### **St. Albans Cagers Beat Church Farm, 37 to 20**

St. Albans' basket ball team today won an intercity game from the Church Farm School from Philadelphia here, 37 to 20. It was the fifth victory in seven games for the St. Albans' team, which was led today by Capt. Charley Vetterlein and Bill Milligan, each of whom scored 9 points.

### **Federal Employment Increases**

Federal employment continued upward in Washington and the country as a whole, in December, the monthly report of the Civil Service Commission today showed. Here the advance was less than 1,000, going from 110,745 to 111,692. In the field, personnel went from 689,334 to 704,097. This total of 815,789 is about 100,000 under the war-time peak.

Policeman Frank Sadeck said it was apparently a murder and suicide.

### **American Wins 500-Meter Skating Race**

STOCKHOLM (AP).—Kit Klein of Buffalo today won the 500-meter race to send the United States away to a flying start in the women's world speed skating championships. She covered the distance in 53.3 seconds to beat Minako Taki of Japan by seven-tenth of a second. Jane Bjerke of Norway was third in 54.8.

## McDonald Is Sentenced To 15-Year Term

Cassius McDonald, Detroit engineer, who aided the Edward G. Bremer kidnapers to dispose of their \$200,000 ransom money, today received a 15-year sentence in Leavenworth penitentiary.

Convicted at the same trial with Harry Sawyer and William Weaver, who received life sentences a week ago, McDonald's fate was pronounced in federal court here today by Judge Gunnar H. Nordby.

Although apparently pleased with the comparatively light sentence, McDonald said he plans to appeal the conviction. Mrs. McDonald, who was in tears when her husband and the other kidnap conspirators were found guilty by a jury, today smiled when her husband received sentence.

Sawyer also will appeal his conviction.

The three men will be taken to Leavenworth sometime next week in a secret move. Sawyer and Weaver are expected eventually to be taken to the federal prison at Alcatraz, located on an island near San Francisco.

**Ransom Passer  
Gets Long Term**

St. Paul, Minn.—U.P.—Cassius MacDonald, convicted as a money changer in the Edward G. Bremer kidnaping, Saturday was sentenced to 15 years in Leavenworth penitentiary.

MacDonald, a former Detroit consulting engineer, was convicted by a jury which also returned guilty verdicts against Harry Sawyer, alleged "finger man" in the kidnaping, and William Weaver, one of the actual abductors.

Weaver and Sawyer were sentenced to life imprisonment immediately after the verdict was brought in. Judge Gunnar Nordbye deferred sentence against MacDonald for investigation of his case.

The white haired MacDonald was grave and downcast as sentence was pronounced. His wife, who attended the trial incognito, broke down and wept openly.

MacDonald was charged by the government with having made several trips from Miami, Fla., to Havana, Cuba, to change more than \$70,000 in ransom bills into other currency.

# Bremer Kidnaping Conspirator Gets 15-Year Sentence

ST. PAUL, Feb. 1.—Cassius W. McDonald, Detroit engineer, convicted as a conspirator in the \$200,000 kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, today was sentenced to serve 15 years in Leavenworth prison.  
McDonald, who was charged with exchanging approximately one-half of the ransom money in Cuba, was sentenced in federal court by Judge Gunnar H. Nordbye, before whom the engineer was tried with two others—Harry Sawyer and William Weaver—and convicted Jan. 24. The other two were given life terms the day of their conviction.

Minneapolis, Minn., Feb. 1.—[Special.]—Cassius McDonald, convicted in the federal court in St. Paul last week as a money changer for the Edward G. Bremer kidnapers, was sentenced today to 15 years in Leavenworth penitentiary. He was a former Detroit consulting engineer and was convicted with Harry Sawyer, fingerman in the kidnaping, and William Weaver, one of the abductors. Weaver and Sawyer were sentenced to life imprisonment.

McDonald's wife, who attended the trial incognito, broke down and wept when the judge pronounced sentence. Sawyer, Weaver, and McDonald will be removed secretly from the Ramsey county jail to prison.

LAST of those in custody for the Bremer kidnaping is now sentenced.

Cassius McDonald, convicted of having exchanged kidnap ransom money for currency more suitable for use at a substantial profit to himself, has now been given 15 years in Leavenworth.

That is a long time in. It should discourage those who still believe that there is easy money in the kidnaping racket. McDonald was apparently a respectable citizen in Detroit with a substantial home.

Incidentally, the fact that the actual kidnapers had to pay him 20 per cent commission shows how rapidly their money melted away.

As an example of the contention that crime does not pay the Bremer case would be hard to beat.

He rifled the cash register, hesitated at a booth where four patrons were sitting, calmly drank their four steins of beer and then departed, saying: "You can tell all your friends Alvin Karpis was in town."

## Three Bremer Convicts Taken To Leavenworth

Sawyer, Weaver and McDon-  
ald Removed Secretly From  
Jail Here.

Three men, two under life sen-  
tences and one under a fifteen-year  
sentence for conspiracy to kidnap  
Edward G. Bremer, were taken  
secretly Thursday afternoon from  
the Ramsey county jail to the Fed-  
eral penitentiary at Leavenworth.

They are Harry Sawyer, former  
St. Paul bootlegger, charged by the  
government with being the "finger  
man" in the kidnaping, sentenced  
to life imprisonment; William  
Weaver of Little Rock, Ark., former  
Barker-Karpis mobster, charged  
with being one of the actual ab-  
ductors, sentenced to life, and  
Cassius McDonald, Detroit engineer  
and gambler, convicted of being a  
money changer for the kidnap gang,  
fifteen years.

All three were convicted in a  
three-weeks' trial in Federal court  
here, which ended two weeks ago.  
They were accompanied by six  
deputy United States marshals on  
the trip to Leavenworth.

**"G-MEN" HUNT KARPIS**

Say Trail of Noted Outlaw, However, is Now "Cold"

**ONLY TWO OF MOB REMAIN**

Police Round Up Members of Gang One by One—"Old Creepy" Passes Second Anniversary of Edward Bremer Kidnaping

Somewhere in America, a gaunt, slight fellow known to his few remaining pals as "Old Creepy" is passing a lonely anniversary.

Two years ago Alvin Karpis, now 27, allegedly held Edward G. Bremer in the kidnaping "job" which made him "Public Enemy No. 1"—marked for death, or life in Alcatraz, shunned by the underworld, and hunted by the world of law and order.

Justice Department men say the trail is "cold" right now, but their relentless manhunt continues. Karpis was "hot" last summer, soon after bravado led him to write a threatening note to J. Edgar Hoover, director of the bureau of investigation. At Saratoga Springs, N. Y., rumor said Karpis had played the horses and lost but escaped a federal trap by a few hours.

**PAIR ESCAPED POLICE**

At the Justice Department it is said he was last seen by officers a year ago, when he and his pal, Harry Campbell, made a gun-brandishing escape from police at a hotel at Atlantic City, N. J. They left their girl friends to face trial.

Other members of the notorious Barker-Karpis gang, helpers and hangers-on, have been rounded up one by one during the last year. William Weaver and Myrtle Eaton were picked up last summer in the Florida house where they were living as man and wife, using a child as a "front."

Cassius McDonald recently was convicted in a St. Paul court of charges

**Where Is the New Evidence?**

NEARLY half the 90-day period of grace accorded Bruno Richard Hauptmann, convicted kidnaper and slayer of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., has now elapsed, and not one new development is apparent in the case. Plenty of rumors, and probes, and fantasies, and statements, yes—but not one new fact.

At this time the entire business tends only to weaken the faith and confidence of the American public in its machinery of justice. The whole thing looks like another victory for the manufacture of synthetic martyrdom for criminals by appeal to racial or class prejudice.

This business of making martyrs of criminals bids fair today to become an organized racket in this country. We have the spectacle of many elaborate and well-financed organizations taking up one collection after another for the defense of criminals posing as persecuted victims of society.

Since we have established courts of law to deal out justice, and temper that justice with mercy, the facts seem to warrant, why not permit these judicial agencies to function as was intended? We can have respect for law only so long as we have confidence in the agencies of law. Executive meddling in judicial actions cannot maintain that confidence.

Employees of the Oak Lawn Trust & Savings bank partly identified the pair as the bandits who robbed the bank of \$2,500 Saturday.

Police said they believed the reason the identification was not definite was due to the fact both men have submitted to plastic surgery in recent months.

James Larsen, former convict, was arrested as a suspect in the robbery Sunday night, and today was being held incommunicado as police and federal agents questioned him.

In Larsen's apartment, police said, were found seven pistols, a sledge hammer such as safe crackers might use, clothing that might be used to assume the disguise of a cleric, and \$700 in currency.

Bank officials made a practice of keeping the doors locked, admitting only those recognized as customers. The bandits gained admittance, however through one of their gang disguised as a priest.

**MOTION ASKING \$2,210 OF

A motion asking return to the Jacob Schmidt Brewing Co. of \$2,210 of the Edward G. Bremer ransom money now held by the Federal government is expected to be filed late today in Federal court by Samuel Lipschultz, St. Paul attorney.

Of the money in question, \$2,125 was found in the possession of William Vidler and \$25 in the possession of John J. McLaughlin Jr., former defendants in the kidnap case, when they were arrested in Chicago in April, 1934. Vidler was tried here and acquitted of conspiracy in the case, while the charges against McLaughlin were dropped.

The money is part of \$200,000 paid for the release of Bremer following his abduction January 17, 1934.

# Gambling and Vice Campant Here as in Raw Mining Town

Reporter Discovers City Is Wide Open and Places  
Are Easy to Find; Watches Truck Driver Lose  
\$25 in One Minute at Dice Table.

The lid is off in Toledo! The city is as wide open as any raw mining town that rip-snorted in the wake of the gold prospectors.

You only have to know where to go—and any cab driver will tell you—to find what you want. Gambling? Plenty, and conducted openly, too. A girl? It's easy.

Liquor in a place operating with a limited license? Pay the cab driver a few extra pennies and he'll land you at the spot.

The much-publicized and oft-quoted vice ring is an actuality here. There is a direct link between

the upper world and the under-world, both trafficking in vice for mutual profit.

Sounds hard to believe, eh? Well, let's take a tour of the city and see what we can find.

We climb into a cab.

"Where can a fellow roll a few dice?" we ask the driver.

