When asked for comments regarding the passing of information to his Section, Agent DeLoach curtly advised Dr. Andrews that it seemed to be rather poor taste to exhibit an intra-Agency memorandum to a representative of another Agency, particularly one reflecting criticism of that Agency. However, inasmuch as he had used this method of reflecting dissatisfaction with FBI cooperation, he should be advised and set straight regarding a few details he apparently refused to recognize in his own Agency. Dr. Andrews was given the benefit of b3 per OGA straight forward explanation as to the Liaison channels through which the FBI passes current and operational information to the Office of Special Operations, CIA. He was additionally advised that CIA, on many occasions, had advised this Bureau that this was the only channel to use in passing such information. It was then pointed out to Dr. Andrews that, in the past, personnel of CIA had advised representatives of this Bureau that the Office of Collection and Section of CIA) should not receive, Dissemination (Dr. Andrews' and and was not cleared to receive, operational information. It was also pointed out that if the Office of Special Operations, CIA, would not trust personnel of the Office of Collection and Dissemination, it was certainly no fault of the FBI. Dr. Andrews was advised of the complete cooperation between the FBI and the Office of Special Operations of CIA. He was additionally advised that if the Office of Special Operations desired to pass on FBI information to the Office of Collection and Dissemination, then it was strictly a problem within CIA. However, the instructions placed on the passing of such information to outside agencies, as applied to the Office of Special Operations, should still be adhered to by the Office of Collection and Dissemination.

With respect to obtaining technical manuals, as used by FBI Agents, Dr. Andrews advised that this request seemed to be a little out of order. He was questioned as to the possibility of the FBI obtaining training school material, as used by the CIA. He replied that he believed no Agency in the Government could obtain this material, due to the high classification placed upon it by CIA officials. He was then advised that the FBI regarded their manuals in the same light, and it would be a little unethical to expect the FBI to pass on such information to a Section of CIA which was not allowed to receive operational information by its own Agency.

Dr. Andrews advised that he was beginning to see the light. He stated that he had had considerable trouble in obtaining information from the Office of Special Operations, CIA, but that this gap was slowly being closed, and he expected full cooperation in the future. He admitted that he did not now consider it advisable to request training manuals from the FBI. He stated he hoped the entire situation as to his Section being able to obtain operational information in the future could be worked out before very long.

	OBSERVATIONS:

The afore-mentioned incident represents the same old intra-agency feud at the CIA. There is considerable jealousy and hatred between the Office of Special Operations, the Office of Policy Coordination and the Office of Collection and Dissemination, CIA. Instead of this feud being lessened, it has now reached greater proportions because of a recent six-page memorandum prepared for Admiral Hillenkoetter by Assistant Director 0S0, b3 per OGA who recommended that the outside activities of other sections of CIA be curtailed considerably.

FBI liaison representatives to CIA have always maintained a complete "hands off" policy in this feud. It is believed that, inasmuch as this matter has now been brought to Hillenkoetter's direct attention, he will take steps to see that no further incidents of this nature occur.

ACTION:

This entire picture of CIA liaison will be followed closely and you will be kept advised of any future developments.

PI: This 30 year old W.M.M. experienced an onset of a perinnial allergic rhinitis, which is classical in type, during the winter of 194-5-6 when at NTC, Great Lakes, Illinois.

Sneezing caused by housedust, freshly printed newspaper, odor of fresh paint, odor of beer and alcoholic beverages (these act only if patient is already responding to other stimuli) cigarette smoke and playing on rugs. General W. B. Smith contacted Mr. DeLoach this morning and advised that CIA representatives in charge of domestic interrogation of aliens for foreign intelligence purposes had indicated to him "the FBI had forced CIA into obtaining permission for each interrogation before an alten could be approached." General Smith inquired as to the necessity for requesting permission of the FBI for CIA to interview He indicated that he was new in his job and that he was seeking permission more than objecting to the above procedure.

Mr. DeLoach pointed out to General Smith that "CIA was not forced into anything." It was indicated that an original agreement between CIA and the FBI had reflected the necessity of CIA requesting a check of FBI files before any domestic alien was interviewed. It was pointed out to him that this procedure definitely kept CIA from stumbling into an active investigation being conducted by the FBL; furthermore, that such "clearances" were very definitely a form of protection for CIA inasmuch as CIA had the advantage of all information in FBI files actually before the interrogation took place. Numerous instances were pointed out to General Smith where CIA had requested a review of FBI files before interrogating an alien - only to discover that the FBI had considerable derogatory information concerning the alien in question or else the FBI was actually conducting investigation of the alien at the time CIA requested a review of files. On one occasion CIA requested "clearance" to interview ian individual who actually was serving as a British Intelligence Agent. It was mentioned to General Smith that for CIA to unknowingly approach such individuals would not only cause a compromise of intelligence information but would definitely bring embarrassment to CIA and the United States Government.



I would like to recommend that these three Special Agent Supervisors be commended by letter at this time because of some splendid work recently completed by them in effecting additional arrangements whereby the Bureau has had made available to it a great number of medical facilities for the use of Special Agent fitness-forduty physical examinations in various field offices.

With respect to Special Agent Supervisor DeLoach, you are aware, of course, that he has carried on the liaison with the Naval Bureau of Medicine and Surgery through which we were authorized to have the use of Naval facilities in the various territories made available for the physical examinations of our Agent personnel on a courtesy basis. Recently, Ur. DeLoach succeeded in getting authority for some additional Naval facilities covering a few more field divisions.

Special Agent Supervisor Reynolds handles the liaison with the Army, and through his efforts, we now have the use of 9 Army facilities in 9 field divisions for the use of Agent physical examinations on a courtesy basis. 

SUBJECT: SPECIAL AGENT PERSONNEL - ADVANCEMENT

Reference is made to SAC Letter #29, Series 1951, dated March 27, 1951, subsection C, entitled "Special Agent Personnel - Advancement." In accordance with the instructions contained therein, the following comments are submitted regarding personnel assigned to the Security Investigative Division for consideration on a long-range basis for development as administrators and executives in the Bureau.

While it is understood that all supervisory personnel assigned to this Division are being considered for development on a long-range basis, at this time comments are being made only on those individuals whose work reflects that they are definitely above average as material for advancement along the lines indicated in referenced SAC Letter.

I am not submitting comments on Inspector Leo Laughlin or the various Section Chiefs, namely, Messrs. Carl Hennrich, Victor Keay, Fred Baumgardner, and Charles Stanley, inasmuch as their continued assignment in their present positions definitely reflects that they are highly capable and merit consideration for any advancement or change of assignment for which the Bureau may desire to consider them.

Also, I will not comment on the Number One Men in the four sections of this Division, namely, Joseph L. Schmit, Internal Security Section, William A. Branigan, Espionage Section, Earl E. Riley, Loyalty Section, and John S. Ammarell, Correlation-Liaison Section. At the present time these men occupy a position equivalent to that of an Assistant Special Agent in Charge and each of them merits consideration for further advancement.

The following are listed in accordance with the instructions set out in referenced SAC Letter and are available for general or special assignment wherever the Bureau may desire to utilize their services:

George H. Scatterday

Mr. Scatterday is presently assigned to the Communist Front Desk in the Internal Security Section. He also assists in handling

mail in the office of the Assistant to the Director. He has all the necessary qualifications to operate in an administrative position. Mr. Scatterday makes an excellent appearance, dresses well, and has a friendly disposition. He is one of the best Supervisors in the Internal Security Section. He has a well-rounded knowledge of Bureau policy, is a tireless worker, prepares excellent memoranda, has the ability to handle personnel, and exercises good judgment at all times. Mr. Scatterday has had extensive investigative and supervisory experience. He is capable of handling additional responsibility and is definitely SAC material on a long-term basis.

Gerald E. Gotschall

Mr. Gotschall is a very intelligent, capable Agent who has demonstrated an unusual capacity for analysis work and for handling complicated problems. He has executive ability and is one of the top prospects in the Correlation-Liaison Section for development. Mr. Gotschall can be considered SAC material on a long-range basis.

