Mr. Hanson telephoned and stated that he has just learned from the Agents in Cuba that Heller plans to voluntarily leave Cuba either today or tomorrow; that Mrs. Heller is presently in Miami attempting to have the bond of Heller reduced to \$10,000; that the United States Attorney is of the opinion that this should be done in view of the fact that the bond of Adams is set at \$10,000, and he is no more guilty than Heller; that he, Mr. Hanson, is of the opinion that we should abide by the ruling of the United States Attorney. I mentioned that there is not much more that we can do under the circumstances.

With reference to McDonald, Mr. Hanson stated that he is informed by the Agents in Cuba that they have an iron clad case against McDonald in the exchange of that money. Mr. Hanson conveyed this information to the United States Attorney, who stated that he was going to immediately recommend that the bond of McDonald be increased to \$50,000.

Mr. Henson suggested that it might be well to let Brown and McKee remain in Miami upon their arrival there for the purpose of questioning McDonald; that they are undoubtedly in possession of pertinent information about his activities which is not in the possession of the other men, and it is believed that considerable time could be saved, and a more intelligent interrogation of McDonald be effected by this arrangement. I concurred in this opinion.

Mr. Hanson stated that he was forwarding a wire to Agent Brown today instructing him to telephone me relative to their return.

Special Agent in Charge Larson telephoned from Detroit to advise that he had consulted Mr. Connelley relative to the discontinuance of the several telephone taps being maintained at Toledo and Cleveland, Ohio and they had agreed that this should be done. I advised Mr. Larson that, inasmuch as no information of value had been developed through these taps, it is agreeable with the Division to discontinue same.

Mr. Larson also advised that Charles Becker, a former bartender at the Casino Club, had been interviewed and admitted seeing members of the Barker-Karpis gang in the Casino Club; that he mentioned the fact that there individuals resembled kidnapers whose photographs he had seen in publications to Ted Angus; that Angus stated that Becker did not know what he was talking about.

Mr. Larson is going to confer with the United States Attorney with a view to referring harboring charges against the Angus brothers and Ni / Cousins and after the issuance of process will take them into custody.

RE: Bremer Case.

SAC Nathan called and stated that Mr. Ellis, of the Burns Detective Agency, was in the office this afternoon and advised that a photographic identification of Jesse Doyle as participating in the robbery of the Bank of Drexel, Missouri, on December 13, 1934, had been made by a number of witnesses. Mr. Nathan stated that Mr. Ellis wanted to know if it would be possible for the witnesses to see Doyle, having seen in the paper that he was being held at Kansas City, Kansas.

Mr. Nathan further stated that the robbery included three men and a boy according to Mr. Ellis' information; that the bank is a State bank and not a member of the Federal Reserve System; that about \$2,500. was taken in the robbery; that Mr. Ellis has other information which he is not at liberty to tell him, but which indicated that Doyle participated in the robbery.

Mr. Nathan stated that the U. S. Marshal advised him that he is going to move Doyle Wednesday or Thursday; that he did not tell Mr. Ellis anything but advised him that he would check up on it and see what it was all about. Mr. Nathan stated that if there were three men in the robbery, there was a possibility that they were Doyle and Davis and the young boy who is Edna Murray's son.

> I advised Mr. Nathan that if local officers, other than the Burns Detective Agency, are interested, we could hardly refuse to grant our consent to just viewing the prisoner. I instructed Mr. Nathan to call Agent Coulter at St. Paul and tell him to put this request up to the United States Attorney; that if the United States Attorney desires them to view the prisoner but not interview him, we will be guided by his recommendation.

> Mr. Nathan stated that the Sheriff is interested and the local police have been working with the Burns Detective Agency on local angles of the case.



BREMER -Victim: Kidnaping The developments during the week have been the return of sixteem indictments at Jacksonville, Florida on February 7, 1935, charging Joseph H. Adams, Henry "Duke" Randall Mathaniel Heller, Cassius M. McDonald, Dolores Delaney and Mynons Burdette with harboring and conspiracy to harbor, misprision felony, conspiracy to commit misprision felony and Adams and Randall were charged with the unlawful possession of a machine gun. McDonald was taken into custody at West Palm Beach, Florida on February 7, 1935 and is held in default of \$25,000 bond. Joe Adams was taken into custody and released on February 9, 1935 under \$10,000 bond. Henry "Duke" Randall is being held on \$10,000 bond. Bond for Dolores Delaney and Mynona Burdette has been tentatively set for \$15,000 each. The boni of Heller is set at \$25,000. Dorigo Conner, who is being sought for questioning in connection with this case, was taken into custody by the Police Department at Kansas City, Missouri on February 5, 1935 on the charge of attempting to murder another woman. Volney Davis, who is under indictment in connection with this case, was taken into custody at Kansas City, Missouri on February 6, 1935 and subsequently escaped from Agents at Yorkville, Illinois. Edna Murray, paramour of Davis, was taken into custody at Pittsburg, Kansas on February 7, 1935. A gun battle was held at that place with Jess Doyle, who fled to Girard, Kansas and surrendered to the Sheriff around noon on February 7, 1935. Respectfully, -576-DIVISION OF MINEST. After receiving your information by telephone on the night of February 6, to the effect that JESS DCYLE, had left Kansas City, Mo. driving a Chevrolet Coupe bearing 1935 Mo. tags 193-380, and that it was possible that he was headed for Pittsburg, Kan., Agent V. R. Clary and the writer checked all streets and garages in Pittsburg, but failed to locate the above describes car.

