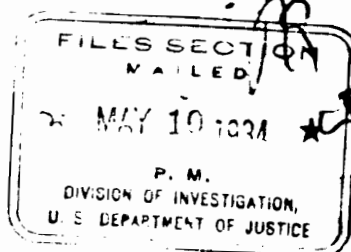

Hagerstown, Maryland, and has lived in Toledo, Ohio, for the past fifteen years. For the past three years he has been engaged in running alcohol from Hammond, Indiana, where he obtained his supply from a man known only as "Frank," described as:

Age - 40
Height - 5 feet 7 inches
Weight - 160 pounds
Dark hair
Dark eyes,

and whose "shop" is located at either 200 or 201 South State Street of that city; that about one year ago while at "Frank's" place he met a man who became known to him only as "Willie" described as:

Age - 28
Height - 5 feet 5 inches
Weight - 160 pounds
Build - heavy
Light hair
Probably brown eyes;

that he and "Willie" became pretty good friends; that about the first of September 1933 Willie asked him if he would purchase a Ford car for him at Toledo without a lot of questions being asked, and was informed that he would, having in mind the Lyman D. Arnold Incorporated, Toledo, Ford Agency, with whom he had previously done business; that about the last of September 1933 Willie came to his apartment and informed him, Woods, that he was ready to buy the Ford; that he then went with Willie to Lyman D. Arnold Incorporated where Willie remained in the background while he, Woods, went in and talked to Mr. Arnold personally and it was agreed that Arnold was to pay him \$40 commission on the sale; that Willie then came in and made the purchase of the car in question, paying for the same in cash with bills of very small denomination, to the best of Woods' recollection at this time; that at that time Willie used the name of "T. C. Blackburn," that he understood Willie was also running alcohol and he knew well that Willie wanted the car covered up so he told Willie to give his address as 4214 North Lockwood, Toledo, Ohio, which he knew was a vacant lot; that Willie then took the newly purchased car and departed and was seen no further until about three months ago when Willie returned to Toledo, Ohio, for a few minutes and stopped by to say hello.

When shown a group photograph of the Karpis gang, Woods was very definite in this statement that none of those individuals were identical with the party known to him as Willie alias T. C. Blackburn, and further that he had never seen any of them; that he does not know where

Willie is at the present time but feels that Frank previously referred to herein can inform of that individual's whereabouts. Woods agreed that when he was next in Hammond he would endeavor to learn more about Willie and where he might be located. Woods seemed very much disturbed over his situation, [REDACTED]

As a matter of record the following description was obtained of Woods from personal observation:

In view of the information contained in letters of reference, investigative activities concerning the identity of Charles J. Fitzgerald with aliases is being incorporated herein, and extra copies of this report are forwarded to the Kansas City, St. Paul and Chicago Offices for incorporation in their files entitled VERNON C. MILLER, with aliases, (Deceased), et al., Conspiracy to Deliver Federal Prisoner.

Superintendent John Louy, Bureau of Identification, Police Department, Toledo, Ohio, was interviewed and he informed after a check of his file of the following criminal record of Charles J. Fitzgerald, aliases:

1/30/19, as Charles Jordan, alias "Big Fitz", alias CHARLES Fitzgerald, #11006, arrested Detroit, Michigan, with John Russell alias Morgan, #11004, charge investigation - fugitive, safe blower; disposition released.

4/22/19, arrested PD, Toledo, Ohio, charge fugitive; disposition, ordered extradited to Ellsworth, Kansas, for safe blowing.

Inasmuch as Division letter of reference has forwarded a copy of the criminal record of this individual to the Kansas City Office, no disposition sheet is being submitted by the Detroit Division Office as it is presumed that the Kansas City Office may have received the above quoted criminal record prior hereto.

Superintendent Louy further informed that the arrest at Toledo, Ohio, on 4/22/19 was made by Detective E. J. Eaton of the Toledo Police Department. Detective Eaton was interviewed and he informed that he recalls his arrest of Charles J. Fitzgerald at 555 Spencer Street, that city, on a charge of being a fugitive from Kansas, which resulted in the removal of Fitzgerald to Ellsworth, Kansas, where he was subsequently tried on safe blowing and robbery charges; that it is his present recollection that Fitzgerald was then a new comer to Toledo and had no friends or connections in that city. Detective Eaton was unable to advise of any possible source of information concerning Charles J. Fitzgerald in Toledo at the present time. However, inquiries of Detective Emmet Cairl, Toledo Police Department, resulted in information that it was possible that one Joe Remue, presently employed by the Page Dairy Company, might be able to furnish information concerning Fitzgerald.

A check of the latest editions of the Toledo telephone and city directories for present addresses of those individuals with whom Fitzgerald communicated while confined in the Kansas State Penitentiary was without result. Further efforts were made to obtain addresses through the Toledo and Rossford, Ohio, postal officials, but with similar results. However one Mrs. Minnie Fitzgerald was listed as residing at 1731 Mansfield Street, Toledo, Ohio. She was interviewed and it was very apparent that she was not the Mrs. Minnie Fitzgerald in interest and could furnish no information of value.

Joe Remue, 1747 Spencer Street, employed by Page Dairy Company, Toledo, Ohio, was interviewed and he informed that he remembers Charles J. Fitzgerald whom he met at a beer parlor of one Fred Goletta, whose present address is 908 Monroe Street, Toledo, Ohio, where that individual operates a small restaurant and beer shop; that he met Fitzgerald in the early part of 1919, to the best of his present recollection, and that they drank beer quite frequently together at Goletta's place and became fairly well acquainted; that however he learned nothing of the past character and

reputation of Fitzgerald until that individual's arrest and removal to the state of Kansas on bank robbery and safe blowing charges; that since that time he has not seen or heard of Charles J. Fitzgerald, and was unable to furnish any information which was indicative of his present whereabouts.

In checking over the list of Fitzgerald's correspondents while Fitzgerald was confined in the Kansas State Penitentiary, Mr. Remue informed that Fitzgerald was not married and that the woman living with him at Toledo, Ohio, at 555 Spencer Street at the time of his arrest was a common law wife whose first name was thought to be Minnie; that this Minnie Fitzgerald had a sister by the name of Minnie Leivigh and a halfsister by the name of Minnie Frantachi, and that he has heard nothing concerning any of them for ten or twelve years. Mr. Remue further informed that the person listed as the correspondent by the name of Fred Coletta was no doubt Fred Coletta who is presently residing at 908 Monroe Street, and is himself a close mouthed and suspicious sort of individual, and when approached by strangers would give no information; that it would be his guess that he is possibly the only one in Toledo who might know anything recently of Charles J. Fitzgerald, and that he would within the next day or so go to Coletta's restaurant and there drink beer with Coletta, during the course of which he would endeavor to obtain recent information concerning Charles J. Fitzgerald. Mr. Remue was furnished with a self-addressed envelope marked for the attention of a Detroit file and stated he would forward any information of value he might obtain immediately.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS: The Detroit Office at TOLEDO, OHIO, in the very near future will interview Joe Remue, 1747 Spencer Street, an employe of the Page Dairy Company, for such information as he may have been able to obtain from Fred Coletta of 908 Monroe Street.

The Chicago Office at HAMMOND, INDIANA, will endeavor to establish the identity of "Frank", alcohol operator reported to be operating from 200 or 201 South State Street, for information concerning the identity of "Willie" mentioned in the body of the instant report and specifically under the interview of Elwood S. Yonkers alias C. W. Woods.

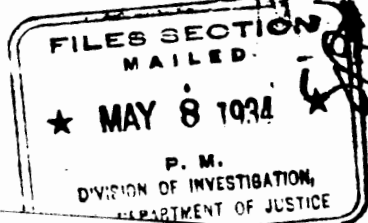

Reference is made to the report of Special Agent M. W. Heckins, dated Detroit, Michigan, May 3, 1934 reflecting the results of an investigation at Toledo, Ohio with respect to the purchase of a Ford V-8 Sedan by an individual who gave his name as T. C. Blackburn. Investigation by the Salt Lake City Office indicates that this is an alias used by a member of the Barker-Karpis gang and in view of the reputation of this gang, it will not be possible to obtain information concerning its activities from any of the contacts which it may have in various localities.

