Mr. Fink also said that Essential Lite leases alone are ordered en very rare occasions and that it would not be difficult for these exclusive agents to determine who purkhased such leases within the period. He also said that the leases are interchangeable, that is, Essential Lite leases are put into \$07R type and these leases may be taken out and fitted into the 524 M & L model.

Mr. Fink also advised that the Chicago Ryc Shield Company to his knowledge, does not sell direct to any manufacturer or jobber without the knowledge of the exclusive agent. For example, if the Dupent Company ordered goggles direct, his company would receive the purchase order and fill the order. In this connection it is suggested that inquiry be made to determine who is the exclusive agent in the states of Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin and Michigan.

Reference is also made to my letter of March led to your office concerning these goggles. On April 23, 1934 information was received by the Chicago Office of this Division to the effect that an individual had appeared at the Eptown State Bank of Chicago, Illinois and presented \$900, consisting of five dollar bills and \$100, consisting of ten and twenty dollar bills to be exchanged for ten \$100 bills. The suspicion of the Assistant Cashier who handled this transaction was aroused because he recalled the same individual having made a similar request about a week before. So therewoon compared the numbers of the five dollar bills with those of the numbers of the bills paid as ranson in the Brener kidnaping case, which had previously been submitted to this and all other banks in Chicago by the Division, and found part of the money exchanged to be identical with that of the Brener ranson money. As a result of this information, a circular, confidential letter was directed to all banks in the Chicago district, advising that the Brener ranson noney was being exchanged in Chicago.

On April 26, 1934 on individual, later identified on William E. Avidler, willed at the First Batispal Benk and exchanged some money. The tellers of the bank having recalled the circular letter sent out by the Chicago Office impediately reported same and stated that the individual exchanging the somer might be located at a certain address. Therespon, agents of this Division immediately proceeded to the address in question and suppreded in locating Vidler who was taken into sustedy. So had in his possession at that time \$3,185, \$2,265 of which was identified as part of the renson money paid in the Bremer kidneping case. A comparison of the fingerprints of Vidler with those in the Division's Identification Duit disclosed that he was received on March J, 1920 on a charge of larces to serve a sentence of from one to ten years in the State Fentientiary at Joliet, Illinois. Vidlor, after being questioned considerably, disclosed that he had obtained this money from John J. McLaughlin alias "Bose" McLaugh lin, a political leader on the West Side of Chicago. McLaughlin was also taken into custody and later his sou, Jack McLaughlin, was arrested at the Board of Trade in Chicago and \$300 was found concented in his but, \$65 of which was identified as part of the Bremer ranson money. Upon being question ed, young McLeughlin stated that his father had given him \$260 of this mor at the time of the Bank Moratorium in March of 1933. Philip beloney, an associate of Vidler, has also been taken into custody and admits in a signed statement driving an automobile transporting Vidler and McLaughlin to various banks where Vidler exchanged money, and that he, Delaney, personally exchanged \$24,000 in bills given to him by McLaughlin.

The Semior Molemphlim refused to make any statement until informed that his son had been taken into custody. Thereupon he savised that he mot one Frank Fright, a Chicago confidence men and underworld character, in the lobby of the Sherman Botel at Chicago and that Bright had suggested to him that he exchange this kidneping momey; that he again not Bright in the Sherman Botel about three weeks ago and that Bright introduced to him two men, known as James and Smith, at the Irving Botel; that these men told Helenghlim they recently arrived from Toledo, Ohio and handled "hot" manay for powerful Mid-East gangsters and that they had \$100,000 to be exchanged, and that he, McLaughlim, agreed to exchange this money on a five per cent commission basis, and that he began to exchange this money on April 17th through Chicago banks, assisted by his friends Vidler and Delaney who did the actual exchangings

McLaughlin states that the money was sometimes delivered to his home and that he sometimes obtained it from the Irving Hotel from Smith and Jones. In connection with the request in the concluding paragraph of your letter for information as to whether Phoenix Donald alias Bill seaver should be located, you are advised that from information received, it is likely that this individual is a member of the Berker-Karpis gang, who partieipated in the kidneping of Mr. Bremer. There is no surrent evidence to point to this conclusion; however, one object in locating him would be to determine whether he possesses eny of the ransom money; and it is believed that this is of ourficient importance to warrant a search for Bill Weaver. In *** the event he is at the time accompanied by Mrs. Myrtle Eston, and it is considered likely that she will eventually talk, probably furnishing incriminating evidence against Teaver and the rest of the Barker-Kerpis gang. This is based upon information received to the effect that Myrtle Maton is not fond of Mill Weaver but is his mistress at intervals by force rather than by choice.

In connection with the above titled case, an investigation was conducted by this office at the State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, upon instructions of Inspector H. H. Clegg, to ascertain criminal record and other data concerning Phoenix Donald, alias Bill Scott, alias William Menver, and other aliases. In connection therewith there is attached hereto a copy of a letter from this office to Inspector Clegg, dated April 19, 1934, which letter it is requested that you return to this office upon the completion of your investigation. It will be noted from that communication that Phoenix Donald, at the time he was incarcerated in the State Penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma, carried on certain correspondence with relatives and others, in the course of which the name of Mrs. W. T. Bowling, sister, Salem, Arkansas, appears.

This is to advise that Special Agent Paul Hansen of this office telephonically advised me today from Mammoth Spring, Arkenses that his investigation disclosed that Krs. W. T. Bowling, sister of Phoenix Donald, received a letter from him addressed in his own handwriting and mailed at Fort Worth, Texas. This is the only information I have, nothing being known as to local address or hotel stationery upon which the letter may have been written. However, it is thought advisable to conduct an investigation relative thereto in view of the fact that Inspector Clagg advised this office under date of April Both that "information received by this office indicates that he (Phoenix Donald alias William Woaver) is very probably one of the kidnapers (above titled case) as he is known to have been a very close associate of the Barker-Karpis gang for some time."

Photograph of Phoenix Donald, alias William Weaver, is attached hereto and it is requested that this photo be returned to the Oklahoma City office when it has served its purpose.



RESORABLUTE FOR THE ATTORNEY GREENAL

In semmention with the investigation which this Division is conducting into the Bremer kidnaping, I wanted to advise you that yesterday Agents of this Division in Chicago took into custedy W. E. Videler. Videler had upon his person \$2,660 of the Bremer money. Videler was convicted in 1920 in Illinois for larceny and sentenced to from one to ten years in the State Penitentiary. In examining Videler, he made a statement that he had received this money from one John McLaughlin, reported to be a West Side politicism in Chicago. Harrants have been obtained for the arrest of McLaughlin, as well as Videler.


In somection with this matter, I wanted to advise you of a development at Chicago which has been characteristic of some of the past developments incident to cases upon which we have worked. In some manner, possibly through employees of the bank which advised we of the efforts of Videler to exchange the bills which he had for larger bills, the newspapers learned that there was some investigative activity. They made inquiry of Mr. Purvis, the Agent in Charge of this Division at Chicago, and in accordance with the instructions which have always governed in these matters, Mr. Purvis stated at the time he could not make any comment. At that particular time Agente of our Division were endeavoring to locate McLaughlin, and to have made any public statement concerning the matter would possibly have resulted in failure to locate Eclaughlia. Some of the representatives of the press at Chicago became highly indignant because Mr. Farvis would not give them all the details concerning the matter and I understand that one of these representatives called Mashington and talked with Mr. Carusi in your office relative to the same. It has been quite difficult at Chicago to impress upon the representatives of the press that we cannot conduct our investigations in the newspapers and that we cannot disclose the details of our work. Because of Mr. Purvis' action in fellowing the policy of met talking for publication in such matters he has incurred cortain contition, and I wented you to know of this particular situation, because I believe that he has merely done the intelligent and sensible thing. If we were to disclose to the press the various Investigative steps which have been and are to be taken, naturally could not make very much headway.

was again interviewed by Special Agent O. G. Hall on March 20, at which time he was given \$10 to meet living expenses.

He stated that "Frisco Dutch" Steinhardt is returning to the Twin Cities within the next two or three days and that "Frisco Dutch" has promised him employment of some kind.

He stated that he has discussed with many underworld characters, mostly minor, the story appearing in the press regarding the identification of the Karpis and Barker gang, and it appears that none of the local characters know Karpis and the Barkers. All of them were of the opinion, however, that Karpis and Barker had done the kidnaping inasmuch as they had been named by this Division. He believes that the story in the papers will keep the Karpis and Barker gang out of the Twin Cities. There is also some talk among the underworld characters that there must be at least two or three local men involved in the kidnaping because of the familiarity with the habits of the Bremer family.

Concerning "Dutch Louie", who was living at the Micollet Hotel until two days ago, the informer said that Dutch Louie is Louie Schonenberg and he described him as being 240 pounds, light hair, Jewish, 48 years of age. He stated that Dutch Louie was visited by Jack Pfeiffer and Mose Barnett.