On the morning of Feb. 7, 1935, Mr. J.D. Miller called the writer at 7:00 a.m. stating that there was a Chevrolet Coupe parked behind the residence of H. C. Stanley, 206 E. Adams St. Pittsburg, Kan. Agent Clary and writer immediately drove by the Stanley home and noticed the Chevrolet, bearing tags numbered 193-380. The car was still parked behind the house as previously described by Kr. Killer. Agents immediately called Chief of Police, Ross Armstrong, Pittsburg, and Sergeant Thomas Stowers, also Pittsburg Police. They were told to meet Agents in the vicinity of the Stanley home. After the arrival of Chief Armstrong, and before the arrival of Thomas Stowers, at about 8:05 A.M., H. C. Stanley came from the back door of his home and got into his own personal automobile, a Buick, and backed out to the street, where he stopped as if waiting for someone. Jess Doyle then, after having come from the Stanley home, entered the Chevrolet Coupe and drove it to where H. C. Stanley was parked waiting. Stanley then drove two blocks south of Adams Street, where he turned west with Jess Doyle following him. Agents Clary and the writer, together with Chief Armstrong, followed the two above mentioned automobiles in a Division owned automobile, that Agents were driving.

Stanley and Doyle in their respective cars turned west after proceeding two blocks south of Adams Street and went three blocks west. crossing Broadway, the first intersection crossed. After driving west three blocks they again turned south and drove in that direction on a street that had a dead end. Apparently neither Stanley nor Doyle realized that the street dead ended until reaching the end. They made the turn at the end of the street and started back facing us. Stanley was leading Doyle by about ten or fifteen yards. There was only one course open for Agents and the Chief to take Doyle, which was to block the street with the Division automobile. Agent Clary drove past Stanley and blocked the street with the Division automobile. The writer immediately stepped out of the car covered Doyle with the machine gun calling "We're coppers, Jess, put your hands up". Doyle then reached in the seat by his side with his right hand, picking up a pistol and with his left hand wheeled his car over the right curb ran along inside of the sidewalk for a distance of about 15 yards turned back into the street and started north.

The writer fired thirteen shots at Doyle through the back of his fleeing car, firing two bursts from the machine gun. Several of the shots fired were seen to hit the car directly behind the driver and Doyle was seen to slump in the seat but continued to drive north. Chief Armstrong was also firing at the car with a high powered rifle, striking the car one time on the right side, the bullet coming out through the right glass frame. Chief Armstrong was firing from the Division automobile.

The writer then jumped back into the Division car, Agent Clary turned the car around and started in pursuit of Doyle. We failed to locate Doyle after the affray. The car was lost in the residential district of Pittsburg, Doyle having a four block lead before the Division car could be turned around.

When it was seen that Doyle had escaped, we immediately drove to the Stanley home, 206 E. Adams Street, Agent Clary went to the back of the house, Chief Armstrong watched the front, the writer went in the house through the front door, ordering everyone to put up their hands. There were three people in the house, Lr. and Lrs. Stanley and Edna Lurray. Edna Lurray had a .32 cal. Colt automatic pistol when the writer entered the house followed by Chief Armstrong. She threw the pistol on the divan. All three people were then placed under arrest and lodged in the Pittsburg city jail.

At writer's request Sergeant Tom Stowers called all outlying cities in the vicinity of Pittsburg, giving the tag number and description of the car driven by Doyle as well as description of Doyle, requesting that officers so notified block all highways within a radius of fifty miles.

At about 11:10 A.M. Sheriff Delamaide of Crawford County, Kansas, called the Pittsburg Police Department stating that he had Jess Doyle in custody at the County Jail. Agent Clary, Thomas Stowers and the writer immediately proceeded to Girard, Kansas and placed a Covernment hold order on Jess Doyle.

Upon interview with Poyle immediately upon reaching the jail, Doyle stated to Agents that he had called the Sheriff by telephone telling him that he was wanted as a fugitive by the Government and that he wanted to get in jail for fear of his life. The Sheriff then stated to Agent that Doyle had called him out of bed by telephone stating that he was a fugitive and had had a shooting scrape in Pittsburg and wanted to get in jail before he got killed, giving the Sheriff his location at the time which was 132 miles southwest of Girard, Kensas.

Poyle then stated that his car was stuck in the mud two miles from where the Sheriff had picked him up. The Sheriff then accompanied

Agents and Thomas Stowers to the Chevrolet car driven by Doyle.

Inside the coupe directly behind and above the seat was found a gun case containing 1 Remington automatic rifle 401 caliber, 1 pump 12. gauge sawed off shotgun; 1 Remington sawed off automatic shotgun and 1 regular Remington 12 gauge automatic shotgun. All these guns were put into the Division automobile together with four suit cases also found in the back end of the coupe. All this property was taken to the County Jail at Girard, where the Sheriff picked up the new Remington 12 gauge automatic shotgun stating that he was going to keep it as a souvenir. This gun is still in the possession of the Sheriff who refuses to surrender same to Agents.

Subsequent search made in the vicinity of the neighborhood where Doyle abandoned his car was made by county officers who accompanied the wrecker to the Doyle's car, which resulted in the finding of a brief case containing several sets of license tags and a Colt .45 cal. automatic pistol. The Sheriff took this pistol also and took it to his living quarters in the jail. He has also refused to turn this pistol over to Agents. In fact requested that all guns found in Poyle's car be left in his custody for his disposition.

After the Chevrolet Coupe had been found it was evident that the gun case previously described had stopped four of the shots from the machine gun. The car when found and examined was seen to have eight machine gun bullet holes on the left side of the back directly behind the steering wheel, and one rifle bullet hole on the right side, that bullet having passed through the body of the car.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE SPECIAL AGENT IN CHARGE:

I am submitting herewith memorandum covering my activities at Pittsburg, Kansas, on February 6th and 7th, 1935, in connection with the Bremer case:

On Wednesday, February 6, 1935, I was instructed to assist Special Agent D. A. Bryce in the surveillance of a house located at 206 East Adams St., Pittsburg, Kansas, the home of H. C. Stanley and his wife.