It is apparent that G. W. Woods, 4211 North Lockwood Street, Toledo, Ohio is a contact for members of this gang and, therefore, will refuse to give any information concerning its activities or identify photographs which may be exhibited to him. Woods, no doubt, will tip off this gang relative to the activities of agents of the Division. Therefore, it is suggested that an investigation be made of the activities of Woods to determine the identity of his associates and it is believed that a check of long distance telephone calls made by him will produce information of value.



The Division has been unable to locate a record of Woods, whose true name appears to be Elwood B. Yonkers, and in the description set forth on Page 3 of the report of reference, it is noted that this individual is known to Detective George Stevenson of the Automobile Detail, Police Department, Toledo, Ohio. An effort should be made to determine whether Yonkers has a criminal record; therefore, you are instructed to have an agent interview Detective Stevenson for the purpose of ascertaining whether Yonkers has an arrest number which will assist the Division in locating a criminal record of this individual.

In view of the statements made by Subject John J. McLaughlin, who was recently arrested in Chicago in connection with the passing of the Bremer ransom money, that the individuals with whom he was dealing were from Toledo, Ohio, and further in view of the fact that two cars known to be in the possession of members of the Barker-Karpis gang were purchased at Toledo, Ohio, the Division feels that a very thorough investigation should be made there for the purpose of determining where these individuals resided and what contacts they have made there in the past.

Reference is made to telegram from the Kansas City Office,
dated April 20, 1934, requesting the registration of 1933 California
license #6-C-189, and disposition made of plates by registrant.

It was ascertained through the California State Division of
Motor Vehicles, San Francisco, Calif., that 1933 California license
#6-C-189 was issued to one Frank Krizo, of Tule Lake, Calif., on a
1929 Ford Tudor Sedan, motor #A517525.

It was ascertained from Mrs. M. Martin, of the National Auto-
mobile Theft Bureau, San Francisco, that the car was registered to
Krizo as sole owner and the car has 1934 California license 4-C-3566;
that there is no report in the records of the California State Division
of Motor Vehicles of the loss or theft of 1933 license plates #6-C-189
and that Frank Krizo has two other cars registered to him, viz: 1933
Ford truck, motor #B35233935, 1934 license A5608, the Pacific Finance
Corporation of Portland, Oregon, being the legal owner; and a 1930
Chevrolet truck, motor #4407801, 1933 license 6-C-188, with no 1934
license issued. It was also ascertained that Frank Krizo has no
operator's license but that an operator's license was issued to his son,
one Frank Krizo, Jr., of Malin, Oregon, #233007, on Feb. 28, 1933, and

upon which operator's license the description of Frank Krize, Jr., is, age 19, height 5-11, weight 171, brown eyes, sandy hair, and upon which there is a notation that the application is signed by his father, Frank Krize.

Tule Lake, Calif., being in the northernmost portion of the territory of this Office, and in one of the wildest and most inaccessible regions of California, it was deemed advisable to contact Krize telephonically, but it was ascertained that Krize lives on a ranch some four miles from Tule Lake, Calif., is a Bohemian, and cannot speak English. Krize was sent for and a Mr. Chester Hazalino, who has a telephone station at Tule Lake and operates a camp, offered to interpret for him. This was done and Krize reported at this time, through the interpreter, that the 1933 plates on his car, namely 6-C-189, were, he thought, still in his possession and he had nailed them to the doors of his barn at the farm above noted.

Mr. Hazalino promised to check this matter and ascertain if the plates were actually there and he reported on the following day, telephonically, that he had been to the ranch of Frank Krize and had there personally seen both 1933 California license plates, 6-C-189, nailed to the door of the barn on the Krize ranch. Mr. Hazalino advised that Krize's son, Frank, was at the ranch at the time that he made his inspection.

Later telephonic contact with W. T. McCaymond, the assistant postmaster at Tule Lake, Calif., developed that Mr. Hazalino is the operator of an auto camp in Tule Lake and is well regarded in that community; that Krize is a farmer and as far as he knew had a good reputation in the community.

The substance of the above noted information was wired to you on April 21, 1934 with the notation that an Agent would be sent to personally verify the possession of these license plates, if desired. In view of telegram received from your Office on the same date, acknowledging receipt of this wire, no further investigation is being conducted in connection with this matter at this time.

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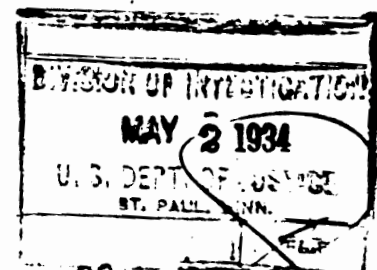
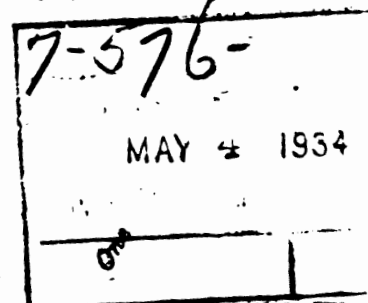

Since Barton is located in the territory covered by the Chicago Office, this information is transmitted in connection with the investigation conducted in your territory relative to the BREMER hideout.



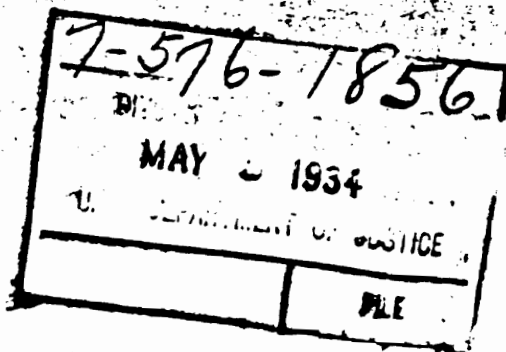
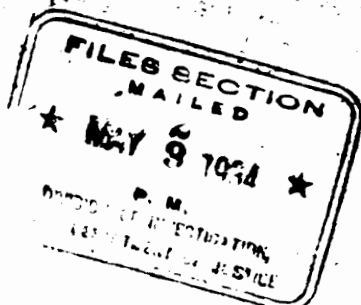
I telephoned Mr. Purvis at Chicago and advised him that I had received inquiries from the press as to whether any indictments in the Bremer case are being returned at Chicago. Mr. Purvis stated that none are being returned.

Mr. Purvis mentioned incidentally that three men had just been brought into the office who were picked up by Agents in the apartment on Marshfield Avenue, where they were looking for Slim and Izzie. He didn't believe any of these individuals were Slim or Izzie, but felt that they would be able to furnish information as to their whereabouts.

I telephoned Mr. Clegg at St. Paul to inquire about indictments in the Bremer case. United States Attorney Sullivan was in Mr. Clegg's office at the time, and stated that indictments had already been returned against Barker, Karpis, the four persons held in Chicago, Slim, Izzie, Frankie Wright, John Doe and Richard Roe. The latter two names are for the persons who actually participated in the kidnaping in addition to Barker and Karpis. These indictments were returned secretly, the report being made to the Court in confidence. Mr. Sullivan suggested that we wait until the certified copies reach Chicago before making announcement. I told Mr. Clegg I would refer inquiries to United States Attorney Sullivan. It is expected that the copies will reach Chicago by tomorrow morning.

AT NEW ORLEANS, LOUISIANA.

