With reference to Division letter of January 31, 1935, referring to the five packages shipped from the Jacksonville office to the Chicago office under Government bill of lading #J-69685, the articles contained in this shipment/were in addition to those listed as stored in the Jacksonville office, and included various articles which presented possibilities as to latent fingerprints, it being noted that there were numerous mirrors in this luggage and also in the pocketbooks concerned, all of which had been processed for fingerprints in the Jacksonville office by Special Agents McDade and Donaghue and such latent prints photographed. However, these prints, due to the fact that the film had been placed in a blue Postal Telegraph envelope, were lost, inasmuch as the light filtered through and destroyed the films before they could be reproduced. After the arrival of these articles at Chicago, they were again processed for fingerprints and such prints as could be lifted were forwarded to the Division for necessary comparison, and inasmuch as no further prints can be obtained from the articles in question, there was returned to the Jacksonville office on February 11th four grips or suitcases containing articles as listed on the attached copy of a memorandum prepared by Special Agent Chaffetz. These were forwarded under Government bill of lading #J-6 643, the original copy of which is being enclosed to the Jacksonville office with a copy of this letter.

With reference to the articles enumerated on page three as being retained at the Chicago office, the articles from which latent prints were lifted are of no practicable value and are being retained in connection with any possible identification which might be made from the lifted prints. The balance of these articles listed on page three, namely the black silver-trimmed suitcase, which is in fact a tin suitcase containing four buylet proof vests, together with

It has been determined from investigation in this district that Volney Tavis, thile in this vicinity, was alosely associated with one Earl Ctuchlick, who has also used the name of E. Stewart. Davis indicated while at Aunses City that it had been his intention to proceed in the near future to the State of Montana to the point where some dam was being built. He claimed that one of the men went by the name of Chester and that one of the other men was a tall, thin fellow but he was unable to furnish the descriptions of the other two. He states that these fellows go back and forth to Florida and are seen driving different makes of cars. Waldon stated that up until about three weaks ago he had seen two men identical with the photographs of Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell visiting these fellows in the apartment. He also advised that his wife had an uncle by the name of Karpis and that he believes the uncle is identical with Alvin Karpis. Waldon insinuated that it would not be safe to talk to the Janitor of the apartment; that the Janitor appeared to be a negro and that his brother had been in some trouble in the South where he was lynched recently.

Special Agent J. S. Johnson promptly called at the Waldon Apartment, 132.


E. Third St., and found Waldon and his wife at home. Under pretext, Mrs. Waldon was questioned as to whether or not she had any relative by the name of Karpis. She stated that she did not have any relatives at all and was at a loss to understand how she could have a relative by that name. At the time of the interview Irvin Waldon seemed ill at ease, while Agent was conversing with his wife.

Henry Mayman, Room 12, at the above address, is the Janitor for the building and has charge of renting the rooms therein. He is an old fellow and apparently of German extraction and seemed very anxious to furnish all information requested by agent. He stated he frequently has aided the Police when called upon and to do so and that on the first floor there lives one Scott Johnson, who has been there for about three years, together with Roy Mancie, who has a broken leg and is a lunatic. On the third floor live Elbert and Elvin Mancie and the Waldons and also a newspaper peddler named Fendellen. The Janitor lives on the fourth floor with tenants by the name of Ernest Simon, Simon's brother and a woman; that Simon is a young fellow on Relief; and that both of these boys are about. twenty years of age and all of them are supported by the Relief. Immediately above the Janitor's room is an Italian Laborer named Biedel, who is about ... 45 years of age and another individual by the name of Clark, who is about sixty years of age, sharing this room with Biedel. Mayman knew of no three or four individuals living together in the house and did not know anyone by the name of Chester or the description submitted by the self-styled informant, Waldon. Mayman failed to recognize any of the Karpis-Barker gang as being among the roomers or as having called there. He stated that all the people who live in the rooms at that address are poverty ridden and have difficulty buying a meal, let alone an automobile. He stated that no one there owns a car, as reported by Waldon. The building is old, and in a run-down condition, with very disagreeable living quarters. In view of the above, it appears that Waldon is suffering from some hallucination.

It is also noted that when the information was furnished by Irvin Waldon to Special Agent N. B. Klein, Mr. Connelley was contacted by telephone and advised that he did not know Irvin Waldon.

In view of the above no further action is being taken as to this particular lead.

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

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
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

The following is additional information obtained from Byron Bolton, alias Monty Cartar, by Special Agent John L. Madala on January 12, 1985.

He advised that should agents proceed to Florida with a view to apprehending Fred Barker, Alvin Karpis and Harry Campbell, whom he believes are presently there, and should they escape in some manner, he firmly believes that they will either proceed to Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland or New York City; that in the event they come to Chicago they will either contact Willie Heeney or Eddie Donovan, both ef. whom are contacts of the Barker-Karpis mob. He stated that Willie Heeney resides at 16th Street and Austin Boulevard, Oak Park, Illinois, and that his home is immediately adjacent to the empty lot which is owned by Irene Dorsey, the wife of Fred Goetz, now deceased. He further stated that Willie Heeney has heretofore been . contacted by this mob for places of refuge and other purposes and that he would not hesitate to harbor them should he be called upon to do so. Concerning Eddie Donovan, above mentioned.

Monty stated that he has heard his name frequently mentioned among the boys and that he is considered a very good friend of both Fred and "Doc" Barker; that sheald fred Barker learn that his brother has been taken into custody by the Federal Government he will immediately contact Eddie Donovan for the purpose of procuring an attorney for him. He further stated that Eddie Donovan, to his knowledge, is the owner of the Green Lantern Tavern located at 79th and Dobson Street, Chicago, Illimeds.

Further information obtained from Monty Carter disclosed that Willie Harrison is very friendly with the owner of the "Homestead", which is located in the vicinity of 95th Street and Western Avenue, Chicago, Illinois; that

heretofore Willie had an numerous occasions taken members of mob to the Homestead for something to set and that he firmly believes that the owner of this restaurant is aware of Harrison's location at all times.

Monty stated that should the boys go to Detroit, Michigan, for refuge they will undsubtedly contact a fellow named Casch. He stated that he knows of no information whatsoever concerning Casch and that he has heard his name mentioned on numerous occasions while in conversation with the boys.

Monty stated that should members of the mob so to New York they will undoubtedly centact Frankie Foster, who is very well known smong the underworld circles in that city. In this connection he advised that at one time he asked "Doc" Barker where Harry Sawyer had disappeared and according to Monty, "Doc" stated that he is now in New York with Frankie Foster. Further, that Sawyer's wife, Gladys, is also with him at the present time.

Monty stated that the contacts for the mob in Cleveland are two men named art and Shimmy. He stated he does not know their last names and he frequently heard those names mentioned among the boys.

Pursuant to your instructions, this agent and Agents R.H. Hicks and J.T. McLaughlin brought William Byran Bolton to the Chicago Division office am the evening of January 8, 1935.

At the time this man was being searched be gave the name of Monty Carter and the following list of property was found in his possession:

1 - collar butten This property was checked in the presence of Agents Val C. Zimmer and J.P.KcCarthy, The same has been placed in an envelope with proper identifying data written theres and placed in the safe of this office.

Among the numerous guns found at the apartment of Russell Gibson, 5920 Pinegrove Avenue, was the following pistol: 52 calibre Colt automatic, serial No. 481780. The New York office was advised by teletype January 14, 1955, that this gun was sold to Hibbard, Spencer, Bartlett & Company, Chicago, Illinois, on April 26, 1928. The records at the above mentioned company disclose that the above described pistol was sold by Hibbard, Spencer and Bartlett to Thomas Hardware Company, Tulsa, Oklahoma, on July 5, 1928.

Oklahoma City office was advised of this information by letter on January El, 1955, and was requested to make appropriate inquiry at the Thomas Hardware Company to ascertain if possible the identity of the purchaser of this pistol. Photographs of Arthur "Doc" Barker and Byren Bolton were at that time forwarded to the Oklahoma City office.

The following guns were recovered in the martment of Russell Gibson, 8920 Pinegrove Avenue, January 8, 1935:

Pistol

Colt automatic .32 calibre, serial 304899, which was sold to Baker Jennings Hardware Company, Lynchburg, Virginia on Angust 22, 1919.

Colt automatic pistol, \$80 calibre, serial 115485, sold to Jenny Semple, Hill and Company, Minneapolis, Minnesota July 18, 1933.

Police special/revolver, .58 calibre,

In letter dated January 19, 1935, the Washington Field, St.Paul and Losingeles offices were furnished this information, and they were requested to ascertain the identity of the purchasers of these various guns.

For the purpose of record, it should be noted that agents kekee, Suran, Jones, and Barber recovered a Ford sedan bearing 1934 Illinois license 1-266-251, motor No. 18-1150845, the property of Monte Carter, which car has now been removed to the Clark-VanBuren Garage, the keys to which car are now contained in the safe in this office.

For the purpose of record it should also be stated that on the night of January 8, 1935, Special Agent Barber recovered the following articles near the rear door of the apartment occupied by Russell Gibson:

Four discharged 351 calibre cartridges
One lead ball from 351 calibre rifle,
(apparently bullet which struck Gibson in head)
Two fragments 30-06 calibre bullet

These articles have been appropriately marked and placed in the safe in the Chicago office.

