Synopsis of Facts:

On Jamery 22, 1935 indistment was filed in the W. Court, District of Minnesota, Third Division, charging that between December 1, 1955 and May 1, 1954 ALVIN KAHPAVICZ, ARTHUR R. BARKER, VOLNEY DAVIS, HARRY CAMPBELL, MIMER FARMER. HAROLD ALDERTON, WILLIAM WEAVER, HARRY SAWYER, WILLIAM M. HARRISON, OLIVER A. BERG, JOSEPH PATRICK MORAN, JOHN JOSEPH McLauchlin, William Edward Vidler, Philip J. Delaney, "Whitie", BYRON BOLTON, JAMES J. WILSON, JESS DOYLE, MENA MURRAY, MYRTLE RATON, JUHN DOE, and RICHARD ROE, conspired to transport the kidnaped victim BREMER from St. Penl, Minnesota, to Bensenville, Illinois, and to hold him for \$200,000 renson, in violation of Act of Congress approved June 22, 1932, Chapter 271, 47 stat. 526; 18 U.S.C. 408a. Defemients ALDERTON, FARMER and BOLTON committed Remsey County Jail, St. Paul, in default of \$50,000 bail; BARKER in default of \$100,000 bail, and WILSON in default of \$5,000 bail. Bench warrants issued for KARPIS, DAVIS, CAMPBELL, WRAVER, SAWYER, HARRISON, BERG. JOHN DOE and RICHARD ROE, bail fixed at \$100,000 each. Bench warrants issued for "WHITIE", JESS DOYLE, MONA MURRAY, MYRTLE EATON, bail fixed at \$50,000 for "HITTE" and \$15,000 mach for the last three. Ho bench warrants issued for McLAUGHLIN, VIDLER and DELANEY as they are under bond under previous 🏰 indictment. Indictment also filed in St.Paul January 22,1955 charging that on Jamuary 17, 1934 ALVIN KARPAVICZ, ARTHUR R. BARKER, VOLNEY DAVIS, HARRY CAMPBELL, MIMER FARMER, HAROLD ALDERTON, WILLIAM WRAVER, HARRY SAWYER, WILLIAM J. HARRISON, BYRON BOLTON, JOHN DOE and RICHARD ROE transported the kidnaped victim BREAKR from St. Paul, Minnesota, to Bensenville, Illinois, where they held him for \$200,000 ransom in violation of Act of Congress approved June 22, 1952, Chapter 271, 47 state 526; 18 U.S.C. 408a. No bench warrants issued on this indictment as all defendants named in above indistment. Non est return made on bench warrant issued on indictment filed against MIVIE KARPIS and others by U. S. Marshal May 4, 1934. Certified sopy this indictment and bench warrant forwarded Jacksonville and Philadelphia Offices. Certified copies conspiracy and kidnaping indictments filed St. Paul January 22, 1935 together with bench warrant for ALVIN KARPIS, forwarded Jacksonville and Philadelphia Offices Jamuary 24, 1935 and new bonch warrant issued for KARPIS under conspiracy indictment as of this date.

DETAILS:

The title of this case is being changed so as to show the Subject KARPIS as a fugitive; to eliminate FRED BARKER with aliases and HUSSELL GIBSON with aliases as they are both dead, and to eliminate JOHN J. McLAUGHLIN with aliases, the indictment as to this subject having been dismissed at St.Psul on November 2, 1934 and United States Attorney George Sullivan having stated that this terminated prosecution as to this defendant; so as to add the aliases CLAIRE LUCAS and HUCK WEAVER to the name of WILLIAM WEAVER; the alias "SEA LION" to the name of HARRY SAWYER; the alias ROY GREEN to the name of WOLNEY DAVIS, and to add the names of additional defendants who have been indicted, to wit: ELMER FARMER, HAROLD ALDERTON with aliases, BYRON BOLTON with aliases, "WHITIE", JOHN DOE, and RICHARD ROE.

This report is made for the purpose of recording indictments filed against defendants in the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota at St. Paul and the status of the defendants.

On January 22, 1935 an indictment was filed in the United States District Court in the District of Minnesota, Third Division, against the following named defendants, the status of whom is indicated after each name:

One <u>ALVIN KARPAVICZ</u> alias Alvin Karpis - January 24, 1935 bench warrant issued, returned not found; new bench warrant is sued; bond fixed at \$100,000.00. (Whereabouts unknown).

One ARTHUR R. BARKER alias "Doc" Barker - Jamery 24, 1935 bond fixed at \$100,000.00. Defendant committed to Remsey County Jail, St. Paul, Minnesota, in default.

One <u>VOLNEY DAVIS</u> alias "Curley" alias "Cotton" - Jamary 24, 1935. bench warrant issued, bond fixed at \$100,000.00. (Whereabouts unknown).

One HARRY CAMPRELL alias George Winfield alias "Dave" - Jamuary 24, 1935 bench warrant issued, bond fixed at \$100,000.00. (Whereabouts unknown).

One MIMER FARMER - Jamuary 24, 1935 bond fixed at \$50,000.00; committed Remsey County Jail in default.

One HAROID ALDERTON elies Harold Allerton - January 24, 1935 bond fixed at \$50,000.00; committed to Remsey County Jail in default,

One WILLIAM WEAVER alias "Bill" Boott, alias Phoenix Bonald, alias Charles W. Lucas - January 24, 1955 bench warrant issued; bond fixed at \$100,000.00. (Whereabouts unknown).

One HARRY SAWYER alias Harry Sandlovich - January 24, 1935 bench warrant issued; bond fixed at \$100,000.00. (Whereabouts unknown).

One WILLIAM J. HARRISON alias "Willie" alias Elmer Howe - Jammery 24, 1935 bench warrant issued; bond fixed at \$100,000. (Whereabouts unknown).

One OLIVER A. BERG alias Ollie Berg, alias "Izzy", alias "Jones" - Jamiary 24, 1935 bench warrant issued; bond fixed at \$100,000.00. (Serving life sentence in Illinois Penitentiary, Joliet, Ill.)

One JOSEPH PATRICK MORAN alies Doctor Joseph P. Moran - January 24, 1935 bond fixed at \$15,000,00; bench warrant issued. (Whereabouts unknown).

One WILLIAM EDWARD VIDLER alias "Williams" - Under bond in previous indictment; no bench warrant issued.

One PHILIP J. DELARKY - Under bond in previous indictment; no bench warrant issued.

One "WHITIE", whose true name is unknown to the Grand Jurors, whose approximate personal description is as follows: 25 or 26 years of age; looks young; height five feet ten inches; weight 170 or 180 lbs.; alender build; light blonde with abundant wavy hair; blue eyes; even teeth; Lithuanian extraction - Jamuary 24, 1935 bench warrant issued; bond fixed at \$50,000.00.

One BYRON BOLTON alies Bryon Bolton, alies Owen D. Gerter, alies Owen Bernard Carter, alies Monty Certer - Jamery 24, 1935 bond fixed at \$50,000.00; committed to Remsey County Jail, St.Paul, in default.

One JAMES J. WILSON alias "Jimmy" Wilson, alias James Jackson, alias Doctor Jim Wilson, alias E. J. POWELL - Jamesy 24, 1935 bond fixed at \$5000.00; sommitted to Remsey County Jail, St. Paul, in default.

One JESS DOYLE - Jamuary 24, 1935 bench warrant issued; bond fixed at \$15,000.00. (Whereabouts unknown).