DETAILS:

On April 25, 1934, agent interviewed Superintendent of Police George Hoyer, who stated that on May 1, 1928, one hour after her arrival in New Orleans, Louisiana, he arrested Paula Harmon, known to him as Marie Mayer, alias Marie Rainey; that he arrested her on suspicion at 144 So. Rampart Street as a result of advance information that she was coming to New Orleans to visit one, Tom Rainey, of Chicago, who was in New Orleans to rob a bank; that Stephen Beck, of Detroit, Michigan, Jack Smith, Stacey E. Hart, and Tom Rainey were bank robbers who robbed the Canal Bank & Trust Company at Market and Bocheblave Streets shortly thereafter, at which time Rainey escaped; that Louise Magness was a woman

connected with them; that both Rainey and Paula Harmon were then out on parole from either Iowa or the Dakotas for participating in a robbery of the American Express Company and U. S. Post Office at Council Bluffs, Iowa; that he, Meyer, believes Rainey and Paula Harmon were then legally married and still together in all criminal activities; that Stephen Beck was in the Louisiana State Penitentiary at Angola, Louisiana, a short time ago; that Jack Smith was killed in a hotel robbery at Oklahoma City in May 1933; that Paula Harmon, upon arrival at New Orleans in 1933, registered at the Roosevelt Hotel, then went immediately to meet Tom Rainey at a house of ill fame at 144 So. Rampart Street, run by one Louise Jackson, who now has a house of ill fame at 931 St. Louis Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, who will give what information she has.

Superintendent Meyer states that the photograph exhibited to him by agent is a very good likeness of Paula Harmon as she appeared in 1928; that she then wore very attractive clothes; that he believes Paula Harmon and Rainey are still working together; that since 1928 he is sure that neither Rainey nor Paula Harmon have been in New Orleans.

Louise Jackson, who runs a brothel at 931 St. Louis Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, appeared cooperative and stated she never saw Paula Harmon, alias Marie Mayer, but that she does remember a baby-faced, mild mannered boy friend of Marie reported to be a big time bank robber; that she remembers no arrest of Marie Mayer at her house but remembers reading of it in the paper; that one, Dorothy, was a friend of Marie Mayer and had lived near an apartment occupied by Marie Mayer in Chicago; that "Dorothy" married, then divorced, one, Steve Gilbert, whose address is unknown; that Dorothy played the piano at night clubs with one "Red" whose other name is unknown to her; that she, Louise Jackson, will contact "Red" and secure Dorothy's full name and address in order that Dorothy may be interviewed as to the whereabouts of Marie Mayer, alias Paula Harmon.

On May 1, 1934, agent interviewed Mr. Jos. H. Pullen, Secretary, Louisiana State Board of Parole, Capital Building, Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Mr. Pullen states that Stephen Beck was incarcerated at the Louisiana State Penitentiary at Angola, Louisiana, on 7/31/33 for assault and robbery at New Orleans, Louisiana, has been paroled, and is now ill and in bed with Tuberculosis at the Veterans Hospital at Detroit, Michigan, and probably will never recover; that he is a Hungarian, a very hard criminal, and probably will not talk much; that he, Pullen, believes the best avenue of approach to Beck is through his sister, Mrs. John B. Vida, Manager of Beck's mother's restaurant at 7845 West Jefferson Avenue, Detroit, Michigan, and who lives at 8111 Thaddeus Avenue, Detroit, Michigan; that Mrs. Vida appears to be an intelligent and rather fine woman. Beck's mother is Mrs. Mary Beck, who owns the above mentioned restaurant, and who lives with Mrs. John B. Vida.

Special Agent James O. Peyronnia, of the New Orleans Office, conducted the following investigation:

On May 5, 1934, agent interviewed Louise Jackson, 931 St. Louis Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, referred to above, and she stated that the girl named "Dorothy" was a sporting girl; that about the year 1928 she married a dance hall master of ceremonies named Steve; that Dorothy divorced Steve and remarried; that she does not know anything about Dorothy's supposed second husband. She stated that the last time she saw Dorothy was about three and one-half years ago; that if she remembers correctly at this time Dorothy either returned to Chicago or to her home at some unknown town in Michigan. Louise Jackson stated that she positively cannot recall the girl named Marie Mayer having been arrested in her house; that as a matter of fact, to her knowledge, Marie Mayer was never in her house, which was a place of ill fame and then located at 144 So. Rampart Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, during the year 1928 and several years subsequent thereto. She stated that if her memory serves her well at this time, the individual whose photograph was exhibited to her by Agent Kopp and Agent Peyronnia, which photograph is that of Stephen Beck, secured by Special Agent Kopp, was in her house at 144 So. Rampart Street about the year of 1928; that on that particular visit this man had a conversation with Dorothy, and that he mentioned to Dorothy about a girl named "Marie" coming from Chicago. Louise Jackson stated that from the conversation she gained the impression that Dorothy was somewhat well acquainted with Marie. Louise Jackson stated that she would not, however, positively say that the photograph of Stephen Beck shown to her is that of the individual who visited her premises on or about the year of 1928 as she related above.

Louise Jackson stated further that all efforts on her part to find out the family name of Dorothy and her whereabouts have been unsuccessful. She stated that in her opinion Dorothy has discontinued leading an immoral life and may have followed legitimate theatrical work, or may have married and settled down.

For the information of the Detroit Office, the Division, in reference letter, requests that the photograph of Paula Harmon, alias Marie Mayer, should be exhibited to persons acquainted with her, and that in the event it is identified as a good likeness of her, copies will be made and distributed to all field offices.

UNDEVELOPED LEADS:

THE DETROIT OFFICE: At Detroit, Michigan, will contact Stephen Beck at the Veteran's Hospital, where Beck is confined with tuberculosis, in an effort to locate and interview Paula Harmon or Sam Rainey, who probably knows where she is.

Attached to copies of this report for the Detroit Office are one photograph each of Marie Mayer, #11622, PD, New Orleans, Louisiana, and of Stephen Beck, #11642, PD, New Orleans, Louisiana.

On the night of May 2, 1934, Captain Harry Gregson, in company with Detective Dan Healy, Police Department, New Orleans, Louisiana, called at the New Orleans Division Office and advised Clerk T. P. Monahan that Dr. S. B. McNair, with offices at 717 Audubon Building, New Orleans, Louisiana, positively identified the photograph of one, WILLIAM KILMER "CHRISTIAN KID" MEAD, ex-convict, which photograph appeared in the Times-Picayune of May 3, 1934, as that of an individual named L. F. Schrader who resided at 1002 Jackson Avenue. Captain Gregson informed Mr. Monahan that he interviewed Mrs. F. B. Hymel, at 1002 Jackson Avenue, who also identified the photograph in the Times Picayune of Mead as that of Schrader; that Schrader left New Orleans on April 1, 1934, giving his forwarding address to Mrs. Hymel as 916 H. Street, N.W., Washington, D. C.; that while in New Orleans Schrader had a green Dodge Roadster; that while residing at her apartment house he had written to Washington and obtained license plates for his car.


On May 3, 1934, agent interviewed Dr. S. B. McNair at his office, 717 Audubon Building, New Orleans, Louisiana, and he stated that on reading the Times Picayune of May 3, 1934, he observed the photograph of Mead, and as same appeared to him to be a photograph of one L. F. SCHRADER, treated by him on January 18, 1934, for chronic sinus trouble, he immediately reported the matter to Captain Harry Gregson. Dr. McNair stated that his records show that Schrader first came to his office on January 17, 1934, for treatment, but that on account of being out of town his office nurse, Mrs. Anna Dixon, arranged for Schrader to return to his office on January 18, 1934, for medical attention. Dr. McNair stated that Mrs. F. B. Hymel, of 1002 Jackson Avenue, a patient of his, referred Schrader to him for treatment. Dr. McNair stated that Schrader paid him cash for each treatment, and that he does not recall any conversation of interest with Schrader.

On interviewing Mrs. F. B. Hymel, manager of a furnished apartment house at 1002 Jackson Avenue, she stated that L. F. Schrader, about sixty years of age, engaged an apartment at her place on December 8, 1933; that he lived continuously in this furnished apartment until the morning of April 1, 1934, when he left for Washington, D. C., having made previous arrangements to leave the city. She stated that Mr. Schrader gave her the forwarding address of 916 H. Street, N.W., Washington, D. C.; that in conversation with him from time to time he stated that he came to New Orleans on account of the climate, for treatment of sinus trouble, and that she referred him to Dr. McNair; that Schrader told her he had been connected with an accounting firm in Washington for about thirty-five years but had retired. She

stated that on one occasion he exhibited to her his pocketbook in which he had two One Hundred Dollar bills and other currency, as well as checks; that on one occasion he endeavored to have her cash a check, which appeared to her to be an interest check on securities.

