



MEMORANDUM FOR MR. CLEGG. *Referred*

Reference is made to the letter dated May 19, 1934, from the Chicago Division Office in connection with the case designated BREKID, describing the beer bottles and other material which were brought to the Division at Washington by Mr. Aaron Kohn, fingerprint classifier, from the Chicago Office for the developing and photographing of latent fingerprints.

It is the general policy of the Division to require Special Agents conducting these investigations to develop latent fingerprints on such objects. In connection with this particular case I am informed by Mr. Kohn that he reached Chicago enroute from St. Paul and had a two hour lay-over in the former city, at which time he visited the Chicago Division Office. Mr. Kohn has informed me that Special Agent Chaffetz and later Mr. Purvis requested that he stay and assist in the development of certain latent fingerprints on these materials which had been just brought into the Chicago Office by Special Agent Chaffetz. As a result Mr. Kohn did not take the next train but took a train twelve hours later out of Chicago and upon leaving Chicago brought with him to the Division one case of 24 beer bottles together with other miscellaneous articles in the collection.

With regard to bringing the material into the Division the Chicago letter of reference, dated May 19, makes the statement, "Mr. Kohn stated it would be impossible to obtain latent fingerprints properly, from these articles, particularly the bottles, without the use of the Division equipment. I, therefore, requested him to personally transport to the Division, the following articles for laboratory examination." On the contrary, Mr. Kohn informs me that it was Agent Chaffetz and the photographer assigned to the Chicago Office who informed him that photographic equipment was not sufficient in the Chicago Office to permit the photographing of the latent prints and that Agent Chaffetz had previously been unsuccessful in recording latent fingerprints with a fingerprint camera. Subsequently both Special Agents Purvis and Chaffetz requested that Mr. Kohn bring the material into the Division. Mr. Kohn states he did not make the statement attributed to him in the Chicago letter.



SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Alleged hideout in Seago Hills, northern Oklahoma, has not been located to date. Valney Davis is applying for a pardon from Oklahoma through Dealey Lester, law clerk, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, who promises to furnish all information known to him regarding Davis, or his associates. Davis has recently received from several separate sources reliable information that the Barker-Karpis gang has recently been in the state of Oklahoma and is hanging out in either Tulsa, Muskogee, or Claremore, Oklahoma. Several confidential informants in the vicinity of Tulsa, Oklahoma promised to cooperate and assist in apprehending this band.



REFERENCE: Letter from Kansas City office dated May 14, 1934, and report of Special Agent Paul Ranson, Oklahoma, May 19, 1934.

DETAILS:

Information having been obtained by the Oklahoma City office from letters from the Kansas City office dated April 29, 1934, concerning an alleged hideout in the Seago Hills, northern Oklahoma, alleged to be frequented by "Doc" Barker and the gang, and the Seago Hills, an Indian name (not official), opinion was expressed by fugitives, inquiry was made at the sheriff's offices of Muskogee, McAlester, V. S. Custer and Woodward, Oklahoma, and the Sheriff's Report from McAlester is as follows:



Egbert Brown was interviewed at Okotah and advised that he has seen a Melvin Miller and is a part Creek Indian, about 38 years old, living near Okotah. There is no Okotah in Oklahoma and there is no Melvin Miller living in Okotah. In all probability the Melvin Miller of Okotah is the Miller spoken of by the informant Open A. Kitaking, an inmate of the State Penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas. Brown said that he would not say if Melvin Miller is a contact to either Jim Clark or "Doc" Barker, but that he is a person who has very little regard for law and order and is not capable of acting in the capacity of a contact man for bank robbers. Brown advised that Miller has a brother, Jay Miller, about 36 years old, a "two time loser", once at Granite Reformatory and then at McAlester penitentiary for robbery with firearms. This brother Jay is now living in California with two other brothers, Gavil and Floyd Miller. The two younger brothers probably are employed as ordinary laborers in Santa Barbara. Brown said that Melvin Miller sells "Rapper's Weekly", a Negro paper, which is out of town a considerable part of the time. Brown said that it is entirely reasonable that Miller should be present in this part of the country as he does not seem to be set out to be a molester. He has never heard of Melvin Miller being connected with Jim Clark, nor has he ever personally, and has never heard of his being connected with the Barker gang. Brown will keep a very close lookout on the home of Melvin Miller and if his home answers the description of the Miller spoken of by the informant Open A. Kitaking and if any thing happens at his place which is suspicious, he will notify the Sheriff at Muskogee, Oklahoma, the Oklahoma City Police and the Oklahoma City office.