McIntire were assigned to accompany me on the survey of towns to be made with reference to locating the hide-out where Bremer was held. Special Agent McIntire is assigned to the Bremer Case at the Chicago Office and has developed an index of the case and has arranged his files according to subject matter. Agent McIntire advised me that no work had been done on the Bremer Case at the Chicago Office since the first of April, inasmuch as instructions had been received from the Division to concentrate all Agents on Dillinger leads. When information was obtained at Whitewater, Wisconsin, on April 16, 1934, indicating that the Pitt sisters, who were serving a sentence at the Reformatory at Milwaukee, and the Shaw brothers, who were serving a sentence at Green Bay, Wisconsin, possibly had information concerning the subjects involved in the Bremer Case, Agent Peterson was sent to Milwaukee and Green Bay. Wisconsin for the purpose of interviewing these individuals, and it was later learned that these individuals had previously been interviewed by Special Agent R. B. Brown, prior to April 1, and no report covering the interviews had been submitted, and therefore Special Agent McIntire was not sware of the fact that these individuals had been interviewed. Special Agent Brown apparently having been put on the emergency Dillinger leads, had not had an opportunity to submit a report covering these interviews. When this matter was brought to the attention of Special Agent in Charge Purvis, he instructed Brown to promptly submit the report, and it was suggested to Mr. Purvis that Special Agent McIntire devote his time to the Bremer Case, in order to become thoroughly acquainted with the investigation conducted to date, so RECORDE INDECED



I am attaching, hereto, a newspaper clipping taken from the Chicago Daily Tribune of April 30, 1934, relating to the alleged implication of William Elmer Mead in the above entitled case. The facts set forth in the newspaper clipping compare favorably with those developed by Special Agents of the Division in this case.

It will be noted in the report of Inspector W. A. Rorer, under date of February 20, 1934, Edward G. Bremer, the Victim in this case, was interviewed concerning his transaction with Martin Wunderlich, who it is alleged borrowed a large sum of money from Bremer as a result of the fraudulent scheme of William Elmer Mead.

Your attention is also respectfully invited to my letter dated January 27, 1934, wherein information is set forth as provided by Lieutenant Edward J. Kelly of the Confidence Men Detail, Chicago Police Department. It will be noted from this letter that Mr. Kelly interviewed Martin Wunderlich on January 26, 1934, at which time Mr. Wunderlich explained the details of the confidence game and identified the picture of one, William E. Mead, Chicago Police Department group picture number 5647. This individual is known to Lieutenant Kelly and was arrested at 2970 Sheridan Road on August 10, 1933 as a Fugitive from Lima, Chio and was returned to Lima where he remained, forfeiting a \$30,000.00 bond.

Although the information contained in the newspaper account corresponds favorably with the information developed by Special Agents of the Division, please be advised that no information whatever concerning same was furnished to the press by the Chicago Office.

The order for his rrest followed the seizure of John F Boss] McLaughlin and four others ate last week as a result of the trac ng of some of the \$200,000 Bremer insom here.

Contractor is Swindled.

The Bremer investigation revealed esterday that, a short time before he kidnaping. Martin Wunderlich, a. t. Paul and Jefferson City, Mo. copractor, was swindled out of at least 50,000, according to the operatives. dead and his gang.





With the exception of Agents Birch and Owens Mr. Brantley is of the opinion that all of the Agents now assigned to the Oklahoma City office are doing at least avorage work and that the following Agents are above the average; Black, Chipman, Deaderick and Hansen, in the order named.

Wilking, Superintendent, The Texas Company, Casper, Wyoming, in which he expresses his regret that he is unable to inform me what disposition was made of a pair of Cesco H & L-524 goggles, said to have been shipped by the Chicago Eye Shield Company to the Texaco Company, Denver, Colorado. Mr. Wilking stated that his company furnishes goggles for its employees use when their work requires them, and at the present time his company has twelve pair of goggles, and that during recent years they have had as many as 100 pairs of Cesco goggles which have been worn out or lost.

Along the same lines Mr. L.A. Wilson of the Chief Dil Co., Grass Creek, Wyoming, informs that one pair of Cesco M & L-524 goggles is presently in use by one of the welders of that company. The records of the Chio Cil Company, according to Mr. Wilson, show that this pair of goggles were purchased through the Wyoming Automotive Company, Casper, Wyoming, and not through the Hendrie & Bolthoff Manufacturing & Supply Co., Denver, Colorado. Mr. Wilson expresses the possibility that the Wyoming Automotive Company were unable to supply the goggles, and the order was passed on the Bendrie & Bolthoff, who in turn placed the order with the Chicago Rye Shield Company. Mr. Wilson states that the firm order number 192295, as mentioned in my letter to him under date of April 17th, 1934, conforms exactly to the goggles he received.



In connection with the investigation involving Alvin Karpis with aliases, I.O. #1218, et al; Edward George Bremer, Victim - Kidnaping, this office has to inform as follows.

It has been determined that Bernard
Phillips, I.O. \$1196, was in New York City stopping at the Hotel
Belvedere from August 24 to September 24, 1932, with his paramour
Winnie Williams, who is at present residing in Chicago. A sheek of
the telephone calls disclosed that on September 2nd, 4th, and \$th,
1932, Phillips telephoned Rhinelander 4-9362, which is listed in the
name of the Hilebbook Apartments, \$1 E. 66th Street, New York City.
This apartment house contains thirteen apartments and is located in
one of the better sections of Manhattan. Inquiry was made to determine just whom Phillips might have called and through the process of
elimination, it is believed the person called has been identified.

One Edward Rudick resided on the fifth floor of this apartment house with his alleged wife. He came there about July 1, 1932 and was requested to leave, which he did on or about September 15, 1932. He was a weekly tenant and paid in cash. He had a sar with Minnesota plates. His alleged wife may be described to the spars of age, 5' 8", 125 pounds, alender build, blonde, tough leaking. Mrs. Edward Rudick left the apartment house about three days before Rudick did. The day Rudick moved out a man assisted him in packing and moving and the superintendent believes this man to have been Phillips.

The Edward Rudick referred to was arrested at New York City on September 18, 1952 charged with extertion. His identification number here is Bl07516. He was discharged September 26, 1952. The files of the New York City Police Department reveal that this same individual was arrested at Mismi, Florida on March 7, 1934 for giolatica of the Harrison Marcotic Act and turned ever to the United States Marcotic Service. It is requested that immediate inquiry be made of the Harcotic Service to determine the present status of the case against Rudick. His place of residence prior to March, 1934 at Missi should be checked to determine whether Phillips or any of the fugitives in this or the allied cases have visited him and the arresting officers should be interviewed to determine what they know ecocorning his associates while in Mismi. Also, it is believed desirable that upon completion of this investigation Rudick be personally interviewed to determine just when and under what circumstances he met Phillips, his activities with Phillips, the last time he saw Phillips, and so forth. The identity of the woman with whom he was living in New York should likewise be ascertained.

For your further information be advised that Winnie Williams was recently interviewed by the Chicago effice. She said that she came to New York City is August 1932 with Phillips but after they were here about two weeks or so Phillips left the hotel to play gelf one day and never returned and she has not seen him since and that the car he went away in was a small sedan bearing New Jersey lipense plates. Upon a later interview Winnie Williams contradicted herself and said that constine in the second December, 1932, while living in Kenses City with Phillips the latter stopped on the street one day and spoke to Alvin Karpis, I.O. fills, but did not introduce her to Karpis. Our investigation at the Hotel Belvidere disclosed the possibility that Phillips did leave Wimie Williams and her child at the hotel alone inasmuch as on September Y. 1932 it would appear from the resords that Winnie Williams and her daughter moved from the suite into another room in the hotel. It is observed that Budiek was in New York City on September 18, 1952. If & Phillips did actually disappear, Rudick would be in a position to furnish information as to statements made by Phillips just prior to his departure from New York City as it is noted Phillips spake to him on September 6, 1938.







DETAILS:

At Chicago, Illinois

The title of this case is being carried as changed, due to the inclusion of the new Subjects - J. J. McLAUCHLIN, JCHN JOSEPH MCLAUCHLIN, JR., PHILIP J. DELANEY and WILLIAM EDWARD VIDLER, who were recently arrested in Chicago, Illinois for having in their possession, having passed, or having attempted to pass and conspired to pass and exchange certain portions of the BREMER ransom money.

Information was secured through the Lakeview Trust and Savings Bank, 320 North Ashland Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, on April 23, 1934, that a party, later identified as Subject VIDIER, had exchanged certain portions of the Bremer ransom money at said bank for good currency. Later investigation disclosed the following summary of information.