On exhibiting to Mrs. F. B. Hymel the photograph of MEAD, as appearing in the Times Picayune of May 3, 1934, she stated that same resembled Mr. Schrader very closely, but that she would not say this photograph was that of Mr. Schrader, who had an apartment at her place. She stated that Mr. Schrader did not impress her as being an individual of criminal tendencies.

On the morning of May 4, 1934, Mr. F. K. Butterfield, of the Western Union Telegraph Company, Chicago, communicated by telephone with Special Agent V. W. Peterson of this office, at which time he read a copy of a night letter which was filed with the Western Union Telegraph Company on May 3, 1934. The said telegram is quoted below:

Chief in Charge, Dept of Justice
Federal Government, Washington, D.C.

"Encouraged by the immortal words of Lincoln justice for all malice for none I appeal to our great Government in Washington to issue orders that the press be permitted to interview my husband so that they can hear for themselves whether the alleged confession reported to have been made by him from Mr. Purvis office was really made or not made. The press representatives have been denied this interview by orders of the Chicago Federal offices. I am unable to make bond which makes him helpless to speak for himself. This most just request having been denied from Mr. Purvis office I am appealing to you". - Signed: "Mrs. McLaughlin".

For your information in connection with the above telegram, Mr. Butterfield advises that four copies of same were charged against the telephone of Mrs. McLaughlin. Through the investigative efforts of Mr. Butterfield it was determined that one copy of said telegram was sent to each of the four newspapers in Chicago, namely, the Chicago Tribune, Daily News, Herald and Examiner, and the Times. Mr. Butterfield expressed the opinion that the telegram was sent as a result of the activity of the newspapers.

In accordance with your instructions contained in teletype message of April 30, 1934, there is transmitted herewith detailed statement concerning difficulty experienced at the offices of the United States Attorney and United States Marshal in connection with the apprehension and detention of John McLaughlin and accomplice in the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer of St. Paul.

On the night of April 26-27, 1934, information was secured from William Vidler implicating McLaughlin in the handling of the ransom money in this case. McLaughlin was reported to be an old time political boss in Chicago, to have been a former State Legislator, to have been indicted more or less recently in a Postal matter and to have considerable underworld connections. It should be understood that the Chicago Division office was seeking primarily Bremer ransom bills in this case. It should be further understood that a search of McLaughlin's house was of primary importance for the purpose of finding bills in this case as well as other pertinent data. It was known that any ransom bills or other evidence which might be found in McLaughlin's house and recovered without a warrant could not be used as evidence. The Press had already carried the story that Vidler was in our custody. Vidler had told us that he had obtained the money from McLaughlin. The urgency of the matter is, therefore, apparent.

In order to secure a warrant of arrest which, upon service, would permit a legal search of the premises of McLaughlin, the United States Attorney was contacted early on the morning of April 27, 1934. Assistant United States Attorney L. J. Hassenauer discussed this matter with me and requested a copy of the indictment which had been filed in the Urschel matter, which he could use as a guide. In the meantime, in order to hold McLaughlin while any legal delay might ensue, agents of the Chicago Division office proceeded to the residence of McLaughlin, secured entry thereto, and after waiting a short time, found McLaughlin and an associate, one Phillip Delaney, and suggested to McLaughlin and said associate that they remain with four agents of this Division in the apartment until a warrant arrived. The four agents remained with McLaughlin, Delaney and members of McLaughlin's family for the entire day while this warrant was being issued.

Assistant Director H. Nathan and Special Agent J. J. Waters returned to the office immediately after making these arrangements and expressed a desire for the immediate issuance of some kind of warrant in order to meet this situation. Mr. Waters then went to the United States Attorney's office at 11:00 O'clock and met Assistant United States Attorney Hassenauer, who had just returned from a conference with me. He repeated his request for a copy of the complaint or indictment which had been filed in the Urschel matter. Mr. Waters called me and was informed that St. Paul had been requested to furnish the above as soon as possible. I had requested the St. Paul office to furnish the Chicago office with a copy of the wording of the Urschel indictment and the wording of the complaint to be issued in St. Paul at the earliest possible moment. I first communicated with St. Paul about 11:15 and in view of the fact that Mr. Clegg was before the Grand Jury, there was a little delay in reaching him, but I am certain that this message was conveyed to the St. Paul authorities not later than noon.

Mr. Hassenauer then proceeded to draw up a complaint, and upon completion of the dictation, stated he would meet Special Agents Waters and Brown of the Chicago office at 2:00 o'clock, when the matter would be discussed with United States Attorney Green.

Shortly after 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, when the complaint which had been drawn up by Mr. Hassenauer was submitted to Mr. Green, the latter disapproved it, because he felt there was not sufficient evidence to substantiate the allegations therein. This was about 3:00 P. M. I requested Mr. Green to get some kind of a warrant inasmuch as I did not know how long McLaughlin and his associate could be held in McLaughlin's apartment without a warrant.

In the meantime I telephoned the St. Paul office of the Division and there was read over the telephone the wording of the indictment in the Urschel kidnaping case. A stenographer was then sent to the United States Attorney's office to read this wording to them there. In the meantime, United States Attorney Green, in the presence of agents Brown and Waters, had put in a long distance telephone call for the United States Attorney at St. Paul, but he was unable to contact him. I then spoke to Mr. Green and told him of the urgency of the matter and he stated that a warrant would probably be issued in about thirty minutes, and he inquired as to whether we could wait that long. I said that after a delay of some hours, I did not suppose that thirty minutes more would matter. Mr. Green apparently resented my remark and stated that he felt that was uncalled for. I, of course, made no reply thereto.

In the meantime a complaint and warrant had been filed at St. Paul, copy of which was received at the Chicago office by teletype at approximately 4:00 P. M. This was immediately transmitted to the United States Attorney's office. A complaint was thereupon drawn up, taken to the Commissioner and a warrant was issued by him at 5:45 P. M. It was, of course, immediately served.

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In regard to the difficulty experienced at the office of the United States Marshal, the subject of this case, John McLaughlin, was brought in to the Chicago Division office in custody of United States Deputy Marshal Cusick and agents of this Division at about 6:30 P. M. Representatives of the Division proceeded to question McLaughlin. At about 8:00 P. M. Deputy Marshal Cusick stated he had conferred with Chief Deputy Marshal King, who had discussed the matter of detaining McLaughlin at the office of the Division of Investigation with United States Marshal Laubheimer. This matter previously had been discussed with United States Attorney Green, who had made arrangements that McLaughlin should be brought to the office of the Division in Chicago rather than to the County Jail to enable the agents to question him. It is a practical impossibility to question defendants satisfactorily in the County Jail, and there is the additional objection that it may have been impossible at the time McLaughlin was taken into custody, in view of the night closing regulations. Cusick, however, informed me that inasmuch as McLaughlin was the prisoner of the United States Marshal, he would have to bring him to the County Jail for detention that night, indicating that this need not be done immediately, but that there would have to be a definite termination to the duration of questioning of McLaughlin by agents of this Division. I then requested him for sufficient time to get in touch with my superiors in Washington. Mr. Cusick then said he wanted to discuss the matter with Chief Deputy Marshal King. He did so, using the telephone in my office. I talked to Mr. King. King told me again emphatically that this prisoner was in the custody of the Marshal's office and that he would have to be taken to the County Jail. He indicated again that this need not be done immediately, but that a Deputy Marshal could not remain indefinitely at this Division office. I told him that I realized this was the Marshal's prisoner and if this Deputy or any other deputy desired to remain at the Division office, I would be glad to have them do so; that, however, I wanted no action taken in the matter of bringing this prisoner to the County Jail until I had time to take the matter up with the Director, who I thought would communicate with the Attorney General in the matter of issuing such orders as were absolutely necessary in order to permit McLaughlin to be properly questioned during the night.

After talking with you, a telephone call was received from Mr. Stewart of the Department, who requested that United States Marshal Laubheimer call him as soon as possible. Shortly thereafter Deputy Marshal Cusick was instructed by his local superiors to remain with McLaughlin at the office of the Division of Investigation and to permit the agents to question McLaughlin until they had obtained the information which they knew he possessed. McLaughlin was questioned accordingly and was arraigned before United States Commissioner Walker on Saturday morning, April 28, 1934.