Sheriff Dick Conner, Pawhuska, Oklahoma, after receiving information of the directions given by informant Kitaking concerning the location of his hideout in the Osage Hills between Bartlesville and Pawhuska, Oklahoma, advised that there could be no hideout located in the section where the directions were alleged.

The Oklahoma City office requested the Tulsa office to have a map prepared at the direction of Kitaking concerning the location of his hideout and accompanied with the letter of reference and a copy of the letter from Kitaking. Deputy Sheriff Fred McCallister, Pawhuska, Oklahoma, and his wife endeavored to locate this hideout, but after driving around in the vicinity for several miles it seemed certain that this hideout is not in the exact place shown on the map prepared by the informant Kitaking. This oil company located at the point where the alleged "place" is supposed to be taking care of some oil wells is the Atlantic Refining Company. About one mile to the east of this location one to two miles to a tidalOsage Island.




by Mrs. Hoffman, [REDACTED] is of the opinion from what Mrs. Hoffman said that Davis is probably in either Kansas or Missouri. [REDACTED] would advise the writer of any future developments concerning this parole and will immediately get in touch with the writer, if he receives any information whatever concerning Davis or any of his associates. [REDACTED] asked that his name be treated in a very confidential manner and asked that he be permitted to deal with but one Agent, as he said that he realizes that when one undertakes to give information regarding any of the Barker gang that he is taking his life in his own hands should that mob ever find out where the information came from. [REDACTED] also advised that Mrs. Hoffman said her brother Volney calls her on the telephone occasionally and it was [REDACTED] opinion that if that telephone were watched closely, some valuable information would probably be obtained concerning where Davis is hanging out.

This angle of the investigation was discussed with Mr. S. P. Cowley of the Division in Washington, who granted Acting SAC Earle M. Black authority to hire a special employee to make a record of all calls coming in or going out from 2-7866 in Tulsa, the telephone number of Mrs. L. B. Hoffman, sister-in-law of Volney Davis. Arrangements have therefore been made [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] This angle is thought to be important at this time, especially in view of the fact that there will apparently be some negotiations between Volney Davis and his sister concerning his parole within the next two or three weeks.

Melissa Bevans, 1433 East 2nd Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma, who operates a beauty parlor there and who is a former underworld character, was interviewed by the writer and at first refused to give any information concerning this matter as she said she had been giving information to Agent H. E. Hollis and she did not propose to be giving information to every person who came along. After talking with her at some length, however, she advised that only a few days before the interview she was told by Roy Sexton, a brother-in-law to one Lon Webb, that nine members of the Barker gang had recently been in the vicinity of Tulsa and that some of them had stayed with his brother-in-law Webb, who was living either at Sperry or Turley, Oklahoma and had recently moved to Tulsa. Sperry and Turley are very small places just a few miles out of Tulsa. Melissa said that she did not question this informant concerning the exact address where Webb had moved for fear the informant would think she was trying to get some information which might be used to apprehend these people. An extensive investigation was made to try and locate the exact address where Webb is now living, but it has not been determined to date, and investigation along this line will be continued in the immediate future. Melissa has promised the writer to communicate with him or to communicate with Deputy Sheriff Tony Benson if she receives any information concerning any of this mob.



Oklahoma to Tulsa, Oklahoma and let them out on Admiral and Federal Streets in Tulsa, where they all got into a new 4-door Chevrolet Sedan. Warner later gave the writer confidentially the name of this cab driver, which was Mack Winnery. Winnery went to school with Fred Barker and knows probably all of the Barker gang and Warner feels that he will be able to obtain some information either from Mack Winnery or his father and that he does not know promised to advise the writer concerning any information of value he receives.

