J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the G-men, last night added his pen to the arsenal of weapons with which he is fighting organized erime.

Hoover revealed intimate details of gangdom in a new book, "Persons In Hiding." All the former public enemies—Alvin Karpis, Harvey Bailey, George (Machine Gun) Kelly, Kathryn Kelly, Harmon Waley, and others, are covered in his book.

Wanted Everything

"Kathryn Thorne Kelly was one of the most coldly deliberate criminals of my experience," Hoover wrote of Kelly's wife. He related how she taught her husband to use a machine gun, made the criminal contacts for him. drove him to robberies, and plotted the Charles F. Urschel kidnaping.

Hoover also traced the growth of a maniacal hatred of G-men in the heart of Karpis as he and all of his underworld henchmen were sent to prison.

Mass Murders

"As we wandered from Texas to Mississippi to Florida, a weird insane plot for a mass slaughter of G-men was hatched in his brain," wrote Hoover.

"Cleveland was to have been the locale for the first act in this mass slaughter. Justice agents were to be lured to an unnamed street corner and mowed down by Karpis, secreted in the shadow of a building, with a machine gun."

Karpis then intended to escape by airplane to Los Angeles, where he was to shoot down the Justice agent there, Hoover's book continues. From California, he was to go to Chicago, do away with the field agent there, then pay a hurry visit to New York for a similar raid. Finally, his one-man war against the G-men was to end by a dramatic murder of Hoover himself in the shadow of the Justice Building in the heart of the

Karpis gave up his plan when "G-heat" became so intense, and his efforts were strained to avoid capture, the book relates. When he was trapped in New Orleans, he never even got a chance to draw a gun.

Joe H. Adams, Miami hotel manager, and Hendry Randall were freed of charges of harboring Karpis after a trial in the United States District court in Miami last June when Judge Alexander Akerman directed a verdict of "not guilty."

McDonald, Adams, Randall and Nathan H. Heller, Havana, Cuba, hotel manager, were co-defendants in the indictments. The indictments against Heller were dismissed two years ago. Karpis is serving a life term in Alcatrax prison.

How the G-men trap public enemies and a fascinating insight into the methods with which Uncle Sam has developed the finest detective force in the world were related to the more than 200 who assembled Monday night at the Elks home to hear and to question L. V. Boardman, federal bureau of investigation agent from Washington, D. C.

Approximately half this number were CCC enrollees, almost the entire roster of the Casper camp being represented, under the leadership of their commanding officer, Capt. C. C. Berry. They were keenly interested in what Boardman had to say. Equally interested were the more than 100 Casper citizens present.

PROVIDED CLUE

Particularly engrossing was his account of how the G-men ran to earth, and captured the Birker-Karpis mob. They had absolutely no ifformation on which to start out, loardman related. By a process of deductions, they developed a sinkle clue—a red gasoline can on which there was a single fingerprint. It was put there by the right fore-times of Doc Barker. He told the inside story of how onetime public enemies now "guests" at Alcatraz were put there; and what the program of even more crime control is for the future.



Spa's Airport Manager and Others Held by G-Men for Alleged Aid to Gunman in 1935.

Seven persons, three of them former Hot Springs police officers, were indicted today by the federal grand jury in Little Rock on charges of harboring Alvis Karpis, gangster, in 1935, when Karpis was a fugitive from the G-Men and escaped a trap set for him in a hideout near the Spa.

Sik of the seven were taken into custedy by F. B. I. men at their homes in and near Hot Springs last night about midnight and brought night about midnight and brought to Little Rock to await the report of the grand jurors this afternoon. The other, a woman, was in custody of F. B. I. men in St. Louis.

Announcement of the septette's arrest was made earlier in the day by Fred Isgrig, United States district attorney.

All seven were allowed to remain in the marshel's office this afternoon while friends attempted to make bond for them. Federal Judge Trimble set the bond for Wakelin and Akers at \$10,000 each and the others at \$5,000 each. At \$ p. m. they were still locked up in a private office at the federal building with no sign of bondsmen.

Arrested at Ridnight.

The arrests at Ho Springs were made by agents of the FBI about midnight, Mr. Isgrig and agents announced today.