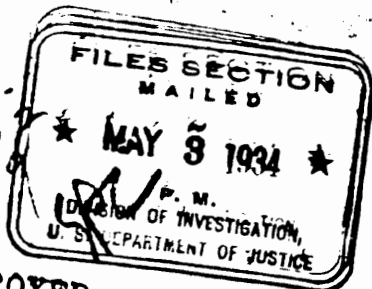
MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL.

Further reference is made to my memorandum dated April 30, 1934, wherein you were advised of the arrest at Chicago, Illinois of John J. McLaughlin and three others in connection with the Bremer kidnaping case.

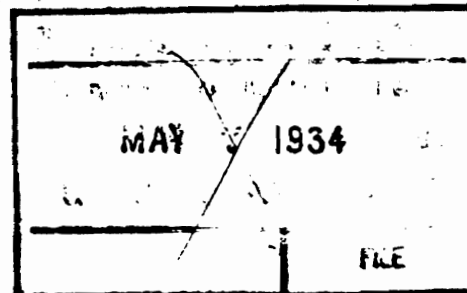
In connection with the arrest of John J. McLaughlin, there appears to have been considerable delay in obtaining the warrants of arrest, which might have resulted in seriously hampering the investigation of this case. There is quoted herein a letter dated May 1, 1934 addressed to me by Mr. M. H. Purvis, Special Agent in Charge of the Chicago Office of this Division setting forth the details relative to the obtaining of the warrant. You may desire to take this matter up with the United States Attorney at Chicago, Illinois for the purpose of facilitating the obtaining of warrants in cases where a delay might result in seriously handicapping the investigation.

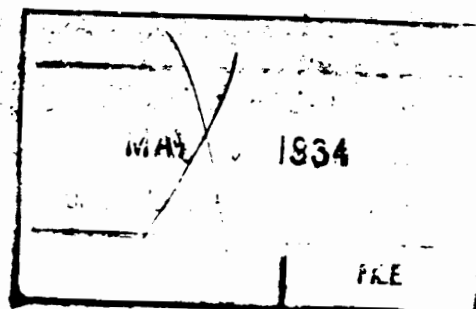
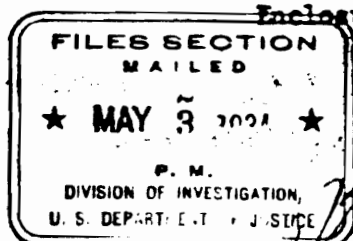

With this matter, I wanted to advise you of a
development at Chicago which has been characteristic of some of
the past developments incident to cases upon which we have worked.
In some manner, possibly through employees of the bank which advised
us of the efforts of Videler to exchange the bills which he had for
larger bills, the newspapers learned that there was some investiga-
tive activity. They made inquiry of Mr. Purvis, the Agent in Charge
of this Division at Chicago, and in accordance with the instructions
which have always governed in these matters, Mr. Purvis stated at the
time he could not make any comment. At that particular time Agents of
our Division were endeavoring to locate McLaughlin, and to have made any
public statement concerning the matter would possibly have resulted in
failure to locate McLaughlin. Some of the representatives of the press
at Chicago became highly indignant because Mr. Purvis would not give
them all the details concerning the matter and I understand that one
of these representatives called Washington and talked with Mr. Carusi
in your office relative to the same. It has been quite difficult at
Chicago to impress upon the representatives of the press that we cannot
conduct our investigations in the newspapers and that we cannot dis-
close the details of our work. Because of Mr. Purvis' action in follow-
ing the policy of not talking for publication in such matters he has
incurred certain enmities, and I wanted you to know of this particular
situation, because I believe that he has merely done the intelligent

MEMORANDUM FOR THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

In connection with the investigation which this Division is conducting into the Bremer kidnaping, I wanted to advise you that yesterday Agents of this Division in Chicago took into custody W. E. Videler. Videler had upon his person \$2,660 of the Bremer money. Videler was convicted in 1920 in Illinois for larceny and sentenced to from one to ten years in the State Penitentiary. In examining Videler, he made a statement that he had received this money from one John McLaughlin, reported to be a West Side politician in Chicago. Warrants have been obtained for the arrest of McLaughlin, as well as Videler.

In connection with this matter, I wanted to advise you of a development at Chicago which has been characteristic of some of the past developments incident to cases upon which we have worked. In some manner, possibly through employees of the bank which advised us of the efforts of Videler to exchange the bills which he had for larger bills, the newspapers learned that there was some investigative activity. They made inquiry of Mr. Purvis, the Agent in Charge of this Division at Chicago, and in accordance with the instructions which have always governed in these matters, Mr. Purvis stated at the time he could not make any comment. At that particular time Agents of our Division were endeavoring to locate McLaughlin, and to have made any public statement concerning the matter would possibly have resulted in failure to locate McLaughlin. Some of the representatives of the press at Chicago became highly indignant because Mr. Purvis would not give them all the details concerning the matter and I understand that one of these representatives called Washington and talked with Mr. Carusi in your office relative to the same. It has been quite difficult at Chicago to impress upon the representatives of the press that we cannot conduct our investigations in the newspapers and that we cannot disclose the details of our work. Because of Mr. Purvis' action in following the policy of not talking for publication in such matters he has incurred certain enmities, and I wanted you to know of this particular situation, because I believe that he has merely done the intelligent and sensible thing. If we were to disclose to the press the various investigative steps which have been and are to be taken, naturally we could not make very much headway.

The informant states that he has received information to the effect that Crip is from St. Paul and was the finger man in the Bremer kidnaping case. He also stated that [REDACTED] told him that Pat Roach had closed his office on April 10, 1934 and the reason for his closing same was that "some of his men might kill somebody and that would ruin Pat Roach".

The informant also informed me that John Hagan received ten thousand dollars from the Herald and Examiner newspaper as settlement for the twenty-five thousand dollar reward offered by that paper for the solution of the Jake Lingle murder case. He also stated that Hagan had given five thousand dollars of this money to Pat Roach for his campaign fund when he was running for the Republican nomination of Sheriff of Cook County.

This informant also informed me that Hagan has a lot of machine guns and ammunition on his farm near Collins, Missouri.

While Mr. Ladd of the St. Louis Office was in Chicago recently, he informed me that Mr. Ross Saunders, who is connected with the Illinois State Police, had called on him in St. Louis on several occasions and that he had gained information to the effect that Saunders borrows money from a prostitute in East St. Louis by the name of Bess Newman. He also states that he has received information to the effect that Saunders used Bess Newman's car recently in a trip to Joliet, Illinois.

Mr. Ladd also informed me that Art Newman, the husband of Bess Newman is now in Joliet on a bank robbery charge.