One EDNA MURRAY alias "Rabbit" - Jamuary 24, 1935 bench warrant issued; bond fixed at \$15,000.00. (Whereabouts unknown).

One MYRTLE EATON alias "Mert" - Jamary 24, 1935 bench warrant issued; bond fixed at \$15,000.00. (Whereabouts unknown).

One JOHN DOE, whose true name is unknown to the Grand Jurers, whose approximate personal description is as follows: 30 - 35 years of age; height five feet eight or nine inches; weight 175 lbs.; dark brown hair; large eyes; round face; sturdy build - Bench warrant issued Jamary 24, 1935; bond fixed at \$100,000.00.

One RICHARD ROE, whose true name is unknown to the Grand Jurors, whose approximate personal description is as follows: 30 years of age; height five feet six or seven inches; weight 155-140 lbs.; dark brown hair; thin face; slender build - January 24, 1935 bench warrant issued; bond fixed at \$100,000,000.

The above indictment charges that the above named defendants, between December 1, 1933 or thereabouts and May 1, 1934 or thereabouts, conspired to violate the provisions of the Act of Congress approved June 22, 1932 forbidding the transportation of any person in interstate or foreign commerce, kidnaped or otherwise unlawfully detained, Chapter 271, 47 stat. 326; 18 U.S.C. 408a, to kidnap the victim EDWARD GEORGE BREMER and transport him from St.Paul, Minnesota, to Bensenville, Illinois, and there hold him for and demand a ransom of \$200,000.00. This indictment alleges ten overt acts in support of the charge of conspiracy. All bonds are returnable the first Tuesday in April 1935.

On Jamuary 22, 1935 another indictment was filed in the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota, Third Division, sharging that on the 17th day of January, 1934, one ALVIN KARPAVICZ alias Alvin Karpis; one ARTHUR R. BARKER alias "Doc" Barker; one VOLNEY DAVIS alias "Ourley" alias "Cotton"; One HARRY CAMPBELL alias George Winfield, alias "Deve"; one MARRY FARMER; one HAROLD AIDERTON alias Harold Allerton; one WILLIAM WEAVER alias "Bill" Scott, alias Phoenix Donald, alias Charles W. Lucas; one HARRY SAWYER alias Harry Sandlovich; one WILLIAM J. HARRISON alias "Willie", alias Elmer Howe; one BYRON BOLTON alias Bryon Bolton, alias Owen D. Carter, alias Owen Bernard Carter, alias Monty Certer; one JOHN DOE, whose true name is unknown to the Grand Jurors, whose approximate personal description is as follows: 50 - 55 years of age; beight five feet nine inches; weight 175 lbs.; dark brown hair; large eyes; round face; sturdy build, and one RICHARD ROE, whose true name is unknown to the Grand Jurors, whose approximate personal description is as follows: 30 years of age; height five feet six or seven inches; weight 135 - 140 lbs.; dark brown hair; thin face; slender build, did, in violation of the Act of Congress approved June 22, 1932, Chapter 271, 47 stat. 326; 18 U.S.C. 408 a, transport by antomobile the kidnaped wictim EDWARD CEORGE BREAKR from St. Paul, Minnesota, to Bensenville, Illinois, and having transported him, held him for reason in the sum of \$200,000.00. As each of the defendants named in this indictment are also named in the indictment previously referred to above, no bench warrants were issued or bonds fixed on this charge.

As noted above, no bonds were fixed or bench warrants were issued for the defendants McLAUGHLIN, VIDLER and DELANKY for the reason that they are on bond on an indictment filed in the United States District Court for the District of Minnesota, Third Division, charging violation of the Act of Congress approved June 22, 1931, Chapter 271, 47 stat. 326; 18 U.S.C. 408a, which indictment also memes ALVIN KARPIS, ARTHUR BARKER, "IZZY", ROY GRAY, and FRANKIE WRICHT. On this indicatment a bench warrant was issued on May & 1934 for ALVIN KARPIS and a not found return was made on May 7, 1954. A certified copy of this indictment, together with bench warrant showing the Marshal's non est return, was forwarded to the Jacksonville Division Office under date of January 26, 1935, at which time certified copies of these papers were also forwarded to the United States Attorney at Philadelphia by the United States Attorney at St. Paul pursuant to the direction of the Attorney General. Through error, in response to a request of the United States Attorney at Jacksonville, Florida, the United States Attorney at St. Paul caused a non est return to be made on the bench warrant issued for ALVIN KARPIS on the conspiracy indictment filed at St. Paul on Jamery 22,1935, and forwarded this with a certified copy of the indictment to the United States Attorney at Jacksonville, whereas the United States Attorney at Jacksonville desired a certified copy of indictment and bench warrant issued for KARPIS, which indictment was filed at St.Paul on May 4, 1934, and when this error was discovered on January 24, 1935 a new bench warrant was issued for ALVIN KARPIS on the conspiracy indictment filed at St.Paul on January 22, 1935.

A copy of this report is being forwarded to all Division offices so that each may be informed of the charges against these defendants in the event any of them may be apprehended in any district,



Re: CBremer case; Cash AcDonald.



Mr. Hanson telephoned and stated that he had just received word from Agent Metcalfe at West Palm Beach, Florida to the effect that he, Metcalfe, had just apprehended Cash McDonald. Mr. Hanson stated that Metcalfe reports that he was driving around the town looking for the car of McDonald, and came upon the automobile standing in front of a particular spot; that he immediately took McDonald into custody and of a necessity took him to the Police Station there.

Mr. Hanson stated that he had wired the Division that the indictment against McDonald had been returned; that he subsequently telephoned Mr. Newby and informed him of the desire of the judge down there that no publicity be given to the returning of this indicoment, the reasons for this desire on the part of the judge not being known to Hanson. I instructed Mr. Hanson to get the United States Marshal, or his deputy, proceed immediately to West Palm Beach, and arrest Mc-Donald on the warrant based upon the above named indictment. Mr. Hanson stated that he was instructing two Agents to proceed immediately to West Palm Beach to assist Metcalfe in this matter, Metcalfe being alone there; that he is proceeding there tonight by airplane.

Re: Bremer case.

Mr. Nathan telephoned with reference to the transfer of Volney Davis to Chicago and stated they could obtain a cabin plane, large enough to accomodate three passengers and a pilot, which will be able to leave Kansas City at 2:30 PM, CST, and will arrive in Chicago about 5:30 PM CST. I instructed Mr. Mathan to hire this plane and to select two of his best agents to go along; that Davis should be securely handcuffed and shackled with leg irons and that he should be escorted to the flying field with three or four additional agents who should stay there until the takeoff.

I further instructed Mr. Nathan to telephone Mr. Connelley at Chicago and advise him of the time of the arrival in order that he might meet the plane there.

