MEMORANDUM.

Mr. Clegg telephoned from St. Paul this afternoon. He mentioned the fact that Mr. Keenan telephoned the United States Attorney at St. Paul this afternoon, suggesting that they include the names of Barker and Karpis in the indictment. I told Mr. Clegg that when Mr. Keenan advised me of this action I stated that I would direct him, Mr. Clegg, to talk with the United States Attorney, and take any action which he felt to be proper. Mr. Clegg stated the problem will be to establish interstate transportation. He said that United States attorney Sullivan at one time suggested that his office not be given any more information than necessary so that there would be no basis for our believing there was a leak" in his office. The St. Paul Office then decided not to give the United States Attorney's office any more information than that needed to secure an indictment, and had not told Mr. Sullivan of the cap and the oil cans. Mr. Clegg stated that after Mr. Sullivan talked with Mr. Keenan today, the grand jury was adjourned until tomorrow morning at ten o'clock, which gives ample time to draw up a new indictment. He said that Bremer testified this morning, at which time he mentioned that the cans were in the car. I suggested to Mr. Clegg that he have a confidential talk with the United States Attorney and decide just what action should be taken. I told Mr. Clegg that Mr. Keenan is planning to be in Chicago Monday for the removal hearing in connection with McLaughlin.

METORANDUM

Mr. Purvis advised me by telephone today that John McLaughlin had been arrested and was still being held at the place so that a search could be made. He stated they had been trying for several hours to have a warrant issued, but the United States Attorney was slow in taking the proper action. I then talked to Mr. Nathan. He stated McLaughlin was located at him home at approximately ten o'clock this morning, and left four Agents there to see that McLaughlin is kept incommunicado. He, Mr. Nathan, and Mr. Waters returned to the office at eleven o'clock, and . Mr. Waters immediately proceeded to the office of the United States Attorney to try to draw up a complaint and a warrant. The United States Attorney's office first wanted a copy of the complaint that was being drawn up in St. Paul, which Mr. Nathan felt would not have been necessary. St. Paul submitted the complaint to the Chicago Office over the tele-type, and all the information needed had been furnished the United States Attorney. ### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Reference is made to newspaper articles referring to one William E Weade as a suspect in the Bremer kidnaping case. Under date of January 27, 1934, the Chicago Division office addressed a letter to the St. Paul office advising that on that date Lieutenant Edward J. Kelly of the Confidence Men Detail of the Chicago Police Department had furnished information to the effect that on January 26, 1934, an individual came into the Chicago Police Department and while waiting to see Lieutenant Kelly proceeded to look through an album of pictures of confidence men which is available in Lieutenant Kelly's office. This individual, at first, would not give his name, business, or reason as to why he was looking through the album. After considerable questioning by Lieutenant Kelly, he advised that he had lost \$200.000.00 to a confidence man and that he was endeavoring to identify this individual. This man later advised Lieutenant Kelly that his name was Martin Munderlich, 530 Desnoyer Street, St. Paul, Minnesota; that he was a road contractor having built roads throughout the United States. Wunderlich had evidently met the confidence man in St. Louis, Missouri, where he got him interested in betting on horse races and as a result of his placing bets for him, he at first won \$370,000.00 but did not receive this money until he could put up an amount of money showing that he, Wunderlich, could have paid in the event he had lost; that he approached Edward Bremer who loaned him \$200,000.00, \$100,000.00 having been taken from a safety deposit box. The result of this transaction was that Wunderlich lost \$200,000.00 to the confidence man.

Wunderlich advised Lieutenant Kelly that he had looked over the pictures of confidence men at the St. Paul Police Department and had identified one of the men; that Tom Brown of the Detective Bureau of the St. Paul Police Department would know who the individual was who had been identified. Wunderlich identified from the photographs exhibited to him by Lieutenant Kelly, the photograph of one William E. Meade, Chicago Police Department group picture No. 5647, who was arrested at 2970 Sheridan Road on August 10, 1933, as a fugitive from Lima, Ohio. This individual was returned to Lima and later jumped a

had requested him to keep this information confidential inasmuch as he did not want his bonding company to know that he had been engaged in betting on horse races.