Reference is made to the letter of the St. Paul office to the Chicago office in the above case dated January 18, 1935, with regard to the keys found in the overcoat pocket of arthur R. Barker in St. Paul. Particular reference is made to the Hurd key, No. FC-838. This key has been found to be the ignition key of 1934 Ford V-8 sedan, motor No. 18-1130845, and same has been placed in an envelope with the other key belonging to said ear, both of which will be found in the safe of this office,

Regarding key No. 2, which is a brass key of the
Independent Lock Company, 1001 KB stamped Q on the reverse side,
Kartin Bader, the janitor of the apartment house at 7269 South Shore
Drive, in which building Freddie and Kate Barker resided during
1934, advised that this key does not fit any lock in that building.
Keys 5 and 4 to which reference is made in the letter from the
St. Paul office to the Chicago office dated January 16, 1935, to
not fit any of the bags in the possession of the Chicago Division
office, and are presumably for the padlocks taken off the metal
suit cases which contain the steel vests belonging to the Barkers
found in Florida. The investigation with regard to the keys above
mentioned, was made by Special Agent F.G.Tillman.

of the search on January 8, 1935 of the apartment
previously occupied by Russell Gibson and others,
3912 Pinegrove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, Special,
Agent R.C. Suran found in the desk drawer in the living
room of this apartment a certificate of title of a
motor vehicle \$1289927 issued to Andrew Allen, 57 East
Harrison Street, Chicago, Illinois, for a 1934 Ford
Victoria, engine \$1142463, together with an invoice of

the Vrba Motor Company, 5100 West 25th Street, Clears, Illinois, and a receipt from Edward J. Hughes, Hecretary of State, dated Movember 26, 1934 for license glate \$1289927.

Agent Buran also found inthis desk two
receipts made out to J.B.Bolton, one bearing date
December 1, 1934, and the other January 1, 1935, each
being for the amount of \$8.00 for the rent of a garage.
The receipts are signed by C. Lipsicts and were on the
receipt slips of Charles Lipsicts, Real Estate, 5936
Pinegrove Avenue, Chicago.

interviewed Mr. Charles Lipsiets at 5936 Pinegrove Avenue, and he stated that on or about December 1, 1934 he rented a garage to J.B.Bolton, which garage was located in the group of garages at the rear of 5936 Pinegrove Avenue. The photographs of various individuals in this case were exhibited to Mr. Lipsiets and he stated the one of a willie Harrison was a likeness to the person renting this garage. Mr. Lipsietz said this individual did not pay the rent January 1, 1955, but the same was paid by a blond headed woman. Mr. Lipsiets pointed out the garage to Agent, and through observation by the rear window Agent determined that the garage centained a Ford Victoria bearing 1934 Illimois license plate \$1289927.

On the night of January 8, 1934, A.P.Barber found a key, which appeared to be the garage key, near the bottom of the stairway where Russell Gibson was wounded. Special Agent S.K.McKee found at this place a set of keys which apparently belonged to the Ford ear.

After the discovery of the Ford Victoria located in the above described garage, it was determined that the key found by agent Barber was a key to the garage in which the Ford Victoria was located, and the key found by Agent McKee ware the keys to the ignition of said ear. This car was stored by Agents McKee and Suran at the Clark-Yan Buren Garage en January 10, 1935.

On the night of Jamuary 8, 1955, Agents McKee and Suran proceeded to the Paddington Garage located at 702 West Irving Park, Chicago, as previous observation by Agents Suran and Madala had revealed Ford sedan \$1266251 was apparently stored in the near vicinity of 5912 Pine Grove Avenue, it was determined by observation of the ears in the Paddington Garage that the car in question was stored therein. The attendant in charge stated that the car had been stored that evening by a tall slim man accompanied by a black haired woman. He advised that the car had been stored compressions days, but always by a woman and January 8, 1935 was the first time the tall slim man had brought the car into the garage.

In the dash compartment of this ear Agents McKee and Suren found a leather case containing State of Illinois certificate of title of a motor vahicle, bearing \$1266251, issued to J.B. Bolton, Harrison Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, for a 1934 Ford sedam, engine \$1130843, and invoice of the Wrba Motor Company, 5100 West 25th Street, issued to J.B. Bolton, Harrison Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, which invoice was for a Ford Beline Forder sedam-black, motor \$1130845, indicating that \$717.00 was received for the above car on September 27, 1934. The invoice was signed by H. Johnson.

Also found in this leather case was a repair bill from the Litsinger Motor Company, 913 West Jackson Blvd., Chicago, Illinois, made out to J.B.Bolton, Harrison Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, dated August 5, 1934. The car on which the repairs were made bore license fl-266-251, and motor #1150845, speedometer mileage 1585. It will be noted that the date of this repair bill is prior to the date of the purchase invoice for the same car. An additional invoice for repairs was found in this leather case from the Shaneay Motor Company, Inc., 2821 Sheffield Avenue; dated Movember 19, 1954.

A vehicle license from the City of Chicago issued to J.B.Bolton, 57 East Harrison Street and a photographic copy of a certificate of ownership issued to J.B.Bolton, Harrison Hotel, for the previously described Ford sedan was also found in the leather case. This car was stored in the Clark-Van Buren Garage on January 9, 1935 by Special Agents McKee and Suran.

At the time of the location of the Ford Victoria coupe on January 10, 1935, there was also found in the reer seat by Special Agents McKee and Suran a set of Illiants license plates, 1934, \$310-949 which plates were scapped in a newspaper. Inquiry at the Secretary of State's office, Chicago, Illinois revealed that these were issued to Marvin Helson, 1813 Heith Avenue, for a Ford, motor \$\frac{1}{4}\text{A3512366}\$. Inquiry at the Auto Theft Detail of the Chicago Police Department revealed that these plates were reported stolen on October 27, 1934 at 12:55 P.M. by John Whitlock, \$\frac{1}{2}\text{A51}\$ South Marshfield Avenue, Chicago, it being moted that oral inquiry at the Secretary of State's office that they were issued to Marvin Nelson, it was ascertained, however, that they were in reality issued to John Whitlock.

With regard to the lifting of letent fingerprints from property found in the apartment of Russell Gibson, the following memorandum is submitted by Special Agent M. Chaffets:

This memorandum will enumerate for you the articles treated by me for latent fingerprints and where they are now located, being preserved for possible evidentiary purposes.

In addition to the articles listed by me in my memorandum dated January 14, 1935, the following werk brought in at a later time:

On the night of January 8 and early morning hours of January 9, 1935, the Agents of the Chicago Division office conducted a raid at 439 Arlington Place, which residence is a

"call house", operated by Tillie C. Lonquest, and on which residence a telephone tap was maintained for a considerable length of time due to the fact that it was understood that parties in this spartment had contact with members of the Karpis Barker gang. During the conduct of this raid, Patricia Lonquest, Tillie C. Lonquest and Grace Lonquest, were brought to this office and questioned. The fellowing memorandum is submitted by Special Agent V.W.Peterson on his interview with Patricia Lonquest:

"January 17, 1935

Patricia Lonquest, 439 Arlington Street, Chicago, Illinois, was interviewed by the writer on January 8, 1935. She stated that her mother, Tillie C., Lonquest, lives at 541 Dakdale, Chicago, Illinois. She has three sisters, Barbara Lonquest, age 34, 459 Arlington, Chicago, Frances Lonquest, age 17, 641 Oakdale, Chicago, and Grace Lonquest, age 20, 641 Oakdale, Chicago.

Patricia Lonquest stated that she has lived in Chicago for the past 8 years. She was formerly married to one Jesse E. Roberts, an attorney with offices in the First National Bank Building, Chicago. During the time that she was married to Jesse E. Roberts, they resided at 231 - 7th Avenue, LaGrange, Illinois, they were married in 1929 and were divorced on August 29, 1932.

Prior to 8 years ago Patricia Lonquest, together with other members of her family, resided at 3711
Westminster Street, St. Louis, Missouri. According to Patricia Lonquest, she met Kildred Kuhlman at the Recreation Night Club, Toledo, Ohio, about the latter part of May, 1934. Patricia at that time was en route to Chicago, from Detroit, Michigan, where she had proceeded with a married man by the name of Jack Burke, who previously resided at the Harrison Hotel at Chicago, Illinois. Jack Burke is stated to be engaged in the sale of bar room fixtures.

Patricia Lonquest stated that prior to that time she was unacquainted in Toledo and that she went with Jack Burke as a companion. Her acquaintance with Jeek Burke was a result of an acquaintance hip catalitated through her connection with the coall flat operated the her and Barbara Lonquest. Patricia stated that mile and Jack Burke were in Toledo, they went to the Recreation with a woman who was later determined to be Mildred Enhimen alies Mildred Clark; that Mildred informed her that she frequently visited Chicago, Illinois, whereupon Patricia invited her to get in touch with her in the event she ever came to Chicago, and gave her the following telephons numbers:

Divorsey 9269 Bittersweet 5225

In October, 1954, Mildred Kuhlman came to Chicago and telephoned Patricia Lonquest. At that time Petricia and Berbara Lonquest were residing at 2242 Lincoln Park West, Chicago, Illinois, Mildred advised Patricia Lonquest that she was in town and Patricia invited her to call at her home at the given address. Subsequent thereto, Mildred, together with an individual known as "Slim", and another man called "Henry", arrived at 2242 Lincoln Park West. They drove a Ford V-8 acden to this place. Upon observing photographs of Arthur "Doc" Barker, Patricia Lonquest positivally identified said photographs as those of the individual whom she knew as "Henry". A photograph of "Slim" Gray was also identified by Patricia Lonquest as a likeness of the individual known to her as "Slim".

At the time they called at the Lonquest residence at 2242 Lincoln Park West, Chicago, meither Mildred, "Slim" nor "Henry" entered the house. Patricia Lonquest accompanied them to the Algiers Club that night where they had dinner and a few drinks, after which she was taken home about 11:00 P.M. The following day Mildred and Patricia went shopping on that same evening, Barbara Lonquest met Mildred for the first time according to Patricia.

Gray and "Doc" Barker, whom she claims were kno as "Slim" and "Benry", together with Mildred, cal her at 2242 Lincoln Park West, after which they drove he downtown. According to Patricia, that was the last she saw "Slim".

A short while before Thanksgiving, 1934, Mildred visited the Lonquest home. At that time Mildre in a car with an individual whom she introduced as « "Elmer", and also with "Henry" (Doc Barker) described "Elmer" as follows.