It might be stated here that along this same line Captain Stewart, former Captain of Detectives, Tulsa, Oklahoma Police Department, was advised by a confidential informant, and the same informant who gave information leading to the apprehension of Glen Roy Wright and others near Mannford, Oklahoma, that on this same date, May 25, 1934, these same outlaws were hauled into Tulsa from Turley by some cab driver, whose name he refused to give. The information concerning the transfer of these men to Mack Winnery is supposed to have been given at 10:00 A.M. on that date.


Charlie Warner introduced the writer to Bob Hyde, a former Police officer in Tulsa, who says that he has an informant who he thinks will eventually be able to obtain information which will lead to the apprehension of this mob. Hyde also advised that Karpis is alleged to have a home near Bristow, Oklahoma and this angle will be checked in the near future.


Deputy Sheriff "Doe" Ridworth, Chandler, Oklahoma, telephoned Special Agent F. S. Smith at Oklahoma City and advised that Carol Hamilton Tankersley, former wife of Herman Barker, the eldest of the Barker brothers, had promised him to help any way she could to apprehend the Barker gang and would talk to Agent Smith concerning this matter. Post Office Inspectors George Hill and E. W. Haines, Tulsa, Oklahoma, advised that Carol Hamilton Tankersley had been instrumental in effecting the apprehension of Fred Barker when he was last apprehended in Tulsa and they expressed themselves as having all the faith in the world in what Carol can do, and they said they believed she would be absolutely reliable and do what she said she would do.

The writer, in company with Agent F. S. Smith, interviewed Carol Hamilton Tankersley, where she is now living at 13½ East Brady Street, Apartment 4, Tulsa, Oklahoma. She can be reached over Telephone No. 4-6614.

It might be stated here that Carol Hamilton Tankersley is a French Canadian and Sioux Indian. She has a rather striking personality, is about 38 years old and is extremely well educated for one of her station. She is fearless and when her former husband, Herman Barker, was living, she associated with him very closely and without any doubt, from all reports, was the leader of the former Barker gang. She planned most of the bank robberies and


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




information concerning these subjects and will furnish the writer concerning any information which he receives.

The Corolla, North Carolina, station of the W. E. Johnson company, reported that Mr. W. E. Johnson, president of the company, had recently visited the town of Corolla, North Carolina, and that he had been shown a photograph of a man, of medium size, wearing a dark suit, a light shirt, and a dark tie, and a dark hat, and that he was wearing a watch chain and a ring. The man was described as being about 30 years of age.



In connection with the above, it would be an interesting observation to have the total amount of funds and securities recovered by banks throughout the country through the action of the State Bankers Association at Minneapolis, Minnesota, and also the number of bank robbers and the like, who have been identified through the investigative activities of that agency. I have pursued this information through reading various reports submitted through all the field offices of the Division and the total amount of recoveries is considerable, whereas the number of identifications is negligible.

If it is possible to obtain these figures through the American Bankers Association or some confidential source it would throw much light on the situation in St. Paul and Minneapolis with regard to the tie-up between the underworld and the police departments there. Of course, under this set-up usually the Federal Detective Agency receives large amounts of information. It is easy to understand why no identification can be expected from that quarter in establishing the identity of the criminal for the purpose of preventing further crime.

My dear Judge:

I am sending the history of lawsuits which have been brought to the government which the Department of Justice has been compelled to file in the northern division of Illinois against the general of Matapedia, Quebec, who was connected with the general of the Russian Revolution.

Positive complaints were filed in the United States Court of Appeals against the general of Matapedia, Quebec, in October, 1904, and against Matapedia, Quebec, in January, 1904. The general rulings on the two cases were made by United States Commissioner Tolson, who identified agents of Yekaterinburg, Russia, as subjects who produced forged documents in behalf of the Republic of Matapedia. The general, the head of the secret police of Russia, had received the forged documents from the American Commissar of the Russian Revolution.