"Want a \$50 Limit Game?"

"There's a nice little \$50 limit game going on here," he says, shifting gears. "I'll take you over."

A short ride and he lands us at the Buckeye, 228 Superior street. Benny Aronoff is the proprietor. We climb a flight of stairs, walk unchallenged through a "restaurant" so obviously a front that the cakes on display are mouldy, and into a large room.

The place is blue with smoke. One wall is covered with a huge chart quoting odds on the horses that go to the post at tracks over the country.

In the center is a large green table, banded by wooden walls four inches high. A crowd two deep lines the table.

In the center stands the house

"stick" man, droning a turn of the dice. He keeps up an incessant chant.

Silver Dollars Used

"Point comin' out gemmun. Place your bets, gemmun. Ten's the point, gemmun. Six he rolls, gemmun. AND seven and out, gemmun." He is the center of attraction about the table, for the players say nothing. But later his drone becomes as mechanical as his motion with the long rake he uses to push the dice back to the player.

At the head of the table stands the house man, nervously clicking silver dollars. Before him several piles are mounted, about a thousand dollars in all. Play is mostly in dollars, so large that half-dollars look like quarters when thrown down beside them.

The chap next to us, obviously a truck driver, bets with a dice thrower he doesn't know and against the house. Five dollars fall noiselessly on the green felt. The dice thrower rolls a two. Our friend follows the law of gambling and doubles his bet, hoping the dice thrower wins. He loses. Our friend mutters and throws another \$10 on the table. Six comes out, then a seven and our friend has lost \$25.

Salary Is Gone

He mops the sweat from his face, pulls his hat down over his eyes, and leaves. He has lost his salary, for which he worked so hard in the cold weather, in four throws of the dice and one minute of actual time.

Not very pleasant, is it? And that seems to be the greatest evil of these gambling places. They cater to the working class. Nightly hard-earned money is pushed on the table in an attempt to run a \$2 bill into a small fortune.

At Ed Wandtke's place, 631 St. Clair street, you can walk unquestioned through a restaurant past two men seated outside a door, and you'll find yourself in a large room, much like the Buckeye. There is the same tired house man, the same blue smoke, the same working-class man throwing his money down. Near the door you can sit in on a

card game. As you need to the money.

The most open place in town, however, seems to be the Sport Center run by Benny Harris at 12 Superior street. As soon as you step inside the cigar store you can see the big craps table and hear the clink of the silver dollars. Harris, however, has crammed the large room with bagatelle and slot machine games.

Persuasion Gains Entrance

Levine's room on the second floor of 513 1/2 Jefferson avenue puts on a little more front. You really should be a club member to get in, they explain, but a little persuasion will gain you entrance to the room, where you can risk your money on faro, roulette or dice.

The women work their trade openly on the streets. The modern version of the oldest trade in the world may be seen bring her car to a stop and accosting a prospective customer. Or you may again pay the cabman and he'll drop you at any of a number of places in the city where you can be accommodated for a small fee.

The operators are nervous though.

"We got a new city manager here," they explain, "and we don't know when he's going to crack down."

They feel, however, that the "cracking down" will be followed by a period of hibernation to allow a crusade to blow over.

# **BREMER CASE LINKED WITH CUBA SNATCH**

Twelve federal government witnesses against the kidnapers of Edward G. Bremer in their recent trial in St. Paul brought to this city about \$1,100 of the \$300,000 ransom paid in the kidnaping of Eutimio Falia Bonet, young Cuban millionaire, last April.

That was the belief of federal agents here today as they puzzled over International News Service reports from Atlanta, Ga., that the \$1,100 had been returned to the Georgia federal reserve bank from that in Minneapolis, after being "passed" in St. Paul.

The Bonet ransom money, strangely enough, was given the witnesses—a dozen Cubans who testified to money-changing activities in Havana of Cassius McDonald, Detroit "engineer"—by the government as part of an advance of \$2,000 expense money, FBI agents believed.

The \$2,000 was withdrawn by the federal government from the federal reserve bank at Atlanta.

Authorities of the reserve bank at Minneapolis said today they never had received a list of the Bonet ransom bills. The \$1,100 was cleared through the Minneapolis institution in January, when the trial of McDonald, Harry Sawyer and William Weaver for the \$200,000 Bremer "snatching" was in progress.

## Link Havana Kidnaping to Bremer Gang

Atlanta, Ga.—U.P.—A possibility that the kidnapers of Eutimio Falla Bonet, young Cuban millionaire, may be linked with the abduction of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, was seen here Friday as ransom bills paid out by Bonet's father at Havana last April turned up at the Atlanta federal reserve bank.

It was learned that \$1,100 in \$100 bills of the \$300,000 paid for young Bonet's release were returned here from the Minneapolis federal reserve bank last month. Only bills on the Atlanta bank were used in the ransom money.

### Came From Minneapolis

This \$1,100 came from Minneapolis at a time when three men were on trial at St. Paul in the Bremer kidnaping. The theory is that one of the Bonet kidnapers was in St. Paul, perhaps attending the Bremer trial, and the person may have been connected with both abductions.

Bonet ransom bills have been returned to Atlanta from points in California, Texas and New York, indicating that there may have been at least three kidnapers who have separated. The first of the ransom money to return here was a \$2,700 bundle from New York July 22.

### Kidnaped in April

Bonet was kidnaped Apr. 3, 1935, and was released the next day when his father produced the currency. The kidnapers were paid in money obtained from the Havana federal reserve bank, a branch of the Atlanta bank. Cuban political "leftists" were accused of the kidnaping at the time and some were indicted.

**Cuban Kidnapers Linked To Bremer Case As Money Comes In**  
**ATLANTA**—(INS)—Nearly \$25,000 of the ransom money paid kidnapers for the release of Eutimio Falla Bonet, young Cuban millionaire, last April has been returned to the Atlanta Federal Reserve Bank during the past several months, part of it from St. Paul, Minn., leading federal agents to believe the Cuban snatch was linked with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, it was learned Friday.

The money returned to Atlanta was part of the \$300,000 paid for the young Cuban's release by his father in Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta bills.

The majority of the bills were returned from the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, though on Jan. 17, \$1,100 of the money was returned from Minneapolis.

The \$1,100 was collected during the trial of Cassius McDonald and Bryan Bolston in St. Paul in connection with the Bremer case for which \$200,000 ransom was paid.

Federal agents believe that the Cuban kidnapers were in St. Paul during the trial, possibly to furnish aid to the defendants. Part of the Bremer ransom money was discovered in Cuba.

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## CUBAN RANSOM BILLS MAY LEAD TO KARPIS

Notorious Criminal Thought  
at Other End of Trail to  
Bank Here.

Out of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta winds the trail that may lead Department of Justice agents to the hideouts of Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell, foremost public enemies of the country, it was learned yesterday.

The steady drift into the bank here of ransom money that won the release last April of Eutimio Falls Bonet, kidnaped millionaire Cuban, is continuing, it was said yesterday, some of the money having turned up at the bank within the last few days.

The money, it is said, continues to come from New York, California and Texas, as it has for several months and government agents, it is said, are close to the spots where the money is being turned into banks after it has either been spent by the hiding kidnapers or traded in for less dangerous money.

### Bremer Link Seen.

The \$1,100 of Bonet ransom money that turned up at the Minneapolis Reserve Bank last month while the trial of the kidnapers of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul, Minn., banker, was at its height, has convinced government agents that one or more of the Bonet kidnapers was in St. Paul at the time of the Bremer trial, either as an interested spectator or as a member of the kidnap gang detailed to offer whatever help he could do to the defendants in the Bremer case.

Karpis and Campbell are eagerly sought by government agents, who are convinced that they were the leaders of the Bremer kidnaping, which netted the kidnapers \$200,000, and also leaders of the gang that kidnaped Bonet with a net profit of \$300,000. The \$500,000 collection in the two kidnapings convince government agents that they quarry is well fortified in their efforts to avoid arrest.

Federal reserve bank officials at Minneapolis, in commenting yesterday on the \$1,100 of Bonet ransom money that had passed into their tills during the trial of the three Bremer suspects, said:

"We believe that this \$1,100 was spent innocently by witnesses at the Bremer trial."

### Officials Are Silent.

They refused to elaborate on this strange statement, adopting the policy of government agents and federal reserve officials throughout the country of refusing to discuss the worry that the kidnapers and the steady inward drift of ransom money are causing them.

R. A. Sims, assistant cashier of the Federal Reserve Bank in Atlanta, refused to discuss the case yesterday other than to explain:

"The Federal Reserve Bank branch in Havana did not turn the Bonet ransom money over to the kidnapers. Some representative of the Bonet family must have obtained the money from some commercial bank in Havana, which in turn obtained the money from our Havana branch. We do not deal directly with the public."

When Falls Bonet in Cuba last April was kidnaped, ransom was demanded in American money. The kidnapers specified three thousand \$100 bills. Bonet's father refused the aid of police, obtained the money from a bank and secured his son's release in 24 hours.

Figures revealed in The Constitution yesterday showing the receipt of Bonet ransom notes at the Atlanta Federal Reserve bank, placed the last return as \$1,800 on January 26, less than three weeks ago. It is understood that several thousand dollars have been received since.

"The money is not coming in as rapidly as it was, however," said the government official yesterday. "This is due probably to the fact that bills that are unfit for circulation are sent to Washington to be destroyed. The Atlanta Federal Reserve bank receives only those notes, which it has issued, that are fit for further circulation."

## BIG TIME CRIMINAL SUSPECT IS NABBED IN ABINGTONS ON MINOR CHARGE; IS RELEASED

**Detectives Lie In Wait  
For Several Days But  
Hunted Man Fails To  
Return For Trailer  
Left In North Scranton  
Garage—Two  
Identify Person  
Sought As Alvin  
Karpis.**

An important criminal suspect, variously identified as Alvin Karpis, America's public enemy No. 1, and a man sought for a holdup at the Milford National Bank on Dec. 17 last, was under arrest in this city for a minor offense less than two weeks ago, paid a \$10 fine, and then slipped through an elaborate trap set for him by government agents and state troopers.