Patricia, to 641 Oakdale Avenue, Chicago, Mildred called et 641 Oakdale, Chicago, the Saturday prior to Christmas, 1934. She came in a car and Patricia denied knowledge as to the identity of the individual who companied her to the Longuest home on that occasion. Mildred stayed only a few minutes and left. Patricia stated that she saw kildred the next Wednesday 12.50 following Christmas, 1934. On this occasion she was by herself and proceeded to the Lonquest residence in a taxi. She also left the place by herself. The next occasion on which she saw Mildred was on January 1, 1935, at which time Mildred was alone. Patricia insisted that the last time she saw "Henry" (Doc Barker) was on the occasion previously ... referred to before Thanksgiving, and further insisted that she had not seen "Elmer" during the past month.

On the Sunday prior to the date of this interview with Patricia Lonquest, she stated that Mildred eams to the Lonquest "call flat" at 459 Arlington, Chicago. Patricia denied knowledge that "Henry" was identical with "Doc" Barker. She claimed that she had no knowledge concerning his true identity and that Mildred had only referred to him as a married man who was keeping her.

With reference to Jehnnie Borcia, Patricia
Lonquest stated that she has known him for the past 7 years.
She stated that Borcia formerly had a tavern just north
of Diversey near the corner of Diversey and Clark Street
Chicago, She first began keeping company with him about
September, 1934. At that time he was living at his home
located in a two-flat building on the southwest corner of
Hamlin and Augusta, Chicago. It was claimed by Patricia
that Johnnie Borcia met Mildred Kuhlman through her about
October, 1934, and that within her knowledge Johnnie Borcia
has never met "Slim", "Henry" (Doc Barker) or "Elmer".

Special Agent V.W.Peterson submitted the following memorandum with regard to his interview with Tillie C. Lonquest:

*Tanuary 18, 1935

Tillie C. Lonquest, 641 Oakdale Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, was interviewed by the writer at the Chicago Division office on the morning of January 9, 1955, at which time she stated that she was 55 years of age, having beam born September 21, 1879; that she is the widow of Albert P. Lonquest, who was formerly a railroad conductor on the E. B. & Q. R.R.; that he worked out of St. Joseph, Missouri; that Albert P. Lonquest has been deceased for a period of 5 years. Tillie C. Lonquest stated that she has resided at 641 Oakdale Avenue, Chicago, for the past two years, prior to which she lived at 4200 Borth Ashland Avenue, for one year and before that lived in

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LaGrange, Illimois, with her daughter Patricis, who was then married to Jesse Reberts for a period of two years. Tillie Lonquest stated that she has four daughters, Barbara, Patricia, Grace and Frances. She advised that she bums a 160 acre farm located about five miles south of Eldorade Springs, Missouri; that one Harry K. Smith rents the farm from her at the present time.

rillie C. Lenquest denied any knowledge concerning any of the subjects of this case. She was shown photographs of the various individuals connected with this matter, but she was unable to identify same. She states that Barbara Lonquest and herself went to Kansas on the Sunday before Christmas and returned only a few days ago. She was unable to provide any further information in this matter, and also denied that she knew Mildred Kuhlman.

Special Agent V.W. Peterson submitted the following memorandum with regard to his interview with Grace Lenguests:

Tanuary 18, 1955

Crace Lonquest, 641 Oakdale Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, was interviewed by the writer on the morning of January 9, 1955. She stated that she resides with her mother Tillie Lonquest and her sister Frances, age 17, at the given address; that she is 20 years of age and was born September 8, 1914. According to Grace Lonquest she is now employed at the Parkway Beauty Salon, 710 Diversey, Chicago, Illinois. Prior to that she was employed at the Lincoln Park Arms Beauty Parlor, and in beauty parlors located in the Bismarck and the Commonwealth Hotels, Chicago, Illinois.

Borcia about one month agoin front of 641 Oakdele ... Avenue, Chicago. At that time he sook Pat Longuest Tillie Longuest and Frances Longuest for a ride his automobile. Grace Longuest denied that she is acquainted with Mildred and was unable to identify \$1 photographs of the subjects of this case. She staged that her bey friend is Thomas Prevenas, who resides at 2627 Haddon Avenue, Chicago, Illinois; that she is engaged to him and has known him for a period of three or four years and that he is a chef at the Bakligs Restaurant on Randolph near Clark Street, Chicago. 1 further information was obtainable from Grace Longues

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with regard to further investigation conducted Aurora, Illinois, the following memorandum is submitted by Special Agent A.A. Muzzey:

January 24, 1935 The writer accompanied by Special Agent J.T.McLaughlin, pursuant to instructions from Special Agent in Charge, D.M. Ladd, proceeded to Anrora, Illinois, for the purpose of renewing contact with confidential informants in that city relative to Volney Davis, Edna Murray, William Weaver, and Myrtle Eston, subjects in the above entitled case.

In Aurora, Agents contacted

approximately a week before Christmas of 1934, at 5:50 p.m., Volney Davis come into the Riverside Tavern and inquired of him as to whether he was "hot". Volney that he ought to know he was "hot" and volkey left very shortly thereafter. further stated that? Volney had come to the Riverside Tavern in a black Ford sedan accompanied by two other men and two women, who remained in the automobile while Volney went into the istated he was unable to get Riverside Tavern.

the license number on this automobile and frankly? admitted that he lacked the intestinal fortitude to immediately inform the Chicago office of Voltage visit in Aurora and to the Riverside Tavern. He further admitted that he was in fear for his life; that he was unarmed at the time Volney came into the tavern and from the way Volney kept his hands in his? pockets he was positive that Volney was armed. further stated that he was afraid to call the Chicago office from Aurora, fearing Volney would discover that he was calling and would do him bodily said that he proceeded to Montgomery, Illinois, town on the outskirts of Aurora, and called the Chicago office, informing authorities there about Volney's presence in Aurora, this call being made about 12:30 at night. further stated that he has not seen Volney Davis nor any of the other aforementioned subjects since that time and assured ... the writer that in the event Volney does reappear in Aurora, he will immediately notify the Aurora Police and the Chicago office; that in any event he will make a serious effort to have Volney Davis apprehended. further stated that during the time Volney : Davis and Bill Weaver resided in Aurora, which was in the spring of 1934, Volney made frequent visits to Joliet, Illinois, and is of the opinion that Volney may have gone to Joliet to contact one Francia Curry, who operates a bar in that city known as the Elks Bar. and that Volney also might have gone to Joliet to contact one John Tezak, who also operates a tavern 🗪 Chicago Street right off Cass Street, that city, and

Dr. S.D. Goodman, Chiropodist in the City of Aurora, who operated on Edna Murray's feet in the spring of 1934, for ingrown toenails, during which operation Volney Davis fainted, and he was resuscitated by Dr. Goodman, who stated that he has not seen nor heard of

suggested to the writer and Agent McLaughlin that possibly Volney Davis may be contacting these men in

Joliet at the present time.

of Volcey nor Edna Murray since the time he performed the operation on Edna's feet. Br. Goodman implicitly assured the writer that in the event he does see or hear anything of Volcey or Edna he will immediately notify the Chicago office, the address and telephone number of which are in his possession.

Miss Emily Myles, living at 729 Penn Avenue, Illinois, who called the writer at his home the night that Volney Davis appeared in Aurora to inform him of -Volney's presence in Aurora, and which call was received by Agent Abbaticchio, transmitted to the Chicago effice; stated that she has never seen Volney Davis, but that me the night in question she was at the Riverside Tavern had told her that Volney Davis had been there early in the evening and that he was afraid to ... inform the Chicago office of Volney's presence in the Aurora, and that she, knowing the writer and knowing that he was anxious to apprehend Volney, called at approximately 11:45 that evening from her home. Miss Myles further stated that she will immediately notify the writer or the Chicago office in the event she acquires any more information relative to these subjects. The telephone will

Agents of the Division had come to Aurora the following day in response to the sall he had made to the Chicago office and that he had given them all the information he had soncerning subjects which information undoubtedly is now incorporated in a report. The writer was unable to see Miss Anna Olson, Walter Burkell, Frank Burkell, or Henry Daily, who have cooperated with the Chicago office in the past relative to these subjects because of the fact they could not be located in Aurora this day.

Continued investigation at Aurora and Joliet, Illinois with regard to the location of Volney Davis is contained in the following memorandum submitted by Special Agents A.A.Muzzey and J.T.McLaughlin:

January 24, 1935

According to statements made by
of lurors, Illinois, which statements were incorporated
in a previous memorandum submitted by the writer. Velney
Davis, subject of the above entitled case, made
frequent visits to Joliet, Illinois, while he was residing
in Aurors, Illinois, and according to
Francis Curry and one John Tezak were named as possible
contacts of Volney Davis' in Joliet.

The writer accompanied by Special Agent J.T.
McLaughlin in Joliet, Illinois, located Frank J. Tezak,
his place of business a combination bar and gambling joint
at 405 Chicago Street, and went into the place, made
discreet inquiry as to the identity of John Tezak and
discovered John Tezak is a brother of Frank J. Tezak and
that these two brothers operate this tavern and gambling
joint. No one resembling any of the subjects in instant
case was seen by Agents, there being but a very few customers
at the bar at the time of Agents' visit.

J. Walter Lowrey, Postmaster, and inquired of him as to the reputation of Tezak and Curry. Mr. Lowrey stated that both were very shady individuals, very unreliable and undoubtedly have hoodlum connections, particularly Curry. Agents were told Curry operates the Royal Bodago Tayern in the Elks Building directly across the street from the Post Office; that this tayern is also a night club on a small scale and that it would be futile for Agents to make known their presence or identify themselves in this tayern for the reason that no information would be forthcoming from anyone connected with it.