Robert J. Lamphere

Mr. Lamphere has been assigned in the Security Division since September 1, 1947. He has done an outstanding job in the supervision of the complex espionage investigations assigned to him. He has a practical approach and the ability to organize and supervise his work using sound judgment. Mr. Lamphere presents a very good personal appearance, is highly intelligent and is an excellent conversationalist. He has the ability to make contacts among all types of people. Mr. Lamphere has the capability for future development as a Special Agent in Charge.

Donald E. Moore

Mr. Moore is considered Number Two Man in the Internal Security Section and presently assists in the administration of the Section. As such, he handles policy matters, issues instructions to Supervisors, makes decisions and frequently has acted in the capacity of Section Chief in the absence of both the Section Chief and Number One Man. Mr. Moore is a tall, well built individual, has an excellent personal appearance, meets people well, and has the ability to handle personnel. He has the necessary qualifications of a Bureau administrator, either at the Seat of Government or in the field. He has had extensive field experience, is a good contact man and has an excellent attitude. His general over-all ability as a Supervisor is outstanding. Mr. Moore is definitely potential SAC material.

Charles M. Noone

Mr. Noone is presently assigned as Supervisor in Charge of the Correlation Unit. He has considerable executive ability and has had experience as a Supervisor in the New York Office. He is serious, makes an excellent appearance, and is a good administrator. Mr. Noone should be considered on a long-range basis for development as an ASAC and SAC.

Sterling B. Donahoe

Mr. Donahoe entered on duty with the Bureau on January 6, 1941. He has been in the Security Division since June 20, 1949. He is one of the outstanding Agents in the Security Division. He has far better than average ability and has the necessary desire for advancement. He has demonstrated in his assignments that he has outstanding executive ability. Mr. Donahoe is intelligent, presents an excellent personal appearance, can make contacts with all types of individuals, and is adaptable to all situations. Based on his performance, he definitely has the capability for immediately handling the duties of an ASAC, and with further development the functions of an SAC.

Hugh J. Pharies

Mr. Pharies is an experienced, well-rounded Bureau employee. He makes a rugged, excellent personal appearance, and has an excellent personality. He has been assigned to the Loyalty Section, Security Division, since April 30, 1948, and has handled all phases of the Loyalty Program. He would be particularly adept in the cultivation of proper relationship with police or business officials. He has considerable poise and self-confidence and has clearly demonstrated that he has administrative ability. Prior to his assignment to the Loyalty Section, Mr. Pharies had considerable field experience, both as an investigator and as a supervisor. He is an intelligent, capable Bureau supervisor, and is thoroughly capable of handling additional responsibilities. Mr. Pharies would have no difficulty whatsoever in handling the duties of an ASAC at this time and is good material for development on a long-range basis as an SAC.

Elbert T. Turner

Mr. Turner has been assigned to the Security Division since March 29, 1946. He is above average in personal appearance and intelligence. Throughout his Bureau service he has demonstrated the ability to use sound judgment. He can also make contacts among all

types of persons and is adaptable to all situations. In his current assignment, Mr. Turner has demonstrated outstanding administrative ability and I feel that he is perfectly capable of discharging the duties of an ASAC at the present time and has capability for further development as an SAC.

Calvin B. Howard

Mr. Howard is presently assigned to the Internal Security Section, supervising work on the Communist Front Desk. He has also assisted in approving correspondence in the office of the Number One Man of the Section. He presents an excellent personal appearance, is intelligent, knows Bureau policy, exercises good judgment, and has an enthusiastic approach to his work. He is well liked by his fellow employees, is a good contact man, and has all the necessary qualifications to act in the capacity of ASAC. Mr. Howard is definitely potential SAC material.

Cornelius A. Moynihan

Mr. Moynihan unquestionably has executive and administrative ability. He has served as Night Supervisor of the Security Division and is doing his job well. He has had experience in the New York Office as a supervisor. Mr. Moynihan is potential SAC material.

O. Eugene Coleman

Mr. Coleman has been assigned to the Loyalty Section since April 3, 1948. He presents a very businesslike appearance, has a most likable personality, and is a serious, loyal Bureau employee. He has an excellent grasp of Bureau policies and has definitely been an excellent supervisor throughout his assignment in the Loyalty Section. Through Coleman's excellent knowledge of the Loyalty Program, he has been able to assist in all phases of this work. It is noted that prior to Coleman's assignment to the Loyalty Section he had considerable experience in the investigative field, as well as supervisory experience in the Chicago and Savannah Divisions. He is a competent, logical thinking Bureau employee who would have no difficulty in handling responsibilities of an ASAC at this time and is good material for long-range consideration for development as an SAC.

W. Raymond Wannall, Jr.

Mr. Wannall entered on duty on July 27, 1942, and has been assigned to the Security Division since July 24, 1947. He is a considerably above-average Bureau supervisor. His personal appearance

is excellent and his personality commendable. From my observations he is the type of individual who can make contacts among all types of persons and is adaptable to all situations. Mr. Wannall's work is definitely superior and I consider him to have the capabilities for immediate advancement as an ASAC and with development as an SAC.

James F. Bland

Mr. Bland is performing supervisory duties on the Communist Front Desk in the Internal Security Section. He has had a wide variety of field experience, both as an investigator and supervisor. He has a good knowledge of security work, prepares clear, concise and accurate memoranda, exercises good judgment, and has indicated that he definitely has administrative ability. He makes an excellent appearance, meets people well, and is well liked by his fellow employees. Mr. Bland voluntarily performs long overtime duty and definitely has potentialities for development as SAC material.

Leo C. Nulty

Mr. Nulty makes an excellent personal appearance. He is friendly, sincere and obviously intelligent and has demonstrated good judgment in handling his assignments. From my observations of him, I know that he has the ability to make contacts among all types of persons and is adaptable to all situations. Smith Blair, Jr.

He has an outstanding background of knowledge of internal security problems and in fact was a supervisor on these matters in the Baltimore Division. He has a facility for organizing memoranda, for handling squads working on large projects, and for preparing memoranda. Mr. Blair has executive ability and can be considered on a long-range basis as SAC material.

Robert H. Egan

Mr. Egan has been assigned to the Loyalty Section as a supervisor since March 26, 1948. He has done an outstanding job. He presents a very businesslike appearance, has a serious approach to his work and is one of the most thorough supervisors in the Loyalty

Section. He is considerably above average in his ability to supervise loyalty cases. He has an excellent background in both investigative and supervisory work, having served as a field supervisor in the Los Angeles Office prior to assignment to the Seat of Government. Mr. Egan is a solid, well-rounded, conscientious Bureau employee and could operate very successfully as an ASAC. He is excellent material for development on a long-range basis as an SAC.

Paul L. Cox.

Mr. Cox is currently assigned to the Security Index Unit, Internal Security Section, where he is handling policy matters in connection with the Detcom Program. He has had supervisory experience, both in the field and at the Seat of Government. Mr. Cox makes an excellent, mature personal appearance, has the ability to make contacts among all types of people, and has indicated an ability to handle personnel. Wayne W. Klemp

Mr. Klemp is an experienced Eureau Agent who has had extensive field and supervisory experience. He is currently performing supervisory duties in the Special Memoranda Unit of the Internal Security Section. He is a tall individual, makes an excellent personal appearance, has the ability to get along with people, and is a good contact man. Mr. Klemp exercises excellent judgment, knows Bureau policy, and has performed his supervisory duties in an outstanding manner. He has the ability to get to the bottom of a problem with a minimum effort, makes excellent decisions and is a well-rounded Bureau Supervisor. Mr. Klemp possesses the necessary qualifications for development as an SAC on a long-range basis.

Edward S. Sanders

Mr. Sanders is the Secretary of the Interdepartmental Intelligence Conference and a liaison representative. He has been commended by the other members of the IIC for his excellent work as Secretary. He does excellent contact work and has acquired a good knowledge of Bureau policy. Mr. Sanders is ASAC material and has potentialities for development as an SAC on a long-range basis.

Warren L. Walsh

Mr. Walsh has been assigned to the Loyalty Section of the Security Division as a supervisor since February 25, 1948. He has been an excellent supervisor in all respects. He presents a very favorable personal appearance, is a most conscientious, hard working employee and has been outstanding in the supervision of his cases. Mr. Walsh is extremely thorough and his instructions to the field are clear and succinct. It has been particularly noted that Walsh has the ability to make his own decisions and carry out his responsibilities on his own initiative. Prior to assignment to the Loyalty Section, he had considerable field experience and is thoroughly conversant with various policies and phases of the Bureau's work. Mr. Walsh is a thorough, conscientious Bureau employee who has administrative and supervisory ability. It is felt he merits consideration on a long-range basis for development as an ASAC or SAC.