The general of Matapedia, Quebec, was compelled to file his defense in the United States Court of Appeals, May 13, 1905, and the decision of the court was rendered in the Declaration of Judgment, June 1, 1905, in which the general of Matapedia, Quebec, was compelled to pay \$100,000.00 in damages to the United States Government.

regardless of reported objections by the Government, insisted that this question was not competent since the Plaintiff had only necessary features to be established at a hearing in several cases on indictments, the Agent was forced to answer the question.

At 5:30 P.M. on May 7, the United States Attorney adjourned the hearing and the Commissioner adjourned the hearing until the Government and defense counsel could agree upon the indictment to be argued on May 8, so that the defense could have made and the Commissioner requested that he be present until May 12. On May 12, when the defense appeared before him, the Commissioner informed the defense that on May 14, in order to consider further and to receive information from the Department of Justice, he would adjourn the hearing until Friday afternoon.

It is obvious from the record that the Commissioner, Walker, went to great lengths to try the case on his own, and to keep the disclosure of the entire evidence from the defense, and the Department of Justice, to the best of his knowledge, although the only question he has is whether or not he can do this in the interests involved.

The Department of Justice, through its legal and investigating forces, and through its Office of Intelligence have made the most strenuous efforts to further the interests of justice. The Commissioner has the responsibility to end the proceedings in this case, and to give the defense a hearing on the motion of the defense, and to adjourn the hearing for such time as may be necessary.








Based upon circular letters which were transmitted from the St. Paul Office to various individuals, including law enforcement officers, municipal, fire department employees, priests, ministers, postmasters, game wardens, and State Conservation Commission employees, replies were received, and the information included in such messages has been tabulated for the purpose of aiding in the location of the hideout of MR. EDWARD GEORGE BREWER, victim in the above entitled case. The towns, cities, and villages which are to be listed herein have been arranged alphabetically. The first group will reflect those municipalities in which there were reported to be four or more possibilities of sounds or noises existing as were described by MR. BREWER in the location of the hideout. Secondly, the towns are being listed as those which possess three possibilities. It is believed that they should be given attention, with those possessing the larger number of possibilities being given preferred consideration.

For the information of recently created offices to whom this communication is being forwarded, there is attached hereto a memorandum prepared in the Division reflecting in summarized form the various sounds and circumstances as reported during various interviews with MR. 
MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Dear Sir:

I am Mr. Edward G. Bremer, the man known as John R. Brown, for the first time and without survey of a number of towns in Wisconsin and Illinois for the purpose of locating the victim by the kidnappers. During my time I endeavored to relieve the pressure which existed in the post between Mr. Brown and myself by engaging him in informal conversations and by suggesting him to informal conversations, trying to pick up whatever I could find to qualify the "bad picture" as we now have it in our minds with the kidnappers. I am satisfied to believe that Mr. Bremer has given us a true picture to the best of his knowledge, although it may have been given reluctantly. My belief are that we have not been told the whole story. Bremer lied to us, although he did not mean to change his story at originally. It was apparent and I have informed by Special Agent V. H. Petersen and others that Mr. Bremer did not like Inspector Boror from the outset, ordered him out of his house on one occasion and refused to cooperate with Inspector Boror. With this in mind, I mentioned the suggestion to him that representatives of the Division, working on the angle of investigation seeking the location of the hideout, will be greatly surprised when the hideout is finally located because it will in no way fit the description as given by Mr. Bremer and interpreted by them. Mr. Bremer stated that he, no doubt, will be greatly surprised himself regarding the general setting of the ground around the hideout, the location of the different rooms within the hideout, and he will positively identify the room in which he does his work. Further, that when the hideout is located, it will be found not in a town where the noises indicated by him are present, the two dominating noises being the siren coincident with a whistle on a weekday morning and the same whistle each morning at the church bell each Saturday afternoon and the noon bell each noon on Sunday mornings and a second church bell each noon. Mr. Bremer remarked, "When you fellows locate the hideout, nothing will give me greater pleasure than facing your man Inspector Boror and telling him, 'I told you so'." In view of my attitude toward Mr. Boror, this remark indicated to me that Mr. Bremer has given information to the best of his knowledge regarding these sounds heard by him and would like to see the hideout located so that he can be placed in the position of being able to make such a remark, not only to Mr. Boror, but to the other representatives of the Division. With this placed in mind, I feel that Mr. Bremer cannot expect the Division to locate the hideout unless he has given a true picture.