February 4, 1935 MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR Re: Bremer Case Miss CL... Coulter called from St. Paul and advised that he had consulted the United States Attorney and attempted to turn over to him the 114,000 end diamonds which had been taken from "Ma" and Fred Barker after they had been shot at Ocala, Florida. The United States Attorney refuses to accept these items and I told Mr. Coulter that this was rather an inconsistent position for him to take after he had issued a subpoena duces tecum for the money and dismonds. Mr. Coulter said that the United States Attorney has indicated that he would use information in the trial of the Bremer Case, showing that these people had the money and diamonds and that the production of the items themselves in Court would not be necessary. In view of the various claims that are being made for the money and diamonds, I respectfully suggest that I be authorized to instruct Coulter to contect the United States Attorney and request that a bill of interplesder be filed in the Federal Court at St. Paul, Minnesota in the name of the Special Agent in Charge of the St. Paul Division Office, whereby the money and diamonds can be turned into the Court's custody for whatever disposition the Court authorizes, after hearing all claims presented to the Court. Mr. Coulter advised that the attorneys for the Fremer interests contemplate bringing legal action to obtain anything of value found in the possession of the Barkers. Since we claim no interest in any of the property, a bill of interpleader would appear proper in this instance and would protect the Division against any conflicting claims from any source. 

RE: Bremer Case

Mr. Baker of the State Department called and stated that he had just received a telegram from the American Embassy at Havana, Cuba, stating that an American citizen, named Nathaniel Heller, was being detained by the Cuben police at the request of Agents McKee and Brown of this Division. I advised Mr. Baker that I was acquainted with this situation and he, in a pugnacious manner, demanded to know "what the idea was in getting this man detained".

I advised Mr. Baker during the course of developments in this situation, on Saturday afternoon the matter had been discussed by you at some length with a representative of the State Department and that Division Agents had contected the Ambassador at Havana on Saturday afternoon, and on Sunday. Mr. Baker stated that he was the person who should handle this case for the State Department and that he was confronted with the problem of enswering the telegram. I advised Mr. Baker that I thought the situation had been all straightened out but that Mr. Wilson could give him more details.

For record purposes it may be stated that Mr. Baker's attitude was belligerent.

I telephoned Mr. Connelley at Chicago and informed him of the apprehension of McDoneld at West Palm Beach, Florida.

I mentioned the surrender of Jess Doyle at Girard, Kansas, and stated that I was somewhat concerned over the possibility of publicity emanating from this surrender; that in view of this, it was not my opinion that we should take him into Chicago and hold him for two or three days; that the only alternative is to interrogate him in the county jail there until the arrival of the United States Marshal.

With regard to Edna Murray, I mentioned that we might be able to get her i to Chicago for questioning before any publicity emanates from Pittsburg, Kansas; that in the event of any publicity, she could be taken by the Marshal before the Commissioner.

I told him that McDoneld is a rather cage individual to deal with; that it might be necessary to file a complaint against him in St. Paul. I told him, however, that McDonald was indicted this morning in Floride for herboring, and we will have no trouble keeping him in custody.

I requested Mr. Connelley to keep the Division advised of any developments in regard to Volney Davis.

During a telephonic conversation with Mr. Nathan at Kansas City, I inquired of any developments at Pittsburg, Kansas in the above. He stated that Edna Murray will talk some, but she will not make any statements which will implicate herself. She denies that she was allowed into the council at the time the above matter was being planned. She does admit certain phases of the above, however. Mr. Nathan stated that he understands a written statement is being taken from her now. Mr. Nathan further stated that Edna Murray states that Jess Doyle is not at all implicated in the matter.

With reference to Jess Doyle, Mr. Nathan stated that he will not discuss the above case at all, claiming that he knows nothing about it. I instructed him to continue working on this man because we know that he is implicated in some way. He stated that he was forwarding a photograph and the fingerprints of Doyle by the very first mail possible.

Mr. Nathan mentioned that the Sheriff where Doyle is being held is not overly cooperative with our men. He seems to be somewhat disturbed over the fact that we had someone under suspicion in his county and did not let him know about it. Mr. Nathan instructed the men to take no attitude toward the Sheriff which would serve to irritate him further.

Mr. Larson telephoned from Detroit and advised that he had just learned that "Cash" McDonald had been apprehended in Florida; that he would like to suggest going through McDonald's home at Gross Point Park in order to ascertain if there is anything of value in the nature of telegrams and letters which might serve as evidence, also with the idea in mind that possibly some of the Karpis gang might be quartered there. Mr. Larson stated that he believed he could obtain access to the house through the chaiffeur and that the Chief of Police has stated to Mr. Larson that he did not believe the latter would have any difficulty in going in and searching the house, but Mr. Larson stated that he did not believe the police would be inclined to do much in this respect on their own initiative.

I advised Mr. Larson that we could not go in and search the house without a search warrant and that we have nothing at present to base such a warrent on other than we might suspect part of the gang to be quartered there and this was not sufficient basis as it was merely a suspicion; that however, Mr. Larson could send several agents out there and look the place over with a view of seeing if any of the gang is in the vicinity or quartered at the house but that we should stay within our legal rights to see if McDonald is quartering them, in other words not to make a search of the house without first obtaining a search warrant.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR RE: Bremer Case.

I called Mr. Nathan at Kansas City and instructed him to obtain a good photograph of Jesse Doyle and send it to St. Paul where Bryan Bolton might identify him as being one of the unknown individuals in the indictment.

I advised Mr. Nathan that I had instructed Mr. Connelley to send Agent Madala to Pittsburg, Kansas to question Edna Murray. Mr. Nathan stated tha Agent Hansen was on his way to Pittsburg to assist in the questioning of Edna Murray. I advised Mr. Nathan that if he thought she should be taken to Kansas City to do so; that he should file a fugitive complaint at once if there is any publicity. I advised Mr. Nathan that it would be well to have the St. Paul Office send him a summary of the indictment; that he should have it for reference in filing complaints; that he should also request copies of the warrants for Jesse Doyle and Edna Murray; that he should give some time and consideration to the questioning of Dorris O'Connor. Mr. Nathan stated that an Agent is questioning her now but he is not asking her questions which will prove embarrassing or in any way let the police know what it is about.

With regard to Jesse Doyle, Mr. Nathan stated that the jail is safe enough but the facilities for questioning are not so good. Mr. Nathan stated that the newspapers know that these people are being held but they do not know who they are. I advised Mr. Nathan to watch out for any attorneys with a writ of habeas corpus.

Mr. Nathan stated that he had received a telephone call advising him that a call was put in from Chicago to Girard, Kansas but the party making the call was unable to complete it. I advised Mr. Nathan that it might be Volney Davis and for him to contact Mr. Connelley and have him trace the call there.

Special Agent in Charge Hanson telephoned from Jacksonville with reference to the telegram which he forwarded to the Division this morning relating to the indictments that were returned by the Federal Grand Jury, to make certain that no publicity be given to these indictments in that United States District Judge Louis W. Strum had specifically issued instructions to this effect, and that the United States Attorney had taken Mr. Hanson into his confidence and furnished him with the information respecting the indictments.

Mr. Hanson stated that under no circumstances should any publicity be given for the time being.

I inquired as to developments at Miami and Mr. Hanson advised that they were making every effort to locate a photograph of Cassius M. Y'cDonald and to that end were endervoring to locate a Pinkerton operative named Eddy Grogan, who is reported to be in possession of such photograph. Mr. Hanson suggested that the Pinkerton Agency in New York be contacted and the present address of Grogan obtained, so that he could be contacted.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Bremer Case; Nathaniel Heller.