Samuel George Kiley

Mr. Riley began his Bureau career on June 17, 1940. He became a Special Agent on February 23, 1942, and has been assigned

to the Security Division since June 12, 1949. He consistently does an excellent job, handles an above average volume of work, and has the capability for handling any type of assignment. Mr. Riley presents an excellent personal appearance and has a dynamic driving personality. He has exhibited executive ability and based on his performance, I would recommend Mr. Riley for immediate consideration as an ASAC, and with further development, as an SAC.

Charles T. Brown, Jr.

Mr. Bown has been a supervisor in the Loyalty Section since March 23, 1948. He presents an excellent personal appearance and has an excellent personality. He is a mature, clear thinking and sound Bureau employee who has had considerable experience in the investigative field prior to assignment to the Seat of Government. Mr. Brown is emotionally stable and clearly exhibits poise and confidence. He has demonstrated that he is able to make his own decisions and have the same carried out. He operates generally with very little supervision. Mr. Brown would be excellent in his contacts with police or business officials. It is believed he should be considered for development on a long-range basis as an ASAC or SAC.

S. Drake Ellis

Mr. Ellis is a very personable Agent who makes an unusually favorable impression outside the Bureau. He is presently doing liaison work and has previously had experience on several supervisory desks in the Bureau. His knowledge of Bureau policy and procedures is excellent and I think he is an excellent prospect for development on a long-range basis as an ASAC or SAC.

Herman O. Bly

Mr. Bly is presently a supervisor on the Communist Party, USA Desk in the Internal Security Section. He has an outstanding knowledge of the operations of the Communist Party; has been responsible in the past for handling policy matters involving not only the Party, but the Internal Security Act of 1950. He is an excentionally hard worker, has initiative, aggressiveness, and is an above average organizer. Mr. Bly has an excellent personal appearance, a good personality and the ability to make friends and contacts. He could serve successfully in any Eureau office and is definitely capable of performing as an ASAC at this time. He possesses the necessary qualifications for development as a future SAC.

Earl F. Lane

Mr. Lane is performing supervisory duties on the Sabotage Desk, Internal Security Section. In this connection, he handles sabotage matters, labor infiltration cases, as well as violations of LMRA and the Federal Train Wreck Statute. He makes an excellent personal appearance, has tact, can handle personnel, and is an alert, intelligent Bureau supervisor. He is desirous of advancing himself in the Bureau's work and has an above average capacity to handle a heavy volume of cases. Mr. Lane has rapidly developed in the Bureau's service, knows how to meet people well, is a good contact man, and a tireless worker. Mr. Lane could successfuly act as an ASAC at this time and his potentialities for development as a future SAC are excellent.

Douglas M. Brown

Mr. Brown has been working in the Special Memoranda Unit, Correlation-Liaison Section, since June 10, 1949, and has acquired an excellent knowledge of the general work of the Bureau. He is unusually good at inspiring confidence in new supervisors and clerical employees. He goes about his work in a calm, methodical manner and has demonstrated executive ability. He will be utilized in starting the new Correlation Unit due to his ability to handle clerical personnel. Mr. Brown has potentialities for development as an ASAC and SAC on a long-range basis.

John Andrew Reilly

Mr. Reilly has been a supervisor in the Loyalty Section since February 21, 1948. He presents a very good personal appearance, has a very pleasant personality, and is serious and business-like in his work. He has an excellent knowledge of the Bureau's policies and procedures and has been a most competent supervisor. Prior to his assignment to the Loyalty Section, Reilly had considerable experience in Communist matters which has materially assisted him in his work in the Loyalty Section. Due to Reilly's knowledge of the work in the Loyalty Section, he has been used in connection with the outgoing signature mail and on occasions has acted as Relief Man for the Number One Man in the Loyalty Section. Reilly is a conscientious and competent Bureau supervisor and should be considered on a long-range basis for possible material as an ASAC or SAC.

Elmor F. Emrich

Mr. Emrich has been a Bureau Agent since September 24, 1934. He has been assigned to the Security Division since May, 1950. This Agent is easily an above average Bureau supervisor. His attitude is outstanding and he has sufficient background and ability to get results. He has demonstrated that he can make contacts among all types of persons and he is adaptable to varying situations. In my opinion he should be considered for development as an ASAC.

Arthur F. Baier -

Mr. Baier is presently assigned to the Internal Security Section where he is performing supervisory duties on the Communist Infiltration of Labor Desk. He makes an excellent personal appearance, has a businesslike, mature approach to Bureau problems and exercises unusually good judgment at all times. He has the necessary initiative, aggressiveness and calmness to operate in an administrative post. At this time, it is believed that Mr. Baier could successfully act as ASAC in one of the Bureau's smaller offices and should be considered on a long-range basis as a potential SAC.

George E. 1rwin

Mr. Irwin is presently a Relief Supervisor in the Internal Security Section. He is also assisting in the reading and approving of correspondence for the Section and in this connection assists in administration. He has a well-founded knowledge of Bureau policy and procedure and has had considerable field experience in a supervisory capacity. He makes a lice personal appearance, has a good personality, and dresses in excellent taste. Mr. Irwin is above average in intelligence, exercises good judgment, and is capable of handling personnel. He is a hard worker and has demonstrated that he possesses administrative ability. He possesses the necessary qualifications for development as an SAC on a long-range basis.

Mr. Davis has the necessary qualifications for future development as an SAC.

Carroll Doyle

Mr. Doyle is currently assigned to the Internal Security Section. He has had considerable experience in the Special Memoranda Unit and is presently handling matters involving the Plant Informant and American Legion Contact Programs. He has a broad knowledge of Bureau policy, is intelligent, and is regarded as one of the better Supervisors in the Section. He makes a good, substantial appearance,

and is alert and forceful in manner. Mr. Doyle approaches his work with enthusiasm, is a tireless worker, and is a clear, logical thinker. He has had considerable experience in police contact work and has also assisted in inspections. Unquestionably, based on his past performance, Mr. Plant has the ability to make contacts among all types of persons and is adaptable to all situations. He has administrative and executive ability. It is my opinion that he has the capability for consideration for development as an ASAC and eventually an SAC.

William Arthur Stigler

Mr. Stigler has been assigned to the Security Division since February 18, 1948. He makes an excellent personal appearance, is obviously intelligent, and in the discharge of his responsibilities has demonstrated sound practical judgment. He has a very favorable personality, being mature and of a serious temperament. Unquestionably, he has the ability, as demonstrated by his past performance, to make contacts among all types of persons. Mr. Stigler is adaptable to varying situations, and based on his past performance, I believe he has the capability for immediate consideration as an ASAC.

James R. Malley

Mr. Malley has been a Supervisor in the Internal Security Section since October 2, 1950. He is presently assisting in the handling of policy matters in connection with the Detcom Program. Agent Malley is an experienced Bureau employee, has a mature, business-like appearance, exercises excellent judgment and is a hard working Agent. He has a unique ability to get along with people. For a number of years, Agent Malley was Supervisor of the Communist Squad in the New York Office. He has had a wide variety of field experience, including assisting in a supervisory capacity in the Kansas City Office.

I feel that Mr. Malley is capable of performing duties as an ASAC at this time and is definitely SAC material. He is capable of handling the most complicated investigative matters.

Frederick C. Zinck

Mr. Zinck is presently performing supervisory duties in the Security Index Unit, Internal Security Section. He has an excellent knowledge of Bureau policy and presently requires minimum supervision and has the capacity for handling a tremendous volume of work. He makes a nice appearance, has a friendly disposition and possesses all of the necessary qualifications as a Bureau administrator. He is alert to protect the Bureau's interests at all times and in view of his wide experience as an investigator and supervisor could successfully operate as an ASAC at this time. Mr. Zinck possesses the necessary qualifications for future development as an SAC.

* * * * * * *

In addition to those listed above, there are a number of other supervisors in the Security Division who have recently been transferred to the Seat of Government and whose work I desire to observe further. Undoubtedly, some of these men will be qualified for advancement in the Bureau's service. In the event they merit consideration for further advancement, I will list them at a future date.