Inspector Rorer in his report dated February 20, 1934, stated that Bremer advised that Wunderlich borrowed \$100,000.00 and not \$200,000.00 from him and that he gave as security a \$100,000.00 Liberty bond and subsequently paid off his indebtedness. Bremer further stated that Wunderlich came to him on the 4th of July, two or three years ago and told him that on the day previous he had visited the Plantation Night Club at White Bear Lake, Minnesota, with a woman who is not his wife and had lost \$6,000.00 gambling; that he had given an I. O. U. and asked Bremer what to do about it. Bremer stated that on that occasion he arranged with the owner of the Plantation Night Club to settle Wunderlich's indebtedness for either \$1,000.00 or \$2,000.00 and claims that in connection with the \$200,000.00 loan to Wunderlich, Wunderlich came to him advising that he needed \$200,000.00 in order to obtain road contracts in the State of Kentucky; that Wunderlich, at that time, had on deposit a little more than \$100,000.00 and he, Bremer, loaned him \$200,000.00 in currency at which time, Wunderlich secured the debt with certificates of deposit in something over \$100,000.00 and subsequently sold Liberty bonds in excess of \$100,000.00 and in that manner paid off the debt. Bremer, when being questioned relative to this transaction advised Inspector Rorer that he would not welcome an investigation of this loan. He was told that the Division would of necessity investigate this loan in order to clear up the matter, whereupon, Bremer stated that he would cooperate with the Agents. Bremer suggested that Wunderlich be interviewed relative to this matter. Bremer explained that the loan to Wunderlich was made shortly after the bank holiday and that the money used was money belonging to the brewery which, due to the bank holiday, had been placed in a safety deposit box.

### <u>M E M O R A N D U M</u>

On January 17, 1934, Edward G. Bremer, President of the Commercial State Bank, St. Paul, Minnesota was kidnaped between 8:15 and 8:45 A.M., immediately after he had driven his daughter to the Summit School. He was taken to a hide-out where he was held until February 7, 1934, when he was released near Rochester, Minnesota after the payment of \$200,000 in ransom money by Walter McGee, who was named by Bremer as the contact man.

In effecting the payment of ransom the kidnapers used three flashlights as signals and Alvin Karpis has since been identified as the purchaser of three such flashlights by a clerk in a St. Paul department store during the time Bremer was held.

Although the place where Bremer was held has not yet been identified, he advised that the car in which he was returned contained a number of gasoline cans used for the purpose of refilling the gasoline tank. He stated that at a point about half way between the place where he was held and Rochester, Minnesota, the kidnapers stopped and filled the gasoline tank with gasoline from these cans. Four gasoline cans, similar to those described by Bremer, were located shortly after Bremer's release at a point about seven miles northwest of Portage, Wisconsin. These cans were forwarded to the Division at Washington and examined for fingerprints which resulted in locating a latent print found to be identical with a fingerprint of Arthur R. Barker, a known associate of Alvin Karpis. Since these identifications were made the Division has prepared and furnished to each of its field offices a detailed memorandum setting forth the modus operandi of the so-called Barker-Karpis gang, which includes, in addition to the two above named, Fred Barker, Volney Davis and Harry Campbell. These individuals are known to be desperate criminals. Arthur Barker was paroled from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma on September 10, 1932, where he was under sentence of life for the crime of murder. Volney Davis was also serving a life sentence at the same institution for the crime of murder and was granted leave of absence November 3, 1932, which leave of absence was extended on June 30, 1932 to July 1, 1934. Fred Barker and Alvin Karpis are wanted by the Sheriff's Office at West Plains, Missouri for the murder of Sheriff C. R. Kelly, during December, 1931.

There is in the possession of each Special Agent of the Division a strip of photographs bearing the likeness and description

of each of the above five named individuals, and each Agent is on the alert to locate and cause the apprehension of these individuals.