It became known this afternoon that the suspect, after being released, was identified as Alvin Karpis by Alderman Edward Bellen, of the Second ward, and by Pete Mosier, proprietor of Mosier's garage, North Main avenue and Green Ridge street. Twelve department of justice agents and state troopers, armed with machine guns, lay in wait at Mosier's garage from Feb. 6 until last Friday, Feb. 16, in the hope that the man would return there to call for a trailer which he had stored at the garage.

"I identified the man as Alvin Karpis when a photograph was shown to me by a government agent who called at my office on Sunday, Feb. 9," Alderman Bellen told The Times this afternoon. Mosier also said that he had identified photographs of both Karpis and a woman who accompanied him and who posed as his wife.

### Trailer Without License

State police at Wyoming Barracks and state highway patrolmen at the Chinchilla substation, smiling down the statements of Alderman Bellen and the North Scranton garage man, denied that the suspect who described himself as Roland M. Gunther, of 304 West 94th street, New York city, when arrested, was Karpis. Federal agents who had a part in the investigation also declared that the man who was arrested here was not Karpis.

State Highway Patrolman F. D. Goodling, attached to the Chinchilla substation, arrested the man who described himself as Gunther on Wednesday, Feb. 6. He was driving a 1935 Pontiac sedan, bearing New York state license plates, on toward Scranton on the Notch road, when Goodling picked him up for failing to have a license for a two-wheeled wooden trailer which was attached to his car.

Taken to the office of Alderman Bellen, the man paid a fine of \$10 and costs. He drove to the Mosier garage, stored the trailer on which three heavy trunks were carried, and then left in his car, stating that he and his wife would spend the night in a central city hotel.

### Woman Returns

On the following day, according to statements made by Mosier in the presence of Detective Lieutenant Clyde Finney this afternoon, the woman, later identified from a photograph by Mosier as Mrs. Karpis, came to the garage in a taxicab. She called an express company and had the trunks taken away. It required the services of four men to lift one of the trunks into the express company truck. The trucks were shipped to an Illinois destination and were later traced to the point of shipment by federal agents, it is said.

Mosier said that he was mystified when a squad of federal men and state troopers descended on his garage on Friday, Feb. 7. They showed him a full-length photograph of a man whom they described as Karpis, according to his story, and he said that he immediately identified the picture as that of the man who stored the trailer in his garage. He also identified a picture of the woman.

The federal agents and state troopers, according to the garage proprietor, established a guard in his garage. The guard, which consisted of three eight-hour shifts of agents and troopers, four men to a shift, continued until last Friday. The agents and troopers, apparently satisfied that their quarry did not intend to call for the trailer, left the garage. The trailer, a rude, home-made affair with two tires that appeared to have been recently purchased, is still in the Mosier garage.

#### Police Reticent

Federal agents and state police officials were not anxious to discuss the incident this afternoon aside from their general denial that the man for whom the trap was set was Alvin Karpis. Alderman Bellen, insisting that he identified the man as Karpis, declared that the suspect was carrying owner's and operator's cards for the Pontiac sedan, which carried New York license N3530.

The local police were not informed of any of the developments in the search for the suspect, although it was said at the Mosier garage that a North Scranton police officer sat in the garage and talked with the suspect's woman companion for more than an hour on the day that she appeared to claim the trunks. The police did not know of the presence of the federal men and troopers in the garage until this afternoon, when Lieutenant Finney went to the establishment.

Karpis, a noted bank robber, desperado and kidnapper, has been long sought by G-Men for the kidnapping of Edward G. Bremer, wealthy brewer, of St. Paul, Minn., on Jan. 17, 1934. He has been traced from one end of the country to the other but has always succeeded in eluding the authorities.

Mosier said that the man he later identified as Karpis was wearing a brown suede jacket, dark trousers and a slouch hat when he visited his garage. He described the woman as being exceptionally pretty.

On Jan. 21, 1935, Karpis and Harry Campbell, sole surviving members of the notorious Karpis-Barker gang shot their way through a police trap in an Atlantic City hotel and made good their escape in a stolen automobile. Two girl friends of the gangmen, Dolores Delaney, twenty-two, and Winona Burdette, twenty-one, were arrested.

Miss Delaney, an expectant mother at that time, was described as Karpis' sweetheart.

The bullet-riddled car in which Karpis and Campbell made their escape was found some hours later in a farm lane in Richland township, Bucks county. The spot where the car was located was two and one-half miles south of Quakertown, which is forty miles north of Philadelphia.

## \$2,710 KIDNAP MONEY ORDERED RETURNED

Joyce Directs U. S. to Turn  
Over Bremer Funds to  
Schmidt Brewing Co.

Federal Judge M. M. Joyce handed down an order today directing the Federal government to return to the Schmidt Brewing Co., \$2,710 of the \$200,000 ransom paid for the release of Edward G. Bremer, kidnaped St. Paul banker.

Of the money in question, \$2,625 was found in the possession of William Vidler and \$85 in the possession of John J. McLaughlin Jr., when they were arrested in Chicago in April, 1934, on charges of conspiracy in the kidnaping. Vidler was tried and acquitted here and the charges against McLaughlin were dropped.

The government continued to hold the money however as evidence in the abduction case.

According to the terms of Judge Joyce's order, the money will be turned over to the American National bank, from which it originally was drawn, by Miss Margaret Mullane, clerk of Federal court, who now has it in custody.

The bank will credit it to the brewing company account, then send it to the Federal Reserve bank in Minneapolis. The Reserve bank will forward it to Washington for cancellation and new money will be issued to replace it.

## U. S. Extends Its Hunt for William Mead

Fugitive from Here Sought  
for Questioning in  
Bremer Case.

An extensive search for William Elmer Mead, internationally known confidence man, who has succeeded in evading capture for several years, has been ordered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, according to an Associated Press dispatch from Washington.

Mead, who is wanted here on an indictment charging him with participation in a mail fraud scheme about 12 years ago, is being sought for questioning in the Bremer kidnapping case, it was announced.

Last reports of Mead were that he was arrested at Northampton, Mass. Police there freed him on bond of \$200 before his identity was learned. He had mutilated his finger tips, it was reported.

Mead failed to show up for trial here two years ago and forfeited a \$10,000 bond.

Whether Mead was believed to have information which might provide a link to whereabouts of Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell, or whether he has become a suspect in the disposal of Bremer ransom money, was a subject of speculation among police officers, according to yesterday's news dispatch.

Boston reports recently have indicated that the Karpis trail may be warm in New England States, coinciding with hints that some of the Bremer money turned up there after Mead's flight, it was stated.

Mead, who is 59 years old, has a long criminal record, which dates back to 1920, and includes arrests by postoffice inspectors, England's Scotland Yard and police in Los Angeles, Denver, Miami and other cities.

His English is poor. He is partly bald and marked by a nervous blinking of the left eye and partial paralysis of the left shoulder and face.

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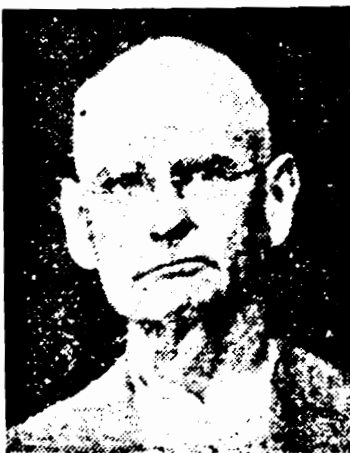

## Trio Named in 3-Year-Old Smith Slaying

Harry Campbell, Another  
Tulsa Thug Named in  
Kansas Confession

The murder of J. Earl Smith, Tulsa attorney, whose body was found Aug. 19, 1932, on a dirt road near Indian Hills Country club, today was laid at the hands of Harry Campbell, Tulsa burglar-bond jumper, and another man implicated by the confession of Jimmy Lawson, life term at Lansing, Kan., penitentiary.

Lawson, Thursday night, gave a full confession to the slaying of Maj. Wint Smith, assistant attorney general of Kansas, in charge of the Kansas state police, Smith told The Tribune Friday.

Lawson told Major Smith that he, Eddie Snyder and Campbell were at the scene of the attorney's death.

John Evans, chief criminal deputy sheriff, said that Lawson's statement bears out the theory that the county authorities had pursued in an attempt to solve the slaying. Campbell has never been apprehended.

Lawson laid the actual slaying to Campbell, but said that Snyder, who is serving a 25-year sentence in McAlester for a Tulsa robbery, had first struck Earl Smith over the head with his gun, which was discharged, inflicting one of the two wounds found on the attorney.

The confession, according to the Kansas official, went into detail, even to the drawing of a map to show a pond on East Federal drive where Snyder allegedly tossed his gun after the shooting.

The confession added that the day after the slaying, Campbell and George (Burrhead) Keady, arrested last week and held in Cleveland, Ohio, under \$50,000 bond on a train robbery charge, left Tulsa together,

Keady is reported to have been identified in the robbery, in which Alvin Karpis, Tulsa gunman and the nation's public enemy No. 1, was reputed to have been the leader.

The body of the slain attorney was found lying beside his car by a man living in that vicinity.

He had left his home the night before, in answer to a telephone call which officers had believed was made by Campbell, but which Lawson, in his confession, says he made.

He told the Kansas official that Smith had been trying to locate Campbell to collect \$3,200 on a fee. Smith had represented Campbell and Glenn Roy Wright, now serving life in McAlester penitentiary, on a case growing out of the burglary of the H. F. Wilcox Oil and Gas Co.

Late for Attorney  
The two were under bond and failed to appear for trial. Wright was later arrested on another robbery charge. Campbell has been at large since, reportedly with the Karpis gang.

The story as told to the Kansas official by Lawson is as follows:

Smith had been calling a hang-out here for Campbell for several days. Finally, Campbell, who was supposed to have been away at the time with Freddie Barker, came to Tulsa with Eddie Snyder.

Snyder told Lawson of a "job" they expected to pull and induced him to join them. Snyder had been out of prison himself for only a short time.

He told Lawson to get in touch with Smith and arrange a meeting with Campbell.

Lawson said he telephoned the Smith residence, and asked for the attorney. He said "Harry is calling." He arranged for Smith to pick him and Snyder up downtown. In Smith's car they drove to the appointed scene near Indian Hills about midnight.

Death Tryst in Night  
A car drove up, containing Campbell.

Lawson said he got out of Smith's car, leaving Snyder in the back seat.