During the afternoon I had Division Car No. 1 at the service station being greased. At about 4:30 PM, Special Agent Bryce called me at the service station and requested that I return to the Besse Hotel immediately. This I did, and, upon arriving at the Besse Hotel, Agent Bryce informed me that he had received a telephone call from Special Agent in Charge R. B. Nathan informing him that Jess Doyle had left Kansas City in a black Chevrolet coupe, 1933 model, bearing 1935 Missouri License tags 193-580, with a Sullivan Chevrolet Co. tire cover. It was thought possible that he would go to Pittsburg, Kansas.

We immediately began driving around the streets in the vicinity of 206 East Adams St. and also Broadway Street which is highway 73-E from Kansas City. We did not see this car, but continued looking for it at intervals of about thirty minutes until quite late. I am not certain of the time that we quit and put the car in storage, but believe it was nearly midnight.

At 7:10 AM on Thursday February 7th, 1935, Special Agent Bryce called me and said, "That car has shown up. Get your clothes on." I dressed and went to his room. At about 7:20 AM I went to the garage and got the car. We drove south on Locust Street, which is the street which intersects Adams Street about 100 feet west of the house known as 206 East Adams St. On crossing Adams Street we observed a black Chevrolet coupe parked north and south in back of the house at this address. We could not see the numbers on the license tags well enough to make them out, nor could we read the lettering on the tire cover. It was thought advisable to avoid attracting attention by stopping and trying to make out the numbers on the tags.

We therefore, continued to the police station to pick up Chief of Police R. A. Armstrong. He had not arrived at the Police station and we went to his home to pick him up. Special Agent Bryce had telephoned him from the police station while I remained in the car. We went to the home of Chief Armstrong, but he had left. A few minutes later we picked him up in front of the Besse Hotel.

Chief of Police R. A. Armstrong, Special Agent D. A. Bryce and this agent

who was driving, proceeded in Division car No. 1, to a point on Washington Street (one block north of Adams Street) where car was parked with motor running, facing east about forty feet from Adams Street.

It was decided to wait for the Chevrolet Coupe to leave, then follow the car out of town, when it was planned to overtake this car and apprehend the occupant thereof without any publicity and also without warning the remaining occupants of the Stanley house.

About five minutes after eight o'clock, H. C. Stanley was observed leaving this house. He went to the garage and backed his Buick Sedan out into the alley. This agent did not see anyone go to the Chevrolet, but in a minute or so, the Chevrolet also started moving. This agent moved the Division car up to the intersection and Stanley's Buick was seen turning south on Locust St. followed closely by the Chevrolet Coupe.

The Division car was driven to Adams Street and west on Adams Street one block to Broadway where these two cars were seen turning south on Broadway. We followed them several blocks south on Broadway when both cars again turned west and then, after driving west a block or two, again turned south. When the Division car made this last turn it was discovered that we were only about half a block behind them. To avoid being noticed, the Division car was slowed down to give the other two cars time to get farther ahead.

It was then observed that Stanley's Buick and the Chevrolet Coupe were making a "U-turn" around a flag-pole in the middle of this street about a block and half away and were coming back toward.us. As we approached the intersection of Quincy and Walnut Streets, Chief Armstrong said that they had gotten into a blind street and that now was the time to get them.

In view of the fact that we were headed in the opposite direction and the Chevrolet Coupe would pass by us, it was considered that any further attempts to trail this car would prove ineffective. By this time, the Division car was on the north side of the intersection facing south, the Stanley Buick was on the south side of the intersection facing north. A car from the west crossed and a car from the east was approaching at a high rate of speed. It was necessary, therefore, for both Stanley's Buick and the Division car to wait, on opposite sides of the street, for these two cars to gross.

It was not deemed advisable to block the road in front of the Stanley Buick because this would have then given the occupant of the Chevrolet warning and have permitted him to have either attempted an escape by abandoning the car, or to get whatever firearms he might have had in readiness.

While the Division car was blocked on the north side of this intersection, the Chevrolet Coupe had come up close behind the Stanley Buick. This made it impossible to get the Division car in between these two cars. As soon

as possible, the Division car was driven across the intersection, past the Stanley Buick, and in front of the Chevrolet Coupe. Special Agent D. A. Bryce, who was riding in the right-hand front seat jumped from the car taking with him a Thompson sub-machine gun loading with a clip of twenty.

The driver of the Chevrolet Coupe (who was later definitely identified as Jess Doyle) apparently had his car in second gear because he seemed to have a great deal of power. As the Division car approached, he suddenly jerked his car over the curb and pulled around the Division car. As Doyle's car passed this agent, I saw Doyle reach down onto the seat of his car with his right hand. Although I did not see Doyle with any firearms, it is my belief that at that time he was reaching for a pistol which was probably on the seat beside him. At this point, it is noted that Mrs. Stanley informed this agent later in the day that Doyle had two automatic pistols when he left her home that morning.

As Special Agent Bryce jumped from the Division Car he called to Doyle to stop. When it was seen that Doyle did not intend to stop and was about to effect his escape, Agent Bryce opened fire with the Thompson sub-machine gun from a point just east of the front left fender of the Division car. A number of the bullets were seen to enter the back of the Chevrolet. Chief of Police Armstrong, who was riding in the back of the Division car fired five shots with an automatic rifle. In the opinion of the writer, none of the shots fired by Chief Armstrong took effect.

As soon as it was seen that even after the firing Doyle was not going to stop, this agent began turning the Division car around. The car was at such an angle in this narrow street that it was necessary to back up twice to get turned around. Doyle's Chevrolet was then observed driving rapidly north on Walnut Street. Walnut Street jogs at a point about four blocks north of the point of firing. By the time we had arrived at the jog in Walnut Street it was impossible to determine which direction the Doyle Chevrolet had gone.