Following is a brief summarization of the evidence in the possession of this office, against the parties now detained, by virtue of having in their possession, or having passed at banks, or having conspired to pass at various banks, quantities of the BREMER ransom money:

WILLIAM EDWARD VIDLER

On April 26, 1934, Mr. Fred J. Bauer, in company with Mr. L. W. Calkins, both of the City National Bank & Trust Company, 208 South La Salle Street, Chicago, Illinois, advised Special Agent H. L. Scott, of this office, that a person, now believed to be VIDLER, on the same morning presented ten Ten Dollar bills and requested to be given in exchange for them, one hundred one Dollar bills. This man has not as yet been positively identified as VIDLER, but it appears, through Vidler's own admissions, that he is the man who attempted to make this exchange of money. The bills presented by VIDLER on this occasion for exchange, are serialized as follows:-

This money is in the possession of the City National Bank and Trust Company, 208 South Lasalle Street, Chicago, Illinois, and if it is desired for Grand Jury purposes, subpoena duces tecum should be issued MOR WILLIAM ZOCH, a teller, care of said bank.

Investigation disclosed that the above referred to money is identical with a portion of the Bremer ransom money.

It was ascertained that the party believed to be VIDLER, had attempted to exchange this money through WILLIAM ZOCH, a teller at the City National Bank & Trust Company. Arrangements were then made by Special Agents L. D. Michols and J. H. Rice, of the Chicago Division Office, to accompany Mr. Zoch to a "bookie" joint at 226 South Wells Street, Chicago, Illinois, at which place, the party believed to be VIDLER, informed Zoch he could be found.

Mr. Zoch partially identified VIDLER. The latter was brought to the Chicago Division Office by Agents Nichols and Rice and admitted that he was WILLIAM EDWARD VIDLER, who had made the exchange of money at the City National Bank & Trust Company, through Teller Zoch.

Special Agents L. D. Nichols and J. H. Rice, of the Chicago Division Office, will be able to testify to the above admissions on the part of VIDLER.

At the Chicago Division Office, Vidler was exemined and money in the amount of \$3,185.00 was found on his person, of which amount, \$2,625.00 was identified as Bremer ransom money. Following is a list of the Federal Reserve notes found on Vidler's person, which were identified as Bremer ransom money:

Special Agents (A) R. A. Knittle and A. H. Crowl, of the Chicago Division Office, can testify as to having compared this money, found in the possession of VIDLER, with the list of Bremer ransom notes, and this money was found to be identical with the money paid by BREMER. This is now in the possession of the Chicago Division Office and call the presented by either Agent Knittle or Agent Crowl, if desired.

Mr. William H. Bleschke, teller and assistant cashier of the Lakeview Trust & Savings Bank, 5201 Ashland Avenue, Chicago, Illi, will be able to testify that on April 23, 1934, VIDLER exchanged \$1,000.00 in Ten Dollar bills and \$1,000.00 in Five Dollar bills, for other money, at Bleschke's cage. Mr. Bleschke has positively identified VIDLER, by virtue of having seen him in the Chicago Division Office.

Bleschke will testify that on Monday, April 23, 1934, when VIDLER asked for an exchange of bills, he (VIDLER) told Bleschke that he (Vidler) formerly delivered alcohol up in Wisconsin and that was the way they pay up there, using small bills.

Mr. Bleschke furnished Agent John R. Welles, of the Chicago Division Office, with thirty-one Federal Reserve notes, drawn on the Minneapolis Branch, and being of Five Dollar denomination, for purpose of examination. It is understood these are the only bills which were set aside by Mr. Bleschke. Examination disclosed that each of these Mills was a part of the Bremer ransom money and are listed as follows:-

Chicago, Illinois
April 27, 1934.

I, WILLIAM E. VIDLER, do hereby make this statement to special Agents H. E. Hollis and L. D. Nichols, of the Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, of my own free will voluntarily and without any force or duress, and without any promise of immunity or reward. I make this statement freely and voluntarily of my own free will because it is true.

My name is William E. Widler. I am 34 years of age, having been born in Chicago, August 22, 1900.

I have known McLAUGHLIN several years. He came to me Tuesday, April 17, 1934, and said he had some money he wanted changed in large bills. He did not want to go to the bank himself. I said to let me know whenever he was ready. He came to my house at 5001 North Ashland Avenue, Thursday morning April 19, 1934 and rang my bell and called me downstairs. I came down to the car and he showed me a package of money. McLaughlin had a Ford sedan. A man by the name of Phil was driving the car. Phil is an associate of McLaughlin.

I asked McLaughlin what the money was, and asked him if it was counterfeit money and he said 'No, it is good money'. So we drove downtown and went to several banks, as follows:

Continental Illinois Bank and Trust Company, where I presented \$2,500.00 worth of the bills given to me by McLaughlin and secured \$2,500.00 worth of larger bills in denominations of \$100.00. The teller at the bank objected to changing this money, stating that it cost the bank money to transact that kind of business.

From there, I went to the First Mational Bank and cashed \$2,000.00. The teller gave me the same story there, so I went to the City National Bank and cashed \$500.00. I also cashed \$500.00 of these bills at the Builders National Bank.

I do not recall the effect denominations of the bills I secured at the last three mentioned banks; however, to the best of my knowledge at this time, it was in \$50.00 and \$100.00 denominations.

I went to another bank, the name of which I do not remember, and eashed \$500.00. From there, I was driven home and given about \$110.00 by McLaughlin. I wish to state here that all of the money eashed by me at the banks mentioned above, was turned over to McLaughlin by me.

On Friday, April 20, 1934, McLaughlin appeared at the same time at my house and told me he had \$6,000.00 more. McLaughlin was again accompanied by Phil, who was driving the car. We drove first to the Hamilton State Bank and changed \$1,000.00; went to the Lake-view Bank and cashed \$2,000.00; went to the Main State Bank and cashed \$3,000.00 and there I was given \$60.00 by McLaughlin.

On Saturday, April 21, 1934, McLaughlin came again with \$6,000.00 and we went to the Uptown Bank and cashed \$2,000.00; went to the Lakeview Bank and cashed \$2,000.00; went to the Main State Bank with the other \$2,000.00. McLaughlin gave me approximately \$60.00 for cashing the \$6,000.00 on April 21st.

On Monday, April 23, 1934, McLaughlin again came to my house and at this time he had \$11,000.00 in bills, which he desired to have changed. I went to the Howard Trust and Savings Bank and cashed \$1,500.00; went to the uptown Bank and cashed \$1,500.00; went to the Lakeview Bank and cashed \$3,000.00; went to the Main State Bank and cashed \$3,000.00; went to the Pioneer Trust & Savings Bank and cashed \$2,000.00. McLaughlin gave me somewhere in the neighborhood of \$70.00 for cashing the above mentioned \$11,000.00 on April 23, 1934.

On Tuesday morning, April 24, 1934, McLaughlin's car was laid up, so I drove over to his house. McLaughlin told me the day before, that is April 23rd, that he was putting his car in the garage and, therefore, I went to his house at 3523 West Jackson Blvd., Chicago, Illinois. I went in to McLaughlin's house but he was not ready. I then went and had a tire repaired and returned to the above address, at which time McLaughlin was ready. He came out to the car and we then drove to the Main State Bank and the teller refused to change money for me. However, he did not give me any reason for his refusal, but said he could not do it today. No more money was given to me until Wednesday afternoon, April 25, 1934, when I was given \$3,000.00, with the understanding that I was to take it to Louisville, Kentucky to change, and return to McLaughlin Friday morning, April 26, 1934. When I arrived downtown Thursday morning, I was apprehended.

of April 19, 1934, when McLaughlin called for me at my more and when I came down to the car to talk to him, Phil was in the car and he heard our conversation about changing the money.

I wish to state further that nearly every day while I was with molaughlin and Phil on the above mentioned occasions, Phil drove to the South side and parked near 79th and Emerald Avenue, where Phil would get out of the car and walk in the direction of 79th and Halsted

and after approximately one half hour, Phil would return with an invelope and hand it to McLaughlin. I wish to state further that every day after the money had been cashed at the banks, we would drive to Irving and Cicero Avenues, in Chicago, and McLaughlin would get out of the car and walk west on Irving, returning to the car in about 20 minutes. We statement was ever made to me by Phil or McLaughlin as to who was contacted at these places.

In the beginning of this statement, I said that I asked
McLaughlin whether the money was counterfeit money. I wish to
elaborate on this statement in that McLaughlin told me that it was
good money, but that it was 'hot' money, but that I need not be
afraid of it. All of the money given to me by McLaughlin to be
changed into larger bills was in \$5. and \$10. denominations. The
arrangement between McLaughlin and myself was that I was to receive
1% commission on the money changed. The first knowledge I had of
the nature of this money was information given to me by Mr. Purvis.

At one time during the days I was changing the money for McLaughlin, I asked him how much of this he had and McLaughlin stated it was about \$30,000.00 or \$40,000.00 more.

JOHN JOSEPH MCLAUCHLIN, JR.

Special Agent A. E. Lockerman, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, 1900 Bankers Building, Chicago, Illinois, will testify he secured Chicago Board of Trade Safe Deposit Company receipt No. 7868, issued to JACK MCLAUCHLIN on April 24, 1934, to cover Box No. C-521, from Special Agent in Charge M. H. Purvis, same having been secured from Special Agent L. D. Nichols, who conducted an investigation at the home of J. J. McLAUCHLIN, Sr., 3523 Jackson Boulevard, Chicago, Illinois.