As Campbell walked up to the car, he reportedly said "Give it to the —."

At that, Snyder, according to the confession, hit Campbell over the head with his gun, which was discharged.

At the same time, Campbell opened fire the convict said.

After the shooting, Lawson said he lifted Smith from the car and laid him on the ground. He believes he died almost immediately. Campbell searched the slain man,

and shortly after, the three got in Campbell's car and drove away toward Tulsa. On the way back, Snyder threw his gun in a pond, Campbell retaining his.

In town, Lawson said he argued with the other two about having gotten him into a murder case. He said Campbell told him it was "the biggest break you could get," inferring that he, Lawson, could now join up with The Karpis gang.

No Bailey Connection  
Campbell referred to Karpis as "Chi," which the Kansas official says is his nickname.

The next day, Lawson said, Campbell left town with Keady.

Later, Lawson became involved in a robbery at Coffeyville, Kan., and was sentenced to life imprisonment.

His statement Thursday night followed weeks of questioning by Kansas officials, according to Smith.

Two days before he was slain, Earl Smith had represented Harvey Bailey, kidnapper serving life at Alcatraz, in Fort Scott, Kan., on a bank robbery charge.

The Kansas official says that Bailey, convicted, was in possession of bonds taken from the bank by Karpis, Verne Miller (of the Kansas City massacre and now dead) and Freddie Barker—also dead.

County officers are confident that Lawson's story is correct in that it definitely coincides with their theory of the slaying, in which no charges were ever filed. It occurred in Rogers county and the authorities there were never able to produce sufficient information on which to base a charge.

## EARL SMITH CASE DETAILS EXPOSED

Kansas Convict Says Harry Campbell, Eddie Snyder Killed Tulsa Lawyer

Harry Campbell, fugitive public enemy, and Eddie Snyder, Tulsa convict now in the McAlester penitentiary, participated in the slaying of J. Earl Smith, attorney, whose body was found near the Indian Hills Country club August 19, 1932, according to a confession made public here Friday by Maj. Wint Smith, Kansas assistant attorney-general.

Smith said he obtained the confession from Jim Lawson, life term in the Kansas state penitentiary at Lansing. County officers began their hunt for Campbell after the Smith murder. They had obtained evidence connecting Campbell, who then was a fugitive on a burglary charge, with the Smith slaying.

The confession, according to Smith, stated that Snyder induced Lawson to join him in a robbery here. He told Lawson to get the attorney to meet Campbell. The lawyer met Lawson and Snyder downtown and the party drove near the country club where Campbell later met them in another car. Lawson said when Smith stepped out of his car Snyder hit him on the head with a pistol and Campbell shot him.

The Kansas convict said he helped drag the body from the car. He left the impression, according to the attorney-general, that Campbell killed Smith in order to avoid payment of a \$3,200 fee to the lawyer.

Snyder and Campbell left Tulsa the next day accompanied by George (Burr Head) Keady, gambler, Major Smith said. Keady was arrested here last week and charged with participating in the \$46,500 train robbery at Garrettsville, Ohio, last November.

Lawson was subsequently arrested and given a life term for a robbery at Coffeyville, Kan., while Snyder received a 25-year robbery term here.

Campbell is believed to be traveling with Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1, according to federal and county officers.

A new link in a chain of evidence pointing to a persistent tieup of someone in Tulsa with the Alvin Karpis gang had been forged Saturday by a statement from a Kansas life term prisoner to the effect that George (Burrhead) Keady, Tulsa bookmaker and gambler now held in a \$46,500 train robbery in Ohio, was connected with Harry Campbell, running mate of Karpis.

Both Karpis and Campbell are known to have used Tulsa as headquarters at one time or another in their lurid crime careers. Campbell has been sought for three years in the slaying of J. Earl Smith, while

held up a train at Garrettsville, Ohio, last November. He is under \$50,000 bond.

His alleged connection with Campbell was revealed in the confession of Jimmy Lawson, formerly of Tulsa and now in Lansing penitentiary, in which Lawson says he was with Campbell and Eddie Snyder, another Tulsa convict, the night Smith was killed across the Rogers county line, August 16, 1932.

Throughout his lengthy statement appeared the name of Keady, who has in the past been connected with George Hurford, Tulsa king pin gambler and bookmaker.

Lawson's statement makes plain the apparent ease with which gangsters have stopped in Tulsa from time to time.

#### Where Gunmen Hid Here

He named a number of addresses at which Campbell and other gunmen stayed in Tulsa. He himself lived in the 1100 block on South Quincy avenue, his statement, given Major Wint Smith of the Kansas state police Thursday night, detailed.

Campbell, Glenn Roy Wright and Snyder, or Moss, as he was known, lived for a time in the 1500 block on North Boston avenue, he said.

The first reference to Keady in Lawson's lengthy statement related to the day after Smith's body was found near Indian Hills Country club.

Lawson said the trio drove to Skiatook that night and drove out into a patch of woods. The next morning, he said Campbell told him to drive to Tulsa and get Keady.

Keady, he said, drove back with him in his own car and met Campbell and Snyder for a conversation. After that, Lawson said, he and Snyder drove over to Arkansas for a few days before coming back to Tulsa.

The next time he saw Keady, his statement read, was after he and Snyder joined Campbell on a farm near Mannford—presumably the same farm where Wright, Campbell's co-defendant on a burglary charge here, was arrested and subsequently sent to prison for life.

At that time, he said, Campbell sent him to Keady with a message for some medicine and groceries.

#### "Rapped" a Tulsa Bakery

Campbell was crippled at the time, Lawson said.

Keady, according to Lawson, took groceries, medicine and some automobile casings to the Mannford farm. Then Lawson and Snyder came back to Tulsa and "rapped a little old bakery, at Seventh street and Kenosha avenue."

Shortly before the killing of Smith, Lawson had been released from prison. Come here, he found that Campbell was apparently linked with Freddie Barker.

"Several calls came in, purported to be from Freddy," read the statement. "When I came to Tulsa they wanted a couple of machine guns to rob banks. Freddy was going to get the guns."

"One night Campbell, a little drunk, told his sister, Flora, that he was expecting a call from Freddy

turned over to the federal government and since that time has been made available for inspection to all law-enforcement officers.

Watts' visit followed action of The Tribune in notifying Governor Marland and Attorney-General Williamson of the statement and its contents.

Although making no statement as to what purpose the federal government had in mind, an agent of the department of justice also inspected the statement early Saturday afternoon.

#### Rogers County Interested

Sheriff Marrs still held Louis Webb, 32, 3303 E. Easton st., in jail after Webb admitted that the three men named, had been at his home the night of the Smith slaying, and that Campbell had come back at various times, as had the other two. A charge of harboring a criminal may be filed Monday against Webb, Watts indicated.

Meanwhile, County Attorney D. M. Battenfield of Rogers county, in which Smith's body was found, planned to confer with Watts relative to the filing of murder charges.

Watts said that he would recommend the filing of such charges as soon as he was able to corroborate the statement made by Lawson.

Lawson went into detail regarding the slaying of Smith, events leading up to it, and subsequent events which drew in the names of gangsters known throughout the country.

He told of Snyder allegedly throwing away his gun after the shooting, tossing it into a small lake enroute back to Tulsa.

Lawson may be brought here from prison to aid the authorities in checking his story, Watts indicated.

#### Sheridan Connection Seen

Watts was accompanied here Saturday by Jack Roberts and T. C. Davis of the state crime bureau, and Charles De Laughter of the tax commission. Robert Houston, state operative, George Collins and T. Van Woody, state men, were also here.

It was learned that Governor Marland had launched this wide investigation in the belief that the Smith slaying might have had some connection with the Sheridan club slayings of last December 3, when George Stewart and Louis Pappan were killed.

Webb's statements to county authorities were to be checked by Watts.

He had admitted that Campbell, since named with Alvin Karpis as one of the nation's "bad men," spent several days at his home when he lived in Sperry, in April, 1933. At that time, county authorities nearly caught Campbell, but arrested Webb and charged him with knowingly receiving stolen property April 21, 1933. Webb was acquitted at preliminary.

Watts is hopeful that Snyder will shed some light on the slaying when confronted by Lawson's statement.

Snyder has a varied record here, having been sent to prison for 25 years on a charge of robbery, following some lesser convictions.

Lawson, in his statement to Kansas officials last Thursday night, told of a fear which he had of Snyder during the time they ran together.

## KARPIS ASSOCIATE NAMED IN KILLING OF TULSA LAWYER

Kansas Convict Says He  
Saw Murder, It Is  
Reported.

By United Press.  
TULSA, Feb. 29.—Harry Campbell, associate of Alvin Karpis, first ranking public enemy, Saturday was accused of the slaying of J. Earl Smith, Tulsa attorney, whose body was found near the Indian Hills Golf club in August, 1932.

Maj. Wint Smith, Kansas assistant attorney general, said that Jim Lawson, convict serving life in the Kansas state penitentiary, confessed that he saw the Tulsa lawyer killed.

The confession alleged that Eddie Snyder, now serving a 5-year term at McAlester penitentiary, induced Lawson to join him in a robbery. They got the attorney to meet them, and drove to the golf course. Lawson, according to Major Smith, related that when the attorney stepped from the car Snyder clubbed him on the head with a pistol, and Campbell shot him.

Lawson said he helped drag the body from the car. He indicated that Campbell killed the lawyer to avoid paying him a \$3,200 fee.

### The New Chief

**R**AY E. ALLEN, the new chief, is a career man in the Toledo police department. He was a young patrolman back in 1914, a sergeant in 1920, a lieutenant in 1923, captain in 1927 and has been the inspector of police since 1933. He is a studious, faithful officer, progressive in his methods, but not sensational—no drum beater or seeker of publicity. He is a policeman and not a politician and it may be assumed that he will refuse to take orders, as some chiefs have done in the past, from politicians who had only an invisible, an unofficial—though powerful—connection with the city government.

There is no more difficult position in municipal government than that of the chief of police of any large city, but it may be expected that Chief Allen will comply with Manager Edy's wise suggestion to develop a sensible, continuous police program, with due attention to the suppression of vice and crime as well as to other problems, including that of department discipline.

The promotion of Chief Allen and of several others raised in rank at the same time, should tend to improve the efficiency of the department and to encourage other capable, honest young officers. It will be fine for them to know that promotion depends upon merit and not upon political pull.