Anticipating that Doyle had possibly decided to make an attempt to return to Kansas City, the Division car was driven several miles north on highway 75-E. After satisfying ourselves that he had not gone in this direction, we returned to 206 East Adams St., Pittsburg, Kansas. Special Agent Bryce and Chief Armstrong went to the front door and this agent went to the back door. No one attempted to leave the back door, and when Special Agent Bryce called to me, I went to the front door and went in. There were two women and one man inside, in addition to Special Agent Bryce and Chief Armstrong. Someone said that one of the women was Edna Murray.

After we had searched the three persons found in this house, I took Edna Murray to the Division car and Chief Armstrong and Special Agent Bryce brought Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Stanley out to the car. As we were ready to

leave this place, Tom Stowers, Desk Sergeant, Pittsburg Police Department, drove up. Edna Kurray and Krs. H. C. Stanley were transferred to his car. The Division car then followed Stowers' car to the Pittsburg Police Station where Edna Kurray and Kr. and Mrs. H. C. Stanley were placed in the Pittsburg City Jail.

Immediately upon arriving at the Police Station Special Agent Bryce called Special Agent In Charge R. B. Nathan at Kansas City, Mo., and told him of the arrests and the encounter with Doyle. In the meantime, at the request of Special Agent Bryce, Tom Stowers called police officers and sheriffs' offices in the vicinity of Pittsburg, Kansas, giving them a description of the Doyle Chevrolet and requesting them to be on the lookout for it. This was done quite thoroly and we were assured that all the principal highways were being watched. It is noted that on this date it was raining quite hard which rendered travel on unimproved roads practically impossible.

After questioning the Stanleys for some time in an attempt to ascertain where Doyle was going when he left their place, Special Agent Bryce, Tom Stowers and the writer made a search of the passable roads and highways in the vicinity of Pittsburg in an effort to locate some trace of Doyle's car, but were unsuccessful.

We then returned to the Pittsburg Police Station and were questioning Edna Murray when word was received from Sheriff Delamaide at Girard, Kansas, that Jess Doyle had voluntarily surrendered himself to Sheriff Delamaide. Special Agent Bryce, Tom Stowers and the writer then proceeded in Division Car to Girard, Kansas, where Jess Doyle was found in the sheriff's office.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of January 30, 1935, referring to the shipment by me of Fourteen Thousand Dollars in currency, and jewelry belonging to the Barkers, which were found in the house they occupied at Oklawaha, Florida, to Saint Paul in violation of the Division's rules and regulations.

In explanation for this action on my part, I can only state that at the time I believed the arrangements to ship these articles to Saint Paul were perfectly satisfactory; however, I now clearly see your viewpoint. I exceedingly regret having taken the action I did and I feel that no one else is to blame. I realize the responsibility for doing the right thing was mine and I followed the wrong course, but I am compelled to state that this was done after serious consideration on my part as to the proper procedure to take. I erred in not seeking your advice.

The articles taken from the Barker house at Ocala, with which I am familiar, were:

Miscellaneous men's and women's wearing apparel, boots and shoes, stored in two wooden boxes in the Jacksonville Office, lists of contents furnished the Division on January 23, 1935,

One lot of miscellaneous shotgum shells, presently stored in the Jacksonville Office, approximately 250 rounds, and

One Buick coupe, motor number 2884746, in good condition, presently stored, at my order, in a garage at Savannah, Georgia. This car was purchased at Saint Charles, Illinois, on March 10, 1934, by a man using the name of T. C. Blackburn, the name Fred Barker was using in Florida before he was killed on January 16, 1935. The same day that he was killed, this car found in the garage near the house he and his mother occupied, and was driven to Jacksonville, Florida, by Agent J. C. White.

Mr. Tamm of the Division, by telephone, has advised that the luggage which was shipped to the Chicago Office by express and that carried to that office by Agents White and Winstead, would be returned to the Jacksonville Office, after which the luggage with the wearing apparel, boots and shoes stored in two wooden boxes in the Jacksonville Office, should be shipped to County Judge L. E. Butch at Ocala, Florida, to be administered under the probate laws of the State of Florida. I have advised Mr. Jutch by letter today that the above articles would be shipped to him in the very near future.

Earwon of the Kinneapolis Folice Department called Special Agent R. C. Coulter of this office and advised him that he had some information which he desired to supply the Division. Through arrangements made, Agent Coulter met Detective Karxon at 4th Avenue South and 18th Street, a considerable distance from the Police Department; and he stated that late yesterday afternoon he was talking with an individual and the name of Harry Sawyer came up, and the individual informed him that he had talked with emother party who had seen Sawyer in Fortland shortly after last Christmas, and this individual informed Detective Karxon that Sawyer was playing between Fortland and Seattle and Tworking a little". Detective Karxon stated that he did not know what his informant meant by Tworking a little" unless Sawyer was plying his old trade of disposing of stolen property.

Detective Marxon declined to mame the individual who furnished him the information and explained that this information was not furnished to him with the thought in mind that it would be used to apprehend Sawyer; and that if the individual who furnished him the information had any idea that it would be used in such a menner, the information would not have come to him; and that this individual under no circumstances would furnish information to him or anyone else with a view to apprehending criminals; and for that reason, he did not desire to disclose the identity of his informant.

Savyer's presence on the Best Coast, information same to this effice on February 11, 1955, that approximately \$3,000.00 worth of bonds stolen from the Kraft State Bank, Meanmonie, Wisconsia, which was robbed in July, 1952, I believe, had been disposed of in British Columbia. There were approximately \$100,000.00 worth of megotiable bonds of various amounts and issues stolen during the above mentioned robbery. It is known definitely that one Frank Rebber and Charles Harmon participated in this robbery as one of them was killed during the robbery and the other one's body was discovered a short distance from Menomonie abortly thereafter. It will be recalled, of course, that Charles Garmon was the husband of Paula Harmon, who was an associate of Fred Barker, with aliases.

In connection with the above, Detective Marzon advised me that it is his understanding that the mob responsible for the robbery of the Kraft State Bank was in Sawyer's place in St. Paul on the morning prior to the robbery; and that there is a possibility that sawyer is on the west Coast disposing of the above referred to bonds.