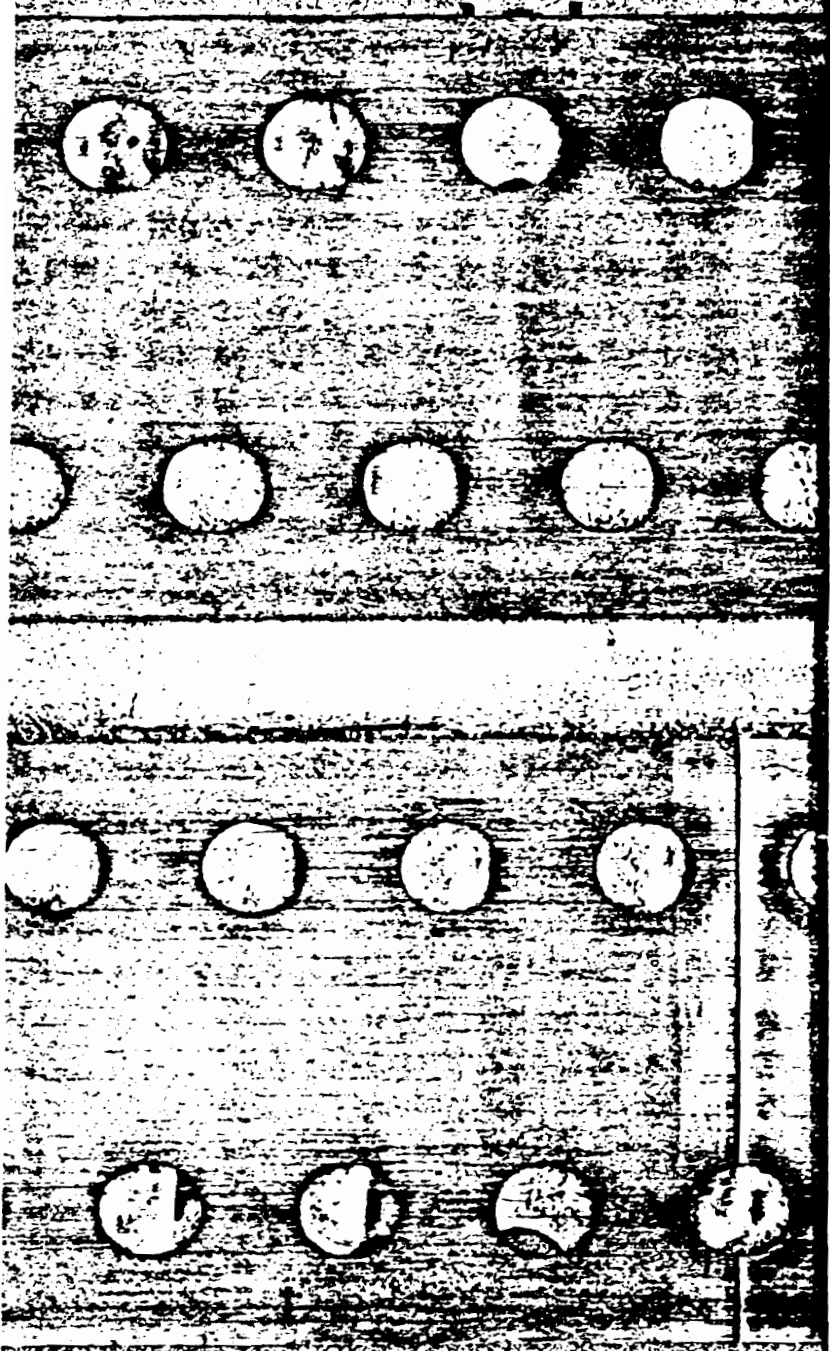

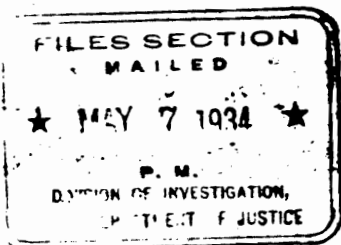

In view of the fact that FRISCO "DUTCH" has been contacted by the leading, roving, criminals operating throughout the Middle West, it was believed that [REDACTED] might be of some service to this Division in connection with the BREMER case. Consequently, he was given \$10.00 by Mr. Purvis, and transportation from Chicago to St. Paul, which amounted to \$14.29. The above information is contained in detail in a letter dated February 26, 1934, to the Division from the Chicago Office. On the arrival of [redacted] in St. Paul, he was interviewed by Inspector Rorer and Special Agent O. G. Hall. He has been interviewed from time to time and has furnished some information but of no particular value; but he has been handicapped by reason of the fact that FRISCO "DUTCH", shortly after the arrival of the informant, left the Twin Cities because of a gambling probe and has since been in Hot Springs, Arkansas. The informant lived for a time at [redacted] but is now living at [redacted] both cheap hotels, notorious for the fact that hoodlums live in them. He was first interviewed at this office on February 27, 1934. He is still in the employ of this office as an informant and has been paid the following sums:

making a total of \$141.00. The purpose of employing this informant was to use him in connection with the BREMER case. However, for the reasons outlined above, he has not been of great service. He has furnished information from time to time regarding the police in the Twin Cities and some information in the DILLINGER case.

Examination of his criminal record will disclose that he [redacted] It was at this prison [redacted] some members of the MOON MOB First Det. The informant claims to have an acquaintance with those mobsters, and evidently does.

The above portion of this letter was dictated by Special Agent Hall and prefaced his conclusion that a decision would be reached soon as to the prospective value of this informant in the future, at which time the Division will be notified as to a recommendation for his continued services.

I am modifying this recommendation, however, to the effect that it is my opinion that the cost of this informant is not great and he is one of very few informants who are available in the Twin Cities; and although his information has been meager, it has been impossible for him to contact the party he hoped to see. I recommend the continuation of his services until further notice.

This information evidently came through a telegram from the news syndicate in Minneapolis. Sergeant N. H. Massey of the Missouri State Highway Patrol stationed at West Plains, Missouri, presented the newspaper to Special Agents R. H. Simons and W. F. Trainor on May 4, 1934, while at Cabool, Missouri. It is noted that the information regarding the location of Barker and Karpis in the vicinity of West Plains is general and that previous information of the same nature is in the instant file showing that Barker and Karpis lived at West Plains for a short period during the latter part of 1931 and killed Sheriff C. R. Kelly during December, 1931, at that place.

In the vicinity, the West Plains Postmaster at Moody, Missouri, has been advised of the activities and residence of this gang. I cover the mail of Mrs. Asper by letter to the Postmaster of Moody, Missouri, to be advised of West Plains, Missouri.

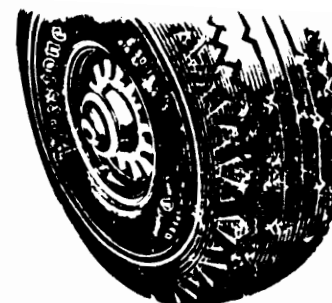

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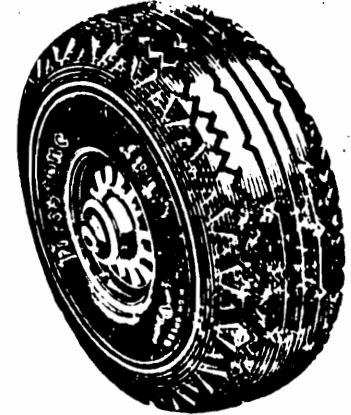

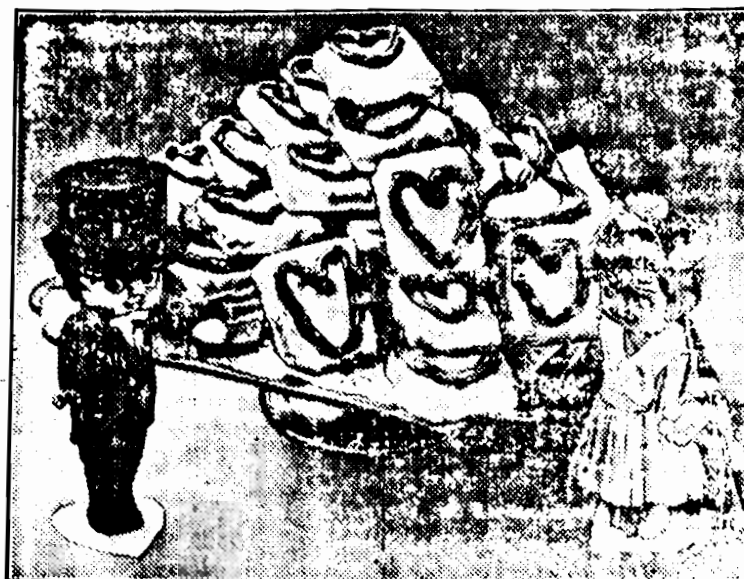

Place in greased loaf tin. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 2 1/2 hours.

Tells of Wunderlich Swindle

The Kansas City Star in a special dispatch from Jefferson City yesterday has the following to say of the Wunderlich swindle:

"Martin Wunderlich, road contractor, with offices here, denied emphatically today he had been the victim of a \$50,000 swindle in connection with the 'hot money' syndicate now under investigation in Chicago.

John J. 'Boss' McLaughlin, former political leader of Chicago, and four others are under arrest there, following discovery of part of the Bremer ransom money collected for the release of Edward Bremer of St. Paul.