MEETING WITH GENERAL WALTER BEDELL SMITH, DIRECTOR, CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY

RECTOR, CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY

With reference to your contemplated meeting with General Walter Bedell Smith of the Central Intelligence Agency, there is attached a brief on matters which may arise for discussion. This brief covers possible proposals by General Smith together with suggested answers, possible issues he may raise and complaints he may make with suggested answers, and more important recent incidents involving non-cooperation on the part of the Central Intelligence Agency with the Bureau.

General Smith undoubtedly will again propose "desk-to-dest liaison," that is, informal relations on a working level between All his personnel and that of the FBI in Washington, D. C. He will probably also propose better general overall coordination between the two agencies and he may again propose a representative of the CIA joining the Interdepartmental Intelligence Conference.

With respect to "desk-to-desk lisison," it, of course, has existed in the past but has been coordinated through our own Lisison Desk. There is no objection in proper instances for supervisors of CIA and supervisors of the Bureau meeting to discuss cases of joint interest, but it is believed we should insist on our present system of controlling these contacts through our lisison representatives. We could, however, have something in the nature of a staff conference, which General Smith has mentioned, by having the Assistant Director in charge of the Domestic Intelligence Division and the Chiefs in charge of the Espionage and Internal Security Units meeting once every month or two with comparable representatives of CIA.

Concerning broad general coordination, it exists not only through our daily exchange of information by mail, teletype, and otherwise, but also by means of the Bureau's liaison representatives, contacts in the domestic and foreign field between our local representatives, and our membership with CIA on various coordinating committees. The real essence of the matter is that while they talk coordination, they by their actions (reflected in recent incidents) do everything to disrupt it. It is believed the mechanism for closer coordination already exists of the light comply with the spirit of such coordination and not give it just "lip service."

are presently assigned to the Liaison Unit baying liaison assign-/ ments, giving particular attention to their present job qualifica There is attached a list giving the names of the men assigned to the Liaison Unit with the dates they entered or duty in the Bureau, the dates they entered on duty as Supervisors at the Seat of Government and the dates they entered on duty in Itaison assignments in the Liaison Unit.

You will note there are presently nine Special Agent Supervisors who are performing liaison assignments in the Liaison Unit.
Three of them, Special Agent Supervisors R. R. XRoach, S. W. XReynolds and C. D. DeLoach, are presently in Grade GS-14, \$8800 per lannum. You will recdly that they were previously considered for promotion to Grade GS-14 on the basis of three years on liaison assignments.

Special Agent Supervisor E. S. Sanders, Grade GS-13, \$7600 per annum, entered on duty in the Liaisph Unit in November 1948 and he is presently Secretary of the Interdepartmental Intelligence Conference in addition to handling liaison with the Air Force and the National Security Council. Under the three-year rule he will be eligible for consideration for promotion to Grade GS-14 in November 1951. It should be noted, however, that Mr. Sanders from November 18, 1942 to November 180, 1943 was on SIS assignment in Mendoza, Argentina, and from May 28, 1944 to December 18, 1944 he was on SIS assignment in Bogota, Colombia. [NI feel Mr. Sanders should be given credit for liaison duties in connection with his SIS assignment and consequently I am submitting a separate memorandum recommending him for Grade GS-I4 at this time.

Special Agent Supervisor C. W. Bates, Grade GS-13, \$7600 per annum, entered on duty in a liaison assignment in February 1949 and he presently handles liaison assignments with the Atomic Energy Commission and the Coast Guard. Mr. Bates will be eligible for consideration for promotion to Grade GS-14 in February 1952 under the three-year rule. Bates has had no previous assignments on SIS which would qualify him for earlier consideration and consequently heswill be considered in February 1952. 149000 - 1369

Special Agent Supervisor M. W. Kuhrtz, Grade GS-13, \$8000 per annum, entered on duty in the Liaison Unit handling Liaison assignments on July 13, 1950 and he handles numerous committee assignments. Mr. Dn Kuhrtz will not be eligible for consideration for reallocation to Grade 35-14 on the basis of his Itaison assignments until July 1953. He has had no SIS experience to substitute for his liaison assignments and In

therefore feel he should be considered at the end of the three-year period which will be July 1953.

Special Agent Supervisor S. D. Ellis, Grade GS-12, \$6800 per Supervisor S. D. Ellis, Grade GS-12, \$6800 per Spresently handles liaison with the Air Force Security Agency. Mr. Ellis has been previously considered for Grade GS-13; however, he was passed over because of his low voluntary overtime record in October 1950. He is being reconsidered for reallocation to Grade GS-13 and a separate memorandum will be submitted on Ellis in this regard.

Special Agent Supervisor M. J. Lynch, Grade GS-13, \$7600 per annum, has been assigned to the Liaison Unit since July 31, 1950 and presently handles liaison assignments with the Army, the Office of the Secretary of Defense and special contacts. You will recall Lynch originally entered on duty as a Special Agent on October 19, 1936 and he voluntarily resigned July 12, 1946. He was reinstated on November 21, 1949. During his first period of assignment he was liaison officer with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police from May 3, 1942 until January 27, 1944 when he was designated Legal Attache in London, England, which latter position he occupied until August 27, 1945. Mr. Lynch with his over a year of liaison assignments in the Liaison Unit at the present time plus the time he was liaison officer with the RCMP and Legal Attache at London, England would have more than the required three years for reallocation to Grade GS-14 and accordingly a separate memorandum is being submitted recommending his reallocation at this time.

Special Agent Supervisor O. H. Bartlett, Grade GS-13, \$7800 per annum, has been assigned to the Lighton Unit with liaison assignments since January 17, 1951. He presently handles liaison assignments with the National Security Resources Board, Treasury agencies and miscellaneous agencies. Mr. Bartlett has had two periods of assignment in the Security Division, the first being from January 31, 1945 until July 29, 1946 when he was designated ASAC at New Haven. During this period of assignment of 12 years for a part of the time he did handle some liaison assignments but the specific period is difficult to determine. During Mr. Bartlett's second period of assignment in the Security Division beginning December 5, 1946 he acted as #1 Man of what was formerly called the Atomic Energy-Liaison Section and as such was not engaged in any liaison activities requiring any additional expenditures on his part. ing to assess Mr. Bartlett's liaison work it is noted in an efficiency report dated April 2, 1946 submitted by former section chief E. G. Fitch of the Liaison Section he stated that Bartlett had been assigned to visa and exit work and more recently had been assigned to the Name Check Unit of the Liaison Section where he had been engaging in checking names for a large number of Government agencies. In a special efficiency

report submitted under date of July 26, 1946 by Mr. Fitch, he stated that Bartlett had been assigned to the Liaison Section and during recent months had been engaged primarily in name check work for various Government agencies. Mr. Fitch also stated that Bartlett had in addition served in a liaison capacity from time to time and in such activities he demonstrated he possessed the tact, force, aggressiveness and enthusiasm vital to such work. It should be noted that on July 29, 1946 Bartlett was designated as ASAC at New Haven.

In view of the impossibility of definitely determining the extent of Bartlett's previous assignment to liaison work, I recommend that he be given credit for six months of liaison assignments in computing his three years for eligibility for consideration for promotion to Grade GS-14. Bartlett without any previous credit would be eligible for consideration for promotion to Grade GS-14 in January 1954. giving him the six months credit for previous liaison assignment, he will be considered in July 1953.



From 4/1/51 until 12/9/51, Mr. DeLoach was attached to the Liaison Unit of the Domestic Intelligence Division. Since 12/10/51, he has been serving as an Inspector in the Training and Inspection Division.

By letter of 5/29/51, the Director expressed his appreciation to Mr. DeLoach for arrangements which Mr. DeLoach had made relative to the use of Naval Medical facilities in several Field Divisions in connection with physical examinations of FBI Agent personnel. The Director pointed out this particular work performed is of tremendous value to the Bureau.

By letter of 6/26/51, Mr. DeLoach was commended for the excellent manner in which he carried out his assignment relative to an Intelligence Conference in Europe. The Director stated that the services rendered by Mr. DeLoach in the interests of the Bureau on this occasion are indeed deserving of special recognition and commendation.