# Fence Buster Vehovec Hurls Defy at Police

Councilman Anton Vehovec, citizen raider and fence buster, today defied police to arrest him for cutting down part of a fence which prevented the public from gaining access to a beach at E. 156th st. and Lake Erie.

Vehovec hurled his defiance when told that Police Lieutenant Bernard Wolf was seeking a warrant charging him with malicious destruction of property.

Just whose property the fence is seems to be a mystery that not even Lieutenant Wolf has been able to solve. The councilman was equally mystified after inquiries at the city safety, service and health departments failed to throw light on the instigator of the bathing blockade.

Significantly, Vehovec's latest outburst coincides with the return to his ward (thirty-second) of Police Captain Michael J. Harwood. It was Harwood who ordered Vehovec's sign "This is a public bathing beach," torn down from the E. 156th st. beach.

"I talked to Chief Police Prosecutor Perry A. Frey about this," Vehovec said, "and he told me I was perfectly right." Frey denied this, declaring he had told the councilman he'd "better watch himself, and that he might be trespassing on city property."

"They're welcome to charge me," Vehovec continued. "The public is behind me. Let them go ahead and arrest me. I'll make them look silly. The only reason that fence was put up is because some big-shot Democratic politician wanted the beach for the exclusive use of nearby residents."

The councilman added that not only would he keep the beach open to the public, but he'd have a stairway built there and a life guard stationed to protect bathers.

A question as to how police are coping with his complaint that four bookie joints and one vice resort are operating openly in the fourteenth precinct brought charges by the councilman of a "tip-off."

## 'Bookie Joint Tipped Off'

"Police have done nothing," Vehovec asserted. "After I complained, the bookie joints were warned by telephone that they'd better close—that things were getting too hot."

"I don't think Harwood is the proper man for the job. I think he needs investigating. The best place for him is a job as life guard at Warrensville workhouse."

Two years ago, when Harwood was in Vehovec's ward, the councilman led personally conducted raids on slot machine exhibitors. He quieted down when Harwood was transferred. Three weeks ago Harwood was re-assigned to Vehovec's ward, and the fence-busting followed.

# Allen Given Full Freedom as City's New Police Chief

Edy Asks Only That Official Refrain From Starting  
Crusades and Drum-Beating;  
Four Others Promoted.

There are no strings attached to the appointment of Ray E. Allen as police chief, John N. Edy, city manager, declared today.

Mr. Edy, in announcing the appointment yesterday afternoon of Mr. Allen as chief, requested only that he refrain from starting campaigns and that there be no beating of drums in connection with police activities.

Promotions in the ranks resulting from the elevation of Mr. Allen from inspector included the naming of Capt. Clarence M. Mead as inspector, Lieut. Clarence I. Fauble as captain, Sergt. Charles Roth as lieutenant, and Patrolman Frank Baumgartner as sergeant.

The promotions came as the first step of a proposed general reorganization of the police department.

Chief Allen will make an inspection tour of police departments in Ohio cities, including the department at Cincinnati, Mr. Edy said. He said that when Chief Allen returns he (Mr. Edy) will call a meeting of the chief with Frazier Reams, county prosecutor, Martin S. Dodd, law director, the four municipal court judges, and George F. Wagner, secretary of the safety department.

At this meeting Mr. Edy said he

hopes a sensible and continuous program of police work, including the handling of vice and general crime, can be developed.

Mr. Edy added that if the newspapers would put away their big

type for six months it would help in the general reorganization program considerably.

Announcement of the appointment of Chief Allen came one month after the death of Daniel Wolfe, former chief.

Mr. Edy said that while the recent mental and adaptability tests were considered in his selection of Chief Allen, and in his approval of the other promotions, the tests by no means governed his approval of the program thus far.

The tests were helpful in the selection of police officials for key positions and in many cases the results confirmed the standings the men had made in promotional examinations taken before the civil service commission.

## Advice of Chief Followed

Mr. Edy said that all the promotions in the department made after he had selected Chief Allen were at the request of Chief Allen.

Mr. Baumgartner's promotion probably can be attributed to the work he did in the recent tests, Mr. Edy intimated. Mr. Baumgartner, it is understood, obtained the highest grade of any of the police officials in the combined mentality and adaptability tests.

Mr. Mead stood second on the civil service promotion list for inspector. Mr. Fauble was first on the list for promotion to captain. Mr. Roth headed the list for promotion to lieutenant, and Mr. Baumgartner was second on the civil service list for promotion to sergeant.

Chief Allen will receive \$3,205 a year; Inspector Mead will get \$2,432.50 a year; Captain Fauble will receive \$2,170 a year; Lieutenant Roth will receive \$2,012.50 a year and Sergeant Baumgartner will get \$1,907.50 a year. A patrolman receives \$1,640 a year.

## Mr. Baumgartner Has Been Assigned to the Office of Prosecutor

Reams with Detective Harry Manson. Chief Allen said Sergeant Baumgartner will be asked to return to his regular police duties.

In connection with the plan for reorganizing the police department Mr. Edy said Sergeant Baumgartner will be asked to assist in general reorganization. Sergeant Baumgartner will work with Chief Allen on general staff assignments, Mr. Edy explained.

Chief Allen is 44 years old and joined the department March 1, 1914, just 22 years and one day before he became chief; he was promoted to a sergeant March 1, 1920; a lieutenant Nov. 16, 1923; a captain May 1, 1927, and an inspector Jan. 3, 1933.

Inspector Mead is 60 years old, lives at 624 Carlton avenue, and joined the department Dec. 26, 1905. He was promoted to a sergeant Dec. 30, 1913, a lieutenant Feb. 1, 1919, and a captain May 1, 1929.

## Deer Closed First Time

Captain Fauble is 48 years old, lives at 333 Mayberry street, and joined the department Aug. 21, 1915. He was promoted to a sergeant Jan. 1, 1929, and to a lieutenant July 1, 1933.

Lieutenant Roth is 45 years old, lives at 1323 Dorr street, and his appointment comes one day after his birthday. He joined the police department Dec. 1, 1917, and was promoted to a sergeant Sept. 1, 1928.

Sergeant Baumgartner is 38 years old, lives at 77 Birkhead place, and after joining the department April 1, 1922, served until June 5, 1924, when he resigned. He again was appointed a patrolman Dec. 1, 1924. Sergeant Baumgartner has been working in the office of Prosecutor Reams since Detective Merle Unkle was promoted to become chief of police at Ashfield, O.

The appointments and promotions were announced late yesterday by Mr. Edy after a two-hour conference in his office with Chief Allen and other members of the police department.

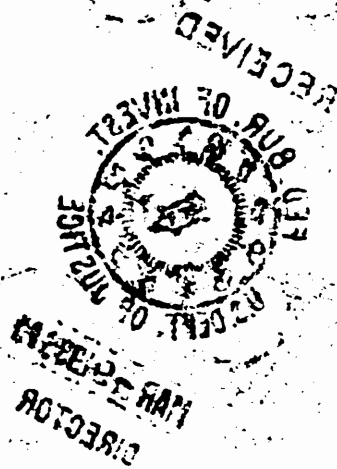

# CHIEF DISSOLVES HOODLUM SQUAD

## Timiney Is Ordered Back to Regular Duty in Bureau.

A complete revision of methods of policing the city of Toledo is contained in a startling order issued today by Police Chief Ray Allen as he began his program of reorganization of the department.

Chief Allen abolished the method of holding special squads responsible for the apprehension and investigation of crime here and announced that every patrolman and scout crew member hereafter will be responsible for crime conditions on his beat or district.

This announcement accompanied Chief Allen's order dissolving the hoodlum squad and ordering its members to report to their immediate superiors for assignment to new duties.

Under this order Detective Capt. George Timiney, erstwhile head of the hoodlum squad, and Detective Frank DeLora, Chris Brennan and

Robert Fielding were ordered to report at once to Inspector of Detectives Louis Haas for assignment.

Patrolmen James Tafelski, John Michalak and John McCarthy, other members of the squad, likewise were ordered to report immediately to Inspector Clarence Mead for assignment to duty with the uniformed division.

Capt. Clarence Fauble was placed in charge of a combined vice, gambling, liquor and narcotic squad which will be called into action to assist patrolmen and scout crew members to gather evidence concerning resorts and beer parlors on their respective beats or districts.

Chief Allen made it plain, however, that the ordinary patrolman will be held strictly responsible for uncovering vice, gambling, slot machines or any criminal activities on his particular beat.

In the event he needs assistance to obtain evidence of criminal activities he will report to his superior who, in turn, will inform Captain Fauble of the necessity of assistance.

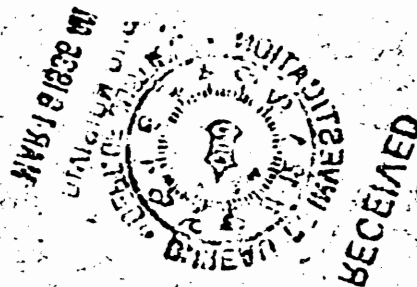

## G-Men Enlisting Dentists In Fight on Crime Chiefs

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—Justice department agents are quietly enlisting the aid of the nation's dentists in one phase of a twofold drive for quick identification of "public enemies."

Representatives of the federal bureau of investigation have been making contacts with dental societies, urging their members to keep uniform records of work done on the teeth of patients.

Such records are as accurate as fingerprints in establishing identity, agents say. They already have succeeded in identifying several dead criminals through this means.

Yesterday the F. B. I. moved to prevent "public enemies" from slipping through the law's dragnet by mutilating their fingertips. The bureau issued a request to all police to "hold" persons with mutilated fingers until their fingerprints can be rushed here for comparison with the government's voluminous files.

This is part of the drive to capture Alvin Karpis and other gangsters. Karpis and some others are known to have tried to thwart identification by burning or cutting their fingers. But federal agents said no criminal has yet succeeded in destroying enough of the telltale whorls and curves to make identification impossible.

The agents believe the criminals' attempts may prove to be boomerangs because their mutilations will be "brands" arousing the suspicion of policemen everywhere.