Edward G. Bremer has furnished representatives of the Division with information respecting the sounds heard by him during the time he was held captive as well as the description, as nearly as he can recall, of the place wherein he was held. Acting upon the limited information furnished by Bremer, Special Agents of the Division are making every effort to locate the house wherein he was held.

From a description of the wallpaper furnished by Bremer, there has been located a paper, exclusively manufactured for the Sears Roebuck Company, which has been positively identified as being identical with the paper covering the walls of the room wherein he was held.

The car designated by the kidnapers to be used by Walter McGee in making the ransom payment, bore counterfeit emblems of the Shell Oil Company on its sides. An effort is being made to trace the source of the metal used in preparing these emblems with a view to identifying the person who prepared the same. The goggles which were used as a blindfold on Bremer have been recovered and it is possible that these goggles will be traced to the kidnapers. An effort is being made to trace certain articles of clothing which were purchased and given Bremer by the kidnapers.

Prior to the payment of the ransom, a list of all serial numbers of the money used in the payment was obtained. Printed copies of this list have been made by the Division and distributed to all banks in the United States. As a result of this distribution, the officials of the Uptown State Bank, at Chicago, Illinois, on April 23, 1934, notified the Chicago Office of the Division that an individual had that day presented \$900, consisting of currency, which had been identified as part of the Bremer ransom money. A circular letter was immediately forwarded to all banks in Chicago calling attention to the list of ransom previously furnished each bank, with the request that the Chicago Division Office be immediately advised in the event an attempt was made to exchange this money.

On April 26, 1934 representatives of the City National Bank and Trust Company, Chicago, Illinois, reported that an individual had exchanged some of the Bremer ransom money, and that this individual was later identified as William E. Vidler, who frequents a certain address of questionable reputation. As a result of the information furnished

by the officials of this bank, Vidler was taken into custody and there was found on his person \$3,185.00, \$2,625 of which was identified as a part of the Bremer ransom money. Upon being questioned, Vidler advised that he had obtained the money from one John J. McLaughlin, Sr., known to him as "Boss" McLaughlin. On April 28, 1934, McLaughlin was taken into custody and at first stated that he knew nothing concerning the Bremer case, but when advised that his son, Jack McLaughlin, had also been taken into custody, confessed to representatives of the Division his participation in the exchanging of Bremer ransom money at various Chicago banks, assisted by William E. Vidler and Philip J. Delaney.

When John J. McLaughlin, Jr. was taken into custody he denied that he was in possession of any money, but there was located in his hat band a sum of \$300.00, including \$85.00 identified as part of the Bremer ransom money.

John J. McLaughlin, Sr., in confessing his part in the Bremer case, stated that he first negotiated with one Frankie Wright in the lobby of the Sherman Hotel and was later introduced by Wright to individuals known as "Izzy" and "Slim"; that he agreed to exchange the money on a 5% cut basis and understood from information furnished by "Izzy" and "Slim" that the first \$100,000 to be exchanged was the "Hamm" ransom money paid by William F. Hamm of St. Paul to effect his release from a gang of kidnapers, and that \$200,000 paid by Edward G. Bremer would be forthcoming later. None of the Hamm money has been located, however. When William E. Vidler and Philip J. Delaney were taken into custody by Special Agents of the Division, they admitted in signed statements exchanging \$32,000 and \$24,000, respectively, of the ransom money for John J. McLaughlin, Sr.

Based upon the above information, there was returned at St. Paul, Minnesota, on May 4, 1934, a secret indictment charging Arthur R. Barker, Alvin Karpis, John J. McLaughlin, Sr., John J. McLaughlin, Jr., William E. Vidler, Philip J. Delaney, "Slim", "Izzy", Frankie Wright, John Doe and Richard Roe with violation of the Federal Kidnaping Statute dated June 22, 1932.