Mr. Lockerman will advise that on April 27, 1934, he went to the Safe Deposit Box Section of the Chicago Board of Trade Safe Deposit Company, 141 West Jackson Blvd., Chicago, Illinois, to make pertinent investigation, where he observed a young man enter the vaults, whom he later identified as JOHN JOSEPH MCLAUCHLIN, JR.

He will further testify that he, together with Special Agent M. C. Falkner, interviewed McLAUCHLIN, Jr. at the Chicago Board of Trade Building, Chicago, Illinois, where McLaughlin, Jr. admitted he is identical with JACK McLAUCHLIN, to whom safe deposit box C-521 was issued by the Chicago Board of Trade Safe Deposit Company on April 24, 1934.

Lockerman will testify that McLaughlin, Jr. admitted he had gone to the Safe Deposit Box that morning, April 27, 1934, at about 8:45 o'clock; that McLaughlin, Jr. stated he had obtained \$55.00 from his safe deposit box, which money he took out of his pockets and showed to Agents Lockerman and Falkner, stating he was scheduled to go on his vacation the following Monday, April 30, 1934, and that he had obtained the money from the vault for that reason on said morning, because the vaults closed at 1:00 P.M. that day and he would have no epportunity to return there.

Agent Lockerman or Agent M. C. Falkner, will testify that
McLaughlin, Jr. admitted his father is "Boss" McLaughlin. The said
Agents will testify they searched McLaughlin, Jr. and that the only money
found on his person was the money he had shown Agents. They will testify
that at that time, McLaughlin, Jr. was wearing a uniform, worn by
all messengers of the Chicago Board of Trade; that McLaughlin was remasted to obtain his coat and other suit from the locker room and
decompany the said Agents; that McLaughlin, Jr. proceeded to that point
where he called for the contents of Rack No. 17, which held his overcost
and the suit of clothes he had taken off that morning.

The said Agents can testify that the overcoat and suit of inthis belonging to McLaughlin, Jr., were thoroughly searched, but a many was found therein. The said agents will testify that McLaughlin, Jr. willingly accompanied them to the Chicago Division Office and at the time of departure from the Chicago Board of Trade Building, the Agents inquired of McLaughlin, Jr., if he was not going to wear a hat; that he stated he did not have a hat, whereupon Agent Lockerman, who had observed McLaughlin, Jr. entering the Safe Deposit Vault during the morning, told McLaughlin, Jr. that at that time he, the latter, was wearing a flat brimmed hat.

Agents Lockerman and Falkner will state that McLaughlin, Jr. denied this statement and told agents they must be mistaken, as he had not worn a hat to the city that morning. The Agents then insisted that McLaughlin had worn a hat and told him to go back to the hat rack and point out his hat. McLaughlin, Jr., who immediately became extremely nervous, pointed out a rolled brimmed grey felt hat, which was not placed in Rack No. 17, stating this was his hat. Agent Lockerman will stated he did not recognize that hat as being the one he had seen McLaughlin wearing in the morning at the Safe Deposit Vault and that he told McLaughlin, Jr., positively, that was not the hat he (McLaughlin) was wearing when he entered the Safe Deposit Vault and instructed McLaughlin to try the hat on. At this point, the hat proved to be about one and a half sizes too large for McLaughlin, Jr. The latter continued to insist, however, this was his hat, although it was too large for him. He was again told that it was known he wore a brown flat brim hat when he entered the vaults that morning. McLaughlin, Jr. then pointed out a brown flat brim hat on the rack and stated that was his hat. This hat was removed by Agents Falkner and Lockerman and after examining same, it was found to contain two envelopes that were sealed, which proved to contain sums of money. These envelopes were tucked under the sweatband of McLaughlin's hat.

McLaughlin, Jr. was then questioned as to whether he had put the money in his hat and he stated he had. He also admitted he had obtained that money from his Safe Deposit Box that morning and said it was money that had been given him by his father; that the \$55.00 he had in his pocket, which he had shown to Agents previously, was not all the money he had secured from the Safe Deposit Box.

Assistant Director Harold Nathan, will testify that when changhlin, fr. was brought to the Chicago Division Office, the money taken from his hat band and counted in the presence of McLaughlin, it was found one envelope contained \$300.00 in bills of five, testify dollar denominations. The other envelope contained only live time dollar bills, making a total of \$315.00 found in the hat

belonging to MoLaughlin, Jr., which he admitted taking from the Safe Deposit Fox.

Brecial Agent (A) A. H. Crowl, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, 1900 Bankers Building, Chicago, Illinois, will testify that he compared the money found in the hat band of McLaughlin, Jr., with the list of ransom money paid in the Bremer Kidnap Case and found that \$85.00 of this money was identical with the Bremer ransom money.

The ransom money found in the possession of McLaughlin, Jr. has been placed in a cellaphane envelope and is now in the custody of Special Agent in Charge M. H. Purvis, Chicago Division Office, and can be introduced by Special Agent (A) A. H. Crowl.

Special Agent M. C. Falkner, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice, 1900 Bankers Building, Chicago, Illinois, will be able to introduce the following signed statement secured from John Joseph McLaughlin, Jr.:

"Chicago, Illinois April 28, 1934.

I, JOHN JOSEPH MCLAUGHLIN, JR., make the following statements voluntarily to M. C. Falkner, who has identified himself to me as a Special Agent, Division of Investigation, U. S. Department of Justice. No threats or promises of any nature whatever were made to me in connection with this statement.

I am 17 years of age and reside with my mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. John Joseph McLaughlin, Sr., at 5523 Jackson Boulevard, Chicago, Illinois. In the same house, there resides my sister, Helen McLaughlin, 11 years of age, and another sister, Mrs. Sherwood Frazer and her husband.

I attended St. Patrick's Grammar School in Chicago, Illinois through the eighth grade, where I completed studies in about 1929. I began work as a messenger for the Rosenbaum Grain Corporation, members of the Chicago Board of Trade, in August, 1932 and have continued in this employment to the present date. My salary has been \$16.00 a week. I have never been in any sort of Afficulty; previous to this time.

I have a bank account at the Continental Illinois Mational
Bank and Trust Co. and I formerly had a safety deposit box at this
institution. On or about April 24, 1934, I rented a safety deposit
box at the Safety Deposit Company of the Chicago Board of Trade,
Chicago, Illinois. My lease on the safety deposit box at the Continental Illinois Mational Bank and Trust Co. expired a day or so
before April 24, 1934, at which time I withdrew \$100.00, which I had
at this safety deposit box and deposited this sum to my account at
this same bank.

When I rented the safety deposit box at the Safety Deposit Co., Chicago Board of Trade, en or about April 24, 1934, I withdrew the sum of \$100.00, which I had deposited at the Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Co., which money had been in my safety deposit box at that institution and took this money to the safety deposit box, which I had secured at the Safety Deposit Co. of the Chicago Board of Trade. In addition to this \$100.00 which I put in this safety deposit box, I also placed in this same box the sum of \$100.00 in cash which my father, John Joseph McLaughlin, Sr. had given me the day before and asked that I place this money in my safety deposit box and hold it until he gave me further instructions. This money consisted of \$100.00 in fives and tens, and possibly one twenty dollar bill.

on or about April 25 or 26, 1934, my father gave me \$100.00 or \$115.00 in eash, requesting that I place this money in my safety deposit box at the Safety Deposit Company, Chicago Board of Trade. This sum was likewise in bills of five and ten dollar denominations. As before, my father told me to hold this money in this safety deposit box until I received further instructions from him.

On April 27, 1934, a number of men whom I took to be officers, appeared at my home and when I arrived there from work in the afternoon, I was detained for about two hours.

The safety deposit box which I have at the Safety Deposit Co., Chicago Board of Trade, was taken out under the name 'Jack McLaughlin'. Jack is my mickname and I took out this box under the name Jack McLaughlin of my own accord, but I had talked the matter with my mother and she had suggested that this name be used.

On the morning of April 28, 1934, I drove to my place of works. It my automobile and decided that it would be best for me to withdraw my money from the safety deposit box which I had at the Safety Deposit Company, Chicago Board of Trade. I felt this was the things.

o because I was suspicious of the actions that had taken place at my home the day before. I proceeded to the Safety Deposit Co., Chicago Board of Trade, and while there I obtained access to my safe deposit box and took from it the sum of approximately \$315.00. I 🤼 noticed at the time that a strange man was observing me while I was in the vault. I further noticed that this strange man followed me when I went out in the building to take the elevator to the seventh floor, where I keep my coat and hat. On my way up I decided that I would not keep this money on my person and I then placed this money in my hat. The eloakroom for employees at the Chicago Board of trade contains spaces which are numbered, where each employee leaves such wearing apparel as he desires to leave. My number in the cloakroom is 17, which is the same number as on my identification badge of the Chicago Board of Trade. Upon arrival at the cloakroom, 1 changed my suit of clothes to another which I had there and left the suit which I was wearing upon arrival at the office and also left my overcoat and hat.