Mr. Lowrey further stated that Curry was the finger man in the kidnaping of one Jim Ward of Chicago Heights, Illinois, during prohibition days; that Curry has been associated with underworld characters as long as the can remember and has provided hideouts and given aid to many hoodlums and gangsters. Mr. Lowrey further stated that Curry is very friendly with the owner of the Louis-Joliet Hotel and although he did not wish tobe quoted

as saying that the proprietor of the Louis-Joliet Hotel was connected with gangsters, nevertheless because of the close association between himself and Durry it is Mr. Lourey's opinion that the Louis-Jeliet Hotel would be a possible stopping place for many gangsters.

Mr. Lowrey suggested that M.J.Formengo, Chief of Police, Joliet, was a very reliable person in shom confidence could be reposed and from whom the fullest cooperation with the Division could be expected.

Agents telephoned Mr. Fornango and requested that he come to the Postmaster's office in the Post Office Building, and there exhibited photographs of the Marpis-Barker mob to him and Chief Fornango positively identified the photograph of Volney Davis as being a person whom he had met in the bar of the Woodruff Hotel sometime ago, the exact date not known to him; that at the time of meeting Volney Davis he does not recall the name by which Davis was introduced to him, but is positive that the person introduced to him is identical with Volney Davis; that at that time Davis had been doing quite a bit of drinking and Chief Fornango had been invited to have a drink with Volney Davis, and the meeting with him resulted.

Chief Fornango personally knows Dr. Joseph Moran and stated that he has not seen Doc Moran in Joliet recently and is of the opinion that Doc Moran would not come to Joliet because of the fact that he is so well known in that eity.

Agents were advised by Chief Fornango not to make any open inquiry at the Royal Bodago Club because of the fact that it would be futile to make such inquiry; that nothing of importance relative to gangsters could be procured from anyone associated with this place.

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Kansas City office confidential informant and thrown out of an automobile on the outskirts of Jolias that he held him in sustedy for lour he questi cmed recoured the information that or five days and from Doe Moran was one of the crowd of four men who had abducted, poisoned and thrown out of the automobile at this time told the chief that the mob had a hideut in the northeast section of Jolist and on three consecutive was taken out to the northeast section of the Ja Ja city in an attempt to find this hideout, but was mable to do so. According to Chief Fornango is now in an ... Insene asylum in Kankakee, Illinole, and suggested to Agents possibly some further information could be procured from proproviding his physical condition and mental condition arranted it.

Chief Formengo assured Agents and the Chicago office of his earnest desire to cooperate and stated that he will be on the lookeut for any of the members of the Bramer kidnaping mob and in the event he does secure information of value will immediately convey same to the Chicago office.

A set of photographs of all the subjects in the instant case was left with Chief Fornango and he stated that he would cover all questionable places in Joliet, particularly the Royal Bodago Club, and he will attempt to discover whether Curry, the owner of the Royal Bodago, has harbored or given aid to any of the members of the mob and will notify the Chicago office of any developments along this like.

Mr. Lowrey, Postmaster, was requested by Agents to inquire at General Delivery/to whether any mail had been sent care of General Delivery to Volney Davis or Bill Weaver, under their correct names and also under aliases used by them, particularly those of J.E. Hanson and William Thornton,

under which names Volney Davis and Weaver were living the Aurora. Mr. Lowrey consulted the man in charge of the General Delivery relative to this request and such consultation was negative in results. Mr. Lowrey promises his fullest cooperation and stated that he would request the Superintendent of Mails to be on the lookent for any mail addressed to these particular subjects under their correct names and aliases and will post these names an the clock in a conspicuous place where all carriers will see them, with instructions to notify him if they should handle any mail addressed to these names.

At the time of the raid on the apartment of Russell Gibson on January 8, 1935, at 3920 Pine Grove Avenue, certain articles were found in his apartment, among which was a slip of paper bearing telephone No. Fairfax 4482, and the name Edna. The following memorandum is submitted by Special Agent S.K. McKee with regard to his investigation of the above mentioned telephone number:

Tanuary 12, 1955

Reference is made to the alip of paper found in the bureau drawer in the bedroom of apartment I north at 5920 Pine Grove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois on January 9, 1955, which bore the telephone number, Fairfax 4482 and the name "Edna".

It was ascertained through the telephone company that Fairfax 4482 is listed to Irene Funk, apartment 2 et 2305 East 70th Place, Chicago, Illineis.

Special Agents R.C.Suran and S.K.McKee interviewed Mrs. B. Ries, manager of the court apartment at the above eddress. Mrs. Ries resides in apartment 1 at 2517 East 70th Place and is the manager of the entire block of apartment buildings.

with respect to Iren@ Funk, Mrs. Ries that she moved into apartment 2 at 2303 East 70th Place on October 6, 1954 at which time she signed a one year lease at a monthly rental of \$55.00. The apartment in question is unfurnished and Mrs. Funk has her oun? furniture. Mrs. Funk was described as being about 35 years of age, of medium height, having dark brown hair and being of ordinary appearance. When she moved into the apartment: her young daughter, approximately 14 years of age, who attends high school, was living with her. According to Mrs. Ries, the daughter went away shortly before Christmas and Mrs. Ries could not say whether she has returned at 35 the present time. Mrs. Ries said she had no knowledge of Mrs. Funk's associates or visitors saying that her baly contact with the woman was at the time the apartment was rented.

Mrs. Ries produced an application for rental of the apartment, which had been filed in by Mrs. Funk at the time she took up her residence in the building. This application indicated she had formerly fesided at 7157 Bennett Avenue, care of Varner; that she is employed as private secretary by Doctor Charles Frazier, 29 East Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois, and that she maintains a bank account at the First Mational Bank. She furnished as references the following persons:

Dr. end Mrs. Charles Frazier Robert Land, Hotel Copeland Walter Marsh, Congress Hotel George Gill, care Baird and Warner

The several strip photographs containing pictures of subjects and their associates in this file were displayed to Mrs. Ries, and she picked out the photograph of Doris O'Commer as being the likeness of Mrs. Irene Funk.

- Adolph Pratscher, janitor of the apartment building in which Mrs. Funk resides, was interviewed, and the same photographs were shown to him as those shown if to Mrs. Ries, and he, without hesitation, stated that Mrs. Funk and Doris & Conner were identical. He advised that until a short time before Christman, 1954, Mrs. Funk had her young daughter living with her. The girl went away shortly before Christmass and according to Pratecher ... he has not seen her at the apartment at the present time. Pratscher stated that for the past couple of weeks he has seen a man come out of the Funk apartment around 7 AM on several mornings and has observed that this man had a key to the back door. This man has also been seen at the apartment in the evening and at the time he has been seen to enter and leave the apartment, he has always used the rear entrance, which opens on a court yard. Pratacher could not furnish a description of this individual other than to say that he appeared to be between 35 and 40 years of age, of medium size and with dark hair.

As a matter of fact, it should be stated that the telephone number located in the apartment occupied by Adolph Pratscher and his wife is Hydepark 9558.

On the morning of January 11, 1935, Mrs. Adolph
Pratscher was interviewed and photographs of persons
connected with this case were shown to her. She immediately
picked out the picture of Doris & Conner as being a
likeness of Mrs. Irene Funk. She stated this woman had come
to her apartment on two occasions and she was positive that
the Funk woman and Doris & Conner are one and the same
person. She was questioned concerning the man whom her
husband stated he had seen going in and out of the Funk
apartment. She sald she had never seen this individual.

It was learned through Mrs. Pratscher that there are two vacant apartments from which observations might be made on the Funk apartment. One of these is situated on the floor below and immediately adjoining the Funk apartment, while the other is on the same floor but located across the court yard from the Funk apartment.

Varner, who resides at 7157 Bennett Avenue, has been conducted and will be reported by Agent R.C.Suran. Agent Suran has likewise made inquiries through the building management of the building in which Dr. Charles Frazier maintains his office.

Special Agent Nokee interviewed Mr. W.J.Clark,
Legal Department, First National Bank of Chicago, and
learned that Mrs. Irene Funk does not maintain either a
savings or checking account in this bank. The search for
an account in her name was made both as to open and elosed
accounts. The First National Bank of Chicago does not
operate any branch banks. A search was likewise made for
credit information under the name of Mrs. Irene Funk
but none could be found.

The following further investigation was conducted and reported in the memorandum submitted by Special Agent R.C.Suran, as follows:

Agents R. C. Suran and S. K. McKee, concerning IRENE FUNK, Apartment two, 2368
70th Place, Chicago, Illinois, Special Agent R. C. Suran interviewed R. C. Showerman, Superintendent of the Hayworth Building, 29 Mast Midison St. Chicago Illinois, which address was given by Irene Funk as being that of her amployer Doctor Charles Frazier.

Mr. Showerman stated that Doctor Charles Frazier had maintained offices in the Hayworth Building for the past seventeen years; that his principal practice was in connection with insurance companies. He further advised that he has on several occasions had the opportunity to observe Doctor Frazier's secretary, and that this woman has been in the employ of Doctor Frazier for not more than eight months, and to the best of his recollection she has perhaps not been with Doctor Frazier for that length of time. Mr. Showerman was shown the strip photograph bearing the likenesses of Doris O'Connor, Edna Murray and Kate Barker, and he without hesitation selected the photograph of Doris O'Connor as being a likeness of the Secretary of Doctor Frazier, whom he knew as Irene Funk.

At the time Irene Funk rented the apartment at 2505 E. Total Place she stated that she resided at 7157 Bennett Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, care of Varner.