The federal grand jury, when it convened here Monday, was charged by Judge Thomas C. Trimble to investigate reports that fugitives from justice were reported to have been harbored in the state, but made no specific mention of the Karpis case and the gangster's residence in Hot Springs for several weeks before he was finally captured in New Orleans.

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The officers also charged that Wakelin knew Grace Goldstein, who later admitted she tharried Karpis in New York and lived with him in

in New York and lived with him in Hot Springs.

"Tip-Off" Is tlaimed.

Loftis and Mrs. Dyer were reported to have rented a cottage at Dyer's Landing on Lake Hamilton to Karpis and John Hunter, also a fugitive from justice. It was charged that it was through Loftis and Mrs. Dyer that Karpis and Hunter learned of the activities of the FBI in October, 1936, when they sought to locate and arrest the pair on federal charges, the FBI agents charge.

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The officers disclosed that in their investigation, they learned that Karpis and Hunter moved to Hot Springs in June, 1935, and lived at various places on Lakes Catherine and Hamilton. They were visited by Harry Campbell and other gangaters.

"They all moved about freely in Hot Springs without any apparent fear of arrest," the agents charged in their report.

Connie Morris was reported by the officers to have been seen frequently with Hunter, and Grace Coldstein with Karois.

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The members of the gang were credited with having shared the \$200,000 ransom money sollected in the Bremer kidnaping.

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The FBI agents credited John Stover, manager of the Hot Springs municipal airport, with having flown Karpis and Hunter and their two woman companions to various cities in the nation and "otherwise assisted them in avoiding detection and apprehension. and apprehension.

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The investigation of the FBI agents, branching out from the Karpis case, is said to have involved Thomas Nathan Morris, bank robber, and his flight by airplane over the nation to avoid arrest on state charges.

The FBI report on investigation involving the Hot Springs officers charged that Akers harbored Norris, Sam Stegal Haynes, Alfred Sonny Lemb and Goldie H. Hairston in Hot Springs from March 15, 1937, to August 15, 1937.

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Haynes was arrested at Benton August 15 last year by state polici and later in the day Lamb was killed in resisting arrest in Hot Springs Norris was captured near Rogers the next day in a raid staged at the hother of his mother and he was wounded. FBI officers aided state police in this raid.

Goldie Hairston, who was wanted on a Dyer act charge, was found dead of gunshot wounds near Gretna, La., September 7, last year. He was wounded at Guifport, Miss., in a gun battle that cost the life of one of the officers pursuing him.

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Norris now is held in the Texas penitentiary serving a 99-year term on a murder charge. Haynes also is in the Texas prison, serving a term of five to 12 years on a charge of armed robbery and is awaiting trial on a murder charge in that state.

Karpis, Campbell and Charles Fitzgerald are serving life terms in connection with the Hamm kidnaping and 35 other members of the gang have either been sent to prison or died eluding arrest as the FBI car-

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Figured in Prisoner's Death.

Hot Springs—The three former Hot Springs police officers, Joseph Wakelin, Herbert Akers and Cecil Brock, arrested in connection with the Karpis-ase, all were connected with the Hot Springs police at the time of the death of a city prisoner. John Dickson, which was followed by sensational developments.

Brock was the only one of the three indicted. Wakelin, then police chief, was dismissed by Mayor McLaughlin in connection with the Dickson case. Akers, about two months later, resigned, giving ill health as the reasor.

Dickson was alleged to have been brutally beaten while a city prisoner in jail and to have died of his injuries. Seven officers, including Brock, were tried and acquitted. The defense testimony was to the effect Dickson died of pneumonia, Dickson had attacked and beaten Chief Wakelin with a shotgun as Wakelin and other officers solight Dickson and his companions in raids in Perry and Yell counties.

Dickson died Christmas Day, 1936. Arrests and dismissals of officers followed early in 1937.

7 Held for Aiding Karpis at Resort

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., May 19 - G-Men today held seven persons who they said had harbored or consorted with Alvin Karpis, the public enemy they captured at New Orleans May 1, 1936.