I telephoned Mr Wilson of the Latin-American Division of State Department, and stated that after a further discussion of the above matter, it was decided to request the State Department to request the deportation of Heller. Mr. Wilson then stated that he didn't know whether this could be done; that as far as he knows, no formal request has ever been made of a foreign government to deport an American citizen; that it was one thing for the Cuban government to deport the man, and entirely another matter for us to request his deportation when there is no extraditable offense lodged against him. I then stated that this man is charged with a crime in the United States, and it would seem that he would be an undesirable alien in Cuba. He then switched the situation around and asked what the attitude of the United States would be if a person were in our country charged with a crime in another country. I informed Mr. Wilson that the scope of my experience has not reached in that field of endeavor, and I was unable to make an opinion.

I then mentioned the indication on the part of Heller that he might voluntarily come into the United States. I told him that the lawyer of Heller had evidently talked him out of this, and the indication on the part of Heller now is that if he learns that deportation proceedings have been instituted against him, he will then volunteer to come to the United States in order to avoid such proceedings.

Mr. Wilson assured me that the State Department is eager to assist the Department of Justice in any way possible in the apprehension and prosecution of criminals; that, however under the circumstances, he is somewhat of a loss to know what to do. He stated, however, that he would keep in touch with me. I told him that there was nothing further I could do in the matter; that I had requested of the Department of State through Mr. Wilson that this man be deported, and ascertained that there was no such thing as a formal request; that we have tried for a week to convince the Ambassador in Cuba that this man should be deported, and the Ambassador is as yet unconvinced. He stated that he would give the matter further thought.



Mr. Hanson telephoned and stated that he had spent the night interrogating the above named subject, who was apprehended by Division Agents yesterday afternoon. Mr. Hanson informed that the story of McDonald does not agree with that of Joe Adams; that he admits knowing Adams and admits having been in the El Commorodo Hotel, but he denies that he knows Willie Harrison or Harry Sawyer; however, he says that the occasion of his visit with Joe Adams was to get a gambling concession, and that he had with him a fellow whom he had met at a gambling place in Miami Beach. He then identified the photograph of Sawyer as that man. He says that Sawyer claimed that his name was Mandovich, or something like that, and that he was from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He denies that he made the airplane trip with Harrison to Havana, although Mr. Hanson has records showing that the two of them were on the same airplane on two occasions. Mr. Hanson stated that he would continue working on this fellow today. I told him that it would be a good idea to let McDonald know that he has been identified as having been in those banks down there. McDonald explains that he exchanged some currency over in Havana for gold; that he was interested in a gambling concession in Havana and that he did not go through with the deal, so he drew what money out of that project that he had over there; that he also had with him for placing in that project \$25,000 in Liberty Bonds, which he cashed over there and bought gold.

I mentioned that the original money is still over there in the original wrappers, and the bank officials have identified him as the one who changed the money; that he should inform McDonald that he had better come through with the straight story, or he will find himself involved in the Bremer case. Mr. Hanson stated that in addition to informing McDonald of these facts, he has informed him that if he, McDonald, is harboring Harrison or Sawyer down there, he will be charged with harboring.

Mr. Hanson mentioned that the herspecial down there were making certain inquiries about one McDonald in West Palm Beach; that while he does not know how they found out about the apprehension of McDonald, he is gaine 35 to take him to Miami immediately and there hold him for further cuestioning; that he has a Deputy United States Marshal with him at the present time, and in case any emergency arises, the capias can be served; that upon their arrival at Miami, the Marshal will be asked to leave for a while.

Mr. Nathan telephoned from the Kansas City Office and stated that in one of the suitcases recovered in Pittsburg, Kanses, apparently belonging to Volney Davis, there were found five Mellon National Bank Travelers' Checks; that the numbers of these checks were furnished to Mr. Brantley of the Oklahoma City Office, who, after a check of the same, ascertained that they were stolen in one of the Okemah, Oklahoma bank robberies on January 22, 1935.

I inquired if there was anything else in those bags of evidentiary value, and he advised that there was not; that there were several letters found in the bags addressed to different names, two of which are known to be aliases of Davis; that there was a new name which has not been known heretofore with a post office box at Grandview, Missouri.

With reference to the money found in the possession of Davis at the time of his errest, I told Mr. Nathan that this money is presently in the possession of Mr. Connelley; that in this connection, he, Mr. Nathan, should request Mr. Connelley to have a further check made to ascertain if this momey came from either of the banks robbed at Okemah, Oklahoma on January 22, 1935.

I instructed Mr. Nathen that under no circumstances should any personal property not possessing evidentiary value be taken by the Division Agents from subjects in their custody.

I telephoned Agent Brown in Havana for any developments in Above matter. He stated that he believes the Cuban authorities will deport Heller if Mr. Caffery does not insist upon his staying; that he believes Mr. Caffery is now won over, due to the fact that we have offered to allow the man to go of his own free will and accord to the United States; that since Heller has refused to accept this offer, Mr. Caffery believes that he is implicated.

Brown stated that Heller is represented by Dr. Ramon Waydin, who, besides being a lawyer, is editor of the El Pais, a newspaper there. Mrs. Heller is somewhat socially prominent over there, and well liked by the other Americans over there; that she has circulated a petition and has gathered the names of many prominent Americans there. She is going to submit this petition to the President this morning in an effort to sway him. However, Mr. Brown states that the personal representatives of the President will take care of that for them. It then remains to be seen whether or not the Ambassador will assume an attitude of "hands off". If so, Brown states that Heller will be taken from Cuba today.

Mr. Brown stated that he understands that Mr. Hanson will forward photographs of McDonald just as soon as the same are obtained; that this photograph will be exhibited to various witnesses over there in an attempt to strengthen their case against belonald.

Mr. Brown stated that he would advise the Division of any further developments.





It was ascertained that they came to Philadelphia in an effort to obtain custody of Dolores Deleney's child.

Mr. and Mrs. Kerpavicz were traveling in a Ford Coupe Automobile bearing Illinois License Plates #522096. The car was stored at 142 N. Broad Street, Philadelphia, Pa., and the same was searched by agents of this office but nothing of particular value was found therein, with the exception of a list of telephone numbers, which Kerpavicz stated were telephone numbers of different mechanics in and about Chicago. There is being attached a copy of these telephone numbers.

Mr. and Mrs. Karpavicz were given permission to see Dolores Deleney at the Hehnemann Mospital, and an agent was present at all times during their conversation with Miss Delaney. It was ascertained through the doctor in attendance that the child can be moved within a period of five or seven days, and at which time Miss Delaney consented that her son, Raymond Alvin Karpis, may be taken back to Chicago by Mr. and Mrs. Karpavicz.

The effects of Miss Delaney were turned over to her, as well as the clothes that were found in Atlantic City, and receipt taken therefor, a copy of which is attached hereto





Volney Davis

Mr. Nothan telephoned from the Kansas City Office to give the following complete story of the apprehension of Davis:

They learned two days ago that the automobile of which they were suspicious was in Kansas City at a motor service company for repairs. It happened to be spotted there by one of the men who works for the company from which Davis had bought it. They checked the situation, and have since that time maintained contact at the place where the car is. Plans were formulated whereby the officials at the garage were to notify the Kansas City Office in advance of the time it was ready to take out so that men could be stationed there. Yesterday afternoon, Davis came by for the car, but it was not completed. Upon receipt of information to the effect that the car would be completed this morning, Mr. Nathan dispatched five Agents to the garage. These Agents were Agents Trainor, Staken, Carry, Shanahan and Dietz. They had two cars available in case they should decide to trail the party rather than take him into custody; however, when the party appeared, it was apparent that it was Davis, so Agent Trainor, who was inside the garage, took him into custody. Davis was alone at the time, having come up to the garage on foot, and only the people at the garage sat the arrest. Mr. Nathan stated that these people have promised to do no telking.