I telephoned Agent in Charge Purvis at Chicago this morning, and advised him I had been advised by a local representative of a Chicago paper that he had received a telegram from his Chicago office stating that Federal Agents in Chicago yesterday arrested a man and has garnered \$3,000 of the Bremer ransom money. I told him that the Chicago correspondent requested confirmation of this story. Mr. Purvis stated he had no idea how this information had reached the press. He stated Mr. Nathan received an inquiry from the Associated Press this morning, they having received the information from St. Paul. Mr. Purvis felt the story would break today anyway, inasmuch as Mr. Nathan, with several of the Agents, had gone out to pick up McLaughlin, a West Side political man, who is under indictment in connection with a mail robbery. Videler had given the information that he received the Bremer ransom money from McLaughlin. 🔺 🦪 warrant was in process at the time, but the United States Attorney had suggested that they go on out to take McLaughlin into custody. They were trying to do 🔆 this secretly. I told Mr. Purvis that when the story does break, I desire that he indicate exactly what the situation is, namely, that the arrests have been made, and that the persons arrested had some connection with the passing of the money in the Bremer case. I suggested that he not call the newspaper representatives in to give them the story, but just to give a brief statement upon inquiries. Mr. Purvis was reluctant to give out the information, but indicated he felt it would probably be better for the story to be given out at Washington, in view of the apparent feeling against him on the part of Chicago newspapers. In this connection he stated that his photograph was carried in yesterday's Chicago American, with an article mentioning only his "bad breaks". He stated that there is also an unfavorable editorial in the same paper concerning him, Mr. Purvis.

After talking to Mr. Purvis I telephoned Mr. Connor, of the Chicago Daily News, who had advised me of this flash, and stated that we had no comment to make, but suggested that Mr. Purvis would probably give out a statement in Chicago some time today.

Mr. Gates also telephoned to state he had received inquiries from both the Associated Press and United Press concerning this matter. I told him he might state that we are investigating the matter but that we have no comment to make.

I later telephoned Mr. Purvis to advise him of the telephone call received from a Chicago newspaper by Mr. Carusi, stating that an Agent of the Division at St. Paul had informed them that the Bremer money had been recovered, and that Mr. Purvis would give no information. I told him of the statement which I gave Mr. Carusi to the effect that he, Mr. Purvis, was acting upon specific

instructions from Washington not to make any statement concerning this case at the present moment. Mr. Purvis stated he had just given out a statement that Videler was arrested yesterday, and that \$3185 was found on his person; that he had a previous record at Joliet; and that \$2685 was identified as Bremer kidnaping money.

Upon my inquiry, Mr. Purvis stated that the Chicago newspapers which have been particularly hostile toward him are the Chicago American, a Hearst paper; the Chicago Examiner, a Hearst paper also, though run by a separate organization; the Chicago Tribune, which is run by the McCormicks; and the Chicago Times. He stated the Chicago Daily News is also slightly assuming a hostile attitude, though not as much so as the other papers mentioned.

On the evening of May 14, 1934, after receipt of a teletype from Inspector Clegg wherein it was requested to advise the name of the fingerprint expert at the Division who could testify in the development and identification of latent fingerprints found on a gasoline can, and also the Police Department from which the fingerprint card was received in making the identification, I talked with Inspecton flegg after his conversation with Mr. Quinn, and advised him that Aaron Johen, Technical Expert of the Identification Unit, who was then in St. Paul, had made the identification of the latent fingerprints on the gasoline can, and that Mr. J. C. Duncan is indicated on the fingerprint cards as the individual who took the fingerprints of Arthur R. Barker, No. 11059 and No. 11906, both fingerprint cards submitted by the State Penitentiary at McAlester, Oklahoma on January 30, 1921 and February 10, 1922, respectively.

Inspector Clegg amplified his teletype request by requesting the name of the photographer who took the photograph of Alvin Karpis, which photograph had been identified by a clerk at St. Paul as resembling an individual to whom she had sold the flash lights. I told Mr. Clegg that I would obtain this information and have it furnished him immediately. A wire was accordingly sent to the Kansas City Office to ascertain the name of the photographer who had taken the photograph of Karpis at the Kansas State Penitentiary and furnish the information to Inspector Clegg.