I am confident that the hideout will eventually be located by either one of three alternatives: first, locating a town having the sounds indicated by Mr. Bremer; second, in the course of the investigation by locating some other






Fig. 1. *Continued*.

Detective Agency. In this connection your attention is invited to  
the report of Special Agent R.C. Burns, dated January 22, 1934, at  
Kansas City, Missouri, in connection with the KARDO case, which pro-  
flets information concerning the Coercia, Kansas, bank robbery and  
refers to GORDON as having received some of the bonds stolen from that  
bank.

Attention is also invited to the memorandum addressed  
to Inspector Rorer on March 1, 1934, by Special Agents Nicholson and  
Hall of the St. Paul Office, as shown on pages 8 and 9 of the report  
of Special Agent O.C. Hall, dated March 2, 1934, at St. Paul, Minnesota,  
in connection with the BREWELL case.

Special Agent S.W. Hardy has advised me that he had  
heard from some official, concerning whose identity he is not now  
certain, during the course of the investigation to locate KAZING and  
BOLDEN several months ago, that WALTER A. GORDON of the Burns Detective  
Agency in Minneapolis, Minnesota, is alleged to have served a term in  
either the South Dakota State Prison, or some prison in the State of  
Illinois. The description of GORDON, as outlined in the teletype ad-  
dressed to the Division suggesting that his record be searched in the  
Identification Unit, was furnished by Special Agent S.W. Hardy, who has  
personally seen GORDON.

Special Agent George Costello has advised me that about ten years ago, when Costello was in the town of Hiore, Montana, he conferred with Mr. R.C. Timmons, the sheriff at that town, and the Sheriff informed Costello that V. Gordon had served a term in State Prison on a charge of burglary, or robbery. I had Special Agent Costello telephone Sheriff Timmons, who is still holding office, and Sheriff Timmons agreed to search through his old records for the purpose of obtaining a photograph of GORDON on which might appear a police, or prison, number through which an identification and criminal record might be obtained. On June 4, 1934, Agent Costello received the following telegram from Sheriff Timmons:

"Subject mentioned in telephone this AM reported convicted and served time in state prison for crime of burglary unable to procure picture at this time will forward soon as possible."

I requested Mr. Costello to forward over his own signature a telegram to Sheriff Timmons asking him to transmit, by straight message, any additional information which he was able to obtain.

The above information and that which follows, as dictated by Special Agent S.W. Hardy, was telephoned to Mr. Dunn of the Division on June 8, 1934.

[REDACTED] of the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension, St. Paul, Minnesota, (who asked that his name be kept confidential), states that GORDON is a friend of HARRY SAWYER, and although he has no evidence to support his belief that many acts on the part of GORDON during the past five years in connection with Minnesota bank robberies have led him to believe that, perhaps, GORDON is connected in some way with the BARKER-KARPIS gang, as GORDON has been able in the past, according to information coming to [REDACTED] to recover some of the bonds stolen in bank robberies which were supposed to have been committed by BARKER and KARPIS. [REDACTED] states that invariably, when a bank is robbed in Minnesota, GORDON will appear to interview parties who have seen the bank robbery and will state positively that he knows who committed the robbery and will scoff at identifications made by parties in the robbed bank from photographs shown them, if the identifications are not of parties whom GORDON has named as the ones who committed the bank robbery and, since the ones GORDON names are invariably not the parties who committed the bank robbery, [REDACTED] has begun to suspect that GORDON tries to force these wrong identifications purposely. He cites the instance of the bank which was robbed