At about 10:00 A.M., on April 28, 1934, I was informed that I was wanted in the office of the Rosenbaum Grain Corporation on the fourth floor of the Chicago Board of Trade Building. I proceeded on my way to that office but before reaching it, I was detained by two men who stated they were with the United States Department of Justice. Accompanied by these men, I proceeded to the cloakroom to obtain my hat and coat. Upon arrival at the cloakroom, I secured my coat and stated that I did not have a hat. A few minutes later, I saw my hat, which was not in its usual place, and I pointed it out to the above mentioned men and stated this was my hat. In this hat was found the money which I had taken from the safety deposit box on the morning of April 28, 1934, which was all of the money which had been in this safety deposit box on April 28, 1934, the amount being \$315.00 in bills.

The money which was found in the hat, as above set out, consisted of the \$100.00 which was in my safety deposit box at the Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Co., plus either \$200.00 or \$215.00, which had been given to me by my father between the dates of April 24 and April 28, 1934. I have carefully read the statements appearing above and they are true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

J. J. McLAUGHLIN, alias "BOSS"

Special Agent R. D. Brown interviewed J. J. McLaughlin, alies "Boss" McLaughlin, at the Cook County Jail, Chicago, Illinois, on the aftermoon of Saturday, April 28, 1934, the day after he had been placed in that institution. At this time, McLaughlin was informed that his son, John Joseph McLaughlin, Jr., had been picked up and a quantity of the Bremer five and ten dollar bills found in his hat-band on that morning, Saturday, April 28, 1934. McLaughlin was then advised that his son was being held. McLaughlin advised that he would do anything to assist his son; that he knew the Government "had the goods on him" and if it would help his boy in any way, he would tell all he knew concerning his handling of the Bremer ransom money. He then stated that he has known a man by the name of FRANKIE ... WRIGHT, a Chicago confidence man and racketeer connection for the last twenty-five years; that he does not know where Frankie Wright resides but often met him in the lobby of the Sherman House Hotel, in Chicago; that approximately three months ago, he met Wright in the lobby of the Sherman Hotel, at which time Frankie Wright informed him he expected to have some whote money and bonds in the near future and suggested that McLaughlin handle some of it.

MCIAUGHLIN stated that about three weeks later, he again met wright in the lobby of the Sherman Hotel, at which time wright told him that his connection was in town and after that they drove to a certain hotel in the northwestern section of Chicago, where he met two men, who were introduced to him as Smith and Nones"; that one of the men was tall and slender and was later referred to by the other man as "Slim".

McLaughlin described XSLIM", as follows:-

McLaughlin described "Slim's" companion, whom he thought we referred to as FIZZY", as follows;-

McLaughlin informed that Slim and Izzy asked him if he wanted to handle some "hot" money, to which he agreed, but that nothing was said at that time relative to the origin of the money. He stated slim and Izzy told him they recently arrived in Chicago from Toledo, Ohio and handled "hot" money for a powerful midwest mob, and that \$100,000.00 was available to be changed into good money; that he, McLaughlin, agreed to handle the money on a 5% basis. He advised that nothing more was said at this time relative to the origin of the money and arrangements were made whereby the "hot" money would be delivered to his home each night and if delivery could not be made, he, McLaughlin, was to call at this certain hotel and pick it up each morning and that the changed money was to be delivered each night to Slim and Izzy at this hotel or vicinity.

McLaughlin stated he first started changing this money on or about April 17, 1934, and he obtained the assistance of PHILIP DELANEY and WILLIAM E. VIDLER, old friends; that Delaney had an automobile and drove VIDLER and himself to various Chicago banks. He advised he is unable to recall the names and locations of the various banks that handled the money, but that he, McLaughlin, never entered the banks personally; that he sat in the car while Delaney and Vidler entered the banks and secured good money for the "hot" money. He stated this procedure was followed for two or three days and finally about three or four days later, he called at this certain hotel, where he met glim exact and Izzy, for the purpose of delivering to them a quantity of money which had been exchanged. At this time, McLaughlin informed he asked alim and Izzy directly if the money were "Bremer Money" or "Hamm Money": that flim and Izzy replied to the effect that Hamm money was being handled by McLaughlin at that time and that they wanted him to expedite the changing of this \$100,000,00 in Hamm money because \$200,000,00 more money would be available.

McLaughlin stated he then asked them if the \$200,000.00 was seener money, but they did not directly reply; however, they indicated it was and he, McLaughlin, understood that he was to handle \$200,000.00 in Bremer money after he had disposed of \$100,000.00 of the Hamm money.

McLaughlin went on to state that he has never seen any of the members of the Kidnap Gang with which Izzy and Slim are connected, during the time he was exchanging the ransom money, but that he believed they must have been in Chicago during that time. No conversation was had indicating the identity of the members of the gang, except that he overheard a conversation between Slim and Izzy to the effect that PRETTY BOY" was the most dangerous member of the gang. He claimed not to have associated CHARLES ARTHUR (PRETTY BOY) FLOYD with the name "Pretty Boy" referred to by Slim and Izzy. He stated, in his opinion, the gang had been in Toledo, Ohio and would probably return there after learning of the arrest of VIDLER, DELANEY and himself, as this town is a good hiding place.

JOHN J. MCLAUGHLIN, SR. was either unwilling or unable to furmish any further information concerning Izzy and Slim, or Frankie Wright, the man who introduced these men to him.

On Sunday, April 29, 1934, McLaughlin was again interviewed at the Cook County Jail, at which time Agent M. C. Falkner was present.

McLaughlin requested to know whether his son, John Joseph McLaughlin, Jr., had been released. He was informed he had not been released as he was being held for further questioning. McLaughlin then stated "I absolutely refuse to talk to you and you can expect no further information from me until my son is released." However, McLaughlin was further interviewed and although he failed to furnish any further information of any value, he orally stated, in the presence of Special Agent R. D. Brown and Agent Falkner, that he was changing five and ten dollar bills, which had been paid for the release of either Williams Hamm, Jr. or Edward George Bremer, Victims in Saint Paul kidnap cases; that he thought he was handling money obtained by the gang as a result of kidnaping William Hamm, Jr., but expected to handle money obtained by the gang in the kidnaping of EDWARD GEORGE EREMER.

special Agent M. C. Falkner, as well as Special Agent R. D. Brown, sea testify as to the guilty knowledge of J. J. McLAUGHLIN, SR. with special to his part in the changing of the ransom money.

McLaughlin emphatically stated that PHILIP DELANEY and WILLIAM with ER did not know and were never told by him, that the money being that he informed them

the money was "hot" and he believes, since there was such a large quantity of the money, that they must have guessed that the money came from a kidnap gang.

MCLAUCHLIN emphatically refused to reduce his admissions to writing. He is being interviewed daily and it is expected he will furnish further valuable information with reference to the connections between the kidnap mob and the money changers.

PHILIP J. DELANEY

Special Agent R. D. Brown, of the Chicago Division Office will be able to introduce the signed statement secured from PHILIP DETANCY showing his participation in this matter. The statement reads as follows:

"Chicago, Illinois April 27, 1934

I, PHILIP DELANEY, make the following signed statement to R. D. Brown, Special Agent, Division of Investigation, United States Department of Justice. I am making this statement of my own free will and volition at the office of the Division of Investigation, 1900 Bankers Building, Chicago, Illinois, and fully realize that same may be used against me.

I have known JOHN MCLAUGHLIN, commonly known as 'Boss' McLaughlin, for about twenty-five years. Buring that period of time, he has been of great assistance to me in obtaining various positions for me and has assisted me financially on many occasions. I have always considered him a very close and intimate friend.

Until the fall of 1933, I have always been able to take fare of myself and family financially, but reverses about that time, and due to lack of employment, I was forced to accept public relief. From time to time during this period, John McLaughlin has assisted me financially, for which I have been very appreciative. Although I have been aware that John McLaughlin has been considered a political boss, I do not know in what manner he has made a living.



Previous to April 17, 1934, for approximately two months, I would call at John McLaughlin's house in the 5400 block on west Jackson Boulevard, and drive him downtown to whatever places he desired to visit, especially the City Hall and the Sherman House Hotel. On or about April 17, 1934, I called for him and we drove to approximately Lawrence and Ashland Avenues, where a man, who McLaughlin called Bill got into the car. I do not know his last name and have never been introduced to him. MSLaughlin then instructed me to drive back on the morth side of Chicago, the exact address of which I do not know, which was near a bank, the name of which I do not know, at which time and place, John McLaughlin gave Bill a package of money. The conversation with reference to this money did not take place at this time and I assumed that McLaughlin had made prior arrangements with Bill. Bill got out of the car and proceeded to the bank near the point where we had parked the car, while McLaughlin and myself sat in the car. Bill returned in a few minutes and said, 'The money is all, right'. I believe he took in a package of five and ten dollar bills in the approximate amount of \$1,000.00. We then proceeded to the Loop. I drove the car and Bill stopped at numerous banks and exchanged several packages of five and ten dollar bills into bills of larger denominations. I do not recall just how many banks were visited. I do not know exactly how much money was changed, but he had no difficulty in exchanging the money on that date.