All of the above information was confirmed by teletype and telegram on May 14, 1934.







found that the Essentialite lens is not the best lens for welding as it permits different rays to penetrate the glass, which rays have been very harmful to the eyes. Mr. Davis stated, however, that they do carry in stock a small supply of Essentialite lenses and he showed Agent their stock of these lenses which consisted of not more than ten pairs. From the records as above stated, it was learned that these goggles were sold to the fellowing firms and in the following amounts.

> WELDING METALS COMPANY 122 E. LARNED STREET DETROIT, MICHIGAN

At this company the manager advised that their records indicated that they bought the frames only and this was for the purpose of installing their own make of lenses which do not in any way resemble the Essentialite lens. The manager of this company advised that the Welding Metals Company has never handled the Essentialite lens nor do they ever have any calls for them. He stated that because of the fact most of their sales are cash sales sold in the Retail Department, it would be impossible for him to tell to whom these goggles were sold.

> UNI FLO GRILLE CANAL CONTRACTOR 4646 LAWTON AVENUE DETROIT, MICHIGAN

Miss Moyer of the Allied Products Company, of which the Uni Flo Grille is a subsidiary, advised that she was purchasing agent for the Allied Products Company and their subsidiaries and that their records indicated these goggles were purchased on April 16, 1932 and that they bore #6 Cesco Weld ...... lenses. A check was made by her and it was found that these goggles are still in the possession of that company, further stating that their company has never used a goggle with the Essentialite lenses.

> ALLIED PRODUCTS COMPANY 4646 LAWFON AVENUE DETROIT, MICHIGAN

Miss Moyer, purchasing agent of this company, advised that these goggles bore #6 Cesco Weld lenses and that they are still in the possession of that company. This pair of goggles as well as the pair sold to Uni Flo Grille were both shown to Agent.

GRIFFIN WHEEL COMPANY 2270 BESCHER BETROIT, MICHIGAN

Mr. B. A. Compton, Chief Clerk of the Criffin Wheel Company from an examination of their records, advised that they show the purchase of one pair of M & L Goggles, Welders Type, from C. H. Dockson Company and that they bore Super Safety Lenses. These goggles are still in the possession of Griffin Wheel Company and were shown to Agent, At the present time they are equipped with a clear lens. Mr. Compton stated that their company had never had more than one pair of these goggles.

LUDINOFON NEWS COMPANY
4743 FOURTH
DETROIT, MICHIGAN 1 Pair

Mr. A. G. Ludington, Manager of Ludington News Company, when interviewed advised Agent that their company had a fire and theft on March 1934 and at this time the above goggles as well as all their welding and cutting equipment were stolen. Mr. Ludington brought Mr. Everett Hammell, Garageman of the Ludington News Company, to the office and he was interviewed by Agent and advised that he had used the goggles which had been purchased from C. H. Dockson Company and he also verified the theft of the same. He stated, however, these goggles were not equipped with the Essentialite lenses; that it was his impression that they had Super Safety lenses.

LONG MANUFACTURING COMPANY
2768 E. Grand Boulevard
Detroit, Michigan

Mr. R. B. Scott, purchasing manager for the Long Manufacturing Company, was interviewed, verified the purchase of these goggles from his records which showed they were purchased on December 19, 1931, He stated that at the time these goggles were purchased, their company was working on a job for the Studebaker Company; that they had a number of men welding at that time and all goggles were charged to the Welding Department rather than to the men. He stated that as a result of this a number of goggles were lost and that it was impossible to trace this particular pair. He advised, however, that their company has never used an Essentialite lens in any of their goggles. The manager of the stock room as well as the foreman of the Welding Shop of the Long Manufacturing Company were interviewed by Agent and an attempt was made to trace this particular pair of goggles. They stated, however, that although they recalled having some goggles of the type in question in their stock room at one time, they no longer have these and it was impossible to tell what might have happened to them.