Mr. Nathan stated that they ascertained where the compenion of Davis who was with him yesterdey resides, this being Jess Doyle. However, since his girl friend, Doris\O'Connor, was arrested by the police at Kansas City for shooting another vocation, Doyle has evidently left town. He stated that they had just returned from Doyle's place, but it looks as though he has left for good. They ascertsined, howe er, the description of the car in which he is traveling, and Mr. Nathan asked my opinion as to the broadcasting of this information. I told him that if this can be done without any mention of Davis, it would be all right.

I instructed Mr. Nathan to get a walver of removed from Davis, charter an airplane and immediately remove him to Chicago, where the proper facilities are available for his questioning; that he should communicate with Mr. Connelley at the Chicago Office informing him of the time of Departure as well as time of arrival; that the Division should also be furnished this information. After the apprehension of Volney Davis at Kensas City, Missouri on February 6, 1935, Special Agents who were maintaining a surveillance of the house occupied by Harry C. Stanley, brother of Edna Jurray, who resides at Pittsburg, Kansas, in cooperation with the local police department, engaged Jess Doyle in a gun battle on the morning of February 7, 1935. Doyle escaped.

There was found residing in the house Edna Murray, paramour of Volney Davis. She was taken into custody and placed in the jail at Pittsburg, Kansas. Around 12:00 noon (E.S.T.) on the same day the Kansas City office received a telephone call from the Sheriff at Girard, Kansas, advising that Jess Doyle had surrendered himself. Special Agents were immediately dispatched to that point, where Doyle is being questioned.

Doyle and Edna Murray are also named as defendants in the indictment returned at St. Paul, Minnesota on January 22, 1935, by the federal Grand Jury, charging them, with others, with violating the Conspiracy Section of the Federal Kidnaping Statute, Title 18, Section 408-C. Very little is known as to the exact parts played by these two individuals in the case.

As you have been advised Cassius McDonald taken into custody yesterday at Mess Falm Beach, Morida. He was interrogated very lengthily, but denies knowing William Harrison or Harry Sawyer alias (Sealion. He does admit, however, that he made two trips from Mismi to Havana last September - he cannot recall the third trip which the records here reveal. Likewise he denies knowing that a William Harrison traveled on the same air whip with him to Havana on Sept. 6th last and returned with him on the same ship on Sept. 11th. He does admit knowing Joe kdams, claiming to have again met him last Sept. thru a Mismi gambler named Long whose description as fermished by McDonald does not fit Sawyer or Harrison. He also stated that the photograph of Harrison re-sembles a man known to him as Whitey Martin who ran a saloon across from the Roney Pleas Hotel on Rismi Beach a couple of years ago; further that he also met a man in a room at the klComodoro Hotel in Sept. who favors Harrison; that there was with this man a second individual who resembles Sawyer and who claimed to be a gambler from rittsburgh; that this second party worked at Carter's gambling house on Kiami Boach.

McDonald also claims that he has been working with Juan R. Jimenes, Colle 7 entre 8 y 10 "La Sierra", Marianas, Havana, Cuba; that Jimenes is a Chinaman who controls gambling in Cuba and that the two of them had control under the Tourist Laws of gambling in Cuba. He had a portfolio with a lot of Spanish writing presumbly contracts which might be a part of his "con" work. McDonald denies knowing my of the Barker-Karpyis crowld or that he telegraphed red Barker alias blackburn at Ocklawsha per the telegram you found there.

noDonald's name is Cassins M. McDonald his aliases being: Cash McDonald, C. McDonald, E. F. McDonald, Two copies of his photograph are attached hereto.



MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

On February 6, 1935 Special Agents of the Kansas City office had under surveillance an automobile at a motor service company in Kansas City, Missouri. The automobile had been located in the garage by one of the men employed by the automobile dealer who had sold the car to Volney Davis. Plans were formulated whereby the officials at the garage were to notify the Kansas City office in advance of the time when the car would be ready for delivery.

On the afternoon of February 5, 1935 an individual called for the car but was advised that the repairs would not be completed until the following morning, at which time Agents W. F. Treinor, Thomas E. Stakem, B. I. Parry, R. P. Shanahan, and H. A. Dietz covered the garage. The Agents had two Division cars available in case it was desired to trail the individual calling for the car under surveillance, rather than take him into custody. When the individual appeared at the garage, he was <u>identified as Volney Davis and was taken into custody by Special Agent</u> Trainor, who was stationed inside of the garage. Davis was alone at the time, having approached the garage on foot and the garage attendants were requested, and promised, to keep the apprehension of Davis confidential. It was learned that Davis was accompanied on the day before by Jess Doyle and the house where these two individuals had been living was located. It appears, however, that the paramour of Doyle, Dorig O'Conner, was arrested at Kansas City, Missouri on the day before for shooting another woman and for this reason Doyle had appearently left Kansas City, Missouri.

Davis was taken to the Kansas City Division office for questioning. At the time of his apprehension there was found on his person \$1100 and a 380 Colt revolver. Pursuent to Division instructions a waiver of removal tas obtained from Davis, an airplane was chartered for the purpose of removing him to Chicago, Illinois where the proper facilities are available for his questioning, and instructions were also issued that Special Agent

in Charge Connelley should be advised of the time of departure, as well as the time of arrival and that the Division should also be furnished with this information. The Kansas City office was further instructed to take every possible precaution to prevent his escape.

Davis was removed, in accordance with these instructions, by Special Agents Trainor and Stakem and Special Agent in Charge Nathan of the Kansas City office has since advised that, prior to the departure of these agents, they were advised of the Division's instructions regarding handcuffs and leg-irons for the prisoner and were further instructed to take no chances, delivering the prisoner safely to the Chicago office. The telegram reporting this information also sets forth that the prisoner was kept in handcuffs during the entire stay at the Kansas City office and at all times was under guard of at least two agents. Davis was accompanied to the airport by five agents and immediately, prior to the departure of the plane, Special Agent in Charge Nathan advised the pilot to hold up the departure until the irons could be fixed. In route from the office to the airport the handcuffs had been removed from the prisoner. Special Agent Trainor was also instructed to immediately advise Special Agent in Charge Connelley and Special Agent in Charge Nathan in the event of any mishap.

The plane carrying Davis and the agents was forced down at 6:45 P. W. in a corn field one mile south of Yorkville, Illinois and ten miles south of Aurora, Illinois. There was not a telephone in the vicinity and a farmer was hailed and requested to drive the agents with their prisoner to town in order to telephone the Chicago Division office. To prevent curiosity and disclosing the identity of the prisoner, all leg-irons and handcuffs were removed and all three walked into the Vaiding Hotel and Earroom. Special Agent Trainor went into the telephone booth, while Special Agent Stakem remained standing at the end of the ber with the prisoner. Then Agent Trainor had entered the telephone booth, Davis struck Agent Stakem on the cheek, knocking him down and then immediately leaped head first through a window and ran along the building to the rear. Agent Stakem immediately drew his gun from his hip-holster, ran to the window and fired twice at the risoner, who disappeared in the dark. Special Agent Trainor, upon hearing the commotion, ran out and tried to follow the prisoner without success. He secured the assistance of local persons and the Sheriff in conducting a search. During the course of the search they passed the car which was later stolen, apparently by Davis, which was a Ford V-8 Sedan, bearing Illinois License Number 104,140, property of Holland Bretthauer, a local grocer. The car was stolen about 7:40 P. M. and Davis apparently had hid in the vicinity from 7:10 to the time of the theft. At the time he disappeared he was wearing a dark blue overcoat, brown suit and hat, wore a finger ring and had in his possession a gold watch and no money. The Sheriff was not advised of the identity of the prisoner, except that

he was a Federal prisoner. Radio alarms were sent through the local police department to bick up the described automobile in which Davis was thought to have escaped.

