### Personal Attention

Mr.J.Edgar Hoover, Director, Division of Investigation, U.S.Department of Justice, Washington, D.C.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

I refer to your letter dated June 19,1934, in which you make inquiry as to when it will be possible for me to be relieved of my assignment at St.Paul in order to return to Washington.

In confirmation of my recent conversation with you by telephone, during the coming week I am scheduled to be in Hibbing, Minnesota, to appear before the Minnesota Peace Officers Association and this is the only definite commitment, at present, for which arrangements have been made.

In a recent conversation with Mr. Bremer, however, I have obtained from him an agreement to meet with all the agents on the special assignment here in informal session so that he can discuss with them, orally, and portray his ideas as to the description of the hideout in a manner which may be more impressive than reading of reports by the individual agents. I have discussed this arrangement, subsequently, with Mr.Ladd and I believe it would be possible for practically all the agents, both those assigned to the St. Paul Office and those on special assignment, to be in St. Paul over the week-end of June 30-July 1,1934. Following this meeting which, frankly, I would like to attend, I know of no particular reason which would make it necessary for me to remain here as I find that Mr.Ladd, who had already closely studied all serials in the Bremer and Dillinger files which had been transmitted to St. Louis, has likewise taken time to make a personal study of the voluminous files in this office relating to the same case.

Special Agent D.L. Nicholson, the invester one man at the St. Paul Office perhaps has a more intimate knowledge of the various details of these two files than anyone else in St. Paul and I have

intentionally been routing copies of all correspondence to Agent Nicholson so that, if circumstances warranted, he could be of inestimable value to Mr.Ladd due to his knowledge of these cases.

I feel that perhaps the most important consideration, in the handling of these cases at St.Paul, is to avoid assignment of the agents to collateral issues of minor importance when, in their enthusiasm, they learn of some contingent circumstance having no direct bearing on the case and offering but little possibility of being helpful in the investigation of the cases. The further investigation of these cases, particularly the Bremer case, it appears to me, is to hew as closely as circumstances will permit to the line of the program that has been arranged for the systematic search for the hideout and efforts to locate the suspects. I do think that it would be advisable for someone to drop into St. Paul for perhaps a day at a time, about once each month, primarily for the purpose of determining that a proper program is arranged and is being consistently followed. I think, however, that such visit might just as well be made, let us say, to St. Paul by either Mr. Furvis or Kr. Cowley from Chicago, and to Chicago by Mr. Ladd or Mr. Connelley. In other words, by having someone from another office come into the St. Paul Office or the Chicago Office for a period of one day only it will help the Agent in Charge, or Supervisor, keep his feet on the ground and prevent his going off on wild and unnecessary tangents.

At the present time, those working on special assignment out of the St. Paul Office are largely absent from the office looking for the Bremer hideout as the result of telephone calls made from Madison to all points in Southern Wisconsin, covered by the St. Paul Office, south of a line drawn from Fountain City to Green Bay, Wisconsin. We have been able to locate twenty-three places where a siren and whistle sound simultaneously at noon, or earlier. Investigation should be concentrated in these places. If the investigations there are not successful in locating the hideout, I believe that it would be wise to next concentrate in the State of Iowa, Mastern Nebraska, and Southern Minnesota. The same program, which is the one presently being carried forward in Northern Illinois and Southern Wisconsin, could, of course, be followed in those territories. With the knowledge already acquired by Special Agent in Charge Ladd and the assistance which Special Agent Nicholson is able to offer, I feel that they will be able to continue this or any other suggested program just as well without my presence here. In the event my remaining here for the weekend of June 30-July 1,1934, for the conference with Mr. Bremer and the

agents is approved, the next commitment of which I am aware is July 12,1934, at some place near Jacksonville, Florida, where I am scheduled to discuss certain subjects for a Peace Officers School for the State Authorities.



The fingerprint she thought she had was supposed to be on a receipt for a premium on a life insurance policy signed by M. Frentzel, a life insurance agent for the Northwest Life Insurance Company, office at Seattle, Washington. She admitted that she knew of no crime he had committed; that he was married and had grown children; based her suspicions on the remark of Frentzel that he had to keep stepping to keep from the law. That Frentzel operates a great deal at Aberdeen.

She had a photograph of Frentzel who she described as:

She spoke of several persons she knew in that section, particularly one Joseph Calder, with whose son she kept company and was to be married some 20 years ago.

Joseph Calder, a real estate and insurance agent, known to Agent for 40 years, stated he was well acquainted with the informant who was past 40 years of age and considered very intelligent. That she formerly worked in the Hays Bank at Aberdeen, Washington (now defunct) and recently had been trying to sell life insurance with no success. Recently she returned to her father, Dan Gleeson, a widower, and was assisting in keeping house.

No criminal record of Frentzel could be found at the office of the Sheriff of Grays Harbor County (Montesano) or at the office of the Aberdeen Police. It appearing that informant has nothing of interest to the Division and her letter is founded on a hysteria this matter will be deemed closed.





TO THE JUDGES OF THE DISTRICT COURT OF THE UNITED STATES FOR THE NORTHERN DISTRICT OF ILLINOIS.

#### Gentlemen:

The undersigned, being the committee to whom was referred the letter from the Assistant to the Attorney General of the United States to Judge Wilkerson, wherein the attention of the judges was called to the proceedings before United States Commissioner Walker in the McLaughlin cases, beg leave to report as follows:

First. One of the matters of which complaint was made in said letter was the allowance by the Commissioner of alleged improper cross-examination. We have examined the transcripts of the proceedings in the cases referred to, which were filed as part of the returns to writs of certiorari issued in said cases, and upon such examination find that the Commissioner was exceedingly careful in his rulings on evidence, and, in our opinion, properly limited the cross-examination of witnesses who identified the defendants.

Second. The second matter of which complaint was made was unnecessary delay of the proceedings. We have looked into that matter, and do not believe that there was unreasonable delay, or any delay which was not reasonably mecessary to the due and orderly administration of justice.

Third. The other matter of which complaint was made was the alleged intoxication of one of the attorneys who appeared for one or more of the defendants. The transcripts above referred to, which we have examined, indicate that the defendant or defendants in question were represented by other counsel as well as by the attorney who is said to have been intoxicated. Accordingly, we assume that the rights of the defendants were not prejudiced. We do not find in the transcripts any protests by counsel for the Government, and therefore assume that the rights of the Government were not prejudiced by the intoxication of the attorney in question, if he was intoxicated.

In conclusion, your committee has to report that no facts have come to its attention which in the opinion of the committee warrants any disciplinary action by the judges.

McIntire, dated June 20, 1934, covered investigation from Agril 30 to June 20, 1934, and suggesting that it would be more efficient to submit reports more frequently and to make the leads more specific, I heartily agree with these suggestions, and will endeavor to comply with the suggestions in the letter of reference.

This Agent proceeded to Neosho, Missouri, arriving there at 3 A.M., 6-25-34. Examination of the register of the Big Springs Inn, the largest hotel in Neosho, disclosed only one registration of apparent interest on 6-24-34, this being the registration of R. G. Harper, Tulia, Oklahoma. The hotel clerk advised, however, that Harper is an employee of the Gulf Pipe Line Company and a frequent guest of this hotel; that he had just returned from attending funeral services for his mother somewhere in the east. Registrations of the Colonial, England and Tourist Hotels, Neosho, Missouri, for 6-24-54, were also checked but no registrations of apparent interest found.