A Federal grand jury ndicted all seven last night. They included three ranking Hot Springs, Ark. police officers, when Karpis and his mob were hiding there and spending their loot from robberies, kidnapings and murders. The others were the manager of the Hot Springs Airport; the owner and the caretaker of a boat landing, and a Hot Spring woman.

It was almost three years ago, in June, 1935, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, when Karpis and Fred Hunter, a henchman, first moved to Hot Springs and took up

residences in Lakeside cottages.
"They kept company with two Hot Springs women. They were visited by Harry Campbell and others of the gang and they all moved about freely in Hot Springs without any apparent fear of arrest."

The seven prisoners were brought here late yesterday. Six of them were taken at Hot Springs and one. Connie Morris, was arrested in St. Louis. Those held were John Wakelin former Hot Springs police chief. lin, former Hot Springs police chief; Cecil Brook, former Hot Springs de-Cecil Brook, former Hot Springs detective lieutenant; Herbert Akers, former Hot Springs detective chief; John Stover, manager of Hot Springs Municipal Airport; Morris Loftis, caretaker of a boat landing; Mrs. Al G. Little Rock, Ark., May 18.—
Federal bureau of investigation officials here announced tonight the arrest in Los Angeles of Mrs. Grace Goldstein, who claimed to be the wife of Alvin Karpis, on a charge of harboring the former No. 1 public enemy at Hot Springs, Ark., in 1935 and 1936.
FBI Inspector E. J. Connelley, who announced the arrest, said she had been taken into custody as she prepared to sail for Hono-

as she prepared to sail for Hono-kulu. A hotel operator at Hot Springs, she left the resort city 10 days ago.

Connelley disclosed that she was among eight persons indicted by a federal grand jury here to day on the harboring charge.

Earlier, seven other persons, three of them former officials of the Hot Springs police force, had been taken into custody on the indictments.

LITTLE ROCK, May 18.—Eight persons, including three former police officers of Hot Springs, were indicted by the Federal Grand Jury here this afternoon after being arrested by agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on charges of harboring Alvin Karpis, former Public Enemy No. 1, in 1935 shortly before he escaped a trap set by G-men at one of his alleged haunts near Hot Springs.

Those arrested are:
Herbert (Dutch) Akers, former chief of detectives at Hot Springs, charged with harboring Harpis and Nathan Norris, member of a gang which operated in Mississippi, Arkansas and Texas.

Both Karpis and Hunter were indicted as coconspirators with Akers today. In the other indictment against Akers, Norris, Sam Stagal Haynes, Alfred (Sonny) Lamb and Goldie N. Hairston, associates of Norris, were named as coconspirators.

Two Dead

Both Lamb and Hairston are now Both Lamb and Hairston are now dead. The former was killed Aug. 15, 1937, by state police, and Hairston was found dead of gunshot wounds Sept. 7, last year, near Gretna, La., after he and companions had fired upon two police officers at Gulfport, Miss., killing one, the Federal agents said.

Summarizing their work this afternoon, agents declared the investigation began immediately after the the apprehension of Karpis in New Orleans May 11, 1936, and Harry Campbell at Toledo May 7, the same year. Both were under indictment for the kidnaping of Bremer.

During the course of the investi-Buring the course of the investigation into the kidnaping of the St. Paul brewer, the report declared "it was learned that the gang spent many months in Toledo and Cleveland, Ohio, as well as in Hot, Springs, Ark., where they resided unmolested."

The agents charged members of the gang who received protection in Hot Springs were Karpis, Campbell and Hunter. They also charged that in June, 1935, Karpis and Hunter moved to Het Springs and lived in various cottages along the lakes near there and that they were frequent visitors to Grace Gold-

Frequent Visitors

They charged that Grace Goldstein "became a constant companion of Alvin Karpis," and that Hunter associated with Connie Morris. Harry Campbell and other members of the gang frequently visited them in Hot Springs, the agents charged.
Wakelin, Akers and Brock, the

agents charged, knew the identifi-cation of Karpis. They added that "Akers was observed on one occa-sion in conversation with Alvin 'Karpis."