He further edvised that the individual who supplied him with this information stated to him that Sawyer has either a sisterer a sister-in-law residing in Portland. However, he could not be definite in that connection; and as far as agent Coulter recalls, there is nothing in the files reflecting the presence of any of Sawyer's relatives either in Portland or in Seattle.

The foregoing information is supplied you in order that appropriate investigation may be made in Portland and Scattle for the purpose of determining whether Sawyer has been in either of those localities recently. With reference to the bonds in question, a report will be submitted in the case UNXHOAN SUBJECTS, Interstate Transportation of Stolen Property, in the very near future and copies of said report will be submitted to your office with the request that investigation be conducted.

After living at the Eleasy-Maser Apertments for about two meeks, Volmey, I believe, borround \$500,000 from Fred Barker, using this money to purchase a new Ford soupe. 

Mr. Harvey telephoned from Philadelphia and stated that Mr. and Mrs. Karpavicz, father and mother of Alvin Karpis, drove into Philadelphia this morning in an old dilapidated Ford automobile from Chicago. They went to a garage and called the hospital inquiring about the Delaney girl and the baby. The guards there immediately got in touch with him, and he dispatched five Agents to the hospital; that the old people talked to the girl in the presence of the Agents. The old people want to take the baby back to Chicago.

Mr. Harvey in this connection mentioned a letter dated February 6, 1935 which Mr. Connelley forwarded to the Division in which he indicated that he would like to see the old folks do this. The doctor has indicated that the baby won't be able to travel for about a week, and Mrs. Karpavicz says that they have only about \$25.00 at the present time. Mr. Harvey wanted to know the Division's attitude in this matter.

I told Mr. Harvey that this is a matter that we should not have enything to do with; that we should let the parents and the Delaney woman make whatever plans are compatible to them; that I concurred in the opinion of Mr. Connelley that we will have a better case against Dolores if the baby isn't with her. Mr. Harvey stated that Dolores has indicated that she wanted the old folks to take the baby.

Mr. Harvey mentioned the \$100 bill which is the property of Dolores Delaney, and which is presently in his possession. I told Mr. Hervey to make the serial number of this bill a matter of record, and then inform her that upon her written request we will do anything she desires with the money. With reference to the property of Karpis which was found in their spartment, I instructed him to get written instructions from Dolores as to what disposition should be made of this material; that we don't want to have anything to do with it, and want to dispose of it in such a manner that we will not be liable to any criticism.

روا مدي Mr. Connelley called from Chicago to advise that Agent Trainor had just frantically contacted him by telephone from Yorkville, Illinois and advised that their plane had made a forced landing subsequent to which Volney Davis escaped from the custody of Agents Trainor and Stakem. I asked Mr. Connelley for additional details and he stated that he did not have any additional information, since Trainor had excitedly left the telephone after furnishing this information. I instructed Mr. Connelley to dispetch a sufficient number of Agents to Yorkville to enable them to patrol all of the highways and side roads in the hope of effecting Davis' apprehension.

I called Mr. Nathan to ascertain whether he had been advised of these facts and learned that he had not been informed of Davis'escape.

Subsequently, Connelley called from Chicago and advised that he had ascertained that the plane had made a forced landing in a corn field, near Yorkville, Illinois and that Agents Trainor and Stakem had proceeded in a passing car into the town of Yorkville; that in reaching Yorkville, they decided it would be too conspicuous if leg irons and handcuffs were left on Davis, and accordingly, they removed all of the irons. They entered a small hotel, and while Trainor was in a telephone booth, calling the Chicago Division Office, Davis assaulted Stakem, dove through a window and escaped.

I instructed Connelley to personally proceed to Yorkville, immediately and properly organize a search looking to Davis' apprehension.

The Attorney General telephoned and inquired whether or not there is any truth to the reports that two of our men with a prisoner were forced down in an airplane near Chicago last night, at which time the prisoner escaped. I told him that I heard of an incident somewhat similar to this, but the men in question have been reporting direct to the Director in New York City.

The Attorney General then stated that he was not going to give out any statement, but for his own personal knowledge, he wanted to know whether or not the above is true. I then informed him that two of our men were transporting a prisoner to Chicago in an airplane; that the plane was forced down; that there ensued a skirmish of some kind, the details of which were furnished by our Chicago Office to you in New York City. He asked if the man got away, and I told him that he did. He then asked who the man was, and I told him I did not know. I was then asked if he were a man of importance, and I again answered that I did not know.

Subject to your approval, I am instructing Agents McKee and Brown to return to Miami when Nathaniel Heller leaves Cuba and after appropriate arrangements have been made for Heller's custody, to spend a day interviewing Cash McDonald in Mismi. Although McDonald was interrogated for a period of approximately 48 hours by J. H. Hanson and other Agents, they were unsuccessful in obtaining any tangible admissions from him. Brown and McKee have, while in Havana, visited various banks where McDonald exchanged Bremer ransom money, and accordingly they are in possession of additional facts which may be instrumental in "breaking" McDonald. After Brown and McKee have completed their questioning of McDonald I believe they should proceed to the Jacksonville Office and dictate a complete report upon the result of their investigation, in order that this information will be readily available to the United States Attorney in Florida. I recommend then that Brown and McKee come into Washington in order that I may discuss with them the substantive evidence available in Havana to substantiate the kidnaping charges against Kerpis, Campbell and Willie Harrison, and to ascertain what if any additional investigation in Havana is necessary or desirable. I feel that if additional investigation is necessary Agent McKee should return there, since Brown should return to Chicago and to St. Paul for the purpose of participating in substentive investigation to substantiate the kidneping charges. It appears that Agent Brown is the only Agent to whom Byron, Bolton will talk freely.