"Dispatches from Chicago today quoted officers there as saying Wunderlich had lost \$50,000 to the 'syndicate' and that William E. Mead, who has served prison sentences in California, Colorado and Florida, was being sought for the crime. Wunderlich was quoted in these dispatches as having denied he was victimized, but admitting he had put officers on Meade's trail.

"There's absolutely nothing to it," Wunderlich said here today.

Wunderlich, who has built many roads in Missouri, has made his home here the last two years, having come here from Minnesota.

The story from Chicago said Wunderlich was lured to South Bend, Ind., by the confidence men, supposedly to arrange a business deal. While waiting for one of the principals to the deal who the confidence men said had been called suddenly to Washington, Wunderlich was said to have been introduced to a 'Kentucky colonel' familiar with systems to beat the horse races. After a day or so of moderate winnings the 'colonel' announced arrangement of a 'killing.' The swindlers announced to Wunderlich they had won \$900,000. But the gamblers refused to pay off until they were assured Wunderlich and the others could have paid if they had lost.

With one of the conspirators, said to have been Mead, Wunderlich went to St. Paul and borrowed a large sum from Bremer. He took the money to South Bend and that was the last he saw of it and of his friends.

According to the federal men, Wunderlich's call on Bremer marked Bremer for a kidnap victim.

Denies to Associated Press

In an interview with Associated Press correspondents in Jefferson City Wunderlich also denied being swindled by a member of the crime syndicate, and Associated Press dispatches carried the following on his denial:

"Jefferson City, April 30.—(UP)—Investigation of federal agents into the \$200,000 kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer, St. Paul banker, led here today, where a prominent Missouri highway contractor admitted 'government men have questioned me about the case.'

Martin Wunderlich, a close friend and business associate of Bremer's, said that 'I don't know a real thing about Eddie's being kidnaped, but federal men have talked to me about it.'

Wunderlich denied that a fugitive confidence man, William E. (Christian Kid) Mead, had mugged him out of \$50,000 in a fake horse race gambling scheme.

"It's all hokey. I didn't lose a single penny to anybody on a horse race," the contractor said.

"I don't bet, except maybe just a little bit once in a while."

Wunderlich admitted that he and Bremer were 'close friends' and that he formerly transacted business with Bremer's Commercial State Bank in St. Paul.

Also federal agents admit that the Dillinger trail has 'gone cold'—on them again, but declare the Barker-Karpis trail to be hotter than ever.

In fact, it is believed today that more federal agents are chasing Barker and Karpis now than are after Dillinger.

Among members of the crime ring held in Chicago are John 'Boss' McLaughlin, former Illinois legislator and reputed overlord of Chicago gambling concessions, who has confessed after four days of grilling that he handled \$53,000 of the \$200,000 Bremer ransom money. Agents have found some of the money in possession of members of the gang, including \$85 found in the hat band of McLaughlin's 17-year-old son.

having been Miss Ada Warner of
West Plains before her marriage. Mr.
Warner, until he suffered a breakdown
in health, was an employee of the local
postoffice.

Mr. Kreigh, who is employed with
the local telephone company, was
present at the birth of his grandson.

KARPIS AND BARKER TAKE SPOTLIGHT FROM DILLINGER

More Federal Agents Chasing Karpis
and Barker Than Are After Dil-
linger, Says News Dispatch
From Minneapolis.

U. S. BREAKS UP RING

Federal Agents Declare Dillinger
Trail Cold, But Karpis and Barker
Trail Said To Be Hotter Than
Ever.

(Special to Daily Quill)

Minneapolis, Minn., May 1.—That
Alvin Karpis and Fred Barker, notori-
ous bandits, may be hiding near West
Plains, Mo., was indicated today by
reports from Chicago that a squad of
federal agents had started on a flying
trip for that city.

The national spotlight was turned
from the bizarre pursuit of John Dil-
linger and focused on Karpis and
Barker when the department of jus-
tice obtained four new confessions
naming them as the actual "snatchers"
in the Bremer kidnaping, which was
engineered by a Chicago kidnap and
swindling ring.

The department of justice announc-
ed today that it has broken up the
ring, that it is holding the principal
members as captives and expects to
clear up the whole case in a few days.

Trail Is Hot

Also federal agents admit that the
Dillinger trail has "gone cold" on
them again, but declare the Barker-
Karpis trail to be hotter than ever.

In fact, it is believed today that
more federal agents are chasing Bark-
er and Karpis now than are after Dil-
linger.

Among members of the crime ring
held in Chicago are John "Boss" Mc-
Laughlin, former Illinois legislator
and reputed overlord of Chicago
gambling concessions, who has con-
fessed after four days of grilling that
he handled \$53,000 of the \$300,000
Bremer ransom money. Agents have
found some of the money in posses-
sion of members of the gang, includ-
ing \$35 found in the hat band of Mc-
Laughlin's 25-year-old son.

MRS. BESSIE SKINNER alias GREEN was interviewed at the St. Paul Division Office on the evening of May 3, 1934. She advised that, in addition to the two BARKER boys, ALVIN KARPIS, HARRY CAMPBELL, VOLNEY DAVIS, and BILL WEAVER, there were, in fact, two other members of the BARKER-KARPIS gang and they are as follows:

1. An individual by the name of "DUTCH" from Des Moines, Iowa. His girl friend is named FRANCES and her man was killed in Kansas City six or seven years ago and was from Des Moines, Iowa, and both "DUTCH" and his girl friend, FRANCES, are close friends of MYRTLE EATON and some time ago FRANCES, who owned a Lincoln automobile, was hard pressed for finances and sold the automobile to ANDY BOTHERMIRE in St. Paul, Minnesota, BOTHERMIRE being an occasional intimate friend of MYRTLE EATON'S. She advised that WILLIAM WEAVER and MYRTLE EATON met "DUTCH" and FRANCES in Chicago during the World's Fair. She believes they met "at the lake". She claimed to be unable to explain further what was meant by the term, "at the lake".

2. An individual called "BIG BOY", also known as "BIG HOMER" (refer to previous reports concerning him in the BREWER Kidnaping case; the Kansas City Massacre case; and interview with EDDIE DOLL in Florida). BESSIE SKINNER stated that "BIG HOMER" was from Chicago, and his wife and son, who is seven or eight years of age, reside in Chicago.

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MRS. BESSIE SKINNER advised that MYRTLE RAYON frequently visits HELL HOWARD, who is well known in Kansas City, and HELL is considered a friend of the BARKER-KARPIS groups' girl friends and MYRTLE RAYON has been known to frequently visit HELL HOWARD in Kansas City. The Kansas City Office was advised of this information by telegram.

BESSIE stated that the BARKER-KARPIS boys visited the Kentucky Derby, in 1935, in fact, one of the members of this mob invited EDDIE GREEN and BESSIE to accompany them to Kentucky for the Derby but, at the time, BESSIE was not feeling well and did not go with them. She stated that she felt reasonably certain that several, if not all, of the members of this group would attend the Kentucky Derby in the near future and that, particularly, VOLNEY DAVIS might be expected to be there and he would be accompanied by his girl friend, who goes by the name of GRACE MURRAY and KENA MURRAY. She is blond, 36 or 37 years of age, short and heavy, being unusually broad across the back.

She further advised that PAULA HARMON now has a series of false upper teeth in front and that, when she talks, her teeth show very noticeably. She is wearing a long bob, coming down to the shoulders and curling up. She uses no make-up and her cheek bones, as the result of an automobile accident, have been so damaged as to make PAULA'S face look flat. She examined photographs of PAULA HARMON and stated that the middle photograph, of the group sent by the Division wherein three small photographs appear on one mounting, more closely resembles PAULA HARMON than any of the others, although her features have changed considerably on account of the accident.