Morris Loftis and Mrs. A. C. Dyer were charged by the agents with renting a cottage to Karpis and Hunter and it was alleged in the report today that they informed the two fugitives in December, 1935, of the details of an investi-

gation being conducted by special F. B. I. agents.

All of the fugitives moved about freely in Hot Springs without any apparent fear of larrest," the agents' report stated.

Piloted Gunmen

Stover, operator of the Hot Springs airport, was charged with flying Karpis and Hunter and their companions to various sections of the country.

In connection with the invest ra-tion of the harboring of T. N. Nor-ris, the agents charged that Norris and his associates, Sam Stigal Haynes and Lamb were "har-bored by Akers at Hot Springs

from March 15, 1937, to August 15,

"Akers had admitted to special agents his guilt in connection with violation if the Federal hardoring statutes," the report stated.

The agints also charged that Norris, Haynes, Hairston and Lamb "committed numerous crimes of violence, including armed robberies and a murder, while being pro-

Blonde Mrs. Grayson, who said she lived as the wife of Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1 until authorities sent him to prison for life, was taken into custody at a downtown hotel here. She was said to have been awaiting a boat for Hon-olulu on which she had booked passage for Friday.

At the county jail she said she lived with Karpis in Hot Springs, Ark., from September, 1935, after a marriage ceremony in New York, until May, 1936, when he was caught in New Orleans.

Karpis Case Long Under Investigation

Special to the Gazette.

Hot Springs, May 18.—The indictment by a Pederal Grand Jury at Little Rock today of three former members of the Hot Springs Police Department and four other persons in connection with Gangster Alvin Karpis' visits to this resort

provoked much comment here.

It was reported early today that Pederal Bureau of Investigation officers had come to Hot Springs last night and taken the seven in custody "for questioning"

Karpin First Appears In September, 1935.

The action was the result of an investigation by government operatives that was begun more than a year 200.

The first information that Alvin Karpis was in Hot Springs dates back to an incident early one Sunday in September, 1935. A large automobile carrying an Ohio state license stopped in front of a drug store on lower Central avenue. A clerk was called to the car and asked to bring out antiseptics and bandages. There were several men in the car. The selerk was told that one of the party had been shot secidentally. The clerk suggested that a doctor be called or that the man be taken to a hospital. He was told curtly that those in the car could render all assistance necessary. The spokesman then asked about cottages on Lake Hamilton. The clerk suggested a place on the lake where a cottage might be rented.

The incident was reported to the then Chief of Police Joe Wakelin who, accompanied by Herbert Akers, then chief of detectives, and Cecil Brock, lieutenant in charge of the Identification Department, visited the place to which the men had been directed. Later, it was said, an official of the F. B. I. was called in The cottage believed to be occupied by the gangsters was raided but it was described. Bottles and other articles found in the cottage were conliscated. From them fingerprints were obtained that were said to be those of Karpis. Officers, however, gave out a statement denying that Karpis had been in the cottage.

Karpis Flees Just Before Officers Make Raid

The next attempt to capture Karpis was mide about a year later. Early one morning they raided a large house that Karpis and others of his pagy were reported to have rented adjoining Potash Sulphur Springs, and new Lake Catherine. They swooped down on the establishment early in the morning, shot out the glass in the windows, threw tear gas bombs into the place and set a mattress on one of the beds on fire, only to learn that Karpis had left the day before.

By that time Karpis had made the acquaintance of Grace Goldstein, who conducted a rooming house on upper Central avenue. Several months later she disappeared and was gone nearly a month. About a week after she returned F. B. I. officials, led by their chief, J. Edgar Hoover, arrested Karpis and Hunter in New Orleans. Connie Morris, young country girl, companion of Hunter, was taken into custody at the same time. Later was released and returned to Hot Springs.

After Karpis had been arrested Miss Goldstein announced that ahe and Karpis had been married in New York. She could not recall the name of the minister or official who performed the ceremony, but she said that Karpis had spent a large sum on her and given her large amounts of cash. She said Karpis had a couple of suitcases filled with

Federal Officers Question Many Hot Springs Residents.