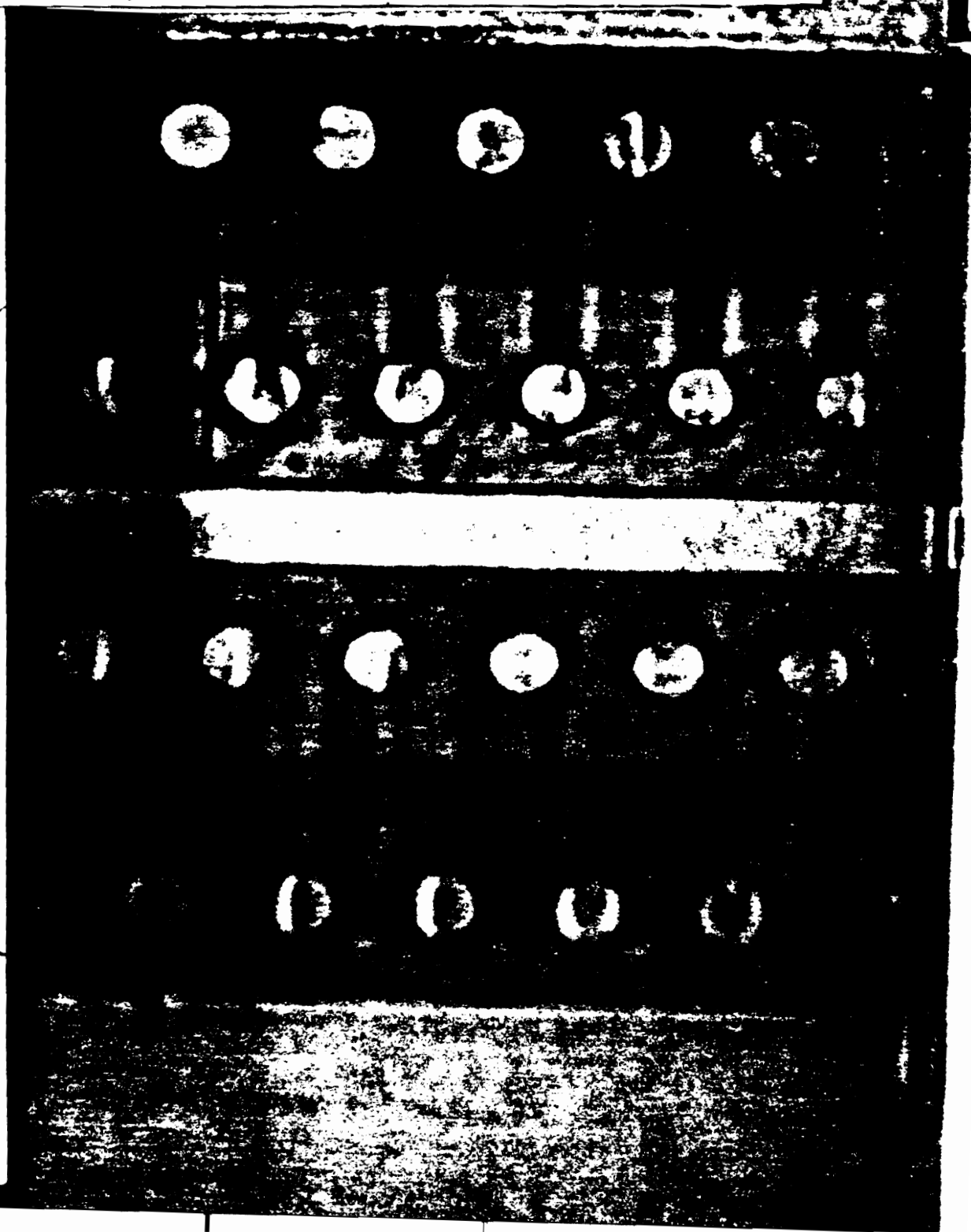

Morrissey, chief of police, said last night. However, Chief Morrissey indorsed the movement and pledged support of Indianapolis police.

## BY THEIR TEETH G-MEN WILL KNOW THEM

Dentists Asked to Record All Work  
in Public Enemy Offensive

### KARPIS STILL SOUGHT

By the Associated Press

WASHINGTON, March 13—Justice department agents are quietly enlisting the aid of the nation's dentists in one phase of a two-fold drive for quick identification of public enemies.

Representatives of the federal bureau of investigation have been making contacts with dental societies, urging their members to keep uniform records of work done on the teeth of patients.

Such records are as accurate as fingerprints in establishing identity, agents say. They already have succeeded in identifying several dead criminals through this means.

Yesterday the F. B. I. moved to prevent public enemies from slipping through the law's dragnet by mutilating their fingertips. The bureau issued a request to all police

to hold persons with mutilated fingers until their fingerprints can be rushed here for comparison with the government's voluminous files.

This is part of the drive to capture Alvin Karpis and other gangsters. Karpis and some others are known to have tried to thwart identification by burning or cutting their fingers. But federal agents said no criminal has yet succeeded in destroying enough of the tell-tale whorls and curves to make identification impossible.

The agents believe the criminals' attempts may prove to be boomerangs because such mutilations will be "brands" arousing the suspicion of policemen everywhere.

# CHIEF MOVES TO WIPE OUT BIG GAMBLERS

Tells Owners of Six Buildings  
Housing Joints To Oust  
Tenants—'Or Else'

## COMPILES DOWNTOWN LIST

Horse Race Betting, Roulette  
and Dice Resorts Marked  
as Vice War Targets

A determined move to wipe out  
big-time gambling in Toledo was  
launched by Police Chief Ray E.  
Allen today.

The chief obtained from the  
county auditor's office the names  
of owners of the six buildings  
housing the major downtown  
gambling joints with a view to  
prosecuting them unless their  
notorious tenants are ousted.

The following list was compiled  
by Chief Allen:

Edward Warnke's dice and  
roulette joint at 631 N. St. Clair  
Street; property owned by Mrs.  
Eliza J. Dow, 2216 Parkwood  
Avenue.

### Aronoff Joint Listed.

Jacob Romanoff's horse race bet-  
ting establishment at 428 1/2 Su-  
perior Street; property owned by  
the Arbrand Co.

Benny Aronoff's horse race bet-  
ting and "numbers" joint at 229  
Superior Street; property held by  
the Toledo Trust Co. as trustee.

Benny Harris' race betting, cards  
and "numbers" joint at 114 Su-  
perior Street; property owned by  
the Toledo Garages, Inc.

Harry Levine's luxurious roulette  
and dice rooms at 513 1/2 Jefferson  
Avenue; property owned by Mary  
Alice Mandler Vaughan.

Ralph Dugan's minor dice joint  
at 625 St. Clair Street; property  
owned by the Steadman Invest-  
ment Co.

### Cites Law Penalties.

Chief Allen cited three sections  
of the state law—13054, 13055 and  
13056—under which charges will  
be brought against the owners, he  
said, if the gamblers are allowed  
to remain in possession of their  
quarters.

Section 13054 provides that any-  
one who knowingly permits a  
building to be used for gambling  
shall be fined from \$30 to \$500,  
imprisoned from 30 to 90 days or  
both.

The next section holds that an  
owner of a property who knows it  
is being used for gambling and  
fails to report this at once "shall  
be deemed to have knowingly per-  
mitted" such use.

### Moves Against Club.

The final section provides a fine  
of from \$50 to \$200 for anyone  
permitting gambling in property  
"of which he has the care or  
possession."

Chief Allen's drive to suppress  
gambling by moving against the  
owners was preceded today by an  
order to his men to clamp down  
on the New Casino Club.

It is to be watched nightly, the  
chief ordered, and is to be closed  
immediately if evidence is gained  
of any violation of the law.

The chief moved against the club,

already the subject of a vice in-  
vestigation by the county grand  
jury, after his attention had been  
called to the antics of a "male"  
chorus that dances nightly at the  
New Casino.

Closing the club would be justi-  
fied, Chief Allen said, if officers,  
after viewing the show decided the  
feminine songs and dances consti-  
tute an indecent performance.

Violation of any provision of the  
state liquor law should result in  
immediate closing also, the chief  
said in his order, which was di-  
rected to Capt. Clarence Fauble,  
head of the revamped vice and  
gambling squad, and to Inspector  
Clarence Mead.

### Question Two Owners.

The antics of such members of  
the troupe as "Tangary," "Jackie,"  
"Faye," "Dixie" and "Annie," who  
appear in baby blue dancing cos-  
tumes, crimson gowns and blond  
curls, formed the basis for the  
grand jury questioning of Ted and  
Bert Angus, proprietors of the  
club, which is on Dura Avenue,  
near the Dixie Highway.

Chief Allen said that he had  
heard about the male chorus, but  
had received no complaints of any-  
one being offended by the conduct  
of members of the cast.

Sergt. Margaret Slater, head of  
the Police Women's Bureau, said  
a woman had complained that two  
of the dancers had "flirted" with  
her husband. Mrs. Slater said she  
sent Policewoman Margaret Bro-  
gan to the club to investigate. Miss  
Brogan reported she found nothing  
wrong with the performance.

Chief Allen's order to clamp  
down on the New Casino came  
after Traffic Inspector Thomas  
O'Reilly and Sergt. Frank Baum-  
gartner had measured the location  
of the New Casino, determining  
that it is a few yards within the  
city limits.

It was called to the chief's at-  
tention that the Municipal Court  
has jurisdiction throughout the  
county and that a police officer  
may make arrests wherever he  
finds violation of the law. Chief  
Allen said that in the future no  
time will be wasted in determining  
exact location of such places as re-  
gards the boundary line.

### "We'll Make Arrests."

"We'll not quibble about 'border-  
line cases,'" he said. "We'll make  
arrests and talk about location  
later."

Meanwhile the police drive  
against established vice resorts and  
gambling dens was producing re-  
sults in the downtown district.

The vice and gambling squad  
found three of the six downtown  
gambling joints closed last night.  
In one, a handful of men were  
found playing bridge. In two  
others there were from 50 to  
75 men hanging around, but all  
gaming equipment was out of  
service.

All downtown vice resorts were  
closed, squad members reported.

### Second Woman Jailed.

Little effect, apparently, has  
been gained in outlying sections of  
the city from Chief Allen's order  
making all policemen responsible  
for vice and gambling conditions  
in their districts. Slot machines  
—the old-time "one-arm bandit"  
type as well as the newer "pin"  
games—still were on display in  
scores of neighborhood stores.