BESSIE was shown the photographs of the three girls being held in the Madison, Wisconsin, jail, the three girls in question being those who were found in the lodge at "Little Bohemia". She identified the blond as the girl friend of TOMMY CARROLL, who was, likewise, a sister of PAT HILLY'S wife. This blond, she stated, is twenty-four years of age and had visited BESSIE GREEN on several occasions in the latter's apartment at 2300 Fremont Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota. She, BESSIE, stated that this girl had not been living with CARROLL for a very long period of time; that she had gone from the Twin Cities to Chicago where she was married to a young fellow who is believed to play in WAYNE KING'S ORCHESTRA, or, at least, he is a night club entertainer in Chicago. BESSIE stated that the blond's hair had been bleached and that the blond's appearance,

as shown in the photograph, was unnatural. BESSIE stated that this same blond girl and PAT HILLY's wife were both sisters of a girl in Chicago by the name of DOLORES; that DOLORES is about 19 years of age and has light brown hair and that this girl, DOLORES, is the girl friend of ALVIN KARPIS. KARPIS maintains an apartment for her constantly in Chicago regardless of where KARPIS may be at the time.

NOTE: It is noted that PAT HILLY's wife and the blond in custody at Madison, Wisconsin, have both stated that the maiden name of DELANEY is theirs. It is also observed that one of the individuals in custody at Chicago, charged with the possession, or passing of the BREMER kidnap money was named DELANEY. The suggestion is offered that it might be within the realm of possibility that KARPIS was making an effort to get rid of his share of the ransom money through connections which he had with the girl, DOLORES DELANEY, with whom he was living.

PAT HILLY's wife has also stated that she has a brother by the name of ROBERT, and a sister by the name of JEAN, and that her father was once a railroad detective in Chicago. BESSIE stated that she recalls that shortly before Christmas, 1933, flowers were sent to the mother of DOLORES DELANEY, in Chicago, either by DOLORES or by ALVIN KARPIS. These flowers were sent two or three weeks before Christmas.

BESSIE GREEN identified the photographs of the two brunette girls held at Madison, Wisconsin, as follows:

The girl giving the name of ROSE ANCKER was known to BESSIE as "MICKY" and is the girl friend of HOMER VAN METER and lived with VAN METER at 3510 Fremont Avenue, Minneapolis, near BESSIE GREEN's apartment, under the name of MR. and MRS. OBER. The above mentioned blond girl friend of TOMMY CARROLL, likewise, visited BESSIE GREEN and ROSE ANCKER alias MRS. OBER.

The woman who gave her name as MRS. THEODORE HANE, according to BESSIE GREEN, is the wife of JIMMIE alias "B-BY FACE" NELSON and is the mother of JIMMIE's two children, a boy about four years of age, by the name of RONALD, and a little girl about two and one-half years of age, who are living with either JIMMIE's mother, or his wife's mother, in Chicago.

Concerning the individual by the name of "IZZY", in Chicago, who is believed to have passed a portion of the ransom money, BESSIE stated that she was acquainted with an individual by the name of "IZZY" WOLKE, who, with his brother, JOE WOLKE, had been in the transfer business in Minneapolis, and both of whom were close friends of HARRY SAWYER and formerly permitted the use of their trucks in handling cargoes of liquor for HARRY SAWYER and BENNY MOORE. BESSIE stated that she knew this was true because she, at one time, lived with a man by the name of BOB WALSH and BOB would obtain the services of "IZZY" WOLKE'S trucks in order to handle cargoes of liquor for SAWYER.

BESSIE GREEN admitted that she, personally, called at the apartment house located at 23-25 South Lexington Avenue, in St. Paul, Minnesota, and rented the apartment which was subsequently occupied by JOHN DILLINGER and MILLIE FRECHETTE and she knew that this apartment was being rented for this purpose.

Concerning the investigation made at San Antonio, Texas, relative to the purchase and shipment of machine guns, BESSIE stated that she did not know the name of the Jew in San Antonio, but she had heard VAN METER, and other members of the mob, talk about a Jew in San Antonio with whom they did business. She didn't know just what business it was they had with the Jew, nor did she know the Jew's name, but she remembered some discussion about the following situation:

She stated that she had heard EDOLIE GREEN state, that in San Antonio, Texas, last summer or in the early fall, JIMMIE WILLIAMS alias "BARY FACE" NELSON, who was probably accompanied by his wife; TOMMY CARROLL, who was not accompanied by a girl friend, but he made a "play" for a manicurist in San Antonio and his attentions to this manicurist led, either directly or indirectly, to the scrape which CARROLL got into when he killed a policeman. She stated that there was also an individual in the group at San Antonio by the name of CHURCH, or CHUCK, and she stated that "CHUCK" was probably correct for his nickname; that his name was, in fact, CHUCK FISHER; that he is now in Leavenworth Penitentiary where he was sentenced not very long ago to serve five years on a charge of mail robbery. She, likewise, understands that HOMER VAN METER was in San Antonio about that time and probably TOMMY GANNON. She said that TOMMY GANNON'S wife, or girl friend, although being in her early twenties, looked as though she might be in her late thirties because she dissipated a great deal.

BESSIE stated that she had, on the occasion of a previous interview, been shown a photograph of BERNARD PHILLIPS. She suggested that no further effort be made to locate BERNARD PHILLIPS who had more than a year ago been taken on a "one way ride"; that his wife was in New York at the time and could not get any word about the location of BERNARD PHILLIPS and his wife caught a bus for the Twin Cities and made inquiries here as to his whereabouts but she said she has not been informed that PHILLIPS had been killed. HARRY SANIER had told BESSIE about the trip made by PHILLIPS' wife and SANIER stated that he did not tell her that PHILLIPS was dead. SANIER explained that PHILLIPS had double-crossed his pals.

BESSIE stated that in and around Chicago, HARRY SANIER has a friend by the name of SKIP HAYNE. She does not know any more about him, she claims.

BESSIE stated that LOUIS CERNOCKY, who runs "LOUIE'S PLACE", north of Chicago, was, she believed, a Bohemian and he is an individual who weighed more than three hundred pounds and usually stood behind his bar all day long while his wife, who weighed more than two hundred pounds, was a very hard worker. They have a son, now attending law school in Chicago, of whom they are very proud. She stated that LOUIS CERNOCKY has a physician who lives at Cary, Illinois; that this physician is about forty-five to fifty years of age, has gray hair, and is a refined and nice appearing man. He is German and has a German name. She believes that there are only one or two doctors in Cary, and his identity would probably be easily established. BESSIE has seen this doctor on an occasion when she and EDDIE GREEN visited LOUIE'S PLACE when she desired to obtain some insurance; that, they applied for insurance from a "kid" who worked in a bank at Fox River, Grove. She paid one year's premium in advance and had LOUIE'S doctor at Cary examine her and about a year later she had her money refunded because the insurance company had refused, for some reason, to insure her. She suggested that this doctor might be an individual who would treat any of the MILLINER gang who were wounded.

The following quoted telegram was received on May 3, 1934, from Special Agent S.E. Hardy, at Madison, Wisconsin:

There is enclosed, herewith, a letter written in some foreign language, believed to be Swedish, and a liberal translation of the letter is said to be as follows:

"Best Mayor:

"I am taking this opportunity to write to you, hoping that you will investigate this that I am writing. I have a voice that is calling night and day and know where the kidnapers stayed, they that kidnaped Bremer. There name is A.B. Leneme, 200 Edena Street. There are \$200,000 in a black can.

"I went to St. Paul and saw Bremer but he said this belongs to the Government and that he had nothing to do with it, and I told my brother-in-law, Dr. Hanson, who works for the Government Hospital but he could not find the street, name, or their address in the directory. I went back home but the voice kept calling me so I take this opportunity to write to you, hoping that you will answer me and let me know how it goes. I will probably go to St. Paul but it might not be for some time. I am a farmer and now it is spring.. If this helps you any, I can probably give you more information later on. I have proved this voice. Forgive me for writing in Swedish, but I felt that I had to let you know about it."

The enclosed original letter is being transmitted for the Division's laboratory to consider in the event the handwriting specimens of this character are involved in any kidnaping or extortion case.

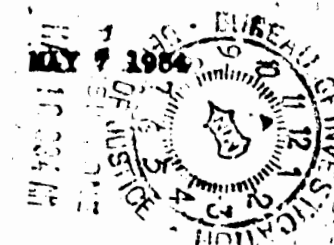