One day Hot Springs suddenly awake to the fact that for several months officers of the Federal Bureau of Investigation had been working here. It was said that the inquiry had progressed nearly a year before it became known generally. Then government officials opened offices in the Thompson building. Scores of persons were asked to visit their headquarters and were questioned on many phases of local conditions. Those who were not inyited to the office were interviewed at their hom?

FBI to Bring Mrs. Goldstein To Little Rock

'Wife' of Gunman, Held in Los Angeles, Eighth to Be Jailed.

Federal authorities today prepared to remove Mrs. Grace Goldstein, alias Mrs. Alvin Karpis, to Little Rock from Los Angeles, Calif., where last night she became the eighth person to be arrested within 24 hours for harboring Alvin Karpis, notorious gangster in the 1935 and 1936 at Hot Springs, where federal officers unsuccessfully attempted to capture him.

E. J. Connelley of Washington, inspector for the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who directed the round-up of suspects, one of them in St. Louis, announced the arrest of the Goldstein woman. He said she was preparing to board a steamer for Honolalu after having flel from Hot Springs about 10 days at o.

Que Still in Jail.

With off exception the effendants arrested at Hot Springs were released on bond late yesterday. Cecil Brock, former lieutenant of the Hot Springs police department, was still in the Pulaski county jail to-day in default of \$5,000 bail.

Those released were foe Wakelin, former chief of Hot Springs police; Herbert ("Dutch") Akers, former chief of detectives; John Stover, manager of the Hot Springs inunicipal alroot and well known without the Mars. Al C. Dyer, owner of a boat landilg near Hot Springs, and Morris Laltis, caretaker at the landing. The eighth defendant is Connie Morris, alias Ruth Hamm Robinson, described as the sweetheart of Fred Hunter, Karpis associate. She was arrested in St. Louis early yesterday. Inspector Connelley said she and Mrs. Goldstein would be arraigned before United States commissioners before their removal to Little Rock. Three or four days will be necessary to bring them here, he said.

The federal grand jury, which had been in session since Monday, reported indictments for conspiracy to harbor against the Hot Springs defendants and Connie Morris when it adjourned yesterday afternoon.

Maximum sentence on the charge is three years' imprisonment. Akers also faces an additional charge that he harbored Thomas Nathan Norris, member of the Alfred ("Sonny") Lamb gang which operated in Texas, Arkansas and Mississippi.

The bonds which were furnished for the Hot Springs defendants were \$10,000 each for Wakelin and Akers, and \$5,000 each for the others. Little Rock and Hot Springs residents furnished the total of \$35,000 of property bonds.

The defendants, whose cases will be set for trial at the October term of federal court, refused to pose for photographers yesterday afternoon. Akers said "I'll promise that you may have our pictures when we're accidited."

Mrs. Goldstein, who operated a Hot Springs rooming house, was named in the indictment as "Jewell Leverne Grayson, alias Grace Goldstein, alias Mrs. Ed Parker, alias Mrs. Helen Wood."

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Arrests in Karpis Case End Two-Year Investigation Here

Arrest of eight local persons, including three former rity police department officials, on charges of having harbored Alvin Karpis, former Public Enemy No. 1, yesterday brought to a climax a two-year investigation which had been con-ducted here by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents.

Although the FBI agents acted with traditional suddenness, their move was not wholly unexpected as Hot Springs residents had generally known that such an investigation vas under way. In fact, many local residents were questioned regarding conditions here.

Some were interviewed in an office which the U.S. officials opened here, while others were visited in their homes.

The returning of the indictments by the federal grand jury yesterday brought the local police onto the front pages of the country's news-

During the investigation, Joe Wakelin, then chief of police, was suspended by Mayor Leo P. Mc-Laughlin, but later restored to good standing as an officer. He resigned from the department this past May 1 because of ill health.

Last July, Mayor McLaughlin announced that Herbert Akers had been compelled to resign as chief of detectives because of ill health.

John Stover, also arrested in the FBI investigation, has been man ager of the municipal airport here-for eight years and is quite popular in state aviation circles.

Morris Loftis is a hoat landing caretaker and Mrs. Al C. Dyer, owner of the boat landing.

Louis yesterday, formerly resided here with Mrs. Grace Goldstein Karpis, wife of the former Public Enemy No. 1 and proprietor of the Hatterie hotel on upper Central avenue.