PAIMER BEE COMPANY
WESTMINSTER & GRAND TRUNK RAILROAD
DETROIT, MICHIGAN
1 PAIR

The purchasing agent of this company was interviewed and after an examination of his records he advised that the same did not show that their company had ever purchased a pair of these goggles from C. H. Dockson Company. The foreman of the Welding Shop was interviewed by Agent and he immediately recalled these goggles. He stated they were brought over on approval by one of the salesmen for C. H. Dockson Company for workmen who wore glasses, but that this goggle did not prove satisfactory and they were returned the same day. The welding foreman advised he has been with Palmer Bee Company for a number of years and to his knowledge they have never had a pair of goggles in their shop. He further advised that they do not use an Essentialite lense because of the fact that it permits harmful rays to penetrate the eyes.

JEFFERS BROTHERS
DETROIT, MICHIGAN + 1 Pair

At Jeffers Brothers it was learned from Mr. Jeffers, the President of this company, that these goggles were purchased for a man by the name of Henry Michaud, who was doing some welding for their company but that he is no longer with them.

Henry Michaud was located by Agent at the Linwood Garage, 2618 Montgomery Street, Detroit, Michigan and upon being interviewed, advised Agent that these goggles were still in his possession. They were shown to Agent.

CHRYSLER CORPORATION
(Plymouth Plant)
DETROIT, MICHIGAN 6 Pairs

At the general offices of the Plymouth Plant of the Chrysler Corporation, the records were examined and although the records show the receipt of these goggles, the Purchasing Agent advised that it would be impossible to trace the same. He stated that their records indicate that they were sent to the store room where they were placed in stock. He advised that the Chrysler Corporation at that time kept a great quantity of welders goggles

on hand and that these were placed in the bins with the other goggles and that when they were charged out to the man, all goggles were charged out as welders goggles without specifying what make or type. He also stated that occasionally goggles are taken up and sent over to be repaired and sterilized and that one hundred or one hundred and fifty pairs are taken over at one time. When the goggles are taken over to be sterilized, a like number of goggles are brought back at the same time and that once a pair of goggles gets into the factory it looses its identity. The purchasing agent as well as the safety engineer for Chrysler Corporation advised agent, however, that their company has never used an Essentialite lens in goggles.

CHRYSLER CORPORATION
(Kercheval Plant)
DETROIT, MICHIGAN 6 Pairs

At the office of this company the records were examined and they indicate that on May 20, 1932, six pair of Special Cesco Weld Slipover. glasses were received from C. H. Dockson Company. This shipment corresponds as to date and quantity with the fecords of C. H. Dockson Company. However, the type of goggles shown on the records of the Chrysler Kercheval Plant, are not identical with the records of C. H. Dockson Company. The purchasing agent of the Chrysler Kercheval Plant advised it is knowledge their company never and their purchased any of the 524 M & L Welders Model Goggles from C. H. Dockson Company as they have a contract for the purchase of goggles with Boyer Campbell Company of Detroit, Michigan. At this plant Agent was further advised that even if they had purchased this type of goggle it would be impossible to trace them any further than the store room; that during the period in question several hundred; pairs of welders goggles were kept on hand at one time and that when goggles were received at their plant they were taken to the stock room and placed in the bins with all of the other goggles and that a small quantity of goggles would lose identity in the stock room.

The records of this company indicate receipt of the goggles from C. H. Dockson Company and also show that they were sent from the Receiving Department to the stock room. An attempt was made to trace these goggles out of the stock room, however, the storekeeper advised that they have no record to whom these particular goggles were issued nor would it be possible to tell how many of these goggles are still on hand. He advised that several hundred pairs of goggles were kept in stock by their company and that there was a big loss and breakage in this particular item. He advised, however, that their company does not use the Essentialite lens on any of its goggles because of safety regulations.