H. C. Veerkamp, bus station employee and Mrs. Rowe, bus station agent, Neosho, Missouri, advised that two bus lines operate from this station and handle passengers from Oklahoma, one being the Crown Coach Lines which could pick up Oklahome passengers either at Fort Smith, Arkansas, or Joplin, Missouri, and the Vicory Bus Line which operates between Joplin and Neosho, and picks up Oklahoma passengers by transfer at Joplin, Missouri, this being the route usually traveled by passengers from Tulsa and Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The only men arriving at the station on the evening of 6-24-34 that appeared to be a stranger around Neosho was a man about 45 years of age, height 5 feet 11 inches, weighing 175 or 180 pounds, wearing a straw hat end gray trousers, but having no coat. He arrived on the 8:20 P.M. bus of the Crown Coach Line from Joplin, Missouri, and started to walk away from the station, but returned and inquired what time he could get a bus out of Neosho the following morning. Agent requested Mr. Veerkamp and Mrs. Rowe to watch for this individual and to advise Agent if the man in question : left Neosho by bus. At 5 P.M. on 6-25-34 when Agent left Neosho, Mrs. Rowe advised that the man in question had not been seen aince Agent's previous inquiry.

C. A. Vicory of the Vicory Bus Line, Route #2, Seneca, Missouri, advised that he was driving the bus of his company which operated between Joplin and Neosho, Missouri, 7 to 11:20 P.M. on 6-24-34 and that he recalls no stranger among his passengers, all of whom, according to his recollection, being local residents who were known to him.

R. S. Kenney, Postmaster, and Tom Hastings, carrier on Route #2, Neosho, Missouri, advised that on 6-1-33 Rodney E. Davis and wife, together with their daughter, Mildred Davis, about 18 years of age, began receiving mail on Route #2 and are still residing on a small tract of land which they bought from Joe Roark a real estate dealer at Neosho; that the Davis home is about seven or eight miles south of Neosho and about two or three miles south of Pea Ridge School House.

Mr. Hastings further stated that John Williams, a son-in-law of Rodney E. Davis, resides on a small place adjoining the Davis place, the two houses being only about two hundred yards apart. Mr. Hastings advised that he has never had any mail for Volney Davis and recalls seeing no young man around the Davis home. Mr. Hastings finally recalled, however, that about a week or two ago he passed the Davis home and saw Mr. Davis and a younger man sitting beside a spring located in front of the Davis home and near the highway. Mr. Hastings paid no attention to this man and is unable to describe him. He further stated that Wayne Biggs, a reputable farmer, resides almost directly across the road from the Davis and Williams homes and would be a reliable source of information.

Mr. Kenney and Mr. Hastings will maintain a close watch on allhail received for the Milliams and Davis femilias and will directly to the Kansas City Division office promised to allowed scrutinize all outgoing mail picked up at the boxes of the Davis and Williams families and to furnish the Kansas City Division office with a record of the address, return address and mailing date of such mail.

During the Hestings advised that on several secasions he has delivered petial delivery letters to the two families aforementioned, but has had no special delivery letters within the past few weeks.

Wayne G. Biggs, Route #2, Neosho, Missouri, was interviewed in the presence of Constable Box and stated that the family of Rodney E. Davis. included Davis' wife and daughter Mildred; that they moved on a small tract of land directly across the highway from the Biggs farm about 6-1-33; that in the fall of 1933 John Williams and wife moved on a small tract of land adjoining the Davis place. Williams being Davis' son-in-law. The Davis and Williams residences are approximately one hundred fifty yards from the Biggs home and are in plain view of the Biggs home when the trees are not covered with leaves. Mr. Biggs further stated that the Williams family carried water from a spring on this farm which is located about fifty yards from and in plain view of his residence; that he seldom goes to the Davis and Williams homes, but the women members of his family frequently visit with the women of the Davis and Williams families and most of his information concerning these families is obtained through that source; that he has seen no strange young man around the Davis or Williams home, but has heard through the women of the family that a son of Mr. and Mrs. Davis has visited at the Davis home three or four times since they have resided in this community, the son merely spending the night with his parents on these occasions and not being seen by any of the neighbors.

Hr. Biggs further stated that on the day of the interview he had seen no one enter or leave the Davis and Williams homes and has seen no

strangers about the place. The two places were closely observed by Agent and Constable Box at intervals over a four hour period, but nothing could be seen indicating any strangers were about either of the two places or that anyone had left either place during the day.

Mr. Biggs advised against interviewing his wife and daughters in-law, but volunteered to secure any information in their possession, in a discreet manner, and to furnish same promptly to the Kansas City Division office. He also promised that he would maintain a close watch on the Davis and Williams homes and would promptly notify the Kansas City Division office if Volney Davis or any other suspicious characters appear. Upon seeing the photograph of Volney Davis, Mr. Biggs stated that he closely resembles his sister, Mildred Davis, and for that reason Mr. Biggs could identify Volney Davis at sight. Mr. Biggs further stated that John Williams is absent for considerable periods of time during which he is understood to be working for some oil company in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and sending money by mail to his wife at Neosho, Mr. Biggs, in a discreet manner, will endeavor to ascertain by whom Williams is employed end his exect residence address when in Tulsa, As soon as received this information will also be transmitted to the Kansas City Division office.

A. J. Hodgden, merchant, McNapp, Missouri (Route #2, Recaho, Missouri) verified the information furnished by Mr. Biggs concerning the time of arrival of the Davis and Williams families in this community and Williams! alleged employment at Tulsa, Oklahoma. Mr. Hodgden advised Williams' wife's name is Bertha, but nothing is known concerning Williams' employment aside from the fact that he is reported to be working for some oil company at Tulsa. The shell farm occupied by Williams is rented from W. E. Carter, Route #2, Neosho, Missouri, who is the agent for the owner, B. F. McCoy, Malcum, Illinois. The place occupied by the Davis family was bought from Joe Roark, real estate men of Neosho, Missouri. It is understood that Davis' son bought this place for him, but details of the transaction are unknown. Mr. Hodgden further stated that Mildred Davis for some time has had a charge account at his store and when questioned concerning payments on this account she has stated that her brother in Oklahoma furnished her money from time to time and also furnished money to her parents. She received some money about Christmas, 1933, but has received very little money since that time and has indicated that this is due to the fact that her brother has not had very much employment during that time. Mr. Hodgden further stated that shortly after the Davis family came to this community a Chevrolet Coach, about 1932 model, with Oklahoma license tags, suddenly appeared in the possession of Mildred Davis, who stated that the car was given to her by her brother, who worked in Tulse, Oklahoma, name of employer not being stated. Sometime during the preceding week Mildred Davis was married to John Harness, who makes his home with his mother, Mrs. Ethel Wyatt and his grandfather, Isaac

Haworth, Route #2, Stella, Missouri. This family is regarded as being somewhat shiftless and it is not deemed advisable to attempt to secure information from that source at this time. Mr. Hodgden advised, however, that Lee Collier, the Postmaster at Stella, Missouri, and Charlie Hinton, the carrier on Houte #2, Stella, Missouri, are both reliable and are in no way connected with any of the families involved in this investigation. Upon seeing the photograph of Volney Davis, Mr. Hodgden stated that he has seen no one resembling this photograph at McNapp, but that he will maintain a close watch and will promptly notify the Kansas City Division office if any information of value is obtained. He added that he would have no difficulty in making an identification as Volney Davis bears a very close resemblance to his sister Mildred.

Mr. Hodgden further stated that Al Atkinson resides near the home of John Harness and would be a reliable source of information.

Constable Box made inquiry at the home of John Harness and at the time observed two strange young men in the house, neither of these parties, however, resembled photograph of Volney Davis, Mr. Box also noted that the Chevrolet Coach, 1932 Model, with black body and wire wheels, which was in the yard bears 1934 Missouri license #575-592. This presumably is the car which Mildred Davis has been using and wich she has stated was given to her by her brother in Oklahoma. Inquiry of the office of the Secretary of State, Kansas City, Missouri, disclosed that office has no record of the license in question. A letter is, therefore, being addressed to the Secretary of State, Jefferson City, Missouri, in order to obtain full information concerning the name of the party to whom this license was issued, as well as full description of the car for which issued.