NEW LIGHT ON GANGSTERS

ALTHOUGH no American city has yet turned wholly sinless and sat down piously to await the wholesale distribution of harps and haloes, it is nevertheless true that we don't hear nearly as much about gangsters and the underworld as we used to hear.

This is partly because the G-men and other law enforcement agencies have done some pretty effective work Even more, however, it is simply because the gangsters and the underworld have ceased to be news. Gangs and underworlds still exist; less defiant, less cocky, perhaps, but still in business.

So any new light we can get on the way commercialized crime operates is worth getting and worth thinking about. We shan't really win the long war with gangsterism until we understand fully how and why gangsterism exists; and some valuable light on the subject is provided by a recent happening in Arkansas.

There the G-men arrested five men and two women on charges of harboring Alvin Karpis, who once was rated one of the nation's most energetic public enemies, back in 1935. Among those arrested were an ex-chief of police, an ex-detective chief, an exdetective lieutenant and the former manager of the Hot Springs municipal airport.

All of which is interesting for two

First, because it shows clearly that the big shot criminals do not operate on their own. Their "gangs" are not made up solely of low-browed thugs and coke-sniffing killers; they depend for their existence on the active cooperation of respected people.

Gangsters have to move from place to place. They have to hide out from the law. And they don't slink furtively about like trembling fugitives in a moving picture. They have their friends, their "connections." who take care of them. They are able to live outside the law because supposedly decent folk help them to live that way.

Second, they can't operate without an understanding with the forces of law and order. Pat Roche, the famous Chicago detective, once remarked caustically that a one-armed prohibition agent on a bicycle could have dried up Chicago in a week if he had really tried; and the implications of the at remark are true of all gangs at all times and places. Crime flourishes when the police let it flourish—not otherwise.

So these arrests in Arkansas are worth the inking about. Rounding up

So these arrests in Arkansas are worth theinking about. Rounding up the people who enabled a public enemy to operate us a less spectacular work than nabbing the public enemy himself; in the long run, however, it is the most important poart of the job of gang-busting.

A DESPERADO'S PASTIME

ALVIN KARPIS, once the nation's public enemy No. 1, is said by Warden Johnson of Alcatraz to have become interested in deep sea fishing since becoming an inmate of the big federal prison. His request for two books, "Salt Water Fishing" and "An Anjerican Angler in Australia," Warden Johnson told Assistant U. S. Attorney Frank Wiedemann of Cleveland, has been granted.

If Karpis, sent to Alcatraz for life for one of the most lurid careers in American criminal history, ever gains his freedom, he may be planning to put many miles between him and the land of his criminal exploits. But, perhaps, the prison authorities and the federal agents and attorneys should be concerned over his interest in far-away places, lest he become fired with a zeal to quit these shores before his term expires. It is more than likely, however, that the one-time gang leader, finding nothing in the prison regimen to renew his interest in criminal activities, has turned to interests that he might have followed long before had he been a lawabiding citizen who didn't have to keep one jump ahead of the police and the G-men. It may be an illustration of the peaceful interests that might have occupied the minds of the nation's desperadoes had they never taken the criminal path.

Mr. Karpis himself might be disturbed, however, if he knew that Warden Johnson was in Cleveland to confer with Mr. Wiedemann regarding another one of his exploits while at large—a \$46,000 train robbery at Garretsville, Ohio, in which Karpis and a companion, also at Alcatraz, are believed to have participated. This fishing expedition into crime clews might place Mr. Karpis back in prison, provided he some day receives time off his life sentence and still further prevent his contemplated fishing trip to Australia or the South seas.

Trial of seven Hot Springs residents, indicted May 18 for alleged conspiracy to harbor Alvin Karpis, a fugitive from justice, in 1935 and 1936, has been set for October 18 in Federal Court here, District Attorney A. Isgrig said yesterday. The eighth person named in the indictment, Connie Morris, entered a plea of guilty, June 23, and was sentenced to imprisonment of one year and one day.

The seven defendants and their attorneys have been notified of the setting of the case, which is on the second day of the regular October term of Federal court. Pleas of defendants will be received October 77 and a petit jury will report on October 18.