at Brainerd, Minnesota, early in November, 1938, in which a guard at the bank, who had previously been a state highway patrolman, immediately talked with one of the bank robbers for approximately 15 minutes minutes before the bank was robbed, and this man later positively identified the photograph of "BABY FACE" NELSON as being the robber whom he had talked to before the robbery and, in this instance, GORDON was to [REDACTED] and tried to persuade [REDACTED] that this man was wrong in his identification of "BABY FACE" NELSON and, according to [REDACTED] information, GORDON even wrote a letter to the President of the Brainerd Bank, pleading that this man was wrong in his identification of "BABY FACE" NELSON as one of the robbers. [REDACTED] stated that he, personally, does not know whether GORDON has a criminal record or not but suggested that Agent see Mr. Charles D. Brown, who formerly was the manager of the Protection Department of the Minnesota Bankers' Association, and who is now located at 710 National Building, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

MR. CHARLES D. BROWN was interviewed and submitted two photographs of WALTER S. GORDON, which he states he secured from Superintendent of Police C. V. McPhail of the Houston, Texas, Police Department, April 8, 1938, with a letter in which Superintendent McPhail states that the original records in the case in which GORDON was arrested in Houston, Texas, have been destroyed, but that he had been able to secure the record from parties to whom the Texas Police Department furnished a copy at the time of GORDON's arrest; that the Houston Police records now show that GORDON was arrested on December 24, 1937, under the name of W.S. GREEN alias WALTER S. GORDON; that it is alleged that on February 28, 1938, GREEN took part in the robbery of the Missouri City Bank, at Missouri City; that, although the record of the Houston Police department is not clear, it would appear that GORDON alias GREEN was in some manner working in conjunction with the officers and his associate, EDWARD M. HARPER alias EDWARD DUNCAN, claims that the job was tipped off in a dream to the Kansas City officers; that GORDON is also supposed to have served a term in the Kansas State Reformatory but the Houston, Texas, Police have no data on this; that the Houston Police photograph of GORDON was being furnished with Mr. McPhail's letter; however, no fingerprints were taken of GORDON at Houston.

MR. CHARLES D. BROWN also furnished copy of a letter written by Superintendent C. V. McPhail of the Houston, Texas, Police Department, January 28, 1938, to Chief of Police J. S. Lubbeheimer, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in which Mr. McPhail states that in connection with the arrest of GORDON under his alias W.S. GREEN, that McPhail had interviewed MR. SMITH, one of

The arresting officers of the Houston Police Department, and that SMITH remembers having arrested GORDON alias GORDON about December 20, 1927, for cutting a tent covering a hobby-horse machine and stealing a block and tackle, which he passed; that Officer Smith states he later informed GORDON on the street, for investigation, and that GORDON was identified by the pawn shop keeper as the party who had passed the block and tackle. That charges of burglary and theft were made against GORDON, at two times. That same furnished in order that GORDON might turn State's evidence against a band of safe crackers at Kansas City; that the index book of the Houston, Texas, Gallery shows that GORDON was photographed at that time as Houston Police Department #109, but the record was missing; that the telephone operator at the Houston Police Department identified GORDON as being wanted in Kansas City and it was through this identification that the Kansas authorities persuaded GORDON to turn State's evidence in the safe cracking cases; that Officer Smith also stated that GORDON later became a Burns Detective operator at Kansas City, and believes that his record at the Houston Police Department was disposed of through the influence of the Burns Detective Agency. Mr. McPhail further states that he received a communication from Mr. Roy S. Smart, Superintendent of the Identification Bureau, Police Department, Great Falls, Montana, under date of March 12, 1924, requesting GORDON'S photograph, record, information, etc.; and Superintendent McPhail states that, perhaps, the Chief of Police at Kansas City, or Mr. Smart of Great Falls, Montana, might be able to furnish more data regarding GORDON.

Photograph of GORDON, taken at the Houston, Texas, Police Department in 1927, their #109, is being forwarded to the Division herewith and one copy of same is being retained in the St. Paul file. Copies of the letters above referred to are enclosed herewith.