By memorandum of 4/26/51, Mr. D. M. Ladd stated that Mr. DeLoach had demonstrated a capacity for contact work and sound thinking. He described Mr. DeLoach as ambitious; possessed of considerable initiative and general interest in the Bureau's activity; having an excellent knowledge of Bureau policy and recommending that DeLoach be considered on a long-range basis as ASAC material, with possibilities for development as an SAC.

Mr. DeLoach was designated an Inspector with no change in grade or salary, effective 10/14/51.

During a portion of the rating period Mr. DeLoach was assigned to liaison duties with the Central Intelligence Agency and discharged his responsibilities in a highly satisfactory way. He was unusually successful in becoming close to top officials in the Government agencies he handled and was, therefore, in a position to dominate the situation in connection with problems arising. Mr. DeLoach was described as aggressive, alert, ambitious and dependable. It was further stated that he had an excellent all-round knowledge of Bureau procedures and possessed administrative and executive ability.

As an Inspector in the Training and Inspection Division, his work has been very well handled indeed. He has personally inquired into a number of personnel situations under specific orders and supervision of the Director. I am informed that the Director was pleased with the handling of DeLoach. DeLoach has made a number of special surveys at the Seat of Government, with a view toward streamlining and each of these has been well received.

With regard to Field inspection experience, Mr. DeLoach assisted Inspector C. W. Stein during the last few days of the inspection of the Buffalo Office and assisted Mr. Stein in the first few days of the inspection of the New Haven Field Office. He has not yet had an opportunity to assist in the complete inspection of any office, nor has he inspected a Field Division on his own. VOLUNTARY OVERTIME TRAINING & INSPECTION DIVISION

During the month of March 1952, Inspector C. D. Deloach was reported as having 57 minutes per day voluntary overtime. Mr. Deloach erroneously neglected to record 2 hours overtime on March 10, 1952, when he was out of the city on a special assignment. He also erroneously neglected to record 42 hours and 3 hours overtime on March 28 and 29 respectively when he was out of the city on a special assignment. He should have recorded such overtime and he understands the importance of having registers properly reflect his efforts. In the future, he will use more care. With this additional overtime recorded. Mr. Deloach averaged 1 hour 21 minutes per day during the month of March. During February he averaged 3 hours 6 minutes overtime per day. During January, Mr. Deloach averaged 2 hours 10 minutes per day. During December 1951, he averaged 1 hour 20 minutes per day. Mr. Deloach reported to this Division for duty in December.

Inspector James S. Egan, during March 1952, averaged 20 minutes per day voluntary overtime. The matter of Inspector Egan's overtime has been previously brought to his attention. You will recall that Mr. Egan has advised that when he physically feels capable of performing overtime he will do so and cannot do so when he does not feel physically up to it.

Mr. William T. Berwanger, who ceased duty in March 1952, worked only 8 days during the month of March, and his overtime was only 25 minutes per day average. It will be recalled that while he was under resignation this man was emotionally upset because of family problems, and those problems brought about his resignation. During February, Mr. Berwanger worked 1 hour 7 minutes per day. During January, he worked 1 hour 45 minutes per day, whereas during December 1951, his overtime was 4 hours 20 minutes per day.

Mr. Horace B. Long, a former Inspector, worked 20 days during the month of March and his resignation had already been submitted. His daily overtime averaged 51 minutes, which was much lower than his previous overtime, which amounted to 3 hours 47 minutes per day in February, 3 hours 40 minutes per day in January, 3 hours 35 minutes per day in December 1951, and 4 hours 17 minutes per day in November 1951.

Employees of this Division will again be reminded of the importance of adequate record keeping and equitably sharing burdens.



Dear Mr. DeLoach:

I am very much displeased at the manner in which you reported to the Bureau certain inequalities in the sharing of overtime by some of the Agents of the Hobile Office. The information which you furnished by telephone indicated that the SAC had not called these inequalities to the attention of the Agents involved. The SAC has advised that he had done so, and it appears that you did not ascertain the full facts with respect to this situation during the inspection. Information furnished by you by telephone, therefore, was incomplete and inaccurate.

You did not comply fully with the requirements of Section 6, Paragraph 0, of the Inspectors' Manual in that you failed to obtain the full information required. It appears that you did not specifically obtain from the SAC information as to whether he had discussed the inequalities in overtime with the Agents involved and that you did not locate additional memoranda addressed to all the Agents of the office concerning overtime.

It is of paramount importance that an Inspector be accurate in all reports submitted to the Bureau. The findings of the Inspector should be clear and the action taken during the inspection should be such as to completely and clearly resolve all accretions that arise during the inspection.

The Bureau is embarrassed by your fatlure to ascertain all the facts and report them fully to the Bureau in your preliminary report made by telephone. It is mandatory that these fundamental and elementary requirements be met at all times in the future, and it should be unnecessary for the Bureau to address a letter of censure such as this to you in the future of because of such derelictions.

DeLoach says he meant to convey the impression that the SAC had not adequately called attention of these 3 Agents to inequitable overtime sharing which impression DeLoach gained from SAC Hawkins' reluctance to provide DeLoach with explanatory reasons without consulting the Agents. DeLoach advised SAC that the 3 Agents reesubstantially below the office average. SAC dawkins advised that one Agent was father of a new child and he would advise as to the reasons for the other two later in the week. DeLoach concluded that SAC Hawkins did not know the answer then and that he had not discussed the matter with the Agents. DeLoach states he did not specifically ask SAC Hawkins of the called low overtime to the attention of the Agents, but judged Hawkins had not done so because he appeared to be unacquainted with the reasons regarding these 3 men.

Findings by Mason 8-4-52

- Hawkins issued office memoranda to all Agents at the end of March, May and June, showing the average overtime per day for the whole office for each Agent, and also furnishing instructions about equally sharing the work load. (Hawkins to Mason by phone).
- 2. Hawkins advised telephonically that he specifically interviewed Agents low on overtime relative to their reasons. He interviewed viewed each of the 3 mentioned.
- Copies of the office memoranda appear in the overtime file of the office. Mr. DeLoach states he did not know of such memoranda, but does not believe notification to Agents by general memorandum for the whole office can be considered adequate notification.
- DeLoach in his telephone call should have pointed out the overtime of the 3 Agents, although inequitable, was higher than 1 hour.

Reference is made to your letter of August 6, 1952, indicating displeasure over the manner in which certain inequalities in the sharing of overtime by some Agents of the Mobile Office were reported to the Bureau.

I of course deeply regret any embarrassment caused the Bureau over this incident and have every intention of making certain that a like incident will not again occur. This is the first letter of censure I have received during my Bureau career and, needless to say, I feel quite keenly about this matter.

The Bureau is absolutely correct in stating that information was not specifically obtained from the Special Agent in Charge, Mobile, as to whether he had discussed the inequalities with the Agents involved. The SAC was specifically questioned as to the reasons why three out of forty-three Agents in his office had not equitably shared the overtime burden; When he replied that he did not know the reason and it would be necessary for him to contact the individual Agents. I assumed he had not previously discussed this matter with them. I, therefore, reported this fact in my inspection synopsis. My assumption now appears incorrect inasmuch as the Agent in Charge emphatically states he had discussed such inequalities with each individual Agent.

There will be no further presumptions on my part during any inspections i conduct. Facts will be obtained and mailed down as they should be.

I definitely appreciate your calling this matter to my attention, and I wish to assure you that if hard work and loyalty will prevent such future errors from occurring, such matters will have no opportunity to arise.

Approval has been received for inspections of Knoxville, Charlotte, Atlanta, and Mobile and New Orleans by Mr. DeLoach. On July 30th approval was received for Mr. DeLoach to commence an inspection of Norfolk on August 4th, this being necessitated by a change in other inspection plans.

Mr. DeLoach was brought in from Mobile in view of his having completed two full inspections on his own covering a period of his first three weeks as a field.

Inspector and it was believed desirable to have the opportunity to discuss with him his progress in these first assignments and to offer him the benefit of the Bureau's views as to his operations and give him a chance to ask questions at the Seat of Government concerning the various procedures encountered. This is necessary with any new Inspector and you will recall was the procedure followed in breaking in the other Inspectors.