The following are to be tried in the Karpis case:

Joseph Wakelin, former chief of police; Herbert ("Dutch") Akers, former chief of detectives, and Cecil Brock, former lieutenant of police, all of the Hot Springs department; Jewell LaVerne Grayson, alias Goldstein, self-styled wife of Karpis; Mrs. Al C. Dyer, operator of a camp and boat landing on Lake Hamilton; Morris Loftis, caretaker at the boat landing, and John Stover, mahager of Hot Springs airport. All see at liberty under \$5,000 and \$10,000 bonds.

Conspiracy Charged.

The indictment charges that Karpis and John Hunter were frequent visitors to Hot Springs during the years 1935 and 1936 and that the former police officers knew of their presence. It also charges that cottages were rented at the boat landing and the two fugitives had as companions Grace Goldstein and Connie Morris, whom they met at Hot Springs.

The Federal Grand Jury will report at 10 a. m. tomorrow to investigate charges against defendants in all four divisions of the district. It is expected the body will be in session about four days and return about 135 indictments against about 175 persons. Most of the charges are expected to be liquor charges, motor vehicle theft charges, counterfeiting and postal law violations.

A two-weeks calendar of miscellaneous business will begin tomorfow before Judge Trimble and the regular term of court at Helena will open October 3.

Following the opening of the court at Little Rock, trial on civil cases before a jury will be held for two weeks will begin November 7 and the civil calendar will be resumed November 21. Changes in the schedule of trials were announced yesterday by Sid B. Redding, district elerk.

Motions for severance of the trials of Stover, Loftis, Mrs. Dyer and Wakelin were presented and denied. Claims Wakelin III.

Mr. Owens and Mr. McHaney then presented four motions on behalf of Wakelin, two for continuance of the case, one to require a bill of particulars and one to quash the indictment. One motion for continuance declared Wakelin was not in physical condition to stand trial. It was denied when District Attorney Fred A. Isgrig and Assistant District Attorley Leon B. Catlett produced affidivits from doctors appointed by the court that Wakelin's health was good.

A second motion for a continuance of the trial of Wakelin was made on the contention that the district attorney and court clerk had refused to permit the attorneys to see a list of government witnesses alled to testify. The contention produced a lengthy argument, Wakelin' attorneys asking for the continuance "until the district attorney produces the list." The two government attorneys contended they did not have to make known their witnesses except in treason cases and "did not intend" to announce them! declaring they "were not to be tampered with. The argument included an exchange of words during which McHaney charged the government with obtaining the names of defense witnesses summoned for the trial and declared one of them "has been visited by a government representative."

Mr. Campbell adopted the same motion for continuance of the charge against the Grayson, woman, after which motions were presented for a bill of particulars as to the "time and place" Wakelin was included in the alleged conspiracy and to quash the indictment against Wakelin. All were denied by Judge Trimble.

KARPIS INTRIGUE **DEFENSE LOSES** EARLY SKIRMISH

Delay Denied By Judge Trimble.

Seven Hot Springs residents indicted on charges of conspiracy to harbor Alvin Karpis, one-time Public Enemy No. 1, lost the first legal round in their fight to escape prison sentences yesterday when Federal Judge Trimble successively overruled defense motions:

For separate trials.
For continuation of the cases. For an order to direct the district at-

torney's office to make public its list of witnesses and to quash the indictments.

Hearings on the motions were pre-liminary to the trials scheduled to start before a petit jury in United States District Court here at 10 a. m. Tues-day. A pre-trial conference will be held in chambers Monday to simplify issues and to discuss limitation of witnesses.

dentity of Witnesses Provokes Heated Debate.

Heated debate arose over the motion Heated debate arose over the motors to require United States Attorney Fred A. Isgrig to turn over a list of government witnesses to defense lawyers with Mr. Isgrig asserting that he had taken this precaution to insure that taken this precution to historian the witnesses would not be "tampered with" and defense lawyers charging that this was an example of the "ar-rogant attitude" assumed by the district attorney in the case.