About moon of that date, John McLaughlin gave me a package containing \$4,000.00 in five and ten dollar bills and I took this money to the Mutual Bank, located in the 7800 block on South Halsted Street, where I was successful in changing this amount of money into larger denominations, and I then turned this amount of money in the large denominations over to McLaughlin. We then drove Bill back to the approximate point where we had picked him up.

On or about April 19, 1934, I again called at McLaughlin's house and picked him up and we proceeded to a point located in the vicinity of Lawrence and Ashland Avenues, where we again picked up Bill and we then visited two or three banks on the North Side of Chicago. The exact names and location of these I am unable to recall where we would park the car and Bill would enter the banks and thangs a quantity of the five and ten dollar bills into larger deliminations. On this date, I drove to the Mutual Bank, located in the WHOO block on Ashland Avenue and again was successful in shanging \$4,000.00 in five and ten dollar bills, which were given me by McLaughlin into bills of larger denominations and I then turned the money over to McLaughlin.

on Friday, April 20, 1934, I again called for McLaughlin and we again picked up Bill at the same place, as above stated, and Bill again called at several banks and changed more of the 'hot' money. On this date I drove to the Mutual Bank, location as given above, and again changed \$4,000.00 of the 'hot' five and ten dollar bills into bills of larger denominations and turned the money over to McLaughlin.

On Saturday, April 21, 1934, I again picked up McLaughlin at his home and we met Bill at the appointed place as before mentioned, at which time Bill again changed a quantity of the money at various banks into bills of larger denominations. I do not recall the name of or the addresses of the banks where we called. On this date I again called at the Mutual Bank, address above, and changed \$4,000.00 of the 'hot' five and ten dollar bills into bills of larger denominations and turned the money over to McLaughlin.

on Monday, April 23, 1934, I again picked up McLaughlin at his home and we met Bill at the appointed place, at the approximate point above mentioned, and Bill again changed a quantity of the money, given him by McLaughlin, at various banks, the names and locations of which I do not recall, into bills of larger denominations and turned the money over to McLaughlin. On this date, I again called at the Mutual Bank and changed \$4,000.00 in 'hot' five and ten dollar bills into bills of larger denominations and turned the money over to McLaughlin.

On Tuesday, April 24, 1934, I again called for McLaughlin at his home and we drove around to the appointed place on the morth side and picked up Bill. Bill called at two different banks, the names and locations of which I cannot recall, which banks refused to change the five and ten dollar bills given him by McLaughlin, into bills of larger denominations. We then drove to the 7800 block on Halsted Street and I called at the Mutual Bank and again changed \$4,000.00 of the five and ten dollar bills into bills of larger denominations and gave the money to McLaughlin.

When I changed the five and ten dollar bills given me by Melaughlin at the Mutual Bank in the 7800 Block on Halsted Street. Would generally park the car at 79th Street and Emerald Avenue and Bill and McLaughlin would wait in the car until I returned with the money.

Nearly every day, while driving McLaughlin and Bill to various banks throughout the Loop, before mentioned, at the end of the day's work, McLaughlin would have me drive him to lrving



and Cisero Avenues, and McLaughlin would get out of the car and disappear, returning to the car in about 20 minutes. McLaughlin never told me where he went when we parked thusly.

John McLaughlin told me that the money Bill and myself had been changing was 'hot' money but did not state where he had obtained it or what connection it had with any certain case. As I recall it, he once told me he did not know the history of the money.

At first, I thought the money to be counterfeit money but when the banks accepted this money, I realized it must have been genuine. I had an idea in my own mind that the money was coming from some mob who had robbed a bank.

I have read this statement and it is true to the best of my recollection.

DELANEY further stated that he believed that the teller at the bank where he changed all the money given him for changing by MCLAUCHLIN; namely, the Mutual Bank located in the 7800 block on South Halsted Street, Chicago, knew that the money was "hot", due to the fact that no questions were ever asked and that it appeared strange to him he was able to change so much money, day after day, without having any questions asked and that he believed arrangements had previously been made by J. J. MCLAUCHLIN, SR. at this bank, with this particular teller. This matter is receiving consideration by the Chicago Division Office at the present time.





Special Agent in Charge M. H. Purvis of the Chicage Office telephonically communicated with me on April 29 advising that J. J. McLaughlin who is in custody at Chicago in connection with the above matter furnished the names of one "Izzy" and one "Slim" as being involved in this case, further stating that they had been in Chicago until recently but had probably left for Toledo, Chio, and it was requested that an investigation be made in that city to determine if persons answering such names are known there.



I telephoned Agent in Charge Purvis at Chicago this morning, and called his attention to article in this morning's Washington Fost concerning ing the arrest of John McLaughlin in Chicago, in which it is stated that ear agents are seeking a confidence man, who is alleged to be a Twin Cities contractor, who like apparently been fleeced. Mr. Purvis advised that he had received a number of inquiries concerning this matter, and while he knows of no basis for the story, he is looking into it.

Mr. Purvis stated he is of the opinion that McLenghlin is to be arraigned May 7th.

Mr. Rendell, of the issociated Press, telephoned to state he had received a wire from Chicago advising that Mr. Purvis refused to give out any information on this case without specific authorisation from me, and wanted to know if the story could be broken here. I told him I would call Mr. Purvis.

I immediately called Mr. Parvis and told him I saw no objection to his giving out the story, with regard to McLaughlin's attempt to pass the money and the fact that it involves the two sums in the two cases.

I suggested that he call the press correspondents in and give them a brief statement on the matter.

In this connection, I then talked with Mr. Mathan, informing him of my conversation with Mr.XFitsmaurice, Washington representative of the Chicago Herald-Examiner, in which Mr. Fitsmaurice told me he had been requested by headquarters at Chicago to talk with me concerning the allegation that Mr. Furvis had given the Chicago Tribune a "socop." I told Mr. Mathan of my suggestion to Mr. Fitsmaurice that I would have him, Mr. Mathan, call upon Mr. Victor-Watson, Managing Editor of the Herald-Examiner, and his absence Mr. XDinehart, the City Editor, explaining our situation. Mr. Mathan will take care of this.

I also indicated to Mr. Mathan the action I desired taken relative to giving information to the press concerning the McLaughlin matter. He stated he would see that this conference is called immediately, and at that time he will also indicate to the press that he is not in Chicago to supplant Mr. Tarvis







MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Special Agent in Charge Blake of the Dallas Office telephoned at noon today to advise that he had received information indicating that Paula Harmon has been located at Cabool, Missouri and is in custody there; that two men with whom she was traveling escaped in a Ford V-8 Sedan, bearing Iowa license plates #37493; that these men had been partially identified as one of the Barkers and Karpis.

Mr. Blake stated that the reason he had received the information was that the woman was at first believed to be Bonnie Parker, companion of Clyde Barrow. I suggested to Mr. Blake that he telephone the information to the Kansas City Office, instructing that office to trace the Iowa license plates, and also to make investigation at Cabool, Missouri.

Kansas City and learned that he had been in contact with Captain Shepherd of the Missouri State Highway Patrol who furnished him with information to the effect that the woman now in custody at Cabool, Missouri gives the name of Florence Isley, described as slim buils, weighing one hundred pounds, 5' 3" in height; that the above automobile was abandoned at Cabool, Missouri; and that the State Officers are endeavoring to trail the men by the use of bloodhounds. Mr. Spear stated that he furnished Captain Shepherd with a complete description and fingerprint classification of Paula Harmon, and Captain Shepherd stated that he would have the fingerprints taken of the woman, and the Kansas City Office will be advised as to her identity. The 1934 Iowa license plates have been traced to one Charles Wilson, Grand Junction, Iowa.

You are advised that our file number 112953, although it pertains to an individual by the name of Albert Duval, is not identical with our file number 41932, which sontains the criminal record of the person in question.

The photostatic copies of fingerprints of Jose h Pinto, St. Paul Police #24145, and Joseph M. Byrnes, St. Paul Police #24145, received under cover of your letter of May 3, 1934, have been searched through the main fingerprint files, and were found to be identical with our files, number 807213 and number 785506, respectively.

I talked to Mr. Clegg this evening concerning the Dillinger case, and inquired about the individual named Sawyer, whose name has been linked with that of Dillinger and several others in St. Paul. Er. Glegg stated that ambuy named Pat Riley, described as small, lighthaired, thin and pale faced, a former Mascot of the St. Paul baseball team, is supposed to be travelling with Sawyer. They have plenty of information and evidence with regard to Sawyer and if they are able to locate Sawyer he 🛬 will be taken into sustody and questioned thoroughly. Pat Riley's sister in-law, Majorie, is a girl friend of a hoodlum mamed Tomay Carroll who is allied with Homer Van Meter. Mr. Clegg stated that it would be advisable to check the Division records on Carroll, but he doubted if Pat Riley has a record, however it is known that Pat Riley is Sawyer's man Friday and probably knows all about Sawyer's doings.