Mr. and Mrs. Al Atkinson and their grandson Wincel Poague, age about 10 years, were interviewed at the Atkinson home on Routs #2, Stella, Missouri, the house being located about one hundred yards from the residence of Mildred Davis' husband, John Harness, as aforementioned. Mr. Atkinson advised that John Harness rents a part of the Atkinson farm and in this way he is seen frequently by Mr. Atkinson; that they do not visit much in the home of John Harness, but Mr. Atkinson's grandson, Wincel Poague, is frequently around the Harness home. Wincel was questioned and stated that about one week ago two strange young men appeared at the Harness home in a car bearing Arkansas license plates and he understood that these men were cousins of John Harness. Upon seeing photograph of Volney Davis, Wincel stated that neither of the men resembled the photograph in question. These are the two men who were seen in the Harness home by Constable Box.

It was later noted by Agent and Constable Box that there was a two seated car, bearing Arkansas license tags, in the yard at the Harness home. This apparently being the car driven by the two young men aforementioned. Mr. Atkinson, his wife and daughter-in-law, as well as Wincel Poague, were shown the photograph of Volney Davis and promised to notify the Kansas City Division office promptly if Davis or any other suspicious young man should appear at the home of John Harness. They remarked that they could easily identify Davis due to the fact that his photograph closely resembles John Harness' wife, the former Mildred Davis. Mr. Atkinson was furnished with some envelopes containing the address of the Kensas City Division office in order that he might promptly report any information of interest in this matter.

None of the aforementioned parties could furnish any information concerning the exact date or place of the marriage of Mildred Davis and John Harness, the impression being that they were married some distance away from their home community.

At the office of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Neosho, Missouri, Agent was advised by Mrs. Parnell, the office manager, that all toll tickets for long distance telephone calls from this community were mailed each night to the main office of the company at St. Louis, Missouri.

E. S. Jones, manager of the Western Union Telegraph Company, Neosho, Missouri, examined his records for one week prior to 6-25-34 but could find no record of any telegrams passing between Volney Davis relatives at Neosho, Missouri, and his sister, Mrs. L. B. Hoffman, 416 East Oklahoma Street, Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Examination of the records of the Recorder of Deeds in Neosho, Missouri, failed to disclose any record of the transfer of a farm from Joe Roark to Rodney E. Davis or any member of his family. The various parties interviewed advised against interviewing Joe Roark in connection with this matter as it was believed that if he found it to his advantage to do so he would immediately notify the Davis family concerning inquiry.

A letter is being addressed to the Postmaster at Stella, Missouri, requesting that for a period of thirty days they maintain a cover on the first class sail delivered to the home of John Harness, Route #2. Stella, Missouri, and that the Kansas City Division office be immissed with a tracing of the address, return address and postmark on their mail: also that the Kansas City office be furnished with a record of all outgoing mail wicked up by the carrier at the mail box of John Harness.



Davis is now residing. Discreet inquiry should be made into the circumstances surrounding any recent conveyance of this property.

Agent, on a pretext, requested the new address of Bailey. Cotner, not knowing the whereabouts of Bailey, stated he had not seen him since the first week of January, but in conversation with Agent, reflected that Bailey was a fireman at one time. Upon this lead, Agent ascertained that Lemar E. Bailey was a member of the local Fire Department attached to Engine Company #28, Riopelle & Milwaukee Avenue, Detroit. Agent interviewed the Chief of that Engine Company, who stated that Bailey was on furlough for eleven days and was due back Monday, June 18, 1934, at 5:00 P.M.

On Monday, June 18, 1934, at 4:50 P.M., Agent waited in the rear of the firehouse where the members of this Engine Company park their cars, and noticed a Ford V-8 Victoria Model with license plates #5260, which were 1934 Michigan plates; the color of the car being light silver aluminum gray. Agent was instructed not to interview Lemar E. Bailey and, not knowing the purpose of the telegram, Agent further investigated the whereabouts of Earley from December to February and interviewed Mr. Walter Roberts, the ar senior bookkeeper of the Detroit Fire Department, who gave Agent the following information: Lemar E. Bailey was on sick leave from December 24, 1933, to February 26, 1934. He was confined at the Pingree General Hospital from December 24 to December 30, 1933. On January 5, 1934, he reported at the Grace Hospital, Detroit, for a laboratory test. On June 6, Dr. G. H. Stockwell called at bailey's home to examine him. On January 17, 18, 19 and 20, he was again confined to Grace Hospital, Detroit. Bailey reported back to duty February 25 to Engine Company #11, Grandy & Gratict Avenue, and on March 20, he was transferred to Engine Company #28, Milwaukee & Riopelle Avenue. He was on furlough from June 7 to 18, and returned for duty at 5:00 P.M., June 18. Between these dates given in this report, the Fire Department has no knowledge of the whereabouts of Bailey.

As a result of circularizing firms located in the Detroit territory and to whom "No.524 M & I Goggles, Welders Model" were shipped by the Chicago Eye Shield Company, of Chicago, Illinois, and the C. H. Dockson Company, of Detroit, Michigan, the following information was obtained:

#### KELLOGG COMPANY BATTLE CREEK, MICH.

12 Pairs

The Kellogg Company, of Battle Creek, Michigan, advised by letter that at the present time they have two pairs of these particular goggles in their storeroom that have not been used and have six or seven pairs in the hands of their welders. It will be noted that only nine pairs are accounted for. Inasmuch as the records of the C. H. Dockson Company, Detroit, Michigan, indicate that twelve pairs were shipped to the Hellogg Company, letter is being directed to that company to ascertain what disposition was made of the other three pairs.

NUMBLER BRASS COLPANY PORT HURCH, MICH.

The Mueller Brass Company advised by letter that their records

indicate they had purchased one pair of these particular goggles and that they are still in the possession of that company.

## WICKES BOILER COMPANY SAGINAW, MICH.

3 Pairs,

The Mickes Boiler Company advised that their records show that three pairs of these goggles were purchased by that company and that they were all equipped with Cescoweld lenses, #6 shade. They further advised that one pair of goggles has as yet not been issued and is still in stock and the other two pairs were issued to shop men, one of which they were able to locate. They advise, however, that they are unable to trace the second pair which was issued to one of their men and cannot state what happened to this particular pair.

#### CONSULERS POWER COMPANY

FLINT, MICH.

The Consumers Power Company advise that all of the goggles used by their company are equipped with clear lenses, with the exception of one pair which was ordered for a welder and did come equipped with colored lenses. This, undoubtedly, is the pair shown on the records of the Chicago Eye Shield Company, Chicago, Illinois, and which is the same type as was used by the kidnspers in this case. This pair is still in the possession of the Consumers Fower Company.

To date, the Pere Marquette Railroad at Saginaw, Michigan, has been unable to locate the record of this particular purchase of goggles. Further efforts will be made to trace these goggles.

UNDEVELOPED LEAD:

The Detroit Office will endeavor to trace further the three pairs of goggles which were shipped to the Kellogg Company of Battle Creek, Lichigan, and which are unaccounted for. Will also endeavor to trace the goggles shipped to the Pere Marquette Railroad, at Saginaw, Michigan.

With reference to your letter of June 29th, 1934, requesting that an estimate be obtained on the cost of manufacturing an additional supply of wall paper #515 from Sears, Roebuck & Company, please be advised that Mr. H. A. Hauptle, Department 653, Sears, Roebuck & Company, 1017 South Homan Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, today advised Special Agent J. J. Metcalfe of this Office as follows.

The cost of manufacturing 1931 wall paper #515 would be from \$40.00 to \$50.00 for 200 rolls of 8 yards each, or a total quantity of 1600 yards. This cost includes everything such as labor, overhead and materials, and is what is termed a "sampling charge," or in other words, a charge for producing samples. The "sampling charge" is the most reasonable charge available at Sears, Roebuck & Company.