The second of the women sought  
for two months as operators of  
vice resorts in which a 13-year-old  
girl served as a professional inmate  
was arrested yesterday.

The woman, Mae O'Dell, who  
ran a resort in Monroe Street, was  
arrested by Detective Harry Man-  
son as she was going to a grocery  
in Trilby from her farm "hide-  
out." The farm, it is believed, had

# Bars County to Gamblers Banished by City Police

Sheriff O'Reilly to Join in Keeping Lid Clamped  
Down; Vice Squad Tour Reveals Operators  
Have Closed Places.

Operators of Toledo gambling houses whose activities may be curtailed, if not stopped completely, by vigorous police policies inaugurated by Chief Ray Allen, will find no refuge in the county, Sheriff James O'Reilly declared today.

Sheriff O'Reilly said that he personally will investigate tonight reports that several prominent gambling house operators are preparing to open places in the county while the "heat" is on in the urban area. Other places, said to be in

operation already also will be included in the sheriff's itinerary.

He reported he had been informed that operators of the Hill avenue gardens were ready to open games of chance for patrons and that a group of Clevelanders, said to be associates of the old Thomas (Yonnie) Licavoli gang, are seeking an entree in gambling circles here with an eye to opening a place of business in the county.

A well known Toledo night club operator was said by the sheriff's informant to be aiding in arranging a place here for the Clevelanders. The operator denied any connection with the Clevelanders or with the Hill Avenue Gardens.

In addition, Sheriff O'Reilly said he was informed that the operator of a downtown gambling house, which was an especial target for forays of the former hoodlum squad under the leadership of Capt. George Timiney, had purchased property in the county with a view to establishing a suburban gaming center.

The sheriff was emphatic in his declaration that he will not permit

the gamblers to gain a foothold in his domain.

"I will not tolerate the dumping of the city's refuse in the county," he said.

"The county is free of gambling now and it is going to remain that way."

## Places Are Closed

Fearing the wrath of the reorganized vice squad under Capt. Clarence Fauble, gambling house operators and resort keepers in the city closed their establishments last night.

Horse race betting spots were reported operating with the assistance of a corps of lookouts.

By their actions the operators of such resorts indicated the lid was on in Toledo, but there was considerable speculation as to whether they would make an attempt to reopen.

At 10 o'clock last night, after receiving reports from members of his squad, Captain Fauble reported that everything was closed.

## Vice Squad Reports

Following is the report of the vice squad:

"We made our first visit to downtown gambling houses at 6:30 P. M. At 631 St. Clair street, 625 St. Clair street, and 518 1/2 Jefferson avenue, we found the places closed.

At 428 1/2 Superior street (the R. & K.), there were several men in the joint playing bridge. At 229 1/2 Superior street (Benny Aronoff's) there were 75 men in the place, but we found no evidence of gambling. At 120 Superior (Benny Harris'), we found about 50 men in the place, but the crap tables were turned upside down.

"On our second visit we found a few men at 120 and 221 1/2 Superior street. They were playing cards, but there was no evidence of gambling.

"All disorderly houses were closed. In our estimation the town is closed tight."

## PLANS PREPARED TO REMOVE MRS. EATON

Bremer Case Figure Probably  
Will Be Taken to Florida  
in Few Days.

Federal authorities prepared today to take Myrtle Eaton from St. Paul to Florida to be tried there for harboring William Weaver, one of the kidnapers of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker.

Her removal was ordered Monday by Federal Judge M. M. Joyce, but a stay of execution was granted to permit her counsel to petition the Federal Circuit court for a writ of habeas corpus to hold her here.

The stay expired at midnight Thursday, however, and T. W. McMeekin, her attorney, said today he would make no further effort to block the removal.

Officials in the United States marshal's office said they had not completed plans for taking her to Florida but that she probably would start the trip in custody of one or two deputies within a few days.

Under indictment for conspiracy in the Bremer kidnaping, for which some of the plans allegedly were made in her apartment at 565 Portland avenue, Mrs. Eaton was arrested with Weaver September 1 on a small chicken farm where they were living near Allendale, Fla. Both were brought to St. Paul and Mrs. Eaton has been in Ramsey county jail ever since.

Weaver, one of the men who kidnaped Bremer for \$200,000 ransom January 17, 1934, was tried here for conspiracy in the crime, found guilty January 24 and sentenced to life imprisonment. It was decided not to try Mrs. Eaton on a conspiracy charge, however, but to try her instead for harboring Weaver in Florida.

## Mutilated Fingerprints.

**T**HE Federal Bureau of Investigation at Washington, of which J. Edgar Hoover is chief, asks police departments everywhere in the country to hold for further investigation all persons in their custody, now or in future, whose fingerprints are mutilated. Suspicion and detention are justifiable in such cases.

The bureau seeks Alvin Karpis, now at the top of the G-men's list as Public Enemy No. 1. Karpis is a killer, kidnapper and a leader of one of the worst underworld mobs.

Karpis and his mob, following the example of others, including dead John Dillinger in his time, rubbed out and mutilated fingertip scrolls and whorls which are the most positive identification marks known to science. It is being done by many criminals whose fingerprints are on record.

The arrest of a person with mutilated fingertips is a danger signal to police. Mr. Hoover emphasizes it. Law-abiding citizens do not mutilate their fingers. In the rare instances where mutilation may be the result of accident, proof of the fact can be produced without difficulty.

## Business Spoiled

Downtown Toledo horse race betting establishments today were reported on the verge of a shutdown following repeated applications of a new police policy of timing gambling squad visits.

A revamping of police strategy now has timed the visits to coincide with the periods when the gamblers expect their most lucrative business—the rush of last minute bets just before important races.

With squad members on the premises at such delicate junctures, the gamblers are unable to reach the source of reliable profits, and gloomy reports from the sidelines this morning were that the gaming shops are ready to close down.

### Find No Activities

Members of Capt. Clarence Fauble's revamped vice and gambling squad found no activities in Toledo gaming houses and vice dens as they made their routine rounds last night, according to police reports.

In previous visits, although they found no gambling, the squad usually encountered a crowd of men lounging in Harris' Superior Sport Center and in Benny Aronoff's Buckeye Cigar store, 229½ Superior street.

Patrolmen William Fink, Edward Kline and Lester Sardusky reported that there were only half as many loungers in these places last night as on previous visits. They said the situation indicated that patrons of the places are becoming disgusted at the prolonged inactivity.

# G-Man Writes Of Gun "Ma" Who Died In Florida Fight

Motorists driving through Oklawaha, 20 miles southwest of Ocala, for the first time always stop to gaze at a neat little two-story house in a grove of oak trees on the shore of Lake Weir, 200 yards off the highway.

If neighbors are around they will tell you about the day a year ago when G-men surrounded the house at dawn and fought the battle of Oklawaha with Ma Barker and her son, Fred, leaders in the Bremer kidnaping.

Mr. and Fred had a regular arsenal in the house. They manned machine guns at the two upstairs front windows, and were not taken out until more than 1500 shots and gas bombs had been fired.

## Hoover Writes of "Ma"

J. Edgar Hoover, head of the G-men, writing in the American magazine, calls Ma Barker the most vicious, dangerous and resourceful criminal brain America has produced in the last generation.

"She was the most dangerous law-breaker in my experience," Hoover says. More so than Dillinger or Baby Face Nelson or any of the rest of our so-called No. 1 public enemies. In her 60 years she reared a spawn of hell. Of her four sons, one was a mail robber, another a holdup man, and remaining pair highwaymen, kidnapers and wanton murderers.

To a great extent their criminal careers were directly traceable to their mother. To her they looked for guidance and for daring resourcefulness. They obeyed her implicitly. So too did the other members of the Barker-Karpis gang of hoodlums, highwaymen, kidnapers and murderers which she headed.

Ma Barker was a product of the Oark mountains, Hoover relates, and married a native of her section. Before her four sons grew to manhood all of them had been accused of law-breaking.

It was not until 1934, however, Hoover continues, "that the federal bureau of information received information that the gang had broken laws under its jurisdiction. In every instance of those state offenses the procedure of Mother Barker, as she had now become known, was exactly the same. First argument; then storming denunciation of what she complained was a studied campaign of persecution. Hers were good boys, she insisted, the best in town. Failing in this trade, she would weaken, beg for clemency."

"They moved to Tulsa, Okla., and the boys went to school there, but they re-educated themselves in the company of the Central Park gang, a crew of youngsters who played about the park in the daytimes, then went forth to night robberies. Here were vicious criminals in the making; the Barker house was their meeting place. There they would talk of crime, while Mother Barker sat and listened, offering here and there canny suggestions on ways to outwit the law."

## Shrewd "Ma" Prospers

"Finally the word passed from crook to crook that there was a place in Tulsa where a criminal not only could get protection, but shrewd advice. Ma grew fatter, shrewder—and prospered."

"Criminals from a dozen penitentiaries sought her out. If a criminal needed a new partner for a job Ma Barker could put him in touch with the best man available. Only two things were lacking at Ma's—liquor and women. A man was a fool to drink, she said. Likewise, he was a fool to run around with women; sooner or later they'd put the law on him. Meanwhile, her boys took part in robbery after robbery."

"Ma lived in luxury. To feel money stream through her fingers, to know it could buy whatever she desired, to order extravagantly and at random—all these were great solaces to Ma Barker. In all her life she was not once arrested. She was officially charged with only one crime, in spite of later revelations."

"Her ambition grew, demanding bigger, more lucrative forms of lawlessness. A kidnaping flashed across the front pages of the newspapers and Ma took her cue. Soon afterward the nation learned that Edward G. Bremer, of St. Paul, had been kidnaped, finally to be released on payment of \$200,000 ransom."

"Ma was the hub of the Bremer kidnaping. When the net gradually closed, she fled to Florida, living in a luxuriously furnished, expensively built establishment on the shores of Lake Weir, with her son Fred. The beautiful white house was an arsenal. In it were two machine guns, two shotguns, three automatic pistols, cartons of ammunition, a rifle, and five bullet-proof vests."

"In the darkness of night the special squad surrounded the place. When the inmates refused to surrender, firing started, and eventually Fred and his mother were killed."