Mr. Clegg is going to telephone Kl Paso and talk to SAC Colvid concerning the wire from there this evening with respect to the airplanes at Pasenix, Arisona, thought to be owned by Sawyer.

Mr. Mathan is questioning the woman, Bessie, at the present time Mr. Clegg stated, but he. Mr. Clegg, obtained the following additional from here with respect to the Barker gang. Harry Campbell has a Cherokee Indian girl about 18 or 19 years old for a girl friend. This girl has straight black hair, unbobbed, and is named Winona or perhaps Wesna. Fred Barker's girl is Pauls Harmon, who, according to Bessie, is a funny looking dame, with flat features, dark complexion, dark brown hair, age 25 to 28, weighs less than a hundred points and wears a size 12 dress. She has been going with Barker since last summer. Bessie stated that she never spe Doc Barker with a girl, but he is supposed to have a girl in Reno. Kate Warker, at the present time is believed to be in Chicago with her sister from California, Esme unknown. Doc)Barker and Fred-Barker had a split-up last Christmas. A lvinCkarpis and has a girl friend named Dolores, age 18, in Chicago, Karpis rents an apartment there for her. Ray Karpis eats quite frequently at an eating place in Maywood, Illinois, just outside Chicago. This place is reached by going sorth on Bashington boulevard to the town of Maywood , turning left to Borth Ave in Maywood. The girl Dolores is supposed to stay Chicago, she has light 12 complexion, light brown hair, brown eyes, has a long bob and uses quite m bit of makeup. Karpis glad has a wife living in Chicago but he doesn't co tact her. Bill Weaver, also a member of the Bremer kidnaping gang, has girl friend named Mary Eaton, who is his girl friend by force, he often yed kidnaping her and taking her away agenst her will.

in Des Moines, Iowa, with her sister in Law, the wife of another one of the Estone. This sister in law runs a chicken eating place which is easy to find and Bessie states that whereever Mary Eaton is Bill Weaver is bot to be slose, however he has been back to St. Paul on at least two occasion since the kidnaping. Bessie stated that she understood the Barker gang to to Redo right after the kidnaping, that Bill has returned to Des Moines & serve as a contact man to handle the money situation. In regard to the money situation, Mr. Clegg stated that about the first of December last year, the Barker gang was broke, that they planned the Bremer kidnaping, obtained the ransom money, turned it over to Sawyer, who was to keep it for minety days, during which time he was to turn it in for good money, and take his cut for the exchange. Therefore it is believed that the Barkers and Karpis are laying low, and are not able to spend much money because of the fact that they have not got hold of the any of the money, and Mr. Clegg stated that Bessie stated that if none of the money had turned up yet, it was pretty certain that it was still being held by Sawyer and that he may be still negotiating through the Kleckmans, who are the bosses in St. Paul, to obtain good money, probably in New York. She stated that it is supposed to be ninety days before the money is turned back to the kidnapinggang, which is probably having just about enought money to get along.

the Dillinger lived in Florida as having a large living room with four/places grouped in a circle in the middle. However Bessie does not place much faith in what Billie says because she is inclined to lord over the other people and to stretch the truth. She stated that Harry Sawyer when he get "hot" usually goes to a hospital outside of Hudson, Wisconsin, which is sort of a private sanitarium for mental cases. At the time of the Bremer kidnaping, Bessie stated that she and Eddie Green were in the apartment building owned by Senator Capper in Topeka, Kansas. The girls who ware with Barker and Karpis drink quite a bit and like night life.

Mr. Clegg stated that little by little they are getting this information out of her, but they are getting little evidence.

With regard to the Hamm case, Bessie stated that it is runored that the Barker gang also pulled that job, but that they lost most of the money from that in a gambling place in Reno.

With regard to the record of Towny Carroll mentioned on the first page of this memo, I am advised by Mr. Newby that he has already checked up on this man and he is known to be an associate of the bank robbers around St. Paul and is wanted by the authorities at Brainerd, Minn., at the present time for bank robbery.

In connection with the investigation being conducted by Special Agent S. L. Fortenberry at Reno, Nevada, where under the name of F. T. HERRY he is making certain under-cover inquiries with reference to the Bremer kidnaping case, you are advised that I have asked Special Agent Fortenberry to submit to me daily a record of his expenditures for which reimbursement might be claimed, occasioned by his presence in Reno. I have received the first two itemizations of this type as follows:

It is obvious to me that because of the front that this agent would have to assume at Reno, there will be certain expenditures occasioned by his investigative status for which he should be entitled to reimbursement. It occurs to me, however, that there should be some sort of daily maximum which he should be required to follow as an average, and I would suggest the sum of \$7.50 as the maximum unless unusual

circumstances arise for which he is able to submit an explanation in justification. Until I have received word from the Division on this point, I am not suggesting any restrictions to him, but if any contrary view is held I shall be glad to be advised telegraphically.

During the past week, I received a communication from him in the nature of a daily letter wherein he discussed the fact that one of the acquaintances which he has made was acquainted with "Doc and Fred". He had been unable to determine their exact identity, and his informant become so inebriated that the police took him to jail. Agent Fortenberry stated that he felt that he should get into jail himself in order that he could have the fellow prisoner feeling and could question this fellow while he was intoxicated; and after assuming intoxication for a time, he was unsuccessful in being arrested and instead the police were about to take him home, whereupon Agent Fortenberry took a swing with his first at the policeman and then the policeman accommodated him by placing him in jail, although Agent Fortenberry's \$10 collateral was restored to him by the Judge the next morning.

In talking with this agent by telephone, as well as in a communication, I have informed him that I felt that such extremes were unnacessary and that he might have recourse to an agent in Reno who is not under cover to make the necessary inquiries. At least, this should be tried before resorting to such extremes.

I felt that the Division should be informed of these circumstances with reference to Agent Fortenberry's assignment in Reno.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

I talked to Mr. Nathan at Chicago Saturday night. He stated that they had succeeded in getting complaints and warrants issued for McLaughlin, et al, but that in doing so it had been necessary for him to promise the United States Attorney at Chicago that indictments would be returned against these individuals at St. Paul. He stated that he had conveyed this information to Mr. Hanni in Mr. Clegg's absence and that Mr. Hanni had advised that he would discuss the matter with the United States Attorney. Mr. Nathan stated that he felt it absolutely necessary that indictments be returned at St. Paul and that if there was any hesitancy or reluctance on the part of the United States Attorney there the Department should take some action here. While talking with Mr. Clegg this morning I asked whether there was going to be any difficulty in getting the indictments. He stated that both the Judge and the United States Attorney were in full accord with the Division's activities and that he did not expect any difficulty at all in getting indictments. It was suggested that should any difficulty arise in connection with this matter he immediately advise the Division in order that the proper action might be taken later. Mr. Clegg stated that the Grand Jury had been dismissed but that it was being recalled for the purpose of returning indictments . against these individuals.







In connection with the arrest of the McLaughlins, Mrs. John J. McLaughlin telephoned the Chicago Office of this Division yesterday afternoon and stated that she intended to send the fellowing quoted telegram to President Roosevelt, Senator Hamilton Lewis, the District Attorney in St. Paul, all mewspapers in Chicago, St. Paul and Mashington and to me:

"I appeal to you in the name of justice as an American, a lady, a wife and mother, to delay indictment against my son and husband. Charges made by your unprincipled agent, Mr. Purvis of Chicago, are false for what reason I do not know. Belpless myself financially to reach Washington to ask investigation of Federal office here, I appeal to you to withhold indictment and judgment until investigation is made of Mr. Purvis and his effice in this case. I deny all charges Purvis has made against my husband and son and I charge him with persecution, mot only of me and mine but all of the wonderful offices of the Foderal Government. I deay the charges made by Mr. Purvis that my son John, Junior possessed marked money. My husband and wonderful seventeen year old son are im jail. I am alone. I appeal to you for help. Please refer to memorandum addressed to Inspector Rorer by myself, dated March 50, 1934, on the same subject as above titled.

Agent Sam McKee and myself on January 29, 1934, went to White Bear Lake, Minnesota, when the Postmaster, Mr. Campbell, was gone. We very carefully, with gloved hands, distilled water, pure white blotters, opened three letters, read and copied them, resealed the letters very carefully and left with no one knowing a thing about it. I assume that the Postmaster suspects we opened the letters, but under no circumstances would I want to see him involved as he is friendly and cooperative with us.

The letters were addressed to the holders of Post Office Box 254 and 345, E. V. DAVIS and E. L. MURREY.

This has been orally reported to Mr. Rorer, Mr. Hanni, and to Mr. Nathan, but has never been written into any report. I carry the copies of the letters in my pocket. As far as the file shows, the contents have never been learned.

Shortly before the kidnaping of EDWARD HREMER, one Boy McCord, a radio operator, while driving his ear near his home, was shot by unknown assailants who were in a grard automobile bearing 1934 Minnesota license 47-372. This number was traced to E. L. MURREY at White Bear Lake, Minnesota, and proved to be the license for a Chevrolet Sedan which was registered to E. V. DAVIS at White Bear Lake.