DEFROIT GRAY IRON FOUNDRY DETROIT, MICHIGAN

At the above company agent was advised that it was impossible to trace these particular goggles any further than the store room; that then is no record to whom these goggles were issued nor was it possible to tell whether these particular goggles are still on hand. They advised that they have ordered a great number of goggles of this general type from C. H. Douksen Company but could not state that happened to these five pairs as the goggles upon being received, are placed in the store room and lose their identity. They advised, however, that their company does not use an Essentialite lense in welders goggles.

> ROBERT WAY 10465 Knodell DETROIT, MICHIGAN

Mr. Way was interviewed by Agent where he was employed at Jack's Welding Shop at the above address. He advised that these goggles are still in the possession of the above company and both pairs were shown to Agent. These goggles do not have an Essentialite lens.

> BOYER CAMPBELL CO. EAST GRAND BOULEVARD DETROIT MICHIGAN

At the above company Mr. Dowdy, manager of the Purchasing Department was interviewed, He stated that their company does a wholesale business and that the goggles purchased from C. H. Dockson Company were later sold by them. From their records it was ascertained that two pairs were sold to the United States Tire Company, two pairs to Holoroft Company and three pairs to Detroit Edison Company; that all seven pairs of these goggles, according to their records, were equipped with Super Safety Lenses.

At the U. S. TIRE COMPANY located on E. Jefferson Street Detroit, Michigan, an examination of their records showed the receipt of these two pairs of goggles on 11/9/32. The records of the store department were examined but it was impossible to trace these goggles beyond the stock. room. The records do not indicate to whom they were ever issued. The manager of the stock room advised that he recalled these goggles but that he has not seen them for perhaps six or eight months. It is impossible to tell whether they are still in their possession and there is a great loss in this particular item.

At the HOLCHOFT COMPANY Detroit, Michigan the records show that two pairs of goggles were received from Boyer Campbell Company on June 21, 1932 but these goggles samnot be traced beyond the stockroom. They are no longer in the possession of Holcroft Company and it is not know to whom these goggles were issued.

At the DETROIT EDISON COMPANY, records show the receipt of three pairs of goggles equipped with Super Safety lenses in June 1952. The purchasing agent of the Detroit Edision Company advised that their company does not use an amber lens in any of its goggles as amber lenses are objected to by the safety department. He stated they keep a large supply of goggles on hand at all times and that these goggles were placed with their supply and it is impossible to tell from their records to whom they were issued or to what plant they might have been sent as equipment of this kind is all purchased through the main office and might be sent to plants in other cities and that their record would show that a sertain number of goggles were sent out but would not show what type or make.





It will be noted that in an effort to obtain possession of mail addressed to certain patrons of the post office at White Bear Lake, Minnesota, a special agent of the Department of Justice sent a spurious forwarding order (copy herewith) to the postmaster at White Bear Lake, directing that the mail in question be forwarded to St. Paul, Minnesota. We have been informed that the special agent who accompanied Inspector Streich to White Bear Lake prior to the time the forwarding order was sent is Mr. E. J. Notesteen.

It appears that a violation of 18 U.S. C. 317 (Section 2347, Postal Laws and Regulations of 1932) would have occurred except for the intervention of the inspector, and the matter is brought to your attention for suitable action.



1. On January 24th, last, Mr. Werner Hanni, the special agent in charge of the local office of the Department of Justice, advised you, as I recall it, that he was interested in some mail which evidently was being held for delivery through a lock box to Kr. E. Y. Davis at White Bear Lake, Minnesota. It is understood that it was stated that Mr. Davis was suspected of a law violation, and it was indicated that I should, if possible, accompany a Department of Justice agent to White Bear Lake for the purpose of examining Mr. Davis' mail. Your wishes were complied with, and, as a result, the Department of Justice agent (whose name I do not remember) took tracings of the handwriting on the one letter and one postal card which we found in Mr. Davis' box. The latter contained a third piece of mail but this article consisted only of a motor vehicle registration card issued by the State Automobile Department at St. Faul, Minnesota.