Special Agents S. K. McKee and R. C. Suran ascertained at this address by observing the mail boxes, that KLDA VARNER occupied the third floor apartment in this building. These Agents also interviewed Mr. Quickborn 1811 E. 71st Street, who is the janitor at that address, as well as being the janitor for 7157 Bennett Avenue. Agents Suran and McKee at once determined. through conversation with Quickborn that he is no doubt unreliable. Quickborn stated that Mr. Fatt, 805 North Clerk Street, had charge of the rental of the building at 7157 Bennett Avenue. Mr. Fatt advised Agents McKee and Suran i Regional Action in the Suran in th that he did not have an opportunity to see the tenants at 7157 Bennett Avenue that however, Mr. JOHN SEYBOLD was his collector, and possibly might have information concerning Elda Varner. Mr. Fatt caused to be made a copy of the lease application executed by Elda Varner, said application being dated Jenuary 22, 1934, and being for a lease on apartment 1, third floor, at 7157 Bennett Ave from March 1, 1934 to April 80, 1935, at a monthly rental of thirty-five in dollars. Elua Varner gave as her prior address 7130 East End Avenue and her landlord as the Prudential Insurance Company. She stated that there were three in her family, and that she paid rent to McKey and Poague, \$1.00 R. Tist St. and that she had lived at 7150 East End Avenue for thirteen months. She furnished the further information that she had been employed at the Fair 22 Department Store for four years as assistant buyer in the junior girls ! partment, her immediate superior being Miss Beatty, phone State 2500.

Agent Suran interviews Mr. M. Kozyed, treasurer and personnel director of the Fair Department Store, who advised that Elda Warner was employed as a clerk at the Fair store during the year 1929, and was promoted to Assistant Buyer in 1931, and that she was considered an efficient employ

Mr. John Seybold, 805 North Clark Street, Chicago, Illinois states that in collecting rents for Mr. Fatt he had opportunity to observe Elda Varner. He stated that she was a woman between thirty-five and forty years of age, five feet five or six inches tall, dark brown hair, slender build; that she has two children, the names of whom he does not know, one being a girl fifteen or sixteen years of age, and the other a boy fourteen or fifteen years of age. Mr. Seybold promised to make discreet inquiries and endeavor to ascertain hore of the personal history of Elda Varner.

Special Agents K. R. McIntire and R. C. Suran on January 12,1935 re-interviewed Mrs. B. RIES, manager of the apartments at 8303 E. 70th Place. She stated that the day following the interview with her by Agents Suran and McKee, she was in a neighborhood beauty parlor, at which time Irene Funk was there also. She stated that on this occasion she took particular notice of Irene Funk, and there is no question in her mind that the photograph of Doriv O'Connor is a likeness of Irene Funk. Arrangements were made with Miss Ries for Agents to occupy the second floor apartment, left, at 7045 Crandon St. Chicago, which point of observation would permit a surveillance of the dinette windows of the apartment occupied by Irene Funk. The apartment at 7046 Crandon is an unfurnished apartment. Miss Ries also advised that the apartment located on the third floor, left, at 2315 E. 70th Place was vacant, and unfurnished. It was noted that this apartment would permit observation of the front windows in the apartment of Irene Funk, as well as the door, to the building.

On January 15,1935, Agent Suran communicated with Mr. Patt and was advised that Mr. Seybold had been unable to secure any additional information concerning Elda Varner. Agent Suran advised Mr. Fatt that it was particularly desirable to ascertain the mames of the children.

With further reference to Doris O'Connor, the following investigation was conducted by Special Agents K.R.McIntire, and J.L.Madala, and the following memorandum is submitted by Special Agent K.R.McIntire:

Reference is made to the memoranda submitted by Special Agents R. C. Suran and S. K. McKee, seen earlier in this report, with regard to Miss Irene Funk, who is believed to be identical with Doris O'Commor.

On January 26, 1935 Special Agents E. R. MoIntire in J. L. Madala interviewed Adolph Pratcher, who is the Jahitor of the building in which Irene Funk resides. At this time Mray Adolph Pratcher was also interviewed. Mrs. Pratcher advised Agent that on January 21, 1934 Irene Funk hired a maid to clean her apartment and that arrangements were made whereby the maid shoul leave the apartment key at the home of Adolph Pratcher, Mrs. Pratcher further informed that at about 7 o'clock PM on the night of January 21, 1935, a woman appeared at her apartment and requests the key to the spartment of Irene Funk. Mrs. Pratcher declared that this woman is identical with Edna Murray, who is known to be the sister of Doris O'Connor. With respect to her certainty in and the this matter, Agents displayed several pictures of women prominently mentioned in this case, and she immediately chose the picture of Edna Murray as resembling strongly, Irene Funk, declaring that that is the woman who called for the key of Irene Funk.

On January 26, 1935 the Division was advised by teletype of the visit by Edna Kurray to the apartment of Irene Funk,

Mrs. Pratcher also informed that approximately two weeks before this occurrence Irene Funk held a drinking party at her apartment.

In view of these developments it was considered advisable to immediately arrange for a tap on the telephone of Irene Funk, which is Fairfax 4482, located in her apartment, No. 2303 at East 70th Place. Agent Madala, through Adolph Pratcher, arranged for the telephone tap. Incidentally, it should be stated that Edelph Pratcher is considered very reliable and will assist Agents whenever possible. This matter was acquiesced by Mrs. B. Ries, the manager of the building in which Irene Funk resides, Mrs. Ries address being 2317 East 70th Place.

Through Mrs. Ries and Adolph Pratcher, Agents McIntire and Madala arranged for the occupancy of a vacant apartment located at 7041 Crandon Street, which is the apartment located on the second floor on the right hand side going up. This apartment gives agents full observation of the rear of the apartment occupied by Irene Funk and makes it possible to observe the area way through which Adolph Pratcher advised he observed a man leaving several weeks ago at about 7 O'clock AM.

Pretcher that Agents may occupy an apartment at 2315 kest with Place, which is on the third floor and which beerlooks the frost of Irene Funk's spartment. This apartment is not being used by Agents at the present time.

On January 25, 1935 arrangements were made for Special Agents C. E. McRas, J. J. Metcalfe and M. Chaffets to occupy the apartment at 7041 Crandon and to maintain a surveillance of Irans Funk's apartment, At about 5:15 PM on January 21, 1935, immediately after the telephone tap had been installed, Agent McIntire over heard the following telephone conversation:

Pritchard, care of the Columbia Club, Indianapolis, Indiana on his 1934 Pontiac coupe, motor number 1029719.

On January 29, 1935 the Indianapolis office was telegraphically requested to discreetly ascertain the identity of Pritchard and on even date a telegram was received from the Indianapolis office advising that Harry T. Pritchard is a prominent Indiana and New York business man with permanent address at 100 Broadway, New York City. Apparently this car has no connection with Irene Funk.

Agents McRae, Metcalfe and Chaffetz, maintaining the surveillance of Irene Funk, ascertained from Mrs. B. Ries that Irene Funk had told Mrs. Ries that she, Irene, had been visited by one Harry Baker, who is connected with the Continental Can Company, Chicago, Illinois.

Beker is living at the Crest Hotel, 5730 Stony Island Avenue, Chicago, Illinois.

On January 28, 1935 Harry Baker visited Irene Funk and late in the evening called the Crest Hotel asking that he be called at Irene Funk's address at 6 o'clock AM on the following morning.

Through Mrs. B. Ries, the Agents maintaining the surveillance learned that the Mr. Newton, mentioned earlier in this report, is B. D. Newton, connected with the Electric Storage Battery Company, 4613 South Western Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, Re is reported to have a wife who is known as Miss Rita and she is reported to work at the Boston Oyster House, Morrison Hotel,

The Agents maintaining the surveillance of Irene Funk have reported to this office that the following telephone calls have been made from the apartment of Irene Funks

This is undoubtedly the man whom igents
McIntire and Madala observed at Irene
Funk's apartment on January 26, 1935. This
conclusion is reached because Agent McIntire
heard Irene Funk call Fairfax 7100 and ask
for Room 622 on the night of January 26, 1935;
at which time she asked the party at Fairfax
7100 if he were coming over soon; that she had
dinner ready for him and that they would so
out for the evening.

Mr. Meyer - Englewood 0270 - which is the telephone number of Clarence E. Miller, 6758 Lafayette Street, Chicago, Illinois. It appears that the party salling from Irene Funk's apartment talked to the daughter of Mr. Meyer, known as Ona Meyer.

The Agents maintaining the surveillance have also ascertained that Irene Funk plans to join the Funk family at Miller, Indiana when she vacates her apartment at 2503 East 70th Place. Immediate inquiries will be made in Miller, Indiana to ascertain the identity of the Funk family.

On January 26, 1935, the Division was advised that information had been obtained by this office that Edna Murray had visited her sister, Doris O'Connor on Monday, January 281, 1935. At this time a request was made upon the Division of for authority to rent two apartments for surveillance, and also authority to tap the telephone Fairfax 4482, listed to Ireas Funk, 2503 Kast 70th Place, Chicago. Authority was granted by the Division to rent two partments for surveillance and to tap said telephone.

On January 19, 1935, Special Agent in Charge R.E.

Vetterli, telephoned the Chicago office from the St. Lexis
office advising that Special Agent in Charge Alt, had wired him
from Jacksonville, Florida, stating that agents in Florida had
seized 1934 Buick compe at Ocala, Florida, bearing motor We,
2884746, with 1954 Illinois license plates 750974. This license
plate was checked by the St. Louis office, and was found tobe
registered and issued to T.C.Blackburn, 114 Walnut Street,
St. Charles, Illinois, under date of March 10, 1954; that Blackburn
purchased the car new on March 19, 1954 from Boff O. Judd Sales
Company, 114 Walnut Street, St. Charles, Illinois. The Bill of
sale for the car was notarized by Fred E. Drew, Occk County,
Illinois.

With regard to the above mentioned car, the following investigation was conducted by Special Agent R.C.Gillaspie:

Interview was had with Mr. Ross O. Judd Sales, 114 Walnut Street, St. Charles, Illinois, who stated that the above mentioned automobile, described as a 1934 Buick coupe, serial £2725776, motor Mo. 2884746, was sold by his brother, Mr. Elmer M. Judd of 4143 Cottage Grove Avenue on March 10, 1934; that the entire transaction was handled by Elmer M. Judd, although it was handled in the name of the Ross O. Judd Sales, St. Charles, Illinois. He exhibited to Agent the original car order showing the sale of the above mentioned ear from the Buick Company to his concern. He stated that the sale price of the car was something over \$1100.00.

in commection with the license plates which were bought at his address. Mr. Ross 0. July stated that these plates came to his place of business apparently at the direction of his brother and that three mem called for the plates at a later date. He stated that he would be unable to make any identification, as the only time he saw them was when they called for the plates. He was shown photographs of all members of the Barker-Karpis gang but could make no identification.