After the EREMER kidneping, further investigation in this connection developed that P. O. Box 254 at White Bear was taken under the name E. V. DAVIS, and Box 345 in the name E. L. MURREY.

Upon receipt of the above information this Agent contacted Post Office Inspector Striech and accompanied him to the White Bear Post Office.

Agent's memorandum concerning this investigation is set out as follows, being dated January 24, 1934, and being Serial 587 of St.Paul file 62-888:





"The above box to DAVIS was rented by FLOYD TRUNKIL, Post Office Clerk, on January 11, 1934, MR. TRUNKIL describing DAVIS as follows:

Age, 35-40 years; height, 5 feet, 10 inches; weight, 180 pounds; hair, light; complexion, ruddy; rough skin; wore light suit, ten overcoat, and gray cap.

The box for MURREY, No. 345, was rented by Post Office Clerk AL.
LINDSTEE on Jamistry 3, 1934, MR. LINDSTEN being unable to give any
description of MURREY other than the following: Age, 35-36 years; height
5 fact 10 inches.

Post office Inspector STREICH'S intention to open all of the above mail for examination but because of the fact that the Postmaster was present enring the letters, MR. STREICH decided against opening same.

mail returned to them. Any person calling for this mail will of necessity be required to call at the window. If any inquiry is made for this mail, Postmaster CAMPRELL has advised that the person calling for same will be taken into custody by the City Manager and Chief of Police of White Bear. The Post Office authorities and the St. Paul Bivision office will be notified.

Agent reported the above facts to Agent Hall and to Special Agent in Charge Hanni, and in a day or so later, when contacting Inspector STREICH about another matter, MR. STREICH stated that the mail at Boxes 254 and 345 had been ordered removed to General Delivery, Post Office, St. Paul, Minnesota, and further stated that he believed this Agent was responsible for the removal order. This was denied by Agent. Inspector STREICH on the following day called this Agent by telephone and advised that he had ordered the above mail returned to the White Bear Post Office.

This Agent did not order the removal of the mail in question and did not open same.

It may be further noted that E. V. DAVIS is a subject in the BREMER case and the name E. L. MURREY is a known alias for ALVIN KARPIS, identified subject in this case.

Recent investigation has also developed that E. V. DAVIS still maintains a P. O. Box at Lakeville, Minnesota, and the photo of VOLNEY DAVIS, a member of the KARPIS-BARKER gang, has been positively identified as E. V. DAVIS.

MEMORANDUM FOR INSPECTOR RORER:

Re: BRKKID St. P. 7-30.

> (Mail at White Bear Lake, Minnesota, P.O. in connection with titled case)

My connection with the above matter came about through information obtained by Special Agent E. N. Notesteen that the persons that had shot, with a machine gun, one McCord in St. Paul, Minnesota, January 13, 1934, had been traced by him to E. L. MURREY, P. O. Box 345, White Bear Lake, Minnesota. The reason we had an interest in this matter was that from a very reliable confidential source from the underworld, I had learned that KARPIS and one of the BARKERS had shot McCord.

You will recall that from the very outset of this investigation, this gang was suspected of kidnaping EDWARD G. BREMER. For the same reasons we naturally had an interest in the persons who had rented P. O. Box 545 at White Bear Lake, Minnesota. Agent Notesteen also learned that P. O. Box 254, same Post Office, had a connection with Box 545. Box 254 was rented in the name E. V. DAVIS, an alias for VOLNEY DAVIS, suspect in this case.

E. L. MURREY is the alias of ALVIN KARPIS. These boxes were rented on January 12, 1934, five days before BREMER was kidnaped. It seems reasonable to assume that the rental of these boxes were a part of the modus operandi of the kidnaping. Consequently, it was of paramount importance that full facts concerning same be secured.

In these P. O. boxes some letters were found by Agent Notesteen.
This, he reported to me. Later he went to White Bear Lake with Post Office Inspector Striech; returned and stated that he had been unable to learn the contents, or effect any way of so doing. I then sent a forwarding order to White Bear Lake to have the mail sent out to General Delivery, St. Paul, Minnesota who later told me in the strictest confidence that Inspector Striech had been trying to find something wrong with his office in order to have him removed to make way for a new appointed, then telephoned Striech that the forwarding order had been the in excordance with Striech's instructions.

Inspector Striceh immediately told the St. Paul Postmaster to otto lim if anyone called for the mail at St. Paul, and a day later to white Bear Lake, Minnesota.

The statement of Inspector Striech that Agent Motesteen had told him that he (Notesteen) had sent the forwarding order, to me, sounds ridiculous, because I sent the forwarding order. In my opinion, Inspector Striech, not knowing I had snything to do with it, merely assumed that Agent Motesteen had done it, and his statement to the Chief Post Office Inspector is untrue.

I talked to Mr. Nathan at Chicago this morning. He stated that he yesterday interviewed Mr. Victor Watson, of the Chicago Herald-Examiner, and was very much pleased with the results of the interview. He stated that Mr. Watson was not acquainted with the situation concerning the allegation made by the reporters on the Herald-Examiner that Mr. Purvis had given the Chicago Tribune a "scoop" on the John LicLaughlin case. He immediately called his subordinates, but all of them happened to be out to lunch. Mr. Watson stated that his reporters should get on intimate terms with the Division of Investigation, whether we encouraged it or not. Mr. Nathan asked Mr. Watson if he could inform his people that we do not engage in the practice of showing favoritism, and indicated to him that he, Mr. Nathan, would be glad to talk to anybody wishing to make a complaint. Hr. Watson asked Mr. Nathan to tell the Director and also Mr. Purvis that if in any way they seemed to be antagonistic or seemed to be attacking this Division, we could be assured that they did not have that kind of feeling toward us, but that on the other hand, he had the utmost respect for our organization. Mr. Watson advised Mr. Nathan that he was leaving shortly for the West Coast, but that upon his return to Chicago, he would be glad to see Mr. Purvis personally.

Mr. Nathan and I discussed generally the situation existing in our Chicago Office with reference to its relationship with the newspapers. I mentioned the fact that there is a very cordial feeling existing between the Division in Washington and the representatives of the Chicago Daily News and Herald-Examiner here, and stated that I felt the situation in Chicago could be cleared up considerably if Mr. Purvis developed a more cordial relation with the papers there. I told Mr. Nathan I also desired him to interview Mr. Craig, City Editor of the Chicago Daily News, expressing our gratitude for the manner in which Mr. Connors, their Washington representative, has cooperated with us. Mr. Nathan said he would take care of this some time today.

I telephoned Mr. Nathan later, and told him that the man with the Chicago Daily News that I want him to see is Mr. Henry J. Smith, Managing Editor. He stated he would see him instead of Mr. Craig.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. NATHAN

Reference is made to the teletype from the Chicago Office dated April 29, 1934, wherein it is noted that John J&McLaughlin has stated that one Frankiek Wright, Chicago confidence man and hoodlum took him to Room 209 Irving Hotel, 4845 West Irving Park Boulevard, Chicago where he met Nones and Smith, who were later referred to as Mizzy and Slim. McLaughlin states that Slim and Issy advised him that they had recently arrived from Toledo, Ohio where they had handled hot money, for a powerful midwest mob. It was recalled that one Charles J.XFitzgerald, alias Y"OMFitz", who has been prominently mentioned in connection with the Kansas City Massacre Case, during the time of his incarceration at the Kansas State Penitentiary, corresponded with a number of individuals in Toledo, Ohio, as reflected in the letter of the Kansas City Office dated February 16, 1934, addressed to the St. Paul Office, in the Bremer Case. It further appears from this letter that among the aliases used by Fitzgerald appears the alias "SlimyWilliam"; also Chi Slim and other aliases.

After consulting with Mr. Cowley I telephoned Mr. Larson and called his attention to the letter of the Kansas City Office referred to above and suggested that the addresses recited in that letter be given immediate consideration with a view to possibly picking up a trace of Fitzgerald. Mr. Larson advised that Agent Meekins is in Toledo, Ohio covering certain angles of the Bremer .Case and that he would immediately furnish Agent Meekins with a copy of the letter referred to above. Mr. Larson also stated during my conversation with him that a record had been located at the Detroit Police Department of one Isadore/Kaplan, #9894, who also used the alias "Issy Kaplan" and is presently wanted under that name on charges of forgery by the Police Department, Flint, Michigan. Mr. Larson stated that he had obtained photographs of Kaplan and had forwarded them to the Chicago Office for identification purposes. I inquired of Mr. Guinane, Identification Unit, whether the Division had a record on this individual and was advised that *Kaplin*, #24276 DATE: 10-29-65 was arrested by the Police Department, Akron, Ohio on October 30, 1933, charged with suspicion. I instructed Mr. Guinane to forward two copies of the photograph appearing on the fingerprint card, submitted by the Akron Police Department to the Chicago and Detroit Offices for identification purposes.