The cost is figured on a basis of \$10.00 per hour and it is estimated that four hours or slightly more would be required to manufacture 200 rolls, which is the minimum quantity that could be ordered under the circumstances. After 200 rolls have been manufactured, the cost of this paper would be approximately 6¢ per roll and could be ordered in any quantity. Mr. Hauptle stated that he is confident that the cost of producing 200 rolls would not exceed \$50.00.

Mr. Hauptle further advised that the particular design and the necessary materials for the manufacture of 1931 wall paper #515 are atill evailable at Sears, Roebuck & Company, and that the identical paper and colors could be produced. He also stated that this particular design of wall paper is not available at any other place than Sears.



City officials, as it is noted some confusion has been made in the motor number, as to the second digit. This motor number has not been registered in Missouri.

Mr. Dan Butler, in charge of the Automobile Registration Records, Springfield, Illinois, advised the St. Louis Office by long distance telephone that his records do not contain a registration for this automobile in the year 1928; that this car was registered in Illinois in 1929 under license #765027 by Krs. Alice Carter, 109a Collinsville Avenue, East St. Louis, Illinois; that in 1930 this same automobile was registered by Mrs. Carter, who gave the same address, under license #628158, issued February 6, 1930; that in 1931 this automobile was registered by Mrs. Carter, who gave the same residence address, under license #1,005,313 issued March 25, 1931; that in 1932 this automobile was not registered in Illinois; that in 1935 Mrs. Carter secured Illinois license tags for this car, #1,229,191, issued September 8, 1933, which were six months' tags for the price of \$6.00. On the 1933 application for license, Mrs. Carter stated that this automobile was not registered in Illinois in 1932 and on this application, she gave her address as General Delivery Dupo, St. Clair County. On this same application, Mrs. Carter stated that this automobile was bought on July 14, 1937 from the Schnure Motor Company in St. Louis and she gave the motor number as 2177639. This will explain the error as to the second digit in the motor number, which error appears to have been made by Ers. Carter when she put the license number on the application" blank in 1933; Mr. Butler stated that in 1934 Mrs. Carter registered this automobile under Illinois license #1,145,222, issued April 12, 1934. On \_\_\_ that application Mrs. Carter gave the same residence, 109a Collinsville Avenue, East St. Louis, Illinois, and again made the same error in the motor number, due to the fact that erroneous motor number (2177639) appears on the certificate of registration. The Illinois State License Records do not reflect that this automobile has been transferred by Mrs. Carter.

The writer communicated with the Detective Bureau, Police Department, East St. Louis, Illinois, and was advised by the office that they are well acquainted with Mrs. Alice Carter, whose residence address is very close to the Police Station. They informed that Mrs. Carter is a union waitress and is employed in the Thisser Restaurant in the two hundred block on Collinsville Avenue, where she has worked for the past two years and before that she worked at the Fairmount Bace Track, near East St. Louis, They informed that she is a tall blond, about 35 years of age, ugly, has large bones, and is ahard worker who has never been in any trouble. The officers further informed that they are personally aware of the fact that Mrs. Carter, who exparently does not have any husband at the present time, has made a number of trips to St. Clair County, where she has a sweetheart, and that she stated a resturant for her gentleman friend somewhere in that county. This will probably account for Mrs. Carter having given her allress as General Delivery Dupo, Illinois, in 1933.

The East St. Louis Detectives also advised the writer that they are personally aware of the fact that Mrs. Carter still owns this Buick Coach and one of the detectives went to the residence of Mrs. Carter and looked at the license number and later called the writer by telephone and read off the license, which he gave as 1,145,222. It will be seen that this license number was the one assigned to this car for the year 1934.

The Division has instructed that information concerning this automobile by reported to all field offices making reference to Division letter, dated May 17, 1934, in which there was transmitted a chart covering all cars which are now or have been in the possession of the members of the Barker-Karpis gang.

Since the rendition of that report, this office has been in touch with Superintendent Moore of that building. He advised that he has made every effort through means of his reliable employees to learn whether Bernard Phillips, I. c. \$1195, has been visiting any one of the individuals mentioned in the report above referred to, but said that the photograph of Phillips could not be identified as such a visitor.

For the past month Superintendent Moore has been attempting to learn the names of the persons who visited Buchalter, Kaye, et al, but said this was impossible owing to the system they have in ass. He said that whenever a group or a mob meet in any one of the spartments at night, the meeting is prefaced by a visit from one individual who instructs the doorman to telephone upstairs that Max or Noe or any other name is calling. The individual calling in this manner goes upstairs but the call is a signal that the others are enroute and that someone leaves the apartment upon receipt of

Doctor Houston said he remembered Gray particularly because of his thick lips and his peculiar manner of speaking. At this time Doctor Houston asked Agent if he knew of Slim Gray's wife being a shop lifter. When Agent asked the reason for this inquiry, he stated that there was an Italian gang in the neighborhood of Marahfield and Polk Streets, Chicago, who specialized in shop lifting among the women and greater crimes among the men. Doctor Houston further informed Agent, when Agent asked him if he knew of a Sidney Lewis or a McDonnell and McDonnell, attorneys at law, that Sidney Lewis was a contact for this Italian gang on Marahfield Street and that McDonnell and McDonnell were the attorneys for this gang. Doctor Houston further stated that McDonnell and McDonnell were also his personal attorneys.

Doctor Houston further stated that he had many patients whose names he did not know and that he knew these men were wanted by the police in some way or other.

From interviewing Doctor Houston, Agent believed that Doctor Houston was very frank and quite willing to help the government.

Three days later Agent again called on Doctor Houston and he told Agent that he had ascertained that Slim Gray had come to his office in the company of two men, whose names he still did not know, but who belonged to the Galeechi (phonetic spelling) gang. This Galeachi gang, according to Doctor Houston, are engaged in many petty crimes, such as shop lifting and sometimes in greater crimes, but of these greater crimes Doctor Houston could not state specifically but could merely state that that was his belief. Doctor Houston told Agent that since the time that Agent had been there before that he had gone down to the vicinity of Polk and Marshfield Streets and had made inquiries and had found that Slim Gray's wife and Mrs. Galeechi had formerly been connected in the shop lifting racket, and that it is his, Doctor Houston's, belief that at the present time the Grays are in contact with this gang.

Doctor Houston could not state the address of the hangout but stated that the house where these people meet is the second house from the corner of Polk Street on Marshfield on the north side of the street.

On Agent's first visit to Doctor Houston's office he asked Doctor Houston if he was acquainted with anyone named McNamara. In this connection it may be noted that at the time the Chicago office entered the apartment of Slim Gray that three men came to that apartment, as set forth in the report of reference. These men were Sidney Lewis, Simon McDonnell and a man named McNamara. At this time Sidney Lewis and Simon McDonnell claimed that they did not know McNamara and stated that they had picked him up at a beer tavern to accompany them on their trip to Gray's apartment to get some clothes.

On Agent's second visit to the office of Doctor Houston, Doctor Houston stated that he made inquiry about McNamara and had found that he was well known to the Italian gang and that Simon McDonnell is the attorney and that McNamara is known to the gang as "Irish".

Another card found in the apartment of Roy Gray was that of the Carmen Beauty Shop at 802 Wilson Avenue. Agent called at this shop where he interviewed Miss Ida Anderson. She recognized the picture of Mrs. Gray but stated she had not seen Mrs. Gray for the past three months. Miss Anderson was unable to identify any of the other pictures. She stated that she knew Mrs. Gray by the name of Mrs. Gray.

Mr. Kaufman, who operates a barber shop at 814 Wilson Avenue, was interviewed by Agent and he stated that he recognized none of the pictures and that he did not know the reputation of the Carmen Beauty Shop but believed that it is a legitimate shop and that it has been in operation there for the past six months.