MattyGleason of Aurora, Illinois approached one G. A. Karnhart and offered to sell him a white gold half-carat ring for \$60.00, claiming that the ring was the property of the prisoner who had escaped the previous evening from Federal officers and is wanted in connection with the Bremer kidneping case; that the prisoner had asserted to him that the Government had taken all his money except the ring and a watch. Barnhart purchased the ring around 10:00 P. W. the evening of February 7, 1935 and Gleason, who sold the ring to him, was followed to a house of prostitution, which is operated by him. One of the persons interviewed at this place identified Davis from the description furnished as an individual who visited that house the night before. Gleason was taken into custody and brought to the Chicago Division office but no information of value has been obtained from him up to this time. It is possible that he has assisted Davis in escaping from that vicinity. The Ford Sedan which was used by Davis in fleeing from Yorkville, Illinois was found abandoned near Wheaton, Illinois with bloodsteins on the front seat indicating hands or legs injured, probably caused from his leaping through the glass window. The ring recovered at Aurora, Illinois fits the description of the ring worn by Davis at the time of his escape.

other activities in this case which prevent their submitting complete memoranda. A complete report will be submitted at a later date.

On February 4, 1935, a telephone call was received at the Kanses City Office from an employee of Noel V. Wood Motor Company, Kansas City, Missouri, which company was cooperating in the efforts of this office to locate a Pontiac Sedan believed to have some connection with the Subjects of the case. Agents were immediately despatched to the Koel V. Wood Company, where it was ascertained that the car had not been brought into that company for repairs, but that anemployee of that company had observed and recognized the car on the floor of the United Motors Service, 2501 McGee, Kansas City, Missouri. It was ascertained that 1955 Missouri license plates were on the car, and that it had a Kensas City. Missouri, city license. Immediate inspection of this car by Agents determined that it was actually the car in which we were interested. It was determined that the car had been left there by a man, and that it would not be ready to be taken from the garage until the late evening of February 5, at the earliest. Arrangements were effected whereby the Kansas City Office would be notified in the event the car should be ready for delivery to its owner prior to that time, and it was arranged that this office should be notified in advance of the time when the car could be driven from the garage, in order that appropriate surveillance might be maintained.

Inquiry through the Motor Vehicle Registration Department of the State of Missouri, both at Kansas City and at Jefferson City, Missouri revealed only that the car was registered during 1935 in the name of G. L. Harper, Box 12, Raytown, Missouri, and that it had been transferred during the month of January from its previous registrant, Grace R. Hanson, to Harper. Inquiries were accordingly made at the Raytown Post Office through the Postmaster, Mr. Muir, where it was determined that Harper was unknown, and that the box had been rented under circumstances similar to the rental of a box at Belton, Missouri, previously reported. It could not be determined at Raytown that Harper was known to any persons interviewed. Photographs of the various Subjects and others implicated in this case were exhibited to persons both at Raytown and at the United Motors Service, but no positive identification was made of anyone. It was determined, however, on February 5, that one of the mechanics at the United Motors Service thought that the photograph of Volney Davis resembled to some extent the individual who had brought the car there for repairs.

On the early afternoon of February 5, 1935, a telephone call was received from the United Motors Service, to the effect that the owner of the car and another man had come in to look at the car and to determine what progress was being made on it. Agents were immediately despatched to that place, but these parties had gone at the time of their arrival, it appearing that they had only remained in the place for a very short time. The Agents were advised that these two persons had come to the garage in a 1935 Chevrolet Coupe, which bore Missouri license #193-360. The garage attendants advised that they had been informed that the car could not be ready on February 5, and the owner of the car had then given

an order that it be washed on the following morning, and that he would call for it about 10 or 11 o'clock. On the possibility that there might be some change in the plans of the owner, it was determined to keep the car under strict surveillance, and Agents were left at the garage for that purpose.

and the same Further inquiries through the Motor Vehicle Department disclosed that the Chevrolet car mentioned was registered in the name of J. C. Stacey. 23 Warner Plaza, Kansas City, Missouri. By inquiries in the neighborhood of that address, it was determined that the car was then parked on Warner Plaza. Agents W. F. Trainor and V. I. Parry observed an individual in the car and endeavored to trail him upon leaving, but lost him in traffic; it is noted that this surveillance occurred after dark, and it was impossible to obtain a view of the occupants of the car. In view of the set-up which had been arranged in connection with the Pontiac, it was deemed by the writer to be inadvisable to attempt any further surveillance of the persons residing at 23 Warner Plaza, inasmuch as such surveillance might create suspicion, and it appeared that the possibilities of identifying the owner of the Pontiac when he came for the car, were better than any other action which could be taken. Accordingly, the surveillance at 23 werner Plaza was discontinued.

Agents of the Kansas City Office resumed their surveillance at the United Motors Service when this place opened on the morning of February 6, 1935, at 7:30 a.m. The Agents taking part in this surveillance were W. F. Trainor, R. P. Sharahan, T. E. Stakem, H. A. Dietz, and V. I. Parry. It was arranged that Agent Parry should accompany the Pontiac from the United Motors Service to another automobile company at the time it was washed, and he was provided with appropriate clothing for the purpose. At a little before 12 o'clock, an individual resembling Volney Davis was observed to walk by the show windows of the United Motors Service Company, and after looking around he entered the place and came over to where the Pontiac was stationed. Special Agent Trainor had an opportunity to get a good look at this individual, and recognized him as being identical with Davis. He was immediately taken into custody and offered no resistance. Upon being searched, it was found that he had in his possession a .32 celiber automatic pistol, which was removed from his person. He was brought to the Kansas City Office immediately, and the Division was notified. Davis was briefly questioned by the writer and admitted his identity. He was asked as to the individual who had been with him on the preceding day, and after some hesitation advised that it was Jess Doyle. He stated that Doyle was probably at 23 Warner Plaza, but expected to leave within ar hour. When questioned as to his place of residence, he advised that he had resided at 3215 Broadway, but had left there several days ago because Edna Murray had deserted him and had been living at the Warner Plaza address with Doyle. It is observed that these statements were subsequently found to be untrue.

In an effort to locate Doyle, Agents Trainor, Shanahar, Dietz, Parry, and Nathan immediately proceeded to 23 Warner Plaza, where, after properly stationing agents at all strategic points, it was determined that apparently no one was in the apartment, and entry was effected through the service door. The

apartment had the appearance of having been vacated by its occupants, although there were a few articles of women's clothing and toilet articles in the place. Prior to forcing an entry through the service door, permission to do so was obtained by Agent from the manager of the apartment, Mrs. C. T. Miller, who resides at 15 Warner Plaza, telephone Valentine 0142. Three Agents were left in this apartment on the thought that Doyle might return there, and Agents were maintained there continuously until the following day, when Doyle was found to be at Pittsburg, Kansas.