> At 12:20 P.M., I telephoned Mr. Tolson and informed him that I had received numerous inquiries concerning the escape of Volney Davis from the Agents of this Division at Yorkville, Illinois, all of which inquiries had been answered with the statement that the situation was being handled by the Director personally in New York City. However, the Attorney General telephoned me and demanded to know whether or not the story as he had heard it concerning the escape of the above was true, stating that he had been informed that a men whose identity is unknown had escaped by slugging one of our Agents at Yorkville, Illinois, after the Agents and the prisoner had been forced down in an airplane. I told the General that such an incident had occurred but the men had been reporting directly to Mr. Hoover in New York City and I was not advised as to the details of the escape, the identity of the man or as to his importance. I informed Mr. Tolson that the

Mr. Tolson then conferred with Mr. Hoover about the matter, and then Mr. Hoover took the telephone and informed me to immediately submit a brief memorandum to the Attorney General giving the facts concerning the escape, the importance and the identity of Volney Davis.

Attorney General seemed to be rather displeased as to my answers to his



questions.



Re: Bremer case

Agent Brown telephoned from Miami and stated that he had just arrived there from Havana; that Heller has been taken into custody by the Marshal at Miami and will be arraigned tonight.

I instructed Agent Brown to interview Cassius McDonald and try to obtain a statement from him, basing their questioning upon the facts which they have developed in Havana; that however, they should be careful not to disclose too many facts which might jeopardize the prosecution. Agent Brown stated that they had some very good facts against McDonald.

I then instructed Agent Brown that he and Agent McKee should proceed to Jacksonville and get out a complete report on their investigative activities in Havana, in order that the U.S.Attorney might be fully informed as to the facts against Heller, Adams, and others. I stated that after Agent Brown had finished this report, he should proceed to Washington in order that he could go over the Bremer File with Agent Newby with a view to outlining the evidence against Karpis, Harrison and Sawyer.

Agent Brown stated that he would probably be in Miami tomorrow and would then proceed to Jacksonville, where it would probably take a day or two to dictate his report.

Please be advised that Romeo Padgett is being held by the Secret Service Division of the United States Treasury Department in this city charged with possession of counterfeit money. Some time in December 1932 Padgett was sentenced in the State Court at Asheville, North Carolina, to serve two years for the transportation of intoxicating liquor. He escaped in February 1933 and was recently apprehended in this city. He is to be returned to Asheville, North Carolina, to complete his unexpired term.

While in custody here Padgett stated that he had some information relative to the location of Alvin Karpis.

Padgett was interviewed by Special Agent W. E. Peters of this office, at which time he stated that following his escape he had been living at various addresses in Cincinnati, Ohio, and Cleveland, Ohio. He advised that he lived on East 56th Street in Cleveland just north of Euclid Avenue, and also from time to time lived in that city on East 19th Street and East 20th Street, Padgett being unable to recall definitely the exact street address. He stated that he had left Cleveland on September 2, 1934, and had gone to Cincinnati, where he read in the daily papers of the attempted apprehension of Alvin Karpis and others at Cleveland.

Upon his return to Cleveland in the early part of October 1934 he made frequent visits to the Prospect Whist Club, the address of which he believes to be 1015 Prospect Avenue. He states that this Club is a "bookie joint", operated by one A"Big Nike", whose last name is unknown to Padgett. Padgett further advised that "Big Mike" also operates a "bookie joint" on the opposite side of the street from the Prospect Whist Club, and that when one of these places is raided operations are immediately resumed on the opposite side of the street. Padgett stated that while in conversation with "Big Mike" and other members of the Cleveland underworld he was informed that Alvin Karpis was in Cleveland the latter part of November or the early part of December 1934. He stated that he had no information whatsoever as to any definite location at which Karpis might have been stopping at that time, and was only able to advise that Karpis is alleged to have made the statement that he was afraid to return to Chicago because of the "Government heat" in that city.

Padgett left Cleveland approximately December 10, 1934, and has no information relative to the location of Karpis or any other members of the gang since that time.


while residing in Cleveland Padgett adopted the alias of Frank Morrison. Attached hereto find a membership card in the Prospect Whist Club issued in the name of F. Morrison. Padgett advises that it is impossible to gain access to the Club without a membership card. Therefore this membership card in the Prospect Whist Club is being forwarded to the Division for any possible purpose it may serve in future investigations at Cleveland, Ohio.

Although I am well aware of the fact that the file on this matter reflects the location of Karpis since the dates mentioned by Romeo Padgett, the above information is being forwarded to the Division in order that the file on this matter may be complete.

I telephoned Mr. Mathan at Kansas City and inquired if he had the statements from Trainor and Stakem relative to the escape of Davis. Mr. Mathan stated that he has these statements.

I told him that the papers here are carrying a story to the effect that the escape of Davis was effected at a time when Agent Stakem and Davis were having a glass of beer. Mr. Nathan stated that according to the statement of Stakem, when they first enetered the building there, Trainor went into the telephone booth; thereafter, Davis asked if he might have a drink, preferably a glass of beer. Stakem ordered two glasses of beer while Trainor was still in the telephone booth. Trainor then came out of the booth, after which they moved closer to the lobby of the hotel. I told him that it is the understanding here at the Division that Trainor went into the telephone booth, after which Davis asked if he might have a glass of beer. Stakem then stepped up to the bar and purchased two glasses of beer, one for himself and one for Davis, after which they started drinking the beer. Mr. Nathan then stated that Trainor came out of the telephone booth at this point and got some change for use in his telephone call. Stakes and Davis then moved out from the bar and toward the telephone booth, this being after the beer had been consumed. Trainor then reentered the telephone booth to make his call. There was no more beer consumed by Stakem or Davis.

I then told him that it was the desire of the Director to know why the leg irons and handcuffs were taken off Davis, and why Davis was not left in the car in which they rode to the city. Mr. Nathan stated that it is his recollection that the statements of these men account that the farmer with whom they rode was in somewhat of a hurry, and they could not or did not want to make him stay. I stated that they should have asked this farmer to remain, and possibly have given him a five dollar bill for his trouble.