At the corner of Wilson Avenue and Clarendon Avenue, Agent .. .. interviewed several gas station attendants. One of these attendants. who refused to give his name, recognized the picture of Lrs. Gray. He also recognized the picture of Doctor Moran which Agent exhibited to him. He stated that the picture of Doctor Moran was that of Doctor Moran but he did not know the woman in the picture of Mrs. Gray but stated that he had seen her before. He further stated that he had often seen Doctor Moran at a gambling place occupied by One Arm Louis" and Charlie Chance and "Peggy" Joyce. This man formerly operated the blackjack table in this gambling place but had quit because they expected him to put all of his earnings back into the game and he had a wife and family to support. He further stated that he had seen Doctor Moran in that gambling place quite frequently in the company of Eddie "DAD" McFadden, who was one time a subject in the Kanno Case. In this connection it is also to be noted that Eddie McFadden is the Uncle of Betty Tracy to whom Doctor Moran is purported to have been engaged at the time of his معمورين والمراس disappearance. A ...

Agent visited the gambling place occupied by "One Arm Louie" which is located on the corner of Clark and Chicago Avenue at 750 Clark Street. This place is a booking "joint" and also operates fare and rolet wheels. Agent stayed in this place for about two hours and saw no one who resembled Doctor Moran, Slim Gray or Jimmy Wilson.

Another card obtained at the apartment of Slim Gray is that of the Acorn Storage and Van Company located at 1332 South Kedzie Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. Here Agent interviewed Mr. Samsky the proprietor. Mr. Samsky stated that he knew of no Gray or Roy Gray Evens and upon looking over his checks for the past six months was unable to find that he had ever moved any people by that name, nor was he able to find that he had ever moved anyone from 626 Waveland Avenue or 36372 Pine Grove Avenue, which were the last two addresses of Slim Gray. He was unable to account for his card being in the apartment of Gray, but stated that it was probable, in his business, that someone had left the card there as an advertising proposition.

Agent interviewed Doctor Maurice S. Altus, a dentist located on the 12th floor of the Sheridan Trust Bank Building, Broadway and Lawrence Streets, Chicago. Doctor Altus stated that on looking over the pictures presented by Agent that he recognized Mrs. Gray, Slim Gray and also recognized the picture of Mrs. Gray's brother. He knew Lr. and Mrs. Gray by that name but could not remember the name of the brother and was unable to find it in his records at the time Agent was there. He stated that Mrs. Gray first came to him in July, 1923, and that no one had sent her. She had first gone to the dentist across the hall, and finding that that dentist was busy, had come in to see him and had come back on several occasions, the last time being in November, 1923, at which time he also cleaned the teeth of Roy Gray.

Ir. Surmers of the Lightning Cleaners located at Broadway and Grace Streets, Chicago, Illinois, was able to identify the picture known to this office as the picture of Mrs. Gray, and also the picture known as Mr. Childs or Mr. Pratt. He stated that he had not seen either of these people for the past three or four months and that the last address he had for either of them was 3637% Pine Grove Avenue. He stated that he knew the brother of Mrs. Gray by the name of Gray and he believed that at the time he called at the Lightning Cleaners that her brother was employed by the Walgreen Drug Company in some store, the location of which he did not know, as a soda "jerker". He described Mrs. Gray's brother as looking very much like the picture

Mr. Summers suggested that Agent interview Mr. Yost, one of the outside men of the Lightning Cleaners who had originally made the contact with the Grays for information that he might have.

At the apartment of Gray was also found a bill for the purchase of merchandise from Cedar and Cedar, who have two stores, one located at 4006 Sheridan Road and the other located at 1743 Howard Avenue, both in Chicago, Illinois.

Lt 4006 Sheridan Road Agent interviewed Mr. L. Cedar, who looked at the bill of merchandise and stated that it was his brother's handwriting and that his brother was at the other store.

From the date on the bill it appears that April 28th was on Saturday and Mr. L. Cedar stated that on Saturday his brother was always at the store on Howard Avenue.

Agent called at 1743 Howard Avenue, where he interviewed Mr. Ben Cedar, who stated that the handwriting on the bill is his but that he could not remember to whom he had sold the merchandise. Byon being shown the picture of Slim Gray he stated that he remembered that that man had come into the store but that it was the first time he had ever seen him and he could not remember the transaction.

In the report of Special Agent E. L. Richmond, Chicago, Illinois, dated June 23, 1934 it was stated that an effort was being made at the Illinois Bell Telephone Company to check the long distance telephone calls from the telephone number Bittersweet 4711. This telephone is in the home of Mrs. George Guyman, the sister of Mrs. Slim Gray. From this check on the telephone it appears that on May 5, 1934 and May 6, 1934, a long distance call was made to Kansas City, telephone Chestnut 6748. From the telephone company it was impossible to learn whether these calls were made to Kansas City, Kansas or Kansas City, Missouri, but in view of the fact that a letter had been received by Mrs. Guyman, as Indicated in the previous report of Agent Richmond dated June 23, 1934, from Kansas City, Missouri, it is believed that these calls were to Kansas City, Missouri.

On June 30, 1934 Mr. Lawrence T. Murphy of 557 Spring Road, Elmhurst, Illinois, appeared at this office and advised that he was a jailer in the County Jail at Wheaton, Illinois and that one William Clifford was now incarcerated in said jail on a Federal counterfeiting charge; that Clifford had stated to him, when Murphy had asked him if he knew anything about Dillinger, that he knew that Doctor Moran was connected with the Dillinger gan; and that he believed that at the present time he was looking after the wounds of Dillinger.

Agent interviewed William Clifford at the Wheaton County Jail and Clifford gave Agent the following information:

That in May, 1929 he was sent to Joliet where he stayed until November, 1930; that in December, 1931 he was again placed in Joliet, remaining until December, 1933; that during this period of incarceration he became acquainted with Doctor Moran, but stated that since that time he had not seen Doctor Moran. He further stated that at the time he, Clifford, had been arrested by Federal Officers on Pine Grove Avenue on a counterfeiting charge, that he was in company with a man named Williams, and that Williams called himself Bill Williams but he believes that he is booked under the name of William McGovern. He stated that William McGovern has seen Doctor Moran several times and that he believes that Doctor Moran has been furnishing Williams with dope since he is a dope fiend. He further stated that about ten days before he and Williams were arrested on May 31, 1934, that Williams had come to see him at his home and asked him if he knew where he could get any dope. When

Clifford asked Williams if he couldn't get any more from Moran, he told him that Moran had left and that he could not find him. Clifford further believes that a Doctor Eye, who is located at Keeler Avenue and Irving Park Boulevard, is in some way connected with Doctor Moran and might also be supplying Williams with dope.

In this connection it is to be noted that in November, 1933, it was from Doctor Eye's office that Dillinger escaped from a squad of Chicago and Indiana police.

Clifford suggested that Williams may have some information as to the whereabouts of Doctor Moran and that he believes that williams would be willing to talk. He further stated that Williams is, at the present time, incarcerated in the Cook County Jail.

In accordance with arrangements previously made, all the agents regularly assigned to the St. Paul office, as well as those temporarily located at St. Paul engaged on the special assignments of the Dillinger and Bremer investigations, as well as Special Agents McIntire and Brown of the Chicago office and Special Agent Dewey of the Omaha office, held a conference on the afternoon of July 1, 1934, with Mr. Edward G. Bremer in the Dutch Room of Schmidt's Brewery. The conference was very informal and Mr. Bremer, the victim in the above mentioned case, very kindly consented to answer the various questions which the agents desired to propound and give explanations of certain events and situations relative to his being held as a kidnaped victim. The primary purpose of this conference was to enable all those agents who were present to obtain first-hand information relative to any circumstances or conditions that would aid them in locating the Bremer hideout and to clarify any matters relative thereto which might be hazy in the minds of any of the individual agents. The following information is recorded, part of which is substantially new, part of which is given for the sake of repetition to other offices interested, the information being developed during the questioning of Mr. Bremer:

Concerning the Hideout.

