord for an officer.

TAKEN FROM DETROIT TO CHICAGO BY AIRPLANE; WILL BE BROUGHT HERE

Another Bremer kidnaping suspect is believed to be in custody.

A United Press dispatch from Chicago today says that federal bureau of investigation agents held a prisoner in Chicago, taken from Detroit by airplane. The prisoner's identity was not revealed.

The prisoner is expected to be brought to St. Paul within a few days, according to the dispatch.

Of the remaining Karpis-Barker gang members, charged with the snatching of the St. Paul banker and holding him for \$200,000 ransom, Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell are the so-called big shots still "on the lam." William Harrison and Dr. Joseph Moran are the other two not yet caught, and the latter is believed dead.

The remainder of the gang are either dead, in prison or awaiting trial.