Mr. Judd further stated this records indicated that the transaction was handled for his brother by R.P.Loper, an employee of Elmer M. Judd, 4145 tottage Grove Avenue. Mr. Judd stated that the reason this ear was sold in his name was because of an arrangement had with his brother, whereby his brother, Elmer M. Judd, would occasionally make sales of new automobiles, and inasmuch as Elmer M. Judd had no license and was not a dealer, all sales of new cars were made in the name of Boss O. Judd Sales, St. Charles, Illinois; that Elmer Judd was engaged in the business of repossessing and handling cars for insurance companies.

Mr. Russell P. Loper, an employee of Elmer E Judd, 4145 Cottage Grove Avenue, stated that he recalls making a sale of a new 1954 Buick coupe to T.C.Blackburn in March of 1954; that Blackburn same to his place of business inquiring about the purchase of a car; that he showed him a catalog and Blackburn tentatively selected a 1954 Buick coupe; that approximately a week thereafter Blackburn again came to his place of business and placed an order for a 1954 Buick coupe without a rumble seat; that he asked Blackburn where he could phone him when the ear we was delivered, to which Blackburn replied that he was movin about a good deal and that he had, no place where he could be reached by telephone; that thereafter the car was delivered and Blackburn called and paid for the car in \$100.00 bills. He stated that he took Elackburn next door to Mr. Fred E. Drew, Notary Public, 4141 Cottage Grove opposite Avenue, where Blackburn notarized the application for license. Further, that he suggested to Blackburn that since he had no regular address he give the address of Ross O. Judd Sales, 114 Walnut Street, St. Charles, Illinois in purchasing the license plates.

Mr. Loper stated that he had never had any previous contact with Blackburn; that he was a perfect stranger to him and that he has not seen him since that time. Photographs of all the Barker-Karpis gang were exhibited to Mr. Loper but he was unable to make any identification. He described T.C. Mackburn as follows:

Mr. Loper stated that T.C.Blackburn was not seem by Mr. Elmer M. Judd as the latter was at that time on a trip in China. It will be noted that the business of Elmer M. Judd is conducted in a showroom in the front of the Daylight Carage at 4145 Cottage Grove Avenue and Mr. Loper explained that there was no connection between the Daylight Carage and the business of Elmer M. Judd. He further stated that he had no papers reflecting the transaction with T.C.Blackburn as they had been forwarded to Ross D. Judd Bales, St. Charles, Illinois.

Interview was had with Mr. Fred B. Drew, Hotary
Public at 4141 Cottage Grove Avenue, who stated that he
could not recall notarizing an application for the bill of
sale for T.C.Blackburn in March of 1954. He stated that he
has numerous people calling on him to notarize papers and it
is impossible for him to remember each individual. He
further stated that he had no record of the transaction.

With regard to the location of Er. Joseph P. Moran, the following memorandum is submitted by Special Agent C.R.McIntire:

McIntire and M Chaffets on January 24, 1935, made an investigation at the Illinois State Penitentiary at Jolist, Illinois, and through the record office learned that William "Fat" Donney, No. Bogos was received at said Penitentiary on June 6, 1922 from Cook County on a charge of robbery with a gun and sentenced one y to life; that he was released on March 25, 1955, and that his Parole Sponsor is Fred R. Schwarts, 5226 West Harrison Street, telephone Kedzie 3800. He is presently residing with his mother, Mrs. Core Vallie, 2738 West Gladys Avenue, Chicago, Illinois.

On January 28, 1935, Special Agents W. C. Ryan and J. Medala located Dohney at his mother's address and requested him to come to the Chicago Division Office, which he did. He was interviewed by Agents Ryan and Madala, and disclaimed any knowledge as to the location of Doctor Moren, further declaring that he did not act as a murse to Alvin Karpis and Arthur R. Barker when their fingerprints were changed. He was glao interviewed by Special Agent K. R. McIntire, who advised him of the serious ness of his position. Further, that if the information in the possession of this office is correct, he could be returned to the State Penitentiary and be compelled to serve the remainder of his life there. He advised that he is fully sware of his position He stated to Agent McIntire that he would be very willing to contact persons who were in Jolist at the time he and Doctor Moran were there, and that he would make every effort to locate Doctor Moran. He advised that he could give no assurance that he could locate Moran, stating that Special Agent R. D. Brown several months ago interviewed him at which time Agent Brown advised him that he would be compensated for his efforts in, attempting to locate Doctor Moran. At that time Dohney advised Agent Brown that he would not care to accept any money from the Division because he could not give definite assurance that he could locate Doctor Moran.

Upon the advice of Special Agent in Charge, D. M. Lad William Dohney was released from the Chicago Division Office on January 50, 1935, after he had given definite assurance that he would communicate with this office at least once a week either personally or by telephone,

Henceforth, agents in the Chicago Office will keep in touch with Villiam Dohney in an effort to locate Doctor Moran. For the purpose of locating Dohney in the future in the event he is wanted for this office for any reason, the following information is being set out:

companies in and around Kansas City. Those persons who were contacted concerning Belcher were of the opinion that he is entirely responsible.

Similar inquiries with regard to Simpson disclosed that he has also been employed in connection with eil companies for a number of years and probably came to Kansas City from Butler. Kissouri. The persons interviewed were not very high in their opinion of Simpson, although no one gave information indicating that Simpson has been connected with any criminal activities. In addition to Simpson's connection with oil companies it was disclosed that he had an ice route for approximately two years and that his wife, from whom he is now probably separated, has been employed for some time in the Commercial Department of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Neither Belcher nor Simpson is listed in the present city directories of Kansas City, Missouri or Kansas City, Mansas. The last known address of Belcher was 850 Troop, Kansas City, Kansas, and the last known address of Simpson was 5122 Harrison, Kansas City, Missouri, this address being that of 1950.

From the information outlined herein it seems unlikely that the proposed contact of the Sawyers would be had with these persons at the filling station. 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

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



Reference is made to telegrams from this office dated February 13 and 14, 1935, and telephone conversation had by me with Mr. Tamm of the Bureau concerning a bond found in the apertment vacated by Jess Doyle at 23 Warner Plaza, Kansas City, Missouri, which was located by the negro janitor at that building, Charles Bownen, and turned over by him to the Kansas City, Missouri, Police Department.

As stated in my telegram of February 14, 1935, subsequent inquiries have developed that in addition to a bond of \$1,000.00 of the City of Peabody, Kansas, #36, there were also found by Bownan two \$10.00 travelers checks of the Mellon National Bank, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, bearing numbers G336580 and G336579. I am advised that these travelers checks were included in the loot obtained in the robbery of the First Mational Bank, Okemah, Oklahoma, or the Okemah National Bank, Okemah, Oklahoma, both of which occurred on December 22, 1934. According to information furnished to Special Agent R. P. Shanahan of this office by representatives of the Burns Detective Agency and of the Kansas City Police, all of these articles were found in a partially filled can of Oveltine which was in the apartment at the time it was deserted by Doyle and which was subsequently chained by the janitor with the permission of the epartment mana ger. My information is that Bownen's wife was preparing to use the Oveltine when these articles were discovered by her. Interview is to be had with Bownan and his wife today, it being noted that efforts which have been made to locate them have been unsuccessful due to the fact that Bowman has left his former place of employment. However, Agents from

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this office are presently on their way to interview him.

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Entry was first made to the apartment which had been occupied by Doyle, under the name of J. C. Stacey, at 23 Warner Plaza, the apartment being number seven, by five Agents, including the writer. At that time it was anticipated that Doyle might be located there, however, it was observed that the apartment had apparently been deserted, there only being a few personal effects and some remements of food in the apartment. Three Agents of this office, R. P. Shanahan, H. A. Dietz and V. I. Parry, were left in the apartment and their instructions were to carefully search it, but to handle any articles found with care to avoid the obliteration of fingerprints. They were instructed to prepare a detailed list of the articles found in the apartment. They were also carefully instructed as to the procedure to be taken by them in the event Doyle should return to the apartment or should send any one there. These Agents were under the immediate supervision of Agent Shanahan, who has been actively engaged in the investigation of this case for some time. They did make a thorough search of the apartment, according to their statements to me, with the exception of a minute examination of the food containers and packages. In this connection I wish to state that I did not specifically instruct the Agents to examine these articles and realize that I am at fault in this. The principal articles which were observed by me in the apartment during the short time I was there were apparently toilet accessories and similar articles evidently left there by the woman occupant. I thought there was a possibility of Doyle returning to the place for some of these articles. There being no luggage and no articles of men's apparel appearing to have any value, I felt that the possibility of there being anything left there of any value was very remote. As I have stated, I was in error and there will be no recurrence of such errors.",

Detailed statements of the Agents who conducted the search are not being transmitted with this letter due to the fact that the Agents in question are all engaged in investigative activity outside of the office which precludes their immediate submission, such memoranda will be prepared and submitted to the Division in the near future.

Subsequent to the withdrawal of the Agents from this apartment, newspaper articles indicated that the Kansas City Police had located this apartment and had searched it. It did not appear desirable to me to return to the apartment for a subsequent search in view of the fact that we had had information concerning the location of the apartment prior to it being

obtained by the police and I did not think it wise to engage in joint investigative activities with them for this reason and for the further reason that the police had not been advised of the connection of Volney Davis with Doyle and his associates.