Inquiry at 3215 Broadway, given by Davis as his former address, disclosed that the address which he meant was the Zelda Apartments, 3211-13 Broadway, where the manager, whose name was not obtained, advised that a Hanson had lived there for a period of approximately two months with his wife, but had left several weeks prior to Agents' visit, stating that he was going to St. Joseph, Missouri. The apartment was briefly examined and was found to have been entirely cleaned out.

Under instructions from Pr. Temm of the Division, arrangements were made to charter a plane in order to take Davis to Chicago. Davis had previously executed a waiver of removal to any point for prosecution or questioning. He was escorted by five Agents to the Kansas City airport, and left Kansas City at 3:20 p.m., accompanied by Special Agents W. F. Trainor and T. E. Stakem. Prior to the arrival of the plane at Chicago, a forced landing was necessitated due to the pilot's losing his way, the landing taking place near Yorkville, Illinois. Davis was taken by the Agents into Yorkville, and, during a phone call being made by Agent Trainor to the Chicago Division Office to advise Mr. Connelley of the situation, Davis succeeded in making his escape, slugging Agent Stakem and diving through a closed window. Agent Stakem fired two shots at him, but apparently neither took effect. Further details in this connection are being omitted, in view of the fact that the Division has been fully advised of the circumstances.

With the approval of the Division, a description of the Chevrolet car in which Doyle was believed to be traveling was furnished to various law enforcement officers in the Kansas City district and to the Division Offices surrounding Kansas City. Detailed information concerning this automobile was also furnished by telephone by the writer to Special Agent D. A. Bryce at Pittsburg, Kansas, who had been spotted there together with Special Agent W. B. O'Mahoney for several weeks. On the morning of February 7, 1935, Agents Bryce and V. R. Clary, who was assisting in the surveillance at Pittsburg during the temporary absence of Agent O lahoney, determined that the Chevrolet car with the Kissouri license noted above had appeared at the home of H. C. Stanley. Accompanied by Chief of Police Ross Armstrong, Agents Bryce and Clary proceeded to that address. Other members of the Pittsburg, Kansas, Police Department were enroute to the scene, but it was observed that persons were apparently preparing to leave the address, and it was noted that Jess Doyle was in the Chewrolet car described. Doyle made his escape temporarily from the agents, who fired at him, several shots taking effect in the car, and it was at first thought that Doyle was wounded, from his actions. However, it was

subsequently determined that he was not hit, although the car was damaged.

Officers in the vicinity were notified from Pittsburg and from the Kansas City
Office to be on the lookout for Doyle, and at approximately 10:30 a.m.,
February 7, information was obtained that Doyle had salled the Sheriff at
Cirard, kansas, from the outskirts of Girard, and surrendered himself, his
car having become stuck, and he apparently having lost his nerve after abserving the shots in his car. He was taken to the Crawford County Jail at
Girard. It was determined by the Agents that the other occupants of the
Stanley home included Edna Murray and Mr. and Mrs. Harry C. Stanley,—all of
whom were taken into custody and lodged at the city jail at Pittsburg.

On February 9, 1935, on instructions of Mr. Tarm of the Division, complaints were filed against Jess Doyle and Edna Murray at Topeka, Kansas, by Special Agent R. G. Reed, the complaints being based on the indictment returned at St. Paul. These complaints were authorized by Assistant United States Attorney D. C. Hill, who also authorized filing of a complaint against the Stanleys, charging them with harboring Edna Murray and Doyle on February 7, 1935. This complaint charged a violation of Section 246, Title 18, C. S. Code.

On February 10, 1935, Doyle and Edna Murray were taken into custody by a Deputy United States Marshal, and were brought before United States Commission r C. M. Armour, Fort Scott, Kansas. They had previously both executed waivers of removal to St. Paul or any other point. They waived hearing before the Commissioner and were committed to the Wyandotte County Jail, Kansas City, Kansas, by the Marshal, and will probably be removed to St. Paul on or about February 11, 1935. The Stanleys will probably be taken into custody by the Marshal on February 11.

During the time that these parties were held at Pittsburg and Girard, Kansas, they were interviewed by Agents of the Kansas City Office and by Special Agents Paul Hansen and Whelan, of the Oklahoma City Office, and Special Agent J. L. Madala, of the Chicago Office. The statements which were made will be incorporated in the subsequent report to be submitted. Memoranda will be prepared by each of the Agents participating in the investigation outlined herein, and included in another report.

It should be noted that on the late afternoon of February 5, 1935, a shooting scrape occurred in Kensas City, during which a woman giving the name to the police of Mrs. Frances Taylor, alias Rush, was shot and seriously wounded by Doris O'Connor, sister of Edna Murray. This shooting occurred at about the time that information was obtained by this office as to the address of Jess Doyle under the name of J. C. Stacey; on the morning of February 5, local newspapers carried an account of the shooting, giving the name of the asseilant as Mrs. Vinita Stacey. In view of the woman having the same name as that of the person residing at 23 Warner Plaza, and operating the Chevrolet

Coupe under suspicion, inquiries were made through the Kansas City Police
Department, where the fingerprints of the woman held were compared with those
of Doright Connor, and the identity of this woman established. On the same
morning, a telephone call was received by the writer from an employee of the
libel V. Wood Company to the effect that the picture of the woman held under the
name of Stacey by the police department, was identical with the woman to whom
the Pontiac Sedan in question had been sold. It is evident that the reason for
Jess Doyle leaving his apartment at 23 Warner Plaza was this shooting affair,
inesmuch as he had undoubtedly vacated this apartment prior to the Apprehension
of Volney Davis.

Doris O'Connor has been interviewed briefly by Special Agent A. E. Farland of this office, but has declined to talk, beyond an admission of her identity after being confronted with the fingerprint identification. It has been established through the records of the Kansas City Police Department that the woman who was shot has been arrested in the past in connection with a blackmeil scheme investigated by the Post Office inspectors at Kansas City, in which she was involved with one John Langdon. The indications are that this woman, together with Langdon, has been associating with Doyle and Davis in Kansas City. She is in a serious condition in a local hospital, and for a time it was thought that she would not recover, but the present indications are that there is at least a chance of her recovery. She has refused to identify her assailant or to give the police any information. She was also briefly interviewed by Special agent Farland, the interview necessarily being extremely limited because of her physical condition. Further attention to this angle of the matter is being given, and every effort will be made to determine the identities of any other persons who may have been associates of the Subjects during their stay in Kansas City.

At the time of the apprehension of Davis, he had in his possession approximately \$1100.00 in currency, consisting of ten one hundred dollar bills, and a number of smaller bills. This money was turned over to Special Agent in Charge Connelley by the Agents who accompanied Davis from Kansas City to York-ville, Illinois. At the same time they turned over certain other personal effects taken from Davis, and the list which had been made of this currency and other effects. No copy was retained in Kansas City, due to the limited time Davis was held here.

Among the effects found in the possession of Doyle were a number of Mellon Travelers Checks, which have been identified as having been stolen from one of two national banks at Okemah, Oklahoma, which were robbed on the same day, approximately December 22, 1934. These robberies were perpetrated by six men, and it appears quite probable that Doyle and Davis were implicated in these and possibly in other bank robberies in this section. Attention is being given to this angle of the case.