I then inquired why Davis was taken into the hotel, when one of the men could have remained outside with him and kept him handcuffed. Mr. Mathem stated that he did not question the men on this point, but supposes that they were merely exercising their best judgment under the circumstances.

I inquired as to the attitude of these two Agents, Minimathan stated that the men have indicated that if they had it to do over again, they would do it differently; that they both feel that they are in line for reprimand and are ready to take it. Of course, they feel badly about the escape of this man.

I then inquired if Davis had any money on him at the time of this trip. Mr. Nathan stated that Davis was thoroughly searched at the time of his arrest, and all the money, his gun, and all other personal possessions taken from him. The money taken from the possession of Davis was in the custody of Stakem for the purpose of taking it to Mr. Connelley at Chicago. Mr. Nathan stated that as far as he knows, Davis had on his person a couple of sticks of chewing gum and a match. I told Mr. Nathan that when questioning these Agents, he might discreetly approach the subject of any possible attempt of Davis to bribe the Agents in any way. Mr. Nathan in this regard stated that one of the men last night mentioned that he was glad that there had been no intimation against their character. He stated, however, that he would bring up the subject in the course of a conversation and get their reaction. I told him that it was desired that a positive statement be gotten from the Agents to the effect that no offer or overture was made to them by Davis. It was suggested that the men not be called into the office specifically for the purpose of asking them the above question. However, Mr. Nathan stated that the men still have a couple of portable typewriters in their possession, and he could call them asking that they bring the typewriters to the office, at which time they could be approached on the above. It was suggested that Davis could have made some offer or overture to Stakem while Trainor was in the telephone booth at the hotel.

I inquired why this men was taken into a saloon in the first place. Mr. Nather stated that it has been explained that upon their arrival in the town, the telephone office had closed; that the man with whom they rode to town suggested that they might make a call from the booth in this hotel; that upon their going into the place, it turned out to be a combination lobby, hotel and barroom. Mr. Nothen stated that the reason Stokem did not make the call is that Stakem does not appear to be as experienced in making such calls as Trainor, and it was consequently made by Trainor.

Mr. Nathan stated that he forwarded one copy of the statement of each Agent, together with his own, via air mail and special delivery, while the other copies were sent regular mail special delivery.

### MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILE

Re: Bremer Case

I telephoned Mr. Connelley at Chicago at 12:30 P.M., and stated that it was desired that he check to ascertain what kind of an investigation had been made into the escape of Volney Davis from Agents Trainor and Stakes on the night of February 6, 1935. I inquired if the inn-keeper had been questioned, and told him that particularly close attention should be given to this questioning in order to make sure that no money changed hands in regard to the above matter.

Mr. Connelley then mentioned the story being carried in the papers to the effect that the Agents were supposed to have purchased the prisoner a glass of beer. He stated that according to the Agents, nothing like that occurred; that they were just standing there at the counter when the fellow hit Agent Stakem. I then informed him that Agent Stakem admitted that he bought Davis a glass of beer, and also had a glass of beer with him. Mr. Connelley stated that Agent Stakem certainly didn't tell him that.

I inquired of the attitude of these Agents, and Mr. Connelley informed that they are both very low and apprehensive concerning their fate, fearing that they might be suspended; that they both admit that they had made mistakes in the handling of the prisoner.

Mr. Connelley assured me that he would contact everyone who might be able to furnish any information concerning the matter, and would send his report by telegram as soon as possible.







Sanders Gramling, Assistant United States Attorney, at Miami, Florida, advised that the Honorable Halsted Ritter, Judge of the United States District Court at Miami, Florida, declined to sign an order delivering this automobile to the Division of Investigation against all persons excepting the true owner, but the Assistant United States Attorney suggested that Randall execute the Certificate of Title transferring that automobile to the Division of Investigation.

This was done on 1-31-35, and this Certificate is now in possession of the Jacksonville Office.

It will be appreciated if the Division will advise the proper disposition to make of these automobiles.

It might also be mentioned that the Jacksonville Office has in its files a bill of sale from the Ungar Buick Company, Miami, Florida, dated December 22, 1934, to Leroy Morrison, indicating that 1935-48 Model Buick Coupe, Motor No. 42949155, Serial No. 2783525, has been fully paid for, as well as a State of Florida, Certificate of Title No. 959114, issued to Karpis under the alias of Leroy Morrison, for the above mentioned Buick automobile.

Donaldson and J. P. Lacour called upon County Judge L. E. Futch at Ocala, Florida, in connection with the surrendering to him certain moneys and other property found in the premises occupied by the late Fred Barker and his mother, Kate Barker, at Oklawaha, Florida. While interviewing the Judge in connection with this matter, he volunteered the information that Inquiry had been made of him by a local attorney regarding the money left by these persons and indicated that this local aftorney was prompted to make this inquiry by reason of a request from attorneys at Saint Paul, Minnesota, who represent the Bremers in that city. Judge Futch was not in possession of any particular details as to anticipated efforts that may be made by the Bremers to acquire the available money and stated that he merely informed the inquiring attorneys that he did not possess any of the money and, therefore, could give the matter no consideration.