Brennan, St. Paul, Minnesota, dated 1-28-554 Om receipt of telegram from the Division, dated January 20,1955, by Special Agent R.C. Coulter, the St. Paul and Minneapolis Police Departments and all officers receiving identification orders in the St.Paul District were notified to be on the lookout for the sar described in this telegram, the driver of which was alleged to be ALVIN KARPISA Victim Bremer was brought to the Ramsey County Jail, where interview ... with Subjects ALLDERTON and FARMER, the substance of which is as follows: 3-Division ... 1-Kansas City 2-St.Paul 1-Jacksonville 2-Chicago 1-New York COPIES DESTR 1-Omaha 1-Philadelphia

The following memorandum is submitted by Special Agent

J. E. Brennant

On the morning of January 26, 1935, Special Agent John 2 Brennan accompanied Biward G. Bremer to the Ramsey County Jail in St. Penl, Minnesota. They repaired to the sell block in this HAROLD ALDERTON and MIMER FARMER, Defendants in this case, ere being held. Both ALDERTON and FARMER were asked if they recognized Agent Brennan's companion. They both stated that they had seen to his picture in the papers and that they recognized him from these pictures as Bremer. It was suggested to them that they may here seen Bremer while he was held at ALDERTON's house at Bendezville, but FARMER stated that he had only been there three times and had had never been in the room in which Bremer was confined, consequently he had not had an opportunity to see him. ALDERTON stated, however, that he had seen Bramer while he was held there, but would not be able to recognize him because of the fact that he had only seen ... him from the back, at which time Bremer was seated at a small table in the corner of the room, and his head was covered with some sort of bandage and tape. ALDERTON inquired of Bremer what was the matter with the fish he had cooked for him, as he had heard more about a series fish than anything else. Bremer stated that inquiry had been made of him as to whether it was lake perch or river perch. ALDERTON stated that it was bullhead. Bremer stated that he didn't think it was as he could recognize perch when he tasted it, and ALDERTON stated that he had purchased some bullhead at the local market at 3 Bentonville, but was unable to get a sufficient supply and had the bought some perch, and that they may have served him some perch. Bremer and AIDERTON exchanged reminiscences about their mental condition at the time that Bremer was being held, during which inquiry was made as to the identity of one of the mob who had treated Bremer better than the rest of them and had brought him a couple say of highballs on one occasion, and ALDERTON stated that he thought that this was probably a fellow referred to as "HEAVY", and asked Bremer if he didn't have a voice with exceptional volume, to which! Bremer replied that he had. Bremer also asked him about smother of the mob who had stated to him that he had brought him down there and was going to take him home and see that he got home of ke ALDERTON stated that this was undoubtedly "DOC" BARKER, as "DOC" had always been rather talkative while there, and that "DOO" was the one who had endeavored to imitate the Mexicans, that is, be talked with a broken accent so as to give Bremer the impression

that the place was occupied by Mexicans, Italians, or foreignors. Bremer inquired as to who the "tough guy" was, and ALDERTON stated that this was undoubtedly GEORGE GOETZ. ALDERTON stated that the first time he found out the identity of the person who was being held in his place was the day after their arrival there when he brought in the Chicago Tribune at which time the mob grabbed 🛊 🤼 🦠 from him and read it over, and that he, ALDERTON, inquired as to whether Bremer was the person held, and that "DOC" BARKER language about it and told him to go see for himself. ALDEREN stated, however, that he did not look to see if it was Bremer, Bremer inquired as to the time of day at which he got up, and ALDERTON: stated that it was around 11:50 or noon. He also said that Bree arrived at his house about ten or eleven e'clock at hight; that he was brought there in "DOC" BARKER's Bulck; that when they left "DOC" BARKER left first in his Buick, and later KARPIS, CAMPRELL, and DUTCH ZIEGLER put Bremer in ZIEGLER's Chevrolet coups and & drove away with him, and apparently Bremer was taken out of this car and put back in BARKER's car some distance from the house, as ZIETER came back alone; that they left about ten o'clock in the morning as he remembers that the children were at recess at the school across the street. ALDERTON also stated that the person it is referred to as "HEAVY" was the one who had bandaged Bramer's head, or otherwise taken care of it, as this fellow had come out and the asked him to boil some hot water for him, and that the last few days that Bremer was held there, he was in a bad way physically as he was wobbly when ZIEGLER took him from the room in which he was held to the bathroom. ALDERTON stated that during the last few days in which Bremer was held at his home, it appeared that The Park they weren't going to be able to collect the ransom money, and that the mob inquired of him as to whether or not he sould drive to St. Peul without getting lost, and that he obtained the impression A from this that they intended to release Bremer if the money was not paid, and have ALDERTON bring him home. ALDERTON also stated that when he found out that it was Bremer who was held at his place, or immediately thereafter, the mob wanted him to go flown town and buy some provisions, and that he stated that he would 🚁 leave right away; that they told him that there was no hurry about it, but he volunteered to leave immediately, and did go down town, or rather did go to the tavern of FARMER, and told FARMER that Bremer was the person who was being held at his house. FARMER interjected the remark at this time that he nearly fell behind The same of the sa

the bar when ALDERTON told him the identity of the person held at ALDERTON's place. ALDERTON also stated that whenever he left () to buy anything, that is, to go to Elmhurst, or any other place, ... he was always followed by a ear, and apparently they did not trust him to leave alone, and FARMER stated that this bunch that had been hanging around his tavern even up to the time of his, FARMER's, arrest; that either "DOC" BARKER, KARPIS, OF WILLIE HARRISON would come around and ask him if any inquiry had been made in Bentonville concerning them or the kidneping, and that he always told them that there had not. FARMER stated that during the time that Bremer was' held, WILLIE HARRISON was at his place quite frequently, and apparently was an outside watchman for the mob. ALDERTON stated that HARRISON used to some and go from his house, during the time Bremer was held there. FARMER stated that on one occasion, subsequent to the release of Bremer, KARPIS and the person referred to by him as "HRAVY", came to his tavern and called him out to the ear, at which time he noticed that KARPIS had bandages on each of his fingers, and that at that time they inquired of him as to whether inquiry had been made in Bensonville about the kidnaping. Something was said as to how Bremer may have obtained the impression that he walked down some steps when he entered ALDERTON's place, and all the state of the state and ALDERTON stated that the only explanation he could give was that there was a concrete walk in the alley, and it would be necessary to step down a bit from this, and then go down a short passage around to the kitchen door, and that they told Bremer to step down, and he may have gained the impression that he was going down some 🖟 steps from this, as he stated to Bremer that the mob were lenghing and joking about Bramer having obtained the impression that he was held in a basement,

Upon receipt of telephonic request from the Division to intervie Subject BYRON BOLTON regarding news dispatch in a Chicago paper to the effect that he had confessed to participation in the St. Valentine's Day Massacre, in Chicago, BOLTON was interviewed by Special Agent Brennan and stated that he formerly lived at 52nd and 51st Streets in Gioero, Illinois, with FRED GOETZ alias GEORGE SINGLER at which time he was employed at the Van Clark Motor Sales Company; that MIRILER came home one day and said he was in some kind of trouble and some time later the Cicero Police come to his home, but neither ZIEGLER nor BOLTON were there: that ZIEGLER was informed that the officers had been there and ZIEGLER came to the garage where BOLTON was employed and took him down the street and said that the police were looking for him and that this was apparently over the trouble he had, but Ziegler did not state the nature of this trouble. The police watched the 🖰 😁 house for some time but ZIRGLER, through some connections he had in Cir ero, had the police taken off and that BOLTON and his wife then moved; that, at this time. a trunk belonging to ZIEGLER was moved to BOLTON'S mother's place and BOLTON states that he had never looked into this trunk and that all this was before the massacree At the time that the trunk was moved, he was living in an apartment on 22nd Street in Chicago; that he contracted pneumonia and the police went to his mother's and opened this trunk and he was later told that they found it to contain machine guns; that this was shortly after the massacre and that the police got his photograph and took it to a woman who occupied a house across the street from the garage in which the massacre occurred and that she is supposed to have identified this pature also though the photograph had been taken twelve years before when he was in the Mavye He stated that he had no connection whatsoever with the massacre and intended to call at the Chicago Police Department and assert his innocence but that ZIBRIEN told him not to turn in as the police would begt him up and make him tell where ZIEGLER could be located and that, as he was in poor health at this time, he went West at the solicitation of ZIEGLER, who paid his expenses; that he intended, when he recovered his health, to surrender to the Chicago Police but that as ZIEGIER was paying him about \$200,00 a month for his expenses, he never got around to dise cuss this matter with the Chicago Police.

BOLTON stated that he had never told anyone that he was in any way connected with the St. Valentine's Day Massacre in Chicago; that, in fact, he knew nothing about it; that ZIECLER never made any statements to him, or in his presence, about having participated in the massaure and that the news tem relating to an alleged confession reported to have been made by BOLTON was entirely without foundation.

Open instructions of Assistant Director Harold Hatham, RAY McCORD, formerly employed as radio operator for the Northwest Airways of St. Paul, who was shot shortly prior to this kidnaping, while attempting to locate a prowler in the neighborhood in which he resided, which was but a short distance from the home of the Subject MYRTLE EATON, was brought to the Ramsey County Jail, where, after having

seen ARTHUR BARKER, stated that he appeared to fit the description of one of the men who had shot him as well as he might be able to give it and that it was too dark on the night he was shot to get a good look at either of the men and the he would, accordingly, be unable to identify his assailant.

At the time of this interview, inquiry was made of BOLTON as to whether or not he had had any discussions with the kidnapers in this case, or any other person, which might lead to the identity of the kidnapers of WILLIAM HAMA, JRee BOLTON stated that he had never heard that case discussed and had no idea as to who had participated in that kidnapinge

Referring to communication from the Chicago Office to the Division regarding tracing of \$580 Colt Automatic Pistol, \$115485, which was one of the guns found in the spartment of "SLIM" GRAY at Chicago, Special Agent 0.6.Hall and Special Agent Brennan examined the records of the JANNEY SEMPLE HILL COMPANY, Minneapolis, Minnesota, and ascertained that this pistol was shipped to them by the Colt Company on July 18,1953, and was sold to the KREGER CORPORATION, 20 Bouth Washington Street, Minneapolis, Minnesota, on 12-22-55. An examination was made of the books of the KREGER CORPORATION but no record whatsoever was found of this pistol. It may be stated that the KREGER CORPORATION is a pawn shop and that the St.Paul Office has heretofore been unsuccessful in tracing firearms sold through this company.