In the room where Mr. Bremer was held, he stated, the board over the window was not beaver board and in fact it was not a composition of any kind, but was wooden. This board was not veneer strips and it did not have any signs or stamps or markings of any kind on it. He stated positively that it was not beaver board or any other composition.

He described the window as being the size of windows which might ordinarily appear in a living room, yet he recalls that the lower window sill was about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  to 4 feet from the floor, which is consistent with his statement that he walked down a series of steps to enter this floor level, and the window was as tall as the average living room window and went up to within about 18 inches of the ceiling. The ceiling was about average in height for a living room or bedroom.

Over the board in question were curtains on which were red roses or red flowers and there was a fringe of about 5 to 4 inches at the bottom of these curtains. The bottom part of the board covering the window permitted indirect sunlight to enter the room through a very narrow crack where the board did not fit tightly against the lower window sill.

He claims that he is convinced that the lighting in the building was connected with some city light plant and not a local Delco plant. There was no flickering or varying in the intensity of the light. As for the light in the room which he occupied, his head would hit a cord or chain in about the middle of the room when he was led past this point, and he judges this cord or chain to be the cord which is pulled to turn the light on and off; and the light itself, he believes, is produced from a colored bulb, probably pink or light red; at least, it was not a brilliant light and it seemed to be somewhat darkened after the fashion of a colored bulb.

He knows of but one entrance to this floor level and that was the entrance where it is necessary on entering to walk down several wooden steps. He could hear people come into the kitchen, which appeared to be the first room as one entered through the entrance in question, but he could not hear them walking down the steps. He was able, however, to hear those entering on several occasions kicking around in the kitchen as if they might be kicking snow off their shoes, but this was not an every-day occurrence but led him to believe that it did snow a part of the time while he was at the hideout.

From his position in the room where he was held, he could hear the sizzling and frying of food in the kitchen; and he is convinced that a man did the cooking because the food was quite greasy and the eggs were always covered with salt and pepper. He stated that the strawberries which were served to him were in good condition, which corresponds to the condition of the strawberries that were purchased by an individual believed to be Karpis at Palmyra, Wisconsin. Likewise, the fish which was served to him were fresh perch and full of bones, which is similar to the fish sold by the same store in Palmyra to an individual believed to be Karpis.

When some of the group of kidnapers left, apparently to go to town, they would be gone from one-half hour to forty-five minutes. There was a coal stove in the living room and the kitchen stove was also believed to be a coal stove. Among the foods served him was what appeared to be canned fruit salad or at least mixed fruit and he recalls that there were cherries and half apricots in the mixed fruits, which appeared to be the canned variety.

He recalls that there was a toilet upstairs and he judged that there were four people upstairs, including a man, a woman, and two children, one of the children being a baby because he heard it cry one night. On one occasion he was asked by his captors whether the boys had been too noisy upstairs and had disturbed his sleep, and he feels that they were trying to give him the impression that they were connected with the people who lived upstairs although he can not identify any of them walking upstairs.

He stated that from his room, while facing the toilet on the same floor level, he heard the train, which would come from his front and pass on to his right. The whistle and the siren were likewise to his right when he stood facing the toilet on his floor, and he insists that there was but one siren each day and two whistles sounded, the first whistle being simultaneous with the sounding of the siren. The later whistle, he would judge, sounded in the afternoon or early evening.

He could hear tin coat hangers jangling against the back of his door when the door was opened, and he could hear the squeaking of wicker furniture. He was permitted to wash his hands in a white porcelain wash bowl or pan.

He stated that he believes there were a total of about twelve trains each day, going in both directions, and the railway he would judge to be about half a mile from the hideout. When the whistle and the siren blew together, he could almost always hear the children at the same time. He judged the children to be going to or from school.

He recalls one of his captors asking him about a squad car which was parked in front of a house near the cathedral, and they asked him whose house this was and he told them that it evidently was the home of Louis Hill.

On the morning that he left the hideout, they shaved him for the first time. They used a straight razor which was badly in need of honing; and it is to be recalled that an identification of Karpis has been made at a barber shop in Palmyra, the barber stating that he gave Karpis a haircut similar to the one appearing in his photograph, and that when leaving, Karpis asked him (the barber) whether he would hone his razor if he should bring it down. An affirmative answer was given but Karpis did not bring the razor.

He also recalls hearing one of the kidnapers state that he sold the old trapper a dog last summer for \$50.

Concerning the bells, Mr. Bremer stated that the same bell which rang Saturday afternoon, rang three times about an hour apart on Sunday morning; and another church bell, different from the one ringing on Saturday afternoon, was heard Sunday morning.

of the gang of kidnapers was a short man, and when walking from his room to the toilet, through the living room and a bed room, although he was blindfolded, this short man would permit him to place his hands on his shoulder and the short man would walk in front of him. He would judge that this short man was about six inches shorter than Mr. Bremer and that his height would be about 5 feet 6 inches. This same short man did not talk like an educated person but he recalls specifically that when he did talk he said "Minnenapolis" for Minneapolis.

He heard his captors speak of being down at the pool room, and they spoke as if they had been at this same hideout place during the summer.

The "flunky" around the place was called "Pancho". In this connection, the Special Agents searching for the hideout have learned that there was a half-breed during January and February in Palmyra, Wisconsin, who is now believed to be working in Milwaukee. An effort is being made to find him.

He likewise recalls that the little fellow, who appeared to be the leader, mentioned the fact that he had a wife and two kids, and another of the subjects spoke in broken English.

### Concerning the travel to and from the hideout.

Mr. Bremer recalls that on the journey from St. Paul to the hideout, the kidnapers kept the radio in the car going most of the time and they would switch from WCCO, a Minneapolis station, to stations in Chicago. He never heard any stations except the station WCCO and Chicago stations. On the return, they left the hideout in the morning and he heard one of the kidnapers ask the other what time they were going to get going, and the reply was that "we'll get going within an hour. It is ten o'clock now." He also recalled before he had left he had heard the siren and whistle blow. About one and a half or two hours before they turned him loose at Rochester, Minnesota, one of the kidnapers stated that he could now see the lights of St. Paul, but Mr. Bremer stated that it was obviously too light at that time for city lights to be so noticeable, and he thinks that they were trying to mislead him. They entered Rochester, he thinks, from the south by means of an unpayed road.



RE: Interview with Prisoner at Anamosa, June 30th, 1934.

Dear Chief:

In an interview with a prisoner at the Reformatory at Anamosa, he imparted the following information:

It seems that at one time he helped a prisoner get out of Lansing, Kansas, by paying an attorney \$450.00 and since that time this said prisoner, who is now in Anamosa, has written letter after letter to the prisoner he helped get out of Lansing asking for the sum of \$25.00 but has never received any answer.

This ex-convict to whom he is writing is better known on the records as "Chicago" Karpis but is now going under the name of Dan Murphy, and for the reason that this said "Chicago" Karpis has not enswered any of his letters nor in any way tried to get in contact with him he feels that he would like to tell where said Karpis can be picked up.

He states that in Bland, Missouri, at the residence of a dope peddler by the name of Floyd/Williams, he states, that this is Karpis' hangout. He also claims that said Floyd Villiams furnishes the crooks with guns claiming that he saw three mechine guns at said residence a year ago last April. He does not know whether Karpis is there at this time but claims that he and his pal, ArtOBarger, go in and out of that town and make it their hangout.

He also states that said Williams' parents, who are also dope fiends, live 1 mile west of Bland on the gravel road and that Karpis also hides out at this house and that he has seen a regular arsenal there at times. Then there is another residence west of town on the same gravel road either 21 or 3 miles out. This house can be easily recognized as it is a new white house on the south side of the road.

He also warned me to be very careful when any of these houses were approached as there were bound to be some crooks hiding out there.

Agent Suran advised that the Chicago Office, was atternting to obtain verification of this wire at Chicago, but it was desired that effort be made through the Western Union and it Postal Telegraph at Kanses City to locate the wire at this point and obtain information relative thereto.