The assignment to inspect Norfolk was advisable inasmuch as the SAC is on probation, has had an opportunity to work in Norfolk long enough for an inspection to reveal his progress or lack thereof, and Mr. DeLoach's inspecting Norfolk will result in minimum travel expense inasmuch as he was to come to Washington anyway.

The fare from Mobile to Washington is \$56.60, whereas the fare to Norfolk from Mobile was \$11.10\$ hamely, \$67.70. The fare from Washington to Norfolk is \$8.88, or, to express it differently, by routing Mr. DeLoach from Mobile through Washington there was a saving of \$2.22 in fare alone and a saving of \$20.25 in per diem. This saving should be considered as minor compared with the opportunity for better training and supervision afforded through Mr. DeLoach's being in Washington for a day and the opportunity to prepare for dictation on the Mobile inspection of \$367.367.

The first inspection conducted by Mr. DeLoach strictly on his own was New Orleans. He left Washington on Sunday, July 13th, arriving at New Orleans on Monday, July 14th, at 2:00 P.M., to commence the inspection.

The New Orleans inspection took approximately two weeks and during the week end in New Orleans Mr. DeLoach worked both Saturday and Sunday, as did the Inspection Party. The New Orleans report of administrative matters and the case write-ups have been received, read, and appear to be good.

Mr. DeLoach left New Orleans on Saturday, July 26th, at 10:40 A.M., and arrived in Mobile at 2:30 PM on the same day, with the same Aides that he had at New Orleans, and immediately commenced a full inspection which proceeded over the week end and was terminated on Friday, August 1st, Mr. DeLoach left Mobile at 12:05 AM, Saturday, August 2nd, arriving in Mashington at 6:00 AM, the same date.

It was initially planned that Mr. Mason would go over with Mr. DeLoach the results of his findings and offer constructive criticism during the course of the week end, and that Mr. DeLoach would be in Norfolk at the commencement of business Monday morning, August 4th, to start a full inspection. Stand-by orders to Aides had already been prepared.

Pr. DeLoach was unable to get out of Nobile earlier on Friday, August 1st, and it was therefore not possible for Wr. Nason to go over Mr. DeLoach's work with him during the week-end because at 11:00 AM on Saturday, August 2nd, when conversing with Mr. DeLoach, Mr. Mason was informed:

Mr. Mason went to the Teletype Room at the Bureau and appropriately adjusted the teletypes to the Aides before such wires were dispatched.

Ur. DeLoach spent Monday, August 4th, at the Seat of Government and several hours were devoted to constructive criticism of his work.

With regard to Mr. DeLoach's travel, it should be noted that he took a night coach from Mobile to Washington at a cost of \$56.60, which sum is \$11.10 cheaper than the fare from Mobile direct to Norfolk. The fare from Washington to Norfolk was \$8.88, or, to express it differently, the cost to the Government was \$2.22 less by routing Mr. DeLoach through Washington than it would have been for a direct trip from Mobile to Norfolk, and of course there was an additional saving of \$20.25 in per diem.

The overtime of Aides on the New Orleans and Mobile inspections was three hours and 45 minutes per day per aide. The overtime of Mr. DeLoach was four hours and 26 minutes per day.

If approved, Mr. DeLoach, who is now inspecting Norfolk, will next conduct a full inspection of Atlanta, then Knoxville, and then Charlotte. He is not expected back in Washington until Labor Day week-end, at which time he will commence five days annual leave previously approved by you.

ADDENDUM: (HHC:hls) The expeditious handling of inspections by the Inspector and Aides is desirable if the inspection is done thoroughly and proper results obtained. The inspection of the Mobile Office by Mr. DeLoach and six Aides in approximately one week is obviously a short time even including the preceding week end and 3 hours and 45 minutes average overtime for each member of the staff.

There has already developed one instance of lock of thoroughness in the Mobile inspection relative to overtime matters and a letter of censure to DeLoach has been recommended.

I find that there were no instructions issued that Mr. DeLoach finish the Mobile inspection within one week or by any specific date although Mr. Mason does "ride herd" to have the inspections expedited so as to reduce the cost of inspections and increase the production of the Inspectors.

DeLoach was ill with dysentery for the last few days of the Mobile inspection—he so informed me by phone before completing his inspection there. His unavailability Saturday due to this illness and due to his arrival by plane at 6:00 A.M. Saturday morning is, I feel/mitigation.

His future assignments and the assignments of all Inspectors will be carefully observed so as to endeavor to obtain maximum production.

I concur in the above recommendations that DeLoach continue his inspections itinerary as follows; Norfolk, began today; Atlanta; Knoxville; Charlotte and then return to Washington.

SUBJECT: INSPECTOR CARTHA D. DeLOACH

Inspector DeLoach has recently conducted the following field office inspections with satisfactory results on his part in each instance. Among his major accomplishments have been:

ATLANTA - His findings were apparently thorough and included reduction of automobiles, investigative delinquencies, inadequate security informant coverage, need for greater economy in communications, time spent in office by Agents excessive, and inadequate Klu Klux Klan informant coverage.

CHARLOTTE - Findings of DeLoach included need for reduction of 7 Agents, 2 stenos, 1 typist, 1 clerk, abolishment of one supervisory desk; 78.2% increase in communications costs past six months; inventory of property fouled up; excessive surplus property; number of administrative procedures needed adjusting; excessive delinquency in security work. As a result, the SAC was placed on probation.

NORFOLK - The SAC was continued on probation following this inspection because of inadequate progress in developing informants. Other delinquencies: frequent missing of applicant deadlines; errors of form too high; time spent in office by Agents too high.

KNOXVILLE - SAC was put on probation during this inspection because of inadequate security informant coverage; "paper accomplishments" in developing potential criminal informants; increase of communication costs 69% in six months; unsatisfactory administration of automobile matters affecting economy.

HOUSTON (recheck) This office was rechecked by DeLoach and the SAC was removed from probation for having cleared up delinquencies discovered in previous inspection.

PORTLAND - Report has just been received. DeLoach recommended reduction of Agent personnel by three; declared six clerical employees surplus, as well as two automobiles and eight references. Criminal informant program inadequate but favorable progress in last six months. The report indicates a thorough inspection with other findings satisfactory.

BUTTE - This inspection currently in progress. No report as yet received.

CONCLUSION Inspector DeLoath, vas defailletime inspector, has progressed very satisfactorily indeed and thoroughly understands his position and is working at it diligently.

RECOMMENDATION That favorable consideration be given to reallocating DeLoach to Grade GS-15. He was put in GS-143effective

Prior to Mr. DeLoach's departure for Boston on 11/9/52/ to conduct a full inspection, Mr. DeLoach inquired as to whether could come back to Mashington to spend Thanksgiving with his family if the Boston inspection was completed by that time. told Mr. DeLoach that he would be either in Boston on Thanksgiving conducting an inspection or he would be on some other inspection and that it was not at all likely that he would be in Washington on Thanksgiving Day.

On 11/21/52 (last Friday), while discussing another matter telephonically, DeLoach stated that he expected to conclude the Boston Inspection the day before Thanksgiving. He stated he would like to come to Washington-to-spend Thanksgiving with his family. I gave him the same answer as mentioned above. I am forwarding herewith (by CHECK - MCNEY ORDER) the sum of \$10, payable to the Assistant Director, Administrative Division, FBI, to be included in said fund. Payment will be made for death by self-destruction after the Agent has been a member of the fund for a continuous period of two years. It is understood and agreed that the sum tendered herewith is a voluntary, gratuitous contribution to said fund which I understand is to be administered in the following manner. The liability of the fund shall not under any circumstances exceed the amount of monies in the fund at the time any liability shall occur.

The Director of the FBI will appoint a committee which shall consider all matters pertaining to the acquisition, safe keeping and expending of said fund, which committee will recommend appropriate action to the Director in pertinent matters. The Assistant Director of the Administrative Division of the FBI shall receive all contributions and account for same to the Director. Upon the death of any Special Agent who is a member of said fund the appointed committee will consider the case and submit a recommendation to the Director as to its conclusions. Appropriate instructions will then be issued to the Assistant Director of the Administrative Division, directing him to pay to the designated beneficiary the sum of \$10,000. There is attached hereto the report of SA WILLIAM A. STEPHENSON dated 12/18/52 at Norfolk, in which circumstances surrounding the apprehension of sinderts in this case are set forth.