2. On the morning of January 26th, the postmaster at white Bear Lake indicated in a long-distance telephone call that he had received an order for the forwarding to the Saint Paul general delivery of the mail which he was holding for Mr. Davis and inquired whether the request should be complied with. Inasmuch as assurances were given that the forwarding order appeared to be genuine and regular, the inquiry was replied to in the affirmative and interrogation was made concerning the time at which the mail would be dispatched. Upon being advised that the forwarded matter would arrive in Saint Paul on Duluth and Minneapolis R. . D., Train 61, which is due here at 12:45 F. M., this information was communicated to the local office of the Department of Justice.

3. At about 1:30 P. H. on January 26th, the agent in whose company I had visited White Bear Lake called on me and confided that he or one of his associates had filed the forwarding order

Reference is made to your memorandum dated March 18, 1954, wherein you requested suggestions in connection with an attached letter dated March 26, 1954, addressed to the Attorney General by Postmaster General James A. Farley, forwarding a copy of a report submitted under date of March 16, 1954, by Inspector John Streich, St. Paul, Minnesota, reporting the activities of Special Agents attached to the St. Paul Office of this Division, whereby the Postmaster at White Bear Lake, Minnesota had been requested to forward to General Delivery at St. Paul, Minnesota the contents of certain Post Office boxes located in the Post Office at Thite Bear Lake.

In connection with the investigation into the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer at St. Paul, Minnesota on January 17, 1954, evidence was obtained by Special Agents of this Division, indicating that certain individuals suspected of perpetrating this kidnaping, had rented Post Office boxes 254 and 545 at White Bear Lake, using the aliases E. V. Davis and E. L. Murrey, respectively. These boxes had been rented on January 12, 1934, five days before Bremer was kidnaped, and it seems reasonable to assume that the rental of these boxes was a part of the modus operandi of the kidnaping, and consequently it was of paramount importance that the full facts some cerning these boxes be secured. Special Agent E. H. Hotesteen, id a memorandum dated January 24, 1954, advised that he went, in company with Post Office Inspector Streich, to White Bear Lake, Minnesota, where Postmaster Fred F. Campbell was contacted, and with the assistance of these Post Office officials, the contents of Post Office boxes 254 and 545 were examined. Tracings were made by Special Agent Notesteen of certain letters found in these boxes and a registration card from the Secretary of State, directed to E. L. of the fact that the Postmaster was present during all of the examination of the letters, Mr. Streich decided against opening same."

The combinations on the two lock boxes were changed, and the mail returned to them, so that any person calling for the mail would of mecessity be required to call for the mail at the window, and in the event such a call was received, the Chief of Police at White Bear Lake was to be notified so that the individual calling for the mail could be taken into custody, and the Post Office authorities, as well as representatives of this Division could immediately be notified. Several days after these arrangements had been perfected, Special Agent Motesteen had occasion to confer with Inspector Streich, at which time Mr. Streich advised that the mail of Boxes 254 and 845 had been ordered removed to General Delivery, Post Office, St. Paul, Minnesota, and he further stated that he believed Agent Notesteen was responsible for the removal order, but Agent Notesteen denied that he was responsible. On the following day, Inspector Straich telephonically advised Agent Notesieen that he had ordered the above mail returned to the White Bear Post Office.

As a result of inquiries made at the St. Paul Office of this Division, it has been ascertained that Special Agent C. G. Hall, Acting in Charge of the office, was under the impression that it had not been possible for Special Agent Notesteen to obtain information concerning the contents of the two lock boxes, located at White Bear Lake, and therefore had sent a forwarding order to White Bear Lake, requesting that the mail found in the lock boxes be forwarded to General Delivery at St. Paul, Minnesota, where same could be examined by Special Agents of this Division, Incidentally, it is noted that the photostat copy of the forwarding order for Box 254 attached to the report of Inspector John Streich, is informal and anonymous and may not have been, or premaps should not have been complied with under the circumstances. However, Special Agents attached to the St. Paul Office

of this Division are being cautioned to refrain from doing enything during the course of their investigations which will be a violation of the Postal Laws and Regulations in the future.