Special agent P. E. Simons conferred with Er. G. G. Creal, Gity Superintendent, Fostal Telegraph Company, Fenses City, Lissouri, and the records of that company for June 20, 24 and 25th were chacked with megative results. The Credit lameger of the lostal Telegraph remarked to ir. Creal that he did have a faint recollection of some telegram having been sent by John Lazia; however, he could not recall the addressee of the telegram or the city of destination, neither could be recall the date the telegram was sent and without such information it would be impossible to locate the telegra: in question.

Similar inquiries were made of ar. Milliam Brown, Manager of the Mestern Union, Kansas City, Missouri, by Special Agent M. C. Spear, at which time the records for June 24th, 25th and 25th, 1934, were checked, with megative results.

You received a long-distance telephone call from Chief of Detectives Herbert ikers of Bot Springs, Arkmans, to the effect that Chief there had some a young min and women with smother companion in a Lincoln Thatton bearing Chiefons Gity 1934 license #1364881; it appearing that Chief /kers telieved that one of the individuals tore resemblance to Arthur R. Barker, and that there were certain suspicious circumstances surrounding their visit to Hot Springs.

Further advised that the license for the Lincoln Phaeton referred to show is issued to H. D. Sims of Recloud, Cklahom, who apparently is a young man of marks, known more or less as a "play-boy," and who has never been known to associate with outlaws, but who is an individual who might be carrying a couple of saved-off shotguns as a matter of self-protection.

Shortly after the receipt of your telephone tall, I attempted to get in touch with Chief Akers at Hot Springs, but I ascertained that he had left for the country and would not return until the next morning, when I did get in touch with him. Akers said he ascertained since he called you that young Sims had purchased some property in the vicinity of Hot Springs, where he apparently will spend some of his vacations. It appears also that Chief Akers later in the day had an opportunity to observe the other man in the automobile at close quarters in various parts of the city of Hot Springs.

Reference is made to your recent inquiry relative to the investigations made at 78 Sherburne Avenue, St.Paul, Minnesota, the home of the nother of PAT REILLY, who was recently taken into oustody here. It is to be recalled that PAT RESILLY has made statements that he has been at all times until the Friday before his apprehension, at the home of his mother at the above mentioned address. Subsequent to that time, however, PAT REILLY has given information indicating that since his location has been sought he has likewise been in Winous, Minnesota. He has also advised that he was, about three weeks ago, in South St. Faul, Minnesota, which is a different county from this. His stories as to his exact whereaboute have been in conflict, and although it is entirely possible that he has been on occasions at the home of his mother, I am not convinced that he is telling the truth when he states that he has been there continuously; in fact, his own statements contradict such any indication.

REILY has described the room which he occupied almost continuously, and Special Agent Querrero, who had an apartment in an adjoining building, states that, possessed of field glasses, he looked directly into the room which REILLY states he occupied and duerrero BECORDED 1.576-

BECORDED

states positively that REILLY was lying if he states that he has been there. The location of the apartment occupied by Agent Querrero under the name of Fred Gomes, is so placed that he can look directly into the apartment occupied by REILLY and his mother, and he can also observe the front entrance to the same apartment building. Mr. Querrero advised on one or two occasions by telephone that he observed the younger brother of PAT REILLY, and we are informed, of course, that REILLY does have a younger brother; and after Agent Querrero interviewed REILLY personally he states that positively this man was not the occupant of the apartment.

It appears likely that REILLY is giving this story as to his occupancy of his mother's home feeling that there would be less chance of anyone being prosecuted for harboring him if he continued to maintain that he was in his mother's home. In fact, I informed REILLY while endeavoring to ascertain where he had been that this matter made his mother subject to prosecution for harboring him, and he responded with the statement that there was no jury who would convict either his mother or his wife, as any mother or wife would harbor their son or husband and no one would convict them therefor. It appears that he might have obtained legal advice and counsel regarding this point, and he continues to stick to this story, although it has been broken down in part by his giving information as to his being at other places during the interval when he states that he was at home.

Regardless of whether he was or was not at home, I am informed that Mr. Henni made investigations at this address for the purpose of locating REILLY during the early part of April. Special Agent O. G. Hall spent several days time making investigations in that vicinity and cruising around in that vicinity in an automobile, and likewise he joined with Inspector Tierney, Chief of Detectives, in several efforts to locate REILLY in that vicinity. Likewise I have been informed of separate efforts made by the St.Paul Police Department to locate him, and we have received several tips indicating that REILLY was at different places in the States of Minnesota and Visconsin, each of which was given investigative attention.

The St.Paul Police Department raided the apartment of REILLY'S mother during the early part of June and failed to find REILLY there. We were not informed that the raid was about to be made by them but have been informed that such a raid was made. REILLY, in fact, has

stated that he was there when the raid started and when he saw the efficers soming he claims that he want upstairs to a stranger's apartment and made inquiries about a sewing machine, although he admits that he was not acquainted with the occupants of the apartment in question.

I have not received information indicating that it would be advisable for two men to keep this apartment under constant surveillance, particularly in view of the fact that REILLY'S wife furnished us full information conserming this spartment and made no effort to conseal His whereabouts or the fact that REHLLY'S mother and relatives live there, and MRS. REILLY'S mother; i.e., PAT REILLY'S mother-in-law, MRS. DELANKY, has expressed herself as being very desirous of having HEILY apprehended, and she has made some trips to this spartment and, in spite of the fast that she was offered a substantial reward for information leading to his location, she advised that he was not in this place. I have personally been contacting MRG. DELANEY about twice each week for the past several weeks, and I know, both from her own statements and from other informants, that MRS. DELANET has no regard whatsoever for PAT RELLY; that she has sought to get information which would emiss her daughter to desire to divorce PAT RELLY, and she has indicated her desire that he be apprehended and sentenced to the penitentiary, both to get rid of him and to furnish a fit basis for MRS. PAT REILLY obtaining a divorce. I, frenkly, have felt for some time that MRS. REILLY'S calls at the apartment of PAT REILLY'S mother was the best possible investigation that earld be made under the sirgunstances.

Agent Guerrero arrived in place of Agent Guerrero, who had been more resourceful, instead of placing him in a position to keep this house under surveillance, I would have been inclined to have utilized that man power into further search for the BREMER hideout rather than to have used him on the more passive type of investigation as the one made by Agent Guerrero. Likewise I would have given preference to an assignment to have located MIRTLE HATON in the BREMER case rather than the continuous assignment to locate PAT REHLLY, had the agent possessed greater ability and resourcefulness than that possessed by Agent Guerrero. In view of the available man power, and in trying to utilize the services of agents in the most profitable directions, I would have considered further efforts to locate the hideout, efforts to locate MYRTLE EATUN, and

various miscellaneous leeds to lecate JUH BILLINGER, of greater importance than the covaring of the spartment building in which PAT REHLY'S mother was located in an effort to lecate him. In other words, with the available men power and with the comparative importance of the leads, I do not believe that in the absence of more specific information I would have easigned four agents to work in whifts of two keeping this spartment building under constant surveillance. Of course, if there had been received any indication whatsoever that RHILLY was visiting the apartment of his mother, this would have altered the circumstances and the decision as to how the services of the agents should be used.

Frankly, in order to conserve time, I have made arrange ments with Mr. Ladd so that agents not on special essignment but assigned to the St.Peul Office, might when in areas of considerable distance from the Twin Cities, handle BREMER and DILLIMBER leeds when they were in the vicinity where such leads existed. At the present time, for example, Agent Hardy is giving exclusive time to the BREMER case. Agent hoonen is likewise assigned on full time for the present to the BREUR case. 50% or more of the time of Agent Botesteen is being given to the DILLINGER and BREMER cases. Agent Anderson is likewise siding in the BREAR and DILLINGER cases with Agent Rotesteen, and the gagents mentioned are not assigned to the special assignment but to the St. Fanl Office. Due to the fact that Agent Melvin, on the advice of his physician, is not prepared to take any extended automobile trips for a three weeks period, Agent Melvin is available in the Twin Cities for general assignment to Mr. Ladd, and at present Agent Guarrero, who has since the arrest of RETLLY been withdrawn from the lead to which he was assigned, is working on general assignment at the St.Paul Office. because of his limited qualifications on the special assignments and in order to compensate for some of the agents who are assigned to Mr. Laid's office but who are in fact at the present time working on the special essignments.