As is noted in this report, subjects have both served penitentiary// sentences. On 11/19/52 they were involved in an armed robbery in South Norfolk, Va. Unsuccessful attempts were made by local authorities to effect the apprehension of subjects. During the course of one of these attempts, considerable gunfire was involved. It was readily apparent that subjects knew they were being sought for by police authorities and had taken extensive efforts to avoid apprehension.

Information indicating the possible location of subjects in an uninhabited section of beach land on the Atlantic Ocean near the Virginia - North Carolina border was received shortly before noon on Sunday, 12/14/52. The initial information received indicated that the subjects were armed with shotguns and revolvers and were in possession of a stolen automobile. When this information was received a recheck inspection of the Norfolk Division was being concluded. In view of the potential danger involved in this matter, command of the raiding detail was taken by Inspector CARTHA D. DeLOACH and Inspector JOHN H. WILLIAMS. As the attached by the territory involved, the subjects being arrested personally by Inspector DeLOACH.

On the basis of the report and information furnished to me by ASAC EVANS and other Agents who participated in this raid, I feel that the Director may desire to give consideration to sending letters of commendation to the following

Inspector CARTHA D. DeLOACH, who assumed joint command with Inspector WILLIAMS of this raid. DeLOACH and WILLIAMS carefully evaluated the problem involved and saw to it that sufficient manpower and equipment were mobilized immediately, formulated a strong and feasible plan of operations, and personally led the raiding party to a successful conclusion.

2. Inspector JOHN H. WILLIAMS. In addition to the comments noted above, WILLIAMS suggested the use of a helicopter in determining the location of the fugitives. Because of the nature of the territory, there being numerous sand dunes in the 35-mile beachline behind which subjects could have remained secreted for many hours, the use of the helicopter was of primary importance in bringing this operation to a prompt and successful

- 3. SA JAMES S. SPRATT. Inasmuch as the raid took place in territory normally covered by SA SPRATT on a road trip basis, he was selected to participate in the raid. He offered many valuable suggestions to the commanding Inspectors predicated principally upon his knowledge of the territory. These suggestions were of material assistance in enabling the Inspectors to work out a feasible raid plan. In addition, SPRATT participated in the apprehension and handled himself in a most exemplary manner.
- 4. SA WILLIAM A. STEPHENSON. STEPHENSON also participated in the raid and operated in a very efficient manner. The case had been assigned to him for investigation and he through unusual application and investigative procedures had developed much detailed information concerning the subjects. Without the information which STEPHENSON had developed, the raid would have been much more difficult. His knowledge of the subjects, their relatives and associates, hangouts and habits was most pertinent to the planning and execution of this raid.

Capt. PHILLIP CREWS of the Virginia State Police was in the Norfolk Office on a social call when information concerning the location of the subjects was received. Inasmuch as the indicated location of subjects was within the territory under the command of Capt. CREWS district of the Virginia State Police, he was invited to accompany the raiding party. As you know, Capt. CREWS is a National Academy graduate and thus familiar with Bureau procedures, having received Bureau instruction relative to operations of this type. He participated in the raid in a very efficient manner. If therefore recommend that the Eureau address a letter to him expressing appreciation for his participation.

Copies of this letter are being designated for the Charlotte Division in order that that division may give consideration to recommending similar letters for officers from North Carolina who assisted in this matter.

For the Bureau's information I have already written to Admiral R. E. WOOD, Commandant of the Fifth U. S. Coast Guard District, expressing my appreciation for the assistance rendered by the Coast Guard. Under the circumstances, it is felt no further action is necessary with reference to the assistance furnished by the Coast Guard.

A separate letter is being submitted to the Bureau marked for attention of the Training and Inspection Division incorporating information relative to investigative techniques used in this matter as being of possible interest to that division in connection with training matters.

DeLoach will leave Boston 11:45 AM this morning, Mississippoint Fastern Airlines, arriving Savannah, 5:52 PM today.

The funeral will be 4 PM, 2/26/53. DeLoach will morning catch the first available plane out of Savannah, thereafter arriving in Boston sometime Friday, 2/27/53.

Meanwhile, ASAC Pershing Bell, who is accompanying DeLoach on the Boston inspection, will continue to guide the inspection until DeLoach returns.

Dear Mr. DeLocoh!

The Bureau is very much concerned indeed over the fact that you spent last week end in Washington without prior Bureau authority and while Special Agents assigned to you were in Boston without the supervision of an Inspector.

The Bureau is fully aware that it was necessary for you to take a train from Savannah to Washington on Priday, February 27th, inasmuch as there were no available air accommodations, and the Bureau understands that you did not plan in advance to remain over in Washington. However, you stayed in Washington from 9:30 a.m., Saturday, February 28th, until 4:50 a.m., Monday, March 2, 1953, without the Bureau's being aware of your location and presuning that you were in Boston.

I an certain that you understand the absorute importance of Inspectors keeping the Bureau fully advised of their plans and of securing approval to leave Aides unsupervised in one locality while the Inspector is physically elsewhere. Although you had secured permission to proceed to Georgia, you had no authority to spend two days in Nashington under the circumstances.

The Bureau will very carefully watch your progress in the future to determine whether this estuation was an instance of had judgment on your part or whether to related to a lack of proper interest in performing your assignments. It is the Bureau's desire to not have to bring such a matter as this to your attention again, at any time in the suture.

A wire was received from Inspector DeLoach, dispatched at Boston, March 2, 1953, advising that DeLoach returned to Boston at 8 a.m., March 2. Later in the day, Mason asked DeLoach why he had just arrived back in Boston on March 2, when it was anticipated that he would be back in Boston on February 27, which was the previous Friday. It will be recalled that DeLoach had left the Boston inspection for the purpose of attending the funeral of his Grandfather in Georgia.

DeLoach explained:

Because of extensive rain, his Grandfather's funeral was held on February 27 (Friday) rather than at 4 p.m., February 26, as scheduled. DeLoach was unable to get transportation out of Savannah until 10 p.m. Friday night. He took a train for Washington, D. C., arriving Saturday morning, February 28, at 9:30 a.m. He remained at his residence in Washington, apparently without contacting the Bureau until 4:50 a.m., Monday, March 2. Deloach explained his purpose in spending two days in Washington over the week end as the result of the above facts, plus his wife had a couple of legal documents which he wanted to help her handle and the fact that she was not feeling well. Mr. DeLoach also felt that he could not be of any advantage to the Inspector's Aides late Saturday or Sunday.

<u>CONCLUSION</u>, *

DeLoach had initially advised the Bureau, prior to his departure for Georgia, that he would be back in Boston sometime during the day. Friday. February 27. He left Georgia Friday, February 27th. He arrived in Washington on February 28th. He did not contact the Bureau, advising of his whereabouts and so far as the Bureau knew. DeLoach was still in Boston, whereas actually he was at his home in Washington. He got no clearance to leave his Aides in Boston, while he spent the week end at his home in Washington.

If DeLoach's wife had been sick for his presence was necessary in Washington and he had requested permission, undoubtedly permission would have been granted for him to be in was hington.

Was using name of Roy Miller, employed in electrical shop, had dyed hair black. Press release made at Seat of Government, Boston, and Charlotte. Memorandum to Attorney General Attached. Radiogram to all Special Agents in Charge sent.

RECOMMENDATION:

Mr. McGuire in Mr. Nichols's Office made a press release concerning subject's apprehension and Special Agent in Charge Marchessault, Boston, and Special Agent Eleazer, acting, Charlotte, were authorized to make local releases.

DETAILS:

On March 4, 1953, subject was added to the Bureau sten most wanted fugitives. On May 17, 1948, Miller, along with six other convicts, escaped from a North Carolina prison camp where he was serving a sentence for armed robbery. A complaint was filed at Charlotte, North Carolina, on June 23, 1948, charging Miller with the violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 408e in that he fled from the State of North Carolina to avoid

prosecution for the crime of armed robbery. On October 11, 1952, Identification Order 2378 was issued.

Earlier today the Boston Office advised that Leroy Miller, Hudson, New Hampshire, brother of subject, informed a Bureau Agent that he learned from his mother that subject was in Dover, New Hampshire. Special Agent in Charge Marchessault and Inspector DeLoach immediately proceeded to Dover.