This is submitted for such use as the Division may care to make of it, and if I receive any additional information bearing on this angle; I will promptly so advise the Division.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Volney Davis was apprehended in Kansas City on February 6, 1935 Pursuant to your instructions, I talked with Mr. Connelley in Chicago, concerning the desirability of removing Davis to Chicago or St. Paul and he stated that he believed it desirable to remove Davis to Chicago, where he could be held for questioning. I accordingly instructed Mr. Nathan to make appropriate arrangements to remove Davis to Chicago and since we desired absolutely no publicity or leak in this situation, suggested that he charter a plane and have Davis transported by this means to Chicago. Mr. Nathan subsequently called me and advised that efforts had been made to obtain a plane but that the only plane available was a four-seated machine, which would accommodate three passengers. I stated that I did not know whether this would be a sufficient number of guards and inquired about weather conditions. Mr. Nathan stated that the airport officials had checked weather conditions and advised that there would be no difficulty in making the flight. I advised Mr. Nathan that I believed if Devis was properly handcuffed and shackled two guards would be sufficient, and accordingly, arrangements were made to transport Davis by plane to Chicago. I was advised by Mr. Nathan that the departure was made about 3:20 P.M. and that it was estimated three hours would be consumed the actual departure of the in making the flight. Mr. Nathan advised after plane that a safe take-off had been made and that Davis was properly shackled and handcuffed. Mr. Connelley was advised of the approximate arrival of Davis, in order that Agents could be stationed at the airport to meet the plane.

At 8:20 P.M. Mr. Connelley called me from Chicago to advise that Agent Trainor had just called the Chicago Office and stated that the plane had made a forced landing at Yorkville, Illinois and that Volney Davis had escaped from the Agents. Connelley was instructed to immediately dispetch a sufficient number of Agents to the vicinity of Yorkville to patrol all highways and make every effort to locate Davis and subsequently I instructed Mr. Connelley to personally proceed to Yorkville and take charge of the search. Mr. Connelley transmitted a teletype to the Division on the morning of February 7, 1935, in which he advised that at 6:30 P.M. the pilot of the plane transporting Agents Trainor and Stakem and Volney Davis, to Chicago, had become lost and had landed at 6:45 in a corn field, one mile south of Yorkville, Illinois. There was no telephone in the vicinity and Agent Trainorhailed a passing motorist and started for the town of Yorkville, leaving Stakem with the shackled prisoner in the corn field. He decided, however, that this procedure was improper and returned to the corn field and obtained the prisoner and Agent Stakem, returning to Yorkville in the car. Trainor explains this action by stating that automobiles had been attracted to the scene because of the landing of the plane and he feared possible publicity if he left the area prisoner in the plane. To prevent curiosity and publicity, Agent Trainor and

Stakem removed the leg irons, in order to permit the prisoner to walk, but left the handcuffs on him. Upon arrival in Yorkville, it was ascertained that the telephone office was closed but the man who had driven the car bringing the Agents and Davis into town advised them that they could make a telephone call from a booth in the hotel and accordingly Agents Trainor and Stakem entered the Vailing Hotel. Prior to entering the hotel, the Agents removed the handcuffs to avoid possible publicity or curiosity in the hotel. The farmer driving the car which carried the Agents into Yorkville was reluctant to remain or to permit the Agents to use the car and accordingly it was necessary for them to take Davis into the hotel. The room which the Agents entered is a combination lobby, restaurant and barroom.

Agent Trainor entered the telephone booth and Volney Davis then asked Agent Stakem if he might have a drink, preferably a glass of beer. Stakem ordered two glasses of beer while Trainor was still in the telephone booth. Trainor came out of the booth to get some change for use in his telephone call and Stakem and Davis finished the beer which they were drinking and moved away from the bar towards the telephone booth.

While Agent Trainor was still in the telephone booth, Davis struck Stakem in the face, knocking him down, and leaped head-first through a window and ran towards the rear of the building. There were two windows in the store and one of the windows was immediately over the entrance to the basement of the building. Davis had evidently planned this move, since he chose the window away from the entrance to the basement and in leaping, landed upon a cement sidewalk. Stakem rose to his feet, drew his gun and ran to the window, firing twice at Davis. Agent Trainor heard the commotion and ran outside in an effort to follow the prisoner but was unsuccessful.

The Agents secured the assistance of local persons, including the Sheriff in conducting the search. During the search they passed a parked Ford car. Davis ran about five blocks to the right and three blocks to the left, at which point he stole a Ford V-8 sedan, silver in color, bearing Illinois tags 104140. This car was parked in the driveway with the keys in the car. This is the car which the Agents pessed while pursuing Davis. It was impossible to ascertain the direction in which Davis fled after stealing this car but the car was subsequently found in West Chicago, Illinois.

Agents Trainor and Stakem state that the reason they removed the handcuffs and leg irons from Davis was to avoid curiosity and publicity.

Matt Gleason of 104 4th Street, Aurora, who is a small-time bookmaker and gambler and operator of a house of prostitution, approached G. A. Bernhart, another bookmaker, on February 7 and offered to sell him a white gold half caret ring for \$60, claiming to Barnhart that this ring was the property of the prisoner who had escaped from the Federal officers upon the previous night. Barnhart advised the Chicago Division Office of the approach by Gleason and upon my authorisation,

the Chicago Division Office paid Barnhart \$60, which he used in purchasing this ring from Gleason. The ring had been identified as the ring which Volney Davis was wearing at the time of his escape. In this regard, it may be noted that at the time of his arrest in Kansas City, Volney Davis had in his possession approximately \$1100 and a 380 caliber automatic pistol which items had been taken away from him. Davis had no money at the time of his escape.

Barnhart purchased the ring from Glesson for \$60 and Division Agents shadowed Glesson who returned to his home at the above named address. He was subsequently taken into custody and it was learned that Volney Davis had visited his place on the night of February 6, lesving sometime on February 7th. Glesson is presently in the Chicago Division Office where he is being interviewed for details concerning Volney Davis' escape.

When the Ford V-8 sedan was recovered at West Chicago, Illinois, it was ascertained that there was some blood in the front, indicating that the hands or legs of the person driving the car had been injured.

In explaining why he acquiesced to Davis' request for a glass of beer, Stakem states that he did this to prevent observers from being suspicious of the prisoner.

The pilot of theplane was Joe Jacobson, who Mr. Nathan states was highly recommended to him by the Inspector of the Aeronautics Branch of the Commerce Department.