During the interviews had by Agents of the Kansas City Office with Jess Doyle at Girard, Kansas, he informed them of the fact that Volney Davis and Edna Lurray had resided in another apartment subsequent to moving from 3211 Broadway. He was unable to give the exact location of this apartment, but generally described its neighborhood. Inquiries made by the writer and Special Agent W. E. Miller established rather definitely the location of this apartment as the Beaumont Apertments, 3028 Baltimore Avenue, Apartment 209. With the permission of the manager of this apartment, Mrs. Schupan, a thorough search was made of the apartment on February 9, 1935. It was found to have apparently been hurriedly vacated by its occupants, who left at least the majority of their personal effects. The search disclosed no firearms or money of any description, there being one cartridge for a .401 rifle in one of the portable trunks in the apartment. There was a large quantity of men's clothing and a smaller quantity of women's clothing, together with a number of handbags and trunks. This apertment was rented under the name of G. Harper on or about February 1. From the newspapers which had not been removed from the front of the apartment, it is evident that the apartment had not been occupied since February 6. The latest paper found in the apartment was that of the afternoon of that date. In this connection, Doyle told the agents that he had spent the day at this apertment efter Davis had gone to obtain his automobile, and had vacated the apartment during the late afternoon, proceeding from Kansas City to Pittsburg, Kansas, that night.

Ifter discussing this phase of the matter with Mr. Connelley by telephone, trangements were effected with the manager of the apartment for Agents
of this office to be planted in it against the possible return of Davis. Special
Agents A. E. Farland, N. O. Scott, and E. M. Heavrin are presently in the apartment, appropriately armed, and will remain there until such time as it appears
that this lead has no possible value.

It is also noted that in the brief interview had with Davis by Agent Farland, Davis advised that he had contemplated going to Coulee Dan, in the state of Montana. However, it has been determined that a number of the statements which Davis made at that time were false.

All leads developed by the inquiries in this district are being given immediate attention, and any leads requiring attention elsewhere are being submitted to the appropriate offices.

Reference is made to your telephonic conversation with the writer of February 2, 1935, concerning the arrest of Nathaniel H. Heller of Havana, Cuba, by the Havana police after having been furnished information by special agents R. D. Brown and S. K. McKee concerning Heller's association with and harboring of Alvin Karpis.

As you were advised telephonically on February 2nd, after special agent Brown's return to Miami from Havana, Brown advised me that upon his arrival in Havana on January 20th he telephoned the United States Ambassador's first secretary, Mr. H. F. Mathews, advising him of his arrival in Havana. He further stated that he did not call upon Mr. Mathews personally or on any other member of the Ambassador's or the Consul's staff until after he had conducted his investigation and furnished the Cuban officials with the information concerning Heller's harboring of Karpis.

Brown also told me that he did not speak to anyone attached to the Ambassador's or Consul's staff until the Havana police had arrested Heller on the grounds that he was an undesirable alien; that after the arrest and on February 2, 1935, he called upon the United States Ambassador, the Hon. Jefferson Caffrey, when he related all the facts to him. Brown mentioned that he made this call between l and 2PM on February 2nd and that while the Ambassador at first appeared to be provoked because Heller had been arrested without his knowledge and because he was not in a position to make a statement to the Press, yet after all the facts of the case had been explained to the Ambassador, Brown was of the opinion that Mr. Caffrey's attitude had changed and that he was no longer disturbed about the matter. Immediately after talking to you on the telephone on the evening of February 2nd, I communicated the Assistant United States Attorney in Miami who authorized a complaint against Heller charging him with conspiracy to harbor Karpis in Miami. The complete details as to the complaint were telephoned to the Division that; night for which reason they are not being repeated here.

Further in accordance with your instructions I went to Havana, Cuba, on February third to call upon Ambassador Caffrey. I explained to him your regrets over the action of Special Agents Brown and McKee in going to the Havana police without having taken the matter up with him or his staff. He informed me that that matter was now a past incident so far as he was concerned; that at the time of the arrest and shortly thereafter the matter was embarrassing because the Press, upon whose cooperation he was very dependent, had called upon him for a statement and he was in mo position to furnish it. He informed me of the necessity for the Ambassador or his staff to be acquainted with the work done by the various representatives of the United States in Cuba, especially when such work might involve a citizen of the United States inasmuch as when a citizen of this country got in trouble it was the duty of the Consul to see that he got his rights and also because the various members of Congress generally were interested in the welfare of their constituents and would call upon the Ambassador or the State Department for information concerning the case.

I explained to the Ambassador that special agents Brown and lickee would keep him fully informed as to their investigation and that no action would be taken by them without the approval of the Ambassador. Mr. Caffrey seemed very much satisfied with that arrangement and requested that the agents keep his first secretary. Mr. Mathews informed as to the case. The agents were instructed to do this. I also pointed out to him that the arrest in this case had been made by the Havana police which fact he stated was known to him. He however pointed out that because of his close relationship with the President of Cuba, he would be called upon by the Cuban authorities for a recommendation with respect to deporting Keller even tho the Havana police made the arrest. In this respect he inquired of me whether I believed Heller was guilty of harboring karpis inasmuch as Heller denies knowing the identity of Karpis claiming to know him only as Mr Naggoner. I informed the Ambassador that it was my personal opinion that the various acts committed by Heller, viz the renting of a home for Karpis, the purchase of an automobile for him, the purchase of a motor for a motor-boat, of various household goods including the purchase of groceries and daily newspapers and the keeping of approximately ten thousand dollars for Karpis, were all such facts or duties outside of the duties of a hotel manager that they lead me to believe that Heller was acquainted with Karpis! identity. The Ambassador then indicated that he would withhold any judgment that he had to make until all the facts were presented to his secretary. I further explained to him that the United States Attorney in Miami was satisfied that the evidence of Heller's association with Dolores Delaney in Miami was such evidence that he had authorized the prosecution of Heller and that there was now

a warrant outstanding for Heller in the United States District Court at Miami.

At the conclusion of my interview with Mr. Caffrey I was of the opinion that he no longer was harshly disposed towards the Division.

I should also mention that the Ambassador also asked if there was any objection to permitting the newspaper men to interview Heller. I, of course, informed him that Heller was in the custody of the Havana police and that so far as this Division was concerned they had complete custody of him and that if they would permit the newsmen to see Heller that was satisfactory with me. I told the Ambassador that I would instruct special agents McKee and Brown to that effect which I did. As I indicated above, I also told these agents to keep the Ambassador's first secretary fully informed as to the entire investigation in Cuba; furthermore that the property belonging to Karpis which was recovered from Heller which property included a radio, motor for a boat, household goods and a Ford Sedan, all of which was recovered by the Havana police be disposed of as the Havana police and the American Ambassador believed proper and lawful.

Subsequent to my return to Miami, late on the night of February third, special agent Brown communicated with me telephonically advising that the Havana police had declined the newspaper men permission to see Heller.

I also should have mentioned above that special agent Brown informed me that he had intended to call upon the Ambassador's secretary, Mr. Mathews, after his telephonic conversation with him on the day of his arrival, but that after commencing the investigation and after contacting who for fifteen years

has lived in Havana

as advised that as soon as the representatives of the Ambassador or Consulate became acquainted with the assignment of the special agents it would appear in the Press. Brown believing that there was a possibility of locating William Harrison and Harry Sawyer in Havana was attempting to avoid any publicity. Nevertheless, Brown disregarded the instructions that I had given him to call upon the United States Consul.