Special Agent in Charge Marchessault advised telephonically tonight that at 11:20 p.m. he and Inspector DeLoach, along with a squad of Agents, apprehended the subject in Somersworth, New Hampshire. Investigation at Dover. New Hampshire, where subject has a wife and child, developed information that subject was employed at Somersworth. Proceeding there. Agents found the subject had been employed for the past three days at the Clairstott Electrical Company but was not working tonight. They learned that about three weeks ago subject started going out with a local girl. He had been using the name of Roy Miller. Agents proceeded to the girlfriend's house and upon entering saw subject disappear into the kitchen. They immediately entered the kitchen and apprehended subject there without incident. Subjectis girlfriend had dyed his hair, which was light brown, black and claims to have no knowledge whatsoever of his fugitive status. A brief interview before calling in developed information from subject that he has been living for the most part in various towns in New Hampshire since his escape and has been working in furniture and electrical Somersworth is sixty miles from Boston and Marchessault advised they were proceeding to Boston with the subject where he will be detained until he can be arraigned first thing in the morning.

The above information was furnished to Mr. McGuire in Mr. Nichols's Office who made a press release to the news service here in Washington, D. C. Marchesseult was authorized to make a press release as soon as the Bureau's press release had been made. Likewise, Special Agent Eleazer, acting in charge, Charlotte Office, was telephonically contacted and furnished with details concerning the apprehension and was instructed to make a local press release due to the interest in that area. This was cleared with Mr. McGuire.

During the entire rating period, Mr. DeLoach has served as a field inspector. His services have been very satisfactory indeed.

It was reported on 6/2/52, following an annual physical examination that Mr. DeLoach was recommended for ardous physical exertion and had no outstanding physical defects.

Mr. DeLoach commenced the first inspection in which he was the Inspector in Charge, on 7/14/52, when he started to inspect the New Orleans Division. Since then, all inspections in which Mr. DeLoach has participated have been conducted under Mr. DeLoach's personal supervision.

By letter of 8/6/52, it was necessary to call to the attention of Mr. DeLoach the fact that he had not tied down certain matters in an inspection of the Mobile Field Office.

Effective October 26, 1952, Mr. DeLoach was reallocated from Grade GS-14 to GS-15.

By letter of 12/29/52, Mr. DeLoach was commended for his effective on-the-spot supervision of the location and apprehension of Will Davis Beasley and another subject in a case involving Interstate Transportation of Stolen Motor Vehicle. The Director stated that Mr. DeLoach manifested excellent judgment in devising the successful plan of operations and personal courage in leading the raiding party which apprehended the subjects, known to be dangerous. The Director felt that Mr. DeLoach's performance on this occasion merited the highest commendation.

By letter of 3/5/52, the Director expressed his concern that Mr. DeLoach did not keep the Bureau advised of his whereabouts over a particular weekend while his aides were conducting an inspection of the Boston Office. Mr. DeLoach was in Washington but neglected to contact the Bureau. Mr. DeLoach reported that his aides in Boston knew of his whereabouts.

The Director stated that he was pleased with the aggressive leadership of Mr. DeLoach in the preliminary investigation and the splendid results in the apprehension of the subject testified to the excellent

During the entire rating period, Mr. DeLoach's services have been quite satisfactory indeed. Mr. DeLoach has progressed immensely and has demonstrated his capability to handle some of the more involved and complex inspections.

Mr. DeLoach has already inspected some of the larger offices such as Boston and Cleveland. He has handled several complex special inquiries involving personnel situations or unusual departures from Bureau regulations.

Mr. DeLoach has the ability to report his work clearly and concisely and his paper work is generally very well prepared. His work appears to be accurate, comprehensive, and thorough.

They had been dencing together. They went to the Normandy Inn and she stated that was partially intoxicated. She stated that he put his hand on her leg, played with her breasts, put his arm around her waist, kissed her several times and that she returned the kisses. This occured in a booth at the Normandy Inn. She stated that saked her to have sexual relations with him and to go to some hotel for this purpose. She stated that she refused on the basis of her religion and that he became "huffy" so that she left him and went home. STATEMENT OF SA
Inspector DeLoach interviewed SA on March 24, 1953, in Minneapolis where SA is on subpoena. SA furnished a signed statement in which he stated that he had gone to office party in June, 1952, which was held at the Sherman Hotel in Chicago and that he went to the party alone. He remained from about 6:30 P.M. until 11 or 11:30 P.M., during which time he had 3 or 4 beers and nothing else to drink. He stated he did not drink to excess and has never drunk to excess. He stated that he went straight home after the party alone and denies that he asked Mins for a date at any time and denies ever having been with her alone socially on any occasion. He states he did not go with her to any lounge or to the Normandy Inn and never kissed of fondled her.
He did state that on one occasion some months ago, he does not recall the exact date, Miss asked him, while at the office, where he stopped to drink beer after work because she might like to stop in there and see him sometime. He admitted that he had not reported this the SAC.
Inspector DeLoach established that while Miss claimed that she had been dancing at the party with SA that, in fact, there was no music or dancing at the party. DeLoach also interviewed a people who attended the party including, a clerical employee of more than 20 years! service in the sureau, and all of these persons recalled seeing SA at the party and stated that he was not drinking to excess and that his behavior was beyond reproach.
In discussing the matter with Inspector Deloach, SA stated that his uncle is at St. Paul, Minnesota, and that he was seriously considering discussing this matter with his uncle with a view to instituting a civil suit against Miss Deloach told him that the Bureau would take no part in such a suit and that he should remember that any information which came to his attention in connection with his Bureau employment was confidential.
ACTION TAKEN
DeLoach was authorized by Mr. Clegg on March 23, 1953, to advise Miss that she was being suspended effective immediately and he was instructed to take up her property and tell her not to return to work and that she would be advised of her status.

Following the Detroit inspection, Inspector DeLoach recommended a letter of commendation for the meritorious work performed in Detroit by Inspector's Aide Joseph P. McMahon of the Miss Gaady-Chicago Division. DeLoach dictated 15 Inspector's Aides personnel write-ups on Sunday 5/17/53, in Birmingham, Alabama. They were transcribed by Birmingham stenographer Tuesday, 5/19/53. At this time a letter of commendation was attached to the personnel write-up on McMahon, however, the letter of commendation was left undated. You noted on the yellow copy of the letter of commendation, "Why the delay in handling this?"

DeLoach dictated on the Detroit inspection all day Saturday and Sunday May 16 and 17, 1953. There were 26 case write-ups to dictate upon, in addition to the synopsis memorandum to you and the letter concerning the inspection to the Special Agent in Charge. Letters of censure and letters of commendation were left undated so that the date could be placed thereon when they are forwarded from the Bureau to the designated employees.

In view of the necessity of dictating a 34-page report regarding the mishandling of a case entitled "Arthur Autrey Butler, Interstate Transportation of Stolen Property" in Atlanta, and in view of the necessity of investigating an anonymous letter incident in the Birmingham Division, DeLoach did not finish dictation of the Detroit inspection until Wednesday, 5/27/53. At the same time he was completing the inspection of the Birmingham Office and had started the inspection of the Atlanta Office. The Detroit report was completely correlated and mailed to the Bureau as of the night of Thursday, 5/28/53. I have issued instructions to all Inspectors that they should not report inspection work on a piecemeal basis. The complete results, for purposes of proper coordination must be sent into the Bureau all at one time. There was therefore a necessity for delaying the forwarding of the Detroit inspection until all matters had been completed.

DeLoach has averaged approximately 4 hours per day overtime during May 1953. There has been no lagging in his inspection report. The above-mentioned delay is regrettable, however, under the circumstances it was unavoidable in this instance.

3-C: The person against whom the evidence found and seized is to be used must consent unless the premises are completely under the control of someone else who then may give the necessary consent.

3-D: Before conducting a search by consent, the owner or occupant of the premises must be clearly informed of his constitutional right not to have a search made without a search warrant and of his right to refuse to consent to the search.

3-F: Acquiescence merely, without clear consent, is mere submission in an orderly way to the demands of public officials. (U.S. vs. Olmstead 7 Fed. 2nd 716; U.S. vs. Marra 40 Fed. 2nd 271).