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# **Fingerprints of "Public Enemies"**

One of the plans recently evolved in the drive against "public enemies" is the move on the part of the federal bureau of investigation to instruct local police to "hold" all arrested persons whose fingertips are found to be mutilated.

When, some months ago, William E. Mead, who was wanted for questioning in the Bremer case, was arrested on a minor automobile charge in Massachusetts, he was freed on bond before his fingerprints had been checked. Now, in the effort to apprehend Alvin Karpis, known as "Public Enemy No. 1," and other criminals, this more intensive method will be put into effect. Since under this system any questionable character arrested for any cause, trivial or otherwise, whose fingertips were in an abnormal condition would find himself the object of immediate suspicion, it would appear that a practice indulged in by the criminal for defense had been turned to good account by the federal bureau as an initial means of identification.

Local Officers on Alert Due to  
Salt Lake Tip

## SEEN IN GREEN ROADSTER

Had Top Down and Oklahoma License  
Plates, Busted 2000 '36 State;  
One of Worst Gangsters.

Police and sheriff's officers of Lewiston were on the alert last night watching for the possible appearance of Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1, wanted on a federal charge of kidnaping. Officers were notified by Emmitt Priest, state commissioner of law enforcement that the nationally known desperado had inquired the route to Pocatello, when he was identified when going through Salt Lake City on St. Patrick's day.

According to Associated Press reports to the Tribune last night Karpis at that time was reported traveling in



a green roadster with top down. His automobile carried 1936 Oklahoma license plates, according to Pfost. The desperado was reported carrying a sub-machine gun.

**Weyerhaeuser Kidnaping Suspect**  
According to records on file at Lewiston police headquarters Karpis has used the aliases A. Carter, Raymond Hadley, George Haller, Alvin Karpis, Earl Peel, George Dunn, R. E. Hamilton and Ray Hunter. He is suspected of playing a part in the Weyerhaeuser kidnaping at Tacoma as well as other major crimes for which he is being sought by the federal government.

His description, as provided by the department of investigation of the United States department of justice, follows: Age 25; height 5 feet, nine and three-quarters inches; weight, 130 pounds; slender build; brown hair; blue eyes, fair complexion; one-inch scar on the lower knuckle of the left index finger.

**Long Criminal Record**  
As Alvin Karpis he was received at

the state industrial reformatory at Hutchinson, Kas., in 1926 for second degree burglary. He escaped in 1929 and returned in 1930. As Raymond Hadley, he was arrested at Kansas City, Mo., March 23, 1930, for safe blowing and larceny of an auto. He was returned to the industrial reformatory as an escape. As Alvin Karpis, he was received at the state penitentiary at Lansing, Kas., May 19, 1930, on a five-to-ten-year sentence for second degree burglary. As George Haller he was arrested at Tulsa, Okla., June 10, 1931, on a burglary charge and delivered to the police department of Okmulgee, Okla. As A. Karpis he was arrested by police officers at Okmulgee, Okla., June 10, 1931, on a burglary charge and sentenced to state prison for four years.

Karpis is wanted in connection with the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer at St. Paul, January 17, 1934, as well as other similar federal offenses.

Denver, March 27 (AP)—The conviction of Ben L. Laska, elderly Denver attorney, for conspiracy in the \$200,000 kidnapping of Charles F. Urschel, Oklahoma oil millionaire, was upheld today by the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals.

Laska was attorney for Albert L. Bates, who, with George (Machine Gun) Kelly and others, kidnapped Urschel and held him for ransom. He was accused of accepting part of the Urschel ransom from Bates. Laska contended it was a legal fee.

It was the first case of its kind in Federal Court in which the Government attempted to prosecute an attorney who represented a convicted kidnapper or gangster. Laska was sentenced to ten years in prison.

Laska was attorney for Albert L. Bates, who, with George (Machine Gun) Kelly and others, kidnaped Urschel and held him for ransom.

The Denver attorney was accused of accepting part of the Urschel ransom from Bates. Laska contended it was a legal fee.

It was the first case of its kind in Federal court in which the government attempted to prosecute an attorney who represented a convicted kidnaper or gangster.

### ONE CHANCE LEFT

Laska's only chance of avoiding his Federal prison sentence of ten years now lies in an appeal to the United States Supreme Court.

### Three Herded into Plane

Chief Deputy Sheriff Roy Emery said he believed the agents had captured two or three persons in the house, which he said, took fire after the tear gas attack. The flames were extinguished.

It was learned that the raiding party carried machine guns, bullet proof vests, tear and flare gas and gas masks.

### Rented by Companion

The house was reported to have been rented about a month ago to Harold Hunter, reputed companion of Karpis. A negro maid who worked for "Hunter" identified a picture shown her as being that of Hunter.

Karpis is sought in connection with the \$200,000 ransom kidnaping of Edward Bremer, St. Paul banker, two years ago. He eluded pursuit last October after being traced to a resort cabin at Lake Hamilton, a few miles away from the raided farmhouse.

15 Men Take Charge of

### G-Men Guard House.

Nettie McCoy, a negro woman, was reported to have identified a picture of Harold (Red) Johnson, reported to be a Karpis lieutenant, as the man who rented the house about a month ago.

She told officers that the man and a woman, in a red car with a California license, rented the house. Later they were joined by another man and woman. The McCoy woman said she left the house after it was rented.

Federal officers late today still refused to permit reporters to enter the house. Some eight or 10 officers remained there, some outside and some inside the house.

Hot Springs (AP)—Seeking someone described only as "a big shot," department of justice agents today surrounded and rushed a comfortable farm house near here with tear gas bombs, afterwards claiming the raid had not resulted in a capture.

A report persisted however, that a capture had been made of a man and two women who were quickly taken out of the neighborhood in a fast car.

Apparently inspired by a previous federal investigation of last October in which the notorious Alvin Karpis was reported to have been traced to a lodge on nearby Lake Hamilton, reports seeped through Hot Springs today that Karpis was the man sought, but the federal officers declined all information about identity of the object of their search.

"He's a big shot but I can't tell you who," one of the raiding party said after the house had been occupied.

## G-Men Believed to Be on Karpis Trail

G-Men, who raided a house on Lake Hamilton early today, were believed to be on the trail of Alvin Karpis, Public Enemy No. 1.

### Farmhouse Pretensions.

The residence, of five rooms and a sleeping porch, more pretentious than the average farm house, stands in the peak of a hill, commanding a clear view of approaches in all directions. Local officers said they learned it was rented a month ago to two men and two women, whose identities remained unknown to their neighbors.

The owner of the house was described as a former Hot Springs resident, now living in New Orleans.

The raiding party said this afternoon that the beds had not been slept in last night but that there was evidence that the place had recently been lived in.

The house on the Malvern road, is adjacent to Lake Catherine, a popular fishing and boating center. The agents insisted the house was found to be empty when they occupied it.

Against this announcement, however, was the report to the sheriff's office in Hot Springs by a man who claimed to have been passing the house at the time of the attack that he had seen a man and two women taken from the house. He said they were rushed away in a fast car.

The agents gave no hint of the identities of the person or persons sought.

The raid occurred within a few miles of the Lake Hamilton resort cabin south of Hot Springs where federal men were reported last October to have traced the notorious Alvin Karpis, wanted for the Bremer kidnapping.

Edward G. Bremer kidnapping in St. Paul in 1934. On that occasion the man believed to be Karpis appeared before officers arriving Agents Surround House.

Moving with secrecy and precision, the agents, who gathered nearby Little Rock last night, closed in on the farmhouse this morning and temporarily took charge of the area. Neighboring farmers who attempted to go up to the house when they were made curious by the sudden appearance of so many strangers reported they were turned back and advised to stay clear of the farm.

After the agents had occupied the house, this regulation was relaxed.

It was learned that about 15 agents took part in the move on the house, into which three tear gas bombs were thrown.

According to the story given out later by members of the raiding party, the explosion of the bombs brought no response from within. One of the bombs, however, landed on a bed and set it on fire.

The bed was thrown from a window and the fire beaten out.

### Bombs Shatter Windows.

Explosion of the bombs shattered many windows in the house, a rather pretentious country home and considerably larger than the average farmhouse in the area.

In response to inquiries, the federal men who remained on guard at the place said "We did not get who we were after."

At least five cars roared away from the house and toward unknown destinations before outsiders reached the house proper.

Agents' cars parked on the nearby highway during the raid showed license plates from Arkansas, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas.

Yesterday, while the federal men were gathering in Little Rock, a chartered plane from Cleveland brought in five men reported as Cleveland justice agents, who joined the party at the state headquarters for the department of investigation.

Some neighbors of the raided farmhouse reported hearing shots fired while the officers maneuvered up to the building, but the agents denied any shots had been fired, asserting the tear gas bombs had made a considerable noise.

Local officers said they learned the house, owned by a Hot Springs man now living elsewhere, had been rented about a month ago to two men and two women whose names they did not know.

Report of the surrounding of the house followed a conference of Department of Justice agents in Little Rock, 50 miles north of here, lasting most of the night. The agents' conference broke up early today without announcement of its purpose.

### Officer Blames Publicity.

One federal officer, while refusing to affirm or deny specific questions as to the capture or escape of occupants of the house, lent credence to reports the inmates had fled by declaring publicity given presence here yesterday of federal officers had "spoiled our plans" and "spoiled a good story."

It was intimated the officers believed the fugitives they sought had been tipped through the publicity and had fled. On the other hand, point blank refusal of the officers to say whether their quarry had escaped, was taken by some to indicate the fugitives had been captured, but that the federal officers wanted to keep the capture secret for the time being.

# KARPIS SEIZED BY G-MEN ON FARM, REPORT

Hot Springs, Ark., March 30.—(UP) — Department of justice agents, moving swiftly and secretly, were believed to have captured Alvin Karpis and another man and woman in a gas raid on a farm house near here today.

The agents, number "12 to 15," bluntly refused to comment on the raid. They acted alone and city and county officials were without definite knowledge of their movements.

Belief that Karpis or some other desperado was captured in the raid was strengthened when airport officials revealed that two men and a woman, herded by G-men, boarded a plane a short time after the raid was completed.

Beyond that brief statement, airport officials were mum, apparently.

Dutch Ackers, chief of the Hot Springs detectives, told the United Press he had been directing a search for Karpis for two weeks, on a tip he was "cooling off" in and around this city.