E. L. McHaney Jr., and Grover T.
Owens, lawyers for Joseph Wakelin.
former Hot Springs police chief, said it was not mandatory under the statutes that the district attorney be required to turn over its list of witnesses but that they would be unable 'to adequately prepare to defend the charges" without it. They declared the government probably would have some "off-brand characters" as witnesses and that they should be given time to check on their reputations and records before the trial.

Mr. Isgrig interposed at this point that the witnesses would be "friends and associates of Mr. Wakelin," adding that "he went he surprised to see them."

Attorney Will Interview Federal Prisoner

Representative James R. Campbell, representing Mrs. Grace Goldstein, operator of a Hot Springs rooming house, obtained from Judge Trimble authority for a private interview Monday with Connie Morris, formerly employed by Mrs. Goldstein who pleaded guilty to the harboring charge against her and now is serving a year and a day in a federal reformatory.

Defense lawyers failed to obtain from the district attorney an admission that the Morris girl had been subpoensed as a witness. Mr. Isgrig did say that she was not now in Little Rock. Reports were current at the time she entered her plea that she would testify for the government in the trial of the other seven persons indicted with her.

Plea of Illness By Wakelin Refuted.

Mr. McHaney asked the court for a continuance of the case against Mr. Wakelin on the grounds that his client was not physically able to appear in court to testify in his behalf. He introduced affidavits from three Pot Springs doctors in support of his

contention.

The district attorney countered with affidavits from persons he destribed as neighbors of Mr. Wakelin to the effect that the former Hot Springs police chief had been active in his garden and at his place on a lake near Hot Springs as late as a week ago and affidavits from two phys-icians who examined him that there was no evidence of physical or mental

was no evidence of physical of mental incapacity.

"There is nothing wrong with Mr. Wakelin," Mr. Isgrig asserted. "except that he does not want to go to trial."

In overruling the defense motion for a continuance, Judge Trimble said:

"The government has gone to a big expense in this trial. This man cannot lay down just before the trial and ask for a continuance on the grounds that he is sick."

Defense lawyers then sought a continuance for Wakelin on the grounds that they had been refused in their efforts to examine lists of witnesses. Sam Robinson, lawyer for John Stover, manager of the Hot Springs airport, was as unsuccessful in ob-taining a continuance for his client on the same grounds

Court Says No Bill Of Particulars Needed.

Judge Trimble overruled motion that the district atto in detail the time and place Wakelin was alleged to have to harbor Karpis.

Leon B. Catlett asserted that this



Conspiracy Trial Will Begin Today

One of the most colorful and expensive trials ever held in Arkansas will begin before Federal Judge Trimble in United States District Court at 10 this morning when a petit jury reports to consider charges that seven Hot Springs residents, including three former police officials, conspired to harbor Alvin Karpis, one-time Public Enemy No. 1, in the resort city in 1935 and 1936.

Convict Pilot Testifies In State's Effort to Link Group With Bandit's Escape

LITTLE ROCK (Ark.), Oct. 22. -(INS)-A former accomplice of Alvin Karpis and an airplane pilot testified today in the Government's trial of seven Hot Springs, Ark., residents, who are accused of harboring the gang leader while he was hiding out at the resort.

The accomplice was John Brock, who assisted Karpis, Fred Hunter and Harry Campbell in the train robbery at Garretts-ville, Ohio, November 7, 1935, which netted \$42,000. The pilot was John Zetzer, of Port Clinton, Ohio, who flew Karnis Hunter and Brook to Heal

Karpis, Hunter and Brock to Hot Springs. Brock turned Government's witness shortly after his arrest, and was given a one-hour sentence in custody of the United States marshal.

MONEY EXCHANGED.

Zetzer was sentenced to three years in the Federal penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pa., whence he was brought here to testify.

Both testified that after the robbery, Karpis arranged for the flight to Hot Springs. Karpis paid Zetzer \$600, and when Zetzer continued on to Tulsa with Brock, the latter gave him \$500 more on their arrival there, both testified.

Other witnesses were introduced to show that after arriving at the airport, Johnny Stover, manager of the airport and one of the defendants, took them from the airport to the hotel.

POLICE ON TRIAL.