Former Special Agent 0.0. Hall interviewed Chief of Detectives James Crumley and Tom Filbin, a slot machine operator and associate of thieves, in Filbin's room, #250, St. Frencis Hotel, and during the source of his conversation with them was informed by Crumley that HARRY SAWYER is alleged to be living with LOUIE BROOKS alias BIG IOUIE, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This information was telephoned to the Philadelphia Office and that office replied by wiere that they were unable to locate BROOKS in Philadelphia and it is indicated from correspondence between the Philadelphia and New York Offices that LOUIE BROOKS may be known to the police in New York Citye

Referring to communication from the Philadelphia Office to the New York Office in this matter, under date of January 5,1955, information is set forth to the effect that SANYER is supposed to be travelling in a Chevrolet Coach bearing engine £2029084. In this connection, reference is made to report as special Agent J.L.Flood of the Omaha Office, dated 2-7-55, a copy of which was not furnished the New York Office but which, for the information of the New York Office, advises of the location of this car at Lakeview, Iowa. The St.Paul Office received a communication from ALICE CONRAD, dated at Lakeview, Iowa, January 21, 1935, but which was postmarked "Ames, Iowa", MISS CONRAD having originally pure chased this car for MRS. HARRY SANYER, in which communication she discloses that she received a letter from GLADYS SANYER on November 11,1934 and subsequently dis-

posed of her ear which was abored in Walker's Garage, in Omeha, with a man by the name of THORPE. MISS CONRAD had heretofore pretended to scoperate with the St. Paul Office in connection with this case but she has been away from her home at 901 South Sixth, Minneapolis, Minnesota, for some time and it was not until the publication of the fact that HARRY SAWYER had been indicted in this case that she had been heard from. A communication was forwarded to the Omeha Office requesting that this woman be thoroughly interviewed at the first available apportunity and she has, since, been traced to Chicago, Illinois, the exact address in Chicago, where she may be located, has, according to telephonic communication with the Chicago Office been ascertained by that office.

Pursuant to request contained in a letter from the Chicago Office, under date of January 50,1935, Subject KIMER FARMER was interviewed at the Ramsey County Jail with regard to the possible connection of EDWARD CHARTHOLD MEY, of Bensenville, Illinois, with this case, FARMER stated that he has known this man since 1920 and he is an employee of the State of Illinois and is a Democratic Committeeman in Bensenville; that he is a friend of the owner of the house in which BREMER was held at Bensenville, which owner lives in the front part of this house. FARMER stated that he never saw BARTHOIMEY talking to the owner of the house during the time that BREMER was held there; that as far as he knows BARTHOIMEY had nothing whatsoever to do with the kidneping case; that he does not know any person named MARCKILA KELLER, or MAJOWSKI; nor is he are quainted with JERRY DeMARS, husband of the KKILER somes.

ALLDERTON was also interviewed in this regard and stated that he knows BARTHOIMEY but that BARTHOIMEY was never in his house and he is sertain that BARTHOIMEY knew nothing about the kidnaping case; that BARTHOIMEY and MOCHELL, owner of the house that ALLDERTON rented in Bensenville, were quite friendly, MOCHELL having obtained a state job through BARTHOIMEY. ALLDERTON stated he does not know MARCHILA KELLER alies MAJONEKI or JERRY DOMARS.

Upon receipt of notice from the Chicago Office, the Secretary of States in the St. Paul District were advised that no further investigation need be sonducted with regard to Ford V-8 Coach, engine \$1150845 and Ford V-8 View toria, engine \$1142465, but that this office is still interested in ascertaine ing if Pontiac Coach 1935 Model, engine \$955155, serial \$815257, is registered. Communications have been received advising that "STOP CARDS" have been placed on the Pontiac Coach and "STOP CARDS" have been removed on the two Fords shows referred to.

On January 25,1935, the St.Paul Police arrested MARTIN SIMS alias HARRY MARTIN in possession of a Ford Coach, engine #1191141, bearing Texas license plates #284665, at the Central Ford Garage, at St.Paul. This ear had a bullet hole in the top of the right front fender, two marks on the right side, a hole through the top, and the right front window had apparently been shot out.

Bue to this and the fact that a passenger's registration certificate for 1936, in the name of MARTIN SIMS, Secor Hotel, Toledo, Ohio, was found in SIMS place session, the police were led to believe this ear may have been used in the escaps of KARPIS and CAMPEKIL. SIMS was questioned concerning his possession of this ear and stated that he had purchased it from the B & W AUTO SALES COMPANY. At Chicago, on October 17,1934, paying \$659,000 for it, part of which was repasented by the value of a Chevrolet Coach, which he traded in on it; that he was sugged in bootlegging and gambling, making his headquarters in and about Chicago; that otherwise he would furnish no information about himself. Special Agent in Charge D.M.Ladd, at Chicago, was communicated with by telephone and requested to sheek SIMS' statement regarding the purchase of this car and as investigation by the Chicago Office confirmed SIMS' statement and the Division replied to inquiry made by the St.Paul Police wherein they enclosed fingerprints of SIMS, that he had no previous record, SIMS was released.

Pursuant to request received from the Jacksonville Office, subposing were issued for money and jewelry found in possession of the BARKERS at Lake Weir; Florida. This property was forwarded to the St.Paul Office pursuant to these subposma, and were subsequently returned upon instructions from the Division.

Referring to memorandum prepared by Special Agent in Charge R.A.Alt, Jacksonville, Florida, under date of January 51,1955, wherein it is stated that HARRY SAWYER, had been identified at the Packard Garage in Miami as having appeared there about two weeks before with a Black Packard Sedan bearing New Jersey license plates, interview was had with at St.Paul, Minnesota, who had previously indeavored to secure possession of a Packard ear, property of SAWYER at St.Paul, Minnesota, in satisfaction of a bill for professional services, stated that this car had been kept at the home of MRS. DANNY HOGAN, 1700 West Seventh Street up to about three months ago and that it is a Model 840 De Luxe Packard Club Sedan, engine #189553, serial #476-273-A, body #146837, frame #189526, and was purchased on June 8,1931, for \$4541,000 by MRS. GLADYS SAWYER. The car is green in color. This may possibly be the car SAWYER had at the Packard Garage at Micmi.

Upon receipt of circular letter from the Division requesting that temporary wanted notices, issued for FRED BARKER, be withdrawn from the local police department, examination of the file of the St.Paul Office and of the identification files of the Identification Bureaus of the St.Paul and Minneapolis Police Departments revealed that no such notices were ever received at St.Paul

Upon receipt of telegram by the St.Paul Office giving description of the car in which JESS DOYLE is alleged to have left Kansas City on 2-6-35, this information was furnished the St.Paul Police Department for broadcast information and through cooperation with the Minneapolis Police Department this information was also broadcast from that station.

Concerning a communication received from the Chicago Office, detell 1-12-55, advising that T.H.JACOB of Wausau, Wisconsin, had information someofing a person who purchased a ser from him, by the name of J.A.WARE, Special Agent W.B.Matney sondusted the following investigation:

Agent inquired at the Marathon Motor Company in Wausan for Mr.Jacob and was advised that he is in Whiteville, Tennessee, visiting Ed Steward and will not return to Wausau, Until after February 1,1955. Agent was advised that the person giving Mr.Jacob information someorning Ware was Mr.H.G.Achterberg, 107-2nc Street, Wausau, Wissonsin.

Agent interviewed MR.H.C.ACHTERBERG, 107-2nd Street in Wausan Wisconsin, who advised that WARE, whom he identifies as WILLIAM WEAVER, come into his blacksmith shop at the same time he purchased a par from Mr.Jacoba. and asked that he fix his new ear so belcould attach his two ton trailer to this car. Agent was advised that WALER JOHAS, his helper, did this work and went with MARE to the Tourist Park and worked on the trailer at that place. Agent was advised that WARE was envious to be out of town the next morning by eight o'clock. Er.Achterberg advised that the next morning he same to work : and noticed that JONAS was not there and that this man's elothes, which were always kept at the shop, were gone. Agent was advised that JONAS left without turning the money for the trailer job over to him and remarks that he was a firm close friend of JONAS but did not know where he could be found. Mr.Achterberg advised that he believes that JONAS left with WARE and sould be found with him at this time. Agent was advised that JUMAS can neither read nor write and has difficulty signing his name, Agent was advised by Mr. Achterberg that he will immediately notify the St.Penl Office if he learns of the location of JONAR,

At 615 Jefferson Street, Wausau, Agent interviewed MRS, WALTER JONAS, who advised that she had divorced MR.JONAS several months ago and had a warrant out for his arrest for non-support of their five children. Agent was advised that MRS. JONAS has not heard from her husband but will advise the St.Paul Office in case she learns of his location as she is anxious to have him returned to wausau by the sheriff's office. A picture of JONAS was secured and is being preserved in the St.Paul File for possible future use. From MRS. JONAS, agent secured the following description:

It is worth while to note that JONAS is supposed to be with LAMARE at this time, whose true name is WILLIAM WEAVER. MYRTLE RATCH is identified as the woman passing as MRS. J.A. WARE.

Agent interviewed Sheriff Eronnenwetter at Wausen, who advised that he was trying to locate JONAS and advised that he would inform the St. Paul office if he locates this man. Agent was advised that several attempts had been made to secure a description of the trailer which WARE had in the Tourist Park at Wausen, but due to the number of trailers that were in town at the same time modescription could be secured. A photograph of JONAS, referred to above, was secured, and is on file in the St. Paul Office.