Mr. Querrero states positively that since June 9, 1934 until REILLY'S errest, he is convinced that REILLY was not in the apartment where he claims to have been. As to this I do not know, but REILLY'S statements that he was thore have been qualified subsequently, and conflicting statements have likewise been subsequently obtained from REILLY'S mother and from his wife, for they have both affirmed and

denied that REILLY was in the spartment during this interval.

In eddition to MRS. DELANEY, REILLY'S mother-in-law, GPAL MILLIGAE, REILLY'S sweetheart, who informed this office as to his whereabouts, and a number of other informants who were being regularly contacted as to REILLY'S whereabouts, Agent Guerrere, since June 9th, had been devoting his entire attention to keeping this apartment under observation. The failure to assign any additional agents to cover this particular lead relative to this particular fugitive is chargeable to me, as I, frankly, did not feel that this one lead to locate the fugitive, in the absence of more information than was available, warranted a greater expenditure of time and man power in view of the total quantity available, while bearing in mind the importance of other leads and fugitives on the two special assignments.

Many years ago Mr. Gordon was instrumental in turning up some bank robbers for a police department and the Pinkerton Detective agency. Working under their instructions he accompanied the bank robber who was going to rob the bank. At the time of the robbery, waile this individual was in the ... bank, Mr. Gordon called the officers in and notified the police

officials, and this individual was shot. The Kansas City "Star" at that time was conducting a campaign against the Kansas City Police Department and printed a libelous article covering this incident. Ex-Senator Reed such the Kansas City "Star" for libel and persuaded Gordon to be one of the plaintiffs.

Sometime after this, Gordon was picked up by the Houston Police Department, they claiming that his name was Green. When they brought him to Police Headquarters he found there reporters from the Kansas City "Star". Their purpose in picking him up was to get him to drop the suit. After a couple of days, he, of course, was turned out, and the Kansas City "Star" settled with him for \$2500.00. However, a picture was evidently taken at this time without his knowing it, which picture, with other records, was evidently destroyed by fire.

A couple of years ago a personal enemy of Goruon had inquiry made at the Houston Police Department, requesting a copy of this picture. The Houston Police Department in turn requested this picture from the Pinkerton Detective Agency. The Pinkerton Detective Agency in forwarding the picture made a statement that it was supposed that Gordon had served time at the Hutchinson, Kansas, Reformatory, and for your information, upon investigation this proved to be absolutely untrue. Upon examination, the picture in question is obviously not a police picture.

We are wondering whether or not your Agent Davis received this information and that is the purpose of the inquiry. For that reason, I am furnishing you with this information.

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of June 27, 1934, and I have carefully noted the contents thereof.

With regard to the information furnished this Division by your Mr. Gordon in a conference at the Oklahoma City Office on June 17th, I beg to state that so far it has been impossible to verify the information furnished by him. The Bill'Schlegel referred to in Mr. Gordon's information is not known to own and operate a farm located fourteen miles north and east of Shanrock, Texas. Bill Schlegel is a gembler and a hootlegger of Shemrock, Texas and is said to be associated in his activities with one "Pete"/Porter, a brother of Sheriff John Porter of Wheeler County, Texas. "Pete" Porter lives on a section of land located fourteen miles north and west of Shaurock. Rex Warren is now said to be at Chickasha, Oklahome. He is also reported to have been closely associated with Schlegel and Porter in their activities. Schlegel and Porter are reported at the present time to be at Kellarville and Belco. Texas. No information has been received as yet which would indicate that Jim Clark, Frank/Delmar and "Doc" Barker are on the Porter farm. Any definite information along these lines which we are able to secure will, of course, be communicated to you.

With regard to that portion of your letter referring to the information received by you to the effect that Agent Davis had made inquiries at Houston, Texas with reference to Mr. Gordon, you will me that when you called the Division you particularly expressed a har. 

In March of this year an agent of this Division interviewed Mr. Gordon in connection with the Breaer kidnaping case and at that time Gordon stated that the Cloud County Bank at Concordia, Kansas was robbed by unknown individuals on July 21, 1932 and that shortly thereafter he established a contact at Minneapolis, Minnesota with a confidential informat and began regulations for the return of the bonds valued at approximately \$240,000.00 for the sum of \$15,000.00. He further stated that subsequently he was able to obtain the return of the stolen bonds for the payment of this amount. Cordon stated that in his own mind he was convinced that Alvin Kurpis and Fred Barker participated in this bank robbery although he had never been able to have them identified as participants.

Gordon advised that his confidential informant was not one of the thickes, but in his opinion is removed four or possibly five from the actual thieves and holders of the bonds and that it would be impossible to trace these connections back in order to definitely determine the identity of the persons stealing the bonds from the bank.


These negotiations are typical of the type in which Gord in has engaged in the Twin Cities for several years according to pursons who are familiar with his methods of operation.

In some of his recent activities quoted above he has been accompanied by an individual known as Leo Belgado alias Leo R. Eubsequently he a pears to have deserted Roche and joined Gordon in an investigation in Oklahoma and Texas.

Delgado in the son of the founder of Delgado Chili Products Company of Dallas and a nephew of Mike Lively, prominent attorney in Texat. At one time he worked as an investigator for the District Attorquy at Houston, Texas under the name of Robert Dell. He also worked for several Islas undertakers at one time.

### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The following is a resume of the investigative activity taking place at the present time upon the Bremer kidnaping case:

## CHICAGO, ILLINOIS:

Agents McIntire and Richmond are working upon local leads mainly growing out of the locating and passing of the ransom money. Arrangements have been made whereby Agent McIntire will be relieved from a majority of the desk work which appears unnecessary in this case and will be continued on active investigative work.

Agent Ryan is checking on various former living quarters of Karpis and his associates. Agent Wells is performing similar investigative activity. Agent Brown is near Palmyra, Wisconsin checking leads on the hide-outs used in this case.

#### ST. PAUL. MINHESOTA:

Agents Noonan, Gross, Hurley and Hardy are at or near Palmyra, Wisconsin looking for the Bremer hide-out and Agent Lawrence is in an under-cover capacity employed as a filling station attendant near a garage reported to be owned by Barker.

Agent Dodd has been following out various investigative leads interviewing McLaughlin and similar activities.

Agent Nicholson is serving as number one man and performing desk work on both the Bremer and Dillinger cases.

Agent Fortenberry as F. L. Berry is in an under-cover capacity at Reno, Nevada. Mr. Clegg believes that his continued maintenance is justified at that point. Instructions relative to his cutting down on RECORDED his daily expenditures will be issued to him.

The suggestion made by Mr. Clegg that two men be immediately assigned on a special assignment to locate Myrtle Eaton will be complied with immediately. I am today issuing telegraphic instructions to have Agents Hurley and Dewey placed upon this assignment.

All Agents working on the Bremer case will attend a conference on Sunday at which time Mr. Bremer will be present to discuss the facts in this kidnaping and to answer any questions concerning the hide-out, et cetera.





Brennan, it was ascertained that during the months of January and February, 1984, the street cars at Madison, Wisconsin, were only operated during the hours 8:00 to 9:00.A.K., 12 o'clock noon to 1:00 P.M., and 4:00 to 6:00 P.M. As of possible assistance in determining the time when victim Bromer could have pussed through Madison, Wisconsin, it is suggested that further inquiry be made with respect to the time when street cars were operated in that city during the months of Landary and Vebruary, 1934.
